Fawn Ridge water nixed

Ruidoso trustees rejected a proposed agreement with Fawn Ridge water users Tuesday night which would have settled the county subdivision's protest against three village water wells.

Village manager Jim Hine outlined the agreement which he and village attorney Lee Huckstep worked out with representatives of Fawn Ridge last week.

The agreement stipulated that the village would sell water to Fawn Ridge in the event that the subdivision's own wells could not produce, Hine said. The subdivision would pay costs of transport, which would involve a water main to tie in with the village system, and Fawn Ridge users would be charged the village water rate.

But the needs of Ruidoso water users would take precedence, Hine indicated.

"I don't see anything wrong with it," Hine said of the proposed agreement. "But, if we're experiencing dry conditions here, we certainly won't have any excess water to sell."

The Fawn Ridge protest against three water wells drilled last summer in the Gavilan Canyon area has been pending with the State Engineer for five months, Hine said. He was told by the state that a hearing will have to be held if the two parties cannot reach agreement, he added.

"They're a totally illegal water system," said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. "They have no basis under recognized water laws of the state of New Mexico and I think we're making a mistake to recognize them."

"I think we should ask for a hearing. They don't own a water right—they're totally illegal."

Davis suggested that the village demand of the State Engineer a report on how the subdivision wells are operating. "Let's

protest their wells," he said.

White said he understood that Fawn Ridge has "domestic wells," with three wells serving 63 users.

A motion to table the proposed agreement and instruct Hine to convey the trustees' position to Huckstep (who was not present) was made by Sherman Atwood and seconded by Frank Sayner.

Trustee Benny Coulston suggested that the fact be established, "Do they have any water rights?"

Hine said that he had been informed by the state that Fawn Ridge has "domestic water rights."

"That doesn't make them a valid water system," said Atwood. The matter was then tabled.

The proposed purchase of Ruidoso Natural Gas Company by the village was also discussed Tuesday night. Al Junge asked the trustees if they had reached a decision on whether the purchase, which will be decided by voters in the March 2 municipal election, is a good idea.

"I want the thinking of the people before I make up my mind," said White.

Junge suggested that the opinions of the trustees on the issue might be important to the voters.

"You're in a position to lead and I don't think you're doing it," Junge said. He indicated that a public meeting on the gas company question is in order. "I'm just trying to weigh the pros and cons of it," he said.

"I personally thought it was a good idea," said Davis of the proposed utility acquisition.

Hine said that he would attempt to contact engineer Willis Umholtz, who prepared the feasibility study which advocated the purchase, about a possible meeting.

Coulston and Sayner agreed after Tuesday's meeting that a public meeting on the

gas company is a good idea.

The trustees accepted a proposal from the Noon Lions Club to place wooden signs directing traffic to the hospital, police station, airport and village administrative center at 17 intersections around the village.

In conjunction with the direction signs program, explained Art Townsend and Bob Yeager, the Lions will be offering street number signs for sale to local businesses.

In other action, the trustees:

—Heard a report from fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy on plans to stencil dump-

sters with a warning against dumping fireplace ashes.

—Tabled a petition for annexation by J. O. and Rosemary Nelson of 5.05 acres near the intersection of Hull and Gavilan Canyon Roads.

—Approved a lot line variance for Lots 4 and 5, Block 9 in Midway Townsite for Orantia.

—Approved a replat of Lots 9 and 10, Block 7 in Cree Meadows for Beall and Biggerstaff.

—Approved a lot line variance for Lot 6, Block 6 in Town and Country North for James Temple.

School board concerned over Hilton Hotel

School board members Tuesday evening decided to send a letter to both the Village of Ruidoso and the village's Planning and Zoning Commission expressing concern about the possible construction of a Hilton Hotel in the vicinity of the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club.

"I recommend serious studying be done before Planning and Zoning decides," said board member Stormy Edwards. "It could create serious traffic problems with the White Mountain Schools and especially when the new high school is built."

The decision that will have to be made is if the area proposed for the hotel will be rezoned as commercial to accommodate the hotel.

Dave Parks, board president, discussed a letter from Burke/Collins Associates, consulting engineers, concerning cost estimates for a proposed sewer main to service the new Ruidoso High School.

The school has \$100,000 available to them for the construction of a lift station and a line to connect with the main sewer system. However, Parks said when more homes are built in the area surrounding the site of the new high school, such a system would have to be replaced with a main sewer line.

"If the city will pitch in and grant some money, a sewer line could be built down Hull Road and Gavilan Canyon and connect with Meander Drive," Parks said. In the future, this sewer line would service all of the area north of White Mountain Drive and Bog Springs.

"We've really appreciated the tremendous cooperation from the city, the county, and our state representatives John Mer-shon and John Bigbee," Parks said, in relation to the planning of the new high school. No decision will be made on the sewer main question for a "year or so," Parks said, as construction has not even begun.

High school principal Tom Hansen reported on price quotes for core drilling to begin soon at the site of the new high school.

Twelve holes of 25 foot depth each will cost approximately \$4,000. Quotes from three firms ranged in price from \$3,600 to \$5,550, according to Hansen.

Because the ground in which the holes

will be drilled is rocky, the chosen company will drill to a point of resistance, even if it is not quite 25 foot in depth, he said.

Two bids on school matters were accepted at the meeting.

An \$8,208 bid from Service Contractors for new exit vestibules at Nob Hill Elementary School was approved.

Also accepted was a \$3,490 bid from Pertee Parks and Associates for fleet insurance for Ruidoso Municipal School District vehicles.

Jim Dickinson, high school math and computer instructor, presented a request for two new computers to be used in his classes. Currently, the class of eight students is using one computer.

"In November, these kids outran the computer. They are writing programs that are beyond the capacity of the present computer," Dickinson said.

The type of computers Dickinson is requesting will have the capacity for storing business files and data. "It can handle most everything the kids will come up with," Dickinson said.

Board members approved the calling for bids on the computers and related equipment.

Other business at the board meeting included:

—Approval of hiring Carlton Chimal as driver of the Johnson-O'Malley van and approval of hiring DeAun Berry as regular driver of an additional bus. In addition, the board accepted the resignation of Mary Murphy, Nob Hill Elementary School library aide.

—Approved a budget increase of \$2,978 for Title IV, B, which is used in the purchase of special aids for teaching in the schools.

—Approved a budget increase for textbooks.

—Approved the rehiring of Pat Valliant as superintendent of the Ruidoso Municipal Schools for a two-year contract. The vote took place after an executive session.

—Report from Valliant that a new school bus has been purchased and is in use in the school system.

The Board of Education will meet next at the Administration Office at 7:30 p.m., February 9.

County facing legal action on road closing

A complaint filed against Lincoln County June 26 was the subject of an executive session at Tuesday's Lincoln County Commissioners' meeting.

The complaint, filed by ranch owner Robert W. Litzman, concerns the closing of a county road located near the junction of state highways 37 and 380, east of Carrizozo. The road crosses Litzman's land (O-Bar-O Ranch).

According to county officials, Litzman has locked the gate to that road twice and the county has cut the lock both times. The county road provides access to some public lands at the base of Carrizo Peak, which is causing some of the controversy in the case.

Action, regarding the litigation taking place, during the executive session has not been revealed at this time.

A bid for \$5,032.40 from B & S Fire was accepted for the renovation of a fire truck at Fort Stanton. Also accepted was a \$4,200 bid from Canyon Culvert for corrugated steel pipe.

Bids were also opened for fire equipment and supplies requested by Fort Stanton and Nogal Fire Departments. A \$6,945.31 bid was approved from Thunderbird Sales.

Betty Fields, representing the town of Carrizozo, presented a request to commissioners to authorize the county road department to repair streets under a cooperative agreement. The project would entail paving of 9.6 miles of street in the town.

"We'll have to do some research," said Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight, commission chairman. It was requested that a representative from the state Highway Department and Guy Henley, county road superintendent, meet soon to discuss the matter.

"I would like to see Carrizozo put the project up for bids and if it's too expensive, then come back," said commissioner John Allen Hightower.

Commissioners also discussed designing a county logo to be used in a government building in Washington D.C. Plans are to have some ideas ready at the next commissioner's meeting.

Other commission business included:

—Appointment of Hightower as chairman of Lincoln Historic Review Board to replace Sterling Spencer who has resigned.

—Approval of designated holidays for 1982.

—Approval of an amendment of personnel policy to use state personnel policies regarding sick leave.

—Approval of a quitclaim deed which will revert land back to original owner Fred La May. It had been set aside for a landfill and was not used as such within a period of three years, as subscribed.

—Rejected a budget increase requested by county treasurer Kay Allison.

—Presentation of the fiscal year 1982-83 school bus route program for commissioners' review.

—Commissioners approval of a new

Downs trustees plan hearings

A call for a hearing concerning a canopy liquor license at Ruidoso Downs Race Track incited interest at the Ruidoso Downs trustees' meeting Monday night.

Currently, such a license is held by the Ruidoso Jockey Club. When the Ruidoso Downs track is closed, the license is used by Ruidoso Sunland. The license owner wants to designate the license used at Sunland Park as number 390 with the license used at Ruidoso Downs to be number c-390-1.

A public hearing on the matter is set for the February 8 trustees' meeting, to be at-

tended by a representative of the state Alcohol and Beverage Control Commission.

"It's up to the governing board to decide (on the issue)," said village clerk Virginia Spall.

Trustees also set March 1 as the date to begin tapping sewer lines in the village.

Six applications were received for the position of village sewer inspector. It was decided the trustees will meet to discuss applications and will announce their selection at the February 22 meeting.

Spall said the Regional Wastewater System's sewage treatment plant is expected to be in operation by June 1, and that the system for billing is now being

completed. Village attorney Richard Parsons submitted a letter of consent to the trustees approving the transfer of funds from un-budgeted funds to budgeted funds, to retire a loan the village has with the State Board of Finance.

The trustees adopted Ordinance 82 establishing increased compensation for the mayor and trustees, effective March 15. The compensation will amount to \$225 per meeting for the mayor, not to exceed \$450 per month. The trustees will receive \$25 per meeting, for a maximum of four meetings a month.

Bids on a used fire truck for the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department were announced. Out of three submitted, a \$4,200 bid from Sierra Blanca Motors was accepted by the trustees for a 1979 Ford

F250 4x4 three-quarter ton pick up. The bid acceptance is subject to approval by the State Fire Marshal.

In response to a water right use protest presented by Tony Parker at the trustees' last meeting, a hearing date will be set on the issue. Parker wants to sell 10 acre feet of water from his property in Ruidoso Downs to a subdivision in the Gavilan Canyon area. The trustees are protesting the sale and will invite a representative of the State Engineer's office to attend the water right use hearing.

The trustees approved Resolution 82-1 requesting a budget revision. The revision is necessary in order for the village to hire a new street department employee.

Trustees will next meet January 25 at 7 p.m., in council chambers at Ruidoso Downs Municipal Hall.

With municipal elections scheduled for March 2 in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan, residents of the three communities are reminded that January 19 is the last day to register to vote.

Persons can register at the administrative offices of the municipalities until 5 p.m., Tuesday, January 19. In Ruidoso, voters can also register at local banks.

Candidates for municipal office desiring to have their names appear on the election ballots must file between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., on Tuesday, January 26, at the municipal offices in their communi-

ty. Ruidoso voters will elect a mayor, two trustees and a municipal judge, all for four-year terms. Ruidosians will also vote on the proposed acquisition of Ruidoso Natural Gas Company by the village and an \$8 million general obligation bond issue for improvements to the village water system.

In Ruidoso Downs, voters will elect a mayor, two trustees and a municipal judge, all to four-year terms.

Capitan voters will elect a mayor and two village councilmen, all to four-year terms.

Chamber plans to operate booth at Dallas sports, vacation show

The Lodger's Tax Committee Wednesday approved a request by Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth for \$10,954.40, to sponsor a Ruidoso hospitality booth at the Southwest Sports and Vacation Show in Dallas, Texas from March 10 through 14.

"The Chamber for some years has been toying with the idea of going to another area to promote Ruidoso. Our first big opportunity is coming up," Jungbluth said. "The Dallas show is one of the largest of its kind in the country."

The Chamber of Commerce investigated the idea thoroughly by contacting other Chambers in the state and the region, and

the response from vacation oriented people was very positive, said Jungbluth. Included in the \$10,954.40 are the costs for 50,000 new Ruidoso brochures, an expanded motel and restaurant guide, expenses for the trip to Dallas and the cost of preparing a sophisticated audio-visual presentation.

Only some of the brochures and guides will go to Dallas, so the actual cost of the promotion is approximately \$7,000. These funds are outside of the previously budgeted expenditures for the Chamber from the lodger's tax. The surplus brochures and guides will serve the community's future visitors.

"We're going to set up a first class booth," Jungbluth said as he explained his

innovative approach to drawing newcomers to Ruidoso. "This is definitely advantageous for the area," said tax committee chairman Ed Hyman, and the other members agreed that the Southwest Sports and Vacation Show is an excellent opportunity to reach as many people as possible in one shot.

On behalf of the New Mexico Winter Special Olympics that will be held at the Eagle Creek Ski Area later this month, Jungbluth requested \$320 for two banners welcoming the Special Olympics participants to Ruidoso. Since the Special Olympics Committee plans on making the event an annual happening, the banners will be stored by the Chamber and used next year also. The tax committee

unanimously approved the money.

The committee also granted Jungbluth's request for funds to help defray the costs connected with tourist promotion in the second quarter, starting in October and ending in December, 1981. The total for that three month period is \$1,176.07, and the total for the year to date is \$3,968.19, which is a little more than one third of the total budget set up for the Chamber of Lodger's tax funds.

The committee's final act was to approve \$500 toward the \$3,188.94 bill submitted to the Village of Ruidoso by a Midland, Texas, contractor to install the lighting on the village's Christmas trees, the community tree at the "Y" and the two at the Ruidoso Public Library.

lease agreement at Four Seasons Mall for county offices located there.

Approval of an extension letter of credit for Shauna Downs subdivision. Representatives from Rust Tractor Company, Albuquerque, attended the meeting to present a study they conducted for municipal and county governments. The study outlined five options available in the purchase of heavy equipment.

The first was the bid and buy method in which the governing body will bid for the item and usually, take the low bid.

The second plan is basically the same, however, it adds a clause, asking the bidder to guarantee how much the piece of equipment will be worth in four or five years.

The third plan, a total cost bid includes a guarantee of buying back the piece of equipment while also guaranteeing a certain limit on the cost of maintenance.

Plan four is considered a lease-purchase contract. This states that the governing body may terminate the lease at any time and also guarantees that the leaseholder may purchase the machinery at the end of the lease period.

Plan five is basically a rent agreement in which the municipality or county may use the piece of machinery for a short while, then turn it over to the lending company.

Commissioners discussed pay increases within the County Road Department. Because specific increases are not part of the current budget, commissioners denied increases except for those connected with a job promotion.

Also brought up at the meeting was the Ruidoso School District's proposal for the county to build a road for the new high school. McKnight expressed an unwillingness to obligate the county to build such a road.

"I'm not against schools or building a road to the school house. I just think someone else ought to build the road," McKnight said.

"They're not pushing anybody. If you don't want to do it, don't," said commissioner Ben Hall. More discussion will take place on the issue in a future meeting.

County Commission will meet next February 9, 10 at a.m., in commission chambers at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Redistricting proposals would make many changes

Proposals on legislative redistricting being considered late Wednesday afternoon in the state House and Senate in Santa Fe would, if adopted, make substantial changes in the areas served by legislators in Lincoln, Otero and adjoining counties.

State Representative John Bigbee, District 50, said to The News late Wednesday afternoon that the plan under consideration in the House would include Lincoln County, excluding the two precincts in Carrizozo and the Corona precinct.

Under this plan, the district replacing 50 would include Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, Angus, Capitan, the Hondo Valley, the Hope area in Chaves County and a portion of Artesia.

Bigbee said that Carrizozo would be in-

cluded with Cloudcroft and Alamogordo, in the district now represented by House member John Mershon, under the proposal being aired Wednesday, and that Corona would be added to DeBaca County and the northern portion of Chaves county, in a new district.

In Senate redistricting, Senator Charley Lee said to The News this morning that the boundaries of Senate District 39 would, under a proposal made Wednesday, include Alamogordo, the east side of Otero County from the Texas line through the Cloudcroft area, Mescalero, about two-thirds of Socorro County and all of Lincoln County. Lee said La Luz and Tularosa, presently in District 39, would be included in another district.

Skiing safety stressed to Lodgers Association

Members of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association received a demonstration on proper ski boot binding adjustment, skiing safety and rental tips from ski shop operator Buddy Carter at Tuesday's association meeting.

"We are a father image to many of our lodgers. They come to us with a lot of questions about skiing and ski rentals. We need to be able to advise them and give them a sure and safe referral," said association president Clark Carpenter. Association members were advised not to get involved with actual ski equipment adjustments. However, a general knowledge of skis and how they work, Carpenter said, may come in handy to help a bewildered motel customer.

Carter told the motel and hotel owners that most injuries occur due to too much speed. "30 percent of the people who get hurt are people who ski too fast and lose control," said Carter. He said that knowing how to stop is the most important factor in preventing speed from getting out of control. "Encourage people to take lessons the first time out because ski school will teach you how to stop," Carter said.

Carter told the Lodgers Association that people who have only skied a couple of times should not even venture up to the upper mountain. In addition, Carter advised association members to tell patrons to take their skis inside at night to prevent ski rip-offs from their lodging establishments.

In other business, the Lodgers Association welcomed Horseshoe Courts, owned and operated by A. J. and Wanda Amos, and White Mountain Cabins, run by Jerry and Lesa Wereman, into the association's membership. Also, incorporation papers were filed in Santa Fe on December 11, 1981, giving the Lodgers Association New Mexico corporate status.

Carpenter announced that 1,000 fireplace information posters are available now to lodge owners. Stressing the importance of the posters use, Carpenter said that if people will pay heed to them, fires could be prevented and money saved. Extra fireplace information sheets will be available to the public at the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, compliments of the Lodgers Association.

Morris and his wife, Karen, have three children, Todd, Michelle and Danielle, who attend Ruidoso public schools.

Alto man shot in right knee

A Ruidoso man was "resting comfortably" in Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Thursday morning suffering from gunshot wounds, in the area of the right knee, sustained in a Wednesday morning shooting incident, according to a spokesman for the Lincoln County Sheriff's office.

Steve Spall, 30, of Ruidoso, was admitted to the hospital Wednesday morning. He was transported to the hospital from a residence in Alto where the shooting reportedly took place.

Susan Bishop, 31, Ruidoso, was to face first appearance proceedings in Magistrate Court today on a charge of aggravated battery in connection with the shooting incident, a spokesman for the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department said.

The spokesman said that the shooting took place between 10 and 10:15 a.m., Wednesday.

Al Junge enters race for trustee

J. A. "Al" Junge Tuesday announced his intention to file for the position of village trustee in the March 2 municipal election.

He has lived in Ruidoso the past six years, moving here from Ft. Worth, Texas, following his retirement after 35 years in the insurance business. "Having the same interest and concern with the future of Ruidoso as the majority of its citizens," Sayer said, "I am seeking reelection to a second term as your village trustee."


"Water and streets are always a major topic. More planning for additional water has been accomplished in the last four years than ever before, and the present board has devised some definite methods of implementation of these plans.

'Tennis bubble' operating at IMG features latest in safety designs

The Ruidoso area has its first indoor tennis facility with the recent opening of the "tennis bubble" at the Inn of the Mountain Gods (IMG).

Two tennis courts are enclosed by the 45-foot-tall (four-and-a-half story) vinyl polyester bubble. Floor area is 14,800 square feet.

The bubble is an air-supported struc-

ture. A blower motor constantly blows air into the structure, maintaining enough air pressure to keep it inflated.

Other features are a snow load indicator, which automatically increases heat to melt off snow, and a wind speed gauge, which increases air pressure to stabilize the structure in high winds.

Greater air pressure inside than out also

has the effect of making playing conditions similar to those found at lower altitudes, explained IMG tennis pro Herman Burkstaller. The Chevron Laykold court surface also contributes to a slower bounce.

The indoor tennis facility is available to guests at the Inn and members of the IMG Racquet Club, Burkstaller said.



Big weekend for Warrior cagers

It will be a busy weekend for Ruidoso High School's varsity basketball team. Tomorrow night the Warriors will be trying to avenge their loss to New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) in the first game of the season. Ruidoso hosts NMMI in a 7:30 p.m. contest. Saturday night the Warriors host Truth or Consequences in a district 3-AAA contest, also at 7:30 p.m. The varsity game will be preceded by the girls' junior varsity and varsity contests. In the earlier game between Ruidoso and NMMI the Colts took a fairly easy

52-36 victory on their home court. However, the Warriors' offense has improved considerably since then and they should make a tough game for the Colts. "I think we can defeat them now," said Ruidoso head coach Barry Nelson. "We tried a lot of different things against NMMI last time but now we know more about what we can or can't do. We'll be ready for them." Ruidoso has gotten balanced scoring from its starting five but has had problems getting consistent scoring over an entire

contest. In the 83-69 district loss to Silver City Saturday night the Warriors held a 32-25 lead over the Colts towards the end of the second quarter but were unable to keep their fast break going and started missing a lot of shots. Bill Richardson has been the Warriors' leading scorer and rebounder this season. The 6-4 senior center has averaged better than 17 points a contest. Guards Scott Neal, Wade Wilson and Marc Delhotal have also been scoring in doubles figures consistently the past month. 6-3 junior

Steve Sluder has done well rebounding and Pete Garcia has been a playmaker. But NMMI is a fine team. The Colts are ranked eighth in the Associated Press AAA state poll with a 5-2 record and are a well-disciplined squad. NMMI can play both a fast break offense and a patterned offense equally effectively. The Colts, a AAA division team, have beaten both AA and AAA squads this season. Truth or Consequences has been erratic like Ruidoso, T or C lost several starters from last season and has been rebuilding this year. However, they are a dark horse candidate for district honors.

NOTES: Deming is the top ranked district 3-AAA team in this week's Associated Press poll. The Wildcats are 9-2 and rated second in the state behind Bernalillo. Silver City is given honorable mention status. Hobbs, which saw its 49-game winning streak ended last week by Eisenhower of Lawton, Oklahoma, is the top ranked team in the state AAAA poll. Undeclared Sandia of Albuquerque (9-0) is ranked second and Farmington is rated third. Two more Albuquerque teams, El Dorado and Highland, are ranked fourth and fifth respectively.

SANTA FE — So the Legislature has come to the Capital City.

You probably couldn't care less. If you're like most New Mexicans (more than 50 percent of the population), you wouldn't name your State Senator and State Representative if your life depended on it.

And we certainly wouldn't ask you anything embarrassing like the number of the precinct you live in.

(A measurable percentage of people who live in our state cannot with certainty identify the name of the county in which they live.)

But the fact that you don't care about things up here doesn't mean events won't take place.

The Legislature will, sometime, though maybe not right this week, redesignate the districts from which we select our representatives to Congress.

(Oh, come on. Surely you know what Congress is...)

We'll have three Congresspersons now, instead of just two. That means the lawmakers get to redistrict the state.

The great burden of cases of such redistricting which have been considered by the courts will force them to make the three districts roughly equal in the number of voters they contain.

The burden of being a member of a political party will force them to try to achieve this in a way which will be most beneficial to the party to which they belong.

Will Democrats, who are humiliatingly aware that our state, so rife with members of their party, now has no Congressional representatives with a D after their names, work hard to carve out a district which will more or less guarantee them a winner?

If they don't, they are not true

Democrats.

And will Republicans be equally intent on keeping total control of the state's delegation to Washington, which means guaranteeing that no Democrats will be elected?

If they don't, their souls will burn in Purgatory.

So that's the contest we have up here at the time these words are written: how to achieve "balance" and "fairness" and all like that, while still taking care of the political group to which each of us belongs.

That's not so easy.

But compared to redesignating the districts from which members of the Legislature will run, it's a piece of cake.

In that particular exercise, everyone who is voting is also directly involved. Talk about conflict of interest.

The possibilities for horse trading here are endless — and we don't even have any horses.

("Hey, if you give me precinct 16 and you ask Larry to give you precinct 45, each of us will come out with something like we ought to have." Etc., etc., etc. This can go on for many weeks before we reach a final solution.)

And all that's just a warm-up.

It isn't till that phase is over that we get to the real work of the year. That's the "regular" session, the one where lawmakers get to vote on budgets for the coming year.

What will the piece de resistance there be?

How to dispose of the state's surplus money.

Blood will flow in the aisles over that little matter. Bruce King and his advisors will be going one way, while the legislators will be off in a direction 180 degrees away from that.

Stay tuned. This is going to get better...

This is a direct quote from an article written by a staff writer Tim Palmer of the Ruidoso News in the 1-7-82 issue of the paper.

Palmer's article was well written, to the point, and covered Chino's talk in detail outlining some of the problems still faced by the Indians in their everyday lives.

I have been present at several meetings where Wendell Chino was the speaker. The tone of his talks remain unchanged — he is still fighting for the rights and dignity of his people.

For this he is to be admired. After reading Tim Palmer's article I turned the page to read an editorial written jointly by the editor and publisher of the Ruidoso News. The only similarity between the Palmer article and the editorial was the fact that both appeared in the

same newspaper.

The "vitriolic" statements made by Wendell Chino were the views of the editor — to say that his recalling the instance of a salesclerk's (in Alamogordo) impolite handling of a purchase he made was a simple recollection and not caustic in any way. Neither were there repeated attacks on Ruidoso or on its citizens.

Building good will and consideration for each other is the only option open to the citizens of Ruidoso and to the Tribe. To do otherwise is self defeating and leads to a continuation of tension and ill will.

We both need each other and criticism of the Tribal Leader as pointed out by the editorial leads to this final question, "Have you an alternate proposal which will accomplish better results than continuing efforts to promote good will and a better understanding?"



Fritz Frazzini recalls Sleepy Ned's exploits

It's hard to believe it's been over 20 years since Sleepy Ned was ripping up stakes competition at Sunland Park. He was a horse with personality. He ran frequently, won regularly, and licked about anything they threw at him. Still, he wasn't your typical stakes winner. It was the way he did it, stumbling along during the post parade, almost falling into a snooze, then exploding into a fireball of speed when the starting gates opened. This reporter, who saw Sleepy Ned at his best some two decades ago, will always remember those high powered get-aways. Usually, it was Sleepy Ned a half dozen lengths in front at the turn for home. More times than not, he kept a second punch in reserve in case his foes thought he might come up short. Sleepy Ned defeated just about every handicap sprinter of any repute in the southwest during the early 1960s. The list includes such bigwigs as Mr. Vale, Long Ears, Winsham Lad, Quick Thrust, Mutuality — and on and on. Once at Ruidoso, he did the impossible — he licked Mr. Vale in a rout. The late Reggie Cornell (who went on to train for Calumet Stables) was once asked to name the toughest sprinter he'd ever faced. Cornell replied: "A horse called Sleepy Ned, who ran in those small New Mexico tracks." Images of Sleepy Ned blasting over the Sunland turf came to mind a few weeks

ago when Sunland staged the first running of the Sleepy Ned Handicap. It was also a poignant time for Fritz Frazzini, the man who had spotted Sleepy Ned in a California sale and purchased him for \$1,000. You get a horse like that only once in a lifetime," Fritz said. "It was like having a kid who becomes a football star. I was crazy about that horse. But he was also my meal ticket. Whenever I was busted, I'd just put Sleepy Ned in a race, then go down and collect my check. "When I was racing him, both my mother and father died. At one point, my father was in the hospital for four months. Those were tough times. It was Sleepy Ned who paid the bills. He kept us going. "He had a mean streak in him, but I didn't mind. He tore two or three shirts off my back. But that was okay. He could have ripped a shirt off me every day and it wouldn't have bothered me. I thought too much of that horse." In recent years, Fritz has been pretty much another face in the crowd of trainers plugging away at Sunland Park, Ruidoso Downs and the State Fair. But 20 years ago, when Sleepy Ned was in his prime, Fritz Frazzini was one of the best known trainers in this part of the country. Originally from Durango, Colorado, Fritz began his track career as a small time owner on the Colorado bush track circuit. He was also a Trailways Bus driver, and from 1945 to 1957, he wore a steady path between Durango and Albuquerque. "The fellow who was training my horses for me was taking me for everything I

had," Fritz said. "I decided if I was going to go broke, I might as well do it on my own." So Fritz hung up his Trailways cap and became an owner-trainer of racehorses. From the way things have turned out, I would have been better off to have stayed with the bus company," he said jokingly. Anyway, it was 24 years ago this month when Fritz got the idea of going to the Pomona Sale in California. He spotted Sleepy Ned in the sale, but wasn't much impressed with him. As one horse after another went through the ring, Fritz wasn't able to launch a winning bid. Finally, there was only one horse left — Sleepy Ned. "I decided I didn't want to go home empty-handed. So I looked at Sleepy Ned, and I looked at the catalogue, and decided to buy him, no matter what," Fritz said. As a three-year-old, Sleepy Ned began his racing career at Ruidoso Downs, and was no world beater. It took four or five tries to beat maidens. As a four-year-old, he came to life, winning the Governor's Handicap at Ruidoso. Just when Fritz was beginning to think he had it made, Sleepy Ned was shipped to Pomona, where he broke down. As a five-year-old, Sleepy Ned was returned to Sunland Park — and became a sensation. That was in the 1961-62 meeting. As Fritz recalls, Sleepy Ned won seven straight races that season, beginning in cheap \$2,500 claiming company and working his way up to handicap competition. "His calling card was that big lead down the backstretch, but he could turn it on a second time at the middle of the turn," Fritz said. "During the post parade, between the paddock and the odds board, he'd stumble and almost fall asleep. He didn't give a damn. He was just lazy. He never had a case of nerves. You couldn't shake him up. But once they put him in the starting gate, it was a different story. He was all business." Fritz isn't shy when it comes to placing Sleepy Ned in the Southwest honor roll. He said, "He was the greatest horse ever to walk on this track, bar none. At the time, he could have beaten any horse anywhere at six furlongs. Barry Whitehead, director of racing at Del Mar, begged me to take my horse out there. But everytime he called, I told him, 'I'm just a farm boy. If I go out there, they'll take everything I've got.'" So Sleepy Ned stayed on his home court, and when he was retired in 1968, his record showed 24 wins — about 20 of them in allowance and handicap races. He also set the Sunland five one-half furlong record (since broken) at 1:032-5 seconds. "He earned about \$65,000. By today's standard, that's about \$150,000. If I hadn't gelded him, there's no telling what he would have been worth as a sire," Fritz said. Sleepy Ned was sent to Colorado to spend his golden years in comfort. In 1968, he and two other horses somehow slipped out of their enclosure, wandered onto a highway, and were struck. The horses and the motorist were killed. "Sleepy Ned's death hit me pretty hard," Fritz said.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

SAVANNAH LARK, one of the all-time races won leaders in quarter horse history, has checked into Sunland Park. Owned by Malcolm Mators of Magdalena, the eleven-year-old gelding has recorded 33 lifetime victories. He started by breaking his maiden on February 24, 1973, at L.I.F.E. Downs in Laredo, Texas. His last win was taking an 870 yard chase on Christmas Day in 1981 at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles. He's also won at Sunland Park, Ruidoso Downs, the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque and the Downs at Santa Fe. He's trained by H. Don Farris.

ROGER MOORE, an executive with the Larry Mahan Boot Company, presented a pair of Larry Mahan Boots to the champions from the recent 29-day fall racing season at Sunland Park. Veteran Larry Byers received his boots for outdistancing the jockeys, three trainers, Bob Arnett, Fred Danley and Cliff Lambert, who each saddled 11 victors during the fall season, received a pair of boots.

LEON'S DREAM, a six-year-old Bold Frank gelding, scored his third straight victory at Sunland Park when he drew out for a half-length victory in Saturday's 11th race, a starter allowance at 1 1/16th miles. He started his streak by capturing a nose decision on November 15 and then tallied again by a nose on December 5. Willie Lovell rode him on Saturday while Victor Escobar handled the chores for his first two wins. Trained by Jim Curry, he's owned by Becky Lee Johnson of Enid, Oklahoma, and Freddy L. Meier of Canon, Oklahoma.

APPRENTICE RIDERS dominated Friday's featured race, a six-furlong jaunt for three-year-olds running for a \$15,000 claiming price. Kenny Roller guided Arabian Outlaw to a one and a half length verdict, while apprentices Casey Lambert and Nicky Wilson guided Feather Step to third place.

BROTHERS F. O. Martinez and Orlando Martinez Jr., captured consecutive races on Friday's program. F. O. won the sixth race on Sweet Ann Brandana (\$10.00) at one mile and then, his younger brother, Orlando Jr., took the seventh aboard Zazette (\$44.40) at six furlongs.

WILLIE LOVELL scored two victories on each day's program last weekend in somewhat of an oddity. On Friday, he tied with Bet N Money (\$7.80) in the fifth race, Mr. B. and A. (\$15.80) in the eighth. On Saturday, he won aboard Posh Affair (\$8.40) in the fourth and on Leon's Dream (\$3.60) in the 11th. Curry trains Leon's Dream while Don Farris handles Posh Affair. On Sunday, the veteran rider won with Title One (\$3.40) who dead-headed the Honor Jet in the third race and then tied on Songman's Pride (\$19.00) in the

tenth. Curry trains Songman's Pride and Lewis Germany conditions Title One.

SHECKY WHO, a five-year-old Sheeky Greene gelding, raced to the season's fastest 870 yard clocking when he was timed in :45.20 while winning Saturday's sixth race by three and three-fourth lengths. He was ridden by Larry Byers for trainer Clifton Dean. Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, is the owner. The previous best 870 yard reading was a :45.30 by Holy-Roula on December 20, the final day of the fall season.

THE FIRST DEAD HEAT during the 55-day spring season occurred in Sunday's third race, a 350 yard scamper for three-year-old and older quarter horses running for a \$5,000 claiming price. Honor Jet, the \$1.80-1 favorite ridden by Marty Leach, finished on even terms with Title One, a \$7.50 choice, ridden by Willie Lovell. Honor Jet paid \$3.40 to win while Title One returned \$6.40 to win.

TRIGGER, an eight-year-old First Balcony gelding, posted his fourth straight triumph at Sunland Park when he scored a head verdict in Sunday's sixth race, a five and a half furlong chase for horses running for a \$5,000 claiming price. He began by winning a \$2,000 claiming race on October 15, won another \$2,000 race on November 27 and then defeated \$4,000 claiming horses on December 12. He paid \$6.40 to win as the favorite. Ridden by regular rider John Cushing, he's owned and trained by William A. Thompson of Ruidoso Downs.

JOCKEY JOE MARTINEZ and his wife, Susie, are the proud parents of a baby girl, Natona Michelle, who was born on Thursday. She weighed six pounds, four ounces.

TRAINER CHUCK MATTOX and jockey Vickie Smallwood combined to win two consecutive races on Sunday's program. They started with Onerionranger, who won the eighth race for owners Chuck and Lorann Mattox of El Paso, Texas. Then they took the featured \$6,375 Pan Zareta Stakes with John's Mary, who is owned by Molly B. Kelly and Lorann Mattox of El Paso. Onerionranger, the third favorite, paid \$11.80 to win while John's Mary, returned \$4.60 as the \$1.30-1 favorite.

SUNLAND'S MUTUEL handle continues on a record course with the daily average now pegged at \$300,949 after 35 days of the 1981-82 season. Last year at this point, the average was \$242,247. The current figure is a gain of 24.23 percent. The current wagering-per-race average of \$27,574 is a gain of 24.23 percent.



Johu's Mary wins Pan Zareta

Johu's Mary, a filly who sputtered in the recent \$51,910 Fall Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park, made her first start against three-year-old competition in Sunday's Pan Zareta Stakes. And came

through with a rousing victory.

Johu's Mary looked like a beaten horse at the top of the stretch, but she loomed up powerfully at the wire and won by a half-

The Pan Zareta champ, who toured the six furlongs in a windy 1:11 1/5 seconds, is owned by Mollie B. Kelly and Lorann Mattox of El Paso, Texas. Chuck Mattox is the trainer.

The Pan Zareta is restricted to three-year-old fillies. A purse of \$6,375 was up for grabs, of which \$3,825 went to the winner. Sunland patrons weren't caught off-guard by Johu's Mary and turned her loose as the betting favorite. She returned \$4.60, \$3.60 and \$2.40.

Picture Point, a 24-1 outsider handled by Joe Ober, held on for a game second and handed out hefty mutual payoffs of \$14.20 and \$6. The filly is owned by W. D. Edgar and Jems Wilson of Blanchard, Oklahoma. Third went to Northern Martin (\$3), ridden by Betty Harless for Carlos Bennen of Nogales, Arizona.

Johu's Mary staged her last outing in the Fall Futurity on December 6, but was unable to muster a challenge as an 18-1 outsider, and flattened out. She ran 12th, 14 lengths away from the winner. So she finished up her juvenile year with a 1-2-1 record from five spins, good for modest earnings of less than \$2,000.

But it was a different story in the Pan Zareta, as Johu's Mary was content to let the front runners (Picture Point and Air Suisse) burn themselves out in a fruitless battle. But as the field turned for home, it seemed Johu's Mary was lagging too far behind. She was in seventh place.

Jockey Smallwood asked Johu's Mary to get rolling at the head of the lane, and the filly gradually picked up steam. In the final yards, Picture Point appeared ready to pull victory out of the fire. But that dream vanished as Johu's Mary closed with a brilliant run. She nabbed the lead about two or three jumps from the finish.

Air Suisse, who was in the thick of it during most of the battle, had to settle for fourth.

HORNERO OVERTOOK tiring Bold Drill deep in the stretch to win Saturday's featured race at Sunland Park.

The five-year-old Good Manners horse closed strongly in the middle of the track

to post a 1 1/2 length victory over Bold Drill in the mile chase for older allowance horses.

Ridden by apprentice Rebecca Thompson, Hornero was well back of the pacesetter Bold Drill, who led by as many as seventh lengths down the backstretch. But he started moving in the stretch and passed Bold Drill and the 4-5 favorite Double B Express.

In running a 1:38 for the mile, Hornero posted his first win in his first start this season for trainer William A. Thompson. Overlooked by the public, Hornero returned \$35.80, \$19.00 and \$6.20.

He earned \$2,400 from the \$4,000 purse for owner Vernon J. Byrd and Roland J. Vaughn of Odessa, Texas.

Bold Drill, who was better than 50-1 at the mutual windows, hung on gamely for second under Joe Holmes. He paid \$27.40 and \$9.00 for second. Double B Express, Sunland Park's horse-of-the-meet for the recently completed fall season, paid \$2.20 for running third under apprentice jockey Casey Lambert.

The quinella returned \$395.80.

ARABIAN OUTLAW rallied from far back to win going away in Friday's featured race at Sunland Park.

The Arabian Law gelding was held back of the early leaders in this six furlong sprint for three-year-olds running for a claiming price of \$15,000. Ridden by apprentice Kenny Roller, he started his big move nearing the far turn.

Pacesetter Easter Honor led almost throughout until Arabian Outlaw passed him deep in the stretch.

Arabian Outlaw, who defeated Easter Honor by one and one-half lengths, ran the six furlongs in 1:11 3/5. He earned \$1,740 for owners William and Anna Ruth Gilliam. He's trained by Harold E. Nolen.

As the 7-5 wagering choice, Arabian Outlaw paid \$4.80, \$3.40 and \$2.80. Easter Honor, ridden by apprentice Casey Lambert, ran second and returned mutuals of \$3.40 and \$2.80. Feather Step, ridden by Nicky Wilson, showed and paid \$17.00.

The victory was Arabian Outlaw's second in six lifetime appearances.



The arrival of the birds like a d armada really surprised me.

azed up at them slack-jawed when my ner hissed "Don't move, get your face n". He left it to me to figure out how I to get my face down without moving. birds circled high and left. That turn- it to be the pattern for the morning.

Many times silent cranes checked out our decoys and then moved on to another field. Finally, about 10 a.m., we had a small group sail right overhead. They were low enough too! Dick and I both got a bird. We decided that was enough for that morning. We creaked out of the ditch just as cold as frogs.

Dick plucked the feathers from the bird's breastbone and showed me how to fillet out the breast. He said that his favorite crane dish was bite sized crane that was wrapped in bacon and then grilled outside.

As we headed for town I thought that "insidious" was not the right word for crane. "Challenging" and "fun" are closer.

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
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

FIRST FIRE APPARATUS






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Wilderness Wisdom

QUESTION—Last year I was fortunate enough to bag a white tailed deer during the season. It was my first and I looked forward to several venison dinners. I'm not sure why, but the meat tends to be tough. The flavor is fine, but I just can't cook it tender.

I really thought I did everything right. The deer was almost immediately field dressed, and when I arrived home in late afternoon, it was skinned, cut up, packaged and froze. I took particular care to insure that it was handled properly and kept clean.

Some of my friends say the carcass should have been hung several days to age, others say this is not so. Does this have any bearing on tenderness? What other steps should I have taken? Vic D., Virginia

ANSWER—Hanging the carcass for a few days will definitely make the meat more tender, just as it will beef. The only problem is the weather is many times unfavorable for hanging outside. The carcass should not be exposed to high daytime temperatures or flies. Wrapping it in cheesecloth or similar material will help protect it from flies. Ideally, the meat should be aged at 38 to 42 degrees for a week or so. Lower temperatures will, of course, freeze the meat while higher temperatures may cause it to spoil. The reason for aging is to allow natural processes to break down the fibers of the meat making it more tender.

If you know someone who has a walk-in meat cooler where you can hang it for a week, your problems are over. Many butcher shops will provide this service for a small fee. In my own case, I start up an old refrigerator that is used primarily for this purpose.

There are other reasons why venison may be tough. One can hardly expect an ancient buck to be as tender as his younger kin. Maybe such a deer would need marinating before cooking, even though it was properly aged. The actual cooking can also render a piece of choice venison into little better than a shoe sole. Most uninitiated cooks will overcook venison. Remember, too, that venison does not contain as much fat as beef, therefore, it tends to be dryer. Do whatever you can to preserve its natural juices. If you choose to grind part of it into hamburger, mix in enough beef suet to make up about one third of the total volume. It may take a little experience before you hit the right combinations, but it's well worth it.

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
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
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


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Whooper decline forecast

Four whooping crane chicks were raised in wild and captive flocks in 1981, a year which may see a slight population decline despite intensive research to improve their numbers.

The highlight of this year's research is a first time effort by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and the Canadian Wildlife Service to radio track birds of the 12, trackers reported one of the chicks hit a power line in north Saskatchewan and died several days later of apparent spinal injuries.

While researchers expressed regret over the loss of the young crane, they emphasized that had the flock not been tracked, the fate of the bird probably would have remained a mystery. Service scientists stress that the more they learn about mortalities, the better prepared they are to prevent them. Previous collisions with power lines have been documented in Kansas a number of years ago as well as in the Grays Lake National Wildlife Refuge.

Power companies in problem areas have cooperated with researchers to solve the problem, sometimes by attaching brightly colored markers to the lines.

The Wood Buffalo flock produced three

chicks this year during an exceptionally dry nesting season that saw increased egg losses to predatory animals. In August, brush fires swept through the forests and marshes, eventually burning over some 70 percent of the cranes' nesting habitat. However, the chicks escaped the ravaged area with their parents and the rest of the flock.

All three chicks in the Wood Buffalo Park flock were captured and fitted with radio transmitters by United States and Canadian researchers several weeks before fire ignited the habitat. The first chick tracked out of the breeding grounds died in Saskatchewan after hitting a power line while making a feeding flight from a pond area to barley fields with its parents. An aerial and ground team then concentrated on tracking a second family group which took an even 30 days making the trip between their breeding grounds and wintering area. After spending nearly two weeks feeding in barley and wheat fields in agricultural southern Saskatchewan, the group made a rather steady migration to Texas. The longest daily flight was 470 miles when the birds left northeastern Montana with a favoring tailwind and

overflew North and South Dakota at altitudes up to 9,000 feet to an overnight stop near Valentine, Nebraska. Twelve overnight (roost) locations were used in the migration flight. They roosted in shallow rivers or streams six nights, stock ponds four nights, a small lake one night, and a temporary rainwater pond one night. The one consistent habitat need appeared to be a roost site with water.

As the international team was monitoring the migration of the main flock, other researchers recaptured a captive reared female whooper set free last spring at Grays Lake National Wildlife Refuge in Idaho. The female had been transported to Idaho from the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center near Washington, D. C., as a possible mate for a lone male raised by sandhill crane surrogate parents. However, scientists felt the two whoopers did not establish a strong enough pair bond to guarantee that the male would lead the female on the 870 mile migration route to Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge in New Mexico.

The Grays Lake foster flock was started in 1975 to establish a second wild flock of whooping cranes, to build the birds'

population and to eventually ensure separate migratory flocks. This would diminish the chance of a natural disaster eradicating the species in the wild. The sandhill cranes in Idaho hatch "spare" whooping crane eggs taken from nests at Wood Buffalo Park and from a captive breeding flock at the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center. A recent shortage of suitable female whoopers prompted scientists to introduce the female raised at Patuxent into the foster flock. Since the recaptured Patuxent female made a good adjustment to the wild, researchers hope to repeat the experiment next year.

Despite the two surviving chicks raised at Wood Buffalo Park and one raised in captivity at Patuxent, scientists say the whooping crane population has not increased, as several mortalities are known. A complete count will be conducted when migration ends in December, and will probably show a slight decline. However, the bird that has become a symbol of all endangered species has been making a gradual comeback. In 1960, whoopers numbered nearly 100 in the wild and 24 in captivity, in contrast to a dismal low of 15 in 1941, when many considered the cranes' extinction to be inevitable.

Buy condos or co-ops?

Thinking about buying a cooperative or a condominium? If you are, then you should know how the two differ, and what effect those differences have on your ability to borrow and on the tax incentives they might offer.

According to the New Mexico Society of Certified Public Accountants (CPA), tax incentives are the main reason why condos and co-ops are the fastest growing segment of the housing industry. But taking advantage of the tax opportunities entails some careful decision making on your part.

The main difference, CPAs say, is that with condos, you buy the condo unit itself whether it's an apartment, townhouse or separate residence. But, when you buy a co-op, you only buy shares in the cooperative managing the building. That difference affects your financing and tax deductions.

Buying a condominium is less complicated than paying for a co-op. For example, with a condo you figure out your down payment, then apply for a mortgage to cover the balance. Those interest payments and any property tax you pay, are tax-deductible, the same as if you owned a house.

Because you don't actually purchase a co-op, you don't have a mortgage. A portion of your monthly payments is applied to the mortgage interest and tax payments of the co-op. The percentage of monthly payments applied to these expenses is tax-deductible. If you take out a personal loan, often at several points higher than a regular mortgage, the loan interest constitutes another tax deduction.

An alternative method of financing is often available for both co-op and condo buyers from developers willing to help you finance in order to sell units. The money they use, CPAs say, is loaned to them by the project's sponsor, such as a bank, pension fund, or private company. Low interest rates they advertise are possible, in part, because they are not paying an individual's interest rate and, sometimes, because neither the rates nor the mortgage are guaranteed for extended periods of time.

Prospective owners should understand what's contained in a financing agreement. If you finance through a developer, note the term of the mortgage and the length of the guarantee. What will you be

paying in five or so years? Today it might be necessary to borrow money at an adjustable mortgage rate or to take a short-term loan expecting to refinance in a few years. Remember, proper planning requires knowing how much money is due when.

Another aspect of the financing to investigate is tax deductibility. The percentage of your monthly payment that is deductible depends upon what percentage constitutes interest, your tax bracket, and how the money is used. If the seller mentions that a certain percentage is tax-deductible, ask if that is contingent on your tax bracket or because so much of the payment is interest and taxes. CPAs warn against depending on a tax deduction to finance your payments unless you are certain of the figures.

Your second monthly payment, in addition to mortgage and taxes, covers maintenance of community property. In a condominium, that may include tennis courts, a swimming pool, a community

center, security or other necessities such as garbage collection. How high this maintenance fee runs depends on how much community property there is and how well it was built. Shoddy construction could result in increased maintenance fees later. If your developer has built other condominiums, ask those tenants if their maintenance fees have risen and why. Maintenance fees are not tax-deductible.

A co-op also requires a maintenance fee for the care of the units. Because all these bills must be paid, the entire maintenance amount must be collected. If one tenant defaults, other tenants might be required to meet the difference. In theory, a single tenant, as a shareholder, could be responsible for the entire bill. Thus, the financial solvency of fellow tenants is important.


Buying a co-op or a condo, CPAs say, like buying a house, entails more than mortgage payments and taxes. Before signing a contract, find out what other payments you have to make.

Average American ate 1,402 pounds of food during 1981

The average American ate 1,402 pounds of food last year, but paid proportionately less for it than in 1960, according to Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food and nutrition specialist at New Mexico State University.

Consumer spending went up 319 percent between 1960 and 1980, Johnson said, but the money spent on food went up less than many other items in the family's budget.

In 1960, about 20 cents of a family's disposable income went for food, but food took only 16 percent of the disposable dollar in 1980, she said.

In the past 20 years, shifts in buying patterns have affected many products. Consumption of citrus juice, for example, went up 21 percent from 40 quarts per capita in 1960 to 51.2 quarts last year.

Beef consumption per capita was also up 21 percent, from 64.3 pounds to 78.1 pounds per person per year. Beef consumption has

been dropping, however, since 1976 when it hit a record 95.7 pounds per person.

Chicken consumption went up even more, going from 27.8 pounds per person in 1960 to 51.2 pounds per person in 1980. That's an 84 percent increase.

Cheese was the biggest gainer of all. Cheese consumption was 8.3 pounds per person in 1960 and hit 17.9 pounds per person in 1980, an increase of 116 percent.

Some foods lost ground over the past two decades. Potatoes dropped from 80.4 pounds per person in 1960 to 44.4 pounds in 1980, a loss of 45 percent. Egg consumption declined 17 percent, and fluid milk consumption dropped from 290 pounds per person in 1960 to 243 pounds per person last year.

Other losers were sugar, down 12 percent, and fresh peaches, down 38 percent.

Openings in visual arts residencies

Professional visual artists, craftsmen, and folk artists are needed to work in schools around the State next year in the popular Artists-in-Schools program administered by the New Mexico Arts Division. The deadline for applications is March 15.

The Artists-in-Schools visual arts program includes working professional painters, sculptors, photographers, potters, weavers, jewelers, furniture makers, and folk artists working in New Mexico's traditional multi-cultural arts and crafts areas. There are openings for the full school year, for one semester, for special short-term residencies, and for brief guest artist assignments throughout the 1982-83 school year.

The Artist-in-Schools is not a teacher, nor is any teaching certificate required for these positions. The artist works with students and their teachers, and with parents and community groups, giving them an understanding of the artistic experience. During a long-term residency the professional artist spends half of his time working in the school and the community, and half his time on his own creative activities. The compensation is \$1,200 per month.

Previous applicants must submit new applications in order to be considered for the 1982-83 Artists-in-Schools positions. Qualified professional visual artists, craftsmen, and folk artists may obtain further information and application forms from the New Mexico Arts Division, 113 Lincoln Ave., Santa Fe 87501.
