TWO SNIDOW PRINTS OFFERED FOR SALE

Festival fund drive launched


The Ruidoso Summer Festival, Incorporated, (RSFI) is preparing for another summer spectacular music program, and to launch the 1982 season's action, they're making prints of two of Gordon Snidow's widely acclaimed works available to the public.

RSFI board member Jeanie Whitwam said that Snidow's "Eyein' the Catch Hand" and "First Messenger from the Rain God" are being sold to help promote this year's Ruidoso Summer Festival. Prices for the limited edition prints are \$125 for "Eyein' the Catch Hand" and \$200 for "First Messenger."

However, Whitwam said that prices will probably go up as more prints are taken out of circulation, so she cautions art lovers to "buy now!" There are less than one hundred of the original 200 prints of "First Messenger" left, and only about 200 "Eyein' the Catch Hand" remain, said Whitwam.

It was in 1980 that Snidow donated the copyright for "Eyein' the Catch Hand," to RSFI. It is a watercolor that won a gold medal at the 1979 Cowboy Artists Show. 450 signed and numbered editions were made available to generate funds for the very successful first Summer Festival in Ruidoso.

Last year, John and Tina Hall of Ruidoso loaned to RSFI their original painting of "First Messenger from the Rain God." 200 limited editions of Snidow's painting of a young Indian dancer watching the first rain drop roll off his umbrella were printed on 100 percent rag paper to finance the second summer music festival.

January's building tops \$1.4 million

Nearly \$1.5 million worth of building permits were issued by the Village of Ruidoso during January, putting 1982 construction well ahead of last year's record pace.

The \$1,494,440 in permits for January compares to the figure of \$604,708 for January of 1981. Value of new construction, which is figured at a \$20 per square foot, topped \$23 million for all of 1981.

Permits are issued for Ruidoso and the area within five miles of the village, including Ruidoso Downs, by building inspector Don Hendricks.

A total of 26 permits were issued last month. Of that number, 19 were for single family dwellings (SFDs), one was for a residential addition, two were for commercial buildings, one was for a commercial addition and three were for condominium projects.

Area firemen extremely busy

Thursday proved to be a busy day for area firefighters.

The first of three fires that day totally destroyed a house under construction in Alto. Alto Bonito Fire Department responded to the call at 4:25 a.m., said chief Howard Puckett.

They arrived on the scene to find the nearly completed house west of the twelfth fairway of the golf course completely in flames. The firemen's concern was to keep the blaze from spreading, Puckett said, and in this they were successful.

Cause of the blaze was not determined, said Puckett. The state Fire Marshal's Office is expected to investigate. Puckett thanked the Ruidoso Fire

Department for its assistance and commended the Alto Bonito volunteers for a "tremendous turnout."

Ruidoso firemen got their next call at 9:44 a.m., Thursday. Live fireplace ashes put in a dumpster caused a sanitation truck to catch fire at White Mountain School.

At 11:45 a.m., firemen were called out once again—this time to battle a house fire near the Elks Lodge off Highway 70.

The firemen then got a two day respite, but they were out again Sunday night. A heater at one of the Storybook Cabins caused insulation to catch fire. Ruidoso firemen controlled the problem with limited damage to the structure.

Gas company purchase question meeting set

Howard Sleeper, company manager, said to The News that "no disclosures of company operations will be made at this meeting. Any release of such information will be made to the trustees after they indicate an interest in discussing the purchase."

Airport action is continuing

Former Texas Governor John Connally has indicated he will support the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) in its efforts to obtain a regional airport, the commission was told Thursday.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Norman Wheeler, who represents his community on the commission, informed fellow SBAC members of the development.

Wheeler said that he had spoken with Ralph Wayne of Houston, Texas, a representative of Connally, Ben Barnes and Joe McDermott, developers of the planned Triple Crown Condominiums on the site of the Chaparral Motor Hotel.

According to Wayne, said Wheeler, Connally and Barnes are very interested in the proposed airport and Connally has offered "to use whatever political influence he has around the country" to further the project.

The two developers are expected in Ruidoso later this month, Wheeler said. SBAC chairman Fred Heckman of Ruidoso suggested that Connally might contact the offices of Secretary of Interior James Watt and Senator Harrison Schmitt on behalf of the airport project.

Wheeler said that he would relay the

suggestion.

Heckman had earlier informed the meeting that a contract for a National Academy of Sciences study on the proposed airport site at Fort Stanton Mesa has cleared the Interior Department's legal department. He reported that Schmitt's office told him an intention to award the contract must be published in the Federal Register.

At the end of a 60 day period which began January 1, Heckman added, the contract for the study can be awarded. The purpose of the study is to determine whether the airport and an agricultural experimental station operated by New Mexico State University can successfully coexist on the Fort Stanton Mesa site.

The site is on federal land managed by the Bureau of Land Management, which is an agency of the Department of Interior.

Heckman said that he hopes the commission will have copies of the contract for the study by the next SBAC meeting in early March.

Lincoln County manager Bill Billingsley and county commissioner Ben Hall were also present at Thursday's meeting.

Fire guts local residence

Ruidoso firemen fought a house fire for over an hour and a half Thursday that gut-

ted a home located at mile marker 261, across Highway 70 from the Elk's Lodge. Fire Marshal Darryl Waltrip said he suspects the accidental fire was caused by a gas floor furnace in a corner bedroom.

The fire was reported at 11 a.m., by Lincoln County sheriff's deputy John McIntyre, who said he saw smoke coming out of the house and believed it to be a structural fire. "The way it was smoking, I thought it

could be saved," he said. Units 2,3,5 and 6 of the Ruidoso Fire Department (RFD) responded immediately and were on the scene shortly after 11 a.m. Also responding to the fire call were Ruidoso Police, Village Water Department, Texas-New Mexico Power Company and emergency medical personnel. No one was injured.

Determining the fire's hot spot was difficult, said Fire Chief Charles Spooner, as heavy smoke billowed from every opening of the house. Firemen suited up with gas masks and oxygen tanks and entered the burning house to find where the fire had originated. However, they emerged from the smoking structure shortly thereafter unable to locate the spreading fire's center. Spooner later said that firemen couldn't see the bedroom where the fire started, from the existing doors and windows. "Our strategy is to find the hot spot first, but we couldn't because that room was boxed in by walls," said Spooner.

Spooner then ordered his men to cut a hole in the building's roof. As the wind gusts at 20 to 25 m.p.h., firemen ascended a ladder with axes and power saws to ventilate the house. Side windows were smashed with crow bars. "We ventilated the roof because that gets the heat out. The more heat builds up, the better the fire burns," Spooner said. He also said that once the firemen exposed the fire, it became hot enough to be pinpointed by the firemen.

Once the hole was made, firemen controlled flames coming from the roof and began spraying water inside the house. They were also able to place a suction fan inside to draw some of the heavy white smoke out. Firemen were called off the roof to concentrate water hosing power inside the house from ground level.

Shortly thereafter, the fire's intensity diminished and smoke coming from the house had been reduced.

However, as one observer noticed thick smoke emanating from a vent, flames again erupted from the roof and basement. Firefighters battling increasing flames at the back porch off of the kitchen were hampered in their efforts as the two hoses they were using, which were hooked up to a water pump truck, were producing only trickles of water. Just as one volunteer yelled, "We're out of water!" an explosion blew out the kitchen windows forcing the firemen to retreat.


Spreading flames enveloped the house as the fire raged out of control. While firemen ran to hook their hoses up to a nearby fire hydrant, the fire overtook the back porch igniting a tree and the ground-cover and threatening a nearby butane gas tank. The time was approximately 11:40, and United States Forest Service fire fighters were called in for extra support.

By 11:53, water from the hydrant was being pumped through engine number 6 and supplying three hoses with plenty of water pressure. The Forest Service personnel arrived on the scene at 12:00 noon, but the RFD had regained control of the situation. For the next 45 minutes, firemen doused the flames and tore smoldering cedar shake shingles from the roof, because they presented the hazardous possibility of blowing off the roof onto the dry grass and shrubbery beside the house.

The house, belonging to Richard and Linda Morgan and rented by local contractor Carl Springfels, was totally ruined, according to Waltrip. All that remained was a jet fighter flight seat and its opening hatch which had been sitting on the front porch throughout the fire. The suction fan and a fireman's ax were also burned.

As Waltrip walked through the charred refuse, he stated his belief that a gas furnace in the bedroom accidentally started the fire and that a bucket of tar left there had caused the fire to burn with intense heat.

When asked to comment on why the fire trucks were not immediately hooked up to the two available fire hydrants on the access road behind the American Star theatre, Spooner said, "That was a misjudgement call. I assumed when we got here that the 1,000 gallons in the two pump trucks would be enough to knock it out. Even with the hydrants, we couldn't have found the fire."

Wheeler in race for Downs' mayor



4-H Clubs should apply now for Community Pride Grants

New Mexico 4-H clubs should apply now for 1982 Community Pride Grants, a program sponsored by Chevron USA.

Grants will be made this year for a minimum of \$50 and maximum of \$500 for the purpose of community improvement. "Community improvement means anything that will make life more enjoyable for a community's residents," said Glenn Bartlett, state 4-H leader at New Mexico State University (NMSU).

Chevron USA recently increased Community Pride project grant funds to \$5,000. The grant supports about 20 Community Pride projects that will be selected by state 4-H leaders, and also covers costs of a 4-H leaders' luncheon, and a training session at the annual State 4-H Conference in Las Cruces, Bartlett said.

Applications for the grants are available from county Extension offices.

"This is a lengthy form that requires a community study, and a meeting with community officials, to determine what kind of project should be considered," Bartlett said. "Groups should also consider the use of some local supporting funds raised through donations, in-kind donations of labor or material, or a local fund raising activity."

In 1981, New Mexico 4-H clubs put up street signs, improved county fairgrounds, renovated senior citizen centers and

homes for the handicapped, improved parks and recreational facilities at schools, and repaired or improved community center buildings, Bartlett said.

Application for the 1982 Community Pride grants should be completed and turned into the State 4-H Office at NMSU in Las Cruces by May 1. The applications will be evaluated and the top 20 will be funded.

I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

New Mexico Game and Fish News

Small and colorful it hovered for just a moment before it swooped down, tail fanned and wings breaking its speed. Decisively but delicately it landed, stayed for just a moment before take-off and then disappeared. Unusual? Yes and no. It so happened that this incident occurred right in front of my office, in the middle of Albuquerque and the bird was a kestrel. It seemed that just for a moment a bit of the wild had come to visit the city and it brings up some serious questions. So, you know, the kestrel is a small falcon.

Many times in our office and in recent public meetings we received questions concerning raptor laws and possession. For instance, is it legal to keep raptors (hawks, falcons, eagles, owls) as pets or to possess their feathers? The answer is no.

In New Mexico we have a state law that makes it illegal for any person to take, possess or ensnare or in any manner to injure, maim or destroy hawks, owls or vultures. It is also illegal to purchase, sell or trade, or to possess for the purpose of

selling or trading any parts of these birds of prey. Bald and golden eagles are similarly protected under federal law.

The same questions have been raised concerning songbirds and the answers are similar. State law makes it illegal to shoot or trap for the purpose of killing, songbirds or birds whose principal food consists of insects. These bird families include bluebirds, bobolinks, catbirds, chickadees, cuckoos (including the roadrunner), flickers, flycatchers, grosbeaks, hummingbirds, kinglets, martins, meadowlarks, nighthawks, nuthatches, orioles, robins, shrikes, swallows, swifts, tanagers, thrushes, vireos, warblers, waxwings, woodpeckers, wrens and all other perching birds that feed on insects. That's quite an all encompassing list, isn't it? Actually the only birds that are not protected by law are the starling, English sparrow and the rock dove (domestic pigeon). Of course all migratory birds are protected by federal laws and treaties.

There are exceptions to these laws under special permits issued by either the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish or

the United States Fish and Wildlife Service or both agencies. Those exceptions come about due to depredation on commercial raising or poultry or game birds, scientific research, falconry purposes, Indian religious purposes or salvage permits.

Basically, if you find any injured bird, immediately contact the Department of Game and Fish or an officer and we will get it to persons qualified to care for it. If you have a problem with neighborhood kids shooting birds with a BB or pellet gun, report it to the nearest Game Department office or officer. A citation or a stern warning and chat with the parents will control most of these mischievous, dangerous and harmful practices.

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
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Dear editor:

Vote March 2 for Al Junge Village Trustee.

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

Goddard High School of Roswell will switch from the AAAA division to the AAA division in the 1983-84 school year.

This move isn't surprising since Goddard is just barely above the 1,200 enrollment mark (the breaking point between AAA and AAAA) and is gradually losing students. The Rockets aren't a strong force in AAAA competition anymore, particularly in their district which includes premier state powerhouses Carlsbad, Clovis and Hobbs.

Roswell's move to the AAA division is probably just the beginning of a large number of changes within the state high school structure.

Silver City, which has been a powerhouse in district 3-AAA football the past few years, is at if not over the 1,200 enrollment figure. The Colts figure to move from the AAA level to the AAAA division fairly soon.

When and if Silver City does move to the AAAA division it will probably have a big effect on district 3-AAA competition. Silver City is the biggest school in the 3-AAA district with perhaps three times as many students as Tularosa, the smallest school in the district.

Ruidoso, with 473 students, isn't much bigger than Tularosa, and it's a credit to the Warrior coaching staff and the talent of the school's athletes that its teams have generally been competitive in the district for the last three years.

However, a big school like Silver City almost always has the advantage when it competes against a school less than half its size. A move by Silver City to the AAAA division would benefit the district schools as a whole.

With the constant changes in enrollment throughout the state, Goddard's move to the AAA division could be followed by a lot of other changes in several schools' athletic districts.

Only the main Albuquerque high schools and such traditional powerhouses as Clovis, Hobbs, Carlsbad and Gallup seem immune from division changes.

Oops. It seems I made a spelling error in my story on ski equipment and sporting goods sales in Thursday's edition of The News.

I referred to the owner of Morgan's Mountain Sports as Morgan Cluff. The correct spelling of Morgan's last name is Clough.

Sorry about that, Morgan.

It's unfortunate that National Football League (NFL) players are thinking about striking before next season.

Warrior hoopsters split a pair

Ruidoso High School's boys' varsity basketball team saw both sides of the coin in splitting two district 3-AAA games over the weekend.

Friday night the Warriors edged out arch rival Tularosa 43-39 on the Ruidoso court. However, Saturday night the Warriors lost to AAA top ranked Deming 77-38 on the Wildcats' court.

The split gives the Warriors a 2-3 mark in district 3-AAA action with five games remaining.

Saturday night the Warriors were simply overmatched against the undefeated district leaders.

"They're by far the finest team we've played this season," said Ruidoso head coach Barry Nelson. "They've got good size and excellent depth. They have 11 players who are all outstanding."

Ruidoso tried to slow the game down against Deming but the hosts jumped off to an early advantage and never trailed in the contest.

Senior Steve Sluder led the Warrior attack with 14 points and 6-4 center Bill Richardson added nine.

However, Friday night's game against Tularosa had better results for the Warriors.

Ruidoso was able to control the tempo of the game by playing a ball-control style of offense which caught Tularosa off guard.

The Warriors led almost all the way in the game, their lead fluctuating between two and eight points most of the first half. Tularosa made a surge early in the fourth period to take a brief lead.

However, the Warriors came back on the strong play of Sluder, Scott Neal and Marc Delhotal.

Sluder hit a basket with 3:00 remaining to tie the score at 37-37. After a Tularosa basket, Sluder followed with a missed shot by Pete Garcia to tie the score. Sluder was fouled on the play and sank the free throw for a 40-39 Warrior advantage with just over a minute to go.

Delhotal then hit two free throws and Neal one as the Warriors cinched the victory.

Sluder led the Ruidoso scoring attack with 15 points, Garcia added 10 points and keyed the Warrior fast break along with Neal. Bobby Knox added eight points and Neal had six.

"It was definitely one of our best games this season," said Nelson of the victory over Tularosa. "We did basically what we wanted to do. I think the win over Tularosa took something out of us when we played Deming the next night."

The Warriors played a nearly flawless fundamental game against Tularosa but committed at least 30 turnovers against Deming.

Ruidoso returns to the court tomorrow night with a home game against non-district opponent Roswell. The Warriors lost to the Coyotes by six points when the two teams meet for the first time in early December. The first game was played in Roswell.

A boys' junior varsity game will start at 5:30, with the varsity game following.

NOTES-Ruidoso, now 4-12 overall on the season, plays three of its last five district games on the road. The Warriors have home games with Deming and Cobre. However they must play Tularosa, Truth or Consequences and Cobre on the road. The district tournament, will be held at Cobre March 4-6.

BRAVES END SEASON WITH 13-3 MARK

Warrior freshmen top Truth or Consequences

Ruidoso High School's freshmen basketball team ended its season with a 46-38 victory over visiting Truth or Consequences (T or C) Saturday afternoon on the Warrior court.

Earlier in the day on the same court the White Mountain Middle School boys' A basketball team completed its season with a 35-20 loss to the T or C Middle School team.

The Warrior frosh jumped off to a 14-8 first-quarter advantage and held the lead the entire game.

After leading 25-16 at halftime Ruidoso saw its lead cut to 33-29 at the end of the third period.

However the Warriors scored 10 straight points to open the final period and eased in from there.

Jeff Knox, a 5-11 athlete, led the Warrior scoring with 17 points. Guard Manuel Montano added 11 and 5-11 Harry Ensor had 10 points for the Warriors.

Coach Thurman Sanchez praised his team, which ended up 5-4 on the year.

"We were intimidated by their size," said White Mountain coach Dean Hood. "Only Russell Easter was not awed by their big team."

Easter scored 12 points to lead the Braves. Bigham added four and Oscar Torres and Mark Langston each had two points for the Braves.

White Mountain ended the season with a 13-3 mark, much better than the 8-9 mark of the 1981 Braves squad.

Warrior wrestlers take 2nd

Putting eight men into the finals the Ruidoso High School wrestling team finished second to Silver City in the Cobre Invitational Saturday.

Silver City scored 165 points to 143 for the Warriors. Deming was third with 133 points, Cobre fourth with 75 and New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) fifth with 63.

Bell took his third straight high placing in a row as he lost a narrow 6-4 decision in the finals. Rue and Montes have been con-

sistent all season, almost always placing in the top four.

Besides Ciraulo, Chuck Schmidt, Rue and Burgess are sophomores or juniors so the Warriors have good strength for the future.

Torres had been out of action for two weeks because of a shoulder injury. However, Saturday the strong senior came through with a fine performance.

"Wade was a little nervous because he hadn't wrestled against the man he met in the championship finals," said Ames. "He fell behind 8-0 but came back strong and almost pinned his opponent before losing."

The Warriors were without several wrestlers for the tournament or else they might have won the championship.

Next on the schedule for Ruidoso is the NMMI Tournament Saturday in Roswell.

"We may have a hard time doing as well there as we did at Cobre," said Ames. "There's more strength in the upper weights among the teams that will compete in the NMMI Tournament. Goddard and Roswell, in particular, have some tough men in the higher weights."

The Warriors will compete in the district 3-AAA Tournament Saturday, February 20, at the New Mexico School for the Visual Handicapped in Alamogordo.

Tularosa junior varsity outlasts Warriors, 57-37

Despite a strong first half effort Ruidoso High School's boys' junior varsity basketball team fell to visiting Tularosa 57-37 Friday night at Warrior gym.







Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Toney Anaya's so used to being an underdog he can't stop acting like one.

When you're way out in front, as he is in the Democratic race for governor, you shouldn't look back. As Satchel Paige said, "Something may be gaining on you."

Why dignity Les Houston, so far back in the pack he can hardly be seen, with a press conference to denounce him?

Put simply, the fight over whether or not Toney had anything to do with cost-of-service indexing for Public Service Company of New Mexico is something of a fake anyway.

Toney insists he didn't personally sign any stipulations on the subject, so he can't be held responsible for it. (Actually, he did sign one set of such stipulations, in a court case, but that's not the heart of the matter.)

Other facts, however, are these: —Toney took office as AG on January 1 in 1975.

—On January 31 of that same year, PNM filed to open Case Number 1186, on indexing.

—On February 26, Anaya wrote a "Dear Dickie" letter to the chairman of the Public Service Commission asking to intervene in the case.

—On March 5, Toney, in person and not by representation of an Assistant Attorney General, asked for and was granted permission to intervene, at a public meeting.

—During a two-day meeting on March 5 and 6, parties to the suit, of whom Anaya's office was certainly now one, agreed to a stipulated settlement.

—On April 22, the Commission filed its decision, which says clearly, "By stipulation with the commission and other parties to this proceeding, the company consents..." and so on.

If that doesn't add up to some kind of consent, at the very least implied, on the

part of the Attorney General's office, what does it mean?

And who ran the Attorney General's office at that time, in such way that he always wanted to take full credit for anything good it did? Nobody but Toney Anaya.

(And if you think that's bad, just wait till you hear the full details on his other-out-of-court settlement on the price of natural gas.)

You've got to watch legislators all the time.

There's a little old "nothing" bill making its way through the current session which would unfairly raise \$130,000 this year from licenses for cosmetologists, who make up the second largest group of folks licensed by the state to practice.

Why this effort, which would cancel the licenses these people have already paid \$7.50 for this year and require them to buy a new license, covering the same period of time, for \$12.50? Principally because the Cosmetology Board just flat overspent its budget by something on the order of \$100,000.

That board, by the way, has a director, at an annual salary of more than \$27,000 a year, an accountant (who apparently failed to account), two secretaries and an inspector. The latter, who might be considered the most important member of the operation, makes the magnificent sum of \$8000 a year.

You can understand why folks who make their living beautifying the rest of us might feel they have just a little gripe over this kind of carryings-on.

Since when was a legislative session designed to reward incompetence by taxing members of any group twice in the same year?

As we say, it's just a little "nothing" bill, but we thought you might like to know about it.

In the P & Z meeting held last Monday, February 1, 1982, there were several people who were opposed to the Hilton project. A few of these people stated that they lived in Pinon Park and did not want a hotel in the neighborhood.

I would like to express my opinion that they already live in a motel for the following reason:

Quote: "We currently have in our rental pool 14 units consisting of approximately 32 bedrooms available for rent and depending on the number of people renting, these units rent nightly from \$67.50 for 2 people up to \$87.50 for 6 renters. Our larger unit rents start at \$137.50 per night. This includes maid service and firewood."

We hope to have three times as many next year after construction is finished." (end quote). (As of February 3, 1982.)

This will bring them to approximately 96 bedroom rental units, which would make them the second largest MOTEL unit in town. These figures do not include additional Pinon Park Condo rental units that are handled by local Realtors.

Obviously Pinon Park is not the only Condo Project in town operating in this manner. I see no reason to go into the lodging tax revenue for that is the city's business, however, that is where the funds would be generated from a legitimate hotel that pays 2.5% Lodgers Tax to the city.

It certainly has been believed by many of us that the intent of the Swim and Racquet Club was to be a Club, which would be an asset to surrounding homes (whether or not it was a profit seeking one). The Swim and Racquet Club, as part of a motel complex is something very different. I think we would all like to see the Club "bailed out"; but it is not fair, or right, to do so at the expense of homeowners who invested in that area in good faith. I'm sure we would all like to see a Hilton Inn in Ruidoso, but I do not think the Swim and Racquet Club property is the right place.

It was argued that traffic in that area will be so heavy anyway, that the extra brought in by a motel would make little difference; and that a 100 room motel, with convention and banquet facilities, would not cause any more than a potential 150 condominiums in that area. Also, the potential danger to school children would be minimized by the motel's efforts to get their customers to use routes other than that in front of the schools.

It is my understanding that the elected officials of the Village do not have to accept the recommendations of the Planning and Zoning Commission; and I urge them to give careful consideration to this issue.

Aside from the fact that to adopt the recommendation will confirm the growing fear that it is a risky thing to invest in residential property in Ruidoso; it will almost certainly involve the Village in a costly lawsuit, which, in the mind of this taxpayer, is a waste of my money.

I'm planning to build a home in White Mountain Unit 5, thinking it has some of the best restrictions in Ruidoso. I have seen the White Mountain Development Company plat of the property to be developed adjoining my lot. That which would affect me is planned for single family dwellings. Now, I am wondering if someday I might find myself confronted with a zone change to accommodate a gambling casino, or something of the sort.

That seems strange in an environment where all of us are fussing about the Federal Government. But - listen to this:

Our chief complaint of the local postoffice is concerned with (1) lack of parking (2) shortage of boxes and (3) lack of downtown delivery.

Now, the postoffice has come up with a plan to eliminate all three problems in one master stroke.

Metal containers holding 16 mail boxes are arriving at our local postoffice. These containers are about four and a half feet high and are held in place on two metal posts which are anchored into concrete. Each 16 box unit will be installed in the downtown area at intervals which should enable each one to be easily reached by our merchants. You can mail a letter as well as pick up your mail at the same location. Users of the new system will give up boxes at the local postoffice (voluntary) which in turn will reduce the number of persons using general delivery. There will be less traffic around the postoffice and our merchants will, at long last, have downtown delivery.

Thanks to Postmaster Gradine and to others who are responsible for this great improvement in handling downtown mail.

DEALING WITH CUSTOMS

American travelers abroad are entitled to basic free-of-duty exemptions when they return to the United States. The personal exemption currently is \$300 (\$600 if you're coming from the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, or American Samoa). The next \$500 in goods is charged a flat duty rate of 10 percent (5 percent from U.S. islands as above). Above this, you will be assessed varying rates of duty, depending upon the item.

If for the sake of convenience you send goods home from abroad, they are subject to the duty for that item, regardless of your personal exemption—the exemption levels apply only to goods actually in your possession upon your return.

You can send gifts home duty-free if the value is less than \$25. If the value is higher, or more than one gift arrives on the same day, the recipient—not you—will be charged the duty. Gifts must be clearly marked "unsolicited gift, value under \$25."

You cannot send gifts to yourself. If you send a gift to someone of your same name, such as a relative, note this on the package so Customs won't think you're sending it to yourself.






