GAS COMPANY MEETING

Utility purchase discussed

Following an informational meeting Thursday on the proposed purchase of the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company by the village of Ruidoso, consulting engineer Willis Umholtz said he hopes Ruidoso voters give the board of trustees the chance to decide on the purchase.

The question of whether the trustees should be permitted to negotiate for the purchase of the utility is on the ballot of the March 2 municipal election. Umholtz stressed that if Ruidoso residents vote in favor of the acquisition, they will only be giving the trustees permission to negotiate—not committing the village to the purchase.

No purchase price for the utility has been set.

Umholtz, who prepared a feasibility study on the proposed purchase which found that village acquisition and operation of the utility would be "feasible and practical," answered questions from a group of about 25 persons for two hours Thursday.

The engineer gave a history and overview of the gas system, which has been in service since 1966. He explained that originally, Ruidoso was to have joined Capitan and Carrizozo in a three-party community gas association.

But while voters in the other two communities approved the idea, Ruidoso voters did not, said Umholtz. As a result, the local system came into being under private ownership, but it buys gas from the Capitan-Carrizozo Gas Association, which owns the transmission line which connects with the El Paso Natural Gas Company main line.

The contract by which the Ruidoso company buys gas from the Capitan-Carrizozo Association expired at the end of 1981, said Umholtz, as did the contract between the association and El Paso Natural Gas Company. He stated that both contracts are being continued on a temporary basis until they are renegotiated.

"I'm of the opinion that it's in excellent condition," said Umholtz of the transmission pipeline which carries gas to the Ruidoso system.

His feasibility study recommends an immediate expansion program and an effort to add new customers (it now serves about 2,500) if the utility is acquired by the village. Umholtz said that the ultimate capacity of the system would depend partly on line pressure, which is written into gas purchase contracts.

"If we could get the peak pressure off El Paso, we could serve another 1,000 customers," he said.

Asked what could be done if Ruidoso had 10,000 customers for natural gas, Umholtz explained that facilities could be added to the transmission line to allow more gas to be transmitted.

In this respect and others, he said, "dialogue with the Capitan-Carrizozo Association is vital." Umholtz was also asked if El Paso Natural Gas Company will sell the Ruidoso system (through the Capitan-Carrizozo Association) all the gas it needs.

"Their current policy is 'sell gas,'" he said.

In response to a question about why the current owners of the gas company do not expand the system, Umholtz said that some of the original owners are dead and the others are elderly.

"They're looking at portfolios rather than investment," he said. Umholtz also explained that the present owners have agreed to accept 80 percent of the purchase price in village revenue bonds.

He called the built in bonds sale "an almost unheard of walking in level" and "a most unique situation."

Another plus, according to Umholtz, is the present workforce of the gas company, most of which he assumes would continue under village ownership.

"I know the people that are there—they are first-rate people," he said.

Umholtz was asked about the effect of the expected deregulation of natural gas

pricing, which some predict will bring a doubling or tripling of gas prices, on the value of the gas company. He said that it would not be affected, because "the cost of a commodity does not affect the value of the system."

He predicted that the village could make a better deal for the company than a private entity because of tax advantages to the sellers. He noted that the state of the bond market at the time of negotiations for purchase is a very important consideration.

Umholtz acknowledged that in any case, the consumer will foot the bill for maintaining and expanding the system.

"The consumer pays for that facility in the long run—whoever owns it," he said. Umholtz was asked during the meeting if he would encourage voters to vote in favor of continuing to pursue the purchase.

"Sure," he said. "It's the only way they (the trustees) are really going to know if it's a good deal."

Downs P&Z okays condos

The Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) granted three code variances to developers of the planned condominium project on the site of the Chapparral Motor Hotel in Ruidoso Downs at a special meeting February 11.

Approval had been given for the project earlier in the week by the Ruidoso Downs trustees, pending P&Z approval. The trustees' approval was finalized by proxy following the P&Z action. The variances allow for the planned Triple Crown Condominiums residential development to be built in a commercial zone.

Brian Lewis, representing project developers John Connolly, Ben Barnes and Joe McDermott, all of Texas, and architects 3-D International, said "this is a very difficult piece of land to work with." He admitted that the plans are "somewhat in variance with what's required in the regulations, and we ask that variances be granted."

Lewis stated that the developers were specifically concerned about the parking, setback and height requirements. "We plan to make the highest and best use of the land," he said.

Jim Rawhouser, P&Z member, said that "since the property is currently zoned commercial we are prepared to grant variances," but only for this phase of the project. "We can only grant variances given certain conditions," Rawhouser said. These include cases for which the property in question presents "particular difficulty or unnecessary hardship in the reasonable use of the land, building or structure."

P&Z members agreed that such was the case with the property planned for the condominium development.

Plans for parking spaces at the condominiums fall 40 short of the number required in the code, which is 266. A total of 226 spaces is planned. Lewis said that the local building code requires one parking space per bathroom, and the con-

dominiums will have one bathroom for each bedroom. Lewis explained that the plan to have a bathroom for each bedroom is intended as a selling point for the condominiums.

Each living unit will have a double car garage, and the developers plan to provide more parking on the site of the present hotel, as construction on the project continues, Lewis said.

A variance was also granted on the setback requirements, as the project plans are "slightly shy" in one of the sideyards, Lewis said. George Riley, representing the fire department, said that he saw no problem in granting a variance. Riley commended the developers for their planning in case of fire, and said "it's more than adequate; it's better than almost any structure there is now."

The third variance was granted on the height requirement, which according to the code is 35 feet for commercial property structures. The highest point shown on the project site plans is 48 feet, 4 inches, calculated from the lowest to the highest point.

Although the usual method of determining height is by the average grade, because of the variation of the land the average grade could change. The code variance was granted based on the lowest to highest point, with the highest point not to exceed 48 feet, 4 inches.

The commission stipulated that the variances be contingent upon the placement of three additional fire hydrants at points marked on the site plan by representatives of the fire department.

The commission agreed the variances are good as long as conditions are met before occupancy of the buildings. Rawhouser also made a motion, approved by the commission, that "one of the requirements we have is to accept landscaping plans" for the development.

Lewis said, "We're excited about some ideas for the next phases (of the development project), including shopping areas for the town. We'll probably have building going on here in Ruidoso Downs for some time to come."

Local sewer expansion contingent on financing

The Regional Wastewater System (RWS) near Biscuit Hill, once it is operational about June 1, will enable areas of Ruidoso not presently served the sewer system to obtain this service, if, village manager Jim Hine said Friday, "financing is obtainable."

Hine said sections of the village that could be served by RWS include:

— Ponderosa Heights, Bogg Springs, Pinecliff, Wingfield Additions and Highway 37 north to the village limits.

— Hull Road areas not presently served, through the new high school site, to connect with the 15-inch main serving Gavilan Canyon.

— Carrizo Canyon; with the mains connecting to the interceptor lines near the Chamber of Commerce office on Sudderth.

"To finance these projects," Hine said, "would require a combined General Obligation and Revenue Bond sale."

Hine noted that a recent attempt to form a special assessment district to serve Pinecliff with sewer failed, due in part to the fact that the bonds could not be marketed.

"The last estimate we had on providing sewer to the area of Ponderosa Heights not served was \$2,629,800," Hine said. "We're still attempting to secure a Farmers Home Administration loan for \$1,250,000, which would call for \$1,379,800 as the village's share."

"Financing our portion would require the passage of a General Obligation bond

issue as well as the issuance of Revenue Bonds."

The cost to the village to provide sewer to new subdivisions during the past eight years, he said, "has been virtually nil," because developers have been required to install sewer lines in those subdivisions in order to tie into the village system to obtain service.

An example of the cost of providing sewer service, Hine said, "is the engineer's estimate of \$500,000 to install a 15 inch main along Hull Road, through Bogg Springs and the new high school complex, to connect into the 21 inch main at Meander Drive leading to the new RWS treatment plant."

Installation of the 15 inch main from Hull Road to Meander Drive, he said, "would provide for future growth and protect the Paradise Canyon lines from overloading."

The \$1.5 million sewer bond issue approved by Ruidoso's voters in May of 1979 was, Hine said, "to pay the village's share of RWS. And we have \$165,000 remaining in this fund."

Hine said that planning for RWS started in May of 1974 with the formation of the Joint Use Board to secure the treatment plant, provide sewer service to Ruidoso Downs and to upgrade and expand the service in Ruidoso.

Planning continued from that time, he said, culminating in completion of three steps, to satisfy state, federal and en-

vironmental requirements, including establishing the need, finalizing plans and obtaining land, to obtaining a favorable environmental impact statement and beginning construction.

"The land right-of-way for the project (the complete RWS program) amounted to about \$360,000, out of that \$1.5 million sewer bond issue," Hine said. "Ruidoso's share of acquiring land was two-thirds of the total, with Ruidoso Downs paying one third."

"Government funding was solely for construction, they didn't pay one cent for land acquisition."

Hine said if action to obtain RWS had not been started in 1974, "the chances are good we wouldn't have our new sewer system."

He said that federal participation in RWS is 75 percent toward the cost of interceptor lines, mains and the treatment plant.

"We just got in under the wire," Hine said, "because the government's share for such projects, beginning October 1, 1974, will be only 50 percent. And there'd have been no way Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs could have financed half the \$6 million cost of RWS."

Hine said that plans to extend the sewer service in Ruidoso "will continue, but the money will have to be found, and outside of General Obligation or Revenue Bonds, there doesn't seem to be any other source."

White can lose mayor bid and stay on as trustee

The News, to help clear up questions being asked by voters on the candidacy of incumbent Ruidoso trustee George White for mayor, obtained an opinion from a local attorney, who researched the New Mexico Statutes Annotated to supply the following information:

If White is elected mayor, it would create a vacancy on the board of trustees. That vacancy could be filled by:

— The mayor naming a successor, with

the consent of the governing body;

— The governing body could call for a special election to fill the vacancy; or

— The mayor can call for a special election, with consent of the governing body.

There is apparently nothing in the statutes, the attorney said, that requires White to resign as trustee (two years remain in his term) in order for him to be a candidate for mayor.

If he is not elected mayor, the attorney said, he can resume his seat as a trustee.

Utilities don't plan shutoffs

Though many families in the state have recently had their power disconnected because of a failure by the state to pay their heating bills, local participants in the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program are finding their utility companies more sympathetic.

The utility assistance program, a federally funded state program designed to help low income families with their utility bills, has failed to make payments to utility companies, resulting in power being shut off for many in the state who cannot afford to pay their own bills.

Those most affected in Lincoln County are families whose primary source of heat is wood, according to Trudy Schoepko of the Economic Opportunity Board (EOB) in Albuquerque. The EOB receives applications for assistance from local centers and sends them to the Governor's Office of Community Affairs in Santa Fe for processing after checking them for accuracy.

Families who rely on wood for heating their homes indicate so on the application, and the state is supposed to send them a check for \$85 to buy a cord of wood. Most have not received this \$85, Schoepko said. The EOB in Albuquerque has received 50-100 calls daily for the past three weeks from clients who have been notified that their power will be shut off or who have had power shut off, said Schoepko.

Locally, residents on the assistance program are apparently more fortunate than others in the state. Both the Texas-New Mexico Power Company and the Ruidoso

Natural Gas Company report that they have not and will not terminate service to anyone on the program.

Buddy Bundick, district manager at the Texas-New Mexico Power Company, said, "the state is late paying bills; they're always way late." Bundick reported that there are 51 local residents on the program, four of whose bills have been paid. The power company has received no money from the state since December 30, Bundick said.

"We will not disconnect anyone on the program," said Bundick.

Joann Hall, bookkeeper at the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company, said there are 13 people on the assistance program with the gas company, and the state has paid bills for two of them, early in January. The gas company has not cut off any users, though, Hall reported.

Both Schoepko and Bundick said that the problem has been brought to the attention of the state office.

Schoepko said she was told that the centralized computer to be used for paying the bills is about ready to be put into use.

Schoepko said, however, that "the computer was supposed to be used from day one of the program."

She feels that the problem may stem from the fact that in the past local agencies made payments directly to the utility companies, while this year all applications from the entire state are processed through one agency.

Bundick also contacted the state agency about their failure to pay the bills. They told him, "We're slow."

Volunteers make up for cuts in Forest budget

Although recreation and wilderness management programs of the United States Forest Service (USFS) have suffered severe funding reductions, and more can be expected, and programs designed to supplement such recreation programs have been lost, Smokey Bear Ranger Station supervisor Paul Gordon said that some forest managers have actually increased service to the public in some recreation and management programs by creatively using volunteers.

"One advantage of the volunteer program is the flexibility and adaptability of the program to people and the land," Gordon said. A volunteer program is currently being planned by the USFS for the Lincoln National Forest, said Gordon. Two Volunteer Program coordinators are being sought by the Lincoln National Forest to supervise the program in the Ruidoso and Cloudcroft areas, Gordon said.

"We sorely need to acquire some people for this station," said Gordon. "There's a whole array of things for them to do." He indicated that retired people interested in contributing to the national forest would be perfect for what the USFS has in mind. "We'd very much like to contact them and

see what they're interested in," Gordon said.

One very successful forest volunteer project that was carried out in the Sandia Ranger District of the Cibola National Forest was the Adopt-a-Trail program. Numerous organizations, such as the Boy and Girl Scouts, the Audubon Society, Young Women's Christian Association and student groups, literally adopt a trail. They see that their trail is kept clear of debris, free of overhanging branches and maintained so that water runs off properly.

According to one organizer of that program, it's not much different than adopting a child. He said that the parents, members of a particular club, agree to care for their trail. They have total responsibility for its upkeep, he explained.

Gordon said that the program coordinators, who themselves will be donating their time and energy to the USFS, will recruit and supervise volunteers needed in the following areas: recreation planning and coordination; recreation cleanup; recreation campground hosts; trail planning and relocation; trail maintenance; trail inventory and signing; wildlife improvement and maintenance; building and facility maintenance; timber marking;

Christmas tree administration; fire tool maintenance and information hosts.

Any interested person 18 years old or older willing to work outdoors, and who is able to donate a substantial amount of time to the program, 20 or more hours a week, is eligible. The volunteer may work any hours that he or she desires, and the USFS is authorized to reimburse the volunteer for travel, food, or other out of pocket expenses.

In order to apply, complete an SF-171, Personal Qualifications Statement, which can be obtained from any Federal Office. Selection will be made by a panel of USFS employees. The panel will evaluate each candidate's qualifications, including experience, performance, awards, training and education.

Candidates will be considered without discrimination for race, color, religion, sex, national origin, politics, marital status, physical handicap, age, membership or nonmembership in an employee organization, or any other nonmerit factor.

Rick Henson appointed horse sales manager

and his family from Albuquerque to Ruidoso.





Ciraulo has great wrestling future

Scott Ciraulo is only a sophomore and already he's on his way to becoming one of the best wrestlers in Ruidoso High School history.

Ciraulo won the 187 pound division in the Cobre Invitational last week, taking a 7-0 overtime victory in the championship match.

"At that tournament I beat everybody in our district," the powerful Warrior said. "So I think I've got a good chance of winning the district title."

Ciraulo has competed mainly in the 167 pound division this season but has tried the 185 pound class twice. He lost one match and took third place in the Deming Tournament last month.

Although he's got serious thoughts about winning the 3-AAA district championship Ciraulo isn't sure about his chances if he qualifies for the state tournament.

"I may not have that great a chance," he said. "I'm only a sophomore and there's a lot of good wrestlers up north. Wrestling is better up there because there's a bigger population."

"If I make it to state I'll just be hopeful of winning a couple of matches and maybe placing."

Ciraulo started wrestling as a freshman and did fairly well, competing in the 185 pound division in the district tournament.

This season another sophomore, Gary Burgess, has wrestled in the 185 pound class while Ciraulo has generally competed in the 167 pound division.

Ciraulo is also a fine football player. He played on the Warrior junior varsity last fall as an offensive tackle and defensive tackle. He also played in two varsity

games.

"Next season I hope to play defensive end," Ciraulo said. "There's more contact when you play defense and you're hitting people."

That's also one of the reasons Ciraulo likes wrestling.

"Wrestling is more of an individual sport than football and you're competing against someone else one on one," he said. "I like wrestling better than football."

With two more years of competition left Ciraulo will have a good chance to show how much he likes wrestling.



Jay Casteberry and Marshall Trembley can do things a lot of other musicians have never even tried.

The talented duo, known as the Garbanzo Brothers, play bluegrass music and entertain customers at the Incredible Saloon and Restaurant by each playing several instruments.

Casteberry plays the banjo, guitar and harmonica while Trembley plays the guitar and mandolin.

The duo, who play at the Incredible two or three weekends a month, have been living in the Ruidoso area for four years since coming from Fort Worth, Texas.

"We were part of another band in Fort Worth," said Trembley. "The band broke up and we moved to Ruidoso. We've played in Fort Worth before coming to the

off and on here at the Incredible for a while."

Bluegrass music got its start in Kentucky back in the 1930's. It usually involves two or three musicians each playing several instruments. The music is mellow and entertaining and Trembley and Casteberry have built up a steady group of fans at the Incredible.

At least 30 people, many of them returning from the ski resorts, crowded into the saloon section at the Incredible Friday night to watch the duo perform.

The two musicians generally perform from 7:30 p.m. to midnight Thursday through Saturday.

Both Casteberry and Trembley are 27 years old and have similar backgrounds in music, getting the bulk of their experience up and we moved to Ruidoso. We've played in Fort Worth before coming to the

Ruidoso area.

"I started playing instruments when I was around 17," Casteberry said. "I had an uncle who played the banjo and I became interested in music largely from him."

Trembley went to school at Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, before moving to Fort Worth. He served in the Navy before going to college. He's originally from Pacific Palisades, California, and has studied both music and journalism.

Bluegrass music has always been popular in the southeastern section of the county but lately its popularity has spread to other parts of the country like Ruidoso.

Lon Nunley isn't the only outstanding high school football player to sign a letter of intent with the University of New Mexico (UNM).

Besides the Ruidoso High School standout, the Lobos received letters of intent from other high school stars from different parts of the country last week.

Among the prep standouts, the Lobos signed defensive lineman Guy Teafatiller of Covina, California; quarterback John Mackey of North Mesquite, Texas, and offensive lineman Steve Parr of South Garland, Texas.

Teafatiller, a 6-3, 230 pounder, is regarded as one of the best defensive linemen in the California high school ranks.

UNM did an excellent job getting him from the likes of USC, UCLA and the rest of the Pacific-10 Conference.

Mackey is one of the top quarterbacks in Texas and has a famous name to boot.

The future Lobo quarterback has the same name as former Baltimore Colt great John Mackey, regarded by many football observers as the greatest tight end ever to play the game.

Parr is a 6-3, 235 pound lineman who should provide plenty of blocking for Lobo ball carriers in future seasons.

Besides Nunley the Lobos picked up two other New Mexico high school standouts in quarterback Bill Rucker of Gallup and Bill Capello of Los Alamos.

Rucker led Gallup to an undefeated regular season before it was defeated by Hobbs in the state AAAA semi-finals.

The Lobos were stronger on defense than they were offensively last season so they went after offensive players heavily this year.

UNM had the top-ranked defense in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) last season and any improvement by the of-

fense next season could make the Lobos a solid title contender.

The WAC is an offensive-oriented conference with the likes of Brigham Young and San Diego State competing in it. UNM seems intent on improving its offense so it can compete with Brigham Young and the other top WAC squads.

New Mexico State University (NMSU) also did a good job in recruiting high school stars.

The Aggies reached across the state border to sign two El Paso players, linebacker Joe Clere of Hanks and lineman Pat Garrity of Burges.

UNM signed 14 other high school standouts and two junior college players.

Eight of the high school players who signed letters of intent are from Texas, three from New Mexico and Arizona and one each from Ohio and Florida.

The Aggies only had a 3-8 record last season and went heavily for talent on both offense and defense in their recruiting. They signed nine defensive players and nine offensive players.

NMSU didn't go as much for junior college players in its recruiting as it has in the past, reflecting a growing belief by many four-year college football programs that getting a player for four years is the best bet.

Many recruitment violations have come about after picking up junior college athletes with questionable grades.

Some college coaches are starting to see this and there is a general swing away from the junior college athlete in favor of the high school standout.

This in itself could cause a major change in the college football power structure in future seasons.

Mistakes stop Warriors as Cobre takes a 53-36 victory

Mistakes and cold shooting proved to be the Ruidoso High School boys' varsity basketball team's downfall as it fell to visiting Cobre 53-36 in a district 3-AAA game Saturday night in Warrior gym.

The Warriors, now 2-4 in district action, stayed close to the visitors in the first half but turnovers and a lid on the basket in the second half proved fatal.

"Actually I think it was one of our worst overall games of the season," said Warrior head coach Barry Nelson. "Mistakes and the inability to hit our shots hurt us. If you can't score you sure can't win the game." Ruidoso trailed the Indians 16-10 at the

end of the opening quarter but played the visitors evenly in the second period and trailed just 29-24 at the halftime break.

Early in the second quarter the Warriors threatened to take the lead several times but never actually overtook the Indians.

Bill Richardson sank a jumper and made a free throw shot to close the Warriors to within three points at 16-13 in the opening minute of the quarter.

Cobre built its advantage up to 18-14 two minutes later. However, Pete Garcia, who scored 13 points and stole two passes in the first half, stole the ball in midcourt and

sank a short jumper to pull the Warriors within two at 18-16.

Ruidoso crept back to within two points several more times in the second quarter but the Indians hung on and built their margin to five points at halftime.

In the third period the Warriors hit a cold spell and didn't score until over four minutes into the quarter when Richardson hit a layup to cut the Indian margin to 39-26.

Cobre held a 41-28 advantage at the end of the third quarter. The Indians held between a 10 and 15 point advantage the rest

of the contest as Ruidoso was plagued by poor shooting. The Warriors missed two or three attempts at a basket several times and the visitors would turn it into a fast break and a score.

"We're looking towards the district tournament now," Nelson said. "Everybody competes in that and we still have a chance to do well there."

However the Warriors still have several games before the district tournament begins March 2.

Friday the Warriors travel to Truth or Consequences (T or C) for a game. Saturday Ruidoso hosts undefeated Deming. The Warriors topped T or C 79-63 in their first meeting last month in Ruidoso. However Deming beat the Warriors 77-58 earlier this month on the Wildcats' court.

Cobre tops Warrior girls

Despite a strong first half effort Ruidoso High School's girls' varsity basketball team fell to undefeated Cobre 63-32 Saturday night in Warrior gym.

The Warriors, 3-13 on the season and winless in district 3-AAA action, held virtually even with the Indians in the opening period, trailing just 12-11 entering the second quarter.

However, the more experienced visitors started to pull away in the second period.

Leading by one point at 16-15 the visitors suddenly scored five straight points to take a 21-16 advantage and were never seriously threatened after that.

Jan Huey, who led the Warriors with 10 points for the game, blocked a shot and was tough on the boards in the first half to help keep Ruidoso in the contest.

In the second half, however, the visitors showed why they are considered to be one of the better teams in the state.

Leading 32-23 entering the second half the Indians used their press to force the young Warriors into turnovers. Ruidoso could score but four points in the third quarter.

The Warriors were unable to hit the scoreboard in the third period until Huey hit a basket to make it 39-25 with four minutes gone in the quarter.

The Indians broke the game wide open in the final period, scoring 18 points and holding Ruidoso to five.

Besides Huey's scoring Lillian Lopez had seven points and Tami Valdez six for the Warriors. Robin Rhodes, who was a defensive standout for the Warriors, added three points.

"We improved a lot in this game," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "They're a very good team and they forced us into making mistakes in the second half."

"However Huey and Rhodes were outstanding on defense for us. We're still making mistakes but we're learning and physically we're in shape. We're getting ready for the district playoffs two weeks from now."

The Warriors will play a non-district game tomorrow when they travel to Artesia. The junior varsity, which was idle Saturday night, will play first with the varsity game following.

Cobre cagers outshoot Warrior junior varsity

Cobre's junior varsity basketball team jumped off to an early lead and hung on to defeat a young Ruidoso High School squad 56-32 Saturday night in the Warrior gym.

The Warriors, who were playing with nine freshmen and one eighth grader on the squad, trailed 13-4 at the end of the first period.

However Ruidoso, sparked by the fine play of eighth grader Russell Easter, fought the visitors on even terms in the second period.

The 5-10 Easter, who just completed a fine season for White Mountain Middle School last week, scored six of his 12 points in the first half and did a good job rebounding for the Warriors.

Ruidoso scored 11 points to 10 for the Indians and trailed 26-18 at halftime.

However Cobre gradually pulled away from the Warriors in the second half. The visitors scored 16 points to six for the Warriors in the third period and continued that

pace in the final quarter for the victory.

"We're a really young team and I'm satisfied with the progress our players are making."

The junior varsity, now 1-13 on the season, will play a district game against Truth or Consequences (T or C) Friday afternoon on the T or C court.

The game will start at 4 p.m. The girls' varsity game will follow it and the boys' varsity contest will start at 7:30 p.m.

Ruidoso matmen 5th in Institute tourney

Running into some tough competition in the upper weights the Ruidoso High School wrestling team finished fifth in the New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) Tournament Saturday in Roswell.

The Warriors scored 79 points and were edged out for fourth place by Roswell, with 79.5 points. Deming won the tournament with 140 points and Silver City had 120. The Carlsbad junior varsity was third with 91 points.

"We just had a bad day," said Warrior coach Gerald Ames. "There were some tough wrestlers there. I think after last week when we finished second at Cobre we thought we could go to NMMI and people would just lay down for us."

Wade Torres, who is just coming off a shoulder injury, was the top Warrior placer with a second place in the 145 pound division.

"Wade did a good job," said Ames. "However he had to wrestle Pat Quinlan of

NMMI again in the finals and he lost. Quinlan is awfully tough."

Other Ruidoso wrestlers who placed in the tournament included Ray Montes, third in the 105 pound class; Henry Rue, third in the 119 pound division; Doug Schmidt, third in the 128 pound class; Jim Askew, third in the 132 pound division and sophomore Scott Ciruzalo, fourth in the 167 pound class.

"Rue probably came through with our toughest performance of the tournament," Ames said. "He had to wrestle Bobby Martinez of Deming who is one of the best around. Henry had a 6-1 lead but Martinez came back and pinned him in overtime."

Schmidt, who has won several tournaments this season, lost a close 19-15 decision in his semi-final match. However, the wiry senior came back and won easily in the third place match.

"We were without a couple of guys," said Ames. "But it probably wouldn't have

made any difference if we had them. We just had a bad day."

Ruidoso competes in the district 3-AAA tournament Friday at the New Mexico

School for the Visually Handicapped in Alamogordo. Most of the teams that were in the NMMI tournament will also compete in the district tournament. However, the Carlsbad junior varsity, Goddard and Roswell are not part of the district and so many of the tough upper weight wrestlers that competed at the NMMI tournament will not be in the district tournament.

"I think we have a chance of winning the district tournament," said Ames. "A lot of times after you don't do as well as you thought you would in a tournament that's just before the district tournament you come back and have a good day in the district competition."

The top three wrestlers in each weight class will advance to the state tournament in Las Lunas.

"I think we can get as many as eight wrestlers to the state tournament," said Ames. "We had about that number of wrestlers place in the NMMI tournament and some of the guys that beat our men in that tourney won't be in the district tournament."

Inside The Capitol

"Probably the part of state government which affects most citizens most directly is the Highway Department."

That remark was made at a Senate Finance Committee meeting last week.

It's true. Every one of us uses some share of another of the Highway Department's work every day.

We almost all agree that the highway system seems to be deteriorating faster than it can be repaired.

Highway Department people don't deny that. They know their job is both endless and close to impossible.

Recent estimates say it would take a billion dollars to put the whole system into first-rate shape — and you know how much chance there is that that kind of money will ever be available.

The whole budget for all of state government during the coming year, Highway Department included, is only about 25 percent larger than that big round number.

But why, when there is such evident need, does the Legislature resist requests the department puts forward?

Well, maybe part of the problem is indicated by what Senate Finance Committee chairman Alex Martinez said to them at that meeting last week.

Their presentation was "confusing," Alex said, and suggested that they "could not get their act together." That leads some legislators, he went on, to the belief that "you do not really need this money"

and that "you are trying to deceive this committee."

That's heavy language, maybe said in something of a fit of impatience.

But it does suggest that Highway Department types have not yet learned how to deal with lawmakers.

When other state departments which deal much less directly with the public are getting more from the Legislature than they asked for, how come the road agency can't make its figures convincing?

How come their presentations are always so "soft"?

This department has received a long letter from Bob Grant, Republican candidate for the governor's job, about a recent column on Bill Segó.

Grant obviously feels much mental anguish over the situation which rises from that court judgment against Segó in Arizona.

Grant says he worked for Segó's election to the State Senate and that they mutually represented each other, Segó in the upper chamber and Grant in the lower.

He obviously doesn't want to hurt a long-time friend, even in the heat of a political campaign.

He is adamant in his assurance that it is not his supporters who are mailing copies of the judgment against Segó to other Republican voters. He says such material, which is arriving in plain envelopes, with no indication of its source, is not from his campaign headquarters or in any way countenanced by him.

Yet it is arriving, as we have positive evidence. Somebody is sending it, and the aim is clearly to hurt Segó's chances.

All that's supposedly legitimate; you can be sure the Democrats will use it if Segó turns out to be the Republican candidate.

What the previous column here called for was at least some attempt to look at the Segó defense. That's what we attempted to provide.

Anonymous mailings — of which we get plenty — seldom make any pretense at fairness. That seems to us a cowardly form of politicking.

"Only" \$1.5 million worth of building permits were issued last month. Significantly, however, the total was more than twice that of January of 1981, which kicked off a record \$23 million year.

With growth seemingly guaranteed to continue in Ruidoso, it is past time to take a long, hard look at the direction our community is taking.

There are many municipalities which owe their present character to unplanned, unchecked growth. Houston, Texas, is the example most frequently given.

But there are also examples of controlled, quality growth—such as Boulder, Colorado.

Ruidoso needs to learn lessons from both.

Village manager Jim Hine stated last fall that Ruidoso should be in a position to hire a full time planner this spring. He indicated, correctly, that the decision to do so rests with the board of trustees.

Though the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) is a dedicated, able group of people who work long hours for the village without compensation, its members readily admit that the expertise of a professional planner would be valuable to them.

P&Z has its hands full seeing that new developments meet existing ordinances. The task of substantiating Ruidoso's growth needs, including low income housing and condominium density, would fall on a planner.

Controlled, quality growth should be on the minds of all of us in Ruidoso, especially our present and aspiring trustees.—TP

National Forest seeks volunteers

Two Volunteer Program coordinators are needed by Lincoln National Forest to supervise the program in the Cloudcroft and Ruidoso areas, according to a Forest spokesman.

Volunteers will work on range, wildlife, timber and recreation projects on the Forest, donating their skills and time to the administration and maintenance of the

National Forest system. The Forest Service is authorized to reimburse volunteers for job-related monetary costs, but cannot pay any salary.

Other benefits include the opportunity of becoming involved in forest management, working with dedicated people, productive use of leisure time, and practical on-the-forest experience.

Persons interested in applying for these positions are requested to contact the Supervisor's Office, Lincoln National Forest, Federal Building, 11th and New York, Alamogordo, New Mexico 88310. Applications will be received until March 1, 1982. Questions concerning the program can be answered at any Forest Service office.

Check cash management services

Managing your money grows steadily more complicated. Retirement accounts, money-market funds, NOW checking, tax-exempt government bonds—instruments designed to give you higher interest—require time, planning, and fund transfers for maximum benefit.

Banks, brokerage houses and other institutions now offer to manage your cash for you. But before you join thousands of others, the New Mexico Society of Certified Public Accountants (CPA) advises you to evaluate where convenience and savings most outweigh cost.

The accounts are generically called "sweep" or "overflow" accounts, and they work by automatically transferring deposits to money-market funds. Once in these funds, your money earns more interest than a checking account, without sacrificing liquidity. Dividends are reinvested periodically. Programs might allow you to use these funds for securities transactions. Free checking is available; sometimes, bank cards are included.

A complete monthly statement tells you how much money is in each account, interest earned, and money spent. Securities transactions and other pertinent information, such as fees or changes in portfolio worth, might be included.

A range of services and fees exist, so investigate differences before you decide what program is best for you.

If you have \$10,000 or \$25,000 in cash or securities, and you occasionally use the services of a broker, cash management at a brokerage firm may be for you. Here, your money will be automatically transferred to a money-market fund and is available when you need it. You may be able to find discount brokerage firms that require only \$1,000 to \$5,000, but these deposits must all be made in cash, and sometimes only excess balances are converted to the fund.

Dividends from money funds are automatically reinvested, but the time period for doing so can be a day, a week or a month. The more money you have in the fund and the more often profits are reinvested, the more you earn.

Brokerage accounts can also make securities transactions available to you at either a regular or discount commission. Programs might give you a line of credit equal to your securities' worth, but these rates are often higher than regular credit sources.

Free checking and bank credit or debit cards provide access to your funds. You might be required to write checks for a minimum of \$100 or \$500, or you may be restricted in the amount of checks you can write within a certain time. If so, you

might need a separate checking account for small amounts. If you are issued a debit card instead of a credit card, the credit company bills items directly to your account. It's just like writing a check.

Finally, most brokerage houses carry annual fees for these services, some as high as \$35.

In response to brokerage firm programs, other sponsors—mostly banks and credit companies—are devising less extensive programs with lower minimum requirements and a small or no yearly fee. Most of these smaller programs are joint ventures with money-market funds.

The minimum deposit required will vary from \$1,000 to \$2,500, but only amounts above the minimum will be swept into the money-market funds. In banks, your minimum balance will remain in a NOW account, earning 5.25 percent interest. You

can draw checks on this balance, but money will be transferred from the fund to cover the requirement. There may be a minimum check amount similar to brokerage firm programs.

To compare programs, first decide what services you need. Then check the advantages. For example, look into the yield of the funds and portfolios. Note how often dividends are reinvested and whether interest is figured simply or compounded. Ask about loan rates if you borrow against your securities.

Finally, compare the cost of different programs. What does the annual fee cover? Add up the commission fees you would normally pay and see if you're getting a good buy.

The best program for you, say CPAs, is the one that offers you the most convenient, necessary services and the highest yield for the lowest price.

Social Security information

An individual's physical or mental impairment must be the primary reason for the person's inability to work if he or she is to be eligible for Social Security disability benefits, Don Austin, Social Security district manager in Roswell said recently.

"Moreover," Austin said "the physical or mental impairment must be medically determinable—that is, the condition must be subject to verification by medically acceptable clinical or laboratory diagnostic techniques." In addition, the impairment must have lasted, or be expected to last, at least 12 months.

Being displaced from a job as a result of technological changes in an industry, or being laid off from work because of adverse economic conditions, does not make a person eligible for Social Security

disability benefits, Austin pointed out.

"The impairment must be of such a serious nature that the individual is unable to engage in any substantial gainful work that exists in the national economy, regardless of whether such work is available in the immediate area in which the person resides, he said.

"Neither can consideration be given to whether a specific job vacancy exists or whether the person would even be hired if he or she applied for the job."

Additional information about eligibility requirements under the Social Security disability insurance program may be obtained from the Roswell Social Security office located in the Federal Building at Fifth and Richardson. The telephone number to call is 1-800-432-5900.

Behind the Scenes

Not only for children

"I pledge allegiance to the flag..."

James Clavell listened as his young daughter recited the familiar words. But when he asked her what they meant, she was speechless.

"It was then," recalls the author of the top-rated 1980 mini-series, "Shogun," "that I realized how completely vulnerable my child's mind was — any mind for that matter — under controlled circumstances."

From that incident 18 years ago came "The Children's Story," Clavell's classroom parable that will air on Mobil Showcase Network (check station listings in your area) Thursday evening, Feb. 18 through commercial messages.

Since it first appeared in the Ladies Home Journal in October 1963, the story has been circulated widely among parents and teachers. It was published in book form by Delacorte/Eleanor Firestone last September. Clavell wrote, produced and directed the 30-minute TV version.

The action of "The Children's Story" takes place on one morning in a classroom in a conquered nation when the arrival of a new teacher causes a subtle yet profoundly important change in how patriotic and family values are taught.

During the course of the program, as host Peter Ustinov points out, the new teacher wins the children's hearts and takes over their minds. "It is not a children's story, but a story for every-

one of all ages," Clavell emphasizes.

"The Children's Story" was filmed in a Long Island classroom with a cast that includes veteran stage, screen and TV actress Mildred Dunnock as the old teacher, newcomer Michaela Ross, the daughter of James Clavell who inspired the story 18 years ago, as the new teacher, and 16 young actors who play second-graders. The cast includes youngsters of many ethnic backgrounds, giving special meaning to the program's theme song, "Children of the World," written and recorded by the Bee Gees.

Clavell's other books include "King Rat," "Tat-Pan" and "Noble House." He has written, produced or directed more than a dozen films, serving in all three capacities for "To Sir with Love" and "Five Gates to Hell." Among his other films are "The Great Escape" and "Watusi."


