## AUTHORITY, PAY AT ISSUE

# EMS in dispute with village

Dissatisfaction within the Ruidoso Emergency Medical Service (EMS) surfaced Friday as EMS director Matt Jakusz met with village manager Jim Hine about the inadequate treatment Jakusz alleges EMS has received from the village administration.

To protest what Jakusz described as a lack of interest by village officials for EMS concerns—he claimed he waited more than three hours to see Hine—Jakusz took out some emergency rescue equipment he carries in his rescue truck and placed it in the Village Administrative Center.

In response to Jakusz's protest action, Hine said, "If they continue to do things like that, it is immediate grounds for dismissal and will be reported to the governing body, and they'll decide on it."

Hine said that he would suggest to the village trustees to carry out a thorough investigation of EMS to find out why operating costs have gone prohibitively high, and why EMS has gone through two ambulances in the past three years. Late Friday afternoon, Hine requested that EMS personnel put the rescue equipment in an ambulance and "take it to where it is supposed to be." EMS employees complied and returned the equipment to the EMS office at the police station.

Jakusz said he and two EMS colleagues arrived at village hall shortly after noon Friday to speak with Hine about a disciplinary report Jakusz had written. Jakusz said Hine said he was busy and would be tied up all afternoon. Hine later said that Jakusz should have made an appointment and added, "I've got work to do like everyone else."

While waiting for a chance to meet with Hine, Jakusz explained to The News why he was upset.

He said his dispute with Hine began when a disciplinary report he had written was overruled by Hine. The report dealt with Rita Robertson, an EMS employee, appearing at work out of uniform.

"Either a blue turtleneck or a white T-shirt is to be worn underneath the short-sleeve shirt uniform, and this person (Robertson) wouldn't wear a white T-shirt. She was told she would not be paid for the days she was not in complete uniform. She was also told that if this was not corrected by March 16, then she would be dismissed. This person (Robertson) came crying to Hine," said Jakusz.

Jakusz said he had just found out that his report had been overturned by Hine. He said Robertson's attitude is now an "I can do whatever I want" attitude.

"How am I supposed to have discipline over my people if they come out here and get everything overruled?" asked Jakusz. Hine said Jakusz has no authority to make a dress code and that such permission must be granted by the village council.

"I overruled what was on that page when she brought it to me because I know of no uniforms that were approved. When you start telling people what color shirts

and socks to wear, that requires approval of the governing body," said Hine.

Jakusz said the matter of the disciplinary report was only the tip of the iceberg and he began to summarize a list of EMS complaints.

He said his staff works 480 hours a month, but is only paid for the 160 hours obligated to the Village of Ruidoso.

Jakusz explained that two uniformed people must stay with the ambulance unit at the EMS office at the police building for 48 hours straight. Those employees are then subject to call for another 48 hours, which means no other jobs or partying, and must be able to reach the office within 10 minutes of being called to pick up the ambulance, said Jakusz. Two other people are given two days off.

Jakusz said that the average pay per hour for 480 hours a month comes to \$1.94. He said he believes it would be fairer to pay EMS employees minimum wage for the first 240 hours and \$1.50 or so for the second 240 hours.

Jakusz also said he was angry because he must carry 800 pounds of rescue equipment in his own truck. He said there is no room in the ambulances for such things as the "jaws of life," 1,000 feet of rope, axes, two Stokes litters and other technical gear.

The village leases Jakusz's truck for \$1 a year, he said. Jakusz claimed the village pays for gas used on rescue calls, but other than that, he said, he pays for the truck's upkeep.

"It would be nice for the city to upkeep the rescue unit, or pay a little extra a month to keep it up. I'm not really paid enough, nor is anyone else, to keep up that unit. I'm hauling all of that stuff around. I only get eight miles per gallon, and I usually get 13 mpg. I have to make up the slack for gas out of my own pocket," said Jakusz.


Jakusz said he is frustrated because he feels EMS is being shuffled around by the village. He said he does not know where the unit is going or what it might be getting. He told The News that hospital administrator Ken Moore and Hine have talked about transferring the ambulance service to the hospital.

"The city doesn't want to spend money on us because in another year or two, we could be down at the hospital," Jakusz said.

Jakusz also said the two village ambulances are in a bad state of repair. He said that both units were made for flat cities with nicely paved streets. The units are too big for the area, and the ambulances have a hard time getting up some of the hills and can do so only at five miles per hour, said Jakusz. He said each unit weighs five tons and only gets four miles per gallon of gas.

Jakusz has proposed that the village purchase a four-wheel-drive van ambulance. He said he found an ambulance company in California that will give \$8,000 trade for one of the old ambulances and deliver an ambulance ready to go for \$22,000. He said the smaller van ambulance will be easier to maintain and give better fuel economy.

"At the first of the year, I talked to Hine about the new ambulance. I gave him a

price list and told him it would be a wise investment for the city. For the first week or so, he sounded enthusiastic. Then he started saying, 'Let's wait until the election is over.' Now the election is over and it's still 'let's wait and see,'" said Jakusz.

At that point in the discussion, Jakusz had the opportunity to speak with Hine and Mayor George White.

"I've had the papers (ambulance price lists) for two months to buy a new ambulance. The reason I didn't bring it up is because of the election. I didn't want to obligate the new council to the old council's decisions," said Hine.

White agreed with Hine's reasoning and asked Hine if there was any money in the budget for a new ambulance. Hine replied negatively. White then said to Jakusz, "There's no money in the budget for an ambulance, it's that simple. My only suggestion is to wait for budget time."

Hine said it may be possible to pay two payments during the two months remaining in this fiscal year. He said he would be happy to put the new ambulance on the March 30 village trustee meeting agenda and let the trustees decide.

On the matter of the disciplinary

report submitted by Jakusz, White said, "I haven't seen the report yet, but I will talk with her (Robertson) on Tuesday."

After the brief meeting with White and Hine, Jakusz said, "I am somewhat satisfied that the request for the new ambulance will be on the agenda, but it doesn't help anybody's salary and it doesn't help the condition of my truck from carrying around their equipment for them."

At that point, Jakusz conferred with his EMS colleagues and it was decided that some of the equipment in Jakusz's rescue truck would be left at the administrative building.

"I'm hoping it will open his (Hine's) eyes up so he realizes all we have to do. I'm also trying to make the city realize they need the rescue unit. Everyone is pleased with it, except the people here (village hall)," said Jakusz in explanation of his actions.

He added he was not willing to endanger anybody's life to prove a point. He said he had enough of his own equipment in the back of the rescue truck to cover almost any situation, unless it was a major catastrophe.

## Border Commission meets Thursday

# Gasoline fish kill yet to be settled

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish is still conducting its electrofishing survey of the Rio Ruidoso, and the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) is pursuing legal action against the Southland Corporation as a result of a gasoline spill that occurred here February 4.

The March 4 deadline for Southland Corporation to respond to EID's proposed settlement for violating EID regulations when an estimated five or six gallons of gas spilled into the Rio Ruidoso has passed.

Joseph Gmuca, the attorney handling the case for EID, said, "If I don't hear anything within a reasonable period of time, we'll have to file a suit." Gmuca said that a reasonable amount of time "would depend on how closely we are to a settlement."

Gmuca told The News he received a call from Southland Corporation attorney Rebecca Fitzgerald Friday, March 5, but that he was not in. He said he returned Fitzgerald's call Tuesday, March 9.

Gmuca said Fitzgerald told him that Southland's senior attorney, Lon Williams, was in court at that moment. Fitzgerald told him that she still did not know what response Williams would give EID, he added.

She told Gmuca she would call him back at the end of the day but did not, said Gmuca. He added that he expects to hear from Southland's lawyers.

Monty Leishman of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish told The News another electrofishing survey will be conducted today and tomorrow. "The importance of Monday's and Tuesday's studies will be to determine the residual kill," said Leishman.

He said earlier studies revealed that a complete fish loss occurred in the first mile downstream from the spill. The site of the spill was the corner of Mechem and Sudderth Drives where an Exxon service station was located. Gasoline from storage tanks, which were being excavated, drained down Mechem Drive to a culvert that leads into the river.

Leishman said his superior told him if no more fish mortalities are anticipated as a direct result of the gas spill, then a bill for the number of fish killed will be sent to Southland Corporation.

Leishman said upstream statistics, with only a 70 percent observation rate, show that a little less than 2,000 fish per mile live in the Rio Ruidoso. He added that one would expect more fish living in the river downstream. The majority of fish in the river are brown trout with some rainbow trout and a scattering of smaller species, said Leishman.

He said that a complete fish loss, estimated at 2,000, occurred in the first mile downstream of the spill. Leishman said around 1500 fish were killed in the second mile, and so on downstream. On a brighter note, Leishman said, "The number of fish are increasing and we're starting to see fish."

# Merit system for village employees takes effect

A merit system for village employees became effective upon passage of Ordinance 82-2 by the trustees March 9.

The system provides for the hiring, promotion, demotion, discharge and general regulation of municipal employees.

Under provisions of this ordinance, a system of grades in position will be established. This system is similar, in effect, to the grades employed in Civil Service.

Wage levels for all grades of employment will be established by the trustees at a later date, but prior to the beginning of the new fiscal year July 1.

The ordinance also establishes a Personnel Board, consisting of one employee elected by the other employees, and from two to four other members, appointed by

the mayor, subject to confirmation by the trustees. The board members will serve two year terms, without compensation.

The Personnel Board will adopt general rules for employees to follow, and will also handle grievances.

Persons not subject to Personnel Board regulations include the village attorney, municipal judge, non-permanent workers and members of administrative boards and commissions.

The new ordinance also establishes the position of department heads for the following operational divisions: airport, police, emergency medical, refuse and solid waste disposal, water, wastewater, shop, municipal services and protective inspection.

# Tom Hansen happy about high school work setting

Tom Hansen, principal of Ruidoso High School, the only high school in the state to have been approved with commendation by the state Department of Education, is pleased to work in the Ruidoso school system.

"I have never seen a better educational setting," Hansen said in a recent interview about the state of his school.

"Teacher morale is extremely high in this school system," he said.

A survey given by the North Central Evaluation team indicated that of 20 high school staff members taking the survey, 18 rated morale as good to excellent; two rated it fair.

"The majority (of the teachers) are glad they're here," Hansen said. "They're part of a team, and they pull together to make this a better school system."

"I love the people's attitudes here," he said.

Hansen revealed that he has "lots and lots of plans" for additional programs, curriculum offerings and personnel, all hinging on completion of the new high school.

He said that all the teachers and principals are "on hold" until the new building is completed, making more space available for all the schools.

Hansen listed vocal music, speech and drama and a second or third foreign language as curriculum offerings he would like to add.

In addition to teachers for these programs, he said he would like to hire a second guidance person and a full-time assistant principal.

Also, Hansen said he hopes to establish a Cooperative Office Education Program, which would train students as office help, and a Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) program, to train students for industrial vocations.

Currently, the Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) program at the high school is serving students whose interests may be better suited for one of these other clubs, Hansen explained.

A new course being offered this year is computer math, open to good math students by their teachers' permission, reported Hansen.

The school started the program this year with one computer, but has added two more since January.

Students in the computer math class are working on programming the computers to handle attendance records and permanent records for the counselor's office and to design weight training programs for individual students. Hansen said that eventually they plan to use the computers to schedule classes, also.

Another program at the high school which Hansen feels is especially effective is the offering of honors courses, worth five points each as compared to four points credit for other classes.

Honors classes offered at the school include advanced math, chemistry, physics, college-level English, humanities and a college survival course.

In the college survival course students are graded and treated as if they were in college. They also study college catalogues and applications and visit some of the undergraduate schools in the state. The purpose of the course, Hansen said, is to "generally try to give an overview of what college is going to be like the next year."

Hansen reported that since the honors classes have been offered as worth five points, more students are taking them and ACT score averages have risen.

Hansen said that his teachers all have six classes per day, a 20 percent greater work load than usual. The school is currently five or six teachers short, but the staff elected to take on the extra class rather than add "floating" teachers to handle the additional work.

"The public is very, very appreciative of our teachers," Hansen said.

"Overcrowding is the biggest problem in the school system," he said.

In the 10 years Hansen has been principal at Ruidoso High School, the graduating class has doubled in number and he said they plan for it to double again in the next 10 years.

Within 12 to 14 years, Hansen said, they plan to have 1,200 or more students at the high school.

The new high school building will help to alleviate the problem, but "we will be building constantly for the next 20 years," Hansen said. "We have not reached a solution."

"If we can eliminate overcrowding and get needed staff, we will have very darn little to complain about," he said.

# Library to display art exhibitions

The Ruidoso Public Library board of trustees announced Thursday that two museums of New Mexico art exhibitions will be displayed at the library this year. Head librarian Mary Lou Gooch told the trustees that except for one-way transportation costs and insurance, the exhibit will not cost the library anything.

"Chuckwagons and Cowboys," a series of lithographs by Theodore Van Soelen, will be shown during the entire month of June, said Gooch. The Museum of New Mexico places the exhibition's value at \$500.

Gooch said Van Soelen immortalizes the people, daily life of the cowboy in the series of 18 lithographic prints. She added that the Minnesota-born Van Soelen grew to know ranch life intimately and much of his research and drawing was done on New Mexico and Texas ranches during the years 1950 to 1959.

In November, said Gooch, a program entitled "Art in Public Places" will be presented at the library. Thirty-five contemporary prints represent the endeavors of eight New Mexico printmakers. They are: Sergio Moyano, Gretchen Tyser, Eugene Newman, Don Fabricant, Bob Hill, Kristin Holveth, Bruce Lowney and Michele Sowards. The exhibit is valued at \$10,000.

In other board business, Gooch reported that part of the ceiling in the adult reading room has collapsed. She said that earlier repairs to the roof may have jarred loose some of the studs holding the ceiling up. The roof remains in good condition, said Gooch, and she added that repairs will have to be done during the evening or weekend.

Gooch told the board she is planning on extending the library sidewalk around to the back of the building.





Almost every high school coach in New Mexico would give anything to have the facilities Artesia High School has for its athletic events.

Ruidoso High School's track team performed on the Bulldog all-weather track Thursday and got a good glimpse of the quality of the Artesia facilities.

The Bulldog track is ideal for running and the Artesia track team doesn't have to worry about meet rainouts because of it.

The spectator stands, used for both football and track, are outstanding. Even the press box is worthy of notice. There are two decks to the press box and a red bulldog statue stands on top of it.

Stadium parking is excellent and so are the locker room facilities.

The high assessed valuation of the Artesia School District (largely because of the nearby oil fields) helps provide the funds for the outstanding facilities the Bulldogs have. However, the whole community is behind the Artesia athletic teams and a large amount of money is raised by the booster club.

Artesia annually has some of the finest teams in the state's AAA division and it's not hard to see why.

The Bulldogs spend a lot more money on their football team than most schools. The large assessed valuation of the Artesia School District enables the high school to afford more money for its athletic teams.

According to Ruidoso head track coach Ronnie Maskew, Artesia used to compete in the AAAA division.

"Several of the schools in the area around Artesia were AAAA schools so Artesia joined the AAAA division even though its enrollment was only of AAA size," Maskew said. "I won more state titles than any other school when it was in the AAAA division."

Unfortunately, Ruidoso doesn't yet have the facilities that Artesia has and may never have them.

Ruidoso is a much smaller school than Artesia (470 for Ruidoso compared to over

900 for Artesia) and the assessed valuation for Ruidoso's schools is much lower than that of Artesia's.

The Warriors are making improvements, though. The recent improvements in the stadium lighting and the spectator stands are a step in the right direction.

The Warrior track team has sparkling new uniforms that are a considerable improvement over the previous ones.

But it's still frustrating to go to a town like Artesia and see the sports facilities they have there.

Artesia's stadium ranks with any I've seen in California and is equal to or better than most high school stadiums in Texas.

Los Angeles Dodger pitcher and Cy Young winner Fernando Valenzuela is continuing his spring holdout.

The Dodger second-year ace is reportedly seeking a \$1,000,000 annual salary which would probably give him a bigger pot of money than Dodger veterans like Steve Garvey and Ron Cey, both good hitters with home run potential who play every day.

Valenzuela is very popular with the fans, as are Garvey and Cey. A good percentage of the Dodger attendance is provided by Mexican-American fans who come to see Valenzuela play.

But it's questionable whether a pitcher should be worth more money than a star veteran player who takes the field for almost every game.

Players like Willie Mays, Hank Aaron and Mickey Mantle (when he wasn't bothered by leg injuries) put in a lot more time on the playing field than any pitcher of their era and their salaries reflected this fact.

Valenzuela should get a lot more than the \$42,000 he supposedly received last season.

But \$1,000,000 annually is another matter. Here's hoping Valenzuela reports to camp soon with his contact problems solved.

# Warrior tracksters shine in opener

The Ruidoso High School boys' track team came through with several fine performances as it opened the season with a five-team meet at Artesia High School Thursday afternoon.

The Warriors captured two first place medals in the non-scoring meet which involved Goddard of Roswell, Carlsbad and New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI), along with host Artesia.

Freshman Cisco Bob provided the biggest surprise as he took a first place in the 1,500 meters, recording a 4:30 clocking.

Bob started out strong and held off the closing rush of a runner from Artesia for the victory.

Bob also finished fourth in the 800 meters with a 2:14.8 time.

"I was really pleased with Bob's effort," said Warrior head coach Ronnie Maskew. "He's only a ninth-grader so he's got lots of improvement ahead of him. He could be one of the best I've ever had."

The other Ruidoso first place came from senior Lon Nunley. Nunley hurled the discus 141 feet for a first place in that

event. Nunley, who is headed for the University of New Mexico (UNM), also finished second in the shot put with a 46-3 effort (a personal best) and was fifth in the 100 meters with an 11.91 clocking. The talented senior also anchored the Warrior 400 meter relay team to a 46.0 time, good for third place.

"Lon did a great job," said Maskew. "His 100 meter time was especially impressive since it's only a tenth off his best of last year (11.2)." Ruidoso finished fourth in the state 400

meter relay last year with a 45.3 clocking. The Warriors ran 48.3 in their first relay last season so if they improve as much this year they could run in the 43.9-43.5 area.

Billy Woodul took a second place in the javelin with a fine 150-8 throw. The state qualifying mark for that event is 163 feet so Woodul shouldn't have any trouble reaching that mark this year.

The Warrior 1,600 meter relay team of Grady Williamson, Scott Neal, Eric Strobel and Don Nunley took a second place with an excellent 3:39.75 time.

Williamson put Ruidoso in second place at the end of his opening leg and Neal captured first place at the end of his leg. Strobel ran a strong leg but was overtaken by a Carlsbad runner. Nunley finished the relay with a 53.2 clocking for his leg, the fastest of the four runners.

Williamson also ran a 54.16 in the 400 meters, good for third place.

Don Nunley also figured in two other fine efforts by the Warriors. The senior took third in the high jump with a 5-4 effort and ran on the fourth place medley relay team which recorded a 4:06.4 clocking.

The other members of the medley relay team included Steve Snidow, Strobel and Denny Landrum.

Landrum had a busy day, also running in the 3,000 meters and the 1,500 meters.

Sophomores Tony Muse and Robert Swanner leaped 18-8 and 16-7, respectively, in the long jump. Muse went over 17 feet last season and should improve on that mark this year.


Maskew was pleased with the performances of practically everybody on the team.

"I think they did a great job," he said. "We've got a chance to do really well this year against the better teams. We'll have to keep on working hard but we can do it."

Maskew felt the Warriors' new uniforms helped them in the meet.

"This is the first year we've had good warm-up suits to go along with new uniforms," he said. "I think it gave the guys pride because they looked good and they performed well because of it."

Ruidoso will have two weeks off before it competes in the Deming Invitational March 27. The Warrior girls' team, which just started practice last week, will also enter the competition.

## Farmington, St. Pius win state cage titles

Farmington High School capped an undefeated season with a tight 58-56 victory over Eldorado of Albuquerque for the New Mexico boys' AAAA basketball title Saturday night at the University of New Mexico (UNM) arena in Albuquerque.

St. Pius of Albuquerque won the AAA title with a 61-58 decision over Tucumcari. Moriarty took the AA crown with a 61-56 victory over Escalante and Cliff topped Floyd 62-54 for the A crown.

Farmington completed its season with a 25-0 mark and its first-ever state championship.

But it didn't come easy. It took two free throws by 5-8 guard Mike Sanders with five seconds left in the game to give the Scorpions the championship.

With the score tied at 56-56, Eldorado missed a shot and Farmington had the ball and a time out.

Sanders was covered by a heavy Eagle press and was unintentionally fouled, giving him two shots.

The junior calmly made both free throws for a two-point Scorpion advantage. A last-second Eldorado shot bounced off the rim and Farmington became the champion.

Farmington started off the contest like it was going to run away from the Eagles.

The Scorpions took advantage of an 18-3 poor shooting by Eldorado to take an early lead at the end of the first quarter. Farmington increased its margin to 28-11 early in the second period before the Eagles got their act together.

Eldorado, sparked by 6-5 Mike Wheeler and Karl Wilock, outscored the Scorpions 17-1 the remainder of the second quarter to trail by just one point at halftime, 29-28.

Eldorado seemed to take command of the game in the third quarter as Wheeler, Wilock and Mike Winters started exerting themselves on the boards and forcing Farmington into numerous turnovers.

Leading 34-32 with 6:50 left in the third quarter, the Eagles scored eight straight points for a 42-32 advantage.

Farmington was as cold in the third quarter as Eldorado was in the opening period. The Scorpions finally got untracked late in the quarter and cut their deficit to 46-39 at the end of the period.

Center Sean Walker, Sanders and guard Duane Ward started putting their shots in and Farmington got back in the contest.

Walker scored a pair of buckets to pull the Scorpions within two at 48-44 with seven minutes remaining in the game.

The scoring went back and forth in the remaining time before Sanders made his winning charity shot.

Eldorado finished the season at 24-2. The Eagles have never won a state championship in basketball.

Joe Eckert hit a 10-foot running hook shot with two seconds left to give St. Pius its victory over Tucumcari in the AAA title game. The Sartans added a free throw in the last second of the contest for their final margin.

The game was close most of the way with favored St. Pius holding its biggest margin at 50-39 at the third-quarter break.

Tucumcari refused to quit, however, and fought back to tie the score at 56-56 on a pair of Troy Brown free throws with 10 seconds remaining in the contest.

That set the stage for Eckert's game-winning shot.

Alois Wagner led the winners with 25 points while Brown scored 15 for Tucumcari.

St. Pius finished the season with a 23-3 record while Tucumcari ended with a 23-4 mark.

In Saturday's third place games Sandia of Albuquerque topped defending champion Hobbs 102-92 in the AAAA division and Pojoaque defeated West Las Vegas 76-43 in the AAA contest.

Friday Lordsburg beat Penasco 103-87 in the AA third place game and Texico edged Rebooth 68-65 in the A contest.

NOTES: Most observers at the state tournament thought Hobbs would meet Farmington in the AAAA finals but Eldorado nipped the defending champions 88-86 in the semi-finals Friday afternoon.

One of the best college prospects in the tournament was 6-8 center Rich Strong of Sandia. Strong, who is being wooed by UNM and powerful Fresno State, scored 26 points and dominated the boards against Hobbs in the third place game. Strong's teammate, 6-3 David Lell, scored a tournament-high 39 points against Hobbs. St. Pius defeated Deming of district 3-AAA (Ruidoso High School's district) 82-56 in the opening round Thursday. Deming had been ranked first in the final regular-season AAAA poll and St. Pius was rated second.

The Warriors will be off until Friday, March 26, when they compete in the two-day Deming Invitational.







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

 Ever fair, Killarney.

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
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
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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Inez Gill was a tiny but extraordinary person. She probably knew more about the sources of our state's revenues than anyone else ever has.

During the night of March 7-8, she stopped breathing, while still asleep. She was finally pronounced dead, at age 63, at 4 p.m. on March 9.

The knowledge she took with her when she died will probably never again be found in a single person. In short, she was almost certainly unique.

That's not just sentimentality. Inez herself was not sentimental, and she would not welcome anyone's being fakely lugubrious over her passing.

She was tough, and she was shrewd. But her major gift was an extremely high degree of intelligence, which she turned, over many years, to an understanding of the way New Mexico taxes its citizens and how much such taxes yield.

She did that extremely well. This writer will almost certainly remember her best as she screwed up her face, which grew more gnome-like as she grew older, and said, with great intensity, "Freddy, why do you say that . . . ?"

"Why?" was Inez's question. The desire to understand — to truly understand — was what drove her.

On this earth, she never completely achieved that, which constantly vexed and disturbed her. Those who loved her might well wish that the completeness of understanding which she never managed to attain to in this life might now be hers in another.

Some folks in Deming seem to want to pick a fight with Senator Ike Smalley. That's understandable.

Smalley is not a comfortable man to be around. He does not bother to pretend to be patient with those who disturb him. By and large, such people are those who seem to him ignorant of the legislative process at which he has been an expert for so many years.

He has been in the Senate since 1957, after previous service in the House. The man second after him in seniority in the

New Mexico Legislature, Representative John Merston, did not arrive in Santa Fe till 1959.

So when reporter Robin Lichtenstein of the Deming Headlight reports that Smalley "reluctantly" admitted to being on retainer from Public Service Company of New Mexico for 10 or 15 years, that adverb is almost certainly well chosen.

When Smalley does not wish to admit to something, no one in the world could be more accurately described as being "reluctant."

But something else may just have gotten missed in the writing of this story. It is the fact that, as any one of dozens of us up here in Santa Fe who have watched him work can tell you, Smalley is perfectly capable of being on retainer from PNM in his private life and voting against it with a resounding "no" in his public life, if it seemed to him that is how things should go.

Smalley, in short, is a true individualist — of which there are all too few in this troubled world. He has a rude and crude kind of integrity which may be little understood in a world which hungers to see everything in the black-and-white good guys versus bad guys of TV drama.

Sierra, Hidalgo and Luna counties may decide to dump on Ike if they choose to do so. It's only fair to warn them they will live to regret it.

Dear editor:

This letter is to the people of Lincoln County. It is about the five miles of road which goes from U. S. Highway 380 to the O Bar O Ranch headquarters. The road is entirely on O Bar O Ranch property. This road also provides one of the access routes to the Carrizo Mountain area of the Lincoln National Forest.

Many people are under the belief that I want to close this road to deny them access to National Forest land. This is not true and in the following paragraphs I will attempt to explain my actions and views.

I purchased the O Bar O Ranch in May of 1981. As a property owner I feel that I should have control over the use of my land. The O Bar O Headquarters is nationally known because of its unique beauty and history which attracts many tourists. As a result, several items have been stolen or damaged by people indiscriminately driving around the ranch. Cars driving off the road have also caused erosion to the pasture land.

There is no mention of a road right-of-way through the O Bar O in my title deed or in the county records. Therefore I instructed my manager to chain the en-

trance to the O Bar O to restrict access and to prevent further vandalism to the land and houses. The chain was promptly cut by the Sheriff's department under instructions from the county manager, who claimed it was a county road. Of course I feel the road is O Bar O property since I paid for it. This issue is still to be decided and I am hoping the people of Lincoln County will support me.

I was later contacted by Paul Gordon, District Ranger for Lincoln National Forest. He expressed his concern about limiting public access to National Forest Land and asked me to join him in finding a solution. In a subsequent meeting between us we sought an alternate easily accessible route to the forest land. One of the routes we came up with was a road from Indian Divide because it would primarily be through National Forest Land and not on private land.

There is presently a road from U. S. Highway 380 at Indian Divide to National Forest land around Tucson Mountain. Another one and a half miles of road would have to be constructed to connect it to the Benado Gap road and the Carrizo Mountains. This would also open considerably more National Forest land to the public.

Paul Gordon pointed out that the Forest Service did not have the existing funds available to improve the existing road and to construct new roads. I then offered the free use of my road equipment and operators to construct the road for them under the supervision of their engineers. We agreed that this would give good access to the public and at the same time give me the privacy I desired on the O Bar O Ranch.

Mr. Gordon then presented this plan to the County Commissioners and they said no. I was quite surprised by this action since it would not cost Lincoln County anything and would best serve the needs of all Lincoln County residents. Some time later my attorney again presented this plan to the County Commissioners and again we were turned down.

I would like to point out that there are several existing horse trails into the forest area. There are also several other places where a road could be made into the National Forest by extending roads with existing rights-of-way. Although I did make the offer to build a new road, it is the responsibility of the Forest Service and county to supply access roads to National Forest land, not mine. I made the offer in cooperation with the Forest Service because I understand the public's need for forest access. All I want is my rightful ownership and control of my lands.

As many of you already know, I am also the owner of the Flying W Ranch (Leslie Ranch), north of Capitan. I am presently making improvements to both ranches and employ several county residents, contract much work locally, and purchase most of my supplies locally. It seems to me that I am doing my part in helping Lincoln County and feel that I should be treated fairly by county officials.

Thank you for letting me express my views and I sincerely hope you will support me.

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

Rooney's rapid-fire delivery of one-liners makes him a perfect foil for the younger actors. They often seem awed by Rooney and Crothers' talents.






