TRUSTEE VACANCY UNFILLED

Water bond issue tabled

Ruidoso trustees postponed the election on a proposed \$8 million water improvements bond issue and tabled appointment to the vacant trustee position at Monday's organizational meeting.

"The input from the community is that they are not ready for a water bond issue yet," said Mayor George White.

"After working with P&Z (Planning and Zoning Commission) and the water study commission, there seems to be a consensus of opinion that we postpone this and search for other (funding) methods for our water bond."

White reported the suggestion that rather than fund the proposed \$8 million project through a general obligation bond, funds be taken partially from revenue bonds and partially from general obligation bonds.

"It was my suggestion and it is my motion that we remove that (the proposed water bond issue) from the ballot right now," said trustee Frank Saylor.

"If left as a general obligation bond it would raise the tax base some one-third, which would be pretty hard to sell," said water board member C. Newton Page, when asked by the mayor to comment.

Trustee Benny Coulston said that it will probably be the latter part of July before the water bond is rescheduled.

"We could come with an issue and a method to pay for it at the same time," Coulston said.

Concerning the appointment of a trustee to fill the vacancy left by White's election as mayor, White reported that the matter had been discussed by the trustees, but Coulston refused to vote on the appointment Monday.

"I'm not ready at this time to do so," Coulston said. "I'd rather do it at the next meeting."

Trustee Al Junge said, "I think we ought to get it done as quickly as we can... We have had notice on this thing for the last week... I think that's what we get paid to do, get things done."

Coulston moved to table the appointment, and the motion was carried after a second by Saylor.

White said that Don Dale had been proposed to fill the vacancy.

Also postponed during the meeting was the election of a mayor pro-tem.

White requested that the election be put off "till we get a full council."

The trustees also postponed the appointment of village employees and board and commission members, usually handled as a formality when a new mayor takes office.

Saylor suggested that no changes be made concerning village employees "until their successors have been named by the mayor and approved by council."

The purpose of the suggestion is "for all employees to retain their present job descriptions and to provide for the orderly continuity of this administration," Saylor said.

Also, White said that he wished to defer the appointment of board and commission members until he could receive input from current board and commission chairmen.

Saylor and Coulston both declined the offer by White for them to make comments or offer "words of wisdom," but Junge took the opportunity to suggest a need for changes in committees' rules. There are currently conflicts among the rules for various committees, he said.

White challenged the trustees "to get busy immediately" working on the budget for next fiscal year.

"I would hope and pray we have cooperation with the mayor and the rest of the council from here on in," White said.

"Let petty jealousies, petty ideas somebody might have, be cast aside."

"There were some pretty harsh things said during the campaign that I didn't think were fitting with councilmen."

"Rest assured I'll try to give you my cooperation. I'll do what is in my power to be fair and square with everyone."

In other business, White read a review of the statutory provisions of the elective officers in a mayor-council form of government.

Trustees will next meet in special session March 22 at 9:30 a.m. to hold a hearing on an appeal of a Planning and Zoning Commission ruling rezoning property located adjacent to the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club for construction of a Hilton Hotel.

Reservation fire destroys buildings, 70 acres of forest

A forest fire on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation Wednesday afternoon destroyed two sheds and burned about 70 acres of forest, according to Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Forestry dispatcher Elizabeth Lapaz.

The cause of the fire is unknown, Lapaz said.

A BIA firefighter was taken to the hospital after a snag fell on her, Lapaz said, but her injuries were minor and she later returned to the scene.

The fire started about a mile southwest of the Inn of the Mountain Gods on the south side of Highway 4 and advanced quickly uphill with winds blowing the flames into dry timber.

The fire was reported about 2:40 p.m., to the BIA dispatcher. BIA units were first on the scene and were later joined by 13 Ruidoso Fire Department volunteers with three fire trucks. In all, about 100 fire fighters responded, said the BIA dispatcher.

The fire was brought under control by 5 p.m.

Fish loss estimate revised upward

Monty Leishman of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish in Roswell reported to The News Wednesday that in his latest electrofishing survey of the Rio Ruidoso, he calculated about five percent more dead fish in the second mile of the fish kill that occurred here February 4.

Leishman said that earlier studies showed a 60 to 80 percent loss of fish throughout the second mile of the spill that happened as a result of an estimated five to six gallons of gasoline leaking into the river at a culvert located just past the intersection of Sudderth and Mechem Drives.

However, Leishman said that the residual effect of the gasoline tank excavation accident has killed about five percent more of the fish throughout the second mile downstream than was originally estimated.

A total fish loss occurred in the first mile, with the loss estimated at more than 2,000 fish.

Leishman said that in his mind, it is safe to say that "we're not going to lose any more fish." Next week, said Leishman, he is going to Santa Fe to confer with Dick

McCleskey, division chief of fisheries of the Department of Game and Fish. They plan on sending an assessment to Southland Corporation of what has happened so far and getting the reaction of the corporation. Southland is the owner of the property where the gasoline spill originated, Leishman noted. Southland will probably receive a letter around March 23.

Leishman stated that the New Mexico Legislature has set a value of \$1 per fish, but added that that depends on what type of fish is considered. Brown trout have suffered the widest decimation of any species in the Rio Ruidoso, said Leishman.

He added that the Department of Game and Fish may compensate for the loss of the Rio Ruidoso's fishery capability, but that it may take the river three to four years to recover.

Leishman said Bill Passmore, a Southland representative, has called him to find out what is happening concerning the fish loss. However, Leishman said he has not been able to furnish Passmore with a lot of information and that by the end of next week, he will be in more of a position to comment on the number of fish actually lost as a result of the spill.

Three-year-old girl killed by gunshot

A three-year-old Ruidoso Downs girl died yesterday afternoon from what a spokesman from the District Attorney's office described as an accidental gunshot fired by her five-year-old brother.

Amanda Urban died shortly after arriving at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital at 2:30 p.m., Wednesday of massive abdominal injuries, according to a hospital spokesman.

The District Attorney's office spokesman said that investigation indicated the girl was accidentally shot with a .357 caliber handgun.

County Courthouse gets new number

Beginning Monday the county courthouse telephone number will be changed to 648-2337. Anyone wishing to reach any office in the courthouse, with the exception of the sheriff's office, should use this number.

The newly installed Mountain Bell phone system provides the courthouse offices with intercom and conference capabilities. Each office will also have one private line with its own number.

Spall out as Downs clerk

Ruidoso Downs village clerk Virginia Spall will not be rehired by Mayor J. C. Day, it was decided at the trustees' organizational meeting Monday.

Day recommended that "all employees be reinstated at their present salary with the exception of one, Mrs. James Spall."

Trustee Bob Power moved the recommendation be tabled and brought before the personnel board.

The meeting was then recessed for a closed session of the personnel board, after which Day announced a recommendation to appoint Wilma L. Webb as village clerk. The recommendation passed after the mayor cast the tie-breaking vote.

Spall, who has been village clerk since April 26, 1976, said after the meeting that she has requested a public hearing on the decision.

The hearing, during which she is entitled to an explanation for her dismissal, must be held within 14 days according to law, Spall said.

She will remain in her position until being relieved by the newly appointed clerk, but she told The News Wednesday that she has not been notified when that will be.

A letter of resignation submitted by village attorney Richard Parsons was read by Day. Parsons stated in the letter that he submits his resignation to each new mayor to give the mayor an opportunity to

appoint whomever he wishes. Day reported that he decided to accept the resignation after learning of a possible

conflict of interest in Parsons' representing a client who appeared before the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Parsons then submitted a second resignation, to become effective March 15.

After discussion by the trustees, however, it was decided that Day, Power and trustee Harold Mansell would talk to Parsons in an effort to persuade him to reconsider.

Commissioners over various village departments were appointed by Day. Trustee Lois Beavers was named Commissioner of Parks and Recreation, trustee Jake Harris was named Streets Commissioner, Power was named Water and Sewer Commissioner and Mansell was named Commissioner of Sanitation.

Mansell was also appointed mayor pro-tem.

Day read a letter from Ruidoso Mayor George White expressing a desire for increased cooperation between the two communities.

"Situating like we are, the communities being so close, we need to make every effort possible to be good neighbors," Day said in response to the letter.

It was decided that the trustees would meet with White at the earliest opportunity.

In other business, Mayor Day:

Appointed Carl DuCep acting police chief, pending confirmation by the trustees.

Determined that Mansell, as mayor pro-tem, and the new village clerk would have signature authority according to Resolution 82-3.

Read Resolution 82-4 concerning the open meetings law.

Confirmed Volunteer Fire Department personnel.

Ruidoso Downs trustees will next meet March 22 at 7 p.m.

County seeks new substation site

Further work on plans for a county suboffice in Ruidoso was tabled by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners Tuesday, until final decision on a site is made.

Problems presented by the building's proposed location just west of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport, on airport ground, prompted the commissioners to reconsider the location.

"You've got an inherently dangerous situation," said Truman A. "Bill" Billingsley, county manager, referring to problems which would be created by vehicular and airplane traffic in the same area.

Ken Guthrie, representing architects Gordon Herkenhoff and Associates, Albuquerque, said the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) was surprised to learn of the proposed building at the airport.

"They did not know Ruidoso had granted this easement," Guthrie said.

It was decided that the commissioners would present a proposal to locate the suboffice next to the Ruidoso Administrative Center at the March 30 Ruidoso Board of Trustees meeting.

Commissioners also discussed the possibility of locating the suboffice south of the proposed airport location and requesting a private easement from the landowner.

Site and floor plans for an administrative building on the south parking lot of the current county courthouse in Carrizozo were also presented by Guthrie. The building will house the administrative office, computer room, commissioners' meeting room and offices for the three county commissioners.

The commissioners approved continuing with these plans and with plans for the installation of an emergency exit in the county jail.

Guthrie said the architects plan to call for bids April 9 and open bids May 4, tentatively.

Approval to reimburse Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital \$58,000 for the purchase of a used ultrasound device from General Electric was granted by the commissioners, with an admonition that future purchases should be made by a call for bids.

Ken Moore, hospital administrator, requested the authority to buy equipment from a single source rather than call for

bids, as additional equipment purchased must be compatible with equipment already in use. The commissioners instructed Moore to specify such requirements in a call for bids.

The commissioners voted for the county to submit an application to the national flood insurance program, a federal program enabling homeowners to buy flood insurance and granting the county management rights for new construction in the local flood plain. The program is free of charge to the county.

Bids on annual fuel requirements were opened at the meeting, with LaMay Distributing, Carrizozo, being awarded the bid at \$1.16.9 for regular, \$1.20.9 for unleaded and \$1.05.9 for diesel.

Commissioners also voted to correct a problem along a portion of Eagle Creek Road, where a sharp "S" curve has caused several accidents, according to commissioner Ben Hall. Residents in the area will donate an easement for the work, it was reported.

In other business, the commissioners: —Approved a budget increase of \$1,550 for the cost of an appraisal of airport land for the proposed county suboffice.

—Made a commitment to submit a road

for the planned new Ruidoso High School on the 1983 school bus program.

—Granted a request to build private roads at the proposed Deer Park Meadows Subdivision prior to approval of the subdivision.

—Approved a letter of thanks to be sent to South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development for the presentation of prints by New Mexico artists to the county.


—Granted preliminary road acceptance and release of surety for replat of Middle Cedar Subdivision on certification by a civil engineer that specifications for acceptance have been met.

—Agreed to install a cattleguard at the Gnatkowski Ranch as a school bus road will run through the property as of August this year.

—Granted a replat of lots 1, 2 and 3, block 3, C-Hill Subdivision, for a property line change to avoid a possible property dispute should the owner decide to sell part of the land.

—Appointed commissioner John Hightower as representative to the New Mexico Association of Counties.

Lincoln County Commissioners will next meet April 6 at 10 a.m. at the courthouse in Carrizozo.

Chief Swenor building efficiency

What's new with the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD)?

Almost everything. With a new facility and new equipment, new programs and top-notch training, Police Chief Dick Swenor is doing all he can to keep RPD up to date.

Swenor told The News in an interview Tuesday about improvements in the department to maintain RPD's good standing.

"This department has a good reputation," Swenor said. Part of RPD's new look is a remodeled facility and new equipment.

The new building, to be started sometime after May 1, will house police, courts and a new detention facility to replace the current outdated jail, Swenor said.

The expansion and face lift of the present building will mean temporary relocation for the RPD this summer, but Swenor said it is worth it to be rid of the cramped quarters.

In addition to remodeling its facility,

RPD is now replacing vehicles that Swenor said were "falling apart" with four new all-terrain units which RPD is leasing for \$2,000 a month.

Because four-wheel-drive vehicles require considerable maintenance under heavy police use, Swenor said it is better to lease the trucks and have no repair costs.

The new vehicles are dark brown with white roofs—the color scheme that will eventually be seen on the entire police fleet, Swenor said the new colors look better than the present beige.

Swenor said RPD will sell the old four-wheel-drive vehicles in a village auction. If, like last year's auction proceeds, the money finds its way back to RPD, more improvements may be forthcoming. The force is attired in new uniforms paid for with last year's proceeds.

Other improvements by the force are programs implemented to increase awareness of RPD and thereby help reduce crime, Swenor said.

In September, RPD began the K-9 program to combat burglary in Ruidoso. With "Duke" the German shepherd always on call and working a full-time shift with his

handler, police officer Bob Achterberg, Ruidoso's burglary rate is down from last year.

Swenor said he "would like to think" Duke is a contributing factor to the lower burglary rate because of his high visibility. Another factor in the lower rate may be the "take home car program" RPD began in November, Swenor said.

Officers are now allowed to use police cruisers both on and off duty. Swenor said this gives the department higher visibility, because the cars are now parked in neighborhoods when officers are off duty.

In addition to heightened public awareness, the take home program boosts officers' morale and pride in their jobs because cruisers are now treated like personal cars, Swenor said.

To deal with traffic accidents in Ruidoso, RPD is participating in a month old program to study local traffic.

As part of an ad hoc committee to advise the state Highway Department, police are doing "flow counts" along with highway crews to determine what changes need to be made to control traffic on village streets.

Swenor said Ruidoso's accident rate is "high for a small town." There were 449 accidents resulting in 203 personal injuries in 1981; and in July and August, Ruidoso "had more accidents than Albuquerque," Swenor said.

To keep a high standard of professionalism on the force, Swenor said he and his 27 employees go through periodic training in such areas as firearms, bomb disposal, juvenile crime and jail duty, which even the secretaries must train for.

Swenor said one of his main concerns as chief is to keep personnel abreast of the latest law enforcement practices through training and certification.

He said top-notch training is necessary because of the dangers and burdens of police work. Because of its emphasis on training and New Mexico state requirements, Swenor said RPD is above average for a small-town police department.

"I feel I've got one of the highest qualified departments in the state," he said. "You couldn't find a better bunch of guys."

most 90 percent of the people he talked had either been to or knew about Ruidoso, added Sandoval.

"We gave away a ton of information," Sandoval said. Jungbluth estimated that somewhere from 25,000 and 30,000 pieces of promotional material were distributed.

Jungbluth said people were grabbing for ski, race track, hotel, restaurant and other brochures. In addition to the pamphlets, a slide show featured activities available to area vacationers, and the booth's walls were lined with scenic photographs of Ruidoso and the vicinity, Jungbluth said.

"Our booth was one of the most attractive ones there, next to the state Chamber of Commerce booths who've been doing

this sort of thing for 20 years," said Jungbluth. "but I feel what we presented was equally as good as what anybody else had."

About 89 percent of the booth visitors registered for the Ruidoso getaway vacation, said Sandoval. M. Harwell of Arlington, Texas, won three days at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and three nights lodging, said Jungbluth.

Jungbluth said that not only was Ruidoso given great exposure at the Dallas show, but that it provided him and the others with a tremendous chance to exchange ideas with representatives of other areas.

"I didn't hear a single bad comment about Ruidoso. The show was undoubtedly a great help to Ruidoso. Some people out of those thousands will now plan their future vacation in Ruidoso," said Sandoval.

April 6 is deadline for candidates to file

Aspiring candidates for the New Mexico House of Representatives and for district 1 county offices have three weeks to file for the June 1 primary election.

The filing date for primary election candidates for offices not subject to the primary designating convention is Tuesday, April 6.

The 1982 House Reapportionment Act requires that nominating petitions and declarations of candidacy for the office of representative be filed for the new

districts created by the legislature in January.

Ruidoso is in Senate District 39 and House District 56.

Candidates for the House of Representatives, district judge, state Board of Education and magistrate must submit petitions and declarations of candidacy by the April 6 deadline.

Candidates for county offices qualify by paying a \$50 filing fee.

Safe drinking water workshop is March 25

A "Safe Drinking Water Workshop" will be held in Ruidoso on March 25.

The free workshop is open to all interested persons. It will be held in the Jasper Pines Restaurant, 428 Main St., Ruidoso, from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The workshop, presented by the New Mexico Rural Water Users Association, is aimed at providing technical assistance to

help community water systems comply with the Safe Drinking Water Act, according to Roger Barnes, program manager.

Instructors will lead discussions on cross connections, meters, Safe Drinking Water Act information, preventive maintenance and valve operation.

The training session is approved for credit toward State Operator Certification.

Utility program problems continue

Participants in the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, a federally funded state program designed to assist low income families with their utility bills, are not having their bills paid, according to Barbara Ward, project director for senior citizens in Corona, Carrizozo and Capitan.

Ward said that the Governor's Office of Community Affairs in Santa Fe, responsible for processing the applications and paying the bills, has been contacted about the problem. They reported, according to Ward, that the bills will be paid.

Nosker seeks seat as county commissioner

Kenneth Nosker, Glencoe, has announced his candidacy for county commissioner for District 1 in the June 1 primary election. He will run on the Republican ticket.

Nosker will be a candidate for the seat to be vacated by current commission chairman Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight.

Nosker served as commissioner from District 3 from 1962 to 1966, but the districts have been changed since then, he said.

She said that Larry Martinez, from the Santa Fe office, also told her he would contact the utility companies involved with the program to inform them that "payments are being distributed."

Some program participants have received notices of termination of their utilities, Ward said, but she assures them that the problem will be remedied by the state office in Santa Fe.

Ken Shockey candidate for county sheriff

Former New Mexico State Police lieutenant Kenneth G. Shockey has announced his candidacy for Sheriff of Lincoln County on the Democratic ticket.

Shockey retired from the State Police in 1980 after 27 years of service, 14 of which were spent in Lincoln County.

He has attended law enforcement management school at Southern Methodist University; FBI schools on fingerprinting, search and seizure and riot control; and a short course in traffic and accident investigation conducted by Northwestern University in Chicago.

Shockey has served as a State Police counselor and was a first aid and pistol team instructor.

"I feel that the sheriff's office must continue forward to keep up with the growth in Lincoln County through continuous training and schooling, and I believe with my experience and knowledge of Lincoln County, that I am best qualified for the job," Shockey said.

Shockey also noted that interdepartmental cooperation and communication are extremely important in achieving law enforcement objectives.

He and his wife Eleanor and their daughter live in Ruidoso.

Chamber offers Spanish

A 12-lesson beginner's conversational Spanish course is being offered through the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce at Ruidoso High School.

Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth said the class will cost \$75 per person and will be taught by Linda Sanchez, who has conducted the course before. Sanchez is an accredited teacher who will plan the course herself using handouts, show and tell and slides, said Jungbluth.

He noted that at least 20 people are needed to form a class, but that if more than that express an interest, then another class will be set up. Jungbluth said those wishing to enroll in the class should call

the Chamber at 257-7395 and state their preference as to what times they want the classes to be held. "We'll tailor the class to the group and see what the group is favorable to," said Jungbluth.

Jungbluth said that Sanchez is prepared to begin the lessons now, but that the class will start about a week after enough people enroll.

About the course, Retail Merchants Committee chairman Larry Langford said, "It can be very beneficial to retail store owners because of the increasing amount of Mexican nationals coming to town. It gets people to converse and get by in Spanish."

Leandro Vega candidate for sheriff

Leandro Vega Jr., former Lincoln County Sheriff, has announced his candidacy for sheriff on the Republican ticket, in the June 1 primary election.

Vega is a life-long resident of Lincoln County with 17 years experience in law enforcement. He is now employed in construction in the Carrizozo area.

As Lincoln County Sheriff, Vega established a sub-station in Ruidoso, the first of its kind in the county. The sub-station serves the Alto, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs areas.

Vega has had extensive training in investigation, fingerprinting and narcotics, and in 1980 he served as special investigator for the District Attorney's office in Lincoln and Otero counties.

If elected, Vega said, he would "insist upon good and impartial law enforcement" by training personnel in current enforcement practices and keeping them abreast of changing laws.

"It is my belief that in order to enforce the laws of our land, adequately protect our people and their property, and solve crime, this can only be accomplished through proper training," Vega said.

Vega and his wife reside in Carrizozo and have two sons attending New Mexico State University in Las Cruces.

"There is always room for improvement, and I intend to help Lincoln County grow better for all the people who have chosen to live here," he said.

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

Winter's Last Days
This message is being sent to you on the eve of Saint Patrick's; and by the time these words reach you the first day of spring will be just two days away.

The little apricot tree near the house and the one in the garden are out in full bloom, encouraged to open by the west wind of March, and the warm sun. The large tree out near the blue bird tree is halfway into full bloom, waving its branches laden with blossoms and buds in all stages of flower and bud. This puts the tree in its full blossom glory through the blending of crystal white of the petals, the pink of the half open flowers, and the pure crimson of the still closed buds. A light drinker up on top of the hill where she was born, the trip down had given her an appetite; and she had breakfast there with the snow falling a little faster.

The snow became heavy and so she curled up right next to a wheelbarrow turned on one side, for shelter. Following her mother down to the barn, she began munching on the hay along with her mother.

Like all cow children, Little Tar Baby the Second, is a very good child staying close to her mother at all times and quick to respond to her every word of cow language.

Since there are no young calves close around yet for playmates, Tar Baby goes running and kicking to entertain the grown cows. And she is picking up grown-up ways, like eating hay, and licking the salt, and trying to munch the range cubes. Warrior thinclads have depth

The Ruidoso High School boys' and girls' track teams this season have one big advantage over last year's teams. Both squads have more depth this season and figure to do well in the upcoming invitational meets.

The Warrior boys have 28 athletes and the girls 22. Last season the girls, who ended up the season with just 13 athletes, had 18 in March.

"Judy McCoy has been looking really good in practice," Castanon said. "She's only a freshman but she could run the 400 meters and 1,600 meter relay."

Sophomore Valerie Garcia has also looked good in practice and could be a member of the 1,600 meter relay squad. She was one of the top Warrior performers last season.

Lillian Lopez, who made 3-AAA all-district in basketball and is also a fine volleyball player, could also make the 1,600 meter relay team.

"We should be stronger in more events this season," said Warrior girls head coach Sergio Castanon. "Last year we were strong in the distance races and the 1,600 meter relay. This season we could be strong in the 400-meter relay also."

The Ruidoso girls' 1,600 meter relay should be especially strong this season and a freshman should be a big part of that improvement.

"We could have three sophomores and a freshman on the 1,600 meter relay team," said Castanon.

One of the big surprises of the Warrior girls' team so far in practice has been the running of senior Sherri Dennis.

"She's a sprinter and has looked good in practice," Castanon said. "We've got a couple of girls out who could do well in the sprints."

Deanna Peto is the top Warrior distance runner and could be one of the best milers in the state. She ranked among the top 10 milers in the AAA division last season.

The Ruidoso boys, who opened the season last Thursday with a meet at Artesia, look strong in the weight events and the relay.

In the five-team Artesia meet, the Warriors finished second in the 1,600 meter relay with a fine clocking of 3:39.75. Don Nunley, Scott Neal, Grady Williamson and Eric Strobel made up that team and seem capable of going considerably faster as the season rolls along.

Ruidoso's 400 meter relay team, which finished fourth in the state AAA meet last season, also has fine potential with Lon

Nunley anchoring the quartet.

Nunley, who ran an 11.2 in the 100 meters last season and is also a fine shot put and discus thrower, sprinted an 11.31 in the 100 meters in the Artesia meet and could get under 11.0 this year.

Other Warriors who could run 11.5 or better this season in the 100 meters include Neal, Strobel, Don Nunley, Peter Garcia and Williamson.

Cisco Bob, a freshman, won the 1,600 meter run in Artesia with a 4:30.0 time and may be one of the best distance prospects in the 3-AAA district.

Billy Woodul is a standout in the javelin. The junior threw the spear 150-6 last week, a mark better than those thrown by several AAAA division athletes last weekend in Albuquerque.

Ruidoso has good depth in other field events like the long jump and high jump and could score well in those events this season.

The Warriors' next meet is the Deming Invitational Saturday, March 27. It will be the season opener for the Ruidoso girls.

The state high school boys' basketball tournament last weekend at the University of New Mexico (UNM) gymnasium in Albuquerque left some lasting impressions on me.

The championship game between Farmington and Eldorado of Albuquerque could have gone either way, as the 58-56 score indicated.

Farmington won the AAAA title, St. Pius the AAA crown. Morarily the AA championship and Cliff the A title.

The Scorpions showed they had the hearts of champions as they built up a big lead, lost it early in the third quarter, and then fought back to win.

All four of these teams deserved to win the state championship in their respective divisions. However, the performance of St. Pius in the three-day tournament was probably the least impressive of the division champions.

Many teams would have caved in after holding an 18-3 first quarter lead and blowing it. Farmington seemed out of the contest after falling behind by 10 points late in the third quarter and seven at the end of the period.

The Sartens were picked to breeze to the state championship if they got by district 3-AAA champion Deming in the first round.

The Scorpions had some excellent guards who managed to pull the team together in the final period.

St. Pius did defeat Deming 62-56 in the opening game last Thursday but was not impressive in doing so. Its performance in defeating West Las Vegas in the semi-finals and Tucumcari in the finals left something to be desired also.

Mike Sanders, a 5-8 guard who made the winning points on two free throws, and slick Barry Reese were probably the best pair of guards in the tournament.

The Sartens had plenty of height and excellent shooters but they seemed to perform at the peak only when pushed to it. Against Tucumcari, St. Pius built up a sizable advantage in the third quarter but had to hang on for dear life as the Rattlers came back to tie the game several times in the final period.

Reese and Sanders, while not high scorers, were excellent playmakers who did well in the clutch and did not make many mistakes.

St. Pius had been ranked first or second in the state AAA poll all season. Most observers felt that the Sartens and Deming were the only standout teams in the AAAA division.

Center Sean Walker, a 6-5 pivotman, and 6-6 reserve Robert Voyles did a good job on the boards for the winners. They more than held their own against Eldorado's Mike Winters and Greg Wheeler.


But the state tournament proved otherwise.

The crowds at the state tournament, which hit 15,000 for the Eldorado-Hobbs semi-final game and 16,000 for the Farmington-Eldorado contest, were knowledgeable about the sport and not rowdy as some crowds have been.

Farmington was the only undefeated team in the tournament, a remarkable feat considering the fact it competed in the AAAA division.

There are not many high school state basketball tournaments in the country which could draw 16,000 to the championship game.

The big crowds were a tribute to the popularity of high school basketball in New Mexico.

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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — He once said, "I'll be back."
Now he says, "I'll be going" — and the state's House of Representatives will be lessened by that fact.
The man is John Mershon, who has more seniority than anybody else in that legislative body.
What's more, he has more power. That's not always the way it's been. The "I'll be back" line was said at a time when the liberals in the House used their own clout to strip him of any substantive assignments.

That may have embittered him a little, but he made his promise to return and then bided his time. With only the weakest of committee assignments then, he continued to do his work — and perhaps to scheme a little.

Out of that scheming, most observers believe, came the current coalition of conservative Democrats and Republicans which overturned the liberals' grip on the House. And with that came his return to power.

This time, he was tougher than ever before, the man who de facto ran things in the House.

First of all, he was chairman of Appropriations and Finance, through which must pass all bills which include so much as a dollar in expenditures. It is also the group which prepares House Bill 2, the omnibus measure which funds most of government for the coming year.

Holding that post, he was ex officio a member of the Legislative Finance Committee, and came to be its chairman as well. That's the operation which is more or less the Legislature in fact between formal sessions.

So Mershon held the reins of two of the Legislature's most potent organizations in his hands.

What's more, he caused both to function as he saw fit.

That didn't gain him increased popularity with the liberals who had rejected him the first time — which worried him not at all.

Mershon is a genuine conservative, not one of those summer soldiers who joined the ranks of the right only when they saw it would be popular to do so.

He really believes the state should not spend a dollar more than is necessary to get its job done.

Inspired by that belief, he held the line against the wild dreams of some of the Legislature's less practical members, whose efforts, left unchallenged, would bankrupt the state.

For that, New Mexico should be grateful.

One of the weaknesses of legislatures is that they tend to create a clubby atmosphere, in which Member A takes care of Member B and is in turn taken care of by him or her.

That doesn't always lead to what is best for the state.

Mershon had the strength of character to resist the clubbiness and to look at bills on their own merits as he perceived them.

That didn't always make him popular. Lawmakers theoretically accept the fact that there is a right way and a wrong way to do things. What they can't stand is somebody who says, "I know what the right way is."

To them, that's like saying, "The right way is my way, and only my way."

Mershon, who has a kind of Calvinistic sternness about him, had the courage to say he knew what the right way was — and if others wanted to draw conclusions from that, to let them do so. New Mexico is the better for that.

He will be missed, for his clear thinking and for his courage.

But don't try to talk him into re-running when he's said he's not going to.

Once his mind's made up, he stands firm.

He'll be missed more than he understands.

Last week's protest action by the head of the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) was a somewhat unorthodox, and perhaps ill-advised, way for a village employee to attract the attention of his superiors.

EMS, as the ambulance service for this area, performs a service which is literally vital. Were it not for that fact, the actions and comments of EMS director Matt Jakusz last Friday would probably not have merited the coverage we gave them.

But the fact is that EMS is a department of the Village of Ruidoso and is funded by the residents of Ruidoso and Lincoln County. More importantly, the lives of any of us might at any time depend on the performance of EMS in a life or death situation.

If there is something wrong in the ambulance service, we want to know about it.

For this reason, we agree with village manager Jim Hine's suggestion that the board of trustees carry out a thorough investigation of EMS.

The village might prefer not to be in the ambulance business. Last fall, Jakusz and other EMS employees proposed taking over the ambulance service and operating it as a private enterprise, and the hospital is reportedly considering the same thing.

But since EMS is a department of the village, we urge the trustees to investigate its operation. If there are problems that affect the health and safety of the public, they must be solved quickly. — TP

Ruidoso Downs has new look for new year

It won't take Ruidoso Downs race track patrons long to discover the "new look" at the mountain track this season.
"We have a new look this season beginning with the new sign in front of the main gate to the new barns on the backside," noted Ruidoso Downs General Manager Finlay MacGillivray.
"Ruidoso Downs will have a new look for the first time in many years," MacGillivray continued. "We'll have new modern mutuel equipment, expanded facilities which we feel will result in a substantial increase in business."
While the attractive new sign greets visitors out front, it's what's inside that will really amaze veteran Ruidoso Downs customers and newcomers alike.
Patrons, officials, horsemen, jockeys and even the staff performers, the horses, will find something has been designed for them in this expansion and renovation program costing more than \$2.5 million.
The most obvious improvement when Ruidoso Downs begins its 76-day horse racing season on May 8 will be the 125 by 135-foot expansion of the grandstand and All-American Turf Club.
The expansion project, complete with an elevator to take patrons to the upper level Turf Club will add 200 new tables and boxes in the Turf Club for a total of 800 more seats. In addition, about 800 new grandstand bucket-type seats will be available in the lower general admission level.
Joan Chase, Ruidoso Downs ticket manager, said persons interested in obtaining season or daily seating should contact her office (505-378-4150) as soon as possible.
"We have a whole new seating program at Ruidoso Downs and we hope to please our customers better than ever before,"

she said. "So far, Texas and Oklahoma are our big tourist areas. Last year, we received requests for tickets from every state, including Alaska and Hawaii. On two or three days, we even had visitors from Europe."
She said the expanded All-American Turf Club will contain 1,248 seats in all areas and the grandstand will now seat 3,185 persons in various sections.
"This year, the horsemen will have six rows of 23 seats each out in front in the open air. Last year, they only had 50 or so. They will be free. They will just have to show their licenses to sit there," she said.
"There will also be 225 seats serving 56 tables downstairs in the new grandstand addition and 240 bucket-type seats under the cover in the grandstand which will be sold on a daily basis. We also have a few box seats available in the grandstand," she said.
"Re-chairing the entire grandstand has just been approved and it should add a whole new uplifting to the grandstand. We hope to be able to handle some groups in the bucket seats in the west end of the grandstand," she explained. "But we can't emphasize enough how important it will be to make reservations early. We have more seats, but there's so much interest in them."
"Many of the bucket-type seats will be available at no charge, which will be a first for Ruidoso Downs," MacGillivray said. "We'll still have our popular canopy area."
Another change in the All-American Turf Club will be the installation of a new buffet dining concept. In previous years, menu service was available but the delays and congestion caused the buffet to be opened. "It's a more efficient and practical method of handling that many people," MacGillivray said.

Perhaps the most noticeable change inside the grandstand, All-American Turf Club and the Jockey Club section will be the installation of the ultra-modern Compact Self-Cash System designed by the American Totalisator Company.
The new computerized mutuel system will allow customers to purchase and cash mutuel tickets of any monetary denomination at any window at Ruidoso Downs.
"It's much, much easier for the customer to use," explained Ruidoso Downs' mutuel manager Jerry Knott. "We'll have instruction sheets for our customers to follow the proper steps."
"The biggest change is we will want the customer to say how much he wants to bet first, then what kind of bet such as win or place and then the number of horse. That's different from what it is now," he said.
Knott said Ruidoso Downs will be wired for 164 of the new machines, although only between 100 and 125 will be in use at one time. He added all units will be used during the crowded Labor Day weekend and, perhaps, during the Fourth of July weekend.
He said 35 windows (19 on the mainline and 16 upstairs) have been installed in the new grandstand addition. "Each window can be expected to handle about \$8,000 each day," Knott added.
With the ability to cancel incorrectly written tickets there's less chance the customer or operator will be forced to purchase unwanted tickets.
"Our daily average handle will show an improvement due to the new mutuel system as well as servicing more patrons," MacGillivray said. "We can handle more people more efficiently. Hopefully, it will be to the public's greater satisfaction."
A year ago, Ruidoso Downs set a daily average record mutuel handle of \$572,581 and a record total mutuel handle of \$40,089,694. In addition, the closing day handle last Labor Day of \$1,170,954 was the best in Ruidoso Downs history.
While the patrons will enjoy the upgraded facilities, so will the jockeys.
New jockey quarters have been installed in the infield as well as the new saddling paddock.
"Our new jockey and saddling facilities have been improved greatly, replacing outdated and antiquated facilities," MacGillivray explained. "With the saddling now being done in the infield in total view of the grandstand, it should be well-received by all our patrons."
"We'll also have a new tunnel for easy access to the infield for owners, trainers and officials," he added.
Horsemen, too, will reap benefits of the extensive project.

"One of the most pleasing aspects of the improvements will be the nine new barns which have been erected on the backside in place of some very old barns," MacGillivray noted. "Our overall new look will include the backside as well as the grandstand. We hope the new barns are to the horsemen's satisfaction which is of course important to us."
While two-legged officials, horsemen and patrons will notice a change, so will the four-legged equine performers.
For the third consecutive year, the five-furlong running surface has been revamped to provide greater safety and running stability for the horses.
MacGillivray said the base of main running surface has again been leveled and compacted and new cushion has been added. In addition, a Fontana safety rail system has been installed along the 550-yard chute at the far end of the track as well as on the inside rail of the entire five-eighths mile oval.
"The system is very costly but has been well-received at Del Mar (near San Diego, California). We know our horsemen and riders will like it here," MacGillivray said. "It is the ultimate in rider safety as well as being maintenance free."
"We are also in the process of doing some landscaping in the infield, and hopefully, it will show results by the middle of the summer," he said.
Although the expansion projects and major upgrading are definitely greatly needed, the already superb stakes and feature race program has been improved to a level unparalleled in American racing.
Ruidoso Downs will offer a race during each of the final three weekends of this year's season which will have a purse of at least \$1 million.
In past seasons, the meet's premier event, the All-American Futurity for two-year-olds and the All-American Derby for three-year-olds have each given away a \$1 million purse.
This season, the first running of the All-American Gold Cup for four-year-olds will be staged. It will be run on Sunday, August 22. The following Sunday, August 29, is the date of the All-American Derby. Both races will have an estimated purse of \$1 million.
On closing day, Labor Day, September 6, Ruidoso Downs will present the 24th running of the All-American Futurity. The gross purse — which includes three consolation races and nominating and breeding awards — will be a record \$2,830,000. (Last year, the gross purse was \$1,530,000).
Starting this year, the winner of the All-American Futurity will collect \$1 million. A year ago, the winner earned \$520,000. The amount to be distributed among the 10 finalists will be \$2 million.

"It should be a banner season," predicted Ruidoso Downs Racing Secretary Donald Rausch. "It's especially true with three \$1 million races. The million-dollar prize in the All-American is what everybody wants to try to go for."
"But where we will be really helped is the new race for four-year-old quarter horses. We won't lose many older horses to other tracks with those big races to hold them at Ruidoso Downs. We'll have a better crop of older horses than ever before."
Since Ruidoso Downs' stall applications were due March 15, Rausch is in the process of screening and allotting stalls. He obviously hasn't had a chance to review all the applications, but he said several outstanding quarter horses are expected to compete during the May 8-September 6 campaign.
Native Gambler, who won last summer's \$132,510 first running of the Rainbow Silver Cup, Denim N Diamonds, who won last December's 10th running of the \$200,000 Champion of Champions race at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles, California and Bold Love, winner of the \$145,880 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic, are all expected to attend.
Naturally, the horse an everyone's mind, Special Effort, is also expected to compete in this summer's Triple Crown races for three-year-olds.
"From what I hear, Special Effort is in training and will be at Ruidoso Downs this summer," Rausch said.
Special Effort, a Raise Your Glass colt, became the first two-year-old Triple Crown winner in quarter horse history when he dominated last summer's Kansas, Rainbow and All-American Futurities.
He is the all-time leading money-winner in quarter horse history with earnings of \$1,009,382.

Special Effort apparently will be primed to compete in the three three-year-old Triple Crown events — The Kansas Derby (\$250,000 est.) at 400 yards on May 23; the Rainbow Derby (\$575,000 est.) at 440 yards on July 4 and the \$1 million (est.) All-American Derby at 440 yards on August 29.
The two-year-old Triple Crown races include the \$575,000 (estimated) Kansas Futurity at 350 yards on May 30, the \$800,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity at 400 yards on July 25 and the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity at 440 yards on September 6.
Four-year-olds will seek the \$150,000 (estimated) Rainbow Silver Cup at 440 yards on June 20, the \$300,000 (estimated) World's Championship Classic (which is open to three-year-olds and up) at 440 yards on August 1. And the \$1 million (estimated) All-American Golf Cup at 440 yards on August 22.
Thoroughbreds have also been included in the lucrative stakes schedule. The Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, a six furlong jaunt for two-year-olds will have an estimated purse of \$125,000. The Norgor Futurity, a four-furlong trip for juveniles on June 27, will have an estimated purse of \$100,000. Other major thoroughbred races include the Ruidoso Derby with an estimated purse of \$25,000 at one mile on August 15 and the Ruidoso Mile, a \$25,000-added race on September 5.
"I am personally looking forward with anticipation and a great degree of enthusiasm to our new season at Ruidoso Downs," said MacGillivray.
It's hard to find anyone connected with the track in the Sacramento Mountains who doesn't share MacGillivray's enthusiasm. After all, it's really "a brand new season" at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

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Crafts fellowships deadline nearing

April 23 is the deadline for craftsmen to apply to the Visual Arts Program of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) for its \$25,000 Crafts Fellowships.
These non-matching fellowships are designed to enable professional craftsmen — metalsmiths, potters, glassblowers, weavers, jewelry-makers, woodworkers, etc. — of exceptional talent and demonstrated ability, and of any age or aesthetic persuasion, to set aside time or to purchase materials and generally to advance their careers as they see fit. A limited number of \$5,000 fellowships will be awarded to emerging craftsmen. Students are not eligible for these fellowships, however.
The Endowment's higher fellowship amounts, which were initiated this past year, more accurately represent a level of annual support for working artists. With this more substantial funding, artists ready to undertake major work will be able to devote to it the necessary time and materials.
These higher amounts, combined with fewer dollars in the NEA appropriation, will of course mean that fewer fellowships can be awarded and that competition will be stiffer than ever. In recent years, only about three percent of fellowship applications have been funded. There is nothing to be gained by submitting work to this national competition unless it is ready to be evaluated in a rigorous professional context, the NEA guidelines point out.
Applicants must be accompanied by 10 slides of recent work plus, if desired, no more than two catalogs of recent exhibitions or no more than three reviews of recent work.
Craftsmen may obtain complete information, guidelines, and application forms by writing to the Director, Visual Arts Program, National Endowment for the Arts, 2401 E Street, North West, Washington, D. C. 20546. Information and application forms are also available from the New Mexico Arts Division, 113 Lincoln Avenue, Santa Fe 87501. The Arts Division's telephone number is 827-2061.

Sinnin And Grinnin, a filly who came to Sunland Park with two victories on the Texas bush track circuit, emerged as the top qualifier for the up coming \$222,920 West Texas Futurity.


Sinnin And Grinnin raced in Friday's sixth race and flashed in with a one and a half length lead in the 330-yard dash.
The filly was clocked in 16.64 seconds, a time which held up as the fastest among the 125 two-year-old hopefuls who participated in 13 elimination trials.
The West Texas Futurity, one of the nation's first major quarter horse events of the year, unfolds on March 28 and hands the winner \$74,732.
Sinnin And Grinnin is owned and trained by James Powell of Kerrville, Texas. Steve Fuller does the riding.
Before shipping to Sunland, Sinnin And Grinnin (by Sinn Fein out of the mare, Lassie Good Bird), staged four outings at Val Verde Downs in Del Rio, Texas. She chalked up a sixth, two wins and a second, in that order, and collected \$7,617.
Sinnin And Grinnin was made an even money favorite in Friday's test and returned \$4 to win.

The 330-yard scamper is set for March 28 at Sunland Park with the first consolation on Saturday, March 27 and the second consolation on Friday, March 26. The other five spots achieved in Friday's 13 trial races went to horses owned by connections from New Mexico (1 1/2), Oklahoma (2), Michigan (1) and California (1/2). Trainer H. Don Farris and jockey Jerry Nicodemus were the only participants qualifying two runners to the 11th running of the juvenile classic. They prevailed with Call Caleb and Victory Doll. The second trial race was obviously the place to run as the first four finishers advanced to the finale with a chance at the winner's share of \$74,232.53. Second-race entrants include Sail On Bunny, Call Caleb, Heza Hombre and Reven Sissy. The second race was run in 16.79 as only a little more than a half-length separated the first four finishers. Only five winners of trial heats made the finale and just four betting favorites gained the finale. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, a prominent area horseman, Matching, ridden by Greg McCarron, led throughout the 8 furlongs in 1:11 over a sloppy track and paid \$5.50 as the second favorite. Matching ran at Sunland Park under the direction of trainer Clifton Dean.

KHALED'S BATTLE POSTED his third straight Sunland Park victory by capturing Saturday's eighth race by a neck over Nervino. The six-year-old Battle Storm gelding was ridden by Richard Bickel for trainer Phil Clemmer. Khaled's Battle is

owned by Thomas H. Cozart of Albuquerque. He started his streak by laking a neck win over One Light Year in a five and one-half furlong chase on January 10 and then won by a half-length over Rate Me Crazy at six and one-half furlongs on January 17. Saturday's race was a claiming event at six furlongs for horses running for a \$8,500 claiming price.

BROTHERS ORLANDO AND F. O. Martinez, kept the first two finishes "All In The Family" for the fourth and 11th races. In the fourth race, F. O. won with Jr. Meyer (12.80) and trainer James W. Curry and Orlando was second on Garfield Red. In the 11th race, Orlando won with Dandy Tonic (\$11,001) for trainer Lewis Germany while F. O. finished second with Stoneridge Policy in Sunday's first half of the Big Q.

NATIVE GYPSY CONTINUED her remarkable winning streak at Sunland Park by capturing a nose decision over Code Of The West in Sunday's featured \$6,550 Smash It Stakes at 400 yards. The five-year-old Special Secret mare won her sixth consecutive race at the west El Paso Texas, track dating back to November 7. After her November 7 win, she won the Savannah Swinger Distance Series 2 and 3 to gain fall season honors for best older and best handicap quarter horse. Following two unsuccessful efforts at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles, California, she returned to Sunland Park and has won three straight races in the spring season for trainer Bob E. Arnett. Owned by Three C Racing Stables of Pampa, Texas, she has been ridden at Sunland Park by Richard Bickel.

SEVERAL JOCKEYS WON two races on one program over the weekend. On Friday, Gary Sumpter won aboard Sail On Bunny (\$6.20) in the second and on Cherich (\$5.40) in the tenth. Both horses are trained by Jake Cascio. Jerry Nicodemus tallied wins on Victory Doll (\$23.00) in the fourth and on Turbo Power (\$5.00) in the 12th. Both horses are conditioned by H. Don Farris. On Saturday, Jack Wallace won on Baffle You (\$6.40) in the seventh for trainer Dawn W. McDaniel and on Dixie Blitz (\$4.80) in the 12th race for trainer Barry H. Germany. On Sunday, F. O. Martinez was the only rider posting two triumphs. He won aboard Old Luck (14.60) in the opener for trainer E. Leonard May and on Jr. Meyer (12.80) in the fourth for trainer James W. Curry.

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Randy Herzberg: Forest Service snow ranger

Randy Herzberg has a job many people might envy. He is the snow ranger on the Lincoln National Forest.

That means Herzberg must ski two days out of every week at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort (SBSR) for free and get paid for it.

However, the job is not all sunshine and fluffy powder. As snow ranger, Herzberg is responsible for seeing that the Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT) complies with the 30-year special use permit it has with the United States Forest Service (USFS).

Herzberg steps into his bindings and assumes the role of snow ranger on Saturdays and Sundays, when the largest crowds are on the mountain. The human and mechanical resources of Sierra Blanca are often put to the limit then, and Herzberg's task is to evaluate their performance.

For the past three years, Herzberg has been arriving at Sierra Blanca around 7:45 a.m., to begin his snow ranger duties. His first task of the day is to check out SBSR's base facilities.

"The first thing I check is the parking lot to make sure it's not a mess and that the parking lot attendants have picked up all the trash that accumulates," Herzberg said.

Next on Herzberg's agenda is the lodge area. That's where the skiing public congregates for food, drink and other amenities. Herzberg is the examining eye that peeks around the place before it opens up to the public.

"Before they open it, I look through the kitchen, the bar and restrooms while they're getting the lodge cleaned up for the day's business," said Herzberg.

Herzberg pointed out, though, that he is not an official public health inspector, whose expertise is sanitation of refrigeration. He said such details, fall into the

jurisdiction of the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID).

Said Herzberg, "My responsibility is to check. If it's bad, I'll blow the whistle and call in EID." However, he noted that Sierra Blanca's base facility crew and kitchen staff are very-competent.

Before the lifts start, Herzberg usually inspects the mountain's lower terminals. There, he makes sure the lift attendants are in their places, that the entrance mazes are set up, that the daily logs are filled out and that the loading ramps have the proper amount of snow on them.

While still at the bottom of the hill, Herzberg also scrutinizes the engine rooms. He goes through them to make sure the engines are running smoothly. Herzberg explained that each terminal has two engines: a main motor, which is either electric or diesel powered; and an auxiliary engine, which is always diesel in case the electricity goes out and skiers must be evacuated from the lifts.

"I'm not an engineer. I'm not looking for specific mechanical details. Again, I'm primarily giving the equipment a general overview," said Herzberg.

Herzberg said he tries to ride all of the lifts early in the day to make sure everybody is in place and the equipment is working properly. He'll ride all five lifts and the gondola, looking at the cable and listening to the struts as the chair passes by the lift towers.

"You learn to look and listen for the specific things, but I only know the obvious. The specifics are for the experts that SBSR employs. If I see something unusual, I'll report it to them," said Herzberg.

Riding the lifts is an important part of Herzberg's job. Not only does the 33-year-old snow ranger inspect the premises, but he does some public relations work in between runs as well.

"I talk with the people on the lifts. A lot of them don't understand that the Forest Service owns the property and not the tribe," Herzberg said.

He said he explains to them that many ski areas operate on federal land. He tells SBSR visitors how MAT had to obtain from USFS a special use permit to run the ski area on national forest land. MAT annually pays USFS 2.26 percent of the gross receipts taken in during the winter, said the slim, trim and tanned Herzberg.

Around noon, Herzberg rides the gondola up to the gazebo. There, he might break for a yogurt or other natural food item he brought along to sate his skier's appetite.

After a light lunch and a scenic look, it's back to inspecting. Herzberg checks the restrooms and looks into the gazebo's food line.

Also at the top, Herzberg sees if there are enough sleds and personnel in the case of an emergency or possible evacuation. He visits with the Ski Patrol to ascertain if the men and women of the patrol are ready and equipped to perform their job of hauling people off the mountain.

During the afternoon, Herzberg skis around to different areas to check the boundary ropes and to see how the lift lines are faring.

Sometimes Herzberg will accompany the Ski Patrol on emergencies to make

sure they're doing the job right and to help out if he can.

"Some people have no sense. They don't know any better and go out there and bust themselves up," Herzberg said.

Later in the day, Herzberg usually visits the first aid station at the base of the mountain. He talks with patrol people and checks the accident log to see if there are any trends developing in injuries occurring.

Herzberg is also responsible, along with mountain manager Denny Grover, for developing new trails and lifts. A couple of weekends ago, Herzberg and Grover marked out two new trails that are being proposed by the snow ranger.

Along with the proposed new trails to be cut around the Snow Park and Caliente slopes, Herzberg is studying an additional four lifts and 16 runs on the mountain north of the present ski area. Part of the snow

ranger's job is to write in-depth environmental impact studies on the areas which will be affected by the proposed developments.

Environmental impact papers may be one of Herzberg's strong points. He studied forestry at the University of Montana. After college, Herzberg joined the USFS as a technician, meaning he did everything from putting out forest fires to digging ditches. He is now a professional member of the USFS team and is presently working on an intensive study investigating the impact oil and gas leases will have on the Lincoln National Forest.

Following Herzberg around the ski area may automatically make one a celebrity because everyone recognizes Herzberg's round, mustachioed face. Herzberg gets along well with everyone at SBSR, even though his job could theoretically put him

at odds with those working at the ski area.

Herzberg must write up a narrative report critiquing SBSR's performance at the end of each day. In it, he discusses all of the positive and negative things he observed during the day. If something could be done better, Herzberg said he gets together with Grover, and the two talk about it. Overall, though, Herzberg said the mountain is very well run and that the equipment is properly maintained.

At the end of the day, Herzberg helps the others make the final run—making sure no one has been left on the mountain. Soon Sierra Blanca will close for the 1982 season, but Herzberg's job as snow ranger will not be over. He will have to oversee all new construction that takes place at the mountain and help get SBSR ready for next winter.

Minor crime wave on in Dona Ana County

Dona Ana county law enforcement officers are beginning to feel like they have been hit by a minor crime wave.

Since just before Christmas of last year, burglars have not given Sheriff's deputies a break. While the thefts have not always netted the offenders much, and in one instance nearly put them face to face with a rifle-toting house sitter, they have been persistent.

This week, the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering rewards of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the offenders in any of the following Dona Ana county break-ins.

On December 24, 1981, burglars entered the residence of Gilbert Garcia, of Garfield, by breaking a window at the side of the house. Items taken were valued at about \$2,000 and included a Magnavox 25-inch color tv, a Cannon AE-1 35 mm camera, a Bell and Howell movie camera, a lady's full-length brown rabbit fur coat, three wrist watches and other small items.

During the night of January 21, someone broke into a storage shed at the residence of Alfredo Serna, near Hatch, and removed a PROMAC 55 McCulloch 16 inch chain saw, a propane torch and an air-compressor and other tools, all valued at nearly \$500. In addition, the burglars tried to remove the battery from Serna's truck, causing damage of about \$60.

Then on January 30, Martin Zaniga narrowly missed a confrontation with some startled intruders. Zaniga was house sitting at the residence of Flora Lucero, just west of Salem, when at about midnight, he

observed a light blue van with a white stripe around the center back up to the south kitchen door. Two male subjects got out of the van, walked around the house to the north side, removed a screen and window and entered the house. Apparently, the burglars heard Zaniga as he got a rifle, and they jumped out the window and ran to the waiting van. Zaniga told investigators there were four Spanish males in the older style van.

On February 6, burglars broke into a storage shed about 75 feet away from the residence of James Lack, of Garfield. The offenders removed about 30 pounds of shelled pecans from a freezer, and several saddles from the shed. Two of the saddles were S. D. Meyers brand, smooth brown leather, valued at \$200 each. A brown child's saddle and a brown lady's saddle were also taken. The total loss was more than \$650.

Also in Garfield, on February 11, burglars broke into a locked chest freezer at the home of Billy Romero, and removed about 820 pounds of meat. The meat was mostly steaks, roasts, and hamburger, and some pork chops and roasts, valued at more than \$1,400.

And what good is meat without chile? Also, on the night of February 11, thieves broke into the Garfield Cotton Gin, and made off with 15 bags of dried red chile, valued at \$560. The offenders gained entrance to the building by cutting locks on the doors. The chile was stored in boxes 20 by 28 inches made of cardboard. Nothing else was taken.

Thieves who broke into the home of Anastacio Pena of Hatch, on February 16, fared a little better. More than \$4,000 worth of firearms were stolen, some of them irreplaceable. Eight rifles and shotguns were taken, including a .22 caliber Winchester, two model 94 Winchester-30-30 caliber rifles, one with a 32 inch octagon barrel, a Savage model 99 .243 caliber, a model 700 Remington 30-06, a custom Carl Gustaf Mauser, and a 20 gauge Ithaca shotgun. Some of the guns had telescope sights, and all of them were heavily engraved with the owner's name. Pena has also offered a \$500 reward for information leading to the recovery of the weapons.

In the first for the State Crime Stoppers Commission last week, information phoned in to the Commission led to the capture of three fugitives in one day. Quick action by Santa Fe police netted a fugitive fleeing from their recent undercover "sting" operation. A call to the state Commission alerted authorities of the individual's intent to board an airplane at the Albuquerque International Airport.

On the same day, another call to the State Crime Stoppers Commission initiated a cooperative action between New Mexico State Police and the Corpus Christi, Texas, Police Department, to apprehend two fugitive felons wanted in Taos County, New Mexico.

The two were taken into custody and will be returned to New Mexico to face charges of residential burglary, larceny, criminal damage to property and conspiracy.

New Mexico Game and Fish News

The state Game Commission met on February 25 and 26, 1982, and established the Big Game Hunting Seasons for the 1982-1983 license year. Since the proclamation pertaining to these seasons will not be available until around April 1-15, grab your calendar and pencil and I'll go over some of the new dates and regulations for those of you needing to schedule vacations now.

The spring turkey season for most of the state and our area in particular will be April 17 through May 2. Bag limit shall be a turkey with beard that extends at least two inches beyond the feathers of the breast.

The Commission set a split north-south deer hunting season. The northern season dates are November 5-7 and November 12-18. The southern hunt dates are November 19-21 and November 25-December 2, 1982. Deer hunters will have a choice of any one of these four hunt periods.

Bow and muzzleloader deer hunters will again be able to hunt during bow season with a bow and during muzzleloader season with a muzzleloader. They are only to take one deer a year though.

Deer bow season has been set generally statewide for September 11 through 24, 1982, and January 1 through 9, 1983. The

major change in the bow hunt is that, with the exception of the southeast area, the bag limit will be one deer with antlers at least two inches long. The bag limit in the southeast will be one deer of either sex.

The deer muzzleloader hunt was split between the southeast and the remainder of the state. The northern half and southwestern quarter of the state will be open September 25 through October 3 with the southeast open October 16 through October 24. The bag limit for both hunts is one deer with antlers at least two inches long.

Public land licenses for elk hunts will again be distributed by a drawing, and hunters will have a choice of one of eight (8) seasons in various hunt units. Season dates will be: October 7-11; October 15-19; October 23-27; October 30-November 3; November 3-30; December 3-7; December 10-14; and January 15-18, 1983. The hunt in the southeast area is October 7-11, 1982.

Muzzleloader hunts for elk will be October 7-11 in Units 9, 15, 17, and 39; October 15-19 in Units 15 and 17; and December 1-5 in Unit 9.

Elk bow hunts are in Units 2, 4, 6, 9, 15, 17, 44. Antelope seasons have been established, as August 28-30 in the nor-

thwest, September 25 and 26 in the southeast, and October 2 and 3 in the southwest. A big change in the antelope application procedure is that those who held a license in 1980 or 1981 are not eligible to apply for a license this year.

The muzzleloader antelope in Alamo-Mesa will be October 2 and 3 and again, if you hold an antelope license in the last two years, you are ineligible to apply this year.

The Barbary sheep hunting system will be same as last year. The B-1 (Unit 47) and B-2 (Unit 2) hunts will be open only to a limited number of successful applicants, January 15-23, 1983.

The B-3 Barbary hunt will be generally statewide. Holders of a B-3 license may hunt Barbary sheep during a deer hunt for which his license is valid, or during the B-3 season January 15-23, 1983. Bag limit for the B-3 hunt is one Barbary of either sex.

As a final reminder, those of you having youngsters under 18 years of age that want to hunt this year should get them enrolled in a Hunter Training class NOW! A Hunter Training card must be in their possession upon application for any hunting license. Contact the Roswell office or the Game Department or your local Conservation Officer for information in New Mexico's Hunter Training program.

Trees being hand planted on Lincoln National Forest

Hand planting of 220,000 trees has begun on Lincoln National Forest, with the first 40,000 trees to be planted on the Mayhill Ranger District. Reforestation of 75 acres in the Cridebring Canyon area west of Sacramento, with ponderosa pine seedlings, should be continuing for the next few weeks. This area was part of the Spring Fire which burned in 1974.

Later, tree planting will include an additional 150 acres on the Mayhill District, and 450 acres on the Cloudcroft Ranger District. This is an annual effort by the Forest Service to reestablish trees on areas of the National Forest that have been burned or that still lack sufficient trees from early logging activity before the land was national forest.

How do you plant 220,000 trees on terrain that is unsuitable for machine planting? A

Forest Service spokesman explained that hand planting is done either by Forest Service personnel or a contract crew. Bareroot trees, packed in moist material are carried by the planters in waterproof sacks to the planting area. Mattocks or augers are used on the Lincoln to dig the holes, because the terrain is rocky.

Trees are not thrust into the ground at random, but the planters try to select spots close to downed logs, or on north sides of stumps or rocks as protection for the seedling. These areas are more protected from the sun and wind, and will also retain moisture longer; they constitute a microclimate that helps the small trees survive.

A lot is said today about disappearing forests, but the people on the Lincoln are doing their part to grow future forests.

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Shootings, butchering of cattle an increasing problem in state

Although "leg of lamb" is a popular cut of meat, "leg of beef" is becoming more common up and down the Rio Grande valley.

Mel Sedillo, chief investigator for the New Mexico Livestock Board, says the problem of cattle butchering has gotten worse statewide, with a resultant higher number of arrests. Sedillo, a recent graduate of the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia, says that most cattle rustlers are eventually caught and prosecuted, but a lot of help is required from citizens and neighbors of the victims.

This week, the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the offenders in a Bernalillo cattle butchering case. At the Davis farm, about a mile and a half south of Bernalillo on the Sandia reservation, mother cows were being kept in calving pens awaiting the birth of new baby calves. On February 14, one of the Hereford cows was found shot, with hindquarters and shoulders removed. Then on March 6, one of the Black cows was found shot and also had the hindquarters and shoulders taken. Sedillo said footprints and tire marks at the scene indicate an average to small size person in a compact vehicle may have been involved in both the butchering.

Anyone with information on this crime, or any other crime involving livestock anywhere in the state, should call the State Crime Stoppers Commission, toll-free, at 1-800-432-6933. Callers do not have to give their names, even to collect a reward.

The Farmington area also has experienced a rash of recent cattle butchering. San Juan County Crime Stoppers has offered rewards for information leading to the arrests and indictments of the offenders in several cases. On November 23, 1981, the remains of a butchered cow was found at Newberry 4-A, a well location six-and-one-half miles from Aztec on New Mexico Highway 73. The cow had been shot, and both hindquarters removed. Then on January 30, 1982, a large box containing cow parts was found on BIA Road 3005 seven miles west of New Mexico 371, and two miles off BIA Road 3003. Investigators discovered the animal had been killed and butchered in a field south of the San Juan River on the Navajo Indian Irrigation Project just west of BIA Road 4078. On February 8, the remains of another butchered cow was found 3.3 miles south of New Mexico 173 on Glade Road. Two Farmington area men, both age 25, were arrested in a January 24 butchering incident, following a tip from a truck driver who heard shots at a corral on Cox Canyon Road.

A tip to Curry County Crime Stoppers last week has led to the recovery of several saddles stolen in the area recently. Curry County Sheriff's Deputies and the New Mexico Livestock Board recovered several of the stolen saddles at Villanueva, south of Las Vegas. Another tip to Crime Stoppers has led to the arrests of four persons involved in a Santa Fe area cattle rustling case. Sedillo, of the Livestock Board, said there has been 12 arrests involving cattle rustling so far this year nearly half the number for the entire year of 1981.

Crime Stopper programs throughout New Mexico pay cash rewards for information leading to the arrest and indictment of persons involved in any serious crime or for the capture of wanted persons. Callers do not have to give their names, and the calls are not taped or traced. The State Crime Stoppers Commission can be reached toll-free, at 1-800-432-6933.



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
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
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
