Still no new trustee

A special meeting of the Ruidoso trustees called for 9 a.m. today to fill the vacancy on the board created by the election of George White as mayor was cancelled by Mayor White at 8:02. Reason for the cancellation was that trustees Benny Coulston and Frank Sayner were not present to constitute a quorum. Only White and trustee Al Junge were present at the appointed time for the special meeting.

An attempt to name Don Dale to the vacant trustee position in a special meeting Friday failed. White nominated Dale at the meeting, which was attended by trustees Al Junge and Benny Coulston.

Trustee Frank Sayner was absent.

Coulston stated that he preferred not to act on the matter without all of the current board members present. He also noted that he wished for an opportunity to visit with Dale and that the two had been unable to get together.

Junge said that since former trustee Sherman Atwood had placed third in the March 2 municipal election, he normally would have been named to the open seat vacated when White moved into the mayor's job.

"He (Atwood) was turned down, very frankly, by Mr. Sayner and Mr. Coulston as the fourth man," said Junge.

White and Junge both said they felt the board should be complete before today's special hearing on the rezoning appeal on the Hilton Inn site at Sierra Swim and Racquet Club Tracts.

Coulston stated that he felt the four present board members were capable of deciding on the rezoning, and indicated that the choice of a trustee is a matter of greater magnitude.

Junge made a motion that Dale be named a trustee, but it died for lack of a second.

White then called the special meeting for today, again with the purpose of filling the vacant trustee seat.

Chamber of Commerce support of Motorcycle Festival announced

Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) president Richard Richburg announced at Thursday's meeting that the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will aid in promotion of the September 29 through October 2 Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival.

"The Chamber is behind us 100 percent," said Richburg. He said he thought the Chamber chose to back RBA because the group is a non-profit organization whose main interest is promoting Ruidoso. The not-for-profit status may also help in receiving money from the Lodgers Tax Committee, added Richburg.

Richburg and RBA associate Lawrence Hill spoke with Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth early last week. Richburg said it was agreed that RBA may use the Chamber's post office box and phone number to receive pre-registration forms and to answer inquiries about the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. RBA members will help sort out the piles of mail they anticipate, said Richburg.

It was reported that more than 50 requests for information about the cycle festival have already been received from all over the country, even though the autumn event has yet to be advertised or promoted. RBA organizers expect 5,000 pre-registered motorcyclists to attend the festival and an additional 15,000 to 20,000 people in Ruidoso for the event.

The Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival logo, designed by Buster Hill and Jim Croy, was presented to Thursday's RBA meeting. Multi-colored pins and patches will be produced from the pattern and given to pre-registered festival participants, said Frances Smeal, RBA secretary.

A motto, "Just for you in '82," was decided on to accompany the logo. RBA members said they chose the motto because they feel that the motorcycle festival is being returned to motorcyclists instead of being a trade show intended primarily for the motorcycle industry.

However, Richburg indicated that a 20,000 square foot tent may be erected on the 13 acres between the Holiday Inn, the festival headquarters, and the Villa Inn Motel to accommodate motorcycle industry representatives and other vendors desiring to display their wares.

Croy said 20 different motorcycle classes will be judged, ranging from 125cc bikes to 1000cc bikes with sidecars. He said first, second and third place plaques will be awarded to bikes made by each manufacturer in the 1cc to 500cc division, the 501cc to 850cc division and the 850cc and up division. Specialty classes will also be set up, said Croy.

Smeal said the motorcycle festival is an American Motorcycle Association (AMA) sanctioned event and an AMA judge will be present. Connie Brown suggested that each of the major motorcycle clubs attending the festival select one or two people to serve as judges for a day.

Plaques will be awarded to those winning the motorcycle judgments, field events and winners of special categories, such as best dressed motorcycle club at the festival. A Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival queen will be crowned and the largest pre-registered motorcycle club will receive \$1,000 to present to their favorite charity, it was announced.

Registration for the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival will cost \$15, \$5 less than last year's Aspenade Motorcycle Convention. An \$8 registration fee will be charged for a motorcycle's extra rider.

The registration price will include patches and pins, admission to the trade area and registration for all events and rides, except the Alamogordo run which is planned for Saturday, October 2. Deadline for registration is September 1, and no refunds will be given after that date, said Richburg.

The next RBA Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival meeting is set for Thursday, March 25, at 7 p.m., at Hill's Pancake House. Anyone interested in helping RBA plan the festival is encouraged to attend the meeting, Richburg said.

Mayor White taking active personnel role

Ruidoso mayor George White, who took office March 10, is taking a more active role in village personnel matters than did his predecessor, Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

White commented on this aspect of his job in an interview with The News Thursday.

"My approach is that of following the letter of the law," said White, "and by law the mayor hires, fires and supervises personnel."

He noted that he has notified all village department heads of his objective to supervise. White explained that village employees will continue to deal with village manager Jim Hine, who will handle day to day personnel matters as director of personnel.

Of his involvement, White said, "We're trying to get back to doing the job of the mayor as laid down by constitutional statutes and city ordinances."

The mayor was asked whether the new approach came about because he had seen a lack in the area of personnel.

"No," he said. "I thought administratively it's been run well. But I've added an added dimension that is caused by law."

White noted that he is available to discuss matters with village department heads during his regular office hours, which are 11 a.m. till noon, Monday through Friday.

Asked whether all residents of the village may see him during office hours, White said, "The door is open—this is why I'm here, for input from the citizens of Ruidoso."

The mayor noted that office hours also enable him to hold conferences with the heads of the various ad hoc and standing committees of the village, such as planning and zoning and water board, and to confer with them on a day to day basis.

White stated that he definitely plans to keep the water board active and that he plans to recommend that it become actively involved in searching out irrigation water that has been adjudicated and is up for sale.

He was asked whether there are other areas of the operation of the village in which he will concern himself directly. White pointed out that besides personnel, the other main job of the mayor is to execute the policies of the board of trustees.

"They make the policy, I execute it," he said.

White indicated that he wants the vacant trustee position filled quickly.

"I want to be sure that we have representation for the community," he said. "You don't have proper representation with a three-man board."

The mayor keeps a two-way radio in his office.

"I can contact my personnel—the department heads can contact me," he said. "It's to speed up communication between the department heads and myself."

White was asked how he likes being back in the mayor's job.

"Wonderful," he said. "You're not in the administrative field for 40 years without some nostalgia at coming back to an administrative post. To me, everything is going well."

Hondo Valley school district patrons protest principal firing

Approximately 40 area residents attended the Hondo Valley Public School's board of education meeting Thursday to protest a decision not to renew the contract of principal Sebrone Denson.

The decision was made at the previous school board meeting, February 18, upon recommendation of superintendent Ernest J. Booky.

When Thursday's meeting was opened to questions from visitors, it was asked "why his contract wasn't renewed and why the board had to lie."

"I think the reason he wasn't hired,"

said board president John A. Cooper, "is the board followed the recommendation of the superintendent. ... It is not only his prerogative, it is his duty to make such a recommendation."

The board refused to give further explanation for the decision. "Personnel problems are not to be discussed; we are forbidden to discuss them," Cooper said.

"There's only one reason that I was told," Denson said, and that was "I am not capable of working with people."

"I do feel that I was unfairly treated," he said. "Rest assured I will not be back at Hondo next year under any of the present conditions."

The audience accused school board members of lying at last month's meeting in reporting that the school janitors had said they would quit if Denson were rehired.

Janitors at Thursday's meeting denied the report.

A question was raised by the audience concerning the evaluation process for school personnel. Denson said the normal procedure for evaluation is "to lay it on the line and put it in the file."

"That evaluation process has not taken place this year or last year," he said. "He's been evaluated all year long," said Booky.

When asked by an audience member why the evaluation has not been written up, Booky said, "It hasn't been, that's why."

"We ask that he be reinstated, for you to reconsider," an audience member said.

"That will have to come in due process," said Cooper. He explained that the matter would need to be put on a board meeting agenda in order to be considered.

Board members expressed their willingness to reconsider the decision, but Denson, who has been principal at Hondo since August 4, 1980, stated that he would not consider returning to the school after his contract expires in mid-June.

State to match funds with cities to promote tourism by Mexicans

A Mexican tourism marketing plan was arrived at Thursday between southern New Mexico business and civic leaders and state tourism officials at a meeting of the New Mexico Border Commission (NMBC).

The proposed plan, devised during day-long meetings held in conjunction with the state Board of Economic Development (BED) at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, is designed to attract Mexican tourists to southern New Mexico through a coordinated marketing effort.

John Sadler, chairman of NMBC, told the representatives of New Mexico travel and tourism officials, bankers, customs officers and Chambers of Commerce that the state will contribute \$10,000 in matching funds to any community willing to participate in the promotion plan.

Sadler suggested that cities use lodgers' taxes collected from motels to raise the matching funds.

Ray Walker, president of Sun Country, a cooperative promotional organization of several southern New Mexico communities including Ruidoso, offered use of his group as the vehicle for promotion.

"Together we can do more," Walker said, explaining that promotion of a region will benefit all municipalities in the area.

Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and vice president of Sun Country, said Sunday he "hopes" Ruidoso will participate in the program.

Several representatives expressed concern that the devaluation of the Mexican peso in February will keep Mexican nationals away regardless of New Mexico's marketing program.

Sadler said devaluation could hinder the program but that it also allows for the necessary time to develop promotion.

The need for promotion was outlined in research presented by the Center for Business Research and Services (CBRS) at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces. In its report, CBRS said New Mexico is at the bottom of the list of the four states contiguous with Mexico in attracting Mexican visitors.

CBRS director Lee Hageman advised the gathering of about 60 persons that more research must be done to provide data so marketing funds will not be wasted. Hageman said his bureau would provide \$8,000 to get the research started, but that he needs about \$25,000 to do a thorough job.

When some of the representatives showed reluctance to fund research in addition to raising the marketing funds, New Mexico Commerce and Industry Department (CID) Secretary Russell Autrey said his department will contribute the remaining

money and let the communities worry about marketing.

That offer solved the major problem in the discussions. Obstacles that could hinder the effort were also aired at the meeting.

Devaluation, which sent the exchange rate from 27 pesos to one dollar before February 17 to about 45 to one now, is not that "grim," according to Melissa Houston, international banking officer at Albuquerque National Bank.

Houston, referring to devaluation of the peso in 1976, said the unfavorable rate is only temporary.

Her other concern, she said, is to encourage merchants and banks to accept pesos. One participant pointed out that businesses in EL Paso, the most frequently visited border city, freely accept pesos for merchandise.

But, that was not seen as an issue by some participants.

Jungbluth said Ruidoso experiences no difficulty with peso exchange.

State Tourism and Travel Division director John Adams said this "lack of communication" is partly responsible for New Mexico's lag in attracting travelers. To alleviate the problem, Adams said he would commit his agency's help and resources in the marketing plan.

"The resources are available" to attract travelers, he said. "We have to put them together."

Chino sees problems with Reaganomics

Mescalero Apache Tribal President Wendell Chino told the state Board of Economic Development (BED) Thursday he sees great deficiencies in President Reagan's economic recovery program with regard to Indians.

"Some of his programs just do not fit the Indian community," Chino said at the board's meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Chino said the president "talks a great deal" about the private sector providing jobs for the unemployed, but he said the Indian community does not have industrial plants to provide work.

"We'll have to do it (provide jobs) on our own," he said. "Our people won't have to depend on government programs."

Chino said unemployment is the biggest problem on the reservation, citing a 75 percent rate "some years ago."

To cope with unemployment, Chino said Indians have to develop their own resources, one of which is tourism.

He said some Indian communities do not want to allow tourists on tribal land, but he said the Mescaleros have localized tourism to the northeast part of the reservation (the area around the Inn of Mountain Gods) and have had success with it.

"We have altitude, scenery, and beauty of the land," he said. "But we could starve on it."


In other BED business, Ray Sadler, chairman of the New Mexico Border Commission, told the board that New Mexico should make a stronger effort to develop tourism with Mexico, an area linked to the state in many ways.

"We're in bed together," he said, referring to the common border and the fact many New Mexicans understand and speak Spanish.

He said Mexico may have up to 300 million barrels of crude oil in reserves, more than in Saudi Arabia, one reason the state should try to attract Mexican investment.

Governor Bruce King also referred to the state's neglect in attracting outside money. He said New Mexico lags behind all other states in getting foreign investment and suggested that quality of life is an important attraction which should be promoted.

State Director of Tourism and Trade John Adams said the United States has to change past habits of dealing with potential markets. He said there is a "lack of consistency" and follow through on promises when dealing with foreign investors.

Aubrey Dunn states his views on New Mexico

...ing the economy of New Mexico providing jobs for its citizens are topics in Aubrey Dunn's campaign for democratic nomination for governor. Dunn, a native of Alamogordo, was in Albuquerque campaigning recently. The man people call "the apple picker" in The News to express his opinions on challenges facing New Mexico into the 1990s.

"I want to see us start immediately to diversify the economic base of this state, with that to develop our educational system so that it may work with industry. In turn is conducive to bringing more money to the state," said Dunn.

Dunn said he wants to diversify the New Mexico economy on a statewide basis. He has his belief that the Land of Enchantment has become too dependent on the federal government and oil and gas industry.

"The federal government through its many installations has been great for the state, but we can't depend on them forever," Dunn said. He mentioned that the loss of any industry could mean the relocation of any industry.

"We enjoy low taxes because the oil and gas industry brings in about \$1 billion of revenue to the state. However, since the actual number of barrels of oil has decreased. Even with the number of rigs increasing, production has decreased over five percent for the past ten to eight years," said the former chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

Dunn argued that this shows New Mexico must begin to diversify. Otherwise, he said, in 20 years the state legislature will be in a situation of having to raise taxes or find other ways of putting people to work.

Directly in conjunction with that, Dunn said, a good department of education with competent people must be formed. Dunn said he feels very strongly that an educated New Mexico public will draw new industries to the state. In return, he said, jobs will then be available to citizens of New Mexico.

"We must have an educational system in the state that high technology and clean industry can employ. We'll fill the void by training people in New Mexico which will produce an available employment market for industries," said Dunn, who was also the chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

"I looked at a recent study done on all of the United States on which states were the most favorable to business. We ranked seventh. Why weren't we rated second or third? We have a good climate, an excess of people and low taxes. The most significant reason is that only 65 percent of our work force has a high school education. That's why industry is not coming here. We must raise the percentage of high school graduates," said Dunn.

Dunn was a state senator from the mid-1960s to the late 1970s. He established the school funding formula which provided for increases to New Mexico public school funding. The funding formula guarantees to each school district the ability to provide an equal basic educational opportunity to every child, said Dunn.

Dunn was also one of the "granddaddies" of the permanent severance tax fund. The tax fund now totals about \$650 million and will one day provide money for capital improvements, buildings, highways and income for New Mexico citizens long after the state's natural resources have been removed from the ground, Dunn said.

Commenting on the Mortgage Purchase Act, Dunn said he does not believe the state should be involved with the "actual nitty-gritty loan business."

However, he added that investing some of the principal money into the state at a mortgage rate that would ensure a fair return to New Mexico might be acceptable. He said the best way to do that would be to let the banks and home savings and loan companies have some credit, but also to let those financial institutions share in the liability.

Dunn is an advocate of advertising New Mexico as a state for tourism as well as a home for industry.

"Ruidoso is the perfect example of what movers and shakers can do," said Dunn in attributing Ruidoso's success in tourism to allocating lodgers' tax funds for advertising. He voted for the lodgers' tax and feels very strongly about the importance of the tourism dollar, Dunn noted.

Dunn also stated his belief in the importance of good highways which allow tourists to travel to and around New Mexico.

"The villages and cities of New Mexico must have a method to raise money to pave streets and take care of community

services," said Dunn. He said he would like to give local government more autonomy and authority using input from citizens. He said this must happen under the new federalism.

"This area in particular must have better airport facilities. I will do whatever I can as governor to see that Ruidoso has adequate airport facilities," said Dunn. He said he will work with the local community to get federal money for an airport and that he will work on tapping state funds for the project.

On the subject of the new federalism, Dunn said when some of the federal programs are shifted back to the state with only partial funding, in-depth studies will have to be conducted to decide which programs will be most beneficial.

"I can work with people and the state legislature to determine what programs we should or should not keep, what percentage of the funding we can provide and how to maintain those programs we decide to keep," said Dunn.

Dunn said he wants to keep New Mexico on a firm financial basis. Although Dunn classified himself as a fiscal conservative, he stated that he is dedicated to seeing that the needs of the deserving are met.

"I mean those needing medical assistance and treatment and those who have mental problems. I'm also concerned about the needs of our senior citizens. All of this can be done without creating a heavy tax burden on the people of New Mexico," said the candidate.

As money comes back to the state, Dunn said, he will watch out to see that the money is not eaten up by the bureaucracy

and by "phony deals" before the needs of New Mexico are taken care of.

"Anytime there is a shift of large amounts of money to the state, county or local government, people will follow that money. As the New Mexico economy grows with the state, we must constantly be on the lookout for hot-shot, sophisticated organized crime figures," said Dunn.

In addition to assisting the Organized Crime Commission, Dunn proposes to appoint a law enforcement coordinator for his office. Dunn explained that this person would report directly to him on law enforcement and penal institution issues.

A presentation by the Secretary of Corrections was given to the gubernatorial candidates two months ago, said Dunn. Dunn said he asked if there was enough money to carry out the needed programs and that the answer was yes.

Dunn said he asked if corrections people had enough authority to do their jobs, and that the answer was again affirmative. Dunn said when he asked if any additional legislation was needed, the reply was negative.

"My position, I told them, is if I become governor, and if they don't have the situation in hand with new prisons, training programs for guards, management and supervisory programs, if they don't have a prisoner classification system, which I see as the key to solving the problem, and if they don't have the escape problem under control, then I'll start at the top and move people to get the job done," said Dunn.

Dunn said the Democratic nomination

for governor is between himself and Toney Anaya. He mentioned that the Republican nomination today is a toss up between John Irick and Bill Segoe.

"Based on what I hear, Irick may be ahead. Both men want to run against Anaya instead of me because they know that I'll beat them," said Dunn.

Dunn said he has built his organization quietly up to this point. He said the campaign plan for the next two-and-a-half months is to get the message across to the people and beat Anaya on June 1.

What's the message?

"I'm the guy for the governor of New Mexico and for the times we are facing. We are entering a new era in the state and the nation as more responsibility is taken away from the federal government and given to the states.

"I've spent 15 years in the state senate. The last seven of those were as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee. I'm familiar with the state and the governorship. I can make the firm and hard decisions that need to be made," said Dunn.

"As a governor who comes from this part of the state, I recognize your problems here. However, the entire state must work together. Albuquerque will do great as a hub of commerce, but only if other parts of the state prosper. We must be fair how the money is to be distributed. I'll make a real effort in the governor's office to promote a feeling of cooperation throughout the state," Dunn said.

Valliant feels local schools best in state

...biased, but I think we have the best school system in the state, and the staff is the best qualified and dedicated," said Valliant, Ruidoso school superintendent, in a recent interview about the status of the school system.

Valliant has reason to be proud, as Ruidoso's school system is the only one in the state to have all its schools accredited with commendation by the state Department of Education.

All schools were accredited about four years ago, Valliant said, and were invited to a state meeting to be presented the accreditation certificates with commendation.

Valliant is obviously proud of the school system.

"I think it's the greatest staff I've ever had, and I've been teaching for almost 30 years," he said.

"The teachers all have compassion for their students; I think this is number one. I don't know of any other schools that have compassion nothing else works. They are always willing to spend extra money for extra help, and all the staff members work very well together.

"The line of communication is the best

I've ever seen.

"I'm very pleased with what we have done, what we're doing and what we want to do.

"We are limited because of space at the present time... but for a school our size we do offer our students more than other schools our size."

The high school currently has 58 course offerings, Valliant said, with only 38 being required by the North Central Association or the State Department of Education.

"Right now everything seems to be hinging on completion of the new high school," he said.

Valliant said he met with the architects for the new school last Tuesday to complete applications for capital outlay money for the 1982-83 school year.

Ruidoso received more capital outlay money than any other school system in the state this school year, Valliant reported. Of the \$10 million appropriated, Ruidoso was granted \$1,259,000.

He noted that the legislature appropriated \$15 million for capital outlay for next school year, and that Ruidoso is one of 27 schools applying for a portion of this money, to be awarded in mid-June.

"We feel optimistic; we think we're going

to get our fair share," Valliant said.

Capital outlay money plus funds received from a two mill levy passed in February, 1981, and a bond election in May, 1981, are "what we're depending on to build this new high school," Valliant said.

The building committee worked out a 20-year plan, including three phases of building for the new high school. But Valliant said that because of the steep growth in enrollment, it may turn out to be only a 10-year plan.

"We've been adding on and refurbishing since I've been here," he said. Valliant has been working in this school system since 1955, as junior high school principal, then as high school principal and as superintendent for the past 12 years.


"Our problem is running out of space to add on; this is why the board felt like we should look for more property," said Valliant.

He predicted a need for an additional building within 10 years, if the enrollment continues to increase at the rate of four to six percent, as it is now.

"I can't see that enrollment here is going to decrease in the near future or even in the long range view of it," he said.

Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners directors meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m., Tuesday at K-Bob's Restaurant meeting room.


Plans for the group's trail ride, tentatively scheduled for the last weekend in April, will be discussed.

Infant formula recalled

The New Mexico Health and Environment Department (HED) today announced a recall of an infant formula sold under the brand name of Nursoy produced by Wyeth, Incorporated, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The recall was initiated Wednesday by the federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) because Vitamin B-6 was inadvertently omitted from certain cans of the infant formula. The recall, which is being conducted by FDA, affects two forms of Nursoy: the concentrated liquid in 13-ounce cans with codes A26M, B2M, and

B9M; and the ready-to-feed formula in 32-ounce cans with codes A28M and B11M.

Dr. Harry Hull, Health Services Division epidemiologist, said the incomplete infant formula could cause health problems if it is used as the sole source of food over a period of one to six months.

Hull advised anyone using the formula affected by the recall to switch immediately and to contact the infant's physician.


"A few infants who develop Vitamin B-6 deficiency from being fed exclusively the Nursoy products in question may develop neurologic problems including seizures. These seizures are easily treated with vitamin B-6. For these reasons, we are notifying the medical profession and the general public of the recall," he said.

Richard Mitzelfelt, Environmental Improvement Division program manager, said Nursoy is distributed nationwide and may be found at most retail outlets in New Mexico where infant formulas are sold.

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Warrior basketball coach to resign

Ruidoso High School boys' varsity basketball coach Barry Nelson will officially resign at the next school board meeting.

"I'm thinking about going back to school to get my masters degree," Nelson said. "My wife Janice has been offered a good job in Arizona and I'll probably attend school at Northern Arizona University" (NAU).

Nelson, who has been at Ruidoso High School since 1974, was head coach of the Warrior varsity basketball squad for four seasons and was an assistant for three seasons before that. He also was an assistant coach with the Warriors' varsity football team for eight seasons. He was offensive coordinator last season.

Nelson had a 47-43 record in his four years as head basketball coach. This year's team went 4-6 in district 3-AAA action and 7-17 overall. His 1980-81 team, however, won the district championship and finished fourth in the state AAA tournament with a 19-8 record.

The Warriors finished at 6-8 in 1978-79, Nelson's first season as head coach. The 1979-80 season, Ruidoso's first in the AAA division, saw the Warriors finish at 15-10 and third place in the district.

Nelson was also one of the main reasons Ruidoso has been a powerhouse the past two seasons in football.

The Warriors have been one of the top offensive AAA division teams in the state the past two years, finishing at 7-3 in 1980 and 8-2 last season. Ruidoso scored more than 200 points in each season due largely to Nelson's efforts as offensive coordinator. The 1981 squad missed the district championship by seven points as it lost to champion Silver City 21-14 in the last game of the season.

Ruidoso athletic director Doyle Howell said the new head basketball coach will probably be named at the May school board meeting.

"We'll decide by then who the new coach will be," he said. "We usually promote from within the present staff if we feel they're qualified."

Junior varsity basketball coach Ron Geyer is currently working with the team during spring practice.

Pioneer Savings wins LL cage title

This year's National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) basketball tournament has been full of surprises.

That's not news as far as the NCAA is concerned because the tournament always seems to have at least one surprise school in the final four each season.

Still, this year's NCAA tournament has had more than its share of upsets.

Alabama-Birmingham's upset of Virginia Thursday night was one of the biggest surprises of the tournament, but there have been quite a few other upsets so far.

Boston College has been perhaps the biggest surprise of the tournament, racing to three startling victories (as of this writing) over San Francisco, DePaul and Kansas State.

San Francisco and DePaul had been ranked among the top six teams in the country at one time or another this season. Kansas State had also been highly rated.

Boston College is a team with no one superstar but plenty of team players. More often than not, that kind of team can overcome the talents of a one player-superstar team.

Perhaps the most impressive team in the tournament so far has been Georgetown. In its Western Regional victory over Oregon State Saturday Georgetown played near perfect basketball, setting an NCAA record for field goal percentage and playing outstanding defensive ball.

With 7-0 freshmen center Pat Ewing dominating on defense and with its excellent overall quickness, Georgetown seems a good bet to win the NCAA championship.

Georgetown could be the dominant college basketball team of the next three

seasons, largely because of Ewing. As good as Virginia's Ralph Sampson is, he doesn't have the supporting cast that Ewing has. Georgetown seems to be able to get everything clicking as a team. It ranks with the best shooting teams of all time.

Georgetown's excellence in the tournament bears out the strength of the East this season.

When the 48-team field was selected for the NCAA tournament, many people (including myself) felt that the eastern part of the country was overly represented. However, the eastern teams have dominated the tournament, thus justifying their large number in tournament seeding.

It's true that teams like the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) were wrongly left out of the tournament, but the majority of the eastern teams that were selected deserved to be in the tournament.

When UCLA was the dominant power in collegiate basketball 10 years ago, many observers felt that eastern basketball (with the exception of the Atlantic Coast Conference) was at best average and was not up to the standards of midwest and western teams.

Times have changed since then as UCLA has virtually dropped from sight and the eastern teams have improved considerably.

The collegiate basketball scene as a whole has balanced out. It's doubtful that a team will ever dominate the sport like UCLA did in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

That makes for more competitive basketball. It also provides a lot more surprises when NCAA tournament time rolls around.

Bobby Lane scored 11 points and Jeremy Lane eight to spark the winners. Jason Lewis had 13 points and Mike Lewis nine to lead Clark's Refrigeration.

Pioneer Savings led most of the way in the ball game but the losers fought back to tie the contest at 26-26 with 1:40 remaining.

Jeremy Lane then hit a short jumper with less than a minute remaining for Pioneer Savings' winning margin.

In the consolation final contest Ruidoso State Bank topped Gibson's 33-30 in overtime.

Kirk Ryan, younger brother of former Ruidoso High School star Glenn Ryan, scored 24 points with a variety of shots to spark the victors.

Emmitt Autrey scored 10 points and Mike Grant added eight for Gibson's. Gibson's held the advantage for most of the contest, taking a 14-9 lead at the halftime break and a 20-17 margin at the end of the third quarter.

Early in the final period Gibson's extended its advantage to 26-17 but Ryan sparked a Ruidoso State Bank comeback which knotted the score at 30-30 at the end of regulation time.

Ryan then scored all three of his team's overtime points as Ruidoso State Bank took the victory and the consolation championship.

In Saturday morning's consolation semi-finals Ruidoso State Bank defeated Jerry's Quick Stop 34-23 and Gibson's knocked off Nosker's 31-24.

Mike Brent, a 5-6 center, dominated the scoring and rebounding for Gibson's in its victory over Nosker's.

In Friday's championship division games, Clark's Refrigeration topped Ruidoso State Bank 36-30 and Pioneer Savings edged Gibson's 25-23.

Opening round action Thursday afternoon saw Pioneer Savings rout Roundup Realty 30-14, Gibson's knock off Jerry's Quick Stop 37-27, Clark's Refrigeration smash Nosker's 39-16 and Ruidoso State Bank roll over Ranch House Restaurant 35-15.

After the championship game all the players on each team were given small trophies.

This was the third straight season the Ruidoso-Sertoma Little League has had a post-season tournament. Last year the teams played without individual sponsors as the Sertoma Club sponsored the whole season.

Warrior cagers hold practice

Fifteen hopefuls for next year's Ruidoso High School basketball team are currently working out in spring practice under the guidance of junior varsity coach Ron Geyer.

"We're going to put the guys through weight training and more fundamentals," Geyer said. "We've got quite a few young guys and a lot of spots will probably be wide open."

The Warriors will lose almost their entire varsity squad to graduation in June so this season's junior varsity and freshmen teams will be counted on to provide a lot of players for next year's varsity.

SANTA FE—Did Toney Anaya sell executive pardons to prisoners in the state pen?

That's a question which Democrats should want answered before they anoint this man as one of their gubernatorial candidates this weekend.

Mark Acuff, editor of the New Mexico Independent, a weekly newspaper, deserves credit for coming right out and referring to that stage in Anaya's life.

Most New Mexicans know that Anaya admitted to selling his contacts when he served as an aide to Senator Joseph M. Montoya in Washington. In those days, what was being commercialized were private bills which would make certain Chinese sailors who jumped ship in the United States American citizens.

Who actually got the money in that affair was never quite clear. Some felt it was the Senator—and that Anaya took a fall for him. Others felt Toney took advantage of his position to his personal profit.

The question about executive pardons for prisoners in our state penitentiary came later, when Anaya was an aide to Bruce King during the latter's first term as governor of New Mexico.

All that is clear in this case is that Toney suddenly resigned.

In government, of course, "resigned" is often a euphemism for being fired.

Rumors then and rumors now say that Anaya, the perennial candidate of the Democratic party, was caught dead to rights pushing across Bruce's desk pardons for prisoners which nobody else had agreed to.

Is that true?

Probably only two people could really tell us for sure.

If one of those is Toney Anaya, you can be positive he will not comment on the matter.

But the other one is Bruce King.

If he has that kind of information, wouldn't you think he would tell us about it rather than have the state fall into the error of electing to the most important office we have a man who personally profited from human suffering?

On the other hand, if he knows that story is not true, mightn't we expect him to come out and say just that in clear and unequivocal terms?

Bruce never has denied it, which would be easier of the two paths he might take.

So we are left with the question which began this column: "Did Toney Anaya sell executive pardons to prisoners in the state pen?"

Maybe the person we really ought to ask in this case is Felix Rodriguez, long-time boss of things at the penitentiary. He doesn't like Anaya; Anaya doesn't like him.

Some of us believe all that is because Felix blew the whistle on Toney and got him fired from the Bruce King staff. Later, we are led to believe, when Toney became Attorney General, he got Felix fired by Jerry Apodaca, then the governor of New Mexico.

But the question remains, and as long as it remains Anaya's reputation is at least possibly besmirched.

Wouldn't you think, if Bruce King could prove that all this never happened, he would do so?

He hasn't.

He might do it between now and this weekend, when his party meets to choose its candidates for this Fall.

Maybe at that convention somebody ought to ask Toney to clear up the matter.

Selling freedom to the downtrodden, after all, is a despicable affair.

Dear editor:

I am compelled to answer Robert W. Lietzman's "Letter to the people of Lincoln County" published in the March edition of the Ruidoso News. From my position as one of the County Commissioners, the events described did not occur quite like they were presented.

Mr. Lietzman: "It seems that your problem is understanding what a county road is in this county. The road in question has been on the county inventory and has been maintained by the county for as long as the county has been maintaining roads. If you insist on its designation as a private road, I suggest you continue your suit against the county to satisfy yourself. So long as I am on the commission the business of this county will be conducted according to the laws of the State of New Mexico and the County of Lincoln in a fair and impartial way. There is a procedure which is to be followed in order to close a road. The county government is and has been willing to cooperate with you under these procedures. This is what we have tried to convey to your attorney and your foreman. They have been told that it seems like a reasonable solution to open the Indian Divide Road and close yours. It seems

to me that the needs of all concerned would be met, but it must be done by the rules and not by any back door deal. I am confident that a public hearing would approve such an exchange. We have had no proposal from the Forest Service concerning this, but have told your representatives that the Forest Service is the one that must approve the building of a new road on their lands. Any time you are able to show us in writing that the Forest Service approves and that the road will indeed be built to their specifications, I believe your goal can be achieved. I must emphasize that it has to be done by the legal procedures.

I don't appreciate the signs you have placed on your gate at Highway 380 stating that this is a private road, etc. I suggest that you are more apt to get cooperation on this matter if you approach it in a cooperative manner.

I take full responsibility for the contents of this letter and it is in no way an official communication from the Lincoln County Commission.

I welcome you to Lincoln County. It is a great place to live and own property. You will find all the officials of this county cooperative and friendly so long as you play the game by the rules."

HEALTH HAZARD

Health and Human Services Secretary Richard Schweiker raises the question whether the government is meeting its responsibility to warn against cigarette smoking, which he calls "the chief preventable cause of death in our society." He says it is not, and he is right.

Schweiker also says the government—more specifically, the Federal Trade Commission—should forthwith develop and enforce a new and much broader system of warnings than we now have. Again, he is right. Almost anything would be better than the current piddling caution, in tiny type on ads and cigarette packages, that smoking is "dangerous to your health."

So now the FCC has the ball. Run with it, fellows! — Mamogordo Daily News

SMOKING DANGERS CITED

Surgeon General C. Everett Koop said Monday that cigarette smoking causes 30 percent of all cancer deaths in the United States and even non-smokers should treat it as "a public health potential hazard."

"Cigarette smoking is clearly identified as the chief preventable cause of death in our society," Koop said in releasing the surgeon general's annual report on smoking and health.

Smoking will be the major cause of an estimated 129,000 of the 430,000 deaths from cancer likely this year, he said. Moreover, he estimated that it will cost \$13 billion in health care expenses and more than \$25 billion in lost production and wages — Associated Press.

FRANCHISING CHILI

There's a growing popularity in franchised Mexican food restaurants around the country, according to the Wall Street Journal. And that could help a home-grown New Mexico industry, chili raising.

Chili production in New Mexico increased in 1981 despite an 11 percent decrease in chili acreage, according to the state Department of Agriculture. Increased yield per acre made up the difference.

And perhaps some of the 23,600 dry tons of pungent capsicum produced here is helping fuel the "crab enchilidas" which are reported to be conquering Omaha, Des Moines and Rochester.

Dyed-in-the-carn-shuck Mexican food lovers in the Land of Enchantment will be amused at some of the attributes of Mexican food praised by the franchise entrepreneurs.

The ingredients aren't expensive—especially when contrasted with some of the more expensive cuts of beef and more exotic items of seafood. No kidding!

People drink lots of Margaritas and beer with Mexican food, making the average check ratio 65 percent food and 35 percent liquor.

The food is usually prepared and served quickly, compared to a multi-course French dinner. This makes possible more customers to the seat hour, according to the entrepreneurs.

But they all need chili, the agricultural commodity New Mexico farmers can provide.

Total value of chili produced in New Mexico in 1981 was about \$29.2 million.

Those crab enchilada entrepreneurs in the Midwest have the good wishes of all the chili farmers in New Mexico, as they seek to spread the appreciation of chili across the length and breadth of the country. —Albuquerque Journal.

Editorial

Wednesday's forest fire on the Mescalero Reservation is a reminder that we are entering the time of year when fire danger is greatest.

The fire on the reservation was confined to an area of approximately 70 acres. This testifies to two things: the efficiency of the Mescalero/Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) firefighters, with the cooperation of Ruidoso Fire Department and United States Forest Service firefighters; and good luck.

"Considering the dryness of the area and the high winds we had that day, they (the firefighters) did an excellent job," said fire supervisor Butch Blazer of BIA.

But, had the fire burned longer before it was reported, or had it not been so accessible, the damage could have been far greater.

As it is, the loss of the 70 acres in terms of grazing, timber and wildlife resources is significant. And no price can be put on the intangible but perhaps greatest resource of any forest—its natural beauty.

Concern over fire in our area seems to increase each time there is a fire, then decrease as we go awhile without one.

But the apprehension felt in Ruidoso Wednesday by those who knew a forest fire was in progress nearby, with strong winds blowing, serves as a reminder of how vulnerable we are.

We urge everyone to be constantly aware of fire danger in the forest and the home.—TP

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ATTENTION GRABBER

Wow!

According to news reports published Thursday, the Mescalero Apache Tribe's plans to drill a whole bunch of wells ... maybe 54 even ... which, you gotta admit, is a good round number ... and build some dams ... and divert 10,000 acre feet of ground water annually onto three irrigation districts ... which is another good round number ... sure got the undivided attention of folks inhabiting the Pecos Water Basin.

If the folks as is complaining are right in their assessment of the area that'd be affected ... then all water users in an area from Ruidoso, through the Honda Valley, to Roswell, Artesia, Carlsbad and Alamogordo are facing quite a challenge in contesting the tribe's plan to latch onto all that water.

Now this ain't gonna be settled overnight ... 'cause there was a hassle that didn't get resolved until 1974 ... after 10 years of legal gymnastics ... when the United States Supreme Court ruled against the Indians, in giving the state jurisdiction over the tribe's water rights. What "jurisdiction" actually means could determine ... over the next few years ... if'n jurisdiction means the state actually has some say so about the tribe's water rights that's one thing ... if the tribe does gain the rights to that 10,000 acre-feet of water per annum ... then that'll be a horse of another color ... with the tribe firmly ensconced in the saddle.

Yup ... this water deal's sure going to get interesting ... which could be an understatement ... before the dust ... maybe from all that well drilling and tilling those irrigation projects ... gets settled.

And ... from here ... it sorta looks as though all the folks as might have water problems is going to have to quit squabbling amongst themselves ... over who's entitled to what water ... and band together ... to see if'n all that water the tribe wants will be theirs to use ... and let everyone else try to figure out how to get along with 10,000 acre-feet less per year. Wow!


The trees are part of the Foundation's effort to promote tree planting during 1982, the 100th anniversary of the first observance of Arbor Day in schools.



Fire danger in forest increasing

Spring brings out fishermen and song birds on the plus side. On the minus side, it brings high winds and increasing fire danger. The combination of dry grasses and high winds, with one stray spark, sets the stage for potential disaster in the forest. Please be extra careful with fire.

Fishermen will be glad to hear that fishing is good on the Penasco River on Mayhill District; and that Bonito Lake will open for fishing on April 1. Weather conditions change rapidly in the spring, so forest visitors should check with the ranger station in the area they plan to visit for most current information on weather, fuelwood areas and roads. Permits are required for all fuelwood areas. Numbers to

call are: Smokey Bear at Ruidoso, 257-4095; Cloudercroft, 682-2551; Guadalupe at Carlsbad, 885-4181; and Mayhill, 687-3411.

On Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, fire danger is listed as moderate to high. Three Rivers Campground is the only campground open at this time. Cedar Creek Picnic Area will be open April 1. Snow remains at higher elevations in the White Mountain and Captain Mountains Wildernesses. "Down and dead" fuelwood areas are open.

On the Cloudercroft District, muddy roads have kept fuelwood areas closed. All developed campgrounds are still closed.

Hiking trails are muddy. Maintenance crews are working on Westside road. Heavy traffic on South New Mexico 24, Forest Road 64 (Sunspot Road), and Forest Road 164 from military convoys on mountain training will continue this week.

Fire conditions are moderate on the Guadalupe District near Carlsbad. Caving activity continues to be high. Trail and road conditions are good. Fuelwood areas are open. Sittling Bull Falls Picnic Area is closed.

Mayhill Ranger District reports that James Canyon Campground is receiving moderate use. Fire danger is moderate to high. Roads are dry. Fuelwood areas are open.

For the little grassy stretch extending from the mountain is a little prairie, of song and story, high in the mountains. You may see antelope peacefully grazing here; and the song of the yellow-breasted meadow lark or prairie lark may be heard, echoing in liquid melody all through the tall gramma grass. (Surely these larks have given the mountain its name). And the perfume of many a prairie flower takes you back to the plains of Texas, Oklahoma or Nebraska. Completing the circle we were greeted by a perfect Saint Patrick's picture. We drove by Wilbur Conley's nursery, and here was Wilbur, hard at work as usual, pushing a wheelbarrow. Not wanting to let go of the handles, he kept pushing, at the same time nodding at us and flashing his pink and blue smile. By the time this reaches you, we will be over into spring, the time of God's miracles of new life.

 1. In a letter to the Director prior to the hearing.

 3. The Technical Rules of Evidence and the Rules of Civil Procedure will not apply at the hearing.
 4. The Director may require reasonable substantiation of statements or records offered as evidence at the hearing.
 5. The Director may also require any view to be stated in writing when circumstances justify.
 6. A verbatim record will be made of the entire hearing.

“The answer lies in a combination of two things. The manufacturers who didn't advertise paid for it and the economies made possible by increasing production paid for it.

“ADVERTISING is a factor in distribution and is paid for through the increase in sales and the savings the increased production makes possible.”

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




