Rezoning hearing a marathon

Ruidoso trustees heard more than six hours of argument Monday for and against a Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) decision to rezone the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club Tract from residential to commercial for construction of a Hilton Inn. Final decision on the matter will be rendered at the April 13 trustees' meeting.

Present at the meeting were Mayor George White, trustees Frank Sayner, Benny Coulston and Al Junge, and Frank Coppler, an attorney from Santa Fe providing legal counsel in the place of village attorney Lee Huckstep. Huckstep did not represent the village because he owns property in the area and was thus in a possible conflict of interest situation.

The meeting began with Mayor George White reading a prepared statement explaining that the quasi-judicial hearing would be conducted de novo, meaning the parties were not limited to matters raised during the P&Z meeting, but could present all facts and arguments deemed relevant to the case.

Stuart Shanor of Roswell, an attorney representing several property owners appealing the zoning change, questioned this manner of conducting the hearing and asserted he would not waive his right to object to a de novo hearing.

THE MORNING was given over to proponents of commercial zoning for the 7.93 acre tract.

Charles Hawthorne, attorney for the present owners of the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club, the proponents of the zoning change, presented what he called the three justifications to be met in order for the village to change a zoning designation.

The first justification, he said, would be if the change promotes or protects the public welfare. Following that, he continued, a mistake in the original zoning could be a cause, as could substantial change in the area under consideration.

Hawthorne said if any one of the reasons for rezoning could be met, the change would be justified.

To meet the first of these stipulations, Hawthorne said he planned to show Ruidoso needs the Hilton Inn, which he said is "better than stacking more condos."

He said there was a mistake in the original zoning of the club, because the property "is, was and always will be com-

mercial." Hawthorne raised the same issue at the February 1 Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) meeting when the zoning change was approved. He said then that under the 1976 comprehensive plan of the village, the property was projected to be commercial.

And, to support the last cause for rezon-

ing, he said the area has experienced substantial change since the master plan went into effect in 1976, with construction of condominiums in the area.

Presenting his case that a Hilton Inn would benefit Ruidoso, Hawthorne first

New board members announced at Chamber of Commerce meeting

The recently elected members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors were introduced at Wednesday's board meeting by Chamber president Richard Sandoval. The seven new board members will take their seats on the board May 1, according to Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth.

Elected to two-year terms by the general membership of the Chamber of Commerce were Joan Bailey of Storybook Cabins, who is presently completing a former board member's term; Bill Braudt of Braudt Construction; Danny Brown of Three Bees Mart; Jim Goodwin of Schlitzky's; Ronnie Hemphill of Dorman and Hemphill, P.A.; Tom Kelham of Ruidoso Gift and Fireplace; and Jim Paxton of NAPA Auto Parts. Paul Crown of Cablevision of Lincoln County will serve the one year remaining in a retired board member's term.

Archer Wilson gave the Chamber's budget report. He said the Valentine Espree Party netted approximately \$2,500. Sandoval expressed his pleasure in the amount earned, stating that over \$4,000 in tickets were sold the night of the party.

\$4,500 will be transferred from the Chamber's "rainy day" savings account,

said Wilson, in order to pay for the Chamber pins, insurance and "piddly bills." He mentioned that the "rainy day" has arrived as the Chamber goes through its slow cycle period from March to early May. Right now, \$757.32 is the present cash balance, Wilson added.

"We had one of those booming months where we had more adds than drops," said Jungbluth, referring to the 14 businesses which have recently joined the Chamber. Four businesses dropped out of the Chamber of Commerce, bringing the total number of members to 484, said Jungbluth.

New Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce members are: Triple M Sales and Services in Cloudcroft; Mountain Valley Vineyards in Capitan; PON Business Machines in Alto; Action Paint and Supply, the Bear Claw Gallery, Gary Myers Studio, and Condo-Tel, all of Ruidoso.

Other Ruidoso business added to the list of Chamber members are: Hill Country Restaurant, Four Seasons Real Estate, Ruidoso Drug, Hospital Pharmacy, V.I.P. Business Services, EGM Linens and Patrick Donovan Insurance.

Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) chairman Larry Langford said RMC members Morgan Clough and Herb Brunell had been appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission advisory

board. Brunell has decided not to serve, and an alternate RMC member will take his place, said Langford.

Clough has been elected to chair the board, reported Langford, who added that the group's first two tasks will be to come up with possible solutions for the midtown parking problem and the traffic control problem that exists throughout Ruidoso.

Sandoval, Wilson and Jungbluth commented on the success of the Dallas, Texas, Southwest Sports and Vacation Show.

"We had an excellent showing, and we did a lot of good," said Sandoval. "We accomplished what we intended to do," Wilson said. He added that the show turned out better than he had anticipated. Jungbluth said that expenses were under the estimated costs of the show.

Although thousands of people talked to Ruidoso representatives at the hospitality booth and received literature, said Jungbluth, sufficient brochures remain for another travel and recreation show which the Chamber is looking into for the fall.

Wilson said that planning is well underway for the 1982 Ruidoso Art Festival, which will take place on the Ruidoso High School parking lot July 23, 24 and 25. Judging of the over 250 applicants filing for the 99 possible booth spaces begins next week, said Wilson. He added that volunteers are

needed to take tickets at the four admission gates.

Jungbluth said the art festival is the biggest profit-maker for the Chamber. He said last year's festival made around \$10,000. The quality of material submitted for this year's show is outstanding, said Jungbluth. Wilson noted that he has received letters from artists who wrote that the Ruidoso Art Festival is "the best show on the circuit."

Jungbluth told the board of directors that plans for Aspen Festival '82 are coming together. Activities in the planning stage include: an antique car show, a tractor pull, a motorcycle convention, a program golf tournament, a high school marching band contest, a chili cookoff, an Octoberfest, an apple festival, mule races, a hunter-jumper show, an Arabian horse show, a bowling tournament and "the biggest parade we've ever had," according to Sandoval.

In conclusion, the Chamber board of directors heard a presentation from Yvonne Lanelli concerning the KENW-TV fund raising tele-auction that will be aired May 24 through 31. Area merchants, artists and craftsmen will be solicited in the upcoming weeks for tax deductible contributions to the television auction, said Lanelli.

Disaster simulation scheduled for Friday afternoon

If you hear fire alarms going off and see lots of flashing red police lights on the streets of Ruidoso Friday afternoon, don't panic. It's only a simulated disaster exercise, said Steve Makowski, Smokey Bear Ranger District fire management officer.

The exercise begins at 1 p.m., Friday and will last about two hours.

"We're going to have a command center simulation. It's an exercise involving the Lincoln County disaster plan," Makowski said.

The command center concept, said Makowski, is strictly the gathering of those with authority in one place to make coordinated decisions. He said part of the disaster plan is to utilize the command center concept to handle any disaster—such as a large fire, a flood, a chemical spill, an earthquake or any major catastrophe.

The exercise will involve a simulated disastrous fire that occurs partially within the village itself, Makowski stated.

At that time, Ruidoso mayor George White, Lincoln County manager Truman Billingsley, Lincoln County sheriff Ernest Sanchez, Ruidoso police chief Richard Swenor, Chris Zamora from the New Mexico State Forestry service, Smokey Bear district ranger Paul Gordon and Ruidoso evacuation coordinator Dave Parks will gather at the main fire station to conduct the simulation, Makowski said.

He added that a representative from the Bureau of Indian Affairs, some of the supervisors of the local utility companies, a representative or two from White Mountain Search and Rescue, the village fire prevention officer and area volunteer fire department chiefs will be invited to observe the action in the command center.

Makowski explained that the authorities will be in one room of the fire station, and in an adjacent room will be "role players" giving the authorities various bits of information to which they must react. He said the Continental Telephone Company has rigged up a communication system which will make the simulation more realistic.

"If (the disaster exercise) is designed on actual predicted fire behavior and takes into account the suppression forces that are available to put the fire out," said Makowski.

Makowski said the objective of the two hour disaster simulation is five-fold. The first objective is to test the Lincoln County

disaster plan for fire situations, given the complexity involved.

Secondly, it is intended to bring out the need for coordination and cooperative efforts between the different authorities with their various resources, said Makowski. Another objective is to stimulate interest in and demonstrate the need for a disaster plan.

The exercise is being conducted to find the weak points in the plan and strengthen them prior to any actual disaster. Finally, it is intended to bring out the need for fire prevention and hazard reduction in Lincoln County, Makowski said.

"The end result is a critique of the operation. What needs strengthening, and what was done well," said Makowski.

He said the original scenario to be used limited the police department's involvement. However, Swenor said he wants to utilize the opportunity to expose all of his officers to an emergency situation where evacuation procedures and traffic control can be practiced.

Swenor said evacuation procedures and traffic control points might be set up in the Upper Canyon and Ponderosa Heights areas. He said he also wants to familiarize his men with the new roads that have been built since the last disaster exercise.

Radio station KRRR will also participate in the disaster plan simulation. KRRR will receive information on a first hand basis, as it would during a real emergency, and broadcast evacuation instructions, Makowski said.

The disaster plan exercise is not done on a regular basis, said Makowski. He said the last simulation was in 1978, but since there have been changes in the various positions of authority, another exercise is warranted.

"ComFIRE (Committee For Improving Ruidoso's Environment) endorses the effort because it fits into their goal and mission, which is to promote fire safety within the community and the surrounding area," said Makowski.

He said coordination between individual authorities is an absolute necessity.

"To get anything done on a major scale requires everybody working together," Makowski said.

Makowski stated that no actual fire would be set. He did say the public may experience some minor inconveniences, such as a baby being awakened by the loudspeakers and sirens and traffic temporarily being diverted.

Village fire prevention officer seeks to educate, inform, advise

The most widely distributed sign in town reads, "Please, Help Prevent Fires," and it can be seen on any of the 1,500 dumpsters in Ruidoso.

How did the messages get there? Ollie Cuddy, Ruidoso's first fire prevention officer, is responsible for the signs.

Cuddy began his job last autumn after Ruidoso adopted the uniform fire code established by the Western Fire Chiefs Association, which calls for the position.

Cuddy told The News in an interview Wednesday that his job is to educate, inform and advise Ruidoso residents about fire prevention and protection.

The four-month-old program to educate residents and visitors not to discard hot ashes in dumpsters was developed by Cuddy to help reduce the rash of trash fires in the village.

But the conspicuous red-on-white signs

have not stopped Ruidoso's most common fire problem.

Ruidoso fireman Virgil Reynolds said the department gets dumpster fire calls almost every day and there is no indication they are diminishing.

Cuddy said people fail to consider the consequences of dumping hot ashes onto a pile of trash—a mistake, he said, that is most often made by tourists who are in a hurry to clean out their lodgings before leaving town.

In addition to dumpster signs, Cuddy is fighting the problem by sending letters to condominium, cabin and motel owners asking them to post warnings on fireplaces, advising visitors of the high fire danger in this area.

Dumpster fires are just one of the hazards Cuddy tries to prevent. Because of summer's low humidity, frequent wind and dried-out vegetation, the fire prevention officer is involved in several projects to inform the public of the situation.

Cuddy is assisting Ruidoso school superintendent Pat Valliant with a "learn not to burn" program to be started at local schools in the fall. The program, designed to educate children in fire prevention and protection, will be supplied with materials furnished by Cuddy's office.

Another program dealing with fire prevention is a clean-up campaign the last two weeks of April.

Working as a volunteer in the campaign, Cuddy will assist the fire and police departments, the Forest Service and other volunteers from ComFIRE (Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment) in cleaning up Ruidoso.

Cuddy said removing litter and dead brush will not only beautify the village but will also help prevent fires by eliminating ready fuels.

Another of Cuddy's responsibilities is to scrutinize building plans along with the building inspector to make sure projects meet fire codes.

He said he ensures there are adequate access roads and fire hydrants near any proposed construction site to facilitate firefighters in case of an emergency.

Cuddy said one of his concerns about local building is the amount of condominiums in the area. He said with "so many condominiums going up so close together," that a strong wind could carry a fire and cause it to spread.

But, he said, Ruidoso is prepared for such an occurrence. He said that although the village is considered a "high risk" fire area, it is adequately equipped with fire hydrants, and the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department provides excellent service.

Summarizing his philosophy on fire safety, Cuddy said the best protection is common sense.

"If you don't think about what you are doing, like throwing hot ashes in a dumpster, you're going to start a fire," he said. "All it takes (to prevent fires) is common sense."

led on Jim O'Leary, president of the development firm that wants to build the Hilton Inn. O'Leary said he would "try to give Ruidoso its own 'Inn of the Mountain' and that the only obstacle to obtaining a Hilton franchise was the zoning classification. To protect the neighborhood, he said, the hotel will have a brick and wood fence to screen it from the adjoining dwellings and to limit noise.

In cross examination, Shanor argued that commercial zoning could allow businesses other than the Hilton on the site. O'Leary admitted he has neither received a Hilton franchise nor paid a franchise fee.

Roy Proppner, a resident of the area, testified that the racquet club has been sited and that it would be beneficial to a neighborhood and community to have a quality Hilton Hotel would bring to the area.

The question of the club deteriorating and becoming an eyesore if it remains in the area (\$1.5 million, according to Hawthorne) and closes down, was also raised by Hawthorne in his intention to allow a Hilton to benefit the community.

Rick Evans, a Ruidoso realtor, said he was concerned the club would "deteriorate and become a blight" if not taken over by developers.

Attorney Gary Mitchell of Ruidoso, also representing those opposed to a commercial zoning, questioned Evans' authority in appraising the area, pointing out that Evans is not a professional appraiser.

Both sides presented professional appraisers as witnesses.

Clifford G. Anderson, owner of Anderson Appraisal Services, said, "Historically in the United States, during the development phase, property values are adversely affected." But, he continued, "property values would definitely increase" upon completion of the inn.

Shanor, who contended that once the site received commercial zoning it could be developed with any business in the C-1 designation, including a service station or gas terminal, asked if those operations could be detrimental to the area.

"That would have an adverse affect," Anderson replied, but he said it was not fair to pick out items not pertaining to the hearing.

Shanor pressed the issue in his case, however.

"No franchise has been issued, no fee paid, no plans and specifications for development," he said. "Would you give the inn credence as a viable project?"

Anderson replied he would have to appraise for "best case and worst case" situations.

Arguing that a complex with tennis courts, swimming pool and convention center is needed in Ruidoso, Hawthorne said in his closing remarks that it would be the only one of its kind in town, that it would provide 85 to 100 jobs and, from axes collected, that it would mean "big bucks for the general welfare of Ruidoso."

Pursuing the second justification for rezoning he had outlined, Hawthorne attempted to show that the R-2 zoning assigned to the property by P&Z February 1 before it granted a rezoning to C-1 (light commercial), was a mistake. The club is a commercial enterprise, he said, and was envisioned as having a C-1 zoning in the 1976 comprehensive plan.

Hawthorne called on Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine to verify the tract was planned as C-1.

Hine read minutes from the trustee meeting of October 26, 1976, at which the comprehensive plan was approved and he confirmed that the trustees adopted the plan and that it showed the projection of the site to be C-1.

Shanor pointed out the non-binding status of the plan. He said the plan is only a guideline for zoning and gives no authority to alter zoning designation.

Hawthorne then questioned witnesses about the private nature of the swim and racquet club to illustrate it has been a commercial enterprise.

One witness said he often frequented the bar at the club even though he was not a member. Mitchell pointed out that that was an illegal activity under the club's rules.

Hawthorne asked local realtor Jim Wimberly, who obtained a Hilton franchise in 1977 for the same location but backed out of the deal because, he said, he could not get favorable financing, what the village's reaction to a Hilton was at that time.

Wimberly said he assumed the area was zoned commercial and he would not have pursued the deal if he believed the tract was not zoned as such. But, when questioned by Mitchell, Wimberly admitted he never approached P&Z or the trustees with formal plans for the site.

Following the third justification for rezoning, that there has been a substantial change in the area, Hawthorne focused on the number of condominiums constructed since 1976 and the high percentage of condos that are rental units.

Hawthorne called on realtors Sonja Hartrout and Evans, both of whom have property around the site, and it was determined that of 140 units at Pinon Park, Fox Hollow and Fairway Meadows Condominiums, 118 are in a rental pool.

If the site remains zoned R-2 (multi-family residential), said Hawthorne, another 99 condominiums could be built there.

Hawthorne then asked planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp about demands on water and sewer systems. Cupp replied that condominiums could require more water than a hotel if the occupancy rate was equal.

Because of the site's proximity to the White Mountain schools, those opposed to the hotel expressed concern about safety in the area.

Rudolf Flack, one of the appellants to the change, said his child could "no longer safely negotiate Jack Little Drive" with an influx of traffic to the hotel.

Hawthorne called on P&Z member Mike Mulholland, who has been performing a study on Ruidoso traffic. Mulholland said White Mountain Drive will become an "arterial highway" upon the completion of the new high school, causing Gavilan Canyon Road to connect with Hull Road and creating more traffic regardless of the racquet club site's future.

Mulholland said Suddeyth and Mechem Drives are all the commercial zones Ruidoso now has and that pressure will be for C-1 zoning on alternate routes. He said the comprehensive plan projects such a case and it is already necessary to construct a barrier in front of the White Mountain schools.

IN THE AFTERNOON, those opposed to the commercial zoning presented their case.

Shanor, representing B. F. and Ann W. Phillips Jr., and Jerry and Myrna Rheudasil, submitted as exhibits plats of the Phillips and Rheudasil properties near the racquet club. Also submitted were certified copies of the title deeds; resume of Dr. Richard-Lai, associate professor of urban development at Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona; affidavit of Anne Phillips that she did not receive notice of the February 1 P&Z meeting (which was not accepted as evidence following Hawthorne's objection that he had no opportunity to cross examine Phillips); and P&Z file reflecting that notices were not sent to the Phillips or Rheudasils.

Shanor called to the stand Dr. Lai, who was retained to render a professional judgment of the proposed Hilton project. Lai was on the Planning Commission for Aspen, Colorado, and presented a plan for Aspen as his master's thesis.

Lai said he had spent two days in Ruidoso during which he studied the minutes of the February 1 P&Z meeting, the blue book (P&Z ordinances), the village comprehensive plan and the Ruidoso area itself.

"My conclusion as a professional urban planner on the zoning actions (taken at the February 1 meeting) is that the site in question is unsuited for C-1 and constitutes a violation of ordinance," Lai said.

He said it would be a "grave mistake" for the village to zone the area commercial.

Lai outlined the following eight reasons for his conclusion:

—The area in question is surrounded on all sides by exclusive residential developments that wish to retain their character.

—The area is isolated from any other C-1 zoning.

—The Hilton will create a need for extensive signs and lights to identify the "rather unnatural site for a hotel." These signs and lights will be detrimental to the residential area.

—The lot in question is small for a hotel, resulting in insufficient room for parking and lack of a buffer zone (surrounding landscaping or open space).

—A hotel is distinguished from con-

dominiums by the fact that condominiums are basically for residential use, while a hotel requires a restaurant and bar with entertainment to attract a crowd.

—A problem would be created by overflow traffic parking in the streets and in the residential area.

—The type of congestion created by a bar near a school area is contrary to sound zoning practices.

—All surrounding areas would suffer because of the isolated C-1 zone.

Lai said the attitude of urban planners toward "spot zoning" is that it is "the antithesis of planning, definitely to be avoided."

He also explained that contract zoning, a situation in which an applicant agrees to submit to certain conditions in exchange for zoning approval, is the "antithesis of planning practice."

The commercial zoning was granted by P&Z with the conditions that the proposed inn be a Hilton and that it be started within one year.

An area cannot be zoned for a particular use, Lai said, only for commercial use.

He explained that even if an applicant agrees to certain conditions, the contract would be completely useless if the project was not completed for any reason.

"A city cannot enter a contract that would bind their lease authority," he said.

The vast majority of cases of contract zoning have been ruled illegal and unenforceable, Lai reported.

In cross examination, Hawthorne asked Lai whether all spot zoning is illegal. Lai said no, but that all cases approved are readily distinguishable from those found illegal.

Hawthorne also pointed out that a bar at the proposed Hilton would conform to New Mexico law requiring it to be at least 300 feet from a school.

"Legality is one thing, good planning practice is another," Lai said.

Hawthorne suggested that the situation would not differ substantially whether a hotel or condominiums were erected on the site, as a large percentage of condominiums in the area are in the rental pool anyway.

"It's not room rental that bothers me," Lai said, "it's accessories—bar, restaurant. A hotel tries to get crowds, a condominium tries not to."

Hawthorne asked Lai whether he had studied the situation from a local point of view and whether he had sought the opinion of local residents before making a judgment. Lai answered that he had examined the area extensively and had talked to some realtors and developers who seemed to have a split consensus on the matter.

The second witness for the opposition was Armand Smith, professional appraiser from Clovis.

Smith made the point that if the racquet club tract is zoned C-1, any use which qualifies under C-1 zoning regulation can be made of the land.

He said that such an action would

adversely affect neighboring property values because the C-1 area would not be compatible with the neighborhood.

This loss in property value would be an example of economic obsolescence, Smith explained, which refers to loss in value affected by something outside the property itself.

"This nonconforming use is going to create some economic obsolescence to adjacent properties," Smith said.

In cross examination, Hawthorne asked Smith, "What effect will a falling-down dilapidated racquet club have on the area?" Smith replied that it would not be of benefit.

Myrna Rheudasil, owner of Racquet Court Condominium 3-B, was the final witness called by Shanor. Rheudasil testified she had not received notice of the February 1 P&Z meeting.

In cross examination, Rheudasil, from Lewisville, Texas, said she and her husband spend about four months a year in Ruidoso. They come here for peace and quiet, she said, and "I don't think a Hilton Inn next to our condo is conducive to that."

Hawthorne pointed out that the Rheudasils' condominium is 188 feet from the proposed conversion center facility.

Asked whether she would oppose the Hilton if she did not own a condominium in the area, Rheudasil said, "Yes, it is not in keeping with the surrounding area."

Gary Mitchell, representing appellants Barney and Lydia Rue, Rudolph and Linda Flack and Ray W. and Rosemary Gann Jr., called only one witness to the stand during his argument.

Flack, owner of Pinon Park Condominium Unit B-5, took the stand to voice his opposition to the proposed Hilton on the site in question.

Flack gave the following list of reasons for his stance:

—The Sierra Swim and Racquet Club has a country club type atmosphere which does not detract from surrounding residential property as a commercial structure would. Shops and a restaurant which would be included in the Hilton are conducive to drawing people to an area but are not conducive to a residential type area.

—Children in the area who safely walk to school now may be endangered by hotel traffic in the White Mountain School area.

—Noise and light pollution created by the high volume of traffic at a hotel is not conducive to a residential atmosphere.

—Potential congestion of traffic could cause overflow into residential streets.

"These things lower the value of my property, in my opinion," Flack said.

He also stated he did not receive written notice of the February 1 P&Z meeting, although he received actual notice through word-of-mouth.

In cross examination, Hawthorne asked Flack whether he purchased his property knowing the village comprehensive plan

called for future use of the racquet club area for C-1 and recreational purposes.

"I knew the plan allowed for consideration in that direction," said Flack.

Hawthorne also pointed out that Pinon Park has no restrictive covenants, although Flack had earlier referred to such in stating the covenants protect property owners from uses that would create a problem affecting property values.

Mitchell decided not to call further witnesses in order to save time, but pointed out property owned by Rue as lots 3, 4, 5 and 8 at White Mountain I Subdivision, which borders the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club; and Gann as lot 2 at White Mountain I, adjacent to Rue's property.

Audience members voicing opinions about the zoning proposal included Mary Kleine, who raised a question about water supply. She said she wondered what precedence the Hilton would have over residents for water use rights and where the proposed Hilton will get water. No answers were given.

Hawthorne recalled P&Z enforcement officer Cupp to the stand to testify that notices of the February 1 P&Z meeting had been sent to all property owners on record in the county assessor's office as owning property within a 100-foot radius of the racquet club site, as required in the ordinances.

Shanor pointed out that the assessor's office was substantially behind in its records.

In his closing remarks, Shanor presented several conclusions.

He said that due to the significant change in the area since the original zoning in 1976, a decision to change the zoning now, even if the original zoning was judged a mistake, is not justified.

He also stated that the racquet club can be a productive element without a Hilton Hotel.

Shanor asserted that his clients are not opposed to a Hilton, only to rezoning their residential area.

Shanor also made the point that residents affected by the matter are part of the public whose general welfare must be considered in the decision.

He urged the trustees to give consideration to the character and suitability of the area and reminded them that a C-1 zoning on the disputed site would allow it to be used for any commercial nature if it is not utilized for a Hilton. Shanor termed this a "high risk situation."

In his closing remarks, Mitchell reminded the board that his clients are full-time residents of the Ruidoso area and that the board is responsible for representing individuals' rights and due process rights.

He said that individuals rely upon the governing body not to change the zoning of their residences.

"What are you going to say to residents who rely on your good integrity and enforcement of the law?" Mitchell said.

Downs attorney rules no hearing for Spall

Former Ruidoso Downs village clerk Virginia Spall is not entitled to a public hearing on reasons for her dismissal from the position, according to a letter from village attorney Ron Harris read at Monday's trustees' meeting.

It was announced at the March 15 organizational meeting that Spall would not be rehired by newly elected mayor J. C. Day, and Spall requested a public hearing on the matter.

"It is my opinion that a Personnel Board hearing to review the propriety of Mrs. Spall's failure to be re-appointed would not only be improper and ill-advised, but would be beyond the jurisdiction of the Personnel Board," Harris said in his letter.

The letter explained that village clerk is an appointive office, to be "filled by the governing body at its organizational meeting."

"Thus the term of office of a Village Clerk expires, by statute, as soon after a municipal election as a successor is sworn," Harris said in his letter.

"The fact that Mrs. Spall's name was not included in the names submitted (to the governing body) for confirmation was not improper in any way."

Spall indicated after Monday's meeting that she intends to file suit on the matter.

"I asked for a public hearing as a public employee," she said, "representing all public employees in the state of New Mexico."

Hiring of Harris as village attorney was approved at Monday's meeting, after it was reported the mayor had appointed him temporary village attorney March 17.

Most other agenda items were tabled following discussion.

Trustee Jake Harris' offer to furnish equipment to build a parking lot near the municipal building was tabled until studied by the village attorney.

Preparation of a personnel practices resolution and salaries for the budget was

tabled until the next meeting. Village clerk Wilma Webb was instructed to prepare an itemized list of each employee's position, current salary and due date for salary increases.

Also tabled was the discussion of risk management insurance for civil rights coverage. The trustees requested a review of all village insurance be made before a decision is offered.

Problems were discussed concerning the village ordinance requiring that sewer taps be drilled. There is a reported lack of drilling machines in the area.

The matter was tabled after a motion that trustee Bob Power be sent to Santa Fe to discuss the problem with representatives from the municipal league and a review of the ordinance be made by the village attorney so that the topic can be placed on the trustees' next meeting agenda.

Also discussed was a request from the Ladies' Auxiliary for permission to beautify the medians. The request was tabled until determination that such a project would be approved by the state Highway Department. Permission was granted the group to use council chambers the first Monday of each month for meetings.

In other business, the trustees:

—Accepted an invitation from Ruidoso mayor George White to meet with Ruidoso's trustees at the Ruidoso council chambers March 29 at 7:30 p.m., to discuss problems pertaining to law enforcement.

—Announced that a hearing will be held April 6 at 9:30 a.m., at the courthouse in Carrizozo for protesting the proposed transfer of water out of the village by Ruidoso Downs resident Tony Parker.

—Renewed the joint agreement with Ruidoso for ambulance service.

—Announced the appointment of Roger Riley to the personnel board.

The next regular meeting of the Ruidoso Downs trustees is scheduled for April 12 at 7 p.m.



Warrior spikers compete at Deming

The Ruidoso High School boys' track team should continue to show improvement when it competes in the Deming Invitational Saturday at Deming High School.

The Warriors opened the season two weeks ago at Artesia and came away with several fine performances in a non-scoring five-team meet.

At the Deming meet, most of the Ruidoso athletes will be in the same events they competed in at Artesia.

"There're no major changes from the last meet," head coach Ronnie Maskew said. "I see Lon Nunley doing well in his events (shot put, discus and 100 meters), Don Nunley doing well in the 400 meters and high jump and Cisco Bob having a chance in the distances."

Lon Nunley made the state AAA meet last May in the discus and could also make

the meet this year in the 100 meters, relays and shot put.

Nunley ran the 100 meters in 11.31 at Artesia, just over a tenth of a second slower than his personal best. Lon won the discus with a 141-foot effort and finished second in the shot put with a 46-3 throw.

Don Nunley took third in the high jump at Artesia with a 5-6 effort and ran a strong 53.2 400 meter leg on the 1,600 meter relay squad.

The 1,600 meter relay team of Nunley, Scott Neal, Grady Williamson and Eric Strobel ran a 3:39.75 time at Artesia and stands a good chance of bettering that clocking at Deming.

Cisco Bob, only a freshman, was perhaps the biggest surprise at Artesia, winning the 1,500 meters in 4:30.0. He also ran a 2:14.8 for fourth in the 800 meters.

Junior javelin thrower Billy Woodul and

the 400 meter relay squad could also do well at Deming.

Woodul, who played quarterback on the Warrior football team last fall, threw the spear 150-6 at Artesia, less than nine feet short of the state meet qualifying standard. With any luck and natural improvement over the course of the season, Woodul should make the state meet.

"It's hard to tell how Woodul will throw the javelin Saturday," Maskew said. "There are so many factors which go into the javelin, such as how windy it is."

The 400 meter relay team of Lon Nunley, Neal, Peter Garcia and Grady Williamson ran a 46.0 for third place at Artesia. Ruidoso, with Neal and Lon Nunley running on the squad, finished fourth in the state meet last season in 45.4.

Ruidoso should also be able to put together a good 800 meter relay team. The

Warriors finished sixth in the state meet in that event last season and ran well at Artesia before a dropped baton put them out of the race.

Talented David Landrum ran in three distance events at the Artesia meet and should give the Warriors some strength along with Bob in the longer races.

Sophomores Tony Muse and Robert Swanner leaped 16-8 and 16-7, respectively, in the long jump in the opening meet and could do better at Deming. Muse went over 17 feet last season.

The meet will begin at 9:30 a.m. There will be no trials in any event. Most of the teams from district 3-AAA will probably compete in the invitational.

It's taken a while but women's basketball is finally on the road to respectability in the collegiate ranks.

This year the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) is having the first Division I women's tournament and the four final teams have been decided.

Chesney State will play Maryland and Tennessee will tangle with Louisiana Tech Friday at Norfolk, Virginia, in the NCAA semi-finals. Sunday the winners of the two semi-final contests will play for the national championship.

While it's an achievement to finally get a national collegiate tournament for women, it's also a mystery why it has taken so long.

Women's basketball on all levels has improved a great deal in the last 10 years. While it's still far from the equivalent of men's basketball talent-wise, many women are developing the specific talents of some of the male players.

Nancy Lieberman, one of the country's top women players, appeared on NBC's Today Show Monday morning and gave viewers some examples of her basketball skills.

Lieberman, a tall slender athlete, showed an outstanding shooting touch and knowledge of the game.

While it's doubtful she could perform a slam dunk or make the outlet pass as quickly as some male players, Lieberman is probably as good a basic shooter as a lot of men.

There obviously has been some good shooting in the Division I tournament. Most of the scores have been 70 or more. In one of the first round games Louisiana Tech routed Tennessee Tech 114-53.

Louisiana Tech, which is 33-1 on the season, also rolled over Arizona State 92-54 and Kentucky 82-60 on the way to the semi-finals.

Women's teams still have a long way to go to catch up with men's teams in pure talent, largely because of their smaller height. However, they've come a long way in the past 10 years in making women's collegiate basketball competitive and interesting to watch.

Speaking of interesting sports to watch, one of the fastest growing individual sports in the country could be making its debut in the Ruidoso area next fall.

Nothing's definite yet but there's a possibility a moto-cross race could be run in Ruidoso shortly after the end of the horse racing season.

Pro football fans can get a chance to see their heroes in Albuquerque this week. Members of the National Football League (NFL) players' union are meeting in the Duke City for some discussions on a possible strike during the 1982 season.

While the prospect of a players' strike is undoubtedly displeasing to most pro fans, the idea of catching a glimpse of "Too Tall" Jones, Craig Morton, Tony Dorssett or Earl Campbell on the street is interesting.

So, for at least a week anyway, Albuquerque will be the spotlight of the NFL football world.

Mammoth one of several significant fossil finds

Discovery of mammoth bones last year on public lands north of Roswell and several recent finds in the Pecos Valley that is piecing together the natural history of New Mexico. Geologist Allan Lemley and paleontologist Keith Rigby of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) have tentatively identified the fossilized remains of tusk, skull fragments as being from an Imperial or Columbian mammoth that lived in the Pecos River Valley between 100,000 and 150,000 years ago.

Imperial mammoth was one of the largest land mammals that ever lived, standing 13 feet in height at the shoulder and weighing 10 tons. Like today's elephants (which it closely resembled) it was a vegetarian. Its fossilized remains were uncovered in a geological formation at the Orchard Park Terrace, located by the Pecos River between 100,000 and 150,000 years ago, when the Pecos was a much larger river.

The terrace is littered with mammoth and a host of other animal remains, said Lemley. "With the increasing gas activities in this area we expect to discover more remains. We have excellent cooperation from exploration companies."

Archaeological artifacts and fossils are

protected on public lands. The BLM requests that people finding fossils not disturb the site or the remains, and contact the Roswell or Carlsbad offices of the BLM. The BLM will act quickly to protect the find while allowing other activities, such as oil and gas exploration, to continue.

Bones of Columbian and Imperial mammoths have been documented from several other locations in New Mexico — but not the woolly mammoth, which lived in colder climates to the north, along the edges of glaciers. Remains of primitive horses (some half again as big as today's horses) and five species of antelope have also been found. An almost complete skeleton (including knee caps) of a camel that lived 100,000 years ago was discovered recently near Albuquerque. Bones from a gigantic ground sloth, which reached a weight of 1,000 pounds, have been found near Hobbs. Also unearthed in New Mexico are bones of a glyttodonth, a ten-foot long armadillo-like animal that weighed up to 500 pounds.

Documented in adjacent states but suspected to have occurred in New Mexico is the California condor, America's largest bird of prey. An endangered population of less than 30 birds still survives in southern California. Predatory animals such as the

sabre-toothed tiger and other large cats, plus wolves must also have occurred. Bones from a cheetah-like animal have been discovered in Nebraska.

All these animals occurred in the western United States until about 10,000 years ago. Vegetation during this period was lush, with a greater number and variety of trees dotting a rich plain. Scientists believe that the weather was probably cooler and damper than what it is now, but without the extremes of our summers and winters.

Paleontologists speculate that dramatic weather changes, coupled with hunting pressure from the spread of early Indians in North America, contributed to the demise of this unique environment. Appropriately termed the "Great Change" this period marked the end of the Pleistocene epoch (from about two and one-half million years ago to 10,000 years ago) and the beginning of the Holocene epoch — the age we live in today.

"Our natural history is a part of our heritage," said John Gregg, District Manager of the BLM in Roswell. "We will preserve and try to interpret what is found of this legacy and make exhibits available to schools, local groups and museums throughout the state."

Forest Service seeks volunteers

Southwestern Regional Forester M. J. Hassell called for volunteers today to help maintain and care for the national forests in Arizona and New Mexico.

"With the help of volunteers," Hassell said, "we hope to reduce operating costs without reducing services. We are asking people to use their time and skills to help the Forest Service continue to provide visitors with rewarding experiences."

Hassell said persons with management skills are especially needed to take responsibility for an entire project and in state and private forestry programs in addition to national forest jobs that include campground hosts, trail maintenance, wilderness rangers, guides, lecturers, tree planters and clerks, Hassell said.

Persons interested in the volunteer program were urged to write or visit any Forest Service office. "They should indicate the kind of work desired, location and when they are available," Hassell said.

"The work hours are flexible — volunteers can work on a full-time, part-time, or even one-time basis — the jobs are both interesting and educational, and they get a great deal of personal satisfaction in knowing they have helped make our world a little better place to live for all of us," he said.

Major qualifications for the volunteers are a desire to work and people with special skills are particularly welcome. There's no maximum or minimum age, but a volunteer under age 18 needs written consent from a parent or guardian.

Volunteers are not federal employees, but they do receive legal protection as well as insurance for work-related injuries. In some cases, they can be compensated for travel, food and lodging expenses.

"Entire organizations may volunteer," Hassell said. For instance, through the "Adopt-A-Trail" program, an organization can volunteer to maintain and improve a trail in the national forests.

Roads and wildlife habitats are among other national forest resources and facilities available for "adoption."

Focus on Small Business

Dear Mr. Shafer:

Government statistics show that only a small percentage of the country's businesses are owned by women. Don't these statistics underestimate the number of women who run businesses from their homes?

You probably are right. The Census Bureau reports 702,000 women-owned businesses in 1977. These firms represented 7.1 percent of all small businesses in the country. The figures are probably higher today.

Before starting a home business, it's wise to be sure you are complying with local zoning regulations, which often place restrictions on the types of businesses. Some rules keep you from hiring other

employees and prevent you from selling goods, or they may define what is objectionable — such as noise, vibration, fumes, odors, hours of operation, effects on traffic, electric interference, etc.

Then there's the matter of licenses. If you buy, sell or trade you may need a business license; often these are based on gross revenue.

The Internal Revenue Service has clamped down on tax write-offs for business uses of the home; but the 1981 Tax Law liberalized some tax advantages in this area.

Remember, too, that any income made from a home-run business must be reported as income.

Murderer of laundry owner being sought

John Kastner was building a future. At just 24 years of age, he already had purchased a laundry in Albuquerque's south valley. He planned to get married in the near future.

But on Saturday morning, January 30, all his plans came to a sudden end.

Witnesses say that shortly before 9 a.m., a white male around 19 or 20 years of age entered Kastner's A&F Laundry at 3901 Sista, South West. The man went into a restroom and reappeared a few minutes later armed with a sawed-off .22 caliber rifle and wearing a ski mask.

The gunman approached Kastner, who was standing near a row of washing machines, and said, "I have a gun and it's loaded."

Police were told later that Kastner tried to kick at the weapon, but failed to dislodge it from the gunman's hands. The offender then fired one shot at the young store owner, striking him in the upper left chest.

Apparently stunned by the shooting, the offender dropped his sawed-off rifle and fled the store.

Kastner died about an hour later at Presbyterian Hospital of the wound.

Witnesses say the gunman was about 5-7, 135 pounds, with light brown hair and medium complexion. He was wearing a red shirt, blue jeans, tennis shoes and a red ski mask with blue stripes at the time of the shooting.

Ironically, Kastner's parents said they had discussed with him how he should react to an armed robbery. They said he

never had been robbed, even though he managed a laundry on South Coors road before buying his own store. It was their conclusion that possibly young Kastner had taken such pride of ownership in his store that the thought of turning over his hard earned money to an armed robber infuriated him.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the person responsible for John Kastner's murder.

Anyone with information about this case is asked to call the commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission also will pay cash rewards of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the solution of other serious crimes committed around New Mexico.

Meanwhile, San Juan County Crime Stoppers also is searching for a murderer. A substantial cash reward is being offered for information leading to the solution of the February 19 stabbing death of Andy Neilson, 38, during a fight outside the Office Bar in Farmington. Anyone with information is asked to call 334-2023.


Santa Fe Crime Stoppers, at 988-5555, is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of the February 10 robbery of First National Bank's Plaza Branch. Police say a blond male, 5-8 to 5-10, wearing wire rim glasses, entered the branch bank around 12:45 p.m. and ordered the teller to give him all the large bills.

Roswell Crime Stoppers, at 623-9000, is offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the solution of a residential burglary. On February 22, someone broke into a home at 412 South Cedar Avenue and took a three-pound coffee can filled with \$400 worth of silver, some jewelry, and two Smith and Wesson .38-caliber revolvers.

And Crime Stoppers of Otero County is offering a reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest of Joseph "Smitty" Martinez, who recently was indicted by the Otero Grand Jury on 31 counts of burglary and receiving or disposing of stolen property. Police believe Martinez has left the Alamogordo area to avoid prosecution. He is described as being 36 years of age, 5-11, 150 pounds, with brown eyes and brown hair. He has a tattoo of a keyhole on his left forearm and a tattoo of a Virgin Mary on his right forearm. Anyone having any information about Martinez' possible whereabouts is asked to call Crime Stoppers of Otero County at 437-2000.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission and the 32 local Crime Stoppers programs in New Mexico pay cash rewards on a continuous basis for information leading to the solution of major crimes and the capture of wanted felons. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Nationally, there now are more than 200 Crime Stoppers programs in operation. Combined, these programs have assisted in the solution of 13,583 major crimes and the recovery of \$43.6 million worth of stolen property and narcotics.

Grazing fees lowered on national forest land

For the second year in a row, fees for grazing livestock on national forest land have been reduced, according to Chris Allison, Extension range scientist at New Mexico State University.

"New Mexico is one of 16 western states where these lower grazing fees will be in effect for 1982," Allison said.

The 1982 rates to lease national forest land for grazing livestock will be \$1.86 per animal month, 45 cents less per animal month than in 1981, Allison said. An animal month in the grazing fee calculation is one cow or horse, or five sheep for one month.

Grazing fees are determined by the Rangelands Improvement Act of 1978. The formula, now being used on a seven-year trial basis, considers rates for leasing private grazing land, the difference between total costs of grazing on public and private land, beef cattle prices, and other costs of producing livestock.

"Grazing fees are lower again this year because the prices farmers and ranchers got for their beef cattle dropped while the costs of livestock production went up,"

Allison said.

Although the average cost of leasing private pasture jumped 12 percent last year, from \$7.88 to \$8.83 per animal month, this increase was more than offset by the drop in beef prices and a 13 percent increase in production costs, Allison said.

The lower fees mean farmers and ranchers in the 16 western states will pay about \$12 million to graze their livestock on federal land in 1982. Half of this amount will be used by the United States Forest

Service to maintain and improve national forest rangelands.

Counties where the national forests are located will get one-fourth of the grazing fee income and the remainder goes to the United States Treasury.

"During 1982, fees for grazing on lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management will also be \$1.86 per animal month," Allison said.

Support of auction on public TV asked

Yvonne Lanelli, Lincoln County educational television station, spoke before the board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Wednesday on behalf of the station's tele-auction fund raising event.

Lanelli encouraged the directors to contribute to and support the public broadcasting station by participating in the May 24 through 31 tele-auction. She said the auction is the single major fund raising effort by KENW-TV to support localized non-commercial television programming.

Lanelli and Cathy Annala of Ruidoso, Pat Scheer of Capitan and Robie Burkstaller of Nogal will be working in Lincoln County to solicit contributions for the television auction. They will urge area merchants, artists, craftsmen, restaurateurs and lodgers to donate goods and services that will be promoted and auctioned during prime time on KENW, said Lanelli.

"Ruidoso items go like hot cakes," said Lanelli. "Anything from Ruidoso is very, very popular."

Although KENW has conducted the tele-auction for the past five years, Ruidoso merchants have participated in the promo-

tion only in the past two years, Lanelli said. She said 35 Lincoln County merchants donated goods or services last year, and added that that was four times as many contributors as the previous year.

She explained that products and services given to KENW will be shown on camera and promoted by professional broadcasters. The retail value of the article will be given over the air, and bids will be phoned in. The contributor will receive a tax deduction equivalent to the retail value of the item, which is in accordance with Internal Revenue Service regulations, said Lanelli.

"The whole idea of the auction, from the bidder's point of view, is to get bargains," she said. Lanelli added that donors receive "tons and tons of publicity" by having their wares shown on KENW, which broadcasts in south central and southeastern New Mexico and parts of west Texas. The Corporation for Public Broadcasting will provide matching funds for what KENW brings in during the auction on a two to one basis, Lanelli said. "She told the Chamber board of directors, 'It's fun. The tele-auction is great for Ruidoso merchants... it's just super.'"

A Series on Common Diseases of Dogs: Canine Viral Enteritis (Parvoviral Enteritis)

—Clinical Signs:

Prominent clinical signs are vomiting (often severe), complete loss of appetite, diarrhea (often hemorrhagic) and rapid dehydration. The stools may rapidly progress to a fluid state, streaked with blood, or become frankly hemorrhagic. Body temperatures may range from 104 degrees Fahrenheit to 107 degrees Fahrenheit in the young puppy and somewhat lower in the adult dog. A significant laboratory finding in parvoviral infection is a very low blood cell count. Very few conditions will provoke this severe a blood reaction.

Parvovirus has also been shown to be a cause of acute deaths in puppies four to eight weeks of age. The virus apparently attacks the heart muscle cells. Puppies become listless, cry, have difficulty breathing, and die of heart failure in a few hours. Others are found dead without being observed having any difficulties. The possibility of permanent heart disease exists for those that recover from this form of the disease. The gastrointestinal form of the disease is most common.

—Disease Transmission:

The disease is apparently spread by direct contact with the feces and vomitus of affected animals. The virus is very resistant and may remain viable for long periods. Dogs with parvoviral disease have been known to shed the virus for nearly three weeks after recovery. The disease may also be transmitted from infected animals to healthy animals by

means of improperly cleaned feed and water utensils, on shoes, clothing and other inanimate objects. It is believed that flies may contribute to the spread of the virus. Although Canine Parvoviral disease is closely related to Panleukopenia in cats, there is no evidence that the cat virus causes disease in the dog or that the dog virus causes disease in the cat.

—Prevention:
There are vaccines currently available for use in preventing the disease. The vaccines available are given in two separate doses administered approximately two to three weeks apart. It must be remembered, however, that full protection does not develop until about one week after the second vaccination. Booster injections should be given more frequently to those dogs entered in shows or placed in other high risk situation.

The virus is extremely resistant to most antiseptics and disinfectants. Household bleach (5 percent sodium hypochlorite) diluted one part in thirty parts water has been effective in destroying the virus when used as a cleaning agent.

If your pet should show any of the symptoms of parvovirus, you should contact a veterinarian as soon as possible.

The virus is not known to cause any human health problems.

State Fair queen contest changed

The queen competition at the New Mexico State Fair will undergo some major changes, particularly in dates, during the upcoming 1982 exposition in September.

Fair Administrative Officer Joan Hillman said that the period of Monday, September 13, through Friday, September 17, has been designated Queen Week at the fair.

She said the biggest change would be the crowning of the new queen on Friday night, September 17, at the All-Star Rodeo.

"We think this will be better for everyone — the contestants, the fair operation and the public," she said. "It will take the pressure off the girls and just work out better for everyone."

She reported that she met with the queen contest directors this week and with them revised the entire structure of the competition.

Pat Ward of Lincoln is queen contest coordinator and Valerie Foutz Hatch of Farmington is her assistant. Mrs. Hatch was State Fair Queen in 1972 and has been assistant in the contest for the past couple of years. Both women serve as chaperones to the contestants during the week.

Hillman said that the dates are very important for all New Mexico girls planning to enter the competition.

The deadline for entries will be Wednesday, September 17.

The first orientation for the contenders will be on Monday, September 13.

The first riding contest will be on Tuesday, September 14, the opening day of the 1982 State Fair. The personality contest will be staged on Wednesday, September 15, and the second riding test on Thursday, September 16.

The official crowning of the 1983 New Mexico State Fair Queen will be just preceding the Tingley Coliseum Rodeo on Friday night, September 17.

Following the crowning, the new queen will accompany the reigning 1982 State Fair Queen, Yvonne Willmuth of Los Lunas, for the remainder of the 1982 exposition. She will assist in the presentation of trophies and ribbons at various competitions, and generally act as a goodwill ambassador.

Hillman reported there are no changes in the other rules for competition in the queen event. Girls must be single, between the ages of 16 and 21 and permanent residents of the county they represent. Each must be sponsored by a local organization in their home county.

The queen competition started at the New Mexico State Fair in 1950 and in that period some 32 girls have won the title.

The contestants are judged 60 percent on horsemanship and 40 percent on personality. Two riding tests are held and a personality session is featured.

One other change in the rules this year is that the names of the three judges of the queen contest will be made public.

The winner of the annual contest, in addition to title, receives a belt buckle, Nameware and \$100 cash from the fair. Additionally, a special handmade saddle is donated to the queen by Dessie Sawyer of Tatum, a longtime booster of all fair activities. The Albuquerque Florists Association also gives the new queen a bouquet of flowers.





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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — No newspaper in Albuquerque subscribes to this column.

Those folks there, especially the ones in the Northeast Heights, could profit from finding out the answers to such questions as these:

— Where is Catron county?
— How does that aged father who appears in those Toney Anaya TV commercials hitting us up for money really vote?

Well, six years ago, when Jack Schmitt was running against Joe Montoya, who was the man who hired Toney and kept him on the payroll while he went through law school in Washington, the elder Mr. Anaya appeared for Schmitt at rallies in Torrance county.

If those people in the Northeast Heights knew that, they might wonder why they were so busy rushing out to support the Democratic loyalists in the Anaya family at the past weekend's Democratic convention.

— What did that TV spot of Jeff Bingaman's really mean?

You remember, that one in which Jeff, who hasn't been seen in years outside a three-piece suit, suddenly appears in denim against a dark horizon. He's carrying a lantern — another rural object not many of us normally connect with Jeff and his Harvard education.

Most folks think that was supposed to be a very oblique reference, probably lost on most New Mexicans, to Diogenes the Cynic and his search for an honest man.

That's what Jerry Apodaca, now Jeff's opponent in the race for nomination to the United States Senate, was answering when he looked straight into the camera, without benefit of production values, and said, "If this guy is trying to hint I am not honest, here's my record..."

Newcomers to New Mexico probably were confused by the subtleties in that exchange, no matter where they live.

— How much does Hispanic culture or its lack amount to in New Mexico politics?

For a snapshot on that particular topic, we give you the delegate to that Democratic preprimary nominating convention who said, "They told me I had to vote for Bill Richardson because he speaks such beautiful Spanish."

"I had an answer for that. I said, 'I think in Congress they speak English.'"

Point of that story is that the man being pressured to push for somebody for the wrong reason is himself a Spanish-speaker.

He is also wise enough to know that whether you have that qualification or not no longer has anything to do with your being elected to Congress.

Most of those late arrivals to Albuquerque don't even know that question ever arises.

The sad thing about all those answers to questions above is that they are aimed at yellow-dog Democrats.

Yet certain facts are also sure.

One is that Republicans, at least if we may designate such people by their votes, outnumbered Democrats in New Mexico by 204,000 to 167,000 last time we chose a president in elections in our state.

Despite the disaffection for Reagan since that time, do you think Democrats, who have offered us nothing, have grown enough to absorb any major part of that major difference?

Not likely.

— And if the economy improves between now and November, it won't make much difference who the Democratic nominee is.

The Northeast Heights in Albuquerque, where they know little of New Mexico politics, is very likely to see to that.

NICOTINE IS ADDICTIVE

Evidence is growing that the nicotine inhaled by cigarette smokers is physically addicting, a panel of researchers said.

"To say (smoking) is just a habit is not enough," said Lynn Kozlowski, a Canadian scientist who has studied nicotine addiction. Kozlowski is one of roughly a half-dozen scientists who participated in a symposium on tobacco addiction.

One reason why it has taken scientists so long to become convinced that nicotine is addicting, Kozlowski said, is that the symptoms of nicotine withdrawal are subtle.

"People have made the mistake of looking for large effects," he said. "It's a small effect — it's hard to describe. People say they don't feel quite right."

Bernard Ellis, a public health consultant who works to develop anti-smoking programs, said most current anti-smoking efforts are aimed only at the psychological effects of smoking — not at the physical addiction. — Associated Press

COURTS AND CAMERAS

The New Mexico Supreme Court has reaffirmed that it meant what it said in its new canon on cameras in the courtroom, when it reversed a ruling by District Judge Frank Allen Jr., banning their use in an upcoming trial.

Judge Allen had granted a defense motion to ban cameras because of the smallness of Allen's courtroom. The trial, that of a well-known political figure, does give promise of straining the capacity of the courtroom at times.

But the Journal, in challenging the ruling, pointed out that today's 35 millimeter cameras are so compact as to take up no more space than their operator would take up if he were without camera. Television newsmen did not appeal the original decision.

The ruling puts New Mexico right in the forefront of the states in allowing camera coverage of judicial proceedings.

The right, it should be remembered, is for the purpose of more widely opening the courtroom doors to the public so that they, through the media, can more completely observe and understand the workings of the court.

Judge Allen himself has said he is in favor of cameras in the courtroom.

And so is the State Supreme Court, according to their ruling opening Allen's courtroom. — Albuquerque Journal

Editorial

If Ruidoso Downs Race Track doesn't gain worldwide fame among racing horsemen, it won't be due to any lack of effort by the directors of Ruidoso-Synland, track owners and operators.

The 1982 meeting will feature:

- The \$1 million Gold Cup, for four-year-old quarter horses, August 22.
- The \$1 million All-American Derby, for three-year-old quarter horses, August 29.
- The \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity, for two-year-old quarter horses, September 6.

That's a whopping \$4,530,000 in purse monies for just three races, taking in the neighborhood of 22 seconds to run the 440 yard dash.

The All-American Futurity this year will pay the winning horse owner exactly \$1 million.

Those are mind-boggling figures, figures that will attract the attention of the nation's thoroughbred horse owners, and possibly leave them a little envious.

Quarter horse races offering purses of this magnitude will command the attention of sports magazines and newspapers. Sports are sports, and the sports fan will realize that there's a whale of a lot of action going on at Ruidoso Downs Race Track—wherever New Mexico is—this year.

To accommodate the fans these three races alone will attract, and to improve the barn areas, Ruidoso-Synland is spending in excess of \$500,000 in improvements for the 1982 meeting.

If anyone has been harboring doubts as to the race track's contribution to this area's economy, they should now and henceforth be allayed.—CD

Oneriotoneranger one winner Sunday

A colt with the loony name of Oneriotoneranger proved he's a three-year-old to be taken seriously by hanging out a three fourths length win in Sunday's 22nd running of the Sunland Park Derby.

The colt was pinched in tight quarters throughout most of the stretch run of the mile journey, but once he spotted daylight, he jumped into the lead. He outmuscled his foes on the final half dozen strides.

At first glance, the name of the Derby champ looks like pure gibberish. But the monicker is easily decoded if you separate the syllables this way: One-Riot, One-Ranger.

But Chuck and Lorann Mattox of El Paso, Texas, owners of the colt, didn't need any hard figuring to get the real implication of the Derby outcome. They were richer by \$6,249 — the victory share of the total purse of \$10,415.

Mattox, who also trains the colt, was all smiles as he led the Derby hero into the winner's circle. No stranger when it comes to success at Sunland, Oneriotoneranger turned the Derby victory into his fourth visit to the winner's circle since the start of the 1981-82 season.

The colt raced in the Derby in partnership with his stablemate, North Tex Avenger. The two carried 9-2 odds, thus setting up payoffs of \$11.60, \$4.80 and \$3. Vickie Smallwood was the winning pilot.

As it turned out, North Tex Avenger did little more than play the role of stalking horse for Oneriotoneranger.

Since the Derby covered a mile, Oneriotoneranger, who lagged well off the pace in the early going, needed someone to challenge the pace setting favorite,

Western Series. North Tex Avenger unwittingly found himself in that role.

Western Series, heavily backed at 3-5 in his first try at the mile course, gamely fought off North Texas Avenger in the upper stretch, but didn't have enough in reserve to resist a late surge from Oneriotoneranger. Nonetheless, Western Series held on for second, earned \$2,221, and paid tote prices of \$3 and \$2.40. Richard Bickel was up in the top load of 121 pounds (as compared to 118 for the winner). Western Series is owned by J. Dell Akin of Versailles, Kentucky.

Sir Avril, a 45-1 outsider, mustered a hard-driving stretch attack to take third under Gary Sumpter. The show price: \$5.40.

The Derby was run in 1:39 flat, a second and three fifths shy of the seasonal mark.

Love N Money top Derby qualifier

Love N Money, a filly who earned over \$192,000 last year, blasted to a one and one-fourth length win in Friday's third race at Sunland Park and set the top qualifying time for the upcoming West Texas Derby. The Derby, Sunland's standout event for three-year-old quarter horses, unfolds on Sunday, April 4, and offers a total jackpot of \$102,763. The winner's slice comes out to \$51,392.

Love N Money stamped herself as the one to beat by covering the 400 yards in 19.53 seconds. A stiff tailwind was blowing. Robert Adair, one of the nation's top quarter horse pilots, was at the helm. Love N Money led all the way.

The filly is by the leading stallion, Easy Jet, out of the mare, American Dream. She's the property of Milton Goodman of Oracle, Arizona. The outing marked her

third straight win of 1982 and pushed her career record to 8-1-2 from 11 starts.

Love N Money raced as a heavy favorite on Friday and returned betting payoffs of \$3, \$2.80, \$2.20. The spin was one of seven Derby trials on the 12-race program.

All-American Futurity draws 2,869 nominations

The 1983 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs drew 2,869 original nominations, reports nominations secretary Dorothy Dillard.

"The list represents a more widespread geographic area, since we received quite a few more nominations from Louisiana, the western states, and numerous eastern locations," Dorothy points out.

An interesting sidelight, she notes, is the fact the original roster for the 1983 All-American represents about 100 more nominators than was on the original list for this year's All-American.

Starting with this year's edition, the All-American Futurity enjoys a big economic boost. The gross purse goes from last year's \$1,530,000 to \$2,530,000. The amount to be split up in the finale alone is increased from \$1.2 million to \$2 million.

The most imposing aspect of the new purse structure is the fact the winner now collects a staggering \$1 million, as opposed to \$528,000 earned by Special Effort, last year's All-American champ.

The All-American winner's purse, in fact, has been on a steady rise in recent years. In 1977, the winner earned \$330,000. This was boosted to \$437,500 for both '78 and '79, took a slight hike to \$440,000 in 1980, and went to last year's \$528,000.

Yearlings nominated to the 1983 All-American Futurity (the deadline was January 15 of this year) are also nominated to the \$1 million (estimated) All-American Derby in 1984 and the \$500,000 (estimated) All-American Gold Cup in 1985.

They're also eligible for this summer's All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs (which begins August 30), and next year's \$250,000 (estimated) All-American Sale Futurity at Sunland Park. The All-American Sale is the world's largest and most prestigious sale of quarter horse yearlings.

The most prolific nominators to the 1983 All-American Futurity are Anne and B. F. Phillips of Frisco, Texas, with 50 head.

Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma, is next with 27 head. Merrick, a horseman of near-legendary proportions, is a two-time All-American winner — Easy Jet in 1969 and Easy Date in 1974.

The McDermott Ranch of Madisonville, Texas, checked in with 25 hopefuls. Harriet Peckham of El Paso, Texas, nominated 20 youngsters.

The 440 Ranch of Aubrey, Texas; and Ralph Shebester of Wynnewood, Oklahoma, checked in with 18 yearlings apiece. Next in line is J and S Farms of Abilene, Texas, with 17 head.

Fifteen head were nominated by Western Bloodstock of Rolling Hills Estates, California; Speed Farms of Alex, Oklahoma; Kemp and McLean of Dimmitt, Texas; Tom Neff of Colorado City, Texas.

Fourteen head: Mary Urschel of Canadian, Texas; Saket Racing Stables of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Thirteen head: Joe Kirk Fulton of Lubbock, Texas; Clay and Mena Neel of Blanchard, Oklahoma; Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas. The Urschels are the owners of Special Effort, the colt who electrified the quarter horse world last summer by sweeping the Kansas, Rainbow and All-American Futurities and becoming the sport's first winner of the Triple Crown.

Twelve head were nominated by Sam Henderson of Odessa, Texas; Gordon Howell of Sunland Park; Meadow Creek Ranch of Auburn, California; Phoenix Shaw and Jack Shaw of Jacksonville, Florida; Dr. D. G. Strole of Abilene, Texas; Bob Weik of San Antonio, Texas.

The original nominating fee for the '83 All-American Futurity is \$50. The other payments: \$100 by March 15, 1982; \$150 by June 15, 1982; \$300 by October 15, 1982; \$400 by December 15, 1982; \$500 by March 15, 1983; \$750 by June 15, 1983; \$1,000 to enter the trials.

The total cost for all payments is \$3,250. Late nominations are possible. The cost is \$30,000 plus the \$1,000 trial fee. The deadline: June 15, 1983.

The cash flow for this summer's All-American is moving at a record clip, Dorothy reports. At this point, 1,510 head are eligible, as compared to 1,406 a year ago.

The funds already on deposit are \$504,725 ahead of the amount at a similar point in the 1981 All-American.

A major improvement project, costing some \$2.5 million, is now reaching the final stages as Ruidoso Downs moves closer to the May 8 start of the '82 season. The campaign, covering 76 race days, extends through September 6 (Labor Day). In May, the basic pattern is Friday through Sunday racing, but activities are also planned for Thursday, May 13, and Monday, May 31 (Memorial Day). In June, it's Thursday-through-Sunday racing, but there's also Wednesday action on the 23rd and 30th. In July, it's a fixed slate of Thursday-through-Sunday racing. In August, the schedule calls for Wednesday-through-Sunday activity. In September, a five-day stretch (Thursday through Monday, September 2-6), winds up the meeting.

First post is 1 p.m.

The brilliant Ruidoso stakes schedule includes a Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses, a Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses, and a Triple Crown (of sorts) for older quarter horses.

The two-year-old Triple Crown consists of the \$750,000 (estimated) Kansas Futurity, the \$600,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity, and the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity. The three-year-old Triple Crown: \$250,000 (estimated) Kansas Derby, the \$575,000 (estimated) Rainbow Derby, the \$1 million All-American Derby.

Four-year-olds can run in the \$150,000 (estimated) Rainbow Silver Cup, the \$1 million (estimated) All-American Gold Cup, and the \$200,000 (estimated) World's Championship Classic. The latter is open to three-year-olds and up.

Main thoroughbred targets include the \$100,000 (estimated) Norgor Futurity, the \$12,500-added Ruidoso Speed Handicap, the \$20,000-added Ruidoso Derby, the \$15,000-added Ruidoso Sprint Championship, the \$25,000-added Ruidoso Mile, the \$40,000 (estimated) Kindergarten Futurity, the \$40,000 (estimated) Rio Grande Futurity, and the \$125,000 (estimated) Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity.

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

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

THE FIRST DIVISION of Friday's seven trial races for the West Texas Derby was definitely the place to run. Five of the 10 qualifiers competed in the first division. The other three qualifiers for the April 4 finale raced in the fifth division and the final two competed in the third race. The five from the opener included Winkum, Regal Pleasure, Jays Mainspring, Mitos Money Maker and Splashing Bunny. Love N Money, the top qualifier with a blazing 19.53 over the 400-yard course, is also the top money maker of the 10 finalists for this major Sunland Park race for three-year-old quarter horses. The Easy Jet filly has a career bankroll of \$196,974 on 11 wins, one second and two thirds in 14 outings. She's undefeated in three outings this year for trainer Robert Baffert. Trainer Jack Brooks was the only conditioner with two entrants in the Derby finale. They included Winkum, an Ichibon gelding, and Summer Encounter, a Hempen filly. Summer Encounter was the only West Texas Derby entrant who ran in last Labor Day's \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. The complete list of qualifiers for the chance at the winner's purse of \$51,392 from a total purse of \$102,783.99 includes: Love N Money (19.53); Winkum (19.59); Regal Pleasure (19.59); Jays Mainspring (19.60); Summer Encounter (19.64); Moons Triangle (19.69); Mitos Money Maker (19.70); Blazing Jo Bar Jet (19.75); Splashing Bunny (19.76); Letmelose (19.81).

TRAINER LISA OUTEDA saddled the winners of both halves of Saturday's daily double races. She won with Debotchery (\$18.80) for owner Joseph F. Archer of Houston, Texas, in the opener and then tallied with Easter Bunch (\$6.20) for owner Thomas A. Riley of Burnet, Texas. Kevin Scholl rode Debotchery while Lotie Figueroa guided Easter Bunch. The 7-3 daily double combination returned \$65.40.

BROKEN STIRRUP set a seasonal fastest time when he scooted to a neck win over Az Tellem Bout II in Saturday's seventh race at four furlongs. The two-year-old Draconic colt was clocked in .45 and four fifths, which bettered the previous half-mile reading of .46 and four fifths set by It's Me Babe on March 6. Broken Stirrup was ridden by Larry Byers for trainer Billy Hitt. He's owned by the Broken Stirrup Syndicate of Abilene, Texas.

FOR ONLY THE SECOND TIME this season, two horses went off as identical favorites. In Sunday's second race, \$1,052 was wagered on both Oklahoma Fleet 74 and Fifty Yard Line to make each horse a co-8-5 favorite. Fifty Yard Line, ridden by Jacky Martin, won the race while Oklahoma Fleet 74, ridden by apprentice Francisco Gonzalez, finished third behind Wind Royal.

TRAINER JOE E. URIEGAS saddled three horses on Sunday and all visited the winner's circle. He started with Fifty Yard Line (\$5.20) in the second race for owner Sue H. May of Fort Stockton, Texas, then had Sunnily Smashed (\$3.40) for owners Carol Childs, William F. Leach and Sue H. May of Fort Stockton, Texas, in the fourth

before saddling Pierre The True for owner Tully Pratt of El Paso, Texas, in the fifth. Jacky Martin rode Fifty Yard Line while Henry Uriegas rode Sunnily Smashed and Vickie Smallwood guided Pierre The True.

APPRENTICE JOCKEY Rebecca Thompson apparently escaped serious injury when she was thrown from her mount, True Power, in Sunday's first race at one mile. A track spokesman said she suffered a mild concussion, but otherwise no apparent serious injuries from the spill. The accident occurred near the turn for home.

STORMY SAILING, a five-year-old Agitate gelding, posted his third straight victory when he captured Sunday's seventh race by a half-length. Following a layoff of more than one year, Stormy Sailing won at first asking in his comeback bid by tallying a head win over Pine Road in a five and a half-furlong race for \$4,000 claiming horses on February 7 at Sunland Park. Then he drew clear by almost four lengths over Uno Amo in a six and a half-furlong starter allowance race on March 7. He's owned by Jon Arnett, who also trains him, and John Blank of Harlington, Texas. Victor Escobar has ridden him in his Sunland Park outings.

SUNDAY WAS A good day for favorite players. Eight of the 12 favorites posted triumphs. Winning public choices included Terry Hill (\$4.20) in the first, Fifty Yard Line (\$5.20), a co-favorite; Sunnily Smashed (\$3.40) in the fourth; Pierre The True (\$4.00) in the fifth; Naval Commander (\$4.00) in the sixth; Stormy Sailing (4.00) in the seventh; Kola Kid (\$4.60) in the eighth and Lil' Impression (\$4.40) in the ninth.

VICKIE SMALLWOOD tallied three victories on Sunday's program. The Texas jockey scored with Pierre The True (\$4.00) for trainer Joe E. Uriegas; Kola Kid (\$4.60) for trainer L. B. Johnson Jr. and won the featured \$10,415 Sunland Park Derby with Oneriotoneranger (\$11.60) for trainer Chuck Mattox.

SEVERAL JOCKEYS posted two wins on a program over the weekend. On Friday, Jacky Martin and Orlando Martinez Jr. tallied two wins. Martin won aboard Winkum (\$3.20) in the first and on Summer Encounter (\$5.20) in the fifth. Both horses were trained by Jack Brooks. Martinez won on Miss Mary Lu (\$27.20) in the featured 10th race and on Shadey Green (\$7.80) in the 12th. Miss Mary Lu is trained by L. Clay Dissler while Barry Germany handles Shadey Green. On Saturday,

Leroy Coombs and Vickie Smallwood each triumphed twice. Coombs won on Jackie Splash (\$3.00) in the third and on Dunker Bill (\$7.60) in the ninth. Both horses are trained by Gilbert McClanahan. Vickie won on Midnight Kiss (20.80) for trainer Harold E. Nolen in the 11th and on Tea For Sal (\$42.40) in the 12th for trainer Chuck Mattox. On Sunday, Bobbie Don Harmon and Leroy Coombs each won two races. Harmon triumphed aboard Terry Hill (\$4.20) in the first for trainer-owner Charles W. Allison and Naval Commander (\$4.00) in the sixth for trainer Elmer Shepard. Coombs won with Paddington Station (\$14.60) and Lil' Impression (\$4.40) in the ninth. Both horses are trained by Gilbert McClanahan.

THE TOTAL HANDLE so far this season (66 race days) is \$22,010,713. Last year at this time, the handle (from 70 race days) stood at \$18,769,221. The current daily average of \$333,495 is a gain of 24.38 percent over the \$268,132 average a year ago. Current betting-per-race is nearing \$30,000.

HORSES COMING OUT of the Number 3 post positions had the most luck over the weekend, scoring seven wins. On the season, the statistics look like this: No. 1-84 wins, No. 2-90, No. 3-86, No. 4-80, No. 5-70, No. 6-66, No. 7-71, No. 8-76, No. 9-72, No. 10-60, No. 11-0, No. 12-0.

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


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
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

Smash It a smash as runner and broodmare

Anyone who dabbles in horse racing surely dreams of owning a stakes winner. There's an even grander dream — owning a mare who's not only a stakes winner but also possessed of that mysterious genetic quirk which enables her to produce stakes winners.

Find a mare with those qualities and you've got a license to mint money. This appears to be the case with the eight-year-old gray mare, Smash It, cornerstone of an impressive racing enterprise owned by Sue May and Carol Childs of Fort Stockton, Texas, and the well known trainer, Bill Leach.

"It's a dream which keeps coming true," says Sue May. "It's especially gratifying after you've tried for so many years to develop horses like Smash It. The ultimate thrill in racing is owning a mare which produces stakes winners." These sentiments are echoed by Carol Childs. "It's been exciting and quite unbelievable. It was a great thrill to have a horse like Smash It, but to watch her babies grow up, and run — well, it makes you feel you can hardly wait for the next one to come along."

Trainer Leach, who's surely become wealthy as a result of Smash It, says: "I won't say I've been touched by the hand of God, but I will say I've been awfully fortunate."

The story of Smash It, and the dynasty she's now producing, began simply enough

at Ruidoso Downs in 1975 when Leach looked over three yearlings offered for sale by Margaret Bloss, the well known horsewoman and tennis buff. The middle priced yearling of the set was called Smash It, reflecting Mrs. Bloss' penchant for putting tennis oriented names on her thoroughbreds.

Leach remembers the rationale which made him select Smash It: "I thought she was by far the best of the three. Her conformation was excellent, and I really liked her mother, Wimberly Blue. I'd seen her run, and was impressed by her. Wimberly Blue had also produced Half Smash, who'd made around \$50,000."

The pricetag on Smash It was \$12,000, and the deal was quickly signed. Smash It thus became the property of a brand new partnership involving Leach, Carol Childs and Sue May. For Carol, this was something of a new adventure, since her only previous experience in racing involved a 50 percent ownership (with Sue) in Bims Blue, a claimer who'd won only a race or two.

The acquisition of Smash It turned into a masterstroke. The filly was a true dream-maker, scoring five wins, two seconds and three thirds as a two-year-old and earning some \$70,000. Her primary success was a ringing conquest of the 1976 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity (worth \$93,100) in a superb clocking of 1:13 flat, which possibly stands as the fastest in the long history of the race. Smash It also finished second to Native Lovin in the '76 Land of Enchantment Futurity at La Mesa Park.

"That was my biggest thrill in racing," Sue says of the '76 Ruidoso Futurity. "It was the first time we had a horse in a stakes race, and Smash It won so handily. It was pure jubilation."

But Smash It suffered from a leg injury, required surgery, and the result was an early end to her racing career. As it later turned out, Smash It was even more brilliant as a broodmare.

Her first offspring (by the great quarter horse stallion, Easy Jet) was Easily Smashed. Ask Carol what she ranks among her greatest moments in racing and she points to that magnificent occasion a few weeks ago when she and her partners attended the American Quarter Horse Association convention in Los Angeles, California, to accept accolades in behalf of Easily Smashed. The colt was named the nation's champion three-year-old colt of 1981.

Easily Smashed pieced together a stunning record during his two seasons of racing. He started 21 times, scored 14 wins, got in second three times, and finished third once. His record includes wins in

Sunland Park's Sun Country Futurity and Ruidoso's Kansas Derby, plus a third in the super rich Rainbow Derby. Add up his winnings and you get \$326,059.

Easily Smashed is now retired to stud, the object of a \$3.6 million syndication package (90 shares were priced at \$40,000 each). He stands at Roy Browning's Ranch at Ada, Oklahoma.

Leach has these views of Easily Smashed: "He was a great-running horse — the best I've ever trained. Like all great ones, they're not much trouble, and they make things easy for you. From the way he's bred, we're hopeful he'll be even greater as a sire."

Smash It's ability as a mama hasn't been limited to the quarter horse side of the game. Her second effort was Luckily Smashed, the result of a matchup with the thoroughbred, What Luck. Last summer, Luckily Smashed won two races at Ruidoso, including the \$26,660 Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity (as a heavy favorite).

A consistent sort, Luckily Smashed ran in five futurity trials, qualified for four finales, and made a little under 40 grand. She's now prepping handsomely for her three-year-old campaign at Ruidoso, with the prestigious Ruidoso Derby looming as a key target.


Smash It's third try at motherhood (in partnership with the thoroughbred stallion, Sunny South) produced the filly, Sunnily Smashed. She's a two-year-old roan filly who resembles Smash It, and hopes are soaring. Leach says: "She worked 48 4-5 from the gate Wednesday, and the boy didn't extend her. She looks awfully good."

The next Smash It offspring to come along was Devilishly Smashed, now a yearling. She's by the thoroughbred sire, Crimson Satan.

Within the next few weeks, Smash It will deliver another bundle of joy — and this one should be a financial knockout. The papa is Easy Jet, which means the newcomer will be either a full-brother or full-sister to Easily Smashed. Carol says: "It wouldn't surprise me if this foal would have a value of \$500,000, but I don't know if we would even sell him — or her — for that much."

After the Easy Jet foal is delivered, Smash It will be bred to another blue-ribbon quarter horse stallion, Rocket Wrangler.

Offers to buy Smash It come in regularly, but they're routinely turned down. Sue May explains pointedly: "Horses like Smash It are few and far between. When you get one like that, you want to hold onto to her."



SINNIN AND GRINNIN, a Sinn Fein filly, had the fastest qualifying time (16.64) for the \$222,920 West Texas Futurity set for Sunday, March 28, at Sunland Park Race Track. She's owned by James L. Powell of Kerrville, Texas, and was ridden in her trial

heat on March 12 at Sunland Park by Steve Fuller. She won her trial race by one and one-half lengths. She has three victories with one second in five lifetime outings.

Bradley's Copy cops Winsham Lad Handicap

Bradley's Copy was well out of contention in the early going of Saturday's Winsham Lad Handicap at Sunland Park. Skipper Road, the 6-5 favorite, appeared to be well in command as the field turned for home in the five and a half furlong dash which packed a total purse of \$8,550.

At mid-stretch, the people's choice began to conk out, and it was soon evident an upset was in the making. Skipper Road quickly tossed in the towel and dissolved into the pack.

That's when Vancouver's Fault, a 6-1 outsider, loomed up suddenly on the outside and seemed almost a certain winner. But matters took a sudden change as Bradley's Copy, rushing up strongly on the rail under brisk urging from Richard Bickel, wrested the lead away from Vancouver's Fault.

At the finish, it was Bradley's Copy in front by a neck and richer by \$5,130. The filly, in lightly at 113 pounds, is owned by James Bradley of Hereford, Texas. Gerald Marr does the training.

Launched at a little better than 6-1 by the crowd of 3,411, Bradley's Copy returned waging payoffs of \$15.20, \$5.40, \$3.40. She covered the five and a half furlongs in 1:05 one fifth seconds. The win was her second of the year and helped remove the sting of her sixth-place finish (at 18-1) in the recent El Paso Times Handicap.

Vancouver's Fault, well piloted by Danny Summerow at 116 pounds, returned \$7.20 to place, \$3.40 to show. Texab, a 4-1 shot handled by up-and-coming Harla Webb, paid an even \$3 to show.

Space Hall films honoring shuttle landing

The presentations are part of a series of special events being conducted at the Space Hall to welcome the shuttle to the Alamogordo area.

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
