"Leaving is Not Easy"
Says Cale Dickey.
So saying, our dear friend and gifted writer paid all of us here in the Land of the Pinon and Pine a great compliment in few words.
A striking coincidence was revealed to me as I began thinking of a few words to write about Cale Dickey — with short notice, because I began to think he was a permanent part of our life here in our homeland in the hills.
Not long ago I was reading a poem by Alfred Lord Tennyson entitled "Ode on the Death of the Duke of Wellington," and somehow one verse called to mind Cale Dickey.
And then after a little visit with him last Wednesday, it turned out that he was born in Wellington, Kansas, March 21, 1918. Could it be that the name of his birthplace cast him in the destiny of a great man?
For Cale has all the marks of greatness, one of which is an abiding modesty.
We know that all great men do not become world famous — a fact brought home to us by the beloved American poet, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow in his poem, "The Village Blacksmith."

The verse about the Duke of Wellington is as follows:
"Our greatest yet with least pretense Great in councils, great in war Foremost captain of his time Rich in saving common sense. And, as only the greatest are, In his simplicity sublime."
This verse very much points to Cale's character, especially in the words, "Least pretense," which is, as we say, one of the pillars of his personality.
Take his column, "Stuph and Junk" with a title that pokes fun at his material, which although written in a light and joking vein, is full of sound philosophy, deep thought, and wide compassion. His stories of visits with "Shakey" reveal that he appreciates the value of "all sorts and conditions of men."
The Duke of Wellington was beloved of his soldiers because of his down-to-earth character, free from all pride of pretense, and full of concern and respect for all his men.
Early in life Cale moved to North Dakota where, as he says, "I was raised in a country newspaper office." He explained that his parents owned several small newspapers, and that he was owner for 16 years of

the New Salem Journal in North Dakota.
Served in World War II
Cale spent 27 months overseas in the European theater in World War II in the intelligence office of the Air Corps with a B-26 bomber outfit. He interpreted aerial photographs and helped plan missions, and in all performed valuable service.
"The Blood Brother"
During his 16-year career as owner of the New Salem Journal, Cale served his community in the northern plains country of hardy pioneer-type folks, and in particular the American Indians of that region.
When the Indians of the Hidatsa tribe would come down to the annual rodeos at New Salem, they were hard pressed to find meals and lodging. So Cale took on this duty; feeding and housing these Indians year after year, and also doing many other acts of Christian charity for these people.
Back in the 1860's the Hidatsa tribe had a great chief named Poor Wolf who kept his tribe in food during terrible famine years through his great gift as a hunter.
In gratefulness, the Hidatsa tribe made Cale a blood brother of the tribe and gave him the name of their revered chief of more than one hun-

dred years ago, "Poor Wolf," by which name Cale is known to these people to this day. As a blood brother, Cale is entitled to all the tribal privileges and benefits of the reservation located at Newton, North Dakota.
Of his eight-year stay here among us, Cale says, "This is the most beautiful country I have ever seen, full of beautiful people." He paused a moment and said, "Leaving is not easy."
Well, it is not easy on us either, for Cale has won a fond place in our hearts.
Cale is going to live "resting for six or eight months" in the Elks Home at Bedford, Virginia. He has been a member of the Elks for 33 years.
And so in his wanderings of good will, this journalistic troubador has come from the wind-swept plains of North Dakota to the land on the slopes of the White Mountain, and is now turning his steps to the sunny shores of "Old Virginia," land of the yellow corn, and springtime-warbling birds.
He will be in our hearts wherever he may go, and we wish him all good fortune and God's blessing. And we remember the saying, "He who drinks of the waters of this stream will return."
So it is, "God be with you, Cale Dickey, 'til we meet again."

Shuttle landing not a boon to local lodges

While hotels, motels and campgrounds in the entire area surrounding White Sands are filled to capacity with visitors hoping to catch a glimpse of the space shuttle landing, vacancy signs were evident over the weekend at most lodging establishments in Ruidoso.
For some reason, Ruidoso seems to have missed out on space shuttle business. Clark Carpenter, president of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association, said it's "really a missed opportunity."
He said there is "probably more lodging available here than in Alamogordo, Las Cruces and half of El Paso. When it was announced that White Sands would be opened for public viewing of the shuttle landing, Carpenter said, "we waited for something to happen."
Chamber of Commerce president Ed Jungbluth said last Wednesday that Ruidoso is always prepared for a large number of people at one time, and "is prepared to handle whatever will come our way this weekend."

Jungbluth said he notified White Sands Public Information and the El Paso Times that "lodging abounded in Ruidoso."
"We have not been inundated at all," though, he said.
"We failed to get the word out," Carpenter said. "If we'd used our heads we would have bought a spot announcement on the network news."
Carpenter said a problem is that the space shuttle landing is attracting a different type crowd than Ruidoso regularly attracts for skiing and horse races, and to someone unfamiliar with Ruidoso looking at a map of this area, Ruidoso probably looks like "Podunk, Texas."
Carpenter said a dynamite opportunity was lost to introduce Ruidoso to these would-be first time visitors.
He emphasized that owners of lodging establishments in Ruidoso are probably not too disappointed, however, as business has been great this winter and last summer.
"It's nothing to cry about," Carpenter said.

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs trustees meet tonight at 7:30 in a special joint session at the Village Administrative Center, with discussion of law enforcement the agenda item.

Fire exercise goes well

As a result of a simulated fire exercise Friday, Lincoln County disaster command center authorities now have a better idea of the problems which they may encounter during an actual disaster and the resources available to them in handling the situation in the most orderly and efficient manner.
Command center participants on hand for the disaster plan exercise were mayor George White, Smokey Bear district ranger Paul Gordon, Smokey Bear timber manager Mike Funston, evacuation coordinator Dave Parks, Lincoln County sheriff Ernest Sanchez, Ruidoso police chief Richard Swenor, Ruidoso police administrative officer Jim Alston, New Mexico Forestry fire management officer David Bervin and his assistant John Roznovak.
Observers were on hand to see what their involvement may be in case of an actual emergency. They included members of White Mountain Search and Rescue, Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (COMFIRE) members, Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department members, Emergency Medical Service personnel and the village fire prevention officer.
Smokey Bear District fire management officer Steve Makowski briefed command center officials on fire conditions and laid down the ground rules for the simulation.
He told simulation participants that they have assembled at the new police headquarters 30 minutes after a fire started on the south side of Upper Canyon Road, across from Whispering Pines Restaurant.
The date is Saturday, May 20, a race day, said Makowski. A 25 mile per hour wind is blowing and the temperature is 78 degrees. Makowski said the relative humidity is eight percent, and it's been 60 days since any measurable precipitation.
He said the fire is five acres in size and four structures are burning. The village fire department has turned the fire responsibility over to the fire team. Makowski explained to command center authorities that the only communication to the outside world is limited to the two radios and two telephones in the command center. All decisions must be relayed to the proper place before any action will be taken, Makowski instructed.
The Forest Service was basically in command of the situation, but as was pointed out during the simulation critique, some decisions that the Forest Service made would not have been made solely by them. Instead, inter-agency fire bosses would have made unified command decisions.

"The only reason the Forest Service was in the driver's seat is because it (the fire) involved not only structural, but wild land," Makowski said.
The role players threw the command center authorities a couple of curve balls, said Makowski. One involved White making a "painful decision" concerning deliberate burning of homes in a back fire maneuver to control the fire.
The chances of holding the fire were 50/50, and after quickly conferring with his aides, White ordered the houses burned. Although the response written into the simulation recommended not to burn the houses, it was an equally good decision on White's part, said Makowski, because the probability of halting the forward progress of the fire was 50/50.
Another "curve ball" involved a man who refused to evacuate as the fire approached his home. Swenor quickly ordered one of his men and Duke, the police attack dog, to the scene. Swenor said in an actual fire the man would have been arrested for his own safety.
Makowski commended the police for their role in the exercise. He said traffic problems and evacuation measures were taken care of so quickly that role players did not have a chance to give the police any major problems.
Traffic in the Upper Canyon area had to be blocked as part of the simulation's evacuation exercise. However, most people did not complain of any inconveniences.
"We have them (disaster simulations) all the time at home (Utah). It makes me feel much more reassured," said Beverly Buller.
Harry Egbert said, "If they're learning something from it, I don't mind. It's worth it if this thing (Upper Canyon) ever caught on fire."

The fire suppression strategy was to hold the fire in the area behind the Smokey Bear ranger station, said Makowski. Backup fire lines would have been placed along Eagle Creek to crowd the fire into that area and prevent it from spreading over the next ridge into the Town and Country subdivision, he said.
Makowski estimated that around 350 firefighters, including police, rural fire units and forest service firemen called in from around the state, would have been present or en route to the fire. He said he believes that would have been enough men to halt the fire.
The simulation critique gave rise to suggestions to improve the efficiency of the command center.
Village fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy suggested the need for new maps with the latest street and utility developments. Swenor added that topographical maps indicating high and low ground would also be helpful.
Swenor said he will equip all his men with topographical maps to be placed in patrol cars if such an emergency should arise. He also said that a large topographical wall map with plastic coating to wax pencil in the movement of the fire and changing location of personnel would be placed in the new police headquarters command center.
"The people of Ruidoso in an actual emergency would pull together. You'd have more volunteers than you'd know what to do with," said Alden Deyo of White Mountain Search and Rescue.
Gordon said it is possible to be overwhelmed by volunteers, creating a hazardous situation in itself. Deyo suggested setting up a center with a volunteer organizer to screen potential volunteers and to direct them to sites where they could be most helpful.
White said the simulation proved itself beneficial, and added, "As mayor, I would like to commend everyone who participated in this exercise."
"I felt we got done what we needed to do," said Makowski. He said the need for coordination among the various authorities with different resources was emphasized and commended the authorities for their cooperative handling of the situation.
Apart from the recommendations raised as a result of the disaster plan practice, Makowski said the simulation gave authorities a chance to see how the command center operates and also allowed them to experience the pressure they would be under when making difficult decisions quickly during a real disaster.

No pine needles in dumpsters, please

Ruidoso residents have been asked by the village Sanitation Department not to put pine needles, building materials, brush and similar items in dumpsters.
Department head A. T. Corona stated

that his people have their hands full keeping up with all of the other refuse of the village, and asked that pine needles and similar refuse be hauled to the village landfill at Fort Stanton Mesa.

Publicity for Motorcycle Festival now underway

The Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival advertising campaign began Thursday evening as Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) members approved the copy for 20,000 flyer/registration forms.
The flyers announcing the September 29 through October 2 motorcycle event will be distributed by RBA members to other motorcycle enthusiasts attending motorcycle rallies, said Jim Croy. He added that the flyer will also be used as paid advertisements in various motorcycle club and association newsletters, as well as national cycle magazines.
Croy said the flyer will be sent to the Gold Wing Roadriders Association newsletter and other newsletters such as the Texas Motorcycle Roadriders Association's "Daimler's Folly." Advertising will also be purchased in national motorcycle publications like Rider, Road Rider and Touring Bike, said Croy.
RBA secretary Fran Smeal said she has been contacting radio stations in Texas and southern New Mexico on the possibility of airing public service announcements about the cycle festival. Besides carrying advertising, she said, some motorcycle publications will regularly run news releases about the festival. Smeal added that since the event is news, certain magazines and television stations will cover the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival as it happens.
RBA president Richard Richburg said he will approach the Lodgers' Tax Committee at its April 14 meeting with the hope

of securing funds needed to kick off a national advertising campaign. He said he will give the committee a complete breakdown on advertising costs, the number of times RBA plans to advertise in each magazine, a copy of RBA's budget and minutes from previous RBA meetings.
Richburg commented that other means of financing will be pursued to assist RBA groundwork efforts, which include printing costs, postage and purchase of Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival pins, patches and name badges.
Smeal said Motorcycle Safety Foundation instructors will judge the motorcycles, as well as holding various safety clinics and seminars. As a part of the "better biking" program, motorcycle safety films will be shown and the Hurt report, a motorcycle injury study, will be discussed, said Smeal.
Since the motorcycle festival is sanctioned by the American Motorcycle Association (AMA), AMA rules will be used to judge the motorcycles and events, said Smeal. She said she is aiming for at least one official AMA judge to be present at the festival.
RBA has decided to add a people's choice plaque to the list of awards. Richburg said the award will get all bikers involved. He said the winner may be selected from any judging category by whatever criteria the people choose.
Joe Gosline reported that he spoke with Ruidoso police chief Richard Swenor about the possibility of RBA roping off the access road in front of the festival grounds, which are between the Villa Inn and the Holiday Inn on Highway 70.
Swenor told The News that the frontage

road may be barricaded to prevent public traffic from interfering with the festival. The road may be used for motorcycle parking and emergency vehicles, said Swenor. He said he will get together with RBA later to find out what they are going to have and how the police may help once more plans and figures are set.
Swenor said New Mexico State Police will probably come to Ruidoso to help with traffic control and law enforcement during the motorcycle festival as they have done during the Aspenade Motorcycle Convention.
It was brought up that Til Thompson had allegedly sold his Aspenade Motorcycle Convention trademark to a promoter in the state of New York. It was rumored that a motorcycle convention would take place in New York in 1983. However, Thompson denied all such statements. His only comment to The News was, "Not true."
In other RBA business, Richburg said Joe Worthen had secured land from the Bureau of Land Management to put on the High Country Motocross Championship. Worthen was not available for comment, but it is reported that a \$10,000 purse is to be offered. Motocross qualifying events will take place on Thursday, September 30, and Friday, October 1. The championship heats will be on Sunday, October 3, said Richburg.
Richburg said that volunteers are needed to help the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. He added that helpers need not necessarily be motorcycle enthusiasts, but can be anyone interested in aiding the Ruidoso economy. The next RBA meeting is at 7 p.m., Thursday, April 1.

Fishing season to open Thursday, April 1

New Mexico anglers have through March 31 to use their current fishing licenses prior to opening of a new season following day.

The State Game Commission last year proved regulations for a two-year period through March 31, 1983. Licenses 1982-83 are required beginning April 1. Dick McCleskey, chief of Fisheries Division, Department of Game and Fish, said fishing proclamations issued last spring for the two-year period are still valid. The Game Commission at February meeting relaxed some regulations and made amendments pertaining to specific waters.

La Joya and Bernardo waterfowl areas will be open to fishing, but not to trotlining, during part of the 1982-83 season—April 1 to August 31, 1982. Fishing hours are 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Both areas are also open to bullfrogging between 6 a.m. and 10 p.m. July 24 through August 31 of this year. Boats without motors may be used for fishing.

Heron Lake is now included in waters open during the special kokanee season September 1 - December 31.

In relaxing the fishing regulations, the Commission approved automatic reels or automatic hook-setting devices for use as

the individual's hook and line, if closely attended, and allowed the use of roe, viscera and eyes of legally taken game fish as bait. A person fishing with a trotline must visit and run the trotline at least once every 24 hours, unless severe weather conditions prevent his doing so.

Lakes opening to anglers on April 1 include Bonito, near Alamogordo, and Burns Canyon Lake at Parkview Hatchery. Lake Maloya, Lake Alice, Santa Cruz Lake and Santa Cruz River will open April 3. Fishing hours for those waters are 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Resident fishing licenses are still \$7.50, \$11.50 with trout validation, and nonresi-

dent license fees also remain unchanged at \$15.50, \$21.50 with trout validation.

Resident junior-senior or handicapped licenses are \$1.25, \$3.25 with trout validation. Licenses are also available to residents and nonresidents for one- and five-day fishing and for fishing on Philmont Scout Ranch.

A trout-water validation is required for any fisherman 12 years of age or older who fishes in designated trout waters, except veterans who have been approved by the Veterans Service Commission and game and fish department for free fishing licenses.

Ruidoso Christian School having successful first year

Ruidoso Christian School, established September 1981 as a ministry of First Baptist Church, Ruidoso Downs, to the community, has experienced "super success" in its first year, according to Jerry Mauldin, school administrator.

The school has an enrollment of 58, with 11 teachers, and an enrollment of 80 to students is projected for next school year, Mauldin said.

In advantage of the school, he said, is small class size, which allows for more individual attention. Also, the smaller sizes are conducive to a closer parent/teacher/parent relationship.

Mauldin said the staff encourages parent involvement as much as possible. Christian School has a PTF (Parent-Teacher Fellowship) similar to a PTA (Parent-Teacher Association), which provides us with a form of interchange of news and dispersment of news to keep parents informed of what's going on in school.

The school is planning a family supper April 16 for staff, students' families and factors to review the past year and plans for the school's future.

Next year the Christian School will offer classes required by the state Board of Education, as well as Bible classes, which

students will be required to take for four years, Mauldin said.

He said that the school's main disadvantage is lack of variation in curriculum, which he and the staff hope to remedy as time and funding increase.

Mauldin said they are currently in the process of developing an athletic program for next year in which Ruidoso Christian School would compete with other Christian schools in New Mexico in soccer, softball and volleyball.

Another aim of the school is to add to the curriculum a foreign language as a requirement for graduation.

"The greatest asset of the school," Mauldin said, "is the excellent staff."

"We hope we'll have ways (in the future) to increase the benefits of teaching," he said.

First Baptist Church, Ruidoso Downs, in cooperation with the Ruidoso Christian School Board, has established a developmental committee. Its purpose is to research avenues of assistance for the school, in terms of seeking funding and property for expansion and development, Mauldin explained.

He said they are in the process of drawing up a five-year growth plan to include building and academic improvements and additional teaching equipment. They hope to build additional classrooms and a gymnasium and to continue to build their

library, "a very necessary thing for our school," Mauldin said.

Members of the development committee are Anne Griffith, director, T. T. Marquardt, Barney Waldrup and Rita Martin. Ronnie Hemphill, C.P.A., serves in an advisory capacity.


The school is totally funded by tuition and gifts, Mauldin stated. Tuition is \$790 a year for students in grades one through 12.

The school also has a half-day kindergarten program, which Mauldin sees as one of the biggest advantages of the school. The kindergarten is open to four and five year olds, and he said the curriculum used for these ages is very successful.

Ruidoso Christian School is interdenominational, Mauldin said, and students represent a cross section of churches in the area.

"I feel like our school is a viable alternative to parents and students who like our kind of environment," Mauldin said. "I don't think our kind of situation is intended for every student."

Mauldin announced that the school has recently chosen its colors and mascot. Colors will be red and white, and the mascot will be a crusader. A school-wide art contest is now being conducted to determine who can draw the best crusader to represent the Ruidoso Christian School Crusaders.





COMMON DISEASES OF DOGS:

5. Internal parasites: Heartworms locate in the heart of dogs and cause illness and death. Humans are not affected. Symptoms include fatigue with respiratory and circulatory distress.

The disease is transmitted by mosquitoes and is becoming more prevalent in New Mexico. A veterinarian should be consulted regarding treatment and prevention.

Roundworms (toxascaris) are the most common worm of dogs in New Mexico. Roundworms are commonly referred to as puppy worms and are rarely found in dogs over six months of age. The larvae may infect humans (primarily children who eat dirt). Fecal specimens from young puppies should be examined for roundworm eggs and if positive, puppies should be wormed with appropriate medication at two weeks intervals.

Hookworms are bloodsucking worms that may cause fatalities in young puppies. Hookworms are not prevalent in New Mexico but should be suspected when stools contain blood or mucus. The disease is diagnosed when eggs are found by microscopic fecal examination. Treatment is effective; however, the disease may recur. The larvae of hookworms may infect humans and cause a disease called

"Cutaneous Larva Migrans" or "Creeping Eruption". Human hookworm disease is not a significant problem in New Mexico.

Tapeworms are the least harmful of all canine internal parasites. They do not suck blood, but live off nutrients from the intestinal tract. The most common tapeworm is transmitted by the dog flea. Dog fleas are not prevalent in most areas of New Mexico which limits the incidence of tapeworm. Canine tapeworms are diagnosed by finding sections of the worm in the stool or what appears to be kernels of rice attached to the hair in the rectal area. Tapeworms may be difficult to eliminate and a veterinarian should be consulted regarding the best procedure.

Whipworms are located in the cecum (appendix) of dogs. This worm is not prevalent in New Mexico and is not contagious to humans.

Mange is caused by mites that penetrate into the skin. The two types of mange found in New Mexico are demodectic mange and sarcoptic mange. Demodectic mange is most frequent and most difficult to treat. It is not highly contagious and is usually transmitted by the dam to her puppies. Sarcoptic mange is contagious by direct or indirect contact with infested dogs. Sarcoptic mange may be controlled by a series of dips with an appropriate insecticide solution. Topical application of mange medications have limited value. Dogs should not be treated for mange without a definitive diagnosis.

Many skin conditions that appear to be mange are not mange and improper treatment may result in a mild skin condition becoming serious. Mange in dogs is not contagious to humans.

There's a possibility a mixed tournament for both men and women will be held at Holiday Bowl next fall. The city women's championship took place in February.



DEMING TRACK INVITATIONAL

Ruidoso girls, boys take third place



The Ruidoso High School boys' and girls' track teams came through with several fine performances as each squad finished third in their respective divisions at the Deming Invitational Saturday.

The Warrior boys scored 89.7 points to finish behind host Deming with 146 points and Reserve with 91 points. Following Ruidoso in the team scoring was Truth or Consequences (T or C) with 78 points, Cobre with 54 points and the Deming junior varsity with six points.

Ruidoso's girls scored 66 points to beat out Reserve (60 points) for third place. Silver City won the meet with 146 points. Deming had 44 points, Lordsburg had 24, T or C 22 and the Silver City junior varsity 16.

Lon Nunley was the leading point getter for the Warrior boys. The senior set personal records with first place finishes in the discus (157-9) and shot put (49-3). Nunley also was second in the 100 meters with an 11.7 clocking and anchored the Warrior 400 meter and 800 meter relay teams to second place finishes.

The 400 meter relay squad of Nunley, Peter Garcia, Scott Neal and Grady Williamson recorded a 46.6 time on the slow dirt track to finish behind Deming. The Wildcats had a 46.37 clocking.

Another top performer for the Warrior boys was freshman Cisco Bob. Bob, who won the 1,500 meters in 4:30.1 at the opening meet in Artesia two weeks ago, equalled that time Saturday in finishing third.

Bob then came back and took a second in the 3000 meters with a 10:08.33 time. He started out slowly but came on strong in the last two laps to take the second place ribbon.

The Warrior 1,600 meter relay team of Don Nunley, Eric Strobel, Neal and Williamson finished first in its heat and second overall with a 3:44.0 clocking.

Williamson, a junior, also took second in the 200 meters with a 24.35 time. Don Nunley was fourth in the 400 meters with a 55.34 clocking.

Garcia competed in the high jump and finished fifth with a 5-6 effort.

Junior Billy Woodul was fifth in the javelin with a best throw of 136 feet. Woodul threw the spear 150-6 in the opener

at Artesia.

The Warrior girls took three first places. Jackie Jefferson and Sheila Espinoza had a one-two finish in the 1,500 meters for Ruidoso.

Jefferson led all the way in the race and finished with a 5:49.0 time for first. Espinoza came on strong at the end for second with a 5:52.0 clocking.

Jefferson also anchored the Warrior 1,600 meter relay squad to a victory in the 4:36.58. Freshman Gia Rose led off the Ruidoso quartet, Deanna Peso followed and Valerie Garcia ran the third leg.

Garcia also took a third place in the 800 meters. At first she didn't get the third place ribbon because the judges didn't get her time.

However, a Lordsburg runner who finished behind Garcia in fourth admitted the Warrior runner beat her and Garcia was given the third place honor.

Shari Dennis won the long jump for the Warriors with a fine 14-11 effort. Dennis also won her heat of the 100 meters but finished fourth overall.

Rose also had a good day, taking fourth in the low hurdles with a 14.5 clocking to go with her strong leg on the 1,600 meter relay team.

Peso took third in the 3,000 meters and Tricia Pfeffer fourth in the discus for Ruidoso.

Both boys' head coach Ronnie Maskew and girls' mentor Sergio Castanon were fairly pleased with their athletes' performances.

"The track here isn't as fast as the all-weather one at Artesia so our times weren't generally as fast," said Maskew. "I think we're making progress, though. Lon Nunley's time in the 100 meters is about equal to his one at Artesia (where Nunley ran an 11.31)."

Castanon wasn't surprised that his athletes did as well as they did.

"We did pretty well," he said. "I think we could have done even better in the relay but we have some injuries."

The Warriors will compete in the Portales Invitational Saturday.

The 1982 Southwest area collegiate football season could be very interesting to Ruidoso gridiron fans.

Besides Ruidoso High School's two-way standout Lon Nunley (who's going to the University of New Mexico on a scholarship), at least three other ex-Warrior athletes should be playing college ball.

Jay Raulerson, who graduated from Ruidoso in 1980, will be a junior offensive lineman on the Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) football team.

Russ Prior, who was a key figure on the Warrior 1980 squad which went 7-3 on the year, didn't play football in his freshman year at New Mexico State University (NMSU), but will try out for the Aggie team this spring as a walk-on.

Bryon Wright, who was an outstanding offensive guard and linebacker on this past season's Ruidoso team, will try out for the West Texas State University (WTSU) football squad as a walk-on.

Prior was one of the top offensive threats for the 1980 Warrior team as a fullback but the 6-1, 200 pounder will probably try out for the NMSU team as a wide receiver. Prior was a first team pick on the 1980 3-AAA all-district squad as a 6-0, 175 pounder. He has put on some extra weight since then and that will help him in the collegiate ranks.

Wright, who was one of the top defensive performers for the Warriors last fall, was left off the all-district first team along with teammate Dariush Rad, a decision which justifiably did not sit well with the Warrior coaching staff.

Bryon does not possess great size but more than makes up for it with his quickness and aggressive play.

Before the school year is out several more members of the 1981 Warrior football team could decide to go out for a college football team.

The Warriors had an excellent team this past season, one that could have won the state AAA title with a little bit of luck.

Instead, Ruidoso finished second in the district with an overall 8-2 record, a mark which was as good as that of champion Silver City.

The Warriors' football fortunes have been on the rise in the past three seasons. Raulerson, Nunley, Wright and Prior hope to bring that winning tradition to their respective teams next fall.

Turning to soccer, the Ruidoso-Sertoma Soccer Association's youth program is just around the corner.

The season will probably begin in mid-April with most of the matches being played at White Mountain Middle School.

There are two meetings for prospective coaches and referees tonight and Wednesday at Ruidoso State Bank.

After the meetings the organizing for the season will move into high gear.

Inside The Capitol

by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Question: What big business in America today most directly affects your life?

Answer: Well, it isn't the auto industry; that one is on the permanent downgrade. And it isn't Big Oil anymore; even that's starting to loosen its grip on the old billfold.

How about this response? "The health-care industry."

That's the baby which already gets into your wallet or purse for a big and healthy bite every year. What's more, it's going to take even more and more bucks as the years go by.

Remember when we used to have Florence Nightingale and the Sisters of Mercy?

Great days. But now?

No Florence; and what's more, no mercy.

Just the fact that we now frankly call it an "industry" should say a lot about how times have changed.

Which could easily lead to a further logical question: What good is health if we die to achieve it?

As Dr. Leonard Napolitano, dean of the University of New Mexico medical school, says frankly, physicians today know more and more. They can give us more and better care than their predecessors, including that old blue-beretted doctor with the black bag we all think we remember—the one who used to make house calls at any hour of the day or night, who held our hand—and according to Napolitano, made us feel good without really doing much else for us.

Today, the picture has changed. As a matter of fact, the medical picture has probably changed more sharply than any other thing in our society.

Small town or large, things aren't the way they used to be when it comes to the men and women who say they would like to make us well (though they obviously have a vested interest in our remaining sick).

And the future? Nothing but more and more of the same—which means medical bills and pharmaceutical bills which rise at a rate which is a minimum of one-and-a-half times what inflation is doing to all other prices. (Exempli gratia: Average daily cash receipts at University of New Mexico

Hospital-Bernalillo County Medical Center rose an average of 16 percent per year for the last five years.)

If we can't afford to pay the doctor now, how are we going to pay him ten years from now?

That's one question the State of New Mexico is asking. Suddenly, it is asking it with some urgency.

Motivated at least in part by Ronald Reagan's shrewd move to unload Medicaid onto the states (not Aid to Families With Dependent Children; the number of kids is declining while the numbers of the elderly and ill continue to climb), some people in government, led by the Legislative Finance Committee, have called for planning to say what we are going to do about this problem.

That's a great idea, but whom do we have to call on to give us information? Our Department of Human Services.

They have formed a task force to study the issue and most people who have watched Human Services function can tell you it will be years before we hear anything from that particular task force. Those folks couldn't "task force" themselves out of a paper bag, principally because the man who runs their shop, totally non-professional in the area of health, will keep any report they make on his desk for weeks and weeks and weeks and weeks....

The state is willing to help. But are state bureaucrats up to the challenge?

Almost certainly not. Hence any desire to reach the citizens and help us solve our medical problems will almost surely fizzle out in the swamps and backwaters of bureaucracy.

It was ever thus. What we need is more than good intentions. One thing we do not have: Gutsy leadership.

During February of this year various committees of the United States Congress that deal with human rights held hearings about religious persecution throughout the world. Undoubtedly the situation of the Baha'i Community in Iran provides the strongest evidence of religious persecution. How incensed we were in America when 52 of our citizens were held hostage, their rights denied them, for 444 days.

For three years, since the revolution in Iran in 1979, the members of the Baha'i Faith, numbering over 300,000 people, have been subjected to a ceaseless storm of persecution. The Iranian Government has made it clear that they intend to eliminate the Baha'i religion in Iran.

Ninety seven Baha'is have been executed. No charges made. No trials held. Over one hundred and fifty Baha'is are languishing in Iran's prisons without charges following their arrests. Baha'i homes have been looted and demolished. Their Holy places razed, their cemetery seized. Baha'is have been dismissed from their jobs if they refuse to recant their Faith. Even their passports have been revoked. Baha'i children are denied an education, professors and students barred from universities.

On Saturday, March 27, a prayer meeting was held at 2608 Sudderth Dr. here in Ruidoso to pray that these summary arrests and executions shall cease and that Baha'is, as law-abiding citizens, be granted their inalienable right to defend themselves against false charges.

Controversy rages on road through ranch

A new "Lincoln County War" has surfaced in recent weeks, but the combatants—a lone rancher versus the county manager and commissioners—are doing battle with words and legal action instead of shootin' irons.

The O-Bar-O case, filed June 26, 1981, by Robert W. Lietzman against the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, involves a road providing access to the Carrizo Mountain area of the Lincoln National Forest. The road, located off Highway 380, about 10 miles from Carrizozo and 12 miles from Capitan, runs through Lietzman's property at the O-Bar-O Ranch.

The problem stems from the fact that Lietzman wants to close the road to restrict access to his property, and the county wants the road open to provide access to the national forest.

Lietzman's complaint concerns several instances of vandalism allegedly occurring at his ranch from summer tourists driving around the property. Lietzman said windows have been broken and things such as paintings and wrought iron grates have been stolen from the house as "souvenirs" because the O-Bar-O property is well known for its beauty and history.

Soon after Lietzman purchased the O-Bar-O-Ranch in May 1981, he instructed his manager to chain the entrance to prevent further vandalism by restricting access to the property.

County Manager Truman A. "Bill" Billingsley instructed the sheriff's department to cut the chain, as it was restricting access to a public road.

"There is no question about the fact that it's a public road," Billingsley told The News. And District Attorney Steve Sanders said it has been a public road since at least 1938.

Lietzman's complaint filed against the commissioners, however, asks for judgment declaring and adjudicating the road to be on private property owned by Lietzman and that it not be a public road.

Lietzman stated in a letter written "to the people of Lincoln County" published in the March 15 issue of The News, "There is no mention of a road right-of-way through the O-Bar-O in my title deed or in the county records."

Lietzman also stated in the letter that he met with Paul Gordon, Smokey Bear District Ranger, to seek an alternate route to the forest land. The plan they discussed would require a connecting road be built, for which Lietzman offered free use of his road equipment and operators.

"Mr. Gordon then presented this plan to the County Commissioners and they said no. Some time later my attorney again presented this plan to the County Commissioners and again we were turned down," Lietzman said in the letter.

He told The News recently that the plan "was actually presented privately to commissioners" by Gordon. "They said no, they didn't want to," Lietzman said.

He said he later talked about the plan to the county manager, who "wouldn't listen at all."

Billingsley told The News that the commissioners have received "no formal request of any sort."

And Gordon said, "I didn't present anything to the county commissioners."

Gordon said he met with Lietzman, discussed plans for an alternate access route and is currently investigating the feasibility of the plans.

He said he did have a preliminary discussion with the county commissioners, and "they're absolutely cooperative."

"They're just as interested in finding a solution and alternate desirable to everyone as anyone else is," Gordon said.

In a letter published in The Ruidoso News March 22, county commissioner John A. Hightower expressed a willingness to cooperate with Lietzman according to procedures designated by state and county laws.

Gordon said, "It is imperative that there be public access into that country." He said he feels confident that some kind of solution can be worked out.

Gary Mitchell, Lietzman's attorney, said he presented the plan to the commissioners at their February 23 meeting, and they suggested a petition be filed for a public hearing on the matter. Mitchell said he plans to follow that advice, and he hopes a public hearing can be held before the case is heard in court.

"One way or another, we've got to get it settled and make sure everything is done right," Lietzman said.

He expressed his feeling that now the county commissioners "are getting interested."

After discussing the matter with both sides—Lietzman and the county commissioners—the biggest obstacle in solving the problem appears to be a misinterpretation of attitudes. It seems evident that all parties involved desire an equitable solution, implemented through the proper channels.


Perhaps a public hearing on the matter is the most equitable means to a solution for all involved, as the public is affected by the road's being an access route to the national forest.







Music, drama skills developed in high school production of 'Godspell'

She said it was really hard for her to remember the cast members were high

school students. They were excited and "scared to death," but the fear created needed energy and adrenalin for performing, Steinbrecher said.

Steinbrecher and Sandy Gladden are sponsors of the Drama Club, but Steinbrecher stressed that the students need and want a regular drama program offered in the school curriculum.

She said she has essentially been teaching a drama class from 7 to 9 a.m. for the past six weeks, since rehearsals for "Godspell" began.

She said they had been rehearsing from 8 to 9 a.m. until the students suggested they start an hour earlier.

Steinbrecher plans to return to school full-time in the fall to study architecture, but indicated she would like to see a drama program at the high school begun before then.

The students want it now and have demonstrated a strong desire to have it, she said. Steinbrecher expressed her hope that it will be made possible in the very near future.






