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DON DALE NAMED TRUSTEE

Sayner questions Mayor White's personnel role

Mayor George White thanked the Ruidoso trustees for their cooperation in unanimously naming Don Dale to the board at Tuesday night's meeting, but things were less harmonious later in the evening.

Ruidoso trustee Frank Sayner's statement on a "state of confusion" of village personnel since White became mayor drew an angry response and a promised rebuttal from White.

Sayner prefaced his remarks by saying that he and others had attempted to speak privately about the matter with the mayor but had been refused.

He then proceeded to read from a prepared statement, stating, "It has come to my attention that the Village personnel is in a state of confusion. We have entire departments talking of walkouts, people hired for specific jobs that are doing other duties assigned by the mayor, jobs being filled not in accordance with the personnel ordinance, policies of city being totally changed unilaterally. This results in administrative chaos, lack of motivation and poor, poor morale."

"A manager does not daily interfere with the operation he has put into effect," said Sayner. He made the analogy of a school board president who would bypass the school superintendent and supervise, hire and fire teachers or tell them how to do their jobs.

Sayner noted that Ruidoso's merit system ordinance, which took effect March 20, requires that hiring, firing, promotions and disciplinary action be based solely on an employee's ability to perform job requirements, and that it further prescribes these requirements and the exact manner in which employees are hired.

He then listed a number of "Examples of not following law; by Mayor." These included naming of deputy clerk to position of village clerk; hiring of two employees not in accordance with the merit system; naming new head of Emergency Medical Service; changing the village purchasing agent; eliminating charge accounts at the airport; reinstating an employee who had been dismissed by a department head;

radioing on the police frequency to send a sanitation truck to campaign treasurer's business; and changing water department shut off policy.

In addition, Sayner continued, all city hall employees were called into the mayor's office and told to report directly to White rather than to village manager Jim Hine and assistant Frank Potter.

"Is it any wonder that morale is low up here?" said Sayner. "You cannot get anything done in a place where the rules are changed daily."

"It would be my challenge ... quit trying to make a show of power and authority and start following the statutes," he said.

Sayner concluded by saying that there are "too doggone many big problems facing us—than to wonder what someone is doing behind our backs without consultation."

"I want to respond in written form," said White. "I didn't anticipate anything like this."

White said he had not changed "one iota" the chain of command, and that department heads who said they have to report directly to him are misinformed.

"I just don't like the accusations," said White. "I could make a few accusations of my own against a few councilmen, including you, Mr. Sayner, but it is beyond my dignity to stoop that low—I'm not going to do it."

The mayor went on to say that for two years he has sat on the board "as a lone wolf," and that "the shoe is on the other foot now."

"Mr. Sayner, I'm disappointed in you," said White. He said he hopes the board can get together without a scrap, however, but concluded, "I don't like to be accused of a lot of things I haven't done."

Trustee Al Junge stated that he has been acting the role of peacemaker recently and that he had tried to avert the scene by having the board discuss matters in executive session.

Junge drew analogies to "dirty laundry" and "beating your wife," saying "all of us look like fools."

Junge noted that his attempt at arrang-

ing an executive session had been refused by the mayor, which White confirmed.

Trustee Benny Coulston said that whether the concerns Sayner had mentioned were real or unreal might not even be relevant. Lack of consultation of the other trustees by White is in itself an important issue, he said.

Coulston said that he felt the trustees wanted White's administration to be the best Ruidoso has ever had, but indicated this could not be if their input was not requested.

"We are going to have several years of poor government if this friction continues," said Coulston.

He added that he would rather hear of things personally than read them in the newspaper. "Those things that require our consent—I believe we deserve the courtesy to know of them in advance," said Coulston. "Several councilmen feel this is not being done."

"When we are unhappy we are going to have meetings like this," said Coulston. He went on to say that the board does not want a "reign of the mayor's office but rather a proper administration."

"I will answer you all—publicly," said Mayor White.

In other business, the trustees:

—Asked the village manager to send out the monthly report of expenditures with the agenda for each regular meeting, at a suggestion from Junge.

—Accepted bid of 11.5 percent interest over five years from Bank Security Incorporated for \$337,000 financing of new hot mix plant.

—Accepted bid of \$12,700 from Fidelity Insurance of Roswell for general liability insurance.

—Instructed police chief to negotiate for lease of temporary buildings for use during construction at police station, as no bids were received on leasing proposal.

—Instructed fire marshal to investigate purchase of a single four-wheel-drive fire truck and return with a price and a recommendation.

—Approved the purchase of two traffic

counters through the state purchasing agency.

—Instructed the airport manager to bring a proposal for technical service of installing equipment at the airport, with permission to seek individual approval of trustees.

—Agreed to have county commissioners take a proposal to locate a county substation north of the Village Administrative Center to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Commissioners Ben Hall told the trustees the other site near Mechem Drive was "almost unacceptable" because of Federal Aviation Administration regulations on airport land.

—Took under advisement suggestions from Junge that the title "trustee" be changed to "councilman;" that daytime meetings be considered; that a one-hour study period take place before each regular meeting; that agendas be ready on Wednesday prior to Tuesday meetings; and that meetings start on time. Junge also suggested a rewrite of the ordinance on appointments to commissions and a restudy of the water rate ordinance. A committee of Junge, Sayner, Potter and White is to study the water rate and report at the second meeting in May.

—Heard from planning and enforcement officer John Cupp that a new one-month record for building permits was assured for March, at over \$3.5 million.

—Agreed to have the street department help the youth soccer league get its field in shape.

—Approved beer and wine licenses for Don Victor's and Dos Amigos restaurants after public hearings.

—Agreed to have the water board proceed with a study of available adjudicated water rights in the Hondo Valley, with the aim of purchasing some.

—Tabled appointments to boards and commissions until next meeting.

—Approved use of village park for antique car show in the fall.

—Agreed to ask the Chamber of Commerce about combining a Chamber Coffee Cart with an open house at the Village Administrative Center.

Dale pledges devotion of time as trustee

Don Dale, a Ruidoso resident for the past nine years, was unanimously approved Tuesday evening by the village trustees, on recommendation by Mayor George White, to serve two years as a trustee.

Dale will complete the unexpired term of White, who relinquished the post after being elected Mayor in the March 2 municipal election.

"I am pleased by the unanimous vote, by the mayor and other trustees in seating me as a trustee," Dale said to The News Wednesday morning. "I know I will have good working rapport with the mayor and the trustees."

"I realize, in view of pending developments in Ruidoso, that this will be a time consuming job, and I will devote the necessary time to get the job done."

"I feel strongly that citizen input to the mayor and the trustees is very important, and trust that the residents of Ruidoso will express their views, to help the trustees in reaching decisions on the important issues facing us in the immediate future."

Dale holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, and has completed several courses in banking.

He was staff accountant with a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) in Lubbock prior to moving to Ruidoso to be an accountant with Dean and Mound, CPA's. He then founded Dale's Furniture, which he currently owns and operates.

Dale is a past president and member of the Ruidoso Valley Noon Lions, past president of Little League baseball, past director of Little League football and a past director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

"One of my major interests is the welfare of our youth," he said, "and if, as a trustee, I can help develop youth activities and programs, that is something I want to do."

Aspen Festival plans in progress

The committee to coordinate Aspen Festival '82 activities met for the first time Monday to discuss a combined planning and budget-making effort.

"If we coordinate all of our efforts, it would make it that much more advantageous," said Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce president Richard Sandoval.

On hand for the Aspen Festival Committee meeting were Sandoval; Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth; Ed Hyman, representing the mule skinniers; and Archer Wilson, Morgan Clough, Lawrence Hill and Richard Richburg, representing the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival.

Committee members agreed to coordinate individual festival activity budgets so that a lump sum figure may be appropriated by the Lodgers' Tax Committee for Aspen Festival '82 advertising. Event sponsors will go through the festival committee to ask for lodgers' tax funding.

Hyman, chairman of the Lodgers' Tax Committee, said if each group can

calculate how much money it needs and get together by mid-May when the Lodgers' Tax Committee prepares its 1983 budget, the Lodgers' Tax Committee can present a working budget to the village trustees before July 1, the start of the 1983 village fiscal year.

Requests can then be submitted all at once and the Lodgers' Tax Committee may appropriate money all at the same time for festival events, Hyman said.

Richburg said the Ruidoso Business Association still plans to request advertising funding from the Lodgers' Tax Committee 1982 budget.

Advertising for some activities may be combined, as was done last year with the annual Ruidoso Downs Mule Meet, Arabian Horse Show, Ascencade Motorcycle Convention and the Hunter Jumper Show, said Hyman. He added that summer Ruidoso visitors should be kept in mind when advertising campaigns for the fall festival are planned.

"Any legitimate thing that brings business to Ruidoso will be given money," said Hyman, referring to the Lodgers' Tax Committee.

Jungbluth said Jerry Bigham will handle the Chamber-sponsored New Mexico championship chili cookoff. The chili cookoff is scheduled for Saturday, October 9, at a site where a picnic license may be used. "Beer is a must" at a chili cookoff, said Jungbluth.

The New Mexico Tractor Pullers Association is planning to hold its event Saturday and Sunday, October 9 and 10. The tractor pull will take place above the race track sales arena where there is a long, flat stretch of earth, said Jungbluth. The tractors will also be in the Aspen Festival parade.

Jungbluth said Danny Flores, Ruidoso High School music and band director, has had a good response from area high schools concerning a high school marching band contest. The winning school would receive funds to start a scholarship program, and the contest could build over the years, said Jungbluth. The bands will march in the parade, he added.

Pat Newell of Yesterday Promotions in Las Cruces wrote Jungbluth about incorporating an antique car show into the Aspen Festival. The pre-1949 automobiles

would also be included in the parade and professional judges would present awards. Games and other participant activities would be held in conjunction with the antique car show, Jungbluth said.

"We would appreciate the mayor, Mr. White, selecting his favorite vehicle at either 'or both events and presenting a trophy to his selection," Newell said in the letter.

Hyman said he expects as large a crowd, if not larger, to attend the Annual Ruidoso Downs Mule Meet than last year and said the purses will be larger if not the same as last year's purses.

"As of right now, all I know is that we'll have the Arabian Horse Show, but the Hunter Jumper Show may not be here," said Hyman. He added that there is a possibility of having an appaloosa horse show or a halter class show along with the mule racing.

"With this many events, you can see how important coordination is," Sandoval said.

He closed the meeting by saying he wants the Aspen Festival '82 coordinating committee to be active and to meet monthly.

Police concerns aired at joint trustees meeting

The relationship between Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police departments was the topic of discussion at a special joint meeting of the villages' trustees Monday.

In the past, Ruidoso has furnished certain services to Ruidoso Downs police as a professional courtesy, such as night dispatching service and use of jail facilities, it was reported.

Ruidoso Police Chief Dick Swenor said that in planning a new facility for his police department, it is necessary to know what Ruidoso Downs has planned for its department in the near future.

"Your guys and our guys depend on each other," Swenor said.

He said there is a need for a written joint powers agreement between the two

departments. It was brought out at the meeting that lately there has been a lack of communication between the departments and between each department and its governing body.

"I don't think we've got a problem; it's a question of communication," said Ruidoso mayor George White.

Several persons at the meeting expressed the feeling that communication will be improved with the recent change in leadership at the Ruidoso Downs Police Department.

Ruidoso Downs trustee Bob Power reported that they would like to have their own 24-hour dispatching service, but it is currently financially impossible.

"Use our people," Swenor said. He suggested to Ruidoso Downs trustees that they not worry about a 24-hour dispatching service.

About 10 percent of the prisoners jailed in Ruidoso in a one-year period are arrested by Ruidoso Downs police. Swenor noted, Ruidoso Downs pays for meals, and Ruidoso police supervise the prisoners.

Swenor said that the evening dispatcher service is not used too often by Ruidoso Downs, but that the calls his people receive are from citizens who want fast response.

He reported that he can promise a response time of four minutes to Ruidoso citizens. It had been brought out earlier that the Ruidoso Downs department's response time is sometimes 30 minutes to one hour.

"Our response time is minimal," said Ruidoso Downs acting chief of police Carl DuCep. "They are in there and they are on the ball," he said of his officers.

White, who chaired the meeting, stated

that the objective of the two boards should be to work out a joint powers agreement and some kind of compensation to Ruidoso to help defray costs of night dispatcher service.

It was decided that Swenor and DuCep would discuss the matter and make recommendations to the two boards of trustees.

It was also reported at the meeting that several builders in Ruidoso Downs have been issued building permits by the state rather than the local building inspector. Ruidoso Downs trustee Harold Mansell explained that Ruidoso Downs is served by Ruidoso's building inspector, and the permit fee is divided between the two villages.

Mansell expressed concern that the villages are losing this income. It was suggested that Construction Industries Division in Santa Fe be contacted about the matter.

Linda Cozby Wertheimer, a Carlsbad native who is rated one of the top news reporters on Capitol Hill, will speak at a banquet Saturday evening. Wertheimer is host for the Public Broadcasting System public affairs program, The Lawmakers, and a regular news reporter for National Public Radio.

Cline, president of the National Federation of Press Women; Photo Composition, to be conducted by Mac Dejana, from the photographic design division of Meisel's Photocrome, Dallas, Texas;

Energy/Energy Writing, by Peyton Yates, Yates Petroleum executive, Artesia; Freelancing, conducted by Tricia Hurst, associate editor of Taos Magazine.

Other workshops will cover business writing, to be conducted by Harold Morgan; product development analyst for Albuquerque National Bank; The Pentagon and the Media, by Lieutenant Colonel Anthony Caggiano, head of the military science department at Eastern New Mexico University; and print design, by Bert Wittup, University of New Mexico professor.

Awards will be presented to New Mexico

Local gasoline prices dropping, but still higher than elsewhere

Ruidoso gasoline prices have kept pace with the national trend in declining gasoline prices, dropping approximately five cents in the past three weeks from round \$1.33 per gallon of regular gas. However, local prices continue to be higher than prices in other New Mexico towns.

Higher shipping costs may account for part of the price difference, but the main reason seems to be that Ruidoso's less competitive market must subsidize the lower gas prices in larger cities.

The lowest prices found in Roswell Sunday were \$1.19 per gallon for self service regular and \$1.25 for unleaded. In Alamogordo, the lowest price for self service regular was \$1.14 with unleaded at \$1.21 at Bowlin's Running Indian.

So gas continues to be more expensive in Ruidoso than in the other two neighboring cities.

Wholesalers are often blamed for the high price of gas in Ruidoso, but most area wholesalers were reluctant to comment on prices or profits. Area wholesalers contacted included Ray Bell Oil Company of Roswell, R. E. Owen Company of Ruidoso Downs, L. F. Jennings Oil Company of Ruidoso, Wesley Martin Oil Company of Alamogordo and Onda Oil Company of Roswell.

Sam Rodar, president of the Service Station Dealers Association of New Mexico, said that considerably higher gasoline

prices are being paid in small towns, sometimes 20 cents per gallon higher than in the larger cities. He attributed this to price wars in the bigger markets, where wholesalers are willing to engage in below purchase price selling to capture the market.

"Marketers engage in price wars where product is sold below cost in competitive more heavily populated areas than Ruidoso. Lost margins are then made up for by pricing product higher in less competitive rural areas, such as Ruidoso. This pattern is repeated all over New Mexico," Rodar said.

In response to Rodar's claim of smaller towns subsidizing larger cities' lower prices, Ray Bell, chief executive of Ray Bell Oil Company, said, "Absolutely not. The bigger towns have more competition, so dealers compete."

Jim Tidwell of R. E. Owen Company said, "no one in this area can live off gas prices like that (those presently being offered in Albuquerque or Santa Fe) because the volume is not here."

Rodar said while all gas stations may have equal status in the public's eye, their suppliers do not treat them equally. He said depending on who operates a service station, a jobber—a wholesale distributor who also sells gas at a retail outlet, like Ray Bell—or a dealer, there is a vast difference in the wholesale price paid for gasoline.

"Hack prices, (the price the refinery charges at the terminal) paid by jobbers and independents, (non-brand name in-

dependent oil companies) are often \$0.70 to \$2.00 per gallon lower than wholesale prices paid by dealers (dealer tank wagon price). Unfortunately for dealers, all must compete in the same retail market," said Rodar.

"Jobber supplied dealers are in most cases being charged prices near or equal to the price that jobbers sell for in their direct operated retail stations," Rodar said.

Average dealer tank wagon prices (before taxes) have dropped from \$1.0065 on March 3, to \$0.9534 on March 24, according to The Oil Daily.

Bell said he receives his gas from various places, but told The News his dealer tank wagon price is \$1.25, which would include the \$0.13 New Mexico state excise tax.

Rodar said retail dealers are working on a very small profit margin. In most cases, Ruidoso dealers said their margin is between three and six cents per gallon. Rodar said depending on a dealer's volume, a dealer should make anywhere from 10 to 13 cents per gallon.

On the other hand, Rodar said jobbers are making very comfortable profit margins. He said jobbers are often making between 10 and 13 cents per gallon profit when he feels they realistically should make a three to five cent profit.

While most wholesalers refused to comment on the price they buy and sell gas for, Tidwell of R. E. Owen said, "I know what my gas costs me, and I know I need to

make at least seven cents per gallon."

"My profit is around a cent a gallon," said Bell. However, last week Rodar said Ray Bell service stations in Santa Fe were selling self service regular for \$1.03. Ray Bell supplied gas stations in Ruidoso were selling gas for \$1.26 last week.

Higher shipping costs based on its geographical location have been given as the reason for Ruidoso's high gas prices, but investigation has revealed that this is probably not a substantial factor.

Bob Wolfe of Steere Tank Lines said it costs \$1.46 a gallon to transport gasoline from Artesia, where gasoline is refined, to Roswell. From Las Cruces, a terminal point for gasoline, to Alamogordo, Wolfe quoted a price of \$0.199.

Wolfe said it costs \$.0302 to haul a gallon of gas from Artesia to Ruidoso and approximately the same amount from Las Cruces to Ruidoso. The difference in mileage between Las Cruces and Ruidoso and Artesia and Ruidoso is only three miles.

Freight rates are calculated per mile, explained Wolfe. He said the more mileage, the higher the shipping rate. He added that it makes no difference whether a tanker is going uphill or downhill, the costs remain the same.

However, Bell stated that freight rates almost double when gas has to be taken "up the hill." He told The News it costs "four to five cents a gallon more" to bring gas to Ruidoso. When Bell was told of the prices quoted by Steere Truck Lines, the

freight company Bell uses, he continued to stick to his original contention.

The difference in transportation costs, at the most a penny and a half, does not explain the difference in gasoline prices at the pump, at the least seven cents.

Rodar said, "On average, a 100 mile haul is worth about \$.027 per gallon. This can hardly explain how gas can be sold for \$1.08 per gallon in one town, and for \$1.31 per gallon in a town 80 miles away."

Diane Davies of The Oil Daily said as Americans have learned to conserve and alter their driving habits, the demand for oil has decreased, thus bringing down the price of gasoline at the pumps.

Dan Lundberg, publisher of the Lundberg Letter, also attributed the price decline to the glut of oil presently on the world market. He predicted that gasoline prices will decline for a few weeks more before gradually rising again.

"I expect prices will continue to fall. Gas will be down to \$1.00 a gallon," Rodar said. He mentioned that in some larger markets, such as Santa Fe, gas is already selling for as little as \$1.03 per gallon for regular.

Most service station dealers have no idea whether gas prices will rise or fall. They are, in most instances, at the mercy of their distributor.

When asked to comment on the decrease in price at his service station last week, Billy Hall of the Shamrock station said, "Because my distributor said to go down. That's all I can tell you."

Although Ray Bell Oil is not the Shamrock's wholesaler (Onda Oil is), operators of the stations Bell supplies, such as the Kerr-McGee and Minit Mart, told The News that Ray Bell tells them how much to charge per gallon.

When Bell was asked why prices at the Kerr-McGee station were \$1.25 on Monday and raised back to \$1.26 on Tuesday, Bell replied, "I do not have the slightest idea. I don't dictate prices to them... The dealers set the prices, of course. They might take a larger margin."

Rodar said from what he hears of Ruidoso, prices won't ever come down in comparison to places like Albuquerque, Santa Fe or Las Cruces. He said there are too few distributors supplying Ruidoso gas dealers, which does not make for enough competition.

The motoring public in small towns and rural areas will continue to subsidize the lower prices which big cities now enjoy. Distributors are waging competitive price wars in the cities in order to capture a larger share of the high volume markets.

In the end, the small independent gas dealer may be wiped out of business when he can no longer compete with the jobber who sells him gas for \$1.20 and sells it himself for \$1.05.

So the Ruidoso motorist who finds himself in Las Cruces or Albuquerque, or even Alamogordo, should fill up the gas tank, because prices will evidently remain higher here.

Still no settlement on fish kill in river

State Environmental Improvement Division (EID) legal counsel Joseph Gmuca told The News Wednesday that no agreement has been reached yet between EID and the Southland Corporation concerning the violation of two New Mexico Water Quality Control Commission regulations when gasoline spilled into the Rio Ruidoso and killed approximately 2,500 fish, mostly brown trout.

March 4 was originally set as the deadline for Southland Corporation to respond to EID's proposed settlement.

"As far as Southland Corporation goes, I can't tell you anything. I (representing the New Mexico Water Control Commission and EID, which by state statute represents the commission and is assigned enforcement powers of the commission's regulations) am pursuing a settlement. Nothing has been finalized. I am hopeful that we will attain one (a settlement)," said Gmuca.

Gmuca would not specify when he expects a settlement to be reached and declined to reveal what any settlement may include.

Tuesday, Gmuca said that he presumed a settlement would be reached by Wednesday after consulting with Southland Corporation attorney Lon Williams.

He said he based his prediction on the fact that Williams seemed ready to settle after learning of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish projection of an initial loss of 2,500 fish in the Rio Ruidoso from the February 4 spill.

"The amount of the settlement that would be appropriate depends on the severity of the spill," said Gmuca. He indicated that Southland would probably prefer not to contend the case in a court of law since 2,500 dead fish would substantiate any claims made by EID.

Dick McCleskey, chief of fisheries for Game and Fish, said the department sent Southland a letter yesterday asking for compensation for the amount of fish lost. He said Game and Fish's estimate of the fish killed was conservative as they used the lower end of the survey chart.

The gas spill occurred on the afternoon of February 4 as gas tanks from the former Exxon station on the corner of Mechem and Sudderth Drives were being excavated. The gas storage tanks evidently fell from their hoists and gasoline remaining in the tanks spilled out.

The gas then apparently ran down Mechem Drive by the Highway 37 bridge where a culvert leads into the Rio Ruidoso.

Monty Leishman of the Roswell office of Game and Fish said from there to a mile downstream, there was a total fish loss.

She said Spence kept telling his mother he was hungry, but he would not eat. After many tests, the doctors determined Spence had a large kidney tumor and cancer.

Activity, usefulness of residents goal of Ruidoso Care Center staff

The prime responsibility of the Ruidoso Care Center, said administrative director Betty Mills, is to help care center residents reach and maintain their highest level of activity and usefulness.

"A lot of people think a nursing home is where people are brought to die," Mills said. However, she contends that such is not the case at the Ruidoso Care Center.

Mills said all efforts are directed toward helping patients get back into the community, if possible. Sometimes an elderly person is brought to the care center because the family no longer wants to take care of the person, said Mills. The care center staff can help that person make the transition from dependence on the family to individual independence.

If a care center resident never leaves, Mills said, there are a variety of programs and activities to make residents feel happy, useful and productive.

"We try to make it as much as a home atmosphere as possible," said Mills.

Once a month, the Noon Lions Club puts on a bingo game for residents, Mills said. She said residents win prizes supplied by the club.

"That (the bingo game) is a highlight with people. They really enjoy that," said Mills.

Each Sunday a different church belonging to the ministerial alliance puts on a church service for care center residents, Mills said. She noted that once a week the Church of Christ visits the care center for singing and bible study.

Things for residents to do are always planned on a daily basis and are posted on a calendar of events, but Mills said there are special activities lined up as well.

Coming up later this month is Volunteer Week, April 18 to 24, Mills said. Nursing home week is in May, and arts and crafts items made by residents will be sold May 15 at the patio sale.

Ruidoso Care Center residents also celebrate Christmas with a festive party, put on an Easter egg hunt for children, have a special Thanksgiving Day dinner and sometimes open the care center up for people to visit and to enjoy a buffet dinner.

However, with all there is for residents to do, no one is forced to participate, Mills said. She said residents have the option to choose whether they want to get involved in one of the many activities or whether they prefer to stay in their rooms and watch television.

An adopt-a-grandparent program was established for kids to visit the elderly folks, but Mills said that there are now more adults visiting the care center. She said that residents get a big boost from visitors and stressed how much it means to the residents.

"We very definitely encourage young people to come up. A lot of these people have lost contact with young people and they need that contact," Mills said.

Volunteers like T. D. Gartman are always needed, Mills said. He's there everyday and puts in more time than many full-time employees, said Mills. "He (Gartman) is the most perfect example of a Christian man I know," Mills said.

Gartman and other volunteers run the "Country Store," which is open from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Residents may purchase personal items at cost, and any money gained on the venture goes back to purchase more supplies.

The Care Center Auxiliary has also provided a lot of needed assistance. For example, a new van with a lift for easy access was procured by auxiliary efforts, the care center administrator said.

Now residents can make trips to Alamogordo and Roswell for doctor appointments in style and comfort, said Mills. She said sightseeing trips to give residents a chance to get out of the nursing home and see the world are also possible now.

Mills also expressed her gratitude to the DECA (Distributive Education Clubs of America), the Pilot Club, Mr. and Mrs. Alvie Cole, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Frall and the many other contributors who donated money for the van. She also thanked Mrs. Pat Rooney for donating the lift and Rudy Loyola for installing the lift.

Mills is a registered nurse who came to the Ruidoso Care Center in March, 1981, as director of nurses. She became the care center's top administrator in June, 1981, and has seen the center expand from caring for 48 elderly people to the present number of 80.

"I'm excited to go to work every morning. Although it's busy, busy, it's fun work. I can't understand why more people wouldn't love working with old people," said Mills. The care center provides a 24-hour nursing service and a physical therapy and ex-

ercise program, Mills said. She said 80 percent of care center residents now participate in the therapy programs.

Mills added that there is a lot of arts and crafts participation. She said people who never showed an interest in arts and crafts before are now involved.

"I sure do attribute that to my staff and the volunteers for getting them motivated," Mills said.

Mills said she is very proud of her staff. She said turnover in the nursing assistant staff is decreasing. The staff is constantly being upgraded and improved to include reliable and responsible people, Mills said.

"Without them, I couldn't do it," said Mills of her supportive staff.

She said she is also very proud of the two-year-old care center's cleanliness and the fact that residents are not unnecessarily sequestered, such as has been reported in other nursing homes.

"We have been surveyed by six different state and federal agencies, and the comments from these people are that residents are well taken care of and the building is clean," said Mills. She added that the building has the latest fire prevention equipment which includes automatic closure doors and a fire sprinkler system.

Mills said the Ruidoso Care Center is one of many care centers across the country run by Healthco Management Corporation of Bellevue, Washington. She noted that Healthco is a profit making organization.

She said the Ruidoso Care Center is operated in the residents' best interest. "Said Mills, "There are some people here with not one living relative in the world and who are unable to care for themselves. We're here for support."



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

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


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Warrior thinclads face tough competition in Portales meet

Ruidoso High School's boys' track team will get a good idea how it stacks up against the best AAA teams in the state when it competes in the Portales Invitational at Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) tomorrow.

The Warriors, who finished third in the Deming Invitational last Saturday, will compete against the likes of Lovington, Artesia, New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) and host Portales.

"Lovington is the defending state AAA champion," said Warrior head coach Ronnie Maskew. "In fact, they're usually one of the best teams in the state on any level."

Artesia is also a fine team, having won several events in a five-team meet with Ruidoso, Carlsbad, Goddard of Roswell and NMMI last month.

Portales and NMMI also have some fine individuals.

"Portales doesn't always have great teams but they usually have some fine sprinters and are strong in some field events," said Maskew. "They always come up with some fine individuals."

Ruidoso has some talented athletes of its own. The Warriors have one of the best weightmen in the AAA division in Lon Nunley.

Nunley threw the discus 157-9 last Saturday for one of the best five marks in the state on any level. The University of New Mexico bound senior also won the shot put with a 49-3 effort.

Nunley also anchors the Ruidoso 400 meter relay team. At Deming the Warriors ran a 46.8 time for second place behind the hosts.

Tomorrow's meet is on an all-weather track which should be considerably faster than the dirt one at Deming. That plus the fact Lovington usually has one of the fastest 400 meter relay teams in the state should bring the Warriors' time down.

"They (Lovington) have two or three guys back from their 400 meter relay team," Maskew said. "They've also got two or three guys returning on their 1,600 meter relay team. They would have won the 400 meter relay at state last year but one of their runners pulled up."

The Warrior 1,600 meter relay quartet of Eric Strobel, Scott Neal, Grady Williamson and Don Nunley should also record their best time of the season tomorrow.

Ruidoso ran a 3:39.7 at Artesia last month and a 3:44.0 at Deming. With EM-

MU's fast track and the tougher competition the Warriors have a good chance of running faster than 3:35.0 tomorrow.

One of the pleasant surprises for Maskew this season has been the running of freshman Cisco Bob.

Bob won the 1,500 meters in 4:30.1 at Artesia and finished third in the same time in that event at Deming. He also took second in the 3,000 meters at Deming with a 10:08.3 time.

The Warriors also have David Landrum and eighth-grader David Ordorica in the distance races.

Ordorica defeated several runners almost a head taller than him in the 1,500 meters and 3,000 meters at Deming.

The Warriors have several athletes who

can compete in the high jump and junior Billy Woodul is a potential standout in the javelin.

Woodul won the javelin with a 150-6 toss at Artesia and was fifth at Deming with a 136-foot throw.

It's usually windy at Portales and that may hurt javelin throwers as the wind sometimes holds up the spear and prevents it from going too far.

Sophomore Tony Muse is the Warriors' top hope in the long jump. Muse leaped 17-4, a personal best, for sixth place at Deming. He has gradually improved over the first month of the season and could hit 18 feet tomorrow.

The trials will start at 9:30 a.m. and the finals will begin at 1:30 p.m.

The possibility of a National Football League (NFL) strike next season has me worried.

A strike among the NFL players would be even worse than the baseball players' strike last season.

For one thing, the baseball season lasts a lot longer than the football season and it tends to drag on, particularly for the also-ran teams. Also, baseball players make considerably more money than football players on the average and it's harder for the average person to relate to baseball players because of this.

Many people seem to relate the rough and tumble world of pro football to their problems in everyday life.

Pro football has generally replaced baseball as the national pastime.

But the main reason a football strike is ominous to many people is the fact that it would leave many men with nothing to do on Sundays.

Men who've watched pro football on television from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. every Sunday for 20 years or more would have a hard time adjusting to a fall without pro football.

How will they react? I see many men reacting irrationally to a fall without pro football.

Some guys might start talking to themselves. Others could stare blankly at a television for hours, not watching the movie or news program which happens to be on in place of the football games.

But it doesn't look good right now. The players seem ready to strike and the owners don't seem willing to discuss the issue with them.

Next fall could be a very sad time for sports fans in this country.

Ruidoso High School's track team could be on the verge of challenging Silver City and Deming for the district 3-AAA championship for several seasons.

The Warriors have a lot of young talent and are improving rapidly, particularly in the distance races.

Freshman Cisco Bob has the makings of one of the best distance runners in the state's AAA division. He has run 4:30 in the

1,500 meters twice this season and could run faster than 4:15 before the season is over.


Sunday. After the Santa Fe tournament he plans to compete in a couple of tournaments during the summer.

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
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
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
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The Silver Lining

Every day from now on, we will awaken to new spectacles of blossom and leaf as Spring once again brings us God's miracles of new life.

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

Yours and Ours

SANTA FE—How about a severance tax on water? That, this column's spies say, was one of the suggestions which surfaced at that unusual meeting of his Cabinet Bruce King held in Las Cruces last week.

Right now, New Mexico is waiting for the courts to decide whether or not El Paso can mine our water.

Most of us think the courts will uphold our state's position, which says, put simply, that our water may not be exported beyond our borders.

But suppose that's not the court's conclusion?

In the case of the state of New Hampshire, for instance, the Supreme Court recently ruled that it cannot refuse to export electrical power.

Now power isn't water, and water isn't power.

But still... So some folks are saying we ought to be ready for any contingency. If we are told we cannot refuse to provide water to others, we'd better get ready to capitalize on the water we may have to sell.

If we were to tax water, of course, everyone who uses it would have to pay that tax.

We tried once to put a high tax on electricity to be exported beyond the boundaries of the state, while we left our local users strictly alone. When that case went to the nation's Supreme Court, we lost it 9-0. "Tax everybody or nobody" was more or less what the judges said.

So—if we have to punish those outside our state who want to use our water and other natural resources—do we also punish those inside?

A tough question—but one we ought to be thinking about.

Here's a new theory of bureaucracy, based on the experience of Brian Sanderoff, who took over the Governor's Office of Community Affairs from Herman Grace.

Sanderoff told the Legislative Finance Committee that he has trimmed the payroll in that troubled agency by one-third.

When you check his performance since doing so, you find he has produced about five times as much per day as his predecessor.

That led Colin McMillin, candidate for lieutenant governor on the Republican ticket, to observe that if Sanderoff went ahead and fired everybody on the staff, his continued improvement in productivity might eventually reach infinity.

It's not only the bureaucracy which has new ways of doing things. Of late, even the judiciary is proposing new systems.

Take the case of federal judge Santiago Campos handing down the punishment for Carlos Gallegos, convicted of using the mails to defraud an insurance company after a restaurant he and another person owned in Las Vegas mysteriously burned down.

Part of Gallegos' sentence was something which was purely not necessary: He was told he had to resign as a member of the State Highway Commission.

Now, Gallegos has been unusually reluctant to do that. When he was originally charged with arson in the Las Vegas case, he refused to quit the Commission because his attorney said to do so would be to admit his guilt.

But once he was found guilty, the least he could have done was drop Bruce King a line and say, "I resign."

He didn't do that.

The Governor told this writer it was clear that Carlos was off the Commission the day he was convicted of a felony—but a letter of resignation would have been at least good form.

Why do those Bruce King appointees want to hold to office no matter how much they embarrass the man who named them in the first place?

We think Rep. Benjamin Rosenthal, D-N.Y., concerns himself too much with what he perceives to be the ignorance of the American wage earner.

Rosenthal is concerned that banks and financial institutions aren't properly warning potential Individual Retirement Account purchasers that \$1 million 35 years from now might not be worth the same that \$1 million is worth today.

It appears likely to us that Mr. Average American Wage Earner has sufficient recent experience with the changing prices of cars, electricity, housing, groceries and virtually everything else he buys, that he's not going to entertain any false anticipation about what the \$1 million of the year 2017 will buy.

All government need do to "protect" the potential IRA purchaser is continue to publicize the Consumer Price Index. — Albuquerque Journal.

One was old-time politico Fabian Chavez, whose weak convention showing suggests his star may have set — or at

Neither of these gubernatorial aspirants made the ballot last week, and they are not taking it lying down. Both aver they will stomp the state to get enough petitions to force their names on the primary ballot.

That could happen, but it won't be easy. Houston, who has considerable support in Albuquerque, is best positioned to do it. He is already hacking away at frontrunners Toney Anaya and Aubrey Dunn. The Demos this year are in reality having two primaries, and we are about to see the first one, which will be short and hot.

Meanwhile, Dorothy Runnels will host a Lea County fundraiser for Mike at her Humble City farm home April 17. Kent Hance, the popular West Texas Congressman, is coming over to give Mike a boost. Tickets will be \$50 apiece, and you get western music and all the barbecue you can eat.


"Our guys depend on your guys," Swenor told Ruidoso Downs officials. He was talking about policemen, but his words hold true for all of us in the two communities.—TP

On the village beat

The newspaper business is a business of words. As a captive audience of reporters was recently told, the obligation of a newspaper is to transmit information to its readers.

Our particular job is to communicate. Few other fields and occupations are as centered around communication as newspaper work.

But when you stop to think about it, communicating plays a vital part in any job. It plays a vital part in living, for that matter.

We got onto this subject when I paid a visit to administrative officer Jim Alston the other day at the Ruidoso Police Department.

Jim is to be congratulated for recently being named to the rank of lieutenant.

"The days of the policeman being a big brawler and that sort of thing are over," said Alston. He pointed out that making arrests is only a small part of a policeman's job—that once an arrest is made, the case has to be processed in court.

In other words, the policeman has to be able to state his case.

"Not only does good grammar, but spelling, punctuation and all aspects of some sort of literary talent come to the forefront," Jim explained. "You have to be able to convince somebody—not only in writing but orally as well—why the arrest was made, and describe the events that transpired."

Alston noted that in his years in police work, he has come in contact with policemen who were extremely good "street officers," but who were severely limited in court because of difficulty communicating.

This difficulty, he said, is probably the biggest failure of today's policemen—"particularly the crop our schools have let down by not teaching them to read and write."

Jim made an interesting comment on the policeman of yesterday, who operated under far fewer legal restrictions than his modern counterpart.

"Most of the old-timers did it rightly or wrongly, but they could make a hell of a good report about it."

Today's officers are better about doing things legally, Alston noted, but the necessity of proving a case "beyond reasonable doubt" makes the ability to communicate far more important to a policeman than it has ever been.

"Quite properly, the case should be thrown out of court if it's not properly stated," said Alston.

He also pointed out that the policeman who does not make his case properly risks

being sued by the person or persons charged with the crime.

"A policeman who doesn't document his actions is possibly opening himself up to a civil claim," said Alston. "It all hinges right back to the ability of the officer to report what happened."

"A good police report uses plain, straightforward, everyday good English," he added.

Jim recently returned from a six-week course at the state Police Academy in Santa Fe. Report writing made up a good part of the classwork, he noted.

"They create situations that you have to make reports on," he explained. "A large percentage is strictly communications skills."

The problem, however, is that "you can't reeducate a person just to hire them—they have to get the basic grounding in school or they're never going to get it."

Jim and his wife Pamela (he gives her most of the credit) gave their own children a lot of basic grounding at home.

"We encouraged our kids to read at a very early age," said Alston. "Our son could read the newspaper before he started school."

None of his children had much trouble with their schoolwork, he added.

Jim said he has noticed that people who read a lot seem to have the ability to communicate, though he's not sure why.

"Exposure, maybe," he said.

Jim, who has several years' experience in the military too, summarized our conversation with this observation:

"A person, except in the most unusual circumstances, will never rise above a mediocre level without an ability to communicate."

The shortcomings of the American public school system in teaching reading and writing are widely acknowledged and discussed.

There is a bumper sticker which says, "If you can read this, thank a teacher."

Okay, but if a kid is a junior or senior in high school, and he can't read the sticker, does he thank a teacher for that, too?

Anyhow, I prefer the bumper sticker which asks, "Have you read to your child today?"

This column will deal from time to time with the subject of communicating.

And on that subject (I gotta do this once), "Hi Mom! And thanks for encouraging me to read."

Sail On Bunny sails to West Texas Futurity win

Sail On Bunny, an 11-1 outsider ridden by Gary Sumpter, came alive in the final jumps and hacked out a head victory in Sunday's 11th staging of the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park.

The 330-yard classic, the first of Sunland's two major springtime futurities for quarter horses, ended with four horses slugging it out on the wire.

The stewards, after taking a deliberate look at the photo finish picture, flashed Sail On Bunny's number and the crowd responded with a roar.

It was Sail On Bunny by a head, followed by Call Caleb, who was a nose in front of the favorite, Sinnin and Grinnin. The latter, desperately trying to hold on after setting a stinging pace, finished a neck in front of Flamboyan.

Flamboyan, like Sinnin and Grinnin, was unable to sustain his speed down to the wire. Throughout most of the race, he was in second place, trying to overtake Sinnin and Grinnin.

The latter, piloted by Steve Fuller at 3-2 odds, broke alertly and quickly assumed a half-length lead. At the midway point, the game filly almost looked like a sure winner. Even with some 20 yards to go, she still appeared to have matters in hand.

Sail On Bunny, owned by Jake Box and Ray Starbuck of Clovis, lingered in the middle of the pack most of the way. Just as it seemed victory was out of reach, the colt ignited. He began his desperation charge about 50 yards from the wire. In the final steps, he was accelerating at a remarkable clip.

Even more remarkable was the final surge put together by Call Caleb. The colt, directed by Jerry Nicodemus at nearly 8-1 odds, broke inwardly at the start and had to be steadied. His situation looked hopeless as he found himself about four-fifths of a length off the lead, in last place, at the midway point. But he literally flew by horses in the last half dozen jumps and nearly overtook Sail On Bunny.

Sail On Bunny, trained by the veteran Jake Cascio, is a son of Bunny Bid out of Miss Myrna Mix. The colt collected \$74,784 out of the final purse of \$172,385. (The gross purse, which included two consolation races, amounted to \$221,575.)

Sail On Bunny handed out mutual payoffs of \$23.80, \$7.40, \$4.00. Call Caleb, owned by H. Don Farris and Don Keith of Sunland Park, collected \$30,789. The mutual returns: \$8.60, \$3.80. Sinnin and Grinnin, owned and trained by James Powell of Kerrville, Texas, earned \$14,402. Sinnin and Grinnin paid \$3.40 to show. The also-rans checked in this way: fourth—Flamboyan, earning \$10,192; fifth—Lucks Lucky, \$8,194; sixth—Deal The Cards, \$7,755; seventh—Bartendress, \$7,312; eighth—Heza Hombre, \$7,090; ninth—Reven Sissy, \$6,647.

Victory Doll, a filly owned by Clarence Scharbauer Jr. of Midland, Texas, qualified for the finale, but died two days prior to the race from an intestinal ailment.

Sail On Bunny covered the 330 yards in a headwind clocking of 16.87 seconds. He came out of the futurity with a record of two wins and a third from three starts.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

STEVE ASMUSSEN, from the well known Laredo, Texas, family of horse enthusiasts, rode his first horse on a recognized pari-mutuel horse track when he piloted Canadian Laredoan in Saturday's sixth race at Sunland Park. The 16-year-old apprentice jockey guided the two-year-old colt to a third place finish as a second favorite. A native of Gettysburg, South Dakota, Steve is following in the footsteps of older brother, Cash, who broke his maiden on April 4, 1978, at Sunland Park. Cash, now one of the country's premier jockeys, is enjoying a successful meet at Santa Anita Park near Los Angeles, California. He received the 1979 Eclipse Award as the nation's outstanding apprentice jockey. Sis Amussen, the brothers' mother, is a prominent Southwestern horsewoman and trainer who has been a successful trainer of race horses throughout the Texas circuit as well as at Ruidoso Downs. Father Keith is an outstanding veteran jockey. CBS News recently conducted extensive interviews with the Asmusens at Laredo and Cash at Santa Anita for use on a Sunday morning news program.

VICTORY DOLL, who qualified for the \$221,575 West Texas Futurity on Sunday, died Friday morning of an intestine infection. The two-year-old Victory Stride filly was trained by H. Don Farris for owner Clarence Scharbauer Jr. of Midland, Texas. She posted a nose victory in her only race when she nipped Captain Blackthorn in the fourth West Texas Futurity trial race on March 12.

RUIDOSO DOWNS received considerable attention this month in England. A lengthy article—supported by 10 color photos and four black-and-white appeared in the March 14 issue of the magazine supplement of the distinguished London Sunday Times. The article, which profiles Special Effort's conquest of last summer's Triple Crown races for two-year-olds, was written by Times staffer Dudley Doust. During Labor Day weekend, Doust, accompanied by a Times photographer, spent three days in Ruidoso doing interviews and researching the All-American Futurity.

BEAU PERE'S LOOM, a three-year-old Loom colt, remained undefeated by scoring a widening three-and-three-quarter-length triumph over Tina Serina in Saturday's ninth race, a five-and-one-half-furlong chase for sophomores running under allowance conditions. Beau Pere's Loom started his career by roaring to a four-length win in a five-and-one-half-furlong maiden race at Sunland Park on January 24. He then rallied for a half-length verdict over Germeo in a six-furlong allowance race on February 23. He's trained by Bob Arnett for owner Louise P. Slentz of Pampa, Texas. Don Howard rode him to the maiden win while Victor Escobar took him to his second win and Richard Bickel was aboard in Saturday's victory.

SUNLAND PARK HOSTED 15 finalists in the Miss El Paso Pageant by naming the seventh race in their honor. The Miss El Paso Contest is scheduled for Saturday, April 10.

VETERAN ANNOUNCER Harry Henson returned to Sunland park for a Sunday visit. The dapper-looking Henson is recover-

ing nicely from hip replacement surgery. He will spend a little time in the El Paso area before returning to Los Angeles where he will again announce the Hollywood Park horse races. Henson spent many years calling the races and working the racing office at Sunland Park.

APPRENTICE MIKE LIBBERG steered three winners on Friday's program. He started with Laura Favor (\$11.40) in the second race for trainer-owner Kenneth M. Grisham, then won aboard Rons Tonto Dancer (\$7.60) for trainer Wayne A. Stanton before winning on Pal's Reason (\$7.20) for trainer Ralph S. Henson in the 12th race.


