# Mayor, trustees in truce

## Tuesday gasspill a tense situation

A tanker truck spilled an estimated 1,800 gallons of gasoline behind the midtown 7-11 store onto Wingfield Drive Tuesday afternoon after a valve under the rig was jarred loose.

The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD) confined most of the spill to a large puddle that covered the breadth of Wingfield, but before cleanup crews arrived on the scene, some of the gas ran down a drainage on the east side of the store and into a culvert under Sudderth Drive.

United States Forest Service (USFS) personnel erected a temporary sand levee below the culvert shortly after the spill and were able to stop the flow of gasoline before it continued down the arroyo adjacent to King's Package Store and into Rio Ruidoso.

It was a tense afternoon at the accident site as RVFD, a USFS tanker crew, Smokey Bear Hot Shots and the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) labored to avoid a disaster.

"Any minor circumstance could have led into a major disaster," Ruidoso policeman Jim Alston said, and praised fireman Danny Garcia for his leadership and expertise in averting trouble on the site.

Store employee Karen Flynn said the Whitfield Tank Lines truck out of El Paso, Texas, arrived about 1:30 p.m. She said driver Juan DeLaRosa entered the 7-11 and asked her where he should pull up to make his delivery. She said she told him that delivery trucks "usually park" directly behind the pumps facing Sudderth in the store parking lot.

The Bureau of Elections in Santa Fe was notified Monday of a preliminary injunction filed by the U.S. District Court suspending the date of filing for House of Representatives seats indefinitely, according to Virginia Thompson of the Bureau of Elections.

A consolidation of five suits questioning the constitutionality of the formula used to arrive at precinct population was filed and has been heard by a three-judge federal court, according to Richard Folmar, assistant director of legislative counsel services in Santa Fe.

The Bureau of Elections will not accept any filings for House seats until notified of a decision by the court. Folmar said there is no way to tell when a decision will be rendered by the judges.

A special meeting of the Ruidoso trustees Tuesday afternoon ended on a note of cooperation, but not before Mayor George White was further criticized for his actions since taking office March 10.

"If they'll cooperate with me, I'll cooperate with them," was White's final statement.

At the start of the meeting, White read a statement which said the meeting had been called by the four trustees: Frank Sayer, Benny Coulston, Al Junge and Don Dale. Coulston was absent.

Purpose of the meeting was given as discussion and implementation of acquisition of land for the proposed water storage reservoir at Grindstone Canyon, and discussion of personnel.

Justification for the closed session was that it involved discussion of a purchase of over \$2,500 value which is available from a single source.

The board then adjourned into executive session with Don Dorman, owner of the 32 acres under consideration for purchase.

White left the chambers shortly thereafter. "I invited myself out," he said. The mayor said he felt that what was being discussed was public information, and that the asking price for the land (roughly \$500,000) was already known to the trustees.

"Everything was in order—and now it's all secret," said White.

After slightly more than an hour, the meeting reconvened in open session. Village attorney Lee Huckstep said that personnel was not discussed in the executive session, and advised the mayor to announce that no action was taken during the closed meeting.

Sayer said that he wanted to deal with the "confusion" of the March 30 meeting, at which he read a statement critical of White's involvement in village personnel matters. He asked for clarification on two temporary employees approved by White.

Village manager Jim Hine said he had suggested the two employees be hired. "At no time did I tell either one of those that they were hired," said White.

"I recommend that we pay them and that they continue working," said Hine. A motion to do so carried.

Sayer then brought up charge accounts at the airport, which he claimed at the previous meeting had been ordered ceased by White. He said that only delinquent accounts should be closed.

White said this was his intent. "It was only a suggestion," he said. "It was not an order in any way, shape, form or manner."

Junge said that the mayor had no right to act, and that whether White had made an implication, suggestion, or whatever,

the important thing was that "the man who was making it had no business making it."

"We individually cannot change policy of the city," said Sayer. He said that policy change has to be done by the board by vote, and that everything revolves around this point—that the broad powers of the mayor are subject to advice and consent of the council.

"We have a city manager to run the city," said Dale. He said that he thinks it is great that the mayor has an office and keeps hours, and that if White has ideas, he can bring them to the council for consideration.

"I guess what we're asking," Sayer said to White, "is whether you'll go along with that same belief or not."

White pointed out that he has been laboring under two policies regarding personnel during his "transition period." These are the state statutes setting forth the powers of the mayor and the village Merit System Ordinance, which took effect March 22.

Of the latter, White said, "It's taken my powers away from me."

He then asked the trustees for direction on certain items, including a matter of trustees receiving a pay increase to which they might not have been entitled under state law.

In January of 1980, White noted, the pay for a trustee was raised from \$40 to \$250 per month. According to the law, he said, persons in office cannot raise their pay while in office.

"I would never have advised the village back in 1980 to do this," said Huckstep, who was not village attorney at that time. He said that he felt he could successfully defend the action in court if he was required to, however, and cited a 1968 ruling from the state Attorney General which he thinks would weigh in favor of the increases.

His second argument, Huckstep said, would be to appeal to a court's sense of fairness. "It's a mighty silly village that comes back two years later and wants the bucks back from something that may or may not be illegal," he said.

Hine said that he got an okay from state official Al Romero before implementing the pay raises.

The question of personnel came up again when Junge asked whether White's designation of planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp as village purchasing agent in place of Frank Potter required approval by the trustees.

Huckstep said that Potter could delegate the duty, but that it was subject to review by the governing body. Huckstep added that the village needs to appoint a personnel officer to effect the personnel (merit system) ordinance.

## County commissioners discuss forest access

Public access versus private rights was the main topic of discussion at Tuesday's County Commissioners meeting, following a request by Bob Burnett, vice president of the New Mexico Wildlife Federation, to reopen county Road 441, which was closed by Sid Goodloe.

The road in question, located between Carrizozo and Capitan, provides access to national forest land and runs through Goodloe's property. Goodloe closed the road, he reported at the meeting, when traffic got heavy. He said people began to use the road, which runs between his barn and his house, to get to the forest, and he

once found people bar-b-queing on his property.

"It is not on any county map as a county road," said Goodloe.

Burnett said the road has been in existence for more than 50 years and was a county road when the Goodloe ranch was purchased. He said the United States Forest Service has an obligation to the public to maintain access to the forest.

Smokey Bear District Ranger Paul Gordon reported that the forest area is important as a source of fuelwood and as an area of possible oil and gas leasing and coal mining, as well as for hunting.

"We would like to have access somewhere in the general area," he said. "The only other access to the forest area,

It was pointed out that the ordinance differentiates between the village manager and the personnel officer. Junge asked Hine to hold down both jobs for now, and to give a recommendation on someone to fill the personnel job.

"The personnel officer could be a good, responsible woman," said Junge. "What I mean is, it's not a cabinet level position."

Duties of the position were described as taking applications, receiving lists of employees recommended for merit pay raises by department heads, keeping track of sick leave, and generally carrying out the mechanical direction of the personnel system as defined by the ordinance.

Hine noted that personnel director will not be a full-time job in itself, and that his recommendation will come from within the present ranks of employees.

The board then confirmed Sarah Crossley as village clerk and Debi Samuelson as deputy clerk. Budget workshop sessions were discussed, and it was agreed they will begin shortly.

Junge then addressed White. "Basically, I think you're a smart man, but since the election I don't think you've been too smart," said Junge.

Junge pointed out that he and White had been "thrown together by camps" in the recent election campaign. He said he had told White that one thing that was wrong was to walk out of or refuse to attend meetings.

"Walking never does anybody any good under any circumstances," said Junge. He alluded to a remark made by White to The News concerning the mayor's role in hiring, firing and supervision of personnel.

Junge indicated that those remarks had been a cause of concern to village employees. "We had a lot of people over here that were tremendously unhappy," he said.

He said that he "literally begged" White to discuss matters privately with the trustees prior to the March 30 meeting.

"The voters were not entitled to all the problems they have had," said Junge.

He pointed to the fact that he, Sayer and Coulston were able to agree in a matter of hours on Dale filling the vacant trustee's seat as evidence of what cooperation can accomplish.

Junge said that the incident with Sayer would never have happened if White had agreed to a private meeting. He noted that White might have had a reason not to meet privately, but that to him, White was just "being ornery."

"You told me you had a mandate," Junge said to White. He then told the mayor that no one will ever know how many people voted for White and how many voted against the man he unseated.

"All you're doing with an attitude like that is putting another Berlin Wall up between the group," Junge said. He added that White's refusal to attend that day's closed session showed that he had not changed, except to "let Jim Hine run the village."

"It was bad politics or bad personnel handling to cram that down people's throats," said Junge, referring to White's involvement in personnel.

Junge told White that the council is prepared to give White 100 percent cooperation, but he called White's rebuttal to Sayer published in Monday's Ruidoso News "a con job and a political ripoff."

Junge stated that he hoped everyone could shake hands and walk out of the meeting in cooperation.

"I don't appreciate chastisement in public again," said White. He told Junge that all Junge had done was "open a can of worms."

"Then I closed it," said Junge. He said that people had said of White's rebuttal to Sayer that the rebuttal did not say anything.

"Then why chastise me?" said White. "Because people deserved an answer to Sayer's charges," said Junge.

The group then discussed its proposed one-hour study sessions, to take place beginning at 6:30 p.m., before regular meetings.

Regarding the closed meeting earlier, White said, "I have been opposed to executive sessions and I'm still opposed. Whatever we have to say, we have to say in public, because we belong to the public."

As for Junge's remarks, White said he was not going to rebut them.

"We're prepared to cooperate with you if you'll let us," said Junge.

White expressed concern that the study sessions will be executive sessions.

Junge said White told him, "You can have all the meetings you want, I'm not going to attend."

"That's still my position," White said.

Dale said that White should be allowed to express his opinion.

"I don't like it and I'm expressing my opinion," said White.

The mayor then remarked "that I have been chastised publicly—I hope that their conscience will let them sleep tonight. I know I've been relegated through the personnel ordinance—the mayor has no power to hire, fire, supervise—it is left to the administrative staff. I hope the administrative people and the trustees will take all the criticisms and gripes that come to the mayor's office."

In conclusion, White said, "If they'll cooperate with me, I'll cooperate with them."

## EMS looking to improvements

The new head of the Ruidoso Emergency Medical Service (EMS) is looking forward to better cooperation with the village and improvements within the service.

EMS director Rick Gustafson said Friday the state of the ambulance service and its relationship with the village is "better than it was" before former director Matt Jakusz resigned three weeks ago.

Jakusz resigned after he made public his dissatisfaction with what he termed a lack of interest in EMS by village officials.

But Gustafson and members of his staff told The News there already have been changes made to improve the ambulance service.

EMS has acquired a used four-wheel-drive truck from the police department to operate as a rescue vehicle. Also, life-saving equipment formerly carried in a rescue vehicle is now stored in rear compartments on the two ambulances so that the gear is on hand when crews need it. Gustafson noted that this enables EMS to keep the rescue truck on standby instead of having it respond to every emergency call, since it is often not needed.

The rescue equipment referred to by Gustafson is part of a full complement of life-saving gear carried on each ambulance. It includes hydraulically operated "jaws of life" and portable motors to run them, Stokes mountain rescue stretchers, climbing ropes, axes and other extrication gear.

Gustafson noted that the rescue and extrication equipment is not always needed on ambulance calls, but it is "nice to have available" when needed.

Rita Robertson, an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) with EMS, said the jaws of life are especially helpful in freeing auto accident victims.

Robertson said the heavy alligator-like jaws with their 20,000 pounds lifting force can tear open crumpled metal in a fraction of the time it takes with conventional hammers, saws and chisels. She said she doesn't know how many saved lives can be attributed to the jaws, but they help reduce the time it takes EMS rescuers to reach victims.

Most of the seven employees are qualified to use the lifesaving equipment carried on the ambulances.

The two state inspected units carry stretchers, oxygen tanks, intravenous supplies, splints, collars, burn packs, general first-aid kits and other life support equipment. Among their most modern supplies are medical anti-shock trousers that inflate around a patient's torso to force fluids into vital organs.

Gustafson said EMS rescue crews are in constant contact with the Ruidoso Honda Valley Hospital (RHVH) during emergencies in case treatment needs to be authorized.

He said administration of intravenous (IV) fluids is one treatment that needs approval by the hospital. Five members of EMS are qualified as Advanced Life Support (ALS) technicians to start IVs. The

other two EMTs are not legally trained to administer IVs but, Gustafson added, EMS personnel will always try to save lives, even if their procedures cannot always be approved by the hospital.

The four EMS members said Friday there are also things the public can do to help save lives. One lifesaving procedure that EMS advises the public to learn is cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

Pat Williamson, an ALS technician, said, "If the public learned CPR, it would save a lot of lives." She said emergency crews are not always able to reach heart attack victims in time to save their lives, and that persons are often stricken when someone is standing by who has no knowledge of CPR.

But, EMS members also advise leaving injured persons alone if one is unfamiliar with proper lifesaving procedures. Jim Wheeler, an EMS member since September, said television often gives people a false impression they can save lives. He said persons can do more harm than good to a victim if improper techniques are used.

Robertson advised that "if you don't know what you are doing, then don't touch." She said if a victim is in immediate danger, then help out, but only to get the person out of danger.

Gustafson said EMS will respond to calls in a 50-mile radius from Ruidoso and if patients need treatment not available at RHVH, EMS will transfer them to other hospitals.

He said the emergency service can ar-

rive at a location within village limits in four minutes providing the dispatcher receives detailed directions and the access is not too steep.

"This is a hard city to get around in," said Wheeler.

Robertson said the lack of house numbers and street signs in parts of Ruidoso makes it difficult for emergency vehicles to find a location if the police dispatcher receives unclear directions. Because of this, Robertson said, the dispatcher asks the caller for a phone number in case EMS has trouble finding a location.

Another thing that sometimes slows EMS response to a call is the size of the ambulances. Gustafson said the ponderous units are designed for relatively flat terrain and therefore have trouble negotiating the hilly streets in Ruidoso. Robertson said she is often embarrassed climbing hills at five miles per hour with sirens squealing while other vehicles pass her.

Gustafson said he hopes the village will approve purchase of a smaller four-wheel-drive ambulance that has more power than the present units and gets substantially better gas mileage.

The purchase request was scheduled for the trustees' March 30 meeting but, because of a full agenda, it was postponed until the next meeting, Gustafson said.

The new director said he expects problems "once in a while" in the organization, but the main thing is that EMS "looks after its patients."

# Gas spill contained by village, Forest Service crews

DeLaRosa then returned to his truck, she said, and the next thing she knew an accident had occurred.

DeLaRosa told The News following the accident that he was driving up the incline next to the store to turn around and line up properly with the filler pipes. As he climbed the crest of the small incline on Wingfield, he said, the truck chassis caught an "internal discharge valve" and broke it off. At that point, gasoline began surging out of a full compartment and

DeLaRosa apparently leveled the rig on the street.

All four 1,800 gallon compartments were full on the delivery truck, DeLaRosa said.

A witness, who declined to give his name, said he was in his daughter's house near the accident scene. He said he heard the "motor on the truck running wide open, and gas was pouring out as the driver tried to kill the engine." He added that "tankers never come around the top" of the 7-11 store.

DeLaRosa said it was his first time delivering gasoline to the midtown store.

He said he immediately called the fire department and Garcia was on the scene within five minutes.

Garcia ordered sand trucks to respond to the spill and by 2 p.m. the liquid running

down the small drainage gutter was halted. Only about 75-100 gallons collected behind the culvert on Sudderth, said USFS member Jim Snow.

Garcia returned to the spill behind the store and began spraying a mixture of AFFF (Aqueous Film Forming Formula) and water on the spill to stifle combustibility of the gasoline.

Garcia said as soon as he blanketed the spill with the foam, the danger of the gasoline igniting was over. The fireman also said he had power in the store turned off to assure electricity would not ignite the spillage.

Policeman Robert Jarvis of RPD said no nearby residences were evacuated after the spill.

After the gasoline was covered by foam, RVFD called in four eight-yard dump trucks loaded with sand. RVFD, along with USFS and Hot Shot crews, shoveled it onto the spill to absorb the fuel.

They later filled the man-made dam below the culvert on Sudderth to also absorb that gasoline. Smith said shortly after the accident that the runoff was stopped before it got to the river.

Wednesday morning, RVFD called in sewage disposal trucks and pumped out the substance below the Sudderth culvert. Ruidoso fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy said Whitfield Tank Lines will be responsible for clearing out the layer of sand behind the 7-11 on Wingfield Drive. Cuddy also explained that the substance was no longer dangerous.

In addition, Cuddy said Whitfield will "definitely pay for" the costs incurred for the accident and cleanup.

A small amount of gasoline seeped into the Rio Ruidoso Wednesday morning, according to one observer.

Jim Edwards of the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) reported some of the gasoline ran into the Rio Ruidoso after an early morning rain Wednesday.

Edwards said he woke to the sound of rain and he "knew (the diluted gasoline) would spill." He said he arrived at the culvert under Sudderth Drive shortly after 6 a.m. and found that a puddle of water had formed over the sand that was dumped Tuesday to absorb the gasoline.

Edwards said the water was pushed through the trench in the sand, and a small flow was leading down the river. He explained that he would have to know the water going into the river and he blocked the culvert leading to the river to contain the flow.

About that time, he said he was ordered to plug the trench in the sand, and Sudderth and the runoff soon stopped.

Rueben Gonzalez of the Santa Fe and Fish Department said an investigation from the department's Roswell office will be driving to Ruidoso to monitor the spill and "see if there are any effects on the life from the spill."

## P&Z tables request on conditional use

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) decided Monday to seek legal advice concerning a conditional use request to permit a go-kart track in Skyland Addition.

P&Z tabled the request to alter the site off Carrizo Canyon Road until it receives legal opinion on a conflicting definition of the nature of the proposed operation.

In his application for a change in the use of the property, Ruidoso businessman Ralph Rush requested P&Z permission to construct a "Kiddy Car Ride," on the 1.75 acre site which now includes a pond for children's boat rides.

Rush defined the operation as a "go-kart" track in a January letter to P&Z requesting consideration for the change. Thus confusion in definition of the track led P&Z to call for legal advice on the matter.

The problem revolves around P&Z ordinances regarding conditions for amusement enterprises. According to one ordinance, a go-kart track must be situated on at least three acres and be 1,000 feet away from any dwellings. Rush's property does not meet those specifications.

However, the site does meet specifications for a "Kiddieland" amusement park. According to that portion of the ordinance,

no conditions are set regarding land size and rides need be only 300 feet away from dwellings. Rush argued that his operation would meet kiddieland guidelines because the "Indy-style" karts he plans to use reach a top speed of 20 miles per hour, which he contended is slower than standard go-karts.

P&Z members were evidently not satisfied with Rush's argument. Mike Mulholland referred to the apparent conflict between Rush's application and his letter and asked that the request be tabled until P&Z obtains legal advice on the matter.

"I want a legal opinion on whether it is a kart track or not," Mulholland said. "If it is a kart track, then we have a problem of nonconformance."

P&Z tabled the request in order to seek an attorney's advice on the change and informed Rush he would have to wait until P&Z's next meeting in May for a decision.

Following P&Z's other business, Rush returned with a proposal to locate the track on three acres of land he said he had permission to lease from an adjacent property owner at the same location and he asked the commission to rule on his request before May.

"Time is of the essence," Rush said. He criticized P&Z for delaying his request since January, when he submitted the letter to the commission. With tourist season

approaching, Rush said, he wants the track in operation as soon as possible.

Mulholland moved to hold special meeting before May providing P&Z gets the legal opinion and proper notification is sent to adjacent property owners. P&Z approved the motion.

In other action, the commission:

- Tabled a request by Manny Badillo for a P&Z opinion on whether the commission would approve a planned development in Green Meadows of single family residences to be sold as time share dwellings.
- Badillo, who represented the developers, said purchase of the property was contingent on a favorable opinion by P&Z on the plan. P&Z member Alden Deyo said, "Zoning ordinances are silent on owning or renting" dwellings that are acceptable under R-1 (single-family residential) guidelines. But P&Z chairman John Schuller expressed concern that the plan classifies the development as a commercial enterprise, which would not be allowed in an R-1 district. The commission tabled the request to seek a legal opinion.
- Approved replat of lots 365 and 366 in Skyland Addition.
- Approved final plat of the Hoyt Apartments in the High Sites Subdivision after hearing arguments from several adjacent property owners against the project.

The proposed apartments are to be

located on a cul-de-sac near the Ruidoso Care Center. The four buildings will occupy two lots and include a total of 13 rental units.

Several adjacent property owners, most of whom said they were advised by Realtors that the area was zoned R-1, which would preclude construction of multi-family units, complained the apartments would crowd the cul-de-sac and deflate property values in the area.

Engineer Tim Collins said the area had been rezoned to R-2 (multi-family residential) six months ago.

Ruidoso fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy argued that the plat did not include enough fire hydrants. The area has one existing hydrant but Cuddy said it should be served by three with addition of the apartment buildings. P&Z approved the plat contingent upon placement of another hydrant in the area.

- Approved preliminary plat of Whispering Pines, Lot 1, Block 4, on Camelot Mountain.
- Tabled replat of lots 19, 20 and 23 in block 35 of Ponderosa Heights for lack of information.
- Tabled preliminary plat of Vista Del Lago, Lots 14 and 15, Block 1 of Camelot Mountain Tracts.
- Approved final plat of Edelweiss Resort Village, Units 1, 2 and 3 in section 32.

## Operation Trash planning underway

The last two weeks of April have been set aside by ComFIRE (Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment) for "Operation Trash," said ComFIRE spokesperson Barbara Duff.

She said Operation Trash is a vitally needed project combining a community clean-up with fire prevention measures as fire season is upon Ruidoso.

Ruidoso fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy appointed members to coordinate the local campaign. The group includes service clubs, students, the Salvation Army and the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs fire departments to make Operation Trash a community effort.

Duff recommended that interested parties assist in the cleanup and watch for further details.

"It is not our intent to disrupt his ranching situation whatsoever," Burnett said. Lietzman said, "I think we all have a problem we'd like to solve without stepping on anybody's toes."

He suggested that the best solution would be to open an alternate road not going through private property. Lietzman reported that he and Gordon have been exploring possible alternate routes, including one through Indian Divide.

Gordon agreed that he and Lietzman planned to investigate an alternate proposal Wednesday.

"My only concern is to see that the public has access," commissioner Ben Hall said.

"I don't like the idea of a road going through your property or Goodloe's either," he said to Lietzman. He also said, "I don't believe in locking people out of public lands."

Hall stated he has no objection whatsoever to an alternate access.

Commissioner John Hightower expressed his belief that private property rights in this country are "under siege."

"The weekenders are going to take us over," he said.

The two commissioners decided to table the matter until possible alternate access routes to be studied by Lietzman and Gordon can be reviewed.

Hall said possibly an alternate access can be opened, and both Lietzman and Goodloe will be able to close their roads.

Earl Cook, representing Gordon Herkenhoff and Associates, Albuquerque, was present to discuss offering more extensive engineering services related to construction of subdivision roads.

He reported that reviewing construction of roads as it occurs rather than only after completion would diminish county road maintenance costs.

Cook proposed that a civil engineer review plans for roads and materials to be used in construction and the construction process, and conduct a final review following construction.

He expressed the firm's interest in a contract relationship with the county for such services, although it was agreed the contract would be one of definition, with no authority.

The commissioners moved that a contract be prepared for their examination at the next meeting.

Also present was Hubert Quintana, from the Economic Development District (EDD), who reviewed local progress of the federally funded housing program.

He said 18 of 25 houses to be constructed are completed or under contract.

"I think we've accomplished the thing

we wanted to do," he said.

Quintana reported that the housing program anticipates being funded by the federal government for the future, as "we are losing" federal funding at this point.

About \$30,000 will be available to the state through the state planning act, and about \$30,000 will be provided from counties and municipalities in the district for services provided by EDD, Quintana stated.

He said the fee structure for the state and municipalities will remain the same, although charges to some municipalities will change. Ruidoso's fees will be reduced but charges to Carrizozo will also be reduced, he reported.

He said sufficient funds will be available through the state and district to continue EDD services and fund some of the costs by for this area in Santa Fe County.

"I very much encourage the community to participate at least one year," Quintana said.

In other business, commissioner Burnett:

- Granted a request to vacate Block 1, from Sweetwater Hill Subdivision.
- Accepted roads in Little Rock Hill Subdivision, Units 1 and 2, for maintenance, following review by county road superintendent.
- Demeu request by Rancho Ruidoso to allow Stanton Corporation to use travel lease at Fort Stanton. It was determined Rancho Ruidoso could supply the water from the pit to Stanton Corporation and would not transfer the lease.
- Approved tentative budget schedule.
- Suggested a letter of thanks be sent to Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt for his efforts in getting the county \$1 million from them by Federal Emergency Management Funds for disaster relief from the 1979 flood.
- Decided they would discuss with the sheriff a request by Jim Woodbridge to hook up his wrecker service to the sheriff's department frequency.
- Reported that Alto has donated to the county a new four-wheel drive fire truck they purchased for \$58,000 through donations.
- Heard a report from County Manager Truman A. "Bill" Billingsley that Ruidoso Downs has requested the county put a volunteer fire department at Glendon, between Hondo and Ruidoso Downs, as Ruidoso Downs Fire Department currently responds to fires outside its jurisdiction because Hondo is unable to reach the area quickly. Billingsley reported that the possibility of a mutual aid assistance between all area municipal fire departments is currently being researched.

## Merchants question high gasoline prices

The Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) of the Chamber of Commerce Monday decided to send letters to local gasoline distributors inviting them to discuss the high price of gas in Ruidoso.

"We've done nothing on gasoline prices," said Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. However, Morgan Clough stated that RMC must keep the issue in the limelight to try to keep prices in parity with surrounding communities.

"We're trying to help the tourists out," said Clough. He noted that RMC has no intention of regulating prices, but added that price fixing is immoral and illegal and should be investigated.

Phony excuses of higher freight costs and the fact that Ruidoso is a resort town will not suffice as explanations for Ruidoso's high price of gas, added Clough.

RMC president Larry Langford commented that many Ruidosians leave town with empty gas tanks and fill up in Alamogordo or Roswell to avoid the high price of Ruidoso gas.

In other RMC business, Janet Goodwin was elected to replace Herb Brunell for a three-year term on the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) ad hoc committee. Clough is the chairman of the eight-member committee comprised of two

representatives each from RMC, Lincoln County Home Builders Association, Board of Realtors and the community at large.

Clough said the committee, which serves P&Z in an advisory capacity, will take up traffic and parking problems in the midtown area. He mentioned that a convention center will not be discussed yet because the midtown parking and traffic problems deserve the immediate attention of P&Z.

"The village has serious problems that it will have to solve in the next few years concerning parking, traffic, convention center, et cetera," Clough said. He added that the committee is not a coffee drinking bull session, but a serious study group which meets once a month. In addition, ad hoc committee members must attend various secondary committee meetings.

Recently installed RMC members were present at Monday's meeting for the first time. They included Goodwin, Healy and

Nancy Shaver. Gary Anderson was not present.

"Your immediate input is desired. You were elected to RMC because we feel you will be an asset to this committee," said Langford.

Healy suggested that a glossary of useful Spanish terms and phrases be made for local merchants since there will be no basic conversational Spanish course offered by the Chamber. Healy said either a general glossary could be compiled, or a glossary of specific terms for specific businesses. Jungbluth said he would pursue the idea with Lynda Sanchez, who teaches Spanish.

Shaver and Jerry Shaw volunteered to investigate the possibilities of selecting an Aspen Festival Queen during the fall festival. The queen would represent Ruidoso at the Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas, as the Aspencade Queen has done in the past.

Jungbluth listed the various Aspen Festival '82 activities being planned. It was decided that a theme for the festival is needed now. Anyone with ideas for the festival theme should make suggestions to Chamber or RMC directors, or call the Chamber of Commerce at 257-7395.

In conclusion, Jungbluth said, "The Chamber has grown to the degree that a third, full-time staff person has been hired. She starts next week."

Ed Jungbluth reported that 210 dozen (2,520) eggs were boiled for the Easter egg hunt that starts at 11 a.m. at Cedar Creek picnic grounds. He said only 15 dozen eggs were lost in Sunday's egg-boiling marathon, as opposed to an average of 30 dozen eggs cracked in the past.

The kids will leave the starting lines and attempt to locate hard boiled, prize and candy Easter eggs. He noted that there will be three age group areas for the kids, providing ample opportunity for finding eggs.

State law requires that pets be vaccinated against rabies, and a village ordinance requires that dogs and cats be licensed, said animal control officer Jack Sniadecki.

Licenses may be obtained from Sniadecki, but he added that licenses are also issued through the mail.

To receive a license for a dog or cat, said Sniadecki, list the following: owner's name, address and telephone number;

pet's name, age, description and color; date pet was vaccinated and who vaccinated it and their telephone number; vaccination tag number; and whether the animal has been spayed or neutered.

Sniadecki said dog licenses cost \$10 for

fertile dogs and \$5 for spayed or neutered dogs. Licenses are \$5 for fertile cats and \$2.50 for spayed or neutered cats.

For a license, said Sniadecki, send a check or money order to Animal Control, P.O. Box 905, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.



### COMMON DISEASES OF DOGS External Parasites

Fleas are not prevalent in New Mexico compared with most areas of the country. The altitude and dry climate may be a limiting factor in the incidence of dog fleas in New Mexico. Fleas are easily controlled by the use of flea powders, sprays and in some instances, flea collars. Dogs that roam in areas infested with plague-infested rodents should be powdered for fleas at least weekly to prevent infestation with rodent fleas. The dog may act as a carrier of plague-infested rodent fleas to humans. Contrary to popular opinion, fleas are not the most common cause for a dog to scratch. Allergies and dry coat are more common causes.

Ticks are a common parasite in many areas of New Mexico. Dog ticks are dif-

ficult to eliminate if they infest homes, kennels, animal shelters or dog pounds. It is usually necessary to employ professional pest exterminators to eliminate and control ticks in infested premises. Dog ticks do not transmit disease and do not normally attach to humans. Ticks suck blood and a heavy infestation may cause anemia.

Lice are occasionally seen in New Mexico. There are two types of lice—the biting louse and the sucking louse. Sucking lice are most frequent. Lice can usually be eliminated by two to three dips in an appropriate insecticide solution at 10-day intervals. Dog lice are not contagious to humans.

national competition before. He competed with Ted Kennedy Jr. in the junior men's division.




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
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
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# Around Sports

College basketball has just concluded its season and pro basketball still has the playoffs ahead, but many sports fans in the country are now turning their eyes to the baseball season which started this week.

Unlike the National Football League, parity has not yet come to major league baseball. Nor is it likely to in the near future. The clubs with the most money still control the free agent market and thus dominate the standings.

Here are my predictions for the major leagues this season. I'm hoping they come out better than my NFL predictions did. I had Dallas winning the National Conference (NFC) and Oakland winning the American Conference (AFC). The Cowboys lost to San Francisco in the NFC finals and the Raiders didn't even make the playoffs.

The National League Eastern Division is possibly the toughest division in baseball. Where else could a team like the Philadelphia Phillies finish third. That's where I see them ending up this season.

I see Montreal winning the division. The Expos have good pitching, some strong hitting, excellent defense and speed and the best catcher in baseball in Gary Carter.

St. Louis should edge out the Phillies for second. The Cardinals were tough in the second half season last year and have some superb talent.

The Phillies still have excellent talent with pitcher Steve Carleton and Mike Schmidt, probably the most valuable player in the game. However, they're getting up into middle age and who knows how much longer Pete Rose will be effective.

The New York Mets could be the most improved team in the division, mainly because of George Foster, picked up from Cincinnati. They've got a strong outfield and their pitching is improving. They should beat out Chicago and Pittsburgh.

The Cubs acquired shortstop Larry Bowa from the Phillies during the off season and also have an excellent player in Bill Buckner. They've got a young team with some bright pitching prospects. They won't be a season-long contender but they'll beat out the Pirates and should get better as the season gets along.

Pittsburgh is destined for the cellar. Dave Parker doesn't want to play for the Pirates or their fans anymore and that could have a negative effect on this once powerful team's play.

The National League Western Division should be a three-team race between the Astros, Dodgers and Reds.

So what else is new? Those three teams have dominated the division for the past 10 years, as have the other three teams in the division but not one division title in that time.

I see the Astros edging out the Dodgers for the title, probably in the last weekend of the season.

Houston still has perhaps the best pitching staff in baseball and playing in their huge indoor stadium is a big advantage for their pitchers and defensive lineup. Even their hitters can take advantage of the stadium.

The Dodgers are the defending world champions but don't look for them to repeat. Most of their starters are at least 32 years old and have probably seen their best days. The other teams will probably point for them since they are the defending champions and that isn't a factor in their favor.

The Reds lost Foster, Ray Knight, Dave Collins and Ken Griffey during the off season and don't figure to repeat their 1981 performance, when they had the best overall record in baseball but didn't make the playoffs. Still, they should have enough to beat out Atlanta and San Francisco.

Atlanta had the best record of any team in the exhibition season but what do practice games mean? Nothing. I see the Braves beating out the Giants for fourth, only because San Francisco traded away its entire starting pitching rotation in the latest example of insanity displayed by that club.

The Giants could have made a run at the top three clubs if they hadn't traded away Vida Blue and Doyle Alexander, their top pitchers from last year. They also gave up two other starting pitchers and Larry Herndon, their leading hitter of last season. They'll beat out San Diego only because their bullpen is still strong and they have the makings of an outstanding outfield.

The Padres have been the doormats of the division and perhaps all of baseball since they began their history in the last 1960s. They'll continue that tradition this season.

The American League Eastern Division will be a dogfight between the Yankees, Milwaukee, Baltimore, Detroit and Boston.

I see New York edging out the Brewers because of the Yankees' experience, their strong bullpen and the addition of Griffey and Collins, who were picked up from the Reds. Griffey and Collins will more than make up for the loss of 38-year-old Reggie Jackson to the Angels.

Milwaukee will challenge the Yankees for first and should beat off the challenge of Baltimore for second place. The Brewers don't really have a weakness and would probably win the American League West of National League West fairly easily if they played in those divisions.

Baltimore still has a strong pitching staff and the genius of manager Earl Weaver, who will manage his last season.

Detroit should edge out Boston for fourth place. The Tigers made a strong run at the second half division title last season, losing out in the last weekend to the Brewers.

Boston is an annual contender in the division but just doesn't have enough talent outside of Jim Rice to really challenge.

Cleveland could be the surprise team of the division but I doubt it. The Indians have been down so long they've forgotten what a winning season is like.

Toronto? What can I say. The Blue Jays should challenge San Diego and Seattle for the title of the worst team in baseball.

Look for Oakland to win out in a close race for the American League West title. The A's have one of baseball's best pitching staffs and one of the best managers in baseball in Billy Martin. They also have Tony Armas, Dwayne Murphy and Ricky Henderson together in the outfield. That trio can catch anything that isn't shot out of a cannon.

Kansas City should give the A's a tough battle for the division title. The Royals just may have won themselves the division when they picked up Blue from San Francisco. Blue had a 2.45 earned run average (ERA) last season and he still has one of the best fastballs around. Kansas City also has perhaps the best hitter in the game in George Brett.

California should finish third. Any team with Jackson, Fred Lynn, Bobby Grich, Rod Carew and Don Baylor playing for it has got to be reckoned with. Still, the Angels' mediocre pitching staff will prevent them from beating out Oakland and Kansas City.

Chicago is another team with excellent talent and an acute shortage of winning experience. The White Sox may have the best overall talent in the division but they don't have a Billy Martin, winning experience or the proven ability to hit in the clutch.

Texas is on the way down. That's too bad because they're popular with people in Ruidoso. The Rangers just don't have the all-around ability that the teams above them have. They've also been rated highly for several years and have failed to live up to those expectations.

Minnesota should beat out the Seattle Mariners for sixth place. The Twins have a decent pitching staff and not much else. Still, that should be enough to beat out the Mariners.

Seattle is improving but still has a long way to go. They had a better overall record than Minnesota last season but that's probably because of the split season.

Who do I see winning the playoffs and the World Series? Look for Oakland to edge the Yankees in five games for the American League title and Montreal to knock off Houston in six games for the National League crown.

In one of the better World Series of the past decade, I see Montreal edging Oakland in seven games.

Ruidoso High School's boys' track team will be virtually at full strength for the Dexter Invitational this afternoon and tonight.

The Warriors could be minus the services of two outstanding performers for the meet in sprinter-weightman Lon Nunley and distance runner Cisco Bob. Neither athlete was at yesterday's practice.

The rest of the team, however, should be at full strength for the invitational.

One possible change in the events could have Don Nunley and Eric Strobel taking

the place of Lon Nunley and Pefer Garcia in the 400 meter relay.

Garcia, who is also scheduled for the high jump, will compete in the 110 meter high hurdles and that comes right after the 400 meter relay.

If Bob isn't able to compete, the Warriors' distance race chances will be hurt. Bob is only a freshman but has already run the 1,500 meters in 4:30.1 twice this season. He also finished second in the 3,000 meters at the Deming Invitational with a 10:08.3 clocking.

Without Bob, Ruidoso's distance

chances would rest with David Landrum and eighth-grader David Ordorica.

Lon Nunley is one of the top discus throwers with a best mark of 157.9. He also has a 49-3 best in the shot put. The senior has run 11.31 in the 100 meters this season and has anchored the Warrior 400 meter relay team in both invitational meets this year.

Even without Lon Nunley and Bob the Warriors would seem to have a good chance at placing high in the meet. Most of the teams entered in the competition are AA and A teams.

Ruidoso's 1,600 meter relay team of Don Nunley, Strobel, Scott Neal and Grady Williamson took first at the Artesia five-team meet and second at Deming. Ruidoso won its heat at Deming but was second in the overall placings. The Warriors have a best mark of 3:39.7 in the event.

Junior Billy Woodul has a good shot at a high place in the javelin with a best of 150-6 this season. He threw the discus 136 feet at Deming for fifth place and should improve on that mark today.

Williamson also has a chance to do well in the open sprints. The speedy junior was second in the 200 meters at Deming with a 24.35 clocking. Williamson is a good starter and with gradual improvement could be

one of the top AAA division sprinters in the state by the end of the season.

In the field events, Garcia and Darin Smith both have personal bests of 5-6 in the high jump and will compete in that event today.

Chris Sanchez and Chip Ramsey will compete in the shot put and discus for Ruidoso. Without Nunley, the Warriors' chances for points in those events drop considerably.

Sophomore Tony Muse is the Warriors' top hope for honors in the long jump. He has a best of 17-4 in that event and has the ability to go over 18 feet in the next couple of weeks.

Warrior head coach Ronnie Maskew likes the track at Dexter.

"It's a pretty good track," he said. "It's a combination dirt and cinder track and it's faster than the track at Deming."

That should help the Warriors' chances for fast times, particularly in the sprint events.

The field events will start at 2:30 p.m. and the track events will begin at 3 p.m.

The Ruidoso girls will resume competition Friday, April 16 at the Roswell Invitational along with the boys. Some of the better AAAA and AAA teams in southern New Mexico will compete in that meet.

# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Name an agency of state government which reportedly keeps files on 70,000 New Mexicans.

Not Taxation and Revenue. No, they don't really keep individual files.

In this case, we are talking about an organization which is so secret that we the citizens who put up the money to keep it operating are not privileged to be told what it really does.

It's called the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission — and if it believes 70,000 New Mexicans, or roughly as many people as there are in Santa Fe county, have to be scrutinized for possible violations of the law having to do with organized crime, this group is very sick.

Do you know about "straw men"? Those are bugaboos which are created so that somebody can say, for instance, "We must now defend ourselves against..."

But do we have to spend \$700,000 this year doing it?

That's the current budget for this operation — a level of spending which was principally justified before the 1982 Legislature by demonstrating that the organization had raided a Santa Fe bar and broken up a heavy ring of bookies and other undesirables.

But is this operation to be like that of Toney Anaya when he was Attorney General? Are we to be impressed only by the up-front stuff that makes the newspaper pages? If we indict everybody but convict nobody, what have we really accomplished?

This writer would hope that the next time the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission comes before one or another legislative committee to establish its credentials, somebody will ask this simple question: "What in the world have you guys accomplished?"

Of course, for that question to be meaningful, somebody will first have to rule that it isn't fair to say, "We can't reveal any facts, because to do so would ruin one of our ongoing investigations."

One of the major problems with organizations of this kind (and many other states have also fallen into the trap of instituting them) is that they can't tell us what it is they are up to.

That we are expected to take on faith. Faith is a religious virtue. It doesn't apply to cops.

Especially right now, when here in our own state, where nobody has demonstrated the presence of anyone from organized crime, there seems to be plentiful evidence to suggest that policemen themselves are not without fault.

Why not, therefore, a Governor's Crime-Among-Policemen Prevention Commission? Why not some sort of organization to protect the honest citizen from the depredations of some rogue cops?

And if you believe police departments move as rapidly against those of their own members who are suspected of some wrongdoing as they move against those who have been targeted for them by the newspapers as being suspects, we've got a lovely lot in downtown Truth or Consequences we'd like to sell you.

It's too bad, but the guys with the badges don't view those of us who don't have badges as being their equals.

How did they put that in Albuquerque recently?

Didn't they call it "professional courtesy"?

Ask the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission to whom they have extended professional courtesy, and they'll tell you they can't say.

After all, everything they do is top secret.

As a taxpayer preparing to file your income tax return on April 15, I'm sure you'll share my outrage at the substantial tax bonanza that Congress voted itself late last year.

The next tax break allows Members of Congress to deduct \$75 per day for Washington living expenses — even if they're not in Washington or working on government business. What's more, they don't have to verify or substantiate their expenses.

For many members of Congress this would mean more than \$19,000 in additional tax deductions. It is estimated that this could mean members could end up paying little or no taxes.

This tax change was sneaked through Congress attached to the Black Lung Benefits Act with no committee considerations and little debate. At a time when the American people have been called on to make personal sacrifices, Congress has said, "Not for us."

### Editorial

It seems that we can expect a record for new construction starts in the Ruidoso area nearly every month. March saw single day and month records of \$1.33 million and \$3.7 million.

When you realize that these figures are based on a valuation of \$20 per square foot, while new construction costs are now around \$50 per square foot, they boggle the mind.

Take \$3.7 million and multiply it by 2.5 and you arrive at \$9.25 million as the actual value of the new construction started last month.

Let's take that money and build an imaginary neighborhood. This neighborhood has 40 new homes valued at \$100,000 each. It has two new condominium projects, each with 30 units valued at \$70,000 apiece.

It has eight new businesses. Five are relatively small, valued at \$100,000 each. Three are larger, valued at at nearly \$200,000 each.

As you can see, we are able to create a substantial neighborhood with our \$9.25 million. Being part of the village, this neighborhood is entitled to services such as police and fire protection, water and sewer, and streets.

The thing to remember is that although this neighborhood is imaginary, the fact that \$3.7 million in building permits were issued last month, and that this area will grow by about \$9.25 million worth of new construction as a result, is not.

Who knows what next month will bring?

Is anybody taking care of the planning to assure that services can keep up with growth?

Whether growth and change will be for better or worse is up to the citizens. Everyone has feelings on the direction they would like to see our community take.

We urge you to make your feelings known to elected and appointed officials.—TP

## On the village beat

Members of our editorial staff were able to sit in on some of the activities of the New Mexico Press Women convention held here last weekend.

Conventions are often stereotyped as excuses to get away and party, but they do provide an opportunity to talk with others in the same occupation.

My own limited experience has been that this usually provides new ideas and a dose of inspiration to take back to the job.

I spoke with outgoing NMPW president Sherry Robinson, incoming president Ellen Syvertson, and National Federation of Press Women president D. J. Cline.

Robinson is a free lance journalist who lives in Albuquerque. She is also a student at the University of New Mexico, working on a degree in (of all things) journalism.

"We have come a long way and we have a long way to go," said Sherry, when I asked her about her two years as president of the state organization. In that time, she stated, the group has grown larger, more active, more visible, more professional and more sophisticated.

Wondering if this improvement reflected an overall improvement of the status of press women in the state, I asked her about the status of press women in the state.

"It stinks," said Robinson. She pointed out that a statewide survey done by a professor at New Mexico State found that women journalists make 20 percent less money than their male counterparts.

According to her, the survey found no significant differences in education, ability, dedication, etc. to account for the pay gap, so a "lagging prejudice" in the industry was blamed.

Sherry acknowledged that there has been progress, though it has been slow. "The people who are coming behind us may have it a little easier," she said.

For the record, the editorial staff pay scale at The Ruidoso News is the same for men and women. The reason Barby Grant has to make the coffee when we're all burning the midnight oil here is that none of us has figured out how.

The new president of the state Press Women, Ellen Syvertson of Albuquerque, is also a student at UNM. She is working on a master's degree in business administration.

"I wanted to develop an expertise in business writing," was her answer to why she is working on an MBA.

In this respect, Ellen is typical of a new breed of journalist—one who works to

become an expert in a specific field in order to better report on it.

Finance and energy are two fields which are very "hot" right now, and last weekend's convention featured workshops on writing for both fields.

"I think that every general assignment reporter ought to find one area that they're very good at, develop it, and specialize—if the opportunity comes up," Ellen concluded.

Will Turbow is looking for a specialty, since he figured out that the present market for "nightlife commentators" is limited.

D. J. Cline is an associate professor of journalism at South Dakota State University. She spoke at the convention on "Responsibility of the Press," and was nice enough to share some thoughts on that subject with me.

Cline is very concerned that newspapers maintain their credibility, and urges journalists to stress accuracy.

"I'm always saying to people, 'let's get things right,'" she told me. D. J. noted that she finds a positive response to her message.

She pointed out that recent happenings which have cast doubt on press credibility—notably, the Janet Cooke incident, in which a reporter won a Pulitzer Prize for a made up story—can be seen as positive. These things are causing journalists to look at themselves, she said.

"You know who's going to benefit from that—the public," said Cline. "If we're going to be their eyes and ears, we'd better be credible." Amen.



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# Tom Brown Jr. addresses MLS

State representative Tom Brown Jr. of Artesia spoke about the recent session of the Legislature and about redistricting to the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) Committee of the Board of Realtors Tuesday.

"This was the toughest session fiscally that I've experienced," Brown said. He stated that the reduction of federal funding through state agencies will make it extremely difficult next year to decide on what programs will be funded.

Given the alarming growth rate of state expenditures, recent tax cuts and the conservative attitude of state and federal legislators, Brown commented, the Legislature will be tightening its money belt.

Brown noted that total state appropriations went over the \$5 billion mark. Referring to cuts in social programs, Brown said, "There was the darndest human cry you've ever heard," and added that it will get worse as the Legislature becomes fiscally tighter.

"Everybody said you (Brown) are a liberal, that you're spending too much money," said the former chairman of the House Finance Committee. "Those who label you a liberal are those who didn't get their appropriation bills passed."

Brown mentioned a tougher driving while intoxicated (DWI) law; a bill allowing the Public Service Company of New Mexico (PNM) to determine rates without indexing; a small county act; appropriations for halfway houses for psychiatric patients; and a condominium code among legislation passed this session.

Brown listed the Residential Mortgage Act and a bill that would have established a railroad authority to construct a rail line in the northwest corner of the state to transport natural resources out of that area as casualties of the session. "This is the first time in my experience that one house (House of Representatives) questioned the germanity of another house (Senate)," said Brown, referring to the Residential Mortgage Act.

"When you talk about redistricting, you hit close to the hearts of politicians," said Brown, referring to the controversy over reapportionment. He said the federal government requires that after the census is taken every 10 years, reapportionment of state voting districts shall take place.

However, Brown told MLS that census figures are still changing, so there are no exact population figures to work with. He added that a three-judge federal panel Monday barred New Mexico from proceeding with plans for the June 1 primary elections.

The injunction was issued at the request of a group of plaintiffs who said the formula used in the state's 1982 legislative reapportionment undercounts minorities and violates the principle of one-man, one-vote.

Brown said he feels ethnic and minority groups were slighted by the votes-cast formula which was used to reapportion voting districts.

Brown said he thinks the courts are changing their thinking on the one-man, one-vote concept of reapportionment in favor of the votes-cast formula. He added that he believes the federal courts will allow the present redistricting scheme to take effect because if neither the House nor the Senate reapportionment goes through, there will be no congressional redistricting.

Brown explained that the court has the authority to appoint a master committee to devise a plan, to go by the prior electoral system and let the next session of the state Legislature decide on redistricting, or to call the Legislature back into session to develop a new plan.

"I wouldn't accuse my colleagues of gerrymandering my district," said Brown, but he added that he was given only one of Artesia's three precincts. A precinct less than a mile from Brown's home was taken away, he said, while Ruidoso, Lincoln, Bonito, Nogal, and other parts of Lincoln County were placed within his district. "What's equitable to me is not equitable to the guy next to me who wants my territory," Brown said.

Brown told MLS he decided not to run for reelection prior to the reapportionment session. At least seven candidates have already announced their intention to run for the seat he is vacating.

## Fire danger high on Lincoln

Warm dry weather and high winds have created an extra dangerous fire situation on Lincoln National Forest this spring. Fire conditions in the forest are similar to those in 1974, the year of the Spring Fire on the Mayhill Ranger District that burned over 15,000 acres. Visitors to the forest are urged to be extra cautious with fires.

On the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, Bonito Lake is open to fishing and is being heavily used on weekends. Cedar Creek Picnic Area and Three Rivers Campground are open. Some snow remains in the high country of White Mountain and Capitan Mountains Wildernesses. Roads are in good condition. Fuelwood areas are open.

Sleepy Grass Campground on the Cloudcroft Ranger District will open April 15. Other campgrounds are still closed. Back roads and trails are drying, with mud and snow in some spots. Joplin Ridge Fuelwood Area (Area Number 9) is open.

Maintenance crews are working on Westside Road during weekdays; and travel on this road is recommended for weekends only. Baird pole and viga area, and the Goodsell aspen pole area are open. Permits may be obtained from the District office.

Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area on the Guadalupe Ranger District will open April 10. Caving activity is moderate. Roads and trails are in good condition. Visitors are advised to be alert for emerging rattlesnakes, and for high winds. All fuelwood areas are open. The District is recommending that people gather their firewood now for next winter.

Mayhill Ranger District reports that construction crews are widening New Mexico 521, between Weed and Sacramento. Motorists are urged to use caution in that area. James Canyon Campground is receiving moderate use.



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
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

Let us all help each other to have a blessed Easter.

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

## Sunland Park Hoofbeats

NO ONE WILL EVER accuse Sunland Park racing secretary Donald Rausch of being against innovative experiments. On Sunday, April 11, two special events will spice the usual 12-race program. The first will be a special non-betting pony horse race and the second will be the second annual Powder Puff Derby. "We used to have these things all the time, but people haven't done them recently," Rausch said. "We're excited about them both and hope they work out really well." The Powder Puff Derby will be run as a regular betting race during the afternoon program. It will feature all female jockeys, including Torney Swan and Shelley Rutherford, who will come from Centennial Race Track near Denver, Colorado, for the event. Rausch said Kathy Campbell, Kim Harmon and Paula Herber will ride in the event as well as the regular Sunland Park lady jockeys. The race will be for four-year-old and older runners going five furlongs for a purse of \$2,500. "No one will have an advantage. All the entries will hopefully be of equal ability," Rausch said. Rutherford won the event over eight foes on February 12, 1981, aboard the 5-2 favorite Christy B. The winner will receive a trophy and a blanket. The pony horse race will have a 12:20 post time. The rules require no tattooed horses and trainers must ride their own horses from a stand still start with stock saddles only. The race, at 330 yards, will be limited to 10 starters. A prize of \$100, a trophy and Tony Lama boots will go to the winner plus \$50 and other prizes to all riders. The race is sponsored by Horse Women United.

Aminau, a four-year-old Jacinto filly, is owned by J. L. Perkins of Navasota, Texas. She is trained by Lisa Outeda and was ridden by Louie Figueroa. It was Aminau's second win with one third in three outings this season.


STEVE BORUNDA, son of Ralph and Terry Borunda of El Paso, won his first race on a recognized track when he piloted Prancing Royalty (\$12.40) to a two and three-fourths length victory in Sunday's fourth race at the classic distance of a mile and one-quarter. The 17-year-old rider started his riding career about a month ago at Sunland Park. He has finished his degree requirements at Coronado High School in El Paso and will graduate with his class next month. He won on Prancing Royalty which was his eighth mount. He also has one third. Prancing Royalty is trained by B. G. Stephenson who owns the horse with Edward Read of El Paso.

STEVE ASMUSSEN, from the well known Laredo, Texas, family of horse enthusiasts, won his first race on a recognized pari-mutuel track when he steered Canadian Laredoan to a three-fourths length victory in Sunday's sixth race. The 16-year-old rider who was born in Gettysburg, South Dakota, is the brother of Cash Asmusen, who won the 1979 Eclipse Award as the nation's outstanding apprentice jockey. His father, Keith, is a veteran jockey and his mother, Sis, is a well known horse trainer in the Southwest. Sis trains Canadian Laredoan for owner Thomas G. Wilson of Laredo, Texas.

ON SATURDAY, Orlando Martinez Jr. repeated his two win effort and Bobbie Don Harmon and Mike Lidberg also turned in two wins. Martinez won on Garfield Red (\$6.60) for trainer Lewis Germany in the seventh and on Tina Serina (\$4.40) for owner-trainer Joe Weich in the eighth. Harmon won on Taconeando (\$6.00) in the ninth and in the 12th on Sensorial (\$5.40). Both horses are trained by H. Duane Sterling while Lidberg won on Blaze Supreme (\$4.40) in the first for trainer Ralph Henson and on Stormy Victory (\$6.80) for trainer Joni Arnett in the sixth.

TOTAL HANDLE over the three-day weekend reached a whopping \$1,254,491, averaging \$418,164. On the same weekend last year, the total was \$1,010,274 for an average of \$336,758. The current weekend was a soaring gain of 24.17 percent. On the season, the average stands at \$337,536, up 23.10 percent over the \$274,185 average at this point a year ago.

THE NUMBER NINE post produced seven winners over the weekend, easily the best. The seasonal totals: No. 1 — 89 wins, No. 2 — 103, No. 3 — 91, No. 4 — 88, No. 5 — 81, No. 6 — 72, No. 7 — 78, No. 8 — 83, No. 9 — 81, No. 10 — 63, No. 11 — 0, No. 12 — 0.

SEVERAL JOCKEYS WON two races on a single program over the weekend. On Friday, Orlando Martinez Jr. and Louie Figueroa each won a pair. Martinez won on Little Guy (\$5.20) for trainer Barry Germany in the eighth and on Zasa Star (\$9.60) for trainer-owner Al McClain in the featured 10th race. Figueroa triumphed on Restless Scott (\$9.80) for trainer Cindy Stewart in the second and on Fortunate Leader (\$7.80) for trainer E. Lenard May in the 11th.

AMINAUN SET a seasonal fastest time when she roared through the stretch to post a nose win over Sourkraut in Saturday's featured \$7,000 Sunshine Handicap at six furlongs. Her time of 1:10 bettered the 1:10 and one-fifth set by Nervino on October 18 and also by Pappa J. on February 7 and by Skipper Road on February 27.

## Love N Money notches West Texas Derby win

Love N Money was snubbed by Sunland Park patrons and reduced to second favorite in Sunday's renewal of the \$101,850 West Texas Derby.

Supporters of the filly probably felt she deserved the role of people's choice with her booming one and one-fourth length win in the trials a week ago — a win which also produced the top qualifying time of 19.53 seconds for the 400 yards.

But Sunday's crowd evidently felt the betting entry of Winkum and Summer Encounter was too good to pass up. Between the two of them, they've earned almost \$240,000.

So Winkum and Summer Encounter were pegged as even money favorites, while Love N Money — who stepped into the Derby with handsome career earnings of \$196,974 — was launched at 6-3.

Love N Money got the last laugh, vindicating herself with a brilliant three-fourths length win, earning \$50,925, and clocking the distance in 19.38 seconds. That time — aided by a stiff tailwind — was only a hundredth of a second short of the '81-'82 seasonal mark set by Johnny Victor on December 20.

It was a rough afternoon for both ends of the betting entry. Winkum, after breaking

sluggishly, drifted toward the inside and finally had to toss in the towel. He ran ninth in the nine horse field. It was the first time in his career he'd finished worse than second.

Summer Encounter fared a little better. She showed brisk speed from the rail post, tried vainly to duel Love N Money, then had all she could stand and quit badly. She finished seventh.

For Love N Money, it was a picture perfect performance. The daughter of Easy Jet (out of American Dream) broke smartly and assumed the lead about a dozen jumps away from the gate. Jockey Robert Adair kept her on a straight course and never resorted to the whip. The filly was in command all the way. She appeared to have plenty in reserve when she flashed across the finish.

Love N Money is owned by Rulon Goodman of Oracle, Arizona. Goodman is the general manager of Rillito Downs in Tucson. The filly came out of the Derby with a perfect four-for-four record this year. Last year, she chalked up a 5-1-2 tally from eight outings. She's trained by Robert Balfert.

Jays Mainspring, off at 5.70-1 under Jerry Nicodemus, closed resolutely out of

fourth place and bagged second. He earned \$17,401. The colt is leased by the Second Guess Syndicate of Fort Worth, Texas.

Splashing Bunny, a 50-1 outsider handled by Gary Sumpter, and Blazing Jo Bar Jet, a 27-1 darkhorse directed by Jerry Burgess, made up considerable real estate in the final stages. The two finished in a deadheat for third. Both were three-fourths lengths behind Jays Mainspring. Each earned \$8,700.

Splashing Bunny is owned by E. L. and Velma Weber of Anadarko, Oklahoma. Blazing Jo Bar Jet is leased by A.O.S. Enterprises of El Paso, Texas.

Love N Money handed out betting payoffs of \$4.60, \$4 and \$2.60. Jays Mainspring returned \$4.40 and \$2.60. Splashing Bunny returned \$4.40 to show. Blazing Jo Bar Jet's show return was \$3.20.

The rest of the field checked in this way: 5th — Regal Pleasure, earning \$5,118; 6th — Letmeloose, earning \$4,095; 7th — Summer Encounter, earning \$3,070; 8th — Moons Triangle, earning \$2,047; 9th — Winkum, earning \$1,023. Mitos Money Maker was scratched, but still earned \$509.

## Aminau captures Sunshine Handicap Saturday at Sunland

Saturday was a big day for Jim Perkins, the well known horseman from Navasota, Texas.

Perkins put his four-year-old filly, Aminau, in the six furlong Sunshine Handicap at Sunland Park, and Aminau held on for a heart-throbbing nose victory over the 12-1 outsider, Saurkraut.

Aminau reaffirmed her value by clocking the six panels in a brilliant 1:10 flat, which knocked a fifth of a second off the seasonal mark set by Nervino on October 18.

Saturday was also a big day for the Sunland Park management. A crowd of

3,385 turned out for the 12-race program.

The Sunshine Handicap offered a total purse of \$7,000 and directed \$4,200 into the winner's account. Aminau now sports a 1982 record of 2-0-1 from three starts, good for earnings of \$6,960. Her career income stands at \$53,762.

The filly, ridden by Louie Figueroa at 114 pounds, broke sharply in the Sunshine but never managed to get a minute's peace. She was hounded all the way, at first by Saurkraut, then by Colonel Day (5-1), and again by Saurkraut.

At one point at the turn for home, Saurkraut managed to stick his head in

front. Aminau opened up once again and was a head in front when she neared the wire. But Saurkraut wasn't through. Under last-second urging from Bobbie Don Harmon, he closed grimly and missed overtaking the people's choice by about an inch. The stewards took a lengthy look at the photo finish picture before announcing the winner.

Aminau, trained by Lisa Outeda, paid \$5, \$3.40, \$2.80. Saurkraut, the property of Jess Burner of El Paso, Texas, earned \$1,940 and refunded \$9.40. \$5.20. Colonel Day paid \$3.80 to show.

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

## Horse sale and clinic at New Mexico State

A sale of 25 registered quarter horses and Arabians will be conducted with the 1982 New Mexico State University (NMSU) horse judging clinic Saturday, April 17, at the NMSU horse center in Las Cruces.

Joe Armstrong, extension horse specialist at NMSU, said this is the first time an organized sale of surplus stock from the university's breeding herd has been conducted along with the annual judging clinic.

Armstrong said, "This would be an excellent opportunity to buy a top quality horse to be trained for performance and halter classes over the next two or three years."

Registration for the judging clinic will be from 8 to 8:30 a.m. April 17 at the horse center west of the NMSU Las Cruces campus on Union Street. The judging clinic will run from 8:30 a.m. until noon, lunch will be served until 1 p.m., and the sale horses will be presented from 1 to 2 p.m.

Armstrong said, "All the horses in this sale have been conditioned by NMSU students, and the sale has been organized and is being conducted by the students."

Tony Johnson, NMSU student, will act as auctioneer.

The 15 quarter horses that will be offered for sale include six yearling geldings, two yearling fillies, one two-year-old filly, two three-year-old fillies, and four broodmares. Three of the broodmares will foal in 1982 and one will foal in early 1983.

The Arabians offered for sale include three yearling geldings, three two-year-old geldings, one four-year-old gelding and two broodmares. One of the broodmares has a foal at side and has been bred for 1983, and the other will also foal in 1983.

Armstrong said, "Any of these horses will make excellent 4-H horse projects. They are sound, gentle and are good performance and halter prospects."

"The horse judging clinic is free and is also open to 4-H club members," he said. "We are planning a strong clinic with type demonstration, performance demonstration, halter classes to judge and a session on oral reasons."




