# Growth keeps planners busy

When Ruidoso formulated its first comprehensive plan in 1961, the village's primary concerns were to upgrade the main road through town and to improve the capabilities of the airport to serve the needs of the fledgling resort community.

Now, 21 years after village officials made the first steps to plan orderly municipal growth, planners are trying to direct commercial expansion away from the now heavily congested main road and a move is on to relocate the local airport.

These are but two examples of growth which illustrate changes in the village the past two decades. Such changes are occupying much of our local planners' time these days.

In an interview with The News last week, village manager Jim Hine and planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp described some of the transformations in Ruidoso's appearance and adjustments planners have to make to deal with this restless community.

In early 1961, when village leaders sat down and discussed priorities for planning, Sudderth Drive was little more than a cow path dissecting the village and pilots landed their planes on an open field that is now the municipal airport.

Hine said widening and paving of Sudderth was completed that year, and the airport modernization was finished in 1963. Now, with heavy crowding of businesses

on Sudderth and the absence of adequate parking on the main artery, the village is taking a long range look for breathing space in other parts of the village.

In the 1976 comprehensive plan, an updated version of the 1961 design which was supposed to last 20 years, the program dealing with land use calls for "creation of local centers within each housing area—a nucleus around which development occurs" to relieve some of the commercial pressure on Sudderth.

Hine and Cupp believe new businesses must be directed into "neighborhood shopping areas" to alleviate commercial crowding on Sudderth and corresponding parking problems in midtown.

"We need some additional C-1 (light commercial) zones for neighborhood shopping areas," Hine said.

Cupp, who has been the planning and zoning enforcement officer since last year, said directing C-1 zoning away from Highway 37 (Sudderth and Mechem Drives) will help a great deal in reducing traffic on the main road through town.

"Theoretically, neighborhood commercial areas will alleviate downtown traffic," he said.

According to results of a traffic survey conducted this spring by state and local highway departments, the congestion on Ruidoso's streets is becoming desperate.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said the traffic figures for the entire village in March showed a 300 percent increase over August 1975.

That is a large jump in just seven years, but more noteworthy is the period used for comparison. Hine pointed out that March is a relatively slow month compared to August, which sees the greatest monthly influx of visitors to Ruidoso.

"Last summer, traffic was backed up from the track (Ruidoso Downs Race Track) to Carrizo Hill," Hine said.

To relieve the congestion, planners have been looking to develop alternative highway routes to allow traffic to bypass Highway 37.

According to the 1976 Comprehensive Plan, Gavilan Canyon Road and Hull Road should be designated secondary arterial routes to carry the ever increasing traffic load.

Part of the overall plan is to connect Gavilan Canyon Road and Hull Road with a highway link through Bog Springs, the area where the new high school will be located.

Once these roads are improved to handle a heavier traffic load, and connecting links are upgraded, commercial expansion can be directed to those areas.

"Planning philosophy is to use the main artery as the commercial area," Hine said. "That's fine until it runs out."

With the trustees' approval last month for the construction of a Hilton Inn near the White Mountain schools off Hull Road, the initial move to create a local center of commerce was made.

Many residents opposed the rezoning from residential to commercial for the

Hilton Inn because they felt the hotel would intrude on the residential character of their neighborhoods and would attract other commercial development in the area.

Cupp said he understands that people do not want these changes in their neighborhoods and that the village should zone new commercial areas so there will be buffers between housing and new businesses.

The comprehensive plan also calls for limited commercial use of the airport property if the airport is ever closed down.

The report refers to a study prepared on the proposed Sierra Blanca Airport to be located on Fort Stanton Mesa. According to the study, operation of two public airports in the area would not be feasible if the regional airport is constructed.

The comprehensive plan recommends that "limited commercial uses" of the municipal airport property be provided in conjunction with surrounding residential areas if the airport is ever shut down. According to the suggestion, arts and crafts shops, restaurants or boutique shops could coincide with existing neighborhoods in the area.

Looking at the changes being considered by planners that have been dictated by the fast growth of Ruidoso since the first comprehensive plan, Hine said it is "ironic" that the village is seeking new areas for commercial expansion, and a site for a new airport.

## State school board ties teacher-coaches to jobs

Any Ruidoso school staff member employed as a teacher-coach in the next year will sign a contract which requires that resignation from either teaching or coaching will result in resignation from both positions, according to a decision made by the New Mexico State Board of Education during its meeting here last week.

The pilot program, which is optional for each local school district, will be adopted on a one-year trial basis while study is conducted on the matter by the state Department of Education legal division. A report is to be made to the state board by March 1983.

Ruidoso school superintendent Pat Valliant said at the meeting that he would like to adopt the plan for the Ruidoso school system.

It was indicated that several school districts in the state have had problems with teacher-coaches who want to resign from coaching but continue to teach.

It was suggested that the proposed contract addendum be extended to all teachers involved in extracurricular activities. This suggestion will be included in the study to be conducted by the legal division.

The Ruidoso schools may be forced to reduce the Title One reading program

fall next year, according to a state school board meeting report on federal funding reductions. Valliant said the local board needs to be prepared to phase out of this program as funds are cut each year.

He said he has "half knowledge" that Title One will be cut 25 percent next year, which will require retaining by one the current Title One staff of one teacher and three aides.

Public Law 94-142, which provides funds in lieu of property taxes to schools in which students living on federal installations are enrolled, may also be deleted, Valliant indicated. He said Ruidoso schools get an average of \$10,000 a year for students living at Mescalero and on national forest land.

Ruidoso school board president Dave Parks, in his opening remarks Thursday, pointed out to state board members the tremendous growth rate the schools here are experiencing and explained that serious limitations of resources and facilities are hindering the schools' present programs.

Plans for the new high school were also displayed for the state board members to view.

"I think the state board meeting went very well," Valliant said. "It gave local school board members a chance to get to know the state board members a little better," he added.

## May 15 designated Police Memorial Day

Mayor George P. White has proclaimed Saturday, May 15, as Police Memorial Day, in honor of the more than 2,000 American law enforcement officers who have been killed in the line of duty.

More than 20 years ago, the late President John F. Kennedy signed into law a bill proclaiming May 15 as a day of mourning for fallen police officers.

Ruidoso has never participated in the event that saw more than 100,000 lawmen honor the day last year, Ruidoso police chief Richard S. Swenor said.

Swenor, in a letter asking the mayor for

the official proclamation, said although Ruidoso has been fortunate to never have had an officer killed in the line of duty, he feels it is morally right for all in the law enforcement profession to "honor our fallen comrades in arms."

White requests that all state and national flags be flown at half mast as a symbol of mourning on May 15. Swenor said Ruidoso police officers will also wear a black mourning band across their badges.

Police Memorial Day is part of National Police Week, which takes place from May 9-15.

## School personnel pay raised

Salary increases for Ruidoso school personnel were approved by the local board of education during a special meeting April 28. The proposed 1982-83 school budget, approved by the local school board during the meeting, will have to be granted final approval by the state school board. A budget hearing is scheduled for May 26 at the high school library at 9 a.m.

Uncertified personnel will get a 12 per

cent increase if the budget receives state approval, and an average 10.9 percent increase was approved for certified staff members, depending upon experience and education.

The total budget, based on estimated revenue of \$8,727,451, calls for expenditures of \$8,711,021, which includes building of the new high school.

## Two men die in plane crash on reservation

A single-engine airplane crashed into a hillside yesterday afternoon two miles east of Mescalero on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation, killing the two men aboard the craft, State Police said.

Killed in the crash were Jimmie Johnson, 51, of Meridian, Mississippi, and Lee Caldwell Baker, 32, address unknown.

State Police spokesman Kenneth Godbey said identification on Baker's body gave a Portland, Oregon address, but the officer said police have been unable to confirm that Baker lived there.

Godbey said the Piper Cherokee 140 crashed into a hillside at 1:53 p.m. about 400 yards north of Highway 70. He said the plane was apparently heading east after taking off from the Alamogordo airport. Godbey had no report of the plane's destination.

Godbey said witnesses reported that the plane was flying low over Highway 70 east of Mescalero when it apparently banked to the north to clear some power lines, then clipped several pine trees before crashing into the side of a hill.

Godbey said the plane crashed about 100 yards from a residence. He said there were no injuries on the ground.

Godbey said the occupants were pronounced dead at the scene. The bodies were later taken to Ruidoso.

## Stricter enforcement of fire code announced

The village Fire Prevention Department (FPD) is making a push to enforce provisions in the Uniform Fire Code that have been neglected in the past fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy said.

The recently completed Operation Trash campaign is seen as a first step in helping eliminate fire hazards in the area. Cuddy said the cleaning of areas where trash accumulates will be a continuing effort in enforcing the fire code.

Starting this October, FPD will require

chimney spark arrestors on any cabin, house, hotel, building or structure located within 200 feet of mountainous brush, forest land or land covered with flammable material.

Also, accumulations of wastepaper, hay, grass, straw, weeds, litter, waste petroleum products or rubbish of any kind will not be permitted to remain on any roof, courtyard, vacant lot or open space.

Cuddy is advising that weeds, grass,

vines or other growth that is liable to be fired should be cut down and removed by the owner or the occupant of the property. When total removal of such growth is impractical due to size or environmental factors, approved fuel breaks may be established between the land and endangered property, Cuddy said.

Cuddy said he is asking everyone in the village to call the Fire Prevention Office at 257-7365, to advise location of fire hazards, or possible fire danger.



## Fort Stanton and Los Lunas schools to compete in Special Olympics events

New Mexico Interagency Special Olympic Games will be held this month for the first time between the Fort Stanton and Los Lunas training schools.

About 30 students from Fort Stanton will compete with Los Lunas students in swimming events at the Los Lunas facility on May 18. Developmental sports competition will be held at Fort Stanton May 20.

Both day's competitions will begin at 10 a.m. with opening ceremonies, and an awards ceremony will be held at noon and at 3 p.m., with closing ceremonies at that time.

Swimming competition events will include backstroke, freestyle, life jacket race, 25 feet walk, object pick-up and a

walking relay.

An obstacle course, object swap, object accuracy toss, log roll, crawl race, walk-run relay and "parachute popcorn" competition will be held at Fort Stanton on the 20th.

Only six other states have held similar competitions between institutions, according to Jeanne Culbertson, coordinator of the games. She said Fort Stanton and Los Lunas are participating in an effort to bring together the students and staff of the two schools.

The New Mexico Special Olympics Office in Albuquerque and the International Special Olympics Office in Washington D.

C. are really excited about the upcoming competition, Culbertson said. She said a lot of support and backing have been received from the two agencies.

Spectators are welcome to come watch, Culbertson said, and people are needed to help with the events by keeping time, running events and helping competitors. Culbertson can be contacted at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School for those wishing to volunteer their help.

Representatives from the Health and Environment Department in Santa Fe have been invited to attend the games, Culbertson said.

She is hoping the interagency competition can be made an annual event.

## Capitan businessman in water squabble with village officials

On the morning of Tuesday, April 27, Glenda Booher of Capitan looked out her kitchen window and saw some men looking over the family's water meter.

"At first, I thought they were reading the meter. But Olan's (her husband) brother said they pulled it, and sure enough, no water. I tried to turn it on, but there was none," said Mrs. Booher.

According to Capitan village clerk Leon Eggleston, Olan Booher owes the village over \$1,700 in unpaid water bills. According to Booher, he doesn't, and he said he won't pay the bill.

Booher has been charged a triple city service charge, because a Capitan Village ordinance states, "all water sold by the municipality to persons outside of the Village of Capitan's corporate limits shall be assessed at rates three times the amounts charged above (within limits)."

However, Booher claims that the majority of his commercial properties lie within the village corporate limits. Those are also the sections which have the water taps.

Booher possesses a map which proves his point. The map is notarized and states, "Filed for record in the office of County Clerk, Lincoln County, Carrizozo, New Mexico, this first day of November, 1948, in book seven, page nine of records."

The map shows a 100-foot strip of land, which Booher's property now sits on, within Capitan's village limits. Just over 11 feet of that land is now the highway in front of Booher's store—Olan's Quick Stop. The same boundary line runs through the

middle of Booher's construction firm office down the road.

However, Capitan mayor Don Stark told Eggleston to call the county courthouse to verify the information on Booher's map, Eggleston said. The county has no record of that map, Eggleston told The News. Obeying orders from Stark, Eggleston said, he began charging Booher a triple rate.

After Booher started receiving a triple charge for his village services, he took his complaint before the village council on November 9, 1981.

The minutes of that meeting state, "Olan Booher was next stating he felt the council should have notified him before the village started charging triple rates on his city services."

"He felt this could have been worked out if the council had talked to him sooner. Mr. Booher stated he felt his bills should be reduced to the regular rates as part of his protest was in the city limits."

"The motion was made by Ken Brag that if Olan would petition for annexation, the council would consider reducing the bills to the regular rate."

Booher said he filled out an annexation form to include his residence behind his store in the village limits. However, village clerk Eggleston said Booher did not notarize the form, did not sign the form, nor did Booher attach an official map to the form.

Consequently, the Capitan Village Council moved to table Booher's request for annexation December 14, 1981.

When the village council met April 12 to discuss the issue, it moved to accept

Booher's second petition for annexation. The council also voted against retroactively reducing his charges for city services.

Sharon Horton, a council member, commented that the city service bill should be paid in full before annexation.

Booher was sent a notice by Capitan village attorney Gary Mitchell which stated that if his bill was not paid in full by Monday, April 26, then his water would be disconnected.

Booher claims the council has a personal vendetta against him and that the council members have been discussing the issue among themselves.

"They're using their office to get to me ... I will not pay a triple water rate," Booher said.

"I have no animosity over Olan. We're (council) trying to follow the ordinances," said Stark.

Stark alleged that two meetings were set up with Olan to discuss the issue. He claimed Booher failed to show up both times.

"That man (Stark) has never called me in his life to set up a meeting or for any other purpose," Booher said.

As it now stands, Booher tapped his water lines with well water behind his home. He is still charged with a triple city service rate.

Stark said it will be up to the council to reconsider the triple charge if Olan can prove his property was in the village limits.

The next question which may arise is whether all of a building receiving city services must lie within the corporate limits to be eligible for city status, or whether a portion of the structure will do.

# Cupp keeping busy with planning and zoning matters

John Cupp came to Ruidoso nine years ago hoping to relax in semi-retirement. But, since last year, Cupp has been one of the busiest people in town.

The former technical sales engineer and hardware store owner is the village planning and zoning enforcement officer—a job that allows little rest in this expanding community.

As Ruidoso's lone administrative officer for planning, Cupp is charged with keeping records of every Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) meeting. He also maintains planning maps, and keeps records of zoning amendments, conditional use permits, variances and appeals. He inspects structures and use of land; he issues certificates, reviews permits and licenses pertaining to land use; and if the situation warrants it, he may initiate legal proceedings when zoning ordinances are violated.

And to add to his responsibilities, Cupp was appointed the village's purchasing agent last month—a new village position created when the council decided to alter the way village departments buy equipment and materials.

"This job is many faceted," Cupp said in an interview last week. "Probably my foremost responsibility is maintaining records for public inspection."

Some of the records Cupp maintains per-

tain to actions of the P&Z commission. At each P&Z meeting, Cupp presents documents from his office to commission members that are relevant to items being considered by the commission.

The records of zoning regulations that are kept in Cupp's office include maps, conditional use permits and zoning variances.

Maps in Cupp's office include surveyor's maps, utility maps, plats of subdivisions and other layouts of the village showing boundaries, roads and developments.

The enforcement officer does not draw up the maps himself. The work is done by surveyors and engineers contracted by the village.

Cupp also keeps records of conditional use permits and zoning variances that are granted after being approved by P&Z and the village council.

According to Ruidoso zoning ordinances, certain land uses are permitted in each zoning district of the village.

In single family residential (R-1) districts for example, the village allows single family dwellings, public schools, libraries, community buildings, parks, churches, golf courses, clubs and lodges.

In addition, if it meets conditional use requirements for a residential district, a recreation area such as a community center, swimming pool, tennis club or other similar facilities may be permitted.

But permits for such conditional uses are issued only after the village deter-

mines the use meets P&Z criteria. According to the P&Z "Blue Book"—the book containing P&Z ordinances—conditional uses have to be "deemed essential or desirable" for the public good and have to be operated so that "public health, safety and welfare will be protected."

Cupp also keeps records of zoning variances. A variance is an exception to zoning regulations regarding area, height and setback requirements for structures. The Blue Book states that variances may be granted when P&Z ordinances result in "practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship that would deprive the owner of the reasonable use of his land or building."

In addition to keeping records for P&Z, Cupp also confers with builders and collects information gathered from village water, sewer and street departments for inclusion into reports to P&Z and the village council, village manager Jim Hine said.

Hine, who as village manager is the chief administrative officer for the village, said Cupp arranges for department heads to check planned utilities and roads for a subdivision. If plans are not approved by department heads, Cupp notifies developers of changes that have to be made for the plans to comply with village ordinances, Hine said.

One of the most time consuming responsibilities of Cupp's job is the requirement that he send notices of requests for zoning changes to owners of property situated

within 100 feet of the site, before the request comes before P&Z.

Cupp said he obtains records from the county assessor's office of the property owners within the designated boundaries and sends notices to them through certified mail that a request was made to change zoning for a piece of land. He said the process takes up to two weeks before the request can be submitted to the commission.

But there have been problems with the procedure. At the hearing before the village council on the appeal of the Hilton Inn site rezoning from residential to commercial in March, one of the appellants claimed she received no notice of the zoning change request before it was considered by P&Z. According to village ordinances, a zoning change can be ruled invalid if the notices are not sent.

Cupp said at the hearing he sent notices to all property owners within the 100 foot boundary, according to the assessor's records. He said it was possible there was no record in the assessor's office that the lady owned the property, if she had recently purchased the land.

Cupp said this process is being changed to comply with a new state law.

He said the state has determined that the records must be obtained from the treasurer's office rather than the assessor's office. He said he doesn't feel the change will speed up the way he gets

records because property has to be assessed before taxes are paid on the land.

"I don't have the foggiest idea why the state made the change," he said. "The ideal way (of obtaining the records) would be to get the records from the village clerk's office. The records are there right after the transaction is made."

As his job title signifies, Cupp also has the responsibility to enforce P&Z regulations.

He said his job requires that he penalize property owners if they fail to comply with municipal ordinances. But he said he prefers to cooperate with owners to resolve differences rather than issue them citations.

"Honey makes a lot more friends than vinegar does," he said.

In addition to his duties as enforcement officer, Cupp was recently appointed purchasing agent for the village.

The position requires that he review supply orders from department heads and see if the village can buy the materials in bulk quantities under a central purchasing agreement with the state.

Hine said the new way of buying materials means the village will not have to always shop around for the best prices on supplies, if Cupp finds out large quantities of the requested items can be obtained from the state through a central purchasing agreement.

Hine said the state has always made items such as office supplies available to municipalities from central warehouses as long as the communities signed purchase orders for large volumes of the supplies.

Hine said village departments in the past had to order supplies individually and seek competitive prices. He said it "makes much more sense" to buy large volumes at discounted prices from the state.

"If we have a year's supply of something like cleaning supplies; departments would merely check something out and get charged a pro rata share of what they used," Hine said.

Hine said the village never participated in the purchasing agreements with the state before because Ruidoso has no facilities to store large quantities of supplies.

But, Hine indicated it is possible the prefabricated building that the police department is seeking for temporary quarters this summer while its present building is remodeled, may be converted into the warehouse needed to store the supplies.

Cupp said he will be going to Santa Fe sometime in the next few weeks to examine what purchasing agreements the state has that the village can participate in.

He said his goal as purchasing agent will be to "achieve as much economy" as he can for the village.



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
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

# Warrior girl thinclads finish second in Truth or Consequences Invitational

New England, Cleveland and Baltimore did the best of the National Football League (NFL) teams in last week's draft.

It shouldn't be surprising that the above teams did well since they had three of the first four picks in the draft.

New England grabbed the draft's outstanding player in Ken Stens, the huge defensive tackle from Texas. Through a series of trades the Patriots garnered several other draft picks and concentrated on improving their defense.

True, they had to give up former all-pro tight end Russ Francis to San Francisco in a trade to get some more high choices, but the quality players the Patriots chose should help them in the near future.

Baltimore, which tied with New England for the worst record in the league last season, chose standout linebacker Johnnie Cooks of Mississippi State as the second player in the draft. The Colts also chose Penn State nose guard Leo Wisniewski in the second round and defensive back Jim Barranger of Michigan State in the third round.

The Colts' picks, all defensive players, make sense. Baltimore had the worst pass defense in the NFL last season and one of the worst overall defenses. Baltimore drafted for its needs and that's what teams should do to improve themselves as quickly as possible.

It doesn't make any sense to take the best player available when you can help yourself more by drafting a less talented player at another position where your team is weak.

The Colts and Patriots each had better material than their records would indicate last season. It wouldn't be that surprising to see these teams show considerable improvement in 1982.

Cleveland also improved itself a lot on defense. The Browns, who have been an offensive-oriented team for several seasons, signed former Canadian star Tom Cousineau just before the draft. Cousineau, a linebacker, will be joined at that position by ex-USC Trojan Chip Banks, the Browns' first draft pick.

Banks, who many people considered to be the second best defensive player in the draft, should be of immediate help to the

Browns. Cleveland also picked defensive end Keith Baldwin of Texas A&M in the second round.

It's interesting that teams that draft high usually go for defensive players. That's because defense is still the key to building a title contender in the NFL.

San Francisco went for defensive backs last season because it had a terrible pass defense for several seasons.

The 49ers got All-American Ronnie Lott of USC and three other highly rated defensive backs in last year's draft.

The result was one of the best defenses in the league and an improvement from a 6-10 record in 1980 to 13-3 and the Super Bowl title last season.

In this year's draft, San Francisco went for offensive players. The 49ers had already built up their defense to a championship level so they decided to fill the remaining question marks on offense.

All in all, other teams which did well in the draft this year were Houston, Kansas City, New Orleans (but not as well as it should have, picking third), Atlanta and Oakland.

Houston got Mike Munchak, the great offensive lineman from Penn State. Munchak should be able to start right in the Oilers.

Kansas City helped itself on both ends of the field as did Atlanta and Oakland. The Raiders pulled off a steal by veteran running back Greg Pruitt, defensive end Lyle Alzado from Cleveland for an eighth-round draft choice.

That trade helped Oakland and Pruitt didn't really hurt Cleveland that much since Pruitt has been injured off and on since he was drafted.

Still, Pruitt is a fine runner and receiver and he may play a lot at the position for the Raiders since he's likely to get injured there.

New Orleans got some fine offensive talent but still needs a lot of help on defense. Sometimes I wonder if the management and coaching staff know what it takes to compete in the NFL.

Defense is the key to a contending team in the NFL, and the Patriots, Colts, Browns took big steps towards regaining their long-time role as contenders in their selections in the draft last week.

Ruidoso High School's girls' track team took four individual firsts en route to a second place finish in the Truth or Consequences Invitational Friday afternoon.

The Warrior boys sent a mainly underclassmen team to the meet and also came through with several fine performances.

Silver City won the girls' competition with 123 points to 90 for the Warriors.

Sprinter Sheri Dennis won two events and Deanna Peto and Valerie Garcia each had one first place for Ruidoso.

Dennis, who qualified for the state meet in the 100 meters last week, won that event in 12.3 and also took the 200 meters in 27.1. The 200 meter time was a touch of a second off the state qualifying standard.

Peto won the 1,000 meters with a 12:33 clocking. She has a best of 12:29 in that event this season. She also finished third in the mile.

Garcia, who is also a strong 800 meter runner, took the 400 meters in 61.0.

The Warrior 400 meter relay team of Sooja Jefferson, Gia Rose, Jackie Jefferson and Garcia took second with a 55.1 time. Ruidoso has run a 53.7 this year. The Jefferson sisters again played a big

part in the Warriors' scoring.

Sooja was second in the long jump with a 15-3 effort. Jackie, who has won several 1,500 meter races this season, was second in that event Friday with a 5:42.0 clocking.

The two Jefferson sisters also ran on the Warrior medley relay team which took second in 2:41.4. Rose and Garcia also ran on that team.

Ruidoso's 800 meter relay team of Capie King, Judy McCoy, Lillian Lopez and Laura Trapp recorded a 2:07.0 time for second place.

Trapp was fifth in the 100 meter low hurdles and Rose was fourth in the 75 meters.

Tricia Jameson finished fourth in the 1,000 and Ruta Bob was third. Bob finished fifth in the state 1,500 meters last season but Friday was her first competition of this year.

Sheila Espinosa also had a good performance, finishing fourth in the 1,500 meters.

Lon Nunley, one of the few seniors on the Warrior boys' team who competed at T or C, earned a state meet berth in the shot put with a first place throw of 48-4.5. He also won the discus with a 154-0 effort. He

qualified for the state meet in discus last week at Artesia.

Ruidoso got some good efforts out of its young relay teams in the boys' division.

The 400 meter, 800 meter and 1,600 meter relay teams all finished third. The sprint medley team of Steve Soidow, Johnny Flowers, Billy Woodal and David Linsdram finished fourth. Woodal is a junior and the other three runners are sophomores.

Soidow and Flowers teamed with Eric Strobel and Mike Douglas for third place in the 400 meter, and 1,600 meter relay events.

The third place 800 meter relay team recorded a 1:42.0 time and was composed of Darin Smith, Flowers, Soidow and Strobel.

Strobel is a sophomore and has been one of the Warriors' better sprinters this season.

Douglas and Flowers ran in the 400 meters and each recorded 47.0 times.

Woodal threw the javelin 145-5 for fourth place.

Both Warrior girls' coach Sergio Castanon and assistant boys' coach Jim Ramsey were pleased with their teams' ef-

forts.

"We did pretty well," Castanon said. "The competition wasn't really that good but it was a good experience. It's nice to get that wall in a meet right before the district meet."

Ramsey praised the efforts of the young Warriors.

"Going by the results of the relays we should have some good relay teams again next year," he said. "At the start of next season we could have the makings of some even better teams than we have this year."

Grady Williamson is the only junior on an otherwise all-senior "first-team" quartet which ran the 400 meter, 800 meter and 1,600 meter relays for Ruidoso at the Las Cruces Invitational Saturday. (See related story on this page).

Lon Nunley, Don Nunley and Scott Neal are the senior members of the relay squad. The rapid improvement of the younger Warrior sprinters in the T or C meet could make up for the loss of the three seniors next season.

The district 3-AAA meet is scheduled for Alamogordo High School either Friday or Saturday. The exact date will be determined in the next two days.

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

BE OBTAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, THAT SECTION 2-3-26(D) OF ORDINANCE NO. 76-2 IS HEREBY AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:  
Public Hearing — The Commission shall hold at least one public hearing in relation to the proposed amendment at which parties in interest and citizens shall have the opportunity to be heard. Public notice of the date, time, and place of the hearing, along with the nature of the amendment requested, shall be given in a newspaper of general circulation in the Village of Ruidoso, at least fifteen (15) days prior to such public hearing. Whenever an amendment is proposed for an area of one (1) acre or less, a notice of the hearing shall be mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the owners, as shown by the records of the County Treasurer, of lots or land within one hundred (100) feet, excluding public right-of-way, of the exterior boundaries of the property which is subject to the proposed amendment. Where property immediately beyond the radius described herein is under the same ownership as the property subject to the application, the owners of adjacent real property, discharging public right-of-way, shall be similarly notified. The written notices of public hearings on proposed amendments shall be mailed at least five (5) days prior to the hearing date. The Commission shall keep minutes of its proceedings, including a record of the vote of each member on each amendment, and the minutes shall be public records.

THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE FIVE (5) DAYS AFTER PUBLICATION.

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
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
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
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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—How about a column which does not mention (except here) the words "primary" or "candidates"?

There are, after all, many other things in the world than the subjects we have covered so frequently in this space in recent weeks.

New Mexico is a lot more than its politicians, their foibles and their actions.

Government consists as well of those who drudge on in the bureaucratic roles, most of whom are dedicated and hard-working, though they may not always be as colorful as the polls are.

Take the Department of Health and Environment, probably the largest division of state government.

It has recently prepared 13 "health priorities" for the state, based on figures assembled by the planning and data section of its Health Planning and Development Division.

What is disturbing is what it lists first. The most important job it sees to do is to decrease the rate of violent deaths among our citizens between the ages of 15 and 24 years.

To put it bluntly, New Mexico kills its youth.

If you think that isn't true, contemplate this fact: In our state the rate of death for this age group exceeds the national rate by 82 percent.

That means we here count such deaths in numbers per thousand of population which are almost twice what can be expected among 15-24 year olds anywhere else in the nation.

And that's not the worst part.

Leading causes of death among people here are accidents, suicide and homicide—all of them violent ways to end

a life. And our comparative rates in these three areas combined are 111 percent higher than the national figures.

That is shocking and disturbing. What's more, Health and Environment tells us that alcohol is involved in as many as half of these violent and bloody affairs among our young.

What kind of a state must we be if we do so little to end this situation?

The price is high. Health planners estimate that the cost of all violent deaths in the state comes to something over \$760 million a year.

That makes violent death, in a macabre way, an important industry in New Mexico.

But that, of course, is only the dollar cost. The human suffering cannot be measured in those terms.

And what do our health people propose as a solution?

They say, in a very modestly worded sentence, that "lifestyle and behavior must be influenced" before this condition can be changed.

Might a writer humbly suggest that values as well must be changed?

It is just possible that as long as we have as our ideal the young stud cowboying down the highway with his beer can in hand, these deaths will continue to increase at a rate at least as fast as the growth in our population.

Until we learn to put first things first, New Mexico is likely to go on killing its young.

What that means in practice is the violent death of our future.

That should be totally unacceptable to us all.

Dear editor:

I read, with somewhat dour amusement, the letter written by Tom Kelham, in reference to El Salvador. While accusing Mr. Turbow of lacking information and being biased, he reveals his own weaknesses in these areas. I'm sure he represents many Americans in his opinions. Reagan's foreign policy could hardly find a better spokesperson, but is Reagan's policy a correct one?

Ambassador to the United Nations, Jeanne Kirkpatrick says that "violence in El Salvador is created by outside intervention, not by social injustice." She forgets that "violence" and "social injustice" have co-existed in this country (El Salvador) for centuries. It is a tradition that doesn't need a Cuba or a U.S.S.R. to survive. In 1932, for example, a General Maximiliano Hernandez Martinez murdered 30,000 people in order to crush a rebellion of peasants who simply wanted minimum wage.

Secretary of State, Alexander Haig says, "We are not going to be dragged into another Vietnam, but the problems will be dealt with at the source of the difficulty." I wonder if he realizes the "source of the difficulty" is military and para-military repression, the prevention of political evolution by the army.

Mr. Kelham would like us to believe El Salvador is just one more battleground on which communism must be fought. In reality, the revolution is of a complex composition. Catholic, agrarian, and nationalist in its roots, but also with strong marxist,

democratic Christian and social democratic elements, with militant students and accountants, printers, and bank clerks.

Like Mr. Turbow, I have grave doubts about the validity of the elections. Mr. Kelham's comparison of their elections to ours is ludicrous. Perhaps we would have 80% voter turnout if we required our citizens to vote, by law. Each voter must show an identification booklet containing names and addresses of his entire family, a photograph, a fingerprint, and other identifying information such as, whether he has served in the military. In the past, voter turnout has averaged about 40%, but for this election, a register was kept at the polls to more clearly identify who voted and who didn't. When Mr. Kelham makes the bizarre statement, that "those who didn't vote are assumed to be passively or actively supporting the guerrillas, he echoes the repressive atmosphere in which brothers and sisters, fathers, mothers, and children die, assassinated by the same death squads that are supposed to guarantee free elections in El Salvador. A young El Salvadorean cab driver named Oscar said he would go to the polls to have his ballot stamped, but would not mark his ballot. "It's ridiculous," he said, "The people don't have any faith in the candidates. I want a party that is for the people, not money. This is a fraud." Perhaps more telling, are the words of Richard Scammon, elections specialist and official advisor to the U.S. state department, "There are two ways you can steal an election: through force or collusion. I can say absolutely, there is no evidence of collusion." God knows, there is plenty evidence of force.

Mr. Kelham shouldn't worry about us calling the Marxist, "agrarian reformers". The Marxist are the ones who are surviving. 240 members of the new agrarian cooperatives have been murdered by paramilitary forces, eighty co-ops are paying "protection" to the army. Protection from what? Protection from the death squads, trained, armed, and financed by the army itself. And if you haven't heard about it, Mr. Kelham, I'm not surprised. In a country where an unfavorable article appearing in the states one week can mean a visit from the military police the next, the reporting has been sketchy, to say the least. The possibility of arrest, torture, and murder has become a most effective form of censorship. Thus, we have seen news reports describing the military government as "liberal and reformist" even though it has received the strongest possible condemnation from Amnesty International, the United Nations, and the World Council of Churches. The four Dutch T.V. newsmen murdered March 17th might have given us more "information" and less "bias" had they lived to report.

Mr. Kelham asserts that "our support" "is still better than doing nothing for a people who need help desperately." Allow me to suggest that "doing nothing" would be better than participating in the slaughter to the tune of 10 million American tax dollars last year. All for arms that are helping to kill an average of about 10,000 people a year, about 50 a day. All for some McCarthy era paranoia about communism. I say, it's time to step out of the picture, quit trying to internationalize an internal conflict. Try to help shift the power in Latin American countries from the armies to the people in cooperation with the important political and economic powers in the area, like Mexico and Venezuela. The United States is most loyal to itself when it recognizes itself as a community founded on revolution, when it does not permit marginal and private interest to set themselves above the meaning, the attraction, and the truth of this great nation.

In 1954, the C.I.A. engineered the toppling of the communist inspired Guatemalan government of Jacobo Arbenz Guzman. Then secretary of state, John Foster Dulles called it a "glorious victory" against communist influence in Latin America. Carlos Fuentes, former Mexican Ambassador to France called it a "glorious victory... against democracy in the name of democracy!" Think about it.

### Editorial

Though the County of Lincoln's plans to locate a substation in Ruidoso received a setback last week, we urge that the county commissioners keep trying and that Village of Ruidoso officials support their efforts.

A site just north of the Ruidoso Village Administrative Center had been selected for the office building. Plans called for the county to lease the land from Ruidoso Municipal Airport, just as the village does with the village hall site.

But the higher-than-expected-value appraisal on the one-and-a-half acre property would cause such a high rent to the county that the project becomes unaffordable.

The county substation which would house branches of the Sheriff's Office, the district attorney's office, the county health office and juvenile probation office, and provide meeting space for commissioners would be an asset to Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

A substation here would be of great convenience to local residents, who presently must travel to Carrizozo to transact most of their business with the county.

If a means is not found for the county to afford the property (a second appraisal has been suggested), the village should consider methods to help out.

It will be a loss to Ruidoso and the county if the substation is not built.—TP

## Reporter's Round

People have been approaching me in the last month or so wondering what has become of the February 4 gas spill that killed at least 2,500 fish in our Rio Ruidoso. This has led me to believe that Ruidoso citizens, at least the ones who fish in the river, are genuinely concerned about the outcome of the case.

That is comforting to me, for it reassures me that it's not merely the case of a reporter making a mountain out of a molehill, trying to hype some issue for his own benefit.

Unfortunately, I have been unable to furnish anybody with a definite answer regarding the conclusion of the case I call the Southland Affair.

When the incident first happened, New Mexico Department of Game and Fish personnel and the local office of the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) were very cooperative in supplying The News with information. After all, they are state agencies which exist to serve the public good.

Then suddenly, Hari Mukhoty of the Ruidoso office of EID said he could no longer comment on the case. He explained that EID would designate a spokesman for the case. The reason for this, Mukhoty told The News, was so information would emanate from a single source to properly inform the news media.

Joseph I. Gmuca of EID legal services, Santa Fe, was named as spokesman. He is also the attorney handling, or may I say, mishandling, the case.

Throughout the month of February, Gmuca told The News that if Southland did not agree to a proposed settlement by March 4, then he would file a formal lawsuit against the Dallas corporation, which owns 7-11.

Well, March 4 came and went, and no settlement was forthcoming. In a March 15 News article, Gmuca was quoted: "If I don't hear anything within a reasonable period of time, we'll have to file a lawsuit." At that time, Gmuca stated that a reasonable amount of time "would depend on how closely we are to a settlement."

A month and a half later, a settlement has yet to be signed and Southland has not been taken to court. Obviously, the two parties involved were not very close to a settlement at that time or an agreement probably would have been finalized by now.

I am forced to ask, "Is a month and a half a reasonable amount of time? Why hasn't some firm, decisive action been taken by EID to resolve the Southland Affair?"

The reason I call it the Southland Affair is because Gmuca seems to enjoy waltzing with the Southland lawyers who apparently play the tunes which Gmuca dances to. Gmuca has not been very cooperative with The News while apparently going out of his way to accommodate the people, at

Southland. It is his job to represent EID in legal matters, and in so doing, to represent the citizens of New Mexico.

It is my job as a reporter to inform the citizens of Ruidoso on matters which directly affect them and their environment.

I feel that there should be no conflict of interest in either one of us conducting our jobs. I performed my job by calling Gmuca regularly to check up on EID's progress so that Ruidosians may know what the people in Santa Fe are doing on our behalf.

I feel that Gmuca has failed miserably in his job. Besides the fact that no agreement has yet been reached, Gmuca, when he would talk to me, has refused to reveal what any settlement will include or what the points of contention are in the negotiating process. Thus, he has denied the plaintiffs in this case (New Mexicans and Ruidosians) their right to know what's going on. It is my own belief that by making at least some of the settlement proposals public, Southland might have felt some pressure and acquiesced sooner.

Then, the busy Mr. Gmuca could get on with his other activities unfettered.

Although the two violations of the New Mexico Water Quality Control Commission are civil, as opposed to criminal, offenses, Gmuca himself has hardly been civil in his dealings with this reporter.

In his suburban New York accent, he accused me of harassing his secretaries and causing them psychological harm. He also said I was a pest.

Balderdash! If Gmuca would take his phone calls instead of ducking into the bathroom or library every time I call, and if he would return my phone calls, then I might be less likely to call his office in an attempt to secure the information which Ruidoso News readers are interested in reading.

Louis Rose of EID legal services informed me, since Gmuca "was not in yet" when I announced who I was, that the maximum fine per regulation violation per day is \$1,000.

Gmuca told The News last week that a verbal agreement of a \$500 settlement had been reached with Southland, which Southland attorneys denied. That is one-fourth of what the state of New Mexico potentially has coming to it, and Southland officials have admitted that a gas spill occurring on property they own killed at least 2,500 fish, mostly brown trout.

I believe Gmuca has dragged his feet in this case. There is no doubt that New Mexico regulations have been violated. Why hasn't this case been pursued more vigorously?

Gmuca has acted politically irresponsibly. He has been placed in a position of authority by the people of New Mexico to serve this state's citizens, but I don't believe he has acted in the best interest of New Mexico citizens.

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# Crime in state and national parks targeted by Crime Stoppers

All yes, the joys of nature... hiking through the woods, hearing the wind's song in the trees, the chirping of birds, the gurgling of a stream and seeing all the wildlife.

Unfortunately, not all the wildlife in New Mexico's national forests are of the animal variety.

It seems incongruous to think of someone getting mugged in the middle of the Pecos National Forest. But several years ago, that's exactly what happened to some hiker. He was mugged by a man who came face-to-face with some armed men.

It seems equally ludicrous to visualize a hiker returning to the trailhead after a peaceful coexistence with nature, only to find that his vehicle has been vandalized or burglarized. But last year, law enforcement officials reported more than 150 such crimes around New Mexico.

The major problem investigators have with these types of cases is that they usually occur in deserted areas. Thus, witnesses are a rarity. In order to solve most of these crimes, either a co-offender in the case or someone with knowledge about it, must come forward with enough information to help investigators put together enough facts for a prosecution.


This week, the State Crime Stoppers Commission is stepping forward to assist. The Commission is announcing that it will offer rewards ranging from \$25 to \$1,000 for information leading to the solution of felony crimes committed within New Mexico's state and national parks.

Anyone with information can become eligible for a reward by calling State Crime Stoppers at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933. Callers do not have to reveal

their identities. Rewards will be paid upon the arrests and indictments of the offenders.

Last week, at its meeting in Las Cruces, the State Crime Stoppers Commission approved the payment of \$2,475 worth of rewards to citizens whose calls to the statewide program led to the solution of crimes ranging from welfare fraud and cattle rustling to burglary, auto theft and the capture of several fugitives.

To date, a total of 403 major crimes have been solved by the police with the help of calls to the State Crime Stoppers Commission. More than \$5 million worth of stolen property and narcotics have been recovered with the assistance of these calls, with another \$370,294 worth of court-ordered restitutions and fines being returned to state government.

**TRAINING SUGGESTIONS: STAY**

The command Stay may be given while the dog is standing, sitting or lying down. At the command he should remain in the position he held when it was given.

Put your dog on his short leash. Command him to go Down. Tell him to Stay. Walk around him, keeping the end of leash in hand, but do not tighten up on it. When he starts to get up, say, "No, Stay." Back away from him, go sideways from him; step over him. Each time he starts to get up, repeat "No, Stay." Each time he starts to follow you when you walk away from him, you must command him to go Down again.

Soon he will Stay while you walk to the end of the short leash, while you walk around him, or even while you jump over him. You will have to try all of these if you want to make a good "stayer" out of him.

After he has made considerable progress, vary the routine by having him Sit while you repeat the procedure. When you feel that he is proficient when worked on the short leash, start work with the long leash. Put the dog Down at your side. Wad up the surplus of leash in your hand and throw it out away from you. Command him to Stay, repeating the word several times. Turn and walk to the free end of the leash. If he rises, rush right back and make him go Down again. Repeat the command Stay and walk away once more. Your immediate objective is to be able to walk to the end of the long leash, pick it up, turn and face the dog for a few minutes. He remains quietly in position until you call him to you. Work on this until he will Stay in

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
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


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**The Dreamer**

**Birthday Of Our Father**

This is being written to you on April 29, as the month of new blossoms and leaves and little calves, prepares to say farewell for this time; and these words will reach you on May three, the birthday of our father, Lynn Whippa Storm, born on this date 1879 in Rochester, Pennsylvania.

Two other May birthdays that come to mind are Brother Lynn's eldest grandchild, the former Elizabeth Lynn Burnett (Mrs. Steve Zlotnich) of Ruidoso, May 6. And Allen Reynolds, our friend and neighbor of many years, May 15.

Our father, Lynn, is the great grandson of Peter Storm who came with his two brothers from Switzerland a few years before the Revolutionary War, and was a soldier in Washington's army at the surrender of the British under Cornwallis, at Yorktown, Virginia, October 19, 1782.

At an early age he was brought to Denver, Colorado by his parents, Francis David Storm, and the former Althea Ellen Reno. In East Denver High School he met his wife-to-be the former Bertha Catherine Kennedy.

After graduation from high school he entered the Colorado School of Mines, where he was graduated with honors as class president, and also class poet, in 1902.

His first work as mining Engineer took him to the coal fields of Dawson, New Mexico; and later to the coal mines of Utah.

In 1908 he went to Valdez, Alaska where he operated a minerals analysis office, and also worked as government surveyor and prospector.

In January of 1909 our mother and the eldest child, John, made the trip to Valdez, and here October 27, 1909 the second son, Daniel was born. The third son, Marcus, was born in Valdez, September four, 1911. Joseph the fourth son was born in Denver Colorado, February 28, 1913. And Lynn, the youngest, in Juneau, Alaska, November twenty-eight, 1914.

After a year in Mexico examining mines

and working for a silver smelter, he came to Texas where he changed from mining engineer to Petroleum Geologist, working for the Sun Oil Company. As the age of retirement of sixty five approached, the company officials said to one another, "if Lynn wants to retire he will have to come to us, we will not go to him."

And father told his friends, "If the company wants me to retire, they will have to come to me; I am not going to them"

This went on for ten years, and finally at the age seventy-five father went to the company officials and said, "I think I had better retire, for I am afraid I am not giving you value received" (or something like that).

"That is where you are wrong, L. W.," said the personnel man. "You are getting better all the time, and we would hate to lose you."

Father then said that he had always wanted to do some writing, and that he wanted to spend some time in New Mexico with his son, Dannie.

A rare combination of engineer, philosopher, poet, Father stayed busy in retirement, writing and studying. He has many scientific articles to his credit that are still used in teaching in Universities. He was active in the Alumni Association of his School, making many suggestions for changes in the curriculum, especially more emphasis on English, which were adopted.

In article about Father, in the Mines Magazine, it said, "Lynn Storm was universally respected and admired: no one was ever known to dislike him."

And his youngest brother, Jerome Vincent Storm, former Moving Picture director in the "Silent Days," when hearing that our Dad had gone to work for the Sun Oil Company, said of his oldest brother:

"They are lucky. When they get Lynn, they get brains and they get honesty."

Father had just finished a book-length manuscript about the Ice Ages of the Earth entitled "The Ice Comes and Goes," shortly before he was called home by Our Lord Christmas eve, 1962.

I feel the blessed presence of our father very fondly close at the approach of his birthday.

Confiscated equipment is not returned to those who are convicted of the charges. Many departments amass such items until it becomes worthwhile to hold a public auction for disposal. Usually, the auctions are advertised in several area papers beforehand, but a call to the department should bring forth some information.

If a bidder knows what he's looking at, he can often come away with a "steal". That's not to say some caution shouldn't be exercised. The departments offer no warranties with the merchandise, and it's your responsibility to assess it's condition.

Many times the auction will place certain limits on the perspective buyers. It may be a one-gun limit per person, or another means of limiting a buyer from amassing a collection for resale.
