

A record—April building permits top \$5 million mark

The building boom continues to skyrocket in this area. A building permit issued to the owners of the Triple Crown Condominium project in Ruidoso Downs sent the value of permits issued in April above the \$5 million mark—another all-time monthly high. The figure for April at \$5,059,140 was the third record breaking sum in the last six months. It follows March's record figure of \$3,715,780. November 1981 also saw a record for building permits. The permits, which are based on an underestimated value of \$20 per square foot, boosted the mark for the first four months of 1982 to \$11,549,900. That compares with \$6,023,579 for the same period

last year. The permit for the Triple Crown project was for 104 condominium units with an estimated value of over \$3 million. The permit was issued by the Ruidoso building inspector under an agreement with Ruidoso Downs to share the inspector. The two villages split the fee. Because of the heavy work load for building inspector Don Hendricks, the Village of Ruidoso recently hired John Emde to serve as assistant inspector. Hendricks said Emde is due to start work full time in mid-May. Permits were issued in April for 49 single family dwellings, five residential additions or alterations, two commercial

buildings, one commercial addition or alteration and three condominium projects. The permits below are listed by subdivision or location, type of structure, and estimated cost of construction. Forest fire controlled after burning three acres

Four boys playing with matches were the apparent cause of a fire that burned about three acres of brush and trees Saturday afternoon in the Airport West subdivision between Rio Arriba Road and Highway 37. The fire, which started shortly before 2 p.m., burned quickly out of control as it was whipped through the dry vegetation by moderate winds. The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD), assisted by United States Forest Service (USFS) firefighters and the Smokey Bear Hot Shot crew, responded quickly to the blaze and kept the flames from reaching several nearby houses. Firefighters had the fire under control before 2:30 p.m. and stayed at the scene until 5 p.m. to douse the remaining hot spots, RVFD fire superintendent Derald Waltrip said. The four boys were reported to have called RVFD after the fire started; they then met fire officials at the scene. 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FORT STANTON MESA TOURED Site study group slights SBAC

The study team was in Las Cruces Wednesday to hear presentations by NMSU scientists on the research at Fort Stanton Mesa. The group was to hold a final meeting Friday morning to assign responsibilities for each member of the six-man committee before wrapping up its schedule.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) expressed doubt Thursday that the evaluation of New Mexico State University's (NMSU) research on Fort Stanton Mesa by a National Academy of Sciences (NAS) committee will be objective after the committee failed to meet with SBAC as planned. SBAC members instructed chairman Fred Heckman to contact United States Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt and inform the senator to "keep a close watch" on the NAS evaluation. The commission's action came after members waited in vain for the study team to show up at the regular SBAC meeting Thursday afternoon in the Ruidoso Downs municipal building. The team of scientists was in the area Thursday to inspect NMSU's research sites on the mesa. According to the group's tentative agenda for its three days in the state last week, it had scheduled to meet with SBAC as part of the group's visit to this area.

Frank Golley, chairman of the NAS committee, said the group did not "have time to meet with the airport commission" as scheduled Thursday afternoon. "There's really not a need to meet with the airport people," Golley said. He said the committee's assignment was to look at the "significance of (NMSU's) research and the impact of development on the research." He said the group did not want to get involved in the conflict over the airport site between NMSU and SBAC. "It's the business of the Secretary of Interior and people like that to resolve the conflict," he said. Golley added that the study group hopes "to bring more facts to bear" on the situation and help the Department of the Interior (DOI) make a decision.

According to the NAS contract to study the research, those are the conditions outlined for the scientists regarding their study objectives. "The objective of the review is to help the Department (DOI) understand the relative importance of the ongoing research and the relative loss to users of this research should the airport request be approved," the contract states. Also stipulated in the pact is: "The study itself will not attempt a comparison" between the importance of the research relative to the importance of an airport to its users. But SBAC members indicated Thursday they felt the NAS committee should have listened to their position on the airport in order for the study group to make an objective evaluation.

Robert Schultz, representing the BLM, said the original airport application presented to BLM was for more than 3,000 acres and asked Heckman to explain the contradiction. Heckman said SBAC never wanted more than 600 acres for the airport, but in its application that was turned down by the BLM in 1978, the 3,000-acre figure appeared because of BLM requirements in applying for land under its jurisdiction. Heckman said, "If we wanted one foot out of a 40-acre tract, then the BLM required that we apply for the entire 40 acres. It turned out to be 3,000 acres, but we never needed that much land." Study group member James Teer of the Weider Wildlife Foundation asked Heckman if the 600 acres was enough space for runways, the terminal, access roads and airport support facilities. Heckman then explained that when the airport site was originally studied, "there wasn't a great deal of use of the two proposed sites (Site A and Site B) by New Mexico State."

Jiltaloom, Rebelier, Special Effort are weekend stars

Jiltaloom, a 7-1 shot ridden by Vickie Smallwood, saved his best punch for the end and rolled to an easy victory in Sunday's second division of the Inaugural Purse at Ruidoso Downs. The roan four-year-old colt, owned by Alvin Hill and Hugh Preston Jr., of Burkburnett, Texas, was well out of contention in the early going of the six-furlong sprint. Special Hank, a 3-1 shot, tried to steal the sprint with a sustained burst of early speed. But Special Hank was continually dogged by Pressure Is On, an outsider, and Saurkraut. Despite the stiff challenge, Special Hank was still in front when he turned for home. At the mid-way point, he managed to keep his lead—and almost seemed to have the win sewed up. In the final stages, Jiltaloom came roaring out of the pack and won going away. The victory margin was two and one-fourth lengths. Jiltaloom collected \$3,000 of the five-grand purse and returned \$16.20 to win, \$5.30 to place, \$3.60 to show. The win was Jiltaloom's second of the year from three starts. He toured the Inaugural distance in 1:15 3/5 seconds. Special Hank, hauling Salustio Borges in the top load of 122 pounds, had to settle for second. The payoffs: \$4.80, \$3.60. Saurkraut, the property of Jess Burner of El Paso, Texas, finished third after staying within striking range all the way. The gelding ended up two and one-fourths lengths behind Special Hank. Fans who backed Saurkraut got back a \$3.60 show price. Joe Martinez was the pilot. The first division of the Inaugural also went to a come-from-behind specialist—

Bradley's Copy. The filly, owned by James Bradley of Hereford, Texas, got away at better than 14-1. She settled in eighth place in the nine-head field, and remained well back most of the way. In the upper stretch, she was in sixth place, ostensibly out of contention. But Bradley's Copy, ridden by Leroy Coombs, passed horses rapidly in the final half-furlong and nailed Time To Sail by three-quarter lengths. During the recent Sunland Park season, Bradley's Copy won the Winsham Lad Handicap, then conked out badly in her next two starts. Sunday's win was worth mutual payoffs of \$30.60, \$11.60, \$4.60. The winning time was 1:17 flat. Time To Sail, handled by Gary Sumpter, finished second and handed out \$4.20 and \$3. Horner, a 5-1 shot, rallied from far back to finish third, paying \$2.80. Racing resumes Thursday with Kansas Futurity trials.

The Raise Your Glass colt zipped to a 20:50 reading into a strong headwind while winning the ninth trial race by three lengths. He will meet nine foes in the May 23 Kansas Derby, the first leg of the Triple Crown race for three-year-olds. The winner of the Kansas Derby will earn \$122,150 from the record Kansas Derby purse of \$354,000. Special Effort, who won an unprecedented Triple Crown for two-year-olds last season while earning \$1,026,723, has set the fastest qualifying time for each futurity he's sought for trainer Johnnie Goodman. Ridden by regular rider W. R. Hunt, Special Effort is leased by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas, to Timothy and Dana Guidry, also of Canadian, Texas. As the overwhelming 1-9 favorite, Special Effort paid \$2.20, \$2.20 and \$2.20. The \$44,771 bet on Special Effort to show created a minus pool of \$9,393. There was also a \$928.40 minus win pool. The complete list of Kansas Derby qualifiers and their times: Rebelier, 20:39; Special Effort, 20:50; Aasertive, 20:54; Easy Diamond Jim, 20:54; Bugs Milo, 20:56; Lika Jenni, 20:63; Go For Bugs, 20:68; Jays Mainspring, 20:69; Real Jet Wind, 20:72. There was a special drawing Sunday morning between Ima Ten Too and Broken Pedal for the tenth and final berth. Each ran a 20:73 clocking. The opening day crowd of 4,806 wagered a record Ruidoso Downs opening day mutual handle of \$579,611. The previous high was the \$460,111 wagered on 1981's opening day.


Clyde Jones dies
Clyde Jones, the well known racetrack photographer in the Southwest for over two decades, passed away over the weekend. Jones, 69, suffered a heart attack while on the job during Saturday's opening day program at Ruidoso Downs. He was taken to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, where he succumbed later in the day. Jones had been the track photographer at Sunland Park since 1960. He also put in several tours of duty at Ruidoso Downs over the years, the last beginning in 1972. Known as a tireless worker and a dedicated craftsman, Jones built a reputation as one of the finest track photographers in the country. Group studying airport sites skips SBAC meeting

Heckman said it was decided at a meeting between Senator Schmitt, NMSU, LM and SBAC in February 1981 that the preferred location for an airport would be Site B because costs for constructing an airport on Site A were pro-

hibitive. NMSU president Gerald Thomas said at Wednesday's meeting that the university could modify its research to accommodate an airport on Site A. He indicated the loss of Site B would cause NMSU to abandon its range studies.

James Klemmedson also inquired if the

600 acres was all SBAC needed. "Would acreage include all facilities?" he asked. "What is the probability of demand for additional land for ancillary facilities and development?"

"I hope it would not be built," Heckman said. "There is no industrial development (in this area), and no agricultural development; our future is tourism." "We planned enough land and it's as big as the airport will get. We will build only what we requested; we are a public body," Heckman said. "We expect BLM to use the highest degree of integrity in this request."

Kothmann asked the SBAC chairman if the commission had problems acquiring financing for the proposed airport.

Heckman said the commission has sought funding "so many times" for the project but could never clear up the land conflict. He said SBAC never had problems with financing in the past, and he said, "Now we want the site first."

"We're not going to build the airport this year," he said. If SBAC obtains Site B for

the airport, he added, "We would need to redesign, which would take at least a year, then we'll get the funding."

Heckman said there is "no way" Ruidoso itself could fund the airport. He said because the proposed project is for a regional airport, the commission would look to the federal government for the majority of funding.

"This airport is the top airport priority in the state," he added.

Heckman also informed the committee that consultants to SBAC, Herkenhoff-Parsons, originally chose 15 possible sites for the airport, but the options were narrowed down to the two locations on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Klemmedson asked Heckman, "What is the status of the other 13 sites as far as potential for airports?"

"They would not be approved by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) or the state Transportation Department," Heckman said. "We've been asked; instead of messing with time and studies, why not build somewhere else?" Heck-

man noted, but he stated that the other sites are not feasible.

Heckman then expressed SBAC's concern that the committee balance its look at NMSU's research with the airport proposal.

"You're scientific objectivity is the main thing we're interested in; you're all from agricultural universities and you're evaluating research of an agricultural university," he said.

Following the meeting with Heckman, the NAS group drove to Fort Stanton Mesa to inspect NMSU's research on the contested airport sites.

Dr. Arnold Nelson, head of Animal and Range Sciences at NMSU, led the scientists on a tour of the southwest part of the mesa—the area where Sites A and B are located—which NMSU uses to conduct range grazing experiments.

Nelson stopped at various locations that were staked to show the scientists the boundaries of the proposed airport on Site B.

NMSU staked the boundary of the 275-acre first phase of the airport with red flags, and the corners of the 3,000-acre site that SBAC originally applied for with white flags.

During the tour, Nelson said as far as he knew, if the land is relinquished to SBAC, the commission "will have to ask for the full (3,000 acre) size."

At SBAC's meeting later in the day, commission member Ben Hall was angered over NMSU's opinion that the airport may take up 3,000 acres of land.

"You don't have to add two and two to know why" (Nelson pointed out the larger tract to the NAS group), Hall said.

"Nelson is using it for his own purposes," he said. "The airport never needed any more land than it needs now."

Hall's anger was only part of the frustration vented at the meeting.

State Senator Charlie Lee, was at the municipal building waiting for the NAS scientists to appear.

"I thought the committee was to be here today," he said. "I wanted to present my point."

Lee said he wanted to tell the scientists he feels "pretty strong" about supporting the airport. He said his support is a change from his position six years ago when he was president of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association.

Lee said that at that time, "some of the research (at Fort Stanton Mesa) was very important to public range grazing. But that was a number of years ago."

"It seems like that part of the research should be about over; its running close to

10 years. It appears some adjustments could be made and (NMSU) could still conduct experiments," said Lee. "It's really just big time politics," he added.

SBAC member Norman Wheeler felt the committee should have heard what the airport commission had to say.

"If they heard New Mexico State's side, they should also hear our side," he said.

Lee suggested that SBAC take its case to state livestock associations and see if agricultural groups feel an airport can coexist with the experiments.

"You're in a political game," he said, and mentioned NMSU is highly skilled at playing the game. "Who are the allies of the university? Agriculture. Don't talk with the university—sell people in the livestock industry your problem."

"I'm afraid your suggestion is the only way we're going to make headway," Heckman said. "We're too small to fight on the university's level. We went in the wrong direction; we relied on too many people; we talked with New Mexico State too much."

Heckman asked the commission if it should mount a "road program" as Lee advised.

"I say we go after them," Hall said.

On Friday, Heckman said he learned NMSU used an outdated map Thursday to show the NAS team the flagged boundaries of the airport. He said the illustration, which shows space reserved for industrial development on the airport site, was never approved by SBAC after Herkenhoff-Parsons completed the work.

Nelson said "the only maps we (NMSU) received were given us by them (SBAC)." He said the university has not obtained a map of the 600-acre scaled down version of the proposed airport.

Heckman also said he had been in contact with Schmitt's office.

Heckman quoted one of Schmitt's aides as saying, "In Senator Schmitt's opinion, you don't know (how objective NAS will be) until you've seen the study."

"New Mexico State University's peers (NAS) are the most qualified to look at NMSU," Heckman quoted the aide. "The Senator feels the strongest motivation of the Academy is to be objective. There is nothing higher in a scientist's esteem than to judge other scientists."

Heckman said after talking with the aide, "I don't want to say we've given up on the Academy at this point."

Lincoln County extension service specializes in giving information

The Lincoln County Cooperative Extension Service, associated with New Mexico State University (NMSU), acts as go-between for the university and the people of the county. The primary job of extension service, according to county extension agent Barry Herd, is to disseminate information. The service is funded by the county, state and federal governments and is divided into four areas of service: agriculture, home economics, 4-H and community resource development. Agriculture extension agent, Herd works with ranchers, fruit growers and those interested in agriculture, offering information and answering questions on a variety of subjects, including pest control, animal health, lawns and gardens pruning. Herd also works with the 4-H groups, including clubs in Ruidoso, Corona, Carrizozo, Hondo and two in Capitan. Mary Ellen Payne, extension service home economist, also works with 4-H, along with an aide who was recently hired to help organize the newly established 4-H club in Ruidoso. Herd said the extension service is hoping to hire a 4-H agent by July 1, so he and Payne can devote more time to the adult programs.

agriculture are available at NMSU to aid him in answering questions and offering advice, Herd said.

A lot of the job is one-on-one, he commented, and the two most important things used by a county extension agent are the telephone and a pickup truck. Herd stated that people need to realize that he covers the entire county in a lot of different areas, which keeps him extremely busy and unable to answer each call immediately.

Herd also works with the 4-H groups, including clubs in Ruidoso, Corona, Carrizozo, Hondo and two in Capitan. Mary Ellen Payne, extension service home economist, also works with 4-H, along with an aide who was recently hired to help organize the newly established 4-H club in Ruidoso. Herd said the extension service is hoping to hire a 4-H agent by July 1, so he and Payne can devote more time to the adult programs.

The 4-H programs, for nine to 19-year-olds, teach agriculture, home economics, arts and crafts and community development through participation in projects in these areas.

Each 4-H club has a volunteer organizational leader, Herd explained, but the extension service is responsible for the overall 4-H program in the county.

In addition to working on projects, 4-H members participate in several leadership and citizenship development conferences in the state and in Washington, D.C. each year. Agriculture and home economics projects are entered in fairs and contests throughout the year, also.

As Lincoln County Extension Service home economist, Mary Ellen Payne works with the five extension homemakers clubs in the county, plus the Zia Senior Citizens Center and the Santa Rita Quilters group, which she helped organize. Payne also offers public programs and workshops on

various subjects related to home economics, such as food preservation and preparation, furniture refinishing and reupholstering and sewing with knits.

Payne also keeps busy answering calls and letters from people with questions pertaining to home economics.

The community resource development area of the extension service is also supervised by Payne, although she said the program is currently not very active. She has worked with various groups in the area of economic development, including helping the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce establish an economic development committee and providing resource people for the committee.

Also in conjunction with the extension service community resource development program, Payne has worked with Carrizozo in obtaining grant money for a variety of projects, including housing rehabilitation, solar heating of the swimming pool and the establishment of Fred Chaves Park.

Payne and the 4-H club also help with the annual town cleanup in Carrizozo, scheduled for May 15 this year.

Both Herd and Payne agreed that having to cover such a large area makes their jobs interesting, but also frustrating. The Extension Service secretary, Carlyn Ladd, is an important part of the staff because she helps out with calls when Herd and Payne are out of the office.

In addition to all of their other responsibilities, Herd and Payne present programs to different groups on various topics related to the extension service projects.

Payne said that the extension service is probably historically one of the most unique services people have ever had.

"We continue their education long after they're out of school," she said, "and serve to give information to people who don't have anyone else to go to."

Payne emphasized that the extension service is most concerned about providing programs which actually show a dollar and cents savings for families and individuals.

Herd explained that the purpose of the extension service is to educate, not to actually provide services. Information is available from the extension service to be utilized by any county resident.

Herd and Payne noted that people tend to use extension services more when the economy is bad because they are looking for ways to save money.

Herd stated that the job of the Lincoln County Extension Service is going to grow as long as Lincoln County is growing, which he expects it to do. More and more people are using it (extension service) all the time, he noted.

Payne said it is a job that is different every day, which makes it interesting.

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

Warriors qualify 14 athletes for state AAA track meet

Warrior boys to send five athletes to state

Ruidoso High School's boys' track team will send five athletes to the state meet next week as a result of their performances at Saturday's district 3-AAA meet at Alamogordo High School.

The Warriors, who will compete in the AAA meet in Albuquerque Friday and Saturday, are Lon Nunley, Don Nunley, Grady Williamson, Scott Neal and Cisco Bob.

Lon Nunley will compete in the discus and shot put and combine with Williamson, Don Nunley and Neal in the 400 meter, 800 meter and 1,600 meter relay. Bob, only a freshman, will compete in the 1,500 meter run.

Bob finished second with a personal best of 4:20.3, just behind winner Joey Flores of Deming, who clocked a 4:19.8 time.

Lon Nunley won the discus with a 157.6 effort (he has a best of 167.8) and threw the shot put 49-8. Nunley initially had first place in the shot put but Silver City made a protest that the Warrior coaches were talking to their athletes during the competition and the protest was upheld.

Nunley lost his first place in the shot put and junior Billy Woodul lost a fifth place effort in the javelin because of the protest ruling.

Earlier, Silver City had been disqualified from the 400 meter relay heats.

"It (talking to the athletes during the competition) is something all the coaches have been doing this season," said Ruidoso assistant coach Jim Ramsey. "All of a sudden Silver City makes a mistake of its own and it decides to make a protest against somebody else."

The Warrior 400 meter relay team ran a 44.9 for second place, took second in the 800 meter relay with a 1:33.1 clocking and won an impressive victory in the 1,600 meter relay with an outstanding 3:27.9 time.

"We knew they had the ability to run fast," Warrior head coach Ronnie Maskew said of the 1,600 meter relay team. "But this was an outstanding time. It's one of the best things I've seen since I've been involved in New Mexico athletics."

Don Nunley ran a blazing 49.7 anchor leg

on the 1,600 meter relay. Lon Nunley added a 51.4 leg, Neal had a 52.4 and Williamson a 54.0.

Deming, with swift Iza Marshall running the anchor legs, took the 400 meter relay in 44.6 and the 800 meter relay in 1:33.0. Marshall also won the 100 meters in 11.5 (against the wind) and the 200 meters with a 23.0 time.

Besides the state qualifying performances, Ruidoso had several other fine efforts from its athletes.

Williamson finished fifth in the 100 meters with a 12.0 time. A powerful headwind prevented the sprint event runners from recording really fast times. The Warrior junior has a best of 11.15 this season.

Neal just missed out on a state meet berth in the 110 meter high hurdles. He finished third with a 16.6 time, missing second place and an automatic state berth by a foot.

Sophomore Curt McClellan finished fifth in the 800 meters with a 2:15.2 time. McClellan had been sidelined with pneumonia.

Sophomore David Landrum and eighth-grader David Ordorica finished sixth and seventh, respectively, in the 3,000 meter run. Both runners had 10:35.0 times.

Ruidoso suffered some misfortune in the medley relay when it was disqualified for dropping the baton.

Bob, who ran the anchor leg, brought the Warriors up to third place but the disqualification held.

Deming won the boys' competition with 105 points. Truth or Consequences (T or C) was a surprising second with 82 points, Silver City was third with 63 and the Warriors were fourth with 47. Cobre and Tularosa brought up the rear.

"We should have a good chance of scoring in every event we're entered in," Maskew said. "We had some times today (Saturday) and we're going to get faster."

The AAA state meet will be held in conjunction with the AAAA meet at the University of New Mexico stadium in the Duke City.

Professional sports franchise in Mexico?

haven't heard that idea passed lately, the possibility of The Land Grant obtaining a major league certainly isn't that far-fetched

greatest thing holding back New Mexico is its small population, over 1,300,000.

Majority of cities having professional franchises have metropolitan areas greater than the entire state of Mexico.

State should still be able to support major league professional sports if the right team and the right person.

Expansion in the National Basketball Association (NBA) would appear to be Mexico's best chance for major professional sports.

Diversity of New Mexico (UNM) arena (better known as The Pit) out frequently for Lobo basketball. The state high school basketball championships also play to near-crowds.

Texas and Kentucky usually have the largest attendance figures for their basketball tournaments than New Mexico.

Mexicans are also interested in boxing, baseball and track, but rest in basketball is especially

particularly true in Albuquerque. A professional basketball team would promote its home games.

Best place to play the home games is The Pit, although a contract would have to be worked out with UNM officials.

officials.

Some of the games could also be played at New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Pan-American Center.

The team could be named after the state rather than any particular city. This has already been done in the NBA with the Indiana Pacers, the New Jersey Nets and the Golden State Warriors.

New Mexico is a large state, so having the professional basketball team play home games at NMSU and UNM (at opposite ends of the state) would be an advantage. People from both the southern and northern ends of the state wouldn't have to travel very far to see the games.

There don't appear to be any plans for NBA expansion in the immediate future. Almost all the large and middle-sized population areas in the country have NBA franchises.

However, there are still areas of the country untouched by the NBA and the other major league professional sports. New Mexico is one of them.

Within 10 years we shouldn't have to say that anymore. If the NBA power structure is smart, they'll see New Mexico as a future spot for a franchise.

Now that the horse racing season is upon us, summer and Ruidoso's numerous outdoors activities aren't that far behind.

There will be so many people in the Ruidoso area over the next four months (possibly over 30,000 people in one day) that professional sports officials might see this area as a good place for a franchise.

Maybe they'll shift one of the current basketball, football or baseball franchises here.

Warrior coach sees rebuilding job

A rebuilding job is facing Ruidoso High School's football team this fall, according to head coach Darrel Stierwalt.

"We're losing 17 or 18 starters to graduation," Stierwalt said before Friday's spring weight-training practice. "We'll have to rebuild on both offense and defense."

The Warriors, who were 4-2 in district 3-AAA play and 8-2 overall last season, are currently working outside Tuesdays and Thursdays and going inside to the weight-training room Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

Some of the Ruidoso offensive starters who are returning next fall include halfback Grady Williamson, center David Swalander, offensive tackle Craig Carson and quarterback Billy Woodul.

Woodul started five games at quarter-

back before Stierwalt went with senior Scott Neal. Williamson, who is a top track sprinter, is a breakout threat and should be one of the top running backs in the AAA division next fall.

Defensively, the Warriors lose all their starting linebackers. But junior Kyle Flack played a lot last season and should be a defensive key for Ruidoso next fall.

Chris Winn, Robert Swanner and Mike Douglas played a lot on the defensive line last season and should be improved this year.

Stierwalt has around 60 players out for spring practice and almost half of them are freshmen and eighth-graders.

"We've got a good crop of eighth-graders here," Stierwalt said. "If they stay together they can be really tough in a couple of seasons."

After the track season ends Saturday with the state meet, the Warrior gridders will be working out on the field for a full week and possibly more.

Stierwalt plans to have the players work out more during a summer weight-training program.

"That could be a key as to how well our players develop this year," he said. "Whether or not they really work hard in the summer weight program."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Some bald facts about politics, to which most voters have given little conscious thought:

—One: Those who have the easiest time raising money for campaigns are those running for legislative offices.

What business people, just to single out a group, would like to "buy" is the ability to cause laws to come into being or not to come into being.

That means people who run for Congress or the Legislature get more money forced upon them than anyone else. (If you run for some obscure office, like Land Commissioner or State Auditor, forget it.)

Jack Schmitt this year will spend a million and a half dollars on his race for the Senate — and he has no opposition in the primary. Almost every cent of that vast sum will be given him.

Why? Because lawmakers can cause things to happen — or not happen.

If a bill you don't want passed can be killed before it gets to the desk of the President or Governor, who needs a President or Governor? Right?

It's simple. Remember it — even in this strange year when New Mexico's lawmakers will be running in a primary all of their own.

—Two: You cannot shake your past. Run for office, and what you have done will come back to haunt you.

Exempli gratia: Antonio Anaya. He can't shake the fact that he was connected with a scandal about Chinese ship impellers. He cannot deny that he had something important to do with the present high utility rates.

The facts stay there — and, you may be

sure, they haunt him.

Even the recent ones will rise during a campaign, like that request for campaign funds from the oil-and-gas operator in Gstaad, Switzerland.

Toney told his local fundraisers he would not take more than \$1000 from anybody, so nobody could say he was owned.

Yet the boss of his California ad agency wrote to the American in Switzerland to say Toney needed \$100,000 to fund his campaign.

Despite the fact that Toney, when the letter became public, said, "Ohhhhh! I'm so maaaaad at him for writing that! I could stamp my foot!" or words to that effect, that letter will come back to haunt him.

Three: Any candidate who would learn how to campaign in special areas could be well out in front of his opposition.

If you've ever driven up Montgomery Boulevard in Albuquerque, for instance, you know that all those people in apartments much like Taos Pueblo who live in block after block along that street must be as attractive as temptation to candidates.

But how do you reach them? And how do you woo them?

They are so heterogeneous, so unmixable, so unassimilated into New Mexico that there is no telling what your approach to them should be.

A former United States Senator, now deceased, said to this writer once, "McCaffrey, I will give you six thousand tax-free dollars if you will tell me how to campaign in the Northeast Heights."

There was a long pause. The writer did not know the answer.

If he did, he would copyright it and sell it to candidates for years to come.

Dear editor:

This letter is a reply to Mr. Carl Parsons' attack on myself, my wife, our restaurant, the Village of Ruidoso Council, and the State of New Mexico Alcoholic Beverage Control Department concerning the application for a beer and wine license.

According to St. John, at a wedding feast in Cana, the first miracle of Jesus was that of turning water into wine. The bible does not prohibit the serving and the use of alcohol. It does teach moderation.

It is both quaint and archaic, but also disturbing, that a minister of a church here in Ruidoso has the audacity and lack of temperance of other peoples beliefs to infer that my wife and I along with the village council and the state of New Mexico are acting irresponsibly, reprehensibly and incomprehensibly in requesting approval of an application for the serving of beer and wine at a restaurant in accordance with state laws.

I take sharp and singular exception to anyone, but especially a man of the cloth, who has the abominable affrontery and unmitigated gall to accuse us, the Village Council, and the State of New Mexico of irresponsibility. This man has never met me, he has not of my knowledge eaten in my restaurant, he has no knowledge of my intentions, but he accuses me and others by my making a proper request.

In 1976 we purchased Nob Hill Restaurant and then enlarged it in 1977. During these years we have hired many of the Ruidoso area young people to work with us. Over the years, these young people have come back to thank us for the help and guidance which we have given them in setting goals and setting examples.

When the situation of a change in the liquor licensing laws came into prominence in March of 1981, the writer started asking questions of our customers and other people as to what they would like us to do. The overwhelming response was then, and has continued to be, one where our customers want the privilege of deciding for themselves whether they may choose from a glass of wine, a cup of coffee, a glass of milk, a cup of tea or a glass of beer or soda. They do not want an outside arbiter of their morals dictating to them as to their choice.

As a result of the questions which were asked of our customers, ministers, council members, and State of New Mexico employees and officials, we embarked on a campaign to gain signatures calling for a referendum in accordance with state, county and local law.

More than 600 signatures were obtained in this special election call. Many signatories were those who indicated that they were in fact opposed to the reason for the election, but recognized that their responsible course of action was to bring the subject to a vote.

As a result of the special called election in September, 1981, more than 400 voters turned out, the greatest number of voters

to do so for a special election in recent Ruidoso history. The final result of this vote was that the referendum was approved by approximately 5 to one in favor. This in itself was the largest plurality of any local option district in the State of New Mexico, excepting Santa Fe.

There has been a period of posting at the Nob Hill Restaurant which was the proper time for the action of expressing objections to the granting of the said beer and wine license. Not a single objection was forthcoming, either in Ruidoso or in Santa Fe.

Now, we have one man, who has decided that his will should dominate the will of the people. He has indicated passionately that anyone who disagrees with him must perform be irresponsible, reprehensible or lacking in intelligence. By inference, then, anyone who disagrees with him does not deserve the right of his own opinions, but rather should be restrained.

My first reaction to the gentleman's letter to the editor as published in the Thursday, May 6, Ruidoso News was one of "well it has been expected". However, when the individual's attempts to use McCarthy type smear tactics to condemn all people who do not think as he does, I have felt necessary to defend myself and the others innocently accused.

My comments can be summarized as follows:

1. Consider the source of the comments.
2. Recognize that each of us has a weakness of insight.
3. Each citizen of the U.S. has the right to his opinion.
4. In the U.S. we are innocent until proven guilty.
5. My rights are the equal of my protagonist, no more nor less.

We have proceeded in our request to serve beer and wine by the dictates of our conscience, the wishes of our customers, and have complied with the statutes of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, and the State of New Mexico.

We do not consider that our actions nor the actions of others have laid us open to the claim that we jeopardize the safety of either adults or children in doing so.

We do not feel that the Village Council has acted unwisely nor do we feel that the state of New Mexico has performed a disservice. We recognize the there can be problems associated with the use of alcohol. These problems were carefully considered by the state legislature before the passage of the law.

Judge not according to the appearance, but judge righteous judgement.

This letter has been meant to inform Mr. Parsons and others who may not have been informed and to answer Mr. Parsons' charges to myself and others.

Village fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy has announced that the village is going to crack down on violations of the Uniform Fire Code.

He is particularly concerned with elimination of the fire hazard posed by accumulations of trash and flammable growth.

The timing of the announcement—shortly after the conclusion of the village cleanup campaign—is appropriate.

First of all, the time of peak fire danger is drawing near.

Allowing fuels like wastepaper, hay, grass, straw, weeds, pine needles, litter, petroleum products or any kind of rubbish to pile up on a roof, vacant lot or any open space is an invitation to disaster.

Secondly, enforcement of the ordinances against accumulation of refuse will, in effect, serve to continue Operation Trash.

There is one key difference, however.

The cleanup campaign suggested in a nice way that residents clean up their property, and offered ways to facilitate the removal and dumping of trash.

The new approach has some teeth. Persons found violating the fire code will be sent a "clean it up or else" notice—with the "or else" being a possible \$300 fine for violation of a village ordinance.

If your neighbor has a fire hazard in his yard, you may be reluctant to report it. But if a fire starts there and burns your house down with it, you will probably wish you had.—TP

Reporter's Round

"Human history becomes more and more a race between education and catastrophe."—H. G. Wells.

The passage was quoted by Joe Romero, member of the New Mexico Board of Education, during the board's monthly meeting held in Ruidoso April 29 and 30.

Romero reported on the National Association of State Boards of Education (NASBE) legislative conference in Washington, D.C., explaining that he feels education in the United States is failing in its task, as evidenced by declining test scores and enrollment.

Romero stated that such programs as foreign languages are "ideas that have come and gone." As illustration of his point, Romero reported that there are 1,000 businessmen working in Tokyo, Japan, all with interpreters, while the 10,000 Japanese businessmen in the United States speak fluent English.

"There is no question about it," he said, "we just can't communicate with the rest of the world."

Math and science teachers are leaving the schools for better paying jobs in other fields, Romero reported, and the Department of Education is in danger of being dismantled.

He stated that the national economy is not going to thrive unless the workforce is upgraded—through education.

But here in Ruidoso, all indications are that education is flourishing. A new high school is to be built to alleviate overcrowding in all four Ruidoso schools, while schools in other areas of the state are being required to cut back in personnel because of reduced enrollments.

Of the 89 school districts in New Mexico, 67 are experiencing decreases in enrollment, and of the other 22 districts, only two or three are growing at a rate comparable to that of the Ruidoso schools, according to Dr. Al Clemmons, director of public school finance.

"Ruidoso is probably the most rapidly growing area of New Mexico, possibly even the United States," said Leonard J. DeLayo, superintendent of public instruction for New Mexico schools.

State school board officials were full of praise and commendation for the Ruidoso schools when I talked to them following the state board meeting.

Mr. DeLayo said the Ruidoso schools have anticipated enrollment growth and are, therefore, able to meet the needs of additional students. He commended them for their planning.

Clemmons and DeLayo agreed that the growth being experienced by Ruidoso's schools is a permanent type growth, not

subject to the ups and downs of an economy dependent on energy related industries, as is true of several other schools in New Mexico.

A more stable and healthy growth is evident here, they said. And while statewide enrollment is levelling off and schools across the country are experiencing a general decline in enrollment, Ruidoso schools continue to grow at an amazing rate.

"There appears to be a responsiveness in the community to the needs of public education, as well as from the administration and local (school) board," DeLayo said.

"The community is setting a fine example for the entire state," he said.

And Alan Morgan, assistant superintendent of public instruction for New Mexico, had this to say about the Ruidoso school system: "It's well organized and has good staff members; I would not hesitate to send my own kids to school here."

"It's a very desirable place to educate children," he offered, "due to the staff and community."

"A school system is only as good as a community demands," Morgan commented. So apparently the community of Ruidoso demands good schools for the education of its children.

Ruidoso school board president Dave Parks was appointed to the local board—by the state school board—in 1963. I discovered during my discussion with state school personnel.

It seems that some problems had occurred among the Ruidoso school board in 1963 which forced the state board to appoint new members. Dave Parks was appointed at this time, and remains on the board to this day by village re-election.

State superintendent DeLayo said such an occurrence is most likely without parallel in the state. He commented that obviously the judgment of the state school board in appointing Parks in 1963 was correct, as evidenced by his continuing re-election.

"It pleases me to have been part of appointing him," DeLayo said.

DeLayo said he is also pleased with Ruidoso school superintendent Pat Vallant's leadership.

In light of these reports on the state of education in our village, it seems Ruidoso is making quite an effort to head off catastrophe—at least H. G. Wells would think so.

I think the Ruidoso schools staff, administration, superintendent and board of education deserve a thundering round of applause. And the community itself deserves a pat on the back for demanding quality education for its school students.

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

TRAINING SUGGESTIONS: SIT

When commanded to "Sit," the dog must promptly assume the sitting posture, squarely on both hips. He must sit at once, whether, at the moment of command, he is heeling, running or lying down.

Put the dog's choke collar and short leash on him. Arrange the collar so that it is up rather close behind his ears. Walk with the dog at heel. Stop, grasp the leash about eight or 10 inches from the collar with your right hand. Order "Sit." Jerk upward sharply on the leash and press down with your left hand on his hind quarters.

All of this action takes place simultaneously: the command, the upward jerk on the leash, the downward push on the dog's back. Keep repeating the command, "Sit." Resume your walk, telling the dog to "Heel" as you start out. Take a few steps and repeat the whole performance. Keep this up for about 15 minutes, long enough for the first few lessons.

While he is learning what is meant by the word "Sit," you need not be very much concerned about how he sits. After he knows and obeys the command, however, you should always have him sit in the proper position—facing in the same direction

as his handler, his head even with or slightly ahead of his handler's knees and with about six inches separating them.

To teach him to sit in the proper position, help him each time it is necessary. As he assumes the sitting posture, swing his rear to the correct spot as he is going down. Use your left hand for this, holding his leash near the collar with your right. If he tries to sit too far ahead of you or behind you, jerk him with the leash to the correct spot.

When he has mastered this routine, he must assume the sitting position promptly whenever you give the command, whether

he is walking or lying down. When the handler resumes his walk, the dog must, without further command, get up and resume heeling unless he has been commanded to stay.

As soon as he will obey this command without help, the same routine must be run through with a loose leash. When perfect results are obtained on a loose leash, the pupil graduates to working this command off leash entirely.



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



The Celebration Of New Leaves

The unusual conditions of Winter and Spring weather have brought about a very delightful spectacle of all the new leaves out celebrating together. Usually some of the earlier-leaving trees are out in full leaf while others are still in the bud. With the starting-and-halting of the Spring weather, due to the cold snaps that have come along long after all the sign of warm weather had arrived, the earlier leaves, such as the cottonwood and poplar, have waited with their growth. With the result that now you see a display of all the trees, bushes, and shrubs with their delicate new leaves glowing and sparkling in the May sun shining down from a light blue sky.

The Oak, usually half size by this time, is hardly much larger than the leaves of the Walnut — usually a week to ten days later than the Oak. The Apricot, earliest of the trees to leaf out (except the Weeping Willow) are hardly half size, while in ordinary years they would be full size.

Today, May seventh, the weather has turned warm after a cold night. There was just the thinnest little film of ice on the metates (Indian grain-grinding rocks) that serve as drinking fountains and bath tubs for the song birds.

Very closely I looked at all the leaves to see if they had been nipped by the frost. Evidently the freeze had not been severe enough to damage the leaves; because now just before high noon, they are making up for lost time, putting on rapid growth. This fast growth brings out the delicate colors of the new leaves and

sprouts. All along the river you may see great rounded clumps of tints of light red, dull gold, orange and lemon yellow — all luminous because the light of the sun shines through the thin and delicate sprouts and leaves.

A White Frost

Here in the Vale the freeze of the early morning of May seven seemed to have no effect upon any of Mother Earth's children. Once again we come back to the idea of the full moon, and its light acting as a protector of young blooms and leaves. The moon was just a day before the full when the frost came in the night. Word is received that the temperature reached twenty-eight in the higher reaches. We will have to wait and see how blooms and leaves fared in the "White Frost" (frost during the Full Moon.)

The Second Bloom

Offentimes when a severe frost strikes the fruit blossoms, the tree will reach into itself and call upon its reserves, and make a second blooming. You could notice this in the lower sections of the Valleys, before this latest freeze. Mostly it is the Apple trees which make this second effort. Surely they must know how healthful the apples are for us; and have our welfare at heart. The apple tree has been our friend and companion since earliest times.

Old Faithful

The Rome Beauty

When you pass by an orchard and see some trees standing out in full white bloom amongst the rest out in half to full leaf, that will be the Rome Beauty, last to bloom of all the apples. Many a year here in the fruit valleys, the Rome Beauty will be the only tree to bear fruit in the fall. We wonder if this old faithful variety has made it through these late freezes.

Regardless of fair or foul weather we are headed for a blessed Springtime. Let us rejoice and be grateful to The Lord.

U. S. Senate candidate airs views

Virginia R. Keehan, Democratic candidate for the United States Senate, recently visited The News and outlined what she feels are the current major issues of concern to the people of New Mexico.

"I think the most important thing on the minds of everyone is unemployment," Keehan said. She said people she has talked to are concerned about the effects of unemployment on individuals and business.

Another area of concern, she noted, is Social Security, particularly among senior citizens, who want to be assured that the program will continue.

A third important issue Keehan mentioned is the "need to find more dollars and less regulations for schools and work toward academic excellence."

Also, she noted, people are talking about the need for stronger enforcement of drunk driving charges. Keehan said justice should be much swifter for drunk drivers.

Energy is a significant problem, also, she said, and she stressed the importance of developing an energy policy, both for the state and the nation.

She said the state must have safeguards for any type of nuclear waste disposal. Keehan, from Albuquerque, has served as assistant director of the Job Corps program in Washington, D.C., is past president of Richard J. Daley College in Chicago, Illinois, and until October 1981 was deputy director of vocational rehabilitation for the New Mexico State Department of Education.

She has lived in New Mexico since 1950 and taught at New Mexico State University in the late '50s, where she also began the counseling program at the master's level.

Sam Waterston stars in the American Playhouse presentation of "Oppenheimer," airing in seven one-hour segments beginning Tuesday, May 11 on PBS. (Air dates may vary; check local listings.)

Filmed on location in the United States and Britain, the story dramatizes the career of American physicist J. Robert Oppenheimer, who was known as "the father of the atomic bomb."

Oppenheimer is one of the most puzzling figures in contemporary American history. In 1945, he was considered a hero after successfully directing the Manhattan Project, which was the largest scientific research project in history. The project produced the world's first atomic weapons and brought about an end to World War II.

Yet in 1953, President Eisenhower was pressured to revoke Oppenheimer's security clearance until charges that he was a Soviet spy could be properly answered. The claim had its roots in Oppenheimer's early days as a left-wing intellectual and physics professor at the University of California at Berkeley.

"Oppenheimer" portrays the controversial physicist's rise and fall over a period of 15 years, from his Berkeley teaching days through setting up and operating the secret bomb laboratory in New Mexico in the early 1940s.





"Despite my past, this was not an easy role for me because it was written by somebody else," says Gould, who at one time was married to singer-actress Barbra Streisand. "But I'll tell you what, this drama is totally contemporary as far as dealing with the trials and tribulations of marriage.

"I tried to make myself one with the material. To me, 'The Rules of Marriage,' are parallel to the laws of nature."

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

The original Cousins' consisted of the main Dining Room only. Our liquor license was purchased from the Wild Snail Restaurant in 1977 at a cost of \$140,000.00. We added the first Saloon and Package Store the winter of 1978-79. We added the patio dining room and bar in the spring of 1980. We added Jerry Dale's in the spring of 1981.

The entire business is operated by Cousins' Inc., a New Mexico Corporation. We operate 7 days a week the year round — closing on Thanksgiving and Christmas days only. We employ anywhere from 60 to 90 people depending on the time of the year.

There is no public passthru from the restaurant to Jerry Dale's. However, we have lighted sideways on the east side of the building. Jerry Dale's has live Country Western music the year round, 5 nights a week. Sunday is Rock & Roll Night with an area Rock & Roll Band performing. The present owners of Cousins' Inc., are Jerry Dale Bigham, Dan Kelley, and Walter Lindborg.
