

Chamber membership drive pits good guys versus bad guys

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will launch its 1982-83 membership drive Wednesday, June 2, announced Chamber director Ed Jungbluth. The fireworks will start before that, though, mentioned Jungbluth. Dan Swaper

new members.

Present airport could be safer?

When people talk about Ruidoso Municipal Airport, conversation usually rotates around the dangers of flying in and out, and of aircraft imperiling residents until the Sierra Blanca airport is constructed.

But Earl Brown believes flying can be made less hazardous over Ruidoso and, correspondingly, less of a danger to the public.
Brown is a highly experienced pilot and aviation consultant who is trying to start an airline that would connect Ruidoso to Albuquerque, and El Paso and Midland-Odessa, Texas.

Brown has been in aviation for 30 years. He was general manager and director of operations for Aspen Airways and Pacific Air Transportation, and president of California Sierra Airlines. He taught airline management at Pepperdine University and was a pilot with Trans World Airlines.

Brown has 22,000 hours of flight time. Using his experience at Aspen, Colorado, to compare hazards of mountain flying there to those experienced here, Brown believes certain measures can be taken to lessen the danger of aircraft coming down in town.

In April, a single-engine plane crashed just off Sudderth Drive, killing three of the plane's four passengers. The crash caused no injuries on the ground, but it reignited fear caused by aircraft flying directly over town.

Brown suggests that Ruidoso look into mapping precise flight paths from the airport, directing aircraft away from Sudderth. That way if planes develop problems on approach or departure, Brown said, the public will not be endangered.

He added that in his two years with Aspen Airways, he saw that directed flight paths can keep planes away from populated areas. He acknowledged Aspen has seen numerous fatalities in light airplane crashes, but he believes the public is not threatened there.

"Aspen has enforced flight path requirements, and the airport has taken steps to make pilots aware (of them)," he said.

Brown suggests that Ruidoso study the possibility of following Aspen's example. If alternate routes are found, he said, the village should require pilots to adhere to the paths.

But airport manager Tim Morris said, "It is impossible to designate paths away from Sudderth."

"The only way to keep (aircraft) away from Sudderth is to force them over the high terrain. Most planes flying in here can't do it," Morris said.

Morris was referring to the fact that the street follows the Rio Ruidoso valley, the only area where the land drops in altitude from the airport, thereby offering an escape route.

Brown said planes do not necessarily have to be directed over surrounding hills. He suggested that aircraft can fly in precise paths away from Sudderth while still following the river valley.

Morris, however, questions whether a pilot in danger will angle the craft away from the main street.

"Even moving one way or the other—what good would that do?" he asked. "If a pilot is having trouble, he's going to try and bring it down on the street."

Morris said flight paths cannot be designed by the village. He said Ruidoso's airport is designated an "uncontrolled airport" by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), meaning it has no authority to set specific flight routes for air traffic.

"Once the plane leaves the ground, we don't have any authority," Morris said. "The airspace belongs to the federal government. The village can't do anything as far as airspace."

Brown acknowledged that he was unfamiliar with village flight path regulations and whether it is possible to divert planes away from populated areas. But he said the airport could take other steps to ensure that pilots make adjustments to mountain flying, thereby minimizing the risk of trouble.

"There is no mystery to mountain flying," Brown said. "There are certain things you should adhere to. Things become more critical."

One of the things Brown referred to is "density altitude," which increases the effective altitude at which a pilot takes off on any given day. Brown explained that density altitude means "the corrected altitude due to temperature."

Brown noted that because the air is thinner at Ruidoso's 7,000 foot altitude runway than at sea level airports, planes take longer to build up takeoff speed. He said temperature also has to be calculated before takeoff, because warm air makes the effective altitude even higher.

Working with a pocket flight computer, Brown figured the effective altitude at 7,000 feet on an 80-degree day. Adjusted for the temperature, the density altitude at which a pilot would depart would be 10,000 feet.

The next step before takeoff would be to alter the plane's weight according to the flight manual for the given altitude. Brown said pilots learn these adjustments during basic flight training, but he feels the lessons are often neglected. The airport should remind flyers to make these checks by posting signs in conspicuous locations, Brown suggested.

"Pilots must fly within limitations of the aircraft," Brown said, and added that the airport must make them aware to check those limitations.

Morris feels such things as posting notices will not make mountain flying safer.

"We had notices at one time, but I don't think they were very helpful. Just because we have signs doesn't mean the pilot will stop and check—he's supposed to be doing that anyhow," Morris said.

The airport manager, who is also a flight safety counselor with the FAA and has 1,500 hours flight time in and out of the Ruidoso airport, feels "posting 50 signs" will not change bad habits of pilots who disregard making checks.

"It's a good suggestion, but I don't know how practical it is—they're either going to do it or not."

"Pilots are a rare breed; most are egomaniacs," Morris said. "If they do have a problem, they won't say anything about it."

Another check Brown thinks the airport should remind pilots of is the engine's fuel adjustment for this altitude.

"You want to develop all the power you can," he said. "That means you have to lean out the mixture so the fuel-air ratio is corrected." That means pilots have to adjust the fuel-air ratio to allow the correct proportion of air to enter the carburetor system to achieve a combustible mixture.

Brown was asked about the danger of strong wind disturbing planes at takeoff.

"Wind is measured from the ground only," he said. "Once the plane is in the air, it becomes part of the air mass."

"You can lose altitude in downdrafts. If the air mass starts down, then the plane goes with it."

But the former airline pilot said it requires only a small amount of extra power for a downdraft to maintain altitude if caught in a downdraft. As far as other air turbulence, he said, pilots have to position their craft to stay on course and compensate for the winds. But he said it requires no extra power to stay aloft.

On the ground, Brown suggests pilots need only to check the plane's flight manual to determine if the craft has the capability to take off in a strong wind.

But Brown realizes recommended steps are not always followed by pilots, which is confirmed by the fact that the majority of crashes are caused by pilot error.

"I think we're seeing a lot of ignorance," said Gail Adams, Brown's partner in trying to establish an airline here.

"Even if the new airport (on Fort Stanton Mesa) is approved, we can take steps to minimize the hazard now," Adams said. But Morris contends the airport can do little to influence pilots.

"Basically, what I can do is this—I can file a violation on a pilot with the FAA and they investigate," Morris explained. "I filed three last year," he said. There were a total of 28,000 operations—takeoffs and landings—at the airport.

"The problem with this airport is encroaching development, and the only thing we can do now is move the airport," Morris said.

"Fort Stanton (Mesa) is the only practical place to put an airport," he said. "Why did they (the U.S. Army) put a strip up there anyhow?"

New superintendent is veteran firefighter

The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD) has a new superintendent, but he is hardly a stranger in town.

Virgil Reynolds was promoted from the ranks to department head on May 11 by the village. He will become the department's first full-time superintendent since RVFD went to a part paid, part volunteer force in 1966.

The council confirmed Reynolds as department head on recommendation of the fire commission. He replaces Derald Waltrip, who had been superintendent for 15 of his 18 years with the department. Waltrip said he plans to remain on the force as a paid fireman.

The council discussed creating the 40-hour superintendent's position at a special meeting May 4 to bring the fire department up to the level of other village departments. Until now, Waltrip worked the same 24-hour on, 72-hour off schedule as the other three paid men.

Another change the department is considering is changing the schedule of the paid men—Waltrip, Danny Garcia and Jesse Reynolds—to a 24-hour on, 48-hour off shift. The suggestion was proposed at the fire commission's meeting Monday night, and Virgil commented that he thought it would be a good idea.

If the department alters the shifts, then the employee who replaces Virgil on the regular shift would be designated a "floater." The commission recommended that the new firefighter fill in for the other paid men, and be available to make inspections under Virgil's supervision.

Reynolds said he has other changes in mind for the department, but that he was reluctant to discuss them before the department's 1983 budget is approved by the village. The village council has to submit the budget to the state by June 1.

As superintendent, Reynolds will be responsible for directing all departmental operations. He will assign personnel and equipment to stations as required and evaluate equipment needs. In addition, Reynolds will supervise inspections of public buildings.

Reynolds takes over a department that consists of three stations—the main fire house and two sub-stations—four class-A pumper trucks, two mini-pumpers and a

boom truck. The department hopes to buy another class-A pumper and a building in the Upper Canyon to house a pumper in the near future.

In addition to the paid men, RVFD has 28 volunteers, supervised by fire chief Charlie Spooner.

The volunteers include Spooner, Terry Brown, Jeff Nunnally, Jesse M. Reynolds, Michael Baptiste, Michael Radziewicz and Greg Lane.

Other volunteers are Dan Jordan, Jeff Brown, Kyle Kannady, Sam Pirelli, Ron Coons, Gregg Griffin, Dale Patrick, Rick Gustafson, Jack Kannady Jr., Jimmy Sanchez and Kenneth Hazel.
Rounding out the force are Rick Hall, Red Farus, Rayner Baca, Andy Williamson, Shawn Shaw, Robby Hall, Brett Stirman, Jeff Von Rosenberg, Michael McCarty and Kip McClellan.

Reynolds feels the combination paid-volunteer force has made RVFD "one of the best departments in the state."

"We're all one big team at a fire," he said. "Without the volunteers, we couldn't do what we do."

Reynolds, who is married and has three children, is a lifelong resident of Ruidoso. He said he is "glad to have the job."
"I've been hoping for a long time it would come up. Now that I've got it, I'll try to do the best I can."

District Court to hear Hilton zoning issue

Rezoning of the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club site from residential to commercial to allow construction of a Hilton Inn will come under review in Lincoln County District Court.

Attorneys for Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Phillips and Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Rheudasil filed a "petition for review" May 12 in District Court on the April 13 decision by the village governing body to uphold rezoning of the site from R-2 (multi-family dwellings) to C-1 (light commercial) to accommodate a Hilton Inn.

The plaintiffs are asking for court review of the amendment to the zoning ordinance and for a writ of certiorari, according to deputy court clerk Joy Leslie. By filing the writ of certiorari, the plaintiffs are asking for complete files of the rezoning issue to present in court.

On April 13, the trustees approved by a

vote of two-to-one the rezoning amendment. In doing so, they upheld the February 1 decision by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) granting the rezoning request.

The plaintiffs claim they didn't receive proper notice of the P&Z hearing on the amendment as required by ordinance, the petition states.

Also, according to the petition, the plaintiffs claim the trustees' de novo hearing March 22 on an appeal to the amendment was inadequate because the board of trustees had no authorization to conduct a de novo proceeding on a zoning appeal. The de novo proceeding meant parties were not limited to arguing matters raised during the P&Z meeting, but could present any facts deemed relevant to the case.

The plaintiffs are asking that the court reverse the decision by the village of Ruidoso.

Denim N Diamonds shines again

Denim N Diamonds, the eighth-richest quarter horse of all time, flashed to a three fourths-length win in Sunday's second division of the Go Together Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The five-year-old mare, who was purchased for a bargain \$32,000 in the 1970 All-American Yearling Sale at Ruidoso, picked up \$3,640 for her Go Together effort. That raised her total bankroll to \$616,902.

Denim N Diamonds is owned by R. D. Hubbard of Wichita, Kansas. She's trained by Don Farris. Jerry Nicodemus, one of the nation's top quarter horse pilots, does the riding.

When the gates opened for the 350-yard Go Together Stakes, Denim N Diamonds sprang out alertly from the rail post. She quickly assumed the lead, moving in that light footed, high flying stride.

When she reached the halfway point, she was about a length in the clear. Nicodemus touched her once with the whip, just to make sure Denim N Diamonds didn't lose interest in the affair. She coasted down to the wire, safely in control.

She Mite Go, a 9-1 shot, closed well on the outside to take second under Danny Bobbitt. But She Mite Go was never a threat to Denim N Diamonds. Angles Dancer, a 40-1 outsider handled by Willie Lovell, finished third, a half length behind She Mite Go.

The 21st victory of Denim N Diamonds' career produced rockbottom mutual payoffs of \$2.20 across the board. The

mare carried 1-9 odds. She also carried the high weight of 128 pounds, as compared to 120 for She Mite Go and 112 for Angles Dancer.

Germeo, the colt who's been scoring big points at Sunland Park and the Downs at Santa Fe, gave three-year-olds at Ruidoso Downs the same treatment in Saturday's \$7,800 Aspen Stakes.

The colt got a perfect ride from Casey Lambert, the 16-year-old Coronado High School student from El Paso, Texas, and blasted out a coasting three and three fourths-length win.

The winning time for the five and one half furlongs was 1:09 on a fast track and produced a winner's purse of \$4,680. A star-studded group of competitors had been lined up to face Germeo in the Aspen, but none was able to muster a serious challenge.

Germeo led all the way, easily shaking off a belated bid from Luckily Smashed, a 6-1 shot. The latter moved well in the final stages to nose Pride Of Loom (9-1) out of the place slot.

The Aspen winner is trained by Cliff Lambert for Paul Salisbury and Tommy Stephen of Midland, Texas.

Amy Jo Mito picked up her third straight win on Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs and stamped herself as a prime candidate for the upcoming \$764,040 Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity.

Ruidoso fans made the filly a 7-2 shot in Friday's test and she returned \$9.20 to win. If she polishes off the Kansas finale, she'll collect a resounding \$254,425.

Each was timed in 18.43. A draw was held at 9 a.m. Saturday and was won by Nativo Time. That put Call Caleb and Mr. Master Bug in the first consolation.

Call Me Favorite, a filly owned by Clarence Scharbauer Jr. of Midland, Texas, sped to a one-and-one-half-length win on Thursday at Ruidoso Downs and set the day's top qualifying time for the upcoming Kansas Futurity.

A total of 18 races, each at 350 yards, was run on Thursday. Another set of 18 races was run on Friday (May 14). The top five qualifiers from each day—as determined by the clock—will meet in the grand finale on Sunday, May 30.

The Kansas Futurity, the first leg of the famed triple Crown for two-year-olds, carries a gross purse of \$764,040. The winner collects \$254,425.

Call Me Favorite, ridden by Jerry Nicodemus, emerged as the star of Thursday's action with her heads-up conquest of the 17th race. She was clocked in 18.32 seconds at just over even money. The win was her second out of three starts.

Here are the four other qualifiers: —Pofiado, 18.32, owned by Robert Foreman of Lubbock, Texas.

—Chicks Etta Wind, 18.35, owned by Gordon Francis of Yukon, Oklahoma.


—Tres Pass, 18.43, owned by Jerry Rheudasil and Joe B. Turner Jr. of Lewisville, Texas.

Lodger's tax group oversees lodgers' tax revenue

In 1974, the Village of Ruidoso opted to take advantage of a 1953 state law allowing municipalities to impose a two percent tax on persons using commercial lodging accommodations.

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The advertising is carried out and bills are funneled through the Chamber, said Jungbluth. 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Ruidoso lodgers told they are part of 'invisible giant'

Francis Durkin, executive vice president of the New Mexico Hotel and Motel Association, told members of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA) Thursday at their annual installation of new officers that tourism in New Mexico is "the most invisible giant."

"The travel industries in New Mexico are the biggest employers in this state. We cannot seem to get that across," said Durkin.

He commented that when one considers all of the car rentals, travel agencies, food outlets and lodging establishments, travel services leave a phenomenal impact on the state economy.

Durkin noted that he prefers the term "travel services" to "tourism" when referring to the industry. The New Mexico travel industry serves the needs of business travel as well as the needs of vacation travel, said Durkin.

"Tourism has some interpretation in some people's minds of something frivolous, not economically sound," he said.

However, Durkin stressed that travel in New Mexico is a serious and vital segment of the economy, providing \$42 million in gross receipts tax. He added that he believes that figure is an underestimate.

"This kind of business (lodging) is so enormous, the impact has not been fully

communicated to the Legislature," Durkin said. A New Mexico Travel Industries Council will be set up soon, Durkin told RLA, and it will include all segments of the travel industry. The council will be able to research the industry and do market studies to encompass the entire travel sector of New Mexico's economy.

Duo wants to draw motorcross, boxing to Ruidoso

Ruidoso is on the verge of being a sports center if Al McChesney and Joseph Worthen have anything to say about it.

Worthen and McChesney have formed High Country Productions, a corporation dedicated to bringing boxing, motorcross and other types of sporting events and entertainment to the Ruidoso area.

"The Ruidoso area is about to take off on a growing spurt and a lot of people are going to be interested in sports and other forms of entertainment," McChesney said.

McChesney, an architect, has a long history of coaching and officiating in boxing. He was head coach of the West Chester State (Pennsylvania) boxing team from 1972 to 1980 and has been an official with the United States of America Amateur Boxing Federation (USA-ABF). He also is a National Collegiate Boxing Association (NCBA) representative to Home Box Office television, ABC, NBC and CBS. He was also an official at the Ruidoso Boxing Invitational (RBI) January 30.

Worthen, a commissioned forwarding agent for Merchants Freight Lines, has an extensive background in motorcross. He was a participant in the 1980 and 1981 Supercross Championships in Houston and competed in 140 events last year.

The two men are looking into staging two amateur motorcross races just before the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival next fall. They are hopeful of having a major race during the festival.

"We're not sure where the location would be for a motorcross track exactly," said McChesney. "Probably in the general area between Ruidoso Downs and Hondo. We're really in the beginning stages of getting everything organized."

Motorcross is one of the fastest growing sports in the country, according to Worthen.

"They had 70,250 people in attendance for the Grand National Championships at Anaheim Stadium in California this year," said Worthen. "That's 7,000 more people than have ever seen the Los Angeles Rams play there for a single football game."

Both men feel that bringing motorcross to Ruidoso would be helpful to the youth of the area.

"A motorcross park would give the kids a place to use their bikes," Worthen said. "Now they ride their bikes in the back woods and some people have complained about the noise problem they cause."

McChesney has high hopes for the future of boxing in the Ruidoso area.

He hopes to bring some Golden Gloves tournaments and possibly a college tournament to the area.

McChesney is hopeful of staging these tournaments in a fairly large arena, possibly the proposed new building being considered by several people in the area. If not that building, he's thinking about the possibility of converting an existing building into an arena.

"We've got several possibilities in mind," McChesney said.

Like Worthen, McChesney also feels the increase in sports activity in the area would help local youths.

"We're hopeful of eventually having a Boy's Club in the Ruidoso area," he said. "That would help the local kids so much and it would keep them busy."

Worthen and McChesney also like the possibility of bringing other entertainment besides sports to Ruidoso.

"We could bring in musical groups for concerts," McChesney said. "There's really no limitation to it."

'Twas the break of dawn on a crisp June morn, I rose and slipped into my chest waders, itching to cast out a woolly worm and snag the day's breakfast. It was only a brief jaunt from the camp, down an embankment and into the cold mountain reservoir. From hours of angling in the same location, I knew exactly my destination—just a short waddle before the line would be knifing through the air.

The sensation is secure in chest waders—the rubber overalls allow you to mingle with the elements, yet insulate the torso from the water's bite. The end of the rainbow lay before me, one more slow-motion step and ... into a bottomless pit. Howling frantic screams for help, I sank to my chin and thrashed to strip off the suspenders, while water surged into the waders—so much for comfort and a trout breakfast.

That was the birth of the jinx. And it has yet to leave home.

The streak of bad luck fortunately has been erratic, but it has returned often enough to remind me of those chilly San Juan Mountain waters.

The most vivid recurrence of the hex came in the fall of 1980. We were bivouacked on the Encampment River in northern Colorado. It was another early morning (I should have known).

Anxious to hook in to some hungry browns, I decided to leave the soggy waders behind and cast from the river bank. Oscar, my bird dog, wanted to tag along.

We selected an auspicious looking bend in the river. I pulled a deer fly out of the fly box and tied it onto the tapered leader. Oscar was busy chasing insects.

I pulled out the line and whipped it through the air—I must say there is nothing like the sing of fly line as it snaps overhead. Dark pools lay before my eyes with squadrons of bugs in holding patterns over the surface. There had to be lunkers lurking in the depths.

After a minor delay (had to retrieve the fly from an aspen branch) I directed the bug across the stream. Oscar, the bird dog, espied the movement. He plunged into the brook and gave chase—this time I really hooked a fighter.

Despite careful maneuvering to get the dog safely back to my side, he panicked and yanked me into the water to join him in his frolic.

Mountain creeks are always cold, and jeans are not the warmest attire when wet. After untangling Oscar—man's best friend—the two of us sloshed back to camp. Charly already had the eggs out, she knew there would be no fish for breakfast.

Fishing is reportedly good in this neck of the woods. Randy Isler, a local Game and Fish man, told me the other day nearby waters are regularly stocked with rainbow, and everyone knows you don't have to be a Grits Gresham to bag your limit with stockings.

He said it is possible to catch 18- to 20-inch browns in the Rio Ruidoso and even in Carrizo Creek. He also whet my appetite by telling me its about time to start throwing flies at the browns, and he suggested trying roly poly bugs.

Randy also said there has been Boy Fly hatch and he recommended Bonito Lake as a good spot to fly fish.

Editor Tim Palmer has been bragging lately in the office that he needs a freezer to hold all the fish he has caught since moving to a house within earshot of the Rio Ruidoso. He invited me to come try my luck.

So we ventured to the river with poles in hand one evening. We tried several good looking holes while our wives waited for us to return so we could fry up a few 10-inchers for supper. No problem, Tim said—I never mentioned my notorious curse.

We made our way upstream, but the pools would not yield their quarry. Soon, it began to get dark, which made it nearly impossible to see the salmon eggs at the end of the line. Skunked and dejected, we knew we would have to return empty-handed.

The fish fry was postponed until another time, and pizza replaced trout on the evening's menu. But I shall not despair, as I stayed dry that night. There is still hope.


One of his first popular songs which has remained a favorite for almost half a century is "Alexander's Ragtime Band."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—The man who runs New Mexico's government starting next year had better be tough.

He shouldn't be chosen because you like the TV ads he's running, because he has pearly white teeth or because you like his wife.

He's got to be the kind of person who can deal with problems like these:

—A major water shortage.
On the high plains, which stretch all the way from Nebraska to eastern New Mexico and from Colorado to the Texas panhandle, irrigation water comes from the underground lake known as the Ogallala aquifer.

In some parts of that territory, that water is being used 14 times faster than it is being replaced.

Net aquifer depletion in Texas is presently running from one to five feet per year.

Given the rising cost of fuel for pumping, farm economists say irrigation in some Ogallala areas may prove to be uneconomical even before the water runs out.

But run out it is certainly going to do, if things keep going as they presently are.

So how do we solve the problem?
Some people want to move water from the Mississippi by pipeline or canal to Texas or northern New Mexico. When it gets here, it would cost \$400 per acre foot, and that's about ten times what farmers can afford to pay for it.

So the man we put into the governor's office has these things to look forward to: a struggle between farm and nonfarm groups over what water we have, plus more attacks from outside the state like the one El Paso has presently mounted to get what water there is.

Those are rough to deal with—the kind of problems which won't be solved by a small-minded, jazy or purely political chief executive.

—Excessive dependence on dwindling resources.
We've said it before, and we'll say it again: New Mexico has to begin now to replace that 40 percent plus of its tax revenues which come from the oil and gas industry.

That industry isn't always going to be around.
Oh, sure, last year completions in oil and gas wells in the state hit an all-time high.

What that means in practice, however, is that the depletion of these resources is now proceeding at a faster rate.

Not one of those 71,415,430 barrels of oil we sucked up out of our earth last year will be replaced. Once gone, they are gone for good.

So we'd better start soon to look for a replacement for this source of tax income, which has made our state government one of the relatively richest ones in the nation in the last decade.

That onerous duty won't be done by a governor who doesn't have a firm grasp on the economics of running a state. He'd better not be somebody who got into office for some superficial reason, such as his popularity, or because he out-promised all his opponents.

It's too bad that citizens don't any more go to political rallies. (Most of today's voters would say, "A rally. What's that?")

That was the one place you could meet the candidates face to face, and even ask them questions, such as what they planned to do about the subjects discussed here.

Now, alas, we are too lazy to bother.
As a consequence, New Mexico could get, starting January 1, 1983, a governor who couldn't solve a major problem if his life depended on it.

God save us from that—but it could happen.

DWI CRACKDOWN

In this vast country, a driver may be two or three thousand miles from his home state when he gets behind the wheel after drinking too much. This points up the fact that drunk driving is a nationwide problem which requires a nationwide remedy.

This approach to the matter is embodied in legislation just okayed by the Senate Commerce Committee and sent to the floor. The measure is, as its co-author Sen. John Danforth of Missouri observed, "a breakthrough for the effort to develop tough and effective strategies to reduce the terrible loss of life and limb due to drunk driving."

Danforth's associate in putting this bill together, Sen. Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island, characterized driving while intoxicated as the nation's number one highway safety problem and said the new proposal "will establish a strong national deterrent to reduce the senseless and tragic loss of life caused by drunk drivers." The theme is repetitive, but that is all right; we need to be reminded again and again that the words have stark meaning in terms of humans maimed and killed.

The bill follows a familiar pattern in that it establishes minimum standards and rewards states which comply with them. The standards set forth in the proposed model law include these: a blood alcohol reading of a tenth of one per cent is taken as proof of intoxication; a driver who fails this sobriety test would be subject to mandatory 90-day suspension of his license the first time, and for subsequent offenses a year's license loss and if the offense occurs within five years of the first at least 48 hours in jail.

Some would say these are tough penalties. Considering the nature and extent of the problem they are meant to deal with they are, if anything, too mild. But they are minimum standards; individual states can go beyond them, perhaps requiring a much heavier jail sentence for second offenders. Enactment of the proposed federal law, with its provision for grants to the states that meet the standards, would be a good start. — Alamogordo Daily News

OUR 'FORGOTTEN' MILLIONS

They may not be very efficient, but apparently they're pretty honest at the Bureau of Indian Affairs field finance office here.

Federal investigators found almost half a million dollars "more or less forgotten" in a safe in March. As bad as that sounds, it was an improvement — of sorts — from the \$1.8 million that accumulated in the safe a year ago.

Of course, the federal government has been robbed of the use of that money for the time it sat idly in the safe just as surely as if somebody had stolen it.

If that amount of money is misplaced here in Albuquerque, how many millions — or billions — are "misplaced" in safes in the major federal regional centers, or in Washington itself?

It's just one more indication of fiscal irresponsibility in a sprawling federal government whose voracious appetite for money is one of the critical issues of the day. — Albuquerque Journal

The designation of a full-time fire superintendent for Ruidoso is a positive step.

Owing to the quality and dedication of the fire department's volunteer and paid personnel through the years, the village has been the beneficiary of excellent fire protection service.

This fact is reflected in the relatively low fire insurance rates we enjoy here.

But growth, along with demands of changing technology and legal requirements on operation of municipal services, made a restructuring of the department necessary.

The thirty-odd volunteers are on call around the clock, every day of the year. They attend weekly meetings, and participate in training sessions.

They are counted on by all of us to respond to general alarm fires, and they do, with enthusiasm and determination.

When the fire alarm goes off in the middle of the night, and you roll over and go back to sleep, he's on his way to fight a fire.

If you know a volunteer fireman, next time you see him, tell him "thanks."

Little League and youth sports have been criticized by some people as being too demanding physically and emotionally for youngsters, but they get high marks in Ruidoso.

Everyone I've talked to that's connected in some way with local youth sports programs has praised the coaches and parents for their attitudes.

Where in some areas there is frequent arguing between parents and umpires or coaches, there is little or none of that in the local soccer, baseball and football programs.

"Some people take it seriously but if you treat it as a game it's good," said Nancy Schmidt, the mother of a boy in the Ruidoso-Sertoma Soccer Association youth league. "There's a lot of sportsmanship involved and soccer gives kids a full opportunity to participate in sports."

"We didn't have soccer where we used to live in Arizona, only Little League baseball."

Sandy McCall, the wife of Bill McCall, coach of the Jaycees Little League baseball team, echoes Schmidt's statement.

"I think it's basically good, healthy competition," McCall commented. "Maybe a few coaches are hard but sometimes you have to be hard. Most of the parents are fair, too."

"All the kids should get a chance to play. It's good for young kids to play together and learn."

Parents and coaches putting pressure on the kids to win all the time, he said. "The kids would get fed up with it after a while."

Grantham also commented about parents putting too much pressure on their kids to excel in sports.

"Parents can be trouble in some leagues but not really here," he said. "Sometimes a parent will put pressure on Little Johnny, asking him why he isn't playing harder, doing better, etc. That's hard on the kid."

"In England a youth can't play in the organizational soccer leagues until he's 14 or 15. They can play at an earlier age in

their school but not in any organized league."

Because each individual child has his or her own personality, Grantham said, a coach sometimes has to motivate some kids differently than others.

"You do have to motivate some kids differently while using the same basic rules," he said. "You may have to explain things a different way to some kids than you do to others."

Regardless of all the complaints about youth sports, Grantham has a lot of praise for them.

"If the program is done right, youth sports can be a great character builder," he remarked.

Jim Clements, president of the Ruidoso Little League baseball program, also has praise for youth sports.

"It's basically good for the kids," he said. "They get to learn sportsmanship and to play with other kids. It also teaches them about life itself."

Clements admitted that some coaches can be too hard on kids.

"Some coaches try too hard to win and others try to give every kid a chance to win," he said. "It really depends on the coach."

Some former major league baseball players—ex-New York Yankee pitcher Jim Bouton, in particular—have said that the pressure to win was always on them. Some former major leaguers have said they wouldn't let their own sons play Little League baseball after what they went through when they were young.

Still, a lot of major league baseball players have praised Little League for aiding their development, and Clements agrees with them.

"There's no real negative aspect about Little League," he said. "A lot of major league ballplayers got their start in Little League."

"Some parents worry about their kids using their arms too much, but we only allow our pitchers to have six innings of work a week and they must have four days between pitching assignments."

The majority of youth sports programs are, like Ruidoso's, run well with the youth's best interests at heart.

However, some youth sports programs have gone overboard in their pushing the "winning isn't everything, it's the only thing" attitude on youths.

When I lived in California the youth sports programs in my home town were geared to win at an excess.

I once saw a spectator punch a soccer referee and then walk off the field without saying a word to anybody.

An incident like that puts the whole youth sports program in a bad light and makes it bad for everybody concerned.

Fortunately, Ruidoso's youth programs have avoided negative incidents like the above one.

Despite short growing season,

"Allah does not deduct from man's allotted days the time spent in a garden."

Now that most danger of frost is over, "green thumbs" are getting out in the fresh air, tilling the soil to produce new gardens full of colorful, sweet-smelling flowers.

"In this area you don't feel real safe about (planting) annuals until mid-May, or after Mother's Day," veteran local gardener Madeline Murray said.

Wilbur Conley of Conley's Nursery in Ruidoso Downs agrees, although he said he once lost plants around the 17th of June because of a late frost.

Some of the hardier annuals, such as petunias, pansies and snapdragons, can be started as early as mid-April, Conley explained. But generally speaking, now is a safe time to begin putting out most plants.

Conley advises beginning with plants which have already been started, as the season is usually too short here to start from seeds. Most seeds need to be started indoors, he said.

The biggest drawbacks to growing flowers in this area are temperature extremes, wind and lack of rain, according to Conley and Murray.

"Because of winds and lack of rain, it's a struggle really to grow anything," Murray said.

But she has been gardening "ever since I

can remember," and has about 22 different flowers planted in her landscaped yard in Ruidoso Downs.

"I had my first row of flowers in mom's vegetable garden," she said.

She advises gardeners to begin cleaning up around April, or after most danger of frost passes, by cutting down and clearing away dead flower stalks.

"I don't clean completely, though," she interjected. "Old foliage protects new little plants in early spring from frost."

After cleaning up, the ground should always be cultivated before planting, Madeline advises. She loosens the ground with a spading fork and then works in steer manure as a fertilizer and soil conditioner. Then she adds mulch on top.

The most important "tip" to gardeners Madeline shared is adding mulch after fertilizer. Mulch—almost any organic matter, such as pine needles, straw, hay, cotton hulls or ground bark—will conserve moisture, discourage weeds and help keep the temperature even. It also keeps a hard crust from forming, which deprives plants of oxygen.

A lot of mulch is free, too, if one knows where to find it.

Alternate freezing and thawing of plants, which often occurs when they are planted early in spring, causes them to heave, Madeline warned. Mulch keeps the plants from thawing as readily, though, as it keeps temperatures fairly even.

Madeline is using three inches of mulch around her plants this year, so that they will not need water as often. She stressed that mulch, especially of that thickness,

should not be placed right against the plant as its richness may cause the flower to rot off.

She says she hopes to be able to water just once a week using this thickness of mulch, but would otherwise need to water at least every other day.

When watering, "a deep soak once in a while is better than a sprinkle every day," Madeline offers as a tip. Shallow watering brings roots to the surface, where they can be dried out by the sun and wind.

"There is no substitute for water," says Mr. Conley. It is important to water at least twice a week, and more often when the wind is blowing, he advises.

And water is just as critical in the winter as in summer, he added. He suggests that evergreens, lawns and perennial plants be watered beginning a few weeks after the snows melt.

"A healthy plant is not as apt to be bothered by insects and diseases," Conley said. And watering is a good way to improve the vigor of plants.

He also advises hosing down evergreens rather than spraying them, as spider mites and other insects can be washed off with a good hosing.

"I water every two weeks all winter long," he commented.

Another helpful hint to gardeners offered by Madeline is to examine plants frequently for signs of bugs and disease. Some fertilizers include an insecticide, she said, but it is best to just check for bugs and catch them early. Sometimes they can be washed off.

"You don't want to kill the good bugs,

ladybugs," she added. When signs of pests are discovered on the plants, contact a nurseryman for advice on proper timing of the problem.

The most popular flowers in this area, Madeline and Wilbur agree, are petunias, because they are hardy; and marigolds, because they are easy to grow.

One can throw a handful of marigold seeds on the ground, and have flowers growing in three or four days, Conley remarked.

Petunias take about six weeks to grow from seeds, but can be planted early as they will withstand a temperature of about 60 degrees, he said. They are easy to grow when planted after they have been started, and are "prolific bloomers all summer long."

Petunias also last long into the fall. "I've seen them blooming till the end of October," said Mr. Conley.

Day lilies are one of Madeline's favorite flowers. They do not need a lot of water, multiply, they bloom from July through September, and the foliage is prettier even after they stop blooming, she said. "I also like chrysanthemums," Madeline declared. They are the last flowers in the fall still blooming, and hang until they are frozen.

She also likes petunias, which she keeps planted outside her bedroom window, because "they smell so good at night."

Besides keeping fresh flowers in her garden, outdoors, and having fresh cut flowers through her house during blooming season, Madeline makes dried flower arrangements with some of her plants.

Queen Anne's Lace (wild carrot) and yarrow both dry well, she reported. She lets the flowers dry naturally by putting them in about an inch of water and letting it evaporate.

Madeline keeps records of all of her plants, jotting down notes from gardening books and magazines about the care of each particular type of flower.

"I can't remember what each thing likes," she said, and recommends such a system to other gardeners, especially beginners.

Other suggestions to those wanting to develop a green thumb are to read a good gardening book and follow its hints. But Madeline admitted, "there are so many different climates just in this area, so you can't just give one set of advice."

The County Cooperative Extension Service in Carrizozo and the Plant Society of New Mexico, of which Madeline is a member, are two good sources of information for gardeners. Anyone desiring to contact the Plant Society of New Mexico can do so through Madeline, at 378-4117.

In addition, the Ruidoso Garden Club is publishing a book of helpful information on high altitude gardening, which can be purchased for a nominal fee, she said.

Anyone just beginning gardening may do well to start by growing wildflowers, Madeline suggested. Wildflowers, such as verbena, flocks, foxglove and yellow broom, do not require the moisture and maintenance that other flowers do.

Wilbur Conley stressed the desirability of including trees and shrubs, such as scotch pine and blue spruce, in any garden

landscaping plan. No landscaping is complete without some shrubs and trees in the proximity of the flower garden, he says.

Fruit trees are another good possibility for a garden in this area. "Fruit trees all do well here," Conley said. Apples and pears do best, he explained, but cherries, peaches and plums also do well. They can be planted any time of the year when the ground is not frozen.

For even more variety in the garden, Wilbur suggests flowering perennial vines, such as honeysuckle and Virginia creeper. They also can be planted any time and all do well in this area.

Generally, the mountain soil in this area is good for planting, Conley stated, although Madeline said that it can be rocky in higher elevations. In such a case, good dirt can be hauled in from nearby.

To non green-thumbers, gardening may sound as if it entails more problems than it is worth. But Wilbur said more and more people are taking to flower gardening all the time.


Madeline said she does it because "I love to."

"I really enjoy it," she added. "It's therapy; it's good exercise ... I like my place to look pretty outside and I love flowers."

According to Mr. Conley, "The money pinch is forcing people to stay home, and they are turning to gardening as recreation."

"They just like to see things grow," he said.



On Saturday, May 22 pianist Vladimir Horowitz returns to London for his first European concert in 30 years. The concert will be televised live in Europe and simulcast in stereo to the United States via satellite for PBS airing later the same day.

Given at the invitation of H.R.H. Prince Charles, "Horowitz in London: A Royal Concert" will take place in the Royal Festival Hall. A voice-over commentary and 25-minute intermission documentary on Horowitz' life will be provided by the BBC.

The concert program (subject to change) will include six sonatas by Domenico Scarlatti; Chopin's Ballade in F minor and Ballade in G minor; Rachmaninoff's Sonata No. 2; and *Kinderscenen* (Scenes from Childhood), by Robert Schumann, played in honor of the royal baby, expected by Prince Charles and Lady Diana, sometime in June.

The program is made possible by grants from the Ambassador Foundation and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. It is a BBC-TV production in association with Columbia Artists Management Inc.

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

There is no public passthu from the restaurant to Jerry Dale's. However, we have lighted sideways on the east side of the building. The present owners of Cousins' Inc., are Jerry Dale Bigham, Dan Kelley, and Walter Lindborg.
