

BOND ELECTION JULY 6

Village to condemn land for Grindstone dam

Voters will decide July 6 on two bond issues to fund the project, which includes a dam, a 1,000 acre feet storage reservoir, and a new water treatment plant.

The Ruidoso council voted Wednesday to acquire land for the proposed 1,000 acre feet water storage reservoir at Grindstone Canyon by means of condemnation.

Pending approval of Ruidoso voters in the July 6 bond election, the village will buy the 50-acre site for a dam, reservoir and water treatment plant from owner Don Dorman at a price to be determined through an independent appraisal.

Dorman informed the council in April that the \$500,000 price he had placed on the property would hold only if certain conditions were met by the village, including closing of the lake to surface use by the public.

At Wednesday's special meeting, councilman Frank Sayner—who along with John Schuller, Lee Huckstep and C. Newton Page serves on the reservoir study committee—presented the committee's recommendations to the full council.

Sayner said the committee arrived at the same conclusions as Boyle Engineering and the village water board (Page, Knud Ottesen and Frank Potter)—“That we must have a new method of delivering water to Ruidoso by December of 1984.”

“Our most dependable source of water is the Rio Ruidoso,” he said. Sayner added that the village has an effluent credit of 730 acre feet of water per year that it has been unable to use because there is no place to store it.

Having concluded that a surface storage facility and dam were needed, Sayner said, the committee studied various sites.

A dam right on the river was ruled out, he explained, because it would not be permitted on the Indian Reservation and condemnation of property in the Upper Canyon would be far too expensive.

A proposed site in Flume Canyon would have involved federal land and thus several government agencies, Sayner said. This would have prevented the project being completed in his lifetime, he added.

Grindstone Canyon was then looked at. Involving just one owner—a private citizen—and one governmental entity—the State Engineer's Office—the site was settled on.

“It is by far the best place,” said Sayner. “It is the recommendation of our committee that we follow New Mexico state condemnation statutes to acquire right-of-way and land,” he stated.

Sayner explained that an appraisal will be made on the property by an Albuquerque group. When the land is bought at the appraised price by the village (pending passage of the bond package next month), he said, there will be no deals or restrictions on it.

“The total control once we acquire the land will rest with the village,” said Sayner. He pointed out that the prerogative to allow fishing on the new lake, for example, will rest with the village.

Completion date for the project is January or February of 1985, Sayner noted—“the exact time we need it.”

The councilman reviewed the financing structure for the \$8 million project. A \$6 million revenue bond issue will be backed by a one percent gross receipts tax imposed by the village.

This sales tax, which by state law can only be used for water improvements, will net \$900,000 per year based on current gross receipts. This amount will increase

if the village continues to grow, said Sayner, and could provide enough revenue to meet the \$1.2 million annual payment on the entire project.

The state law creating the optional gross receipts tax for water improvements requires that general obligation (GO) bonds be issued for an amount equal to at least one-third that of the revenue bonds.

The \$2 million general obligation bond issue (also to be voted on July 6) will be spread over at least \$50 million in assessed property valuation, Sayner noted. He pointed out that the GO bonds will not be sold until 1984 or 1985.

“If we continue to grow, there may be no (property tax) increase,” he said. He added that he is quite confident that sales tax revenue will pay back the entire \$8 million.

If needed at all, said Sayner, the property tax increase will amount to at most \$2 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Costs on the \$8 million project were broken down by Sayner as follows:

- Line from water plant one in Upper Canyon to new Grindstone treatment plant: \$400,000.
- Dam, including cost of land: \$4.6 million.
- New water treatment plant: \$1,360,000.
- Five-million gallon storage tank and lines: \$1 million.
- Control center: \$155,000.
- Line to storage tank at Black Forest: \$36,000.
- Line to tank at Skyland: \$48,000.
- Contingency fund: \$372,000.

If the bond issue fails, he indicated, the village will have to raise money for water

improvements by increasing the charge for water.

Sayner called this prospect “rather frightening.”

A new treatment plant and lines must be constructed with or without a dam, said Sayner. He stated that the \$2 million needed for that project could be raised by approximately doubling the current charge for water.

Councilman Al Junge asked whether Sayner was saying the smart thing for permanent residents is to let visitors help pay for water improvements (through the sales tax).

“You hit the nail on the head,” said Sayner.

He expressed concern that senior citizens would be hardest hit by a rate increase from the current \$1.75 per thousand gallons to around \$4 per thousand. The councilman noted that senior citizens are regular voters and expressed hope that they will support the bond issue July 6.

Councilman Don Dale said that surface use seems to be a big concern of the electorate. He asked whether voters can be assured they can use the lake.

Sayner said the condemnation route was chosen for that reason, and that the statutes allow for village control of the property once it is acquired.

Schuller pointed out that a 50-foot strip around the shoreline of the lake has been planned for recreation. The lake itself will cover 44 acres and, at 1,000 acre feet, will hold about four times as much water as Alto Lake.

The reservoir study committee recommended that the village begin immediately acquiring water rights to ensure that the reservoir stays full.

Village cannot grow beyond '84 on present water

Newt Page, a member of both the reservoir study committee and the village water board, advised the council it has to “face facts” about the water situation in his presentation at the special meeting, and asked for a moratorium on annexations until the Grindstone project is finished and supplying water to the village.

Page requested the moratorium after he detailed facts that he said show the village is ahead of the 1984 date when it has been determined existing water supply will equal demand.

The council made no motion on the request.

Page reiterated reasons why he thinks the village must push for the Grindstone Canyon reservoir and other improvements in the water system. He has been explaining the situation to various civic groups in Ruidoso in past months.

In a report to the council, Page first outlined the purpose of the water board—to study the present water situation and to make proposals on how to improve the water storage and delivery system.

He explained that Ruidoso currently has rights to and receives in an average year 1,785 acre feet of water out of Eagle Creek, the Cherokee Well and the Rio Ruidoso. As he explained in previous presentations, that is enough water to supply Ruidoso temporarily at its current rate of growth of 7.3 percent.

Page noted, however, that the village already has approved final plats on residential housing units that will bring the number of residences in Ruidoso to the projected 1984 level, if all the units are built in the immediate future.

As part of his presentation, Page said the village has rights to an extra 730 acre feet a year in effluent credit that is now lost downstream. Effluent credit is credit for water that goes through the system and is returned to the river downstream. It can be applied as a water right upstream.

The total rights would bring to 2,525 acre feet the average yearly amount of water available to the village. Page said that if Ruidoso had the capability to store that much water a year, it could supply growth into 1989.

But Ruidoso cannot store the amount of available water.

Water board member Frank Potter said the village lost 280 million gallons of water last year that it could have kept in the

system if Ruidoso had the capability to store the effluent credit.

That is the reason for the 1,000 acre feet reservoir in Grindstone, Canyon, Page noted.

Page projected the future with the proposed reservoir. He said it would take about three years to fill the dam to the 1,000 acre feet maximum, with current available water rights.

The village could maintain that maximum level with present rights until 1989. By then, Page projected, growth will necessitate purchase of additional rights to keep Grindstone full.

Page recommended that Ruidoso begin efforts to purchase more rights downstream from the village limits in order to ensure an adequate future water supply.

“There are 2,164 acres of water rights available,” he said, and suggested the village run a preliminary survey to determine where it can buy or lease additional rights.

Lee Huckstep, a member of the reservoir study committee, suggested the council target water rights between village limits and the new regional wastewater treatment plant at Biscuit Hill, which he indicated are the most feasible for the village to obtain.

Page also suggested that drilling of additional wells be pursued in the Cree Meadows area. He told the council that Cree Meadows Country Club recently drilled a well in that area that is producing 400 gallons a minute.

All the plans for acquiring more water for the Grindstone Canyon project are designed to increase use of what Page calls the best soft water in the Southwest. “When you mix a drink up here, you get real Cutty Sark, not half limestone,” he quipped.

But Page, saying he had to also wear a “black hat” had dire predictions if the bond issue fails to pass and the village continues to approve new developments.

He said that if the bond fails, Ruidoso has four temporary measures at its recourse. He said the village could institute mandatory water rationing or conservation; it could raise water rates to force conservation; or, as a last resort, Ruidoso could stop issuing water taps. Also, he reminded the council it could resubmit the bond issue in two years, according to state law.

Page also repeated that the Planning and Zoning Commission has already ap-

proved plats on multi-family units that bring projected growth above the 1984 level and he urged the council to seek planned growth.

In his final recommendation, Page asked the council to pass a moratorium on any property annexations and to freeze zoning that does not comply with the 1976 Comprehensive Plan until the Grindstone project is finished and on line.

That recommendation met strong opposition from the council.

Councilman Frank Sayner said a moratorium or freeze would leave the village no flexibility to annex properties it determines to be advantageous.

“It would leave no room to negotiate with the owner of Grindstone, who has plans for development,” he said.

Councilman Benny Coulston said the economics of a moratorium “would completely stagger the imagination.”

“By the smallest stretch of the imagination,” Coulston noted, “it would add 50 percent to the value of every lot (in the village).”

Coulston contended that a moratorium and freeze would make even a ramshackle cabin with a water tap worth \$50,000 because of the property value.

In reference to the village having

already approved plats that raising the growth rate to 1984 levels, Coulston said many of the lots would not see construction for a period of two to three years.

“Look at White Mountain Five,” he suggested. “We annexed it two years ago (with) about 200 lots. There are probably 15 houses under construction or completed (and) the streets are still unpaved.”

“If we accept a development, the demand is minimal for the next two to three years,” he said.

Councilman Al Junge asked Page to trust the council to make the right decisions regarding annexation.

“The only thing I have against it (the moratorium) is psychological,” Junge commented. He added his belief that if a moratorium is passed, the public will feel that the council is not “wise enough to limit things.”

“I think you're going to have to trust the council to keep a tight rein on this thing,” Junge said.

The council accepted Page's report, but it made no motion on the moratorium and freeze request.

Also, on the recommendation of Huckstep, the council decided to hold a town meeting on the bond issue sometime within the next three weeks. The council announced no date for the meeting.

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Ruidoso Downs short of water

Ruidoso Downs residents should be aware that the village water supply is down to seven feet, or 77,000 gallons, according to mayor J. C. Day Jr. He asks that all residents begin to conserve water so the supply is not totally drained.

The large number of visitors over the Memorial Day weekend probably contributed to the drain on the water supply,

village clerk Wilma Webb indicated.

An average of 97,731 gallons of water per day were used during the month of April, Webb reported, so the 77,000 gallon supply could quickly be drained.

She said Ruidoso Downs has no emergency source of water, so when this supply is gone, there will be no water to serve the village.

Late rally by Bad Guys nets Chamber membership drive win

The Bad Guys came from behind very late in the day to beat the Good Guys again in this year's annual Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce membership drive. One hundred businesses were enlisted as new Chamber members during the intensive one-day push Wednesday.

Chamber secretary Doris Baca stated that unofficially, the Bad Guys, led by Wayne “The Savage” Sivage, scored 1,119 total points while the Good Guys, led by Dan “Nanny Necker” Shaver, tallied 930 points.

After 5 p.m. Wednesday, the Good Guys had accumulated about 300 more points than the Bad Guys, and it looked as if the Good Guys might finally win a Chamber membership drive.

However, as membership drive participants gathered at Cedar Creek picnic grounds for a post-membership drive barbecue, the Bad Guys began racking up the points. One or two especially tough Chamber prospects worth a lot of points were finally swayed into the Bad Guy

camp, which put the Bad Guys on top of Shaver's hard driving Good Guys.

Once again, the Good Guys signed up more new members this year than Sivage's Bad Guys. Nineteen Good Guys convinced 57 business owners of the Chamber's virtues while only seven Bad Guys working throughout the day were able to sell 43 Ruidoso entrepreneurs on the Chamber.

Good Guy Shaver questioned the results and lambasted Chamber director Ed Jungbluth and Sivage for collusion. Jungbluth claimed he didn't help the Bad Guys cheat this year.

“These (point tallies) are not right, I'm telling you. You saw what they did last year. I know there was cheating. How can you get 600 points in an hour?” asked Shaver.

“Since an official protest has been lodged and it was a photo finish, we will hold off on announcing the formal winner until we study all the photos tonight,” joked Jungbluth.

“Bad guys kind of carry a little bit of an image that brings people around,” said

Ken Cole of the very effective Bad Guy duo of Cole and Ronnie Hemphill. In explaining their success, Cole denied all dastardly, disruptive and deceitful deeds. He added, however, that at least they didn't do anything that was “too bad.”

Said Bad Guy Ron Harris, “We have the innate ability to entice people to join who had no intention whatsoever of joining.”

The membership drive began Wednesday morning with a breakfast meeting. Jungbluth laid down the ground rules and point system. The prospect lists were passed out to team leaders and distributed among team members.

Said Chamber president Morgan Clough to the teams before they hit the streets, “Be good or be bad, but get some cash. Get as much as you can. We need it.”

The two teams met again for lunch and progress reports. After lunch, any Chamber prospects from either of the two lists plus any businesses not already in the Chamber were fair ground for either team. The fun-filled competition ended at the picnic grounds when the last of the newly signed on Chamber member candidates were submitted.

Truck driver charged after fatal accident Tuesday on Highway 70

The driver of a semi-tractor/trailer that crashed into the rear of a car on Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs Tuesday afternoon, causing the death of a 16-month-old girl, has been charged with vehicular homicide.

Ruidoso Downs police arrested Scott Francis Trimble, 35, of Phoenix, Arizona, following the fatal accident and booked him on the vehicular homicide charge. Trimble was released on \$500 bond Tuesday night and is awaiting arraignment before Magistrate Judge James Wheeler.

Conviction on the charge carries a maximum penalty of 18 months in jail and a \$5,000 fine, or both, if classified a felony. If classed as a misdemeanor, the maximum is 90 days in jail and a \$100 fine, or both.

Judge Wheeler said the charge can be made a felony if it is determined Trimble was driving while under the influence of alcohol, or was driving recklessly. Ruidoso Downs police officer Charles Robinson, who investigated the accident, said his observations showed Trimble had not been drinking.

Trimble was the driver of the Kenworth rig that was involved in the three-vehicle accident about 4 p.m. Tuesday. The truck is owned by Southwest Trucking Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

The infant was pronounced dead at the scene.

Jerri Hazel and her five-year-old son, Jeremy, the only other passengers in the vehicle, were admitted to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital for injuries received in the crash. Both were released Wednesday.

Trimble escaped the accident uninjured, according to Emergency Medical Service (EMS) technician Jim Wheeler.

According to police reports, both vehicles were eastbound on Highway 70 when Trimble's truck struck the rear of a third vehicle that was turning left in front of the Ruidoso Downs First Baptist Church.

The car, driven by Cecilia Silva, 59, of Ruidoso Downs, was forced across the westbound lane of the highway and came to rest on the road shoulder. Silva and a passenger, 84-year-old Carolota Sanchez, were treated at the hospital for minor injuries and released Tuesday evening.

"The only thing I know," Silva said Wednesday, "is I was turning left, and he hit me. I had my signal on; I was going to turn. Police said a witness confirmed that the Silva vehicle was signaling for a left turn."

Officer Robinson said he had not determined if the Silva car was partially in the driving lane as it was preparing to turn. The policeman pointed out there is no turning lane where the accident occurred, just a separation in the median strip of the four-lane highway. Robinson also quoted

the truck driver as saying the right lane was occupied by other vehicles.

"These (traffic) islands often don't have a way for people to turn properly," Ruidoso Downs Police Chief Carl DuCept mentioned.

After striking the Silva vehicle, police said, the semi continued east in the left-hand passing lane and crashed into the Hazel car.

Mindy Lynn was a passenger in the back seat of Hazel's two-door Mercury sedan when it was struck from behind, crushing the rear of the car into the pavement and pushing the vehicle about 400 feet into the opposite lane of the highway, according to officer Robinson.

DuCept said he estimated the speed of the truck was about 40 mph, which is the designated speed limit for that stretch of the highway. He added there was "no evidence of negligence" on the part of Trimble.

Jeremy Hazel was helped out of the vehicle shortly after rescue personnel arrived. But it took crews about 40 minutes to free his mother, who was pinned behind the steering wheel as the front of the truck came to rest on top of the car's back seat. The baby girl was buckled into an infant seat in the back, said EMS employee Rita Robertson.

EMS workers, Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso police, sheriff's deputies and State Police officers, along with volunteer firemen and wrecker crews, all pitched in to help remove the car's occupants.

The semi crashed into the rear of a car driven by Jerri L. Hazel, 22, of Ruidoso, causing the death of Hazel's 16-month-old daughter, Mindy Lynn Hazel.

Downs P&Z discusses control over buildings

Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Wednesday discussed the need for control over the types of buildings being erected in the village limits.

The discussion began when P&Z member Jim Tidwell reported that "a two by four shack" has recently been set up near Frank's Fruit Market as a commercial structure.

"This has got to stop or we will have nothing but shanties," Tidwell stated.

He suggested that P&Z meet with the village trustees and attorney to seek authority to approve or disapprove the issuance of building permits and installation of water taps as a means of controlling the types of structures being built.

"We should be able to control the type of buildings that go into this village," Tidwell said.

He also suggested that two persons be appointed as P&Z enforcement officers. It

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
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



Women coaches making their mark in youth soccer league

Team sports has been thought of as a man's world for a long time, particularly in the coaching area.

However, women have made strides in coaching in recent years and Ruidoso is no exception.

Carla Grover and Suzanne Grantham both coach youth soccer teams in the Ruidoso-Sertoma Soccer Association (RSSA). Grover is coach of the under-12 age division Strikers and Grantham coaches the under-eight Bandits.

They both say they've encountered little or no difficulties because they are women.

"I've had none whatsoever," said Grover, who has been coaching the Bandits for three years. "Nobody has ever given me a bad time."

"When the youth teams from Alamogordo and Lubbock came here they were all very nice also."

"Sometimes the kids have talked back a little, but when I've given my position everything is all right. Under-12 kids are very receptive, probably more so than the under-eight kids. They're old enough to listen."

Grover felt there might be problems

with the older under-16 youths.

"Some of them are as big as me," she laughed.

Grover started playing soccer in the women's league two years ago. She had a son in the youth league, and when his coach quit, Butch Grantham (director of the RSSA), asked her to coach.

Grover says teaching the basic skills of soccer is easy.

"It's not hard at all," she said. "The basic skills like kicking the ball and dribbling with it are easy to teach. However, some things like maintaining position in play can be difficult and are hard to teach."

Grover, who has also been head of the children's ski program at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort for eight years, enjoys coaching youth soccer.

"I like to watch the kids progress in their skills and seeing their growth," she said. "Winning is also nice."

Grover is not optimistic about the Ruidoso women's program catching on this year.

"We didn't have enough people come out last season and it doesn't look good so far this year," she said.

Grantham's association with soccer

started in Dallas in the early 1970s.

Her husband, Butch, coached youth soccer in the Texas city and was also a member of the National Soccer League's Dallas Tornado B team.

The Granthams moved to Ruidoso in 1975 and formed the RSSA three years later. Suzanne became a coach in the first season, dropped out for a year to have a baby, then returned for the 1981 spring season. The Bandits have been her only team.

Like Grover, Grantham's experiences with the team have been almost all positive.

"At first, some of the boys got a big kick out of it or were a little ill at ease," she said. "They would snicker behind my back sometimes. Once the kids relaxed and they saw you knew what you were talking about, everything went smooth. At first the girls on the team were perhaps a bit more relaxed about the coach being a woman than the boys were."

Grantham's biggest thrill from coaching soccer comes from watching the kids enjoy themselves.

"The kids really get a big kick out of the sport," Grantham said. "Even when they

lose they come off the field with a big smile and say 'we'll get them next time, coach'."

Grantham says that girl soccer players can be just as aggressive as boys.

"I've seen some girl players really put it to some little boy players," she said. "You don't have to be big to play soccer and almost anyone can learn how to play it."

"When you start coaching, you teach the kids the basics. Little kids that age (four to eight years old) don't have much of an attention span. Sometimes you have to tell them something two or three times so that they will understand."

Grantham also says that soccer is an easy game to coach.

"I would imagine soccer is easier to coach than some other sports," she said. "It's easy to learn and there are a lot of books about it, especially for beginning coaches."

There have also been some women coaches in Ruidoso's Little League baseball program, although they are not currently coaching.

Women are becoming more involved in sports of all types and people like Suzanne Grantham and Carla Grover are leading the way.

Ruidoso High School had one of its best football seasons in many years last fall and the number of Warriors who might be playing college football next season reflects this.

The University of New Mexico (UNM) alone will have two ex-Warriors going to school there and possibly playing football.

Lon Nunley received an athletic scholarship to UNM and Scott Neal will probably go out for the football team as a walk-on. He received an academic scholarship to UNM.

Nunley was an all-state linebacker and will also play for the South All-Stars against the North this summer.

Neal, an outstanding defensive back as well as quarterback and running back, could compete at any one of those three positions at UNM.

Byron Wright and Don Nunley (Lon's twin) will attend West Texas State University (WTSU) in the fall.

Wright was an outstanding outside linebacker with the Warriors while Don made all-district as a tight end. Nunley will probably play at tight end or split end at WTSU.

Several other Ruidoso gridders are uncommitted about where they might go to college next fall.

The four players who will go out for college football next season are the most Ruidoso has sent into the collegiate ranks since Darrel Stierwalt became head coach four years ago.

Next fall Ruidoso should be as well represented in the collegiate ranks as any AAA division high school in New Mexico.

It doesn't pay to be a Super Bowl champion.

Only one of the past Super Bowl champions had a better record in the season following its championship. Not surprisingly, it was the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The Steelers recorded a 10-3-1 record and won the Super Bowl for the 1974 season, defeating Minnesota 16-6. The next year Pittsburgh repeated as Super Bowl champions, recording a 12-2 record in the process.

But otherwise, Super Bowl champions have had a hard time repeating the following season. Pittsburgh has won the Super Bowl twice in a row two times while Miami and Green Bay have each put together two Super Bowl titles in a row once.

Perhaps the biggest letdown after a Super Bowl championship was the Oakland Raiders' drop to a 7-9 record last year. The Raiders won the Super Bowl for the 1980 season after gaining a wild-card berth for the playoffs.

The 1981 Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers could have the same problems the Raiders had.

Randy Cross, the 49ers' all-pro offensive guard, injured his leg during a charity benefit Monday and it will be at least three months before he'll be able to practice again.

The 49ers managed to avoid any serious injuries last season. However, if the injury to Cross is any indication, San Francisco could have a considerably less enjoyable season in 1982.

The rodeo is held in cooperation with the New Mexico Junior Rodeo Association, with kids from all over the state competing



Robert Davidovici to perform on Stradivarius violin Tuesday

Ruidoso Summer Festival concert goers will have the opportunity to hear a great symphony star perform on a great instrument Tuesday, June 8, at 8 p.m. in the Ruidoso Downs Race Track Sales Arena. Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra (FWSO) and Texas Little Symphony (TLS) concertmaster Robert Davidovici (pronounced Da-VEED-o-vech) will play a violin crafted by the famous Italian violin maker Antonio Stradivari in 1710. A native of Romania, Davidovici grew up in Australia and began studying music in Sydney. He later studied under the famed Ivan Galamian at the Juilliard School of Music in New York. Before being appointed to the position of artist-in-residence at North Texas State University, Davidovici served as a teaching assistant to the Juilliard String Quartet. In 1972, Davidovici earned the first prize of the Naumburg Competition. Davidovici won the Flaggler Award in 1973 and was also one of the prize winners in the 1972 Montreal International Violin Competition for Excellence in the Performance of American Music. Davidovici was a semi-finalist in both the 1974 Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow and the 1976 Queen Elizabeth

Competition in Brussels.

Playing with TLS Tuesday evening, Davidovici will perform Mendelssohn's Concerto in E minor for Violin, Opus 64. The program will also include the Sinfonia Number Two in B-flat major, Opus 18, by Bach; and Beethoven's Symphony Number Eight in F major, Opus 93. Like the Stradivarius violin which he plays, Davidovici has performed throughout Europe and the United States. He has also performed widely in Israel, Australia, South America and the Far East. Of his many engagements already booked for next year, Davidovici will play in the People's Republic of China and Mexico.

As FWSO and TLS concertmaster, Davidovici serves as the trustee of the Stradivarius violin donated to FWSO by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Davis of Fort Worth, Texas. Although there is really no way of placing a price tag on the invaluable Stradivarius, it is thought to be worth at least \$250,000.

"This is a remarkable instrument," commented Ann Koonsman, FWSO executive director. "The sound of the fine Stradivarius violin has been described as the 'ultimate listening experience in music.'"

In bringing the Stradivarius to Ruidoso, Davidovici is recreating the mission of the famed violinist Viotli, who was the first to introduce and prove the merits of Stradivari's handwork in Europe's music capitals in the late eighteenth century. It has been written that the connection between Davidovici and Viotli is striking because the Davis Stradivarius is one of the instruments played by Viotli during that exciting musical era.

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Ruidoso's Sales Volume Leaders

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — What are we going to do about our counties? You didn't know they had problems? They do. They do.

Just for one example, a person taking a survey here in Santa Fe during the recently completed political campaign asked this question:

"Given the difference in resources which each has, which of these branches of government do you think does the best job?"

Here are the results:

- State government, 48 percent;
- City government, 30 percent;
- County government, 5 percent; and
- Undecided, 17 percent.

Put simply, "undecided" in that quiz did better in the minds of the public than "county government" did.

That isn't good. And who is most responsible for the way the county government is perceived? Almost certainly, by and large, the County Commissioners.

It's the folks who dominate the county courthouse, in other words, who have most to do with what the citizens believe the county is up to, even if those persons are really only part-time employees.

The full-time people — ones like the treasurer and the clerk and the assessor — are somehow perceived as being the creatures of the Commission.

That's usually not so. In New Mexico, most of those permanent and full-time offices are occupied by people who run and run and run — often with

the deputy succeeding the formal officeholder whenever the four-year limitation runs out, and being in turn succeeded by the previous incumbent when his or her turn runs out, and so on.

In other words, most of the people in the head offices in your courthouse have been there for years — and plan to be there for years more.

That's good only if they are good people. It isn't good if the only reason they can pull this off is that nobody else wants to run against them.

In most of New Mexico's 13 counties, the latter is more likely to be the truth. And how do these county officials do when they come up there to Santa Fe?

Well, take the last legislative session as one example. The counties came up here determined to get a share of the taxes the state charges its citizens. Bruce King, the governor of the state, wanted to give that to them. Did they get it?

Go ask your county officials. Whatever they failed to get may come back to the original thesis in this column — that county officials are not much taken as being important in New Mexico. The record in recent years seems to suggest that they don't get a lot of serious hearing up here when laws are being passed.

And what are they doing about that? Well, their formal association of county governments is busy falling all over itself. Its most recent administrator is now out on the street (the second such in the last four years), and they have almost nobody to speak for them in the coming legislative session.

That's a lousy timing, counties. As far as getting a share of the bucks the state has, it's now or never.

This is no time to be fighting among yourselves. The only losers can be your county's citizens.

DIFFERENT SLANT

On a percentage basis, President Reagan has made far more political choices of ambassadors than other recent presidents did. This has led to sharp censure on grounds that, generally speaking, career Foreign Service officers are much better qualified for such posts.

White House Personnel Director D. Pendleton James has a curiously different slant on the matter. He dismisses criticism as "self-promotion," and say he hopes for more political appointees because "access" to White House bigwigs makes them better ambassadors than mere career officers, "who don't have it." His notion of excellence through access reflects a decidedly narrow concept of what constitutes a good ambassador. Someone ought to take Pendleton aside and tell him what representation abroad is all about. — Alamogordo Daily News

THE RULES OF RACING

At long last, the State Racing Commission has agreed to apply strict new penalties across the board to those who abuse race horses by giving them illegal drugs.

Guilt parties may now expect more equal, and more strict, enforcement of the rules of racing. Those wagering at state tracks can be reasonably sure all horses in the race are running without the aid of drugs.

Horse racing is a multi-million dollar, nearly year-round industry in New Mexico. It is in the interest of owners, trainers and track operators to keep horses in competition. But some have resorted to illegal drugging of the animals to keep them running.

Racing patrons, meanwhile, could not really be sure whether they placed bets on a horse free of drugs or a horse who could barely walk, much less run, without the help of illegal drugs.

The Racing Commission is the public watchdog against wrongdoing in horse racing. But the commission is made up of people quite knowledgeable about, and sometimes involved in, the business.

The five-member panel wrestled for years with the drug problem. Often the commission was regarded as too lenient on violators, occasionally too arbitrary, but hardly ever too strict.

The commission is protecting the industry and patrons by adopting strict new penalties. First offenders will be fined \$1,000 and suspended a year; second-time offenders, \$2,000 and two years suspension; third-time, offenders, \$10,000 and indefinite suspension.

Those penalties hardly appear too lenient. And they do not appear too strict, since the integrity of the industry is otherwise at stake — Albuquerque Journal

O'CONNOR SPEAKS

Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor said that women have come a long way since the 1870s, when the nation's highest court cited their "the natural and proper timidity and delicacy."

"There really has been a remarkable change in the influence of women in this country," she told 128 graduating seniors during Columbia College commencement exercises.

Mrs. O'Connor, the first woman on the Supreme Court, was introduced by Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., as "one of the most powerful women in the world."

"I don't feel like I have all that power he's talking about," she said. But she went on to discuss the growing opportunities women now have.

And the 62-year-old mother of three said women can pursue careers without denying themselves the chance to raise families.

"It is possible to plan a family and a career and to do well at both," she told the graduates of the Methodist-affiliated women's school. "But you'll probably have to work harder than your husband to do it." — Associated Press

Reporter's Round

I spent a very interesting evening recently sitting in on a theater workshop conducted by Herb Robins—veteran performer, director and writer of television, film and stage productions in New York and Los Angeles. Robins teaches a method of acting which he terms "translated imagery," which, to the uninitiated observer, appears to be a euphemism for hallucinating.

Robins instructed his students to stand in front of the group and describe what they "see." According to various accounts, the room was filled with everything from balloons to a dinosaur and several types of vegetables. Well, I failed to see much of anything except several folding chairs being occupied by several people. And being the skeptic that I am, I found it difficult to believe that anybody else could see a dinosaur in the room either.

Obviously nobody actually did see a flesh and blood dinosaur towering over the room, but one participant allowed herself to visualize a dinosaur inside her head and was encouraged by Robins to share the vision with the rest of us.

The point of this process of "translating imagery," as I think I understand it, is to learn to trust one's subconscious mind and ignore the intellect while being creative—whether through acting, writing, painting, drawing or whatever. Robins patiently explained to me during a break in the workshop that it is acceptable to be in touch with this part of the mind, or the imagination, while reading a novel or dreaming or as a child, but not in everyday life.

He said we give ourselves a gift when we allow our imaginations to have free rein, so to speak, because the act of being creative is an emotional release—a sort of catharsis.

Robins commented that he really needs this release; he has to be creative, which I suspect is pretty universally true, although creativity appears in various forms. Not everybody is gifted with the ability to write successful screenplays or to give a convincing performance before an audience. I think the height of my creativity surfaces while I'm dreaming, because when I feel a desperate need to escape from the world I tend to take lots of naps.

But I can still relate to what Robins was saying. When I read a novel—or even take a nap—I get totally involved in another world, a different realm of consciousness. It almost startles me sometimes to put down a book and realize I live in 20th century America rather than medieval

England, and there are no knights in shining armor to rescue fair damsels from distress.

Robins said when he is involved in acting or writing, or any creative endeavor, he is unaware of his past and his future and even present problems because his imagination, or subconscious, takes precedence.

"You have to pray you have a subconscious," Robins told his students. I, remaining a skeptic, asked Robins how an actor can depend on his subconscious to provide him with the appropriate imagery, and also concentrate on dialogue while performing. He assured me that the subconscious always produces the correct imagery and that the dialogue will proceed naturally.

To illustrate his assertion, Robins told us about an actor who was performing in Edward Albee's "The Zoo Story," and, during a particular scene, was directed to appear utterly repulsed by another character in the play. Utilizing Robins' method of translating imagery from the subconscious, the actor visualized the other character as ear wax, of all things, and was genuinely repulsed—and so gave one of his most convincing performances.

In illustration of his point that an actor will not need to concentrate on his lines, Robins instructed the workshop students to continue repeating several words as he directed the action on the "stage." The participants reacted to his directions and emphasized their lines in accordance with what was occurring onstage, although the words had no relevance to the action.

The dialogue seemed to emanate automatically to fit the "reality" on stage.

Robins insists that this form of emotional release—opening up to one's imagination—is more effective than all forms of therapy.

A key point, however, is knowing when and where to do so. Being able to restrain from letting one's imagination dominate his entire life may keep one out of the funny farm. Robins said the difference between maturity and immaturity is being able to keep the imagination or subconscious in check during normal daily activities. After all, our intellects will atrophy if not used sometime.

Robins is also currently directing rehearsals of the play, "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre," to be performed over the July 4 weekend at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Since viewing as well as performing in theater can be cathartic, I encourage anyone in need of an emotional release to support the production.

Jockey/Trainer of the week

The Memorial Day weekend was both good and bad for jockey Vickie Smallwood. She started by winning aboard Jack The Knife (\$6.60) in Friday's ninth race. But her luck drastically changed when she was thrown from Pierre The True in the far turn in Sunday's fourth race. Fortunately, the blonde-haired rider was uninjured and came back to win on My Going Jesse (\$5.80) in Sunday's ninth race. She also won aboard Pride Of Loom (\$14.20) in Monday's featured Memorial Day Handicap.

For that courageous performance, Vickie has been honored as Ruidoso Downs' Jockey-of-the-Week for the fourth weekend of horse racing this season at the mountain track.

She is now third in the rider standings through the first month of this year's 76-day campaign. Vickie has eight triumphs with one second and five thirds from 34 mounts. That's a superb winning percentage of .235.

Steve Harris remains the local jockey leader with 13 victories, five seconds and nine thirds from 62 mounts. His winning percentage is .209.

Other members of the top ten jockey circuit include Jacky Martin (2nd); Joe Martinez (4th); apprentice Mike Lidberg (5th); Leroy Coombs (6th); Kevin Scholl (7th); Kenny Roller (8th); Joe Ruiz (9th); and Gary Sumpter (10th).

In the trainer standing, Bob Arnett won three races over the weekend including the featured Memorial Day Handicap to gain Trainer-of-the-Week laurels.

Arnett, who was fourth last week, advanced to second. He has saddled nine winners with four seconds and three thirds from 37 starts. His winning percentage a fine .243.

William F. Leach, second last week in the trainer division, has taken the lead. He has nine winners with six seconds and eight thirds from 48 starts for a winning percentage of .187.

Other top ten members include Jack W. Brooks (3rd); R. Frank Thompson and H. Don Farris (tied for fifth); Rex D. Brooks (6th); Gerald E. Marr (7th); Jimmie Claridge (8th); Jose Dominguez (9th) and Nerrel Bruney (10th).

Racing continues Thursday and Friday this week with 12-race programs presented each day.

Saturday's featured event will be the second running of the Master Salls Handicap at 870 yards. Three-year-old and older horses will run under handicap weights assigned by Racing Secretary Donald Rausch. The purse will be \$7,500-added.

Sunday's highlight will be the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at four furlongs for the 10 two-year-olds who qualified from last Friday's two trial races. The winner will earn \$31,734.88 from the total purse of \$68,469.32.

Favorites still going strong

Wagering favorites enjoyed another successful weekend over the four-day Memorial Day holiday period at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The public selections won 20 of 48 attempts over the fourth weekend of horse racing at the mountain track for a fine winning percentage of 41.6. In addition, 31 of the favorites finished first, second or third for an in-the-money average of 64.58 percent.

Overall, through the first month of this year's 76-day season, the favorites have done better-than-average with 65 of 145 favorites winning. That's a percentage of 39.6, better than the national average of around 33 percent.

Of the 168 favorites, 112 have been in one of the three money positions for an average of 66.6 percent.

Friday and Monday were the favorites' best days last weekend. Six public choices won each day.

Five straight favorites prevailed on Friday, starting with Cue Me First (\$5.20) in the seventh, Mito Hurts (\$5.80) in the eighth, Jack The Knife (\$6.60) in the ninth, No Tell Motel (\$5.00) in the tenth and Nashville Flame (\$3.80) in the 11th. Impressive Lad (\$4.40) won the fifth.

Monday favorites winning included Winds Of The East (\$7.40) in the second, General Gage (\$6.00) in the third, Moons Triangle (\$8.40) in the fifth, Exclusive Roula (\$4.40) in the sixth, Texoma Charger (\$4.40) in the seventh and Gold Bidder (\$5.40) in the eighth.

Odds-on selections (horses who were favored at less than even money) had difficulties. Of the six heavily backed horses, just two won (Nashville Flame on Friday and Southern Sall, \$3.60, on Saturday) won while one finished third and three failed to finish in the money.

The weekend's biggest favorite was Pierre The True, who was a \$60-1 choice in Sunday's fourth race. He lost his rider, Vickie Smallwood, around the far turn of the 870-yard scamper. The second biggest favorite was Germeo, a \$70-1 choice in Monday's featured Memorial Day Handicap. He finished fourth.

THE CURRENT HANDLE at Ruidoso Downs, after thirteen race days and 168 races, is \$6,405,912; the current daily wagering average is \$492,762; and current wagering per race is \$38,130. At the same time last year, the handle was \$5,731,670; wagering average was \$440,898; and per race wagering \$34,118. The daily average is up 11.76 percent and per race wagering is up 11.76 percent.

All-American Yearling Sale attracts record number of quarter horses

A record 1,060 horses have been entered for this year's All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale, according to Rick Henson, director of the sale.

"As far as I know, this is the largest sale of strictly quarter horses in the United States," said Henson, who is in his first year as director of horse sales for Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated.

The record number of entrants will extend the 21st annual sale to five days. Last year's sale set previous records for 964 catalogued horses over four sale days.

The sale is held in the All-American Sales arena on the track grounds.

This year's first session is set for Monday, August 30, tentatively beginning at 10:30 a.m. Day sessions will be held on Tuesday, August 31 and Wednesday, September 1. Night sessions beginning at 7 p.m. on Thursday, September 2 and Friday, September 3 will complete the gigantic sale.

"The quality also looks excellent. We have all the great quarter horse sires represented," Henson said.

Henson said a full sister to Easy Prince, who sold in 1981 for a record All-American price of \$400,000, will also be available. By Easy Jet out of Go Galla's Lady, she is consigned by the Cimarron Ranches of Marble Falls, Texas.

"Her full brother, Easy Prince, was the highest-priced horse we've ever sold and he's already a stakes winner," Henson said.

Henson said the prominent Canadian, Texas, horseman Dan Urschel will sell horses for the first time in several years. He has 11 consigned in the sale.

Others with several horses consigned include Gordon Howell (who has the World Champion Truckle Feature standing at his Sunland Park, breeding farm) with 12 head, Valton Cox of Lubbock, Texas, has 14 and Harriett Peckham (who has the great quarter horse sire Easy Jet standing at her famed Buena Suerta Ranch in Roswell) entered 13.

Among the outstanding sires represented in the sale are Easy Jet, Raise Your Glass (sire of Special Effort, quarter horse racing's all-time leading money maker); Truckle Feature, Dash For Cash, Real Easy Jet, Shawnee Bug, Bugs Alive in 75, Ichibon, Pass 'Em Up, Timeto Thinkrtek (the 1973 All-American Futurity winner); Hempen, Rocket Wrangler (the 1970 All-American Futurity winner), Azure Te and Tiny's Gay.

Henson said the catalogues are expected to be available in July.

He said the veteran auctioneering crew which has handled the sale in previous years will return. The announcer again will be Tom Hammond of Lexington, Kentucky, while auctioneers include Keith Babb of Monroe, Louisiana; Scott Caldwell of San Clemente, California and Bill Tackett of Collinsville, Oklahoma.

"The All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale remains the most prestigious quarter horse sale in the country with its record number of entries," Henson said. "Even though other sales are popping up around the country, people still feel this is the granddaddy of them all."

"It's a festive week with the All-American Futurity, which offers a million dollars to the winner, topping the activities," he added.

A NIGHT ON THE TOWN

Cree Meadows Restaurant offers fine continental cuisine

After a glorious day of playing the horses at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, you still want to impress upon your favorite out of town friends what a great and fun place Ruidoso is to visit and to live in.

So, to top off a day at the races, you need a night on the town.

There's no better way to appreciate a Ruidoso evening than to dine in the comfortable elegance of the recently remodeled Cree Meadows Restaurant situated in Cree Meadows Country Club.

The restaurant opens at 6 p.m. However, I know Cree Meadows chef Bob Gregson specializes in continental cuisine, so in keeping with the European tradition of eating late, our reservations were made for 8 p.m.

I was the first one to arrive. Hostess Sue Gregson greeted me with a smile and a refreshingly different Welsh accent. Friend Bruce arrived while Sue was arranging our table. Growing impatient waiting for Kim and Anne Marie, Bruce and I were seated by our gracious hostess and began to scan the menu.

As the girls made their fashionably late entrance, our gaze was pulled from the enticing menu. Sauntering towards us in their light, pastel slacks and frilly blouse ensembles—perfect attire for a casual Ruidoso evening—the beautiful expanse of the dining room revealed itself.

The room is dominated by two very large brass chandeliers. The luminaires, we were told, were made in California for Cree Meadows Country Club at no small price.

Lighting is, of course, very important at a restaurant to create the right atmosphere. The ambiance of Cree Meadows is very much dictated by those two chandeliers; one of taste and high quality, yet simplicity and cordiality.

The plush red carpet contrasts well with the natural white sandstone walls. The

room is nicely appointed with ferns, cacti and other plants.

However, the nicest part of the room's decor is the large picture windows which allow the Cree's dining guests to behold the magnificent scenery which lies at Cree Meadows' feet. Looking past the country club's lush fairways, the eye is drawn to the brilliant setting sun silhouetting Sierra Blanca.

As the sky's backdrop changed from varying hues of gold and orange to pink and purple, we were moved to ask for the wine list.

Our delightful and witty waiter, Gordon Freeman, who is also the maitre d', presented us with the Cree's extensive wine list.

Gordon informed us that the house red wine was a Sebastiani sold by the glass for \$1.25, by the half-liter for \$4, and by the full carafe for \$7. The house's white wine is a Liebfraumilch. A glass goes for \$1.50, a half-carafe for \$4.50 and a full liter for \$8.50.

Trying to be very snobby, we poo-pooed Gordon and asked about the "other" wines which we knew Cree Meadows stocked.

"Well," replies Gordon, "we have a Simi Valley Cabernet Sauvignon for \$9.75, or how about a Zinfandel Beringer for \$8.75?"

We pretended to be unimpressed and urged Gordon to become a bit more extravagant. After all, the newspaper was jumping to the top of the list and mentioned Dom Perignon for \$118 a bottle, the Lafitte Rothschild for \$88 and a Mouton Cadet Rothschild for \$68 a bottle.

"Now let's not get carried away," I said. "Don't you have something sort of in between, hmmm?"

Obligingly, Gordon mentioned a \$36 bottle of Pouilly-Suisse and a Saint Emilion

Rothschild for \$18. Trying to pick a wine that would accommodate everyone's meal and thinking that we might want more than one bottle during the course of the evening, I chose a moderately priced bottle of Mouton Cadet Rose, Rothschild, 1977.

Does anyone in these democratic days—where the waiter probably earns more than many of the restaurant guests—turn down a wine? Well, I have once, but there was no reason at all to be snooty because the wine was very good once it warmed up five or seven degrees. Then, the wine's flavor and bouquet could be enjoyed fully.

It's a good thing Bruce and I had a head start on looking at the menu because it is full of many appetizing items, which makes picking a repast a most difficult choice.

The menu items are very well priced considering the fancy dishes chef Gregson offers. The Tournedos Cree Meadows—twin filets sauteed in wine with a bernaise sauce atop—costs \$13.95. For \$12.95, the mignonettes of beef moutard—a finger of beef prepared with Dijon mustard, brandy and cream—can be yours.

Cree Meadows Restaurant offers a variety of chicken dishes. The chicken cordon bleu—filled with ham and Swiss cheese—goes for \$12.50; and chef Gregson's special recipe of chicken Kiev is only \$9.95.

Of course, Gregson, who is from Manchester, England, prepares English style fish and chips for \$6.95. The trout almon-dine is \$9.95, and the trout Bretonne—sauteed with lemon, shrimp and mushrooms—costs \$12.95. For \$13.95 one can get the shrimp Orly—deep fried shrimp served with red sauce.

Chef Gregson also prepares a gourmet meal for two. It consists of shrimp cocktail to start things off, French onion soup, a

tossed green salad followed by Chateau Briand Bouquetiere and topped off by vanilla cassis parfait, all for \$50.

In addition to the more involved dishes which Gregson creates, there are the traditional American cuts of beef which are in the \$14 to \$15 price range. Such cuts as filet mignon, rib eye steak and, when available, prime rib are offered. All entrees are accompanied by soup or salad and vegetable.

Bruce ordered the prime rib. Kim asked for the steak Diane—a small filet prepared with a burgundy wine sauce that cost \$15. Anne Marie chose the peppered steak Lucifer for \$14. The steak Lucifer is flamed with cream and brandy and covered with pepper.

Since everyone was ordering beef, I wanted to add a little variety to our dinner. I also knew that all four of us would want to try each other's dishes, so I asked for the scampi Provencale. Scampi Provencale is shrimp sauteed with garlic, parsley and mushrooms, and it costs \$14.

Gordon soon brought us our homemade broccoli soup. It was perfect: the right temperature—not too hot as to scald our sensitive palates—with an even consistency to match its flavor. It was just enough to stimulate our appetites without monopolizing stomach space.

Next came our appetizers, as if we really needed something to increase our appetite. I had ordered the artichokes a la Grecque while Anne Marie chose the tempura fried zucchini. Both were simply excellent.

Fried foods have a tendency to be greasy and heavy and to overrun the taste of the fried object. However, the zucchini was light, crunchy and retained its own natural flavor. It was complemented with a most unusual and tasty apricot and mustard sauce.

The artichoke hearts melted in my mouth. They were served in a warm vinegrette sauce with onions. The soft tex-

ture of the artichoke hearts contrasted well with the tangy taste of the vinegrette sauce, which I might add did not have the typical vinegrette sauce's eye-watering tartness.

As the others sat about talking politics and unions, I thought back on the appetizers and looked forward to the main course. Sipping on my pleasingly dry wine, I recalled some of chef Gregson's history.

Bob's brother and mother have always been involved in the food preparation business. When Bob was 20 years old, he graduated from Hollins Domestic and Trades College in Manchester, England. During his three years of schooling, he also apprenticed in French restaurants.

Bob is a saucier, one who specializes in sauce making. He worked in several different restaurants on the European continent before coming to the United States almost nine years ago.

Upon moving to the U. S., Gregson worked as a chef at French restaurants and also did some restaurant consulting work. On a vacation to Ruidoso in 1977, his Volkswagen bus caught on fire, and the Ruidoso bug caught him. The Gregsons have leased the restaurant facility at Cree Meadows Country Club since February of 1979.

"What I like most about this place is that I've got the freedom to create ... We create dishes all the time," Gregson told us.

He said food is like magic. You start with an idea and work with the basics: mixing, matching, adding, thinning, thickening, seasoning, subtracting. He added that a lot of things have come together by mistakes, but we surely didn't taste any mistakes while we dined at the Gregsons' Cree Meadows Restaurant.

I was brought back to the dinner table by Gordon serving my scampi Provencale on my right side while the omnipresent busboy filled our water glasses.

Although Ruidoso is not a seaport, the shrimp were surprisingly good. They were

soft and tender, not the usual chewy shrimp that Ruidosans must accustom themselves to. The shrimp were nicely arranged on a bed of garlicky and buttery lit with lemon slices separating the lit guys.

Anne Marie's first comment about the peppery steak Lucifer was, "It makes me sneeze." Everyone's meat was cooked order. I tasted everyone's, and the meat was so tender and juicy that it brought me the savage carnivore in me. I can still taste it when I think about it.

As we finished our meal, Sue Gregson stopped by our table. That evening was the first time that Cree Meadows Restaurant used the large banquet room to accommodate a record-breaking dinner crowd, she said. Well over 300 people ate at Cree Meadows Saturday night, and some were turned away, added Sue.

Sue stated that they usually serve in the main dining room which seats about 100 people. The banquet room in which we ate seats in excess of 200 people.

For dessert, Anne Marie and Kim split an order of the double chocolate torte, had the butterscotch with two cups of richly brewed coffee. Both tortes were—use an expression which Cale Dickel wouldn't let me use—yum-yummy.

Pleasantly full, we sat around finishing our coffee until we were enticed by music emanating from the bar.

Before going into the bar, we took our apres-dinner promenade around the country club. Upon entering, we were seated deep cushiony seats, and we ordered our favorite after dinner liqueurs.

Ron Montgomery was entertaining the crowd and some were dancing to the mellow country and western songs. Ron who is from Midland, Texas, plays electric guitar accompanied only by rhythm-making machine. Listening to him as we sat in the dimly lit bar was a most pleasant way to end a day at the restaurant on a night on the town.

THE 440 RANCH of Madisonville, Texas, and trainer J. Michael Welch qualified three horses to the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity following Friday's two trial races. They earned berths in this Sunday's chase with Impressive Lad, winner of the first trial race; What A Gem, who was fourth in the first trial race; and with Cue Me First, who won the second heat. The winner of that four-furlong dash for two-year-old New Mexico-breds, will collect \$31,734.66 from the total purse of \$63,469.32. The complete list of qualifiers (from first heat): Impressive Lad, Future King, Big Bid, What A Gem and M.J.'s Tinker; (from second heat): Cue Me First, Dragon's Mist, Suzanne, Cajun Eyes and Dratahni.

BIG BID AND DRAGON'S MIST, both Draconic offspring, were sold last summer in the ninth Annual Summer Sale for Thoroughbred Yearlings. Big Bid was sold for \$4,000 while Dragon's Mist was purchased for \$10,500.

AN ODDITY OCCURRED in Friday's 11th race. The winner, Nashville Flame, carried program number four, Lady Columbia, who finished second, was horse number five; Glorious, who was third, carried program number six and Golden Dynasty, who was fourth, had program number seven.

SPECIAL HANK SHOWED why he is one of the Southwest's top sprinters when he held off a late bid by Jiltaloom to register a three quarter length triumph in Saturday's featured \$6,000 Barlaris Stakes at five and one-half furlongs. The five-year-old Special Secret gelding led throughout in recording fractions of :23 1-5 for the quarter, :46 4-5 for the half-mile, 1:00 4-5 for the five furlongs and 1:07 4-5 for the five and one-half furlongs. Ridden by regular rider Salustio Burgos for trainer George Coper Jr., Special hank scored his third victory with one second in four appearances this season. He's collected \$12,755 for owner Lowell F. Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas.

RULE THE DECK also made a successful debut at the races by scoring a game head win over Runnin Barre in Sunday's fifth race for four-year-old and older allowance horses going 400 yards. The Scout Leader mare was one of the standouts at last year's Ruidoso Downs

meeting. She ran third, just a neck behind Higheasterjet in last August's \$1 million All-American Derby. It was also her fifth consecutive victory dating back to September 11 at the New Mexico State Fair meeting in Albuquerque. As a three-year-old, she scored eight wins with one second and one third in 18 appearances for trainer R.D. Hay. She's collected \$177,672 for owner Dirk Jones of Lubbock, Texas.

SUNDAYS PAYDAY snapped his seasonal fastest time when he scooted to a :47 2-5 clocking while winning Sunday's first race by one and one-half lengths over Summily Smashed. The two-year-old Loom colt had a :47 3-5 while capturing his maiden win by almost five lengths on May 15. Trained by Bob Arnett, Sundays Payday has now won two races in three outings in his brief career at Ruidoso Downs. He's owned by Hugh C. Preston, Jr. of Burkburnett, Texas.

JOCKEY VICKIE SMALLWOOD took a severe spill aboard Pierre The True, a 3-5 favorite in Sunday's fourth race at 870 yards. The mishap occurred going into the turn for home when Pierre The True got into tight quarters, apparently clipped the heels of the horse in front, stumbled and threw his rider. Vickie was taken from the track by track ambulance, but she was not seriously injured. Vickie, much to her credit, returned for the ninth race and won handsomely aboard My Going Jesse.

THE TRIPECTA, introduced for the first time at Ruidoso this season, continues to gain in popularity. On Sunday, the Tripecta — in which fans attempt to pick the top three finishers in order — accounted for a handsome pool of \$51,056. This was well above any of the day's quiniela pools, and the Daily Double (\$37,750), but not as hefty as the Big Q (\$67,391). The Tripecta is linked to the eighth race each day.

A DELEGATION OF SOME 25 MEMBERS of the Kansas Quarter Horse Racing Association was on hand for the Kansas Futurity, as part of that group's annual bus excursion to Ruidoso. Heading up the delegation were president George Blatchford, secretary Rex Childs and treasurer H. W. Leatherman. Wagering on the Kansas Futurity topped out at \$97,740 — a seasonal one-race record thus far.

PIERRE THE TRUE, a longtime 870-yard kingpin at Ruidoso Downs, swapped barns on Sunday via a 10-grand claim

submitted by Wallace Jankowek. But that \$10,000 wasn't a seasonal mark. The record claiming price, thus far, was the \$15,000 paid for Passthemoneyhoney on May 23 by J.E. Adams and Hip Russell.

JOHN BOYS ALIVE showed he really liked the 870-yard Ruidoso Downs course. After 15 lifetime starts running only at straight quarter horse distances, he led throughout Sunday's fourth race at 870 yards to post a three-quarter length win over Mr Wise Dancer. Ridden by Kevin Scholl for trainer J.B. Montgomery, the three-year-old Bugs Alive in 76 gelding is owned by Betty Lou Shebester of Wynnewood, Oklahoma. It was his first victory since winning an allowance race at 350 yards last September 19 at Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw, Oklahoma. John Boys Alive returned \$27.40 as a \$12.70-1 outsider.

RUIDOSO DOWNS HAS A RECORD claiming race run as Sunday's ninth event. The race, written by racing secretary Donald Rausch, was designed for thoroughbred horses running for a claiming price of either \$30,000 or \$25,000. Captense, a four-year-old Loom gelding, won as a \$8.20-1 outsider, while Dunker Bill ran second and Irish Antics finished third.

PRIDE OF LOOM set a seasonal fastest time when he raced to a 1:07 3-5 clocking while scoring a nose win in Monday's Memorial Day Handicap at five and one-half furlongs. The Loom gelding established early fractions of :23 2-5 for the five furlongs. He was ridden by Vickie Smallwood for trainer Bob Arnett, and owner Hugh Preston Jr. of Burkburnett, Texas. Pride Of Loom captured last season's Norgor Futurity at four furlongs on July 12 while earning more than \$39,000 as a two-year-old.

BUSINESS WAS REALLY BOOMING at Ruidoso Downs over the four-day holiday weekend. The total handle soared up to \$2,460,921, thanks in large part to Saturday's \$711,343 and Sunday's remarkable \$864,851. Sunday's handle prompted many visitors to comment: "It looks like Labor Day." The daily wagering average over the weekend was \$615,230, which punched the seasonal average (after 13 race days) up to \$492,762. After the same 13-day period last summer, the average stood at \$440,898. The current figure is a gain of 11.76 percent. The current Memorial Day weekend reflected a mutual gain of 23.91 percent over the same holiday weekend last year.

Welch and Jockey Club a family tradition

Being a member of the Ruidoso Jockey Club is almost a family tradition with James Welch, the retired oilman from Artesia.

Welch, who now makes his home in Ruidoso, points out that his late father, Van Welch, was one of the original members of the Jockey Club.

The exclusive organization—a separate entity from the race track (at that time)—was incorporated on November 2, 1952.

Since the elder Welch had a training farm—called Shamrock Farms—it was only natural that James Welch would grow up around horses, and in the shadow of the Ruidoso Jockey Club.

But, with the passing of Van Welch, Shamrock Farms also came to an end. James Welch explains: "Since my sisters weren't interested in racing, we decided to

liquidate the farm, and all the horses—about 25—were sold."

Since then, Welch's interest in racing has been simple enough. "Just as a spectator," he smiles.

But his connection with the Jockey Club has been much more than just an observer. He's been a member of the board since 1963, and he served as president in 1969, 1970, and 1971. In late 1973, when the Jockey Club purchased both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park, a wholly-owned subsidiary, Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, was organized to operate the two tracks.

Welch was elected a director of the first Ruidoso-Sunland board of directors, and was reelected to that post last month. "I've seen nothing but improvement of the two tracks over the past three-and-a-half years, and I can't foresee anything but a great future for Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park," he says.

He described the last Sunland Park season, which finished up with a striking gain of 22 percent in daily average, as "a very pleasant surprise."


So far as the current Ruidoso Downs season, he says: "With all the money we've spent at Ruidoso to improve the facilities, I'd be surprised if we didn't handle \$50 million during the season."

That would be quite an improvement over the 1981 season, which accounted for a handle of just over \$40 million and went into the books as the best in track history.

"The new board of directors now has two main priorities," Welch goes on. "We'd like to build a new sales facility at Ruidoso Downs to house the All-American Sale and the Ruidoso Summer Sale, and we'd like to construct a Jockey Club at Sunland Park," he explains. "Those are the two projects we'll be spending most of our money on in the next three to four years."

Although Welch is retired from business, he still plays a role in the Welch Oil Company, an oil production and drilling company located in Artesia.

But his duties and responsibilities as a board member of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park are likely to take more and more of his time. It's a challenge he obviously enjoys.

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — I know that several states now follow the practice of releasing hatchery raised fish in streams and lakes that may not offer significant natural populations. I suppose this logic makes some sense, but doesn't it cost the states large amounts of money to raise and stock these fish? Is there really that much benefit shared among state taxpayers?

It would seem more beneficial and practical to improve the quality and underwater habit of the waters so they would support fishable natural populations. Perhaps then stocking wouldn't be necessary, since self-perpetuation could replenish those lost.

I have never cared to fish the stocked streams, mostly because of the large crowds of people that flock after the stockings take place. It hardly seems like fishing; more like lining up for snagging. Would you comment?

Dear Bob — Many states have been raising fish in hatcheries for release in streams for a good number of years. Personally, I think it is quite a worthwhile project. Presumably, the states recover a portion of the operating cost through the sale of fresh water fishing licenses that may not have been otherwise sold. It should also stimulate the local economy a bit through the sale of fishing tackle, lures, bait, food, and a dozen other commodities. All of which, in most states, turns additional tax money to the state governments.

You must also realize that many, perhaps most, of the streams that are stocked cannot normally be expected to support and sustain native, or natural, perpetuation. Maybe the waters just aren't suited for the reproduction of that particular species, or perhaps the fishing pressure is so heavy for a particular stretch of water that natural populations could not possibly keep pace.

The point is, I guess, that stocking provides opportunities for many more people to fish waters which could only provide that privilege to a few if left to produce natural populations of fish. You may not care for this kind of fishing because you are perhaps more fortunate in having opportunities to fish elsewhere. But to many people, this is the best, and maybe the only, opportunity. Hopefully, many will release their catch to be enjoyed again.

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Super Select Sale held to 100 quarter horses

Following a stringent evaluation, 100 regal-bred quarter horse yearlings have been approved for the second annual Ruidoso Super Select Sale here. Bidding will begin at 7:15 p.m. August 29, 1982, in the Ruidoso Downs Chaparral Convention Center, located just east of Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Sisters and brothers to six champions, including two-time world champion Dash For Cash, are among those catalogued for the sale, which in its first year established numerous industry records. There are also yearlings from a number of \$100,000 producing mares.

"Once again we're going to offer the finest quarter horse yearlings available in one night of bidding," said Richard Thompson, president and general manager of the sale. "The response to this year's sale was tremendous and it was extremely difficult to limit the field."

Over 300 applications were processed by the Super Select Sale earlier in the year. After a pedigree evaluation by a panel of experts, 135 yearlings were chosen for conformation inspection by Jerry Wells, one of the sport's most respected and knowledgeable horsemen. Using Wells' evaluations the sale panel narrowed the list of yearlings down to an even one hundred.

"The finest producing families are included in this year's catalogue, and Jerry's precise evaluations confirm the excellent quality of stock available," added Thompson.

There will be a \$20,000 guaranteed return to the consignor again this year, said Thompson, but he added there will be a slight change in procedure. "If the yearling sells for less than \$20,000 the sale company will make up the difference to the consignor instead of purchasing the yearling for that price," he said.

Last year in the inaugural mixed sale, 54 yearlings passed under the gavel for an average of \$63,886 — which is four times higher than any other sale average and almost six times the national average for all quarter horse yearlings sold at auction.

Three of the nation's top seven selling quarter horse yearlings in 1981 were sold at the first Super Select Sale, including Himto Dancer, a colt purchased for a world record price of \$510,000. Also in last year's sale was Hot For Cash who sold for \$500,000.

This year's highest seller could come from a number of outstanding consignments. Hip Number 41, an unnamed colt by world champion Easy Jet out of Osage Lamb, is a half brother to 1971 champion two-year-old filly Osage Rocket (\$266,643) and 1978 champion two-year-old filly Osage Juana (\$222,474).

Another impressive entry is hip Number 82, a filly by Easy Jet named Lear Thirty Five. She is a half sister to two-time world champion Dash For Cash (\$507,687).

Also consigned to this year's sale are: Hip Number 30, None Such Miss, is a full sister to 1980 champion two-year-old Mighty Deck Three (\$442,757); Hip Number 80, an unnamed colt by world champion Tiny's Gay out of Dee Mount, is a half brother to 1981 champion two-year-old filly Dashingy (over \$830,000 and still in training); Hip Number 22, an unnamed colt by Easy Jet, is a half brother to 1975 and 1976 champion aged gelding Wanta Go (\$175,108).

Two highly regarded mares also have yearlings in the sale. Charger Bar (\$485,437), the 1971 world champion and winner of 21 stakes races, has a colt by Sir Rambler as hip Number 73. Vansarita Too, a full sister to 1960 world champion Vandy's Flash and two other running champions, has a colt by Easy Jet as hip Number 79.

There are also yearlings from outstanding mares that have produced Johnny Vitorio (over \$398,000 and still training), Miss Three Wars (\$181,390), Viking Anne (\$183,809), Jeanifer Jet (\$175,779), Wake Up Lil' Suzy (\$160,068), Double Knit (\$117,131), Sheswright (\$108,884) and Brace (\$107,587).

This year a total of 30 stallions will be represented in the Super Select Sale. Leading the roster is Easy Jet, the 1969 world champion who is the sport's all-time leading sire of money winners. His get have earned over \$12 million. Easy Jet will have 37 yearlings in the sale.

Also well represented is 1976 and 1977 world champion Dash For Cash. In six years, a stallion with only four crops of

foals to race, Dash For Cash has the highest average selling price for yearlings of any stallion. A share in Dash For Cash is now worth \$750,000. Dash For Cash will have 11 yearlings in the sale.

There will be eight yearlings sired by Tiny's Gay, five by the thoroughbred Azure Te and five by the thoroughbred Raise Your Glass, who sired last year's world champion and million-dollar earner Special Effort.


The heart of the quarter horse industry will be well represented in this year's sale, according to Thompson. He said there are consignors from 12 states whose yearlings were accepted.

The strongest concentration came from Texas from where 40 yearlings were consigned. Oklahoma followed with 25 yearlings while California has 14 and New Mexico has eight. Other states represented include Missouri, Kansas, Washington, Florida, Arkansas, Arizona, Louisiana, and Illinois.

The leading consignor is Lynne and Marshall Jelderks of Arroyo Grande, California. They have four yearlings. Those consignors with three yearlings include Breakaway Farms of Dallas; Frontera Farms of Sunland Park; Green Pastures of Purcell, Oklahoma; Meadow Creek Ranch of Auburn, California; and Warren and Vickie Wylie of Buna, Texas.

This year's Super Select Sale has been expanded to two dates. Yearlings will be offered in the August 29 sale at Ruidoso Downs while broodmares, weanlings and stallion shares will be sold October 16, 1982, at Jerry Wells Ranch near Purcell.



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
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Luckily Smashed in Friday feature

Luckily Smashed, who has faced the finest three-year-olds on the grounds, meets five allowance foes in Friday's featured race at Ruidoso Downs.

The What Luck filly appears to be in a favorable spot in this race restricted to three-year-old New Mexico-breds going six furlongs for a purse of \$3,600.

Luckily Smashed has performed well in three races in May at the mountain track. She opened on May 9 with a respectable fifth in an allowance chase at five and one-half furlongs. That was her first race since last September at the New Mexico State Fair meeting in Albuquerque.

Then, she ran second, beaten by less than four lengths to Germeo in the \$7,800 Aspen Stakes on May 15 over five and one-half furlongs.

In the Memorial Day Handicap at five and one-half furlongs, Luckily Smashed made a strong closing bid to capture third place, less than two and one-half lengths behind winning Frigde Of Loom.

The filly should like the extra 110 yards as well as facing only New Mexico-bred competitors for the first time in 1982.

Luckily Smashed enjoyed a productive season last year, winning three races with four seconds and one third in 12 outings for trainer William F. Leach. She earned \$36,583 for owners Carol Childs, Sue May and William F. Leach of Fort Stockton, Texas.

Her most impressive victory last season as a two-year-old was a one and one-half length verdict over Somebody's Lady in the \$29,660 Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity on June 14 at Ruidoso Downs.

Luckily Smashed's toughest opponent may well be Tonkawa Charger, a Foggy Road gelding.

Tonkawa Charger was one of the state's finest runners last year. He scored five triumphs with three seconds and two thirds in 14 outings for trainer J. Michael Welch. He earned \$33,918 for owner Melvin G. Riggs of Fort Stockton, Texas.

This season, Tonkawa Charger has run superbly, although he has failed to win in four tries.

After opening with a second, just a neck behind Callmechance on April 18 at Sunland Park, Tonkawa Charger finished sixth in the C.D. Wooten Handicap at Sunland Park on April 24.

He began at Ruidoso Downs with a second behind Pocketpurse in a six-furlong chase designed for \$20,000 claiming horses on May 22. His last start produced a third-place effort behind Jack The Knife and Ferro Fair in a five and one-half-furlong race on May 28.

Here's the field in post position order with assigned jockeys and weights: 1 - Bold Remark (Danny Summerow, 117); 2 - Luckily Smashed (Joe Martinez, 112); 3 - Mr. Zips Bonny (Pedro Benitez, 112); 4 - Love N Bellevue (Mike Lidberg, 115); 5 - Coy's Prize (Casey Lambert, 110); 6 - Tonkawa Charger (Willie Lovell, 117).

Racing continues Saturday with the featured second running of the Master Salls Handicap at 870 yards. Three-year-old and older runners will compete under weights assigned by racing secretary Donald Rausch for a purse of \$7,600-added.

Sunday's main event will be the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at four furlongs. The winner of the season's first major test for two-year-old thoroughbreds will collect \$31,734.66 from the total purse of \$83,469.32.

Post time for each day's 12-race program will be 1 p.m.

Jockey Steve Harris coming into his own

When Steve Harris was 14 years old, he was working in the jockey's room at Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw, Oklahoma.

Now, eight years later, he still spends some time in the jockeys room at Blue Ribbon Downs as well as other Southwestern horse race tracks. His occupation, however, has taken a somewhat different slant.

"My father (Dr. Boyd Harris of Fayetteville, Arkansas) owned part of Blue Ribbon Downs. They just raced weekends. When I was little, about 14 years old, I worked as a runner for the track. I also spent a lot of time in the jockey room hanging up silks and other things. That's how I got interested in riding for a living."

"I was always pretty little and I'd always been riding horses," said the 22-year-old native of Fayetteville, Arkansas, home of the home of the University of Arkansas.

So Harris, after receiving his high school diploma in 1978 from Fayetteville High School, decided to ride professionally. He had ridden in match races around Oklahoma and Arkansas. "I'd done pretty well," he said.

In the summer of 1978, he loped horses for the prominent Midwestern thoroughbred trainer Bob Hollis at Arlington Park, a major thoroughbred plant near Chicago. He also won his first race on a recognized pari-mutuel track when he guided Riviera Princess for Hollis to the winner's circle that summer at Arlington.

So what happened to Harris' fledgling career as a thoroughbred rider?

"I got homesick," he said, laughing. "I came back to Sallisaw and started riding there."

His career riding quarter horses was about to take a dramatic improvement.

Robert Dinitz was just starting to train quarter horses. Harris was just starting to ride quarter horses.

They combined to win three derbies in the fall of 1978 with Fifth Quarter, a Jet Deck Jr. colt. They also won the Mistletoe that fall at Blue Ribbon Downs.

Now, Harris is regarded as one of the quarter horse racing's finest retrainers.

He was leading rider at Blue Ribbon Downs, the largest non-pari-mutuel track in the United States, for three years (1979-1981).

He has topped the jockey standings for two of the first three weeks this summer at Ruidoso Downs, home of the nation's richest races for quarter horses.

In 1981, he won such major quarter horse races as the \$320,295 Sun Country Futurity with Greybon at Sunland Park, the \$145,880 World's Championship Classic with Bold Love at Ruidoso Downs and the \$494,753 Heritage Place Futurity with Jumbo Pacific at Blue Ribbon Downs.

This year has started superbly for the Arkansas native.

Harris won the \$482,376.27 Black Gold Futurity at Blue Ribbon Downs aboard Little Royal Chick on April 18. A week later, he took Breezy Smith to victory in the \$104,724 Alamo AQBA Futurity at Val Verde Downs in Del Rio, Texas.

In his current hot streak at Ruidoso Downs, Harris guided Go For Buses to a second-place finish behind Special Effort in the \$384,000 Kansas Derby, the first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses.

"Everything's starting to work out better now. I really don't know why I'm doing so much better," he modestly said. "It's much tougher at Ruidoso Downs than the other tracks. All the good horses are here at one meet."

Harris' success has also made a prophet out of his agent, Donnie Stewart, 38, of Fort Worth, Texas.

"I called him this winter while I was at Sunland Park and asked him to take his book. So we started out together in January at Sallisaw," recalled Stewart. "I used to handle jockey's book, but I quit two years ago. I just got tired of it. I wasn't going anywhere. Then I started training at Denver and I was called to take Steve's book last year at Ruidoso Downs. But I decided not to. I didn't want to get back into the business until I had someone I knew and someone who would do well." Stewart said.

"I called him because I thought he was the hottest thing going in quarter horse riders. I think he has one of the best futures any quarter horse rider could hope for," said Stewart.

According to the May bulletin from the American Quarter Horse Association, Harris is the highest-ranked Southwestern rider in the country.

Harris has gained 43 wins with 31 seconds and 31 thirds from 204 mounts for earnings of \$244,976 through April 30. That puts him in sixth place among the nation's leading quarter horse riders in terms of earnings.

Harris rides for such well known Ruidoso Downs trainers as Jack Brooks, Rex Brooks, James Taylor and Jack Dube.

Despite all the major races, Stewart claimed Harris gets as much enjoyment from winning a routine race.

"Sure, we'd like to win the All-American (the \$2,580,000 All-American Futurity on Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs)," he admitted. "You'd have to be stupid to say you wouldn't want to. But Steve gets just as much thrill winning a race for \$1,500. Winning is winning. The money may be better in other races, but there's nothing like winning."

Harris and his wife of more than a year, Daline of Springdale, Arkansas, certainly agree—there's nothing like winning races. It's a habit riders can easily appreciate. Especially those who have done as well as Steve Harris.

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
