

Traffic offenses keeping Judge Nunnally very busy

If you're fed up with the monumental increase in traffic on Ruidoso's streets, and you have seen more drivers violating traffic laws than you thought you would witness in a lifetime, just think how the local judge feels.

Municipal Judge Sam Nunnally handles traffic cases and misdemeanors for the village of Ruidoso. In the past few months, Nunnally has broken the record twice for

the number of cases he has heard. In March, Nunnally processed 453 cases, or almost 20 cases for every working day. That was his all-time record for cases heard.

Last month ranks second on the record list. In May the judge heard a total of 401 cases, an average of over 19 cases a day.

The cases come before a judge who previously was accustomed to working half-days. Recently, Nunnally said, he has put in regular nine to five shifts and often has been called during evenings to advise

police officers on complaints concerning family disputes.

The preponderance of cases that come into Nunnally's court are for traffic offenses. Last month, 342 traffic cases came before the judge, ranging from failure to yield right-of-way to drunk driving.

Nunnally, who has been municipal judge since March of 1972, a month when he said he heard only 36 cases, said one of his main concerns is the increase in local drunk driving violations.

He heard 20 DWI (driving while intoxicated) cases last month, and Municipal Judge James Wheeler heard nine second-offense DWIs. Nunnally noted that the 29 cases was a big jump from an average of under 10 DWI cases in Ruidoso each month.

The municipal judge relates the hike to the overall increase in traffic on Ruidoso's streets.

"I'd say we're dealing with a lot more people, it's the law of averages," Nunnally said. "The media has also done this for us. It has brought the attention of drunk

drivers to the public."

The judge notes that most local DWI violators are permanent residents in the area.

"This segment (DWI offenses) has always been with us, but it was never highly publicized," he mentioned.

To deal with the problem, Nunnally refers most of the violators to a DWI course sponsored by the state Court Referral Educational Services.


"We're going to have a DWI school soon," Nunnally said, "and its going to be

a large one." The program comes to Ruidoso about every six weeks, Nunnally said, and about 25 to 30 participants are required for each class. The four-hour course is an intense lesson on the hazards of drunk driving—the cause of most accidents nationwide.

In addition to the state program, the judge also suggests more attention be leveled on the dangers of drinking and driving, starting with driver's education courses in high school and continuing with an emphasis on the problem in the media.

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RIO GRANDE KINDERGARTEN FUTURITY

Impressive Lad scores win

The 440 Ranch of Aubrey, Texas, launched three contenders in Sunday's renewal of the \$63,469 Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and captured the top two slots.

The 440's Impressive Lad, a gelding who'd waited until last week's Kindergarten trials to score his first win, hauled off the top prize of \$31,734.

But it was no easy matter, since his stablemate, Cue Me First, was in the thick of things all the way — and lost the victory by going wide into the turn for home. She also took a hesitant stride when she appeared ready to regain the lead deep in the stretch.

Those mishaps by Cue Me First allowed Impressive Lad to steal under the wire with a neck victory in a four-furlong clocking of 47 2/5 seconds. That time equalled the seasonal record. Stiff winds were blowing down the backstretch.

Ruidoso patrons who'd supported the 440 entry of trainer Mike Welch had to be con-

tent with modest payoffs of \$2.60 to win, \$3 to place and \$2.20 to show. Future King, a 17-1 shot owned by Fletcher H. Hall of Capitan, got in third — two and one-half lengths behind Cue Me First. The latter was piloted by Willie Lovell. Joe Martinez was up on Future King.

Cue Me First collected \$13,983 for finishing second, while Future King earned \$7,616 for third. The show payoff on Future King was \$3.40.

Cue Me First, a fast-breaking filly who'd made the finale of the rich Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park, appeared to be in strong position to snare the Kindergarten when she broke smartly from the No. 2 post and set the pace down the backside. Impressive Lad moved up to take over second place.

As Cue Me First began negotiating the turn for home, she suddenly broke stride and went wide, despite frantic efforts from jockey Lovell to get her back on course. That's when Impressive Lad saw his opportunity and snuck into the lead.

Surprisingly, Cue Me First regained her stride, broke again, and came out of the gate again. For a while, it seemed she would go tearing past her stablemate. But something distracted her and her stride bobbed, just when she needed a final burst of speed.

The third member of the 440 team in the Kindergarten was What A Gem, who was never in the fight, finishing seventh and earning \$1,269. The Kindergarten is restricted to New Mexico-breds. Sunday's version was the richest in the history of the race.

SAVANNAH GAMBLER, running as a 5-2 shot, fought off repeated salvos from

heavily favored Special Hank and pulled out a neck victory in Saturday's second staging of the Master Salls Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

It was a classic matchup between a quarter horse (Savannah Gambler) and a thoroughbred (Special Hank) at 870 yards — the only meeting ground between the two breeds.

The general opinion holds that the thoroughbred has the edge in these encounters, but that wasn't the case in the Master Salls, as Savannah Gambler refused to let his thoroughbred adversary pass him in the stretch.

At one point in the upper stretch, the two appeared to be on even terms, with Special Hank coming on powerfully. Savannah Gambler, who hugged the rail much of the way under a savvy ride by Vickie Smallwood, dug in fiercely during the final 100 yards or so. The four-year-old gelding was opening his slim advantage when he hit the tape in a seasonal record clocking of 45.86 seconds. The previous mark was set at 46.76 earlier in the week.

Savannah Gambler is trained by R. Frank Thompson for Robert Searis Jr. and R. W. Sewell of Odessa, Texas. The win, his fourth in a row, was worth mutuel payoffs of \$6.80, \$2.40, \$2.20.

The gross purse of the Master Salls Handicap was \$9,000, of which \$5,400 went to the winner. That pushed Savannah Gambler's 1982 money line up to \$11,930.

Special Hank ridden by Salustio Burgos under the top weight of 121 pounds (two more than Savannah Gambler's burden), earned \$1,980 for second. The mutuel payoffs: \$2.40, \$2.20. The gelding is owned by Lowell Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas.

Draconic's Loom, a 6-1 shot handled by Willie Lovell, stayed in third all the way and paid \$2.60.

Master Salls, the stallion owned by Mary

Urschel of Canadian, Texas, was on hand to lead the post parade. In 1975, Master Salls won ten races at Ruidoso — seven of them stakes. His achievements stand alone in the history of thoroughbred racing at Ruidoso.

SHES A SNOOP lunged out of the pack on the final steps and won Thursday's six-furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, ridden by Angel Jacobo, went off at 4-1 in the \$12,500 claiming sprint and handed out betting prices of \$10.40, \$7.80 and \$4.20.

Pop's Spirit, a 3-1 shot directed by Casey Lambert, led most of the way — but had little left for the end. Lambert tried vainly to keep the gelding going, but Pop's Spirit had to settle for second, and payoffs of \$7.80, \$4.

Mark of Sovereign moved well at the end to finish third, returning \$7.20.

Shes A Snoop, who toured the distance in 1:16 1/5 seconds, is owned by B. Raymond Evans of Tulla, Texas.

LUCKILY SMASHED enjoyed an easy journey while polishing off her five foes in Friday's six-furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly never felt the sting of jockey Joe Martinez' whip as she handily took command at the top of the stretch.

At the finish, Luckily Smashed was four and three-fourths lengths on top in the sprint restricted to three-year-old New Mexico-breds. She was timed in 1:14 2/5 seconds and returned depressed payoffs of \$3.20, \$2.20, \$2.20.

Luckily Smashed earned \$2,160 out of the allowance purse of \$3,600. The filly is owned by Carol Childs, William Leach and Sue May of Fort Stockton, Texas.

Tonkawa Chacker, a 5-2 shot who set all the pace until Luckily Smashed took over, finished second and paid \$2.80, \$2.40. Mr. Zips Bonny got in third, returning \$3.

Summer Festival has exciting start

To the utter delight of his audience Saturday night in the Sales Arena, pianist Leonard Pennario performed not one, but two encore pieces: Gershwin's Prelude in C sharp and "The Banjo" by Gottschalk.

However, before the evening's close, Pennario enchanted everyone present by playing Beethoven's Concerto Number Four in G major, Opus 58 with the Texas Little Symphony.

Watching Pennario perform in his elegant white evening coat was watching an artist in the process of creating something beautiful. And like a suspense novel writer, Pennario kept his audience dangling on the edge of every note.

Pennario's performance was, to say the least, very well executed.

After a short intermission—long enough for orchestra patrons to stretch their legs, order a drink and talk about Pennario's masterful piano playing—Giordano and the Texas Little Symphony returned to play Dmitri Kabalevsky's "Comedians" Suite. Pennario then returned to the stage and played "Rhapsody in Blue" by the great American composer George Gershwin.

"Good music is so soothing to the soul," said one person at Saturday night's performance. "It fills you with a sense of wonder of the human genius."

Before the white haired Pennario played, conductor John Giordano led his Texas Little Symphony through his own original film score, "West Texas Suite." The piece evolved from a piece Giordano

did for a Public Broadcasting Service documentary entitled "Milepost 407: A West Texas Story."

The piece is composed of four movements. The first depicts the vastness of the plains country. An account of the Indians is presented by a mournful English horn and the beat of a tom-tom. Using sounds familiar to most of us, Giordano helps us to identify with each segment of the piece. For instance, the sound of the cavalry call to arms indicates the first presence of the white man and the building of army forts.

The sound of battle ensues, followed by the slaughter of the plains buffalo. Giordano explained that in the film, stacks and stacks of buffalo bones are seen on the screen.

The second movement portrays the lonely cowboy out on the range as he watches over the teeming herds of cattle. The introduction of the early settlers and the start of civilization in the West sets the scene for the third movement.

"All the elements are here," said Giordano of the fourth section. The discovery of oil, the large scale migration to the Southwest and the congestion of Fort Worth and Dallas are depicted. Although the piece starts off very intimately and delicately, dominated by flutes, the piece ends with a jamboree of sounds describing the sounds of a fast moving area and impatient people.

"West Texas Suite" is a piece that really goes somewhere. The history of West Texas is told from start to finish and the audience knew exactly where it was at

each point in the story. Giordano himself is as slick and smooth as his music. The easy going and affable conductor's gestures are definitive. Watching him direct his orchestra may be as entrancing as listening to the sounds which emanate from the instruments.

Few modern musicians take full advantage of the depth of sound which an orchestra offers. Giordano has done it. His contemporary composition is a refreshing change to the electric instruments of our electric age.

Off to an excellent start this year, the third annual Ruidoso Summer Festival began Friday night by an informal evening of Dixieland jazz performed by core members of the Texas Little Symphony, except for one ringer, said Giordano.

The crowd took to the dance floor, or in some cases just stood up and boogied, as the old favorites such as, "When the Saints Go Marching In," "Dixie" and "Alexander's Ragtime Band" were played.

Sunday, hundreds of people jammed inside the Inn of the Mountain Gods for the very successful Champagne Brunch recital. Ten to 20 mph winds blew the outdoor concert inside, but that did not seem to hamper the symphony or Giordano from putting on another excellent performance of classical selections.

The Dixieland Jazz Band will perform again tonight at the Silver Slipper Soiree at 8 p.m. in the Mesalero Room at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Guests will play craps and black jack to raise funds for the Ruidoso Summer Festival.

Tickets are still available for the gala af-

fair. They cost \$15 per person and hors d'oeuvres will be prepared by chef John Frey of the Inn.

A minimum chip purchase of \$10 will be required to play the tables and people still holding chips at the end of the evening will be eligible for the many prizes that have been donated to the Ruidoso Summer Festival, Incorporated (RSFI).

The prizes include: a weekend for two at the Inn of the Mountain Gods; Indian artist White Buffalo's depiction of the Chaco Canyon cliff dwellings in turquoise and coral, "Rock Point," donated by Chino's at the Inn; \$100 gift certificates from Tim Wishard, goldsmith, Mary's Fashions and Smith Limited Gallery; and Gordon Snidow's print, "First Messenger from the Rain God."

Tuesday, June 8, Texas Little Symphony concertmaster Robert Davidovici will play the "Davis Stradivarius" in the Sales Arena at 8 p.m.

Shari Lewis will provide the energetic entertainment Wednesday, June 9. She too will perform in the Sales Arena at 8 p.m.

Nothing is scheduled for Thursday evening, but Roger Williams is the guest artist slated for Friday, June 11, in the Sales Arena at 8 p.m.

Tickets for the Summer Festival are still available, said ticket chairwoman Alicia Carpenter. General admission seats are \$5.

Derald Waltrip's farewell to village hall not fond

Veteran fireman and former superintendent of the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD), Derald Waltrip, resigned from his position as paid fireman last week.

Waltrip, who had been with the force for 18 years, submitted his resignation Tuesday. Superintendent Virgil Reynolds said he has replaced Waltrip as one of the three paid men with Eddie Espinosa, who was a volunteer.

Waltrip said Friday he left the department in bitterness.

"I am a little bitter towards city hall," he said.

The reason for his discontent, he said, is related to recent changes in the department.

In May, the council restructured the department, creating the job of full-time superintendent and altering shifts of paid men from a 24-hour on, 72-hour off to a 24-hour on, 48-hour off work schedule.

Waltrip said he disagreed with some of the changes, which he said caused him to be labeled a "troublemaker."

"They (village council) think just because I disagree that I am causing trouble," he contended, "but that's not the case at all."

Waltrip, who had been superintendent of RVFD for 15 of his 18 years with the department, worked the same schedule as the other three paid men.

The village fire commission offered last month to recommend him as full-time department head, but he turned it down; saying at the time it required too much work. But Waltrip mentioned in May that

he planned to remain with the department as a paid fireman, if he agreed with the new system.

Also, Waltrip said he favored the change in the work schedule, if the village compensated the firemen for the extra time.

But Friday, the former superintendent said pay increases in the preliminary budget were not enough for the extra hours. He said the village is granting paid firemen a 15 percent wage increase for the new fiscal year.

"Paid men are getting a 15 percent raise," Waltrip noted, "but they're putting in 25 percent more hours. And they (village hall) call it a raise?"

Village manager Jim Hine confirmed the amount of the pay hike, and he added that under the new personnel ordinance, the village has classified firemen in a higher pay category than other employees. He said he did not want to argue the point that the raise does not compensate duty firemen for additional hours.

Another budget disagreement Waltrip said he had with the village was over a pay request for volunteers.

The former superintendent said he asked the village to pay each of the 28 volunteers \$30 for each fire call, but the council turned down the request. Volunteers presently receive \$5 a week for attending department meetings.

"Volunteers have to take off from jobs (to respond to fires) or the middle of night," Waltrip said. "I don't think it's been appreciated."

Waltrip also contended the pay for volunteers would cost the village less than hiring new employees. Approved under the new budget is an increase for two additional paid firemen.

Waltrip indicated the overriding cause

for his resignation was related to recent changes at RVFD that he said were dictated from above.

"You get politics involved and it can't be anything but trouble," he said.

"If we could decide what we want—not what city hall wants—it'd be fine," he suggested. "If the city wants improvements, they should supply money and let the volunteers decide what to do."

"Those people (village hall) don't know anything about the fire department." Although he is angry about the new system, Waltrip said he will miss the department.

"It's going to be hard to adjust," he said. He added that he "wouldn't mind joining the volunteers," if the firefighters could have more control over the department.

The long-time fireman reflected on the previous volunteer operation.

"It was basically a volunteer department; it was always controlled by them," he said. "The volunteers have never worked for city hall, they always did it for the people."

"It worked so well, I can't see anybody messing with it. There's never been any doubt whether they could put out fires," he said. "Firefighting is 100 percent of the job, the rest is on the sidelines."

Waltrip started his career with RVFD as a volunteer in 1963 and became a paid man in 1966 when the village initiated the paid-volunteer setup. He was made the first department head in 1969, a position he held until last month.

The former superintendent wishes the design of RVFD had not changed.

"I don't think the changes are as necessary as growth in the department," he said. "You don't change something that works; we just got to the point where we

need more firemen."

Waltrip said the department "always has had 25 to 30 volunteers." He noted the state previously limited the force to 30 volunteers, but many more willing firefighters were put on a waiting list.

He said now the department has trouble keeping volunteers, and he believes the paid program is partly the reason.

"The way we always operated was complete control was the (volunteer) chief and his officers. The paid men would work with them," he said. "Now the paid men operate the whole thing."

Waltrip believes there was more unity in RVFD in his early years with the department.

"It was a closer bunch of guys before," he commented. "It started out as a necessary thing. You had a bunch doing what they thought had to be done."

Waltrip feels Reynolds, who recently replaced him as superintendent, will experience problems keeping firefighters under the revised system.

"I've been saying for 10-15 years volunteers would not work for a full-time chief," he said. "Virgil is supposed to tell people what to do, but in my opinion, you should lead people. The head man should be the first one in a fire, and show them he's willing to do it."

"I don't think even Virgil is too sure what is going on," he contended.

Waltrip, who is 52 years old and has been a Ruidoso resident since 1944, operates a cabinet and woodworking shop, called the Gateway Mill, on Paradise Canyon Road. He said he has neglected the business for the past few years, but now he says he will devote more time to it.

"I'm trying to put the business back together and make a living," he said.

Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival may go without AMA sanction

American Motorcycle Association (AMA) sanctioning may not be granted for the Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) sponsored Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival planned for September 29 through October 2, announced RBA secretary Fran Smeal Thursday.

Instead, a large motorcycle rally scheduled for the same weekend in Durango, Colorado, may receive AMA sanctioning, she said. Smeal stated that it seems AMA is angry with RBA for advertising AMA sanctioning of the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival before it was actually given.

However, Smeal emphasized that chances for AMA sanctioning are not totally lost, and that within a month's time, RBA will know for sure where it stands regarding AMA sanctioning of the event.

Smeal added that AMA sanctioning is not a prerequisite for a motorcycle festival. She stated that while AMA sanctioning is a sign of a quality motorcycle event for some people, it is hardly an indication of the event's quality to all motorcyclists.

"With or without AMA sanctioning, we're going ahead," Smeal said. AMA sanctioning requires impartial judging and certain rules pertaining to competition, poker runs and field events, said Smeal. She added that the rules for the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival are already based on AMA rules of fairness and sportsmanship.

With two major motorcycle events taking place in the western United States at the same time, RBA members discussed the possibilities of losing the people who usually attend the Ruidoso motorcycle rally to the new Durango event. Butch Smeal commented that the "family crowd" will

probably visit Ruidoso while the "fast-moving crowd" will probably go to Durango.

"This is the area that has the reputation of being the place to be in the fall," Fran Smeal remarked.

The Smeals also stated their belief that the major motorcycle manufacturers will want to take part in both events. However, to do so will require the splitting of their traveling exhibition teams instead of concentrating their efforts at one rally.

Butch Smeal said the brewing controversy about the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival in motorcycle circles all over the country may cause people to come to Ruidoso out of curiosity alone.

In other RBA business, the group decided to buy additional advertising space in various national and regional motorcycle magazines without an AMA sanctioning statement. The decision was based on \$4,000 allocated in Lodgers' Tax Committee expenditures for 1982-83.

Carrizo Mountain fire contained

A lightning-caused forest fire that burned for two days last week destroyed about 12 acres of mixed conifer trees and brush on the north side of Carrizo Mountain.

Andy Hale, superintendent of the Smokey Bear Hot Shots, said Hot Shot crews from forest districts around the state were called in to fight the fire, which burned in an area overlooking White Oaks Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning.

"There are no roads in to it," Hale said. "It was all cross-country bushwhacking."

Hale said crews from the Santa Fe National Forest, Gila National Forest and the Smokey Bear team had to hike for about an hour to reach the fire.

Because of the location, a "helipack" crew from the Cibola National Forest also was called in to drop water on the blaze from a helicopter, Hale said.

Hale, who said he was fire boss for the

operation, also called in planes to drop slurry to contain the flames.

"The air tankers made eight different runs to drop slurry," he said.

Hale said crews contained the fire by 4 a.m. Thursday, and stayed at the site until Friday on the cleanup. He said a few firefighters remained to ensure the fire did not restart from hot spots.

Hale said there were no injuries among the crews.

'Arsenic and Old Lace' dates changed

A total of 30 four-year-olds have entered the trials, which will be run as the sixth, seventh and eighth races, for the season's first major event for four-year-old quarter horses. Each race will be at 440 yards and will offer the 10 entrants in each a purse of \$1,900.

The 10 fastest runners from Thursday will advance to the second running of the Rainbow Silver on June 20. The winner will earn \$75,192.50 from the purse of \$150,385.

Mighty Deck Three will break from the second post position in the eighth race, which lured perhaps the toughest foes.

Other contenders include Baby Hold On, a Dash For Cash mare; Rule The Deck, who earned more than \$177,000 last year and the consistent Runnin Barre.

Baby Hold On, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Gerald C. Blue of Amarillo, Texas, has won 12 career starts, including five races at Ruidoso Downs. She has two wins this year, including a win worth \$17,175 on April 4 when she took the Miss Peninsula Handicap over 400 yards at Bay Meadows.

The seventh race drew Berserverance, an entrant in last year's \$1 million All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The sixth race lured Lucks Gay Chic, Dr. Depot, Rocky, Explosive Native and Midland Native.

Lucks Gay Chic enjoyed a superb 1981 season. The What Luck horse won seven races with three seconds in 10 outings. He won the \$86,994 Rainbow Derby Consolation and the \$146,000 All-American Derby Consolation.

He opened his 1982 season with a driving one and one-fourth length win over Rio Mesa at 350 yards in an allowance chase on May 9 at Ruidoso Downs.

Racing continues Friday with trial races for the Norgor Thoroughbred Derby at six furlongs. Saturday's highlight will be the Lincoln County Claiming Stakes at seven furlongs for horses running for a claiming price of \$5,000. The purse will be \$5,000-added.

TRAINING SUGGESTIONS: HEEL

When a dog is commanded to "Heel" he walks without force or urging at his handler's side with his right shoulder about even with the handler's left knee. If on leash, the leash hangs loose. If off leash, the dog walks well in the same position.

Snap the short leash on the collar with your dog at your left, pass the leash through a circle formed by your thumb and first and second fingers of your left hand. The end of the leash is held in your right hand. Hold your left hand and arm at your side in your usual walking position. Your dog can walk comfortably with a slack leash, and you can easily check him quickly if you hold him in this manner. Get the dog on your left side, give the command "Heel" and walk forward. For the first lesson, don't pay much attention to the manner in which he goes—it is enough that he goes with you. Use the word, "Heel," often. During succeeding lessons keep him fairly well in the correct position.

When he gets ahead of you, bring him back, commanding "Heel" and at the

same time make him mind by giving quick, sharp jerks on the leash. Do not bring him to you by sustained pulling on the leash. Give him a little slack in the leash when he is heeling as he should. Then, if he drops behind or forges ahead, correct him with the vocal command and jerking on the leash. Keep at this, lesson after lesson, until your dog heels in the correct position without tugging at the leash.

The dog must adapt himself to your changes of pace and direction. When you step backward or sideward, walk fast or slow, the dog must instantly do the same. As you make right or left turns, your dog must maintain his position at your left side, speeding his gait when you turn to the right or slowing it when you make a left turn. When you turn to walk in the opposite direction, it will make it easier for the dog to understand if you will hesitate a moment or step backward one step before reversing your direction.



When Sugar Ray Leonard suffered an eye injury that endangered his career, many boxing followers felt that the sport had suffered a fatal blow.

After all, Leonard is the game's top showman, and an excellent boxer to boot. Some boxing enthusiasts feel if Leonard retires, boxing would go into a long drought.

They seem to have forgotten that the heavyweight division is still regarded as the glamor division of boxing.

And the heavyweight division championship will be decided when champion Larry Holmes and top-ranked challenger Gerry Cooney battle Friday in Las Vegas, Nevada.

The fight will have a racial flavor to it since Holmes is black and Cooney is white. The image of the 6-7 Cooney as "The Great White Hope" has added greatly to the fight buildup.

Race shouldn't have any bearing on a sporting event, but unfortunately it does in many sports fans' eyes.

There hasn't been a white champion in the heavyweight division since Ingemar Johansson won the title from Floyd Patterson in 1959. Patterson won the title back the next year to become the first heavyweight boxer to regain his title.

The last time a white American was heavyweight champion was in the mid-1950s when Rocky Marciano wore the crown.

Many boxing promoters feel boxing would really prosper with the fans if a white man was the heavyweight champion.

They might be right. Look at the success Sylvester Stallone's three Rocky movies have had with movie fans. Undoubtedly, one of the reasons the movies have been so successful is because many people see

Rocky as "The Great White Hope" who is the underdog, but comes through for the victory and the championship.

Whether this kind of feeling can be called racism or not is debatable. Many ethnic groups have cheered for athletes from their background in all kinds of sports.

Look at Joe DiMaggio's following from the Italian community in New York in the 1940s. Many Hispanic people also cheer for boxers from their ethnic backgrounds.

There undoubtedly is some form of racial bias in these feelings, but generally it's more for the athlete of the fans' ethnic background than against the other athlete or athletes.

As for the Cooney-Holmes fight itself, the outcome is hard to predict.

Cooney is probably a harder puncher, but Holmes has the experience and is a quicker boxer.

Cooney's best chance to win is with an early round knockout. If the fight goes past three or four rounds, however, Holmes should have a big advantage.

Cooney hasn't been tested that much and the majority of his fights haven't lasted very long. Of course, the main reason they haven't lasted long is because of Cooney's powerful left.

Still, Holmes should be a much tougher opponent than Cooney's other foes. I see the champion's big-fight experience being the telling factor.

Look for Holmes to win by a decision or a TKO in the last two or three rounds of the fight.

Unless Cooney goes down early, which is unlikely, he would probably get a rematch in the near future. He should be more ready for Holmes by then.

But regardless of who wins the Las Vegas encounter, the fight should be one of the better matches the heavyweight division has had in several years.



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

After wowing adult and children audiences at last year's Ruidoso Summer Festival, comedienne, actress, dancer, recording artist, newspaper columnist, author and symphony conductor Shari Lewis returns to the third annual Ruidoso Summer Festival at 8 p.m., Wednesday, June 9, at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track Sales Arena.

No matter what role Lewis takes on, the attractive blonde always puts on a fun, refreshingly wholesome, educational and charming show. Lewis, successful at everything she does, is also considered one of the foremost ventriloquists in the English-speaking world.

When Lewis was just 11 years old, her father took her to see John Cooper, a 99-year-old ventriloquist. It was this aged but extraordinarily gifted man who taught Lewis the secrets of ventriloquism.

Lewis will perform with the Fort Worth Symphony "Pops" and conductor John Giofardo. As usual, the renowned puppeteer will appear with Lamb Chops, the lovable little lamb, and her other singing and joking animal puppets.

Beyond her fame as a ventriloquist and puppeteer, Lewis's talents have also distinguished her as a writer, actress and humanitarian. She is an author of 21 books, and has another in the works. As a conductor and orchestra performer, Lewis is a newcomer, but she now conducts major symphony orchestras and regularly gets a big hand from sophisticated classical musicians.

"official magician for the city of New York," Lewis has appeared successfully with symphony orchestras across the nation for some time.

Lewis has earned five Emmy Awards and one Peabody Award for her talents. Freshness and a constant sense of wonder, like a child's, seem to be the source of Lewis' success.

The Scotch are good judges of character from first glance; and this time their task was easy; for the Pope's character is written upon his features plainly as the letters on a page.

High intelligence, deep love of his fellow man, courage, purity of character, deep faith, and boundless compassion, all these and much more are plain to see upon the face of this man of God.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—You, being a person who reads political columns, probably voted last Tuesday.

That causes some satisfaction in the breast of most of us who bothered to show up that day. After all, we are conscious that we who voted contributed to the welfare of our state, even if those hordes who did not bother were not as interested as we.

(That consciousness is a warm thought which we can use to heat the house during the cool months of the year.)

Those who didn't show up, on the other hand — those who meant to but couldn't bother because business kept them in the shop all day, or they got stopped by somebody just as they were about to take off for the polling place, or who had some other equally weak excuse—cannot take pride in their performance.

Citizens vote. Interested, caring citizens never miss the chance to vote. Intelligent, interested, caring citizens even take the time and trouble to decide whom to vote for before they go to the polls instead of more of less voting at random.

Would you want to estimate how many of those who showed up at the polls last Tuesday fit into that last category?

If your candidates won, you can take some credit for it. If they lost, it was those others—both those who showed up but voted incorrectly, and those who didn't bother to show up at all—who made the difference.

Living in a democracy costs something. Lots of people are not willing to pay even that small price.

They are the ones who unbalance things

and cause more trouble by refraining from voting than could be caused if everyone went to the polls.

One of the more meaningful remarks going around Santa Fe before the election cited a good reason for people in the north to vote for Bob Mondragon as their Congressional candidate.

Like most good reasons for voting for somebody, this one had little to do with the qualifications of the candidate.

It was the fact that, if he managed to get to Congress, he would guarantee that his wife Bell would open a restaurant in Washington where New Mexicans back there could get some true New Mexican food.

Not a bad reason to vote for a man.

In the closing days of the campaign, as the spots got closer and closer together on almost every radio and television station in the state, one could not help thinking the feds made a terrible mistake.

A couple of years or more ago they ruled that if a candidate appears "live" on his or her spot, that appearance would be entitled to the lowest rate the particular station charges any advertiser.

Result: Almost no spots now run without the voice of the candidate—even if he or she cannot read from a script his or her own name without stumbling.

Some agencies handling political campaigns are smart enough to permit the candidate to read only the disclaimer at the end of the spot—that part where it says, "This spot paid for by..." Some candidates are barely capable of doing that.

Does it ever strike the geniuses who are hired at great cost to advise politicians that it might be to their advantage never to allow the candidate to speak or be seen? Maybe the spots would cost more, but then maybe they'd accomplish more as well.

After all, in politics, winning is the name of the game; and winning comes only when the votes have been counted, not when some candidate is talking into a tape machine, sounding like an android.

Between now and the election in November, some of those high-priced media consultants should think about that.

ALCOHOL PROBLEM

The alcoholic, or the heavy drinker who always seems to be on the verge of alcoholism, these are the ones we tend to think about when the problem of alcohol-related troubles comes up for discussion. The National Research Council, an arm of the National Academy of Sciences, urges shifting our focus to moderate and light drinkers.

In its report commissioned by the Department of Health and Human Services the Council does not propose any such folly as ignoring those who habitually consume large amounts of alcohol. Indeed, it calls attention to studies showing that the five per cent of our population classified as the heaviest drinkers account for half the national alcohol consumption.

But the chairman of the report panel, Mark H. Moore of Harvard University, notes something else of great significance, that alcoholics or heavy-drinkers comprise fewer than half of those beset by drinking-related difficulties. It is "ill-timed periods of alcohol use," not chronic heavy drinking, Moore said, that causes most problems from drinking, drunken driving, loss of employment, and so on.

The report's thesis, as stated by Moore, is that "there is a piece of the alcohol problem that lies outside the area of heavy drinking." That argues for corrective measures geared to this aspect of the matter, among them the Research Council's recommendations to increase alcohol-and-health education, tighten enforcement of drunken driving laws, boost taxes on beer, liquor and wine, and raise the minimum drinking age. — Alamogordo Daily News

ROSWELL DOG FIGHTS

It is encouraging that a group of concerned citizens in Roswell has organized to stop the "sport" of dog fighting developing in Chaves County.

Pets are being stolen from homes and yards; their function is to bait the pit bulldogs used the fights, which of course involve gambling. Many of these pets, each dear to someone are mutilated or killed as a result.

Besides the sheer inhumaneness of this activity, it is against the law — a fourth degree felony, to be exact. Roswell police are doing what they can, but they undoubtedly welcome the help they're now getting from citizens themselves.

Planned are a Canine Alert telephone hotline and reward money for persons who will report promoters of pit bulldog fights. Various Roswell area civic groups and organizations are being asked for donations; some already have given. Even children are kicking in what they can — nickels and dimes.

Blood sports which are as old as the "games" in the Coliseum at Rome, unfortunately bring out the worst in man. Foot Oscar Wilde once dismissed that pastime of the English aristocracy, fox hunting, as "the unspeakable pursuing the uneatable." What, we wonder, would he have had to say about those who find pleasure in watching dogs tear each other apart? — El Paso Times

VIDEO GAMES DRAWING FIRE

Video games that young people find addictive "may not only be socially isolating but may actually encourage violence between people," says a Stanford University psychologist.

Philip G. Zimbardo suggested that such games "could be easily reprogrammed to promote cooperative play among several players, to focus on rescue operations, say, instead of destruction." — Associated Press

Editorial

The July 6 special election is less than a month away.

The Ruidoso News wishes to go on record now as being in favor of the \$8 million water improvements program.

The village has done its homework on the questions: Do we need more water? Where do we get it?

Two committees—the water board and the reservoir study committee—have come to the same conclusions. Their findings concur with those of the engineering firm employed by the village.

Yes, we do need the means to treat and store more water, because demand will soon exceed the supply the present system can produce. The Rio Ruidoso is our most dependable source of water, and the village has rights to a considerable amount of water that cannot presently be utilized because there is no place to store it.

The proposed method of financing the improvements, which include a dam in Grindstone Canyon and a new treatment plant, is sensible and fair.

Revenue from a one percent gross receipts tax will be used to pay off a \$6 million revenue bond issue. The \$2 million general obligation bond issue which must, by law, make up part of the package will not increase property taxes significantly.

With the sales tax, visitors to Ruidoso will share the cost of water improvements.

The News recognizes its responsibility to provide information on which voters may base their decisions. We welcome questions on the water improvements program and pledge to get answers.—TP

Let's face it—politicians don't have the best image in the world.

A professor of mine told a story about one of the best students he ever had. This was such a fine upstanding young man that my prof, in an attempt to steer the fellow into public service, got him a job on the staff of a Texas congressman.

After two years in Washington, the guy came back totally disgusted with what he had seen.

"They are nothing but a bunch of crooks," reported the disillusioned youth before leaving to make his fortune in the private sector.

Stories like that one, and full blown scandals like Abscam, tend to reinforce the popular opinion that many politicians are crooked.

When a young woman I met recently, Kim Seckler, said she had worked at the New Mexico Legislature this past session, I was interested to hear what she thought of our elected representatives.

I was a little surprised to learn that politics, New Mexico style, made a favorable impression on her.

Kim, a 1978 graduate of Tularosa High School, is the daughter of Herb and Lenore Seckler, who live near Mesalero.

After graduating from the University of New Mexico in December, Kim went to Santa Fe as a bill analyst for the State Senate majority leadership.

"I analyzed all the bills that came through the Senate Conservation Committee and Senate Education Committee," she said.

So much legislation is introduced at each session of the Legislature, Kim explained, the lawmakers do not have time to read each bill.

So for every bill that was referred to the two committees after being introduced on the Senate floor, Kim would write a short brief.

"Just the bare bones," she described her reports. One bill required research in the State Engineer's Office. It involved water desalinization in Torrance County.

Coincidentally, Kim found, Public Service Company of New Mexico owns water rights in that county and proposes to locate a power plant there.

Putting two and two together, Kim decided it was a case of PNM trying to get the state to desalt their water for them. Her brief incorporated information from state engineer Steve Reynolds' private report on the area (he found desalinization non-cost effective and inefficient, she said) and the bill went nowhere.

So a bill analyst at the Legislature is in a position to influence what will happen to a piece of legislation?

"Theoretically," she acknowledged. Besides analyzing bills, Kim did some speechwriting and press releases. She became friends with State Senator Ben Altamirano and worked on his campaign for the U. S. House of Representatives.

"Some really amazing stuff goes on—you really get to see who runs New Mexico," said Kim of the capitol scene.

Things in Santa Fe are very accessible, she noted, from lawmakers to lobbyists to state employees.

"Good bunch of people up there—you'd be surprised," she laughed.

Kim said she would give varying marks to the legislators. "Some were remarkably well informed," she said. "These are guys who ... politics just sort of flows through them ... they have an ear for things."

At the other end of the spectrum were a couple of solons who were "just real jokes."

One legislator who made a favorable impression on Kim was Senator Charlie Lee of Alamogordo. "I thought he was really sharp," she said.

"I was really impressed with Santa Fe politics," Kim declared. Did this mean her experience in the capitol city made her aspire to run for office someday?

"I think that everybody—right down to the pages—leaves there thinking 'I'm going to run for something,'" she said. She added that it is exciting to think about being involved in the future of New Mexico.

"I enjoy politics—it's fun," she concluded.

But does it attract a good class of people, I asked, still waiting to hear about the crooks.

"It attracts a different type," Kim said. She characterized politicians as outgoing, thick skinned, and willing to maneuver.

This month, Kim starts a one-year job with the National Collegiate Athletic Association Volunteers for Youth program. She is one of four national student administrators of the program, and will spend most of the year traveling.

I asked her if she plans to return to New Mexico.

"It's my home," she said, "I'll always come back."

Congratulations to Kim Seckler on her successes thus far, and here's wishing her the best in the future.

One of the state departments that seems to enjoy blowing its own horn (based on the number of press releases they put out) is the Environmental Improvement Division.

A month or so ago, EID announced the successful settlement of a lawsuit against Bill McCarty Construction over some cement wastes that got into the river.

It should be pointed out that the settlement was made "without admission to any of the allegations of the Complaint," according to District Court records. Though the language of the press release implied deliberate dumping, McCarty said the spills were accidental, and settling saved money and hassle.

By the way, it's time to announce the winner of the first "Joe Gmuca Award," named for an EID lawyer.

It goes to Ernest V. Joiner, publisher of the Lincoln County News. In his column, Joiner offered \$100 to anyone who could explain a bit of "modern poetry," then acknowledged an issue or two later he wrote the lines himself.

Why didn't you offer \$1,000, Ern? Your money was as safe either way.

Welcome, movie fans, to the third installment in the story of Rocky Balboa, the Italian Stallion. That underdog from Philadelphia, that palooka from obscurity who pummeled his way into big-time cinema stardom is back for the final chapter in this successful series of films.

Scoring for this film will be on a 10-round basis, with four stars the highest ranking possible per round.

Round 1: This is the opening, a rehash of what we've seen in "Rocky II." Nothing new, but necessary and thankfully brief. Two stars.

Round 2: The credits haven't even rolled yet and we're presented a montage of Rocky as a champion who has defended his title 10 times. He's also a celebrity who's been on "The Muppet Show" and done ads for American Express. Four stars.

Round 3: Another montage, this time of the villainous boxer Clubber Lang — who's big and mean, hitting others when they're down and inflicting punishment as if he enjoyed it. Two stars.

Round 4: Rocky does a charity benefit, stepping into

the ring with a 7-foot wrestler. Two stars.

Round 5: Scenes of Rocky living well. A statue of the champ is unveiled in Philadelphia. He's thinking of retiring, but Clubber Lang, who attends the ceremony, insults Rocky's wife. The fight is set. Three stars.

Round 6: Rocky prepares for the match. Dull. One star.

Round 7: The fight. Rocky goes down, and so does Burgess Meredith. Would you believe he was Jewish? Predictable. One star.

Round 8: Rocky's in the dumps. Apollo Creed wants to train him for the rematch, but Rocky has lost the desire to fight. Three stars.

Round 9: Rocky trains in Apollo's old training ground, a seedy Los Angeles gym. After several false starts, Rocky gets the fire back. Three stars.

Round 10: The second fight with Lang. Who wins? Well, how do you stop a determined Italian Stallion? Four stars.

Judge's Decision: "Rocky III" is predictable, sometimes corny, but has a simplistic appeal that is hard to shake — it's a winner, but not by a KO.



Looking at victims

Victims are often the most neglected party in violent crimes.

Historically "ignored," victims are "beginning to ask 'What about us?'" according to Tom Tomizawa, producer of an upcoming NBC news special that examines victims of crimes and their pain.

"NBC Reports: For Every Violence, There is a Victim," airing Saturday, June 19, presents the stories of three crimes and the immediate and long-range effects on the survivors.

NBC news correspondent Fred Briggs talks with the Serplo family of Elmhurst, a suburb of Chicago. While she was at work, the family's mother was shot and killed by a soldier. In West Pullman, not far from Chicago's southern limits, Briggs speaks with the family of Joseph Kolar, who was killed during a holdup at the savings-and-loan where he worked as a guard. On Chicago's South Side, Gregory Harden, now a paraplegic, is interviewed. Harden was shot eight times on the way home from work.

"We're sort of riding a building crest of victim concern," said Tomizawa in a telephone interview. "Defendant, prosecutor and police have all received attention. I think a number of legislators are paying more attention to bills that will help victims."

In searching for cases, NBC worked with prosecutors, victim's organizations, hospitals and various other sources and emerged with nearly three dozen possible crimes, all considered "routine acts of violence," explained Tomizawa.

"Almost every one was extremely dramatic and highly charged with emotion," he said. It was "frightening" that some of the stories only got two paragraphs in the papers or were omitted completely.

The victims were hesitant at first to talk about the past and the pain. "Initially they seemed to feel they didn't want us to probe into their feelings. But as we went on, they wanted to make it easier for others. They were extremely open on camera, Tomizawa said.

"It was hard for us to stand and hear it," he added.

Although the program takes place in the Chicago area, "it is a national story, Tomizawa remarked. "It occurs everywhere. It's what victims go through. It is the same trauma they go through everywhere. There is despair over the lack of concern."

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
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"EYE" NEVER KNEW THAT!

Have you ever wondered why a jockey wears protective goggles and the horse does not?

Actually, the horse is much better equipped against dirt, dust, rain and mud than is his rider.

On a muddy day the jockey must wear several pairs of goggles, pulling dirty glasses down, thus exposing clean glasses. Fortunately, the horse doesn't need goggles for he is equipped with built-in "windshield wipers."

A horse has something called a "third eyelid". This is a membrane tucked into the inside corner of the eye. When foreign particles enter the eye, the third eyelid sweeps across the eye from inner to the outer side much as a windshield wiper does.

Oddly enough, jockeys have not always worn goggles. It was back in the 1930's that James McCoy showed up in the jockeys' room with a pair. McCoy, who was still exercising horses as he neared 70, took a good deal of ribbing at first, but it was not long before all the jockeys had equipped themselves with goggles.
