## Coe family celebrates 100 years in Lincoln County with reunion

who originally came to this area 100 years ago.

The Lincoln County War was over, and Frank Coe, partner of Billy the Kid, returned to the land he loved from his exile in Durango, Colorado. Pardoned by the governor of New Mexico, Frank Coe came back to Lincoln County with his new bride, Helena Tully Coe. That was in 1882.

The 100th anniversary of the Coe family's settling in the Ruidoso Valley was celebrated this past weekend in the home of Ken and Eleanor Shockey. Eleanor Bonnell Shockey is a descendant of the Coes

Frank Coe came to Lincoln County from Missouri with his brothers—Jasper and George—as a young man seeking his fortune. They settled in the Ruidoso Valley in the area of Glencoe (the Coes' glen) and developed an irrigation system that spawned fertile farm crops. They also raised cattle.

Frank got caught up in the famed Lincoln County War and was expelled from the area as a result. Upon his return, he resumed and expanded his ranching and

farming operation to include almost 300 acres of farmland and 10 sections of rangeland. He also raised five daughters and one son.

More than 50 descendants of the three Coe brothers, now bearing different surnames, gathered at the Shockey residence Saturday night for a family reunion.

Among them was Louise Coe, the first woman senator in the state of New Mexico. Louise served four terms in the state Senate, from 1925 to 1941. She held the chairmanship of the Education Committee and even served as president pro tem of the Senate during her final four years.

"I'm a pioneer. No other woman had done it," Louise proudly proclaimed. All the Coes, past and present, are pioneers.

Edith Coe Rigsby was another esteemed member of the Coe dynasty present Saturday. Edith is one of two of Frank Coe's daughters still alive. She grew up riding horses on the Coe ranch while her brother studied law at Stanford University.

"I remember going with my Uncle Jap (Jasper), my dad and George. I was just a child, and we surveyed the Devil's Canyon road," Edith reminisced.

That road is much the same as it was when the Coes originally surveyed it.

Edith spoke fondly of days past, when the Coes gathered for family affairs like the one this past weekend. Being a musically oriented family, sisters and brothers would take up instruments while others sang or danced.

Dancing and singing was also the main activity at the Navajo Lodge, which Edith built. It was the only place to go for fun, said the second to youngest daughter of Frank Coe.

Edith said she has lived in the Ruidoso area all her life because she loves it. Edith continues to live in Ruidoso, at the care center.

The Coe ranch is still in the family. It is

now run by David Bonnell, a grand-nephew of Frank Coe. Cattle are still rounded up by horse as they were years ago, said David.

However, descendants of the Coe brothers, like most families, have spread out. They're now bankers, well-drillers, store owners. The majority of relatives still live in the surrounding area, but some now live in Albuquerque, Texas and Oklahoma. Sylvia Coe McCord came all the way from Bowling Green, Ohio, to be at this year's family reunion.

The tough pioneer spirit from the past continues to make the Coes a strong, close-knit family today.

## Water program is the result of years of study

(Editor's note:

The proposed \$8 million water improvements program will be the subject of a Ruidoso town meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at the village administrative center.)

What led water study groups working for the Village of Ruidoso to decide the village needs the Grindstone reservoir project?

The conclusion was the culmination of efforts by Boyle Engineering, the water board, the reservoir study committee and other village officials over the past few years.

### Summerow suffers broken leg

Two riders involved in the 12th race pileup yesterday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track suffered only minor injuries, while a third was admitted to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital with a fractured leg.

Danny Summerow, who was riding the horse that fell and triggered the accident, broke his leg in the mishap. Vickie Smallwood and Gary Sumpter were both treated at the hospital and released.

Members of the water board and reservoir committee outlined the decision process in an interview last week.

"I felt like we had a team to approach the problem for the best benefit of the community," said reservoir committee chairman John Schuller.

To understand the conclusions, a look at the background of the studies is helpful.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter, who sits on the water board, said that Boyle Engineering, the Albuquerque firm that designed the capital improvements

program, has been retained by Ruidoso since 1974 to study the water system.

In 1974, Boyle was hired to conduct a hydraulic analysis of the municipal water system. Potter said the analysis was a study of gradient levels in the system. The result of the study was the design of an integrated system that includes 28 different pressure zones.

In the meantime, a \$5 million water bond was approved by voters in 1974 to improve the system and to construct a 3,400 acre foot reservoir adjacent to the Ski Run Road, which follows Eagle Creek.

Village manager Jim Hine said engineers for the project, Mann Engineering of Roswell, estimated that the dam project would cost over \$3 million. By the time bids were ready to be let for the reservoir three years later, Hine said, actual costs had skyrocketed to over \$8 million.

Also, Hine noted, due to dam collapses in Wyoming and Georgia, the federal government imposed stricter restrictions on dam projects, which boosted costs even higher.

The village manager said prohibitive costs forced Ruidoso to abandon the project and the village applied the earmarked funds to the existing system.

In 1978, Hine said, the village asked Boyle engineers to design a smaller dam on the Eagle Creek watershed. The Hill Top project, as it was to be known, was in lieu of the earlier proposal. But the project

fell through, because the land was not easily accessible and was in an area that involved pumping water from Eagle Creek, thus making costs too high, Hine said.

By 1979, improvements funded by the bond issue were completed. Added to the system were the number three treatment plant, which can process two million gallons a day, and the two five-million gallon storage tanks on Alto Crest. The bond also funded other improvements to the system.

But village fathers determined that those improvements to the system were not enough. It was only one year following the Alto Crest improvements that Boyle engineers drew up the capital improvements program currently under scrutiny.

Boyle determined that, based on Ruidoso's 7.3 percent growth rate, the village would need additional storage and treatment facilities by 1984.

As Hine noted last week, "No one construction project is going to solve all the (water) problems."

A look at statistics shows the basis for the present proposal.

Figures show that average available water comes to almost 1,800 acre feet a year. Calculating that four house units use one acre-foot each year, the water would supply over 7,000 housing units.

Based on the 7.3 percent growth rate, it is projected that Ruidoso will have well over the projected number of units by 1984.

In fact, Schuller sent a letter to the village council on June 1 that explains Ruidoso is already committed to more than the projected 1984 figure.

Schuller, who is chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), wrote that the total of residential permits and approved multi-family units as of last month will increase family units in the village to 7,594.

The problem is, Ruidoso lacks the storage and treatment facilities to produce enough water to meet that demand.

In his presentations to local civic groups in past months, water board member C. Newton Page has explained that the

village only has raw storage for 260 acre feet at Alto Lake.

Alto Lake impounds water from Eagle Creek. Presently, there is no means of storing untreated water from the Ruidoso River.

Water from Alto Lake is treated in plant number three and stored in the two tanks on Alto Crest. The lake is replenished by water from Eagle Creek, from which Ruidoso has rights to 2,606 acre feet a year (based on the expected conversion from a flow right to a volume right). That compares to 214 acre feet that the village has rights to from the Ruidoso River.

The dams on Eagle Creek were proposed to utilize the maximum amount of rights

## Double B. Express takes Mescalero Apache Handicap

Three years ago, Double B. Express was named the thoroughbred Horse-of-The-Meet at Ruidoso Downs.

Judging by Sunday's Mescalero Apache Handicap, Double B. Express stands a big chance of picking up the honor once again.

The seven-year-old gelding, well ridden by Apprentice Casey Lambert, boomed through between horses and pulled out a dramatic half-length win in the six and one-half furlong struggle which carried a gross purse of \$8,550.

Double B. Express toured the Mescalero Apache distance in 1:19 4/5 seconds, which clipped a full two seconds off the seasonal record (but did not approach the track standard of 1:17 3/5).

Sunday's victory was worth \$5,130, which cranked Double B. Express' lifetime earnings up to \$171,857. The sturdy

gelding is trained by Cliff Lambert (Casey's father) for the Double B. Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico.

Ruidoso patrons evidently felt Double B. Express was in over his head and made him the fourth favorite in the eight-head field. Thus, the mutual returns were a generous \$12, \$7 and \$3.20.

Double B. Express carried a feathery 114 pounds, seven less than the 3-1 shot, Jiltaloom. The latter moved well out of fourth place during the final desperate drive to the wire but was unable to overtake Double B. Express when that one squeezed into the clear about a half-furlong from the wire.

Jiltaloom, handled by Vickie Smallwood, had to settle for a hard fought second, a check for \$1,881, and payoffs of \$4 and \$2.60. The handsome roan colt is

owned by Hugh C. Preston Jr. of Burkburnett, Texas, and operates under the tutelage of trainer Bob Arnett.

Captense, ridden by Mike Lidberg, raced as a 5-2 second favorite and gave a good account of himself. The colt (carrying 111 pounds) set most of the pace and managed to sustain his speed until the top of the stretch. Even then, he didn't give up readily. He finished third, a neck behind Jiltaloom, and returned \$2.60. Captense is owned by Hugh B. Preston, also of Burkburnett, Texas.

The most dramatic aspect of the Mescalero Apache outcome was the fact Double B. Express was well out of the picture most of the way. He was in seventh in the early going. Even at mid-stretch, the gelding looked like a beaten horse. But he

moved up suddenly, found an opening and won going away.

A four-horse mishap marred the 12th race. The accident, which occurred in the first turn of the five and one-half furlong sprint, was triggered when Flashy Dresser, ridden by Danny Summerow, stumbled. The resulting collisions caused three other horses to lose their riders. These were: Firespill, ridden by Pedro Benitez; Paso Lester, ridden by Vickie Smallwood; Sinquilla, ridden by Gary Sumpter.

Benitez got up and walked from the scene, but the other three riders were taken by track ambulance to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. Flashy Dresser suffered a broken leg. The other three horses apparently were not seriously injured.

BAFFLE YOU, a seven-year-old gelding who'd been no worse than second in his last six tries, emerged as the clear-cut star of Saturday's Lincoln County Claiming Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The seven-furlong duel for five-grand claimers turned into a landslide for Baffle You.

The gelding came alive at the midway point of the backstretch and went thundering into the lead with obvious ease. None of his foes was able to keep up the rest of the way.

Ridden by Jack Wallace, Baffle You glided down to the wire to win by five lengths and earn first-place money of \$3,600. The gross purse was an even six grand.

Baffle You went into the Claiming Stakes as the property of Ernest Fanning

of Coalgate, Oklahoma. But he came out belonging to Willie Hill and trainer William Thompson. The two handed over \$5,000 to claim the gelding.

Baffle You returned \$6.60, \$4.40, \$3. The Gin King finished second under Pedro Benitez, returning \$5.20 and \$3.80. Who's Arguing got in third for a \$4 show price.

The winning time was 1:29 flat. REAL SPECULATION, owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, overtook the pace-setting Pride of Loom and cruised to a length win in Friday's headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The six-furlong trip, covered in a bristling 1:14 1/5 seconds (only one tick off the seasonal record), was one of two trial races leading to the upcoming \$30,465 Norgor Thoroughbred Derby.

## MacGillivray out, Erwin in as racetrack manager

Finlay MacGillivray, general manager of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park, has resigned.

MacGillivray submitted his resignation to the board of directors of Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, during the board's meeting at Ruidoso on Saturday (June 12).

The resignation becomes effective June 30.

R. Wood Erwin, who previously held the post of general manager of the two tracks, will return to take over the post vacated by MacGillivray, announced Jess Burner, president of Ruidoso-Sunland. Erwin assumes command on July 1.

In announcing his resignation,

MacGillivray expressed the view that the recently elected board of directors "should have a free hand in selecting a general manager of their choice to carry out their policies."

He added: "Mrs. MacGillivray and I have no immediate plans except to return to Albuquerque, go fishing and play a little golf. I'm looking forward to getting away from the many continual pressures and demands of the position. It is time to step down and enjoy life for a while."

Before assuming the top executive post of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park, MacGillivray, a native of New Mexico, spent 17 years as manager of the New Mexico State Fair. He left his position at

the State Fair in mid-1980 to take the general manager's post at Ruidoso-Sunland.

Erwin, one of the most well known racing executives in this part of the country, has a racing background which extends some 36 years. In 1944, Erwin helped found La Mesa Park Race Track in northern New Mexico, and managed that track for 21 years. During that time, Erwin aided the founders of Sunland Park in getting that track in business. He was Sunland director of racing for one season, then served as general manager for three years.

In 1966, Erwin moved to Denver, Col-

orado, where he took over as general manager of Centennial Race Track for two years, then served as a steward for the next seven years. Erwin returned to New Mexico in 1977 to become general manager of The Downs at Santa Fe for two years.

In 1978, when the Ruidoso Jockey Club purchased both Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs, and formed Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, as the parent corporation of the track properties, Erwin was named general manager of the two tracks. He held that post until his decision to retire, in mid-1980. Since that time, Erwin and his wife, Jane, have been living in La Jolla, California.

# Water program is result of years of study

Ruidoso owns the watershed. But the stream normally flows well under that level.  
Page pointed out that, according to 26-year United States Geological Service (USGS) flow charts for the stream, the average Eagle Creek flow drops the amount to 1,544 acre feet a year that Ruidoso can utilize.  
"We have all the rights we need (on Eagle Creek)," board member Knud Ottesen noted, "but there's not enough water to go along with it."  
Also, 40 percent of the water rights on the Ruidoso River and Eagle Creek are lost downstream after the water goes through the system. That water, known as effluent, can be added to the traditional rights. This "effluent credit" increases the total available water to Ruidoso to over 2,500 acre feet per year.  
But Ruidoso currently lacks the facilities to store that much water. Thus the need for another reservoir, the groups determined.  
Page has pointed out that the proposed 1,000 acre feet Grindstone reservoir will be filled with water the village now loses.  
But does the village have to lose the effluent credit?

Ruidoso can store 16 million gallons—or 48 acre feet—in water storage tanks. The two water treatment plants (number one in Upper Canyon, which has just been repaired, and the Alto Crest plant are now functioning); the number two plant in Gavilan Canyon is not operating) can process almost 2.5 million gallons a day. Spread out over a year, this would be 2,800 acre feet.  
An acre foot equals 325,826 gallons.  
If Alto Lake and the treatment tanks could be replenished year round, there would be no need for another storage facility.  
But river flow decreases in the summer in the Southwest, and peak demand on the system occurs at the same time.  
"Dealing with facts and figures, you've got to look at average availability versus peak demand," Potter suggests. "Peak (summer usage) puts us on line with Roswell ... That's when we need water in reserve."  
Potter said the highest daily usage occurs around the Fourth of July holiday. He noted that on the average, Ruidoso has used 3.5 million gallons daily during that period. He added that the Alto plant can be pushed to help meet that demand.  
However, Ottesen pointed out that Eagle

Creek typically goes dry in the summer, thereby leaving no water to refill Alto Lake.  
Taking all the facts, Boyle determined that a reservoir was needed on the Ruidoso River watershed.  
Taking Boyle's conclusions, the water board was charged with investigating the findings, and also to look at other potential water sources.  
Page, who along with Ottesen and Dick Hall were appointed to the board in 1980 (Potter since has replaced Hall), looked first at water outside the Ruidoso basin.  
"A year and a half ago," Page said, "we tried to look into a trade for Bonito (Lake) water. We found that we didn't have any right to Bonito."  
The board also looked again at Eagle Creek, but concluded the stream lacked flow to fill another reservoir.  
"The major contribution of the board," said councilman Frank Sawyer, "was proving there wasn't enough flow in Eagle Creek to fill (another) dam."  
Also, the board determined that it will take three years to fill the Grindstone reservoir. Water will be diverted from the Ruidoso River into the reservoir. Ottesen pointed out the water will not require pump-

ing, as the location is at a lower elevation than the diversion point.  
Also, Page noted that Eagle Creek effluent credit can be applied to the Ruidoso and stored in the reservoir. He said since Eagle Creek flows into the Ruidoso River, it is part of the Ruidoso watershed.  
Last April, the reservoir study committee was appointed to evaluate Boyle's and the water board's findings.  
Page said the committee, which he sits on along with Sawyer, Schuller and village attorney Lee Huckstep, also was charged to look into all the legal aspects of the bond issue, and to ensure that the proposal conformed to the village comprehensive plan.  
Sawyer, who looked into traffic access to the Grindstone site, arrived at the conclusion that the most feasible access would be a road connecting the area to Carrizo Creek Road.  
Also, the committee designed a "flow chart" which shows how money will be spent for the project.  
John Schuller said there were differences of opinion between the groups studying the Grindstone project. But, he noted, the fact that each group concurred on the final conclusion demonstrates that the bond issue is well considered.

# Building valuation changed; permits top \$3 million

The Village of Ruidoso changed the way it estimates values of building permits last month to reflect more accurately actual cost of construction.  
May was the first month Ruidoso based estimated value of structures on actual building costs in issuing permits, planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp said.  
Cupp said the state Construction Industries Division required the village to alter the way it sets permit values. Previously, permits were based on an underestimated value of \$20 per square foot.  
Under the new method, Cupp said, permit values "run anywhere from \$15 to \$100

per square foot, and everything in between."  
He said the new basis for estimation is reflected in the total value of May permits. The May figure was \$3,149,328, for 51 permits. Under the former square foot value, Cupp noted, the figure would have been almost \$2 million less.  
Still, the mark was considerably less than the April amount of \$5,059,140, which set the all-time monthly record. Permit records also were set in March of this year and in November 1981.  
But the May figure is 27 percent greater than the May 1981 amount of \$2,477,160.  
The amount brings this year's value to \$14,699,308, which is a whopping 73 percent hike over last year's mark at this

time—\$8,500,739.  
Permits were issued in May for 35 single family dwellings, five residential additions or alterations, eight commercial buildings, one commercial addition or alteration and two condominium projects.

# Activities set for Aspen Festival '82

The Aspen Festival '82 Committee convened Thursday to discuss events being planned for the October 8 through 11 Aspen Festival.  
While the idea of an apple festival has definitely been dropped from the prospective list of activities, plans for the hunter-jumper show are still in doubt. Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth said he has heard nothing from the planners of that event yet.  
A tractor pull scheduled for Saturday, October 9, is definitely on, Jungbluth told the committee. However, due to conflicts with mule racing at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, the tractor pull will have to be relocated, said Jungbluth. Aspen Festival Committee members are now searching for another site to hold the tractor pull.  
The committee heard that the mule races are set for Saturday, October 9, at the racetrack. A bowling tournament is also being planned and coordinated by Roger Marshall.  
An antique car show will also be part of Aspen Festival '82 activities. The old cars will be parked at Schoolhouse Park for public viewing after the festival parade, Jungbluth noted.  
Another event planned for the busy weekend of October 8, 9, 10 and 11 is a high school marching band contest. Ruidoso school officials have established a committee to oversee the contest and are reportedly very enthusiastic about initiating a marching band contest in Ruidoso.  
"We're going to have the best dang parade this part of the world has ever seen," commented Jungbluth.  
The Aspen Festival '82 parade will be held Saturday, October 9, and the committee feels it will be bigger and better than in years past. "Building a Better Ruidoso" was the parade theme chosen by the Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber at its June meeting.

# Newgens get relief from parking problem

The word got through. Ruidoso residents Lloyd and Violette Newgen feel their message to village hall last week had some effect.  
Following their plea to the village council Tuesday to take action about a parking situation in front of their house at 101 Hansen Drive, the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) posted no parking signs last week on one side of the street.  
"Something seemed to have helped," said Mrs. Newgen after the signs were erected.  
The Newgens voiced complaints before the council that trucks from Ruidoso

Wholesale Lumber Company regularly blocked the street in front of their house.  
The Newgens wrote the council a letter complaining that trucks delivering and loading at the lumber yard behind the company block their driveway. They added that drivers refuse to move the trucks when so asked.  
In the letter, they also asked the village to post no parking signs on both sides of Hansen Drive. They said when trucks are parked in front of the lumber yard—directly across from the Newgens—and vehicles are parked on the other side, there is no room for the traffic to get through.  
RPD posted only the side of the street on which the Newgens live. Chief Richard Swenor indicated both sides were not posted because the lumber yard has a legitimate right to load and unload from the street.  
Being a residential and commercial area, Swenor said, there are bound to be problems with commercial deliveries.  
"I see more of these problems with more commercial/residential areas coming along," he said.  
Village attorney Lee Huckstep noted that the village has an ordinance prohibiting parking a vehicle, whether occupied or not, in front of a driveway.  
Swenor indicated drivers will be cited if caught blocking the Newgens' driveway.

# Sniadecki cites animal problems in Ruidoso Downs and Capitan

Jack Sniadecki, Lincoln County Animal Control Officer, has sent a letter to the state Health and Environment Department (HED) describing problems in Capitan and Ruidoso Downs regarding animal control.  
Sniadecki wrote that "the tremendous volume" of stray animals in Ruidoso Downs has led to an "explosive" situation.  
Sniadecki said the Downs has a population of 4,800 dogs and cats, compared to a permanent resident population of 949.  
He added that many animals are brought into the village during the summer from areas that have a rabies problem.  
Referring to what he said is inadequate animal control and quarantine facilities in there, Sniadecki complained that Ruidoso Downs experienced eight animal bites last year, and that none of the animals were properly impounded.  
He said the village has four holding pens for dogs, but has no animal control vehicles, equipment, or area for proper disposal of dead animals. He claimed the town spent \$350 one month to impound three dogs, which he called "a gross misuse of taxpayer money."  
Sniadecki wrote that the situation in Capitan is similar. He claims that each

day, people from Capitan abandon animals in the Fort Stanton area, where the animal control office is headquartered. He said the town forces its citizens into the act by not having animal control.  
Sniadecki noted that people can be fined or jailed for such actions.  
He said that he finds it "ironic" that the rest of the county pays for "an acceptable level of animal control ... to insure the humane treatment of animals, as well as insuring all fairness to the pet owner," while he feels the two communities refuse to recognize the state laws requiring animal control, and neglect the oath of office to uphold the laws.

### Around Sports with Gary Brown



In the May 27 edition of The News, I said this space that the Los Angeles Lakers could win the National Basketball Association (NBA) championship over the Philadelphia 76ers in six or seven games. The Lakers went on to win the series in six games, winning it the way most people thought they would—with superior depth and team play.

They did it with superstars like Magic Johnson and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. They also did it with players like Bob McAdoo and Kurt Rambis.

McAdoo was a three-time scoring champion a lot of teams didn't want because they felt he didn't give 100 percent all the time. He disproved that belief with the Lakers.

Rambis was a free agent who played in Europe last season and wasn't considered to be good enough to play in the NBA. However, I wasn't surprised to see the 6-9 Rambis make it in the NBA.

I have seen Rambis perform since he was a junior at Cupertino High School near San Jose, California, in 1975 and have always been impressed with his intensive play.

That year Rambis (he was 6-7 then) led Cupertino to the Central Coast Section title with a one point victory over St. Ignatius of San Francisco.

Rambis was frail looking then (and he still doesn't look like a muscleman) but he was extremely agile and had an outstanding outside jump shot.

He also had extremely long arms, even for someone of his height. He usually dominated the opposing centers who were in the same height range as he.

In his senior year, the Northern California high school basketball playoffs were played for the first time at the Oakland Coliseum.

The Rambis-led Cupertino team was a slight favorite to win it all but was upset by Foothill of Bakersfield in the first round.

But Rambis was outstanding. He scored 38 points in that contest and more than held his own on the boards. The lack of an outstanding supporting cast prevented Cupertino from winning the game and the championship.

Still, Rambis went on to lead his team to the consolation trophy, defeating St. Ignatius for the third time in two seasons in the final game of the tournament.

Rambis then played at Santa Clara University where the Broncos usually had winning seasons but no championships. Their conference was dominated by the University of San Francisco.

For two years, Rambis played with Mark McNamara, a 6-10 center who was the ex-Cupertino star's top high school rival.

McNamara transferred to the University of California at Berkeley after his sophomore year. There were strong rumors that the two giants didn't get along at Santa Clara.

This past collegiate season McNamara was the leading scorer and rebounder in the Pac-10 Conference.

It will be interesting to see, however, if McNamara does as well in his first NBA season next year as Rambis did this season.

McNamara is a bigger and stronger player than Rambis but the Laker forward has that certain important asset going for him that not every player in the NBA has. It's called heart.

Larry Holmes' victory over challenger Gerry Cooney in the heavyweight boxing title fight Friday night went about as I expected.











# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE — Numbers. Numbers. Who's got the numbers?**

That's what that race for the governorship between John Irick and Toney Anaya will come down to.

If 70 percent of the registered voters in the state show up at the polls on November 2, it's going to take something on the order of 280,000 votes for one candidate to make him the winner.

That 70 percent figure some think may be too high; but given the interest shown in the June 1 primary, it seems a fairly likely level. Candidates would be wise to use something like it as a target.

Where does either side get that kind of support?

Obviously, it's tougher for Republicans, going in.

If they could hold every registered member of their party, pick up each and every citizen registered in a minor party, and then add all independents without exception, they could get into office without the help of any Democrats.

None of that is very likely to happen, however.

That's why Republicans always create "Democrats for ..." in every major campaign. They have to convince lots of Democrats to come over to their cause or they can't get anywhere.

That's not any job, especially if your "Democrats for ..." organization is just a sham or a hollow shell.

As John Irick said during a press conference in Santa Fe last week, "Fred McCaffrey and I have worked in some campaigns where we pretended to have such an organization when in fact we didn't have much at all."

That's a fact.

This year, Irick says, he'll put together a "Democrats for Irick" operation totally separate from his regular campaign. What's more, he says it will be adequately

funded and given a paid staff. It can then go out and press hard for those Democrats who have little love for Anaya to get to the polls and vote for Republicans.

Irick also says he believes Republicans can normally count on about 46 percent of the voters who go to the polls supporting the GOP, even though that party doesn't have nearly that percentage of voters registered to it.

That figure could be a little low. For safety's sake, it is based on votes for lesser statewide offices, such as auditor and treasurer, rather than on the top of the ticket, where there may be more glamor to attract Democrats into switching. The theory is that if they'll switch for the lower-level offices, you can count on their going Republican at the top.

Assignment of the "Democrats for Irick" group, therefore, will be to pull in enough members of their party to give Irick and Colin McMillan that additional five percent of the total their analysis shows it takes to put them over the top.

Jack Schmitt, meanwhile, will be trying to do the same thing in the Senate race, as will all other Republicans in all other races.

It's a tough assignment, but the realists in that party know they can't get elected to anything unless they pull that off.

At that same press conference, by the way, Irick said when asked who might head up such an organization of Democrats who support his candidacy, "How about Senator Bob Wood?"

That probably wasn't meant to be a formal announcement of Wood's appointment, since Irick hadn't gotten Bob's permission to name him yet.

But when asked about the use of his name, Wood was, as usual, both graceful and generous.

He allowed as though he'd be glad to take the job, even if use of his name in that context was news to him.

Wood, like Irick and Dunn, another former state Senator, was an Aubrey Dunn supporter during the primary.

On March 17, 1982, this man-caused fire burned 67 acres, mostly grass, pine saplings and some small wooden sheds near a residence. Winds gusting to 25 mph that day significantly increased the danger to the Inn and to property in Ruidoso, especially the Camelot Estates. Thankfully, the fire was contained with a minimum of loss of resources. BIA initial attack force included 67 fire fighters, 4 pumps and 2 dozers, supported by other BIA and Inn of the Mountain Gods staff.

Cooperation from Ruidoso included two structural pumper units manned by volunteers plus a 20-man volunteer crew and four-man pumper crew from the Smokey Bear Ranger District.

#### GAS PRICE GAMES

Crude oil oversupply has led to a return — at least in flavor—of the halcyon days of dropping gasoline prices in this country, and competition between stations for customers.

But an indictment unsealed recently in Las Cruces throws a dash of cold water over the retail gasoline market in Southern New Mexico, if the indictment allegations prove correct.

Several distributing firms are accused of conspiracy to fix retail prices of gasoline. One firm has already pleaded no contest to conspiracy charges.

The indicted companies will have their day in court before it is determined if a conspiracy actually took place. And if it's determined that one did, chances are Southern New Mexico gasoline customers will eventually get some form of financial redress.

But for Southern New Mexico motorists, it must be discouraging to contemplate that while OPEC was on the ropes, some homegrown businessmen might have been willing to take advantage of the slack. —Albuquerque Journal

#### OIL CRISIS

That little word "glut," however ugly it sounds, is festooned with pleasant connotations when applied to world oil supply. There is in it (or appears to be) the ring of plenty. The Organization of Oil Exporting Countries has moved to counter the glut with sharply reduced production, and the rest of the world indulges in satisfied chorales.

Here in the United States, we can all see the results as gasoline prices go down. What could be better!

What would be better is assurance that world petroleum reserves are not running out, after all. There can be no such assurance. As Energy Secretary James Edwards reminds us, lower prices are no guarantee that the oil crisis is over, and we "can't afford to act as if" the current trend is the start of a long-term decline. The realities of the reserves-demand equation all but rule that out. —Alamogordo Daily News

### Editorial

The Ad Hoc Advisory Committee to the Planning and Zoning Commission last week became the latest entity to call for employment of a professional planner by the Village of Ruidoso.

This resurfacing of the suggestion to place planning in the hands of a professional leads us to ask: What are we waiting for?

Last November, village manager Jim Hine told the Planning and Zoning Commission the village should be ready to hire a full-time planner by the first of March.

"In my opinion, the need is there—it has been," Hine said.

Candidates for the office of trustee (councilman) were asked before the March municipal election if they were in favor of hiring a permanent full-time planner for the village.

"I am definitely in favor of hiring a permanent full-time planner by the Village of Ruidoso. This is long overdue and should have been done some time ago," answered then candidate, now councilman Al Junge.

"Yes, within budget constraints, I feel a full-time planner would be of extreme value to the P&Z commission ..." said councilman Frank Sayer.

Junge often refers to ideas that have been discussed and committees that have been formed—never to be realized or activated. When an idea has as much obvious merit as this one, it deserves action from the governing body.—TP

## On the village beat

Village officials are once again talking about forming a non-profit corporation to purchase water rights for the village.

A proposal for such a corporation was submitted to the governing body last August by Harold Kious, an Albuquerque investment banker.

What the corporation does, in theory, is provide a means to transfer water rights in a way that benefits the seller and the buyer.

The banker and the law firm handling each transaction make out all right, too, naturally. The Internal Revenue Service would probably be the only party less than overjoyed by the arrangement, but heck, you can't please everyone.

The seller benefits because payment is made in the form of a "debenture." This debenture is tantamount to a municipal bond—it carries tax-free interest. Also, since payments are spread out, the seller's capital gains tax on the sale is spread out.

Being able to offer the seller this tax advantage is supposed to put the buyer (the village) in a better negotiating position. The debenture is paid off over a period of time, so the buyer also has the advantage of being able to spread payments.

The "not-for-profit" (as it is called in legalese) corporation owns the water rights and leases them to the village. At the time the debt on the debenture is retired, the water rights are turned over to the village and the corporation is dissolved.

The corporation (if formed) will have five directors and a registered agent. The directors, I presume, will be local citizens interested in water and/or financial matters.

The agent will be the one to actually negotiate the acquisition of water rights. He or she will have the authority to obligate the village to a purchase or lease.

Kious' proposal is for a two-phase plan. Phase I was approved by the council the other night. It consists of creating the corporation—preparing articles of incorporation, preparing by-laws, filing with the state Corporation Commission, and preparing a resolution enabling the village to approve such a non-profit corporation and its function on behalf of the village.

Phase II also entails preparation of certain documents: lease between village and corporation; contracts of sale (between corporation and sellers of water rights); form of option; forms of warranty deed and special warranty deed; and escrow bank agreement.

Whew! Kious' "financing consulting fee" for Phase I services will be a minimum of \$1,200 and a maximum of \$2,800. The Santa

Fe law firm which will handle the legal work on Phase I—Kegel, McCabe and Montez—set its fee at \$1,500 to \$3,300.

Phase II of Kious' proposal is "Negotiation and Closing of Each Acquisition." This is where the law firm will really earn its money, according to village attorney Lee Huckstep, who was explaining all this to me.

Lee referred to the writing of "opinion letters" (the opinion being that the interest income is, indeed, tax-free) by these lawyers as "very hairy stuff."

In Phase II, both the banker and the law firm work on a commission basis, if the transaction is more than \$10,000. For smaller deals, Kious has a minimum fee of \$600; Kegel, Al, get \$750.

On a sale of \$10,000 to \$15,000 in water rights, the banker takes \$600 plus three percent over the \$10,000; the lawyers take \$750 plus three percent over \$10,000. The cut gets smaller, percentage-wise, as the size of the transaction increases.

We are borrowing the idea for a non-profit corporation from Roswell, which set up the Roswell Water Development Corporation to facilitate the purchase of the Tweedy Ranch at \$1.19 million.

Harold Kious said the principal should work for Ruidoso with numerous smaller transactions, although there will be more procedural work.

Anyhow, the village is going ahead with setting up the corporation, so it will be there if needed as a vehicle to do business, as Benny Coulston put it.

Frank Sayer said the talk in the coffee shops is that no one is going to sell their water rights. If rights are acquired through condemnation, Sayer said, the village will have to pay cash.

Condemnation is kind of a nasty word to bring up when the subject is water. To me, it conjures images of irascible Hondo Valley landowners, sitting on their porches with shotguns across their laps, saying "Git!" when Newt Page goes to buy their water rights.

I guess we'll have to wait and see what happens. Unless the bond issues for the water improvements program pass in the July 6 election, we won't be able to utilize the water rights we now have, and there won't be any need to acquire more for some time.

In the meantime, village officials, water bugs like Page and Knud Ottesen, and Dave Sheppard and I will continue to explore what Huckstep called the "deep dark waters of municipal bonding," and other subjects related to our most precious commodity—two parts hydrogen, one part oxygen.

### A Great Athlete And Sportsman Is Called Home

It was a shock to hear June nine that Leroy Robert Paige, affectionately known throughout the entire sports world as "Satchel", had been called home by Our Lord. He was a star pitcher during his prime, and later, with the Negro Baseball Leagues; but did not have the opportunity to show the world his great gift as a pitcher until he was past the age of forty. He was given a place on the Cleveland Indians by owner Bill Veeck in 1948.

Although barred from the Big Leagues during his prime by a "Color Line" that existed in those days, Paige was never the least bit bitter, and remained a great sportsman, retaining his sunshiney personality and Christian character throughout his life.

His nick name "Satchel" came from the

fact that upon his feet he wore loose-fitting shoes. He was a great student and also practitioner of the rules of health, many of which were his very own.

With Satchel, tight clothing of any kind was out, especially shoes. He also advised us to relax always, and to "keep the juices flowing by jangling around gently as you move."

As a barefoot boy playing sand-lot baseball I wanted to be a baseball pitcher able to throw all kinds of curves and other fancy pitches. And today I bless the inventor of television for the privilege of being right behind home plate so as to see the pitches of the great hurlers come to the plate.

Satchel Paige was a master of every pitch in the arsenal of the pitcher and then some. He is one of the few who could throw what we used to call a "fade-away."

The knuckle ball of today is something like it.

The fade-away comes to the plate like any other pitch and then actually seems to disappear, leaving the batter with the frustrating impression that he has gone suddenly blind.

His sense of humor was a healing balm to friend and stranger alike, and his Christian nature carried him happily through his three-score years and ten, plus four.

He lived to see what we all have rejoiced to see, athletes of all races playing together — fulfilling the true goal of sportmanship.

Satchel Paige will ever hold a fond place in the memory of sport lovers, and in the hearts of Americans. And we all take comfort in knowing he is in the loving care of Our Lord in Heaven.

## THE PET CORNER

### TRAINING SUGGESTIONS: DOWN

When a dog is commanded "Down" he must immediately drop to a lying position. He must do this whether, at the moment of command, he is heeling, sitting, standing, running or walking.

Have the dog "Sit" at your left side. Drop to your left knee. With your left hand gripping the leash close to his collar, give it short, sharp jerks downward. Say "Down" "Down" "Down." Repeat this procedure again and again.

Some dogs will fight this lesson, and the trainer must persevere, with a great many repetitions. If your dog is stubborn, refusing to go down, use your right hand to pull his forefeet out from under him while giving him the verbal command and jerking downwards on the leash.

It helps to give the verbal command repeatedly, even during the time the dog actually is Down. He can't hear it too often while he is learning.

With this command, as well as with the command "Sit," unless you order him to Stay, he must instantly get up and Heel when you start to walk away.

This exercise has a depressing effect on most dogs, so it is well not to keep it very long at a time. Be sure to give your pet plenty of praise and encouragement when he does a good job of it—no, however, when he is in the Down position. Then he should not be petted by anyone. If you do, he'll want to get right back up.

In teaching this command, vary your routine and don't always give various commands in the same order. As soon as he knows Down, give him the command at times other than when he is heeling. You want this command to be obeyed instantly no matter where the dog is or what he is doing.

## Ruidoso State Bank to be acquired by holding company

The Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, Texas, recently announced approval of the application of Ruidoso Bank Corporation (RBC) of Ruidoso to become a bank holding company by acquiring Ruidoso State Bank (RSB).

RBC is a non-operating corporation organized for the purpose of becoming a bank holding company through the acquisition of 80 percent of RSB. RSB has \$44.8 million in deposits.

RSB president Robert Hays stated that a minimum of 80 percent of the stock in RSB will be exchanged for stock in RBC.

No changes will take place in RSB's operation, according to Hays. The primary reason for the acquisition, he indicated, is that certain capital markets and other types of services are more accessible to a holding company than a bank.

The Reserve Bank has taken into consideration the competitive effects of the proposed transaction, the financial and managerial resources and future prospects of RBC and RSB, and the convenience and needs of the community to be served, the announcement states.





COLORFUL LANGUAGE COVERS A LOT OF GROUND

When a horse race is run from one point to another given point, the ground covered is the same...but, depending whether it is a Quarter Horse or Thoroughbred race the ground is not measured in the same terms.

Quarter Horse races are measured in yards. Thoroughbred races are measured in furlongs...and, to the unschooled, a furlong is 22-yards.

The most a Quarter Horse runs on recognized tracks is 870-yards. The least a Thoroughbred runs is 4-furlongs (or 880-yards). The two breeds meet in only one type race...that being an 870-yarder which was originated at Ruidoso Downs many years ago...the race having a '10-yard twilight zone' where both breeds can feel comfortable.

Real color comes into the term 'furlong' when traced back to colonial racing enthusiasts. In those early days it was mainly 'match' racing with Thoroughbreds...and, not having any standard distance markers, the race would be the equivalent to a 'furrow long' in some farmer's plowed field.



**DEAD MEN DON'T WEAR PLAID**, from Universal Pictures. Directed by Carl Reiner, screenplay by Carl Reiner, Steve Martin and George Gipe. Starring Steve Martin, Rachel Ward, Reni Santoni. Rated 'PG.' ★ ★ ★

Spoofs of past films have just about exhausted all the genres. Such films as "The Mark of Zorro," "Young Frankenstein," "Airplane!" and many more turned their satiric eyes on a certain style or trend in films to such an extent that "spoo" films are now almost a genre unto itself.

When Carl Reiner, George Gipe and Steve Martin conspired to do a cinematic send-up of the "film noir" genre of the 1940s, they decided to take the idea one step further. Rather than just spoof the old films, they would intercut to them, incorporating characters and scenes directly into their film.

The result, "Dead Men Don't Wear Plaid," has lots of style, an abundance of belly laughs, and preserves a reverence for the old films.

Because of judicious editing, Martin actually picks up the phone and it's answered by Humphrey Bogart. Clever dialogue around the pre-existing footage and the magic of film creates interesting interplay

between old and new.

It's a clever gimmick, done with much care and ingenuity by director/co-writer Reiner as well as by the talented editors and scene designers, who had to exactly match the films of 40 years ago. Their talents are considerable — some of the intercutting between old and new is flawless.

There is an original mystery story here, but the bends and twists in the plot are geared to the film clips and not the story itself.

Martin is unlike any other comic working today. He seemed perfectly at home in the 1930s-style "Pennies from Heaven," and is fine as Rigby Reardon, private eye.

Rachel Ward plays his female interest, and she's everything a guy could ever want in a client — smooth and sexy, mysterious and rich. Reiner plays a cross between Eric Von Stroheim and Colonel Klink, and is OK as villains go, but seems more like a refugee from a Mel Brooks spoof.





**Cheap Trick** — "One on One" (Epic) — Cheap Trick's ascendant star was abruptly eclipsed after the phenomenon of "At Budokan." The band's rather good album, "Dream Police," died on the vine, and even Beatles' producer George Martin couldn't help them stage a comeback.

In "One on One," the power-pop quartet (featuring a new bassist, Jon Brant) concentrates on the "power" to the detriment of the "pop." This will probably not be the album to save the group's reputation.

**Marshall Crenshaw** (Warner Brothers) — For that new wave sub-group that sees the '50s revival as the impetus of the '80s (Blasters fans, for example), Marshall Crenshaw is an appealing addition. The 28-year-old from Detroit, with the help of Go-Gos' producer Richard Gottehrer, debuts with a tasty confection of simple songs and catchy melodies. It's featherweight, but it's fun.

**Jim Carroll** — "Dry Dreams" (Atco) — Jim Carroll can't play the guitar, and to call him a singer is to stretch the meaning of the word. But his poetry is so compelling that the songs insist on leaping off the turntable and grabbing you by the throat. Nothing on "Dry Dreams" approaches the punch of "People Who Died" from his last album, and the pace may lag a bit at times, but Carroll fans should not be disappointed.

### Veteran stars opt for new networks

The three major networks once signed top-name stars to exclusive performing contracts. But if you look at the new fall schedule, you won't be able to tell who's who without a TV magazine.

The networks have found that it's cheaper to pay a star a substantial fee once a project is tailored for him or her than to sign the star to a long-term deal.

NBC learned the hard way last year when they signed veteran stars to exclusive performing contracts without having series concepts. Thus, James Arness ("McClain's Law"), Angie Dickinson ("Cassie and Co.") and James Garner ("Bret Maverick") found themselves in series that seemed to be recycled from their original shows.

Here's a rundown on who'll be switching networks in the fall:

Robert Ulrich — Formerly of ABC's "Vega\$,," he'll now star in "Gavilan," a James Bondish adventure series airing on NBC.





## THE WINE CELLAR

German wines have a unique appeal to almost everyone. There is a low alcohol content (8% to 12%) and the balance of sugar and acid produces a smooth sweet wine. Eighty-five percent of German wines are white and these wines are the ones seen most often. The Rheingau vineyards, along the Rhine River, produce wines bottled in brown. Blue Nun, Liebfraumilch, Schrodeder and Black Tower are from this area. Hattenheimer Nussbrunnen and Schloss Johannisberg are both Spatlese which means late picking... The grapes are left on the vine longer to ob-

tain a greater sugar content. Along the Moselle River is the area of Mosel-Saar-Ruwar. The wines from this area are bottled in green. Kendermann and Steigenberger both produce a Zeller Schwarze Katz (Black Cat). Kendermann also produces a Piesporter Goldtropfchen and Krover Nacktarsch (Naked Bottom). Whichever German wine is chosen can only complement a dinner or can be enjoyed for "just sipping."
