

Bids called for on police building

The Ruidoso council Tuesday approved a call for bids on construction of the \$600,000 police-courts building remodeling project.

The action came at a special afternoon meeting. The meeting started at 4 p.m. and was recessed after 45 minutes because the project architect, John Vanoy Moore, was not present.

When the meeting reconvened at 6:45, Moore reviewed changes in the project plans for the mayor and council.

The architect explained that he compiled a list of 13 "alternates"—work called for in the plans which can be deleted or contracted separately at a later date, subject to budget constraints.

His intent was to "buffer the bids," Moore said. In the event the bids on the entire project come in higher than the budgeted amount, money can be saved by awarding the bid less some or all of the alternates.

Included in Moore's list are: air conditioning equipment, concrete curbs, cabinet work, shelving, carpet, ceramic tilework,

kitchen equipment, vinyl wall covering, mirrors, canopies, lockers, and furnishing of a room for Emergency Medical Service.

"Alternates are trying to do before the fact what you end up clumsily trying to do after the fact," said Moore.

During the earlier portion of the meeting, police chief Dick Swenor told the council that he, Moore and others have gone over the plans thoroughly in looking for ways to keep costs down.

Officer Jim Alston, a member of the committee overseeing the project, pointed out that in making changes, the safety and security of prisoners has not been compromised.

Village purchasing agent John Cupp stated the aim of "getting the best end result for the dollars we had to work with."

Swenor was reminded that the project was originally to have been bid March 15.

"It's been one little Murphy's law after another thing that keeps cropping up on us," said the chief.

Alston pointed out that, when built, the detention facility portion of the building

will be a "pacesetter."

"I think we're approaching a model facility in that sense," he said.

Swenor noted that the building will not be a "plush" complex. "It's an operational facility," he said.

The officers expressed hope that District Court can occasionally be held in the complex when it is completed, saving residents and officers trips to Carrizozo.

They pointed out that space cutbacks have been concentrated in administrative functions.

"I personally don't feel the (planned) facility is large enough," said Alston, "but it's all we can afford."

He added that the remodeled building will allow better use of available space than does the present building.

"The delay factor is now becoming critical," Swenor told the council. He noted that the temporary building which will house the department during the remodeling is nearly ready.

The council also discussed a bond on workers involved in installation of security

equipment at the complex. Village attorney Lee Huckstep said that such bonds are unheard of in New Mexico and that the State Police Department keeps a list of such workers on its projects.

A penalty fee to be assessed the contractor if the project is not completed on time was also discussed. Moore said specifications called for a \$200 per day penalty. The possibility of imposing a larger penalty was mentioned, but no action was taken.

Moore said that performance security will be in the form of a letter of credit. He added that he plans to further qualify prospective contractors for the project with other work they have done and through references.

Plans for the electronics portion of the project did not arrive in time for review by the council Tuesday. Moore requested that bids be called for on leasing of the equipment as soon as possible, so that they too can be opened July 15.

The council was to review the plans in a special meeting this morning.

WATER!

Whys and wherefores, pros and cons discussed at town meeting

In the first of two town meetings on the upcoming water bond vote, Ruidosans heard the village's case for requesting approval of the \$8 million improvement plan.

The highlight of the forum came when Mayor George White stated his opposition to the project. The council members present, Benny Coulston, Don Dale and Frank Sayner, expressed disappointment in the mayor's position, and all went on record in firm support of the issue.

Reasons for the capital improvements program and questions on its financing were also raised at the town meeting. Assistant village manager Frank Potter presented charts designed by water study groups that focus on present availability of water, water rights, and projected demand.

He explained that over 80 percent of the water processed in the system comes from Eagle Creek and about 20 percent comes from the Ruidoso River.

That translates into 1,544 acre feet on Eagle Creek (if the present flow right is converted to a quantity right) and 214 acre feet on the Rio Ruidoso.

Noting that the Rio Ruidoso flows almost five times as much as Eagle Creek based on long-term flow charts, Potter asked if it makes sense that Rio Ruidoso water isn't stored.

"The only reason we're not taking more Ruidoso River water is there is no place to store it," he said.

He also noted that 730 acre feet a year from the two watersheds is lost downstream after going through the system.

Ruidoso gets credit for that water, called effluent credit, which means it can add that amount to its traditional rights upstream. "Effluent credit is the reason for the dam," he said.

Mayor White then mentioned that a protest has been filed regarding the change in the location at which effluent is discharged into the Ruidoso River.

Effluent is now discharged from the new Biscuit Hill water treatment plant. Until the plant's opening last week, it was directed into the river from the old sewage plant east of the high school.

Potter said farmers located between the two plants filed the protest with the State Engineer's Office because they will no longer receive the extra water for irrigation that was being discharged into the river. But he indicated that the protesters have no actual right to additional water.

Coulston noted that municipalities are efficient users of water. He said communities return water to the river, rather than using it up "like irrigation farmers."

Councilman Frank Sayner, a member of the reservoir study committee, described the scenario if the bond issue fails.

Sayner said if voters reject the proposed dam, the council will immediately look into means of funding a new treatment plant, which, he said, is needed to more adequately utilize Ruidoso River water.

He said \$2.5 million dollars would have to be raised to construct the plant. He added that the funds would probably come from a water rate hike to the 5,000 metered users in the village.

The increase could mean monthly bills as high as \$75, he predicted.

In an explanation of the bond issue,

Sayner described the financing terms. Of the \$8 million needed for the improvements, the village will ask voters to approve a one percent increase in the gross receipts tax, raising the sales tax to 5.25 cents on the dollar. Revenues from the tax will be used to retire a \$6 million bond issue.

Based on last year's tax figures, Sayner said the one percent would raise \$900,000 a year.

At an assumed interest rate of 14 percent, Sayner said annual payments on the total debt would be \$1.2 million.

According to state law, the village can finance only three-quarters of the improvements through revenue bonds. Therefore, Ruidoso also will ask voters to approve a \$2 million general obligation (GO) bond, which would mean a property tax hike.

Sayner said that in 1981, assessed valuation totaled \$50 million. Based on that amount, he said, the extra \$300,000 to meet the yearly payment could be raised on a maximum \$4 increase per \$1,000 in assessed value. But he also noted that another \$5 million in assessed value will be added to the tax rolls this year, which lowers the tax bite.

An average house in Ruidoso might cost \$75,000, he said. The assessed value, at 33 percent, would be \$25,000. The three dollar raise per thousand would add up to \$75 a year.

Also, the councilman said, based on construction schedules for the project, GO money would not be needed "until at least three years from now." By then, he said, because of inflation, he expects that the entire debt could be paid from the sales tax increase.

Sayner also noted that the one penny hike in sales tax only can be applied to retire the revenue bond, according to the state law which permits municipalities to impose the one percent tax to finance water improvements.

If the issue is rejected, Sayner said, the burden of paying for improvements will be placed on permanent residents, rather than on visitors who increase demand for water in the summer.

But Mayor White pointed out that the village raised the water rate last year, and has since accumulated \$300,000 in its coffers from the hike, that is intended for the water system.

"It won't be necessary to raise the rate (again)," he said. "That's money we could use for expansion."

Benny Coulston disagreed.

"We anticipated using the money to purchase additional water rights," he replied.

Currently, most residential users pay a \$12.50 minimum water fee, plus \$1.75 per thousand gallons after 4,000 gallons use. Coulston predicted that customers will see an increase to three or four dollars per thousand if the bond issue is defeated.

"To keep the status quo," he said, "We could pay a \$40 to \$60 monthly bill. Talking about fixed incomes, that's going to hurt."

One audience member suggested that water tap fees be increased for the program.

Sayner noted that the fee already has been tripled—from \$250 to \$750. In addition, he said Ruidoso ensures that developers pay for service costs by paying a utility expansion charge. As an example of the amount paid, Sayner said a developer in White Mountain recently paid a \$64,000 utility expansion charge.

But one audience member was not convinced that part-time residents are being required to help pay for their share of the improvements.

"We have enough water for people here now," he contended. "We want to build the reservoir for additional growth."

"They (part-time residents) should pay for the privilege of coming here," he suggested. "You tax everybody; it's not fair."

Coulston noted that the one percent tax adds \$100 to residents' annual bills if they spend \$10,000 a year in Ruidoso.

Village attorney Lee Huckstep warned against discrimination toward outsiders.

"There seems to be sentiment among the group to make outsiders pay who create the peak demand," he said.

"I can be sympathetic with the idea to make the Texans pay for the project. But there's an equal protection clause in the constitution that prohibits that."

He said the anti-discrimination clause allows travelers to partake of the same benefits in each state that residents enjoy.

"The plan adopted goes further than anything conceivable in making those people pay," he suggested. "They are going to be paying a tax which goes to the betterment of the community."

"Growth is not the issue here," he said. "It's survival of this community as we know it. We cannot supply water to every lot now, if a house is put on it."

Coulston added his belief that those who relocate to the Southwest must make water one of their main concerns.

"Most of us choose to live in the arid Southwest," he began. "When we made that choice, then from here on out we only have two choices on water—expensive water or no water."

White announces opposition to bond issue

Describing himself as "the devil's advocate," Ruidoso mayor George White came out in opposition Tuesday to the proposed Grindstone Canyon reservoir project that will be voted on July 6.

Reading from a prepared statement at the first town meeting on the bond issue, White indicated to the council he will actively campaign against the project.

"I have decided to oppose the bond issue," he said.

Referring to a special meeting on the project June 2, White berated the councilmen for refusing to take action on a recommendation from water board chairman C. Newton Page and reservoir study committee chairman John Schuller to place a moratorium on future annexations.

At the June 2 meeting, the council took no action regarding the recommendation. Councilman Al Junge said at the time that the village would have to "trust the council to keep a tight rein" on development.

In his message Tuesday, White said the council "refused to take any action on the (moratorium) proposal and gave no assurances that they would even try to curtail the growth pattern now underway, even in the light of the shortage of water."

White continued by recalling a state-

ment he made at the September 8, 1981, trustees meeting. That statement was in reaction to the annexation of 300 acres in the White Mountain subdivision.

His concern, he said at the time and repeated Tuesday, is over the lack of water and the "inability to see much improvement (in the water situation) in the next several years."

He said Ruidoso is fast losing its "mountain village atmosphere," and unless real estate development is curtailed, he would "campaign actively against any and all bond issues to pay for water or sewer extensions."

White explained why his position remains unchanged.

He referred to the water board's figures that show enough available water to meet demand until 1985.

"If we would stop growth now," he suggested, "we could go to 1985 without too much trouble."

However, Schuller, who is also Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) chairman, recently pointed out that approved plats in the village already exceed the projected figures.

White added, "This scares the life out of me to think by 1985 we won't have any surplus water at all."

White then informed the councilmen he will maintain his stance and oppose any

water projects until, as he put it, the council follows "the advice of the water board and Planning and Zoning to curtail development."

Councilman Don Dale was the first to respond.

He told the mayor he had made a couple of misstatements. Referring to remarks made at the June 2 meeting, Dale said the council had "made assurances that we would curtail development."

"There's no way we could lock ourselves up in a shell and say there will be no more development in Ruidoso," he said.

"If we do, we'll break the shell in five years and find we have no water storage," Dale added that he "would like to go on record as being completely for it (the bond issue)."

P&Z member Mike Mulholland also wanted to correct White. He noted that P&Z chairman Schuller personally recommended the moratorium, but the issue was never voted on by the commission.

Councilman Benny Coulston then stepped in. He wanted to know if either the water board or reservoir committee went on record for an annexation halt.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter replied that the subject was never put to a vote of the water board, of which he is a member.

Coulston then said he was disappointed in the mayor's position.

As a final note, General Nord told the gathering of Ruidoso Chamber members that Thursday, June 17, at approximately 10:45 p.m., an Arles missile may be seen ascending from the southern end of WSMR. Nord suggested that skygazers look to the southwest, towards Las Cruces, to catch a glimpse of the bright test rocket.

Chamber announces it's for water bond issue

The board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce voted unanimously yesterday to officially and formally endorse a yes vote in the July 6 election on the \$8 million water capital improvements program.

The board decided to endorse the proposed water bond after hearing from village councilmen Frank Sayner and Benny Coulston. The two men gave their personal word to the board that if the bond passes, then the \$8 million will be used exclusively for a new dam and treatment plant.

Sayner told the Chamber directors that the Grindstone Canyon dam site is "a natural." He explained that other dam site possibilities were on United States Forest Service land.

However, Sayner said private land was finally selected because it allows construction to begin in September without the

necessary environmental assessments and other red tape involved with using federal land.

Time is very important to the construction of the dam, stressed Sayner. He noted that the present water system will be able to supply good quality water to Ruidosoans and the many people pouring into this mountain community only until December 1984. Completion of a Grindstone reservoir and water treatment facility, if the bond passes, is expected by January 1985.

Sayner listed approximate costs figured into the \$8 million bond issue as follows:

- Dam, including cost of land: \$4.6 million.
- Line from water plant one in Upper Canyon to new Grindstone treatment plant: \$400,000.
- New water treatment plant: \$1,360,000.
- Five million gallon storage tank and lines: \$1 million.

- Control center: \$155,000.
- Line to storage tank at Black Forest: \$36,000.
- Line to tank at Skyland: \$48,000.
- Contingency fund: \$372,000.

Sayner admitted there seems to be disagreement about how soon a completed dam could fill up with water. Some believe it will take only nine months. Others believe it will take considerably longer to fill the dam.

"We're looking at two years maximum growth and water. We can only be so big," commented Sayner. He added that after the dam is built, only four more years of growth at the present annual rate of 7.3 percent may be maintained.

Sayner stated that due to a state legislative act, an additional one percent sales tax may be imposed to pay for water improvements. Doing so, pointed out Sayner, would bring in \$900,000 annually to the village of Ruidoso for the debt retire-

ment of the bonds. The remaining \$800,000 could be financed by a general obligation bond or property tax increase, mentioned Sayner. At the present rate of growth, Sayner said, the highest increase possible on property taxes will be \$4 per \$1,000.

"It seems to me the easiest way to pay the money. If the whole issue goes down to defeat... We will still have to put in a water treatment plant to serve Ruidoso," Sayner remarked.

Sayner pointed out that all three questions on the ballot must be marked yes if the bond is to pass. Otherwise, the issue cannot be brought up again for two more years.

Coulston stated that it is the unanimous decision of the council to pass the bond proposal. However, he said Mayor George White has changed his opinion on the matter from formerly favoring the passage of the bond to opposing it, "which is very disappointing to the council."

Councilman Coulston also noted that while he may be favorable to the bond's passage at the polls if a moratorium on growth is placed as a rider to the bond proposal.

He continued by saying that Ruidoso has staked its future to the Eagle Creek watershed, which will not be able to handle the burden of supplying water in the near future. Coulston said Ruidoso is presently using 100 percent of the Eagle Creek water, but that Captain is entitled to 60 percent of it.

"This village has got to make a decision to stake our future to the Rio Ruidoso because it is the only decent water we have," Coulston stated.

In other Chamber board business, Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth announced that Doug Cluff of E-Z TV has accepted to fill a vacant seat on the Retail Merchants Committee. Chamber president Morgan Clough

reiterated that the Chamber had acquired 100 new members during the recent membership drive. He plainly stated that the Chamber was expecting approximately 55 new members, but congratulated both the Bad Guy team and the Good Guy team for their super effort.

"We must be doing something right to continue our growth," Clough commented. Jungbluth said the annual Cadillac Party will be held at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Wednesday, August 18. Tickets will cost \$195 per couple, and only 200 tickets will be sold, he added. Invitations will be sent out soon, stated Jungbluth.

The Chamber board also voted to discontinue the weekly coffee cart during the summer months of July and August. There is too much going on and most people are too busy to attend the Wednesday morning get-togethers, Jungbluth explained. Coffee carts will resume the first week in September, however.

Racetrack offers support of Downs' bid for more revenues

Two attorneys and the general manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track attended Monday's Ruidoso Downs trustees meeting to offer support in any efforts to persuade the state Legislature that the village should be entitled to additional revenues from the track.

Village and racetrack officials discussed the matter at two meetings between the two bodies after Mayor J. C. Day, during the May 24 trustees meeting, expressed his belief that the village is being "shafted." Day stated that the village should be receiving gross receipt taxes from all sales at the track, but that the Legislature has exempted race tracks from the requirement to pay such.

"The board (of directors at the racetrack) enthusiastically supports your position," said track attorney T. T. Sanders Monday. "We will try to do whatever we can do to alleviate the situation."

"There has to be a way this village can keep from sitting here and drying up with one of the biggest industries in the state within the village limits," stated Day.

He told The News Tuesday that Senator Charlie Lee contacted him about ten days ago and indicated he will work on the mat-

ter with the Legislature. According to Day, Lee said he will find out how much gross receipts taxes the village currently receives from the track, as the amount is not a matter of public record.

Also Monday night, Day reported that a vehicle has been purchased from the sheriff's department to be used by police officer Dale Patrick for animal control, junk auto citations and enforcement of Planning and Zoning Commission ordinances.

Trustee Harrold Mansell reported that Ruidoso animal control officer Jack Sniadecki's claim (printed in an article in The News that day), that the village has a population of 4,800 dogs and cats is incorrect.

"There can't be 4,800 dogs and cats unless he doesn't know the difference between dogs and cats and horses," Mansell argued.

Sniadecki had recently submitted, at the village's request, a proposed contract for \$24,000 a year for animal control services for Ruidoso Downs, which the village said it cannot afford.

"Before I pay him \$24,000 a year, we'll buy a Cadillac and have a chauffeur drive it and pick them (dogs and cats) up in style," Day said at Monday's meeting.

It was suggested that the village devise a plan of action to answer the letter about the village's animal control problem,

which Sniadecki addressed to the state Health and Environment Department.

In other business, the trustees: —Opened sealed bids on village equipment to be sold. High bids were accepted from J. C. Capps for a tractor, and backhoe, with a bid of \$1,886; Harold Mansell for 90 feet of steel pipe, for a bid of \$65; Bill Taylor for a 1978 Ford LTD police vehicle, for a bid of \$225; J. C. Day for a tractor lawn mower, for a bid of \$26.

—Reported that rates for dumping at Ruidoso's landfill will be increased by \$5 effective July 7.

—Granted final approval to the 1982-83 budget after receiving approval from Santa Fe.

—Agreed to pay police officer Jack Richardson \$40 for painting his patrol car.

—Tabled a request to purchase a lawn mower for the village and requested the village clerk to check on prices for used mowers.

—Approved a zoning map designed by the Planning and Zoning Commission, with any proposed changes in the map to be presented to the board of trustees.

—Decided that village employees need approval from two members of the governing body (including village clerk) for out-of-town trips, and that travel plans should be presented to the board if possible.

The possibility of having the village issue industrial bonds on behalf of the racetrack was also brought up at a June 9 meeting between village and racetrack officials, Day said Tuesday. Representatives from the track suggested the village sign industrial bonds worth between \$8 and \$10 million for construction of a new sales barn at the track.

The village would not be responsible for repaying the bonds, Day explained, and, under the present tax system, would not benefit financially from the arrangement.

Sanders reported at Monday's meeting, however, that it would not be feasible for the village to issue the bonds on behalf of the track.

No action was taken on the matter.

The next meeting of the Ruidoso Downs trustees is scheduled for June 28 at 7 p.m. at the municipal building.

Robert Hays named head of state bankers group

Ruidoso State Bank president Robert L. Hays has been elected president of the New Mexico Bankers Association (NMBA). He assumed the duties of the position during the trade association's annual convention in Albuquerque last weekend.

A native of New Mexico, Hays was named president of Ruidoso State Bank in June, 1978, and previously was vice president of a bank in Kansas.

He has a bachelor of science degree in economics from Abilene Christian College, Abilene, Texas, and graduate certificates from the Colorado School of Banking, Boulder, Colorado, and the National Commercial Lending School in Norman, Oklahoma.

Hays will serve as president of the NMBA, the trade association for the 68 banks in New Mexico, for a one-year term.

Downs P&Z seeks to control structure types

A desire to control the types of structures being erected in the village was scussed Tuesday during the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission P&Z meeting.

Chamber announces it's for water bond issue

The board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce voted unanimously yesterday to officially and formally endorse a yes vote in the July 6 election on the \$3 million water capital improvements program.

The board decided to endorse the proposed water bond after hearing from village councilmen Frank Sayner and Benny Coulston. The two men gave their personal word to the board that if the bond passes, then the \$3 million will be used exclusively for a new dam and treatment plant.

Sayner told the Chamber directors that the Grindstone Canyon dam site is "a natural." He explained that other dam site possibilities were on United States Forest Service land.

However, Sayner said private land was finally selected because it allows construction to begin in September without the

necessary environmental assessments and other red tape involved with using federal land.

Time is very important to the construction of the dam, stressed Sayner. He noted that the present water system will be able to supply good quality water to Ruidosoans and the many people pouring into this mountain community only until December 1984. Completion of a Grindstone reservoir and water treatment facility, if the bond passes, is expected by January 1985.

Sayner listed approximate costs figured into the \$3 million bond issue as follows:

- Dam, including cost of land: \$4.6 million.
- Line from water plant one in Upper Canyon to new Grindstone treatment plant: \$400,000.
- New water treatment plant: \$1,300,000.
- Five million gallon storage tank and lines: \$1 million.

- Control center: \$155,000.
- Line to storage tank at Black Forest: \$36,000.
- Line to tank at Skyland: \$48,000.
- Contingency fund: \$372,000.

Sayner admitted there seems to be disagreement about how soon a completed dam could fill up with water. Some believe it will take only nine months. Others believe it will take considerably longer to fill the dam.

"We're looking at two years maximum growth and water. We can only be so big," commented Sayner. He added that after the dam is built, only four more years of growth at the present annual rate of 7.3 percent may be maintained.

Sayner stated that due to a state legislative act, an additional one percent sales tax may be imposed to pay for water improvements. Doing so, pointed out Sayner, would bring in \$900,000 annually to the village of Ruidoso for the debt retire-

ment of the bonds.

The remaining \$300,000 could be financed by a general obligation bond or property tax increase, mentioned Sayner. At the present rate of growth, Sayner said, the highest increase possible on property taxes will be \$4 per \$1,000.

"It seems to me the easiest way to pay the money. If the whole issue goes down to defeat... We will still have to put in a water treatment plant to serve Ruidoso," Sayner remarked.

Sayner pointed out that all three questions on the ballot must be marked yes if the bond is to pass. Otherwise, the issue cannot be brought up again for two more years.

Coulston stated that it is the unanimous decision of the council to pass the bond proposal. However, he said Mayor George White has changed his opinion on the matter from formerly favoring the passage of the bond to opposing it, "which is very disappointing to the council."

Councilman Coulston also noted that White may be favorable to the bond's passage at the polls if a moratorium on growth is placed as a rider to the bond proposal.

He continued by saying that Ruidoso has staked its future to the Eagle Creek watershed, which will not be able to handle the burden of supplying water in the near future. Coulston said Ruidoso is presently using 100 percent of the Eagle Creek water, but that Captain is entitled to 60 percent of it.

"This village has got to make a decision to stake our future to the Rio Ruidoso because it is the only decent water we have," Coulston stated.

Racetrack offers support of Downs' bid for more revenues

Two attorneys and the general manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track attended Monday's Ruidoso Downs trustees meeting to offer support in any efforts to persuade the state Legislature that the village should be entitled to additional revenues from the track.





habit of devices used to control the howler. Killgo said the U. S. Magnificent Arabians from the Hindi Arabian Ranch in Duran, New Mexico; and stately Quarter Horses from the Royce and Jeanne Washburn Ranch located in Bonito Canyon, performed in the arena.

Brahim Hindi, half-Lebanese grandson of Alex Hindi, the founder of the ranch, rode atop a beautiful 26-year-old Arabian that is an original offspring of one of five horses that Alex imported from Lebanon in 1930.

Brahim was attired in Arab dress and the steed was outfitted in a 100-year-old Syrian outfit—the scene provided a sense of authenticity.

The Washburns demonstrated skills used in breaking quarter horses that were originally trained for racing. At the end of their track career, Royce explained, the horses must be retrained for the rodeo arena.

"At the track," he said, "they're trained to run straight." He demonstrated part of the process. In a small pen, Royce drilled a tan mare through the paces. Around the circle she trotted, stopped and reversed, and the former racehorse heeded his commands without a flinch.

The Washburns were explaining the techniques to the crowd, when a young cowboy in the group interrupted and asked who stired the mare.

A knowledgeable question for a young squirt drilled by his cowboy hat, I thought.

When asked if he felt tour was informative, he replied: "Oh, it's fun." "I got talked into it by my grandma."

It was time for chow after the trip to the rodeo grounds.

The Cowbelles whipped up a tasty plate of beans, barbecued beef (of course), potato salad, fresh rolls (and boy were they) and an apple dessert.

During the break, Greg Haussler of the Soil Conservation Service instructed us in Range Planning and Management.

In preparation for our sojourn to the R Bar R Cattle Ranch (owned by George and Nancy Ranney), Haussler presented a chart illustrating the Ranney spread.

The Ranney ranch is located 12 miles southeast of Corona in the Gallo Canyon. About 350 Angus cattle graze on 18,000 acres that is divided into numerous pastures.

In planning a ranch operation, Haussler said, the natural resources should be inventoried.

Most of the Ranney range land is located on shallow-soiled ground.

Based on the quantity of natural grasses in the area, Haussler said, it requires 40 to 60 acres yearly to support one animal unit, which is one cow and calf, less than one horse, or five head of sheep or goats.

Considering the upkeep of the spread, Haussler added that a physical inventory also should be made. To run the operation, he said, ranchers must plan for roads, fences, water, farm implements and feed.

The most crucial element in running a ranch is the supply of water. Haussler noted that the Corona area receives an average of 15 inches of precipitation a year.

On the chart, a maze of fences, pipelines and water storage facilities is outlined. Haussler explained that pastures are divided so water supplies are strategically located, thereby ensuring uniform grazing.

Out at the R Bar R, George Ranney explained the economics of cattle ranching.

Ranney, who has been ranching for 14 years since relocating from Libertyville, Illinois, gave a brief lecture on the realities of ranching.

He commented that 90 percent of his revenue is earned from shipping fattened calves, and he noted that a rancher must carefully calculate the value of each animal.

"You'd better be damn sure the price has been calculated correctly," he exclaimed.

After shipping, he said, each cow is bred and checked for pregnancy. If one fails to become pregnant, it is sold.

"We ship and sell every bloomin' cow that isn't re-bred," he remarked. "It's just not economical."

For those of us who harbored notions of the romantic life of a cowboy, the rancher

knocked us right out of the saddle.

"Today's cowboy spends very little time on horseback," he said. "These days, he is in a pickup."

"He's a jack of all trades. He repairs fences, feeds and checks cattle and breaks ice in winter," he said.

"For the cowboy there's only one school—the school of experience."

And if anyone was inclined to level criticism at cattle raisers for high beef prices, Ranney offered the ranchers' version by explaining the dilemma of ranching.

He explained that ranchers cope with a continuing decline in prices for their product, while costs rise. He noted that the situation conforms to the "classic law of supply and demand ratios," with a decreasing demand for beef.

The visit to R Bar R also included a branding demonstration, and talks by a brand inspector and a feedlot operator.

Interested observers of the lectures included a family from Taiwan.

For Mei Casey, who took part in the tour along with her American husband Bill Casey, her 65-year-old mother and three-year-old daughter, it wasn't the first look at a ranch.

"I've seen a ranch in Taiwan," she mentioned, "but it was only a small one."

"I think it's real interesting to see the open space," she said. "And I learned something new."

We all did.







Special Effort to run Friday

Special early post time of noon will be set for Friday's 16-race Rainbow Derby program at Ruidoso Downs. A total of 180 three-year-olds have entered the trials hoping to qualify for one of the 10 positions in the Rainbow Derby, second leg of the Triple Crown for owners quarter horses. Each trial race will be run at 440 yards with a purse of \$1,000. The 10 fastest runners from Friday's races will earn berths in the Rainbow Derby on July 4. The estimated purse is \$100,000. The eyes, however, will be on the defeated Special Effort, who will compete in the seventh heat. Special Effort captured an undefeated Triple Crown for two-year-olds last year at Ruidoso Downs, won all races to become quarter horse

racing's all-time moneywinner. The Raise Your Glass colt has just as awesome this year in his two races at Ruidoso Downs. He opened with an easy three-length win in his Kansas Derby trial race on May 8 at Ruidoso Downs. Then he romped to a two and three-fourths length victory over old nemesis Go For Bugs in the \$354,000 Kansas Derby, the first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds, on May 23 at Ruidoso Downs. If Special Effort wins the Rainbow Derby and the final leg, the All-American Derby on August 29, he will join My Easy Credit as the only horses to sweep the three-year-old Triple Crown series. My Easy Credit won the trio in 1977. Overall, Special Effort is undefeated in 11 races for trainer Johnie A. Goodman. He's earned \$1,150,013 for owners Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas.

W. R. Hunt will again be aboard as Special Effort will break from the second post position. The ninth race will also be a center of attention. The swift Rebelier will meet Go For Bugs, who has been second to Special Effort in his last two confrontations with the champion. Rebelier had the fastest qualifying time of 20.39 (Special Effort had 20.50) for the Kansas Derby. The swift filly roared to a four and one-half length win in the 12th Kansas Derby trial race. She was disqualified from competing in the Kansas Derby due to a positive test. But last year, she was most impressive, winning six of eight races with two seconds for earnings of \$37,450. Trained by Jack W. Brooks, she's owned by Ann Freeman of El Paso, Texas, and her mother, Alice Fisher of Wichita Falls, Texas. Go For Bugs, meanwhile, ran second last Labor Day to Special Effort in the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity and was second in this season's first major three-year-old race, the Kansas Derby. Still, the Bugs Alive in 75 colts won four races with four seconds in 10 appearances last season. He earned \$319,223. Overall, in his brilliant career, he's posted four wins with six seconds in 13 starts for earnings of \$373,281. He's trained by Paul L. Walters for owner Mary Watkins of Madison, Mississippi. Besides Special Effort and Go For Bugs, five Kansas Derby finalists will compete in the Rainbow Derby trials. Real Jet Wind, who was third, will run in the third race; Broken Pedal, who was fourth, will compete in the 11th race; Aassertive, who ran sixth, is set for the 15th race; Easy Diamond Jim, who was eighth, is ready in the sixth race while Ima Ten Too, who was ninth, will meet Special Effort in the seventh. Two horses were supplemented at a cost of \$15,000 each. Ms Krugerand will rub in the fifth trial while Bojars Magic will run in the 12th division. Racing continues Saturday with the third running of the Norgor Thoroughbred Derby. The winner of this six furlong chase for three-year-olds will earn \$15,232 from the total purse of \$50,465. Sunday's feature will be the second running of the Rainbow Silver Cup at 440 yards for four-year-olds. The winner will gain \$75,192.50 from the total purse of \$150,385. Post-time for Saturday's and Sunday's 12-race program will be the usual 1 p.m.

First Baptist offers quality education, fellowship

First Baptist Church in Ruidoso Downs has been involved in much more than regular worship services. One of the ministries of the church is the Ruidoso Christian School, which just completed its year successfully.

Pastor Dale McCleskey said he has felt for the past several years to begin a Christian School.

Basically, it is my belief that the educational training of children is the responsibility of the home and the church," McCleskey said.

It is not the proper responsibility of the government to educate children," he added. "More and more, the federal and state governments control things which used to be controlled at home."

"It is not a protest movement at all," he said. "I feel the church and school ministries fit together beautifully," he added.

The present church building was erected in 1973, and "at the time it seemed like a very ambitious project," McCleskey reported. He said it is obvious now that it should have been built much larger.

In addition to sponsoring the Christian School as a ministry of the church, First

Baptist also serves as a branch of the International Baptist Bible Institute (IBBI) of El Paso, Texas, with McCleskey serving as branch director.

College level Bible courses are offered through the program during fall and spring semesters for a nominal tuition charge. There is some degree accreditation received through completion of the courses, although the credits are not accepted at all universities and colleges, McCleskey reported.

The IBBI courses were first offered last year, with 28 students enrolled. "We had an excellent response," McCleskey said.

It's unique in our area," he noted. "Most communities don't have the opportunity to get college level Bible teaching."

"That's part of what I think is basic to what we ought to be doing—providing opportunities for learning and growth," he added.

First Baptist also offers a 15-week discipleship seminar during the summer, dealing with the basic elements of Christian living.

McCleskey noted that all of these educational ministries are open to persons of any denominational background. He emphasized, however, that he is not an ecumenicalist, but believes that genuine

disagreement among denominations is healthy.

"The solution is not to compromise, but to maintain mutual respect for each other," he said.

McCleskey said First Baptist is "very definitely" a conservative church.

"We not only believe the Bible from cover to cover, but we believe the cover is genuine leather," he quipped.

"I think there's a misunderstanding of what it means to be a Baptist," McCleskey declared. "Somehow people have gotten the idea of Baptists being very straitlaced and negative."

"I'm proud of the fact that Baptists were the first to stand up for true religious liberty," he said.

McCleskey noted that he feels there is currently a resurgence of interest in spiritual matters throughout the country. "People are realizing materialism isn't getting us anywhere; there has to be something more to life," he stated.

"It is not necessarily a revival of Christianity," McCleskey added. "People are turning to just about everything imaginable to find something to fill the emptiness."

"Absolutely everything under the sun is being tried in an effort to find meaning," he continued. "I believe you find meaning in a personal relationship with Jesus."

McCleskey said he was called to preach in 1970, so he transferred to Wayland Baptist College in Plainview, Texas, where he earned a bachelor's degree. He then attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, where he earned a master's degree. McCleskey has been preaching in various situations since 1970, but First Baptist in Ruidoso Downs is his first full-time pastoring position. He has served in the position for almost five years.

The remainder of the church staff consists of associate pastor Jerry Mauldin, who also serves as administrator of Ruidoso Christian School, and Mary Anne Boons, secretary. McCleskey said he thinks of the entire school staff as church staff also.

"The biggest thing about our church is we have an excellent fellowship," he said. "There is a little discord in our fellowship as any body I've ever been part of."

He voiced concern that in many cases church membership takes the place of a personal relationship with the Lord rather than serving that relationship. There are a tremendous number of people in Ruidoso, he said, who really love the Lord but are not active participants in a church.

"That says ... that the church is not meeting people's needs," McCleskey noted.

"Everybody suffers as a result," he explained. "People's needs aren't met and ministries don't get carried on."

"One of our goals is that we would like to be able to furnish the highest quality education possible and make it available to every student who desires it," McCleskey stated. Money is a major obstacle to this goal, he added.

"We are very actively pursuing the matter of scholarship programs, but they are very limited at this point."

"If all the people in the Christian community worked together, we could do so much more than gets done currently," McCleskey noted.

He emphasized that the Christian School is supportive of the public schools and has had a good relationship with them.

"We want to value and care very much for that relationship," he commented.





Tully Ranch has a long and colorful history



AN OLD TRADING POST still stands on the Tully homestead. It was built in 1905 by Jim Tully. Almost anything could be bought or traded for, in-

cluding coffins. Food and building materials were available at the trading post, and mail was delivered there.

The Tully Ranch in Glencoe has been a part of Lincoln County since the turn of the century.

And the history of the ranch has been a very colorful one.

James Tully bought the ranch in 1905 from the Prosper Gonzales family. There was an adobe home with four rooms that was probably built in the 1850s or earlier.

The home, now owned by James' son, Gerald, has been added on to gradually since then.

Gerald, 78 and still adept at steer roping (a sport he started when he was four years old by roping small animals), remembers his family's first years in the home.

"I was born in 1903 near Fort Stanton," he said. "We came here in 1905. I can remember that three of the rooms had wooden floors and the other one had a dirt floor. When I first started roping I used chickens and dogs."

A trading post was built by the Tullys in 1905 just to the right of the adobe home. It still stands, a brown rustic building.

"It was used for almost everything," said Gerald's wife, Wynema. "Everything from coffins to nails were sold there. You could also get groceries and the mail there, too."

There are two other old adobes built by the Gonzales family nearby. They are believed to have been built around the same time as the present Tully residence.

The main Tully residence's original rooms have the high ceilings and thick walls typical of the adobes of the 1800s. The ceilings in the old rooms are at least 10 feet high.

Gerald's son Gerry, who also does a lot of steer roping, lives nearby. He teaches math at Ruidoso High School when he's not steer roping.

Jim Tully was a state Representative from 1912 to 1916 and a state Senator from 1917 to 1921. He listed his occupation as a farmer and stock raiser.

He helped create Lincoln County Forest and helped bring a lot of attention to Lincoln County's scenic beauty. He died in 1986.

Gerald Tully's main interest was and is cattle. Besides raising the animals, his career as a steer roper is long and distinguished. He set a world record for roping 12 steers in 1948 and won the coveted Crosby trophy that year.

in New Mexico from the 1920's on. Just last in New Mexico from the 1920s on. Just last Sunday, Gerald teamed with Kress Jones to win the second day's competition in the first Gerald Tully Steer Roping Contest. The duo roped four steers in 50.11 seconds, winning \$460.

The Tullys own around 4,600 acres of land in the Glencoe area. The land on which Gerald and Gerry's homes sit takes up about 200 acres.

The area around Glencoe up to Ruidoso has grown considerably in the 77 years since the Tullys bought the old adobe homestead. Many of the people who lived around Glencoe in the early 1900's have long since died.

"A fellow from Roswell who's writing a book about me asked me whether I have any enemies," Gerald said. "I said no. I've outlived all those S.O.B.'s".





SANTA FE — The primary's over. We're now in that phase of New Mexico politics called "preparation for the 1982 general election."

Meanwhile, in the Capital City of our state a great meeting of the lawmakers who run everything in government is taking place.

Big deal? Naaaaah. Not so big a deal.

If you think we citizens must be in a state of chaos and cannot predict what is to come, how about these for a couple of safe bets on the future?

Unless the economy of the nation goes to hell to the extent it did last in 1929, put your money on Joe Skeen as Congressman from southern New Mexico.

If all Reagan economic programs turn to pure sheep manure (an analogy chosen in honor of Joe Skeen), the incumbent from that district may take it in the neck in November.

If not, he won't either. Stick around and see.

Win or lose, he won't hurt too deeply. In fact, he'd probably just as soon stay at home.

But that doesn't mean the observations of all those breathless young television reporters who think Jan Hartke is an "exciting" candidate mean anything.

If people like that knew what they were talking about, Tom Udall would have been the candidate in the northern Congressional district and lots of others would have been big — except that the mere, ordinary, commonsensical voters turned such candidates down.

Lujan ousted Tom Morris from office after that gentleman had been there for about ten years.

Some people think that's a magic number; they look for Lujan to get put out to pasture now.

They're wrong. Don't bet against Lujan any more than you would against Skeen.

If you think New Mexico is a place of johnnies-come-lately, have another thought. Over half of us here were born in this state.

We'll almost always go for our local boys. That will help Skeen and Lujan — and work to the detriment of their adversaries.

THOSE SOCIAL SECURITY GAMES

The social security system doesn't have to go bankrupt, but that is what it will do if our nation's policymakers keep refusing to face the issue.

All three social security trust funds are getting dangerously low, according to the trustees of the system. Although no one denies that there is a serious problem, only a few politicians have had the courage to offer genuine solutions. As a result, working people, by a huge majority, feel that paying their social security taxes is roughly equivalent to pouring money down a rat hole. And they resent having to pay higher and higher taxes for a retirement plan that may not be around when they turn 65. By the same token, retirees worry that the money they were counting on for retirement will be snatched away from them in some desperate last-minute attempt to save the system.

Just a few facts will illustrate the problems facing present retirees, future retirees, and social security system itself.

First, social security benefits have increased by 205 percent in the past 12 years, while the average wage has increased only 121 percent.

Second, it will take only 13 months for the average earner who began paying social security taxes in 1937 and who retired this year to exhaust all of his contributions. From that time on, he will be supported by payroll taxes on the present worker. Persons now receiving benefits have a legitimate concern that working men and women may not be able to bear the higher and higher social security tax burden.

Finally, for the worker who will retire in the future, the situation is completely uncertain. For example, without reform in the system a 35-year-old would contribute at least \$80,000 to the system before he retires. Yet, when he gets ready to retire, the system will have more than \$3 trillion in unfunded liabilities. His 60 grand will have gone to pensioners who retire before him and his retirement money may not be available.

Thus, workers and retirees alike have a vital stake in reforming and stabilizing the system.

Yet both groups have not been convinced that our government will act promptly and responsibly to keep social security alive. Instead, they have been treated to the spectacle of politicians playing election-year games with their futures.

One of the politicians' favorite games is You First. In this game, everyone chants "Insolvency!" until one player proposes a solution to the problem. Then, this player is ridiculed for wanting to gut the social security system, with cries of "He wants to balance the budget on the backs of the elderly!" The winner of the game is the person who can make the most noise while offering the least solution. The losers are those who depend on social security.

Another favorite game is Hide and Seek. The object of this game is to take social security out of the unified budget and hide it in some off-budget account. The winner of the game is the person who can hide it so well that no one knows how much it costs or how bad its financial problems are. The losers are those who pay taxes and those who want an honest accounting.

A third game is Blindman's Bluff. In this game, politicians promise ever-increasing benefits to retirees even though the money for them does not exist. The object is to get re-elected by claiming that the impossible is a sacred right. The official rules do not say whether the "blindman" is the promising politician or the deceived voter, but the game is over when the social security trust funds run dry.

We have had enough childish games with social security. It is time to play straight.

The minimum adjustments necessary to keep the trust funds solvent for the next three years are well known. The funds are now projected to be at least \$6 billion short in fiscal year 1983, \$17 billion short in fiscal year 1984, and another \$17 billion short in fiscal year 1985.

To raise this money, only three plausible options exist—no more and no less. First, the growth in benefits, which has been simply phenomenal during the last decade, could be slowed somewhat. Second, the revenues into the system could be increased, either from general revenues or from ear-marked taxes. Third and most likely, a combination of increased revenues and slower growth could be agreed to.

None of these three alternatives necessitates a cut in benefits from current levels. Any one of them, in fact, accommodates substantial growth in benefits—at least 16 percent during the period from 1982 to 1985. Most important, any one of the alternatives would permit the system to meet its immediate obligations to retirees and its future obligations to the people who are now working.

In the budget resolution it just passed, the Senate called for only the vaguest of actions on social security. About all it accomplished was to admit that the social security system needs help to stay alive—it did not recognize the size of the malady or prescribe a cure for it. However, the budget did require action this year to guarantee short-term solvency. This is the minimum Congress must do. Even though Congress is suffering from the election-year flux, it should stop playing political games and do what is necessary to restore confidence in our social security system.

Editorial

Our community—Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and those areas of the county that lie close in—took a major step into modern times last week.

The event was the starting up of the new Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant at Biscuit Hill.

When the facility began treating waste June 8, it was the culmination of more than eight years of effort and \$7.5 million in costs.

In the early 1970s, Ruidoso recognized the need to expand its wastewater treatment capacity. The village learned in 1974 that with joint participation of Ruidoso Downs on a treatment facility, state and federal funds would be available for the project.

Thus the Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs Joint Use Board for Wastewater Facilities was formed. The board, with Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine serving as clerk and signatory authority, began the three-step process of justification of need; design and land acquisition; and construction.

In seeing the project through, the board made a far reaching and long-term contribution to the two municipalities. Ruidoso Downs and part of the county have sewer service for the first time; Ruidoso has a plant that can handle a growing demand.

We congratulate all who served on the Joint Use Board through the years, and especially Jim Hine, whose "baby" it was from the beginning.—TP

We cut through the grandstand area. It was full of all sorts of people. Some were the older tourist type—baggy pants, straw hat with wife and lounge chairs in tow. Then there were my contemporaries—shorts, tank tops and beers in hand.

After sneaking around, asking dumb questions and checking everything out, we ended up in the Turf Club.

Now, I don't mean to be a snob, but that's the way to go. It's nice and cool up there. There are tables to sit around and good food at surprisingly low prices with courteous service.

She punched her Tote 300 computer, and zoom, a ticket was rolling into my hands. My God! I'd done it. Thoughts of paupers prison and declaring a chapter 11 tormented me. So, I thought to myself, this is what everyone means when they talk about horse racing being exciting.

Well, the race was exciting. You can't help but get emotional with all those other people around you screaming and urging on the horse that will make them a fortune.

Number four won. However, number seven didn't place. A weird feeling came over me.

I was feeling down because I had come so close to winning, but this stupid feeling of confidence arose. I couldn't wait for the next race to begin.

I felt a bit itchy. The gambling bug was gnawing at my conscience.

In the fifth race, I had intended to play it safe. But when I got to the window, I got real nervous. I blurted out "Maly' or to place."



Vickie Smallwood doing what she wants to do — ride racehorses

The other day, an interesting thing happened to Vickie Smallwood as she was riding the 3-5 favorite, Pierre The True, in a speed duel at Ruidoso Downs.

In the turn for home — just as Vickie and Pierre The True were coming on like a runaway truck — the airspace got a little tight.

"One of the horses bumped us, and we began backing off," Vickie, 21, explains. "Pierre The True is a good horse, but he's got a heart about this big," she says, holding up two fingers to indicate an object about the size of an undergrown pea.

So instead of bursting into the clear, Pierre The True conceded ground, got into more trouble, clipped the heels of a few horses, stumbled badly, and sent Vickie nosediving into the turf.

Vickie bounced around like a rag doll and came to rest with stars in her eyes and all the get-up-and-go of a club fighter who'd stopped a right hook from Larry Holmes. The ambulance crew rushed to the impact area, scraped the unmoving pilot off the turf, loaded her into a stretcher, then into the ambulance, and off they hurried. The scene looked pretty grim.

But after being checked by the medics, and being allowed to get back on her pins,

and put some air in her lungs, Vickie shook off the kyo. A few races later, she was back in her work clothes, and pounded out a hard-driving nose win with My Going Jesse.

The point of the episode isn't that jockeys' female or male, are kamikaze pilots bent on flamboyant suicides. It's just that a spill is usually part of a day's work. Nothing to fret about — as long as your hide stays intact. Vickie says plainly, in a no-big-deal shrug: "I haven't had any bad spills yet. I just don't worry about it. I don't even think about it."

You might call this a highly professional attitude, and it's probably one reason why Vickie is the most successful lady jockey in the history of Southwest racing. During the recent spring meeting at Sunland Park, she ended up seventh in the standings. Currently at Ruidoso, she's holding down third, a few notches out of first place. But the Smallwood Express took a slight slow-down last week when she was suspended a few days for over-eager riding. "I ran over Jockey Mike Lidberg in the first race last Saturday," she fesses up.

Ask Vickie if her track success is a combination of instinct and talent, and she'll

shrug off the question, as if it were unduly complex. She says directly: "I just like to get with it. It feels easy when I ride. I always knew I could do it. When I was a kid, I used to ride without a bridle. If I fell off, it didn't matter."

Raised around horses in New Boston, Texas (not far from Texarkana), Vickie was soon rodeo-riding. But when she turned 15, she decided rodeo-riding wasn't cutting it. "It got old," she says. "The horses didn't go fast enough." Later, her best friend happened to have a boyfriend who was a jockey, and she and her friend went to see some match races at DeKalb, Texas.

After the races, Vickie was allowed to climb aboard one of the horses, and ride him up and down the track. "That was the first time I'd been on a racehorse, and I really liked it," she now says. "It was the spirit of the thoroughbred that appealed to me."

Like any 16-year-old who'd found her destiny, Vickie launched her track career eagerly. But it was a case of moving at the speed of growing grass. For six months, she worked at a ranch in Avery, Texas, breaking colts and getting okayed out of the starting gate. Next came a one-year stint at Delta Downs, galloping horses for

trainer Bill White. Was it a fun year? "I learned a lot," she responds.

At this point, she was 17, and ready to do some serious riding despite resistance and worry from her parents, and lack of interest by two young brothers, one 18, the other 11. (The two brothers were more interested in football.) In frequent phone conversations, Vickie's mom wondered whether it was suitable for a young girl to be off on her own, riding horses. Vickie's answer: "I like it."

Her first chance in a race came at Delta Downs, but it wasn't a storybook beginning. Vickie's horse went off at 99-1, led for the first part, then caved in and finished fifth. "I rode for a long time, and never got close to winning," she recalls. "I was getting to think I'd never win a race."

Matters took a positive turn when the care and feeding of Dan's Funny Face, a plodder of some modest talent, was turned over to Vickie. "If you clean him, take care of him, brush him, track him, and do everything needed to get him ready for racing, you can ride him," she was told. So for a month or two, Vickie played nursemaid and exercise rider to Dan's Funny Face, and finally the horse was entered in a six-furlong race at Delta Downs.

"We got through on the fence, won by about a half-length, and paid \$110," Vickie says. It was her 70th trip to the post. "I felt like I'd accomplished something," she says.

When the stewards decided Vickie wasn't in line for a five-pound apprentice allowance, she left in a huff, and landed at Tucson, Arizona, where she wound up as a top apprentice and the fifth-leading rider. She'd logged about 38 wins, and was ready to sink her youthful teeth into bigger fish.

In the summer of 1980, she won 26 races at Sante Fe, including a stakes race. The following spring, she became the first lady jockey to win a stakes race at Sunland Park, taking the Sunland Park Derby with Streaking Sis. Last summer, she won the \$69,624 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity, becoming Ruidoso's first lady stakes winner. That was an especially sweet occasion, since her family was on hand. Later in the season, she took the Speed-Handicap with My Going Jesse. During the 1981-82 Sunland season she won the prestigious Fall Thoroughbred Futurity with Jack The Knite and the Sunland Park Derby with Oneriotoneranger.

With success of this kind, there's no family resistance to Vickie's jockey career. Try asking her if a rugged life of

this sort, spills and all, is suitable for a young lady, and she'll retort: "It's a lot better than putting in eight hours a day in some office."

Veterinarian Jerry Rheudasil has had lifelong love for horses

Owning quality thoroughbreds and quarter horses is nothing new to Jerry Rheudasil. But serving on the Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated Board of Directors is a new challenge.

"I'm real pleased to have been elected to the Board of Directors," said the long-time horse owner and veterinarian. "It's encouraging to see the changes being made here (at Ruidoso Downs Race Track) and hopefully there will be more to come. We have an impressive physical plant.

"We just want to make it one of the finest racing facilities in existence and maintain it as such," he said.

Although the Lewisville, Texas, horseman has just recently been elected to the executive body which governs Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs, he clearly has one goal in mind.

"We want quality horse racing at both

tracks," he explained. "Any input I can add that might improve the quality of horse racing at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs has to be my prime goal."

Rheudasil has always been involved with horses.

Born and raised in Paris, Texas; he was graduated from Texas A & M University in 1958 with a degree in veterinary medicine. For the past 20 years, the 47-year-old Texan has operated the 407 Ranch, located about 10 miles northwest of Lewisville, Texas. Lewisville is about 25 miles north of Dallas.

"I've loved horses ever since I was a kid. I'm just one of those people who likes horses. I've also been involved with livestock all my life," he added.

Rheudasil owns several horses. They are primarily quarter horses, although he does have a few thoroughbreds.

Perhaps the finest quarter horse he owned was Mito Wise Dancer, a Mito Paint colt out of Folly Watch Miss. Mito Wise

Dancer's most impressive effort was a half-length win over odds-on favorite Dash For Cash in the 1976 All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs. With a purse of \$568,042, the All-American Derby is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown races for three-year-old quarter horses.

Rheudasil owned Mito Wise Dancer in partnership with Carl Dodd, who bred the Mito Paint runner, and Gary Pogue. While handling the famed Dash For Cash one of his few career defeats, Mito Wise Dancer collected \$188,491.98.

Besides having a one-third interest in Mito Wise Dancer, Rheudasil also owned the sire, Mito Paint, who has become a fine quarter horse and thoroughbred sire. "Mito Paint and Mito Wise Dancer stand at the Phillips Ranch in Frisco, Texas. I owned and syndicated Mito Paint," he said.

He also owns in partnership a two-year-old thoroughbred, Master Ego, who is a half-brother to the standout four-year-old

runner Bold Ego.

Bold Ego won the 1981 Arkansas Derby at Oaklawn Park and finished second after leading throughout in the 1981 Preakness Stakes, the second leg of the thoroughbred Triple Crown.

Master Ego was purchased in the 1981 Keeneland Summer Sale at Lexington, Kentucky.

Rheudasil also owns Bartonville, a six-year-old Mito Paint gelding, who has been one of the Southwest's finest 870-yard specialists for the past few years. Bartonville, who won two allowance races last summer at Ruidoso Downs, enjoyed his finest season at the mountain track in 1980.

The chestnut gelding tallied four victories, including a 2 and a quarter length verdict in the \$14,425 Brigand Handicap, the meet's featured attraction for 870-yard runners. Bartonville was named Ruidoso Downs' 1980 best older quarter horse and best 870-yard horse.

"Bartonville's the best 870 horse I ever had," he said. "We hope to bring him back to Ruidoso Downs and have him run again later this season."

Besides his race horses, the Lewisville horseman has numerous broodmares.

"I'm also involved in several studs through syndication. I don't breed at my place," he added.

Although he has been associated with race tracks and horses for more than a quarter-century, Rheudasil has hardly become jaded by winning horse races.

"There's nothing like getting your picture taken in the winner's circle," he said with obvious enthusiasm. "The most intriguing thing is to win a horse race with a horse you raised and bred. That's the ultimate in this business. When you breed the mare, watch the foal develop and then watch the horse put out a winning effort, it's the best thing that can happen in racing."



Jockey/Trainer of the week

Mike Lidberg enjoyed a weekend at Ruidoso Downs few jockeys ever experience.

The 21-year-old apprentice rider tallied nine winners, doubled his entire meet's output and zoomed into second place in a spectacular display of riding ability.

Lidberg won three races on Friday, scoring with Policy Dancer (\$6.40) in the fourth, Via Moon (\$6.80) in the sixth and Merry Mermaid (\$14.60) in the eighth. He won two races on Thursday, Saturday and Sunday.

The youngster now has 18 victories with eight seconds and 12 thirds from his 85 mounts. His winning percentage is a fine .211.

For those efforts, Lidberg becomes the Jockey-of-the-Week for the sixth weekend at the mountain track.

Jacky Martin remains atop the jockey standings. He has an identical number of wins as Lidberg with 18, but has recorded 13 seconds and 10 thirds from 89 mounts. His winning percentage is .202.

Other riders in the elite group include Steve Harris, Joe Martinez, Casey Lambert, Vickie Smallwood, Gary Sumpter, Willie Lovell, Larry Byers and Kenny Roller.

In the trainer standings, William F. Leach was named Trainer-of-the-Week for winning five races and maintaining his five-win edge over Bob Arnett, who also tallied five victories over the weekend.

Leach won two races on Thursday and Friday and one on Sunday. He has 19 triumphs with seven seconds and 12 thirds from 77 starts. He has a superb winning percentage of .246.

Arnett, perennially among the leading trainers in New Mexico, remains in second place with 14 victories, nine seconds and five thirds from 65 starts. His winning percentage is a fine .215.

Other members of the top ten trainers include R. Frank Thompson, Jack W. Brooks, Clifford C. Lambert, Gerald E. Marr, Rex D. Brooks, Jan G. Arnett, Jimmie D. Claridge and Jack W. Dube.

Racing resumes on Thursday at Ruidoso Downs with six trial races for the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity. Each race will be at four furlongs and will offer a purse of \$1,900. The races will be run as the first, second, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth events.

The six winners will automatically advance to the final four trials with an estimated purse of \$100,000. There will be a special drawing among the six second-place finishers for the final four berths.

Racing continues Friday with trial races for the Rainbow Derby, the second leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses. Each trial will be at 440 yards with a purse of \$1,900.

Saturday's main event will be the third running of the Norgor Thoroughbred Derby at six furlongs. The winner of this chase for three-year-olds will collect \$15,232 from the total purse of \$30,465.

Sunday's feature will be the second running of the Rainbow Silver Cup at 440

yards for four-year-olds. The winner will gain \$75,192.50 from the total purse of \$150,385.

Such outstanding competitors as Rule The Deck, Mighty Deck Three and Luck's Gay Chic will compete in the season's first major contest for older quarter horses.

A NIGHT ON THE TOWN

The Incredible an experience in fine dining

Taken in its literal sense, "going out to dinner" simply means partaking of the evening meal someplace other than at home.

But when certain elements are present—such as pre-planning and anticipation, and wise choice of a dining establishment—going out to dinner can be one of life's finest pleasures.

Our recent dining experience at the Incredible qualified as one of those times. We were a few minutes late for our 7 p.m. reservation. The Incredible, located just north of the junction of Highway 37 and the Ski Run Road, is a 15-minute drive from downtown Ruidoso.

Co-owner Jennie Smith greeted Cathy and me and seated us next to a window looking out on the pines.

"People have been eyeing your table," Jennie noted with a smile. Indeed, several diners were waiting. Reservations are a good idea at the Incredible, especially on weekends.

Our waitress, Lise Centre, introduced herself and gave us our menus. We read the welcome message on the first page, "... it is our wish to make your visit one you will savor."

A feeling of regard for the customer was also reflected in Lise's request that we sign the guest book of the Incredible. That seemed to bode well for what was to come, and it did.

We munched with gusto on "starters" of fried mushrooms and zucchini.

A tasty salad of bibb lettuce with the house dressing, ranch, whet our appetites

for the main course. Sunflower seeds in the salad and bits of garlic bread toast enhanced the greens.

Cathy and I both opted for combinations. She chose steak and lobster. I, knowing the Incredible's reputation for prime rib, picked that cut and lobster.

When Lise set my plate down, I'm sure I got an "Incredulous" look on my face. I had to feast my eyes for a time before reaching for my fork. In fact, the meal looked so good I took a picture of it.

With the first bite, my taste buds confirmed what my eyes had discovered—this was a rare treat.

There is nothing in the world quite like lobster drawn in butter. And when you want to get down to some serious beef eating, prime rib is the way to go.

Enjoying them together, as I certainly did at The Incredible, seemed to set off and multiply the attributes of each. Cathy, the steak eater in the family, was equally impressed with her entree.

The horseradish sauce, which complemented the beef nicely, deserves mention, too. A baked potato completed the feast.

Later, in speaking with the Incredible's other owner, Tom Dorgan, I learned that our experience was in keeping with the stated aim of the eatery.

"Our philosophy of the Incredible is to serve ample portions of high quality food," said Tom. Something else the restaurant offers is a wide variety of dishes—the largest entree selection of any place in town, according to Dorgan.

Our combinations topped the price list at \$18.95, but dinners start at \$6.25. Besides prime rib, steaks and seafood, diners may choose from veal, chicken and pasta dishes, plus Southwest favorites like chicken fried steak and bar-b-que pork ribs.

A children's menu, for youngsters 12 and under, is available as well.

The Incredible wine list also offers a wide selection, with Blue Nun Liebfraumilch a featured choice.

We were feeling quite content by the time the last morsels of beef and lobster had disappeared from our plates. But when Lise wondered if we would like some dessert, we asked, "What do you have?"

Her description of the first item, Mud Pie, prompted us to try that. We weren't disappointed. This delicious concoction of chocolate and vanilla custard and whipped cream topped with pecans on a pastry crust was worth writing home about.

Sipping an after-dinner coffee, it was easy to feel at peace with the world.

But our night on the town was young, and the strums of blue grass music from the lounge brought us out of our reverie and drew us that way.

Inside, the Garbanzo Brothers were holding forth. Marshall Trembley and Jay Castleberry take the stage at the Incredible lounge at 9 p.m. Thursday through Sunday.

Their blend of down home music and humor makes for good time listening. And those boys can pick!

Marshall on the mandolin did a slow to very fast-tempo version of "Greensleeves," accompanied by Jay on guitar, that was well received by a mixed audience of waiting dinner clientele and good, ole' boys and girls there for the music.

The Garbanzos also harmonized nicely on The Band's "Up on Cripple Creek," with the racetrack in the song being, of course, Ruidoso Downs.

"Niki Hoy," a hula number complete with swaying gestures, is another popular number. Marshall and Jay seem to really enjoy entertaining, and they obviously work hard at putting a good show together.

When we left the Incredible, we knew we had gone to the right place for "a night on the town."

Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

MARK GORDON
RULE THE DECK posted her sixth consecutive victory while setting the fastest qualifying time for the second running of the Rainbow Silver Cup. The Scout Leader mare zipped to a 21.81 clocking while scoring a three fourths length victory over Mighty Deck Three in Thursday's third trial heat at 440 yards. Ridden by regular rider Jack Wallace, Rule The Deck looked sharp in recording her 15th lifetime victory for trainer R. D. Hay. She's collected \$248,526 for owner Dirk Jones of Lubbock, Texas. As a two-year-old, Rule The Deck won five races with three seconds and one third in 10 outings for earnings of \$47,314. As a three-year-old, she tallied eight triumphs with one second and one third from 13 appearances for winnings of \$177,672. This year, she has won both her Ruidoso Downs outings for winnings of \$3,540. Rule The Deck started her current winning streak by capturing two races last September at the New Mexico State Fair meeting in Albuquerque, then won twice in October at Trinity Meadows at Weatherford, Texas. Perhaps her best effort was running third, just a neck behind Higheasterjet in last August's \$1 million All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

IN THURSDAY'S TRIALS, four horses qualified from the third division, while three each qualified from the first and second divisions. The Rainbow Silver Cup is set for June 20 at 440 yards. The winner will collect \$75,192.50 from the total purse of \$150,385. The complete list of qualifiers and their times: Rule The Deck (21.81); Mighty Deck Three (21.90); Lucks Gay Chic (21.91); Baby Hold On (21.97); Dr Depot (22.02); Runnin Barre (22.02); Kiss A Toad (22.09); Layover Charlie (22.11); Midland Native (22.14); Angies Dancer (22.14).

MIGHTY DECK THREE also performed admirably in his 1982 debut. The Mighty Deck gelding ran second, less than one length behind Rule the Deck, and recorded the second fastest qualifying time (21.90) for the Rainbow Silver Cup. He started just five times last season as a three-year-old, gaining one victory (a West Texas Derby trial race win at Sunland Park) with one second. He earned \$17,642. As a two-year-old, he was brilliant. He won his first four races at Eureka Downs in Kansas and then won five straight Ruidoso Downs events, including the \$587,500 Rainbow Futurity,

the middle jewel of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses. He finally suffered a setback when he dropped a nose decision to Higheasterjet in the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity on Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs. He was a 2-5 favorite in the final leg of the Triple Crown. Overall, during his magnificent two-year-old campaign, Mighty Deck Three won 10 races with one second and one third in 12 outings. He earned \$528,960. Owned by Timothy and Dana Guidry of Canadian, Texas, Mighty Deck Three is trained by G. Blane Wood.

THE COMBINATION of trainer Bob E. Arnett and owner Hugh C. Preston Jr. of Burkhurst, Texas, qualified two horses to the Norgor Thoroughbred Derby following Friday's two trial races. Sail On Home, who finished fourth in the first trial heat, and pride Of Loom, who was second in the second division, each earned a position in the finale at Ruidoso Downs on Saturday afternoon. The winner of the six-furlong chase will collect \$15,232.83 from the total purse of \$30,465.66. Perhaps the horse who will be the favorite in that race for three-year-olds will be Real Speculation. The Real Value colt turned in a 1:14 1/5 clocking, the second-fastest six-furlong clocking here this season. He stalked the early pacesetter Pride Of Loom, and then Richard Bickel asked him for his best during the stretch and he gradually pulled away. Real Speculation's best career effort was running second to Plucky Hussy in the 1981 edition of the prestigious Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park.

APPRENTICE RIDERS Casey Lambert and Mike Lidberg each won three races during Friday's program. Lambert scored with Wonga Tonga (\$4.60) in the second and on Pockelpurse (\$5.00) in the seventh race. Both horses were trained by Clifford C. Lambert. Casey won the 12th race on Da Da Sa Ke Do (\$14.20) for owner-trainer Ken L. Hirst. Lidberg tallied wins aboard Polley Dancer (\$6.40) in the fourth and on Via Moon (\$6.80) in the sixth. Both horses are trained by Bob E. Arnett. Lidberg also triumphed on Merry Mermald (\$14.60) in the eighth race for trainer L. Z. Roberts.

SIX SEASONAL FASTEST TIMES were set over the weekend, four of them on Thursday. Deckem Easy raced to a 17.88 for the 350 yards; Rule The Deck was timed in 21.81 for the 440 yards; Likanero had a 1:21 4/5 for the six and a half furlongs

and John Cameron topped the seven furlongs in 1:38 3/5. On Saturday, Hemptens Chicagay ran the 400 yards in 20.11. Sunday, Codi Mundi snapped his seasonal fastest time at 550 yards clocked at 27.48.

JOCKEY STEVE HARRIS shook off the soreness of a slight mishap on Saturday to win on both his mounts on Sunday. Harris injured his leg while pulling up Solamente who won Saturday's 11th race. The accident occurred about halfway down the backstretch after the three-year-old Viking gelding scored a frontrunning one and one half length victory at 550 yards. Harris returned on Sunday to guide Henri Pen (\$3.80) to win the third race at 440 yards for trainer Rex D. Brooks and then scored with Imaladysman (\$3.60) in the fifth race for trainer A. Ted Simon. It was the blond rider's second consecutive triumph aboard Imaladysman.

SHORT SHRIFT IS BECOMING one of the area's better 370-yard sprinters. The three-year-old Sold Short gelding won his second straight race at the distance when he rallied through the stretch to post a one-length win in Sunday's fourth race. His first 10 career starts were at the regular quarter horse distances, but he proved he could negotiate the additional distance when he zipped to an easy four-length victory over Mr Wise Dancer at Ruidoso Downs on June 4. His clocking of 46.76, at that time, was a seasonal fastest time. That race was for horses running for a \$4,000 claiming price. His time on Sunday against \$7,500 claiming horses was 47.53. He has been claimed from his last three races. His latest owner is Carl D. Youens and his new trainer is William F. Leach. In 12 career outings, Short Shrift has collected three triumphs with two thirds in 12 appearances.

RICHARD BICKEL BECAME the second jockey to pilot four winners in a single program when he accomplished the feat on Sunday's card. The veteran rider tallied with Casey D Chase (\$4.40) in the second for trainer R. Frank Thompson, dead-heat with Ailegiance (\$2.80) in the seventh for Fred Danley; won on Short Shrift (\$4.40) in the fourth and then captured the 12th with Atom Sam (\$11.80). Gerald E. Marr trains Short Shrift and Atom Sam.

Peoples' choices running true

Wagering favorites enjoyed another successful weekend at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Nineteen of the 48 public selections posted victories for a fine winning average of 39.5 percent, better than the national average of around 32 percent. In addition, 31 of the 48 favorites finished first, second or third for an in-the-money average of 64.5 percent.

Through the first six weekends of this season's 76-day meeting, 103 of 263 betting favorites have posted wins. That's a good 39.1 winning percentage. The favorites have also finished in one of the top three positions in 176 of the 263 races for an in-the-money average of 68.9 percent.

Favorites won six races on Thursday, three each on Friday and Saturday and took seven on Sunday.

Favorites dominated Sunday's 12-race program as six straight public choices posted victories. The streak started in the second with Casey D Chase (\$4.40), continued with Henri Pin (\$3.60) in the third, Short Shrift (\$4.40) in the fourth, Imaladysman (\$3.60) in the fifth, Coda Mundi (\$5.40) in the sixth and ended when Ailegiance dead-heat for the win (2.80) in the seventh. Stormy Sailing also won the eleventh race as \$5.40 favorite.

The weekend's biggest favorite, My Going Jesse, won the seventh race on Saturday, returning \$3.00 as a 1-2 choice.

The highest-priced favorite over the weekend was Stash II, who paid \$7.00 while capturing Saturday's ninth race.



Rule The Deck seeks to rule Sunday's running of Rainbow Silver Cup

Rule The Deck seeks her seventh consecutive victory in Sunday's featured second running of the Rainbow Silver Cup at Ruidoso Downs.

The 440-yard chase for four-year-olds is the season's first major event for older quarter horses. The winner will collect \$75,192.50 from the total purse of \$150,385. Rule The Deck has simply been awesome in her current winning streak. The Scout Leader mare started her skein last September at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque by winning two races, including the New Mexico Derby at 490-yards. She then won two races at Frinity Meadows in Weatherford, Texas.

The New Mexico-bred speedster opened her 1982 campaign with a head win over Rumin Barre on May 30 in an allowance race over 400 yards.

In her Rainbow Silver Cup trial race last Thursday, she zipped to a three-fourths length victory over Mighty Deck Three in 21:81, the fastest qualifying time of the 10 Silver Cup entrants.

While Rule The Deck has been spectacular in her last six outings, she has been impressive throughout her three-year racing career.

As a two-year-old, Rule The Deck won five races with three seconds and one third in 10 outings for earnings of \$67,314. Last season, as a three-year-old, she scored eight wins with one second and one third in 13 appearances for earnings of \$177,672.

Trained by R. D. Hay for Dirk Jones of Lubbock, Texas, Rule The Deck has won 15 career starts and earnings of \$248,526.

Veteran rider Jack Wallace will again be in the controls on Rule The Deck in the Rainbow Silver Cup.

Mighty Deck Three, a sensation two years ago during his two-year-old season, was clocked in 21:90, the second-fastest qualifying reading.

Although he lost by less than one length to Rule The Deck in last Thursday's third trial race, Mighty Deck Three showed he will be a potent factor in the Silver Cup.

The Mighty Deck gelding opened his juvenile season with four wins at Eureka Downs in Kansas. He then captured five straight races at Ruidoso Downs, including the \$587,500 Rainbow Futurity. He suffered his first setback by dropping a nose decision to Higheasterjet Labor Day in the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity at

Ruidoso Downs.

Still, Mighty Deck Three won 10 races with one second and one third in 12 outings for winnings of \$628,980 in a fabulous two-year-old campaign.

Mighty Deck Three's three-year-old season was less than spectacular. He raced just five times, scoring one victory and one second and earnings of \$17,642. His last victory was on March 27 at Sunland Park in a trial race for the 1981 West Texas Derby.

Trained by G. Blane Wood for owners Timothy and Dana Guidry of Canadian, Texas, Eddie Vallejos rode Mighty Deck Three in his trial race.

Lucks Gay Chic, who had the third-fastest qualifying time, is also a threat.

The What Luck horse swept to a three-fourths length win over Dr Depot in the first trial race in a rapid 21:97. The black horse had won three straight races dating back to last August at Ruidoso Downs when he posted a one and one-fourth length win in the \$146,000 All-American Derby Consolation.

In 16 career outings, Lucks Gay Chic has compiled a magnificent record of 11 victories with three seconds. He's made

\$98,181.

Trained by Hugh Tucker for the Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma, Lucks Gay Chic has not been worse than second since his last race during his two-year-old season in 1980.

Two Silver Cup entrants participated in the 1979 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs.


Baby Hold On was purchased for \$46,000 while Layover Charlie was a bargain at \$7,500.

Baby Hold On raced to the fourth-fastest qualifying time with a 21:97 while running third behind Rule The Deck and Mighty Deck Three in the final trial heat. She has the biggest 1982 money line with earnings of \$42,365, including a win in the Miss Peninsula Handicap over 400 yards on April 4 at Bay Meadows near San Francisco, California.

Layover Charlie, a Jet Charger gelding, had the eighth-fastest qualifying time while running second to Kiss A Toad in the

second trial heat. He's won two races with two seconds in five appearances this season.

Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity trials Thursday


A total of 58 two-year-olds have entered six Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity trials on Thursday at Ruidoso Downs. Each race will be at four furlongs with a purse of \$1,000. Each winner will automatically earn a berth in the finale on June 27 with an estimated purse of \$100,000. There will be a special drawing among the six second-place finishers for the final four positions. The races will be carded as the first, second, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth events on Thursday's 12-race program. While there are numerous standouts in the six trials, perhaps the two most noticeable entrants are Sundays Payday and Impressive Lad. Sundays Payday has won his last two races in most impressive style. Following a sixth-place run in his career debut at Ruidoso Downs on May 9, he swept to an easy victory by almost five lengths against maidens on May 16 at four furlongs. His time was a fine :47 3-5. His next race was even better. He rallied strongly through the stretch to gain a one and one-half length verdict over Sunnily Smashed in a four-furlong allowance chase

on May 30. His time of :47 2-5 tied for the fastest half-mile reading this season at the mountain track. Overall, the Loom colt has two wins in three outings for trainer Bob E. Arnett. He's made \$3,592 for owner Hugh C. Preston Jr. of Burkburnett, Texas. Sundays Payday will compete against nine foes in the 12th race. He will again be ridden by apprentice Mike Lidberg. Impressive Lad, meanwhile, will face eight opponents in the first race. His last race was a driving neck win over stablemate Cue Me First on June 5 in the \$63,469 Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at four furlongs at Ruidoso Downs. The First Impression gelding was second for much of the early running, then swung to the rail and held off Cue Me First. His time of :47 2-5 tied Sundays Payday for the meet's fastest four-furlong reading. Overall, Impressive Lad has two victories with one second and one third in five appearances for trainer J. Michael Welch. He's earned \$33,688 for the 440 Ranch of Aubrey, Texas. Of the eight horses who were supplemented into the Norgor, each at a cost

of \$2,500, Running Bucket has perhaps the best credentials. The Insubordination colt's best outing in his three lifetime runs was a second-place effort, just a length behind Twist Her on May 2 in the prestigious Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park. With a purse of \$318,190, the Riley Allison Futurity was the richest race in the history of the west El Paso, Texas, track.

Other key entrants include Sand Digger, Irish Jo Jo and Hard And Hold in the 10th race, and Sunnily Smashed in the 11th event. Racing continues Friday with trial races for the Rainbow Derby, the second leg in the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses. Each trial will be at 440 yards with a purse of \$30,465.

Sunday's feature will be the second running of the Rainbow Silver Cup at 440 yards for four-year-olds. The winner will gain \$78,192.50 from the total purse of \$150,385. Such outstanding competitors as Rule The Deck, Mighty Deck Three and Lucks Gay Chic will compete in the season's first major contest for older quarter horses. Post time for each day's program will be 1 p.m., with the exception of Friday, when post time is 12 noon.

Lucks Gay Chic's hard days behind?

 Hugh Tucker won't find many who will disagree with his assessment of Lucks Gay Chic.
 "He's a grand-looking horse," said the veteran trainer of his shiny black horse who will be one of the favorites in Sunday's second running of the Rainbow Silver Cup at Ruidoso Downs.
 "I suspected all along he was going to be pretty good," Tucker said. "He broke his maiden in his first out at Ruidoso Downs (on July 20, 1980). We thought at the time he'd be good."
 Lucks Gay Chic hasn't done anything to change that initial analysis. He should like Sunday's distance of 440 yards in this classic for four-year-old quarter horses. The winner of the season's first major test for older quarter horses will earn \$75,192.50 from the total purse of \$150,385.
 Lucks Gay Chic had the third-fastest qualifying time with a 21:91 while winning last Thursday's first trial heat by almost one length. He has now won three straight races dating back to last August when he scored a one-and-one-quarter-length win in the \$146,000 All-American Derby Consolation at Ruidoso Downs.
 "I thought he was one of the hard luck colts last year," Tucker said. "I felt he was finalist material for the major races last year. His only bad race was in the All-American Derby trials. He coliced the night before his trial (yet still ran second to the eventual Derby winner Higheaster-jet)."

Then Dr. Tommy Bullard of Weatherford, Texas, performed surgery on both his front knees last September.
 Since the What Luck horse has won both races this year, he's obviously recovered from his physical problems.
 "We're really pleased with him," said the veteran trainer. "It seems like he's really sound. Jacky (rider Jacky Martin) said he was really full of run last Thursday."
 At the beginning of his career, Lucks Gay Chic had trouble breaking from the gate.
 "He stumbled at the start when he was a two-year-old. We finally got him to break from a tailgate and he's broken all right since," he explained. "In his trial race (as a two-year-old) for the All-American Futurity, he fell right on his nose at the start. He came back to win an allowance race later that summer. But then in his trial race for the Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity, he was right back to his old tricks. He had trouble at the start. But no more."
 In fact, except for those times when he stumbled as a two-year-old, Lucks Gay Chic has been either first or second in every race. In 16 career outings, he's tallied 11 victories with three seconds. He's earned \$93,181 for the Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma.
 Tucker also trained Lucks Chic Gay, Lucks Gay Chic's full brother who is a five-year-old. Lucks Chic Gay won the 1978 All-

American Congress race at River Downs in Cincinnati. He's now standing at stud in Ohio.
 "Lucks Gay Chic is excellent to train. He has a mind of his own, but he loves to run," Tucker said.
 Lucks Gay Chic must outrun nine foes, including the two horses who set faster qualifying times — Rule The Deck and Mighty Deck Three.
 Rule The Deck will seek her seventh straight victory in the Rainbow Silver Cup after winning her trail race by almost one length and setting the fastest qualifying time of 21:81. In a brilliant career, the Scout Leader mare has posted 15 victories and earnings of \$248,526.
 She's trained by R. D. Hay for owner Dirk Jones of Lubbock, Texas.
 Mighty Deck Three, who ran second to Rule The Deck in last Thursday's third trial heat, had the second fastest qualifying time of 20:09. As a two-year-old he was magnificent, winning 10 races with one second and one third in 12 outings. He won the \$387,500 Rainbow Futurity and finished second, just a nose behind Higheaster-jet in the \$1,250,000 All-American Futurity.
 Although he only raced five times last year, Mighty Deck Three is still a tough horse to defeat.
 The Rainbow Silver Cup will be the 10th race on Sunday's 12-race program. Post time will be 1 p.m.
