# Voters approve dam

Ruidoso voters Tuesday gave overwhelming approval to the \$8 million water capital improvements program, passing a one percent sales tax and two bond issues to finance the program by a two-to-one margin.

The village council immediately set the wheels in motion to acquire the 50-acre site in Grindstone Canyon which is to hold a 1,000 acre foot storage reservoir and a new water treatment plant.

Village manager Jim Hine called the number of voters "by far the greatest turnout we've ever had in any special election." A total of 836 ballots were cast, including three absentee ballots.

Interestingly, the absentee votes were two "for" and one "against," which paralleled the overall ratio.

Hine pointed out that the turnout for the election nearly doubled the previous record of 439 voters for a special election, set in September 1981 when voters approved restaurant beer and wine licenses.

On the first of three questions on Tuesday's ballot—whether to impose a one percent gross receipts tax, with revenue earmarked for water improvements—there were 560 votes for and 288 votes against.

On the second question—whether to issue \$6 million in revenue bonds for improving the water system—there were 548 votes for and 287 votes against.

On the third question—whether to issue \$2 million in general obligation bonds for water improvements—there were 556 votes for and 282 against.

The village council met in special session Wednesday morning to canvass the election results. Councilman Al Junge

made a statement thanking the voters.

He said that the electorate has placed faith in the council, and that the bond money will be spent exactly as planned. He added that regular progress reports on the project will be made to the public.

Junge also stated that the one percent sales tax will not become effective until January 1, 1983. Village officials believe they will be able to issue bonds at less than the 14 percent interest rate which was mentioned before the election, he indicated.

Junge acknowledged that the improvements program "was not the easiest thing (for voters) to understand." "Sorry we put 'em through such a trauma," he added.

Village attorney Lee Huckstep suggested to the council that the village immediately select an appraiser and condemnation attorneys in preparation for condemnation proceedings on the 50-acre site.

Huckstep explained that the normal procedure would be for the village to select one appraiser while the landowner, Don Dorman, selects another. In some cases, he added, a third appraiser is selected by the other two.

The village will also possibly want to seek an "order of preliminary entry," Huckstep said. This would allow engineers access to the Grindstone dam site before the actual purchase of the land.

Junge suggested that a committee be formed to "ride herd" on the water system improvements project. Councilman Frank Sawyer agreed with the idea.

"We've promised—and I want to

deliver," said Sawyer.

Councilmen also discussed two other water-related matters. It was agreed that council representatives will attempt to meet with "Bones" Wright and other owners of land between the old and new wastewater treatment plants.

The village is protesting an application by Wright and others to drill a shallow well to supplement water rights on the Rio Ruidoso, while landowners between the plants are protesting the change in the village's effluent discharge point to the new plant site at Biscuit Hill.

A special meeting was set for 5:30 p.m. Tuesday between councilmen and representatives of Fawn Ridge Subdivision. Fawn Ridge has had a protest pending against ground water use by the village for some time, and the council Wednesday indicated a desire to resolve the matter.

Huckstep also reported to the council Wednesday on the water slide at the swimming pool. He said the District Court instructed the village to accept a check from Sierra Enterprises for a judgment owed. The slide was to have been sold by the village Monday, but the sale was cancelled when the check was offered.

The attorney also said the court has given Sierra Enterprises until the end of this month to remove the slide and restore the premises. Huckstep added that the court indicated it would use its contempt powers against the company and its officers if those conditions are not met.

Hine reported to council that he received a first payment on an unpaid fuel bill from Sundance Helicopter, with another payment expected next month.

## Hilton foes given standing

District Judge George Zimmerman ruled Tuesday that petitioners do have legal standing to appeal a decision by the Ruidoso board of trustees (councilmen) to rezone the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club site from R-2 (multi-family dwellings) to C-1 (light commercial) for construction of a Hilton Inn.

Zimmerman said following a hearing on a motion to dismiss the petition that he will assume such is the case unless a review of the records convinces him otherwise. He will hear oral argument on the case Tuesday, July 20, at 1:30 p.m. in Carrizozo.

The petition for review of the April 13 decision of the Ruidoso council was submitted by B. F. and Ann Phillips and Jerry and Myrna Rheadasil, owners of property adjacent to the Racquet Club site.

A motion for dismissal of the petition was subsequently submitted by Frank Coppler, attorney from Santa Fe representing the village in the case.

Ruidoso attorney Charles Hawthorne, representing Sierra West Limited (SWL), owners of the site in question, then filed a petition for intervention. This petition claims that the interests of the village are not identical with those of SWL, so SWL's interests in the case are not adequately represented by the village.

Zimmerman accepted the petition for intervention.

Coppler attempted Tuesday to persuade the judge that the appellants have no legal standing to appeal the case. An appeal, he argued, "requires proof of adverse effect" of the decision on the petitioners.

"The petition did not allege any kind of special damage will befall the petitioners as a result of the rezoning," Coppler contended.

The only evidence of damage to the appellants submitted before the village council's March 22 hearing was a potential traffic problem to be created by a hotel, he argued. Any time an area is rezoned from residential to commercial, there will be additional traffic, Coppler explained.

In similar cases in Alabama, Nebraska

and Michigan, the attorney pointed out, this argument was not sufficient to prove that an individual landowner had been aggrieved.

Testimony of witnesses at the village hearing provided conflicting evidence about whether the appellants' property would be harmed by construction of a hotel in the area, Coppler reported.

Roswell attorney Richard Olson argued on behalf of the petitioners that they are presumptively aggrieved by the zoning decision. Olson stated that the petitioners have been damaged by owning property immediately adjacent to a tract zoned commercial.

The attorney also cited objections to spot zoning, the de novo hearing held by the village council, the petitioners not having received notice of the hearing, and an alleged improper vote of the Ruidoso governing body.

Judge Zimmerman announced his decision to hear the case after he reviews the records, and indicated he wishes to resolve it as soon as possible.

## Aspen Festival band contest looking for bands of all sizes

Discussion of a high school marching band competition in the 1982 Aspen Festival highlighted yesterday's Aspen Festival Committee meeting.

With only four committee members present, the group decided to contact marching band units of all sizes throughout the state and invite them to participate in Ruidoso's Aspen Festival.

The decision was made after Ruidoso High School band director Danny Flores reported to Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth that AAAA high school bands would probably be unable to come to Ruidoso due to two large marching bands competitions the weekends prior to and after Aspen Festival.

Although Flores was not present to report directly to the committee, he had informed Jungbluth that major high school marching bands from Roswell and Alamogordo could probably be counted on if transportation expenses are paid by the Aspen Festival Committee.

Estimated costs of bringing bands from Roswell and Alamogordo to Ruidoso are \$2,500, Jungbluth said.

"Needless to say, I'm extremely disappointed," stated Aspen Festival Committee chairman Richard Sandoval upon hearing the status of the marching bands and upon learning that Flores would not make the meeting.

"We've got to start someplace," commented Chamber president Morgan Clough about the committee's strong desire to have a marching band contest with or without the big marching bands.

Committee member Archer Wilson gave his support to the idea by expressing that smaller bands should also be given a chance to compete and earn awards.

"I'd enjoy a 30-piece band that's really trying," Sandoval said.

Jungbluth suggested that professional band directors be asked to judge the bands. He said professionals are qualified to judge the bands and will add lend credibility to possible band contests in the future.

Depending on the response from high

school band leaders throughout the state, different marching band classes will be set up. Scholarships for the winning band in each size category will be awarded. Clough added that scholarship money could be used by bands for instruments, uniforms, or however they see fit.

In other Aspen Festival Committee business, a professional-amateur bowling tournament was discussed. The tournament, to be coordinated by Roger Marshall, will be Chamber sponsored. Marshall expects to gross \$3,600, said Jungbluth. Sandoval commented that the event must be looked into to make sure it meets Chamber standards.

Jungbluth mentioned that the Ruidoso Businessmen's Association (RBA) continues to make plans for the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival despite the refusal of the American Motorcycle Association to sanction the event.

All other Aspen Festival projects are being worked on, said Jungbluth. He added that the Aspen Festival poster currently being designed by J. D. Yaokum will be ready sometime next week.

## P & Z postpones action on Grindstone development

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Wednesday postponed action on the preliminary plat of Grindstone Canyon Estates for the second straight month because of continued uncertainty whether easements for the Grindstone water project will cross developed property, which would increase prices to acquire land for the easements.

Grindstone developer Don Dorman voiced anger over the postponement, saying he has been "waiting in abeyance ... for one full year" to go through with his planned 632-unit development.

Dorman asked for P&Z approval on the first phase of the 300-acre project in June. But P&Z tabled the matter because of confusion whether easements for water transmission lines in the project would conflict with developed property.

At the June meeting, P&Z tabled consideration of the development until after the July 6 election. Now that the water project has been approved, the same questions caused the commission to again postpone action on the proposal.

Dorman plans to build 220 single family homes, 88 townhouses, 220 condominiums, stacked apartment buildings, a 21-acre recreation area and a 14-acre conference center around the planned reservoir.

The site also includes space for the 50 acres that will be condemned for the dam, reservoir, treatment plant, transmission lines and water storage tank that voters approved in the water bond election Tuesday.

P&Z is still concerned there will be conflicts with water transmission lines crossing developed property.

P&Z member Tom Kelham expressed the commission's predicament if it approves Dorman's project and causes the village to pay more to condemn land if the lines—particularly the pipe from the treatment plant to a water storage tank that will be located west of the reservoir—cut across land tabbed for development.

"Today it's undeveloped land," Kelham said, "if the plotting is approved, it will increase prices for condemning land for the transmission line."

Dorman cautioned that, if the village "rapes and pillages" property he hopes to develop, then Ruidoso will have to pay for "damages (if) arbitrary routes go across property."

He continued by asking: why run the line through property, "when it could be done just as well in the roadway?"

Dorman said: "I'm not trying to force the issue, I'm trying to preserve my capital and move forward with ownership of the property."

The developer also had a brief exchange with P&Z chairman John Schuller regarding promises Dorman said he received that easements for the lines would con-

form to his street plans.

Dorman said Fred Burns and Jake Vigil of Boyle Engineering assured him when he was working on preliminary plans for the development in June 1981 that the transmission line would follow the streets.

Schuller said the "mutual agreement was not completely proper" because only the village council is authorized to make such assurances.

Commission member George Shoemaker posed questions that he said "should go back to the council."

He said several things bothered him about the project, including access into the Grindstone area, right-of-way for the main sewage line and whether the council wishes to consider a development with "600 more (water) taps" before the new reservoir is completed.

Schuller added that approval of the bond issue has put P&Z in a "better position to accomplish objectives" regarding the development.

"It's a question of timing," Schuller said. "Now that we know where we stand, now is the time to make the various judgements."

But the chairman suggested the matter be discussed in a workshop with commission members, Dorman and the council within the next two weeks to resolve the uncertainties surrounding the development.

Dorman reminded P&Z that workshops previously were proposed on the matter,

but never came to light. But he said he would put his "fate in the hands of the commission and the city."

P&Z postponed Dorman's request and agreed to schedule the workshop within two weeks.

In other business, the commission denied a request by R. C. Buckner to rezone a parcel of property in Paradise Canyon from R-1 (single-family dwellings) to C-1 (light commercial).

Buckner said he owns buildings that previously were used for commercial endeavors on two lots at the 90-degree curve in Paradise Canyon, but, he said, he learned the entire area is zoned residential.

When asked what he planned to do with the lots, he said he wanted the zoning changed to C-1 "to enhance the value" of the property for resale.

Kelham told Buckner that P&Z is "precluded by regulations for rezoning solely to enhance (property) value. It has to be for the public good," he said.

Police Chief Richard Swenor protested the change. Swenor, who lives in the area, argued that the property "is not suitable in any way, shape or form for commercial property."

He added that the curve has the third highest accident rate in the village. P&Z denied the rezoning request.

In other matters, P&Z:

—Denied a request from Clay Adams for a front lot line variance of 10 feet on a lot in White Fir Subdivision. Adams requested the variance for a structure to be located adjacent to the Rio Ruidoso in the Upper Canyon. P&Z turned down the request, asking Adams if the house could be situated closer to the river to allow the required 20-foot setback from the street.

—Approved a vacation of right-of-way on Alamogordo Street in the Ruidoso Springs Subdivision for Alma Russell. Russell, who owns property on both sides of the street where she requested the restriction on right-of-way, said she envisioned building a greenhouse into the side of a hill where the street comes to a dead end.

Russell also asked that the village open the street to the lots—numbers five, six and seven—so she could have access to the area. Schuller said it would be an expensive project and asked that the request be placed in committee for study. The commission concurred with Schuller's request.

—Denied a request from Doy Christian for a rear lot line variance of 10 feet on Lot 5, Block 3, in Country Club Estates. Christian said she wanted the variance to build an addition onto her house. P&Z turned down the request on the basis that Christian has alternatives to alter the house in a way that will not encroach on lot line setbacks.

—Tabled a request from Jack Yates for a front lot line variance of seven-and-a-half feet on Lot 3, Block 5 in Paradise Canyon.

—Approved a replat of E/2, Lot 35 and all of Lot 34 in the White Fir Subdivision for Mike Callahan.

—Approved a replat of Lots 13 and 14, and a replat of Block I, K, and M, in the Middle Cedar Subdivision (county) for Otis Pearson.

—Approved the final plat of A Touch of Texas townhouse project for the Stinson Development Company after P&Z determined the project conformed to village planning requirements. The project will consist of 24 units and will be located west of Southwest Children's Home, near the Green Meadows Addition.

—Approved a land transfer on Chipmunk Avenue, Bingo Street, Forrest Lane and a part of Tract H between the Ruidoso Land Company and the Village of Ruidoso.

—Approved a replat of Eagle Creek West Condominiums for Eagle Creek West, Incorporated.

—Approved the final plat of Unit 4, Del Norte Addition for Alex Adams.

—Approved a petition for exchange of 30 feet of right-of-way for property upon which road already exists in Lot 1, Tract Q, in Palmer Gateway for Bill Hirschfield.

—Approved a right-of-way for Lot 1, Block D in Red Cedar Subdivision.

—Approved the final plat of High Ridge Condominiums for Paul Southwick.

# Building tops \$3 million for fourth straight month

Building permits issued last month in Ruidoso topped the \$3 million mark for the fourth month in a row.

The June figure was \$3,442,306 for 49 permits. It compares to the May total of \$3,149,328 and the April mark of over \$5 million which set the all-time monthly high in Ruidoso. The March figure was \$3,175,780.

June was the second month for which value of building permits was based on actual building costs—a change from the previous valuation of \$20 per square foot

for each permit issued.

The new method was required by the state in May so permit values would more accurately reflect building costs. Planning and Zoning enforcement officer John Cupp said estimated permit values now run anywhere from \$15 to \$100 per square foot.

The June 1981 figure was \$1,743,020 for 47 permits issued. The total so far this year stands at \$18,141,614 for 278 permits, which compares to \$10,243,759 for 277 permits at this time last year, which shows a 77 percent increase.

Permits were issued in June for 38 single family dwellings, five residential additions or alterations, five commercial buildings,

and one condominium project.

## Financing programs explained to Realtors

Grant Gist, a Pioneer Savings and Trust vice president and manager of the local branch of Pioneer, explained the myriad of financing programs which are now available in a Ruidoso Board of Realtors meeting Tuesday.

"The good news is that we still have money. The bad news is that it's expensive," Gist told the Realtors.

The regular conventional loan has a fixed rate of 16.75 percent and carries a call option in New Mexico, stated Gist.

The second loan type which Gist mentioned is the conventional one-year adjustable rate mortgage (ARM). The note's rate and payment is adjusted annually

based on the movement of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board (FHLBB) average rate on existing homes. The index is currently at 15.390 percent.

A conventional five-year ARM is also available through Pioneer, said Gist. The note's rate and payment are adjusted every five years based on the movement of the weekly average of the five-year United States Treasury Securities. This index is published weekly and is currently 14.9 percent.

The Lincoln or graduated payment/adjustable rate mortgage plan (GPARM), involves a deferred interest, noted Gist. It is a very popular plan, he said, especially in Ruidoso.

The deferred interest plus the original principal balance will never exceed 125

percent of the original loan, said Gist. The note is tied to the six-month T-Bill monthly average, which is currently running at 12.22 percent.

The Affordability Plus program is another GPARM. It, too, is tied to five-year United States Treasury Securities. Each year for the first five years, the payment will increase seven-and-one-half percent. It is then recast to the then current rate for the next five years.

Every five years thereafter, the rate and payment are adjusted. The borrower has a "one time option" at the beginning of the sixth year to limit the payment increase to seven-and-one-half percent per year for five more years or until the payment rate equals the interest rate, whichever is sooner, Gist explained.

Gist mentioned five other loan options which Pioneer is currently offering. They are: the Builder Commitment loan; the Seasonal Resort; the Jumbo Conventional; Federal New Mortgage Act Resale and Refinance; and a Pioneer Resale and Refinance.

In other MLS related business, Ruidoso Board of Realtors president Janet Warlick Pearson announced that a Texas Instruments representative will be in Ruidoso Saturday, July 24, to conduct a seminar on the use of the business calculator.

Gary Lynch received nominations to be the Ruidoso candidate for the state Realtors association citizen of the year award.

## Village and county officials to meet with FAA

Village and county officials will be meeting with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) personnel today to try to negotiate an arrangement for purchase of a parcel of Ruidoso airport land for construction of a county courthouse sub-office.

The meeting was arranged after FAA officials rejected an agreement between the village and county for purchase of the one-and-a-half acres north of the Ruidoso administrative center by the county for \$75,000. The sum would be paid off in ten annual \$7,500 installments, with no interest.

The county had originally planned to lease the land, but the \$75,000 appraised

value would require payments of about \$9,000 a year, making the tract too expensive to lease.

FAA, as regulatory authority over the airport land, must approve any lease or sale agreement.

Ruidoso mayor George White, county commissioner Ben Hall and county manager Truman A. "Bill" Billingsley will travel to Albuquerque to meet with officials at the airport's district office to discuss possible alternatives.

One item the county plans to negotiate with is an offer to pay cash for the land, it was decided at the last commissioners meeting.

"We may look at other approaches, too," Billingsley said Wednesday, although he would not elaborate on what they might be.

## July active on Lincoln

July activities on Lincoln National Forest are many and diverse. Hiking, camping, fishing, and sightseeing are among the most popular. Check with the ranger station in the District you plan to visit for most current information on recreation opportunities.

Visitors are reminded that campfire and smoking restrictions are still in effect, although there were some scattered showers last week. More rain is badly needed.

Smokey Bear Ranger District at Ruidoso has closed South Fork Campground until further notice because of water problems. Bonito Lake is being heavily fished. Streams are running low. Trails Number 19 (South Fork) and Number 33 (Blue Front) in the White Mountain Wilderness are blocked by downfalls. Other trails are open. Fuelwood areas are open. Permits are required for all fuelwood areas on Lincoln National Forest. Smokey Bear ranger station number is 257-4095.

Bears continue to visit campgrounds on the Cloudercroft District. Campers should keep food put away in cars. Ice chests and tents may be damaged by bears if food is left in them. Campfire programs are conducted at Silver Overflow Area Saturday evenings at dark. Pony and Joplin Fuelwood Areas are open. Wildflowers are beginning to bloom along Sunspot and Sacramento River Roads (FR 64 & 537). Cloudercroft's number is 682-2551.

Guadalupe Ranger District at Carlsbad reports that caving activity is moderate. Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is open for daytime use only. Trails and fuelwood areas are open. Guadalupe District number is 885-4181.

Mayhill Ranger District reminds motorists that no centerline and loose gravel make driving hazardous on New Mexico 82 between Cloudercroft and Mayhill. Water is low in Rio Penasco and Bear Canyon Lake, making fishing poor. Fuelwood areas are still closed. Mayhill's number is 887-3411.

## Civil Air Patrol to host open house at airport



## Chicks Etta Wind in Friday's trials

Chicks Etta Wind continues her quest for a Rainbow Futurity berth when she competes with 80 others in Friday's time trial races for the prestigious Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The swift filly won the Kansas Futurity, the first leg of the Triple Crown, on May 30 at Ruidoso Downs and will certainly be one of the key contenders in the nine 400-yard dashes on Friday.

The races, to be run as the third through the eleventh events, will each match nine horses for a purse of \$1,900.

The 10 fastest runners from Friday's heats will gain berths in the Rainbow Futurity over 400 yards on July 25. The second leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses will carry an estimated gross purse of \$700,000.

Friday's trials match the first and second place finishers from 42 elimination races run over the three-day period from June 23 through June 25.

Chicks Etta Wind was equally as brilliant in her trial race as she was when she recorded a one and one-quarter length win in the Kansas Futurity over 350 yards. The Chick's Etta Deck filly won by a

widening half-length in the 33rd Rainbow Futurity trial heat over Ease On Dallas. That was her fourth consecutive victory after opening her career with four unsuccessful tries to find the winner's circle.

She broke her maiden at Val Verde Downs in Del Rio, Texas, before capturing three straight wins at Ruidoso Downs.

By winning four of eight starts for trainer Johnny Bustamante, she's earned \$256,792 for owner Billy G. Francis of Lafayette, Louisiana. She will again be ridden by Rudy Bustamante in Friday's fifth race.

Another key threat is Call Me Favorite, who ran second to Chicks Etta Wind in the Kansas Futurity.

The victory Stride filly won three races with two seconds in five outings. She's collected \$115,924 for owner Clarence Scharbauer of Midland, Texas.

Call Me Favorite won her trial race by almost one length as a 1-9 favorite. Trained by Sandy Farris, Call Me Favorite will compete in the 10th race.

Glo Billy Sims is also a definite factor in the 10th race. The Little Glo gelding raced to a half-

length win in the fifth Rainbow elimination heat. He zipped to a 20.28 reading for the 400 yards, which was the fastest time of the 36 elimination division winners.

He opened his career with three unsuccessful outings, then really started to run with authority. He took a trial race for the Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park, gaining the fastest qualifying time, and then won the \$303,832 Sun Country Futurity on April 25 at Sunland Park.

Glo Billy Sims won a trial race at Ruidoso Downs for the Kansas Futurity before finishing third in a Kindergarten Futurity trial heat at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles, California.

Saturday's highlight will be the Jet Deck Stakes at 440 yards. Three-year-old and older quarter horses will compete under handicap weights. The purse will be \$6,500-added.

Sunday's feature will be the Rio Grande Stakes for New Mexico-bred runners. Three-year-old and older runners will compete under handicap weights over six furlongs. The purse will be \$6,000-added. Post time for each day's 12-race card will be 1 p.m.

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



## Artist displays glass creations at CMCC

Tijeras artist Jim Boardman displayed several of his glass creations Monday in the Cree Meadows Country Club banquet room.

Boardman brought with him a sampling of his specialties—glass horses and other animals, and barbacks done in stained glass and pen and ink etchings on glass.

Two of Boardman's favorite subjects are Rocket Wrangler and Padron. Rocket Wrangler is one of the top ten breeding quarter horse stallions, and Padron is the top Arabian stallion competing in the international Arabian Horse Show in Louisville, Kentucky. Both stained glass pieces are in the \$15,000 price range.

However, Boardman's skilled work sells for as low as \$85 for his custom-made branding iron designs. Using a person's or ranch's initials, Boardman comes up with a design for a branding iron. Some of the designs are actually used for branding irons, but many people simply display the pen and ink on glass drawings as paintings in their dens or living rooms.

Boardman grew up in Gallup and has had extensive engineering and art training. He's worked in almost every art medium: metals, enamels, watercolors, oils, sculpture and air brushing.

Glass, though, has captured Boardman's imagination at the moment.

When asked why he prefers working with glass, Boardman responded, "Because your art is restricted to cuts and colors... It's a challenge to find the colors."

"In every one of these pictures, there's no duplication of any sort. I can give you the lines, but not the exact colors again," added Boardman.

Although Boardman has done creative drawing all his life, his roots lie in automotive and aircraft engineering. In his younger years, Boardman designed show vehicles.

"The last show car I built (the Demon)

held the number two position nationally in a year-long showing. That's against everything—boats, cars, motorcycles, everything," commented Boardman.

At the present time, Boardman is designing a custom built vehicle for paraplegics. He is constructing the three-wheeler to accommodate individuals' handicaps and to allow for easy handling, entering and exiting of the vehicle.

As well as attending many courses in engineering and art all over the world, Boardman himself has taught. However, Boardman claims to be his own greatest teacher.

"Somebody tells you something can't be done and you do it," he stated.

For those who missed Boardman's exhibition, the Tijeras artist said he will return to Ruidoso soon when his kachina spiritual work is completed.

# Carrizo Lodge offering full schedule of art school classes

Despite continuing construction work on expansion and renovation of facilities, Carrizo Lodge, on Carrizo Canyon Road, is again offering a full schedule of art workshops throughout the summer.

The art school classes at Carrizo Lodge have been offered annually since 1956, when Frederic Taubes, a Polish-born artist and teacher of international renown, discovered the lodge and began teaching the first art workshops.

Carrizo Lodge art workshops continue to attract artists and teachers from across the country to instruct classes in oil, watercolor and acrylic painting, porcelain art, calligraphy and stained glass, among others.

Courses currently being taught, through July 16, include transparent watercolor painting by Naomi Brotherton of Dallas, Texas; and the integration of watercolor, oil and acrylics by Carl Cogar of Las Cruces.

Porcelain art classes will be available for the first time at Carrizo Lodge, taught by Ruidoso artist Paula White July 19-30. This class is designed for students with a basic art background or experience in porcelain painting. Classes are limited to 16 students. White is a well known teacher and demonstrator in the porcelain art field and has exhibited in shows throughout the United States.

Oil painting classes taught by Jean Green of Olton, Texas, will be offered July 19-24. This workshop is for beginning and intermediate students who wish to improve their skills and broaden their painting experience.

Ben Konis of Amarillo, Texas, will also be teaching at the lodge July 19-30 and August 2-13. His first workshop will include sessions in portraiture, figure painting, still life and landscape. The second workshop will be limited to advanced students and will include studio and on location painting.

Konis, who has taught at Carrizo Lodge and other art schools for more than 10

years, stresses individual attention in his classes and is considered a truly inspiring art instructor.

Workshops will also be offered August 2-13, including one in watercolor by Danny Gamble of Canyon, Texas; mastering acrylics—florals, landscapes and still life—by Victoria Runge of Norman, Oklahoma; transparent watercolor by Virginia W. King of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; oil painting—landscapes, wildflowers and still life—by Maxine McLaugh of Little Rock, Arkansas; and watercolor by Sheila Boylan Parsons of Conway, Arkansas.

Summer classes will conclude with workshops to be taught August 16-27. Scottsdale, Arizona, artist Dick Phillips will teach watercolor for novice, intermediate and advanced students; pastel and oil painting of portraits and landscapes will be taught by Albert Handell of Woodstock, New York; and Jan de Ruth of New York, New York, will teach portrait painting—painting the nude.

There will be winners in the championship flight, first flight and second flight. A new car will also be given out to the first person to get a hole-in-one on the 15th hole today.

The July 4 weekend had both good and bad points for the United States in international sports competition.

There were all-American finals in both the men's and women's singles competitions at the Wimbledon tennis tournament in England. Jimmy Connors defeated John McEnroe in five sets for the men's title and Martina Navratilova toppled Chris Evert Lloyd for the women's championship.

However, on the track and field scene, America didn't come out so well. The Soviet Union defeated the United States in a dual meet in Indiana Friday and Saturday. Both the American men and women lost their separate meets.

The American men's loss was especially heartbreaking because the meet was decided when the United States' first runner in the 1,600 meter relay pulled a muscle and was unable to finish his leg. Thus, the Russians won the event (traditionally an American stronghold) and took the team victory by a narrow margin.

The Soviet women have generally beaten the United States women since the track series between the superpowers was started in 1958. However, the American men have won almost every time the meet has been held and to lose on American soil was especially frustrating.

Los Angeles will host the 1984 Summer Olympics and traditionally the host country has done well in Olympic competition. Perhaps the loss to the Russians will help Americans prepare for the Los Angeles games.

But the United States hasn't won the overall team title in the Olympics since 1952, the first year the Soviet Union entered the competition.

The Olympics were originally started in ancient Greece with the individual as the focal point, not countries.

However, the modern Olympics (which were started in 1896) have seen politics and team scoring take precedent over individual competition.

Since the Russians first entered the Olympics 30 years ago, team scoring has taken on an even bigger part.

Many observers have seen the Olympics as part of the "cold war" between the Soviets and the United States.

The Soviet Union has won every team championship in the Olympics since 1956 mainly because its athletes are supported by the state and the Russians put greater emphasis on "amateur sports" than the United States does.

Most people in this country don't really take an interest in the Olympics until the year it's scheduled to take place. Even then, many people show little or no interest in the Olympics.

The United States has a golden opportunity to break the Soviet Union's stranglehold on the Olympics in Los Angeles.

However, the American athletes will need more than a "home" advantage to topple the Russians in the total points standings.

The Soviet Union's strengths are in virtually every sport on the Olympic schedule. In comparison, American athletes excel in track, basketball, swimming, boxing and sometimes shooting, but little else.

For a country of over 200,000,000 people with a great abundance of natural talent and a tremendous amount of wealth (despite the current sluggish economy), the United States does not do nearly as well as it's capable of doing in the Olympics.

Hopefully, the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles will signal the beginning of a vastly improved United States amateur sports program.

If the United States falls short in Los Angeles, it may be a long time before this country can compete in overall Olympic competition with the Soviet Union.



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
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



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

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

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

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

# Locust and aspen trees thrive in higher elevations



**QUAKING ASPEN** is so named because the slender, flattened leafstalks enable the leaves to tremble in the slightest breeze, states Southwestern Trees, a reference book. Larry Anklam, Forest Service range conservationist and wildlife officer, said aspens grow

in the higher mountain elevations and usually replace Douglas firs after they have burned. This was probably planted. Aspens also serve as a nourishing food source for elk and other mountain animals eating the tree's leaves and soft bark.

This is the first in a series of picture pages intended to help both Ruidoso visitors and local residents identify some of the many varieties of trees in the area. The locust and the aspen are both deciduous trees. Deciduous trees shed their foliage at the end of a growing period, as opposed to conifer trees, which remain green—thus the name evergreen.

According to range conservation and wildlife officer Larry Anklam of the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the United States Forest Service, the New Mexican locust grows alongside sloped drainage bottoms and creek bottoms.

Anklam added that the New Mexican locust has a tendency to thrive in burned or other disturbed nature areas. "Southwestern Trees: A Guide to the Native Species of New Mexico and Arizona"—a Forest Service publication—states that because of the locust's rapid growth, it is of special value for erosion control.

*Robinia neo-mexicana*, the locust, is also called the southwestern locust. Southwestern Tree describes it as a spiny shrub or small tree up to 25 feet tall and eight inches in trunk diameter.

The New Mexican locust's leaves are feather-like in that leaflets are arranged directly opposite each other. The leaflets are elliptical, one-half to one-and-a-half inches long. Adult leaflets are bristle-tipped, thin and pale blue-green in color.

Anklam mentioned that the locust produces a pretty and large flower grown in clusters. Between May and August, the three-quarters inch long, pealike locust

flower is purplish pink and fragrant.

The locust is widely distributed in the Sacramento Mountains at 4,000 to 8,500 feet elevations. It commonly forms thickets on north-facing slopes and is associated with Gambel oak, ponderosa pine and upper pinon-juniper woodland.

*Populus tremuloides*, the quaking aspen, is a popular, if not populous, tree in the Ruidoso area. The Aspen Festival, an annual Ruidoso event in the fall, celebrates the changing of the aspen leaves' color.

Also known as the golden aspen, the quaking asp and trembling poplar, the aspen's leaf blades are nearly round, short-pointed, rounded at the base and finely saw-toothed. Southwestern Trees states that the aspen's leaves are shiny green on top and dull green below. The leaves turn gold and orange in autumn before falling.

Anklam noted that the vast aspen stands high up in the Sacramentos are most likely the result of past fires. Aspens may be found in the upper part of the Lincoln National Forest's thick ponderosa pine forests.

Aspens grow high in the mountains and plateaus—6,500 to 10,000 feet elevations. Aspens are predominant on cool, shaded mountain slopes, in canyons, and along streams.

Identification is made easy by the smooth whitish bark. The tree is a favorite among persons who carve their initials into the soft white bark, but visitors to the forest are urged to enjoy the trees in their natural state, and to leave them that way.



**THE NEW MEXICAN LOCUST**, like the aspen, usually grows in burned or disturbed nature areas, noted Larry Anklam. He added they can often be found thriving along side slopes and drainage bottoms. This

locust was found alongside a graded road in Cedar Creek, which Anklam said was typical for the erosion-controlling New Mexican locust.

# Thoroughbred sale is end of this month

Rick Henson is anxious for his first test as Director of Horse Sales for Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated.

"You bet I'm looking forward to the thoroughbred sale. It's the first sale that I've gone the complete cycle on. The horses will start arriving on July 28 so we have to get the stalls bedded and ready for them," said Henson.

The 10th Annual Summer Sale for Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings is set for two sessions for the first time in its history. Sessions will be held Friday, July 30, and Saturday, July 31, starting at 7:30 p.m. each night in the All-American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs track grounds.

A total of 160 thoroughbred yearlings have been cataloged and 80 will be sold each night.

"That's a gain of 59 percent for horses cataloged over last year," said Henson, who manages the Summer Thoroughbred Sale as well as the five-day All-American Select Sale of Quarter Horse Yearlings later this summer. "This is the second year this sale has been restricted to thoroughbred yearlings which guarantees its continued growth. We're pleased the sale has grown because it shows how attractive the sale has become."

Henson said sale catalogs are now available. Horsemen desiring sale catalogs should contact Henson in writing at the All-American Sales Arena, Ruidoso Downs Race Track, P.O. Box 449, Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico 88345.

Each thoroughbred sale yearling is nominated to six major futurities at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park. These 1983 futurities consist of the \$300,000 (estimated) Riley Allison Futurity and the \$60,000 (estimated) Sunland Fall Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park; the \$60,000 (estimated) Rio Grande Kindergarten and the Rio Grande Futurity (for New Mexico bred); the \$100,000 (estimated) Norgor Futurity and the \$125,000 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

In addition, for the first time, all yearlings who pass through the sale ring for purchase or repurchase are eligible for the \$15,000-added Thoroughbred Sale Futurity set for Sunland Park in the fall of 1983.

Henson said numerous outstanding mares and sires are represented at this year's sale.

A year ago, a Duck Dance colt out of Tamalle Pie brought the top sale price of \$36,000. This year, a Duck Dance filly out of Tamalle Pie will be offered for sale by the same consignor, John L. Shaw of Jacksonville, Florida.

Other outstanding mares represented include such fine Southwest campaigners as Charlotte C., Dancing Straw, Juliets Doll and Staronade.

Among the leading sires are such standouts as Draconic, Master Salls, Well Mannered, Master Hand, Plenty Old, Impressive, Platoon Leader, King Of The

Castle, Nativo, Bold Clarion and Loom, who has sired the last two winners (Pride Of Loom and Sundays Payday) of the prestigious Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity, the richest thoroughbred race ever run at Ruidoso Downs.

Henson said Rancho Jonata of Buellton, California, will be the largest consignor at this summer's sale with 10 head. Don Brooks of the Westbrook Farms of Hereford, Texas, has consigned seven head, while the H. B. Ranch of Huntsville, Texas; Ralph Johnson of Campo, Colorado, and Jack Barnes of Altus, Oklahoma, have each consigned six yearlings.

Other prominent names on the consignors' list include Jess Burner of El Paso, Texas; V. J. Callaway of Hobbs; the Fairweather Farms of Navasota, Texas; S. F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas; Hobeau

Farm of Ocala, Florida; Carl Lee Kemp of Dimmitt, Texas; John L. May of Fort Stockton, Texas; and the Three C Racing Stables of Pampa, Texas.

Henson said Tom Hammond of Lexington, Kentucky, will return as the announcer while the auctioneers will again be Bill Tackett of Collinsville, Oklahoma, and Keith Babb of Monroe, Louisiana.

"We have a much, much better selection of mares and sires this year as well as having such a large increase in the number of horses to sell," Henson said. "To quote Jacky Brewer, our sales coordinator, the Summer Sale is like having a small salad before a great big dinner. We do everything the same for the Summer Sale we do for the All-American, except it's on a smaller scale. We want everything to be right with the thoroughbred sale."

## Henson takes over as racing secretary

Rick Henson, director of Horse Sales for Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, will also serve as racing secretary for the remainder of the current Ruidoso Downs season, announced General Manager R. Wood Erwin.

The move came about when Don Rausch this week resigned his post as racing secretary of both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

General Manager Erwin said: "Don was a good racing secretary, and I'm sorry to see him leave. He wanted a two-year contract, but we don't have any two-year contracts to give him. I couldn't do anything for him."

Erwin also announced that Henson, whose main duties are the management of the Ruidoso Summer Sale for Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings and the All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale, will take over as interim racing secretary at Ruidoso Downs.

"Rick will be filling in as racing secretary for the time being," Erwin said.

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# Monjeau lookout tower has served 50 years

For 50 years, Forest Service lookouts have watched the mountains and valleys around Ruidoso from a fortress-like structure on top of Monjeau Peak. The original Monjeau tower was constructed of wood in 1932, under a federal works program, as a much-needed fire observation post for the White Mountain District of Lincoln National Forest.

Herbert Traylor, a long-time area resident, recalls that his father was the first lookout to serve on Monjeau tower. Before the tower was erected, Mr. Traylor often rode horseback to the top of Monjeau Mountain, where, seated on the rock outcrop on the crest of the peak, he would scan the area for smoke. Monjeau, at an elevation of 9,841 feet, offers a panoramic view of the mountains and valleys around Ruidoso, Capitan, and Fort Stanton.

In 1936, the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) replaced the wooden structure with the massive rock tower still used today. Monjeau tower is important historically because it is an excellent example of the stic construction typical of the CCC.

The main purpose of Monjeau tower is as a fire observation post, but the lookout also records weather data. When lightning and thunderstorms enter the area, the lookouts report several fires in one day from lightning strikes. Lookouts spot and report any fires from lightning strikes, to pinpoint the fire, and to report on the fire's progress. Mr. Traylor mentioned one lightning strike that hit near the tower and there was fire all around. "Richard Owens, the lookout presently stationed on Monjeau, commented that the lightning storms "can get pretty scary."

Monjeau lookouts report an average of five fires per season. Causes vary, but most of the fires result from people's

carelessness. The Dam Fire in 1958, the Salazar Fire in 1960, and smaller fires too numerous to mention, were caused by smoking. The Arroyo Fire, reported by the Monjeau lookout during hunting season in November 1970, began with a cigarette spark from a hunter's vehicle. A more wretched event is an incendiary fire, such as the Gavilan Fire, discovered from Monjeau tower in May of 1967, which burned over 1700 acres. That fire was of primary concern because it was so close to the densely populated area near Ruidoso.

Sightseers often make the drive to Monjeau for the spectacular view. Mr. Traylor recounted an incident that occurred in the 1960s, when some tourists drove up to the tower one day with a very small dog. The lookout heard a woman screaming, and then saw that an eagle had the little dog and was flying away with it. The eagle and dog disappeared over Roadmaker Canyon. The lady was quite infuriated and thought the Forest Service should be held responsible.

Monjeau was named for a Frenchman, C. Monjeau, who had a mining claim in the Bonito Creek area prior to 1882. Early settlers in the area began calling the mountain "Monjeau"; and about 1920 a land developer, trying to sell sites for summer homes near Carrizozo, first printed the name on his maps.

Monjeau tower is located at the end of Forest Road 117, which runs northwest from N.M. 532 about six miles. The unpaved road is quite rough and steep in some areas, requiring a slow rate of speed and a sharp eye for protruding rocks. Skyline and Monjeau Campgrounds are located at varying elevations along the road, and are pleasant viewing spots for picnickers and sightseers.

# Carrizozo crime jumps

The crime rate has taken a huge jump in Carrizozo during the past 35 days. Recently this south-central New Mexico community of 1,222 persons has experienced a crime wave of staggering proportions. In the past five weeks three burglaries and six vandalism have been reported to Carrizozo police.

The first incident occurred May 29, when vandals spray-painted the words "Carrizozo Locos" on a fence at English Hardware Store.

Two nights later someone broke into Jackie's Bar and took two six packs of beer and a half pint of whisky. Indications are the burglarly will be solved by local and state police officers.

On June 6, vandals again hit Carrizozo when five barrels of dirt were rolled into the streets, creating a traffic hazard.

Two days later, still another burglary was reported. A local resident reported someone had entered her home and taken two stereo speakers and an equalizer with a total value of about \$1,300.

Also on June 8, Nickel's Hardware in Carrizozo reported that someone had fired a BB pellet through the front window. The same offender is suspected of firing a BB pellet through a window in a truck parked

near another business.

On June 9, still another BB pellet hole was found in a window at the Gift Gallery and more BB holes were found in windows at the Grocery Basket. Later the same day, BB dents were found on the new gym door at Carrizozo High School.

Then on June 16, the swimming pool was burglarized. The offenders had stolen some money from the office and also from a soft drink machine. The loss was estimated between \$50 to \$100.

While none of these crimes will ever make it to the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted List," the crime spree has Carrizozo residents fuming and plans are afoot to start a Crime Stoppers program.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of this series of crimes.

Anyone having any information is asked to call State Crime Stoppers at its toll-free number, 1-900-432-6933. Callers do not have to reveal their identities. Of course, State Crime Stoppers also pays cash rewards for information leading to the solution of other major crimes in addition to the "Crime of the Week."

# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE**—On July 15, watch to see who is allowed to run unopposed. That will help tell you whether we can expect another conservative coalition in the House of Representatives next year. Republicans are having some trouble making up their minds about whether to stay with that coalition group or not. Maybe, the thinking goes, this might be the year to strike for a pure Republican majority in the House, instead of continuing an arrangement which gives Republicans power only as long as they cooperate with Democrats in the other party.

The current House has 42 Democrats and 28 Republicans. If the GOP could gain seven seats from the other party, they'd have absolute control.

That's got to be something of a temptation to Corky Morris, the state Republican boss, who might like to get his name into the history books for having been chairman when his party succeeded in capturing the House.

But to push for total takeover that could be a sweet arrangement.

That's the one under which conservative Democrats have politely seen to it that important Republicans in the House had no opposition in their runs for office, while Republicans were equally kind to them.

That cozy kind of cooperation has helped keep the Democratic-Republican coalition afloat.

If Republicans decide instead to go for all the marbles, they could end up upsetting everything.

That date of July 15, mentioned at the end of this column, is when Governor King has called for members of major parties who intend to run for the Legislature to declare themselves.

It will stand as the official day only if the courts fail to decide otherwise.

That could well happen. If it doesn't, and King's call stands, Democratic and Republican candidates for the Legislature are expected to declare for office that day, bringing with them petitions in the proper number to support their candidacy. Candidates in districts which fall within a single county declare themselves to their county clerk. Candidates for multi-county districts have to travel to Santa Fe with their petitions and make their declaration to the Secretary of State.

Other types of candidates have to take action at an earlier date.

If you want to be a write-in candidate, you have to declare that fact by July 12. You don't need any petitions from supporters; just your word will do. If you haven't declared by that time, however, no votes in your name will be counted later.

If you're a candidate from an officially registered "minor" party or you want to run as an independent, you have to sign in by July 13. You'll need lots of petitions, too, for either of those categories.

All that is true, as we say, unless the courts tell us otherwise.

\*\*\*  
Lots of folks think Jack Schmitt swept to the nomination as Republican candidate for U. S. Senator without a dissenting vote.

Not so. Schmitt's plurality was a mere 99.99 percent of the Republican votes cast.

Orrin Hatch, his write-in opponent, got five votes on June 1.

Schmitt, by the way, has a bill in the Senate hopper which would force the Census Bureau to compile its reports in 1990 and thereafter on a precinct-by-precinct basis.

That would make districting a whole lot easier.

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## Harrison Schmitt Reports To NEW MEXICO

"There is no price tag on freedom" There is no greater calling than the defense of freedom. What good is independence without a defense of that independence...without a willingness to defend that independence and freedom. Our search for peace must never place life at a higher value than freedom.

History shows us one thing with certainty: Men and women eventually place a higher value on freedom, both religious and political, than on life itself. The early Christians, our own fight for independence, the pangs of civil war, two world wars, Hungary, Afghanistan and Poland are but a few examples. As we honor our national colors, and our day for independence, we pay striking tribute to such sacrifices for freedom and country above life. Many of our comrades in arms or in space have paid the ultimate price, or lie disabled, to preserve freedom and country for their families, their fellow Americans and for mankind. We must never forget them.

Today we are faced, as were the defenders of freedom before us, with an unrelenting challenge from another civilization of oppression. For our times, the champion of this civilization of expression is the Soviet Union.

In honor of those who have sacrificed in the past, we must look at what we face in the future. In my service on the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee and the Intelligence Committee of the Senate, I have come to see the total scope of this modern threat to freedom.

Remember, there is no nuclear freeze movement in the Soviet Union.

There is nothing more precious than freedom and independence. We have offered our lives to protect it.

We must always be willing to do so again.

## Sense & Nonsense

"Stop the ride, I want to get off." Independent farmers in New Mexico and across the nation are stuck on a financial merry-go-round, facing a bleak future of lower and lower prices for their crops and eventual extinction of the family farm we know it today in America.

That's a scary thought. If present trends continue in the marketplace, the only cultural operations that will survive are corporate farms with the ability to dominate the marketplace and have prices set at will. With less and less farmers producing more and more of our food, the margin of error in years of poor harvests will no longer exist and food shortages will occur.

What effect would this have on consumers? Based on a study I requested of the Congressional Budget Office, there would be very little significant change in food prices. Farm prices for wheat and rice account for only 15 percent of the consumer's dollar spent on cereals and bakery products. At most, this program might cause food prices to rise by about 1 percent, raising the Consumer Price Index by .2 percent.

However, benefits to family farms and farm income would be substantial. Net revenues would increase since higher crop prices in combination with diversion payments and reduced production costs would offset the lower production levels and reduced deficiency payments. More important, though, is that farmers would receive a larger share of their income from domestic and foreign consumers and a smaller share from the federal government and reduction in surplus grain stocks would improve their prospects for increased benefits in 1984-1985.

Clearly, making payments to farmers for not planting crops is inconsistent with this country's trend to getting the government out of the marketplace. However, given the circumstances of this crisis, I see no other choice but a short-term acreage diversion program to save our independent family farmers. Agriculture is New Mexico's largest private industry outside of oil and mining and history shows that agriculture made New Mexico possible. Without short-term help to pull them from the brink of bankruptcy, independent family farms will cease to exist. Their future, New Mexico's future, and the future of all Americans rests on our action. They deserve that fighting chance.

Secretary John Block to institute a paid acreage diversion program for wheat, corn, rice, and upland cotton as an emergency measure to save the independent family farmer. My plan combines the current voluntary acreage reduction program with a paid acreage diversion program, in which farmers would voluntarily set aside 15 percent of their acreage and receive payment for up to 10 percent additional land they set aside. Paying this small amount of money to farmers now would produce an overall savings of \$3.9 billion in reduced deficiency payments and smaller quantities stored in the loan program.

### WESTERN HEROINE

Many authors have written about the American West, but few have ever taken as much trouble to understand Apache Indians as Eve Ball.

Born in Kentucky and raised in Kansas, when Ms. Ball moved to New Mexico, she lived a short distance from the Mescalero Apache Reservation. She earned the Indians' friendship and confidence and, over the years has written books that show tremendous insight into their daily lives.

Thus, it was really no surprise when the Western Writers of America honored her at its Santa Fe convention last week with its top award, the Saddleman Award, for the "outstanding contributions to the history and legend of the West."

Now a spry, young 92, she has written dozens of books chronicling the life of the Apaches Indians, which span 33 years of effort. Those first efforts were struggles—publishers were reluctant to print anything based solely on interview—but the final results were books like "Idea, An Apache Odyssey," "My Girlhood among Outlaws" and "In the Days of Victoria."

A past winner of the organization's Golden Spur Award, she is still active and is busy writing another book.

Another Western legend live on. — El Paso Times.

### SPACE PROPAGANDA VICTORY

The Soviet Union has scored another propaganda victory over the United States by sending the first non-American Westerner into space.

The joint Soviet-French mission now under way marks the tenth time the Soviets have sent non-Russians into space. Apart from their own cosmonauts, the Soviets have sent pilots from Bulgaria, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Hungary, Poland and Vietnam into space.

The only joint manned space project involving the United States occurred seven years ago when American and Soviet space vessels linked up in space.

The earlier Soviet joint missions were

hailed by the Russians as proof of socialist friendship and unity. The latest mission provides the Soviets with new ammunition for extolling the mutual benefits of detente and East-West cooperation. And it drives another little wedge between the United States and socialist France.—Albuquerque Journal

### SMART DRIVING

Very soon, now, we will witness again the outward surge of people caught up in that annual phenomenon: the vacation trip. This calls for going from wherever you are to someplace else. Most do it by car.

That prompts a thought about getting there and back safely. Many things contribute to this, driving with care, avoiding alcohol, getting enough rest to assure alertness, and so on. A most interesting and significant event occurs every year at this time in Mescalero. Young Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT) maidens entering womanhood are honored by the tribe.

It is interesting because one is able to observe the sacred rites of a highly traditional culture based on totally different beliefs than the usual Anglo-Christian upbringing.

The significance of the puberty rites lies in the importance the Indian culture places upon the women; the bearers of children who will advance the Indian nation and continue its fine customs.

The annual puberty rites are the most important ceremony which MAT has carried on throughout the years. This year's six young maidens became the focus of the tribe for four days—an honor they deserve as future wives and mothers.

The ceremony began early Friday morning as the girls, wearing their traditional hand-tanned buckskin costumes, lined up in front of the Sacred Teepee where certain cultural rites took place.

Some of the religious meanings of the many symbols and objects used in the ritual are reserved for tribal members only, but it is clear that the maidens' motions are meant to instill good luck and health throughout their lives, said Evelyn Breuninger, MAT council member.

It seems many cultures and faiths have a ritual to honor the transition from childhood to adulthood. In orthodox Judaism, for instance, it is the 13-year-old boy entering manhood who is honored in the Bar Mitzvah ceremony. However, it is a refreshing change to see a culture honor its women rather than its men—especially in these post-ERA times.

The family of each maiden works very hard to prepare for the Annual Ceremonials, often a couple of years in advance. A buck must be caught, skinned and tanned, and then the buckskin costume may be made. Certain annual nuts and berries must be picked and prepared for traditional dishes. Hard to find teepee poles must be cut and peeled.

It is a long and arduous preparation process. The maidens help their mothers so they can learn the customs and methods of their ancestors.

Tiffany Torres, Veralyn Sylvia Platta, Aida Mae Davis, Jennifer Lester, Eivalyn Naiche, and Denise Valdez were the maidens taking part in this year's Annual Ceremony. They have earned the respect and honor of their tribe, and this reporter wishes them peace, health and happiness

during long and productive lives.

MAT has expanded upon the annual puberty rituals to include a variety of cultural and fun-filled activities throughout the weekend, and non-Indians are welcome to participate, too.

For instance, Saturday's events began with a four-mile foot race. At 10:30 a.m., the Third Annual Mescalero Parade got underway. The last entry didn't go by until close to 12 noon.

A horseshoe tournament took place every day. The famed Mescalero Rodeo began at 2 p.m.; and starting at 2:30 p.m., the American Indian Band of Northern New Mexico played. The Zuni Pueblo Dance Group and the MGM singers and dancers from Oklahoma entertained the crowds until suppertime.

After watching the great Indian entertainment all afternoon, the spectator begins to feel almost Indian and appreciate the spirit behind the dancing—although one should not expect to be accepted as anything other than a "White Eyes."

The illusion of living the Indian way of life is furthered at meal times. In keeping with the communal spirit of the tribe—and for good luck—families of the honored maidens serve lunch at mid-day and dinner in the evening to everybody for free. It is truly an experience to be savored.

For those not ready to try the native dishes shared by the families with the public, a variety of concession stands provided food and drink. Booths alongside the food concessions sold trinkets, crafts and souvenirs of the 1982 puberty rites to take home.

The most exciting event takes place after supper. First, Apache men and women perform the Apache War Dance and later engage in Apache social dancing. As the sun began to set and jackets and sweaters were put on, the huge bonfire was lit in the middle of the ceremonial grounds. The awesome Dance of the Mountain Gods was about to begin.

The Dance of the Mountain Gods has been performed by Apaches for many generations to drive away sickness and evil and to bring good health and fortune to the tribe.

The annual ceremonies are over for this year. Those who didn't have a chance to visit the sacred rituals this year should make it their business to attend next year. It's a new and stimulating sight, sound and smell experience.

The puberty rites not only offer everyone a chance to understand the Mescalero Apache customs and culture, but to understand themselves and their own faults as well.

which I was told is the forte of chef Jim Mangus.

To start off the evening, Pena suggested a bowl of Boula Boula as an appetizer. Intrigued by the Polynesian-sounding name, I agreed to try the concoction, while Charlotte selected a Pate Maison.

While waiting for the appetizers, I turned my attention to the listing of entrees and was pleasantly surprised to see a wide selection of courses at very reasonable prices.

I had my choice of mouth-watering delights such as Bay Scallops and Mushrooms, Beurre Blanc for \$9.75; Breast of Chicken Supreme, et Crabe (or Lobster) for \$10.95; Canadian Sole en Roulade, \$10.95; Shrimps De Jonghe en Cocotte, at \$12.50; or several other entrees topped off by a Planked London Broil for two at \$19.95.

Booth aptly terms the fare at the Brass Fan as "continental cuisine at American prices."

Desiring something out of the ordinary, I chose the Chicken with Crab, while Charlotte chose the Canadian Sole.

Having both decided to dine on white meat, we knew that white wine would be a must to complement the meal. The Brass Fan has a nice variety of French white wines, as well as some popular Californians.

Since we chose to dine on French Cuisine, we decided to toast the repast with a bottle of 1980 le Grande Cheneau Macon Village Blanc—moderately priced at \$12.50.

The appetizers arrived forthwith. Dipping into the Boula Boula without hesitation, I knew with the first spoonful why Pena recommended the soup. It is an interesting combination of spinach and oyster creme topped off with hollandaise sauce. Charlotte was just as pleased with her liver pate, which is wrapped in bacon to give it that extra touch.

Pena soon reappeared with the wine. He exhibited characteristics of a true sommelier as he uncorked the bottle and applied just the right touch as he poured the golden-nectar into my glass. The le Grande Cheneau had a fine bouquet and was crisp

on the palate, providing an appropriate temptation of the taste buds for the main course.

As the bottle cooled in a beautiful brass wine cooler, the sun set in all its fiery glory behind the Sacramento Mountains, creating an exaggerated red glow in the burgundy colored room. We sipped the light French wine and listened to the flutter of the fans.

Pena came out with a platter bearing the main course just in time to wake us out of our reverie.

Mangus had transformed the breast of chicken into a true gourmet meal. Stuffed with crabmeat and resting on wild and domestic rice, the fowl was topped with just the right amount of Thermidor sauce. Broccoli and asparagus accompanied the meal—making for a combination that was simply delicious.

Charlotte was equally as enchanted by

the way the Canadian sole was prepared. Sitting upright on the plate, the sole was wrapped around crab and lobster and covered with sauce Americaine. The course was also accompanied by a loaf of oven-fresh bread.

We leisurely dined and sipped on the wine—wistfully wishing that the meal would not end.

But alas, the last delectable morsel disappeared from the plate, and it was Pena's signal to bring out the dessert tray.

Pastry chef Reen Iserman created a select assortment of sweet delights that made choosing a difficult task. Huge rumballs were surrounded by slices of cheesecake, Black Forest chocolate cake, napoleons, and other delicacies.

I couldn't pass up the cheesecake, while Charlotte decided on a piece of the chocolate cake.

Marlan Maloy, The Brass Fan manager,

spoke with us after the superb meal.

When we related our enjoyable experience in the intimate setting of the Burgundy Room, he noted that that was precisely the atmosphere desired.

Maloy calls The Brass Fan a "city restaurant in a small town," a most appropriate description, I thought.

After our dining experience, we wandered down Sudderth and decided to stop in Nottingham's Pub. The beer garden at the pub evokes impressions of relaxing in an English neighborhood drinking establishment. The sunken garden is

accented with wood paneling and glass cabinets where bottles of several Nottingham's offerings are on display.

I felt like ordering a pint of stout and discussing the latest happenings at Buckingham Palace. Instead, from what is undoubtedly the town's widest selection of imported beers, I ordered a Beck's pilsner. And of course, one good Beck deserved another.

When the night came to an end, I reflected on the fact we had spent a night on the town by dining and drinking in European-style surroundings, while never leaving midtown Ruidoso.

## Stars and Stripes to Jackie Splash

Jackie Splash overcame fellow three-year-olds in Monday's first running of the Stars and Stripes Allowance at Ruidoso Downs and enriched himself by \$4,200.

The victory was the gelding's first of the Ruidoso season in five starts. It was also his third win of the year, and pushed him to the 882 bank account over the 10-grand-level.

The Stars and Stripes, the exclusive domain of three-year-olds, spanned the exciting seven and one-half furlong distance and offered a \$7,000 purse.

Three hopefuls in the seven-head field — Jackie Splash, Jack The Knife and Pocketpurse — were rated almost dead even by the fans. Each of the three carried 2-1 odds, but Pocketpurse was the actual favorite by a few dollars.

Jackie Splash, well rated by Joe Martinez under a light 109-pound load, hugged

the rail and saved plenty of ground during most of the journey. Jack The Knife, packing Salustio Burgos in a 117-pound impost, assumed a striking position near the front of the pack as the field reached the turn for home.

At the head of the lane, Jack The Knife wrenched the lead from the tiring 50-1 longshot, Tequilla Please.


But jockey Martinez, knowing it would be futile to stay on the rail, guided Jackie Splash three horses wide at the last turn and was well placed for a final assault. For an instant, it seemed Martinez intended to take Jackie Splash further outside to get around Jack The Knife, but he switched courses and slipped through between horses. That maneuver probably made the difference.

Jackie Splash was full of run when he

engaged Jack The Knife in the final half-furlong. He pulled away at the end to win by a neck in a sharp 1:34 2/5 seconds. The payoffs: \$6.60, \$3.20, \$2.80.

Jackie Splash is owned by Royal Foster Jr. and Finis Westbrook of Sterling City, Texas. Jack The Knife returned \$3.40 to place, \$2.40 to show. Pocketpurse ended up third, paying \$2.80.

A three-horse spill was triggered in the eighth race when Jean's Late Show, ridden by apprentice Casey Lambert, went wide at the first turn and struck other horses. Jean's Late Show, Atom Sam and Oban's Son went down. Jockey Mike Lidberg escaped serious injury, but jockey Richard Bickel and jockey Richard Bickel were taken to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. Lambert and Bickel also escaped serious injury.

Success follows Joe Martinez. The popular jockey had an outstanding weekend over the busy six days of holiday horse racing at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, culminating with a four-win day on Monday.

For winning 10 races over the week, Martinez gathered Jockey-of-the-Week honors for the ninth weekend of racing at the mountain track. The spree boosted Martinez from fourth place in the jockey standings to the runner-up berth.

Martinez captured two races on Thursday, Friday and Sunday. He also rode four winners for trainer Jimmie Claridge, who was named Trainer-of-the-Week for saddling six victors.

Martinez has 26 winners with 18 seconds and 28 thirds from 182 mounts. His winning percentage is .159.

Jacky Martin, however, remains the leader among the riders with 35 winners, 23 seconds and 20 thirds from 146 mounts. His winning percentage is a fine .246.

Other members of the top ten rider colony include Steve Harris, apprentice Mike Lidberg, Vickie Smallwood, apprentice Casey Lambert, Larry Byers, Richard Bickel and Leroy Coombs.

Claridge also enjoyed a fantastic weekend with six winners, which averaged a winner for each day. The four horses he and Martinez won with included I'm A Dancer Too (\$5.80) on Thursday, Rattle Box (\$10.60) on Friday and on Jackie Splash (\$6.60) in Sunday's featured Stars and Stripes allowance race and on Jimmylin (\$4.60) in Sunday's 11th race.

The productive weekend brought Claridge into fourth place in the trainer standings. He has saddled 13 winners with 15 seconds and 10 thirds from 87 starts. His winning percentage is .149.

William F. Leach continues to lead the trainers with 28 winners, 13 seconds and 19 thirds from 124 starts. His winning percentage is .230.

Bob E. Arnett is closing with 28 winners, 18 seconds and 11 thirds from 113 starts.

first leg of the Triple Crown on May 30, Call Me Favorite, who was second in the Kansas Futurity and Glo Billy Sims, who won the prestigious Sun Country Futurity on April 25 at Sunland Park.

Saturday's highlight will be the Jet Deck Stakes at 440 yards. Three-year-old and older quarter horses will compete under handicap weights. The purse will be \$6,500-added.

Sunday's feature will be the Rio Grande Stakes for New Mexico-bred runners. Three-year-old and older runners will compete under handicap weights over six furlongs. The purse will be \$6,000-added.

Post time for each day's 12-race card will be 1 p.m.

Over the busy ninth weekend of horse racing at the mountain track, betting favorites posted 26 victories from 72 races or a fine winning percentage of 36.1. In addition, 45 of the 72 public choices finished first, second or third for an in-the-money percentage of 62.5.

For the season, 187 of 453 favorites have won for a fine winning percentage of 41.2, which certainly ranks as one of the nation's highest winning favorite percentages. Besides that, 311 of the 453 public elections have finished in one of the money positions for a fine percentage of 68.6.

Over the six-day holiday weekend, favorites enjoyed their best days on Friday when eight won and on Thursday and Sunday when six paraded to the winner's circle. The favorites did worst on Wednesday when none won, on Monday when only two prevailed and on Saturday when four captured wins.

During Friday's excellent showing by favorites, seven consecutive betting choices won. The streak started with smooth Is News (\$4.20) in the third, continued with Kari L. (\$5.20) in the fourth, Special Dancer (\$3.40) in the fifth, Riverde Rebel (\$6.20) in the sixth, Real Alteration (\$3.40) in the seventh, Fill Mackish up (\$3.80) in the eighth and ended with Ride Of Loom (\$3.60) in the ninth.

Odds-on favorites (those horses who left the post at less than even money) also performed well over the holiday weekend. Ten of the 16 odds-on favorites won, while two were second, one finished third and three failed to finish among the top three.

The weekend's biggest favorite, Special Hank, did as expected winning the eighth race on Saturday as a 3-10 choice. He paid \$6.00 to win.

Cute Investment was the highest-priced winning favorite last Sunday's featured rainbow Derby.

## Dessa rancher Sonny Henderson new to Ruidoso-Sunland board

F. (Sonny) Henderson, a rancher from Dossa, Texas, is a newly elected member of Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated. Henderson will be one of the guiding forces behind the continued growth of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park. "My aim is to help make Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park two of the best tracks in this part of the country," he says flatly.

Henderson's background extends deeply into thoroughbred and quarter horse racing. Henderson is ideally suited for his responsibilities.

Henderson has been on a ranch since he was a child, but it wasn't until he first got into the horse business. Whether it was beginner's or plain horse sense, Henderson's venture turned into a remarkable success at the All-American Sale at

Ruidoso, and I spotted this pigeon-toed filly called Dream Rocket. I liked the way she looked — so I bought her, mostly on impulse. But I was also swayed by the fact I'd been impressed by her sire, Rocket Bar."

Dream Rocket made her racing debut on the Texas non-pari-mutuel circuit, and knocked off the Columbus Futurity. Later, she ran second in the Texas Futurity.

Henderson shipped her to Ruidoso Downs, where she came under the wing of the top quarter horse trainer, Jack Cascio, and finished fourth in the Kansas Futurity. Later in the summer, she qualified for the Rainbow Futurity, the second leg of the Triple Crown, but finished fifth.

At one point during the summer, she defeated Go Dick Go by a head in an allowance race. As luck would have it, she was matched against Go Dick Go in the finale of the All-American Futurity but finished sixth as Go Dick Go sped to victory. "I was snake-bit in those Triple Crown races that year," Henderson now smiles.

But it was a different story a few years later, when Henderson's great Jet Comanche finished second (by only a head) in the 1975 All-American Derby at Ruidoso. At year's end, he was named the nation's champion running gelding by the American Quarter Horse Association.

In 1976, Watch A Native carried the Henderson silks to victory in the Kansas Derby at Ruidoso. Two summers ago, Henderson's thoroughbred filly, Sunday's Night, captured the \$64,762 Norgor Futurity, and was later named the two-year-old thoroughbred filly of the meeting. She also picked up honors as the year's champion New Mexico-bred filly.

Henderson's current racing operation includes a 17-head stable at Ruidoso Downs, split almost evenly between thoroughbreds and quarter horses. Tommy Dean is his trainer. Henderson also has a seven-head string at Hollywood Park.

Ask him to name his best horse now in training, and he'll point to Answer To Music, a four-year-old who won the Rancho Santa Fe Stakes at Del Mar last year. He's now made about \$80,000. Henderson's filly, Matching, won in stakes competition

at the thoroughbred meeting at Los Alamitos.

Henderson's breeding operation includes such outstanding dams as Sister Fleet, Thirty One Jewels (winner of Sunland Park's rich Allison Thoroughbred Futurity), and Structural, a full sister to the thoroughbred stakes champ, Holst The Flag.

Henderson also owns shares in such world-famed thoroughbreds as Secretariat, Damascus, Barrera, J. O. Tobin and Cannonade.

There've been many highpoints in Henderson's career in racing, but perhaps few have been as gratifying as those provided by Watch A Native—and his victories over the great quarter horse, Dash For Cash.

"As a two-year-old, Watch A Native and Dash For Cash met three times—and Watch A Native won two of them," Henderson says.

But future highpoints in Henderson's track career may well be concerned almost as much with the fortunes of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park as his own racing and breeding enterprises.

## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

**PRIDE OF LOOM** won his fourth race in meeting when he led practically throughout in registering an easy four and ree-fourths length victory over Shortrift in Friday's ninth race at 870 yards. The speedy Loom gelding won an allowance race at five and one-half furlongs on May 9, then race third in the pen Stakes on May 15. He won the Memorial Day Handicap at five and one-half furlongs, ran second to Real Speculation in a Norgor Derby trial race and then on the \$30,465 Norgor Thoroughbred Derby on June 19. Trained by Bob E. Arnett Jr. owner Hugh C. Preston Jr. of Arkburnett, Texas, Pride of Loom has been ridden in all four triumphs by Vickie Mallwood. This season, Pride of Loom as four triumphs with one second and two thirds in 10 outings for earnings of \$25,147. He is the first horse to score four wins this season at Ruidoso Downs.

**BOLD EGO**, who won the 1980 Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park, ran second in an allowance race at six furlongs last Wednesday at Ak-Sar-Ben in Omaha, Nebraska. It was the four-year-old runner's first start since March 19. Bold Ego, under jockey Ken Jones, ran second throughout as a 2-5 selection to Incubator, who paid \$14.20 to win. Incubator won by three lengths in 1:10 2/5 over a track rated as sloppy. Bold Ego was scheduled to run in last year's Omaha Gold Cup, Ak-Sar-Ben's premier attraction for three-year-olds, but was scratched on race day because he injured a hoof. J. D. Barton from the Double B Ranch of Anthony, New

Mexico, who owns an interest in Bold Ego, said trainer Jack Van Berg is preparing Bold Ego for the Ak-Sar-Ben Handicap, a six furlong dash on July 16 which carries a \$50,000-added purse.

**BOTH EXTREMES WERE PAID** over the weekend in the trifecta wagering, where patrons attempt to select the first three finishers in order in the eighth race. On Saturday, the season's lowest trifecta was paid as Special Hank, a \$30-1 favorite won with By Going Jesse, the 5-2 second-choice, second and Mill Iron third. That payoff was a paltry \$19.40 snapping the previous low trifecta of \$40.20 on May 8 when Relelier, Texoma Charger and Duplicate Six placed in the first three positions in a Kansas Derby trial heat. On Sunday, Dimple Deena, who paid \$115,000 to win, won the eighth race with Sunny Mama, the 7-2 second-choice, second and Merry Mermaid third. That payoff was \$7,934.80, topping the previous biggest trifecta payoff of \$6,701.80 set on June 20 when Step And Count, Garfield Red and Sostanis combined in that effort.

The Saturday and Sunday trifecta handles were the two best of the season. The exotic wager is in its first year of operation at Ruidoso Downs and is rapidly gaining popularity. Sunday's handle was \$58,596 while Saturday's handle of \$57,937 was the second-best this year. The season's previous largest trifecta handle was \$51,056 set on May 30.

Sunday's Big Q pool of \$81,559 was the largest this season. The previous biggest Big Q pool was the \$73,728 wagered on Saturday's Big Q.

**DOUBLE B EXPRESS**, one of the Southwest's most durable handicap performers, won his third straight race when he zoomed through the stretch to post a one and one-half length win over pacesetter Captense in Saturday's featured \$13,525 Governor's Handicap. The seven-year-old Bold Tactics gelding started his streak by taking an allowance race at six and one-half furlongs on June 5. He then scored a half length win over Jiltaloom in the Mescalero Apache Handicap on June 13 at six and one-half furlongs. The Governor's Handicap win was Double B Express' 26th lifetime triumph from 85 starts. He's also scored 16 seconds and 12 thirds for earnings of \$179,972. He is trained by Clifford C. Lambert for owner Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico. Apprentice Casey Lambert has ridden Double B Express to his three consecutive victories.

**APPRENTICE JOCKEY STEVE ASMUSSEN** won both halves of the daily double on Sunday. Asmussen started by taking the opener on Maljamar (\$28.00) for trainer Marilyn S. Asmussen and then won the second half on Lady Columbia (\$6.20) for trainer R. Frank Thompson. The 7-5 daily double combination returned \$161.40.

**POP'S SPIRIT** SET a seasonal fastest time when he blitzed to a 1:07 reading while easily winning Sunday's eighth race by five lengths. The three-year-old Red Viking gelding took the lead around the first turn and gradually increased his margin under apprentice Casey Lambert. It was his second straight romping win as he took his last race on June 26 by nine and one-half lengths. The previous fastest five and one-half furlong reading this season was a 1:07 1/5 clocking by Annihilator on June 19. Pop's Spirit is trained by Clifford C. Lambert for owner Double B Ranch.

**HALF-HOUR PROGRAM** on the Rainbow Derby, produced by The Quarter Horse Show of Fort Worth, will be aired on July 10 over KTVT-TV in Fort Worth, on July 11 on KGMU-TV in Oklahoma City, and on July 13 on the SPN Network.

The KTVT-TV signal, via an extensive cable network, reaches 673,055 subscribers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and New Mexico. The air time is noon.

The SPN programming is carried on 486 cable systems in 1,533 communities, which translates into a total household count of 4.6 million. Airtime for the Rainbow Derby show is 8 p.m. Eastern time. Fans who happen to be in Ruidoso on that date (July 13) can catch the SPN telecast on Channel 20 on the cable system, at 6 p.m.

**SALE CATALOGUES ARE NOW AVAILABLE** for the 10th annual Summer Sale for Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings. The sale will be held in two sessions for the first time ever starting at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, July 30, and Saturday, July 31, in the All American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs track grounds. A total of 80 horses will be sold at each night's session. Each of the sale yearlings is nominated to six major futurities at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs. R. Rick Henson, director of horse

sales for Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, said catalogues may be obtained from his office or by writing him at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, P.O. Box 449, Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico 88346.

**FAVORITES STRUGGLED** through Wednesday's off-track conditions as all 12 wagering favorites failed to win. Mucho Hombre (\$80-1) bolted, Rockthdora (\$80-1) finished third; Primetime Wrangler (\$160-1) dead-heated for sixth; Mr. Cinder Truck (\$160-1) was 10th; Smooth Flyer (\$110-1) was fourth; Rocky Country (\$230-1) finished fifth; Lift A Shoe (\$180-1) was seventh; Sultry Susana (\$200-1) ran third; Likanaero (\$330-1) was third; Charge It Papa (\$210-1) ran second; Go Sparkling Lad (\$110-1) ran fifth and Knife Wing (\$240-1) finished second. It was the first time this season none of the favorites won during an entire program.

While the favorites had their troubles on Wednesday, they certainly performed up to expectations on Friday. Eight of the 12 public choices visited the winner's circle, including a string of seven consecutive favorites from the third through ninth events. Winning choices included Smooth Is News (\$4.20) in the third, Karl L. (\$5.20) in the fourth, Special Dancer (\$3.40) in the fifth, Riverside Rebel (\$6.20) in the sixth, Real Altercation (\$3.40) in the seventh, Fill Mackip Cup (\$3.80) in the eighth and Pride of Loom (\$3.60) in the ninth and Joshaway (\$5.60) in the eleventh.

**CONGRATULATIONS TO** Mickey and Larry Byers on their 25th wedding anniversary on July 1. Larry is a veteran jockey who has campaigned at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park for many years. Mickey, on occasion, has handled Larry's jockey agent chores. The couple has two children, Kelly, who works in the Ruidoso-Sunland photography department and Billy, who is following in his father's footsteps as a jockey at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

**THE HEAT IS ON**, one of the finest two-year-olds last season in New Mexico, won her first race since winning last September at the New Mexico State Fair meeting in Albuquerque. The three-year-old Rocket Wrangler filly captured a half-length decision over Coda Mundi in Thursday's featured \$7,925 Zia Stakes over 400 yards. The filly, ridden by Jack Wallace was near the leaders throughout then powered her way at the end in 20:19 over a track rated as heavy. Last season, The Heat Is On scored nine victories with two seconds and one third in 14 appearances and earnings of \$112,500. She's trained by R. D. Hay for owners F. I. and Kathleen Martin and M. Virginia Murray of Taiban. She returned \$3.60 as the 4-5 wagering favorite in the Zia Stakes.

**IN STEWARDS' RULINGS:** — Jockey Randy Liedecker was suspended three days (July 2-4) for careless riding when his mount Bees Nosey was disqualified from third and

placed fourth during the 11th race on June 27.

Jockey Mike Charles was suspended three days (June 30-July 2) for careless riding while on Neat Creek in the 11th race on June 25. Neat Creek was disqualified from fourth and placed sixth.

**JOE RUIZ WON** two consecutive races on Monday's program. He started with Peckhams Rocket (\$8.20) in the third and then won the fourth aboard Neat Creek (\$6.40). Both horses are trained by Doug McMullen and both were second-wagering favorites.

**GARFIELD RED** set a seasonal fastest time when he roared to a 1:34 clocking for the seven and one-half furlongs while winning Sunday's ninth race. That time eclipsed the season's previous fastest seven and one-half furlong reading of 1:35 3/5 set by John Cameron on June 10. Garfield Red was trained by Lewis L. Germany and was ridden by apprentice Ruben Miranda. Germany owns the four-year-old Elegant Boy gelding with Grady D. Hopper of El Paso, Texas.

Jimmylin recorded his third straight victory by taking Sunday's 11th race at six

furlongs. The 11-year-old Nimette gelding started his streak by drawing off to a seven-length win in a five and one-half furlong chase on May 23, then won by four lengths on June 4 in a five and one-half furlong starter allowance. He's trained by Jimmie Claridge, who also owns him with Leonard Zielke.

**JOE MARTINEZ WON** four races on Sunday's program, including three straight events. He started with Took A Native (\$42.60) in the eighth for owner-trainer Robert E. Hirst, then captured the featured Stars And Stripes Allowance race aboard Jackie Splash (\$6.60) and took the 11th aboard favored Jimmylin (\$4.60). The last two winners are trained by Jimmie Claridge. He also won the 12th race aboard Karuh (\$8.40) for trainer Bob E. Arnett.



## Brangus take over Sales Arena July 24

The All-American Sales Arena on the track grounds at Ruidoso Downs is normally the setting for the sale of quality race horses.

In fact, the year's first horse sale comes up on Friday and Saturday, July 30-31, when the 10th annual Summer Sale for Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings is offered.

Later in the season, starting on August 30, the Sales Arena opens its doors once again, this time for a five-day stand by the All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale.

But before these sales take place, there'll be another auction is the All-American Sales Arena, and this one won't involve race horses. It'll involve Brangus cattle.

The date is Saturday, July 24, and the starting time is 7 p.m. The venue is the All-American Brangus Production Sale, which will offer 50 female Brangus cattle and two bulls. The animals (all breeding

stock) will be put on the auction block by Canning Ranches of Capitan and Diamond A Cattle Co. of Roswell.

Hap Canning of Canning Ranches expects about 300 to 400 buyers to be on hand, mostly from Texas, Oklahoma and Arizona. "It looks like the sale is going to be a success," Canning says. "We made advance motel reservations for 165 rooms in the Ruidoso area, and all rooms have already been taken. That's certainly a good sign. If the sale succeeds the way we think it will, we hope to make it an annual event in Ruidoso."

Up until this point, the sale was a "traveling production sale," which means it was held in various New Mexico cities over the past six years.

Canning is well known for his racing stock as well as his Brangus cattle. In 1981, Canning's filly, Plucky Hussy, won the prestigious \$261,220 Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park.
