PRO-AM TOURNEY OCTOBER 11 Top golfers to compete here

Big time golf is coming to Ruidoso! Inn of the Mountain Gods golf pro Jack Warlick announced Thursday that the Inn, in conjunction with the Ruidoso Rotary Club, will sponsor the Inn of the Mountain Gods Invitational Pro-Am Golf Tournament, Monday, October 11.

"It's definitely a start towards a major golf tournament in this area," Warlick said.

Three of the top professional golfers in the nation have agreed to play in the tournament, according to Warlick.

Charles Coody, Dave Eichelberger and Dave Hill have all agreed to play in the pro-am tournament. A number of other leading touring professionals have also in-

dicated definite interest in the tournament and are checking their schedules to see if they can make it.

There will be 12 pro-am teams in the tournament. Each team will consist of a professional, perhaps a celebrity, and three amateurs. Each amateur will be charged a fee for competing. The fee has not yet been determined.

The three golfers who have officially agreed to compete in the tournament all have impressive credentials.

Coody, who hails from Abilene, Texas, won the 1971 Masters championship and was also a member of the United States Ryder Cup team that year. Coody, 45, is in his 20th year on the pro tour. He's one of a handful of golfers to have earned \$1,000,000 in a career.

Hill, also 45, of Lakewood, Colorado, has been on the pro tour for 24 years and has also won over \$1,000,000 in his career.

He has won 13 tour events during his career and has been a member of the United States Ryder Cup team three times. He won the Vardon Trophy in 1969. The Vardon Trophy is awarded to the golfer who has the lowest stroke average on the tour each year.

Eichelberger, from Fort Worth, Texas, is 38 and has been on the tour for 16 years. He has scored five tour victories during his career, the last being the 1981 Tallahassee Open. His mother has a summer home in Alto.

Tommy Morel, Director of Sales and Marketing for the Inn, was naturally pleased about the tournament announcement.


"We're looking on it as an annual tournament," he said. "We're seeing it on a 10-year basis."

Morel also said the Inn is looking for celebrities such as sports figures and motion picture stars to compete in the pro-am.

"There has been some interest indicated by local people word of mouth," Morel said. "We had a meeting about the tournament recently and some people expressed a great deal of interest in it."

"We haven't set a fee for the amateurs yet but will probably do so in the next couple of weeks."

Proceeds from the tournament will go towards helping junior golf in New Mexico.

Annihilater gains stakes victory on muddy track

ANNIHILATER liked the muddy going in Sunday's \$7,200 Rio Grande Stakes at Ruidoso Downs and rolled to a half-length victory.

The outcome of the six-furlong sprint for New Mexico-breds in the three-year-old and up category was no big surprise, since Annihilater got away at 7-2 odds.

But the gelding's journey was made a lot easier when the 8-5 favorite, Luckily Smashed, stumbled at the start. The filly's chances were pretty well ruined. She trailed badly throughout most of the race, then came on gamely at the end — even though victory was out of the question.

Luckily Smashed must have made up some 15 lengths in order to finish fourth.

Annihilater, kept off the early pace by jockey Vickie Smallwood, settled in fifth place during the backstretch run. Dynamic Sesenta, a 13-1 longshot, and Draconic's Loom, a 10-1 outsider, hooked up in a duel at the front of the pack.

As the field turned for home, Germeo, the second-favorite at 5-2, began a strong attack. He moved up briskly under Pedro Benitez to take the lead, looking every bit a winner.

But Annihilater, charging in the middle of the track, caught Germeo deep in the stretch and soared into the lead without

much trouble. He was well in control at the end. His clocking, on a track listed as muddy (from extremely heavy rains just before the first race), was 1:13 3/5 seconds.

Annihilater, the property of Walter F. Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma, collected \$4,320 out of the gross purse of \$7,200. The win, his second in a row, was probably the biggest of his career. The mutuel returns: \$9.20, \$4.80, \$3.80.

Germeo, owned by Paul H. Salisbury and Tommy Stephen of Midland, Texas, collected \$1,594 for second and handed out tote payoffs of \$4, \$3.20, Texas Duster, ridden by Randy Leidecker, came on steadily to finish third. The show price was \$6.

Ruidoso racing resumes Thursday at 1 p.m.

MR. EASY ED scored a surprisingly easy victory in Saturday's featured \$8,100 Jet Deck Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The three-year-old Hempen gelding relished the sloppy going to register a widening two and one-half length victory over Kracker Kas in the 440-yard stakes race honoring one of quarter horse racing's greatest sires.

Heavy afternoon rains turned the track from fast to sloppy and that's apparently just what Mr. Easy Ed wanted. He left the

gate under Roy Brooks second as Kracker Kas took the early lead. Mr. Easy Ed soon zipped by Kracker Kas on his way to a 21:94 reading.

Overlooked by the crowd, Mr. Easy Ed returned \$32.40, \$9.00 and \$9.00.

Kracker Kas, ridden by Jacky Martin and one and one-half lengths better than third-place Rocket Jet Bug, paid \$4.20 and \$5.00 to place as the \$3.10-1 second choice.

Rocket Jet Bug, ridden by Larry Byers, finished third as a \$4.60-1 third choice and paid \$5.20 to show.

Rocket Jet Bug, sixth on the alltime list of quarter horse moneymakers, broke slowly as the gate opened and ran last in the seven-horse field as a 4-5 wagering favorite.

The victory was the second this season for Mr. Easy Ed. He has also posted two thirds in five appearances this season for trainer Joe Merrick. The Jet Deck Stakes win was worth \$4,850 to owner George H. Suthers of Sayre, Oklahoma, and increased his 1982 earnings to \$14,903.

Lightfooted, Hempens Easy Tam and Deckem Easy were late scratches.

The start of the eighth race was delayed for about 30 minutes due to a power failure which left Ruidoso Downs without elec-

tricity. Heavy rains and lightning apparently were the culprits.

SHAKEN NOT STIRRED zipped to the fourth consecutive victory in her brief career and recorded the fastest qualifying time for the Rainbow Futurity during nine time trials Friday at Ruidoso Downs.

The Raise Your Glass filly was clocked in 20:09 while winning the sixth trial race. It was the fastest clocking of the 10 entrants who earned berths in the July 25 finale.

The Rainbow Futurity will be run over 400 yards. It is the second leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses. The winner will earn \$253,079 of the gross purse of \$728,065.

Shaken Not Stirred has won three consecutive races at Ruidoso Downs after winning her career opener at Val Verde Downs in Del Rio, Texas. The filly is owned and trained by Nurrel Bruney of Dennis, Texas.

Jerry Nicodemus rode her in Friday's trial.

The only serious casualty from Friday's trials was Chicks Etta Wind, who won the Kansas Futurity on May 30, the first leg of the Triple Crown. She finished fifth in the third trial race.

The only Kansas Futurity finalist who

earned a Rainbow Futurity position was Yankee Win. The Windy Ryon filly had the eighth-fastest qualifying time with a 20:27. She finished seventh in the Kansas Futurity.

Mr. Master Bug, a Master Hand colt had the second fastest qualifying time, a 20:22 clocking while scoring a half-length victory over No Tell Motel, who gained the 10th and final spot in the finale.

Mr. Master Bug posted his fifth consecutive victory with the time trial effort. He won the \$111,403 Kansas Futurity First Consolation on May 29.

Glo Billy Sims, who won the rich Sun Country Futurity on April 25 at Sunland Park, tied for the third-fastest qualifying time with a 20:23.

Call Me Favorite, who ran second in the Kansas Futurity, ran second behind Glo Billy Sims and had the 11th fastest qualifying time, a 20:35. That earned the Victory Stride filly a spot in the Rainbow Futurity's First Consolation on July 24.

BIT OF SOVEREIGN withstood a late challenge by Likanaero to win Thursday's featured race at Ruidoso Downs.

The Sovereign colt led practically throughout as he broke from the first post position, hugged the rail during the five and one-half furlong jaunt and then outlasted the rapidly closing Likanaero to register a nose win.

Ridden by apprentice Steve Asmussen, Bit Of Sovereign was timed in 1:07 3-5 for the distance run by 10 three-year-olds running for a claiming price of \$10,000.

As an \$8,80-1 outsider, BIT Of Sovereign returned \$19.60, \$7.40 and \$5.60. Likanaero, ridden by Joe Martinez, finished second and paid \$5.80 and \$3.60.

Mark Of Sovereign, ridden by Betty Harless took third and returned \$7.20.

The victory was Bit Of Sovereign's second in six lifetime outings for trainer Marilyn S. Asmussen. He also has two thirds and has collected \$4,056 for owner Antonio Pahaez Pier of Laredo, Texas.

Racing continues each day this weekend through Sunday. Post time each day will be 1 p.m.

County Commissioners to vote on Ruidoso sub-office land buy

Lincoln County Commissioners will hold a special meeting Monday to decide whether to offer a cash payment of \$75,000 to Ruidoso for one-and-a-half acres of airport land north of the village administrative center for construction of a county courthouse sub-office.

"It seems to be the only alternative," said county manager Truman A. "Bill" Billingsley following a meeting with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) officials in Albuquerque Thursday.

The meeting, attended by Billingsley, commissioner Ben Hall, Ruidoso mayor George White, airports district office chief Bill Howard and program officer Gary Foster, was arranged after the county's offer to pay for the tract of land in 10 \$7,500 interest-free installments was rejected by FAA.

Howard had earlier indicated in a letter to Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine that

FAA would approve a lease agreement, with payments of \$9,000 a year.

"It is our position that it is much more prudent to lease airport property than to sell it outright," the letter stated.

Commissioners would not agree to pay \$9,000 a year in perpetuity to lease the tract of airport land, however. It would be an unwise use of taxpayers money, Hall indicated Friday.

One alternative discussed Thursday was lower lease payments, Billingsley said.

Howard told The News Friday that FAA would prefer leasing rather than selling the land, but only if the lease were at a fair market value.

He said that he will accept a cash payment if commissioners decide to make such an offer.

The proposal will also need to be approved by the airports regional office in Fort Worth, Texas, Howard said. Billingsley said approval of the State Board of Finance is also required, as well as the Ruidoso council.

Mayor White said the village councilmen discussed the matter before he attended the meeting and indicated they would agree to whatever arrangement could be made with FAA. Action will be taken on the matter at Tuesday's council meeting.

If the proposal to pay cash for the land is accepted by all parties, Billingsley said, construction on the sub-office may begin in August.

The structure will house a sheriff's substation, with offices for the district attorney and juvenile probation officer; and a public health office, with a full-time public health nurse and a clerk.

Plans also include an office for an administrative person with access to a computer terminal for use in answering questions regarding records and tax matters.

The cash for the land purchase will be taken from the general fund, Billingsley said.

"With reduced costs of construction of the Carrizozo (courthouse) building, plus other savings in the budget, there are adequate funds available," he reported.

William Harrison joins hospital medical staff as specialist

Dr. William A. Harrison recently joined the medical staff of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH). Harrison is one of four medical specialists RHVH has recruited.

"The community will fall in love with Dr. Harrison," claimed RHVH administrator Ken Moore.

Harrison comes to Ruidoso from Scott and White Memorial Hospital in Temple, Texas, where he completed his residency in gynecology and obstetrics last month. Harrison is originally from El Paso, Texas.

He attended Texas Western University (now University of Texas at El Paso) and graduated with a degree in microbiology and zoology in 1964. Harrison then began graduate work in microbiology at the University of Texas in Austin.

Dissatisfied with that field, Harrison transferred to Texas A and M. There he studied the veterinary sciences and graduated in 1968 with his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree.

Harrison did a two-year stint in the United States Army after graduating from Texas A&M. He was stationed with the Walter Reed group in Maryland, but was then transferred to Viet Nam for service. Harrison finished his military duty at the William Beaumont Medical Center in El Paso.

Once out of the army, Harrison started his own private veterinarian practice in El Paso. He continued his practice there for several years, before deciding he wanted to become a people physician.

As Ken Moore explained, Harrison made the switch because he saw ways to save animals from death, but the related costs were too high.

"He's the kind of person we want here. He'll do as much as possible to keep people going," said Moore.

Harrison started a two-year Ph.D./M.D. conversion program at the Universidad Autonoma de Ciudad Juarez. Then, in 1977, he went to Yale University's teaching hospital, St. Vincent's Medical Center in Bridgeport, Connecticut.

Harrison received his medical degree through Juarez University in 1978, but stayed on at St. Vincent's for his internal medicine internship.

Soon, Harrison will set up shop in a temporary building on the hospital grounds. In the meantime, he has been taking care of vacationing doctors' patients.

"They assure me that the building will be occupiable by mid-July, but that remains to be seen," joked Harrison.

Harrison commented that the growth of the community indicates an apparent need for an obstetrician-gynecologist.

"I plan to bring current and quality obstetric and gynecological care to the community and service area," he stated.

Ruidoso is not unfamiliar territory to the 39-year-old Harrison or his wife, Virginia. While the Harrisons were living in El Paso, they kept a cabin in Flume Canyon.

They've returned to the growing mountain community because they wanted "to go to a place we enjoyed."

The Harrisons have two children. Kathy is 16 and Billy is 13.

"My wife and I both feel that the Lord had a lot to do with our being brought to Ruidoso, and we both want to make a worthwhile contribution to the community and its population. We look forward to working with and living among our fellow Ruidosians," said Harrison.

District Attorney Sanders instructs police on search

District Attorney Steven Sanders told enforcement officers Thursday afternoon that laws hindering police are being "weeded out" by the Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Sanders said he plans no changes in policy of relaxed laws.

Sanders indicated at a seminar on search and seizure laws and courtroom procedures that laws are being changed to police operations, especially concerning searches of vehicles.

Sanders said the New Mexico Supreme Court and the United States Supreme Court recently handed down rulings which enforcement officers the right to search anything in a vehicle, if the officer has probable cause to believe the vehicle contains contraband, "under any circumstances" exist at the time of the search.

A change from previous rulings allows police officers to obtain search warrants to look into closed containers in a

vehicle, if officers had probable cause to believe illegal items were present.

The New Mexico ruling, which Sanders termed "the most liberal decision in favor of the law enforcement officer," was handed down in January.

The ruling came in a case involving an officer who pulled over a driver on a traffic violation. The officer reported he smelled marijuana in the car, and proceeded to search the vehicle's contents—including closed containers. Sanders said the officer opened the trunk and found several closed plastic bags. He opened the bags, and found they contained marijuana.

The search was ruled illegal in district court, said Sanders, because the officer failed to obtain a search warrant to look into the closed bags. The case was appealed to the state Supreme Court, which ruled the search legal.

"The law used to say you couldn't search closed containers in a vehicle," Sanders said. "With the Supreme Court ruling, now you're allowed to search anything in a car."

Sanders said the ruling was "vigorously

dissented" by a state Supreme Court judge, and was appealed to the U. S. Supreme Court.

In June, the nation's highest court ruled in a similar case regarding a vehicle search. Sanders said the case involved a police officer who stopped a car for a legitimate cause, searched the contents, and found cocaine in a closed suitcase in the trunk.

In what he called the "most far reaching decision in search and seizure of automobiles," Sanders said the court ruled that if a police officer has a probable cause, and exigent circumstances exist, the officer can search closed containers without a warrant.

"The container issue is basically a dead issue now," Sanders said. "It's no longer important to get a warrant. You can search the entire car and anything in it."

Probable causes could be the presence of drugs or drug paraphernalia; detection of marijuana smell; or reason to believe that illegal contraband is being carried. But, Sanders added, a search has to be limited to items on which the probable cause is determined.

As an example, Sanders said an officer who suspects that a person is carrying illegal firearms cannot search through closed containers too small to hold a weapon without getting a search warrant.

"Part of the probable cause is what you are searching for," he explained.

Exigent circumstances also must exist before the search is commenced, Sanders said. Exigent circumstances means "an emergency situation exists requiring swift action to prevent danger to persons or property or escape of a suspect," he explained.

The emphasis of the seminar was on vehicle searches, but Sanders also described a case involving a warrantless arrest that was upheld because of exigent circumstances. The case he described was one in which police officers entered a suspect's house without a warrant and arrested him on suspicion of rape.

The man was convicted, but his lawyer appealed to a higher court "because of concern over exigent circumstances." Sanders said the arrest and conviction were upheld in appellate court because

police had reason to believe the man could escape from the house.

While new search and seizure rulings are helpful to law enforcement officers, Sanders cautioned that the best defense against civil liability is possession of a warrant or verbal consent for the search.

Chief Swenor said after the seminar he will make no changes in department policy, regardless of the recent rulings.

"What the law says and our department policy are two things," Swenor said. Swenor indicated he is pleased courts are granting more leeway for law enforcement. But, he added, his department has "tighter restrictions" in policy than what the law grants.

He said Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) officers can search unsecured containers in a vehicle if officers have probable cause for a search. But, Swenor said, officers need a search warrant to search "secure containers."

In addition, Swenor said RPD officers "in every case, always ask for consent to search." "We'll basically follow the same

policies," he added. "The seminar was intended so they (officers) could refresh themselves."

Sanders also advised the law enforcement personnel, who included employees from RPD, Ruidoso Downs Police Department and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, on practices to follow in the courtroom.

He said the most important thing an officer should do on the witness stand is "tell the truth."

He also suggested officers talk in their own language, address the jury—instead of lawyers—speak loudly and clearly, and avoid hostility toward defense attorneys.

He suggested that officers offer no opinions while on the stand, and that they answer only specific questions without offering "an excess of information" that could provide leads to defense attorneys.

Sanders suggested the hints on courtroom testimony to prepare officers for tricks he said are used by lawyers to confuse witnesses, often resulting in mistrials.

Sanders said, "I'm amazed and outraged at the stupid things that happen in courts that result in mistrials."

Canning said he hopes to make the sale event at the arena. In the past, his yearly production sale to San Angelo, Texas, because,

he said, overnight accommodations for buyers was hard to find.

This year, Canning said he was able to line up enough rooms in Ruidoso to attract buyers to the sale. Canning anticipates about 400 buyers will participate.

Although the Sales Arena is known mainly for the yearly sales of select thoroughbred yearlings and the All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale, Canning feels the Brangus sale will generate enough interest to make it an annual event.

"I know a lot of people like to come to Ruidoso," Canning said, "and this will be another way to attract them."

Canning said four classes of Brangus

will be on sale. The categories are: cows and calves, bred heifers, open heifers (not bred) and two bulls that are herd sire prospects.

Canning explained that Brangus—which are three-eighths Brahman and five-eighths Angus—are the second most common breed in New Mexico after Herefords. He said Brangus are recognized as better foragers than Hereford, because they utilize more plants than the English breed. He added that Brangus are particularly well adapted for prolonged heat in the southern part of the country.

Canning noted that the market is currently "very strong for registered cattle," which, he hopes, will translate to good selling prices.

Solar workshop July 24

Earth sheltered solar homes will be the topic of a workshop to be presented by the New Mexico Solar Energy Institute (NMSEI) at the Albuquerque Technical Vocational Institute (TVI) main campus July 24.

The day-long workshop will include information about earth berthing, site assessment, soil analysis, waterproofing, architectural and structural considerations, building codes, zoning restrictions, passive solar design concepts and economics.



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

Around Sports with Gary Brown



It looks like an era has come to a close in the National Football League (NFL).

The Oakland Raiders appear to be on their way to Los Angeles for the 1982 season (if there is a season this year) after the Los Angeles Coliseum Commission voted 7-1 Wednesday to approve a 10-year agreement for the Raiders to play there.

While it's doubtful that many people in the Ruidoso area will have any strong opinions about this probable move, it brings back strong memories to me.

The idea of the Raiders, who were the NFL's winningest team in a 15-year period from 1963 to 1973, moving to Los Angeles still has me talking in my sleep.

I can remember when the Raiders played in a 20,000-seat stadium in Oakland before crowds that filled only half of the stands. Oakland went through more layers trying to get a winning combination in two years than most teams do in 10.

Oakland went 6-8 in 1960, its first season. However, the Raiders slumped to 2-12 in 1961 and 1-13 in 1962. In 1963, however, Oakland rode the excellent running of all-back Clemon Daniels, the passing of quarterback Tom Flores, and a defense that bent but didn't break, to a 10-4 record. That was good for second place in the old American Football League's (AFL) Western Division standings.

After that, Oakland built up one of the most amazing records in modern professional sports history. They had a 5-7-2 record in 1964 but didn't have another losing season until last year, when the Raiders went 7-9.

In that 18-year period, Oakland went to the Super Bowl three times and won twice. But what was most amazing was winning the Western Division championships in 10 seasons. The Raiders also made the playoffs twice as a wild card team.

In 1977, they finished second to Denver in the Western Division but earned a wild card spot and knocked off Baltimore 23-17 in overtime. A possible quick whistle on a

Denver fumble by Rob Lytle cost the Raiders a victory against the Broncos and a second straight trip to the Super Bowl.

Oakland's second wild card berth came in 1980 when the Raiders finished second to San Diego. However, Oakland knocked off Houston, Cleveland and San Diego to earn another trip to the Super Bowl. They played Philadelphia and it was no contest. The Raiders won 27-10 and the game wasn't as close as the score indicated.

The Raiders' first losing season in 17 years came last fall, so perhaps many people on the Oakland side of San Francisco Bay aren't that concerned about the move to Los Angeles anymore. When I flew back to the Bay Area for a weekend in May, few people in the East Bay suburb where I used to live were talking about the Raiders.

After all, even if the Raiders do move, the fans in Northern California still have the present Super Bowl champion 49ers to watch.


But it's hard to imagine many Oakland area fans joining the ranks of the 49ers. Before the Raiders were started, there wasn't much in the way of professional sports in the East Bay. Only the roller derby Bay Area Bombers played some games in Oakland, and roller derby hardly rates as a major professional sport.

Los Angeles Raiders! That name just doesn't ring right. But it's not surprising that Los Angeles wants the Raiders.

Here the children went to school to Josephine Stetson in a one-room school near where the Senior Citizen center now stands "near that big pine tree."

In 1922, the family rented land on the Reservation where her father raised the "finest potatoes and corn." They lived "at the wind mill" the other side of the summit. During the summer Maymie went to school in Mesalero. The family became well acquainted with the Mesalero Apache Indians.

In November of 1922 Maymie attended school at the old one-room Stetson School located where the present school building now stands, just east of Ruidoso Downs.

Ola Casey Jones was the teacher, teaching all eight grades. Maymie was in the eighth grade.

In March 1923 Maymie married Elmer Payton, pioneer rancher of the valley; and the couple raised five children: Bethel, Edward, Roy, Helen, and Rusty (Elmer Jr.).



She's a smart lady, who now has the advantage of having campaigned actively all over the state.

That's something many political helpers never get.

Many who are most valuable in a campaign in telling you what you should or should not do have never had the experience of doing anything themselves.

Mary has that experience, and she will be more valuable in the campaign because of it.

It's no fun to sit down after a campaign and write letters to thank all the people who may have helped you in some way.

Few winners and almost no losers do it. Aubrey Dunn is an exception to that rule. What's more, he adds a personal note to many of the letters going out just to show you that he appreciates you personally.

Smart man — and he'll keep the friends he has because he does things like this.

Pay little heed to that idea of Adair Gossett that Caleb Chandler should resign his race for Congress and let Aubrey run in his place.

For one thing, you'd have to have the Democratic central committee all ready to give the post to Aub. They'd probably give it to David King instead.

Besides, Joe Steen's going to win that race.

Aubrey ought to stay home and raise his apples.

Letters to the Editor

Dear editor:

In response to your editorial in the July 5, 1982, Ruidoso News, I would like to take this opportunity to respond.

In light of your short tenure as editor and given the fact that your only source of information on the Lodgers' Tax Meeting of June 29, 1982, could have been Mr. Turbow's report (Mr. Turbow, himself a relative newcomer), I would like to point out a few facts for your enlightenment.

The community of Ruidoso has not had any advertising campaign for the summer season in the past few years. With the advent of the lodger's tax, and the subsequent enforcement and collection of lodgers' tax funds, monies that otherwise had not been available did in fact become available for advertising purposes.

Because previous members of both the Advertising Committee and the Lodgers' Tax Committee felt that the winter season was the weakest season, with regard to the tourist trade, those few dollars that were available for advertising were spent in an attempt to attract people to Ruidoso in the fall and winter seasons.

It has only been in the last few months that Lodgers' Tax Fund projections indicated that with a good summer of '82 and a good winter season in '82-'83, (coupled with adequate collection and enforcement of collection) would Ruidoso be able to sustain a year-round advertising campaign. The purpose of such a campaign would tend to create a more stable economic condition here, by attracting more tourists; rather than the ups and downs we have experienced in the past.

During a May, 1982, Lodgers' Tax Meeting the Chamber Advertising Committee learned that funds of a sufficient nature would be available, not only for a summer ad campaign, but perhaps, if all goes well, an expanded YEAR ROUND CAMPAIGN. Therefore, the Advertising Committee began to put together an, albeit shortened and somewhat late, advertising campaign for July-August and early September, 1982. I believe this answers your questions, "Why so late?" and "Why not?" (Why the ad committee did not know what funds might be available.)

Area travel agents stress that, particularly in the current economy, at least 50 percent of the general population plan vacations on impulse. Therefore, your statement "This seems to ignore the fact that most people plan their vacations — even weekend vacations — many months in advance" would appear to be at a minimum of at least 50 percent unfounded. Further, your conclusion that advertising "probably won't draw many people here this summer" is totally negative and irresponsible.

I take absolute exception to your last paragraph, for it is here that you have failed completely to get the facts. The proposal you allude to is strictly in the preliminary working stages and would have to be approved by the Village Council. Additionally, if the proposed agreement or one in kind were to be approved, it would be subject to strict scrutiny, not only by the Village, but also by Certified Public Accountants, retained to audit the use of the Lodger's Tax Funds.

Furthermore, it appalls me to think that a responsible newspaper would indicate that conflict of interest could be a problem, with a not yet finalized agreement or with the Advertising Committee. In fact, the Advertising Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lodgers' Tax Committee are both all volunteer committees, made up of a good cross section of responsible business people in this community, whose only purpose is to attract tourists to our community during all seasons of the year.

On the Village beat with Tim Palmer



They were talking trash last week at Village Hall.

It seems the idea of a big centrally located trash compactor for Ruidoso is generating some momentum. Friday, two fellows in the trash compacting machinery business put on a presentation for a couple of councilmen—"Garbage Commissioner" Al Jungce and Don Dale—plus village manager Jim Hine and several others.

It must be explained that, in the vernacular, we are talking about a "transfer station" when we talk about a centralized trash collection point. The transfer takes place when trash is dumped from collector trucks (the kind the village has now) into a "push pit," and from there into a compactor.

The trash is then scrunched into about one-seventh its former size as it is pushed into a long trailer. The trailer full of compacted trash is then pulled by a truck tractor to the landfill.

The trailer has a built-in ram which pushes the trash out its rear door at the landfill.

The tractor-trailer rig moves about five collector trucks' worth of trash in one trip, saving four round-trips over the present system.

Troy Tate of Border Machinery in El Paso was one of the gentlemen making the presentation Friday. El Paso was the first city in the nation to get a transfer station, in 1971, and Tate was the man who put it in.

He noted several advantages to the system, each resulting from elimination of trips to the landfill by collector trucks. First, it allows those trucks to spend more time on their routes.

Second, it saves wear and tear on the trucks. Third, it saves man-hours.

Tate had further testimony to the effectiveness of the transfer station concept. The same company which designed and built the system for El Paso, Peabody Gallon of Ohio, now has over 200 such systems in use or under construction around the U.S. and in Canada and Brazil.

Don Dale asked Tate and Don Shuck, the Peabody Gallon representative, for a ballpark figure on what a transfer station for Ruidoso would cost.

The numbers given were:

—One 11-cubic yard push pit: \$38,000.

—One holding pit with compactor: \$38,000.

—One 75-cubic yard trailer: \$39,000.

—One truck tractor: \$50,000 to \$60,000.

With freight and assembly thrown in, the total estimated cost for the system is around \$200,000.

That seems like a lot of money, but Jungce stated that the system would easily pay for itself in four years, and Tate agreed.

As it turns out, Jim Hine did a study

some 15 months ago on the transfer station concept and the potential savings to Ruidoso.

He figured fuel, depreciation, maintenance and labor costs on running four trucks to the landfill at Fort Stanton Mesa twice a day. (The village has five collector trucks but does not run all of them to the landfill year-round).

Hine found that running one transfer truck instead of four collector trucks would result in a saving to the village of \$209.80 per day. Based on a 253-day work year, the total saving comes to an impressive \$53,500 per year.

I asked Mr. Hine if he thinks the village will be getting a transfer station.

"My personal opinion is that we have no alternative but to get one," he said.

He noted that the village was close to going to the transfer system for trash several years ago, but funding at that time was concentrated in the area of wastewater treatment.

"I think this is a very high priority," said Hine. He predicted that action on the project could be taken within a year.

I wondered if the cost of electricity to power the compacting machinery might be high. But Tate explained that since the system is hydraulic, with a 25-horsepower electric motor pumping the hydraulic fluid, power costs are not at all prohibitive.

The compactor can handle just about anything, said Shuck, including refrigerators. Only construction materials like rebar and pipe, or big chunks of concrete, shouldn't go into it.

I Didn't Think You'd Take It Personally
Wasn't that the title of the followup book to "Ball Four," the expose on major league baseball written several years ago by former New York Yankees pitcher Jim Bouton?

The title came to mind when I started getting some feedback on an editorial in the Chamber of Commerce which ran last week. (See Letter to the Editor this page.)

For the sake of clarification, the potential conflicts of interest I saw with the Chamber's Advertising Committee taking over allocation of lodgers' tax revenue could result if there were other groups competing with the Chamber for those dollars.

Richard Sandoval told me the Chamber would rather not be an active promoter of special events—preferring the role of coordinator. Either way, no personal conflict of interest was implied nor should have been inferred.

On the whole, the Chamber seems to do a very good job promoting Ruidoso. That, of course, is in the interest of the entire community.



Steven Spielberg's "E.T." is one of the most enjoyable pieces of cinema in a long, long time. It's a film the entire family can see and share together, and one many people will want to see over and over again. Thus "E.T." also should become one of the great financial successes of the year, as a film needs the repeat business to become a certified blockbuster.

Everything goes right in the film, even though the story is little more than a variation on "a boy and his dog" theme and the formula is as old as movies — right down to the chase scene at the end. The characters (human, that is) are all finely drawn, and they are played by unknown actors. It is easy to identify with the characters and allow ourselves to be drawn headlong into this most tender tale of sci-fi.

As for E.T. itself, not since "Star Wars" Yoda has an artificial creature become so quickly loved. Future generations may look back at our

time and point to a general disenchantment with authority or a lack of faith in our leaders as the reason why the heroes of our movies are puppets, not people. Sometimes it's easier to believe in the unreal than the real.

"E.T." makes you want to believe. Spielberg, the guiding force of the project, has been making movies that he would like to go and see himself. He is a lover of cinema who knows how to combine the best of the new with the old masterpieces, and, with the possible exception of George Lucas, no one does it better.

"E.T." shows every sign of becoming one of the top-10 money-making films of all time. If that happens it will mean that four of those films — "E.T.," "Jaws," "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" and "Raiders of the Lost Ark" — will have been made by Spielberg, and that, my friends, is almost out of this world.





