Chamber defends position

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth voiced his resentment Friday about what he says are aspersions cast upon the Chamber and what he described as misinformation being circulated by community members and the press concerning the debate over the proposed contract to merge the Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) and the Chamber's Advertising Committee. The controversy emerged at a June 29 special meeting of LTC with members of the advertising committee. The purpose of that meeting was to discuss a \$16,543 summer ad campaign proposed by the advertising committee. Although skepticism was expressed by several LTC members, the campaign passed. Also discussed was the idea of an annual Ruidoso advertising budget. At the same meeting, the contract proposal to merge the two committees was brought up, but not discussed in any detail after LTC chairman Ed Hyman stated he had been told by village attorney Lee Huckstep that such a contract would be illegal.

"The Chamber didn't have anything to do with it," said Jungbluth concerning the presentation of the merger. He stated that Archer Wilson, LTC member, founded the idea of bringing the two committees together on his own a couple of months ago. "The Chamber of Commerce presented it (contract proposal) to nobody. We (Chamber Executive Committee) were asked not to lobby, for it by Archer," continued Jungbluth. He explained that Wilson presented the contract to the executive committee and the committee endorsed the proposal because it made sense and had been done

successfully in other communities. Wilson then took the idea on his own to LTC members and village councilmen, according to Jungbluth. Wilson's proposal states, "The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce (RVCC), through the Central Committee of its Advertising Committee, will undertake to provide a promotional program for the Village of Ruidoso..." The contract further proposes that "the Central Committee of the RVCC Advertising Committee will be composed of the five people currently serving on the Lodgers' Tax Advisory Board (LTC) in addition to four members of the RVCC Advertising Committee, to be appointed by the RVCC Board of Directors. The Central Committee will be chaired by and presided over by a member, appointed and elected by the nine member Central Committee." Furthermore, responsibilities of the Central Committee will include: planning and developing the Advertising Committee's program of work for each fiscal year; developing the annual budget for the Advertising Committee; meeting monthly to review program and financial statements; and preparing monthly program and budget reports for presentation to the RVCC Board of Directors at its monthly meeting. The proposed contract states that as an independent contractor, RVCC will provide its own accounting system for the purpose of establishing the proper accounting methods in the use of the monies transferred to the RVCC through the collection of the Occupancy Tax. "We're not asking for a blank check. There is no blank check in the proposal," stated Chamber president Morgan Clough, who later joined in on the conversation. "We just want an easy working relationship among all the parties concerned so that lodgers' tax funds can be used to the

best possible means to promote Ruidoso." Jungbluth explained that the Executive Committee endorsed Wilson's proposal because LTC and the Advertising Committee could work together as a unit from an idea's inception to the end. This would eliminate a lot of wasted meetings and time going back and forth between the two committees before a joint proposal could be presented to the village council for final approval, he indicated. "I would just as soon desire that Archer retract his proposal," commented Jungbluth. He added that other organizations may go to LTC on their own requesting lodgers' tax funds for their special events. They may also place the ads, do the bookkeeping and furnish valid receipts to be reimbursed from village hall. "I'm tired of having to reimburse everyone else's stuff and being accused of spending the money," remarked Jungbluth. While expressing his dissatisfaction with the merger proposal at the Wednesday, July 14, LTC meeting, (at which it was announced that there is not \$16,000 for the summer ad campaign) LTC member and Ruidoso Lodgers' Association president Clark Carpenter presented LTC-budgeted advertising expenditures photocopied from village hall records. His point was that a low 28.5 percent of lodgers' tax funds is being used to promote Ruidoso in newspapers and on radio and television. On that list of expenditures was a \$5,621.18 appropriation to the Winter Special Olympics. No LTC member remembers making that appropriation. Jungbluth said there is no record of a Chamber request for \$5,600 of lodgers' tax monies on behalf of the Special Olympics. "We're (the Chamber) taking the flack for it, and we had nothing to do with it," argued Jungbluth.

Village councilman Al Junge, who was present at the July 14 meeting, made the comment that if the documents were duplicated from village hall records, their accuracy may be doubted. "But if that's wrong, what else is wrong?" asked Clough, referring to Carpenter's 28.5 percent figure. Also in reference to some of the statements based on village documents made by Carpenter at the LTC meeting and to RLA, Jungbluth responded: "We're (Chamber) the ones with the facts and information." The inadequacies of the present accounting system for lodgers' tax funds are recognized by all involved in the summer advertising campaign/merger proposal feud. "By their own admission, they (LTC members) don't know what's going on accounting-wise," said Jungbluth. "You can't have tax dollars... and not have proper administration. Any fund has got to be administered by somebody. Lodgers' tax dollars are not our dollars any more than they're their (LTC) dollars," Jungbluth pointed out. He suggested that LTC take an inner look at itself and redefine its purpose and goals. As Jungbluth said, the Chamber is already the clearinghouse for lodgers' tax monies. He claimed the Chamber's records are immaculate and open to public inspection. They are audited on an annual basis, he added. Groups seeking lodgers' tax funds to advertise their event may go through the Chamber to get an appropriation. If the request is approved, the Chamber either issues a check to the group for the amount desired, or places the advertising itself. All bills and receipts are returned to (SEE PAGE 2)

Jockey Club Stakes to Nukidintown, Tonkawa Charger

Melvin G. Riggs, an owner from Fort Stockton, Texas, enjoyed considerable success in Sunday's twin divisions of the Jockey Club Stakes at Ruidoso Downs. Riggs is part-owner of Nukidintown, a filly who raced as a 10-1 outsider in the Jockey Club first division and pulled out a plucky nose victory. Three races later, the second division of the Jockey Club Stakes came up, and Riggs had another contender — Tonkawa Charger. The gelding went off at just over 16-1, and once again, matters ended with a sustained battle down the muddy stretch. Riggs' extraordinary luck held up as Tonkawa Charger fought off repeated assaults from the 5-2 shot, Germeo, and won by a neck. Each end of the Jockey Club Stakes carried a purse of \$11,000, and each handed the winner a handsome \$6,600. The seven-furlong duel is conditioned for three-year-olds, and is a stepping stone to the upcoming Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby. In the first division, Nukidintown broke in fourth place, then moved up steadily to snare the lead from Pop's Spirit during the backstretch run. The two raced in side-by-side fashion the rest of the way, with Nukidintown prevailing with a very game stretch run. The gelding was well ridden by Kevin Scholl.

Nukidintown, who came out of the Jockey Club Stakes with '82 earnings of \$17,571, returned mutual payoffs of \$21.60, \$11, \$5.60. The win was his second of the current Ruidoso season. Pop's Spirit, ridden by Gary Sumpter, settled for second-place money of \$2,420 and returned \$4.60, \$3.20. Pocketpurse, a 7-1 outsider, came on at the end to finish third — better than five lengths behind Pop's Spirit. The show price: \$4.20. The winning time: 1:27 2/5 seconds. The second division, clocked in 1:27 flat, was somewhat of a repeat of the first division. It was strictly a two-horse affair. Tonkawa Charger took command at the break, while Germeo settled in second. The latter was unable to overtake the race-maker, despite a good stretch try. Tonkawa Charger paid \$34.40, \$11.60, \$4.80. Germeo: \$4.20, \$3. Luckily Smashed, the 6-5 favorite, was out of it all the way, but came on for third, paying \$2.80. Both Jockey Club winners are trained by Mike Welch. The Heat Is On, who won the sixth race easily, had the distinction of becoming the first horse at Ruidoso to pay \$2.10 (to show), under new Racing Commission rules pertaining to minus wagering pools. Wool Growers hear airport review

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) presented its case for a regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa to the New Mexico Wool Growers public lands committee Thursday. Present on behalf of the commission were State Senator Charlie Lee, SBAC chairman Fred Heckman and county commissioner John Allen Hightower. "Just get some conversation going" was Lee's stated aim in meeting with the wool growers. The senator suggested to SBAC in the spring that it seek to make agricultural groups aware of the airport issue. Last month's meeting with the state Cattle Growers led to today's meeting at the New Mexico State University experimental station on the mesa (see related story). Heckman gave the wool growers a history of the airport issue, explaining that Ruidoso has outgrown its present airport. Factors making the airport unsafe which Heckman cited are buildings below the flight path; runway alignment contrary to prevailing winds; and the lone "escape route" being down the river valley over the center of town.

He told the group that 16 potential airport sites were studied, and that only two feasible sites were found—both on Fort Stanton Mesa. Heckman then outlined the proposed plan for the new airport. Hightower also addressed the group briefly. He said he is sometimes asked why he wants to help rich Texans with an airport. "I tell'em I kinda like those rich Texans—their money's as good as anyone's," said Hightower. He said the county welcomes visitors and wants to offer the service of a safe airport. "Ruidoso needs it and Lincoln County needs it—and they're going to need it more in the future," the commissioner concluded. Heckman said that the sale of the present Ruidoso airport is seen as the primary source of funding for a new airport. He added that SBAC does not want to see development on the mesa and that the airport and the agricultural station can be good neighbors. Heckman said after the meeting that he sees definite value in the presentations to agricultural groups. SBAC will address the Farm Bureau later this month.

Airport meeting today

The state Cattle Growers Association, in a follow-up to its June meeting with the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) in Las Vegas, will meet with SBAC and New Mexico State University (NMSU) officials today on Fort Stanton Mesa. Bob Jones, president of the Cattle Growers, said Saturday the purpose of the meeting is to make an on-site inspection of NMSU's research, and see if the Cattle Growers will reevaluate their long-standing endorsement of NMSU in the airport conflict. "Before, it was our opinion there were alternate sites (for an airport)," Jones explained. "But the (June) discussion pointed out new avenues by the commission (SBAC). "We're sincerely trying to be fair," he added. Jones said the Cattle Growers have endorsed the university's position because the cattle association felt the range research on the mesa was very valuable in pointing out that rotational grazing methods recommended by the

Bureau of Land Management (BLM) were detrimental. NMSU has hindered efforts by SBAC to lease 600 acres on the mesa because the university contends an airport would interfere with the research. NMSU leases over 26,000 acres on the mesa from the BLM in a long-term joint agreement. SBAC has started a campaign to address agricultural groups with the airport proposal, because those groups are in a position to know the value of NMSU's research. Jones said other parties to attend the meeting today will be a BLM representative, state secretary of agriculture William Stephens, and State Senator Charlie Lee. Jones said he also invited the New Mexico Farm Bureau president to attend. Jones said the Cattle Growers will hold a news conference at 3:30 p.m. at NMSU's headquarters on the mesa—after talking with NMSU and SBAC—to discuss its opinion on the issue.

Schmitt advocates agriculture as weapon against Soviet Union

U.S. Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt, saying he is "scared" of the Soviet Union threat of economic and military domination over the world, told the New Mexico Wool Growers Friday that agriculture "will have to take its place as one of the major strategic weapons in this country." Schmitt, speaking before a Wool Growers banquet at the Elks Club in Ruidoso, also came out in support of the balanced budget amendment to the Constitution, and he suggested the government develop a consumption-based tax system, rather than the present income tax system or a flat rate tax. The senator suggested the U.S. should use agriculture as "leverage" to force a diversion in the Soviet economy—from the military-industrial complex to one oriented toward agriculture. Schmitt added the U.S. should "ask whether we haven't subsidized agriculture in the Soviet Union," with grain exports that allow the Soviets to focus on a military buildup while neglecting the agricultural segment of their economy.

However, in a speech he titled "The Crisis in American Agriculture," Schmitt noted that steps must be taken to strengthen the farm economy before the U.S. can afford to give up the Soviet market for farm products. "The fundamental problems domestically are very, very serious," Schmitt said. "You all have seen those green-and-white bumper stickers that say 'No farmers-no food.' Well, the logic of that is unassailable. The implications are that we're really in danger of having no farmers." Schmitt pointed out that farm indebtedness has reached \$200 billion. That goes along with total purchasing power that has sunk below \$20 billion—one-third the level of three years ago—and total equity of \$1 trillion. Other problems in American agriculture, Schmitt noted, are the loss of economic communication between farmers and customers—with only 20 percent the cost of products being paid for production—the loss of four to six billion tons of topsoil per year, and a growing international trade imbalance. As the U.S. faces a crisis in agriculture,

with many farms gone bankrupt and others on the brink of folding, Schmitt said we are letting slip away "our only opportunity to bring peace and well-being to the world." Focusing on the Soviet Union, Schmitt said the Soviets have "a long-standing design to isolate the U.S. from the rest of the world." The senator added the Soviet Union has subordinated the rest of its economy—especially agriculture—to an emphasis on the military-industrial complex. "They have created a monster," he said. "They have created something they can't turn off." If the Soviets averted their attention away from the military, Schmitt asked, "What would they do with the tens-of-millions of workers (in defense industries)?" Schmitt pointed out that in a free market society, the production of arms can be "turned off" while the production of goods and services can be "turned on." But that doesn't exist in a communist society, he said. (SEE PAGE 2)

P&Z hears Grindstone Resort Community plans

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), in a special workshop Thursday, again heard the terms of a proposal from developer Don Dorman to develop phase one of the 300-acre Grindstone Resort Community.

The commission made no decision on the request, because action may be taken at regular meetings, but Dorman said Friday he "feels much better" about his chances to receive P&Z approval on the first phase at the commission's August meeting.

P&Z tabled the phase one request at both its June and July regular meetings. In May, Dorman requested annexation of approximately 150 acres of the land which lies outside village limits and asked for approval of the master development plan.

The commission asked him to withdraw the request from the May agenda, Dorman said, because "the powers that be felt that approving the master plan and annexation was premature," and that it would have clouded the water bond issue.

Dorman came back to P&Z with a re-

quest for approval of phase one of the development, which lies in the area between the planned reservoir and water storage tank. The commission tabled the matter because of uncertainty whether the transmission line to the storage tank would cut across property planned for development—thereby increasing land prices for the line easement—or whether the line could follow planned streets.

Also, the commission asked Dorman to resubmit the request after the July 6 water bond election, P&Z indicated then that the results of the election would help clear up the potential conflicts with the reservoir.

On July 7, the day after voters approved financing of a dam and reservoir, a water treatment plant, transmission lines and a storage tank; to be located on Dorman's property, P&Z again heard the developer's request.

The preliminary plat of phase one was tabled again, because of the same reasons that surfaced at the June meeting. The commission also scheduled the workshop to take a closer look at the proposal.

Dorman plans to build 222 single family homes, 88 townhomes, 220 condominiums, 32 stacked apartment units and 90 group

lodging units. Also included in the master plan is a conference center and a family recreation area that engulfs a performing arts center and entertainment village.

Phase one lies "completely in village limits," Dorman said, and includes 120 lots for single family dwellings. He is seeking approval of the preliminary plat so he can get roads in and start building on the lots "to offset some of the money" he has invested in the project.

At Thursday's workshop, the issue of easements for the storage tank transmission line seemed to be resolved. Dorman said Jake Vigil of Boyle Engineering met with him July 13 to discuss the water line. Dorman reported that Vigil assured him that the lines could follow the planned roads.

"He told me the cost of straight lines (from the treatment plant to the tank) versus the cost of following (road) grades is very little cost difference," Dorman said.

At the previous P&Z meetings, Dorman warned the commission that it would cost more to lay water lines through his property than under streets. After the workshop, assistant village manager Frank Potter noted the village would save the cost of

condemning land for the line, if the pipe would follow the streets.

Dorman explained he began buying parcels in Grindstone Canyon in 1978. In the autumn of 1980, he hired a California group to make a market analysis of the property. In May 1981, he said, the firm issued a report on the housing concept for the area.

Dorman said Boyle engineers approached him in June 1981 about locating a reservoir in the canyon. The following August, Dorman said, the engineers proposed the present site to the village as the preferred location for the water facilities.

In the meantime, Dorman said, he had the development—then called Grindstone Estates—redesigned to accommodate the reservoir.

"We already had a broad definition of the road configuration," Dorman said. "They (Boyle) said, 'We see no problems (transmission lines) following roads.'" The commission raised no questions Thursday on the transmission line.

P&Z member George Shoemaker asked about water service to the development. Potter said that according to the utility

plat, the development could be served "totally from the Upper Canyon" high pressure water line, which would not necessitate finding additional water sources for the development.

Regarding sewage hookup to Grindstone, Dorman said collector lines will diverge in two directions. One side of the development would be connected to a line on Fifth Street south of the Post Office. Another collector line would be constructed to connect into the planned Carrizo Canyon line, for which bids were opened last week, land surveyor Tim Collins noted.

Collins added that most wastewater would flow by gravity out of the development. Housing units close to the lake, however, will require pump stations to get waste into the main collector lines, Collins said.

Fire superintendent Virgil Reynolds and fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy expressed dissatisfaction regarding fire prevention.

According to the master plan, a main "Community Collector Drive" will bisect the development and tie in to D Street on the north and Carrizo Creek Drive on the

south. Dorman said there will be no direct access from the collector drive into private lots.

Looped drives and cul-de-sacs are planned to diverge from the main street. Dorman said the design concept is to construct housing units in secluded clusters with access to the secondary roads. He added that the concept is for an exclusive development in the forested area that will retain as much natural cover as possible to keep a "mountain flavor."

Reynolds questioned whether structures would be spaced far enough from trees to prevent a fire from rapidly spreading.

Dorman replied he would comply with any ordinances regarding spacing of structures away from trees. But P&Z chairman John Schuller noted that Ruidoso has no ordinance pertaining to the issue.

To allay fire department concern over the secluded and forested area, Collins suggested Dorman "delineate a piece (of land) for a fire (sub)station." Dorman said he could set aside a lot "if that's what the village wants."

the Chamber, which pays the bill and/or seeks reimbursement from the village.

"We have the physical plant and personnel to place the ads and do the promotion," commented Clough.

Jungbluth also said he was hurt by denunciations of the Chamber and its performance in behalf of Ruidoso at a July 13 RLA meeting.

He said the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce's aid to tourists. It is in the top 10 percent of Chambers across the country, stated Jungbluth.

"We must be doing something right. If we don't do it, who will?" he asked.

He mentioned that a few years back, Ruidoso was a very seasonal tourist town. One-and-a-half persons could have managed the Chamber then, but Ruidoso has been diversified now, he claimed. A winter, fall and spring season have developed in addition to the summer season, and three-and-a-half people can barely keep up with the traffic.

"Ruidoso is no longer America's best kept secret," Jungbluth commented.

Jungbluth asked where all the tourists came from. In response to Carpenter's charge that the Chamber spends too much time and money to welcome tourists once they're here, Jungbluth mentioned that 14,427 tourists entered the Chamber building last year seeking information—often lodging information.

All of those people were aided and their questions answered, said Jungbluth. The Chamber serves as a welcoming center and information center as well as a promoter of Ruidoso, he stated.

"When the tourist asks for information, we have to be able to provide that information," said Jungbluth.

He said he resents the lodgers' criticism of the Chamber. Only three lodgers have attended Chamber board meetings in recent months, yet they are critical of the running of the Chamber, stated Jungbluth.

"Some of the people critical are involved in the decision making process," said Jungbluth, apparently referring to Chamber members.

"If we're (Chamber) doing it wrong, tell us, and why we're doing it wrong," said Clough.

"Had the two committees worked together—as Archer's (Wilson) proposal had them doing—the idea would have been worked on together from the inception," said Jungbluth about the summer ad campaign.

As it stands now, there will not be an advertising campaign until the fall. There is also no agreement on an annual advertising budget and the merger contract proposal is stalemated.

However, there are many decisions to be made in the near future concerning all three of these issues, and there are several sides to be heard.

Senator Schmitt addresses convention here

But the senator indicated the U.S. has the ability to force a diversion in the Soviet economy, if we, and our allies, would use agriculture as a strategic weapon.

"There are unbelievable losses in agriculture in the Soviet Union," he noted. Schmitt said because of poor farming techniques and lack of storage, the Soviets lose one-fifth of the grain harvest each year as well as half the potato crop.

"Why do we have to subsidize agriculture in the Soviet Union?" he asked. "Frankly, it's because of our lack of perception and our irresponsible allies."

"There must be new trade negotiations," he suggested, and added that "our allies must understand that continual access to our markets and defensive shield depends on equitable trade."

But Schmitt said he recognizes that problems in American agriculture must be alleviated before farmers can realistically relinquish markets. To assist agriculture and let it "stand on its own," Schmitt outlined four solutions to problems in the agricultural sub-economy.

First, he supports a reemphasis in agricultural research directed toward methods to reduce costs of production and to develop pest and weed resistant crops. He also stresses conservation practices to reduce soil erosion and save irrigation water.

The second step Schmitt advocates is development of a marketing system that will cut out the added costs in farm products that are going to distributors. Schmitt noted that 50 percent of the cost of

farm goods goes to taxes added between the farm and market.

Schmitt also wants more government encouragement of agriculture, which he said can be accomplished by less bureaucratic interference. He also said the U.S. should do away with the "unfair and regressive income tax system," by developing a consumption based tax system, with over-the-counter tax credits to protect the poor. Schmitt said a consumption tax network would be fairer and simpler to manage than even the flat rate tax now being considered.

The final step for a stabilization in agricultural income would be government created incentives for both long and short terms. Schmitt said the government should eliminate taxes on savings and investment to encourage more savings; and, to keep farms from going under, he thinks

excessively debt-burdened land should be refinanced at bought-down interest rates.

But before the steps to save agriculture can be climbed, Schmitt acknowledges that a general recovery in the economy is necessary.

Noting that the top item on the "economic hit parade" is high interest rates caused by the ever-bulging federal deficit, Schmitt said he supports a Constitutional amendment calling for a balanced budget.

"We're approaching 50 percent in total borrowing to finance the deficit," Schmitt explained. "When it comes to credit, the government always goes to the head of the line. Without a major increase in capital, such demand keeps interest rates high."

Schmitt said government should balance the budget not by raising taxes—which he laments is now being done by Con-

gress—but by cutting waste and unnecessary spending, and putting a cap on federal entitlement programs.

The senator stressed again that savings and investment should be encouraged that would result in an influx of more "real money" in the economy, that would create more credit at lower rates.

Investors demand high returns on investments, Schmitt noted, but because double-digit inflation of recent years cut deeply into profits, investors held tight on their purse strings. But Schmitt expressed hope inflation is under control, which would benefit an economic recovery.

"Inflation seems to be in remission, but, like a cancer, investors remember the pain," he said. "We've got to keep the inflation genie in its bottle. If it gets out of control again, we'll see even higher interest rates."





Well, an old familiar story was repeated Tuesday night in Montreal.

The National League All-Stars won their 11th straight game over the American League with a relatively easy 4-1 decision. It was also the senior circuit's 19th win in the last 20 All-Star games, one of the most amazing feats in professional sports.

Why does the National League dominate the All-Star Game?

There are a number of reasons. One, the senior league has a good deal more depth in top quality ballplayers. While the American League could probably field a starting lineup equal to that of the National League, the latter circuit's reserves have often won the All-Star Game for it.

In recent All-Star games, the American League has seldom scored in the last three innings. The National League, on the other hand, has frequently come from behind to win the games. It did so in 1979 and 1981 with thrilling style.

The fact that the National League All-Stars have come from behind many times is due to the superior depth it usually has. Another reason is one that perhaps is a bit outdated but still has an effect on the comparable talent of the two leagues.

The National League went after black players much more frequently than the American League after Jackie Robinson joined the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947.

In the 1950s and early 1960s, the National League All-Star teams. On the other hand, the American League All-Stars during that period had fewer black players.

It may or may not have been intentional but the American League got very little use from players who represented around 10 percent (now black people make up about 12 percent of the population) of the country's population during the 1950s.

Thus, the American League was hurting itself by not taking advantage of the full

scope of the country's athletic talent.

While the two leagues are fairly equal in racial makeup now, the National League seems to still reflect the style of play when black players like Hank Aaron, Willie Mays and Roberto Clemente were at their prime. They were all excellent hitters who also possessed top throwing arms and plenty of speed.

I'm not saying that white players don't have the above physical talents. However, it was generally black National League players who showcased the aggressive play 20 years ago that is still shown in the way ALL the National League All-Stars play now.

Psychology is probably another reason why the National League dominates the All-Star series.

Once the National League started dominating the series in the early 1960s, the senior circuit's players developed a winning attitude in regards to the game.

The National League All-Stars always seem loose and confident in approaching the game. They seem to know they're going to win the game if they play the way they're capable of playing.

This is an important factor in sports. In the last two Super Bowls, the team which was looser and less restricted by its head coach won the game.

Teams that have talent and confidence are less likely to make mistakes. In Tuesday's All-Star game, the American League players looked like they were waiting to make a mistake. They didn't run the bases well and they took careless swings at the plate, striking out 10 times.

Once the American League All-Stars win a game, they may be able to get rid of this "losers" attitude that seems to plague them.

Unless they can do that, it's likely we'll see the National League dominating the All-Star game for years to come.

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

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
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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Today, two stories — both political, of course.
The first concerns a man who is and always will be a strong Republican supporter.

He has been an official of that party, but he is not loved by all its members.
His mistake, if it is one, is to be one of those Republicans who are always around who are a little less dogmatic, a little less overbearing than others of that clan.

These people have thrown off fine Republicans. Theodore Roosevelt was one. Nelson Rockefeller was another.

They constitute a wing of the party which is sometimes even a little liberal. They are also the GOP's most idealistic branch.

But the hardnose, nuts-and-bolts members of the party are the ones who are usually in control.

They look upon these folks as some sort of Big East, preppy branch of the party, with which they must put up but for whom they are not required to do anything.

Anyway, this man, who supported Bill Sego in the primary, took the time and trouble to write to John Irick after the primary was over, to wish his party's candidate well.

He enclosed a check with his letter — a rather large one. It had four figures after the dollar sign.

He meant to be friendly and supportive. Has he ever heard a word from John Irick and the nuts-and-bolts Republicans? Not a word.

No thanks, no comment. Just a long silence.

Frankly, given the choice, he'd like to take his money back.

If the Irick people aren't even well enough organized to get out the "thank you" mail, they are in bad shape.

That particular kind of bad shape loses elections.

Which brings us to the second story ... It's about a man who seems to have grown too cocky.

He's the one who's running against John Irick — Toney Anaya, as you will undoubtedly remember.

What makes us think he's getting too big for his britches?

Well, for one thing, the kind of talk he gave when he introduced his new consultants, Tim Kraft and Chris Brown.

He talked about how much money they cost.

Why, guys like these make \$5,000 to \$12,000 a month, he said, as though that were some measure of their — and his — importance.

What became of poor Toney on the front porch with his old daddy, asking us to send him our dimes and dollars?

He's big-time now — but it's pretty dumb to brag about it.

That same day he made another boast — and boasting, be it noted, is always unwise in a candidate for office. Turns the folks off, you know, when what a candidate should be trying to do is turn them on.

He bragged that surveys show him winning this race by 20 percentage points.

If they do, he shouldn't tell anybody.

He should also take a look at some recent New Mexico history.

Nobody has been elected governor by a margin of that kind since Jack Campbell demolished Merle Tucker, and that was in the neighborhood of 20 years ago.

Recent New Mexico governor's races have all been close, and, despite Toney, there is little reason to expect this one to be anything else.

Make too much noise about what a big winner you are going to be, and you're very liable to alienate folks.

That might be the first thing Kraft and Brown should teach their candidate.

Dear editor:

Recently an individual came before the city council offering a search and rescue service for a substantial fee.

There are two volunteer groups based in Ruidoso who are involved in search and rescue.

The first is White Mountain Search and Rescue, which was formed in 1961 and is a state certified team, and meets all of the requirements for certification under the New Mexico Search and Rescue Act of 1978.

WMSAR is also a member of the New Mexico Emergency Services Council and as such is not allowed to charge for its services.

To meet the requirements for certification all team members undergo training in first aid, technical rock climbing and victim evacuation, communications, ELT-direction finding, search and rescue procedures, survival, man-tracking and physical fitness.

WMSAR has a four-wheel-drive van which carries such equipment as first aid packs, climbing gear, communications

equipment, and acts as a command post during emergencies. All of this equipment is paid for by donations and members' dues.

WMSAR is listed in the New Mexico State SAR roster of teams and its volunteers have participated in search and rescue missions in the Organ Mountains, Magdalena, Cloudcroft as well as Lincoln County and Ruidoso within the past six months.

WMSAR sponsored the first meetings in Ruidoso which led to the formation of the second group of SAR volunteers, The Sierra Blanca Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol, which is now the second largest CAP squadron in the state of New Mexico.

WMSAR will continue to assist all local law enforcement agencies, the U. S. Forest Service, and county agencies in any emergency.

We would also like to thank the Village of Ruidoso for their continued support of WMSAR and the Civil Air Patrol.

It looks like Ruidoso may get a county sub-office after all.

Seeing this project through (and there are still a couple of hurdles to clear) has required a great deal of persistence from county manager Bill Billingsley and the county commissioners, especially Ben Hall.

Cooperation from the Village of Ruidoso, which agreed to provide some of its airport land for the sub-office and has worked with the county on a method to make the transaction, has also played a large part.

County-village cooperation was also evident in last week's approval by the Ruidoso council of joint powers agreements on fire prevention and protection and on the Highway 37 alternate (Gavilan Canyon Road) proposal.

The first agreement formalizes, for legal reasons, the arrangement by which the Ruidoso fire department goes to the aid of any fire department in the county when called on.

The second outlines a cooperative effort between the county and the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs to conduct a feasibility study on making Gavilan Canyon Road an improved bypass route to carry some of the traffic which now uses Highway 37 through Ruidoso.

With traffic a major problem in Ruidoso, the bypass project is of critical importance.

We applaud the county and village officials for their cooperative spirit. We're all in this together.—TP

ROBOTS COMING

Does anyone get the feeling that they're creeping up on us? "They" being the mechanized intelligences that keep proving themselves capable of more and more skilled operations.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES' PAY IS OUT OF LINE

Federal pay is supposed to be comparable to the pay for private employment. In fact, federal pay and benefits have soared far above levels available to individuals in private business and industry.

Case in point, printers. The Government Printing Office assigns "detailed printers" to congressional committees — 41 to the Senate, 33 to the House. At least 10 of the Senate printers make a minimum of \$40,000 a year. House printers make from \$28,000 to \$48,000 and average \$37,000 a year.

The head of the Government Printing Office, Danford Sawyer Jr., says campaign donations from the printers' union to key senators and congressmen protect pay levels for GPO's 5,000 employees far above anything offered in the private sector.

The printers are typical. On average, federal workers receive salaries 35.5 percent higher than private-sector salaries. For instance, federal workers in California average \$19,206 a year, 25 percent higher than the average pay in the private sector, which is \$15,365.

What's more, federal benefits, including pensions, are considerably higher than in the private sector. Most federal workers but few private workers may retire at 55 with 30 years of service. Federal retirees have their pensions fully indexed to the consumer price index, a protection afforded to only 3 percent of private-sector retirees. There are higher compensation benefits and more generous vacation leave privileges for federal workers than for private workers.

When private workers are being laid off, working shorter hours, having their pay frozen and even reduced, it would be unfair for federal workers to be exempt. Many worthwhile federal programs are being cut because of a budget deficit that will certainly exceed \$100 billion in the coming year, a record for red ink. A strong case can be made for placing a freeze on federal salaries and pensions. — Valencia County News-Bulletin

On the Village beat with Tim Palmer



The field of law enforcement, while reaching ahead with new technologies and techniques, is also calling on something that has been around for a long time—hypnosis.

And the Ruidoso Police Department has its own hypnotist in residence—Lieutenant Dave Pfeffer.

Pfeffer was certified a "Forensic Hypnotist" (forensic meaning pertaining to courts of justice—I had to look it up) in April of last year. He completed a 48-hour course in basic investigative and forensic hypnosis through the Texas Engineering Extension Service at Texas A&M University.

His certification as forensic hypnotist qualifies him to testify in court—presenting evidence gained through hypnosis of witnesses.

Pfeffer noted that the use of hypnosis in law enforcement has been increasing in recent years. He refers to it as "a useful and helpful tool in investigation."

He also expressed concern, however, because courts in some states have been refusing to admit evidence from hypnosis because of procedures used to get it. An example of an improper procedure is asking of suggestive or leading questions.

People are open to suggestion when hypnotized, said Pfeffer.

"If you describe something to 'em, they'll see it," he said. The subject must be allowed to describe what he or she sees, he added.

Pfeffer explained that people recall responses to all their senses, on a subconscious level. What a subject will "see," then, if guided by a competent hypnotist, can be any sensory experience from the time of birth on.

The reason we cannot consciously recall everything, Pfeffer said, is that our conscious minds are so involved in the here and now.

Have you ever had a dream in which a person you haven't seen or thought of for years—maybe since childhood—appears? This seems to back up the lieutenant's conviction that the mind records and stores everything one experiences.

Persons with so-called photographic memories have unconsciously figured out how to use their subconscious minds, said Pfeffer.

He pointed out that hypnosis is used in other fields besides law enforcement. Psychologists use it to break down memory block and bring out fears the patient did not know the reason for; and some dentists use it instead of a local anesthetic.

People tend to think of the "stage hypnotist" who plays on suggestibility when

they think of hypnosis, said Pfeffer. He laments this image of the field, and says that people who act like chickens at a stage hypnotist's suggestion are exhibitionists anyway.

"It's not a lie detector technique," he went on. "In the police department, we only use it on witnesses or victims of a crime."

He outlined the hypothetical situation of a witness being present at a convenience store robbery and having a shotgun swung at him. Under hypnosis, according to Pfeffer, the witness can recall the type of shotgun; what the robber was wearing; the color and license plate number of the robber's vehicle, and any dents in it; and the physical appearance of the robber, with scars or other identifying marks.

The hypnosis session is recorded (preferably on video tape), and if proper procedures have been used, it is admissible evidence in court.

In some cases, a police artist is present while a subject recalls a person who committed a crime. Thus a drawing of the suspect can be made and circulated.

Hypnosis can be effective in allowing a person to overcome the mental block he or she may have created in response to a stressful situation. For example, through a "theater" technique, a rape victim can recall the crime while remaining emotionally detached.

Pfeffer sees hypnosis as an effective tool for anyone trying to deal with stress. It has definite application in the highly stressful occupation of policeman, he feels, as well as practical application in things like quitting smoking.

A future column will deal further with this aspect of hypnosis, and describe this reporter's experience of "going under."


If you have not done so, I would suggest making your plans soon to attend the Ruidoso Little Theater production of "Arsenic and Old Lace."

You've got to give Clint Eastwood credit. He has worked his way up from a minor role in the TV series, "Rawhide," to one of the top box-office stars in the world. From the drifting loner in Sergio Leone's spaghetti Westerns to super-cop Dirty Harry, Eastwood gathered a fistful of dollars, if not raves, from the critics.

Being a success meant Eastwood could become his own boss. He set up his own production company, began to do personally selected projects and directed most of the films himself. The enormous successes of "Any Which Way You Can" and "Every Which Way But Loose" proved that as long as Eastwood could sneer, drink beer and throw punches, the fans would keep lining up.

Eastwood has been recently trying to change his image a bit by taking on roles that are more challenging, such as his "Bronco Billy." His latest film, "Firefox," is a further attempt at breaking out of the Eastwood persona.

It doesn't work, and the fault is all Eastwood's. He has taken a cloak-and-dagger novel of spies, sleuthing and supersonic jets and placed himself as a mere cork in the water, jostled about by international intrigue. Eastwood has been known as the man who takes action, and in "Firefox" there is little action for him to control.

Super-hero Eastwood has been reduced to a Vietnam war pilot who still suffers from combat flashbacks. He's politely ordered to sneak into Russia and steal a jet that's twice as fast as anything the United States can put in the air. For the first two hours Eastwood ducks in and out of shadows in a tedious stream of forged passports, many of which don't seem necessary as the security around the plane is less than that of a K-Mart on a weekend.

When he does finally steal the plane, the airborne special effects begin, but the film is already too bogged down to take off. Eastwood took a risk with the role, but this risk gets only an "E" for effort.






