Ruidoso Downs has identity problem

The Village of Ruidoso Downs seems to be having identity problems. Several businesses in the village have been paying gross receipts taxes to the Village of Ruidoso, according to Downs village clerk Wilma Webb.

She said many residents and business owners apparently are not aware that Ruidoso Downs is a separate municipality. Village officials have recently undertaken to enforce village ordinances which in the past have not been strictly enforced. Webb said she has noticed several instances of violation of the ordinances regarding signs and outdoor displays and business registration fees.

The sign ordinance, adopted in May 1980, requires that an application for a permit to erect a sign be obtained from the village clerk, accompanied by a \$20 application fee per sign. Completed applications should be submitted to the Planning and Zoning Commission for approval. Renewal fees shall be \$10 per year, the ordinance states.

In June 1981, a business registration fee ordinance was adopted, requiring all owners of businesses doing over \$500 to pay a registration fee of \$25 per year prior to engaging in business.

Webb said individuals are operating businesses and erecting signs in the village without ever having notified the village and without receiving the proper permits. She also has learned of several

businesses for which Ruidoso is listed as the place of business, meaning Ruidoso Downs does not receive gross receipts taxes from them.

Webb said the state Department of Taxation and Revenue is working on reviewing the tax records and said it will return the revenue which is due Ruidoso Downs. Webb said she submitted a list of 18 businesses to be audited by the department.

"I think they're honest mistakes," Webb and Mayor J. C. Day agreed, "but it takes away from our income."

Webb and Day want to make residents aware that the ordinances will be enforced, however, and that citations will be given to those in violation.

EASY RIO GRANDE WINNER

Teeny Blade cuts it in Futurity

Teeny Blade went to the races for the second time in his career on Sunday's program at Ruidoso Downs and made an easy \$28,032.

That was the victory slice of the \$56,064 Rio Grande Futurity, an annual six-furlong sprint for home-bred two-year-olds.

Despite a lack of experience, Teeny Blade was made a 3-2 favorite — and looked it. The colt, a son of Plucky Blade out of Tenny's Brat, turned in a thoroughly workmanlike performance.

Under the steady influence of jockey Leroy Coombs, Teeny Blade avoided the lead until the field began straightening out for the backstretch run.

Cue Me First, a 5-1 shot, was allowed to fire up a head of steam during the first half of the sprint, and was still two lengths to the good when he reached the turn for home.

But Teeny Blade moved up briskly to draw even with Cue Me First at the mid-way point of the turn, and there were probably few fans who felt Cue Me First stood any chance of hanging on.

At the top of the stretch, jockey Coombs gave Teeny Blade about three left-handed smacks with the whip, and the colt responded with a sudden powerburst. The maneuver sewed up the victory.

Teeny Blade, owned by Carlos E. Alexander of Lovington, did little more than romp over the final 50 yards and soared across the finish line with a three-length lead.

Draconic Deck, the 2-1 favorite piloted by Vickie Smallwood, made up plenty of real estate after the turn for home, but was never a threat to the winner. Draconic Deck, owned by Frank Ratliff Jr. and John Sheppard of Seminole, Texas, finished second and collected \$12,334.

Cue Me First, a filly owned by the 440 Ranch of Aubrey, Texas, ended up a game but tired third. She earned \$6,727 to go with the \$20,188 money line she carried into the Rio Grande.

Teeny Blade, trained by Gerald Marr, made his racing debut last week in the Rio Grande trials, winning by three lengths as a 14-1 outsider. That performance was enough to convince most Ruidoso fans Teeny Blade was a Real McCoy among home-breds.

The colt covered the Rio Grande course on an off-track clocking of 1:16 flat and paid \$5, \$3, \$2.60. Draconic Deck refunded \$3 and \$2.40. Cue Me First, ridden by Larry Byers, paid \$3 to show.

Trainer Marr had these post-race observations: "Sure, we're impressed with Teeny Blade. With no more experience than he's had, and the way he's exercised by them with everything in control, we have to be happy."

Marr also trains Lt. Pearle, a two-year-old filly now competing at The Downs at Santa Fe. Asked to compare Lt. Pearle with Teeny Blade, Marr said: "Lt. Pearle is one of the better two-year-olds in the state. But since Teeny Blade has been out only twice, you really don't know what kind of company he's been with. So it's

hard to compare the two. But I really think they're pretty close."

Marr added he would probably bypass the \$125,000 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity on September 4 and point Teeny Blade toward the New Mexico State Fair George Maloof Futurity at Albuquerque on September 19.

Teeny Blade was bred by Clayton Hust, who also bred Plucky Hussy, the 1981 Riley Allison Futurity winner at Sunland Park. (Both are by Plucky Blade.)

Ruidoso Downs enjoyed another surge at the betting windows over the weekend. Saturday's crowd of \$7,074 bet \$770,316, while Sunday's turnout of 6,227 wagered \$682,296. On the same weekend last year, 6,841 bet \$741,911 on Saturday, and 5,566 bet \$646,212 on Sunday.

Racing resumes Wednesday at 1 p.m. with first-round All-American Futurity trials.

MUSICAL KING made his fourth start of the '82 Ruidoso Downs season in Saturday's headliner and came through with his first victory of the year.

But the gelding had to run for all he was worth, squeezing through between horses late in the stretch to win by a nose on the last stride of the six and one-half furlong journey.

In those three previous starts at the meeting, Musical King raced at odds ranging from 17-1 to 41-1. Saturday's excellent turnout of 17,074 made the gelding a 9-1 shot in the duel carrying a claiming spread of \$22,000 to \$25,000.

Musical King was ridden by Vickie

Smallwood for Robert Searls Jr. and R. W. Sewell of Odessa, Texas. The mutual payoffs: \$20.20, \$9.80, \$6.

During the early portions of the sprint, Musical King lagged in 10th place. He was in seventh place when he turned for home, ostensibly out of range. But the gelding got the job done with a big push in the final half-furlong.

Time To Sail, with Mike Lidberg up, finished second for payoffs of \$4.80, \$3.60. Apalachee Chief (ridden by Larry Byers) paid \$5.60 to show.

Musical King clocked the distance in 1:21 4/5 seconds and earned \$3,180 out of the \$5,300 purse.

Total wagering on Saturday's 12-race program soared up to \$770,316.

VIBRANT PRINCESS survived a nip-and-tuck battle and barely won Friday's \$10,050 Futurity Prep Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly hardly got a chance to catch her breath in the six-furlong sprint for two-year-olds.

She managed to wrangle an early lead, but then backed off a bit when the 52-1 longshot, Wm. The Actor, moved briskly in the backstretch to take control.

But Vibrant Princess, ridden by Joe Martinez as a 6-5 favorite, kept her position on the rail and inched back into the clear. At the turn for home, Western Saint, a 6-1 shot, advanced strongly to challenge the favorite.

All-American Futurity trials start Wednesday

The trail leading to the 1982 All-American Futurity begins Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs.

Wednesday's card is the first of three programs which comprise the first round in the elimination run for the \$2.5 million All-American Futurity.

The All-American, which offers a stunning \$1 million to the winner this season, is the third and final leg in the coveted Triple Crown for two-year-olds.

The main standout in Wednesday's program is Yankee Win, the filly who made her mark on July 25 when he raced to a nose victory in the finale of the \$728,085 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso. Yankee Win collected a resounding \$253,079 and established herself among the year's top quarter horse stars.

She also came out of the Rainbow with a brilliant record of eight wins from nine starts, good for career earnings of over \$340,000. The valuable filly is trained by C. Dwayne Gilbreath for Jerry Rheudasil of Mr. Master Bug, the outstanding colt who had to settle for second behind Yankee Win in the Rainbow Futurity, is the big cheese in Wednesday's seventh race. The colt earned over \$115,000 in his Rainbow venture.

The eighth race includes two standouts — Miss Squaw Hand (seventh in the Rainbow finale) and Call Me Favorite (winner of the Rainbow Consolation).

Wednesday is also Ladies Day and Senior Citizens Day.

Extraterritorial Zoning Commission meeting set

The Extraterritorial Zoning Commission will hold its first regular meeting Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. at the Ruidoso administrative center.

The commission was recently established for the purpose of adopting a zoning ordinance for the area surrounding the village limits in a one-mile radius.

Members of the commission include M. R. "Milt" Alcorn, chairman, Mike Mulholland, secretary, and Tom Kelham—representing the village; Walton Wilson, vice chairman, Wes Grigsby and Howard Shanks—representing the county; Greg Haussler, ex-officio member.

Village and county representatives were appointed by the village council and county board of commissioners, respectively. Haussler was selected by the zoning commission, as will be an additional member, to serve at large. All members will serve one-year terms.

The Extraterritorial Zoning Commission has been appointed the task of designing an ordinance, within 360 days, which shall provide for the manner in which zoning regulations, restrictions and boundaries of the districts are determined, established and enforced and amended, supplemented or repealed.

At Tuesday's meeting, the group will establish a regular meeting schedule and discuss forming the first rough draft of the ordinance, Alcorn said.

He said the commission will probably alternate meeting in Carrizozo and Ruidoso.

State statute permits the establishment of such an extraterritorial zoning commission, according to Ruidoso planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp. He said such a commission had been set up here several years ago, but became inactive.

"We decided to get it started again to be a viable commission," Cupp stated.

Building permits in July showed steep downturn

Ruidoso building permit values in July took a 49 percent plunge from the June dollar value figure.

The total estimated value of permits in July was \$1,749,639 for 39 permits. The June mark was \$3,442,306 for 49 permits.

The figure shows a steep slide in new construction starts for the month. But Lincoln County Homebuilders president Paul Jordon does not think the drop is cause for builders to worry.

Jordon said local construction has slowed down because the market is now flooded with completed structures that Realtors are trying to sell. He noted that some developers overbuilt in recent months, and are having a hard time attracting buyers.

Jordon sees the slump as part of a normal building cycle. He said builders concentrate on new construction during spring in hopes of having completed buildings on the market during the summer.

This past spring's building permit figures seem to support that. In April, building permit valuation set an all-time monthly high at over \$5 million. Permit records were also set in March of this year

and November 1981.

In May, Ruidoso changed the way it estimates values of building permits to reflect actual cost of construction. Previously, permits were based on a value of \$20 per square foot.

This July's mark compares with the July 1981 figure of \$1.5 million. The total this year is \$19,891,253 for 317 permits. Last year at this time, the mark was \$11,833,059 for 320 permits. This year's figure is 40 percent higher than last year's.

Permits were issued in July for 28 single family dwellings, eight residential additions or alterations, one commercial building and two condominium projects.

Motorcycle Festival gets extra land

Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) treasurer Connie Brown told The News Sunday that an additional 8.9 acres adjoining the three-acre Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival site may also be used by RBA for its motorcycle festival.

"We did it. We got the land... I have the agreement from John Pennington on the other nine acres," Brown said.

Pennington, of El Paso, Texas, is the owner of the 8.9 acres adjacent to the three acres owned by the Holiday Inn. The Holiday Inn has already agreed to let RBA use its parcel of land for the September 29 through October 3 festival.

Brown wrote Pennington in a letter dated Tuesday, August 3, 1982: "In your telephone conversation with Hazel Haynesworth August 2, 1982, she informed us, RBA, that you agreed to give us permission and allow us to use your property located on Highway 70 (frontage road) east of the Holiday Inn motel for our

Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. "It is our intent to level your property, as soon as possible. The Village of Ruidoso is contributing their machinery, time and labor. We do think that leveling and seeding (if possible) would be a great benefit and value to you, now and in the future, with no cost to you ...

"We also intend to keep your property cleaned, policed and maintained at all times during and at the end of the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival.

"Tent assembly will start on September 24 and (be) vacated October 3, 1982, which will give us time for a complete clean up of the area.

"We do have liability insurance for the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival.

"We surely appreciate your support in our efforts to bring some revenue into our village, keep it here, and help the village people at a time when their tourist trade is very slow, which may help some through

the winter months. "Enclosed, please find the Ruidoso Business Association agreement for you to sign and return to us. An early reply would be very much appreciated as we need your signature to present to the Village of Ruidoso so they can proceed with the leveling of your land."


Pennington signed the agreement and returned it to Brown Thursday, August 5, she said.

Vibrant Princess was under pressure throughout the stretch before hitting the wire with a dwindling head lead over Western Saint. The latter was a neck in front of Waco Johnny, and Waco Johnny ended up a neck in front of Hard And Bold — which means four horses were dueling for the lead at the wire.

Vibrant Princess, trained by Jimmie Claridge for Thomas W. Moore of Fort Worth, clocked the six furlongs in 1:15 seconds flat and returned \$4.20, \$3.40, \$2.20. The victory purse of \$6,030 pushed her career earnings up to \$29,643. Since launching her career at Ruidoso earlier in the summer, she's chalked up three wins and two seconds from five starts.

Western Saint, ridden by Vickie Smallwood, earned \$2,211 and refunded \$4.80, \$2.80 in the betting. The filly is owned by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma.

Waco Johnny, ridden by Gary Sumpter, collected \$1,005 for third and paid \$2.40. Jockey Sumpter claimed interference from both Vibrant Princess and Western Saint, arguing both horses bothered his mount near the wire. The stewards turned him down.

Clocked in 1:43 4/5 seconds, Luckily Smashed returned mutual payoffs of \$7, \$5, \$3.80. Sena Road, carrying odds of almost 6-1, advanced out of third place to finish second, returning \$5.60 and \$4.60. Sunny's Rounder ended up third (\$8.20), three-fourths lengths behind Sena Road.



Head coach Darrel Stierwalt is optimistic about this year's team.

"We had a pretty good spring session," he said. "We worked on offensive and defensive formations and moved people around to fill positions where we had people graduating."

"We also got some good efforts from the players during the summer weight training program."

The Warriors were 4-2 in district 3-AAA action last year and 8-2 overall. They lost a co-championship and state playoff bid in the last game of the season when they were edged out by champion Silver City, 21-14, in the last two minutes.

There are 17 Warriors returning from last year's fine team.

Some of the top players include quarterback Billy Woodul, running back-defensive back Grady Williamson, running back-defensive back Eric Strobel, fullback-linebacker Kyle Flack, center-defensive tackle David Swalander, defensive end-offensive tackle Robert Swanner, offensive tackle-defensive tackle Craig Carson, wide receiver H. R. Luercas, wide receiver-defensive back Mike Douglas and offensive tackle-defensive end Chris Sanchez.

Woodul, who shared the starting quarterback duties with since graduated Scott Neal last season, has always been a fine passer and has improved his 40 yard dash times considerably over the summer.

Williamson should be one of the fastest AAA division running backs in the state this fall. He recorded a 100 meters best of 11.1 last spring and ran on three Warrior state meet relay squads.

Strobel, only a junior, is another back with plenty of speed. Also a trackman during the spring, he has good size and should continue to get better during the upcoming season.

Flack, who got in a lot of playing time at linebacker last season, also has good running ability and should see plenty of action at fullback this year. He'll be replacing all-state linebacker Lon Nunley and Chris Lopez at fullback.

Swalander started at center last season and is one of the best players on the squad.

Swanner saw considerable playing time at defensive end last season. A junior, he should do well both ways this year.

Carson and Sanchez should be the top standouts in the Warriors' interior lines this year. Both weigh at least 190 pounds.

Luercas and Douglas both have good speed and hands, ideal for wide receivers.

The Warriors will open the season with an away game at Lovington September 3. They will follow that game up with a contest at Socorro September 10 and play their

first home game September 17 against Dexter.

Ruidoso's homecoming will be September 24 against AA powerhouse Jal. The Warriors will tangle with New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell October 1 and open the district season with a home game against Cobre October 8.

Ruidoso will play archrival Tularosa October 15 at home. The Warriors will close out the season with away games at Deming (October 22), Truth or Consequences (October 29) and Silver City (November 5).

The Warriors will have a scrimmage against AAAA division school Las Cruces at 2 p.m., August 28, in Ruidoso.

NOTES-Ruidoso is hopeful of adding AAA powerhouse Artesia for the 1983 season. That year Tularosa will leave the AAA division for the smaller AA class but Stierwalt is still hopeful the Warriors can play Tularosa as a non-district foe that year.







SANTA FE - In New Mexico this year, nobody speaks for the center. We've got state contracts - left versus right - in the governor's race and the Lujan-Hartke race. We've got two guys fighting to see who will be the right of whom in the Steen-Chandler race. We've got two liberals of sorts in the Richardson-Chambers race.

The only place there might be a centrist is when Jeff Bingaman runs against Jack Schmitt. But Bingaman says nothing. Hence nobody speaks for the center. What's bad about that is that the center is where most of the people are. Let's just take one of these races, the governor's, as a quick example.

It's neat that this year we have a strong contrast between gubernatorial candidates.

It's good to have a choice, and a clear one.

We in New Mexico have that this year. Anya, firmly fixed at the left end of the political spectrum, and Irick, as strongly wedded to the far right.

You pays your money, and you takes your choice.

But there are many people who don't want to do that.

They aren't for the Toney Anya, spend-spend-spend, wing-beck-Jimmy-Carter philosophy.

They could go for John Irick if they had to.

Trouble is, Irick gives them no reason to do so.

He sounds like a resuscitated Barry Goldwater, Sr., the man who would rather be "right" than president.

Instead of making a slight move toward the center and hinting that he might possibly understand a small amount about human needs, Irick prefers to keep himself on the far right, where he retains the support of the Jack Stank-Army-Carter-Corky Morris folks.

Sense & Nonsense

There is considerable fanfare and fuss made over a young New Mexican who has been appointed to one of our nation's service academies. It is well-deserved too, since each one selected represents a cross-section of the best students the state has to offer our country.

Unfortunately, we tend to lose track of these bright young stars and they graduate in relative obscurity. I took a little time, through the research efforts of staff members in Albuquerque and Washington, to trace some of the earliest graduates I recommended for appointment to these service academies and see how well they are advancing in their careers.

My earliest recommendation for appointment came from the New Mexico High School Class of 1974. David Gallagher, a former resident of Alamogordo and a graduate of Alamogordo High School, is a fighter pilot assigned to the 37th Tactical Fighter Wing in George Air Force Base in California. Lieutenant Morris Lafayette Norton is stationed at Banger Submarine Base in Bremerton, Washington, and will return to work in Lovington following his discharge in June of 1983. Morris was a 1974 graduate of Lovington High School and received a degree in oceanography from the Naval Academy in Annapolis in 1978. Stationed on the USS Ethan Allen, a submarine, he received his "dubious" serving as the head of each department of this nuclear sub, and is now in engineers school in preparation for an engineers exam to be promoted to the position of ship engineer. Morris will return to Lovington to take a position in the Lea County Electrical Cooperative.

EXPENSIVE HELP

Suppose you are running a large federal government agency with a public relations staff numbering 34 practitioners of the art. Suppose further that you, as director, think you and some of your top officials could do with a little schooling in how to handle the media. The natural thing would be to call upon that public relations staff for some expert assistance.

This may be the natural course, but it is not the course followed at the beleaguered Environmental Protection Agency. Director Anne Gorsuch has chosen to hire an old Denver friend of the maximum allowable fee of \$221 a day plus \$15 a day for Washington living expenses, for the job.

Gorsuch and her chief aides are to be trained. Trained in what? Says the outside consultant, Don Ferguson, in ways to give "better, more accurate, more effective information." Says an anonymous agency employee reportedly familiar with the project, trained in evasive tactics with the idea that "the press is out to get you".

Maybe some of the press is indeed "out to get" the EPA, but that is not the question. The question is whether an agency on budgetary grounds ought to hire a highly paid outside public relations consultant to do what the agency's public relations people could do at no extra cost. 





THE WORLD ACCORDING TO GARP from Warner Bros. Directed by George Roy Hill. Screenplay by Steve Tesich. Starring Robin Williams, Mary McCormack and Glenn Close. Rated R.

John Irving's successful novel, "The World According to Garp," was much more than just a best-seller. To many the book embodied the confused culture of our time as it wrestled with such problems as sexual freedom vs. family ties, just living alongside liberation. It was a long, complex and often unnerving book, but it sold 5 million copies and is still selling well.

To convert those 500-plus pages into a motion picture of reasonable length was a ponderous task that many refused, including Irving himself. The task went to director George Roy Hill ("The Sting," "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid") and screenwriter Steve Tesich ("Breaking Away," "Eyewitness"). They've done a tremendous job in bringing "Garp" to the screen. The film is one of this year's best.

The film, like the book, follows the birth, tragicomic life and absurd death of T.S. Garp. Although much of the material in the book has been eliminated from the film, most of the spirit and intent of Irving's novel has been maintained. Garp's world is a sometimes exhilarating, sometimes exasperating merry-go-round of profanity and absurdity.

Robin Williams plays Garp, a departure from his usual zany outings. Here he is subdued and controlled while the world around him seems to have gone haywire. Perhaps Williams and the filmmakers realized that the world of Garp is so outrageous that even the comic genius of Williams would have a difficult time topping it. So will other 1982 movies when the Academy Awards are handed out.





