Pop's Spirit pulls away to Thoroughbred Derby win

Pop's Spirit, a gelding who'd raced with a cheap five-grand claiming price on his head early in the current Ruidoso Downs season, cruised to a coasting three-length win in Sunday's \$28,889 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby.

It was his sixth win of the season, and pushed his Ruidoso haul to \$27,398 — thus completing one of the best rags-to-riches stories in recent Ruidoso history.

Ruidoso patrons were probably a little stunned by the way Pop's Spirit knocked off the Derby. The gelding, well-riden by youthful Casey Lambert, stormed into the lead from the number 8 post.

Casey obviously planned to win the Derby by his own way, leading from start-to-finish in the mile journey. Bug Bopper, an outsider, rushed up to challenge Pop's Spirit during the first run in front of the grandstand, but the attack couldn't be sustained. Bug Bopper paid a stiff price for his audacity and drooped well off of the picture.

An early assault was also expected from the 32-1 longshot, Sunny's Rounder. But the gelding cashed in his chips sooner after the break and was never a factor. Luckily Smashed, the second favorite who usually finishes with a big kick, was kept well off the pace — fruitlessly waiting for Pop's Spirit to cook out.

Jack The Knife, a stablemate of Luckily Smashed, didn't have that much patience and rushed up to menace Pop's Spirit at the turn for home. Although filled with enthusiasm, Jack The Knife didn't have sufficient punch to overtake the people's choice.

Jockey Lambert never felt a need to use the whip, but he shook the reins a few times, and put a little more zip in his riding motion, at the top of the stretch. That was all the encouragement Pop's Spirit needed. He opened up easily and did little more than gallop down the straightaway, winning with much in reserve.

Luckily Smashed delivered no advance whatever. She faltered at the end, sagged badly, and finished eighth. She beat only one horse — the weary Bug Bopper.

Pop's Spirit covered the first two furlongs in a swift 23 seconds flat, then hit the halfway mark in a sharp 46 2/5 seconds. His final clocking of 1:42 2/5 seconds equalled the seasonal mark.

The outcome of the Derby clearly vindicated the judgment of the Double B. Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico. On May 15, the gelding was spotted in a \$5,000 claiming race at Ruidoso, and acquired for that paltry amount.

Cliff Lambert (Casey's father) is the Double B. trainer.

Pop's Spirit, who appears to have sewed up the seasonal crown among three-year-old thoroughbreds, returned betting payoffs of \$3.80, \$3.40, \$2.80.

Pocketpurse, a 40-1 shot directed by Pedro Benitez, moved well at the end to finish second, earning \$6,355. He returned \$35.60, \$6.40. Third went to Sena Road, an 8-1 shot handled by Richard Bickel. Third was worth \$3,466. The payoff: \$3.80.

Racing resumes Wednesday at an early 12:30 a.m. with All-American Derby trials. **RULE THE DECK**, the brilliant mare who lost both the \$135,495 World's Cham-

pionship Quarter Horse Classic and an eight-race win streak on a disqualification, got her revenge during Saturday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The mare returned to duty in the seventh race, which was one of five trial heats leading to one of the world's richest races — the \$980,720 All-American Gold Cup.

Rule The Deck knocked her foes silly, leading from the first jump, then opening up even more ruthlessly in the final strides. Ridden by Jack Wallace, Rule The Deck thundered under the wire in a head-wind clocking of 22.02 seconds on a slow track.

She won by the remarkable margin of four and one-fourth lengths.

Rule The Deck's clocking held up as the fastest of the afternoon, and appears to make her the favorite in the Gold Cup finale on August 22. The winner earns a whopping \$490,365.

The Gold Cup is restricted to four-year-olds. This year's edition marks the debut of the race.

Rule The Deck, owned by Texas Tech law student Dirk Jones, raced as a 1-9 favorite and coughed up meager mutual returns of \$2.20, \$2.60, \$2.20.

In her previous out on August 1, Rule The Deck raced as a second-favorite in the \$135,495 World's Championship Classic,

finished first by three-fourths lengths, but her number was taken down for interference. She's been gunning for a ninth straight victory.

The second-top Gold Cup qualifier was Baby Hold On (\$4.60), who moved powerfully in the final stages to nail the odds-on favorite, Queen For Cash, in the 10th race. Baby Hold On, owned by Gerald and Darlene Blue of Amarillo, Texas, was timed in 22.27 seconds. The other qualifiers:

— Queen For Cash, 22.29, owned by J. E. Jumonville Jr. of Ventress, Louisiana

— Mr. Speed Boat, 22.43, owned by W. L. Edwards of Ruidoso

— Lucks Gay Chic, 22.47, owned by Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma

— Explosive Native, 22.49, owned by E. L. Baker Jr. of Fort Worth, Texas

— Hempens Easy Tam, 22.54, owned by Darrel Kisse of Miami, Oklahoma

— Runnin Barre, 22.54, owned by Robert and Juanita Ballenger of Paoli, Oklahoma

— Higheasterjet, 22.55, owned by G. D. Highsmith of La Grange, Texas

— Kiss A Toad, 22.55, owned by Brooks Hall of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

Higheasterjet, the second richest quarter horse of all time (with earnings of just over \$1,012,000), won his trial heat by an easy one and one-fourth lengths, then was disqualified for interference and plac-

ed third (in the sixth race).

But Higheasterjet's recalled time was still fast enough to put him in the Gold Cup finale. The disqualification snapped Higheasterjet's eight-race win streak.

DYNAGO VICTORY, a colt who's already earned over \$162,000, kept his All-American Futurity hopes alive on Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs by racing to a mud-splattered head victory.

All races on Friday were run at 440 yards, and each was part of the first-round elimination trials for the All-American.

In order to advance into the final round on August 26, a hopeful had to finish in the top three in the first round. The All-American comes up on Labor Day, offering a gross purse of \$2,530,000 and handing the winner a cool \$1 million.

Dynago Victory raced as a 1-5 favorite in Friday's ninth race and jumped into a half-length lead under Jerry Nicodemus. His lead dwindled steadily at the end, but he was a head in front when he hit the wire in a no-wind clocking of 22.57 seconds.

The colt, owned by Clarence Scharbauer Jr. of Midland, Texas, returned mutual payoffs of \$2.60, \$2.40, \$2.20.

Shaken Not Stirred, the beaten favorite in the recent \$728,035 Rainbow Futurity, also gained a berth in the August 26 runoff — but the filly suffered a blow to her

prestige by getting nosed out by the 8-1 outsider, Azure Jet Lad. Shaken Not Stirred went off as an odds-on favorite in the third race.

Easy Prince, the colt who'd brought a record \$400,000 in last summer's All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso, raced as an odds-on favorite in the fifth race. But Easy Prince was victimized by bad luck. He stumbled

Court expected to order Racquet Club sale

The Sierra Swim and Racquet Club will apparently be under new ownership soon.

A hearing was held in District Court last Wednesday to establish priority of holders of liens against the racquet club. Ruidoso State Bank submitted a petition for foreclosure of lien in May 1981, to recover judgment of more than \$1 million.

Jim Wimberly, former owner of the property, holds a mortgage for approximately one-half million dollars, he said, and is second behind the bank to receive judgment in the sale.

Other holders of liens against the property include Ruidoso Printing; Ruidoso Wholesale Lumber; the Village of Ruidoso (in the amount of \$4,562 for water, sewer and garbage services); and Jack Hicks, who filed a mechanic's lien.

According to Ron Harris, attorney representing Ruidoso State Bank, the court must yet decide where Hicks stands in order of priority. Harris said that following this decision, he will be instructed to prepare and file with the court a decree of foreclosure. A sale date will then be set, no less than 30 days after the decree is filed.

Harris said it is his intent to schedule the sale exactly 30 days after the filing.

Ruidoso State Bank, according to Harris, is "pretty much obliged" to bid the amount of its mortgage in the sale. Bank president Robert Hays refused to comment on whether or how much the bank would bid, however.

Wimberly stated that he does intend to bid on the property in the sale, but he would not disclose the amount.

Village manager Jim Hine said Friday that as far as he knows, the village will not submit a bid for the racquet club.

Hays and Wimberly both declined to comment on any plans either may have for the racquet club if it is purchased. Plans for construction of a Hilton hotel at the site have apparently been abandoned, however.

Louis Maldonado, partner in Vista Enterprises, developers who planned to construct a Hilton hotel at the site, said Friday his company does not plan to bid on the property at a foreclosure sale.

"I think we have wasted enough time on this project," he stated.

Maldonado said that plans are currently being finalized for construction of a Hilton on an alternate site in the village, which he would not disclose.

He said the plans will be presented to the village council as soon as all arrangements are finalized.

badly at the start and lost all chances as the second-favorite. Lucks Lucky, cruised to a half-length win.

Miss Azure Te Bug, the filly who'd lost her Rainbow Futurity bid by being jostled by Bartendress, returned to action in Friday's seventh race and won handily by a length as a heavy favorite.

BARTENDESS, a filly owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, came through with a strong half-length win on Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs and gained a berth in the August 26 final qualifying round for the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity.

Thursday's program was the second of three straight days devoted to first-round

trials for the world's richest horse race. In order to get by the first round, a hopeful had to finish in the top three in his 440-yard heat.

Bartendress, who drew into the second race, broke smartly and took command at once. She was in control throughout, winning with a tailwind clocking of 22.30 seconds.

The filly negotiated the course in straight-as-an-arrow style, unlike her performance in the recent \$728,085 Rainbow Futurity. In that one, she finished second by a nose at 32-1, but was disqualified for interference and placed last.

Ruidoso patrons made Bartendress a topeavy favorite in Thursday's outing, and she returned \$2.60, \$2.60 and \$2.20.

Thoroughbred trials Thursday

Sundays Payday, winner of the richest thoroughbred race ever run at Ruidoso Downs, heads the field for Thursday's trial races for the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity.

The races, each at six furlongs with a purse of \$1,900, match the \$5 two-year-olds eligible to participate in the meet's featured thoroughbred attraction. They will be run as the seventh, eighth, 10th and 11th races.

To automatically advance to the September 4 finale with an estimated purse of \$146,631, a horse must finish either first or second in the trial races. A special drawing will be held among the four third-place finishers for the remaining two berths in the six furlong finale.

Sundays Payday has enjoyed a spectacular season. Following a sixth-place effort in his career debut on May 9 at Ruidoso Downs, the Loom colt won four straight races at the mountain track.

His most important conquest was a widening three-length win in the \$153,767 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity on June 27.

After that impressive performance, Sundays Payday was taken to La Mesa Park in Raton where he won a trial race for the prestigious Land of Enchantment Futurity. Although he was disqualified and placed second during the trial race, he still qualified for the finale on July 25 over five and one-half furlongs.

Despite a hazardous trip in the Land of Enchantment, Sundays Payday still finished second and collected \$32,474.

That brought his career record to four victories and two seconds from seven starts for trainer Bob E. Arnett. He's earned \$114,353 for owner Hugh C. Preston Jr. of Burkburnett, Texas.

Sundays Payday will face eight foes in the 10th race.

Vibrant Princess, who finished third behind Sundays Payday in the Norgor, looms as another key entrant.

Since that setback, Vibrant Princess has captured two races with her frontrunning style. On July 18, she drew clear for a four and one-half length win at five and one-half furlongs in the Pocket Coin Allowance Stakes at Ruidoso Downs and on August 6, she outlasted Western Saint and Waco Johnny for a head victory in the Futurity Prep Stakes over six furlongs.

The General's Prince filly has posted three victories with two thirds in five career appearances for trainer Jimmie Claridge. She's earned \$29,643 for owner Thomas W. Moore of Fort Worth, Texas.

Vibrant Princess will compete against eight opponents in the 11th race.

Waco Johnny, less than a half-length behind Vibrant Princess while running third in the Futurity Prep Stakes, appears to be the major entrant in the seventh race.

The Sharp Kid colt has captured two races with two seconds and one third in seven outings for trainer Brooks Claridge. He's collected \$6,800 for owners L. Glen Hays, Herman C. and Raymond Hickman and Larry Zettle of Bend, Oregon.

Following Friday's regular racing program, Saturday's highlight will be the Mr. Tattoo Handicap seven and one-half furlongs. Three-year-old and older runners will compete under the handicap weights assigned by racing secretary Rick Henson for a purse of \$12,000-added.

Sunday's feature will be the first of three million-dollar races at Ruidoso Downs, the

All-American Gold Cup. The inaugural running of this 440-yard fixture for four-year-old quarter horses will have an estimated purse of \$980,000.

Post time for each day's program will be 1 p.m.

One local lumber yard has ordered a shipment of treated shake shingles to keep on stock, and two others will order the roofing material on demand but do not plan to stock it because of the high cost of inventory.

The village council banned the use of untreated shake shingles as roofing material in May, after village fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy issued a report regarding fire danger of untreated shakes.

Last week, councilman Benny Coulston said he tried to order treated shakes but found lumber companies will not keep them on stock. Coulston said if he could not get shingles soon, he would seek to rescind the ban.

Dave Ragsdale of T-Bird Home Center said Monday morning he has ordered a shipment of treated shakes to keep on supply. He said he has not received too many requests for the shingles in the three months since the ordinance went into effect. But, he noted, demand has started to increase.

Power company asks rate hike

Texas-New Mexico Power Company (T-NMP) customers may soon be paying higher electric bills, if the company's request for a rate increase is approved.

A request was filed August 12 with the New Mexico Public Service Commission for a 7.10 percent increase in rates, according to Maxie Davie, vice president of public affairs for T-NMP.

The increase, expected to generate \$3,420,858, was proposed due to higher interest expenses and rising costs of materials, services and supplies, Davie stated in a recent press release.

A typical customer's bill will increase \$2.71 per month if the proposed increase is approved, Davie reported, based on consumption of 400 kilowatts per hour.

The percentage of increase would vary according to different classes of customers, from 4.02 percent for street lighting to 8.93 percent for large general service. Residential rates would increase 6.31 percent.

Treated shingles available, local lumber dealers say

"We wanted to wait until the demand got good enough," he said. Ragsdale said the treated shingles, which are impregnated with a fire retardant chemical, cost about \$120 for enough to cover 100 square feet.

A spokesman for Ruidoso Wholesale Lumber and Supply said an average roof has an area of about 1,600 square feet. He quoted the price for treated shakes at \$150 to \$200 per 100 square feet, which compares to \$30 to \$60 for the same quantity of untreated shakes, he said.

The spokesman said Ruidoso Wholesale does not stock treated shakes, and has no plans to do so.

"Nobody has asked to order them," he said. "The price runs everybody away."

Steve Phelps of C&L Lumber and Supply said he has ordered treated shakes for customers since the ordinance passed, and has had no problems getting the roofing material shipped to Ruidoso. He said he will not stock treated shakes because of the high cost of inventory, but that he would be glad to order them when requested. He said the treated shakes cost about \$140 per 100 square feet.

Special Effort, Higheasterjet run

The two richest quarter horses of all time, Special Effort and Higheasterjet, will be in action this week as Ruidoso Downs swings into the homestretch of the 1982 season.

Only three weeks of racing remain.

This week, activities kick off on Wednesday and extend through Sunday. But there's one exception to the normal pattern, and that's a 12:30 p.m. starting time on Wednesday.

The reason for Wednesday's early start is to accommodate 14 440-yard trial races for the \$1 million All-American Derby. First post throughout the rest of the week is 1 p.m.

Without doubt, tremendous interest will be riveted to Wednesday's program as Special Effort, considered by many the greatest quarter horse of all time, goes in the eighth race.

The colt, owned by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas, is undefeated in a dozen lifetime starts and holds a money line of \$1,153,803. That makes him the biggest money-maker in quarter horse history.

But Special Effort finds himself in the ironic position of having to prove himself all over again — to a certain degree. He started the season smartly by winning the \$354,000 Kansas Derby. He won his trial

heat for the \$668,620 Rainbow Derby, but his clocking put him in the consolation — an invitation he subsequently declined.

Higheasterjet, the sport's second-top money maker (with earnings of just over \$1,012,000), will be in business at the end of the week when he faces a star-packed field in the finale of the \$980,730 All-American Derby. The event, limited to four-year-olds, makes its debut on Sunday.

Briefly, here's a sizeup of the weekend slate:

WEDNESDAY — 14 trial races for the \$1 million All-American Derby, starting at 12:30 p.m. The lineup includes the likes of Special Effort, Johnny Vittorio, Dashingy, Chicks Passem All, Rebelier. Wednesday is also Ladies Day and Senior Citizens Day.

THURSDAY — The 12-race card includes four six-furlong trial races for Ruidoso's most prestigious thoroughbred event, the \$146,631 (estimated) Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity. The trials are booked as the seventh, eighth, 10th and 11th races. The candidates include Sunday's Payday, winner by three lengths of the recent \$153,767 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity at Ruidoso. Sunday's Payday, who drew into the 10th race, holds a career record of four victories and two seconds from seven starts, good for earnings of

\$114,353. Vibrant Princess, who finished third in the Norgor, is the standout in the 11th race.

FRIDAY — The regular 12-race program.

SATURDAY — The spotlight is on the Mr. Tattoo Handicap for three-year-olds and up at seven and one-half furlongs. The race originally carried an added purse of \$7,500, but the ante was boosted to \$12,000-added as part of racing secretary Rick Henson's round of stakes increases last week. The Mr. Tattoo is likely to attract Double B. Express, Ruidoso's leading candidate, at this point, for the '82 Thoroughbred Horse-Of-The-Meet crown.

SUNDAY — The first running of the \$980,730 All-American Gold Cup offers the winner a mind-numbing \$490,365. If Higheasterjet gets the job done, he'll go soaring ahead of Special Effort as the sport's leading money-maker. But Higheasterjet appears to be up against the toughest assignment of his career. He barely managed to squeak into the qualifying list. Here's the way they qualified: Rule The Deck, 22.02; Baby Hold On, 22.27; Queen For Cash, 22.29; Mr. Speedboat, 22.43; Lucks Gay Chick, 22.47; Explosive Native, 22.49; Hempens Easy Tam, 22.54; Rynnin Barre, 22.54; Higheasterjet, 22.55; Kiss A Toad, 22.55.

Stakes purses hiked by \$19,500

A total of \$19,500, including a major boost for the Ruidoso Mile, has been added to six key stakes races at Ruidoso Downs.

The Mile, the meet's featured attraction for three-year-old and older thoroughbreds, will now have a purse of \$30,000-added. It's set for September 5.

"Older thoroughbreds now have a chance to run for \$35,000 in August at the Downs at Santa Fe (in the Santa Fe Special), then come to Ruidoso and run for more than \$30,000 in September (in the Ruidoso Mile) and then go to Albuquerque to run for \$40,000 (the New Mexico State Fair Handicap)," said Ruidoso Downs racing secretary Rick Henson.

"Older horses will now take a serious look at coming here when they can run for that kind of money," Henson added. "It will really encourage horses from Lincoln, Denver and Santa Fe to look at these kind of races. If the money is right, the horses will follow."

The complete list of stakes which have been hiked:

- The Mr. Tattoo Handicap, a seven and one-half furlong chase for three-year-old and older horses on August 21. The purse is now \$12,000-added, up from \$7,500-added.
- The Ruidoso Sprint, a six furlong race for three-year-old and up horses on August 28. The purse has been increased

- from \$15,000-added to \$17,500-added.
- The Roadrunner Stakes, a six furlong dash for three-year-old New Mexico-breds, on September 2, has been boosted from a \$7,500 purse to \$10,000.
- The Brigand Handicap, an 870-yard dash on September 3 for three-year-old and older runners, has been increased from \$12,500-added to \$15,000-added.
- The Ruidoso Mile has been hiked from \$25,000-added to \$30,000-added.
- The Ruidoso 550 Championship, a 550-yard sprint for three-year-old and older runners on September 6, has been raised from \$10,000-added to \$12,500-added.

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It's been a lifetime of skiing for Dale Pearson

Dale Pearson has been skiing almost as long as he's been alive. The Ruidoso resident started skiing when he was four years old. Now, at 25, he's a professional skier with a long list of accomplishments.

"I've been skiing professionally for two years," Pearson said. "I made All-American three straight years at the University of Colorado. That's something I'm really proud of."

Pearson learned to ski when his father was a ski instructor at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort. He became a member of the Junior Ski Racers team when he was only five years old.

"I competed on the Junior Ski Racers through high school," Pearson commented. "The junior ski program was really active then and a lot of families were involved."

"I also competed in most of the other sports through my freshman year of high school. I played freshman football and basketball. However, I then decided to concentrate on skiing instead because I felt I was going somewhere in that sport. I was one of the few A (highest division of junior racers) skiers in Ruidoso."

Pearson was impressive enough as a skier to receive a skiing scholarship to Colorado at the beginning of the 1975-76 school year. While he was there, the team won four national collegiate championships, part of an eight-year string of national

championships.

"Colorado won the national championship eight straight years from 1972 to 1979," Pearson said. "Besides making All-American I also won the Dick Schoenberger Award for the best Colorado skier during my senior year."

Pearson competed in the giant slalom and slalom events in college. He finished in the top five in the country in at least one of the events for three straight years, thus qualifying for All-American honors.

After Pearson's senior year at Colorado, Wyoming took the national championship from the Golden Buffalos in 1980. Utah, another consistent skiing powerhouse, won the national title in 1981. However, Colorado regained the national championship in 1982.

Pearson rates the skiing competition in the Rocky Mountain area and the Northeast as generally the best in the country. The northeastern part of the country has some excellent coaching at many of the colleges.

The Northwest area, including Washington and Oregon, is not generally as tough, according to Pearson.

This past ski season, Pearson competed on the professional Rocky Mountain Peugeot circuit and finished fourth in the overall standings.

He was also on the United States development team in 1980 before turning professional.

"I work out with weights and run a lot during the off season," the 5-9, 155 pound Pearson said. "At Colorado we also work-

ed out on the football stadium stairs. That's really rough."

Pearson is about the average size for a professional skier.

"Most skiers are of average size," he said. "Really tall people don't usually have the quickness necessary to become top skiers."

The pro skiing season usually lasts from November to April and most of the competition is in Colorado. However, this summer Pearson won the giant slalom championship in the \$10,000 Summer Pro Race at Timberlake Lodge in Oregon. He also finished third in the slalom race.

Pearson has taught at a ski training school in Bend, Oregon, the past two summers.

The sky could be the limit for this fine skier from Ruidoso.

DALE PEARSON of Ruidoso was a three-time All-American at the University of Colorado from 1977 to 1979. He was a Junior Ski Racer at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort when he was five years old and has been ski-

ing since then. He was a member of the United States development team in 1980 and has been skiing professionally for two years.

The Atlanta Braves have done what 10 days ago I said probably wouldn't happen.

Going into this last weekend's series with the San Diego Padres, the Braves had lost nine straight games and 13 of their last 24. They were swept eight straight games by the Los Angeles Dodgers and lost five of six to the upstart San Francisco Giants.

Now the National League's Western Division is anybody's race.

However, if anyone is to be considered the favorite it would have to be the defending World Series champion Dodgers.

Although they're a bit long in years, the Dodgers still proved they have what it takes in the clutch by sweeping the two Atlanta series and winning four of six from Cincinnati.

Los Angeles has always been a tough team down the stretch. In 1978 Los Angeles entered September a half game behind the Giants but swept San Francisco in two series and won the Western Division pennant going away.

Last year the Dodgers fell behind Atlanta two games to none in the strike-caused divisional playoffs before winning three straight from the Astros.

Los Angeles then rallied from a 2-1 game deficit against Montreal to take the National League pennant and overcame the Yankees from a 2-0 game disadvantage for the World Series title.

Players like Steve Garvey, Ron Cey and Dusty Baker have always been tough in the clutch and the Dodgers' pitching staff one of the best in baseball. They're definitely the team to beat now.

Ironically, it's the Giants who may be Los Angeles' main threat for the division championship. San Francisco was 10 games below .500 in late June before starting its hot streak.

The Giants looked like a team headed for nowhere but possibly last place in the first couple months of the season. But manager Frank Robinson and his coaching staff have turned that team around, particularly the young pitching staff, which has done an outstanding job.

Reggie Smith joined San Francisco as a free agent before the season started. He was bothered by nagging injuries early in the season but has been perhaps the hottest hitter in the National League over the last month. He also gives the Giants

something they haven't really had in a long time: pennant pressure experience.

The Braves are still in the race. However, most teams that have blown big leads in the past usually find it hard to get their winning ways back.

I still think Atlanta has the best overall talent in the division but it may take a frustrating season like this one to turn the Braves into a real pennant contender.

San Diego seems to be slipping now and it's unlikely the Padres will still be contending for the division title when the last week of the season rolls around.

Too much youth and questionable pitching would appear to be too much of an obstacle for San Diego to overcome.

Houston and Cincinnati? It's wait until next year for those teams, perhaps the most disappointing squads in the major leagues this season.

As for the other division races, Philadelphia and St. Louis are a virtual toss-up for the National League's Eastern Division title. The Montreal Expos were favored to win the division crown at the beginning of the season but have never really gotten untracked this year.

Kansas City and California should battle for the American League Western Division title down to the last weekend.

Both teams have a great deal of talent in their batting lineups. Kansas City has a slight edge pitching-wise and that should give it the division title by a game or so.

The Chicago White Sox have stayed in third place for most of the season and don't quite have the talent to stay with the Royals and California.

In the American League's Eastern Division, Milwaukee stands above all the other teams this season. The Brewers have probably the most overwhelming every-day lineup in baseball, one that compares with some of the better New York Yankee teams.

The Boston Red Sox and Baltimore Orioles, both rich in pennant race experience, will probably battle for second place. The Detroit Tigers and the onemighty Yankees will more than likely have to settle for break-even seasons, probably winning between 80 and 85 games.

Ruidoso High School's football team has less time to get ready for its scrimmage with Las Cruces High School than was originally planned.

The scrimmage has been changed to 4 p.m. this coming Saturday at Las Cruces. Originally the scrimmage was scheduled for Ruidoso Saturday, August 28.

However, Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt doesn't see any disadvantage to playing the scrimmage a week earlier.

"We've come pretty far along in practice already," he said. "We've worked on offensive and defensive plays and gotten our kicking game well established.

"Besides, the extra week between the

scrimmage and our first game (at Lovington September 3) will give us some more time to get any players who are injured ready for the opener."

The Warriors begin working with pads today and are continuing their varsity two-a-day practices. The freshmen will continue to work out in the afternoon.

Las Cruces, an AAAA division school, has been having a rough time in the past few years. It's in the same district as Alamogordo and Sandia of Albuquerque and those teams are usually among the best in the state.

"They've got a new coach this year (Paul Petty) and haven't done well recent-

ly," Stierwalt commented.

Stierwalt is also hopeful that more players will come out this week. At present there are 36 players practicing with the varsity and 15 with the freshmen. The junior varsity squad will be made up of sophomores and freshmen when the season begins.

NOTES: Halfback Grady Williamson and fullback-linebacker Kyle Fläckson suffered sprained ankles recently but the injuries don't appear serious. Quarterback Billy Woodul and running back Eric Strobel are also displaying their talents at probing the ball. Sophomore Manuel Montano has looked good kicking extra points.

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
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CCD grads picnic it up

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Michael Murphey promises variety of musical styles in concert

Those planning to attend the Concert in the Pines this Friday—featuring Michael Murphey, Jerry Jeff Walker and Gary P. Nunn—are in for a surprise, promises Michael Murphey. In a recent telephone interview with The News, Murphey talked about his music and about what the audience can expect from the concert.

Michael Murphey is best known for his Top 40 ballads "Wildfire" and "Carolina in the Pines," but he performs all types of music, from honky-tonk country to pop ballads.

The singer/songwriter attributes this versatility to the time he spent as a professional songwriter in California.

"When you're a professional songwriter, people throw different projects at you—rock, country. I learned a lot because I had to write about all the kinds of music there is."

During this time, Murphey's songs were recorded on albums by Kenny Rogers, the Dirt Band, Linda Ronstadt, Jerry Jeff Walker and Bobbie Gentry, among others.

While earning a living as a songwriter in California, Murphey did some performing, mostly as a sideman playing bass, or traveling back to his native Texas to perform his own songs.

Murphey said he always performed original material, which meant there were fewer jobs, but more creativity.

"I'd rather work for \$100 or \$150 and do my own songs than get \$500 singing 'By the Time I Get to Phoenix' at the Holiday Inn," Murphey stated.

But he advises others who seek a career in music, "whatever you have to do to stay in music is better to do than get out of it."

Murphey said he has never had any job outside of the music field, which is no surprise considering that he began at the age of six. At 15, he began playing music professionally, "to earn extra money." When he was 17, Michael hosted a local music show in Dallas, Texas, which is when "the bug sort of bit me," he said.

After attending a local college for about a year, Murphey transferred to UCLA to be close to the music business. This is when he began writing songs professionally and eventually decided he wanted to do some recording himself.

After his demonstration tapes were turned down by all the record companies he had submitted them to, Michael decided to return to Texas. In Austin, he formed his own band. A producer from Nashville, Tennessee, heard the band in Dallas and took it to Nashville, where Murphey recorded his first album, "Geronimo's Cadillac."

Michael Murphey has recorded 10 albums in the 10 years since then, with his newest release, "Michael Martin Murphey," his debut with EMI/Liberty.

The singer has never returned to Los Angeles or Nashville, "because my success came after I got out of those places," he said. Murphey prefers to live in the Southwest and now resides in Taos.

"I'm always scheming to stay out West," Murphey admitted. "The camaraderie of the people who live out here doesn't exist in other areas."

"If I could get away with it, I would just tour the Southwest and Rocky Mountain area, but that's not a very broadminded attitude."

The performer travels about 200 days a year, giving 130 to 140 concerts. Friday will not be Murphey's first visit to Ruidoso to perform. He gave a concert here last summer, after which "we immediately discussed coming back next year," he said.

"Every chance I get to perform in New Mexico I take," said Murphey.

His concert last year was not his first visit to Ruidoso, although, it had been "years and years" since he had been here vacationing with his parents as a child.

"I was shocked to find how much it could grow and still keep its nice character," Murphey related. "I'm real impressed with the town."

The performer said he is especially impressed with the location of the concert—at Eagle Creek—where there is a sort of natural amphitheater. "The sound is real good."

"I love it when an outdoor show is surrounded by beautiful country," he commented.

"I'm excited about being there during the peak season," Murphey added. And he promises the audience "a pretty fast paced, fast moving show."

"The average person probably goes home tired from my concert," he reported. "I don't want them to leave feeling they want more."

Those who know Michael Murphey only for his hit ballads will probably be surprised by his concert. Of course "Wildfire" and "Carolina in the Pines" will be included in his performance. "I always try to put those songs in the show because people feel cheated if they come and don't hear those songs—but I also include things they don't expect to hear," Murphey commented.

Among the music his audiences may not expect to hear, but will, are old time fiddle tunes, Southern rock music, esoteric folk songs, Irish music, acoustic numbers, honky-tonk country, old time banjo songs and pop ballads.

Murphey said he always changes the show to include a surprise element, so the concert is not a repeat of the one before.

He said he enjoys singing all types of music and really does not have a preference. "I like singing the ballads," he added. "They tend to bring more pleasure to more people. They're nice to do and appeal to a wide range of people."

The performer/songwriter/recording artist does have definite ideas about which areas of his profession he most enjoys.

"Performing is probably the most fun, though the traveling aspect kind of tempers that a little."

"Writing is the most rewarding over the long run. It keeps coming back to you; you feel you've done something that's gonna last longer than you do."

"But for day to day enjoyment," Murphey added, "performing is best." Seeing the smiles on faces in the audience when a familiar song is played is the kind of instant feedback that makes performing so worthwhile, he explained.

This kind of interaction—with the audience and with the other musicians on stage—is "the life's blood of it," acknowledged Murphey.

"Without meeting the public eye-to-eye, it would be very sterile," he added.

Murphey will get an opportunity to meet the Ruidoso public eye-to-eye this Friday, and he said, "I am really excited to come to Ruidoso."

"I'm gonna be there to help the people enjoy part of the summer—what's left of it; we're gonna have a good time out there."

Murphey added that he is looking forward to playing with Jerry Jeff Walker and Gary P. Nunn.

"The spirit of the whole thing is that we're all friends playing together," he concluded.

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

Services for Charles Klein were planned in Odessa, Texas. We wish Romeo many happy returns of the day and all God's blessings on the occasion of his birthday.

And we take comfort in knowing his father is safe and happy in Heaven with Our Lord, after a long and blessed life here among us.

The City That Came Back To Life
"Oh speak through earthquake, flood, and fire
Thou Still, small voice of calm."
So goes the old Episcopal Hymn.

Years ago I asked a native New Mexico boy of Hispanic descent where he was born. He mentioned the name of a village; and I asked him where it was located. He hesitated a moment or so and then said, "I think they took it off the map now."

He meant that as the population dwindled and moved away, the town faded from the map. Valdez Alaska, the birthplace of myself and my brother, Mark, was almost totally destroyed by the earthquake of Good Fri-

day, 1964. A tidal wave soon followed which finished the destruction. And then later a fire broke out in the ruins, leaving hardly a trace of the historic village.

But Valdez refused to be "taken off the map."

From Skagway we went back to Juneau, and then took the plane to Anchorage, and then another plane to Valdez.

Mother Nature once again did us one more favor by rolling back the clouds so that the trip to Anchorage was a rare experience of viewing Alaska scenery at its best, in mid-summer when the shining snow-capped mountain peaks are set off by the brilliant green lower down; and inlets, and Aqua-marine glaciers, "emerald Isles, and winding bays" all along the coast land. And Anchorage is in a magnificent setting on the vast and curving Cook Inlet, a majestic city, gem of the northland with Alaska's crown of glory, Mount McKinley, all silver and gold, in the distant background.

A Little World All Its Own
I could feel my heart beating higher as Lynn, Joe Redinger, and I watched closely from the sky for the first glimpse of my native city, scene of fondest memories.

The clouds rolled by completely now, and down shone the sun on a magic world. Valdez bay appeared below, and we entered a vast valley with lofty mountains on one side, the most beautiful seen thus far on the trip, towering into the sky, their tops decorated with light blue glaciers, and white streams running down to the bay.

On the other side was a high mountain, close by out the plane window, greenest of the green, with sparkling Lynns flowing down. And then my heart gave a jump, as off to one side my eye caught the landmark of my infancy, the Valdez glacier, blue as our mother's eye, welcoming me home, after sixty-nine years.

The Valdez Spirit
Out of the plane and on to my native ground, a thousand memories of purest happiness returned with a rush — at the smell of the breeze off the bay, and the moist fresh air from the mountainside filled with aromas of leaf, flower, shrub, moss, and berry.

In a spell of boundless joy — and new, calm feeling of experiencing a dream come true — we rode on into a right little sparkling new city reminding you of something in a story book.

Not long ago my neighbor Debbie Jones and her friend Jane Tully made a trip to Alaska. We were talking about the natural beauty of Alaska, and Debbie said,

"What I like most of all was the people." The streets are wide in New Valdez, reminding you of the open heart of Alaska, the place is spotless and every home well kept. The flowers are the most colorful and fragrant you ever saw. And the people are in harmony with the charm of their town. We visited Mr. Truck Egan, elder brother of Ex-Governor William A. Egan, age eighty-five. His sister Alice Horton was under the weather, but we did have the pleasure of meeting her lovely daughter, Mrs. Donna Fischer.

Mr. Egan said he remembered our father, and had sold papers in Old Valdez when he was a boy. He told me many things about the early days and identified buildings in old photographs I left with him.

At the Valdez Heritage Center we met

the curator, Judith Kreutzer, her assistant Linda Guthrie, and the chairman of the Heritage board, Mr. Steve Brittain.

Just as we entered, they were making photostats of a plat our father had made about 1908 of Valdez with the Gold claims all located around the city. This almost unbelievable good fortune followed us all over Alaska. We had a grand visit and we left them some old photographs taken by our father, and some of the prints of Western paintings by our Brother Mark, a native of Valdez.

Debra Reed at the chamber of commerce and visitor center was a wonderful help in all ways, helping us locate the site of our old home where Mark and I were born.

We also met a queen of a lady in Mrs. Dorothy Clifton at her historic center, "Archives Alive" a treasure house of history and historical objects.

With the help of some maps, Lynn was able to find the location of our home. There is nothing left of the old town, but the main streets are marked.

As I stood on the site of our old home, everything seemed to speak to me. The breeze from the glacier whispered in my ear and, the light wind from the bay caressed my cheek. And the Heavenly happiness of the old days came back, and the spirits of all our loved ones were lovingly close at this sacred spot.

Dorothy, in true Alaska generosity, made us three copies of documents from the old Church of the Epiphany complete with the baptismal record of Mark (Marcus Kennedy Storm).

We also saw a documentary of the Earthquake and the tidal wave which struck Valdez. It all brought home to you what a splendid victory the people of Valdez have won over dire adversity, in bouncing back and building this beautiful little city.

So Valdez is reborn; and stands as a living monument to the great faith and courage, the great reserve that abides deep in the human heart — to be called upon to overcome all troubles, and accomplish all things. Across the bay is another monument to man's indomitable spirit, the terminal of the Alaska pipeline, the motto of which is "We didn't know it couldn't be done."

So the spirit of Valdez has come smiling through, and for their motto the folks of Valdez have taken some lines from the forty-sixth psalm:

"God is our hope and strength, a very present help in Trouble

Therefore will we not fear, though the earth be moved, and though the hills be carried into the midst of the sea."

SANTA FE—You can't fool Toney Anaya.

He has apparently looked at state government and decided the Department of Finance and Administration is where the power is.

That's right—which is why Bruce King put his nephew David in charge there when he took office.

What will Anaya do?

Well, rumors up here now have him naming Bob Strumor to that choice job, the one where almost all the power lies.

You don't know Strumor? Try this on for size. The law firm Toney presently heads (though he is almost never to be found there) is called Anaya, Strumor, Gonzales and Fruman.

Apparently Toney has no nephews ready for key jobs.

What he does have, however, is a group of lawyers who used to work with him in the Attorney General's office.

Talk here says they will be the folks with the clout if Anaya gets into office.

Another one to keep your eyes on: Paul Biderman, who now handles consumer affairs in the present Attorney General's office.

Like Strumor, he's a tough-minded, public-oriented lawyer, who, given Anaya's presence in the Roundhouse, could help to change the increasingly conservative direction in which New Mexico has been traveling.

Larry Hamm has left his position as head of the state's motion picture promotion operation, amid a shower of press releases which quote the Governor and Russell Autrey, Hamm's immediate boss, as praising him to the skies.

Don't be fooled.

What seems to have brought Hamm down at last—right now, when the King administration does not appear to need any more unpleasant experiences—was just what this column has been saying about him for some time: He couldn't seem to

distinguish his private interests from those of the state of New Mexico, which was paying his salary.

Hamm has formed a private company to make motion picture deals in New Mexico.

We will probably never know how much of the formation of that enterprise went on during hours in which we taxpayers were paying his salary.

Both King and Autrey reportedly are heaving sighs of relief that Hamm is gone.

Others may follow him, especially if, as we hear, employees of his bureau have taken time off ostensibly for such things as funerals for members of their immediate families while they took work and pay on the side from producers shooting television commercials in New Mexico.

The Department of Justice must know nothing about Indians.

They seem to believe one Red brother is identical with every other Red Brother.

In their court case aimed at overthrowing our state's legislative redistricting, for example, they appear to think the Zunis and Navajos belong in the same district because they share a "community of interest."

Their minds seem to work like this: "These people are all Indians, so they must think alike."

Not so. Zunis and Navajos share about as many attitudes as Turks share with Armenians.

Justice's superficiality ("all 'minorities' must think like all other 'minorities'") is patronizing and insulting to Indians, Hispanics, and all other minorities, to say the very least.

Hot-rock attorneys who sweep in here from Washington to tell us about New Mexico often know very little. We could get on better without them.

Which is more or less what the Indians of New Mexico have been telling the rest of us here, with notable success, for many years.

Editorial

The Village of Ruidoso is studying the possibility of locating its police-courts-detention facility complex at Schoolhouse Park.

We suggest that village officials take a long hard look at parks and recreation (or lack thereof) before committing a section of the park to this use.

The Parks and Recreation Commission has been curiously silent for several months. Perhaps the recent appointment of a new member and directive from the village council to make a progress report will result in some action.

Ruidoso does not have enough parks. Ruidoso does not offer enough recreation to its citizens. Both of these are as important in their own way toward making a community livable as the more basic services like water and sewer and police protection.

Someone on the council should take the lead in pushing for the acquisition of more park land and hiring of a full-time recreation director.

We suggest that the village investigate the possibility of purchasing the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club. Buying the club and converting it to a public athletic facility, with a park area around it, would be a quantum jump ahead for Ruidoso in parks and recreation.—JP

On the Village beat with Tim Palmer



Like every good New Mexican, I have known for as long as I can remember that the All-American Futurity is the "World's Richest Horse Race."

I think the thing that sticks in people's minds (at least those people who are only peripherally aware of horse racing) is that the winning horse collects so much money for a race that takes about 20 seconds to run.

Something that made an impression on me—working in the barn area at the New Mexico State Fairgrounds in Albuquerque in 1969—was that Easy Jet, fresh from winning the All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, had his own private whirlpool bath. Well, he could afford it.

Easy Jet picked up about 160 grand for his 400-yard sprint. The gross purse that year was \$600,000.

Now that was quite a bit more than Galobar won in the first A-A Futurity in 1959, when the winner's share was \$65,000, but peanuts compared to this year's first prize of a cool \$1 million.

That works out to more than \$45,000 per second, or \$2,272.72 per yard, according to my Ruidoso Downs media guide and souvenir book, courtesy of Dick Alwan.

Speaking of Dick Alwan, I would like to compliment him, Mark Gordon, and the other people in the track's publicity department on the great job they do. We certainly appreciate their contribution to our newspaper.

Track manager Woody Erwin calls that crew "the best in the business," and I believe it.

The gross purse for this year's All-American Futurity is \$2,530,000. Through the years, I mistakenly believed that the racetrack itself put up the prize money, with the prestige of hosting the "World's Richest Horse Race" justifying the expense.

That's not the way it is, however. Through a sort of complicated, sort of simple process, the owners of quarter horses who want their charges to have a shot at that million dollars put up enough money to create the huge gross purse.

Dorothy Dillard, whose title I believe is nominations secretary, was kind enough to explain.

We took the hypothetical situation of me owning a quarter horse filly, foaled this year, which I want to enter in the 1984 All-American Futurity: I have until January 15, 1983, to enter my horse.

The original nominating fee of \$50 must accompany my entry. When Dorothy told me there were 2,869 original nominations for the 1983 Futurity, I began to see how the money piles up.

Entering my horse has also made her

eligible for the All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. To keep the horse eligible for the '84 race, I make payments of \$100 by March 15 and \$150 by June 15.

I also pay \$500 to put the animal in the yearling sale. This year, Dorothy said, there are over a thousand horses in the sale.

A change of ownership does not affect a horse's eligibility for the big race. So even if I plan to sell my horse rather than keep her, I'm smart to keep paying the subscription fees because she's more valuable with her eligibility.

This helps explain why 2,677 second payments and 2,446 third payments have been made this year. The most entries from a single entity were the 50 head nominated by Texans Ann and B.F. Phillips.

The couple is now two entities, having gotten divorced recently. At a horse sale at their ranch, presumably conducted to divide community property, one horse brought \$1 million and another \$800,000, according to Dorothy.

The first, Queen for Cash, is eligible for next year's All-American Gold Cup; the second, Just An Old Love, is eligible for the All-American Derby. So this nomination/subscription/send in money procedure is constantly going on for Ruidoso Downs' other rich races, too.

All of this keeps Dorothy very busy all year long. And what does she do with all the money that flows in?

She puts it into certificates of deposit in amounts of less than \$100,000, and into Treasury bills in amounts of more than \$100,000.

All of this money earns interest, naturally, and that money also goes toward the race purses. The track takes half of the original \$50 nominating fee for advertising, clerical fees, etc., Dorothy noted.

The flat one million dollar winner's purse in this year's All-American Futurity obviously has some publicity value, but Dorothy pointed out that it also helped draw 100 to 150 more nominations.

All in all, it's a pretty neat system.

Dorothy first came to Ruidoso in the mid-1950s and worked in the money room at the racetrack. When she moved to the position of horsemen's bookkeeper, she didn't know that whether a race horse was accompanied by a pony horse made a difference in the prize money check.

When one of the stewards told her, "That horse had a pony," she answered in a shocked tone, "Really? Right on the track?"

Hope you don't mind me telling you, Dorothy, and thank you very much.

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

It is fitting that a film using the latest state-of-the-art technology in computer-generated images should focus on the world of the computer as the subject matter. The never-never land of "Tron" is the inside workings of a computer, with the firmament little more than a microchip and a heaven that glows with liquid crystal displays.

Jeff Bridges stars in the film as whiz-kid computer programmer who keeps trying to break into the programs of the Master Computer. Using a special laser device, he is eventually able to enter into

the synthetic microchip universe.

The feeling the viewer gets is akin to sitting on board that tiny triangle-shaped space ship in Asteroids or being alongside Pac-man as he chases Blinky through the maze.
