

# Candidates for House discuss qualifications, views

Voters will go to the polls Tuesday, August 31, to cast ballots in the special New Mexico primary election.

Seven persons—five Republicans and two Democrats—are vying for their party's nominations for State Representative from District 56, which includes parts of Lincoln County (including Ruidoso), Eddy County and Chavez County.

Republican candidates are Fred Collins, Ben Hall, Fred Pool Jr., Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and Ernest Sanchez.

Democratic candidates are Marvin B. "Mickey" McGuire and Anita Sanders.

Local polling places are: for precinct 11—White Mountain Middle School; for precinct 13—Ruidoso Public Library; for precinct 14—Ruidoso High School; for precinct 15—Ruidoso Downs municipal building.

The News spoke with each of the candidates this week to ask their views as the primary approaches.



FRED D. COLLINS

Fred D. Collins is an Artesia area rancher who maintained a cabin in Ruidoso for 15 years and now makes frequent trips to the area to go hunting. He thinks a person has to be broad-minded to relate to the diversity in District 56.

"Anyone running here needs to be well acquainted with the district," Collins said. "You've got a farm and ranch element, you've got the oil industry and you've got the tourist industry."

Collins said he sees no major problems in the district, and he has no quarrels over the way it was drawn up by the Legislature.

Collins has been a member of the State Republican Central Committee for 12 years and was a delegate to the national convention in 1976. He cites his experience in business and politics as qualifying him for the state seat.

"I've always had an interest in the workings of our government," he said. "As a member of the state Republican Party, I have kept up with the changes occurring under the Reagan administration that will affect New Mexico."

If elected, Collins said, he will work on changing the way bills are drafted and introduced. "I would like to see the whole system made simpler, and more to the point. I would like to see bills drafted without loopholes, so they could be more easily understood."

"We need less bills with more teeth in them," he concluded.



BEN HALL

Ben Hall, a Republican who currently serves as Lincoln County Commissioner, agrees that there are very few, if any, issues in this election.

The one question he is most asked concerns how the state will react to the new federalism program, Hall stated.

"The biggest thing is the states learning to fund their own schools, counties and municipalities themselves instead of the federal government doing it for them," he said.

"That's a little bigger responsibility for representatives ...," Hall noted.

"I look forward to doing it because I think the states ought to have more say-so in how their money is spent and who gets it," he continued.

Hall has been a resident of the Ruidoso area for 35 years, during which time he has served on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, Regional Wastewater Board and Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Planning Board. He has also served as an ex-officio member of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital and will complete his fourth year as county commissioner this year. He has operated his own general construction firm for 20 years.

Hall said that during his involvement in local government in the past four years, he has gained experience in dealing with state agencies, thereby qualifying him to seek election as a State Representative.

"I've dealt with most state agencies in Santa Fe in the last four years, from the Department of Finance to the Highway Department," he noted.

"I try to approach everything with an open mind and look at both sides of an issue before I make a decision," Hall stated. "This is what most people want and need."

If elected, Hall said, "I'd like to see that our counties and municipalities and schools still get the same level of funding and maybe more than they have been getting."

If federal funds are cut, he explained, the state will have to figure out a way to

help. Hall said he knows what the needs of local government are.

"I'd like to see that our state remains one of the few in the United States that's got a surplus of money and all the citizens get the services they deserve," the candidate concluded.



MARVIN B. "MICKEY" MCGUIRE

The lone Lincoln County candidate for the Democratic nomination for State Representative from District 56 is M. B. "Mickey" McGuire.

A native of the lower Penasco area—the only part of Chavez County to fall within District 56—McGuire has been in the education field for 28 years. He and his wife Ruth have three children.

Asked about issues in the primary election, McGuire replied, "I think perhaps the possibility of a decline in some of the resources that the state has had available, through the oil and gas recession—how to compensate for that—and the best possible use of the state's resources."

McGuire said his varied background, with a degree in business and economics and working experience in that field, plus his time as an administrator in a decision making capacity, can be assets to him as a legislator.

He said his first priority if elected will be to convince the people from both parts of the district that he will represent them and to get input from them.



THOMAS P. "COTTON" MCKNIGHT

Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight is a sheep and cattle rancher living in Picacho. He currently serves as chairman of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

A lifetime resident of southeastern New Mexico and a longtime member of the Republican party, McKnight is active in agricultural, community and business pursuits.

He feels that a regional airport, roads and the economy are the main issues in this election.

"The major concerns that I feel are coming from Artesia, Ruidoso and Capitan are: the airport—in Ruidoso; the people in Artesia are concerned with road closures on federal land; they're concerned with what the economy is going to be like when Ronald Reagan's federalism goes into effect in New Mexico; and the highways between Artesia and Roswell and especially between Roswell and Ruidoso," he said.

McKnight feels that his experience in ranching and also from serving on the county commission has qualified him to seek a position in the state House of Representatives.

"My experience in the ranching business has allowed me to come in contact with a number of people in different occupations, and I feel that my experience as county commissioner has also allowed me to gain

a great deal of experience from being in the political realm of things," he stated.

"I also feel that this experience I have gained through the ranching business and also the county commissioners office will enable me to do a better job as State Representative in Santa Fe for the entire district."

McKnight said that he has not made any plans to introduce new legislation if he is elected, but that he intends to pay attention to the directives of his constituents. "A freshman legislator has got to sit back, wait, watch and then decide what his constituency may want him to do when he's able to get it accomplished."



FRED POOL JR.

Fred Pool Jr. of Hondo, candidate for the Republican nomination for House of Representatives District 56, has been active in the Republican party for 30 years. He is a graduate of Artesia High School, and has been in the oil and gas business in New Mexico and West Texas since 1949.

Pool has lived in Lincoln County since 1972. He and his wife have four grown children.

"Really I haven't run into any major issues that stand out," said Pool. "Talking to people in Eddy County and Lincoln County, they're both concerned that they're not going to have a district of their own. They're both concerned about being well represented by whoever is elected. But I've met no real outstanding issues."

# All-American Derby Sunday

Special Effort meets perhaps the toughest challenge in his magnificent career when he faces what may be the best field of three-year-olds ever in Sunday's All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The winner of this 440-yard dash which is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown for sophomore quarter horses will earn \$33,000 from the gross purse of \$1 million.

Despite posting only the fourth fastest time of the 10 qualifiers from the 14 trial races on August 18, the unbeaten Raise Your Glass colt appears to be an odds-on favorite to become only the second quarter horse to win both the All-American Futurity and All-American Derby.

Special Effort's four-length triumph in last Labor Day's All-American Futurity capped the greatest season any quarter horse has ever enjoyed. He won all nine starts, including an unprecedented Triple Crown sweep of the Kansas, Rainbow and All-American Futurities. His career earnings of \$1,026,723 propelled him into the leading all-time quarter horse moneymaker position.

This year promises to be almost as brilliant for Special Effort.

He won his trial race for the Kansas Derby, then captured the Kansas Derby, the first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds, by almost three lengths. Although Special Effort captured his trial race for the Rainbow Derby, his time was only 11th fastest and he failed to qualify for the finale.

In the eighth All-American Derby trial race, he zoomed to a one and one-fourths length win and ran a 22:06 for the 440 yards.

In his sensational career, Special Effort has won all 13 starts for trainer Johnnie A. Goodman. He's collected \$1,154,949 for owners Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas.

While Special Effort is the horse to beat, a star-studded cast is ready to win this prestigious event should the colt suffer his first career setback.

Two West Coast fillies have produced spectacular results in their brief careers. Dashing and Justanold Love, both trained by Charles W. Cascio, looked sharp in easily winning their trial races.

Dashing, who was purchased for \$50,000 in the 1980 All-American Select Sale For Quarter Horse Yearlings at the All-American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs track grounds, won the 10th heat by two and one-fourth lengths. Her time of 22:12 was the sixth best.

The Dash For Cash filly won seven of nine races in 1981 with one second for earnings of \$629,859. This season, she's won four of five races with one second and earnings of \$45,132. She's leased by Windi Phillips to Anne Phillips of Frisco, Texas.

Justanold Love took the third trial heat by two and one-half lengths in a 22:07, the fifth-fastest reading. She captured five of seven races as a two-year-old in 1981 and earned \$170,450 for owner J.E. Jumonville of Ventress, Louisiana.

This season, Justanold Love has won six of seven races with one second for winnings of \$41,692.

Although both Dashing and Justanold Love have campaigned mostly at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles, their superb trial race victories indicate they had no

trouble adjusting to the mountain climate at Ruidoso Downs.

Lightfooted, an Easy Jet filly, posted the fastest-qualifying time, a 21:95 while winning the first race by a neck.

Lightfooted has suddenly become a potent threat at Ruidoso Downs, winning two of her last three races for trainer O.S. Carlton III. She's owned by Harriett C. Peckham of El Paso, Texas.

Johnny Vittoro, who ran second to Lightfooted, is also a contender.

The Vittoro colt won 11 of 15 races with one second and one third in 1981 for earnings of \$350,755. Among his major wins was a one-length score in the \$101,067 Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity last December at Sunland Park.

Although he hasn't won this year for trainer Alfred Fontenot, he's collected \$49,818 for owners Ronald D. Marney and the Haymaker Farm of Yukon, Oklahoma.

The third-fastest qualifier was Perking Bug, a Bugs Alive In 75 colt, who zipped to a 22:05 reading while running third behind Lightfooted and Johnny Vittoro.

Ironically, Perking Bug has been third in each of his three races this season. Trained by Don E. Drake, he's owned by Ralph Shebester of Wynnewood, Oklahoma.

Outa Control, an Angel's Jet Rail colt, has compiled an amazing record this year while campaigning at La Mesa Park in Raton.

He scored five straight wins at the northern New Mexico oval, taking such events as the Raton and Jayhawk Derbies.

His frontrunning one and one-half length win in the seventh trial race was his sixth consecutive victory. His time of 22:18 was the seventh fastest qualifying clocking.

Trained by Lonnie S. Barber Jr., he's collected more than \$100,000 in his career for owner Nick Holl of Gruver, Texas.

War Star Wrangler, who was second to Special Effort, had the eighth-fastest time with a 22:21. The Rocket-Wrangler filly is trained by Sandy K. Farris for owner Larry Hughes of Salida, Colorado.

Classy Native, third in last year's All-American Futurity, won the ninth trial heat by almost one-length while tallying the ninth-fastest time of 22:22. With five victories, three seconds and four thirds from 16 career starts for trainer Paul L. Walters, she's earned more than \$120,000 for owner L.V. Bell of Wichita, Kansas.

Quickest Bug Alive won a shake for the 10th and final berth with his qualifying time of 22:25. He posted a nose victory in the second trial race.

A Bugs Alive In 75 colt, Quickest Bug Alive has won three of 18 career starts for trainer Randy L. Hill. He's owned by the Wilmoth Interests, Incorporated of Marion Center, Pennsylvania.

Here's the field with qualifying times: Lightfooted (21:95); Johnny Vittoro (21:99); Perking Bug (22:05); Special Effort (22:06); Justanold Love (22:07); Dashing (22:12); Outa Control (22:18); War Star Wrangler (22:21); Classy Native (22:22) and Quickest Bug Alive (22:25).

# Jail Committee site seeking

One month after the council rejected a bid on the police-courts building project and sent the program back to the drawing board, the Jail Liaison Committee is searching for a site for the building before it makes new recommendations.

The project, which has been planned since 1978 and was approved by voters in a bond election in 1981, was dealt a blow when the plan to remodel the existing police complex fell through because only one contractor submitted a bid. The bid was rejected by the council, on the recommendation of the jail committee, because it came in at twice the budgeted figure of \$650,000.

After the bid was rejected, committee members speculated contractors did not wish to bid on the remodeling job because it involved working around the existing police-courts structure on Wingfield Street, policeman Jim Alston of the committee said.

Councilman Don Dale, chairman of the committee, said Tuesday the consensus of the committee is to retain the present building because it has beneficial uses, but is no longer suitable as a jail. Alston noted that the jail was condemned by the state several years ago, but has remained open on waivers.

The council instructed the jail committee to pursue alternatives for the project, and return with other proposals to the council. Alston drafted a sketch for a new building, and committee members began searching for sites.

On August 10, the council okayed a committee proposal to study a site in School House Park on Sudderth Drive. That site, located directly behind the tennis courts, was considered by committee members because it is village-owned land, it is on a major thoroughfare, and it is centrally located and highly visible.

But Dale said this week the committee may have to abandon the park site because of opposition within the community.

"I don't think it's still an alternative," Dale said. "We've got so little park area, it would be a shame to use it for buildings."

Alston and deputy chief Larry Simon of the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) concur that the park site was not the best alternative for a new station, but they note that other village-owned sites probably do not satisfy requirements.

"I can't say I was 100 percent agog over the park," Alston explained. "It just seemed to be a suitable site. But if it's not suitable to the public, we just don't want it."

In selecting a site for the complex, the police department is looking at various factors. Alston said foremost on the list is "Inhabitability."

The department also would like a location close to a major thoroughfare, with about two acres of land to enable future expansion, Alston said. The site also must be in an area where RPD can erect a 150-foot high transmission antenna, he added.

The School House site met all those requirements, Alston noted. Besides being a feasible spot, Alston and Simon feel the police presence in the park would enhance safety in the area. Simon pointed out the area behind the tennis courts is one of the department's high incident areas.

"Personally, we had thought police presence in the park would give an aura of enhancing safety," Alston said.

Members of the Parks and Recreation Commission wish the village would look elsewhere for a station site.

Commission member Dave Anderson said he would like the area to remain park land, and that he hopes the village will someday consider a building there to house a health and activity center. Chairman Bill Morrison also does not want a police station located in the park. He proposes that the picnic grounds be expanded into the area.

Dale said the council has received calls opposing the park site, which has led the jail committee to pursue other locations. But Dale said other village-owned locations are not favorable for the building.

"We've looked at every city-owned possibility," Dale explained. "Some of the

city land is too small and too far out of the way. We have some on Camelot but it's useless for commercial use. There is also some in Cedar Creek, but it's out of the question for a police building.

"We're looking for one-and-a-half to two acres of land for parking and future expansion, and as close to a main artery as possible," he continued.

"There's one other requirement, and it's the main reason it can't be in the present city hall area. We also require a 150-foot tower, and we would have to go to the FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) for approval," Dale said. He noted that he thinks the FAA would not approve the tower near the present village hall, which is adjacent to the municipal airport.

Dale also explained that if the jail committee finds no feasible village-owned sites, the village may pursue a trade for privately owned land.

The police department agrees that several private sites are feasible for the building. But Alston points out there is a high premium on private land in Ruidoso, and the village has a limited amount of money budgeted for the entire project.

"There are two items of knowledge," he said. "The present jail is condemned, and there is a limited amount of dollars."

"There's one thing we want to stress... give us some suggestions, and let us work on it," he concluded.

# Candidates discuss qualifications

Pool said he feels he can represent both ends of the district, having lived in both. He noted that he has been in business for himself for 32 years, and that the experience of dealing with people can be valuable in the Legislature.

He added that he is personally acquainted with many legislators. Also, the experience of raising four children has made him familiar with the needs of schools, Pool indicated.

"Distribution of block grants coming to the state from the federal government is one important subject," Pool said. "Also the structure to be set up to administer them."

Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez of Glencoe is another Lincoln County resident running on the Republican ticket in District 56.

Sanchez, who is completing his second consecutive term as sheriff and cannot seek reelection according to New Mexico law, disagrees with the redesign of the district. He said the problems facing the tourist and farming sectors of Lincoln County are notably different than those in other parts of the district.

"I think Lincoln County is big enough now to have its own representative," Sanchez said. "I'd say tourism is always a must to attract in the county... and Artesia depends on industry, of course."

Sanchez sees growth as one of the main problems facing Ruidoso. Related to growth is the necessity of a new airport to serve the Ruidoso-Carrizozo area — something he would like to work on as a legislator.

"I think the (Sierra Blanca) airport is a must," he added. "It's got to come about someday. I'm sure if there was other land available, they would have looked at it."

Sanchez sides with the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission on its proposal to locate an airport on land now occupied by New Mexico State University to conduct agricultural experiments. He said the "site is good for the county as a whole" because of its location between Carrizozo and Ruidoso — the county's largest towns.

If elected to the Legislature, Sanchez, who has 21 years logged in public service

including 14 years in the sheriff's department, said he would rely on his experience to work on law enforcement, crime prevention and penal institution problems.

Another area of interest in the Legislature for Sanchez would be welfare reform. During his five years with the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue, Sanchez said, he saw many abuses that he would like to solve.

Realtor Anita Sanders of Artesia has some definite views as to why she feels she's qualified for State Representative from District 58.

"I think I'm good at getting to the point, the nitty gritty," the Democratic candidate said. "I feel I'm mentally able and have the desire to do the job."

"Being a Realtor should also help. I feel I'm good at making compromises and solving problems."

Sanders, who doesn't have any experience in public service, feels the reapportionment issue is an important one.

"I didn't like the way it was done," she commented. "It will probably be changed in the future and I'd like to help change it. Right now parts of Artesia are in different districts from each other."

"I think it's basically an economic issue rather than an ethnic one. I think all people in New Mexico have basically the same needs, regardless of ethnic background."

Sanders also has some strong opinions about corruption in government.

"Corruption in government is not reflective of the average person," she said. "I don't believe government in general reflects the views of the majority of the people."

## Council, school board discuss sewer

In an informal meeting Tuesday, members of the Ruidoso council and the Board of Education discussed their cooperative efforts to provide sewer service to the new high school under construction at Bog Spring.

Mayor George White, who referred to the meeting as "just a breeze session," represented the council along with councilmen Don Dale and Benny Coulston.

School board president Dave Parks and board members Lamar Osbourn, Stormy Edwards and Don Swalander were also present, as were several school administrators and village officials.

Parks stated that the school board is still in the position of having \$150,000 to contribute toward the cost of construction of a sewer line down Gavilan Canyon Road.

He also informed the meeting that it has suggested an existing eight-inch sewer line serving the lower end of Gavilan Canyon Road can perhaps give "partial relief" if this line can be tied on

to, he indicated, the cost of a new line would be less because it would not have to run all the way to the main line at Meander Drive.

Parks said that White Mountain developer Bill McCarty has agreed to grant right-of-way for a new line at no charge to the village.

He added that a village bond election before the end of this year, with a bond issue to partially finance sewer construction, would not affect the projected opening date of the new school fall of 1984. He also predicted that the school district will be floating a new bond issue soon.

Revised property valuation is expected to cause the district to fall below the indebtedness level it needs to remain eligible for state capital outlay funds, Parks explained. He said the issue will not exceed \$1 million.

A village bond issue of \$1.7 million for extension of sewer service to Ponderosa

Heights (and, presumably, Gavilan Canyon) and a school bond issue of \$1 million would be absorbed in the present two-mill levy, he said, because of a "tremendous increase in valuation."

"We're all spending the taxpayers' money so we both need to work together," Parks told the council.

Coulston acknowledged that a sewer line down Gavilan Canyon is inevitable, but said that it is three or four years away. The problem is the \$500,000 price tag (for the 15-inch line all the way from Hull to Meander), Coulston said.

"I suppose what we're asking is for you to ante up another \$100,000," Coulston told the school board.

Parks replied that the problem the school board has is with the state capital outlay committee, and that the state has already granted nearly \$3 million to the district.

The state is looking at every cent asked for and requiring that every nickel be ac-

counted for, he explained. He pointed out that the school board has indicated by the amount budgeted that it could provide sewer for the school for \$150,000, and that asking for more "could blow our entire request."

Coulston suggested that a letter from the Environmental Protection Agency testifying to the need for having the new school on village sewer might help with the state.

Acquisition of additional right-of-way for the road to serve the new school was also discussed. It was agreed that village officials, John Cupp and Frank Potter in particular, will continue to seek solutions to both problems.

Village attorney Lee Huckstep said he would investigate possible dates for a bond election. The vote could not come before December, it was noted, because of the primary and general elections.

Members of both bodies agreed the meeting was worthwhile and stressed the need for continued cooperation.

## Parks and recreation meeting enthusiastic

The Village of Ruidoso may get its very own Parks and Recreation Department — that's if local sentiment is as strong as support voiced for the department by a gathering of interested persons Wednesday night.

About 30 people met at Ruidoso Public Library to discuss the need for the department, and the unanimous consensus of the group was they must demonstrate to the village council local backing for more village emphasis on parks and recreation.

To show that support, the group decided to initiate a petition drive asking for creation and funding of the department. The results of the drive will be presented to the council on September 14 at its regular meeting.

The group met at the library at the request of Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) member Dave Anderson. Anderson, who was recently appointed to the commission, wanted to solicit citizen input to determine the direction of the commission. PRC member Ken Moore was also present at the gathering.

The group expressed dissatisfaction with the lack of progress by the PRC. The commission was formed in April. By May, the advisory group set goals of seeking additional parks and recreational facilities, improving existing facilities and asking the council to hire a parks and recreation director.

Members of PRC besides Anderson and Moore are chairman Bill Morrison, Dub Holl and Dick Shaw. The last meeting of the commission was in May. Persons at last night's gathering wondered why PRC was inactive throughout the summer.

"The commission is powerless," one man contended. "They've been in there five months and they haven't done anything. We need to set up a department."

Anderson agreed that the commission has accomplished nothing notable since its inception. He also feels the public now must demonstrate a desire for an organized parks and recreation program before the council will establish a department.

"We need a nucleus to work from," Anderson suggested. "We need to show a

need, and enough people that care about it."

Moore suggested the group emphasize positive aspects that a developed recreation system could bring to the community. He told the group that it should point out recreation programs can be productive. He explained that, because the cost of a new department is high, residents should convince village leaders that the department also can generate revenue.

Anderson told the group he is slated to address the council on September 14. When he was appointed by the council August 10, the governing body requested a progress report from PRC by mid-September. Anderson said he wanted to present a list of goals to the council that would indicate public desire for village-organized recreation.

At the start of Wednesday's gathering, Anderson asked participants to list three or more activities they would most like to see available in parks and recreation. He also asked the group to express whether they would volunteer to assist with recrea-

tional programs.

Anderson said he will use the results of the survey to inform the council of activities desired by the community. He said the list of programs will help determine the scope of additional facilities needed, and in turn, the goals will demonstrate the need for a department.

"We've got to show an interest," Anderson reiterated.

The group then enthusiastically supported a call for a petition drive to best show community interest for the idea. The petition will ask the council to "create and fund an appropriately directed parks and recreation department." The participants at the gathering indicated they will circulate the petition on the streets, and make it available in several businesses. The group also called for a meeting on September 8 at the library to review the results of the drive.

Anderson also asked the gathering to get the word out for residents to express their support for the department to the council. "We've got to instill motivation in the community to take part in this," he suggested.

## Ruidoso Downs studying landfill at Glencoe

Ruidoso Downs is looking into the possibility of using land in Glencoe for a sanitary landfill, it was reported at the trustees meeting Monday.

David and Harvey Bonnell have reportedly agreed to allow the village to dump on property they own, for a charge per truckload. Ruidoso Downs currently uses Ruidoso's landfill at Fort Stanton, but could save about 40 miles per trip going to Glencoe instead.

The location of the sanitary landfill must be approved by the state Environmental Improvement Division and a letter of con-

sent must be signed by the Bonnells before the new site is confirmed, it was reported.

A proposed increase in water rates was again tabled for further study. Trustee Jake Harris said that his suggestion that a flat-rate charge be imposed requires additional discussion. He reiterated that a study should be conducted comparing the amount of water used in a year to the amount of money it generates.

This study would permit village officials to determine the amount which is being charged per one thousand gallons of water. The village now charges \$10 a month for use of up to 4,000 gallons and \$1.60 for each 1,000 gallons over 4,000.

On July 12, trustees had approved an increase from \$1.00 to \$3.50 per 1,000 gallons over the minimum. Residents protested the increase at the following trustees meeting, however, and it was tabled. At the August 12 meeting, Harris suggested a flat-rate charge be established and trustees agreed to study his proposal.

Trustees again tabled the increase Monday, agreeing to work on Harris' suggestion.

In other business, trustees: —Approved abandonment of Mountain Shadows Estates Subdivision for Tony Parker.

—Tabled discussion of repayment of a

loan from the state received in the summer of 1980 to finance improvements to the water system in the Los Lomas area of the village. An increase of 50 cents per month in residents' water bills was approved in 1980 to repay the loan. Trustee Bob Power raised questions at last month's meetings about whether this amount is still being applied towards payment of the loan. The matter was tabled Monday because Power was absent.

—Appointed Trustee Harris voting delegate and Mayor J. C. Day Jr. alternate voting delegate to the New Mexico Municipal League Conference.

—Approved adjustments in the budget.

### Cleanup announced

Dates for Ruidoso's semi-annual town cleanup have been announced by organizer Barbara Duff. The cleanup will take place September 18-25.

"We are inviting civic clubs to participate," said Duff. She added that a year-round program is now in effect which allows for pine needles to be picked up when placed in plastic trash bags next to dumpsters, and that limbs of up to three-foot length are also picked up.

"We desperately need six pickup trucks and drivers," said Duff. Further information on the cleanup is available from the Chamber of Commerce.

## Double B Express, Jiltaloom duel Friday

Double B Express seeks revenge for a runnerup position last weekend when he defends his title in Saturday's ninth running of the Ruidoso Sprint Championship at Ruidoso Downs.

The seven-year-old Bold Tactics gelding will face nine foes in this six-furlong chase. The purse will be \$18,800.

Double B Express, who has won four of his last six races, made his usual late move through the stretch in last Saturday's \$12,800 Mr. Tattoo Handicap over seven and a half furlongs. But he was forced to swing to the outside and finished second, only a head behind Fill Mackis (Cp).

The durable performer has taken four races at this summer's Ruidoso Downs meeting, including the Mesalero Apache Handicap, the Governor's Handicap and the Billy The Kid Handicap.

He's campaigned throughout the Southwest at tracks such as Santa Anita Park near Los Angeles and Turf Paradise in Phoenix. He's won 27 races with 17 seconds and 12 thirds from 88 appearances and has bankrolled more than \$190,000.

A year ago, Double B Express roared through the stretch to post a one-length win in the Ruidoso Sprint Championship, giving apprentice jockey Casey Lambert his first stakes triumph.

This season, Double B Express has tallied four triumphs with one second and two thirds from 11 outings for trainer Clifford C. Lambert. He's earned \$27,653 for the Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico.

secretary Rick Henson who saddled Double B Express with coltweight of 122

pounds. Jiltaloom, a winner of two straight races, will also carry 122 pounds.

The four-year-old Loom colt has enjoyed a fine mountain campaign this season, winning three races with two seconds and one third. His best effort may well have been a widening four-length win over Ollie King in a five and a half furlong allowance race on July 24. Jiltaloom's time of 1:06 was the fastest reading at that distance this season.

After campaigning much of last season at Louisiana Downs in Bossier City, Louisiana, Jiltaloom started this season with a win and a second at Sunland Park.

He's suddenly developed into a potent threat for trainer Bob E. Arnett with four wins, three seconds and one third from eight outings this season. He's earned \$17,231 for owner Hugh C. Preston Jr. of Burkburnett, Texas.

Special Platoon, a three-year-old filly owned and trained by Coy Hendrix of El Paso, Texas, cruised to an easy win in Wednesday's mud splattered headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The soggy conditions didn't bother Special Platoon in the least, and didn't dampen the crowd's liking for the filly. She went off as a 3-5 favorite under Betty Harless.

After splashing into an early lead, Special Platoon maintained a comfortable margin in the five and a half furlong jaunt. At the turn for home, the 7-2 second favorite, Raging Ruby, moved up strongly to duel for the lead.

For several jumps, Special Platoon and

Raging Ruby appeared to be on almost even terms. But Special Platoon settled the issue with another power burst. She glided under the wire with a two and a fourth length lead and returned betting payoffs of \$2.20, \$2.60 and \$2.20. The journey was timed in 1:09 flat.

Special Platoon came out of the race with a career record of three wins and a second from four starts. Wednesday's victory added \$3,480 to Special Platoon's money line.

Raging Ruby, ridden by Pedro Bentez, ended up second and handed out \$2.80 to place, \$2.20 to show. Dimple Deena, an 8-1 shot handled by Gary Sumpter, paid \$3 to show.







# The Silver Lining

## A Birthday Visit With A Pioneer Of Early Ruidoso

On Saturday, August twenty-one, I was honored to be present at the birthday celebration of Mrs. Ruth Jenkins at her beautiful home in Upper Ruidoso, by the river side.

Saying that she is age "thirty-nine and holding" Ruth said that she has been coming up to Ruidoso for forty-seven years.

Present at the gathering were her daughter, Rosalea Davis, and her husband, Bill Davis of Waco; and their friends, Robert and Lillian Bremer. It was a perfect day with the river running at just the right volume to sing a melodious song as it traveled by; and we talked of many a happy memory.

Ruth said that she and her late husband, Mr. Telfair Jenkins built their home in 1947, after trying to find a piece of property on the river.

Mr. Ernest McDaniel Sr., who had bought a section out of the Lord Cree estate, sold them their present location; and they brought two carpenters from Roswell, and then hired two local men in building the house.

The home is certainly a mansion among the Douglass Fir, having the early-day Ruidoso exterior of pine slabs. On the inside it is built with all the fine craftsmanship of a jeweler, and is full of antiques and family treasures of years past.

In the course of the talk, Bill Davis said that he entered the University of Texas in 1933; and that his grandfather, William Prather (after whom Bill is named) was president of the University toward the last of the eighteen hundreds.

Mr. Prather had studied under Robert E. Lee, who was president of Washington College (now Washington and Lee University). Lee often told his students that "the eyes of the South are upon you." Borrowing from this sentiment, Mr. Prather told his students often that "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You."

And from this came the words to the school song of the University of Texas: "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You" sung to the tune of the old favorite song of years past, "I Been Workin' On The Railroad."

Bill Davis also said that George Washington's personal physician, Dr. Craik, who was at the Father of Our Country's bedside when Washington was called Home, is his great-great grandfather.

Later on Bill says he will fill me in on the Texas School song history, and the history of his people.

The Davis' met Lillian and Robert Bremer while on a trip through The Orient, where they both found out that they had homes in Ruidoso.

It was an inspiration to visit Mrs. Ruth Jenkins in company with her kinfolks and friends, and I look forward to many visits in the future. And we wish Ruth many happy returns of the day and all God's blessings.

**The Quiet River**  
The Ruidoso River was well named "The Noisy River" by the early Spaniards. Along the old horseback trails and wagon roads which used to cross over the flat tops of the hills on either side of the valley, you could always tell when you were approaching the Ruidoso. If you listened closely a mile or more away you could hear the river's melodious rushing sound. In those days the river ran much more water than it does today in its regular flow.

There is a spot on the river that I call the round bend, on the way in to the house, just this side of the old corral. In the old adobe house you could be lulled to sleep by the melody of the stream as it ran over a series of little waterfalls before it came into a quiet stretch near the bank. Then when the river is on flood, churning at the banks, you can hear it for miles.

However there is a time, just when the floods have gone down and the river is running a strong stream, and before the river runs at its usual rate, that the noisy river is quiet for a mile or more up stream and runs calm and silently here at the round bend.

Last night, August twenty-three, just after twilight, the tree frogs and crickets were singing their song of approaching early fall, under the giant walnut tree shadowing the bend. Through the branches and onto the river's curve the new moon reflected its gold.

The flowing half circle of water made hardly a sound, running just within its grassy banks, only a whispered harmony to the melody of the evening singers in the deep grass and up in the branches of the trees.

And the quiet river held you in its spell, another of Mother Nature's magic little interludes of the late summer. It reminded you of the great silent rivers of Alaska, and reminded you also that God's world is small after all, with endless charms and blessings everywhere.

With Morel leading the way, Ruidoso just might be playing for a district and state championship come late fall.


## Party set for Warrior players

# Ruidoso High junior varsity to scrimmage Artesia; varsity draws bye

The Ruidoso High School junior varsity football team will take the spotlight from the varsity this Saturday when it travels to Artesia High School for a 7 p.m. scrimmage with the Bulldogs.

Last Saturday the Warrior varsity scrimmaged powerful Las Cruces High School and held its own with the AAAA division school.

At least 30 junior varsity players will make the trip to Artesia.

"We plan to use two platoons," said Ruidoso head junior varsity coach Jim Ramsey. "We'll probably use 11 sophomores at one time and 11 freshmen at another time."

Sophomore Kenny Espinosa and freshman Russell Easter will be at quarterback for the junior varsity Warriors. Espinosa is a 5-10, 125 pounder while Easter, who is also a basketball standout, goes 5-11 and 145 pounds.

The junior varsity Warriors will have an assortment of running backs to choose from in the scrimmage.

Mike Williamson, Bryan Alexander, Mark Langston and Tommy Crow should see action at fullback. Players at tailback and wingback include Bret Maul, Randy Reynolds, Mitch Mulligan and Wade Proctor.

Kevin Jameson and Chris Woodul should

see plenty of action at offensive guard. Kyle Jameson should play at center while his brother, Kerry, is a tight end.

Chip Ramsey, son of the junior varsity mentor, Mark Frost, Bobby Dickinson and Jimmy Flack are other linemen and tight ends who should see action in the scrimmage.

Curt McClellan and Justin Smith are expected to play at split end.

Some of the players will play on both offense and defense.

Last year's junior varsity squad finished with a 3-3 record against tough competition. The Warriors defeated Goddard of Roswell twice and tied Roswell High School once. Both of those schools are in the AAAA division while Ruidoso is an AAA school.

"I think we have a good chance of equaling or bettering last year's record," Ramsey said. "If we can do that we've had a good year. I would say this year's team is ahead of last year's at the same time in practice. I've had more time to work with them this year."

The junior varsity opens the season at Carrizozo Saturday, September 11. The game will begin at 11 a.m.

NOTES-The Ruidoso coaches will leave tomorrow and scout a scrimmage between the Lovington High School varsity and Dunbar High School of Lubbock, Texas, before the Artesia scrimmage. Lovington is the Warrior varsity's first opponent of the season, Friday, September 3. The Warriors have avoided any major injuries so far in practice. Junior quarterback-defensive back Cyrus Simmons is on crutches with strained ligaments but should be okay next week.

Large enrollment doesn't necessarily make a high school tougher in athletics. Good examples of this can be seen in New Mexico's AAA division.

In district 4-AAA, Artesia had the largest enrollment in the last school year with 921 students. Lovington followed with 768, Portales had 744, Tucumcari had 541, and New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) had only 400.

Despite the fact Portales was the "medium sized" school in that district, it still managed to win the district football crown and go on to take the state AAA championship. Artesia, with the largest enrollment in the district, finished second in that loop and was eliminated in the first round of the state playoffs.

Lovington won the district title (and the state crown also) in track while Tucumcari won the district basketball crown and took second in the state tournament.

In district 3-AAA (the one Ruidoso competes in), Silver City had over 1,000 students last year and was the largest school. The Colts won the district crown in football and finished second in the state playoffs. A larger enrollment can help more in football than other sports since sheer numbers of players can help depth-wise.

Deming, with 981 students the second largest school in the district, won titles in basketball and track.

Cobre had 623 students, Ruidoso 455, Truth or Shiloh 452 and Tularosa 344.

The Warriors and Cobre have been competitive in most of the district's sports. Two years ago Ruidoso won the district crown in basketball, and the Warriors finished in a second place tie in football last season.

Cobre finished last in the district football race last season but did well in basketball and track.

Tularosa, despite having the smallest enrollment in the league, made the state

football playoffs as a result of beating the Warriors. Both teams had the same district record (4-2) but Tularosa got the nod because it defeated Ruidoso 13-0.

In some ways, a large enrollment may be a disadvantage for some schools' athletic teams.

When I was attending high school in California in the late 1960s, a coach and sportswriter both told me that larger schools usually didn't have the school spirit and interest in sports that many of the smaller schools had.

The coach's theory was that once a school got over 2,000 students (and possibly lower in some cases), the student body lost its sense of togetherness that motivated students to cheer for the team and athletes to go out for sports.

My high school had around 1,600 to 1,700 students and competed in an AAAA level league (although schools weren't designated by divisions then in that part of California). We were the second smallest high school in the league but were still generally competitive against the other schools.

Some of the schools we played had over 3,000 students despite the fact they were only three-year high schools. We defeated the biggest high school in San Francisco (George Washington) during a basketball holiday tournament one year.

This past season George Washington lost the first California state large-school basketball title by one point to Carson High School of Los Angeles. However, when we played George Washington it didn't have a championship caliber team.

The point is that most high schools that have well organized sports programs can usually compete against other schools that have up to twice their enrollment.

Although enrollment can be a disadvantage, most high schools that have sound athletic programs aren't going to be a pushover for anybody.

Quarterbacks in the state's A division. Fullback John Aguilar and offensive linemen Todd Proctor and Paul Sullivan are other top Tiger returnees from last season. Proctor is a 6-0, 190 pound tackle and Sullivan is a 5-11, 170 pound guard. Both linemen also play on defense.

The Tigers have some excellent first string talent, probably as good as any A division team in the state. Head coach Mel Holland is concerned about a possible lack of depth, however.

## Capitan to scrimmage Eunice in Artesia

The Capitan High School football team will get a good indication of how well it has progressed in practice when it tangles with Eunice High School in a scrimmage in Artesia at 6:30 p.m. today.

Eunice is an AA division school while the Tigers are an A division team. However, Capitan has been one of the best teams in the A division for several years. The Tigers made the state playoff semi-finals last season and lost to Reserve in the state finals two years ago.

Quarterback Grady Eldridge gives the Tigers a great offensive weapon. The 6-0, 180 pounder rates as one of the best







The Gladdens now live in an adobe house they built themselves about four years ago, but they decided to construct another one this summer.

"We just love building an adobe," Sandy said. Of course, Mike, Sandy and Kerry haven't done all the work themselves. A few family members and friends have helped, too. Sandy's brothers Dick and Tom Edmister, her father E. A. Edmister, her brother-in-law L. O. Hardin, her nephew Jason Edmister, neighbors Craig Whipple and Debbie Allison, and friends Maggie Hawthorne and Mark Kashmar have all pitched in. Her brother Dick had built an adobe house for a friend in Albuquerque and was available to help them at the time they decided to start the first one. Sandy and Kerry both agreed that living in a house built by themselves and family and friends is special. They enjoy the process of building an adobe so much, though, that Sandy said they may build a third one later—but only to sell.

Their first house is now on the market and the second will be ready to move into soon.



For those who prefer other than red meat, K-Bob's also features golden fried jumbo shrimp and fillet of fish as well as chicken fried steak, chicken strips and chicken teriyaki.

The prices are among the best features of K-Bob's Steak House, with steak dinners ranging from \$4.50 to \$9.95.

The menu states that the original concept of the Parsons in starting the K-Bob's chain was to "serve the finest quality beef in a pleasant atmosphere at reasonable prices." I'd say that concept has been carried out in K-Bob's of Ruidoso.

## Classy Native has class trainer

There's one major difference between training an outstanding filly such as Classy Native and high school athletes. "Classy's mommy and daddy never came to me to talk about their daughter," kidded Paul Walters, who has trained race horses for 26 years as well as high school athletes for 18 years.

Walters, who coached high school football and basketball players at several Oklahoma towns, is quick to praise his three-year-old Haisanative filly.

"Classy was voted two-year-old filly of the meet last year (at Ruidoso Downs). She's always been a nice mare. She's one of the better fillies I've trained," said the 48-year-old conditioner from Vian, Oklahoma. "One of her strong points is that she's bred to run 440 yards. That's a real advantage since all the major three-year-old races are at 400 or 440 yards."

Classy Native will get a chance to compete against what may be the finest field of sophomore quarter horses ever assembled when she runs in Sunday's \$1 million All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs. The winner of this 440-yard dash which is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown for sophomores will earn \$333,000.

Walters broke Classy Native at Muldrow, Oklahoma, and has had her throughout her 16-race career.

"She's a sound filly with a minimum of problems. Anytime you train a horse that's

been as sound as she has, you have to feel fortunate," he said. "You appreciate fine race horses and also the owner, who has given you the opportunity to train them."

Classy Native captured two races with two seconds and three thirds in nine outings as a two-year-old. Her best effort may well have been running third in the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity last Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs.

This season, she's posted three wins with one second in four outings. In her career, she's earned \$120,833 for owner L. V. Bell of Wichita, Kansas.

Classy Native won the ninth All-American Derby trial race last Wednesday by almost one length. Her time of 22:22 was the ninth-best time of the 137 entrants.

Training quality horses for major races is nothing new for Walters.

He's had two winners of the Kansas Futurity, the first leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses. Prissy Gold Digger won in 1977 and Favorite Past Time took the 1979 edition. Prissy Gold Digger returned in 1978 to win the All-American Derby First Consolation.

Walters, meanwhile, cited the excellent

balance of the 10 starters in the All-American Derby.

"With the quality of this race so high, you just can't make any mistakes. That's what owners pay us to do — to eliminate mistakes and make sure the horses run a true race. Of course, you can't always count on that, but with this kind of field, everything has to be just right," he said.

Although he quickly cited Special Effort, quarter horse racing's all-time leading money-maker, who is set for the Derby, he noted not even that superb runner can make an error.

## Favorites had good weekend

With only two weeks remaining in this season's Ruidoso Downs horse race meeting, wagering favorites have enjoyed considerable success.

The last five-day weekend was one of the best this season for the public selections as 27 of the 62 favorites won for an excellent 43.5 percent. That brought the season's totals to 322 winning wagering favorites from 827 chances.

That's a superb batting average of 38.9 percent, far above the national average of around 32 percent for winning favorites.

In addition 44 of last weekend's 62 favorites finished either first, second or third, for a fine in-the-money percentage of 70.9. The season's tally for in-the-money for favorites is 564 of 827 horses for a percentage of 68.1.

Favorites enjoyed their best day last weekend on Wednesday when eight won. Six won on Friday while five prevailed on Saturday and four won on Thursday and Sunday.

The best streak for favorites occurred on Wednesday when public selections captured the last seven races. The streak started in the eighth with Special Effort (\$2.10), continued with Classy Native (\$3.60), Dashing (\$2.60), The Heat is On (\$3.20), Texas Viking (\$5.20), Tarbug (\$2.40) and ended in the 14th race with Cute Investment (\$3.20).


Odds-on favorites also had a fine weekend with 13 posting triumphs, seven

running second, one finishing third and only three failed to finish among the first three runners.

The weekend's biggest favorite, Special Effort, won as expected and became the first horse at Ruidoso Downs to pay the

minimum \$2.10 to win as a 1-20 favorite in Wednesday's eighth race.

Super Torque was the weekend's highest-priced winning favorite. He returned \$7.20 for winning Thursday's 12th race as a \$2.60-1 favorite.

Pedro Benitez has a reputation of being one of the most determined, hard-riding jockeys at Ruidoso Downs.

Last weekend, he demonstrated his talents while winning five races at the mountain track and earning Jockey-Of-The-Week laurels for the first time this season.

He won two consecutive races on Saturday, scoring with longshots Bees Nosey (\$71.80) in the 11th and on King Of The Game (\$28.20) in the 12th. He repeated the same trick on Sunday, winning two straight races, taking the sixth on Seven R. (\$6.20) and the seventh aboard Pocket-purse (\$4.20).

He also won a race on Friday.

In the jockey standings, Jacky Martin increased his lead slightly over Joe Martinez in the battle for the top spot. Martin has 58 victories with 41 seconds and 30 thirds from 238 mounts. His winning percentage is an excellent .243.

Martinez has 53 triumphs with 58 seconds and 50 thirds from 355 mounts. His winning percentage is .149.

Other top ten riders include Steve Harris, apprentice Casey Lambert, Leroy Coombs, Mike Lidberg, Larry Byers, Vickie Smallwood, Gary Sumpter and Kenny Roller.

In the trainer standings William F. Leach increased his lead over season-long runnerup Bob E. Arnett with four wins over the weekend. That effort also earned him Trainer-Of-The-Week honors.

Leach has 47 victories with 27 seconds and 27 thirds from 206 starts. His winning percentage is a fine .228.

Arnett has saddled 41 winners with 34 seconds and 15 thirds from 188 starts. His winning percentage is a good .218.

Other members of the top trainer list include Jack W. Brooks, Jimmie D. Claridge, Clifford C. Lambert, Gerald E. Marr, Jack W. Dube, R. Frank Thompson, Rex D. Brooks and C. Dwayne Gilbreath.

Racing resumes on Wednesday with the last Wednesday card this season. It's again free general admission for ladies and senior citizens as Ruidoso Downs begins its final two weekends of this year's 77-day race season.

Wednesday's highlight will be the five and one-half-furlong dash for three-year-old fillies seeking a purse of \$5,800. Tina Serina and Special Platoon appear to be the major contenders.

Thursday's program will match the 106 two-year-olds who finished first, second or third in the 36 All-American Futurity elimination races on August 11, 12 and 13.

The 10 fastest runners from these 11 trial races will gain berths in the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity on Labor Day. The winner of the 440-yard third and final leg of the Triple Crown for two-year olds, will gain a record purse of \$1 million.



## All-American Select Sale starts Monday

The great Easy Jet and Moon Spot II head the sire list for the 21st annual All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at the All-American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs track grounds.

Easy Jet, who won the 1969 All-American and Kansas Futurities, has the finest record of producing quality quarter horses than any sire in history.

Syndicated for \$30 million in 1980, he has produced two All-American Futurity winners — Easy Date in 1974 and Pie In The Sky in 1978 — as well as such champions as My Easy Credit, Easily Smashed and Easy Angel.

Moon Spot II, a 1969 foal by Moon Deck out of Little Bor-Ax, has sired such stakes winners as Moon Fan, Gypsy Geisha and Jody's Deck.

Moon Spot II has 28 offspring in the nation's most prestigious sale of quarter horse yearlings. Easy Jet has 26.

The sale will cover a five-day span since a record 1,060 yearlings have been catalogued. The two-volume sale catalogues are available to interested

buyers at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The sale begins Monday, August 30, at 10:30 a.m. The same mid-morning starting time is in effect on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 31 and September 1. Night sessions, starting at 7 p.m. are slated for Thursday and Friday, September 2-3.

Other sires with multiple offspring in the sale include Pass 'Em Up with 23; 1975 All-American Futurity winner Bugs Alive In 75 with 22; Azure Te with 18; Shawnee Bug with 17; Real Easy Jet with 16; Mighty Te with 13.

Moon Lark, the 1978 All-American Futurity winner, has 11, as does Raise Your Glass, who sired Special Effort, quarter horse racing's all-time moneymaker. The speedy Hempen also has 11 offspring in the sale.

Other famous sires and the number of sale horses include Bunny Bid (6); Dash For Cash (2); Duck Dance (3); Mighty Deck (6); Mito Wise Dancer (6); Tiny's Gay (8) and Timeto Thinkrich (2). The latter, winner of the 1973 All-American

Futurity, is the sire of the brilliant mare, Denim N Diamonds.

Mr. Kid Charge, the 1971 All-American Futurity winner and the holder of Ruidoso's 900-yard track record (19.65 seconds), has one offspring in the sale.

Included among the top dams represented in the sale is the outstanding Medley Glass, a daughter of Raise Your Glass. Medley Glass was an outstanding track star, winning the 1978 All-American Derby while en route to career earnings of nearly \$400,000. Her sorrel colt, Easy Medley, figures to command considerable interest. The sire is Easy Jet.

Speed Farms of Alex, Oklahoma and Valton Cox of Lubbock, Texas, head the consignors' list. Each will have eight head represented.

W. L. (Bill) Jones of Abilene, Texas, and Tommy Winn of Rhome, Texas, each have seven head in the sale.

The 1981 All-American Sale set numerous records. The \$400,000 spent for the colt, Easy Prince, was the highest purchase ever in the sale, snapping the previous record of \$300,000.

Total sales in '81 hit \$13,546,950, eclipsing the previous high of \$11,026,300. That reflected a gain of 22.88 percent over the 1980 sale. The average price of \$14,969 was another All-American standard.

A total of 964 head was catalogued last year and 905 passed under the gavel.

All yearlings entered in this year's sale are nominated to the 1983 All-American Futurity (\$2,530,000); the 1984 All-American Derby (\$1 million); and the 1985 All-American Gold Cup (\$500,000 estimated). Yearlings passing under the gavel in the 1982 sale may be nominated to the \$50,000-added 1983 All-American Sale Futurity (\$250,000 estimated) at Sunland Park.

The veteran auctioneering crew which handled the All-American Sale in past years returns for this year's session. The announcer will be Tom Hammond of Lexington, Kentucky, while auctioneers include Bill Tackett of Collinsville, Oklahoma; Keith Babb of Monroe, Louisiana; and Scott Caldwell of San Clemente, California.



**SPECIAL EFFORT** may be in for the toughest test of his brilliant career in Sunday's All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs. The third and final leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses has lured an outstanding field. The winner of this 440-yard classic will collect \$330,000 from the gross purse of \$1 million. Special Effort continued unbeaten and recorded the fourth-fastest qualifying time of the 10 entrants. The Raise Your Glass colt is undefeated in 13 races and is quarter horse racing's all-time leading moneymaker. He's been magnificent for trainer Johnnie A. Goodman and owners Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas. Three excellent fillies are also qualifiers. The two brilliant West Coast competitors, Dashing and Justanold Love and local favorite Classy Native are set to challenge Special Effort. Johnny Vittorio, who won last December's Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity, has made more than \$400,000, will also compete. Lightfooted, a lightly raced Easy Jet filly had the fastest qualifying time with a 21.95 reading. She's owned by Harriett Peckham of El Paso, Texas, and is trained by O. S. Carlton III. Trainer Charles W. Cascio and Danny Carzoza gained the finals with Dashing and Justanold Love. The total earnings of the 10 finalists is \$2,759,832. Special Effort is, of course, the leading moneymaker of the group with Dashing second. Special Effort has collected \$1,154,989 while Dashing has earned \$674,991. Four Texans own finalists while Oklahoma owners have two, and one each comes from Louisiana, Colorado, Kansas and Pennsylvania.

**THE COMPLETE LIST** of qualifiers and their times: Lightfooted (21.95); Johnny Vittorio (21.89); Perking Bug (22.05); Special Effort (22.06); Justanold Love (22.07); Dashing (22.12); Outa Control (22.18); War Star Wrangler (22.21); Classy Native (22.22) and Quickest Bug Alive (22.25).

**MAGIC GOLD MINE** won her first race since taking the Blue Ribbon Futurity in March of 1981 at Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw, Oklahoma, when she swept to a neck triumph over favored Tams Easy Native in the fourth All-American Derby trial race on Wednesday. The three-year-old Rocket's magic filly is trained by Jack Brooks for lessor Ronald B. Saunders of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and lessee Donald M. Justice. She was ridden to victory by Jacky Martin and returned \$12.80 to win.

**JACKY MARTIN** won three consecutive races on Wednesday's program. He started with Magic Gold Mine (\$12.80) in the fourth, won with Ichi Rocket (\$9.00) in the fifth and ended with Rebelier (\$3.20) in the sixth. All three horses are trained by Jack Brooks.

**OUTA CONTROL** continues his lengthy winning streak with a one and one-fourth length win in Wednesday's eighth trial race at 440 yards. The three-year-old Angel's Jet Rail colt won five straight races at La Mesa Park in Raton, before winning his sixth straight at Ruidoso

Downs. Included among his triumphs were victories in the Raton and Jayhawk Derbies. He's won six of seven tests this season with one second. Trained by Lonnie S. Barber Jr., he's owned by Nick Holt of Gruver, Texas.

**SPECIAL EFFORT**, quarter horse racing's all-time leading moneymaker, became the first horse at Ruidoso Downs to pay the minimum \$2.10 to win. Special Effort took the eighth All-American Derby trial race on Wednesday and actually paid more to place (\$2.20) and show (\$2.20) than he did to win.

**WEDNESDAY'S BIG Q** returned a paltry \$8.40, the lowest payoff in the past few years. Tarbug (\$2.40) won the 11th with Seventy One South second, while the two favorites, Cute Investment (\$3.20) and Summer Encounter, ran one-two in the second. There were 3,091 valid tickets after the first race, and then 2,331 good tickets for the small payoff. The previous low was \$9.80 on August 27 when Summer Encounter, Mito Money Maker, Winkum and Rebelier combined for that return.

**ROCKET JET BUG**, winner of the \$560,160 1980 Rainbow Derby, won his first race in two years when he posted a head decision over Bryants Noble in Friday's ninth race. The five-year-old Showum Jet gelding traveled the 400 yards in 20.04. Trained by J. B. Montgomery for owner Betty Lou Shebester of Wynnewood, Oklahoma, Rocket Jet Bug was ridden by regular jockey Larry Byers. That gave Rocket Jet Bug a 1982 record of one triumph with two seconds and three thirds.

**DR DEPOT TALLIED** his third straight victory when he took Saturday's sixth race at 550 yards by a half-length over Easy Sale. The four-year-old Rene Depot gelding won four races with four seconds in 11 starts last year as a three-year-old and earned \$127,517 for owner Barbara A. Smith of Lewisville, Texas. He ran fourth in the \$200,000 Champion Of Champions classic in mid-December at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles. He ran fourth in the Rainbow Silver Cup on June 20 at Ruidoso Downs, then started his streak. He won a trial race for the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic, then took an allowance race at 400 yards on August 8. Saturday's race was at 550 yards against allowance runners. Trained by C. Dwayne Gilbreath, he was ridden by Alex Baldiviez Jr., who has been aboard on his winning streak. He ran the distance in a rapid 27.34 and returned \$2.60 as the 3-10 favorite.

**SATURDAY'S BIG Q PAYOFF** was the

highest this season. The \$27,154 return to two winners eclipsed the previous biggest Big Q payoff of \$20,468.20 on May 21. The highest payoff in recent years was a \$29,908 on June 8, 1980. Saturday's Big Q was unique in that Pedro Benitez rode both winners and Vickie Smallwood guided both second-place horses. Benitez rode Bees Nosey to a \$72.80 return in the 11th race while Smallwood steered Bingo Bonanza to the runnerup position. In the second half, Benitez guided King Of The Game to a \$28.20 return while Smallwood steered John Cameron in second. The gross pool was \$44,841 while the net pool was \$54,308. There were only 221 live tickets after the first half. Each ticket was worth \$153.26.

**CYCLONE'S FLAME**, an 11-year-old Cyclone Audrey gelding, competed in his 100th career race Sunday at Ruidoso Downs and swept to a driving victory as

the \$1.70-1 favorite. It was the 22nd career victory for Cyclone's Flame with 14 seconds and 17 thirds. Ridden by Leroy

Coombs, he's trained by Cecil Crabtree for owners Lahoma Y. Bowen and Robert Kellerman of Abilene, Texas.

A full sister to Make Mine Cash, recent winner of the \$1.2 million Faberge Special Effort Futurity, will be one of 100 exceptional yearlings offered for sale Sunday night (August 29) in the second Ruidoso Super Select Sale.

Chaparral Convention Center located just east of the racetrack in Ruidoso Downs. Last year in the first Super Select Sale, Make Mine Cash was purchased for \$120,000 by R. D. Hubbard, and already in her first season of racing the daughter of two-time world champion Dash For Cash

has earned \$506,426. Her major victory came in the Faberge Special Effort Futurity at Los Alamitos, California, when she edged out Sall On Bunny. Make Mine Cash's full sister will be offered as Hip No. 89, consigned by Ted Bruce and Floyd Jackson. She is a sorrel filly by Dash For Cash out of the stakes-placed daughter world champion Easy Jet, Easy Missile Bar and is named Dash For Diamonds.

Another graduate of the 1981 Super Select Sale is Flamboyant, the first colt who passed through the ring and brought \$110,000. He has qualified for five futurities this year and earned over \$183,000. Flamboyant ran third to Make Mine Cash in the Faberge race.

Next year's stakes winners could come from a number of outstanding consignments to Sunday night's sale. There will be full or half brothers and sisters to six champions and 18 \$100,000 winners.

Hip No. 92 will be a half sister to 1976 and 1977 world champion Dash For Cash. She is by 1969 world champion Easy Jet. Dash For Cash earned over \$507,000 and his yearlings have brought the highest average selling price the last three years.

Also consigned to the sale is a full sister to 1980 champion two-year-old Mighty Deck Three, a winner of \$442,758, and a half brother to champion gelding Wanta Go (\$175,568).

Hip No. 41 will be an Easy Jet colt out of Osage Lamb, who has produced champion fillies Osage Juana (\$292,476) and Osage Rocket (\$266,643). Two mares who have produced finalists to Sunday's \$1 million All American Derby at Ruidoso Downs have yearlings in this year's sale. Hip No. 14 is a full brother to Johnny Vittoro (\$400,573) and Hip No. 80 is a half brother by world champion Tiny's Gay to 1981 champion two-year-old filly Dashingy (\$374,991).

Another yearling from an outstanding mare will be Hip No. 73, a colt by Sir Rambler out of 1973 world champion Charger Bar. A full sister to this yearling recently broke her maiden by three lengths and is expected to compete for first prize in the Golden State Futurity.

There are also brothers and sisters to Miss Three Wars (\$181,390), Viking Anne (\$183,009), Jennifer Jet (\$178,779), Wakup, Lil Suzy (\$160,068), Madonna Mia (\$124,683) and five other \$100,000 winners.

All of the yearlings were inspected by noted quarter horse trainer Jerry Wells. There is also a \$20,000 guaranteed return to the consignor for each yearling. Last year 54 yearlings were sold for a record average of \$63,585. Topping the sale was a world record price of \$510,000 for Himbo Dancer, a half brother to Higheasterjet.

## Go For Bugs to go for it Friday

Go For Bugs, a career winner of almost \$400,000, heads the field for Friday's featured All-American Derby Second-Consolation at Ruidoso Downs.

The winner of this 440-yard dash for three-year-olds who qualified from the 14 trial races on August 18 will collect \$9,700 from the total purse of \$78,000.

Although Go For Bugs finished second to the outstanding California filly Justanold Love in the third trial heat last week, he still toured the 440 yards in 22.39, which

earned him a tie for the fourth-fastest time of the Second Consolation entrants.

The Bugs Alive in .75 colt had a superb two-year-old season in 1981. He won four races with four seconds from 10 tries and earnings of \$319,223.

He finished second in the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity last Labor Day behind Triple Crown winner Special Effort and ran second this May to Special Effort in the Kansas Derby.

Trained by Paul L. Walters, Go For Bugs has tallied five wins with eight seconds in 17 outings. He's collected \$389,123 for owner Mary Watkins of Madison, Mississippi.

The swift filly, Summer Encounter, is a prime candidate off her blazing speed. The Hempen filly earned berths in the 1981 Rainbow and All-American Futurities and finished second, just a nose behind Cute Investment in the Rainbow Derby this July at Ruidoso Downs.

Summer Encounter has won seven races in her career with two seconds and one third for trainer Jack W. Brooks. She's bankrolled \$215,271 for owner Jerry Wells of Purcell, Oklahoma.

Other threats include Ponti Bar, third in the 1981 Kansas Futurity and the winner of

this year's Kansas Derby Consolation and Viva El Sels, a career winner of more than \$135,000.

Here's the field in post position order with assigned jockeys (all horses carry 120 pounds): 1—The Heat Is On (Jack Wallace); 2—Tams Easy Native (Jerry Burgess); 3—Ponti Bar; 4—Hempens Chiegey; 5—Arrows Request; 6—Summer Encounter; 7—Go For Bugs; 8—Maskeo Rocket; 9—Steppin Easy; 10—Viva El Sels (Nicky Wilson).

Saturday's main event will be the All-American Derby's First Consolation at 440 yards. The winner will earn \$22,000 from the purse of \$146,000. Rainbow Derby winner Cute Investment and the brilliant filly Rebelier head the field.

## Dean McKinney named Ruidoso-Sunland racing secretary

Dean McKinney is coming home. "This part of the country is home to me. My aunts, sisters and mother still live here in Ruidoso," said the veteran racing official who has accepted the position of racing secretary at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

McKinney will assume his new position (pending approval from the New Mexico State Racing Commission) with the start of the Sunland Park meeting in October. While he's looking forward to his new position, supervising a racing office is nothing new for the 52-year-old native New Mexican.

"My basic premise as a racing secretary is to give everyone an equal opportunity to run his horses where they belong," he explained. "I won't do something for someone that I wouldn't do for everyone."

"Getting into a racing position always seemed like a desirable occupation. I had jobs where I punched a clock from nine to five. With a racing secretary's job, you're kind of on your own. The same thing never happens twice. It's a challenge — you never know what's going to happen next."

Born in Carlsbad, McKinney grew up in the small southern New Mexico town of Weed, about 70 miles south of Ruidoso.

He spent six years in the United States Marine Corps and served overseas in Korea.

Following several nondescript jobs, McKinney found his first racing official's position. In 1965, he began work as a stall superintendent, placing judge and entry clerk at Evangeline Downs in Lafayette, Louisiana, and continued through 1968.

After that, he worked through 1971 as a racing secretary at Beulah Park near Columbus, Ohio. In the early 1970's, he spent time as a state steward for Kentucky and

as racing secretary at Latonia Race Track near Florence, Kentucky.

He then left Kentucky to serve as a consultant for three years at Parr Meadows, a now-defunct quarter horse operation on Long Island, New York. He also spent one year as racing secretary and vice president in charge of racing operations at Parr Meadows.

McKinney's other non-New Mexico racing positions included serving as director of racing and racing secretary at Portland Meadows in Portland, Oregon, and one summer (1970) as state steward for the state of Idaho. He spent last winter as a steward at Hillito Park in Tucson, Arizona. McKinney is also quite familiar with racing in the Land of Enchantment.

He's spent 1970-1972 as racing secretary at Ruidoso Downs and served during the summer of 1978 as a steward at Ruidoso Downs. During the winter of 1977-78, he was a steward at Sunland Park.

He's spent the summers of 1980, 1981 and this summer as steward at the Downs at Santa Fe. At the State Fair meeting in Albuquerque, he's worked as a clerk of scales, placing judge and will be a steward at this September's State Fair campaign.

Although he's enjoyed being a steward and a racing secretary, McKinney explained the differences between the two jobs.

"They're sort of at extremes," he said. "As a steward, you're enforcing the rules and regulations of whatever state you're in. By the very necessity of the job, you're relegated to playing judge or policeman. As a racing secretary, you're trying to provide a service to the horsemen, the public and that track's management. It's more of a positive situation."

"I took this job because I wanted to make the change from steward to racing secretary. I'd been here before and en-

joyed it. When the opportunity presented itself, I took it. Right now, although I officially won't start at Sunland Park until after the New Mexico State Fair, I'm working on stall applications and the first condition book," he added.

McKinney said he would assume a wait-and-see attitude before making any changes in the basic structure of the racing offices at either Ruidoso Downs or Sunland Park.


"I only worked that one winter at Sunland Park and that was five years ago, so I'm really not that familiar. I don't even know if anything needs to be changed or doesn't. I'll take a wait-and-see attitude and initiate changes if and when I can," he said.

"But whatever job I'm in, I won't meddle in someone else's job. When I was at Sunland Park as a steward, that's what I was concerned with. Doing my job, not telling someone else how to do theirs," he added.

With McKinney's experience in so many states and supervising so many different racing operations, he was quick to praise the horse racing industry in New Mexico.

"Naturally, the states which have a much larger population have bigger mutual handles and purse structures, so you have to take everything in perspective. For a state with a population of around one million like New Mexico, our purses and quality of horses are as good as any place I've ever been. With our small population, the purse structure at Ruidoso Downs, the Fair and Santa Fe is very good."

"I've been around horses ever since I was a kid, although I never worked as a trainer. I galloped horses and worked as a groom. I've always liked being an official and I'm looking forward to my new job," he said.

# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Though you might not suspect it, we currently have a gubernatorial election contest going on.

Most people apparently do not notice that.

Most people do not care.

Most people have enough problems of their own without worrying about who is going to be the next governor.

But — somewhere out there in space — there are these two candidates dancing around, never touching each other, never talking about anything which could be called an "issue," never saying anything of particular interest.

That takes considerable skill. To keep from talking about anything of interest is extremely hard.

Even the most inept candidate, as history demonstrates, will occasionally stumble into something the public cares about.

So far, however, in this gubernatorial campaign, that has not happened.

Nobody, as far as this correspondent can see, has said anything of any interest.

To whose advantage does that work?

To that of Toney Anaya, the Democratic candidate, who began the campaign well out in front of his Republican adversary, John Irick.

Is Anaya still out in front?

Well, the Irick people themselves recently released some partial results of surveys they have taken.

(Rule: Never believe anybody who gives you only parts of the results of a survey. Ask to see it all, or pay no mind to it.)

What do those results show?

Well, for one thing, they say Toney Anaya has something like 98 percent name identification in the state of New Mexico.

That's hard to credit.

To put it simply — though one hopes, not irreverently — Jesus Christ would not get

in a survey a 98 percent name identification in New Mexico. Ronald Reagan might run as high as 88 percent. Members of the state's Congressional delegation might be in the lower 80's.

Why would the Iricks let us know they had such startling results about those who recognize Toney?

Because they want to throw the other side off.

They want to convince Anaya that he does not have to work as hard as he has traditionally done.

Like the tortoise, they would like to see him make like the hare.

Will that work?

Probably not.

After all, just about the time the Irick people were giving us those numbers, Anaya was making another observation.

"I have always said," Toney told us, "that this was going to be a very close election."

Why would Toney like to sell us a new theory now?

Maybe because those high-priced consultants he has hired, Tim Kraft and Chris Brown, have convinced him it is a good thing to show a little humility.

Maybe because his surveys now show this is not going to be the walk-away he had assured us it would be.

Be cautious of anyone who begins sentences by saying, "I have always said..." That's usually a dead giveaway for somebody who has "always" said nothing of the kind.

What we seem to have is two gubernatorial candidates who choose to try conning us, preferring that to anything said about each other which might be of real substance.

And all this right now, when New Mexico needs a real leader as it never has before

## Congressman JOE SKEEN Reports From Washington



### VETERAN'S AFFAIRS: A LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Knowing of your concern for our nation's veterans, I wanted to take this opportunity to bring you up to date on matters of interest to you.

While Congress has passed quite a few bills in the past year that affect veterans, there were four major pieces of legislation that could have direct importance to you. Major provisions in these bills include:

- \*Special help for former prisoners-of-war;
- \*Programs for disabled veterans;
- \*Additional medicare care (including the benefits associated with Agent Orange);
- \*New educational opportunities; and
- \*Increased compensation for service-connected disabilities.

There is also a new type of peace-time GI Bill for veterans of the all-volunteer army being considered. I further believe the VA medical care system must be improved and protected, VA construction projects have to proceed so that the best value for each dollar spent can be realized, and Congress must address the special problems of aging veterans.

Perhaps most important of all is improving the nation's economic conditions so that the unemployed and underemployed veterans can find good jobs. I will continue to work for a sound fiscal policy that includes significant reductions in federal spending that will lead to a balanced budget and the restoration of a healthy economy.

Here is a summary of major legislation affecting veterans approved by the 97th Congress:

**THE FORMER PRISONER OF WAR BENEFITS ACT OF 1981 (P.L. 97-37)**

Provides priority hospital care and outpatient treatment to former prisoners-of-war.

Provides service-connected benefits for the former prisoners-of-war for psychoses and any of the anxiety states (including post-traumatic stress neurosis).

Reduces from six months to thirty days the requisite prisoner-of-war incarceration period for presumptions relating to certain disabilities and diseases.

Requires the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs to maintain a centralized record of claims of former prisoners-of-war and of the disposition of such claims.

Defines the term "former prisoners-of-war" to include persons who, during active service during a period other than a period of war, are held under circumstances that the Administration finds comparable to internment during a period of war.

Provides authority for the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs to establish an Advisory Committee of Former Prisoners-of-War to advise him on matters relating to this group of veterans.

**VETERANS' DISABILITY COMPENSATION AMENDMENTS (H.R. 8782)**

Awards a 7.4 percent cost-of-living increase to veterans and their survivors for service-connected disability compensation. (Pensions for non-service-connected disabled veterans increase automatically as Social Security increases.)

**VETERANS' DISABILITY COMPENSATION, HOUSING AND MEMORIAL BENEFITS AMENDMENTS OF 1981 (P.L. 97-48)**

Increases disability compensation and dependency and indemnity compensation by an average 11.2 percent, effective October 1, 1981, for over 2 1/2 million veterans and dependents.

Requires the Administrator to include in the annual budget any plans to make major reductions in personnel or to close VA offices. Provides that such plans cannot be implemented until the beginning of the next fiscal year thereby giving Congress an opportunity to take legislative action to prevent such closings or reductions.

Prevents the VA from using medical care funds to conduct cost comparison studies related to contracting-out-of-functions now being performed in-house at local VA hospitals.

Requires OMB to certify that appropriated funding and personnel ceilings have been provided to VA for medical programs.

Increases the one-time automobile allowance for certain service-connected veterans from \$3800 to \$4400.

Extends eligibility to adaptive equipment for automobiles where a veteran's service-connected disability impairs his ability to operate the vehicle without such equipment. The State licensing authority and the Chief Medical Director must certify that such equipment is required for the issuance of the operator's license.

Permits GI insurance to be paid in a lump sum when an insured veteran fails to designate a method of payment.

Increases Servicemen's Group Life Insurance for active military personnel and Veterans' Group Life Insurance coverage from \$20,000 to \$35,000, effective December 1, 1981.

Increases the specially adapted housing assistance grant for "wheelchair homes" from \$30,000 to \$32,500.

Clarifies the intent of Congress in barring VA benefits to members of the All-Volunteer Forces who fail to complete at least 24 months of their obligated service.

Prevents certain single veterans from losing pension while undergoing rehabilitation at a VA medical facility.

**VETERANS' HEALTH CARE, TRAINING, AND SMALL BUSINESS LOAN ACT OF 1981 (P.L. 97-72)**

Requires that the VA operate not less than 60,000 hospital and nursing home care beds and maintain the availability of such additional beds and facilities to fulfill the VA's contingency responsibilities for assistance to the Department of Defense.

Extends the period of the Psychological Readjustment Counseling Program (Vet Centers) until September 30, 1984.

Establishes priority inpatient and outpatient care for certain Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange and for those veterans exposed to radiation at Nagasaki and Hiroshima and in subsequent nuclear testing.

Grants authority for the expansion of the scope of the Agent Orange epidemiological study required by Public Law 96-151.

Provides, effective January 1, 1982, that the delimiting period for Vietnam era veterans who have remaining entitlement and whose GI Bill delimiting period would have otherwise expired be extended through December 31, 1983, for pursuit of apprenticeship or on-job training or a program with a vocational objective or a secondary education program.

Provides for an extension of the Veterans Readjustment Appointment Authority for eligible disabled and Vietnam era veterans to provide for non-competitive appointments in the federal government to September 30, 1984.

Provides a Small Business Loan Program with a one-time appropriation of \$25 million for both direct and guaranteed loans for service-connected veterans and for veterans of the Vietnam era.

## Reporter's Round

The governing body of the Village of Ruidoso is relying on the work of boards and committees to research and investigate a number of issues that plague this expanding community.

Councilman Al Junge gives credit to citizen advisory groups for being valuable to the community. With problems besetting the village at almost every turn, he notes the committees serve to take the burden off the councilmen of looking into the matters themselves.

But how often is the public informed of the committee meetings? More important, does the public wish to exercise its democratic rights and participate in these sessions?

Advisory groups in town have been formulated to examine the airport, the jail building project, water issues, the Grindstone reservoir project, village personnel, the library, parks and recreation, lodgers' tax issues, planning and zoning, architectural building plans and even the cemetery.

Some of the groups, such as the Planning and Zoning Commission, are bound by state law to hold public meetings. But others, those that are created at the council's discretion and are not governed by statutes, may meet in open or closed sessions whenever the members wish.

Unfortunately, the meetings often are closed.

The state Open Meetings Act, more commonly referred to as the Sunshine Law, specifies which public bodies are bound by law to hold open meetings.

According to the law, "All meetings of a quorum of members of any board, commission or other policy-making body of any... municipality... held for the purpose of formulating public policy, discussing public business or for the purpose of taking any action within the authority or delegated authority of such board... are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times, except as otherwise provided (by the law)."

A legal assistant in the state Attorney General's office explained that the law is vague concerning advisory groups. She noted that most advisory committees have no legal capability of making public policy, and thus are exempt from the law. But she added, the legal status does not exempt committees from the spirit of the law.

The spirit of the law is outlined in the state policy on open meetings. This policy

reads that "all meetings of any public body except the legislature, shall be public meetings..."

The questions concerning the advisory groups are: Do they constitute public bodies; and are they setting public policy?

The village boards and committees are clearly public bodies. Members are appointed by elected officials, and the governing body has delegated authority to these committees to investigate matters and return to the council with recommendations.

The council also has demonstrated that it attaches a great deal of weight to the recommendations. In July, the Jail Liaison Committee investigated peculiarities in bid specifications on the police-courts building project and recommended to the council rejection of the bids.

The council summarily rejected the bids and sent the project back to the drawing board based on the recommendation.

The advisory committee's input led to the final policy decision by the council — evidence that recommendations from committees have power. That power should not be underestimated.

The governing body has delegated crucial functions to the committees of establishing contact with the public, examining disputes, contributing their expertise to the council and suggesting the course of government policy making.

If these advisory groups hold their meetings behind closed doors, they are missing the opportunity for input from the public in helping decide what the course of the village should be. The closed doors also foster suspicion that the discussions are not in the best public interest.

Several members of these boards and village officials alike are fond of saying these groups have nothing to hide. Then why the closed doors? Don't the committees recognize that it would be valuable for the community to be aware of the workings of government?

Earl Warren, former Chief Justice of the U. S., wrote in 1974 that the public should "strike at secrecy in government wherever it exists, because it is the incubator for corruption."

Ruidoso is on the verge of government by committees. It's about time the public is admitted to the process.

Strike at this secrecy, Ruidoso. Closed meetings shackle the basic right to know that must be cherished and defended in any democratic system.

In 1887 Mr. Josh Hale set aside this plot of land for a family cemetery, where he buried his wife and moved the bodies of two of his daughters previously buried elsewhere. The cemetery was known as the "The Hale Family Cemetery." If anyone wishes to verify these facts, please note the dates on the headstones of these persons. Also the deeds of record are recorded in Book A-1 of deeds page 472 when the land surrounding the cemetery was sold by Josh Hale in 1893 to Mr. John Y. Hewitt.

Mr. Frank Stetson never owned the land where the cemetery was first erroneously called Stetson Cemetery Mrs. Sydney Bonnell asked me why I allowed it to be called Stetson Cemetery? I didn't know what I could do about it and I couldn't afford to hang a sign as she suggested and it has erroneously been called Stetson Cemetery for several years. I now can afford the sign and have corrected the mistake.

Concerning the school: When I came to the Ruidoso Valley in 1917 there was a one room school building where the Stetson School building is now located, called "The Hale School." A gentleman by the name of Mr. Cree was teaching school in the Hale School at that time. Later two rooms and a basement were added to the one-room building and in 1918 Mrs. Cora Curry and Ola Jones taught school in the Hale school building. Later Mrs. Todd Browning taught in the Hale school.

In 1918 Mr. Frank Stetson came to the valley and bought the land surrounding the Hale school. In the 1930's plans were made to build a four-room school building and Mr. Stetson donated more land and the school building was subsequently built and named the "The Stetson School."

# Special Effort seeks fifth Triple Crown jewel

## HOW TO MAKE AN EASY \$37.5 MILLION

### IN HORSE TRADING

Special Effort has been on a long and winding financial trail — one which began when the colt was still a yearling. An early key player in the drama was Allen Taylor, a pipe-line contractor from Beeville, Texas. "I was at the races at Laredo, and this friend of mine — Trainer Doug McMullen — handed me a Polaroid shot of this yearling. Doug told me the yearling was for sale for \$20,000."

Taylor liked the colt's sire, Raise Your Glass, but he was particularly taken by the dam, Go Effortlessly. "She was just a mediocre stakes mare, but I'd watched her run all through her career. She had a lot of heart."

Later, after Trainer Johnny Goodman was brought in to check the yearling, Taylor sealed the deal with cold cash and Special Effort was his. The original owner was the breeder, Allen Moehrig of Seguin, Texas. Next, Taylor's long-time pal, L.E. Willis (a San Antonio Subaru dealer) was taken by the yearling, and asked to buy a 50 percent slice. "You bet," Taylor said. The price, between friends, was a no-profit \$10,000. Two weeks later, Willis was stricken by a heart attack and passed away. The 50 percent share in what was to become one of the most valuable properties in racing history reverted to Willis' widow.


Special Effort made his first outing at Goliad, Texas, won brilliantly, and Taylor was soon rejecting offers — including one for \$250,000. "We don't want any more partners," he explained. Special Effort then went to Ruidoso, where he won by almost five lengths in the trials for the \$787,350 Kansas Futurity and set the top qualifying time. Enter Dan Urschel, the high-powered sportsman and something of a John D. Rockefeller of the quarter horse industry. Goodman called Taylor: "Urschel wants to buy the colt for \$700,000." Taylor replied, uninterested: "If he gets to a million, call me back."

A few days later, Urschel cranked the ante up to the \$1 million Taylor and Mrs. Willis had in mind. It was an offer few people can refuse. After the pact was signed, Urschel smiled. "If this horse doesn't turn out to be a winner, I'm liable to look a little foolish." In retrospect, Taylor says: "No, I don't feel like a dummy. I'm a businessman. When someone offers you \$1 million, you have to go for it. Sure, I wish I had the colt back. But if I had a chance to do it all over again, under the same circumstances, I'd still sell the colt."

Special Effort quickly took on the earmarks of a financial genius, winning the Kansas Futurity by a length at even-money and earning \$250,522. After sailing through the two qualifying rounds of the \$689,370 Rainbow Futurity, the colt was made a staggering favorite in the finale. He won by 1 1/4 lengths, and \$232,536 was deposited to his account.


Triple Crown fever quickly began spreading through the quarter horse world. The big question: After all these years, is a Triple Crown winner really possible? Enter another major player in the Special Effort drama, the wheeler-dealer supreme, Agent Dan Tyner of Oklahoma City. Tyner advised Urschel to strike while the iron was hot. His message: syndicate now, before the All-American trials. Urschel agreed and Tyner and his team went to work. The package: 150 shares at \$100,000 per share. Suddenly, Special Effort had a market value of \$15 million. Urschel kept 50 share, and Tyner marketed the remaining 100 units in a weekend.

After qualifying for the All-American, Special Effort's value took another boost. A win in the All-American, according to a typical assessment, would push the value up around \$25 million. In the press conference following the All-American, Tyner was jubilant: "When I was in the winner's circle a few minutes ago, someone offered \$250,000 for a share, if one were available. That figure is a good projection — and puts the value of the colt at \$37.5 million."
