

Meet Nob Hill Elementary School's new staffers

Nob Hill Elementary School has added four new members to its teaching staff this year, including Becky Johnston, special education teacher; Pernina Martin, special education aide; Tana Yochum, Title I reading aide; and Donna Parker, Title I aide.

Becky Johnston taught special education for six years in Roswell and Tucumcari before moving here. The special education class she is teaching at Nob Hill is a new program at the school this year.

Johnston has five students of kindergarten and first grade age in her class thus far. She is working with them on language development, pre-reading skills and socialization behavior.

"I enjoy working with special ed kids," Johnston said. She agreed they are more challenging to teach and she also likes instructing the small group.

"I try to start where they're at and build on the skills they have," she said. Her main goals as a special education teacher are to work the students into regular classes with the higher level students and to build their self-confidence. Building

self-confidence is "one of the main goals with all special education kids," Johnston said.

She has a bachelor's degree in special education and elementary education and a master's in special education, both from

Working with Johnston as an aide is Pernina Martin, who has taught in schools in Texas for five years. She has taught Title I math, high school math, and health and

migrant program classes during that time. Martin has a bachelor's degree in elementary education with a minor in physical education and health from Tarleton State University in Stephenville, Texas.

She assists Johnston with teaching the special education students. When asked how the school year has gone thus far, Martin said, "exceptionally well."

Tana Yochum and Donna Parker are new Title I reading aides at Nob Hill this

year. Yochum has lived in Ruidoso since 1962 and is a graduate of the Ruidoso school system. This year is her first as a school teacher.

She has a bachelor's degree in social welfare from Lubbock Christian College in Texas and worked as a juvenile probation officer in Lubbock before moving here.

Donna Parker is also working as a teacher for the first time. She has lived in Ruidoso for eight years and decided she wanted work that would allow her to be home when her school age children are home. Her husband, Eddie Parker, teaches at the high school.

Donna graduated from high school in Las Vegas, Nevada.

As Title I aides, Yochum and Parker will be working with first and second grade students on reading enrichment skills. They work with small groups of students to provide more individualized attention. Their goal is to help their students learn to read a little better, Yochum reported.

Parker said the year so far "has been great."

"I really think it's going to be interesting and helpful to the kids," she added.

NUMEROUS EVENTS PLANNED

Aspen Festival '82 coming soon

Plans for the various events which will make up Aspen Festival '82 are proceeding on schedule, Chamber of Commerce Aspen Festival committee members reported Thursday.

Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth said the starting time for the festival parade the morning of Saturday, October 9, has been changed from 11 to 10:30. The reason for the change is that several other Aspen Festival events will be starting right after the parade.

It was suggested that a sound truck be placed near the end of the parade to inform parade watchers of those other events, which include mule racing, the tractor pull and the chili cookoff.

At least 20 commercial floats are expected to enter the parade, it was reported, as well as several school bands. Entry fee for float judging on the parade theme, "Building a Better Ruidoso," is \$15.

Budgie Green has offered parade judges the second floor balcony at The Wild Snail as a vantage point, Jungbluth said. He added that the Noon Lions Club will again assist with staging of the parade at Mechem and Sudderth Drives.

One difference in the parade this year is that there won't be a big gap. This is because far fewer motorcyclists are expected.

It was pointed out, however, that motorcyclists from the previous weekend's Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival are invited to stay over and ride in the parade.

Chili cookoff committee chairperson Joan Bailey reported that it has been learned the first New Mexico runner-up in the cookoff qualifies for the world championship cookoff at Terlingua, Texas, along with the New Mexico winner.

How to coordinate admission to the chili cookoff, which will take place on an upper parking area west of the racetrack, with Saturday's mule races was discussed.

Plans for other aspects of the chili event—including confirmation of judges; sales of T-shirts and caps; sales of food; obtaining a temporary liquor license; and providing live music—are being finalized.

Committee members also were briefed on the Inn of the Mountain Gods Pro-Am Golf Tournament and the Pro-Am Bowling Tournament.

Two other Aspen Festival events, the Motorcycle Festival (September 29-October 3) and the Antique Auto Festival (October 9 and 10) have received numerous entries and appear to be headed for success, it was reported.


Appointment of the Grand Marshal for this year's parade was discussed and a name was put forward which all committee members found agreeable.

In a special meeting Friday afternoon, the council went into closed session to discuss pending litigation. Councilman discussed litigation expected over the swimming pool, village clerk Leon Eggleston said, but took no action.

Tougher fire regulations for condos

Fire protection authorities are stiffening measures for Ruidoso condominiums and townhouses that are placed in rental pools, after the State Fire Marshal's office ruled recently that the rentals must meet the same fire regulations as motels and cabins.

Ruidoso fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy said he learned about the decision affecting Ruidoso in August at fire training school in Socorro. He said the state office

has singled out Ruidoso because of the high percentage of condos and townhouses in rental pools here.

Cuddy said he and fire superintendent Virgil Reynolds will begin inspecting units that are used primarily as rentals to ensure that fire protection regulations are met. Cuddy did not elaborate on the requirements.

Until the rentals are inspected, Cuddy advises that at least a two-and-a-half

pound ABC fire extinguisher be placed on each floor in condominium and townhouse structures. Cuddy added that building inspector Don Hendricks is requiring fire extinguishers on each floor for new multi-family buildings.

Cuddy said the tougher regulations do not apply to multi-family dwellings that are not rented out.

In another matter, Cuddy noted that spark arrestors will be required on all chimneys effective October 1.

Improper culverts cause flood problems

Minor flooding after heavy rains this summer caused a deluge of complaints to village hall about inadequate drainage systems in Ruidoso.

In response to the problem, planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp has sent a warning to all excavators working in the village to adhere to design standards for installation of culverts, or be liable to lose permission to operate in Ruidoso.

As described in the letter, the problems for much of the improper drainage are caused by undersized culverts being in-

stalled; the use of incorrect culvert material; culverts being installed without permission from street superintendent Jack LaMay; poorly designed and maintained ditches; and blockage of natural drainage.

The letter also advises excavators and property owners that design standards require that all culverts be a minimum of 18 inches diameter and a maximum of 30 feet long, unless cleanouts are provided. Cupp explains that culverts must be made with new, corrugated metal or reinforced concrete and that drainage plans must be approved by LaMay.

The requirements also prohibit interruption of natural drainages, unless LaMay approves placement of drainage systems. Cupp also emphasizes that 18 inches is the minimum culvert diameter, but the actual size must be sufficient to carry anticipated runoff, as determined by an engineer.

Cupp said it is the legal responsibility of the property owner to see that the design standards are met, but he adds it is the moral responsibility of the contractor to properly install the system. He said if contractors fail to abide by village regulations, they are apt to lose their privilege to do business in Ruidoso.

Cupp said he sent the letter to dirt con-

tractors working here, as well as to Lincoln County Homebuilders Association.

Cupp said Friday, "We're having an awful time with the flooding. People have been literally flooded out—their property was damaged." Much of the time, he noted, the problem stems from unlicensed contractors installing culverts, or contractors trying to save money for homeowners.

But he said, "There's no call for it. We've had some culverts put in that were only four to six inches (in diameter)." Cupp added that if design standards are not followed, property owners could be subject to a \$300 fine and 90 days in jail for the misdemeanor.

E. T. Commission studies Roswell ordinance

Members of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission met Thursday to continue work on establishing an ordinance zoning property surrounding the village limits in a one-mile radius.

The group spent most of the afternoon reviewing the Roswell-Chaves County Extraterritorial Zoning ordinance and making changes applicable to Ruidoso and Lincoln County. It was decided that the commission should have more latitude to grant variances to the ordinance, once it is established, than is allowed by the Roswell ordinance.

Commission members may grant a variance only, according to the Roswell ordinance, if proof is submitted of "extreme

hardship or complete loss of any financial benefit in the property" as zoned. Mike Mulholland stated that because buyers of property in the area to be zoned by the commission may not be aware of the zoning when they purchase land, the ordinance needs to be more lenient about granting variances.

It was decided to change the ordinance to read that variances may be granted only upon submission of proof of "unreasonable hardship" caused by present zoning. Walt Wilson suggested that a copy of the ordinance be placed in each local real estate office when it is completed and approved. Potential buyers of property in the area governed by the ordinance can then be made aware of the regulations regarding zoning.

Commission members decided they will use the Roswell-Chaves County Extraterritorial Zoning Ordinance, state statutes and present county and village zoning as guides for writing an ordinance for Ruidoso-Lincoln County. The Santa Fe ordinance will be used for reference only.

Ex-officio member Greg Haussler showed the group a slide presentation about land use in New Mexico prepared by the state Division of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. The slide show stressed the importance of proper planning of land use to avoid soil and water problems.

Ernest McDaniel suggested that the extraterritorial zoning ordinance should specify that lot size will vary according to the availability of ground water, as required in the Santa Fe ordinance. Other

members agreed to the suggestion.

Commission chairman M. R. "Milt" Alcorn reported that village councilman Benny Coulston and county commissioners Ben Hall and John Hightower have been appointed members of the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority. The zoning authority will act as an appeal board for the commission and will also approve or disapprove the extraterritorial zoning ordinance when completed.

Each member of the commission was given a map illustrating the present zoning of the village and showing the area to be zoned around the village limits. They were also assigned 10 pages of the Roswell ordinance to review before the next meeting, which is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. November 4 at the Soil Conservation Service office in Capitan.

Capitan shorted on last census count

The village of Capitan has a population of 769 according to the 1980 census, but village officials report that there are 1,097 residents in Capitan. The village filed a complaint with the U.S. Census Bureau over the difference in the figures, and a hearing was held last month on the matter.

Former Capitan village clerk Leon Eggleston attended the hearing in Albuquerque August 23, and learned that the statistics will not be changed despite their

inaccuracy. The purpose of the hearing was to encourage suggestions about ways the census can be made more accurate in the future, Eggleston said.

The census figures determine the amount of revenue sharing funds to be received by the village, Eggleston indicated, so the incorrect count results in less money for Capitan.

Capitan village clerk Virginia Spall said the village could use the additional revenue, but that no major problems have been created by the census count.

She was unable to estimate the difference in revenue based on the census figures and the village's own count, but said she just prepares the budget according to the amount of revenue appropriated.

Eggleston reported that problems with the U.S. Census Bureau's count apparently resulted from using inaccurate county/village boundary lines and having residents of Alamogordo conduct the census for Capitan. It was reported at the hearing that the Census Bureau will begin using an electronic device to find invisible

boundaries and will use local persons when available to conduct the count in an effort to make it more accurate.

Eggleston, who is now village clerk for Ruidoso, also reported that the recent Municipal League meeting in Albuquerque was "a very good meeting." He attended workshops on bonding and insurance and several question and answer sessions with political candidates.

He said the sessions were very informative and a lot of help to him as village clerk of Ruidoso.





The Blind People Will Now Enjoy A Great Experience "Indeh: An Apache Odyssey" is a great book, first of all because it is written by a great person, Eve Ball.

Then, as the great British philosopher, Thomas Carlyle, said, "It is something that needs to be said." Carlyle was a Scot-chman who did not believe in wasting anything, least of all words.

There are many things that need to be said, now in this time of avalanches of things that need not be said, and yes, many that were far better left unsaid. Therefore the person who writes or says something constructive has done a lasting favor to the world.

The book is also the story of a great people, The Apache Indians, — a story which would have been left untold were it not for Eve Ball. Many stories of these colorful people have been written, some giving a wrong impression, others sincerely trying to be just in the matter; some from second hand information, others from experience among the people — but mostly all from the white man's point of view.

One of the many gifts of the Apache is the ability to "read people" as the old folks used to say — that is to be able to through short acquaintance, or even at first glance, to tell the character of a person, to see into his very mind and soul.

The old Mexican proverb comes to mind:

"Me conoces de me cara, pero de mis hechos no." (You know me by my face, but not by my deeds.)

And in the Zane Grey story, one fellow says to the other shortly after first meeting him:

"Stranger, you strikes me unfavorable." The Apache Indians "read" Eve Ball accurately, and she struck them "favorable".

She was the one to whom they could trust their sacred treasures handed down from father to son since time out of mind.

And the book is their story — their treasures; and it is a true treasure also in the literary world.

There is an old prospector saying that, "It takes a mine to run a mine."

Well it would take a book to begin to tell the charm of "Indeh: An Apache Odyssey."

"That Inward Eye" One of the favorite poems handed down to us by William Wordsworth is "The Daffodils."

"They stretched in never-ending line Along the margin of the bay: Ten thousand saw I at a glance Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.

I gazed and gazed, but little thought What wealth to me the show had brought;

For oft, when on my couch I lie In vacant or in pensive mood, They flash upon that inward eye Which is the bliss of solitude. And then my heart with rapture fills, And dances with the daffodils."

And so we rejoice that through the appreciation and work of Mrs. Jane Erwin, the blind folks will be able to become acquainted with this valuable and beautiful story through the power, the magic, the blessing of "The Inward Eye."

Socorro outlasts improved Warriors

The Ruidoso High School varsity football team battled host Socorro evenly for three quarters before finally falling by a 20-0 score Friday night.

Despite the loss, the Warriors' second in as many tries this season, Ruidoso showed great improvement over its opening week 39-18 loss to Lovington.

Socorro scored a touchdown in the second quarter on a pass from halfback Lonnie Sandoval to end Noah Jaramillo. Socorro, also called the Warriors, kept that narrow 7-0 advantage into the final quarter before pulling away.

However, Ruidoso had several chances to equalize the score before the final period.

On the opening series of the game, Socorro could only move the ball three yards to its own 30 before having to punt the ball.

Ruidoso got the ball on the Socorro 49 and started a short drive of its own.

Quarterback Billy Woodul hit wingback Grady Williamson with a 26 yard pass to the Socorro 23.

However, the drive stalled at the 20 and the hosts took over.

Both teams traded series before Socorro started its initial touchdown drive.

Starting at their own 27, the host Warriors drove 73 yards in 11 plays for the score. Most of the running was done by the 185-pound Sandoval.

Socorro moved the ball to the Ruidoso three where Sandoval threw his pass to Jaramillo for the score.

Ruidoso received the opening kickoff and made one of its best drives of the night, reaching the Socorro 21 before having to give the ball up.

Williamson, who led the Warrior rushers with 58 yards, ran four times for 26 yards during the drive.

The rest of the half saw the teams trade the ball back and forth without any more real scoring threats.

Ruidoso received the opening kickoff of the second half and had a short drive of 26 yards, the longest gain being an 18 yard run by Williamson down the left sidelines from the 24 to the 42 in Warrior territory.

During the first second half drive, Ruidoso got a scare when junior offensive tackle Craig Carson was injured and had to be taken off the field on a stretcher.

However, an examination at the Socorro hospital showed him to have a badly bruised back and nothing more.

The absence of Carson hurt the Warrior offensive attack but Ruidoso still managed to drive to the Socorro 39 before giving the ball up.

Socorro scored its second touchdown midway through the final period on a 70 yard drive.

Quarterback Ted Reynolds completed two passes and ran the team well during the drive. Running back John Vallejo took the ball in from three yards out to culminate the drive with 6:40 remaining in the contest. The extra point was good and Socorro held a 14-0 advantage.

The Warriors received the kickoff on their own 21 and drove 22 yards before a Woodul pass was intercepted.

The last scoring chance for Ruidoso came with less than three minutes remaining when freshman Russell Easter intercepted a Reynolds pass and returned it to the Socorro 21.

However, two plays later, the ball was fumbled in the Ruidoso backfield and a Socorro player returned it all the way to the Warriors' 20.

Reynolds ended the drive five plays later with a pass to Mike Jajala. The extra point kick was wide but Socorro had a 20-0 lead and its second shutout victory in as many

games. Last week Socorro defeated Deming 19-0. Deming plays in Ruidoso's 3-AAA district.

Ruidoso gained 180 yards total offense—107 on the ground and 73 passing. Socorro had 173 yards rushing and 72 passing for a total of 245 yards. Much of the hosts' yardage came in the last period.

Despite the defeat, Ruidoso head coach Darrel Stierwalt felt his team played well. "I'm really proud of the guys," he said. "We played a lot better than last week and the defense, with all those young guys in there, did a great job."

The Warriors used a lot of athletes on defense and played several sophomores and freshmen. Easter, Manuel Montano and linebacker Jessie Reynolds were some of the young players who did well on the defensive unit.

Besides Carson's injury, several other Warrior players suffered nagging injuries.

Williamson has a hip pointer but it has not been determined whether he'll be able to play in the home opener against Dexter Friday. Fullback Kyle Flack and running back Cisco Bob have bruised knees.

champion.

If a strike forced the league to shorten the season to just eight games instead of 16, teams might just play the clubs in their own division twice. Possibly two games would be left over for teams from other divisions or the opposing conference.

Another way would be for each team to play the other teams in its division once and play the rest of the games against "outside" opponents.

I prefer the former method. If a team plays the other clubs in its own division twice, fans would get a clearer idea of which team is the best in each division. If two teams play each other twice, fans can get a good idea of where each team stands.

But a shortened season wouldn't please many people.

Suppose, for example, that the Dallas Cowboys have a rash of injuries for a couple of games and lose to opponents that have no business being on the same field with them.

In an eight-game season, two or three losses could push the Cowboys into third place. That clearly wouldn't be a good indication of Dallas' talent since the Cowboys are clearly better than their toughest opponents in their division, Philadelphia and New York.

A 16-game season, on the other hand, would give teams that had gone through injury problems a chance to make up for lost ground.

Either way, the outcome isn't promising for professional football fans.

Clearly, the best thing would be for a quick settlement to be reached before the proposed strike comes about.

But there's about as much of a chance of that happening as I have of making an NFL team as a defensive lineman.

The Computerization of The Ruidoso News

Old-timers like "catching hot bread" and "Linotype machines." I am familiar with these terms from hearing them, but I'm not really sure what they mean.

Before too many years go by, I will probably be an old-timer talking about an obsolete piece of equipment called a "typewriter."

When I started with The News in the fall of '81, we typed our stories on sheets of newsprint. If the story was longer than one sheet, we got out our glue and pasted the sheets together.

Then we spiked them on a nail on the editor's desk. Cale would edit the copy with a pencil before sending it to the typesetters.

All of this changed along about December, when we got some new equipment. Now, we type our stories on "terminals." These amazing machines consist of a keyboard with a viewscreen.

So the writer sees each letter and word as it is typed, and can back up and correct mistakes. Once the story is in the form the reporter wants, he or she enters it onto a "diskette," which has been inserted into the terminal at the start.

The diskette is then passed on to the editor, who calls up the story on his terminal screen and edits the copy. When I get done with it, I take it back to the composing department and they put it in a machine called a "Trendsetter," which is a photo typesetter machine.

The Trendsetter puts the information onto photographic paper. When this paper is run through a printing machine, what emerges is copy that looks just like what you are now reading—ready to be proofread and pasted onto pages.

The step of having our copy retyped for typesetting has been eliminated.

The terminals have other advantages, too. Certain of their keys can be defined, so that something the writer uses over and over—like a byline—can be written out by hitting a single key.

But this is not to say the machines are entirely problem-free. You may have seen Lou Grant on TV when he "loses" a story in his terminal.

Losing a story is something all of us at The News have done a time or two, and it is pretty darned aggravating, let me tell you.

The trouble with these "smart" machines is—they do exactly what you tell them. Now let's say I have written a brilliant account of a meeting I attended. My story is three files long—a file of the diskette being analogous to a page of the paper. So here I am, ready to enter the third file onto the disk.

It is 1 a.m. as I write, and I groggily hit the "replace file" key, used to enter

changes in files that have already been entered) instead of the "enter file" key. When I hit the "execute" key, I seal my fate. File three replaces file two, and my hour's work writing file two vanishes forever.

Figuratively "executing" oneself in this manner is enough to make a grown man cry. In fact, when more or less what I've described happened to Dave Sheppard recently, I swear I heard bellows of rage from the newspaper building up at my house near the post office.

Stories also get lost when there is a momentary power failure which causes the terminal screen to go blank. In those cases, stuff that is already entered on the disk doesn't get lost, though, so if you're paranoid about it you can enter your story after each line you type.

Besides our seven handsome Compu-graphic Mini-Disk Terminals, we have a new face in the office. This is a Radio Shack TRS-80 computer.

Why did we need a computer?

"Our circulation has grown so much the last five years that the hand posting and maintenance of circulation records just became impossible for one person to take care of," explained publisher Ken Green.

That, coupled with the decrease in price for small business computers and the availability of software tailored to the newspaper business, prompted the purchase of the TRS-80.

According to Ken, we have the largest mail circulation of any paper our size in the state, and the widest variety of zip codes among our subscribers. Also, many of our subscribers are very mobile, and the computer will make it easier to ensure that their paper keeps up with them.

If you get The Ruidoso News by mail, you may have noticed the mailing label on your paper. The labels are printed by the line printer which goes with the computer. If you spot an error on the label, please let us know.

In the future, Ken noted, various general bookkeeping functions will be added to the computer.

Meanwhile, Mary Lois Green has been busy transferring our circulation records from a card and stencil system to the computer. In doing so, she has discovered cards from some subscribers dating back to the start of the paper more than 30 years ago.

Mary Lois has noted that while the new system is faster, cleaner and less trouble, it is also sort of impersonal.

And I guess that's one problem with the computer age. But maybe, with computers all the time doing more of our work for us, we can use the time to get to know each other and get along better.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Dollar for dollar expended, county government is the best kind we get. That thought, expressed by a leading member of the New Mexico Legislature, is wholly concurred in by this department.

That's not to say county government is perfect. It isn't.

What's more, in New Mexico it is as various as our 33 counties are various. But its average ranks high.

That is obvious from some of the material which is coming in to an interim legislative committee dealing with how much he cut in federal funds will hurt New Mexico.

That group asked each county to answer some meaningful questions.

So far, only 19 counties have answered, but they are a good cross-section of the state—some large, some small; some crowded, some empty; some rich, some poor.

If they had more money, the counties were asked, what would they spend it on? Roads, jails and equipment, in that order.

Interestingly enough, about a third of the 19 counties answering, so far said they would use some of the extra money for more social services, such as senior citizens' centers. That's something the Reagan administration might be surprised to read.

And if revenues go down, they were asked, what would they cut?

Restoring services, they began with (this recall the Reagan priorities), followed by the salaries of their employees, followed by road building and maintenance.

Which of the things they presently pay for would they most like to get rid of?

The cost of supporting the district courts, they said, followed by the price they pay for the district attorney's office, followed by whatever it costs to support a county health office and an office for an agricultural agent.

They think Santa Fe makes their lives more difficult by enacting stiff requirements about jails and law enforcement activities; by punishingly high demands about sanitary landfills; and about how to figure and enforce the formulas for valuing the property to which taxes apply.

One problem in all this is that New Mexico counties each seem to be relatively unique. No one is much like another.

For instance, law-enforcement costs are higher in counties which border on Mexico and where there are lots of temporary residents, as there are in gas-and-oil counties.

On the other hand, gas-and-oil counties, which are rich, have low expenses for indigent care, which is not true of counties in the poorer northern part of the state.

Things are never simple.

Counties, for instance, should be paying much attention to the effort of the Highway Department to dump back on them many miles of roadway the state has traditionally cared for.

That isn't to say the impulse by the Highway Department to unload these roads is entirely unfair. In many instances, the roads we are talking about should never have been taken into the state system in the first place.

But the reason the state wants to get rid of them—because they cost too much to maintain—should be as valid when discussing why the respective counties do not want to take them back.

As between state and county governments, there will always be a tension. What one profits from, the other generally loses on.

That's the essence of the symbiotic relationship into which these governments are locked.

But somebody ought to speak up for the counties here in Santa Fe, where decisions are made which can do them much harm. Counts have been humble too long.

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You've probably heard there's a new bank coming to Ruidoso. And now, First City National is here—and we think we have just the kind of bankers you've been waiting for.

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
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

The drop in Russia tourism started in 1979. There was no strong reason except that many people, anticipating the 1980 Olympics, opted to wait for that event.

In 1980, of course, the U.S. boycotted the Olympics, and most tourists decided against going. Russian tourism that year dropped to an all-time low.

In 1981, there was still a bit of a "hangover" from the 1980 boycott. American visits to Russia increased over the previous year, but not by much.

The tide seems to be turning in 1982. Bookings for trips to Russia are up. Opinion in the travel industry is that people feel they want to experience Russia and have waited long enough. Many packages are available.

Despite the ban on Aeroflot, there are still convenient ways to get to Russia directly from the U.S. Many foreign airlines, such as Finnair, KLM, SAS and British Airways, have regular routes to Russia via their home countries. Most packages are using these alternative airlines.





Zack Mayo (Richard Gere) has had a tough life. His mother died when he was only 13, and he was forced to live with his father in the Philippines. His father was in the Navy and at sea most of the time, so Zack had to fend for himself. When the elder Mayo was at home, about all he showed his son was the sleaziest bars and whorehouses. Zack became a streetwise loner.

As a young man, Zack wants to leave his past behind to become "An Officer and a Gentleman" as a navy flier. The independent kid from the gutter wants to soar in the clouds, but the main obstacle in his path is boot camp and a drill sergeant with a masters degree in meanness and a pedigree in personal abuse.

The stage is set for a military melodrama, and were it not for the inspired acting of nearly every cast member, this film would quickly fall from sight.

All the performances are superb, but look for Gere and Debra Winger to receive Oscar nominations.

Miss Winger plays Gere's girlfriend, a military groupie from the neighborhood near the Naval base, who is looking to land a flier as a cure for the small-town blues. Instead of a ticket out, she gets a passport to romance. Some of their love scenes are definitely adult material.

As the rude-and-crude drill sergeant, Louis Gossett Jr. insures that boot camp is nothing like the one pictured in Bill Murray's "Stripes." He's the cliched sergeant, hurling abuse at the recruits in unending tedium.

Although this film is only director Taylor Hackford's second effort, he takes a rather mundane script and, with the aid of the superb acting, makes it appear like a much better movie than it actually is.


