Queen Marian to reign over Aspen Festival '82

After two hours of interviewing and half an hour of deliberation judges crowned Marian Cadena Queen of the Aspen Festival '82 and Lois Covill and Denise Delkotal princesses of the festival. The three women will reign over the 1982 Aspen Festival and represent Ruidoso and the Chamber of Commerce for the next year.

Larry Langford made the announcement at Cree Meadows Restaurant Sunday afternoon after telling the 17 contestants they were all queens and special in the judges' eyes.

Cadena, 17, is a senior at Ruidoso High School where she participates in a work study program. She has lived in Ruidoso for four-and-a-half years since moving from Tularosa. She hopes to attend college next year but is undecided whether to study counseling or nursing.

Her interest in those subjects comes from her work as an office assistant for Dr. Paul Whitwam. Whitwam was Cadena's sponsor in the contest and largely responsible for her entrance into the contest.

"They bribed me. They bought me a new dress," said Cadena, who had not been excited about the contest when the Whitwams first brought up the subject. However, she eventually became very enthusiastic about it.

Her proud father, Jesse Cadena, said, "I just told her not to hold back and be herself."

Marian took her father's advice. "I was pretty comfortable," said Marian. "Once they got me talking I didn't shut up."

The judges mentioned Cadena's enthusiasm. Ellen Miller, a judge for the contest, said, "We all were captivated."

The judges read applications the contestants had filled out about themselves, then interviewed each girl privately for about five minutes. They asked questions in two main categories.

They asked each contestant what they would tell a person about Ruidoso and to tell about a very high and a very low moment in their lives. The Reverend Charles Spooner said the judges also took into account how each woman generally came across and their appearance.

Cadena, as Festival Queen, will ride in the front of the parade on October 9. She will also participate in a variety of other activities during the festival, including acting as honorary judge in the chili cookoff and riding in the opening exercises of the mule races.

For being chosen 1982 Aspen Festival Queen Cadena received a Merle Norman cosmetics kit, a savings account at First City National bank with \$50 in it, a half dozen roses and a tiara.

Princesses Covill and Delkotal, sponsored by Don's Pharmacy and The Roadrunner respectively, received a half dozen red carnations.

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
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
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
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
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

 Most people visit Machu Picchu as a day trip from Cuzco. However, if you book far enough in advance, you can stay right on the site at the Hotel de Turistas. It has only 30 rooms, but a stay here allows you much more time to explore the ruins at leisure.
 Most people from the States fly into Lima, the capital city. If you want to visit Machu Picchu and see more of the country, your best bet is the many available package deals that include time in Lima, Cuzco and Machu Picchu.
 Another famous Peruvian sight is the Nazca Plain, with its huge hieroglyphic, type drawings that can only be appreciated from the air. Fly there from Lima, or drive to a nearby town and then take a short sightseeing flight.
 The town of Arequipa is less visited by tourists. Highlight is the 400-year-old convent of Santa Catalina, virtually a city, where the nuns once had their own houses.
 The small Indian village of Pisac is famous for its weekly handicrafts fair that attracts Indian craftspeople from all over.

It's getting down to separating the men from the boys in the major league baseball races.

With just two weeks remaining in the season, all four division races are still wide open.

Even the American League Eastern Division, which has been dominated by Milwaukee all season, has turned into a two-team race.

The Baltimore Orioles, who have been steady contenders since the late 1960s, have steadily closed the gap on the Brewers and things should be really interesting the next two weeks in that division.

Still, I see the Brewers hanging on for the division title.

The Western Division of the American League is basically a three-team race with Kansas City and California holding the upper hand and the Chicago White Sox fighting to stay in the running.

Kansas City has a better pitching staff than California but the Angels have a better starting lineup. The White Sox don't have the talent of either club that's ahead of them but have hung on stubbornly most of the season.

The Royals have held a slight lead over California most of the season. Many so-called baseball experts say that pitching is 90 percent of the game. That's debatable, but pitching still is a big enough part of the game to help decide the winner.

I look for the Royals to win the division by a couple of games.

In the National League Eastern Division, St. Louis and Philadelphia hold a slight advantage over Montreal, the team that was the general pre-season pick.

Montreal probably has the best team in the major leagues, talent-wise. The Expos have a solid pitching staff and an excellent

eight-man starting lineup.

However, Montreal has generally been the bridesmaid in recent seasons. Last year the Expos did win the division title but that was due mainly to the split-season owing to the strike. If there had not been a strike, the Phillies would probably have been the champions since they held a solid lead at the time of the players' walkout.

St. Louis is another team that's loaded with talent and the Cardinals have proved it by leading the division race much of the season.

I look for the Phillies' experience to be the difference. Philadelphia should win by a game or two in a race that probably won't be decided until the last weekend.

The Western Division of the senior circuit has perhaps the most interesting race.

The defending world champion Los Angeles Dodgers have come on strong in the last two months and should be the favorite over the Atlanta Braves, who started the season with a record 13 straight victories.

However, the San Francisco Giants have been the hottest team in baseball over the past three months. The Giants have won 45 games while losing just 27 in that span.

It's probably too much to expect the Giants to overtake the Dodgers. The Braves are another matter, however. Atlanta has not played good ball in the later stages of this season.

I see the Dodgers winning the division with the Giants overtaking the Braves for second place.

As to the playoffs, look for Los Angeles to nip Philadelphia in five games and the Royals to top Milwaukee in the same number of contests.

The World Series? It should be one of the better ones in recent years. Look for the Dodgers to defeat the Royals in seven games.

Mistakes hurt Ruidoso in loss

A couple of mistakes proved to be the difference as the winless Ruidoso High School varsity football team lost its home opener to Dexter 22-16 Friday night.

The Warriors lost a fumble on their first series of the game which led to a touchdown. Another fumble with less than two minutes remaining in the game ended a drive for a possible winning touchdown.

Ruidoso fumbled on its 25 yard line on its opening series and the Demons scored in four plays, William Reed taking the ball over from the four yard line. A run for the two point conversion was good and Dexter led 8-0.

After the first Dexter score, Ruidoso came back early in the second period to tie

the contest.

Senior Grady Williamson returned a Demon punt to the Dexter 15. From there the Warriors scored in three plays.

On third and two at the seven, quarterback Billy Woodul dropped back and found tight end Mike Douglass at the one yard line. Douglass banged into the end zone for the score. The same combination hooked up for the two point conversion and the game was tied.

Dexter came right back, however, and took the lead for good with a 50-yard, eight play drive.

Jimmy Natividad, a small but quick back, concluded the Demon drive with a three yard run up the middle with 7:06 re-

maining in the half. He also ran for the two point conversion and the Demons took a 16-8 advantage into the locker room at halftime.

The Demons grabbed a 14 point advantage in the third quarter when Willie Aldaco ran four yards for a touchdown. A running play for a two point conversion was stopped short and the visitors led 22-8 going into the final quarter.

The Warriors put together their best quarter of the game in the final period, largely due to the passing of Woodul and the fine receiving of Douglass and split end H. R. Lueras.

Starting on their own 32, the Warriors drove 68 yards in five plays for their se-

cond touchdown.

The big play of the drive was a 28 yard pass from Woodul to Douglass on the right sidelines which brought the ball to the Dexter 35.

On the next play, Lueras made a leaping catch of a ball which bounced off a Demon defender to give the Warriors a first down on the Dexter 21.

On the next play, freshman fullback Mark Langston broke two tackles and ran 21 yards for the touchdown. Woodul connected with Grady Williamson on a short pass in the left side of the endzone for the two point conversion and Ruidoso trailed 22-16 with 6:58 remaining.

The Warriors had two more chances to score but failed to push the ball across the goal line.

On the Demons' offensive series following the kickoff, David Swalander recovered a fumble on the Dexter 45. However, the Warriors could only move five yards on their series and the Demons took the ball over.

Ruidoso had one last chance to score with 1:50 remaining in the game. Douglass made another fine catch of a Woodul pass on the Dexter 28. There was a mixup in the backfield on the next play, however, and a Demon player recovered the loose ball.

Ruidoso gained 70 yards rushing and 78 passing for a 148 total. Williamson led the Warrior rushers with 36 yards and Langston added 28. Dexter had 246 yards total offense.

Woodul completed six of 12 passes for 70 yards and Williamson threw one pass that was incomplete. The Warriors went briefly with Williamson at quarterback and Woodul at fullback early in the third quarter but went back to their traditional offense after one series.

Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt was naturally disappointed with his team's defeat.

"We didn't improve over last week (a 20-0 loss to powerful Socorro)," he said. "We made some fundamental mistakes like in blocking."

"However, our young kids like Russell Easter and Mark Langston did a real good job and gained valuable game experience."

The Warriors, now 0-3 on the year, will have their homecoming game Friday when Jal comes to town for a 7:30 p.m. contest. Ruidoso defeated Jal 20-0 last season. Jal finished second in the state's AA division playoffs last year.

A first quarter mistake proved costly to the Ruidoso High School junior varsity football team as it lost to the visiting Roswell High School ninth graders 6-0 Thursday night.

The only touchdown of the game was set up when the ball was fumbled on a center snap for a 30-yard punt and it was recovered by Roswell on the Warriors' 10 yard line.

Two plays later, Coyote fullback Rick Brown bulldozed over from the four yard line for the touchdown with 5:45 left in the opening quarter.

Ruidoso's best drive was to the Coyote 12 yard line in the second quarter. However, a pass interception ended the Warriors' scoring threat.

The rest of the contest saw both teams' defenses dominate.

Ruidoso had one last chance to score in the final minutes of the contest. The Warriors drove from their own five yard line to midfield before having to give the ball up on downs.

"I think the kids did a very good job," head Warrior junior varsity coach Jim Ramsey said. "We had some kids playing at different positions than they were used to playing and they were a little jittery. Some of the kids haven't played much organized ball before now."

The Warriors only suited up 22 players for the game. Last week, in the 6-0 opening loss to Carrizozo, Ruidoso had 30 players suited up.

Quarterback Kenny Espinosa came in for praise from Ramsey. Espinosa completed six of 15 passes and was on target with most of his attempts.

Ramsey also praised the whole Warrior defensive effort.

The junior varsity Warriors will travel to Tularosa Saturday for a 2 p.m. contest.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Everybody in government can make laws.

We who are outside of government, of course, can't.

It's perfectly clear that elected legislators can pass laws; basically that's about all they do.

It has become increasingly clear in recent years that the courts can "make" law, at least by their interpretation of laws already made. A current example: that decision that says bars and package stores are responsible for the subsequent actions of any drunks they serve.

But it's not equally clear to everyone how members of the administration, the third branch of government, can accomplish the same end.

It's by making regulations. When a legally constituted state agency has been given the power to make regulations, any regs it creates within the framework of its own power have the de facto force of law.

So everybody in government can do it somehow.

No wonder government sometimes seems like such a heavy burden and those who promise to get it off our backs get such a positive response.

What happens when two of the bodies rule in conflicting ways?

A recent case: A set of laws called the Children's Code seems to say courts may name either private attorneys or the public defender's office to represent indigent juveniles, yet a rule set by the Supreme Court says the public defender has to do the job.

Many public defenders don't want to do that. What they object to most is that after doing it, they have to collect the money for their fees for the state.

They don't represent the state, they say, and they have no mechanism for collecting money or for handling it.

Supreme Court Justice William Riordan, appearing before a legislative committee, appeared to take the position that the courts may create a rule which contravenes a statute.

He didn't say that straight out, but in answer to a question, he said it would appear the court believed that at the time it adopted the rule.

For a judge, that comes pretty close to being a forthright admission.

Of course the judge didn't seem too happy at being hauled before a group of legislators to discuss the matter. Generally, those in the judiciary take a dim view of being asked questions by those in another branch of government. The very idea seems to some of them to threaten the famous doctrine of separation of powers.

What's more, in this case, the legislators were a little impatient with the whole question. John Mershon, chairman of the committee, was asking the two sides to go outside and settle it quietly, just as judges sometime do with the two sides appearing before them.

Last we heard, nothing had been settled, and the rule which says one thing and the law which says another are both on the books.

In these difficult economic times, there are some who might be concerned that Congress is attempting to balance the budget on the backs of the poor.

Let me reassure you that the budget cuts will affect all Americans — not just the low-income.

For instance, wealthy people will be paying higher taxes next year. Doctors will have their Medicare reimbursements restricted. Students must now prove financial need to get loans.

In other words, there is hardly any group of Americans that isn't going to be affected

to some extent by these cuts which are vital to economic recovery.

The reason why we are cutting federal spending is to bring down interest rates, keep inflation low and reduce unemployment.

If we didn't cut spending, the government would be forced to borrow more money to pay off its debt, which would keep interest rates high and prevent citizens from being able to purchase cars and homes.

In addition, business could not expand because it could not afford the huge interest rates of recent months. Unemployment would remain high.

Certainly the poor are affected by the budget reductions. I wish that was not the case. No one in Congress does. But you cannot cut tens of billions of dollars from growing federal budgets without that happening.

Fortunately, we have been able to cut only the GROWTH in most programs.

—Food stamp beneficiaries will still receive an increase in October of at least 8.6 percent.

—The Supplemental Security Income program for the aged, blind and disabled will still be increased by more than \$1 billion from 1982 to 1983 (\$7.9 to \$9.3 billion).

—Medicaid will still go up nine percent every year between now and 1985.

The growth in many federal programs during the past few years has been tremendous. The cost of Medicare increased a whopping 139 percent from 1976 to 1982; food stamps went up 102 percent between '76 and '81 and Social Security, 90 percent during the same time period.

Beware when you hear "Official poverty statistics." The Census Bureau recently advised us that these statistics can be anywhere from 12 to 42 percent too high because they don't count non-cash benefits such as Medicaid and food stamps.

The hard truth is that because of the recession, the nation simply can't afford social welfare programs that are as generous as you or I might want to be.

However, with the steps Congress has taken to curb federal spending, everyone should be much better off as interest rates continue to drop and inflation is restrained at reasonable levels.

This week marks the transition to autumn—the time of year when we can kick back on the porch, gaze skyward and reflect as the migratory birds honk overhead on their annual flight south, telling us the completion of an annual cycle is near.

Autumn is perhaps my favorite season. Born and raised in a northern latitude where seasons are distinct, I would be lost if I were separated from the traditions of fall.

Autumn is for reaping the bounty of harvest. The thrashing of combines, and the chatter of mechanical reapers unite with the harmony of song as the fields, orchards and vineyards become melodic places of celebration.

Autumn is for marveling at the mastery of Mother Nature as she prepares the wooded groves for the grip of winter and dresses her flora for a final annual display in the brilliance of colors from her palette.

Autumn is for daytime hikes with family and friends into the shelter of the forests, where one can witness the animal kingdom scurrying forth to hoard its winter supplies.

Yes, autumn is a time for warmth, comfort and festivity as the climate rotates on to its cooler side.

The first signs of the changes are evident. In the Rio Ruidoso Valley, leaves are losing their green lustre as cold nights have ebbed the flow of vital sap that transports the trees' nutrients. In coming weeks, as the sun angles farther on the horizon, the green pigment chlorophyll will not have sufficient light to photosynthesize and will die off, leaving other leaf pigments to steal the show.

The Aspen Festival is dedicated to this colorful stage of our most abundant deciduous tree. I wait in anxious anticipa-

tion for the quaking aspens to transform into hues of gold. Although fall's foliage displays are not as magnificent here as in the Green Mountains of my native Vermont, I find the contrasts of the bright aspen groves engulfed by dark stands of evergreen to be worthy of distinction.

Since this is my first autumn in Ruidoso, I have never experienced the apple picking traditions of the Hondo Valley. But I was raised in an apple-producing area, and each fall season I think back to sounds and smells of the orchards as the trees are relieved of their ripened fruit.

Orchards were closed the first weeks of harvest as apple growers picked the fruit for market. As the harvest waned and growers filled their warehouses, orchard gates would open and local folks would be invited to "come pick your own." The orchards would become centers of social merriment as parents filled the bushel baskets and we kids would dare each other to climb to the tops of the trees to claim the plumpest "Macs."

At the larger orchards, apple growers would sell cups of fresh-pressed cider. There is nothing like the tart nectar of a Macintosh to quench your fall thirst.

Fall is also the season of gridiron clashes and homecoming parades and the hunter's chase of game.

Autumn would seem somehow incomplete in America without the cheers and grunts of a high school football field on a Friday night or Saturday afternoon.

Pep rallies raise the temperature of the community and townspeople speculate on the chances of their young warriors. And then comes game time and spectators bundle up in the stands to watch their padded heroes huddle below. Cheerleaders perform on the sidelines, and the head of the squad prays that her boyfriend, the quarterback, wins the game with a touchdown pass.

After the game the athletes have earned a harvest feast—the highlights of which are venison that is the bounty from a hunting trip and hot apple pie topped with cheddar cheese.

Autumn is for strolling on leaf-covered ground and listening to the crackle underfoot. It is for raking those leaves into a giant pile, jumping into the pile, and raking them again.

Autumn is for flannel shirts, chopping wood and stoking the fireplace. It is for collecting nuts and roasting them over the fire. It is for snuggling up in front of the fire with a hot drink and a good book, or dreaming of the first snow to whiten the slopes.

At the end of the day, autumn is for crawling into a cold bed that is loaded with heavy covers. It is for falling asleep as another flock of bugling geese pass overhead, and remind us again of the transition in the year.

INSIGHT INTO A 'BAD BILL'

The United States Senate recently gave its approval to what's called the Federal Immigration Reform Bill by a vote of 81 to 18 and the measure is now headed for the House.

John Watts Young, James Alton McDivitt, Edward Higgins White II (deceased), Charles "Pete" Conrad Jr., Frank Borman, James Arthur Lovell Jr., David Randolph Scott, Eugene Andrew Cernan, Richard Francis Gordon Jr., and Edwin Eugene Aldrin Jr., will join fellow Gemini astronauts Virgil Ivan Grissom, Leroy Gordon Cooper Jr., Walter Marty Schirra Jr., Neil Alden Armstrong, Michael Collins, and Thomas Stafford as inductees into the only facility in the world honoring the men and women who have dedicated their lives to space research.

Each of the ten Gemini astronauts to be inducted into the International Space Hall of Fame Saturday, October 2, have made major contributions to space exploration.

For instance, John Young was the first person to fly in space five times. He logged 533 hours 33 minutes in his first four space flights of which 20 hours 14 minutes were spent walking on the lunar surface. On his fifth flight he was spacecraft commander of the first flight of the Space Shuttle Columbia in April of 1981. (Young will be a speaker at the induction ceremony.)

James McDivitt was command pilot of the Gemini IV mission. He also flew the

lunar module lander for the first time during the Apollo 9 mission.

Edward White II was the first American to walk in space during the Gemini IV mission. He died in a flash fire during a ground test of the ill-fated Apollo 1 on January 27, 1967.

Charles Conrad Jr. logged 1,179 hours 38 minutes in four space flights, of which 7 hours 46 minutes were spent walking on the lunar surface and 4 hours 59 minutes during two spacewalks on Skylab 2. It was during one of these spacewalks that he and astronaut Joseph Kerwin deployed the jammed solar panel wing to save the mission from failure and make it a viable space home and workshop for the succeeding Skylab 3 and 4 crews.

Frank Borman was command pilot of the Gemini VII mission, the longest manned space flight up to that time. Other firsts were the first rendezvous of two manned maneuverable spacecraft (with Gemini VI) and the longest multi-manned space flight.

James Lovell Jr. was pilot, with command pilot Borman on the Gemini VII. He was the first person to journey twice to the moon (although he never landed on its surface).

David Scott's first assignment as an astronaut — also his first space flight as pilot — was Gemini VIII with command pilot Neil Armstrong (also making his first space flight). The crew performed the first successful docking of two vehicles in space but had to return their wildly gyrating

spacecraft back to earth shortly after docking due to a thruster malfunction.

Eugene Cernan was the second American to walk in space during the Gemini IX mission. With New Mexico's (Senator) Harrison Schmitt, he descended to the moon's surface aboard the lunar module from the Apollo 17. Cernan was the 11th person to walk on the moon and the last to leave his footprints on its surface.

Richard Gordon Jr. served as pilot for Gemini XI. Firsts for this flight included: the first tethered station-keeping (between Gemini XI and an Agena target vehicle), establishment of a new altitude record for that time of 850 miles, and the first fully automated controlled reentry. Prior to his becoming an astronaut, Gordon was a Navy flight test pilot. In May 1961, he won the Bendix Air Trophy Race from Los Angeles to New York, setting a new speed record of 859.74 mph and a transcontinental speed record of 2 hours 47 minutes.

Edwin Aldrin Jr. received the nation's highest civilian award, the Presidential Medal for Freedom, for his flight on Apollo 11 in 1969. His first space flight was with Gemini VII veteran Lovell in the Gemini XII mission. He became the fifth American to walk in space. Aldrin has written a book, Return to Earth, describing some of the postflight experiences and problems he encountered as an astronaut.

The International Space Hall of Fame will be open free-to-the-public the day of the induction ceremony, Saturday, October 2, from 3 p.m. till 8 p.m.

Columbia shuttle film to premiere

On Sunday, April 12, 1981, Americans shared an unforgettable moment of pride and wonder, as the Columbia, the world's most sophisticated and versatile spacecraft, executed a perfect takeoff from launch pad 39A at Florida's Kennedy Space Center. After circling the earth 36 times, the first space cargo ship, capable of carrying up to 65,000 lbs. of cargo, returned to earth in such good condition that it required only minimal refurbishing for its second flight, seven months later. All mission objectives were achieved.

In 1982, New Mexicans can experience the reality of that remarkable adventure because of an extraordinary film called "Hail Columbia" to be shown at the Omnimax Theater (one of only 11 in the world) in Alamogordo.

The theater features the largest projector in the world, 70mm film projected via a fish-eye lens onto a giant 40-foot wide

wrap-around screen, and a six-channel audio systems. The size of the image and the way it wraps around and limits your visual range create some fantastic optical effects. In fact, you feel like you are moving — as if you're actually participating in

the action on screen.

"Hail Columbia" will be showing at the Omnimax Theater in honor of the 1982 inductees into the International Space Hall of Fame, premiering the day of the induction ceremony, October 2.

Glynn Lunney to speak

Manager of the Space Shuttle Program Dr. Glynn Lunney will speak at the International Space Hall of Fame 1982 induction ceremony. The ceremony will be held in front of the Space Hall Saturday, October 2, 1982, in honor of 10 astronauts from the Gemini Program.

Dr. Lunney has been with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) since 1959. Since that time he has

been involved with the Gemini, Apollo and Space Shuttle Programs. He has received numerous awards for exceptional service and outstanding leadership as well as NASA's Distinguished Service Medal.

Lunney is currently responsible for all functions related to the management and integration of all elements of the Space Shuttle Program. He is stationed at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas.

Four honorees expected at ceremony

Four Gemini astronauts and their wives will attend the induction ceremony Saturday, October 2, at the International Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo. These astronauts are John Young, Eugene Cernan, Richard Gordon and James Lovell.

Selected from the second group of astronauts, September 17, 1962, Young's space career encompasses the Gemini, Apollo and Space Shuttle programs. In fact, he served as pilot with command pilot Gus Grissom on the first manned Gemini flight on March 23, 1965, and commanded the first flight of the Space Shuttle Columbia in April of 1981. Young will represent the Gemini astronauts during the ceremony and will respond with a short acceptance speech.

Lovell, too, was chosen with the second group of astronauts in 1962. His first space flight was as pilot on Gemini VII, the longest manned space flight up to that time. He also served as command module pilot for the epic six-day journey of Apollo

8 on man's maiden voyage to the moon in 1968 (the Apollo 8 carried no lunar module and circled the moon without landing). Lovell became the first person to journey twice to the moon (although he never landed on its surface).

Cernan was chosen with the third group of astronauts on October 18, 1963. He made his first space flight as pilot of Gemini IX. During this flight he became the second American to walk in space. He later made his third space flight on the lunar landing mission, Apollo 17. His crew on Apollo 17 consisted of Ronald Evans, command module pilot, and Harrison H. Schmitt (New Mexico Senator and honoree inducted into the International Space Hall of Fame in 1977), who served as lunar module pilot and descended with Cernan to the moon's surface aboard the lunar module. From their lunar base in the mountainous Taurus-Littrow region, Cernan and Schmitt, a geologist, completed three highly successful excursions to the

nearby craters of the Taurus mountains of the moon. Their extravehicular activities on the lunar surface lasted a record 22 hours and 4 minutes. The Apollo 17 mission was also the longest manned lunar landing flight, 301 hours 52 minutes, and returned the largest collection of lunar samples, 249 pounds. Cernan was the 11th person to walk on the moon and the last to leave his footprints on its surface.

Gordon, too, was chosen with the third group of astronauts in 1963. He flew in space for the first time as pilot for Gemini XI. He performed a spacewalk and a stand-up EVA exercise. Firsts on Gemini XI included: the first tethered station-keeping (between Gemini XI and an Agena target vehicle), establishment of a new altitude record for that time of 850 miles, and the first fully automatic controlled reentry.

Gordon's second space flight was as command module pilot for Apollo 12 in November of 1969. Other crewmen on man's second lunar mission were Charles Conrad, spacecraft commander, and Alan Bean, lunar module pilot. Throughout the 31-hour stay on the lunar surface by Conrad and Bean, Gordon remained in the command ship Yankee Clipper, circling high overhead in lunar orbit.







OK, so summer's over and you've seen "E.T." six times already, and "Friday the 13th, Part Three in 3D" just isn't your kind of movie. You're looking for a light comedy, but there doesn't seem to be much around.

Enter Ron Howard and Henry Winkler from TV's "Happy Days." They've come up with a film whose plot would never make it as a TV sitcom. A slightly crazy scheme to turn a city morgue into a house of prostitution.

Of course this bizarre brothel is a situation ripe with possibilities, especially with Michael Keaton as a wacky but lovable "idea man" and Winkler as the terribly shy accountant caught up in the scheme. Together they form an impresario/accountant team much like Zero Mostel and Gene Wilder in "The Producers."

"Night Shift" is no "Producers," but as a late-summer/early-fall comedy

when the pickings are slim, one could do far worse "Night Shift" is a pleasant diversion.

Ron Howard (Opie of "The Andy Griffith Show" and Richie Cunningham of "Happy Days") directed this film from a script based on an actual incident in New York City. Howard's previous directing jobs included one TV-movie and "Grand Theft Auto," a low budget car-crasher for Roger Corman. That film was nothing special, so it's easy to see why it took a few years for Howard to get another assignment. To his credit, however, the kid from "Mayberry" does a fine job of directing.

He is helped along by Winkler as the shy accountant, but especially by Keaton, another face from TV who makes the transition to the big screen. His timing and personality are perfect for this role and he makes the best of an often silly situation.






