## County acts on unbuilt roads

County commissioners took action Tuesday toward removing 22 county roads from the tax rolls because they were platted but never constructed. Gerald Dean, county manager Suzanne Cox and Butch Allen were appointed to a road viewing committee to verify that the roads are not in existence.

Commissioners will then act at their October 12 meeting to remove the roads from the tax rolls but to leave easements for the roads for possible future construction.

Most of the 22 roads are just outside the village limits of Capitan, but a few are in or near Alto and Ruidoso Downs.

A number of complaints have been received recently from residents being taxed for roads which were never built. Commissioners therefore requested a list of all such roads so they could be removed from the tax rolls.

It was stated that subdividers are to fault for the problem because they fail to build roads as specified in the plats submitted for approval of the subdivision. Taxes are assessed according to these plats, so some property owners have been required to pay the 10 cents per foot road maintenance assessment for non-existent roads.

Commissioners also decided to begin requiring a permit for any kind of utility work on a county easement. They discussed requiring a \$200 charge for cutting across a county road and establishing a \$100 fine for anyone doing so without a permit.

Road Department superintendent Guy Henley reported that his department often has to repair roads after utility companies and county residents cut them up to install lines.

It was decided that Cox will review the current ordinance regarding requirements for work to be done involving a county road and that the ordinance will be enforced.

In other business, commissioners: —Approved a budget request for \$1,000 for the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission.

—Approved an amended budget for the Carrizozo Health Center for one year. The original budget covered only two months.

—Signed a contract with Western Programmers for computer equipment.

—Signed a contract change order with Herkenhoff and Associates for installation of a four-inch water line and meter to service the courthouse addition and the present courthouse building. Cost of the work will be \$7,800. Commissioners indicated they were dissatisfied with the cost, but agreed the work needs to be done.

—Agreed that it would be a good idea to put a gravel pit approximately four miles east of Ancho.

—Agreed to permit the county road department to furnish labor for completion of Fort Stanton Park. The park will be used primarily for visitors to Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School.

—Approved an application for special dispenser's liquor permit for the High Country Motocross Championship Race at Eagle Creek Ski Area October 3.

—Denied approval of a liquor license for the Hondo Bar because the establishment is closed and state statutes require that it remain open a certain number of days in order to keep a liquor license.

—Passed a resolution to increase the budget for a salary increase for an employee of the appraiser's office who received certification.

—Denied a request from the Carrizozo Police Department to resubmit its bid on a 1978 Plymouth from \$500 to \$150.

—Agreed to post a 35 mile per hour speed limit sign on Fort Stanton Road.

—Agreed to release the mortgage for Shauna Downs Subdivision.

—Appointed Cox, Howard Shanks and Tranquillo Silva to a road viewing committee to recommend for or against vacation of road in Capitan North, Unit Two. Terrence Bussey was appointed as an alternate to the committee.

—Granted permission to the county manager to determine whether county employees would prefer being paid every two weeks rather than twice a month after the new computer system is installed.

### Trash pickups this Saturday

A village crew will make trash pickups Saturday as part of a village cleanup effort, campaign organizer Barbara Duff announced.

Persons unable to transport their

refuse to the village landfill may arrange for a pickup by calling Duff at 257-2340 or the Chamber of Commerce at 257-7395, between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Debris should be bagged or banded and placed next to dumpsters.

## Dandy Don Meredith joins Pro-Am field

The Inn of the Mountain Gods Pro-Am Golf Tournament set for Monday, October 11, has added some big names to its competitors' list.

Don Meredith, the former Dallas Cowboy quarterback and now color commentator for ABC-TV's Monday Night Football, actor Dale Robertson and stand-out pro golfer George Archer have been added to the list of participants in the tournament.

Meredith will be here for the tournament unless the National Football League strike is over and the ABC staff has to change its broadcasting team for the game October 11.

Meredith also does television commercials for Lipton Tea.

Robertson, who starred in the television series, "Wells Fargo," will be a new actor on the popular CBS-TV series "Dallas" this fall.

Archer is the 12th professional golfer to agree to compete in the pro-am tournament. The Gilroy, California, resident has won \$1,161,847 in his 18-year pro career.

The 42-year-old golfer won the 1969 Masters championship and has 11 other

pro tournament victories to his credit. He won \$111,093 last season.

Other pro golfers who have agreed to compete in the tournament are Lou Graham, Dave Eichelberger, John Mahaffey, Charles Coody, Brad Bryant, Fuzzy Zoeller, Bob Murphy, Lon Hinkle, Mark Hayes, Dave Hill and Tom Purtzer.

D. A. Weibring had to drop out of the field due to another commitment.

Zoeller and Coody are also Masters winners. Coody won the 1971 Masters and Zoeller won the famed Green Jacket in 1979.

There is a possibility more pro golfers and celebrities will be added to the field.

About half the amateur field has been filled for the tournament. The amateur fee is \$1,200 per golfer.

The tournament is sponsored by the Inn in conjunction with the Ruidoso Rotary Club.

Gallery tickets for the tournament will cost \$20 a person. ## Vendors' ordinance hashed out

Three Chamber of Commerce representatives and one village councilman met for the first time as an official committee Tuesday to propose changes to the ordinance concerning seasonal or intermittent conduct of business.

Larry Langford, Ed Jungbluth, Richard Sandoval and Don Dale of the Business Registration Committee were present.

It was decided to raise the cost of a permit for seasonal or intermittent outdoor sales from \$50 to \$100.

The word "decoration" was added to a clause restricting placement of hanging apparatus used for outside display.

"No driveway, public parking space or parking lot" was substituted for the phrase "no parking lot or driveway" in a clause limiting outdoor displays and sale of merchandise. The change is intended to clarify the ordinance and make it more enforceable.

Langford suggested that a clause stating that all vendors would be required to comply with the ordinance regardless of previous practices be included and that vendors be given a limited amount of time to comply. Dale, village council representative to the committee, said he would talk to village attorney Lee Huckstep about wording of the clause.

Langford also suggested that a clause be added making it clear that in issuing the sales permit the village in no way assumes liability. Sole liability rests with the property owner who signs written permission allowing the vendor to operate on his property, it was acknowledged. Members of the committee agreed with the suggestion.

A clause stating that copies of the application for the sales permit would be kept on permanent record and a copy sent to the Bureau of Revenue Tax Department was also added to the proposed amendments.

At this point in the meeting the committee members expressed a desire to make

clear that the ordinance is not intended to hinder local vendors of homegrown agricultural products, who are exempt from the ordinance. They also said they wanted to make it clear that they did not want to harm local permanent businesses in any way.

"The intention is to put together an ordinance that is fair and makes everybody play by the same rules," said Langford. The ordinance changes were initiated in order to limit itinerant vendors who sell products out of their trucks, pay little or no taxes, and donate nothing to the village, said members of the committee.

A checklist of the conditions for issuance of a sales permit was added to the proposed ordinance. It is to be signed by the vendor and the person upon whose property the vendor will operate. It is to be used by village officials "in conjunction with application for seasonal or intermittent business."

The conditions on the list are as follows: —Application has been applied for at

least 10 days in advance of anticipated need and fee paid.

—Applicant does have and has shown proof of a valid New Mexico Limited Sales Tax Permit.

—Written permission from property owner on whose property applicant will sell goods is attached to form.

—Written certificate is attached to form stating at least two off-street parking spaces are available to applicant.

—Written certification is attached to form stating that restrooms will be available during all hours of activity.

Statements about copies of the sales permit application being kept on permanent record and liability of property owners will also be added to the checklist when proper legal wording is worked out.

Members were pleased with the proposed ordinance changes and planned to look at it again after an attorney had gone over it. If everything is right they plan to present it to the village council at the October 12 meeting.

## Mule Skinners plan for races

The Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners ran through a long agenda concerning preparations for the mule races at Ruidoso Downs Race Track October 8-10.

Melvin Means, president of the Mule Skinners, went through a two-page list of about 25 items for the members to consider, then opened the floor to discussion, asking, "What else needs to be done that I haven't thought of?" Members, often referring back to experiences from prior race meets, discussed a number of subjects.

Finances, publicity, maintenance of the Ruidoso Downs track and stables and safety considerations were all talked about.

At the start of the meeting Means reported a balance of \$8,837 dollars in the Mule Skinners account. That is over \$1,000 more than was collected last year, Means

noted, but he warned against complacency, saying the group lost money last year and is kicking in an additional \$1,000 to the purse this year.

Means reported sponsors for 31 of the 39 races scheduled and encouraged members to find more sponsors soon to assure the group of breaking even this year.

A news release has been sent to newspapers, radio and television stations announcing the event, said Means. Sharon Bettencourt, chairman of the show committee, told members that television station KBIM out of Roswell would be filming practice sessions Wednesday for the mule show and would air footage of the mules on the news and The Sharon Bell Show.

Means said he had received many calls about the mule show, a new event for the races this year. Bettencourt suggested putting one dollar of the two dollar admission fee for the show into the jackpot to increase purses for the jackpot events, with

the other dollar going into the general fund for the four-day event. There was talk of putting more money into the jackpot for the first day.

Auctioneer Bill Hernandez said he had preparations for the auction under control, although there was some question about exactly which facility at the racetrack will be used for the event.

A long discussion about care of the track and stables followed the broaching of that subject. The general consensus of the group was that they all would make efforts to leave the area in as good or better condition than they found it.

"We want to do everything we can to please those people down at the track," said Means. He said he had sent a letter to the Board of Directors of the racetrack thanking them for their cooperation and for allowing the Mule Skinners to use the track. He also sent two free passes to each director and promised to leave the track in

very good condition, he added.

Dave McMath, stall superintendent for the races, suggested adding a five dollar deposit on the \$15 charge to racing mule owners for stalls to make sure the stalls are left clean. Members agreed it was a good idea and should be done.

Logistical and safety preparations were also discussed. Means said that he had taken care of insurance for the event except for the arena events which he believed he could take care of with no problems. Mule Skinner Briscoe West said he believed he had an ambulance and Emergency Medical Technician lined up.

The members decided it was important to hire someone to take care of parking to make sure that there will be order in the parking lot.

Telephones, cleanup crews, security and signs directing people to the proper entrances were other items considered.

## Committee briefed on water project

Assistant village manager Frank Potter briefed the Grindstone Dam Oversight Committee on progress thus far in the \$8 million water capital improvements program at an informal meeting Tuesday.

Potter said an Albuquerque engineering firm—Sergent, Hauskins and Beckwith—is currently conducting core tests at the dam site for potential borrow material. At this point, he added, options of a total earthen dam or a cement-treated base dam exist. An earthen dam would be 300 feet thick at the base and 100 feet tall, Potter explain-

ed, while a cement-treated base would have a smaller area. The estimated length at the top of the dam is 1,320 feet.

Aerial photos of the project area were taken some weeks ago, Potter reported. Intrasearch of Englewood, Colorado, is doing geosurveys from the photos for use in location of utilities the raw water transmission line from the diversion point on the Rio Ruidoso to the reservoir must cross; elevations; size of the line; and other engineering requirements.

The diversion point has been changed to

the Martin Road area, it was noted.

Design work on the new water treatment plant to be built near the dam is also in progress in California, Potter added. Actual construction on the project is scheduled to start in April.

Potter also reported that New Mexico State University has expressed an interest in a small hydroelectric project using Grindstone water. Federal funds might be available for such a project, he noted.

The committee set an organizational meeting for 10 a.m. Tuesday, October 5, at village hall.

## Guilty verdict in Camp Sierra Blanca murder trial


Former Camp Sierra Blanca inmate Felix Martinez was found guilty of second degree murder Wednesday in District Court in Carrizozo. Martinez, Richard Lujan and David Sedillo had all been charged with the murder of fellow inmate Scott Wayne Thompson August 2, 1981.

Lujan was acquitted Wednesday and Sedillo had earlier entered a plea bargain with 12th District attorneys, pleading guilty to second-degree murder. He was sentenced to three years in prison.

Prosecutors sought a conviction of first degree murder against Lujan and Mar-

tin, but Assistant District Attorney Bert Atkins said he felt good about the verdict. The two are now in the Penitentiary of New Mexico.

Martinez was tried for the third time in the case. Two earlier trials had ended in mistrials.

# Junge disputes article

In a tape recorded conversation at his home Monday, Ruidoso councilman Al Junge, calling complaints by village employees last week about his alleged disruption of daily village operations a "tempest in a teapot," disputed the article in The News which included the employees' comments.

Junge, who said he questioned village hall employees about their published remarks, invited assistant village manager Frank Potter and this reporter to his house to discuss the matter.

Junge recorded the conversation.

The councilman, who argued that the published quotes of Potter and village clerk Leon Eggleston were taken out of context and were untrue, contended The News intends to denigrate him as a councilman.

Junge said last week's article on the complaints "was not fair" to him. He claimed the article is evidence of this newspaper's intentions to criticize him.

He contended the criticism started with an editorial by News publisher Ken Green, published July 25. He also claimed The News resents that he is opposed to village committees meeting in announced open sessions.

Junge also claimed this newspaper wants "sensationalism" on the front page, and asked why last Thursday's article appeared on an inside page.

Junge said he "searched" village hall for the sources of the complaints after the

comments appeared in the newspaper. Junge asked this reporter how the "investigation" was started.

He said he was puzzled about Eggleston's comments regarding a verbatim transcript of part of a council meeting that Eggleston said Junge requested. Junge said it was his understanding that Mayor George White informed two reporters of the existence of the transcript. He contended if White had not mentioned the item, the newspaper would not have known about it.

Junge explained he asked for the verbatim account because he wondered about comments made by councilman Frank Saylor that appeared in a news article. Junge said he "pondered what was said" by Saylor.

Regarding Eggleston's remark that Junge could have listened to the tape himself, the councilman agreed. But he said that as councilman, he has the right to ask the clerk to perform any reasonable tasks.

Junge said he asked Eggleston whether he (Junge) was disruptive to him or the village. Junge quoted the clerk as saying certainly not.

Junge said he suggested Potter meet with employees to discuss the chain of command at village hall according to a new organizational chart. He said some of the employees were dissatisfied, but it had nothing to do with him.

Potter said last week he told the employees to disregard individual policy making by councilmen because Junge made personal requests that disrupted

village hall.

Monday, the councilman asked Potter if he (Junge) upsets the routine of village administration. Potter indicated that Junge does not.

Concerning a time clock that Potter said was requested by Junge for village hall, Junge said the council agreed to his request that the clock be installed.

Junge said employees below the level of assistant supervisor are required to log their hours on the clock. He said the clock helps to determine areas where additional employees are needed. Junge noted that the clock helps village hall workers who put in more than 40 hours a week control their hours.

Junge took exception to last week's newspaper article that said he insisted on the time clock. When told that was how Potter explained the whereabouts of the clock, Junge said, "That's why they have courthouses."

Junge said the newspaper had no criticism of previous councils because those governing bodies didn't do anything. He contended the present council has done more since March than the previous one did in four years.

He said other council members indicate they are grateful that he is keeping up with village matters. He said he does not place himself above the other members, but that as mayor pro-tem, he is trying to provide a sense of leadership.

He also said the newspaper should be available to help disseminate council "ideas."

## State Treasurer candidate McBroom interviewed

William "Bill" McBroom of Albuquerque, Republican candidate for State Treasurer, said on a campaign swing through Ruidoso recently that declining revenue from natural resource exploitation is a concern to the state.

"We have got to make sure that our present economic base has been expanded to the point that it will take up that slack," said McBroom.

McBroom is currently completing his second term as Bernalillo County treasurer. He explained that the state position is primarily administrative in nature. "To act as banker for the state of New Mexico."

The treasurer is directly accountable for all public funds, he said. This includes investment of idle monies in the general fund and the severance tax permanent fund, which is now roughly \$700 million.

Also, the treasurer sits as a voting member on boards overseeing investment of the personnel and educational retirement funds, and as a member of the State Investment Council, which oversees all state investment practices.

As treasurer of Bernalillo County, McBroom said, he handled collection, distribution and investment of hundreds of millions of dollars. He feels that his experience in that office can help him as

state treasurer.

New procedures and technologies incorporated at the county level can help the state achieve a modern, professional operation that is now lacking in certain areas, he remarked.

McBroom was asked whether he favored a proposal to free state money for low interest mortgage loans which was defeated in the last session of the Legislature.

"I favored the concept in that the construction industry could have used some assistance in the way of additional capital," he said. However, he added, "My overall investment philosophy is that the state of New Mexico should not be in the banking business—it's not the purpose of public funds."

Money should be invested in New Mexico to improve the highway system; attract new industry; improve the educational system; and develop water resources, McBroom said.

He acknowledged that input of the state treasurer into the allocation process is usually not direct, but that the officer can help with projection of revenues.

McBroom also acknowledged that counties are typically hard pressed financially, with the unpopular (because it is regressive) property tax their main revenue source. Allocating a percentage of

gross receipts tax to counties would not be regressive, he noted.

McBroom called the next four years a "critical period of time" for the state. The state is in good shape financially now, he indicated, but must expand its economic base so that its tax base will be expanded with additional revenue from new industries.

## Capitan Wilderness lease agreement reached

Attorneys for the Sierra Club and leaseholders of oil and gas drilling rights in the Capitan Wilderness area say they are close to a compromise settlement of a suit brought by the Sierra Club.

Attorneys for the leaseholders have agreed to abandon claim to 1,300 acres within the Capitan Wilderness in exchange for Sierra Club's dropping its opposition to drilling on 3,363 acres outside the

wilderness area but within the Lincoln National Forest. Terms of the agreement have been agreed upon and both sides are awaiting final forms to sign, said Lynn Slade, attorney for one of the leaseholders.

The leases, which were issued in October 1981, were the first formally approved inside a wilderness area in the United States and triggered a national debate over

development in wilderness areas. The U.S. House of Representatives has since approved a ban on wilderness leasing.

"Basically, our intention was in protecting the wilderness," said Michael Sherwood, the Sierra Club's lead attorney in the case. "Everyone agrees that there's very low potential for oil and gas (in the wilderness area)," he said.

## Rains make roads and trails muddy on Lincoln

General rains on all Districts have caused muddy roads and trails in some parts of the Lincoln National Forest. Fuelwood areas are closed on all except the Guadalupe District until roads dry out. Temperatures are ranging from the low 30's to mid 70's.

Smoky Bear District at Ruidoso reports that Bonito Lake is full and streams are running muddy. Fishing has been light. Cedar Creek Picnic Area will close October 1. All campgrounds on the District are closed for the season, except Three Rivers which is open year round. Hikers are asked to take precautions during

thunderstorms, which are often accompanied with lightning.

On the Cloudfcroft District, only Lower Sleepy Grass Campground is open. Others are closed for the season. Roads and trails are very muddy. Motorists are reminded that resurfacing work on Highway 24 south of Cloudfcroft is in progress. An International Volksmarch and the annual Mile-High Enduro are scheduled for this weekend at Cloudfcroft. October 2-3 are the dates set for the Oktoberfest Arts and Crafts Fair, also at Cloudfcroft. Cavers are beginning to contact the

Guadalupe District at Carlsbad to make reservations for caving trips during the November holidays. Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is open. Trails and roads are open, but District personnel advise motorists to watch for running water in low lying areas, as flash flooding is likely to occur because of rains.

James Canyon Campground on the Mayhill District is receiving light use. Fishing is fair on the Penasco River. Roads are wet and muddy. Construction continues on Highway 504 between Weed and Sacramento.

# Pleasant evening provided by California vintner

The Roman God of Wine, Bacchus, would have been proud of the transformation of the conference center at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Monday evening into a place of celebration to fine wine and food.

Sebastiani Vineyards of northern California's Sonoma Valley alighted at the Inn Monday, and invited several of its fellow wine lovers to join in the affair.

Don Sebastiani, a third-generation winemaker who, with his brother Sam and a brother-in-law are continuing to operate the family-owned winery, graciously hosted a tasting of some Sebastiani

favorites to dedicate an unveiling of a new line of varietals.

The occasion was the introduction to New Mexico of Sebastiani's Country Varietal Wines, a selection of reds and whites that will phase out the well-known Mountain varietals.

Sebastiani invited southern New Mexico restaurateurs and liquor store operators to the tasting.

Sebastiani explained that the winery, which came under his and Sam's proprietorship with the death of their father August two years ago, made a decision to enhance the quality of its product and promote a distinct Sonoma Valley style to deal with fierce competition among California

wineries.

"With the Country Wine we want to make available wines from grapes growing only in the north coastal areas," he said.

The Sebastiani Country wines are billed as premium table wines. The white varietals include Country Chardonnay, French Colombard and Chenin Blanc, and the Country reds are Gamay Rose, Pinot Noir, Zinfandel and Cabernet Sauvignon.

The wines, which are already on the market, symbolize Sebastiani's dedication to quality. Each variety is bottled in a classic 1.5 liter magnum bottle sealed with cork.

The 1980 Country French Colombard is a dry table wine with a fragrant aroma and a tart, light aftertaste. Another Country varietal offered for the delight of Monday's wine tasters was a 1979 Chardonnay.

The Chardonnay, which is California's premier white wine grape and one of America's favorite varietals, is an exquisitely dry wine with a crisp, fruity flavor and smooth texture. As I worked my way along the serving tables, I overheard an enchanted taster comment, "It's beautiful," as he sipped on the Chardonnay.

Balancing the table with the white Country wines were a Country Pinot Noir and a Cabernet Sauvignon. Both the hearty reds upheld the quality of the new line that is well represented by the whites. The Pinot Noir has a woody, fruity character that is a result of its oak barrel aging. The Sauvignon is medium-bodied and has the deep, rich flavor common to the Sauvignon grape.

A selection of Sebastiani vintaged varietals was perhaps the evening's piece de resistance. My favorites were an '81 Pinot Noir Blanc that is dubbed the "Eye of the Swan," and an '81 Sonoma Valley Gewurztraminer Rosa.

The Eye of the Swan is a fascinating white wine that is extracted from black-skinned Pinot Noir grapes. The magical transformation is really an established winemaking process. To create the wine, the clear grape juice, or must, is separated from the skins as soon as the grapes are pressed. Because the skins taint the must only delicately, the resulting wine has a coppery hue.

August Sebastiani named the wine after the Black Australian Swan, a resident of his own aviary. The Eye of the Swan has the light, fruity flavor of a white wine, but has the body and lasting taste of a red wine and can complement white or red meat dishes.

The Gewurztraminer was easily the most consumed wine at the tasting. The Rosa color of the wine is the natural tone of the mature Gewurztraminer grape. The spicy and pronounced fruity taste and fragrant bouquet are the pleasing qualities of the wine.

After we thoroughly treated our palates to divine combinations of wine, bread and cheese, Don Sebastiani expressed his delight in sharing the offerings with the guests.

He described the event as personal and intimate, and he said the same characteristics are a goal of his family in the winery's operation.

The winery, located in Sonoma, was established by Don's grandfather Samuele at the turn of the century. Samuele, who learned winemaking in the Tuscany region of Italy, purchased vineyards that were once worked by padres of the Mission de Sonoma to make altar wines and included them in the estate. He operated the family business until his death in 1944.

Don noted that his grandfather received recognition for his wine at the 1935 Paris Exhibition—evidence of a tradition of quality that was present long before today's much-publicized blind comparison tastings between Californian and European wines.

August Sebastiani inherited the vineyards and his father's winemaking skills. August's many innovations and achievements in winemaking included introducing the first varietal wines in jug packages, and marketing the first Gamay Beaujolais Nouveau in the U.S. The Nouveau is a traditional French wine that is rushed to market only weeks after its vinification.

Don also described the ingredients of a Sebastiani wine. Because 80 percent of the determination of a wine's quality happens in the vineyard, he said the care starts with treatment of the young vines.

"The young grape vines are so vulnerable to the elements that we actually put them under ground, and mound dirt over the vine," he explained as he illustrated the winemaking process with slides.

He said many of the Sebastiani vineyards are planted on hillsides, which give vines the benefit of abundant sunshine and good drainage—two ingredients highly desired in the diet of grape vines. Don noted that adequate drainage forces the roots to work hard to find water. He said a thriving grape vine is one that has to strain, which gives it a hearty root and large leaves that increase the plant's ability to photosynthesize.

He also said the geography and lumpy-clay soil of the Sonoma Valley provide a "tremendous amount of importance to the taste of our wine." He compared the open valley to the Napa Valley, which lies to the east of Sonoma. He noted that since Napa—which he said produces "absolutely exquisite wines"—is closed on the north end, it retains the warmth of the day.

The distinction that separates the two valleys is the fact Sonoma is exposed to the San Francisco Bay in the south and the Pacific Ocean to the north. He said the geography allows vineyards to bathe in

daytime sun which is crucial to the grapes' sugar content, but night and morning fog rolling off the ocean in the summer cools the earth considerably, which he said preserves the character and acidity of the grapes. He said the climate is most evident in the buttery, rich flavor of the Chardonnays.


The vinification is an exacting, technical aspect of the wine's creation. Don noted that his brother Sam, who is president and wine master, is responsible for the creating the end product. Don, who is occupied full time as a California State Legislator, is vice-president of the company.

He said new technology combined with


the time-honored aging process of red wines in oak casks are found in Sebastiani cellars. A recent addition to the winery is a "decanter centrifuge," which enables Sebastiani to clarify grape must to the most precise tones.

The dedication to a continuing tradition of quality is the prevailing theme of the Sebastiani family. As Don put it, his family insists on quality at every step because "you cannot make a silk purse out of a sow's ear."

He concluded the evening by thanking the guests for partaking in the enjoyment of wine and food, which he said "go intimately together in a god given way." It was a truly bacchanal ending.

# GOP women hear speakers discuss roles of First Lady, women in the '80s

Peggy Traver, president of New Mexico Federated Republican Women, and Gayle Irick, wife of GOP gubernatorial candidate John Irick, visited Lincoln County and addressed the regular monthly meeting of Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County in Ruidoso Tuesday.

Introduced by state vice-chairwoman Penta Pool of Hondo, Traver spoke on "Networking and the role of the woman in the '80s." Traver has presented this program to other clubs in the state and has been invited to address the Colorado State Federation at its upcoming state convention.

Irick spoke on the role of the First Lady and how she would fill that role.

"Networking is an active verb used by the media to describe women in positions of power and responsibility," Traver explained.

"The '70's were an era of women moving forward, and the '80's will be an era of women working together with men."

"Men have had the 'Old Boys' Network' for years," she continued. "Now women

must learn to trust and support each other. There is strength in numbers."

To accomplish this, she suggested developing contacts in the neighborhood through community projects and "being honest — help others to be helped yourself."

Gayle Irick sees the role of the First Lady as "hostess to the Governor and to New Mexico" and "representing the women of New Mexico."

First Ladies seem to have their own programs of interest, she noted, and hers would be in the area of Home Health Care. Herself a registered nurse, Irick explained home health care as intermittent care of a sick person in his or her home by a visiting nurse of aide. This keeps the patient out of a hospital or nursing home and cuts costs to the patient or supportive agency.

"I would like to see the program expanded in the rural and smaller communities," she said. She emphasized this would not be a new program but an expansion of an already existing one. She was also highly complimentary of the present home health

care program in Lincoln County.

Following the two women's addresses, a question and answer period followed. Topics included tourism and the importance of voting in November.

In the business meeting preceding the program, members discussed an entry in the Aspen Festival parade October 9. Cathy Annala, Barbara Paxson and Ann Denton are the Parade Committee. They are planning an entry with FRWLC members and GOP candidates.

Fred Collins, the successful GOP primary candidate for State Legislature District 58, also addressed the group and pledged his representation of Lincoln County if elected in November. "I plan to work with your Chamber of Commerce, county manager and all village managers and run a clean, professional campaign," he said.

Volunteers are needed to staff the Ruidoso GOP headquarters located in the Devon Development Building. Anyone interested can go by the headquarters and sign up.

A nominating committee was named to select a slate of officers for the group's November meeting and election.

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

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# Gateway Assembly of God Church offers old-fashioned gospel preaching

"Old-fashioned," "fundamental" and "Pentecostal" are adjectives which surface most frequently when discussing the Gateway Assembly of God Church with its pastor, the Reverend Edwin Rimer.

"We absolutely believe in the authority of the Bible; we believe Jesus Christ is the only hope for the world and for individuals; we believe in His divinity, virgin birth and literal resurrection from the dead; and we absolutely believe in His visible return," Rimer stated.

"Our first priority is reaching people with the gospel; other things are secondary—though not unimportant," the pastor reported.

Rimer has been involved in reaching people with the gospel in various ways since his ordination as an Assembly of God preacher. He was an evangelist at revival services in New Mexico, Kansas and Texas before accepting a job as youth minister at a church in Albuquerque. Rimer then became associate pastor of that church while also being on call as a fill-in preacher.

He then was employed as pastor of a church in Moriarty for one year before returning as associate pastor in Albuquerque. While at this church, Rimer and three other members began singing as a special ministry for the church. This led into an eight-year full-time performing career for the quartet.

The King's Quartet traveled around the country, performing around 1,850 to 2,000 concerts before finally deciding in 1974 to break up. The demands of being on the road an average of 21 days each month were too great, Rimer explained.

The group gave up its recording contract with Calvary Records. Also given up were appearances with performers such as The Oak Ridge Boys—then the number one gospel group in the nation—and Andrae Crouch.

When asked how he feels now about the years spent as bass singer for the King's Quartet, Rimer said "I wouldn't take a million dollars for it."

He cited as a reason the fact that music brings people out who won't attend church to listen to a preacher. It was a rare performance when no audience members were converted to Christianity, Rimer

said. Following the breakup of the group, Rimer returned to the church in Albuquerque as associate pastor again, and spent another two-and-a-half-years. He then spent a year-and-a-half "looking for an area I felt I could be used in." He found Ruidoso and the Gateway Assembly of God Church.

At that time, just under two years ago, the average attendance at church services was 42. An average of 184 attended services at Gateway Assembly of God last month, Rimer reported.

He attributes this growth to "the undiluted, straightforward, uncompromising teaching of the gospel of Christ."

"We don't change to meet the times; we believe the gospel remains steady," Rimer reported. He said their approach to preaching and theology also remains unchanged.

But since attendance has not remained steady, the church is facing the problem of lack of space. Rimer and his family recently leased a house so the parsonage could be converted into Sunday School classrooms and additional offices.

"We're really crowded, but that's a good

problem," the pastor commented.

"We need more space for further growth," Rimer pointed out, although there is no space at the present location for additional building. "We can't build till we get more property," he noted.

He said the church is considering acquiring property and moving the entire facility, but "we are not actively seeking one direction."

"We are definitely open to anything that might come along," Rimer said.

He projected that the church's growth will level off until a new building is available, but will continue "at a good rate" if additional facilities are acquired. Rimer estimated that attendance would reach about 300 within six months after opening a facility with seating capacity for 450.

A stronger outreach program would probably be initiated, Rimer explained, if the church building could accommodate the additional attendance. Another reason that outreach is a problem is the layout of the village, which makes it somewhat difficult to locate homes by the address, the pastor pointed out.

But he said he really likes Ruidoso, and that "the people are very open and friendly."

The church is also very open and believes in freedom of worship during services, the Assembly of God pastor explained.

"If you feel like weeping, weep; if you want to cry out, cry out. I believe most people are strapped and tied into a mold of how to worship," Rimer said. "We don't want to restrain anybody."

Rimer said people in his church are emo-

tional and make no apologies about it.

Rimer was raised in a Baptist church and attended a Baptist college in Springfield, Missouri. He switched to the Assembly of God denomination following "a personal experience with baptism of the Holy Ghost."

He explained that his doctrinal viewpoints changed as he studied in college, which led him to become a Pentecostal. Rimer completed his education through correspondence courses from Assembly of God colleges.

He said he does not encourage the young people of his church to attend Bible college, although he was happy to announce that eight of them chose to enter a Bible college this fall and three more plan to enroll in January. He said he tries to discourage them to do so because "if God is calling them to the ministry, He can do it better than I can."

Rimer said the church has a strong youth program, with a variety of organized groups in which the young people can participate. Christ's Ambassadors (CA's) is a fellowship and ministry organization for the teenage youth. The younger girls can participate in Missionettes, an organization which prepares them for the older Women's Missionary program (WM). The WM program sponsors fund raising projects for Assembly of God missionaries.

Royal Rangers is a Christian Boy Scout group, the members of which are involved in Bible training, camping, church projects and earning merit badges. A youth choir and children's choir also keep the youth of the church busy.

The church also has an active adult choir

and often invites outside musical groups to perform.

"We're a very musically oriented church," the pastor reported. "We love gospel music."

Various soloists, duets, quartets and instrumentalists within the church also often provide special music for church services.

Worship services are held Sunday mornings at 10:30 and evenings at 6 with Sunday School preceding the morning service, at 9:30 a.m. Bible study meetings are held Wednesdays at 7:15 p.m.

Rimer said the church is very open to outside ministries, such as Christian drama groups, youth groups from other churches, young people just starting out in the ministry, and visiting missionaries. Any group or individual that shares the same basically fundamental Christian beliefs is encouraged to participate in the church's services, Rimer explained.

He said he wants Gateway Assembly of God to be "a place for people who hurt spiritually; I want it to be a hospital for sinners."

"We're concerned about people," Rimer noted, "but not from a social standpoint." He explained that their concern for people is from a spiritual standpoint.

"If you get the spiritual right, a lot of problems automatically go away."

Rimer summed up the attitude of the Gateway Assembly of God Church by sharing this little proverb: "If you give a man a fish, you feed him for a day. If you teach him to fish, you feed him for a lifetime."

"We prefer to teach people to fish," Rimer concluded.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 9, ARTICLE 7, SECTION 11(A) OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, TO ADD THERETO PROVISIONS REGULATING THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS IN RESPECT TO FIRE HYDRANTS AND TO REPEAL ANY EXISTING ORDINANCES OR PORTIONS OF ORDINANCES INCONSISTENT THEREWITH, AND FURTHER TO AMEND CHAPTER 9, ARTICLE 7, SECTION 14 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, IN RESPECT TO VARIANCES FROM THE PROVISIONS REGULATING THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS IN RESPECT TO FIRE HYDRANTS AND TO REPEAL ANY EXISTING ORDINANCES OR PORTIONS OF ORDINANCES INCONSISTENT THEREWITH.

existing building is situated within 20 feet of a fire hydrant, then any alteration or enlargement of the building shall be done in such manner as to not lessen the distance between the existing building and the fire hydrant.

Chapter 9, Article 7, Section 14 of the Municipal Code of Ruidoso is hereby amended to read as follows:

VARIANCES  
Variances from the strict application of an area, height, setback or location of building in relation to fire hydrant requirements of this ordinance may be permitted in cases of exceptionally irregular, narrow, shallow or steep lots, or other exceptional physical conditions, where the strict application of the requirements of this ordinance would result in impractical difficulty or unnecessary hardship that would deprive the owner of the reasonable use of his land or building, but in no case shall impractical difficulty or unnecessary hardship be found when financial gain or loss or monetary savings is the basis for the claim of hardship. (Remainder of 9-7-14 to remain unchanged.)

All ordinances or portions of ordinances inconsistent with the above provisions are hereby repealed.

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

# Timber inventory is the root of forest programs

Multiple use planning of the national forests is the key to management practices of the U.S. Forest Service (USFS), and the foundation upon which multiple use programs are built is constructed with a series of inventories.

A timber management inventory is the basis of the process that helps foresters diagnose forest needs, establish priority of management areas and prescribe uses for the national forests.

Mike Funston, a timber specialist with the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest, spends up to a third of his time supervising timber inventories.

"In order for us to plan management of the forest, we have to inventory it," Funston explained.

A timber inventory is done once every 10 years in specific areas. It begins with an aerial survey of the district. From the aerial photographs, Funston recognizes specific vegetation patterns and delineates on a transparent overlay the homogeneous stands of timber. The stands are contained in compartments of the district that are designated on a large scale map.

After he outlines the stands on the overlay, Funston further stratifies the sections into equidistant points that designate the location of the survey plots. He said the size and relationship of the plots to each other depends on the density of vegetation in the area.

"The fixed plots could be as large as one-fifth of an acre, or as small as one-five-hundredth," the forester noted. "It depends on the density."

In the forest, Smokey Bear employees use the aerial photos and the overlay map to find the plots—some of which are in rugged areas. Once on the site, foresters stake the plot and select the trees for the survey.

Funston said the study encompasses everything necessary to wildland management. Foresters are assigned to catalog tree species, measure the height and diameter of trees, determine the age and growth patterns of vegetation, and collect data on diseases and damage in the site.

Funston compiles the survey results in his office and feeds the information into a computer. The printouts provide him a statistical basis for forest management planning.

The inventory is used in conjunction with public seminars, opinion surveys and other studies to design planning for the forest. The information for the first step in a forester's planning strategy—to diagnose needs of the stand—is supplied by the field tests.

The next procedure is determining the priority of a site. The Forest Service attaches the highest priority to timber stands with a high potential for productivity.

"We want to invest more in sites that have high quality," Funston said.

Funston explained that sites showing stagnate tree growth or damage by disease and pests are usually classified as high priority. Fire, weather and animal damage also can contribute to placing the trees at the top of the list.

Once the priority of the stand is categorized, the USFS uses the data to prescribe management for the site. Sometimes the prescription is to leave the stand alone, but management can range from thinning a site and selling the timber as firewood, to a clear cut of an area to enhance growth of a tree species or create

an area for recreation.

But clear cutting timber in the Smokey Bear District is a rarity, Funston explained. The procedure—removing all the trees from a section of land—has been done locally only at the Sierra Blanca ski area for expansion of the trails.

Funston indicated that clear cutting is a sensitive topic because of the timber industry's reputation of denuding entire mountainsides in the Pacific Northwest. But he emphasizes that, from a USFS forester's viewpoint, cutting a patch in the forest canopy, which is sometimes called salvage cutting, can enhance a tree species or rid an area of diseased timber.

Funston noted that most of the timber cutting here is done to thin the forest, which helps reduce fire danger.

Recreation dominates forest use in the Smokey Bear District, Funston said, but he noted that commercial timber harvesting has gained ground.

The district comprises 360,000 acres of the 1.1 million acre Lincoln National Forest. Of that amount, commercial forest land—or land that primarily consists of ponderosa pine and Douglas-fir, which are suitable for saw timber—constitutes about 55,000 acres. Woodlands—piñon-juniper and oak—make up about 200,000 acres.

Funston explained that the Forest Service has assigned a goal of six million board feet of timber to be harvested from the Lincoln National Forest this year. He said Smokey Bear's share is 1.4 million board feet.

A small portion of the commercial harvest was supplied from this summer's expansion of the ski area. Funston added that planned widening of the road to Mon Jean Lookout will produce another timber sale.

Until recently, the bulk of timber management was directed to commercial tree species because they are the most desirable for lumber products. But in the past three years, Funston noted, the Smokey Bear District has initiated an innovative program focusing more attention on surrounding woodlands, and has applied the same precise inventory procedures for ponderosa pine and Douglas-fir sites to the woodlands.

Funston mentioned that woodlands have been the traditional source of firewood in the Lincoln National Forest, and with in-

creasing demand for firewood as heating fuel, the USFS must intensify its management of these areas.

"It's actually more productive to harvest commercial forest land for fuelwood," he said. "It grows three to five times the volume per acre per year as woodland."

Funston noted piñon and juniper trees take up to 200 years to grow large enough to be suitable for fuelwood, and therefore, wood heating is not the best economical use of woodlands.

He said the piñon-juniper and oak woodlands are best suited for Christmas

tree and pine nut harvesting, fence posts, wildlife habitats (especially for mule deer), picnicking and camping and livestock grazing.

The use is designated after foresters—or wildland managers, a term Funston prefers for USFS foresters—complete the three-prong approach to planning that begins with a timber inventory. And it is all designed to provide the greatest good to the greatest number of people.

He explained that a wildland manager blends all the knowledge "to enhance the productivity of the environment and make it compatible with human needs."

The measuring device takes readings in cosine decimals and allows users to quickly determine the angle of a slope or height of a tree. The tool is one of several instruments—costing hundreds of dollars—that timber inventory crews carry into the forest.

of the same cloth as his New England forefathers.







## John Payne is Sunland stall man

Depending on your mathematics, John Payne is either batting one thousand or zero.

"This is the first official job I've ever had. In fact, it was the first job I ever applied for and I got it," said the new stall superintendent at Sunland Park. "I guess you could say I was batting one thousand or zero."

Payne is in his first month as stall superintendent after a lifetime of following horses in some capacity.

Although the Sunland Park 85-day horse race meet doesn't start until October 15, there are about 220 runners and 13 ponies stabled at Sunland Park. Payne said a large group of horses would start arriving at the west El Paso track this week (September 20-26) when the New Mexico State Fair meeting enters its final week.

"We'll have a large influx of horses here with trailers backed up for four blocks after the Fair ends on September 28," Payne said.

Payne said he originally applied for the racing secretary's position this summer when it became available during the Ruidoso Downs meeting. At that time, he told Ruidoso-Sunland officials he would only consider the stall superintendent's post or secretary's job.

Then, he was called in for an interview during the Labor Day weekend and was told the job was his.

"The way I understand it, the stall superintendent has the responsibility of seeing that the right trainer has his right stalls. Later on, when we have big futurities and derbies, there will be a large influx of horses and I'll work closely with the racing secretary (Dean McKinney) to make sure all these people have stalls for their horses," he said.

"I'll work with the racing secretary and the trainers trying to accommodate everyone. We want to keep all the trainers' horses close together since it's much easier for the trainers if the horses are together," he said.

There are slightly more than 1,800

assigned stalls at Sunland Park for runners and slightly more than 160 pony pens.

"I want to know what kind of horses are in the pony pens and who has them," Payne said.

The 46-year-old track official was born and raised in Perryton in the northern Texas Panhandle area near the Oklahoma border.

He started his race track work in 1954 as a groom at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas. In 1955, he trained horses throughout New Mexico.

"I then took a short vacation and spent 20 years in the United States Navy and retired," he said. "My greatest delight was being stationed overseas at a place where they had horse races. I attended the races in Japan, the Philippines, Hong Kong and other places, so I never really lost touch with it."

He left the service in 1976 and trained horses primarily for his wife at La Mesa Park in Raton, and the Downs at Santa Fe. Now, however, he's working for Sunland Park with one goal in mind.

"I'm going to attempt to work with the racing secretary and the horsemen for the betterment of racing in New Mexico. That's the only reason I took this job. I would like to see New Mexico horse racing as good as any place in the country, or for that matter, in the world," Payne said.

## "Agony of De-feet" out



Dr. Burton S. Schuler, a podiatrist with offices in Roswell, Alamogordo and Las Cruces, has written a book titled "The Agony of De-feet."

The book, published by the Las Luz Press, deals with the problems people with foot pain have and why they do NOT have to go through crippling surgery or be hospitalized to help their problems.

The doctor explains what to do with corns, calluses, bunions, heel spurs and other foot problems.

Schuler explains how foot patients can have operations for a much cheaper price in a podiatrist's office than in the hospital. Some operations at the hospital can cost between \$1,500 and \$2,000 while the operation in the doctor's office may cost as little as \$700.

He also says that people with specific health problems, such as diabetes and overweight people, must pay special care to their feet.

Schuler also explains the actual practice of podiatry and how it deals exclusively with foot problems.

The doctor is the founder of the Amulatory Foot Clinics. He has written several articles for magazines and has performed thousands of foot surgeries in his offices during his career. He has also appeared on television and radio on numerous occasions concerning foot care.

### Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Hank Pohlmann wants to take over the Indians.

He's the Farmington geologist who ran briefly for the Republican nomination to the governor's job, and he keeps mailing Senator Pete Domenici petitions about the state annexing Indian reservations.

So far he's generated about 2,500 signatures on a form which says "the taxpayers of New Mexico believe Indian reservations should be annexed by the state where presently located and be taxed, represented and treated in the same fashion as all other citizens of the United States of America."

The petitions may have some sociological interest as revealing the attitudes of some citizens who live near Indian reservations, but they are not likely to accomplish much.

The nation's record on abrogating treaties with Indian tribes is already spotty enough without suggestions that we mar it further.

Sometimes people campaigning against one another turn out to be almost too friendly, as some say the Silver City Twins, Jeff Bingaman and Jack Schmitt, often are.

Other times, campaigners clearly don't like each other. That would appear to be the case as between Marjorie Bell Chambers and Bill Richardson, contestants for New Mexico's new third Congressional seat.

Photos shot when they were addressing the Albuquerque Press Club show Richardson looking morose and slightly dyspeptic as Chambers talks, and Chambers in prayer, apparently for patience, while Richardson does so.

Exacerbating the bad feeling between the two is the call Chambers made on former candidate Tom Udall, who ran against Richardson in the primary. Chambers is trying to give the impression Udall provided her with much ammunition to use against Bill; while Udall, who would

like to run for office again as a Democrat, is trying to play down any help he may have given the Republican candidate.

If the new governor is smart, he'll quit holding breakfast meetings.

That, at least, is the advice of some of the old-timers up here, who find such meetings on the chief executive's schedule often make them edgy.

They're not opposed to friendly gatherings over the coffee and crullers.

What makes them nervous is that a breakfast meeting at the Governor's Residence or the Inn at Loretto which has as its guestlist the very people who are meeting later in the day in the Governor's Conference Room could be a violation of the Open Meetings Law.

To put that very simply, they think if the Investment Council meets with the governor privately at 7:00 a.m. and then holds a public meeting at 9:00, all the decisions may well have been made in private and the later gathering may be only an empty charade.

Example: When the Board of Finance was choosing architects for that big prison-construction job, one of the largest the state has entered into, the discussion at the formal meeting took less than three minutes. It was obvious that we were getting a little play-acting, along the lines of "you make the motion, Joe, and you, Charley, second it; and here's the way the vote will go..."

Some of us think that's not the way government is supposed to operate. We'd like to hear the arguments pro and con, especially in the sensitive areas controlled by the Investment Council and the Board of Finance, two of the major groups with whom the governor usually meets privately.

(A more devious person suggests that if the governor insists on such meetings, his staff should at least be careful not to list them on his official schedule, which is available to everyone.)

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### Sense & Nonsense

Pacemakers for the heart are a boon to many people suffering from heart trouble, but they may have turned into a boondoggle in the federal government's Medicare program.

Medicare pays for 80 to 90 percent of all pacemaker procedures in this country, from implantation to followup and monitoring. A recent investigation by the Senate Special Committee on Aging, of which I'm a member, uncovered disturbing facts which show the American taxpayer is being forced to pay for wasteful and unnecessary equipment and services.

Since Medicare reimburses for the "reasonable cost" of services, there is no reason for medical institutions to use cost-saving measures.

Pacemakers are just one small part of the Medicare program. Many areas of equipment and services provided by medical institutions have risen dramatically with no efforts to cut these costs to the patients. Costs have thus risen not just in Medicare, but in private health plans as well.

From 1976 to 1981 the Medicare program grew from \$17.8 billion to \$42.5 billion, an average of 13 percent a year.

There may be some changes in the short term which will reduce the cost of Medicare and in the long term, may lead to our medical institutions finding ways to effect cost savings in Medicare. That would obviously mean lower health costs to all.

The recently passed Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 has three major areas of Medicare reform. First, Medicare will pay no more than the average cost of particular equipment and services. In the past, if the cost was high,

the reimbursement was also high. Now, only the average and below-average costs will be fully reimbursed.

Second, there will be a limit on the annual per-case growth of reimbursement to hospitals. It will be better than the past system of allowing reimbursements to rise exactly as hospital costs rise, with no incentives for savings.

Third, and probably most exciting, is the portion of the bill which instructs the secretary of Health and Human Services to develop a better reimbursement system as a means of saving money in Medicare.

This provision would pay a hospital a set price for providing certain equipment or services. If it costs more, the institution would absorb the expense. If less, they would be allowed to keep the extra money they saved.

This is the best means to reward those hospital administrators who are making a sincere effort to hold costs down and discourage those who would cheat and defraud the Medicare system. Furthermore, the savings would be passed on, not just to Medicare patients, but to all patients.

A prospective reimbursement system could have prevented many of the abuses we are now discovering in the Medicare pacemaker program. Without the blank check of cost-based reimbursement, the manufacturers would have become more competitive and provided their equipment at a lower cost.

The Medicare pacemaker program is just a symptom of the poor fiscal health of the overall Medicare program. It is now up to the Congress and federal government to effect the cure.

### Editorial

Maybe those one hundred or one thousand or however many Palestinians were massacred last week in Beirut are better off than they were.

After all, what kind of life is it to be a stateless person—never knowing any other existence than a refugee camp?

Of course, Israel seems to have found a ceaseless state of war to be a workable existence.

For a long time, Israel justified its militarism by saying it was necessary to the very existence of the state. But recent Israeli actions indicate a total disregard for the sovereignty of other nations.

The slaughter in Beirut reportedly took place at the hands of rightist Lebanese Christian militiamen. But since its forces occupy the city, Israel must be held accountable.

The response of the United States to last week's atrocity was, as usual, limited to appropriate adjectives uttered by President Reagan. He announced that he was "horrified," and indicated he believed Israel's thrust into west Beirut "would prevent the kind of tragedy which has now occurred."

What the president needs to realize is that this country's support of the government of Menachem Begin has reached a point of diminishing return. Begin has clearly shown that he cares nothing for world opinion when it conflicts with his aims.

If support from the U.S. can continue to be taken for granted by Begin, who knows what his next move will be?—TP

### Reporter's Round

After 20 hours of driving across the deserts of California, Arizona and New Mexico, I was beginning to get a little worried when the countryside outside of Alamogordo was still mighty sandy and covered only with bushes a few feet high. Standing in my bedroom in Palo Alto less than a week before, looking at Ruidoso on my Rand-McNally Road Atlas, I had accepted Tim Palmer's job offer partly because there was all that green stuff on the map surrounding Ruidoso. Tim had said I could ski and fish here. But I had had more in mind than skiing down the dunes of White Sands while keeping an eye open over my shoulder for any missiles that might be screaming towards me.

Then out of Tularosa I started to climb. Trees started popping out of the ground. There was a green meadow and a stream! I fought the urge to jump out of the car and look for those sly trout. I knew must be lurking in those shiny pools and kept the pedal to the metal so I could see just what kind of town I was going to live in for the next stretch of time.

A few miles down the road I realized that I had arrived in a small gem of a place in the middle of the dry Western deserts. But I was a little confused. The countryside was certainly beautiful but where was the center of town? What was City Hall doing out here in the middle of a field next to the airport?

Later I headed for the newspaper and the job I had accepted over 1,600 miles of telephone wire. I was received with warm smiles, firm handshakes and assignments for the weekend.

It is hard to explain the difference I notice between the people of Ruidoso and those of Palo Alto. But somehow when I meet a person here I feel I am looking deeper into their eyes than in Palo Alto where the smile often seems only a reflection and a mask for what is really going on in their minds.

It would be unfair, however, to group all the people of Ruidoso together and describe them as one just as it would be with Palo Altans.

My first assignment with the paper was to write a series of articles about the Aspen Festival. I have been to more meetings than I can count. They have all been interesting, for the crash course in the affairs of this community as well as an insight into many of its different facets.

Each group has a different personality. The Ruidoso Business Association (organizers of the motorcycle festival) are very different from the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and the Mule Skinners.

The Ruidoso Business Association met in Nancy Radziewicz' kitchen over iced tea and beer. The room was filled with jokes and loud laughter. There was so much enthusiasm that members had to fight for the floor so they could make their point. Although I didn't see them I had the distinct feeling that everybody had motorcycles between their legs and were talking over the roar of the engines.

In spite of the difficulties of organizing the event on their own for the first time, these people were going to bull their way through and produce a successful event. And they were going to have fun during the festival.

On the other hand, the directors of the Chamber of Commerce met in a conference room over a long table at the Chamber. Agendas, financial reports and tablets of clean paper were arranged in front of each seat. The meeting was brought to order with the rap of a gavel and members delivered their reports as called upon.

The tone was quieter and the jokes milder. These people were used to dealing with the public. There was much talk of the community, money coming into it and the success of the whole Aspen Festival. It was a group of successful, moving business people.

The Mule Skinners met at the library. They smoked cigarettes and drank coffee for quite a while before settling down to business. Cowboy hats, boots and jeans were standard attire. They talked slowly and with accents thicker than most around here.

I felt more relaxed at their meeting than most of the others. But once they settled down to business I was impressed with their efficiency and at the same time courtesy to all members.

Quite a different affair were the meetings of the contestants for the Aspen Festival Queen. The giggles, pretty young faces and breathless enthusiasm were reminiscent of my own high school days. It seemed very familiar except for the young lady who told me she drove her father's backhoe for a summer job.

All these people were different. But throughout these first 11 days I have encountered sincere friendliness and great enthusiasm from all.

I am told this is one of the quietest periods of the year but am repeatedly struck by how busy everyone seems to be. So much of that energy is going into the Aspen Festival and I look forward to it eagerly.

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## LEGAL NOTICE

### VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION ACT OF 1973

The Ruidoso Board of Education guarantees equal educational rights for all students identified as handicapped students residing within this district, and to protect the rights of handicapped individuals regarding equal employment opportunity as is projected in Section 504 of the U. S. Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

a. The Ruidoso Municipal Schools administrative staff has not and will not knowingly discriminate against any qualified handicapped prospective employee solely on the basis of a physical and/or mental handicap.

b. No qualified handicapped student has been or will be denied access to a proper education setting, provided he/she meets entrance requirements established by both state and federal laws.

c. Existing facilities are readily accessible to handicapped persons, or can readily be adapted if the need becomes known. New buildings conform with state building codes re accessibility. Any planned alteration for existing buildings will provide for accessibility for handicapped persons.

d. An on-going outreach program is conducted in an effort to identify and locate any qualified handicapped individual who is not of school age. Local community service groups are given verbal presentations of services available for the school age handicapped as well as regional and state service availability.

e. General. A recipient that operates a public elementary or secondary education program shall provide a free appropriate public education to each qualified handicapped person who is in the recipient's jurisdiction.

f. Appropriate education. (1) For the purpose of this subpart, the provision of an appropriate education is the provision of regular or special education and related aids and services that (i) are designed to meet individual educational needs of handicapped persons as adequately as the needs of non-handicapped persons are met and (ii) are based upon the individual's needs.

g. Implementation of an individualized education program developed in accordance with the Education of All Handicapped Act is one means of meeting the standard established in paragraph (b) of this section.

h. A recipient may place a handicapped person in or refer such person to a program other than the one that it operates as its means of carrying out the requirements of this subpart, if so the recipient remains responsible for ensuring that the requirements of this subpart are met with respect to any handicapped person so placed or referred.

i. Free Education. (1) General. For the purpose of this section, the provision of a free education is the provision of educational and related services without cost to the handicapped person or to his or her parents or guardian, except for those fees that are imposed on non-handicapped persons or guardians if they must pay for services provided to a handicapped person.

j. Transportation. If a recipient places a handicapped person in or refers such person to a program not operated by the recipient as its means of carrying out the requirements of this subpart, the recipient shall ensure that adequate transportation to and from the program is provided at no greater cost than would be incurred by the person or his or her parents or guardian if the person were placed in the program operated by the recipient.

k. Residential placement. If placement in a public or private residential program is necessary to provide a free appropriate public education to a handicapped person because of his or her physical condition, including including nonmedical care and room and board, shall be provided at no cost to the person or his or her parents or guardian.

l. Placement of handicapped persons by parents. If a recipient has made available, in conformance with the requirements of this section and 34.24, a free appropriate public education to a handicapped person and the person's parents or guardian choose to place the person in a private school, the recipient is not required to pay for the person's education in the private school.

m. Disagreements between a parent or guardian and a recipient regarding whether the recipient has made such a program available or otherwise regarding the question of financial responsibility are subject to the due process procedures of 34.36.

n. Compliance. A recipient may not exclude any qualified handicapped person from a public elementary or secondary education after the effective date of this regulation in full compliance with the other requirements of the preceding paragraphs of this section shall meet such requirements at the earliest practicable time and in no event later than September 1, 1978.

o. Academic setting. A recipient in which this subpart applies shall educate, or shall provide for the education of each qualified handicapped person in the least restrictive environment appropriate to the maximum extent appropriate to the needs of the handicapped person.

p. A recipient shall place a handicapped person in the regular educational environment operated by the recipient unless it is determined that the recipient that the education of the person in the regular environment with the use of supplementary aids and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily. Whenever a recipient places a person in proximity of the alternate setting to the person's home.

q. Nonacademic settings. In providing or arranging for the provision of nonacademic and extracurricular services and activities, including meals, recess periods and the services and activities set forth in 34.27, (a) (3), a recipient shall ensure that handicapped persons participate with non handicapped persons in such activities and services to the maximum and extent appropriate to the needs of the handicapped person.

r. Comparable facilities. If a recipient, in compliance with paragraph (a) of this section, operates a facility that is identifiable as being for handicapped persons, the recipient shall ensure that the facilities and the services and activities provided therein are comparable to the other facilities, services, and activities of the recipient.

s. Evaluation and placement. A recipient that operates a public elementary or secondary education program shall conduct an evaluation in accordance with the requirements of paragraph (b) of this section of any person who, because of handicap, needs or is believed to need special education or related services before taking any action with respect to the individual. The evaluation shall be in a regular or special education program and any subsequent significant change in placement.

t. Evaluation procedures. A recipient to which this subpart applies shall ensure that the evaluation and placement of persons who, because of handicap, need or are believed to need special education or related services which ensure that: (1) Tests and other evaluation materials include those tailored to measure, assess or evaluate the strengths and not merely those which are designed to provide a single general intelligence quotient; and (2) Tests are selected and administered so as best to ensure that, when a test is administered to a student with impaired sensory, manual or speaking skills (except when results accurately reflect the student's aptitude or achievement level or whatever other factor the test purports to measure, rather than reflecting the student's impaired sensory, manual or speaking skills (except when results accurately reflect the student's aptitude or achievement level or whatever other factor the test purports to measure).

u. Placement procedures. In interpreting evaluation data and in making placement decisions, a recipient shall (1) Draw upon information from a variety of sources, including aptitude and achievement tests, teacher recommendations, physical conditions, social or cultural background, and adaptive behavior.

v. Establishment of procedures to ensure that information obtained from all such sources is documented and carefully considered.

w. Ensure that the placement decision is made by a group of persons, including persons knowledgeable about the child, the meaning of the evaluation data, and the placement options.

x. Reevaluation. A recipient to which this section applies shall establish procedures, in accordance with paragraph (b) of this section for periodic reevaluation of students who have been provided special education and related services. A reevaluation procedure consistent with the Education for the Handicapped Act is one means of meeting this requirement.

y. Recipient that operates a public elementary or secondary education program shall establish and implement, with respect to actions regarding the identification, evaluation, or educational placement of a handicapped person, a system of procedural safeguards that includes notice, an opportunity for the parents or guardian of the person to examine relevant records, an impartial hearing with opportunity for participation by the person's parents and a review procedure. Consistent with the procedural safeguards of section 504 of the Education of the Handicapped Act is one means of meeting this requirement.

z. Nonacademic services. A recipient that operates a public elementary or secondary education program shall provide nonacademic and extracurricular services and activities in such a manner as is necessary to afford handicapped students an equal opportunity for participation in such services and activities.

aa. Nonacademic and extracurricular services and activities may include counseling services, physical recreational activities, transportation, health services, recreational activities, special interest groups or clubs sponsored by the recipient, referrals to agencies which provide assistance to handicapped persons, and employment of students, including both employment by the recipient and assistance in making available outside employment.

bb. Counseling services. A recipient to which this subpart applies that provides personal academic or vocational counseling, guidance, or placement services to its students shall provide these services without discrimination on the basis of handicap. The recipient shall ensure that qualified handicapped students are not counseled toward more restrictive career objectives than are non-handicapped students with similar interests and abilities.

cc. Physical education and athletics. (1) In providing physical education courses and athletics and similar programs and activities to any of its students, a recipient to which this subpart applies may not discriminate on the basis of handicap. A recipient that offers physical education courses or that operates or sponsors intercollegiate, club, or intramural athletics shall provide to qualified handicapped students an equal opportunity for participation in such activities.

dd. A recipient may refer to handicapped students physical education and athletic activities that are separate or different from those offered to nonhandicapped students only if separation or differentiation is consistent with the requirements of 34.24 and only if no qualified handicapped student is denied the opportunity to compete for teams or to participate in courses that are not separate or different.

## Long-range financial plan wise

If you have young children and are caught up in the expenses of setting up a household, college costs and your retirement may not seem to be an immediate problem. Without long range planning, however, your future financial worries could multiply. If you can't save for both items simultaneously, says the New Mexico Society of Certified Public Accountants (CPAs), investigate savings methods that can generate savings for education and can then be used to plan for retirement.

Of parents who expect their children to attend college, 36 percent have no savings plan to meet college expenses. Of the other 64 percent, many have no formal plan and simply hope their savings will be enough. College costs may double by the time 1982 babies enroll. And, with federal aid possibly being reduced, the money you put aside might not be enough.

CPAs suggest you investigate several savings plans before deciding which will best serve your needs. Ideally, your plan will allow you to save the most and pay the least tax. One way to do this is to transfer the assets or cash to your children who pay tax on interest and earnings at a lower rate, if at all.

As a parent, you can make interest-free demand loans to your child who, through a trustee, invests the money. All dividends and interest are payable to your child and the first \$1,000 of unearned income is tax-free, plus whatever exclusion applies. And, CPAs note, if you need to borrow the money to loan your child, deduct the interest cost.

In order to qualify as an interest-free

loan, the loan must have no maturity date and must be payable on demand. CPAs warn that the IRS has challenged the deductions for these loans, but has not yet had much success.

Another, more formal means, to transfer assets to your children is through a Clifford trust. Instead of loaning money to your child, set up a trust fund for cash or income-producing assets, such as stocks and bonds. The dividends and interest, again, are charged to the beneficiary and you avoid paying taxes at your bracket. Although the new, lower tax rates might reduce your tax liability anyway, Clifford trusts can still be beneficial.

For example, say you put \$10,000 in a Clifford trust and the cash is invested to yield ten percent compounded annually. After the ten years, parents in the 40 percent bracket would have only \$7,900 interest income after taxes. The child, on the other hand, would have about twice that if he or she had no other income.

The assets must remain in the trust for ten years and one day minimum, although the trustee can transfer assets among investments. So, if you intend to use a trust to pay for college, you'll want to arrange the trust by the time the child is eight or nine. And, because of the administrative and legal work involved, CPAs suggest you start the trust with an appropriate amount of money, such as \$10,000.

Another hitch is that income received from the trust can't be used to pay expenses like food, clothing, shelter or education that you're obligated to provide. (While most states require parents to pro-

vide education only through high school, in some cases higher education may be viewed as an obligation.) After the trust is dissolved, however, the assets return to you. And, if the original \$10,000 investment has appreciated, your capital will be larger.

Once you regain your capital, you can use it in either of two ways. You can, for instance, add some of the initial \$10,000 to the interest income of your son or daughter and help him or her pay for college. Or, you can put the entire amount aside for your own needs.

For example, let's say you set up a trust or make an interest-free loan to your child. When the money reverts, you use \$6,000 of the \$10,000 to help your child pay for college. The other \$4,000 is put aside for your retirement.

The IRS limits your deduction on contributions to an Individual Retirement Account up to \$2,000, however, so the entire amount cannot be immediately placed in the fund, without paying an excess payment tax. If you elect to retain the entire \$10,000 capital once the holdings of the trust revert to you, you will have to invest some of it in tax-exempt investments or pay tax on any income it earns above your exclusion.

CPAs estimate that you need between 60 and 70 percent of your last year's income to maintain your standard of living in retirement, however, so this savings shouldn't be put off until the last minute. Any additional savings you can afford while still paying for education costs should be earmarked for retirement.
