

# Meet new staffers at White Mountain Mid School

White Mountain Middle School has a new principal this year in addition to two new teachers.

Texie Cole replaced Sid Miller as principal when he became administrative assistant in the superintendent's office. This is Cole's first administrative job, but she is certainly not new to the Ruidoso school system, having taught elementary school here for 14 years.

She also has several years experience teaching in Texas—at the third grade level in Fort Worth and as seventh grade history and social studies instructor in Richland Springs. Cole also was responsible for beginning one of the pilot Head Start kindergarten projects there.

She has a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, a master's in teaching from New Mexico State University and administrative certification from Eastern New Mexico University.

Cole outlined three areas that she intends to emphasize as principal of White Mountain Middle School: involvement in the evaluation and development of curriculum; maintaining close interaction with students; and working closely with parents.

"Curriculum is very vital," Cole said. It needs to be reevaluated to determine what changes may need to be made, she indicated. She noted that teachers will be responsible for choosing their own curriculum, because "they're the ones who are the experts."

"I will be very much involved in curriculum because I like it—I consider it one of my specialties," the principal explained.

Cole said she intends to keep an open door policy for students in an effort to maintain close interaction with them. She also has begun inviting students to her office for conferences as a way to keep in touch with them on an individual basis.

Cole also hopes to strengthen parent involvement in the school and held an open house for parents during the first week of school to introduce them to the idea. She hopes to establish a community support council which would keep parents informed about and involved in their children's education.

Resource people from the community would be involved—through the council—in giving programs at the school and interacting with students in other ways.

Cole said she has received a lot of support from parents and faculty members for such a community support council.

She explained that "students need to be very closely tied to home as long as they can," but that usually parents begin to feel their children drifting away during the middle school years. Her plan is to help strengthen the link between home and school during these years by keeping parents involved in what is going on.

Cole said she has not needed to make any changes in the running of the school since taking over as principal, as "it was a good situation when I came in and I want to continue with that."

Her goal is "to try to keep a smooth running school so the teachers can have smooth running classes," she reported.

The principal said her expectations for the students and teachers are high. "Basic skills are what school is all about and what learning is all about; they're our purpose and reason for being here," she explained.

"I expect a lot out of the teachers and students. I feel education should be very positive and that people in general will only do as much as expected of them."

Cole indicated that she considers herself lucky to be employed by the Ruidoso school system. "I consider it the best school system in the state of New Mexico. I think more people are concerned with quality education than in any other school system I've been in," she concluded.

The two other new staff members at

White Mountain Middle School seem to share Cole's feelings about the Ruidoso school system.

Rebecca Radcliffe is teaching home economics to sixth, seventh and eighth graders in Ruidoso after having taught the same subject at Hondo for five years.

She also spent one year teaching seventh and eighth grade earth science in Dallas, Texas.

Radcliffe earned a bachelor's degree in home economics education from Baylor University in Waco, Texas, and has completed half of her master's degree coursework in child development and foods and nutrition at Texas Women's

University in Denton, Texas.

Radcliffe, who has lived in Ruidoso since 1977, said she always wanted to teach in the Ruidoso school system. "I always heard it was an outstanding school system, and it is," she commented.

As home economics instructor—the first at White Mountain Middle School—Radcliffe is teaching courses in consumer education, career planning, clothing and textiles, foods and nutrition, family relationships and personal grooming. The curriculum is pre-vocational, to prepare students for further study during high school, she explained.

Radcliffe is also sponsor for the cheerleaders and is establishing a home ec club at the school. Plans for the club are to work on service projects for the community, conduct money raising projects and put together a cookbook.

The new home economics teacher said she has really enjoyed working at White Mountain Middle School thus far. "I think the kids are just wonderful," she added.

Shannon Brown also transferred from the Hondo Schools this year, to teach sixth grade language arts at the middle school here. She instructed special education and gifted students at Hondo for one year and previously taught elementary age classes in Carlsbad for four years.

She has a bachelor's degree in elementary education and music from New Mexico State University and a master's in special education and gifted students from Eastern New Mexico University.

As language arts instructor, Brown teaches reading, spelling and creative writing to 90 sixth graders. She said her emphasis is on creative writing because

"there seems to be such a void in kids being able to write as they get older."

"I'm trying to teach them to write without hesitation," Brown said she is also including a section of study on poetry and would like to do some work with dramatics and possibly start a readers theater.

"I feel education should be for the kids," she said. "They should be the focal point. I want to give them the right to be themselves and learn a little in the process."

Brown lives in Lincoln and said she, also, feels the Ruidoso school system is "one of the best systems I've ever worked in."

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### It's motorcycle time!

With the First Annual Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival fast approaching, Ed Jungbluth, Chamber of Commerce executive director, called a meeting Thursday afternoon to make sure all preparations are moving smoothly and offer any last minute help if needed.

Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) members Buster and Lawrence Hill reported that everything was moving right on schedule for the September 29-October 2 event.

"We came out smelling like a rose," said Lawrence Hill about an earlier problem of finding enough tables for the event. The Chaparral Convention Center had an unexpected supply of tables for vendors' booths at the Trade Show in that building.

Tommy Morel, director of sales and marketing at the Inn of The Mountain Gods, told the Hills that he saw no reason why the Inn could not help with chairs still needed for the festival.

Lawrence Hill reported that he would need help setting up the 40-foot by 100-foot hospitality tent next to the Holiday Inn, which is festival headquarters.

Preregistration for the festival stands at 500, it was reported, but the Hills expect most of the participants to sign up the first two days of the festival.

Lawrence Hill said he had talked to a vendor at a motorcycle festival in Steamboat Springs, Colorado. The vendor reported that everybody he talked to said they were coming to Ruidoso this

weekend. The vendor advised getting ready for 2,500 to 3,000 people.

Buster Hill reported that RBA has over \$2,000 worth of contingency gifts and will be holding drawings every 15 minutes throughout the festival. They also plan to give away two fully accessorized Honda 450 motorcycles, a \$2,500 gift certificate from Custom Dressers of Oklahoma City and a \$300 light bar.

Morel and Jungbluth also delivered progress reports for the Celebrity Pro Am Golf Tournament, the Chili Cookoff and Tractor Pull.

The fate of the Tractor Pull is in doubt, Jungbluth said. Organizers of the event refused to stage the pull at the old drive-in across from Ruidoso Downs Race Track because too much ground preparation is necessary at the sloped arena.

Many other sites were rejected because they either required too much preparation, were unavailable or could not provide enough crowd control. An enclosed area is necessary because organizers depend entirely on gate receipts for operating expenses.

Jungbluth said he was making attempts to stage the event at two other places. The rodeo arena in Mescalero and the Western Highlands racetrack were options he mentioned.

On a brighter note, Jungbluth reported that preparations for the chili cookoff are moving smoothly and that 50 dozen T-shirts with the cookoff logo have arrived from the silkscreener. The T-shirts will be for sale around town and at the cookoff Saturday, October 9.

"Our trophies will be out of this world," boasted Jungbluth of the five ceramic bowls and eight wooden plaques that will be given to winners in the chili and showmanship categories.

Jungbluth reported that head judge Roy Nakayama told him that every other person at last weekend's chili cookoff in Odessa, Texas, said they were coming to the Ruidoso cookoff. Organizers are prepared for up to 100 cooks and 5,000 spectators, said Jungbluth.

The cookoff will be free to the public, with gates at the top of the parking lot where the event will be staged to prevent gate crashers for the mule races running the same day, said Jungbluth.

Morel reported that preparations for the Pro Am golf tournament were also progressing on schedule.

"It's all coming together in the last three to four weeks," he said.

Morel said organizers want to stage a first class affair so that the professional golfers who participate in the event will return to the tour with glowing reports of the tournament and entice more pros next year.

Morel did say that they would need help with course preparation just before the tournament. Volunteers will be needed to mark hazards and rope off fairways.

All present at the meeting expressed optimism about the upcoming Aspen Festival.

"These events—the Aspen Festival—could be the single largest happening in the state," said Jungbluth.

## P&Z okays Grindstone annexation over objections

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) in a special meeting Friday approved an annexation request, over objections by the water board, from Grindstone Resort Community developer Don Dorman.

Dorman has petitioned for annexation of 152 acres of Grindstone Canyon into the village.

The commission okayed the annexation after hearing from water board chairman C. Newton Page that, even with planned completion of the \$8 million Grindstone water project in three years, Ruidoso will lack water to supply existing and approved housing in the village by the end of the decade, unless additional water rights are purchased.

Page asked that developers have sufficient water rights to supply their land. Grindstone does not have water rights.

The commission also tabled condominium conversion requests for the Apache Motel on Mechem Drive and the Village Lodge Motel, which is part of Innbrook Village. P&Z removed a commercial rezoning request from consideration because the Wingfield Subdivision property already was zoned commercial.

Page recommended that new annexations be required to bring in a water supply—at the rate of one acre foot of water for every four housing units—after he explained the village already has overcome the water system.

In an analysis of the demands on the system, Page said, studies of usage have shown that four housing units require an

acre foot a year. An acre foot equals almost 326,000 gallons.

He said the existing and approved housing in the village as of last May was 7,400 units, which would require 1,850 acre feet per year to supply. He said present water facilities can store and treat 1,800 acre feet per year—enough to supply 7,200 units.

Once the Grindstone reservoir is filled and on line, Ruidoso will be able to utilize its maximum water rights of 2,500 acre feet. At the present growth rate of 7.3 percent a year, Page predicted the water system, with present water rights, will supply the village only until the end of the decade.

But Page noted that the village has approved 6,800 residential lots that have not been built on. If 50 percent of those lots were built on by the end of the decade, added to the 7,400 existing and approved housing this year, the total units would be raised to 10,800. Even with Grindstone reservoir full, he said, that would be an overcommitment of 700 units on the water facilities.

Regarding the planned Grindstone Resort Community, which is located in a forested area south of the post office, Page noted that 320 units are projected for the 150 acres requested for annexation. The development would include 652 housing units on 300 acres. Half the area lies within village limits. P&Z has approved the Grindstone master plan and phase one of the project.

He said the additional 320 units would require 80 acre feet of water per year. Based on the projections of growth and available supply, Page made the recommendation that annexations be required to bring in

water rights. He said the same stipulation is made in Santa Fe.

Dorman said he tried to buy water rights, but he said owners of the rights were unwilling to let him check if they were adjudicated. He noted that one acre foot of rights could cost as much as \$12,000. Because of Dorman's difficulty in negotiating, P&Z member Greg Masters asked if the commission should pursue the matter.

Water board member Bill Karn said a municipality can acquire rights more easily because it has the power of condemnation of water rights. Karn pointed out the purpose of the utility expansion charge (UEC), included in the new water ordinance, is partly to provide the village money for water rights purchases.

But Karn said the recently passed expansion charge is not fair because it penalizes single family dwelling owners and lets condominium developers pay a small price for utility expansion. The new UEC is \$200 for single family lots, \$500 for multi-family lots and \$300 for commercial lots.

Karn said that multi-family structures containing several units could be erected on one lot. He estimated later that the UEC for Dorman's entire development would be \$17,800—or enough to buy less than two acre feet of water rights.

P&Z member Martin Rose asked if developers requesting annexation are required to bring in water.

Member Tom Kelham said the council has not directed the commission to use water as a criterion and should not be considered by P&Z. But chairman John

Schuller disagreed. He said, "Water should be very definitely taken into consideration... (and it is) a primary concern of Planning and Zoning."

Masters asked how much in revenues the development would add to Ruidoso.

Dorman, who is a Certified Public Accountant, estimated that construction on the annexed property would be \$13 million. He said at present property tax levels, that would add \$100,000 a year to village coffers.

Furthermore, he said, if the 152 acres is not annexed, Ruidoso could lose \$200,000 in gross receipts taxes. He said commercial ventures in Grindstone could add \$50,000 a year to the village.

Steve Makowski, Smokey Bear Ranger District fire management officer, asked about primary and secondary access to Grindstone. Dorman said the main access would be off Carrizo Creek Road, and that D Street, Bench Street, Santa Anita Drive and Santa Maria Drive—all south of the post office—would provide secondary access.

Makowski said all those village streets are inferior as emergency vehicle routes for the amount of traffic the development would generate. Dorman said he would assure that roads in Grindstone would meet planning design standards.

P&Z member George Shoemaker asked Dorman if it would be a big hardship for him to proceed with development of phase one, and resubmit the annexation petition after the reservoir is constructed and filled.

Dorman replied that it would be a "substantial financial burden" for him not to get annexation.

P&Z approved the annexation request, with member Mike Mulholland disqualifying himself from the vote. The request included zoning designations for single and multi-family housing and commercial areas. The matter now awaits consideration by the village council.

In other business, the commission tabled two condominium conversion requests for existing motels, to seek legal opinions on whether the conversions must fall under the same planning guidelines as multi-family projects.

The first request was from the Apache Village Motel on Mechem and Virginia Canyon Roads. Schuller pointed out rear exits for the motel cabins are too small for condominium requirements. Kelham noted that parking for some of the units does not conform.

Member Jim Faxton suggested the commission maintain consistency and require the motel units to meet condominium rules. He pointed out P&Z denied a conversion for the Redbud Motel earlier this month because it did not conform. The commission passed a motion to get a legal opinion.

The Village Lodge request created the same problem for the commission. Owner Jack Stahl said he filed a condominium declaration for the motel last year and began selling units. He said the lodge would continue to operate as a motel and that the change in ownership was a method of financing to allow owners an investment opportunity.

Mulholland said the conversion should not have to conform as a condominium because only the financing is being changed.

Shoemaker argued that the motel got clearance for zero lot line setbacks because it originally was zoned commercial, but the setbacks do not conform for a residential zone. Stahl said a condo is not necessarily built, but it is a means of ownership. P&Z tabled the matter until its October meeting.

P&Z removed a rezoning request from light commercial to general commercial for Lots 9, 10, 11, 24 and 25, Block 2 in Wingfield Subdivision because it was learned the lots were zoned already for the requested use.

Rex Skelle, representing the property owner, said the owner wishes to build an auto parts store and foreign car repair shop on the site. The area is between Big John's Barbeque and the post office in upper Ruidoso.

P&Z field officer Paul Davis said the commission received nine letters protesting the change and six supporting it. Adjacent property owners at the meeting said they did not want the enterprise near their residential neighborhood.

When Tim Collins noted the area has a nonspecific commercial zoning designation, P&Z acknowledged it could not deny the request.

In other action, P&Z:

- Approved lot line variances for Jack Yates.
- Approved a replat of Lot 5, Block 4, in Hamilton Terrace for Todd Beckman.
- Approved a request from Kelham that P&Z members be sent certified plot maps of property scheduled for P&Z consideration 10 days prior to the meeting. He also asked that all four corners of the properties be clearly staked.

## Banker Roy Seay drag races too

"I hope to be a successful race car driver in the area and to be the president of a bank someday," said Roy Seay, assistant vice president at Ruidoso State Bank. At 31, Seay is working his way up to a presidency and he is already a successful drag race driver in the area.

Wednesday he leaves for Green Valley, Texas, to see if he can become a successful race car driver in the Central United States region. He is one of 32 members of the New Mexico team that will race 10 other teams and close to 400 cars for a total purse of \$88,000 in Central Division Bracket Racing Finals.

Sitting in a back office at the bank behind a large desk and wearing a suit and tie, it is hard to imagine Roy Seay, drag racer. Don't they all wear racing jackets and hats with STP written on them?

Not according to Seay. He says that while many of the racers make their livings in the automobile business, there are racers from all walks of life. There are doctors, lawyers and insurance salesmen who race cars. Seay bought his first car from a retired Sandia Laboratory scientist who still races.

"At the races we're all in Levis," and you can't tell what everybody does during the work week, said Seay.

While racers see nothing odd about a banker drag racing, some of Seay's fellow workers find it a little different.

"I think he's gonna break his neck," said Andree Cohen. "But he's got to have a lot of guts to do it."

"Sounds like fun. You've got to do something to get out of the routine of a desk job," said Arnold Baumann, senior vice president at the bank. He said he prefers tennis for his escape from the desk.

"I think his (Seay's) wife deserves a medal," said Connie Boem.

There was a time, Seay admitted, when racing was such an all-consuming passion for him that it did put a strain on his marriage. But now it is strictly a hobby for him. "I only race if the time is right and there is no family affair that is more important," he said.

Seay is also very safety conscious. "Safety is the number one thing," he said. The National Hot Rod Association (NHRA), which oversees the races, requires a strict safety inspection before any car races.

In spite of all precautions, accidents can happen. Seven weeks ago Seay had one that made him give up on any chance of making the races in Dallas.

While racing at 110 mph down the quarter-mile track, Seay's 1965 Chevy Nova Super Sport backfired slightly. At the same time there was a small leak in his high pressure fuel line that had started some time after he arrived at the starting line. It was spraying the high octane aviation fuel the car uses all over the engine and inside the car.

"The fire was coming through the shift hole," said Seay. He grabbed for the fire extinguisher and sprayed it at the fire while bringing the speeding car to a stop.

Nothing happened to Seay but the car was gutted. If he had not had the fire extinguisher within easy reach, the whole car would have been ruined. And there would have been a much greater risk of injury to Seay.

The fire happened when there were still three races in the season. Seay's "Nova Cain" was undriveable. He figured there was no chance for him to qualify for the regional finals and put it out of his mind.

He set to repairing his car, buying a new part every payday. The process of repair would be slow because he did not have the money to replace the expensive parts he needed. His is a "poor boy operation," said friend and invaluable help Wayne Ward. Bracket racing is for the racer who can't

afford the kind of racing that takes a \$12,000 motor, said Seay. There are a range of classes and Seay is in the class that can run the quarter mile in 12 seconds, topping out at an average of about 115 mph. His engine cost him about \$2,000 and is still a very special one.

It is a 355 cubic inch V-8 with a 12.5:1 compression ratio and can develop as much as 9,000 rpms. Most street cars have an 8:1 compression ratio and top out at about 5,000 rpms. He calls it a blueprint engine because it has been machined to much more exacting standards than normal factory engines.

He has no charging system in the car except for three batteries. There is a gas tank that holds maybe two gallons. There are no lights, no interior seats except for the driver's, and no hood over the engine.

On Sunday, September 22, Seay found out he had qualified for the regional finals with the New Mexico team in spite of missing the last three races of the season. The track manager who notified him said, "There are 32 cars and you're number 32." He had to have the form in the mail by Tuesday.

He was excited but didn't know if he could raise enough money to repair the car in time for the races. He certainly did not

have the money, he said, and he couldn't give himself a loan.

Two of his regular sponsors, Sierra Blanca Motors and Roswell Lock and Supply Company kicked in money but it was not enough to repair his car and take him to Green Valley. Seay went to the Chamber of Commerce and Ed Jungbluth, the executive director. Jungbluth said he would raise the money and told Seay to enter the races.

Using the facilities of Sierra Blanca Motors and the help of friends Bob Smith and Wayne Ward, he worked until 2 a.m. every night, after banking all day, to get the car in shape for the race.


By Sunday the car was ready, except for a carburetor he was waiting for which he was not worried about. Seay leaves Wednesday with Bob Smith as his pit crew, towing "Nova Cain" behind his van. For three days in Texas he and Smith will "sleep in the van and live in the pits," said Seay.

"All it boils down to now is the guy who can tune his car to the track and drive it," he said Sunday.

So Roy Seay will be getting a little time away from his desk this week. But you know what they say about bankers' hours.

## Mills' dismissal from Care Center draws reaction

Betty Mills was dismissed Tuesday as administrator of the Ruidoso Care Center—an action that was upsetting to her and others in the community.

She will be replaced by an administrator who will arrive sometime in the near future. Kathy Boyer will be acting administrator until Mills' replacement arrives.

David M. Sempler, vice president of Healthco Management Corporation, the company that owns Ruidoso Care Center, arrived Tuesday from Bellevue, Washington, to tell Mills that he had found a replacement for her.

In a written letter that Mills requested after learning of her termination, Sempler listed the Care Center's loss of \$37,000 this

year; complaints by a former employee and a former patient; standards not being up to other Healthco facilities; and poor judgment for taking a vacation during a difficult period at the center as reasons for her termination.

Mills said she was surprised and hurt by the move made by Sempler. She said she had "no indication that any of this was brewing ... He did not give me a chance to resign. He fired me."

Mills said the Care Center had only lost \$27,000 this year but that profits had been recorded in July and August. This was a vast improvement over last year when the Care Center lost around \$100,000, she said. She refused to defend herself against the other accusations, saying they were "ridiculous."

Because of health reasons, Mills said, she had planned to step down soon anyway. Negotiations are now going on to

sell the Care Center to another company and Mills had planned to stay on until the purchasing company took over the center. The date for transferral of ownership was originally set for October but has since been pushed back to January.

Mills said she wanted the community to know that neither Boyer nor Del Lewis, Mills' replacement, had anything to do with her termination. "He will have my full support and I hope he has the town's support," said Mills about Lewis. She emphasized that the village's support is critical to the existence of the Care Center.

The move surprised and disappointed many members of the community. The News has received two letters to the editor lamenting the firing, calling it a result of petty politics.

Dr. R. A. Beechie, who helped Mills get hired, said, "Frankly, I'm very disappointed." He said he had never heard a

complaint and that he thought it was "a foolish move on their part ... I don't think they'll find any better."

Village council member Benny Coulston said he was "extremely disappointed." He said the community had begun to strongly support the Care Center since Mills' arrival, and expressed concern that the firing may affect the center's support. He also said he was "personally offended" by the firing.

Kathy Boyer, acting administrator, said, "No, I do not think that she needed to be fired. There was a better way." She said that for the most part workers were surprised and that it was a shock to everybody, because Mills was such a caring and compassionate administrator.

Sempler acknowledged that Mills brought many improvements to the center, especially in the area of making it

a part of the community. "Betty brought it a long way," he said. "It needs to be taken a little further."

"I think it is a little unfair, more than a little unfair, to cry 'Foul!' when she so often expressed a willingness, even active desire to be replaced," Sempler said.

Mills is a registered nurse and has no training in administration. Because of this, Sempler said, she had expressed to him a willingness to be replaced by a more experienced administrator if Sempler found one willing to take the job. He said that she had recently expressed an active desire to be replaced because of health reasons and delays in the purchase of the Care Center by the other company.

"I am very sorry it has happened this way," he said. "I honestly thought Betty would be relieved."

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

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
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

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## Around Sports with Gary Brown



Sometimes a lazy fall day can bring back memories of years past. Particularly if you've read something that reminds you of a certain situation in the past.

I received a newspaper of a San Francisco newspaper Thursday and read that my old high school's football team won its first game in two years.

My high school was named College Park, not to be confused with College Park, Maryland, the home of the University of Maryland.

One victory in two years! When I was in high school, our team had two winning seasons in four years. Although we failed to win a game in my sophomore year, we did gain two ties and were competitive against most of our opponents.

I didn't play football past my freshman year, being a bit too skinny to survive the gridiron wars.

I stuck to track and cross country but followed the football team intensely.

Our best season was in my junior year, when we went 7-1-1 and finished second in the league.

The biggest game of the season was against the team that eventually won the league championship. It was College Park's homecoming game so almost everybody at school was up for the game, like Ruidoso High School was last week for its homecoming game with Jal.

Entering our homecoming game against Mount Diablo High School (that school was named for a nearby mountain that in Spanish means the devil), our team was 5-1 on the year and 3-1 in league play.

We lost our only game of the season the week before by a 14-7 margin. The game was tied at 7-7 until our opponents scored a touchdown with five minutes remaining to cinch the victory.

A victory over Mount Diablo was a must if we had any hopes of winning the league title. The Red Devils (that was Mount Diablo's nickname) were undefeated entering our game.

They were ranked second in the East Bay Area Prep Poll, which drew from high schools in an area of over 1,500,000 people at that time. Most observers didn't think we had a chance of winning the game. Even some of the students were doubtful about the outcome.

But the players weren't. They went out and stopped Mount Diablo without a first down in its first offensive series following the kickoff. We came back and scored on a long drive of around 75 or 80 yards and led 14-0.

Mount Diablo scored on a long run to tie the game at 6-6 at the end of the opening quarter. However, College Park scored on a long pass play to take a 13-6 lead midway through the second period.

Things were looking good for my school then but Mount Diablo turned things around in a hurry. They came back on the following kickoff and drove for a touchdown to tie up the game.

A couple of minutes later, College Park fumbled and Mount Diablo turned that turnover into another touchdown for a 19-13 halftime advantage.

The halftime homecoming celebrations were mixed. Most of our fans felt the team had met its match and would fall apart in the second half.

But it didn't. Our fastest running back returned the second half kickoff 100 yards for an apparent touchdown. However, a penalty called the play back and we had to start out from deep in our territory.

The team drove 80-plus yards for the tying touchdown and go ahead extra point. College Park led 20-19 with about 17 minutes of football remaining.

But the Red Devils didn't quit either. They came back and scored on another long drive early in the fourth period. The extra point was good and they led 26-20.

We failed to score on our next possession but the Red Devils were also stymied by our defense.

College Park then got the ball back around its 25 yard line with about five minutes remaining in the game.

## Local fishing report

It was do or die with a probable championship riding on this last drive. Slowly but steadily, College Park drove down the field, reaching the Mount Diablo 20 with less than two minutes remaining in the contest.

It was fourth down and around seven or eight yards to go on the Red Devil 20 yard line. What was needed was some kind of trick play.

And the team came up with one. College Park's quarterback took the center snap and handed the ball back to the halfback, the same one who earlier had run 100 yards on a kickoff return. He ran to his left as the quarterback sprinted down the right sidelines towards the end zone.

Probably everybody in the stadium expected the halfback to run. After all, he had gained over 600 yards rushing in just six games as part of a well-balanced attack. Or if he didn't run with the ball, he might throw it to our tight end, who made all-league two years in a row.

But he found our quarterback instead, one step ahead of a defender at the goal line.

The College Park stands exploded in celebration, but ahead lay the crucial extra point.

The game was tied at 26-26. A tie wouldn't do any good since it would still put College Park a game behind Mount Diablo in the standings with just two games remaining.

But the placekicker had made most of his extra point tries during the season. He surely wouldn't miss a crucial kick like this one!

To make the situation even more dramatic, the holder for the extra point was the kicker's brother, a standout defensive back and the second string quarterback.

For years afterward, College Park graduates would discuss what happened on the extra point play.

The snap from the center came back, the placekicker brought his leg forward and the ball went up in the air.

The only problem was it was about five yards short of the goal post. Either the center snap had been bobbled or the placekicker just got off a bad kick.

Nobody could tell for sure. We were all looking at the goal post as the kick went off.

I'm told the two brothers, still argue about whose fault it was that the kick wasn't good.

Whatever the case, the game ended in a 26-26 tie and College Park's championship hopes went down the drain.

Oh, the team won its final two games for second place in the league. But all that separated my high school from its first championship in a major sport was one errant extra point attempt.

That near miss seemed to jinx College Park. For several years afterward, it had winning teams but couldn't get a championship.

College Park didn't win a football championship until 1976 or a basketball championship until 1975. It has never won in track or baseball. Only in wrestling has it been a consistent winner, having won four league championships and one Northern California state title.

Yes, on lazy fall days, it's easy to remember how much times has changed.

# Warriors beaten by Jal, 27-0

The Ruidoso junior varsity will have a bye this week before hosting Goddard High School Thursday, October 7. That game will start at 6 p.m.

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

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



As you near the vehicles you hear terrifying cries of pain—someone is seriously injured. "What can I do?" you ask out loud. The question says it all, you do not know the first steps to take to treat the injured.

A training course for local law enforcement and firefighting agencies being offered this month is designed to teach the

personnel exactly what those initial steps are.

Officers and firefighters are learning how to be "First Responders." The course, comprised of on-the-spot diagnosis and treatment of injuries, is being taught by Ruidoso fireman Barry Cole to the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police and fire departments.

Cole received his training as a first responder instructor in January while he was an officer with the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD). The course, designed by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and offered by the state Emergency Medical Services, is an updated version of advanced first aid.

"This is a lot different from first aid ...

advanced first aid doesn't teach as much patient diagnosis," explained Cole, who is also a qualified Emergency Medical Technician.

Cole said the 40-hour course teaches persons to administer basic life support as soon as they arrive on the scene of an accident or injury. He stresses that the techniques—including CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation), bandaging, splinting and treatment of burns—are especially important within six minutes after an injury has occurred. That's the crucial period when the brain becomes damaged if it receives no blood.

The first procedure first responders perform is to survey the scope of injuries at the scene. In a multiple injury situation,

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# as first responders

Cole said, responders are taught how to do a "triage," or sort the persons to be treated from the most severely injured to the least.

Then come the primary and secondary patient surveys. The primary survey involves talking to the victims and asking about their injuries. Responders will check the level of consciousness and amount of bleeding. They also check the ABCs—airway, breathing and circulation—the three elements of CPR.

In the secondary survey, responders check pulse, respirations, reaction of pupils to stimulus, temperature, and color. Responders will also run their hands down the victim's body to check for injuries.

Participants in the course learn CPR

techniques on an advanced mannequin called a "Record-a-Annie." The mannequin is connected to a light gauge and a recorder that prints the level of pressure on the heart and amount of air blown into the lungs. If someone compresses the chest too hard or forces too much air into the lungs, a warning light flashes.

Using a variety of classroom techniques, including lectures, films and written tests, trainees learned immediate treatment for such injuries as heat stroke and exhaustion; hypothermia; frostbite; body and skull fractures; arterial bleeding; thermal, electrical and chemical burns; chest wounds and cardiac arrests; shock; and blocked airways.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor

said all RPD officers have taken the course in the last two weeks. He noted that officers have received some of the training before, but he said the First Responder course includes many updated measures that have made procedures easier. He complimented Cole as an excellent instructor, and he mentioned the training would be beneficial to anybody.

Cole said he will start a third 40-hour period with local volunteer firefighters in two weeks. Cole stressed that the entire purpose of the course is to "keep a patient alive until an ambulance arrives," and that untrained persons attempting to render assistance can sometimes do more harm than good.

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



## Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Topic for today: What every young citizen should know about severance tax funds.

The issue arises because more than half the legislators who show up here next January will be full of plans to put that money to work.

Most people don't understand how it all works.

So let's take a look at the whole scene.

First off, the money comes from special taxes imposed on minerals severed from our earth. The largest amount of it comes from gas and oil, but there are also such taxes on uranium and coal, all put there on the theory that we need somehow to recompense New Mexicans of the future for what we allowed to be taken away today.

For many years, the law permitted the Legislature to use half the annual yield from this source to issue severance tax bonds, so long as the other half of the income went directly into a severance tax permanent fund, the corpus of which could not be touched.

Then Representative John Bigbee introduced a bill to change all that.

Its major aim was to require that all the tax revenue generated in this way go into the severance tax permanent fund, and that only the interest earned by investing that money be used for bonding purposes.

Obviously such a move will cut down the capacity of the state to issue such bonds by a considerable extent. Where up till now it could use as much as half the sum taken in for that purpose, now it will have a considerably lesser sum.

To ease that shift-over, the Bigbee bill, which passed and was enacted into law, called for a five-year interim period during which both types of bonds could be issued.

That means that now, and until July 1, 1985, we can use the 50 percent amount from annual payments plus the interest

earned by the severance tax permanent fund as our bonding capacity. In other words, we have got more potential bond money now, but there is a definite date set beyond which that will not be true.

We call the bonds backed by the annual revenues generated by the tax "severance tax bonds." We call the other kind "severance tax income bonds."

Where does the money we get from these bonds go to? Mostly to capital projects, that is, buildings and highways and equipment.

The last Legislature, for instance, authorized \$144,341,841 worth of such projects—not as much as the \$254.7 million authorized the previous year, but that included the big spending required as a result of the prison riot.

Of the 1982 \$144 million provided for, \$74,479,650 was to come from severance tax bond money and \$4,419,000 from severance tax income bonds.

Presently there are all sorts of other clever schemes running through the minds of legislators for use of this sort of dough. One wants to use about \$60 million of it to build a railroad to move coal from the northwest quadrant of the state—a proposal that deserves to be looked at extremely carefully. Another wants to use \$100 million over three years to revive the flagging mortgage industry, and thus the flagging construction industry and the flagging real estate industry in New Mexico. That one too ought to be viewed with some skepticism before rushing into it.

So should all the other proposals for use of this money. Remember how we started by saying that this was planned to be money held in trust for the future citizens of New Mexico?

To accomplish that, we'd better be sure the money is there in the future and that it yields the maximum amounts consistent with safety, anything else that may be accomplished with it should not even be considered a close second.

### GAME, FISH MONEY WELL ALLOCATED

After a bit of a public relations faux pas at the beginning, the state Department of Game and Fish has made a responsible and laudable first appropriation of the money state taxpayers donated through an income tax checkoff program.

The bobcat, the desert bighorn sheep, the Rio Grande cutthroat trout and Gila trout, and the Socorro isopod top the list of wildlife species which will benefit from "Share With Wildlife" funds.

It one must receive a surprise, the kind the Game and Fish Department received on the refund check-off was the right kind. Expecting about \$150,000 from the voluntary program, it instead netted some \$256,000.

The State Game Commission is on the way to fulfilling the intent of the program with the expenditures approved. Such responsible handling of the money will doubtless ensure continued generosity from New Mexico taxpayers concerned with wildlife species that aren't popular game animals. — Albuquerque Journal

## On the Village beat with Tim Palmer



People say New Mexico—with its great size and cultural, climatologic and geographic diversity—is more like five or six states than one.

I regularly tour the state by perusing the various New Mexico newspapers we receive here at The Ruidoso News, and it occurred to me to wonder how different and how alike our cities, counties and regions really are.

Up north, a recent issue of The Taos News has a front page story speculating on what the coming winter will be like. Comments from three area residents, in response to the question, "Will this be a hard and memorable winter?" are included.

One woman answers, "Yes. The old people have studied the Cabanuelas and say it will be severe." The story notes that Cabanuelas is a means of forecasting weather for the year based on weather the first 24 days of January, and that this year, January was snowy.

A man replies, "Yes... The old people say when the aspens start turning earlier, it means a long winter. But they're not turning yet."

Another says, "Who knows? One old story is that if the ant hills are tall with heavy cover, it will be a hard winter."

To me, one of the interesting things about this story is the way the character of Taos comes through. The references to "the old people" evoke images of Taos area families which go back more generations than anyone can remember.

That is in contrast to the newcomer and transient elements in Ruidoso. But of course Lincoln County, especially the Hondo Valley, has its well established families.

The story also shows something we already knew—that people everywhere are always wondering about the weather. Maybe people in towns that have ski areas nearby a little more than most.

By the way, in case you hadn't noticed, the aspens have started to turn here in Harmony Valley.

Moving a little south, what news from the capital? If there is any newspaper in the state that reflects the character of its city, it is The Santa Fe Reporter.

"The City Different" is one label Santa Fe goes by. "The City Eccentric" would often serve as well. For example, a recent issue of The Reporter contains a feature story on "The Prairie Dog Lady."

This is an elderly woman who takes food that has been thrown away by grocery stores and bakeries and feeds it to the prairie dogs that live on a couple of vacant lots right in Santa Fe.

The prairie dog lady has been feeding the critters for years, the article notes, and has thus come to know their likes and

dislikes. "... they'll eat just about anything—except for grapes, that is," she is quoted as saying. "Isn't that funny, they won't eat grapes? They love avocados."

The Reporter always includes what it calls its "living section."—"Santa Fe Style." This often features gourmet recipes and such, but the particular issue I was looking at contained a treatise on Frito pies.

The article leads off: "Only in Santa Fe would a state government secretary call a Public Service Company Commissioner out of a utility hearing to find out if the Dairy Queen she owns serves Frito pie."

Yes, Santa Fe is the domain of the state government employee, and it is widely acknowledged that there are too many of those. It could almost make you a little envious, thinking of all the public servants making a nice living on the public payroll, and getting to enjoy Santa Fe's prairie dog and Frito pie lifestyle.

But who would want to be part of something everyone puts down all the time—state government?

Down in our end of the state, The Herald of Truth or Consequences reports that Getty Oil is planning to drill two wildcat wells in the northern portion of Sierra County.

This raises the prospect of T or C joining the ranks of Artesia and Roswell and other "oil-intensive" southern New Mexico towns. An oil find would presumably be very welcome in Sierra County, because The Herald also reports that the T or C school district may be in trouble because enrollment is short of the projected number, which means less funding.

Although they're just starting to look for oil near T or C, the question of what the state will do as the oil and gas dries up seems to be raised more frequently these days.

Perhaps people are seeing the handwriting on the wall when they look at Grants and Silver City, which have been hit hard by falling demand for uranium and copper. It was front page news in the Silver City Daily Press last week when copper mine closings in Arizona and Michigan were announced.

It was as if to say, "things are tough all over—don't expect them to get better very quickly here."

But talk to the old-timers in any New Mexico city, and chances are they have seen the cycle of boom to bust repeated at least once, and don't get too excited either way.

Each of our cities has its own character and characters. And though we're far apart in many ways, I think it's safe to say we're all glad to be part, and glad the others are part, of the Land of Enchantment.





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

"Road Warrior," which comes from Australia, is one of the best adventure films of the year, making such sword sagas as "Conan the Barbarian" seem like a walk in the country.

"Road Warrior," which is set in the future, is a post-Armageddon tale of good and evil, and of survival in-between. In a world where gasoline is the liquid gold, the "Road Warrior" is a hero who can fight with the best of them, but who also discovers a bit of humanity during the struggle. Clad in black leather, he can handle anything that has a motor and wheels.

Essentially he is your basic epic hero, resembling everyone from Odysseus to Clint Eastwood. Like an ancient Greek myth there is as much action and adventure as latent

meanings. "Road Warrior" has as much pathology as mythology.

Making all that action work is some of the best stunt work seen in any film, Australian or otherwise. Cars, motorcycles, helicopters, and especially a tank-car all move at speeds they were never intended. The vehicles usually end up in a fiery ball of metal, their screaming occupants trapped inside. In this society, vehicular homicide is a talent to be nurtured.

Mel Gibson plays the title role, essentially repeating his role from "Mad Max," a film that grossed \$100 million worldwide. He also starred in Peter Weir's highly acclaimed "Gallipoli," another Australian film, which demonstrates that they are moving into the forefront of international cinema.
