

# Meet the new teachers at Ruidoso High School

Ruidoso High School has added three new members to its teaching staff this year, including Karen Gray as art instructor; Nancy Holland as teacher in chemistry, physics and geometry; and Elmer Chavez as Spanish and physical education teacher.

Gray previously taught junior high and high school art for six years in Lubbock, Texas. She has a bachelor's degree in art education from Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

She is teaching basic concepts of drawing and design to six classes of about 25 students each. The classes also include sessions on painting and working with clay, ink and colored pencils. In addition to her teaching duties, Gray is sponsor of the freshman class this year.

Her own work is exhibited at 20/20 Gallery. She specializes in fantasy and surrealism using color pencils.

Gray said she feels "art is one of the most important areas (of education) though it does not get much recognition."

"It develops the more human side of us," she added, and helps students develop a sense of "good taste in other areas of life."

Holland has taught school for 10 years, most recently in Alamogordo and Hondo. She graduated from the University of Oklahoma in Norman with a bachelor's degree in math and earned a master's in math from Oklahoma State University in Stillwater.

In addition to her chemistry, physics and geometry classes, Holland is assistant

coach for volleyball and basketball at Ruidoso High School this year.

Her philosophy of education is that "all education should be tailored to fit the individual student."

She is teaching ninth through 12th graders in her classes this year.

Chavez moved to Ruidoso this summer from Grants, where he had been teaching physical education. He has classes in English as second language and Spanish I and Spanish II, and will also teach one class of boys physical education next semester.

Chavez is also head coach for the volleyball team and assistant coach for boys basketball and girls track. He has a bachelor's degree in physical education from Lubbock Christian College.

Chavez said he really enjoys working in the Ruidoso school system thus far.

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# Crime awareness pushed

Keeping Ruidoso aware of crime prevention measures and local problems with home and business security are two of the top goals of the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD).

As RPD security and public relations officer Chuck Mahenski puts it, the department is always "trying to stimulate an awareness. We all have a responsibility to ourselves and our community."

Informing the community of crime activity in Ruidoso; giving tips on crime prevention and safety; and relaying information on hazardous or dangerous activities are all topics of new informational programs from the police department aired on Cablevision of Lincoln County.

Local cable viewers will become acquainted with Mahenski and officer Robert Kenney in the 20-minute segments shown on Thursdays at 6:30 p.m. and Saturday mornings at 11:30.

Mahenski described the series before last Thursday's taping of a program on firearms. The show, which has been running three weeks, has dealt with crime prevention and security in the village, and has introduced RPD's police dog, Duke, to viewers. Last week's program was on personal defense and firearm laws.

Asked if the department received response to the first programs, Mahenski replied "it was better than anticipated."

The programs offer the department another means of communicating with the public. Although Mahenski says it is not a problem for the Ruidoso force, he acknowledged that communication is always an area that can be improved upon in the law enforcement field.

"I'm pleased with the way people accept the police department here," he said. "We had 37,500 telephone calls, complaints and reports last year. We encourage that to continue. If you're not involved, join in."

Mahenski noted that effective communication with the police department and within village neighborhoods is the best means for cutting down on Ruidoso's biggest crime problem—residential burglaries. With a majority of dwellings unoccupied by their owners for long periods, Mahenski indicated, theft is too common in housing areas.

The first crime awareness program broadcast advised viewers what to do to update security of their homes and businesses. Mahenski said the show also was an appeal to viewers to call police if they think they have security problems.

Mahenski said if persons contact RPD and wish to have their places checked for

security problems, he will examine their homes or businesses in depth and write a report on what they can do to improve security.

He said the police department emphasizes practical and cost effective solutions to problems. He noted that businesses especially are relying more and more on alarm systems for protection. But with the high expense of alarms, he said, the more logical avenue is usually better door and window locks and area lighting.

"People have relied on the fact their goods were insured and they tended to deny—these things couldn't happen to us," he explained. "But that's an attitude we're trying to change. We're trying to get people more involved."

Mahenski pointed out the reliance on insurance as protection of valuables has resulted in escalating insurance premiums and a higher burglary rate nationwide, and Ruidoso is part of that trend. He said property owners can lower their insurance costs and better protect their possessions by concentrating more on preventive security.

Many Ruidoso businesses have installed alarm systems connected to monitors at the police station. The security officer said nearly 200 alarms are installed at RPD, and that many justify the systems' cost—from \$300 to \$2,000. But he repeated that good locking devices and adequate lighting are often just as efficient as protection measures.

"The first step of protection is physical deterrence," he said. "Lighting and substantial locks are the most effective deterrents. Statistics show that places broken into are usually in poorly lighted areas and have flimsy doors and locks."

Mahenski said average door locks on houses are installed by builders with economy in mind, and the locks can be entered by burglars in a couple of minutes. He said the extra cost of dead bolt locks

and window locks is justified in increased protection.

Another effective preventive measure is for persons to inform police when they leave town. Mahenski said if homeowners would let RPD know when their dwellings are unoccupied, officers will watch the places while on their regular patrols.

He said police are in the process of establishing a Crimestoppers program here, but it will be some time before state approval is received.

In the meantime, he advises residents to start their own neighborhood watches. He said if neighbors notice suspicious persons or activities near adjoining properties, to call RPD, and police "will respond immediately."


Mahenski pointed out that RPD does not emphasize guns as a method of security. He said too many people who own guns are not trained in the safe use of firearms. But because society is increasingly arming itself, he said, gun owners should be better informed of legal and proper use of weapons.

That was the topic of last week's cable program. Mahenski said he, Kenney and attorney Karen Parsons talked about the legal possession and use of weapons, what people can do to defend themselves, and the ramifications of using deadly force.

Mahenski said "the indiscriminate way weapons can be obtained by most anybody" bothers him, but he said he was equally concerned by the prospect of laws being passed that will take firearms away from people. He added, however, that the right to carry weapons carries a great deal of responsibility.

"If people want (firearms), they're going to have to show they are capable to handle them safely," he suggested.

Mahenski concluded by saying if enough gun owners in Ruidoso contact RPD and ask for instructions on proper handling of their weapons, police will arrange for safety lessons at a gun range.

# Parks and Rec wants volunteer head; meeting Tuesday night

Dave Anderson of the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) said last week his group has determined the village cannot support a full-funded parks and recreation department during the current fiscal year, and therefore is asking the village council only to sanction a volunteer director and assistant.

Anderson will present the formal proposal to the council at a special meeting Tuesday at 7 p.m.

The council instructed the parks commission September 14 to formulate a budget for a department and a director's salary and return with the figures. The PRC undertook a campaign over a month ago to get the department established.

Anderson said Friday he went over the budget for parks and recreation this year, and found there is not enough money to hire a full-time director and fund a department.

He said he and Dave Warren, who is involved with local athletic leagues, isolated three items on the parks budget where little or no money has been spent this year. Those items—building maintenance, maintenance supplies and parks maintenance—show a combined balance of \$5,400, Anderson said.

Allowing for projected spending in those areas based on a percentage of what has been spent thus far, Anderson said the year-end surplus still should be around \$5,000.

In a letter to the council, Anderson said those funds could be used for maintenance of existing grounds and ballparks. And he asks that supervision of the facilities be put under a volunteer parks director and assistant.

He said that the only favor PRC is asking of the council is that it sanction the two positions. Anderson noted school superintendent Pat Valliant, high school athletic director Doyle Howell and White Mountain Middle School principal Texie Cole have all agreed to let recreation organizations use the schools, if activities are under the supervision of a village-sanctioned director.

Anderson said the two volunteers have to be sanctioned to be included in the village insurance policy. He added that the schools require persons using the facilities be insured.

In an interview Friday, Anderson said he has lined up several volunteers who will help improve local athletic fields. He noted some recreational programs now exist, but because of incessant problems with schedules and acquiring facilities, a parks and recreation director is needed to better organize the programs and add new ones.

He added that under the auspices of a department director, parks and recreation can generate much of its operating funds through sponsored sports tournaments and activities. He said the village could better determine a budget for the department next year, after a director has had a

chance to organize the department.

He said the schools have been very cooperative with the PRC, and in his letter he asks the council not to let the opportunity to work with the schools "slip through our fingertips."

Anderson acknowledged that the commission's request is only "a skeleton of a department," but he said the approach with volunteers is the "only way it will get off the ground."

He wrote that he and Dave Warren have the desire and the sports experience to fill the volunteer positions for the remainder of the fiscal year. Asked how much time he could devote to the position if it were on a volunteer basis, Anderson said the council should consider the effort he has given already to PRC.

"I've given a lot of time to this committee," said Anderson, who has been on the commission since August. "That should give them some indication of how much I'll put into it."

"I love this town and I want to see the kids and adults have something. The programs are ultimately for the kids; they are the backbone of the community, and if we don't provide something for them, they don't want to stay here."

# Golfers anxious to play here

Former Masters winners Charles Coody and George Archer are both anxious to compete in the first Inn of the Mountain Gods Pro-Am Golf Tournament Monday, October 11.

"It sounds like a really good tournament," Archer said. "It appears you've got a really good field there."

Coody and Archer were both interviewed by phone over the weekend from San Antonio, Texas, where they competed in the Texas Open.

Coody finished at 274, 12 strokes behind winner Jay Haas, who had a 262. Archer finished at 276, 14 strokes behind Haas. The top finish by a golfer who will compete in the Inn tournament was turned in by Tom Purtzer, who scored a 273. Brad Bryant, another golfer who will compete in the Inn tournament, scored a 278.

Archer has been fairly pleased with his play this season.

"I've had a pretty good year," he said. "I've won over \$80,000. The last tournament I competed in where I placed high was the Buick Open (in August) where I took third place."

Archer's last tournament victory was the 1976 Las Vegas Open. He won the 1969 Masters but calls all tournament victories big thrills.

"Right now the strongest part of my game is stroking the ball," the 18-year pro said. "Usually it's been my putting but I'm kind of a streak putter."

The cool weather of the Ruidoso area should be an advantage to Archer.

"I've won most of my tournaments during the winter," he said. "I grew up in San Francisco and have been used to playing in cool weather."

Coody, who won the 1971 Masters and is a 20-year pro, vacationed at the Inn five years ago with his wife.

When asked whether he was looking forward to the tournament, he said, "Oh yeah! I've heard an awful lot about the course there. But I can't tell anything about it because I only looked at it."

Coody said he started slowly this year on the tour because he did not play much in the spring. But his game started improving by summer, and he got his best finish of the year at the Canadian Open in July,

where he ended up with a third place score. He has won \$57,000 this year.

He has not been happy with his game this year but has been shooting more consistently lately, something a golfer is always looking for.

"This week, I've been playing fairly well from tee to green," he said.

Coody said his best year was 1971, mainly because he won the world's premier tournament (the Masters). He said he actually has had years when he's played better than 1971, but "winning the Masters has to be the highlight of any golfer's career."

The next stop on the pro tour following the Inn tournament is the Pensacola (Florida) Open October 21-24.

Smith will leave his post as vice president and director of racing at Los

The new general manager is expected to arrive in El Paso, Texas, today, said Ruidoso-Sunland publicity director Dick Alwan. Smith will be at the helm when Sunland Park opens its 85-day meet October 15.

## Downs down on animal ordinance

A recent effort to enforce village ordinances in Ruidoso Downs has caused an uproar among residents. Citations were issued to about 13 residents in violation of an ordinance relating to the location of housing for animals, and about 50 people attended a meeting Thursday evening to protest the action, according to village officials.

The ordinance states that "any shed, shelter, pen or enclosure for animals cannot be any closer than 50 feet to any dwelling, house, place of business or street."

The ordinance was adopted around 1977, according to village clerk Wilma Webb, but has never been enforced until now.

A number of horse owners in the village would be forced to move their horses off their property if the ordinance were enforced. According to village trustee Bob Power, who received one of the citations, some lands on which horses are currently kept are only 100 feet wide.

The maximum fine for violation of a village ordinance is \$300, municipal judge

Fred Bernard said, but no charges have been assessed. A committee was formed at Thursday's meeting to review the ordinance and recommend changes to the village's governing body.

Committee members are Joe Welch, Dean Brewer, Debi Branum, Jackie Branum, Pete Woods, Alice Allison and Ray Reed. Judge Bernard will serve as chairman with no voting power.

Municipal officer Dale Patrick had issued the citations as part of his assignment of enforcing village ordinances in an effort to initiate a cleanup of the village.

## Restaurant closed by state agency

The Holiday House Coffee Shop has had its permit to operate suspended by the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) for repeated violations of the New Mexico Food Service Regulations, according to Hari Mukhoty, environmentalist with the Ruidoso EID office.

The restaurant has been ordered closed until an inspection by the Ruidoso EID staff determines that regulations have been complied with.

Reasons given by the District EID manager in Roswell for suspension of the permit include "a lack of training and supervision" revealed by "repeated violations during the last eight inspections" and four downgradings of rating to "C" or un-

satisfactory since December 1979. Also listed as reasons are "the number of serious or major violations which have repeatedly occurred which could become the cause for customers becoming ill." These violations include proper temperature control, handwashing hygiene, toilet/handwashing construction of facilities, insects, rodents and animals, and toxic items improperly stored.

A hearing was held in Roswell September 28 to determine whether the permit should be suspended. A letter written by the District EID manager to Velma McCollum, owner of the Holiday House, states that she indicated during the hearing that she knew she was "careless in the operation of the restaurant but yet did not correct the problem."

The letter also suggests ways to correct

underlying causes of the violations, including having McCollum and her key personnel attend the Roswell food school and setting up a self-inspection and training program to ensure that employees complete their cleaning and other job responsibilities.

The permit will be reinstated by Mukhoty, according to the letter, after the suggestions are carried out and violations are corrected.

McCollum could not be contacted for comment.

# Reporter discovers he prefers poker motorcycle - style

Before Friday, whenever I thought of poker images from my college days came to mind—a bunch of guys sitting in some stuffy room drinking, smoking, swearing and betting money into the early morning hours. I found out Friday at the motorcycle festival that there is a much better way to play the game.

The Alamogordo-Space Poker Run was not going to be played in a stuffy smoky room. We had to travel all over the countryside to get our cards. And I wasn't going to play against five or six people. There were over 200 players in this game.

A poker run consists of picking up one card at a time at a variety of predesignated spots around the countryside. I didn't want to drive my car so I hung around the registration table hoping for somebody who might give me a ride.

I waited at that table all of about 30 seconds before D. L. Bragg said he would be willing to give this cycle-less reporter a ride. His wife wasn't riding that day and I was going to play her hand.

I followed Bragg out into the bright sunshine and up to a huge Honda Aspencade motorcycle. It was so big I was only mildly surprised when Bragg told me that he had towed a camper that slept two behind it. Bragg didn't have an extra helmet but his friend Albert Jones did.

Albert handed me his extra helmet while telling me that Bragg's wife had not come along on this poker run because Bragg had laid his bike down one too many times. The

two men laughed as I wondered what I was getting into.

Bragg and Jones have been coming to motorcycle festivals ever since Til Thompson staged the first one in Ruidoso. Bragg said the two men usually come up from El Paso and spend "the whole darn week loafing. It gets you away from the telephone."

Bragg's telephone is at his service company where he repairs motor homes. Jones is retired but used to own a Harley Davidson dealership. Bragg's Honda was the source of plenty of jokes from Jones throughout the day.

But it was no joke once we got on that bike. Helmet strapped on tight, I climbed on to the motorcycle behind Bragg. It was almost as comfortable as my favorite chair at home.

The control panel looked to me like an airplane cockpit. There were dials, buttons, gauges, a stereo radio and even vents if you needed a little more air than 50 miles an hour might provide.

It was hard to tell when the run officially started but at one point bikes just started heading out and we followed suit. Bragg turned the throttle and the motorcycle responded with a jet-like hum. I sank into my seat as we accelerated onto the road.

This poker run was going to take us first to Clouderoff; then to three different stops in Alamogordo; on to one in Tularosa; and back to the Hospitality Tent in Ruidoso for our last card.

Once on the road I quickly realized that I was going to enjoy this kind of poker much more than the kind played at a table. I was comfortable and secure on this huge motorcycle. The sun was shining on an

especially beautiful day after Thursday's rain and the cool breeze was blowing in my face.

As we rose towards Clouderoff I understood why it is called Aspen Festival. Ranging from deep green to yellow and orange, the turning aspens stood out

beautifully against the green valleys and evergreens. It beat the heck out of smoking cigars in a stuffy room at two in the morning.

Along the road to Clouderoff we drove in a caravan of about 30 bikes. There were plenty more ahead and behind us that we

couldn't see.

We pulled in at Tex's Bar-B-Que Pit for our first card. The cool air had blown through my light windbreaker and I was thankful for a chance to warm up.

I also wanted to draw that first card. Bragg reminded me that I had better draw a good card since I was playing for his wife, the one who had been afraid to come along. I drew a seven of diamonds, but D. L. could say nothing since he had drawn a two of clubs.

As soon as we had drawn our card, we were back on the bikes and headed for Alamogordo and the International Space Hall of Fame. I was still a little chilly but Bragg told me we would soon be dropping off the hill and into warmer air.

On this leg of the trip we had left most of the other people behind, and we saw only two or three other bikes at a time as we rode along. Very soon out of Clouderoff I could see the White Sands and desert stretching out below us. We dropped quickly and I welcomed the warmer air.

We arrived at the International Space Hall of Fame and drew our second cards. Bragg drew a five of diamonds and I drew a king of hearts. He was disgusted with his draws but I had hope.

We wandered around the Hall for a while looking at all the pictures of men landing on the moon and models of incredibly sophisticated machinery. D. L.'s comment was, "And they haven't even found the cure for the common cold."

It was a short ride to the Omnimax Theatre (about 200 yards) and our third

cards. I drew another king and was already looking forward to the trophy I would win. Bragg grumbled over his nine of spades. The next movie was not for another 40 minutes and we decided not to wait.

Our fourth card and lunch was waiting for us at the Desert Aire Restaurant in Alamogordo. The lunch was good but the cards weren't. 
I may not have won anything but I certainly couldn't say I had lost anything either.

The ride, indeed, was what it was all about.



## Wallet, owner to be reunited

A long-lost wallet and its owner will soon be reunited—after more than 20 years since the billfold, filled with invaluable family pictures and personal identification cards, was stolen from a midtown Ruidoso bar.

Dollie Mae Fairless, a former Ruidoso resident who now lives in Oklahoma, is anxiously awaiting the return of her billfold that was stolen in 1959 as she was selling tickets to raise money for the Ruidoso Does Club.

The wallet and its contents—including a pass to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track for the 1959 season, the year of the first running of the All-American Futurity with a purse of \$100,000—have remained remarkably well preserved in the 23 years since the wallet was last seen by its owner.

This week, a worker in a midtown gift shop was rummaging through the remains of a house that was razed when she discovered the bulging black billfold buried in the rubble.

Susan Norvelle, who works at Kiva Gifts at 2542 Sudderth, was just "nosing around in the boards," that were heaped behind the gift store after workmen tore down the house, when she bumped across the wallet.

"It was just under a bunch of old boards," said Susan. After she found the wallet, Susan went through its contents hoping to find the owner's identification and phone number. There was no money in the billfold. And, of course, Dollie Mae was not to be located in Ruidoso.

Margie Adams, another worker at the gift shop, brought the wallet to the Ruidoso Police Department and asked if police could track down the owner. Although several ID cards clearly established Dollie Mae as the owner, neither Dollie nor her pictured friends and relatives could be found in this area.

One of the cards, however, provided the clue that led to eventual contact with Dollie Mae. "In case of emergency," the card asked, "contact Irene Imoe." A quick glance in the phone book revealed an I.A. Imoe living in Ruidoso.

As it turned out, when the number was called, the voice on the other end of the receiver was Slick Imoe, the son of Irene and a cousin of Dollie Mae.

"Yes, I know her," Slick replied. "She's my cousin."

Imoe said Dollie Mae and her husband Rubert lived in a house located in what is now the parking lot of Ruidoso State Bank for several years. He said the couple moved to Oklahoma sometime in the 1960s.

As Slick flipped through the pictures in the wallet, he noticed a young, blond boy identified as Gary Simpson. He said Gary is Dollie Mae's grandson, and that he still

lives in this area. Slick added, though, that he does not know how to contact Gary.

When reached at her home in Ashland, Oklahoma, Dollie Mae was delighted to hear her wallet had been found. She remembered all the details of how she and her wallet were separated.

Dollie Mae, who was a member of Drove 152 of the Ruidoso Does (the women's organization of the Elks Club), said she was in midtown Ruidoso one day in 1959 selling tickets on a "money doll."

She said she and a friend went into the Central Bar, which was located in the vicinity of the present Kiva Gift shop, and she took the billfold out of her purse and put it on the bar as she was selling a ticket.

The next thing she knew, the wallet was missing. It contained \$40, the pictures and IDs.

"There was a man in there who I'm quite sure stole it," she remembered. "We felt like he took it. What we did, is we went behind the bar to look for it. I knew he lived in a house back there."

Dollie Mae said she never found the man or the wallet, and she never reported the theft to the police, because she felt "it just wasn't worth it."

She said she and her husband moved away from Ruidoso in 1965. Dollie Mae hadn't heard of the wallet again until last week.

Slick and his wife Edith Imoe will send the wallet to its owner this week.

"Oh, I can't wait (to get it back)," Dollie Mae said over the phone. After a 23-year separation, those words are easily understood.

Since 4-H depends almost entirely on the work of volunteers, part of Richardson's job is to find volunteers to conduct programs 4-H members are interested in. He welcomes persons who are interested in teaching a particular skill to 4-Hers.

"What makes 4-H so exciting," said Richardson, "is if you want to get into a particular area of interest, it's there for you." He pointed out that 4-H is no longer just "cows and ag and raise pigs"—that programs like photography, public speaking and radio and TV management are also offered.

The organization also has an international exchange program, and clubs participate in competition on the state level.

Richardson emphasized that 4-H is family-oriented.

"It promotes keeping the family together," he said.

The National Football League Players Association (NFLPA) has tentatively drawn up a schedule of "All-Star" games to be played throughout the remainder of the players' strike.

These games strike me as being at the very least risky to the players from an injury and economic standpoint.

The All-Star teams will be determined by divisions. For example, there will be games with the American Conference (AFC) Western Division going against the National Conference (NFC) Western Division or the AFC Central Division playing the NFC Western Division.

The first game is set for Sunday, October 10, in Washington D.C. between the AFC Western Division and the NFC Eastern Division.

The All-Stars will be playing alongside "teammates" who they may not be that familiar with. This would probably increase the chance of injuries and ironically could end players' careers at a time when they are striking for more benefits.

It would be especially ironic if a player was injured only a couple of days before the strike was settled and vast improvements were made in the players' benefits.

The All-Star games may be a way for the players to keep in shape and hold the "competitive edge" while on strike. It could also provide football fans with some pro grid entertainment while the strike is

on. But these are short-term advantages and it would seem the negative factors far outweigh the positive. Hopefully a solution to the strike can be worked out soon so these All-Star games won't have to take place.

If the NFL strike continues through December, it's possible the owners may decide to start a mass "rebuilding" project.

At least one owner has said that they (the owners) might consider starting all over again like the old American Football League owners did, with new players and a new format.

If that was the case, then the NFL players might switch to the new United States Football league and pro football fans would be watching their favorite players in the spring instead of the fall.

Hopefully, that won't be the case. The NFL has been in existence for over 60 years and its brand of football is now regarded as the most popular team sport in the country.

Collegiate football and major league baseball's divisional playoffs and World Series will partly take the place of NFL football until professional hockey and basketball start.

However, if the NFL strike is still unsettled by mid-December, the majority of American sports fans will be in a downcast mood.

# Motocross championships a success

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
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

# Warrior offense sparkles in 41-21 loss to Colts

Despite its best offensive showing of the season, the Ruidoso High School varsity football team lost its fifth straight game—a 41-21 defeat at the hands of New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) Friday night in Roswell.

The Warriors gained 320 yards total offense and seemed in control of the game against the favored Colts in the first quarter.

Ruidoso jumped off to a 13-0 advantage in the first period before the hosts rallied for the victory.

The Warriors scored their first touchdown on a 60 yard drive midway through the opening quarter. Several runs by wingback Grady Williamson and some fine passing by quarterback Billy Woodul brought the Warriors within scoring range at the 15 yard line.

A touchdown pass was called back because of a penalty but freshman fullback Mark Langston then took a handoff from Woodul, cut to his right and ran in for the score. Robert Swanner kicked the extra point and Ruidoso held a 7-0 advantage.

The Colts received the opening kickoff but got nowhere on the following series, a long pass knocked away at the Warrior 30 ending their drive.

Ruidoso got the ball back and drove 65 yards for its second touchdown.

Langston drove six yards to put the Warriors at the Colt 21. Williamson then cut for 12 yards to the NMMI nine. Two plays later, junior halfback Eric Strobel ran in for the score from the five. Swanne's extra point attempt was blocked but the Warriors held a 13-0 advantage with 1:15 remaining in the first period.

But that seemed to wake up the hosts and they dominated the game from then on, although the Warriors still continued to move the ball well.

The Colts drove 70 yards early in the second quarter to get on the scoreboard.

Running back Marc Williams, who scored five touchdowns, culminated the drive with a 18 yard run in which he beat two Ruidoso defenders to the left side of the endzone.

On the Warriors' next series, NMMI's Williams stepped in front of a Woodul pass and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown. NMMI quarterback Jody Bratcher then threw a two-point conversion for a 14-13 Colt lead.

Williams finished the first half scoring with a 12 yard run.

The Warriors almost scored in the final seconds of the first half, getting as far as the Colt 15. However, time ran out before they were able to get in the endzone.

Williams added his fourth touchdown on a 27 yard run in the third quarter and his fifth in the final period on an eight yard run.

Doug Shields concluded the Colts' scoring with an 88 yard run.

But the Warriors still has some spark left, driving 66 yards for a touchdown.

Williamson, who had 122 yards in 16 carries, ran for 20 yards to put the ball on the NMMI 45. Fullback Kyle Flack ran for nine yards and Williamson scampered for 21 more yards in two carries to the 15.

From there, Williamson drove up the middle for the final 15 yards and a touchdown. He then took a pass from Woodul for the two-point conversion with 3:53 remaining in the game.

Woodul finished the game with eight completions in 14 attempts for 121 yards. The Warriors rolled up 199 yards on the ground. The Colts had 375 yards total offense.

"We're making progress," said Warrior

head coach Darrel Stierwalt. "The kids showed improvement over last week (a 27-0 loss to Jai) and we moved the ball well. We passed a lot and that helped open up our running game more."

NMMI was probably the Warriors' toughest opponent this season.

"They've got a great offense," said Ruidoso offensive coordinator Vince Collins. "They're better than Lovington because they can run like Lovington and they also have a good passer, which Lovington didn't."

Although most of the Warriors' positive showings were on offense, several Ruidoso players also did well on defense. Sophomore Tommy Crow intercepted a pass and junior Scott Ciraulo recovered a fumble.

The Warrior offensive line also had probably its best game of the season. Tight end Gary Burgess and split end Justin Smith did well in place of Mike Douglass and H. R. Lueras, who were out with the flu.

Ruidoso will open the district 3-AAA season Friday with a home game against Cobre. The Warriors defeated Cobre 20-6 last year. The game will start at 7:30 p.m.

## Capitan defense tough in 6-6 tie at Dexter

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

## Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Lots of folks agree with Fab.

He, of course, is Fabian Chavez, perennial Democratic candidate, who ran for governor in this year's primary and was given a sharp trouncing.

What he's talking about now is that proposed constitutional amendment we will vote on this Fall to make many judges' posts non-elective.

He's against it. So are many others, and for most of the same reasons Fabian cites.

His expertise in the matter comes from five years as chairman of the state Legislature's Criminal Justice Study Committee. That makes his opinion worth something.

Chavez makes these points in criticizing the proposal:

To call a system for appointing judges "merit selection" is to use a phony catchphrase which ignores reality. In fact, the system substituted for election is blatantly political.

Those who want to be appointed simply politick the committee charged with making recommendation and the governor, instead of going to the voters.

The amendment, as drafted, calls for the Judicial Standards Commission to recommend to the governor "all persons qualified" for judicial appointment when an opening occurs. That could end up being a third or more of the attorneys in the state.

The amendment also says the Judicial Standards Commission, which already has power to recommend to the Supreme Court that incompetent judges be removed from office, will tell the voters before a justice or judge comes up for a retention election results of its evaluation of each judge and justice.

Chavez logically asks if the group which recommended the person for appointment in the first place is likely to criticize him or her later.

The argument which seems to move most of those who agree with the Chavez thesis is simply that all three branches of government should be responsible in some fashion to the electorate.

Judges may feel they are above that sort of thing, as some apparently do, but many voters are jealous of their right to have some substantive part in the selection even of the judiciary.

Many feel the popular will should be reflected there, as well as in the other two branches of government.

Besides, as Fabian also points out, nobody has ever clearly shown that an appointive bench is superior in any way to an elective one. "I challenge those who think otherwise to prove it," he adds.

He also criticizes the amendment we will be voting on this year for inconsistency. It does not, for instance, remove the magistrate judges from the elective roll. They will, under this plan, still be chosen by the voters, a fact which leads Chavez to say politics has already infected what is described as a non-political process.

It's when he gets into his sweeping criticism of all lawyers that Fabian shakes some and pleases many.

"I found out during my years of study of the judicial system that we cannot leave the administration of justice to the judges and the lawyers," is the way he puts it.

All proposals for judicial reform, he claims come from lay people.

And just to frost the cake a little, Chavez goes out by inviting those who disagree with his views, attorneys or publicly, to debate the matter with him privately.

Many here think Chavez would prevail if such a debate takes place.

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## Clipped comment

### WILDERNESS INTACT

Those who believe energy companies and environmental groups refuse to compromise should be heartened by the Capitan Mountains Wilderness agreement just announced.

Frank Yates of Artesia and Public Lands Exploration Inc. Of Dallas have agreed not to slant drill into the Capitan Wilderness. In exchange, the Sierra Club has agreed not to pursue its suit to stop exploratory work on land adjacent to the wilderness.

The original lease approval last October was issued by the federal Bureau of Land Management. It broke with the long-standing federal policy of protecting wilderness areas from such leases. The Sierra Club had sued because the leases were issued without public hearings or an environmental assessment.

The main importance of the agreement is that the Capitan Mountains Wilderness will remain unscathed by energy development. It may also serve as a precedent should the federal government issue similar leases in the future. —Albuquerque Journal

### SERIOUS BUSINESS

No doubt few laymen would be deeply moved one way or another were scientists to announce that a decaying proton had been found. Decaying or in the best of health, protons are not for most of us the stuff of high drama.

It ought to be of some general interest, all the same, that the experts in this arcane field think such a discovery would be of stunning importance. Long-range, yet stunning nonetheless.

There they are, teams of them, in an Ohio salt mine, a Utah Dakota gold mine, a silver mine in Utah, an iron mine in Minnesota, and various sites deep underground in other countries. What they have in common is that in these places insulated from cosmic ray interference they seek proof that protons are not eternal, but ultimately subject to decay.

This would suggest that maybe 10,000 billion billion years or so hence most of the protons would be gone and the whole universe would vanish. Long-range, as noted — but serious business — Alamogordo Daily News.

## On the Village Beat

"Who is Ralph Rush and why are people saying terrible things about him?"

Once in a while, a writer will dream up a title (that one is an adaptation of a play title), and, so his cleverness doesn't go to waste, write a piece to go under it.

Some months ago, I invited Mr. Rush to drop by and talk, and he took me up on the offer last week after reading about himself in the paper again.

Ralph Rush, for the uninitiated, is the fellow who leased the village swimming pool in School House Park last year. He then installed a water slide.

Rush explained that his idea to bring a water slide to Ruidoso is what led him to lease the pool in the first place, after deciding it would not be feasible to build his own pool.

He was already in the eagre business, having helped start Egle Creek Ski Area, plus a ski rental business, a go-kart track and a miniature golf course after moving here in 1975.

Rush said he heard the village was losing money operating the swimming pool, so he looked into taking it over. He was told the voters would have to approve the lease in a special election.

He said he was also told he would have to pay \$1,000 for election costs. But as it turned out, he recalled, the pool question was voted on in the March 1981 special election when voters approved issuance of bonds for police, fire, sanitation and street improvements.

"This is kind of when it started," said Rush. He admitted he has always been a little irate that the village wouldn't just put the lease question on the ballot, without charging him.

But he went ahead and leased the pool and installed the slide. Then halfway through the summer of '81, he said, he discovered he was losing money.

Rush contends that he was told by the village that in the summer of '80, the pool had grossed \$8,000 and cost \$9,000 to operate. He says he grossed \$38,000 in '81, but still lost money.

Why? According to Rush, the village had given him figures that were "completely, grossly in error." He claims the village neglected to put in start-up costs and that it pulled chemicals for the pool from the water department.

"So I went and said, 'You guys lied to me—it's to the point of fraud,'" said Rush. He also failed to pay his last lease payment and his water bill.

He withheld the letter, he said, after finding out he was being charged for water used to water the grass at the park.

Rush said he wanted to renegotiate the lease, since he felt he had been knowingly or unknowingly misled. His contention, he said, was that the village could let him run the pool for nothing and still come out ahead, since the village would not be losing money operating it themselves.

But the village sued Rush for the \$7,000-plus he owed, and canceled the lease. The court ruled in favor of the village, and threw out a countersuit by Rush.

That was when he learned about "sovereign immunity," said Rush. He interprets that to mean the city can lie and

get away with it. Now negotiations for the sale of the water slide to the village are in progress. It was Don Dale's council at last week's council meeting that the council "might be buying ourselves a bunch of headaches" by buying the slide that prompted Rush to talk to me.

Rush feels that since the village would be getting the slide for much less than he paid for it, such "slurs" are unjustified.

Personally, I think Dale's concern that popularity of the slide could diminish through the years—making it a poor investment—is valid. And his comment that councilmen should run their own businesses downtown (rather than commit the village to a business operation like the slide) is a point well taken.

But the darn slide is there, and something will have to be done with it. As far as Rush is concerned, he did what he set out to do when he leased the pool—provided a new form of recreation (the slide) to kids and tourists, and increased use of the pool substantially.

Rush pointed out that for a tourist town, Ruidoso does not offer very much for kids and tourists to do. He feels that he has contributed to the community with his recreational facilities.

"And what is he going to do now? I love this place and I'm not going to leave," he stated. Rush said he is planning to put a miniature golf course next to his "formula cars" track by the Pizza Hut.

He and the village have some differences over the car track, too. But that, as they say, is another story.
