## Airport commission weighs study results

The results of a study by the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) on the research by New Mexico State University on Fort Stanton Mesa has led the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) to seek guidance on the next step in its efforts to acquire a preferred site on the mesa for a regional airport.

SBAC met in a special meeting Thursday to discuss the study's conclusions. The NAS was commissioned in March to evaluate New Mexico State University (NMSU) range research at the 26,000-acre Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch. One of the objectives of the study was also to determine the impact of an airport on the research.

The NAS committee concluded that an airport on the preferred site, known as Site B, and the research could not coexist. NMSU leases the land which includes Site B from the federal Bureau of Land Management.

At Thursday's meeting, SBAC chairman Fred Heckman noted that the commission, NMSU and U.S. Senator Harrison Schmitt agreed at a February 1980 meeting to seek an independent analysis of the research and abide by the conclusions if the evaluation was found to be objective.

Heckman also said they agreed the process would be split into two parts—the first was the evaluation and the second is the political decision based on the results.

"Now the political decision must be made," Heckman said.

The members of the commission—including Heckman, who represents Ruidoso; Harold Mansell, representing Ruidoso Downs; Benny Coker of Capitan; and Ben Hall, from the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners—agreed to bring four courses of action to their governing bodies to get direction on the next step. The Mescalero Apache Tribe also is part of SBAC, but did not have a representative at the meeting.

The four alternative approaches now are:

- To seek political support for construction of an airport on Site B.
- To agree the research should continue and to seek an alternative site for the airport. As far as SBAC is concerned, Heckman said that would be Site A, which

is also on the mesa, and is a mixture of federal, state and private land. A small portion of Site A lies on the land NMSU leases for its experiments.

•To continue with Ruidoso's present airport and to "forget everything."

•To apply for review under the Administrative Procedures Act—which may lead to a court case—if the governing bodies feel the evaluation was not properly done.

Mansell said he thinks "it's been proven the study is ridiculous," and added "as far as I'm concerned, I'd just as soon go through the legal steps."

But State Senator Charlie Lee warned the commission that it should look into the appeals process before taking the matter to court. He noted that he had once gone through the same procedures, and it was not resolved for over two years. He suggested SBAC examine the procedure to be able to inform the governing bodies on what is involved.

Lee also told SBAC he thought the commission's efforts to explain its case before state farm groups last summer had "made inroads" with the organizations, and he suggested SBAC continue to seek support from the local Farm Bureau and Soil Conservation Service.

Heckman noted that this year's political campaigns are nearing an end, and that commitments from candidates would be very important to the commission. SBAC decided to write letters to candidates running for Congress; gubernatorial candidates; and candidates for state land commissioner.

After Schmitt released the study results last week, he said he was disappointed in the conclusions, and he reaffirmed his commitment to help SBAC acquire a location for an airport. Republican gubernatorial candidate John Irick also reaffirmed his commitment to helping SBAC, as did U.S. Representative Joe Skeen.

Last April, after a fatal airplane crash near Ruidoso's main street, Sudderth Drive, Democratic governor candidate Toney Anaya pledged his support in a news release to helping SBAC work with NMSU on land trades on the mesa.

At the beginning of Thursday's meeting, Heckman read the eight conclusions of the NAS study.

The first conclusion is that "construction of an airport at Site B would materially af-

# Developer doubts Water Board

The Ruidoso Water Board's projections showing the number of housing units the water system will support through the end of the decade have come under fire by Grindstone developer Don Dorman.

Dorman, whose annexation request for 152 acres of the Grindstone Resort Community is scheduled to be heard by the Village Council Tuesday, claims the board's calculations that one acre foot supplies four housing units exaggerates residential usage and misrepresents the water situation as being more critical than it is.

"The critical need may not be as critical if my numbers are more representative," said Dorman.

Dorman contends the board's figures are not accurate because the percentages of water consumed by residential and commercial users are not separated in the figures developed by the board.

Water Board chairman C. Newton Page does not dispute that his committee has

left out commercial units in the water usage ratios, but he thinks the board's projections accurately reflect the amount of water required to service the village.

"Our basic assumption is that the growth of schools, restaurants, businesses and the hospital are growing at the same rate as residential," Page said.

To clarify the numbers, Page explained how the board made the calculations.

When his committee started out two years ago, Page said, it was looking for means whereby it could take current usage rates and project them onto levels which the water system could support.

The easiest way to make the predictions was to take total yearly water production and divide it into the amount of house units, Page explained. The board took the housing figure from the 1980 census.

Taking those housing numbers, which totaled 5,411 on the census chart, the board divided the 1,340 acre feet produced by the village in 1980 into the housing and got the four units per acre foot figure.

"The production increased significantly in 1981," Page noted, but the housing total,

which was determined by adding building permits to the census count, increased only slightly. This resulted in an even lower units-per-acre-foot number than the previous year. But Page attributes that to 1981 being a dry year.

The data so far for 1982 shows that the housing unit per acre foot figure—at 3.97—has returned to the 1980 level.

Working on that assumption, the board projected the capacities of the water system through the decade. As of May this year, residential building permits and approved condominiums brought the housing to 7,418 units. But the water rights the village can now use total 1,795 acre feet, which could support only 7,180 units at the four-to-one ratio. Thus the board argues that the present system already is over-committed.

Going a step further, the Water Board noted that 6,831 lots which are not yet built on are planned in the village. If 50 percent saw construction by the end of the decade, housing units would increase to 10,833.

Assuming Ruidoso by mid-decade will be able to impound 730 acre feet in effluent water credit that is now lost downstream, the available water would increase to 2,525 acre feet. This could supply 10,100 units, the board determined. Even with the proposed Grindstone reservoir on line, the system would be overloaded by 733 units.

Those were the final conclusions of the Water Board, and the numbers are what led the committee to request that annexations be required to bring in their own water rights.

Asked why commercial structures were not counted in the housing numbers, Page explained that the water produced is needed to supply households and all the services required by residents. He recognizes that each house probably does not use the 81,500 gallons yearly represented in the four-to-one ratio, but the board says that is what is needed to support the lifestyle of residents. One acre foot equals about 326,000 gallons.

Maintaining the residential-commercial growth proportions is the key element in the board's projections. Page believes as residential growth increases, commercial

services will be needed at the same ratios as now exist, and the house unit figure will remain about the same.

But Dorman contends commercial expansion will fall behind residential, and he believes available water supplies will service 75 percent more house units than the Water Board claims.

Separating residential metered water from commercial use for the first nine months of 1982, Dorman saw that housing absorbed 56.4 percent of the metered water while commercial users required 43.6 percent. But Dorman also found that metered water accounted for only 62 percent of the water produced—the rest is lost in the system.

Dorman projected the metered water percentage levels through the rest of the year, and estimated that residential use will total 866 acre feet of the 1,571 acre feet that should be produced this year.

Dividing that number into the 6,243 house unit figure for 1982—which is the same housing number used by the Water Board—Dorman arrived at a ratio of seven units per acre foot of water.

Dorman took those numbers and projected what the present capacity of the system could support using 1,795 acre feet. He reduced the 38 percent waste level to the 20 percent rate that is considered as acceptable loss for a municipal system and allocated the increase in available water to all users. He also divided the remaining wasted water into the residential and commercial figures accordingly.

Dorman then estimated that available water for residential users would account for 67 percent of the total, or 1,210 acre feet. Multiplying that number by the seven unit ratio, he said the present system could support 8,470 housing units—considerably more than the Water Board's estimate of 7,180.

Assuming the system could support housing at a seven-to-one ratio, Dorman determined that the total water available with present water rights at the end of the decade could supply 12,565 housing units.

fect" NMSU's range grazing research by reducing or eliminating grazing studies and faculty and student activity at Fort Stanton.

The second conclusion says disruption of the research would prevent full use of the university's investment at the site, and the impacts of the loss of the research would prevent NMSU from integrating individual studies into a model of grazing in Shor-grass Prairie.

Another result of the study says the ranch, because of its location and size, is an unusual facility for grazing research, and is representative of two broad types of vegetation in the Southwest. The study adds, "No other active stations have grazing research programs operating in this mix of vegetation types."

The study also concludes that the "core studies" of the grazing program would be disrupted. Those studies are continuous, deferred pasture rotation and short-duration grazing comparisons, plant response studies and enclosure studies. Other studies that would be impacted less severely are wildlife programs, plant competition studies, control of noxious plants and watershed studies.

The sixth conclusion says "it is unlikely the university could move the integrated

program to some other site if airport construction was approved," because no comparable sites are obvious, and relocation would require large investments. It also said the faculty would have to be motivated to repeat the work.

The seventh conclusion is disruption of the program is a serious matter, that the work is slow and tedious, and that disruption could have adverse effects on the morale and careers of the faculty and graduate students of the Department of Animal and Range Sciences.


The final conclusion says the impacts would reduce the efficiency and productivity of that university department in its role of testing ideas and concepts for the livestock industry and that the industry is of major economic importance to the state.

# Amendments include judge selection, fund use

Seven proposed amendments to the state constitution and a question regarding Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages will appear on the election ballot Tuesday, November 2, along with names of candidates for political offices. State Senator Charlie Lee visited The News last week to explain what voters will be deciding when they vote for or against each of these amendments.

The first proposed constitutional amendment on the ballot seeks "to provide for Judicial selection by appointment and for Judicial tenure." If this amendment is passed, the governor will be given the responsibility of appointing Supreme Court justices, judges of the court of appeals and district judges from a list of nominees selected by the Judicial Standards Commission.

The Judicial Standards Commission, created in 1967 for the purpose of investigating complaints and allegations against judges, is composed of nine members. Of the nine members, two are judges appointed by the Supreme Court; two are lawyers appointed by the Board of Bar Commissioners; and five are laypersons appointed by the governor. The terms for commission members are staggered, with laypersons serving five-year terms, while the other members are appointed to

four-year terms.

Under the "merit selection plan," as the amendment proposal is termed, the electorate will be given the opportunity to decide whether to retain each judge after he has served a four-year term.

Incumbent judges will be evaluated by the Judicial Standards Commission every four years. Their names will be placed on the general election ballot, with a recommendation from the commission for retention or rejection. If a majority of the voters decides against retention, a new judge will be appointed by the governor from a list provided by the Judicial Standards Commission.

Probate, municipal and magistrate judges are not affected by the proposed new judicial selection system. They will continue to seek election as do all judges under the present system. The present elective system does allow for appointment by the governor of judges to fill vacancies and newly created positions.

Senator Lee explained that the amendment was proposed in the Legislature by Senator Joe Mercer of Albuquerque. Lee said that the primary argument in Mercer's proposal was that "he felt a number of very qualified people, because of fear for the political arena, wouldn't submit their names for judgeship."

Local bar association president Mel O'Reilly agrees that appointment of judges through the merit selection process

proposed in the amendment would tend to fill judgeship positions with individuals who are most qualified rather than those who may be the best politicians.

Lee reported that he voted against the amendment proposal because judges "are public officials like anyone else; I felt the public should have the opportunity to decide." O'Reilly indicated that, although he favors the amendment, he feels that judges who know the residents of their jurisdiction—made possible through the process of campaigning—may be better able to serve that jurisdiction.

But proponents of the amendment point out that, under the elective system, incumbent judges must spend time away from their judicial duties to campaign. There is also the possibility that elected judges will feel indebted to their campaign contributors, proponents argue.

Lee agreed, however, that under the merit selection system, the governor may be able to control the judiciary because he appoints the majority of the members to the Judicial Standards Commission as well as having the final decision in appointing judges. O'Reilly did not agree that this would be the case.

The judicial reform amendment is an important issue in this election and deserves careful consideration by all voters before they arrive at the polls November 2.

The second proposed constitutional amendment on the ballot seeks "to remove the power of the Legislature to appropriate funds from the principal amount of the severance tax permanent fund." Senator Lee explained that the permanent fund consists primarily of taxes received from oil, gas, minerals and forestry.

Presently, legislators can submit proposals for utilizing these funds and approve the appropriation by a three-fourths vote of each house. The purpose of the amendment is to protect the permanent fund monies by requiring a referendum to approve removal of revenues from the fund, Lee explained.

The Senator said the permanent fund has been set aside primarily for future development and maintenance of schools. "The Legislature is asking the public to approve (the amendment) so legislators can't be pressured into spending permanent tax money," Lee reported. He said proposals have already been presented to use fund monies for railroad and pipeline construction.

These are worthwhile projects, Lee stated, but, if approved, the permanent fund monies will soon be spent. The result will be a return to a direct tax for projects the permanent fund had been designed to finance.

Lee said New Mexico is "one of the few states that is financially sound" and therefore should not need to deplete per-

manent fund resources.

Proposed constitutional amendment number three on the ballot November 2 is "to provide for an income tax exemption of \$3,000 of income derived from being a member of the New Mexico National Guard."

"The purpose is to try to provide an incentive from the state to enter the National Guard," Lee explained. Legislators agreed there is a need to strengthen our armed forces, he noted.

The fourth amendment question to be decided in the election is whether "to allow county sheriffs to serve unlimited two-year terms." Currently sheriffs can serve only two terms consecutively.

Lee reported that he voted against this amendment proposal because he feels sheriffs should not be singled out from other county officials to be permitted to serve continuing terms. Also, he believes this amendment is a "back-door approach" to allowing state officials to serve unlimited terms.

Lee said an amendment to allow state officials such as the governor and commissioner of public lands to serve unlimited terms has been on the ballot several times in the past but was defeated. Lee feels proponents of such an amendment are pushing for adoption of the amendment relating to county sheriffs in an effort to gain support for unlimited terms for state

officials.

The senator said an argument offered by legislators in favor of the proposed amendment on next Tuesday's ballot are that the public will still have the choice of whether to re-elect the incumbent sheriff. Opponents argued that the sheriff could establish strong ties in the community and maintain his position by pressure, Lee reported.

Lincoln County sheriff Ernest Sanchez, who has served two terms and is unable to run in this election, said he feels his department could offer more consistent service if the sheriff were permitted to remain in office. When a sheriff serves two terms, stays out for a term and is then re-elected, everything in the department may have changed.

Sanchez said he would like to add new programs and equipment to the department now but will not because his successor may not want them. The more time a sheriff is allowed to remain in office, the more time he has to set up effective programs, Sanchez noted.

He said if a sheriff is not doing a good job, the voters will remove him from office.

To arrive at that number, he added the 1,200 acre feet to 385 acre feet that he estimated would be allocated to residential users from the 730 acre feet in effluent. The 585 represents more water for residential use than the current 56.4 percent of the metered amount.

That higher average for housing complies with Dorman's belief that residential growth will increase at a faster rate than commercial.

Dorman also disputes the board's assumption that construction on current platted lots will progress at 50 percent by

1990. Dorman estimated 25 percent of the lots will be built on.

Taking 25 percent of the platted lots, which equals 1,708 units (of the 6,831 figure), and reducing the present number of existing housing and approved residential permits from the board's total of 7,418 to 6,831, Dorman suggests housing will increase to 8,539 units by the end of the decade.

Assuming the system could support 12,565 units, he arrives at a surplus of water of 575 acre feet at his seven-to-one ratio.

Dorman explained his projections. "When you speak of house units and pro-

jected growth, you've got to separate commercial from residential growth," he said. "I'm saying commercial use will not stay in the same exact ratio as residential. I'm stating flat-footedly use is one acre foot per seven house units."

R. B. Collins, district supervisor of the State Engineer's office in Roswell, said the state does not use either of those two methods for projecting water system capacities.

"I don't believe you can come up with anything possible on house units," he said. Collins said the reason the state engineer's office does not use house units in its figures is because occupancy levels

fluctuate too much.

Instead of applying house unit figures, Collins said, the state determines how much is required daily per person. He said the average in the state is 420 gallons per person daily in the summer, and 100

gallons in the winter.

To arrive at the annual requirements, Collins suggested the average between the two numbers probably would be accurate. That would equal 260 gallons daily per person.

Multiplying the average daily requirements per person by 365 days in the year, the annual need becomes 94,900 gallons per person—which is more than what the Water Board calculates for annual housing unit usage.

## DECA conducting rentals survey

Are you interested in the prospect of finding rental housing at reasonable rates in the Ruidoso area? The Ruidoso High School DECA chapter (Distributive Education Clubs of America) is currently conducting a market survey to determine the housing needs of permanent Ruidoso residents.

The club is conducting the survey for a Carrizozo-based corporation which is considering constructing a rental housing project aimed at low and/or moderate income residents.

"We're interested in the Ruidoso market, but not the portion of the market which is already well-established," Chuck Adams, chairman of the board of Chamari Incorporated, said. "Most of the effort is going into low income housing projects."

Adams said he feels rental housing affordable to low and moderate income residents has been neglected in Ruidoso. Builders should be more sensitive to the needs of the community in which they are building, Adams indicated.

He said that if the survey demonstrates a need for low income housing in this area, he will probably seek financing through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Housing and Urban Development or another federal agency which provides funds for such projects. Farmers Home Administration Lincoln county supervisor Shorty Green said a completed market survey is a required part of any application for FmHA financing of a low income multi-family housing project.

Adams said he always conducts such a survey before initiating any type of construction project.

The DECA club is receiving some com-

ensation for its work on the surveys, according to sponsor Eddie Parker, but is doing it primarily as a service project. He indicated that conducting a market survey such as this is good experience for the students.

Anyone who is interested in completing a survey form can contact Parker at 257-7324 or 378-4864, or contact any Ruidoso High School DECA member. Those filling out a survey form are under no obligation. Information required includes name, address, place of employment, income, current rental payments and types of services desired.

Adams said Friday the survey should be completed within a couple of weeks, after which the forms will be carefully studied to determine the rental housing needs of Ruidoso residents.

## BLM land sales a year or so away

The federal Bureau of Land Management (BLM), as a part of its Assets Management Program, will sell lands in Lincoln County, but not until at least October 1983, district information officer Hans Stuart said Friday.

BLM owns a large tract of land around Fort Stanton and many smaller tracts scattered throughout the county. The BLM administers the land where New Mexico State University conducts range research, which also includes the preferred Site B for the proposed Lincoln County regional airport.

The goal of the Asset Management Program is to "look at lands and determine how they can best be managed for the maximum public good," said Stuart. Isolated and small tracts that are difficult and expensive to administer are the ones most likely to be sold, Stuart indicated.

The income from the sales will be used to reduce the federal deficit, he said.

The Asset Management Program was created in response to an executive order signed by President Reagan in February 1982. According to an Interior Department fact sheet, the order directs members of all executive branches to "conduct a review of their property holdings which are not utilized, are under utilized or are not being put to optimum use."

Stuart said some land in Lincoln County will be sold as a result of this order but the BLM Roswell district offices have not received any specific instructions about how to proceed.

Before land can be specified for sale, economic, archaeological and en-

vironmental evaluations must be made. The method of sale can also vary. The sale could be to the highest bidder, or possibly to preferred customers such as nearby ranchers or cities for urban development.

BLM also lacks funds to proceed with the sale, a spokesman noted. Due to recent budget cuts BLM employees have been directed not to initiate any new programs, said Mel Varlow, realty specialist with BLM. Varlow said they should find out in December what money they have and begin to initiate the sales then.

James Abbott, Lincoln National Forest supervisor, said the Forest Service was also directed by Reagan's order but that an Act of Congress is necessary before any National Forest land can be sold. Abbott said the Forest Service has not started the process of identifying land for sale and does not anticipate any sales in the near future.

Stuart emphasized that "there always has been authority to sell land, especially scattered holdings." Before Reagan's executive order, lands east of the Pecos River in Lea, Eddy, Chaves, Roosevelt and De Baca counties had been generally evaluated, and Stuart said BLM had determined 5,000 acres that could potentially be sold. However, these lands will have to undergo more specific evaluations before they can be sold and will probably not be for sale for at least a year.

Stuart said that when the land is available there will be public notices 60 days in advance of the sale.

However, only surface rights to the land and not mineral rights will be sold, said Stuart. BLM will defer to the State Engineer on decisions about selling water

rights, he added. Stuart noted that land with any appreciable water above ground will probably not be sold.





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# Capitan defeats Mountainair 32-0 in Homecoming game

The Capitan High School varsity football team coasted to an easy homecoming victory over the Mountainair Mustangs 32-0 Thursday night despite having five touchdowns called back because of penalties.

The victory, coupled with Carrizozo's loss to Reserve 25-20, sets up next week's showdown with Carrizozo for second place in the district and a spot in the state playoffs.

After only one offensive play and less than two minutes elapsed, the Tigers had scored twice and led 9-0.

The Tigers blocked Mountainair's first punt and Danny Cummins ran up the middle for a five-yard touchdown on the Tigers' first play from scrimmage. Todd

Proctor's kick was good, giving the Tigers a 7-0 lead.

After Capitan's kickoff, Mountainair lost 13 yards on three plays. The hike to Mountainair's punter went over his head and out of the end zone, scoring a two-point safety for Capitan.

Mountainair's subsequent kick was returned to their 12-yard line, but David Beaver's touchdown run on the next play was called back because of an illegal procedure penalty. The Tigers fumbled to the Mustangs on the next play.

When the Mustangs came up three yards short on a fake punt, the Tigers got the ball on downs on the Mustang 35. Jon Todd Aguilar scored on a three-yard sweep around the left end after a drive highlighted by freshman Chris Peralta's 20-yard run to the fifteen.

By this point Capitan coach Mel Holland was shutting whole platoons of second stringers into the game.

The second quarter opened with the Mustangs mounting their only serious drive of the game, aided by two Mustang facemask penalties and a roughing the kicker call. Mustang quarterback Jack Smith completed three passes but the drive fizzled at the Tiger 38 and the Mustangs punted.

Aguilar's keeper for 37 yards helped the Tigers drive to the Mustang 15. But a clipping penalty and an illegal receiver downfield cancelled two Mustang touchdowns. The half ended without any other scoring.

Capitan drove 31 yards for the only score in the third quarter after both teams trad-

ed interceptions. The scoring play was a 13-yard pass from quarterback Dewey Keller to wide receiver Tim McElhannon running a slant-in pattern. The extra point made the score 23-0.

In the fourth quarter David Beavers ran a Mountainair punt back 40 yards to the Mustang 18 but the Tigers failed to score, having two more touchdowns called back because of penalties.

At that point the Mustangs put in their second string, which promptly lost 18 yards. Tiger linebacker Rudy Saiz tackled Mustang quarterback Smith in the end zone for another safety on the next play.

The Tigers' last score came on a 50-yard punt runback along the right sideline by Jerry Lobb, who used his blockers to spring him the last few yards into the end zone.

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## Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Almost every hunter, fisherman, camper, or backpacker has seen evidence of poaching. Most of these people probably even know a poacher. It may be a friend who takes a hen pheasant during season, a relative who shoots a dove out of season, or a neighbor who kills deer all year long. It often doesn't arouse much concern, but

this poaching is a serious problem in New Mexico.

There may not seem to be a problem with someone poaching one animal, but it has far reaching effects. Let's take deer for an example and see how poaching has reduced future populations.

Assume that one doe deer is killed. That doe will have two fawns almost every year during good conditions. One of the two fawns will probably be a female. This female will grow up and have two fawns every year also. In a five-year period, according to my calculations, there would be a total of 31 deer produced by one doe.

Take this process one step further. According to a study conducted in 1977 by the Game Department more deer were killed

illegally than harvested by licensed hunters. It was estimated that almost 34,000 deer were poached in New Mexico in 1977. It is reasonable to assume that half of these deer were does. Dividing 34,000 in half and multiplying by 31, results in a total of 527,000. This figure shows the number of deer that would have been added to New Mexico deer herds by 1982 if no poaching had occurred in 1977.

This example doesn't take into account a multitude of other factors involved with a deer herd. But it does show that the deer poaching problem has a tremendous effect on deer populations. If deer were not poached each year New Mexico deer hunters would have a bountiful crop of deer every year.

Deer are not the only animals poached, and the effects on other species can be even more drastic. Doves, quail, and pheasants reproduce even more rapidly than deer. These birds can have anywhere from two to 10 young a year, so the result of poaching can be even more disastrous.

All these animals belong to the people of New Mexico, not to the Game Department. So poachers are cheating hunters by killing animals during closed seasons or exceeding the bag limits.



## Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Any dispute over land titles is serious.

When it involves about two million acres in an area of New Mexico where there may be as many as 13 billion tons of coal in the ground, it's serious indeed.

That's what led former Governor Jack Campbell to say last week that it could be "a catastrophe for the state which if the Navajo Nation succeeds in the suit it recently filed.

That's the action in which the tribe asks for enough land to double the size of its present reservation. All the land in this suit, however, is within the confines of our state. It's also all in the mineral-rich northwestern quadrant of the state which we have been counting on to produce both direct and indirect revenue for New Mexico in the years ahead.

If you need a reason to make your choice for Attorney General and Land Commissioner carefully on November 2, this could well be it. Both these people will be highly important in this matter for their full term—as will many other such in the years to come.

What the suit says is that President Theodore Roosevelt, toward the end of his presidency, issued an order for the expansion of Navajo lands. Bowing to pressure, attorneys for the tribe says, Roosevelt's successor, President Taft, rescinded the order. He didn't do that legally is the claim, so the Navajos believe they have valid title to all the territory involved.

And, at least for now, titles are where the problems lie.

As Governor Campbell sees it, the lawsuit will put some cloud at least on the titles of all landholders in the area, reportedly something over 1000 in number. That in turn, the Governor says, will make it difficult for any serious development to take place while the suit is in progress. "I

think any financial institution being approached for money would take a very cautious line because of this lawsuit," Campbell says.

He compares the possible bad results of losing this one to what will happen if New Mexico loses the water case with El Paso.

The case was proposed as a class-action one by the Indians' attorneys. That means that everyone with any presumed title in the area can be sued as a group, without the necessity of bringing each to trial. It also means that many of those who may lose most will not be active participants in the suit, no matter its effect on their future.

If federal courts rule against the class-action aspect, according to Charles Carpenter, another Santa Fe attorney with experience in the energy area, you can count on the abstractors getting rich.

"There will be years of checking to do on every plot of land in the area in question," he says. "And while that goes on, title to every one of those pieces will remain doubtful."

What's more, you can expect to see more Indian lawsuits before the year is over.

The last extension of time for filing of such claims is scheduled to run out the end of this calendar year, so tribes must get their cases on the record by that time.

We already have a suit from the Zunis laying claim to much of the water in the Zuni river, Rio Nutria, Rio Pescado and their tributaries. The Taos Indian people also claim title to all streets, alleys and public lands in the city of Taos.

More such actions will be forthcoming.

Not even the lawyers, who stand to get rich on the litigation involved, see this as being healthy either for the presumed owners of the lands involved or for relations between the Indian and non-Indian peoples in the state.

Bad times ahead.

"LET THE SUN SHINE IN"

Our advice to Al Junghe is to get out of the shade and conduct the Village business in the open. There would be no need for this letter if Mr. Junghe would have continued his "diplomacy without publicity," however since he is prone to write letters to the editor bragging on his self-claimed accomplishments we believe there should be a reply stating the pertinent facts with regard to the Fawn Ridge signed agreement.

Rather than give a boring blow by blow account of the different committees' functions, we can summarize that the following list of concessions were made by Junghe's committee to Bill Elliott (Fawn Ridge) from those recommended by the Fawn Ridge Protest Committee.

1) The Fawn Ridge payment of \$1,500 for hook up charge for a 2-inch meter was omitted.

2. The normal procedure of the village installing one of the Village's meters was turned over to Fawn Ridge who will "install a meter" (Their Meter?)

3) Changed the charge for water from one being the same as that charged village residents to "the maximum commercial commodity charge" (this will amount to less than what village residents pay for their minimum charge.)

4) Omitted the clause whereby Fawn Ridge total units would be limited.

5) They omitted the clause whereby the village would only be obligated to the total amount of water that the village pumped during each separate year.

6) They omitted the clause whereby the village would lease the Fawn Ridge water right for that particular well or wells whenever they became permanently dry.

Items 1, 2, 3 and 4 above are not conformable to the Village water ordinance # 82-12 which was passed last month (Mr. Junghe was chairman). The signing of this agreement is considered an act of questionable legality since the Council failed to first revise the Village Ordinance. The Council thereby acted contrary to that which they were sworn to uphold.

In item 5 they failed to protect the water rights of the citizens of Ruidoso in that the Village is now obligated to furnish Fawn Ridge up to 12 acre feet of water per year regardless as to whether the Village ever uses any of the wells that are under protest.

By not enabling the Village to lease the unused Fawn Ridge water rights we must now reduce the available water right of the Village by some 12 acre feet in our projections. In complying with the State Engineer we can lease these rights in the amount that they have been used for their beneficial use. This historical use would be our basis for maximum liability per well to Fawn Ridge. By using Bill Elliott's figures this would currently amount to some 180,000 gallons per month. This is considerably less than the guaranteed 483,775 gallons noted under the agreement.

At the current known asking price of water rights the Village is pledging some \$120,000 worth of water rights to protect their interest in an investment of what could be only \$35,000. One of the wells under protest has water tested to be so bad that I doubt that it will ever be used for potable purposes. A second well is over a half-mile away and in a separate geological fault block which we believe is sufficient evidence to have it lifted from the protest.

### Editorial

The ball is in the Supreme Court.

Village officials are counting on the state court to rule this week on the validity of Ruidoso's July bond issue election in which voters approved an \$8 million water improvements program.

The fact that the matter is now in the hands of the court is a relief, because the village needs to have an answer soon on whether it can proceed with its plans.

But it is also frustrating, because the matter wound up there through no fault of the village.

What we have here, as the line goes, is a failure to communicate. The village did not know the state's reclassification of the county's bonding category could affect our bond issue.

Why? Because the state did not tell us. In fact, they gave us every indication that everything was fine.

Since the village proceeded in good faith, since the law is unclear about when the reclassification takes effect, and since the village overwhelmingly approved the bond issue, it seems there is no way the court can reasonably rule against us.

But since this is a judicial rather than legislative body we are talking about, we can't very well call them on the phone and tell them how to vote, like we can our lawmakers.

All we can do is keep our fingers crossed.

And we can always hope the state gets its act together someday.—TP

## On the Village Beat

Rolland Ramos and I were privileged to represent The Ruidoso News at the recent convention of the New Mexico Press Association in Albuquerque.

This 74th annual get-together of newspaper people was, for me, a whirlwind of meeting people, attending seminars, meeting at banquets, being convivial at the hospitality suite and all-around hectic activity.

But we sure enjoyed ourselves—though it took most of last week to recover and wind down.

A legal seminar conducted by Associated Press state bureau chief Kent Walz and Albuquerque attorney Michael Gross was especially informative. State Supreme Court Justice William R. Federici briefed us on the new "Shield Law," which takes effect November 1.

A shield law gives a journalist the right to keep his sources of information confidential, unless certain conditions apply. A previous law was passed by the state Legislature in 1973, but the state court threw it out, saying the Legislature could not write such a law.

So the court, in the person of Federici, drafted a law. Albuquerque Journal editor Jerry Crawford was the prime mover of "Rule 514," beginning in 1978. Crawford explained that those advocating a shield law wanted to eliminate some legal expenses for New Mexico newspapers by giving the courts guidelines—"something that would avoid testing the First Amendment all the time."

Under the rule, a reporter who refused to divulge a source of information would be tested as to whether he had kept the information confidential (not told it to any person other than his editor, for example); and whether he got the information "in the course of pursuing his professional activities."

Participation in any act involving physical violence, property damage or criminal conduct disqualifies the reporter from invoking Rule 514. For example, the rule would not apply if a reporter broke into someone's office to look at the files.

A party seeking to learn a reporter's source of information has to show four things: first, that the information or sources are material and relevant to the action; second, that alternative means of getting the information have been exhausted; third, that the information is crucial to the case of the party; fourth, that the party's need of the information outweighs the public interest in protecting the source.

Thus the burden of proof is on the party seeking the information, not on the reporter. Justice Federici and Crawford indicated satisfaction with Rule 514,

despite its falling short of absolute privilege.

And, as Crawford said, the reporter can always go to jail if he still refuses to divulge his source after being ordered to do so by the court.

Gross, who has represented the Albuquerque Journal in some important litigation, warned us that reliance on a confidential source is our "Achilles' heel."

He urged the press to try to get the information elsewhere. Gross also made the point that all newspapers in the state have to live with the decision handed down by the courts in any single case.

It was interesting to observe the cooperation between the judicial branch of state government, represented by Justice Federici, and the press. Also, references to lawsuits against the Albuquerque Journal led me to believe that newspaper has been sued many times.

After seeing their new plant, I also believe they can afford to defend themselves. The NMPA was the first group to tour the new Albuquerque Publishing Company building on the north side of the city.

It is impressive. Rolland and I were gawking like country boys come to the big city when we saw the incredible machinery. An elaborate overhead conveyor system carries newspapers from the presses into machines which drop in advertising inserts automatically.

This is in contrast to our system, which has kids doing the inserting by hand.

Our tour also passed by the newsprint storage area. As we looked across a room holding 80 double-size rolls of newsprint, our guide told us those rolls and more would go into the next day's (Sunday's) paper.

We use about two rolls of newsprint per issue.

But the Journal and Tribune use the same make press (Goss) we do. And once we got over the size and newness of the plant, we realized that it was just a large-scale version of ours, serving the same function—putting out the newspaper.

There was much more of interest and value at the convention, and I think I can safely predict that some recognizable changes in the content and appearance of The Ruidoso News will come out of it.

But I guess the major benefit, as far as I'm concerned, was an intangible. That is that feeling one gets from gathering with colleagues, exchanging ideas, coming away stimulated and glad to be "a part of it all."

In my case, it made me feel glad to be part of the New Mexico working press.
