

# Area candidates state qualifications

The News recently interviewed all local, opposed candidates for office. The candidates were asked why they think they are the best choice for the office. Their answers are listed below.

The Republican nominee for the District 56 State Representative seat is Fred D. Collins of Artesia.

Collins cites his 20 years in politics as the main qualification for State Representative. He is vice-chairman of the Eddy County Republicans, he has been on the state Central Committee of the Republican Party for 12 years, he was a New Mexico delegate to the 1976 GOP national convention, and he is the northern Eddy County coordinator for U.S. Senator Harrison Schmitt.

# Court rules bond election okay

The controversy surrounding a dispute between Ruidoso and the state Department of Taxation and Revenue on collection of a tax to finance the Grindstone Canyon dam project was resolved in Ruidoso's favor by the state Supreme Court Wednesday.

The court announced yesterday that it will enter a permanent writ of mandamus directing the state taxation department to collect the one percent supplemental municipal gross receipts tax beginning January 1, 1983.

The court's written order to that effect will be entered shortly, reflecting its oral decision. This will result in bond counsel being able to render a favorable opinion upon the municipal gross receipts tax bonds.

"In a nutshell, this means that the dam will proceed as scheduled," said village attorney Lee Huckstep. Huckstep and village manager Jim Hine traveled to Santa Fe to present Ruidoso's case. Basically, the village's position is that it held the July bond election in good faith, and that it should be allowed to proceed with the financing scheme for the

water project that voters approved.

The dispute resulted from a change in Lincoln County's salary classification. The change from a Class C to a Class B county prohibits municipalities in the county from participating in a special state law allowing imposition of a one percent tax to finance water system improvements.

But Ruidoso officials have argued the change does not take effect until January 1—even though the county was notified last spring. The village contends that it held the July election in good faith, thinking the change was not effective until 1983.

But Ruidoso was informed two weeks ago from the tax department that it would not collect the tax.

That action led the village to seek an immediate ruling from the high court so bonding authorities would know if they could begin selling revenue bonds before the end of the year.

The bond counsel is Sutin, Thayer and Browne. Huckstep noted that bond counsel writes and attaches an opinion stating that the bonds are passed in accordance with the law. The opinion allows the holder of the bonds to receive tax-free income.

In a telephone interview following the court's ruling Wednesday morning, Huckstep described the brief hearing.

According to the village attorney, the Village of Ruidoso was first to present its case, followed by Taxation and Revenue. After the court heard both sides, justices made their decision in private.

After making its decision, the court instructed the attorneys for both parties to prepare an appropriate form of order which will then be signed by the court and entered as the final order of the Supreme Court.

Counsel for the village, John Conway, will now consult with Taxation and Revenue to draft the form of the order, Huckstep said. The Supreme Court indicated it will sign the finished form, he added.

According to Huckstep, the first question in the hearing from Chief Justice H. Vern Payne to Taxation and Revenue was, "Why are you even concerned about this?" That question provided Ruidoso's representatives the indication from the court they were looking for.

Huckstep said the ruling "was more than we'd hoped for at this point in time."

"We did not think the matter would be resolved in toto today ... but it was."

So sale of the revenue bonds will be authorized and the tax will be collected. "On behalf of the governing body of the Village of Ruidoso, the election was ordered and held in good faith and justice has prevailed," said Jim Hine.

"We thought at all times we were following the laws and rules and regulations, and the court has ruled that we did."

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said village hall employees responded enthusiastically when news of the ruling hit Ruidoso.

"Go get 'em," Potter said he told the employees. He said he was referring to getting the project back on track.

Mayor George White said, "I'm happy to hear they gave the decision in our favor."

The mayor noted that the ruling will provide a precedent in case other communities that pass the special tax for water are caught in a similar situation. White also noted that now, approval is given to increase the local gross receipts tax January 1 from 4.25 percent to 5.25 percent.

## GO bonds sold, annexation deferred

The Ruidoso council took a big step toward getting the financing of the Grindstone Canyon reservoir project underway Tuesday when it approved the sale of \$2 million in General Obligation (GO) bonds.

According to state law authorizing the funding structure of the \$8 million water improvements project that voters passed in July, one-quarter of the program has to be funded with GO bonds—which are paid back with property tax revenues—with the remaining amount to come from revenue bonds. Those bonds will be retired with money from a one percent gross receipts tax increase.

The confusion about whether the village could proceed with the revenue bonds and raise the sales tax—created because of a change in the county salary classification—was cleared by the state Supreme Court yesterday. With the court's ruling favorable to Ruidoso, the village now has a green light to continue the financing structure.

Darrell Fowler, financial consultant with Stern Brothers of Albuquerque, said Wednesday the GO bonds had to be sold before the revenue bonds. He said the bonds are earmarked for improvements in the water supply system besides construction of the dam, which will be financed mainly from the revenue bonds.

Earlier Tuesday, the village okayed the bid from Kirchner, Moore and Company; Coughlin & Company; and Dain Bosworth, Incorporated. The bid came in at 10.5 percent interest averaged over the life of the bonds.

Fowler said the bonds will be retired by 1996, and there will be no additional property tax levy until sometime next year. Fowler would not speculate Wednesday what the tax increase will be because the change by 1983 in assessed valuation will determine the levy.

The ordinance passed Tuesday adopts the bond sale and sets the form of the bonds and the tax levy.

Preceding council's adoption of the ordinance, Fowler asked for approval of a resolution which authorizes the village to

return the bid deposit to the unsuccessful bidder and accepts the low bid. Council unanimously passed the resolution.

In a related matter, council placed the Grindstone annexation request in a committee composed of councilmen Frank Sayner and Don Dale until the outcome of the Supreme Court ruling on the bond election was known. Sayner said he did not want to take action on the annexation with the water issue in limbo.

In the pre-meeting study session, councilman Al Junge said if an item is placed in committee, then it is the committee's option when to place the matter again before the council.

About 20 persons left the meeting room after the action was announced on the controversial annexation request from Grindstone developer Don Dorman.

Also at Tuesday's meeting, councilmen heard several requests for ordinances and resolutions from village officials and from the audience.

Realtor John Hall asked for guidance on the shake shingle resolution that has been in confusion the past few months. The council granted a grace period in August on the requirement that wood shakes be treated with a fire retardant because builders had been unable to receive the treated shakes.

The council banned use of untreated wood shingles in May. But it was pointed out at Tuesday's meeting that the original resolution did not stipulate the shingles had to be impregnated with a fire retardant chemical—as was the intention of the council.

The document requires that builders be limited to using Class C shingles. Building inspector Don Hendricks said Wednesday a Class C rating is the best fire rating achievable with wood shingles. Other shingle ratings are Classes A and B—which are given to fireproof products.

Hendricks indicated shingles do not have to be factory treated to get a Class C rating. He noted the rating could be achieved by using an approved spray-on retardant.

## Downs seeks solutions to road, water problems

Frustration seemed evident among Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday as they discussed possible means of helping the village solve a few of its problems, such as water and unpaved roads.

It was reported that Herbert Quintana, with the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (EDD), had visited Ruidoso Downs recently and indicated he can find funds to pave some of the village's roads. Quintana told village officials, it was pointed out Monday, that he believes the State Highway Department and federal department of Housing and Urban Development will each pay half of the cost to pave some of the roads in the village.

The trustees all agreed that such a project would be of tremendous help to the village. The only roads now paved in Ruidoso Downs other than State Highway 70 are those in Los Lomas Subdivision. During each rain, rocks are washed off feeder streets onto Highway 70, creating a hazard.

But trustees Jake Harris and Bob Power disagreed about the need to stub out con-

nections to the sewer line before any paving is done. Harris suggested the village should do so for all houses which will have to tie on to the line, so the roads will not have to be cut after they are paved.


Power argued that the village cannot afford to do so and that residents are required to be tied on to the sewer line by June 1 anyway. He said road work will not be started before then.

Harris contended that many residents will be unable to tie on to the line by the deadline set up. He registered frustration when Power began arguing about details of line placements, saying the idea would require more thought than he had had time to give it.

Trustees finally passed a motion "to do the best we can to get behind Mr. Quintana on this paving." Quintana is scheduled to return to Ruidoso Downs Friday to work on details of applications for funding of the work.

Also discussed was a study report from Boyle Engineering on needs for the village's water system and a bill for \$7,500 for the study. The report indicated the village needs a one million gallon metal storage tank.

# Amendments cover legislators' pay, phone revenue

Voters in Tuesday's general election will be determining the fate of several proposed constitutional amendments as well as electing candidates to U.S., state and local offices.

In an effort to clarify the issues to be decided Tuesday, The News asked State Senator Charlie Lee to explain each of the amendment proposals. The first four listed on the ballot were discussed in Monday's issue of The News.

In the fifth amendment request, legislators are asking the public to increase their per diem and their mileage allowance for travel to Santa Fe. Current members of the Legislature are paid \$40 per diem and 10 cents per mile for travel to and from Santa Fe during each legislative session. The requested change in the constitution calls for payment of \$75 per diem and 25 cents per mile.

Senator Lee said legislators argued that they cannot travel to and stay in Santa Fe on the amount of money presently allotted

"They said they are losing money by serving in the Legislature," the senator reported.

Lee said he voted against the amendment "because I knew what the job paid when I hired on." He believes that the constitution was designed to form a citizen's government and those citizens serving in the government should expect to "spend their own time and money to represent the people."

Lee said some other states allot 27 cents per mile to their legislators for travel to and from the capital and about four or five states have lower allowances for legislators than New Mexico.

The senator said a proposed increase in per diem and mileage allowances has been turned down by voters several times in the past. Not much objection was voiced by legislators when the amendment was proposed, he reported.

The sixth constitutional amendment to be voted on Tuesday seeks "to include directory advertising and other directory listing service earnings, investment and

expenditures in fixing telephone and telegraph company rates."

Senator Lee explained that the state Corporation Commission guarantees a certain percent (14.25) of return profit to telephone companies. In fixing phone rates to allow that percentage of profit, the commission currently considers "the earnings, investment and expenditure as a whole within the state," according to the state constitution.

Revenues from Yellow Pages advertising have not been accounted for in establishing phone rates in the past, but they will be if the amendment is passed. The result would be that the Corporation Commission's review of phone company earnings would reflect a higher profit. This rate may be lowered so profits would not exceed the 14.25 percent guaranteed by the state, Lee indicated.

The senator said there was not much opposition to the proposal in the Legislature. Proponents of the amendment argued that the phone company has been able to get a fair return on its investments plus extra profit on the side from directory advertis-

ing. They contended that all earnings should be considered in "one package," the senator reported.

He said 47 other states have already adopted this type of amendment.

The final proposed constitutional amendment, if passed, would "permit county indebtedness for purposes related to the construction or acquisition of water and sewer systems, airports and sanitary landfills." This adds to the present purposes for which counties are able to incur indebtedness, which include erecting, remodeling or adding to public buildings and constructing and repairing roads and bridges.

Lee said this proposal "just sailed right through" the Legislature. It is an effort to help counties with small communities which do not have the power to generate revenue for such projects. Lee said it is also an attempt to compensate for cuts in funding from the federal level.

Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox said the amendment will probably not directly affect Lincoln County in the near

future. She said she does not entirely favor having counties provide water and sewer systems for its residents, but Lincoln County may be in the position someday of having to provide a county sanitary landfill.

Issuing bonds would be one of the possible methods of financing such a project, she noted.

Any proposed bond issues would require approval of county voters, which Cox termed a "protection." The county manager admitted that counties most likely will soon "have to broaden the services provided in the past."

The amendment to permit additional projects to be funded by the issuance of bonds by counties would provide one method of funding some of these services.

One question on the ballot Tuesday which will definitely affect Lincoln County, especially Ruidoso, is the one which asks voters, "Shall Sunday Sales of alcoholic beverages be made in this local option district?"

Senator Lee said the referendum was in-

cluded as part of the 1981 Liquor Reform Bill sponsored by Senator Les Houston of Albuquerque. The referendum is included on the ballot only in counties or municipalities which are already "wet."

If the majority of votes in Tuesday's election are not "for" on this question, Sunday sales of liquor by the drink will be banned in Lincoln County, the senator emphasized. He said he and a number of other legislators were not aware that the referendum was required as part of the liquor reform bill passed last year.

Lee pointed out that defeat of this referendum could have a major impact on a resort town such as Ruidoso.

All of the proposed amendments on Tuesday's general election ballot are important and should receive consideration from voters before they arrive at the polls. The electorate should feel a responsibility to voice its opinions on changes in the state constitution as well as on the individuals who will represent citizens in U.S., state and county government.

# Bond sale passed, Grindstone annexation deferred

Hall told the council that reletors are having a difficult time bidding on housing because they do not know which shingles are required.

Builder Johnny Jarratt explained that spray-treated shingles cost less than factory-impregnated brands, and he argued that spraying with a chemical is just as effective as the factory process.

Sayner said he would be satisfied with spray-treated products if the application is effective for five years. Sayner moved that the resolution be amended to allow either sprayed or impregnated shingles, as long as the Class C rating is maintained. Council approved the motion.

Council also approved a request from assistant village manager Frank Potter to authorize the Street Department to install culverts in driveways that obstruct drainage and to bill owners of the property for the work.

Potter told council the village spends \$20,000 a year installing culverts in driveways where property owners have blocked drainage. He noted the department recently spent \$3,000 in one area of town doing the work. Don Dale moved to instruct village attorney Lee Huckstep to draft an ordinance granting the authoriza-

tion. The council also approved three matters pertaining to the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z).

P&Z member Mike Mulholland requested the planning laws on building setbacks be updated to require setbacks from lot lines for commercial structures as well as residential. Mulholland noted setbacks are required for residential buildings, but only commercial structures abutting residential property are covered by the same setbacks.

In addition to the setback request, P&Z enforcement officer John Cupp asked that persons wanting to build on commercial or residential lots and anyone wishing to place mobile homes on lots be required to submit certified plot plans to P&Z.

An audience member suggested that architects be allowed to draw the plot plan, which he said would cut down the cost to the property owner.

But Cupp said many owners have submitted plans done by registered surveyors that placed structures wrong on property. Civil engineer Tim Collins concurred. He said 50 percent of the uncertified surveys locate buildings wrong on property.

The council approved the request for certified plans and the setbacks after P&Z

member Jim Paxton noted his commission has been burdened by requests for variances on buildings that do not conform to property clearance requirements.

In another P&Z matter, the council approved a request from Cupp to designate all commercial areas on the master planning map as C-1 (light commercial) areas. Cupp said the map shows the zones now only as commercial, which allows for any business venture. With the change to C-1, Cupp said new business owners will have to seek P&Z approval to erect buildings.

In other action, council:

—Approved a request from Tom Kent, owner of Cochera Restaurant, to have Huckstep draw up a lease for village property behind the restaurant that Kent desires for additional parking.

—Passed a resolution creating a special assessment sewer district in the Snowflake Ridge area north of the Swiss Chalet on Highway 37. The engineer for the sewer project will be named by the village.

—Approved drafting an ordinance pertaining to towing vehicles left on the roadside. Police Chief Dick Swenor said the law will bring the restaurant into conformance with court rulings that prohibit police from removing vehicles from public roads.

—Approved a request from Potter to draft a solid waste ordinance which will increase trash disposal rates. Junge said the increase will be from the current \$4 residential charge to \$6, and from \$7 to \$10 for commercial.

—Approved a request from Potter to amend a contract offer from the state Highway Department that commits the state to only \$17,900 in snow removal costs this winter. Potter said the price last year for clearing State Highway 37 was \$103,745. He requested permission to accept the contract on the condition the state furnish two snowplows for village trucks.

—Approved a bid of \$17,507 on a mobile home from a Roswell company. The bid was not the lowest submitted, Cupp told the council, but the trailer has a better resale value than the one bid lower.

—Gave Cupp permission to select a bid on a new fire truck. Cupp noted a bid from Stanco of Albuquerque was the lowest at \$75,292 on a Class A pumper, but that the company took one exception to the bid specs. A second company met specifications, but the bid was \$4,000 higher. Council

also approved a request from the fire department to add \$2,000 in options to the truck.

—Heard a letter from the planning commission giving its support to retaining John Schuller as P&Z chairman. The council rejected Schuller's resignation two weeks ago and appointed Dale and Sayner

to ask him to reconsider. Dale said they met with him, and he thinks Schuller may stay on P&Z. Schuller could not be reached for comment.

—Heard from Dale that the Forest Service has asked the village to consider whether it would want to lease 10 acres of land at the midtown lookout tower.

—Instructed councilman Benny Coulston to investigate the 911 emergency telephone service for the village.

—Heard from Cupp that he would like to hold an auction in two or three weeks on surplus village equipment. The items include vehicles, calculators, typewriters, and portable generators.

# Problems plague Downs trustees

Power complained that the engineering firm had earlier completed a similar study, at no charge, utilizing the same maps and charts. "There's \$7,300 that's blown in the head," the trustee stated. Mayor J. C. Day pointed out that the state construction grants administrator, Jeanne Zoltai, had indicated at a meeting in July that such a study would have to be done before the state will release the \$100,000 grant appropriated for use on the village's water system.

It was agreed that a representative from Boyle Engineering will be invited to the next meeting to explain whether and how this report differs from the one completed earlier.

Release of the grant money also requires matching funds, which the village has been unable to raise. Zoltai had said in July that she would look into other possible sources of funding.

"Gonna do's is all you hear," trustee Harrold Mansell commented about the promises for help with the village's lack of revenue.

"Well, do you have any better approaches?" the mayor retorted. Mansell agreed that the village should apply for possible matching funds even though he feels available monies will not

be granted to Ruidoso Downs.

Mansell handed out copies of the National Academy of Sciences report explaining its findings that an airport at the proposed site B on Fort Stanton Mesa would be incompatible with New Mexico State University (NMSU) research being conducted there.

"It's science and fact," Mansell stated about the report; "where I come from we call it b.s. and black magic."

Power said he believes Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt, who requested a study of the NMSU research site, had "snookered" the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) into believing an unbiased third party would conduct the study. Power argued that a team of professors could not be unbiased about a university research project.

"It's not an unbiased report; there's just no way it can be unbiased," he insisted.

Mansell informed the group of several options open to the airport commission in pursuing a site for a regional airport, including taking the matter to court or initiating purchase of an alternate site. The trustee indicated he prefers challenging in court the importance of the NMSU research.

"I'd like to take it through the whole process myself; I can't see that a prudent judge would say we didn't need it (the air-

port)," Mansell said.

He stated he will contact the trustees prior to the next SBAC meeting to determine their feelings on the matter.

In other business, trustees:

—Granted permission to the Ladies Auxiliary to hold a Christmas bazaar and bake sale in the municipal building December 4. A policy was adopted to allow any Ruidoso Downs non-profit organization to use the building's meeting room with the permission of the mayor or village clerk. A cleanup deposit will be required, they stipulated.

—Heard from village clerk Wilma Webb that the state Environmental Improvement Division has approved the village's sewer ordinance. Approval of the federal Environmental Protection Agency is still required before funds for the Biscuit Hill Wastewater Treatment Plant are released.

—Heard from Mayor Day that volunteers are needed to serve as flagpersons while the medians on Highway 70 are being cleaned up. He reported that 13 of the medians have already been cleared of trees and debris.

—Approved payment for Paula Smith to attend dispatcher's school.

—Heard from Day that the village's new tractor has been delivered and paid for.

# Hunter charged

Hunting out of season is not looked too kindly upon in Ruidoso.

Magistrate Judge James Wheeler let it be known recently with a stiff fine and a jail sentence that anyone taking shots at game that is not in season will have to answer for the crime if brought into his court.

Wheeler leveled a \$1,000 fine and a 30-day jail sentence on Cliff Richardson, 30, of Ruidoso for shooting into a herd of elk October 6—the day before the beginning of the elk hunting season.

# Employee injured

A village employee who was severely cut in an accident at the Upper Canyon water treatment plant Monday is in good condition at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital today.

Water Department worker Dick Brady was hurt in an apparent fall at the plant. He received head and arm lacerations in the accident. A hospital spokeswoman said he received sutures on the cuts and was admitted for observation.

# Condo conversion on P&Z agenda

A condominium conversion request will again highlight the agenda of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) regular monthly meeting Monday.

Jack Stahl, owner of the Village Lodge Motel, has resubmitted a request to change the motel into condominiums. P&Z tabled the request in September to seek a legal opinion on whether the conversion must meet ordinances for multi-family developments.

Stahl has argued that the conversion does not change the function of Village Lodge as a motel. In his September presentation, he suggested the business should not have to meet all requirements for condominium developments.

P&Z sought legal advice after members indicated differing opinions on the applicable laws.

# Warriors throw improved offense at Tigers

A big and physical Truth or Consequences (T or C) team will test Ruidoso High School's improving offense when the two teams tangle at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Truth or Consequences.

The Warriors, still winless with an 0-8 record, rolled up 287 yards total offense in last week's loss to Deming, their third best total this season.

However, wingback Grady Williamson, the Warriors' leading rusher this season, is questionable for the game with a sprained ankle. Williamson has twice gone over the

100-yard mark for a single game and has scored three touchdowns and a two-point conversion this season.

Junior halfback Eric Strobel leads the Warriors' scorers with seven touchdowns and is also a threat to catch the ball from quarterback Billy Woodul.

Woodul completed 14 of 20 passes for 140 yards against Deming. Freshman fullback Mark Langston has scored two touchdowns this season.

The Deming defense is anchored by tackles Larry Coslin (225 pounds) and Ken Woods (200 pounds). The ends are Rich Murry (180 pounds) and Gary Sullivan (185 pounds).

"We're going to have to control the ball on offense and not give their offense much of a chance to get on the field," Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt said. "They're a big and strong team, particularly in the offensive and defensive lines."

Woodul is again scheduled to start at quarterback with Strobel slated to go at halfback and Langston at fullback. If Williamson cannot start, Cyrus Simmons or Randy Reynolds may take his place at wingback.

Mike Douglass is scheduled to start at tight end and H. R. Lueras will go at split end. Craig Carson and George Gresham

will start at guard while Kip McClellan and Chris Wynn will start at tackle. Senior David Swalander will again start at center.

Carson, at 175 pounds, and Gresham, at 180 pounds, are the biggest Warrior starters.

Defensively, sophomore Manuel Montano and 170-pound senior Danny Hoffer will start at tackle. Hoffer is the biggest Warrior starter outside of Carson and Gresham.

Kevin Jameson and Gary Burgess will start at defensive end while Kyle Flack will go at middle linebacker. Gresham will start at one-outside linebacker spot while Strobel, Tommy Crow or Jessie Reynolds will start at the other outside position.

Simmons and freshman Russell Easter will start at safety while David Landrum and freshman Mike Williamson will probably go at cornerback.

Flack and Hoffer are the only seniors on the Warrior defensive unit. The rest of the

unit will return next season with more experience and size.

T or C is only 1-2 in district action, having lost to Silver City and Tularosa after defeating Cobre. But Stierwalt still respects the Tigers.

"We felt they should have defeated Tularosa," he said. "They're a solid ballclub."

The Ruidoso junior varsity will conclude its season at 8 p.m. tonight with a game in

Roswell against the Goddard High School ninth graders.

Last month Goddard defeated Ruidoso 38-0 in Ruidoso. However, the winless Warriors have improved and have only given up 14 points in their past two games.

Last week Ruidoso lost to Chaparral Middle School of Alamogordo by an 8-6 score but had several chances to score and win the game. The offense has been hurt by mistakes.

## Ruidoso spikers aim for second

The Ruidoso High School varsity volleyball team will attempt to nail down second place in the district 3-AAA title race when it plays at Silver City and Cobre Saturday.

Ruidoso is 4-4 in district action and 8-6 overall in the season. The Warriors are coming off a doubleheader loss to district-leading Truth or Consequences (T or C) last Saturday in Ruidoso. The Warriors lost the first match in two sets and the second one in three.

Despite the losses to T or C, several Warrior athletes played well. Lisa Williams, who had been a reserve much of the season, got her first start and did well at setting up and spiking.

Lori Morel, Dodi Baldonado, Laura

Trapp, Kody Taylor and Claudia Brantun are the other starters for the Warriors and have played well in the past three weeks. Morel, a senior, is probably one of the best AAA division players in the state.

He also instructed beginning girl gymnasts with Desert West Gymnastics before coming to the RGA job. He judged Arizona boys' gymnastics competition in 1978-79 and has instructed several beginning boys' gymnasts classes.

# Bill Karn thanks his lucky

"It's unbelievable that anybody could have the luck that I have," said Bill Karn, former uncontested king of the Hollywood radio producer-directors. What seems unbelievable is the story he tells as we sit in his "warehouse" cabin on the edge of the Cree Meadows golf course.

Born in Tucumcari when New Mexico was still a territory, Karn's career in radio, television and movies brought him in contact with just about every major actor, director and producer in Hollywood.

Sitting in his informally arranged cabin drinking cups of instant coffee while Karn smokes cigarettes continuously, it is hard to imagine this big burly man in the middle of Hollywood.

The kitchen is the only well-defined living area of the cabin—with cabinets, sink and a formica-topped table. Nearby is a rocking recliner, a lamp and a television on a wire stand. Outside of this small area the warehouse part of the cabin takes over. Bundles wrapped in brown paper line the walls. One of the first hang gliders in the country hangs above a window and the walls are plywood.

As Karn narrates anecdotes about Bette Davis, Joan Crawford, Jimmy Stewart, Henry Fonda, Bing Crosby and many others, it all seems incongruous and somewhat fantastic. But spread out on the table are scrapbooks with pictures, articles and scripts that verify the story.

His voyage from a graduate of Tucumcari High School to the top of his profession was a long one with many jumps and steps

that Karn calls unbelievable luck. No man, however, reaches the peaks he did without a substantial amount of talent and hard work.

When Karn graduated from high school he was offered a partial scholarship in music, but, as he put it, "the depression had other plans."

Knowing from his early childhood when he listened to dance bands on his huge crystal radio set that he wanted to enter radio, he bid his time, waiting for a break.

"A big, ugly Irish cracker salesman heard me singing with my friends in a local beer joint, during prohibition. He told me they were building a radio station at Pampa, Texas, and he knew Gilmore Nunn, the owner. With no other preparation, I went with him, Bob Rose, to Pampa and worked extra for JC Penney until the station held an audition. I got a job announcing. Five dollars a week and board and room," said Karn.

From there he moved to radio stations in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Dallas, Texas; Cincinnati, Ohio; and Chicago, Illinois, earning top ratings.

Listening to his mellow voice one can easily imagine taking all his advice when he was the voice of "Master Gardener" for a station in Texas.

When the second World War began Karn entered the army as private in the infantry but later entered the Air Force's Officer Candidate School. He became president of the Honor Council, following Clark Gable in that position.

During the war he was transferred to the Air Transport Command Station in Long Beach, California, where he first listened to two popular shows, the "Railroad Show" and "the Count of Monte Cristo."

"I knew I could write better scripts," he said. Not knowing that Hollywood buys full length movie scripts from a five-page outline, Karn wrote and timed twenty-six complete half-hour scripts and took them to Hollywood.

"A week later he (the show's producer) called and said he could use all of them if I would let him space them. Naturally I

would. Then came the bombshell. He was sorry but it was a short budget show and could only pay \$500 each. He could have had them for half that amount."

Karn got his break with NBC while he was still in the service. When a musicians strike cancelled NBC's weekly show with the Marine Corps Band Karn called and offered to fill in with a band he was working with. The band was "topnotch," said Karn. NBC accepted and when he appeared three hours early with a timed, balanced, rehearsed and ready-to-go program the powers that be were impressed. Homer Canfield, the NBC program director, said he could find a place for Karn when he got out of the service.

Karn took Canfield up on his offer and was hired as a producer-director in 1945. He worked for two years as an NBC associate director on "Blonde," "Bazooka Bob Burns," "Abbott and Costello" and "Amos and Andy."

"As I watched those high-powered agency men, I knew of a certainty that I was a better director than they," Karn said. "Many times I saw them give in to a star and settle for less than perfection."

Karn didn't do that when he was a director. Once when working with Bette Davis she threatened not to go on the air if a line were not removed from the script. Karn knew the script would suffer without it and prepared a statement saying, "Mrs. Bette Davis, in a fit of pique, has refused to go on. In her place..." He was prepared to go without one of the biggest stars of the day. Minutes before the show went on the air Bette Davis bowed to his direction and went on with the line in the script.

But he rarely had to be so forceful. Eddie O. Denault, executive producer of the television program "Dallas," remembers him as very easy to work with. Karn gave Denault his first job as assistant director on the television show "Dangerous Assignment."

"Explode on Bill Karn?" Edward G. Robinson once said. "Never. He knows radio better than I, and I respect his judgement and good taste."

"He is the only man stubborn enough to overrule me with enough charm to get away with it," said Lucille Ball in a magazine article years ago.

His big break came with the Screen Directors Playhouse, which adapted all of the major motion pictures and used the original stars. The first show was "Stagecoach" with John Wayne. NBC was looking for a director to do the western. NBC figured that Karn's background in Texas made him qualified for the position, so he was chosen as the director.

The show was originally scheduled for one week. But with the success of the first show it was scheduled for another week, then continued for three-and-a-half years and three hundred scripts. The show became the number one show in the nation. Karn worked with just about every major motion picture star. In his own words, "The only two I've missed are Clark Gable and Susan Hayward."

At the same time he was directing the Screen Directors Playhouse to the number one rating he was also producing and directing "Baby Snooks" and "Your Hit Parade" into the top ten. No one had ever put two shows into the top ten let alone three. His "Starlight Concert" was only number twelve.

He was tops in radio. But he saw the popularity of radio giving way to television. "About this time I decided television was going to be my forte," he said.

"He made the conversion very rapidly and beautifully from radio to television," Denault remembered. Denault went on to say that Karn was a very talented director with the ability to get the best performances out of his actors, cameramen and other crew members.

Karn started in television by taking "Dangerous Assignment" from radio to television. He also directed "The Schlitz Playhouse," "Gangbusters," "Uncommon Valor," "On Guard," "Thru the Porthole" and "The Bob Mathias Story."

It was while directing the "Schlitz Playhouse" that he met Nancy Reagan. "She was a 100-percent conscientious artist," he said. He remembered being especially impressed by Reagan and Barbara Hale who once worked alone during a lunch hour on a scene that had not been going well. When everyone got back from lunch the two women had reworked the awkward scene into a beautiful one.

"Thru the Porthole" was the number one children's show put on by the Lutheran Church. "I had more fun on this than anything I ever did. We made fun of everything," he said. He laughed when he told the story of the ventriloquist on the program.

The man was exceptionally talented but not especially smart. When he ran into

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

financial difficulties a friend explained a way out of them. But the ventriloquist immediately forgot. The people on the show hit on the idea of explaining the solution to the man's puppet. The puppet remembered everything, said Karn.

Karn was not content to work only in radio and television. He also worked in movies. "Maw Barker," "Gangbusters," and "Five Minutes to Live" were among the movies he directed.

Much of the radio, television and movies he did at the same time. He worked a tremendously strenuous schedule; seven days a week from seven in the morning to midnight.

"I suddenly woke up one morning and instead of looking forward to the day I dreaded it," he said. "I got tired." He realized that he had enough money to live comfortably. Since he no longer enjoyed his work, Karn decided he would retire as soon as he completed established commitments.

"When I finished those I took a vacation that has lasted until now," he said. He retired in 1960 at the age of 49.

After retiring he became heavily involved in racing. He went to the races every day for six years. He pointed to one of the boxes against his cabin wall and said he had \$100,000 worth of losing tickets stored away from one year in which he still won money.

He also enjoyed traveling. He said he used to carry a rack of clothes in his car. "If it was a pretty day I might not come back for a week."

He first started coming to Ruidoso with his family in 1947, "and like everyone else I fell in love with it," he said.

He watched the horse races at Ruidoso Downs when they were little more than match races and the spectators sat in bleachers. But he enjoyed them and said that he never missed a season from 1947 until 1973.

Now, Karn lives in Ruidoso part of the year and the rest of the time in Hollywood. While here he helps his son Bill build houses. Karn senior has done all the planning and drawings for the three houses they have built.

Karn still watches a fair amount of television. He is a member of the Arblton and Nielsen rating systems.

"I count as five thousand people," he said.

When asked if he doesn't miss the glamorous lifestyle of a top Hollywood producer and director he responded, "Do I miss it? No! I never missed it for a single day."

At the same time, however, he obviously enjoyed reminiscing about his Hollywood years and wrote recently, "It was a wonderful time in a wonderful industry...big names, big bands, big salaries...big achievement. I was very lucky."



# Core drillers explore Grindstone rock at dam site



**ADJUSTING THE PARTS** on one of the Sergeant, Hauskins & Beckwith drilling rigs is a rig operator. The geotechnical engineering firm is drilling along the axis of the proposed Grindstone dam to test the soil and bedrock. Workers plan to drill eight holes along the axis—all about 100 feet deep, which is the height of the planned dam.

While clouds shrouded the continuation of the Grindstone Canyon reservoir project because of a legal snag, drilling crews were working full time testing the dam site.

Crews on two drilling rigs from Sergeant, Hauskins & Beckwith have been punching holes into the soil and bedrock in the canyon for about two weeks. Information from the tests will provide engineers with valuable data on the stability of the area's geology.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said work never stopped on the engineering side of the project even though there was doubt until yesterday that the dam would be built. Potter noted that crews are working against the clock to complete core drilling and soil samples before winter weather sets in.

The engineering firm performing the tests is working under a \$61,000 contract. The work includes: finding location of borrow and aggregate; geologic field mapping and exploratory trenching; seismic investigation; test drilling and testing of permeability of the rock; lab testing; and engineering analysis.

# Lodgers concerned about tax collection

The Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA) asked for copies of the lodgers tax rolls this week in an effort to discover which lodgers are not paying the required tax. RLA was denied access to the list, however, because the information is considered confidential.

RLA directors feel that a number of people who are renting out accommodations are not charging the lodgers tax to customers. The directors have been spurred to action, said RLA president Clark Carpenter, by the large number of new condominiums and houses built in the last year. Carpenter and other RLA members believe that many of the condominiums and houses are being rented on a nightly basis, especially on busy weekends. According to state law, accommodations rented on a nightly basis are subject to lodgers tax.

RLA director Lowell McIntyre said the directors believe they can determine who is not paying the tax by checking the lodgers tax rolls.

However, when McIntyre asked for the tax rolls at village hall Tuesday he was told by village clerk Leon Eggleston and village attorney Lee Huckstep that the rolls contain confidential information and are not open to the public.

Eggleston told the News that the lodgers tax rolls are considered confidential.

because they report the gross receipts of the village's lodging business.

Eggleston said that Huckstep called the Taxation and Revenue office in Santa Fe concerning releasing only the names of lodgers who are paying the tax. Officials there, however, advised him not to release them.

"I don't want to see any of them (non-paying lodgers) get in trouble," said McIntyre. He explained that RLA directors just want to increase the revenues of the lodgers tax so that more money can be spent on advertising Ruidoso.

"The majority of the lodgers feel we

should advertise more heavily," McIntyre said.

He noted that the faltering economy and expected absence of Mexican tourists (due to severe peso devaluations) could mean fewer people visiting Ruidoso this winter.

"If we had more money in the lodgers tax fund we could advertise more to make up for lost trade," McIntyre said. He noted that there are people in Texas who do not even know that Ruidoso has a ski area.

RLA directors believe that the extra money could be provided by lodgers who are not paying the tax they should be. McIntyre said the non-paying lodgers are

enjoying the benefits of advertising paid for by the lodgers tax fund but not contributing anything to it.

Eggleston, however, said he believes almost all the lodgers are paying the tax. He said that when he became village clerk in June he went over all the listings of motels in the telephone book and all the newspaper advertisements for lodging. He said he found no lodgers who were not paying the tax.

Since then, he said, he has given lodgers tax forms to anybody who has come in to obtain a business registration for overnight rentals.

# Writer offers escape for readers

"It's not possible," said Aola Vandergriff, bestselling author from La Luz, when asked if she writes on a regular schedule.

Yet somehow, between helping her daughter run a campaign for county clerk of Otero County, sewing clown suits for a local parade, attending school board meetings and a thousand other things, she plans to write 41 chapters in the next two weeks.

In the last eight years she has written "so many (books) I can't count them," she said recently after giving a speech to the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County. She tried to remember and figured she had written about 16 books over the last eight years for two different publishers under her own name and the pseudonym Kitt Brown.

Before her recent "Daughters" series of six books about three women and the adventures of their lives, she had sold over 25 million books. She has been translated into "just about every language but Swahili," said her husband Bill.

Vandergriff talks in a friendly manner, repeatedly turning to her husband to ask details she can't remember about one book or another. At 62 she still has jet black hair. She wears red and black and chain smokes the longest, skinniest cigarettes on the market.

"I've always written little things since I was a child," she said. But it was after attending a writing class in Sacramento, California, that she "came home walking on air" and began to write seriously for publication.

"I like to believe I pioneered the humorous confession," she said. She sold 2,000 of that type story to magazines—mostly about a housewife with six children and their circus-like lifestyle, which closely paralleled her own life.

Her first book was published in 1974 and she has been selling them all over the world since.

Vandergriff describes her books as historical fiction. Almost every one has a woman or women heroines who prevail

through adventures and trials of life in situations everywhere in the world.

The heroines and varied locations are what Vandergriff feels are the basis of her tremendous popularity.

"I think it's because I invented a reader," she explains. She believes her readers are mostly young working women pushed around at work all day, then required to attend to children and husband at home at night.

Late at night they sink into her books and find escape with women who heroically face trials in the Australian outback, the Alaskan wilderness or untamed Indian country. "She wants to escape to another life, place and century," says Vandergriff of her typical reader.

However, she also tells the story of three elderly brothers who are at every book signing in Alamogordo. They are always first in line, then squabble among themselves about who gets to read the book first.

In order to write accurately she almost always travels to the place she is writing about because "every country looks different and smells different... if I go I pick up the atmosphere."

She says the book, "Daughters of the Opal Skies," placed in the outback of Australia, was her favorite to write, but admits it was probably because she enjoyed traveling in the country so much. While there, she was able to meet many Australian aborigines, normally a very closed society.

Later, when she hosted some aborigine visitors to the United States, she was adopted as a mother by one of them—which is a very rare honor.

Vandergriff says she has never experienced writer's block, which stops so many others dead at their typewriters. She writes most of her books straight through and edits almost nothing once she is finished. She once wrote a 300-page book in a month.

"I think I could write just about any style except Rosemary Rodgers," said Vandergriff. Rodgers writes what Vandergriff calls lurid books.

"I have a terrible time writing the love scenes," she admits, and adds that her daughters often tell her that she has to heat up the love scenes when they read

them.

"My daughters all help me," she says. Her sons, on the other hand, have not read any of her books. In spite of that, a son living in California has bought more of her books than anybody, Vandergriff said. He has to supply books to all his girlfriends who love reading them.

"It does wear me out," she says about writing the books. She figures it is worthwhile, however, because "I love those checks."

The way to get the checks, she advises hopeful writers, is "don't write for yourself. Write what's selling." She adds that tenacity is extremely important for beginning writers.

In addition to being prolific, Vandergriff has been recognized for her quality many times with many awards. She is most proud of the Zia Award she received from the State of New Mexico for excellence in writing. She notes proudly that she was nominated for that award by a man.

The 41 chapters she must finish for her editor by the end of the month will complete the book tentatively titled "Daughters of the Storm."

Fitting it in with her daughter's political campaign, granddaughters pouring Coke in her shoe, and everything else in her busy life may be difficult, but she says the book gets written "if you have enough pressure."

# "Poor Folks" cookbook cuts family grocery bill





Despite traffic problems near the start, veteran rider Larry Byers quickly swung the Beat A Native filly way to the outside and she coasted home in 20.24 for the 400 yards. It was the fourth straight triumph for Bartendress, who won the

\$96,947 New Mexico Futurity in September at the State Fair in Albuquerque. Trained by Clifton Dean, she's owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas. This season, the swift filly has posted eight victories with three seconds and one third in 15 appearances. She's collected \$127,901. Running second was Wranglers Go Man, a Rocket Wrangler colt, who was ridden by Jimmie Hunt. Third was Mighty Manor, ridden by Gregorio Torres. Bartendress returned \$2.80 as the 2-5 wagering favorite.

It was the sixth time in her last seven races Bartendress has been a wagering favorite.

**TRAINER JOE CHAVEZ** had two victories on Saturday's program. He saddled Aiming-Gun (\$8.20) for owner Ralph Padilla Sr. of Los Lunas, in the fourth race and then won with Contrary Jerry (\$10.00) in the sixth for owner Henry L. Wolfel of Albuquerque. Ramon Apodaca rode Aiming-Gun while apprentice Dale Cordova guided Contrary Jerry.

**LARRY BYERS** won two consecutive victories on Saturday's program. After guiding Bartendress to victory in the featured Shue Fly Stakes, he took Gold Wizard to a one and one-half length victory in the 11th race. Both were wagering favorites. Bartendress paid \$2.80 and Gold Wizard returned \$3.40 as the \$1.70-1 choice.

**TRAINER BOB ARNETT** and jockey Mike Lidberg combined to win two consecutive races on Friday's program. They started with Zoom Corporation (\$3.20) in the ninth and then tallied with Scots Sissy (\$17.00) in the featured 10th race. Those were the first two wins at this season's Sunland Park meeting for Arnett, perennially one of the state's leading conditioners.

**FRIDAY WAS A DAY** longshot fans must have enjoyed. Nine of the 12 winners returned double digit mutual win payoffs. **SIX DOUBLES**, who finished sixth in Sunday's Savannah Swinger Distance Series No. 1, was sold last week in a private transaction. The three-year-old Easy Six colt is owned by LeRoy Spires of Snyder, Texas, and is trained by Clifford C. Lambert. He previously was owned by Clarence Scharbauer of Midland, Texas, and was trained by H. Don Farris. As a two-year-old in 1981, Six Doubles gained two wins with one second in eight tries and winnings of \$46,286.

**FRIDAY'S TRIFECTA** returned a season high of \$2,152.40. Dynamo Dobbin, ridden by Paul Jaramillo returned \$10.60 to win as the \$4.30-1 second wagering favorite. Corporate Prince, ridden by Louie Gomez ran second as a 19-1 outsider, while Mr. Bay Jeep, a \$20.60-1 risk steered by Mike Smith ran third. The trifecta, where bettors must select the first three horses in order in the eighth race, is gaining popularity in its first season at Sunland Park. Trifecta wagering made its debut in southern New Mexico during this summer's 77-day meeting at Ruidoso Downs.

**AN ODDITY OCCURRED** twice on Saturday's program. In the sixth and 12th races, the first three horses were guided by apprentice jockeys. In the sixth race, Dale Cordova took Contrary Jerry to a one and one-fourth length win over runnerup Martironi, who was ridden by Rubin Miranda. The third horse, Andy Handy, was ridden by Casey Lambert. In the 12th event, David Lidberg took Omni Blue to a front-running two-length triumph over Money's Delight, who was guided by Dale Cordova. The show horse was Struttin' Billy, who was ridden by Paul Jaramillo.

**KENNER BAR POSTED** his third straight victory when he scooted to a half-length win in Sunday's fourth race at 400 yards. He started his streak by defeating

\$8,500 claiming horses on September 26 at La Mesa Park in Raton, then won his Sunland Park opener on October 16 in a 400-yard dash for \$3,200 claimers. He led throughout on Sunday while recording a 20.47 clocking against \$5,800 claiming horses. He was ridden for the second straight time by Salustio Burgos for trainer O. D. Jamison. Robert D. Hayes of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, owns the five-year-old Kitaman horse. Kenner Bar returned \$12.00 as the 9-1 second wagering favorite.

**SPECIAL HANK DEMONSTRATED** his 870-yard prowess by rallying for a widening victory by almost two lengths over Mighty Duck in Sunday's ninth race at 870 yards. His time was a season's best 45.13 and was also one of the fastest times for the distance in recent years. It was the five-year-old Special Secret gelding's fifth win with two seconds in eight tries at 870 yards this season. Ridden by Salustio Burgos, he's trained by George H. Cosper Jr. Special Hank is owned by Lowell F. Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas. As the 3-5 favorite, Special Hank paid \$3.20 to win.

**APPRENTICE RIDER** David Lidberg enjoyed a superb day Sunday, piloting four winners with one third from eight mounts. He became the first rider this season to win four races on a single program. Lidberg teamed with trained J. Doyal Roberts for three wins. They began with Welly Jack (\$4.20) in the first for owners Lamoyne Carpenter and W. D. LaMay of

Capitan, continued with Pappy's Present (\$46.20) in the third for owner Manuel W. Davis of Snyder, Texas, and then captured the eighth on Yallah Zip (\$10.60) for L. G. and Helen Rhodes of Abilene, Texas. Roberts became the first trainer this season with three wins on a single program. Lidberg also took the 12th race for trainer Bob Arnett on Hurry Native (\$17.00). Arnett, meanwhile, also won two races on Sunday, scoring earlier in the seventh race on Sail On Home (\$6.40) for owner Hugh C. Preston of Burkburnett, Texas.

**THE WEEKEND HANDLE** soared up to \$996,388, which was a gain of 19.04 percent over the same three-day weekend a year ago. Sunday's total of \$409,714 was the highest handle in the history of fall racing at Sunland Park. That handle was a gain of 31.10 percent over the same Sunday handle last year. After six race days, the daily average stands at \$344,844, a hike of 8.64 percent over the \$314,511 average at this point last year (five race days). Wagering-per-race is now humming along at \$28,737, also up 8.64 percent over last season's comparable \$26,209.

**THE LEADING POST POSITION** so far this season is the Number 5 slot with 17 wins. Of these, seven were chalked up by thoroughbreds, nine by quarter horses. Here's the seasonal breakdown: No. 1—10 wins, No. 2—5, No. 3—12, No. 4—10, No. 5—16, No. 6—5, No. 7—7, No. 8—2, No. 9—3, No. 10—2, No. 11—0, No. 12—0.

### "Sneak preview" for race fans

Sunland Park race fans will now receive a "sneak preview" after each horse race at the west El Paso track.

"We're going to show the pan shot on the monitors of the stretch run after each race while the horses are being pulled up on the backside," explained Sunland Park General Manager Don (Curly) Smith. "We think it will be beneficial for the public to see the stretch run as soon as possible." Smith said the entire replay of the quarter horse races as well as the pan shot of the thoroughbred stretch races would be shown on all Sunland Park color closed circuit television monitors located throughout the plant.

In addition, the entire replay of all races will be shown on the television monitors, as in the past, immediately after the race has been declared official.

"It gets the crowd involved to see the stretch run before the horses are even unsaddled," Smith said. "They can see how close the photos are and even analyze the race. It's been a really popular addition at other tracks and we want to have it done here. It makes for a better show and that's what we want to give people at Sunland Park."

Smith said he checked with Cy Leland of Criterion Films, Incorporated, and determined there would be no problem with showing the stretch runs immediately after the horses cross the finish line.

Sunland Park will present 12-race programs on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Post time each day will be 12:30 p.m.

## Bartendress wins Shue Fly Stakes

Bartendress got off to a troubled start in Saturday's renewal of the \$24,008 Shue Fly Stakes at Sunland Park, but the filly easily overcame her problems. She got back into contention at around the midway point of the 400-yard scramble and roared to an impressive one-and one-half victory.

First place for the New Mexico-bred field of two-year-olds amounted to \$12,004, and that pushed Bartendress' career income up to \$127,901.

Bartendress is owned by Sam Henderson of Odessa, Texas. Larry Byers is the pilot. The trainer is Clifton Dean.

Sunland patrons had little doubt as to Bartendress' ability and made her a 2-5 favorite. She handed out betting payoffs of \$2.80, \$2.40, \$2.20. The win was her eighth of the year in 15 starts. She also holds three seconds and a third.

Bartendress was clocked in 20.24 seconds, which was a bit off her top qualifying time of 19.89 seconds. The Shue Fly champ is by Beat A Native out of Bar The Thought.

Shortly after the break, Bartendress found herself in tight quarters. The filly was pinched off. Jockey Byers had no choice but to pull her back to avoid an even tighter situation. Bartendress dropped back into last place, and may have been a

good two lengths away from the lead in the early going.

Byers applied the brakes, steered Bartendress to the far outside (going around Mighty Manor), and then shifted into high gear. The filly launched a long charge. At the halfway point of the sprint, she was nearly in the lead. In the final 50 yards, she was pulling away with authority.

Wranglers Go Man, ridden by Jimmie Hunt for J. Phillip Patterson of Oklahoma City, ended up second and collected \$4,081. The son of Rocket Wrangler returned \$3.40 and \$2.80. The payoffs: \$3.40, \$2.80.

Mighty Manor, piloted by Gregorio Torres, finished a head behind Wranglers Go

Man and earned \$2,400 for third. The show payoff was \$3.40. Mighty Manor is the property of Calvin and Roberta Stout of Grady, New Mexico. The remaining order of finish: 4th — Feature Leader, \$1,690; 5th — Glorys Magic Miss, \$1,200; 6th — Just As Easy, \$860; 7th — Cletos Easy Jack, \$720; 8th — Tokum Jet, \$490; 9th — St. Who, \$240; 10th — Easier Chicklet, \$240.

## Chickarun purchased for \$101,000

The young stakes-winning mare Chickarun was purchased for \$101,000 to top the second Ruidoso Super Select Sale of broodmares and weanlings October 16 at the Jerry Wells Ranch in Purcell, Oklahoma.

The leading bid was entered by the partnership of Walt Knorpp, Preston Carter and R. W. Boston Jr. Chickarun, a winner of the Trinity Quarter Horse Association Futurity and Raton Futurity to earn over \$43,000, was consigned by Don Brooks and Lowell Neumayer. She was in foal to Streakin Sb.

A total of 66 mares passed through the ring and brought \$1,885,700 for an average of \$28,445. Sixteen weanlings also sold for a total of \$289,300 for an average of \$18,081. The sale also featured the sale of three stallion shares for a total of \$227,500, bringing total sales for the afternoon to \$2,382,500.

Before the sale began it was announced that the entire Saket Racing Stable dispersal, which included lot numbers 20 through 86, had been withdrawn. On October 16, the Ruidoso Super Select Sale Company filed a lawsuit against Kenneth E. Tureaud and Sylvia Ann Tureaud in U. S. District Court in Oklahoma City seeking damages and injunctive relief for the withdrawal of the Saket horses.

According to sale manager Richard Thompson, legal action continued the week following the sale and a settlement with Saket Racing Stables was being pursued. District Court Judge David Russell also issued a temporary restraining order to Tureaud stopping any further sales of the horses listed in the Saket consignment.

The Saket consignment had featured the dams of such outstanding quarter horse runners as Higheasterjet, the sport's leading money winner with \$1,495,312. Pie In The Sky, winner of the 1979 All American Futurity, and Medley Glass,

winner of the 1978 All American Derby. Also in the Saket consignment was Cova's Ego, dam of 1981 Preakness runnerup Bold Ego. There were also weanlings and yearlings out of some of the outstanding mares in the consignment.

Besides Chickarun, other high selling mares included: — Diamond Pretender, a seven-year-old mare whose current two-year-old runner is Sun Country Futurity winner Glo Billy Sims. Diamond Pretender was purchased by Wes Self for \$90,000 and consigned by Ridgelaigh Farms. She was in foal to Bugs Alive in 75.

— Promise Of Joy, a seven-year-old stakes winner of \$75,450. She was purchased by Dr. Michael Wright for \$30,000 from the Horner and Pruitt consignment. Promise Of Joy is in foal to Easy Jet.

— Vibrant Dee, a seventeen-year-old stakes-winning mare whose full sister Dee Mount is the dam of Champion Dashingly, was purchased by Bobby Cox from Paradise Creek Farms for \$51,000. She is

in foal to world champion Dash For Cash.

The two top-selling weanlings were both purchased by B&J Investments from Dan and Jolene Urschel. Topping the venue was Hip No. 14, a colt by Dash For Cash out of the champion mare Lady Juno. He sold for \$30,000. Also selling was a filly by Easy Jet out of the stakes-placed mare Sioa Minga. She brought \$45,000. Another leading seller was a filly by Easy Jet out of Ida Run purchased by Bob Miller for \$25,000. She was consigned by Brooks and Neumayer.

Thompson also announced the dates for the third annual Super Select Sale. The yearling sale will be held August 28, 1983, in Ruidoso Downs. It will be held at the new Super Select Sale facility currently being constructed 11 miles east of Ruidoso on Highway 70. Thompson said the construction will be finished before January.

The Super Select Sale of broodmares, weanlings and stallion shares will be held Saturday, October 15, 1983, at a site to be announced later, Thompson said.

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

## Maskeo Lady wins swinger

Longshots got the upper hand in Sunday's first leg of the Savannah Swinger Distance Series at Sunland Park.

Such nationally prominent three-year-olds as Love N Money and Six Doubles suffered severe humiliation. Both ran well out of the money.

Top honors went to Maskeo Lady, who finished first in the 350-yard scramble as an 11-1 longshot; Maxfield, who took second at nearly 20-1; and Brown Sugar Bowl, who hammered out a third-place finish as a 10-1 shot.

It was also a big afternoon for the

Sunland Park management, as the solid mutual upswing, evident during opening weekend, continued through the season's second weekend. Sunday's crowd of 3,506 punched the day's handle up to an excellent \$407,714.

That was the highest one-day handle in the history of fall racing at Sunland Park. The previous high was set at \$407,390 during opening-day a year ago.

Included among the highpoints of Sunday's big betting surge was the \$40,867 wagered on the newly installed Trifecta on the eighth race, and the \$43,927 wagered on the traditional Big Q, which covers the last two races.

Maskeo Lady, a three-year-old filly owned by W. A. Cochran of Odessa, Texas, surprised the Sunland crowd with a heads-up get-away in the Savannah Swinger. The filly, ridden by Christopher O'Dell, established a slim early lead. But it was a mad scramble for the lead slot.

Maskeo Lady managed to hold her own in the early going. But that wasn't the case with either Love N Money or Six Doubles. The latter, who went into the Savannah Swinger with career earnings of around a quarter million dollars, carried the top load of 125 pounds. She raced as a 2-5 favorite.

The people's choice broke sluggishly, was clearly out of contention after a half dozen strides, and sagged into an eighth-place finish. Six Doubles, packing 130 pounds, had a little more spark at the start. But the classy colt quickly saw his position deteriorate. He was in tight quarters for the first 50 yards, then was unable to generate an attack. He ran sixth at just over 3-1.

Maskeo Lady, trained by L. B. Johnson, ignited about 100 yards from the wire and pulled away sharply to win by a half-length in 18.04 seconds. The filly earned \$3,840, which boosted her 1982 income up to \$13,183. The mutual payoffs: \$24, \$9.20, \$4.60.

Maxfield, ridden by Louie Figueroa for Charles Webb of Farmington, raked in \$1,408 and paid \$17.60, \$8.40. Brown Sugar Bowl earned \$788 for third. The show payoff: \$6. Mike Lidberg was up.

## Bob Arnett, top trainer at Sunland Park

Here's a two-part question for trivia fanatics: What trainer has won the most races at Sunland Park, and how many wins has he logged?  
The answer is Bob Arnett, and it doesn't take much brains to figure that one out. Arnett's been knocking off races at Sunland Park with clockwork accuracy over the past 20 years or so.  
During the summer, Arnett fielded a remarkable battalion of stakes horses (all owned by Hugh C. Preston of Burkburnett, Texas), and etched a Ruidoso Downs stakes record which is likely to hold up for some time.  
Arnett is now back at Sunland Park, supervising a 30-head string, and once

again concentrating on his favorite pursuit — winning races. But he won't have all of his heavy hitters bearing down during the current fall meeting. In fact, most of his stars have been turned out for a well-needed rest. But Arnett, as usual, will have more than enough good ones to make another big run at the Sunland trainer championship.  
But getting back to the second part of our trivia question: How many races has Arnett won over the years? The answer is around 1,260. "By the end of the 1982-83 season, I hope to reach 1,300," Arnett says.  
Arnett has probably won more races than the next two trainers put together. He's won the Sunland crown nine times.  
Now 50, Arnett has reached the point in life when he's starting to think of backing

off a bit. He says: "In another four or five years, I'd like to shut down and take it easy. It's hard work keeping a big stable, and staying on top. There's tremendous pressure. I'd like to retire, fish and hunt a little, go to California and buy and sell some horses. But I've had it in my mind not to retire until I've got 1,500 Sunland Park wins. I'd like to have a record nobody can break."  
Arnett was raised in Tucson, and got his early track experience on the rough Arizona fair circuit. "You had to learn your lessons well," Arnett recalls. "There were some old men on that circuit who knew what they were doing, and you learned by watching them. You learned to run your horses 'crippled' — or you didn't survive."  
When Sunland opened in 1959, Arnett was on hand for a few months. That was his pattern during Sunland's first few years. Arnett would race in Tucson, Soudita, Duncan, Safford, then ship to Sunland for October, November and December. But after his third year on this schedule, he decided Sunland had more of a future than the Tucson circuit, so he began staying for the entire season. His best output, in terms of number of wins, came during the 1974-75 season, when he chalked up 75 wins. That's the second-best win production by a trainer in Sunland history. (The top mark was set at 82 by W. A. Thompson in

1970-71.)  
Over the years, Arnett has built a reputation as a solid trainer who wins plenty of races. His strong suit has been claiming and allowance races. But Arnett's attack strategy changed last summer when he beefed up his contingent with one stakes star after another. Most were owned by the Preston outfit. "I can't think of any owner who dominated the thoroughbred stakes program at Ruidoso the way Preston did last summer," Arnett says.  
The team included the exceptional colt, Sundays Payday, who won six races, including the \$146,901 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity and the \$153,787 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity. Arnett, who's not one to go overboard in praise, describes the colt in these direct terms: "I think Sundays Payday is as good as any colt in the world."  
Preston shares Arnett's opinion, since he plans to nominate him to next year's Kentucky Derby. A winner of \$200,000, Sunday Payday is the richest stakes horse ever to emerge from the Arnett stable.  
Sunland patrons will have to wait to see the colt in action. He's now taking it easy, and won't be back until the start of the year. Arnett has in mind the Sunland Park Derby (March 19) as a tuneup for the Kentucky Derby.  
Arnett's summer squad also included such stars as Jiltaloom (named the cham-

pio sprinter at Ruidoso), Pride Of Loom (winner of the \$30,465 Norgor Derby), My Going Jesse (winner of the Three Bars Handicap), and the crack stakes mare, Native Gypsy.  
But Arnett ran into a little bad luck with Native Gypsy after she set the third-fastest qualifying time for the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic. He explains: "She cut herself in the swimming pool, and the cut required 14 stitches. We had to scratch her out of the Classic. The wound broke open at Albuquerque. But we've got her back here at Sunland, and she's looking good. We'll start her again in the spring."  
The group he's now directing at Sunland includes Stash It, who ran third in last week's Fast Gas Handicap. Another is Scots Sissy, whom Arnett claimed at

Ruidoso for \$4,000. Scots Sissy subsequently won under an \$8,000 price. It's been the same story with Ho Chi Star. Another Arnett customer is the capable three-year-old, Sail On Hoins (he won at Albuquerque in 370-yard competition).  
Arnett says it was particularly satisfying when his Ruidoso stable produced an entire squad of stakes winners. "It was a great feeling to have so many horses of that caliber," he says. Usually, you're lucky if you have just one stakes horse.  
Last fall, Arnett won 11 Sunland races in the fall to deadheat Fred Danley in the trainer scramble. During the spring, he scored 24 to nose out Cliff Lambert by a notch. If Arnett can duplicate his 35 wins of last season, he'll be on the threshold of 1,300 Sunland wins and on schedule toward his career goal of 1,500.

### Free general admission for senior citizens at Sunland

Senior citizens will be getting special treatment at Sunland Park this season, according to general manager Don (Curly) Smith.  
All senior citizens will be allowed free grandstand admission throughout the 1982-83 meeting. The only requirement for admission is any form of identification in-

dicating senior citizen status, Smith pointed out.  
In addition, Friday has been designated Ladies Day throughout the season. The girls will get free grandstand admission, and one lucky lady will be selected each week to receive a number of prizes, including \$30 in free wagers and dinner for two at K-Bob's Restaurant.

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

## Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Look for mixed signals from the voters Tuesday.

At the national level, particularly, things may be very contradictory.

Voters don't appear to have much faith in the Reagan administration, but they have not yet learned to blame the President himself.

(It just goes to show you what a few years as an actor can do for you.)

It's likely that, when the votes are counted, the Republicans will still be in control of the Senate, though their margin may be smaller. In the House, however, the number of Democrats is likely to rise, which means we have another Congress with control by one party in one house and by the other in the other.

Republican control of the Senate can be good for New Mexico, whose Pete Domenici was named by a national magazine recently as the most powerful member of that body.

Here's how they described him:

"Domenici has set the tone on federal spending and tax policy with Reagan as a sometimes reluctant partner. Some say he pushes too hard, but he usually gets his way. Many believe Domenici's Senate power will continue to grow."

That same magazine called Bob Dole most effective, Bob Packwood most aggressive and James McClure most disappointing.

Will Domenici's present partner, Jack Schmitt, be back to serve with him? It's hard to say.

National commentators had early said he was one of the most defensible of Republicans. As Jeff Bingaman has continued to gain on him, that has seemed more possible. Latest brouhaha over contents of commercials on the media may have helped Bingaman some, Schmitt not at all.

We'll get at least one Democrat in our Congressional delegation, something we haven't had for some time. Though Joe Skeen and Manuel Lujan look safe for another trip to Washington, newcomer Bill Richardson will be the choice of that new northern Congressional district.

Richardson has sometimes sounded like he owes more loyalty to Tip O'Neill than to New Mexico, but once he's settled in he'll probably be all right.

(During campaigns, lots of foolish things get said, more's the pity.)

The governor's race could still go either way, though as this is written this correspondent would call it a squeaker for Anaya.

Most minor races will also likely go to Democratic candidates, though Al Romero, running for state auditor, may find himself facing some problems.

New Mexico at home, in other words, is likely to remain heavily Democratic.

Legislative races, like county contests, are too hard to call. In those, the voters often know the candidates personally — which is sometimes a help and sometimes a hindrance as far as getting into office is concerned.

Of course, if none of the predictions made above come to pass, you can count on the most logical and rational explanations here for why they didn't.

What's the use of being a columnist if you can't blow a little smoke to cover up your own stupidity?

Meanwhile, we'd be willing to bet that as you read these words there are at least three important races in which you have not yet made up your mind.

Lots of undecideds make it a tough year to call.

Think about it — and if you have to, pray about it. The election's just around the corner.

Ah, progress. —Hop Graham, Lovington Daily Leader


# Jeff Bingaman makes things better...

## Reporter's Round

When I called the Alcoholic Beverage Control in Santa Fe to find out more about the upcoming referendum concerning local option of Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages, I was told to call a Mr. Romero. He told me that he really didn't know all that much about the referendum and the best man to talk to would be Mr. Art Waskey.

When I called Mr. Waskey he wasn't there but the woman who answered the phone asked if she could help me. When I stated my question she transferred me to another voice. That voice transferred me to another one and the next to another because none of them really understood the referendum. I gave up for the afternoon.

Although I did finally reach Mr. Waskey, who explained everything thoroughly and clearly, the general air of ignorance I ran into the afternoon before seems indicative of the situation among all voters.

No one, except for a few restaurant owners, seems to know what is at stake. Some I asked knew there is a referendum but thought we were voting on package sales. Many didn't even know it existed. The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, to whom it is vitally important, had no policy formed as of Tuesday afternoon.

Tourism, the lifeblood of Ruidoso, is what is at stake. It is people visiting Ruidoso, spending their money, supporting every person living here in one way or another.

On Tuesday each county in New Mexico, except Roosevelt and Curry (because they are already dry), will decide whether to allow bars, restaurants and other public facilities to sell alcohol for consumption on the premises on Sundays.

This referendum has nothing to do with package sales of liquor. No matter what happens at the polls, package sales on Sundays will still be prohibited.

But if a majority of the people who vote in Lincoln County Tuesday vote against the Sunday sales of alcohol, then no bar or restaurant will be able to serve alcoholic beverages to customers who ask for them on Sundays.

Can you imagine a big three-day holiday in the summer? Say Fourth of July or Labor Day. Ruidoso is packed with people to see the races and enjoy the beauty of the area. The streets are full of people wandering in and out of shops, restaurants and motels. They are all on vacation. They are here to relax and have a good time.

But, oops, along comes Sunday, the middle of the weekend and normally the busiest day. The racetrack has to close down all its bars. Bars in town are closed and people who ask for a drink before dinner or a glass of wine with dinner are refused. Cancel the whole thing.

Imagine then at the Los Alamos Racetrack in California, the new tracks in Oklahoma or the mountains of Colorado and Arizona. Imagine Ruidoso and its shops, restaurants and motels empty.

How about a snowy Sunday in the winter. Coming in from the cold slopes of Sierra Blanca, Sam the Skier orders a steaming Irish coffee to warm him and maybe loosen those stiff knees of his. But it's Sunday. Sorry, how about a coffee? Well, okay, if that's all you have.

Later, after a full day of vigorous exercise Sam looks forward to his favorite cocktail, a big juicy steak dinner and a good red wine. Sorry Sam, it's Sunday. No alcoholic beverages can be served in Lincoln County on Sunday.

Sam says, "Oh yeah, it is Sunday. I have to work tomorrow. Forget the dinner. Forget my plans to leave tomorrow. I'm going home now. I wonder what Vail is like? Or Durango? Or Telluride?"

When people are on vacation they like to drink. It is a way for many to relax. When they plan their vacation they will go to a place where they can drink when they want.

You don't have to drink if you don't want to. Not everybody does. But you aren't going to stop those who do like to drink by passing a law. Prohibition did not work and neither will this.

It will merely drive people to other resort areas where they can get a drink when they want one.

This issue may not be as important to other towns in the county. Captain, Carrizozo and Corona do not rely on tourism as much as Ruidoso. Those who are strongly opposed to alcohol will get out and vote against Sunday sales. Many who have no strong feelings about alcohol may not vote. The rest of the county could conceivably vote against Sunday sales.


After talking to a number of people over the last few days, it appears to me that almost everybody who already understands the referendum or has explained to them realizes that it is vital to the economic well-being of the community to vote for Sunday sales of liquor. But so many people don't understand—don't realize what is even being voted on.

It is easy to understand why they are confused. It seems this has been voted on before. In 1971 New Mexicans voted on Sunday sales. But the bill was ruled unconstitutional on a technicality.

Then in 1981, when Senator Les Houston pushed through the Liquor Reform Act it seemed everything was settled. But as a concession to church groups, a provision was included in the law providing for a vote on Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages, which is what we are doing now.

There has been an ad running on KRRR with a person saying, "I can't believe he won. I can't believe he won." It is a message urging everybody to get out and vote.

You may be saying, "Where are all the tourists? Where did they go?" if you don't vote for Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages come election day.

# Cobb gets in

Randall "Tex" Cobb is getting ready at the Inn of the Mountain Gods for the biggest moment of his life.

The heavyweight boxer is training at the Inn for his World Boxing Council (WBC) championship bout with champion Larry Holmes next month at a still undetermined site.

The fight is tentatively scheduled to take place either November 22 or November 26. If the National Football League strike is still on, the fight will probably take place on the earlier date. If the strike is over, it will probably go on the latter date.

Baltimore, Maryland; Las Vegas, Nevada and Washington D.C. are among the cities that are being considered.

Cobb, a 27-year-old former defensive end for Texas Christian University's football team and now a New Jersey resident, has been working out at the Inn for two weeks and will probably continue training there until a week before the championship fight.

He was scheduled to fight Mike Weaver for the World Boxing Association (WBA) title two months ago but suffered a split lip in practice and the fight had to be called off.

However, the 6-3, 230-pounder is healthy now and went a few rounds with sparring partners George Chaplin and Charley Singleton Tuesday afternoon, showing some impressive punching ability.

"Tex's best punches are a straight right and a right cross," said Paul Clinite, Cobb's manager. "He also has a very strong left hook."

Holmes is one of the most underrated champions in heavyweight boxing history, and he has an awesome left jab.

What plans do Cobb, Clinite and trainer George Benton have to counteract Holmes' jab and overall boxing ability?

"What we're going to have to do is out-muscle him," Clinite said. "We're going to have to counter his left jab with a right and just out-muscle him."

Holmes took Gerry Cooney out in the 13th round with a technical knockout last summer but many observers feel he could have won the fight much earlier if he had wanted to.

"Cooney wasn't ready for Holmes because he hadn't fought anybody really tough," Clinite said. "He had an undefeated record with all these first-round knockouts but he fought mostly bums and has-beens. Tex has fought some good fighters so he should be ready for Holmes."

Cobb, who has a 20-2 career record, knocked out Ernie Shavers in the seventh round two years ago and also defeated Benito Mecerdo, another ranked heavyweight. Cobb's only losses were split decisions to second-ranked Michael Dokes and Ken Norton.

"He should have won both fights," Clinite remarked. "Cobb still hasn't peaked yet; he still has some things to learn, but he's learning them."

Cobb gave credit to Singleton and Chaplin for helping him in his workouts.

"They're both top contenders and are first class individuals," he said.


Singleton is a tall, lanky fighter weighing around 180 pounds while Chaplin is a powerful boxer weighing 220 pounds.

Cobb works out six days a week. Besides sparring, his workouts also include hitting the large and small punching bags and running at least an hour each day.

This is the second time within the past six months that Cobb has worked out in the Ruidoso area. He trained in Carrizozo for several weeks last summer before his fight with Weaver was called off.







# Cottonwood and maples provide color along the creeks



The narrowleaf cottonwood (*Populus angustifolia*) is the largest deciduous tree (one losing its leaves each winter) in this area. It grows to 50 feet tall with girths reaching one-and-a-half feet.

Although it is a close relative of the quaking aspen tree, being in the same family and genus, its leaves are much more slender. The leaves are lance-shaped with fine teeth and are usually about two to three inches long. They look similar to willow leaves in color as well as shape. Right now the leaves are turning from pale yellow-green to yellow and falling off the trees.

In the early spring the tree releases a multitude of cottony seeds that blow over the countryside.

Its bark is smooth, light yellow-green becoming light gray-brown and fissured on larger trunks.

The narrowleaf cottonwood is a riparian tree, meaning that it grows along banks of rivers or lakes. One can see many of them along the creek below Bonito Lake. Many of the trees there were knocked down by floods in the winter of '72-'79, however.

It is a common tree and has an extensive range, growing in the Rocky Mountains at 5,000 to 7,000 feet from Canada to Mexico.

The wood from this tree is not used commercially but the tree is often planted for shade and erosion control.

Maple is also a deciduous tree with

leaves that turn yellow and then bright red at this time of year. There are two species growing locally: Rocky Mountain Maple (*Acer glabrum*) and Bigtooth Maple (*Acer grandidentatum*).

The leaves of the two species look similar and are heart-shaped with three lobes. The leaves of both are dark shiny green, although the Bigtooth Maple often has fine hair on the back of its leaf. The Rocky Mountain Maple has more sharply sawtoothed leaves and can have the three lobes of the leaves on separate stalks.

Both species have red twigs. The fruits of both are the characteristic paired long-winged keys that spin round and round as they float to the ground. The bark of both is smooth, thin and gray or brown.

Both maples grow in moist soil and ponderosa pine forests. The Bigtooth Maple grows at elevations of 4,700 to 7,000 feet. The Rocky Mountain Maple grows at higher elevations of 7,000 to 9,000 feet and also in Douglas fir and spruce-fir forests.

The Rocky Mountain Maple is usually a smaller tree or even shrub not over 25 feet in height, whereas the Bigtooth can grow to 50 feet tall.

The wood of both is very hard but is generally not used commercially because the trees are too small. They both make good fuel and the Bigtooth Maple has been used as a source of maple sugar.

**THE ROCKY MOUNTAIN AND BIGTOOTH MAPLES** grow in moist soil in the ponderosa pine forests. Both have reddish leaves in the fall. The two types are difficult to distinguish but the Rocky Mountain Maple generally grows at higher elevations of 7,000 to 9,000 feet and is a shrub or small tree up to 25 feet tall. The Bigtooth Maple grows at elevations of 4,700 to 7,000 feet. It is always a tree and grows to 50 feet high.
