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AIRPORT SITE A THE ONE?

SBAC to keep after it

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) has not abandoned hope of establishing a Lincoln County regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa, but the commission is stymied over which of two sites on the mesa to pursue.

To help it reach a decision whether to go after Site B or Site A, the commission decided Thursday to contact political officials and government agencies to ask for recommendations.

Until now, SBAC's efforts have been directed toward Site B, a location it prefers for an airport but which is on land controlled by New Mexico State University (NMSU). Site A, which lies to the west of B on a mix of federal, state and private land, also has been found suitable for an airport but would be more costly than Site B.

SBAC has reached a crossroads in its effort to locate an airport on the mesa because of the conclusions of a recent study. That study, conducted by the National Academy of Sciences for the Department of the Interior, complicated that an airport on Site B would be incompatible with research being conducted by NMSU.

The university leases over 28,000 acres on the mesa from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to conduct agricultural experiments. Site B lies entirely within the leased land, while Site A includes only a small portion of land leased by NMSU.

The mesa is about 15 miles north of Ruidoso off Highway 37. The university has said it could alter its studies to accommodate an airport on Site A. But NMSU has refused to relax its hold on the leased BLM land which contains Site B.

SBAC reached the decision to contact officials after members of the commission unanimously reaffirmed their goal of locating an airport on the mesa.

"Stay the course," suggested Lincoln County's representative Ben Hall when asked how the county commission stands. Representatives from Captain, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs echoed that position.

But the course the commission will follow has become fogged following the results of the study. At SBAC's October meeting, chairman Fred Heckman of Ruidoso noted that the commission agreed to abide by the results of the Academy study, if it found the evaluation to be fair.

Heckman also has said that if SBAC wants to contest the study conclusions, the only avenue left is to appeal the study through administrative channels. The appeals process eventually could end up in a federal court, and the commission has been advised that it could last as long as two years.

The commissioners commented on the Academy report Thursday, and the consensus was the evaluation heavily favored NMSU.

"I take it the feeling is that this wasn't the most objective job," Heckman said. "Biased is the word," member Harrold Mansell of Ruidoso Downs interjected.

But Hall put the results into perspective. No matter how SBAC feels about the conclusions, Hall said, "It's something we've got to live with."

After the commission receives advice on its next step, it will be more clear which location SBAC will pursue. If it decides to abandon Site B and concentrate on Site A, SBAC will have at its disposal some of the preliminary groundwork for Site A.

The alternative location has been studied by consultants to the commission, and has been found feasible for an airport. Heckman noted Thursday that environmental impact, archeological, and cost estimate studies were done on Site A in 1980, and are more current than information on Site B.

But before SBAC changes course and goes after Site A, the commission wants to solicit advice. Hall said SBAC should "not get crossways" with all the officials and agencies involved. Thus the decision to make contacts and to try to arrange meetings with New Mexico's newly elected officials.

SBAC chairman Heckman said he will write Senator-elect Jeff Bingaman, Governor-elect Toney Anaya and U.S. Representative-elect Bill Richardson. It was noted that Richardson does not represent this district, but Hall pointed out that the commission needs all the political support possible.

SBAC will also contact Senator Pete Domenici, U.S. Representatives Joe Skeen and Manuel Lujan, and newly elected Lincoln County commissioners Kenneth Nosker and Bill Elliot.

Heckman will also write to the BLM; the Federal Aviation Administration; the state aviation division; NMSU; the state tourism division; the state Farm Bureau; cattle and wool growers; the state land commissioner; and the Ruidoso Downs-Sunland Park Jockey Club.

SBAC member Benny Coker of Captain said he had talked with Anaya during the campaign, and he quoted Anaya as saying that if elected governor, he would instruct the NMSU Board of Regents to work for the Lincoln County airport.

Coker also said he talked with Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell, whom Coker said would be a good contact with Anaya. Coker asked Heckman to seek Mitchell's support also.

"It would be a political move that would help the commission," Coker said.

A point Coker said he wants relayed to

the officials is the benefit an airport would be to this area's tourist economy.

Another contact, Coker suggested, would be former Texas Governor John Connally and his partners who are involved in the Triple Crown condominium development in Ruidoso Downs. Coker said Connally would be a connection to Interior Secretary James Watt.

Mansell, who said he has met with the Triple Crown partners, agreed to write them.

Heckman asked the commission if the yearly fees of \$500 from each member should continue. He noted that, if SBAC pursues Site A, the commission will have to hire an appraiser.

Hall said SBAC has \$4,700 in its treasury. Coker summed up the commission's move to reaffirm its political contacts and keep the ball rolling on the regional airport proposal.

"We shouldn't lose any momentum. It's a long, long way from somebody landing on that strip."

Road dispute heats up meeting

Another clash over the rights of private land owners and the public was heard Friday concerning maintenance of a road leading to National Forest land. James McDaniel requested that county road A038—which leads through his ranchland and into the Lincoln National Forest—not be maintained by the county road department.

McDaniel reported that the road has not been maintained for the past nine years but the road department crew began to work on it recently.

"It is passable now, and I will not deny access to anyone," McDaniel explained. But, he added, "if the road is maintained it's gonna open the land to the public."

County Road Department superintendent Guy Henley said the U.S. Forest Service requested three years ago that the road be improved to provide better access for them. Henley reported that he "held off" doing the road work for a while, "but we were going to start doing it the other day."

"We were gonna fix the eroded places in the road and broke one of the blades," Henley commented.

"That road is in terrible shape and why it hasn't been maintained in nine years I don't know," he continued. Henley later mentioned "there is no way we could get a Cat (earth mover) in there for fighting a forest fire the way the road is now."

Smokey Bear District Fire Management Officer Steve Makowski reported that "the Forest Service feels the entire road is needed for access to National Forest land and for a fire access measure. We anticipate greater use of the road for fire suppression efforts."

McDaniel expressed his belief that improvement of the road would result in trees being felled for firewood and cattle being stolen from private ranchland. He said he estimates about 100 cords of wood were taken from his land last year.

"I've never denied anyone to cut wood from my private land if it's for his own use," McDaniel noted. "I don't want the road closed—I won't deny access, but I ask not to have the road improved so it will be

convenient and make traffic uncontrolled.

McDaniel argued that when Forest Service personnel issue fuelwood permits they give the permit holder a map which does not illustrate the boundaries between private and National Forest land.

Makowski pointed out the Forest Service's fuelwood policy is to provide the permit holder with a one-half-inch map, "but we delineate private land and give clear instructions that removal from private land is forbidden." It was noted that Forest Service personnel accompany private land owners who wish to chop fuelwood to make sure they do not trespass on National Forest land.

Commissioners chairman Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight took exception to this policy, indicating it is unfair to "go out with a private land owner" to ensure he does not get wood from forest land but not "go out with the public" to ensure they do not take wood from private lands.

"We can go with one individual to protect him from a trespass situation," Makowski replied. It is impossible to accompany everyone who wishes to chop fuelwood, however, he indicated.

Suboffice under way

Construction should begin today on the county courthouse suboffice just north of the Ruidoso village hall. The construction bid was awarded to Timberlake Construction of Carlsbad and El Paso, Texas, at Friday's county commissioners meeting.

Timberlake had submitted the low bid of the eight bids received on the project, at \$279,900. Miguel Cheng-Guajardo, representing architects Gordon Herkenhoff and Associates, reported that the firm wanted permission to begin construction Monday. A four-month completion time is expected.

Building permits show decrease

A slump in building that began in the summer evidently is continuing in Ruidoso. And it has local builders and Realtors concerned.

When asked if the slowdown has worried the local construction industry, Lincoln County Homebuilders president Paul Jordan replied, "I think they are... a little."

Jordan said several builders, especially those who came here from out of state to take part in the recent building boom in Ruidoso, have left the area to seek work elsewhere.

The evidence of a slowdown is contained in recent building permit figures. Starting in July, the number of permits issued in the village began to show a drop from the amount issued in the first half of the year.

Building permit records were set in March and April of this year.

The number of permits in June was 49, but that mark dropped to 39 by July. In August the total was 34, and in September the number dropped again, to 31. The permits issued in October are up to 37, but it is only speculation whether the increase is a harbinger of a construction upturn.

Those figures compare to a higher number of permits issued at this time last year. The total up until October 1981 was

472 permits. But this year that figure is at 419.

The October 1981 mark of 49 was preceded by 62 permits issued in September 1981, and 41 for August 1981.

Jordan said the slowdown "definitely" should be attributed in part to the devaluation of the Mexican peso. He noted that with the devaluation and the restrictions on taking pesos out of the country, very few Mexican nationals can afford to buy property in this area.

Jordan, who is a Realtor, also points his finger to the glut of new condominiums and townhouses in Ruidoso. He said condominium developments that lack amenities "just aren't selling." But he is optimistic that, with the slowdown on new developments, sales soon will increase.

"We just overbuilt a little bit here," he commented. "We've just got to hope it's going to start (selling) again."

The building permit figures seem to substantiate the claim that more condos were constructed than what there was demand for.

The village has issued no permits for condo developments in the past two months, and the total so far for the year is only 21 permits for condominium projects. At this time last year, the building department had issued a total of 74 permits for condominium construction.

The number of permits for single-family dwellings is about the same as last year, with 305 issued so far in 1982 compared to 301 by last October.

The building permit valuation on the 37 permits for October was \$1,704,972, which brings the year's mark thus far to \$25,552,979 on 419 permits. Last year the figure stood at \$18,492,545 for 472 permits.

The difference in the permit valuation is tied to the change last May in the method of estimating valuation to more accurately reflect construction costs. Until then, permit valuations were estimated at \$20 per square foot.

Permits were issued in October for 27 single-family dwellings, four residential additions or alterations, five commercial buildings and one commercial addition or alteration.

No bus service expected for skiers this year

There will be no bus service picking up skiers in town and taking them to Sierra Blanca Ski resort this winter.

The Inn of the Mountain Gods will run a bus from the Inn to Sierra Blanca but the bus will not stop in town because the Inn's license prohibits stops along the route, said Tommy Morel, director of sales at the Inn.

The Ponderosa Bus Line, which ran out of the Holiday Inn last year, will not run this year because the ownership of the buses is being contested in court. Ann Correges, director of operations at Holiday Inn, said that when Reddington Investments bought the Inn and took over active management, nobody would take responsibility for the buses.

Correges said that even if ownership is decided, the buses will probably not run because they did very little business last year and it would not be worth the investment.

Dick Cull, who ran Sierra Blanca Bus Line from 1975 through 1981, has sold his buses and has no plans to restart the business.

"Every bus service that has operated has lost money," said Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber of Com-

merce.

Lack of steady business is the main stumbling block to a profitable business, according to Cull.

He said he could count on a full bus when bad weather made the drive to Sierra Blanca difficult. But on clear days people prefer to drive their own cars, and Cull said he often did not have two passengers. "The only reason people don't use it is the expense," said Nancy Radzewicz, owner of the West Winds Motel.

Liability insurance alone costs \$3,000 a year for the bus service, said Cull. In addition, the buses can only make one round trip a day with passengers, because of the length of the trip and the difficulty driving against the traffic in the mornings and afternoons.

The high cost of operating the buses drives up the cost of the tickets. Cull charged \$8 a round trip in 1981-82 and the Inn of the Mountain Gods is charging \$10 this year.

When asked if the village might run an inexpensive service such as is available in many other ski resorts, village manager Jim Hine said it could not be done because the service would take the bus out of the village's corporate limits.

Jack Warlick, interim general manager of the Inn of the Mountain Gods, said that

business is steady for the Inn's bus service. He attributed this to the fact that reservations are available at the Inn's front desk and that the bus leaves every day from the Inn parking lot.

He did not know, however, whether the service is profitable or not. Even if it loses money, it is worth it to the Inn as a service to guests, Warlick explained.

Most people contacted did not seem very concerned that the service will not be available this year. Lodgers Radzewicz and Clark Carpenter said that few of their customers used the buses except in incle-

ment weather. Radzewicz said that she tries to arrange carpools among her guests for those who do not like to drive.

Morgan Clough, president of the Chamber of Commerce, indicated that the fact no bus companies ever made money showed that there was little interest in it, and that it would not be missed very much at all.

No one will know until a snowy day this winter what effect no bus service will have. But whatever the case, tourists will not have a service offered at many other ski resorts.

Extraterritorial zoning ordinance review complete

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission met Thursday to complete its review of the Roswell-Chaves County Extraterritorial Zoning Ordinance, making changes where needed for application to this area.

The commission was set up for the purpose of designing an ordinance zoning property surrounding the village limits in a one-mile radius. At the September 9 meeting, each member had been assigned 10 pages of the ordinance to examine before Thursday.

The major change made in the Roswell ordinance was the deletion of several types of business from the list of permissible uses for land zoned commercial. Mike Mulholland suggested that sheet metal businesses, travel trailer parks, automobile sales and service, and filling stations and commercial garages not be allowed in a general commercial zone.

He also suggested that junk yards be permitted in an industrial zone only with a special use permit. Howard Shanks noted that commercial horse breeding and training facilities should be added to the list of permissible uses for industrial-zoned areas.

Ernest McDaniel suggested that a paragraph be added to the ordinance which would prohibit mobile home parks from being established in a flood plain area.

Several references to a flood commissioner, flood and storm drainage master plan and flood district were left in the ordinance although none of these exist in Lincoln County or Ruidoso. Greg Haussler pointed out that there is a need in this area for such and that the references should be included in the ordinance because they probably will be established in the future.

Also questioned in the Roswell ordinance was a regulation stating that the minimum lot size is 10 acres for land in the shallow water basin. Since the State Engineer's Office has jurisdiction over the water basin in this area, it was decided he should be asked to clarify what areas may need to be regulated in this way in Lincoln County.

Walt Wilson suggested the need to increase the maximum penalty for violations of the extraterritorial zoning ordinance—once it is established—due to higher land values in this area.

It was reported that state statutes regulate the amount of fines and/or length of imprisonment which can be levied for violation of municipal or county ordinances. It was decided that the matter will be checked into, however.

Chairman Mill Alcorn reported that he would like to have the first draft of the ordinance completed by the end of this year. A meeting was scheduled for this Thursday, November 11, at 2 p.m. for review of

the ordinance after it has been typed.

The ordinance will have to be approved by the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority before it can be enforced. Members of the zoning authority are county commissioners Ben Hall and John Allen Hightower and village councilman Benny Coulston.

An extraterritorial zoning enforcement officer will also be appointed. Members decided the enforcement officer should be someone recommended by the county and that the position will be discussed with the county manager soon.

Downs P&Z okays plans

Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday approved two requests for construction of commercial buildings and tabled a request to establish a small trailer park.

L. N. Hambrick reported that he plans to construct about 450 mini storage units on slightly more than three acres of property behind the Hollywood Bar. The structures will be concrete and metal and there will be a resident manager at the site.

Commission members noted that the property is already zoned commercial. They indicated that the plans are approved assuming all village fire and setback codes are met and a building permit is obtained.

Hambrick assured P&Z that all codes will be complied with and said he plans to begin on the project right away.

Also approved was a request from Desertaire Oil and Gas to erect an office building on property to be purchased from R. E. Owen Company. P&Z chairman Jim Tidwell, representing Desertaire, noted that the building will have electricity and restrooms.

A request to place four mobile homes on 50-feet by 125-foot lots in Mountain Homes Subdivision was tabled for further consideration. The property is currently zoned R-3 and would need to be changed to CTP (commercial trailer park) if the request is approved, Tidwell reported.

Commission members indicated they hesitate to grant such a variance in one case because they will set a precedent for doing so in other cases. Tidwell said he wants to look at the property in the daylight before making a decision on the matter.

Man jailed after Saturday shootout

A Ruidoso man is being held in the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) jail this morning on \$10,000 bond after allegedly assaulting a woman and shooting at police officers Saturday night.

Jesse Lund, 30, was charged with aggravated assault and aggravated battery on a police officer following the shooting incident at approximately 10:40 p.m. Saturday.

RPD Chief Richard Swenor said officers responded to a call from a woman who claimed Lund assaulted her and threatened her with a gun at the Lincoln Apartments building on Mechem Drive. Swenor said several officers surrounded the building, looked into the windows of the unit where the woman said Lund was, and asked Lund to come out.

The RPD chief said one officer noticed a man sitting inside with a rifle between his legs.

Swenor said officer John Layher approached a window in the back of the apartment and saw the man moving around. After Layher knocked on the window and identified himself as a policeman, Swenor said, the man fired shots through the window.

Layher was not hit by the shots. Swenor said officers then instructed neighboring residents to turn out their lights and stay away from windows. The chief said officers then lobbed two tear gas

canisters into the man's apartment.

Following a brief wait, a woman came crawling out the door, Swenor said. After the woman was out, a man came crawling through the same door, Swenor added.

"Neither one of them were sure if someone else was in there," he said.

Swenor then instructed four officers to don gas masks and inspect the apartment. Swenor reported that one of the officers discovered a man hiding under a bed with a .22 caliber rifle. The man later was identified by the assault victim as Lund.

Lund was taken out of the apartment and booked on the assault charges.

Nobody was injured in the incident. Swenor noted this morning that it is fortunate no one was hurt.

"The Murphy's Law aspect took over," he said, referring to the fact two other people that police did not know about were in the apartment. Murphy's Law is an axiom that says: "If anything can go wrong, it will."

Swenor commended his officers for performing "as they were supposed to."


Life in Germany topic of meeting

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Wasted hot water is bad news

Domestic hot water heating is the second largest use of energy for residential homeowners. The Department of Energy estimates that it accounts for 18 percent of the average homeowner's energy bill in New Mexico.

Ben Casey of Sunbelt Solar Energy said that figures produced by the solar industry estimate that the average family of four is paying approximately \$420 a year to heat its water.

In the future it will be more. The energy problem has not gone away. If energy prices rise at a conservative 15 percent per year, energy bills will double in five years. They will double only if you do not take steps to reduce your energy usage. Water heating is an area where many people can easily save money.

The easiest, cheapest and quickest way to save money is turn down the thermostat on your hot water heater. Most hot water heaters are preset at the factory at 140 degrees. Dennis Fisher, district customer services manager for Texas-New Mexico Power Company, said that most families find they get along fine with 120 degree water.

Rick Kuerston, Buckeye Gas Plant manager, suggests turning the thermostat down a bit at a time until you notice that you are not getting enough hot water to fulfill your needs.

Another way to spend less on hot water is to not waste it. Every time hot water goes down the drain without being used, it is the same as money down the drain.

According to the Texas-New Mexico

Power Company homeowner's energy guide, a hot water heater leaks a drop a second wastes 200 gallons per month or about 180 kilowatt hours of electricity a year. That is \$14.43 a year for a leaky faucet at the current rate of 8.02 cents per KWH.

Texas-New Mexico Power Company has just been granted a rate increase that will increase the cost of a leaky faucet even more. How many leaky faucets are there in your house?

Many of us wash our hands every day by running it when we don't use it. Do you turn on the hot water, wash your hands quickly and turn it off before the hot water ever comes out of the tap? That heated water still has come out of the heater and will cool in the pipes without ever being used.

Does unused hot water flow down the drain while you are shaving? How about just filling the sink up part way and cleaning your razor in that?

Do you turn on the hot water in the shower and let it run while you undress, letting gallons flow down the drain before you even get in?

These are not huge wastes of hot water and not everyone is going to cut back to a spartan lifestyle in order to save a few gallons of hot water. It is good to remember, however, that every time we save a few gallons of hot water we save some money.

By just being aware, you can start to notice when you are getting no benefit from the expensive hot water flowing down the drain, and begin to reduce the waste.

Fisher recommends using electric heat tapes for your exposed water pipes with

caution. Good pipe insulation is the best method to keep the pipes from freezing. The heat tapes have very fragile thermostats that can break easily, said.

An elderly lady once asked Fisher to perform an energy audit on her house. He found a series of heat tapes on pipes under the house where foam insulation and duct tape would have been adequate.

The tapes' thermostats had broken and they were on even in the summer. He replaced them with insulation and the lady's electricity bill dropped \$23 the next month.

Sometimes insulation is not enough and heat tape is required. If installed, it should be inspected regularly to ensure that it is working properly.

If you want to eliminate your water heating bill completely, solar water heaters use the sun's energy instead of gas or electricity to heat your water. The solar water heaters are considerably more expensive than regular water heaters.

However, the federal and state governments combined will pay for 65 percent of the solar heater in the form of direct deductions from your income tax. Combined with the savings earned by the reduced gas and electricity bills, most solar hot water heaters pay for themselves in two to two-and-a-half years for houses that use electricity or propane, and about six years for natural gas homes, said Ben Casey.

By just being aware of your hot water usage and taking a few steps to reduce waste you can easily save money and energy. In fact, why don't you go and turn down the thermostat on your hot water heater right now?



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

Colts ruin Ruidoso finale, 58-6

The Ruidoso High School varsity football team found out why Silver City is ranked first in the state's AAA division when the Warriors lost to the host Colts in the regular season finale 58-6 Friday night.

Silver City didn't waste any time showing its strength against the Warriors.

After Ruidoso got one first down on the opening series of the game, the Warriors had to punt and it took the hosts just four plays to travel 64 yards for a score.

Joe Vasquez ran for five yards to put the ball on the Warrior 49. Quarterback Danny Bowman then completed an 18-yard pass to the 31.

Fullback George Peru ran for two yards to the 29. On the next play, Vasquez' brother Joe ran through a hole on the left side of the line for 29 yards and a touchdown. The extra point attempt was good and the Colts led 7-0 with 8:01 left in the opening period.

The Warriors failed to get a first down on their next series and punted, Silver City taking over on the Ruidoso 44.

Bowman hit Dale Maxwell with a nine-yard pass to the 35 and Jim Vasquez ran for four yards to the 31.

Bowman then hit Joe Vasquez with a short pass and the talented senior ran down the sidelines for the touchdown. The extra point kick was again good and the hosts led 14-0 with 4:52 remaining in the period.

The Warriors fumbled the ensuing kickoff at their own 14 and it took Silver City three plays to get on the scoreboard.

Peru ran for three yards to the 11 and Joe Vasquez gained eight to the three. He ran in for the score with 3:35 left in the first quarter. George Finley ran the extra point in for two points and the Colts held a 22-0 advantage.

Silver City scored on its next series just before the quarter ended, driving 50 yards in four plays. Peru scored from 12 yards out and the extra point was again good for a 29-0 Colt advantage at the first quarter break.

Peru scored his second touchdown on a five-yard run midway through the second period. Finley kicked the extra point and the Colts led 36-0.

The Warriors scored their only touchdown of the game on an 88-yard drive near the end of the second quarter.

From his own 16, Warrior quarterback Billy Woodul hit tight end Mike Douglass on the sidelines and the 6-2 senior ran for 21 yards to the Warrior 37.

Woodul hit Strobel for four yards on a curl pattern to the 41. The duo hooked up again on the next play for nine yards and a first down at the 50.

After an incomplete pass, Woodul connected freshman fullback Mark Langston on a short swing pass for a seven-yard gain to the Silver City 43. Langston then banged for four yards to the 39.

Woodul then hit Douglass on a short pass for a five-yard gain to the 34. On the next play, the senior quarterback found junior split end Curtis Palmer alone in the end zone for the touchdown.

Palmer, who caught the winning pass against Truth or Consequences (T or C) last week, had beaten the one Colt defender easily.

The Warriors tried a two-point conversion but senior wingback Grady Williamson was stopped inches short of the goal line on a sweep and the Colts took a 36-6 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Silver City held the Warriors scoreless in the second half while scoring three touchdowns and a safety for itself.

Ruidoso used a lot of players in the second half and both Woodul and junior Cyrus Simmons saw action at quarterback.

Silver City had a big size advantage over the Warriors, averaging around 180 pounds in both the offensive and defensive lines. Ruidoso's offensive line averaged just under 165 pounds while the defensive line averaged around 150 pounds.

Silver City gained over 300 yards total offense while the Warriors picked up 65

rushing and 116 through the air. Woodul went over the 1,000-yard mark passing for the season. He's believed to be the first Ruidoso quarterback to go over the 1,000 yard mark since Blaine Miller did it for the state AA champions in 1972.

Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt was disappointed about his team's loss but wasn't surprised at the way Silver City looked.

"They didn't do anything that surprised us," he said. "We just couldn't stop them.

They're an awfully good team. I'd say the state title is going to be between them and Artesia.

"I thought our offensive line did a great job pass blocking. I think Billy did a good job passing, especially since he had a couple dropped."

NOTES: Deming finished second in the district race with a 4-1 record. The Wildcats topped T or C 39-22 Friday. In the other district finale, Tularosa rolled over Cobre 25-7.

Even though Ruidoso High School won't be in the state AAA division football playoffs this year, the competition in all the divisions should be very interesting.

The AAAA division, composed of New Mexico's largest high schools, has a number of outstanding teams that could play in the playoffs. District 4-AAAA, composed of teams like Clovis, Carlsbad and Roswell on the eastern side of the state, is by far the toughest district in New Mexico.

Clovis won the state championship last season and finished second to Eldorado of Albuquerque in 1980.

However, Hobbs looks like the best bet for the state AAAA title. The Eagles finished second in the playoffs last season and are probably stronger on defense this year. Hobbs doesn't have an All-American running back like it did last season in Timmy Smith but it probably has a better all-around team.

Alamogordo rates as a darkhorse candidate for the title. The Tigers defeated Sandia of Albuquerque in sudden death last week and are loaded with speed.

Sandia will probably make the playoffs as a second place team but it has perhaps the state's best lineman in Fred Madia, the state champion in the shot put and discus.

A number of other Albuquerque schools like Manzano, Eldorado and Del Norte could also challenge for the title.

But the title will probably belong to a district 4-AAAA team in the end. That's where the best football in the state is played.

In the AAA division, Silver City, Portales and Artesia are probably the best teams. The top schools in the northern part of the state like St. Plus and Aztec are good but not quite on the level of the top southern schools.

Portales is the defending state champion while Silver City has a well-balanced team and finished second last season.

Artesia is always tough and has come on strong this season after a slow start. The Bulldogs have one of the best quarterbacks in the state in Scott Runyan.

Portales is tough and strong, just like it was last season. It has the added advantage of being the defending champion and that helps a lot when the pressure is on the line.

Look for Portales to win the title again, beating out Silver City in the title game by a close margin. Last season Portales topped the Colts by a 20-16 score.

Next season Ruidoso could be in the AAA playoffs.

The Warriors will have nine defensive starters and five offensive starters plus some fine prospects from the junior varsity squad and a strong White Mountain Middle School team.

Ruidoso also got some probable help for next season when a 6-3, 240-pound athlete from Goddard High School of Roswell transferred to the Warrior campus last week.

Ruidoso didn't have much size this season but that's something a 240-pound lineman can cure very quickly!

New Mexico Game and Fish News

If I've said it once, I've said it a thousand times. Be sure of your target!

This statement is repeated many times across New Mexico at this time of year by hunter training instructors. In this way at least hunters under the age of 18, who are required by law to receive hunter safety training, are exposed to the importance of this basic safety rule.

Unfortunately, and quite tragically, this rule has already been violated by one adult hunter this year.

New Mexico recorded its first firearms hunting fatality for 1982 on Friday, October 8, when an elk hunter shot another elk hunter in the head at a range of 30-35 yards in thick aspen growth 13 miles south of Coyote. The shooter told State Police that he had seen and shot at a bull elk but apparently missed it, instead hitting the unseen hunter beyond the bull. The incident was investigated and results have

been turned over to a district attorney for possible prosecution.

I'm sure you're wondering about the same thing I did when I first heard the "accident" report. In the first place, how did the shooter get that close to a bull elk in thick aspen? If the brush was so thick how did he know it was an elk? Was the elk really ever there? If he saw the elk why didn't he see the hunter? If the elk was moving through the brush at such close range, it must have been moving quickly trying to get away, so did the hunter ever really have a reasonable shot through the aspen? And finally, did the hunter simply shoot at a sound?

I haven't seen the investigation report for this incident so I don't know anymore about the shooter's story. But, he obviously wasn't sure of his target. And because he didn't follow all the rules of safe hunting, I can't call the incident an "accident." The bullet was not fired by

chance or accident. The shooter consciously pulled the trigger without knowing exactly what his target was or where his bullet would land if he missed his target.

Another detail to note is that the victim in this shooting was wearing a faded yellow jacket and a white cap, colors which blend in with the natural colors of an aspen grove in the fall. A blaze orange jacket and cap may have saved his life.

The seriousness of this incident should come to bear on all hunters preparing for the remaining elk hunts and the upcoming deer seasons. Hunters must realize that when they make the decision to pull the trigger on a high power rifle they are making the decision to release a deadly force. The conditions under which they do so must be entirely within the rules of safe gun handling.

There is no excuse for a firearms "accident."

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
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

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—They treated the deans with deference, though some within the deanly group appeared not to have gotten the message.

These are deans from colleges and universities in the state which train teachers.

Some of them appear to have come to this meeting in Santa Fe to discuss whether we should have tests of professional competence for those who want to be school teachers in New Mexico.

That is no longer the question. It has been so ordered.

This meeting of the Professional Standards Commission and its committee on testing is to get on with project—specifically to talk about what kind of tests will be administered.

No amount of digging-in of heels by deans or administrators or teachers' unions is going to change that now.

Admittedly, that doesn't make a lot of people in the school systems happy. They feel somewhat demeaned that their professional group is being singled out for special testing, both inside the schools of education and for teachers already on the payrolls.

Some may even fear the tests in the belief that certain individuals will not do too well. "Do you think every practicing attorney could pass the bar exams if he or she had to take them over?" some have been heard to mutter.

Probably not—but that's not the question.

The reason teachers and would-be teachers got stuck with this onerous duty is that they are solely funded in their posts by government funds.

It is the belief of many in government, specifically of many in our state

Legislature, that those who provide the dough have a right to demand some form of accountability.

What's more, when they observe a marked decline in the quality of education in the schools which absorb by far the largest share of the revenues the state disburses, they can hardly help averting to the fact that the quality of teaching may have something to do with that.

To many of us who aren't teachers, that seems logical enough.

Still, the teachers stay unhappy at the thought.

To many lawmakers, and some plain-citizen citizens as well, that seems like sending us a message that we must accept educators, unlike those in other professional and trade groups, on faith.

But you can't test teaching ability, they say. How can it be measured? It's too elusive, too evanescent, too impalpable for measurement.

Some of us just won't accept that belief. We observe, for instance, that there isn't a principal worth his or her salt who can't tell you who are the good and the bad teachers in the building.

Teachers themselves also know.

So how do they reach those conclusions? Isn't there some form of testing which may be used, just as teachers themselves use extensive testing to determine which are successful students?

In New Mexico, we intend to try to find such teacher-tests, and no amount of moaning and groaning is going to change that now.

Deans and such could contribute more to the process by making an honest effort to advise us on how to go about this in a rational manner.

Which one of you old boys wants to be parks and recreation director?

The "old boy network"—by which persons are placed in public sector jobs by connections rather than qualifications—has been known to exist. What a shame if it were to operate in this important choice.

It works like this: a job opens up or is created by state requirement or public pressure or whatever reason. Such-and-such person expresses an interest in the job. The person or persons charged with filling the job agree, "Such-and-such is a good old boy—let's give it to him."

Presto! You have a person filling a job not by virtue of training or education or experience in that field, but because he or she was around and was interested.

If a job is important enough to create in the first place, it is important enough to fill with the best possible person. The only way to find such a person is to advertise as widely as possible, within reason, that the job is open.

Parks and recreation is a highly specialized field. The village council has taken a giant step by authorizing the position of director, but the next step—finding a qualified director—is the most important.

The Parks and Recreation Commission should be called on for suggestions on advertising the director's position, and invited to screen the candidates.—TP

I suppose experienced travelers can make the kind of trip Cathy and I made last weekend without having it phase them too much. But we were phased.

Our problem was how to stretch a weekend and go all the way to Missouri, economically, without having to make the 15-hour drive both ways. The answer was to drive-fly-drive.

El Paso, Texas, and Tulsa, Oklahoma, have two things in common which made this feasible. First, they are fairly close (two to three hours drive) to what would be our starting points and destinations—Ruidoso and Springfield, Missouri.

Second, they are both served by Southwest Airlines, which offers very good fares on its routes.

So we drove to El Paso, hopped on a plane to Dallas, caught another flight to Tulsa, rented a car, and cruised on over to Springfield. Sounds simple, no?

And it was simple, in that we pulled it off without a hitch, both ways. But jet lag or time zone shift or something caught up with us, because it was too weird, having worked half a day in Ruidoso, to be driving along the Will Rogers Turnpike in Oklahoma late that night, Missouri bound.

Through a stroke of luck, the car rental company did not have our reservation for a "sub-compact," so they gave us a new fire engine red Camaro at the same rate. Blasting the Tulsa FM stations on the stereo radio enhanced the unreality.

Probably the fact we were famished did, too, but we rectified that by stopping in that restaurant built over the turnpike. I chose a window table and watched Cathy give a start when a big semi zoomed under us as she took a bite of sandwich.

Fortified, we drove on, and arrived in the "Queen City" around 1 a.m.

The next morning, we woke to find the Ozarks ablaze with fall colors. People told us we had hit it just right for the turning of the leaves.

A few miles east of Springfield toward Branson is the little town of Highlandville, and we drove down there to see Cathy's grandmother. I guess Highlandville is a town—I've never been able to figure out what is there besides Uncle Gene's grocery-gas station.

Anyway, the place is kind of special to us because we got married in a field out behind the store.

Wanting to be able to identify the trees providing the brilliant display of color, I asked Cathy's aunt which were which. She explained that the leaves of the hard maples turn red, and the leaves of the soft maples turn yellow.

That was as much arboreal knowledge as I picked up (I'll do better next time, Dannie).

But the trees sure were pretty to look at. The hard maples are spectacular, with

their distinctively shaped leaves carpeting the ground beneath their boughs in red.

On our second afternoon in the "Show Me State," I made a run with my pal Jim Klousia up to Bolivar, some 25 miles north. This afforded a view of the rolling countryside—the hills which give the Ozarks their special charm.

When I first went to Missouri to school, I was prepared to dislike it. In my mind, I had lumped it into some vague geographical mass called "the Midwest."

If the truth be known, I thought I was "too cool," being a Colorado native who grew up in New Mexico.

But two years in the Ozarks made me a believer, though I think I appreciate it even more when I go back than I did while living there.

Jim and I played some tennis on the backyard court of our former coach, John Bryant, for whom we played at Southwest Baptist College (now University). The court adjoins a heavily wooded area.

There must have been thousands of birds in those trees, singing their evening song. It was a mellow setting indeed.

The excuse for going to Missouri at the end of October was the SBU varsity-alumni tournament, and it took place Saturday. This is an annual get-together of present and past players—the first one I had made since graduating in '76.

Klousia and I are two of the former SBU players who went on to coach at the collegiate level (Jim is men's coach at Southwest Missouri State University). But we agreed that neither of us had found the satisfactions in coaching that Coach Bryant can take.

Part of the reason is that he has been able to give people (us, to name two) a means to greatly better their lives through sport. And I know Coach Bryant is as proud that he can number doctors, lawyers and a newspaper editor (!) among his ex-players as he is of district titles and national rankings and such.

So it was a great feeling Saturday to be playing and to look around and see the courts filled with my fellow players, and to be a part of it.

That night, at the post-tournament party, the present players and their girlfriends played charades, while the past players and their wives admired one couple's new baby, and talked about our jobs and our lives.

LANGUAGES OF THE CARIBBEAN
The islands of the Caribbean offer foreign flavor as well as sun, sand and the special island languor. There are Spanish, French, Dutch and English islands, as well as American.

There are six Dutch islands in the Caribbean: the ABC's (Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao) and the 3 S's (St. Maarten, St. Eustatius, Saba). Dutch is the official language, but English, Spanish, and local dialects are heard more frequently.

Martinique, Guadeloupe and St. Barthelmy are still French property, and very French in ambience. On Martinique and Guadeloupe, the natives speak a Creole patois.

French is also the official language of Haiti. Five other island countries, Dominica, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Grenada, The Grenadines—changed hands often between England and France in the early days; all inhabitants speak a French patois, although English is the official language on St. Vincent and Grenada.

Many islands were originally English possessions, but you'll find the accents vary. Montserrat, for example, speaks with a brougue, a result of early Irish settlement. Jamaican patois is a mixture of Welsh and African.

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
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

4. The Election shall be held at the Multi-Purpose Room of the Village Library, and persons entitled to vote at this Election may vote at said Library between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
