## TRAFFIC PROBLEMS LEFT TO VILLAGE

# Highway Department has little to offer

Village of Ruidoso officials went into a meeting with state Highway Department representatives Thursday looking for solutions, but came out of the session only with suggestions from the state officials that Ruidoso must solve its own traffic problems.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss several traffic problems in Ruidoso, primarily the congestion on State Highway 37 in the summer and how to relieve it. The village also briefed the Highway Department on the high accident rate, downtown parking problems, signing and traffic signal problems and the need for widening Mechem Drive.

Village officials—including assistant village manager Frank Potter, police chief Richard Swenor, Planning and Zoning Commission chairman John Schuller, and Greg Masters, a member of the ad hoc advisory committee on traffic—addressed the state authorities.

The delegation from the Highway Department was led by Tony Gonzales, planning director for the department. Joining Gonzales were: Lou Madrano, state head of traffic services; Worth Smelser, District 2 engineer; Erving Sisk, District 2 maintenance; and Ralph Smith, with District 2 signing.

District 2, which is headquartered in Roswell, encompasses Lincoln County. State Representative-elect Marvin "Mickey" McGuire also sat in on the discussion, as did Mayor George White and village councilmen Benny Coulston, Al Junge and Don Dale.

Potter led off the discussion by telling the state officials the village has several problems on the state route that bisects town, but has "never come up with solutions or commitments from the Highway Department."

"We're looking for solutions today," Potter began.

The main solution Potter and the village were looking for was help from the state to divert traffic off Sudderth and Mechem Drives and onto Gavilan Canyon Road.

Gavilan Canyon Road has long been included in the village comprehensive plan as an alternate traffic route to relieve Highway 37 through the village.

In fact, it was pointed out at the meeting by Coulston that plans for the bypass have been discussed since 1970.

The main problem in getting the state to include the route in the state alternate highway system is improving the road to state standards. The 1976 comprehensive plan for the village shows a link to Gavilan starting approximately in the vicinity of Frank's Fruit Market on Highway 70.

Gonzales said the state has always indicated it would take over the alternate route subject to its connection to U.S. Highway 70 and the right-of-way being dedicated to the state.

But Potter noted nothing has been accomplished on the connection. He added

that the village believes the intersection off Highway 70 should be addressed by the state as part of improvements being carried out on the highway.

Gonzales said funds for upgrading Highway 70 expire this year, and that he is unsure of future appropriations for the route. He said \$1.3 million has been spent on a section of the highway through the Mescalero Reservation.

Gonzales added that it would be at least another six years before the connector could be considered on the state plan for U.S. 70 if the village chooses that avenue. The planning director then suggested the village earmark a portion of the funds that it receives annually from the state on a 50-50 cooperative road funding program to the project.

Potter asked if the Highway Department could design the project in its planning department.

Gonzales answered that the planners now are "overloaded" with work, and it is unlikely they can take on more. He said the "most expeditious" way to get the design completed is for the joint powers proposing the bypass to hire a consultant.

Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Lincoln County have signed a joint powers agreement to participate in the alternate route project.

Councilman Dale asked why the project is "always put on the back burner" since it has been on the drawing board for 12 years.

Gonzales noted the bypass is not on the state system, and the Highway Department has limited funds to maintain its 12,000 miles of roads in the state.

"Under Commission (State Highway Commission) policy," he said, "we can't accept a road until it's completed."

Potter interjected, "We kind of feel your problem and our problem is the same problem." He said if Highway 37 does not meet future needs, then the state should help with the solution.

"We're willing to cooperate on funding of construction," Gonzales pointed out, referring to the 50-50 cooperative program and the state Municipal Arterial Program (MAP). The MAP program is a 75 percent match from the state to a 25 percent match from municipalities for bypass route projects.

But Gonzales noted that the MAP method of funding could cost more than the co-op because MAP projects must go out to bid.

The work on cooperative projects is done by municipal street departments with the state supplying 50 percent of the funding.

Gonzales said the Legislature appropriated \$10 million in co-op funding this year, with \$2 million earmarked for each of the Highway Department's five districts.

Ruidoso street superintendent Jack LaMay said the village share this year is \$150,000—\$100,000 less than what was requested.

Potter switched the subject of the proposed link to a temporary solution which

he said would "basically save Ruidoso's life."

The proposal, which Councilman Junge called a "Band-Aid deal," is to upgrade Walnut Drive—located next to Gibson's at the "Y"—to serve as a temporary link to Gavilan. Village officials said the connector is needed immediately so traffic can be diverted from midtown by next summer's racing season.

Worth Smelser said the paving of Walnut should be done with this year's co-op money.

Potter said the remaining funds—which enabled paving of many village streets last summer—are earmarked for the completion of improvements to Leon Farrar Drive and University Drive.

LaMay estimated that the Walnut project would cost \$65,000.

Potter said after the meeting that the village would take some of this year's co-op money to fund the work on Walnut.

Village officials presented the state visitors a list of village daily traffic counts, accidents and parking problems to support their case that something needs to be done to relieve Highway 37 traffic in the summer.

John Schuller read the figures from average daily traffic (ADT) counts that were done this year. He said the March average for Gavilan Canyon Road was 936, while the number increased to 1,861 in July.

The average for Sudderth in March was almost 18,000 per day, and the number climbed to 23,260 in July. He said the July counts were evidence of the "tourista" impact on traffic.

Gonzales speculated that Gavilan Canyon probably could carry double what it now does.

Schuller said the zoning of his commission (Planning and Zoning) is that "the immediate expediency of Gavilan" would provide the best relief for the village.

Gonzales asked about the 1980 census count for Ruidoso. He said he was told the population two years ago was 4,280, but Mayor White noted the village gears its planning for a year-round population of 12,000.


Planning and Zoning enforcement officer John Cupp said 5,800 house units—including condominiums—are occupied.

Noting the growth potential of the village, he said 419 1982 building permits had been issued as of November 1, and the total permits for last year was 600. He added that about 7,500 lots are vacant, but have been approved for building on.

Chief Swenor quoted the accident rate in the village, and offered solutions to decreasing the rate.

Swenor said the village will exceed the all-time high of accidents this year. He said there already have been over 500 accidents—more than the entire 1979 amount.

Swenor said in the last three years the village has had more accidents than any city of similar population in New Mexico,

and also has had more than larger cities such as Grants, Las Vegas, Deming and Belen.

"We need to slow traffic down on Sudderth," Swenor declared.

He advised the main emphasis for making the streets safer is to increase the number of speed limit signs on Highway 37, and to add traffic signals at busy intersections.

But state traffic director Lou Madrano said "reducing the speed limit is almost a misnomer," because "the traveling public will drive at the speed that is comfortable."

Swenor agreed that compliance is already "lousy" on certain sections of Sudderth and Mechem.

Ralph Smith said, "You're swimming upstream against a real swift current if you try to post an arbitrary speed limit." He also contended enough regulatory signs exist, but that they are overlooked because of competition with business signs.

Jack Johnson, area State Police supervisor, said the highest accident frequency in the county is along the stretch from Alto to Angus Hill. But he noted the speed limit in Alto is already 25 miles per hour, which he called "completely unrealistic."

Johnson suggested, however, that Mechem be widened from Alto into the village because of an "insurmountable problem" with growth and traffic on the highway.

Coulston also asked about widening and the addition of turning lanes on Mechem.

He said the growth on Mechem "staggers the mind." He said "it's not our fault" there is so much building in the village, and he said residents should be grateful there is a traffic problem here, because depressed areas of the state do not have to worry about traffic.

He said last year Realtors handled \$100 million in transactions in the village.

Turning to the Gavilan Canyon bypass issue, Coulston asked, "If we don't have the money, at what point can we get help on engineering?"

Gonzales reiterated that the state "is in the same boat" concerning a lack of funds.

Gonzales speculated that, with the support of new Legislators such as Mickey McGuire, the state may release more funds for relief routes next year. But he said the Highway Department is looking at a shortage of nearly \$150 million in revenue to apply toward budgeted projects.

Coulston wondered if village officials should approach Legislators, the Lincoln County Commissioners and the Highway Commission and inform the authorities about the village's traffic problems.

Madrano suggested the village should go those routes, and get its priorities in order. Gonzales said that two years ago, the main local concern was improving the Ski Run Road. It was pointed out that project is not yet finished.

Potter said the village is not in a position to drop any of the priorities.

Gonzales also said the responsibility for

traffic is two-fold. He said the state must determine the highway needs, while the village should control development.

When it was pointed out the Safeway store under construction on Mechem will be the largest in the Southwest, Gonzales responded: "We didn't build Safeway... the problems occur after the roads are designed and built."

Greg Masters asked for state input on the parking problem downtown.

Masters noted the ad hoc committee completed a survey of parking problems, and the worst problem is with congestion in a seven-block area in midtown. He asked if Sudderth was crowded in that section because of the parking lanes lining the street.

It was pointed out the street is generally wide enough in midtown.

When Masters asked about controlling delivery truck schedules for midtown, Madrano said it can be done with local ordinances.

Gonzales noted the parking problem is caused primarily from the lack of off-street parking.

Masters agreed, and said two one-acre areas are being looked at in midtown for parking lots. He did not specify the location of the lots.

After the meeting concluded, Potter said the council will have to hold a workshop to discuss its priorities and the direction to take. He said the village's case will have to be taken to the Highway Commission.

## SBAC chairman denies Ag Secretary's claim

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman Fred Heckman called comments made by state Agriculture Secretary Bill Stephens at a governor's cabinet meeting Wednesday false.

"We've had no conversation with Bill Stephens whatsoever," Heckman said Friday.

The Associated Press last week quoted Stephens as saying before the cabinet that the report completed by the National Academy of Sciences which says New Mexico State University (NMSU) research and an airport cannot coexist on the preferred airport site on Fort Stanton Mesa means the airport "will be built on Site A."

SBAC prefers Site B on the mesa, but has been engaged in a long conflict over that site with NMSU, which leases the land containing Site B to conduct range research. Stephens was also quoted as saying

SBAC has accepted the report, and has asked for a broad base of help to acquire Site A, which adjoins the NMSU land and is on a mix of state, federal and private property.

But at meetings following the release of the Academy report, SBAC never committed itself to abandoning Site B. In fact the commission has decided to approach elected officials and seek advice on what to do.

"As per the commission's instructions," Heckman said, "we're going to build an airport on the mesa. We're still after both sites."

Heckman noted that concerned parties are feeling pressure to get something done since the release of the report, and he speculated that that prompted Stephens to comment on the issue.

But Heckman repeated the commission's stand is unchanged.

"Our stand is we're waiting and seeing. We're still taking a look at both Site A and Site B."

Stephens could not be reached for comment.



## TRAFFIC PROBLEMS LEFT TO VILLAGE

# Highway Department has little to offer

Village of Ruidoso officials went into a meeting with state Highway Department representatives Thursday looking for solutions, but came out of the session only with suggestions from the state officials that Ruidoso must solve its own traffic problems.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss several traffic problems in Ruidoso, primarily the congestion on State Highway 37 in the summer and how to relieve it. The village also briefed the Highway Department on the high accident rate, downtown parking problems, signing and traffic signal problems and the need for widening Mechem Drive.

Village officials—including assistant village manager Frank Potter, police chief Richard Swenor, Planning and Zoning Commission chairman John Schuller, and Greg Masters, a member of the ad hoc advisory committee on traffic—addressed the state authorities.

The delegation from the Highway Department was led by Tony Gonzales, planning director for the department. Joining Gonzales were: Lou Madrano, state head of traffic services; Worth Smelser, District 2 engineer; Erving Sisk, District 2 maintenance; and Ralph Smith, with District 2 signing.

District 2, which is headquartered in Roswell, encompasses Lincoln County. State Representative-elect Marvin "Mickey" McGuire also sat in on the discussion, as did Mayor George White and village councilmen Benny Coulston, Al Junge and Don Dale.

Potter led off the discussion by telling the state officials the village has several problems on the state route that bisects town, but has "never come up with solutions or commitments from the Highway Department."

"We're looking for solutions today," Potter began. The main solution Potter and the village were looking for was help from the state to divert traffic off Sudderth and Mechem Drives and onto Gavilan Canyon Road.

Gavilan Canyon Road has long been included in the village comprehensive plan as an alternate traffic route to relieve Highway 37 through the village. In fact, it was pointed out at the meeting by Coulston that plans for the bypass have been discussed since 1970.

The main problem in getting the state to include the route in the state alternate highway system is improving the road to state standards. The 1976 comprehensive plan for the village shows a link to Gavilan starting approximately in the vicinity of Frank's Fruit Market on Highway 70.

Gonzales said the state has always indicated it would take over the alternate route subject to its connection to U.S. Highway 70 and the right-of-way being dedicated to the state.

But Potter noted nothing has been accomplished on the connection. He added

that the village believes the intersection of Highway 70 should be addressed by the state as part of improvements being carried out on the highway.

Gonzales said funds for upgrading Highway 70 expire this year, and that he is unsure of future appropriations for the route. He said \$1.3 million has been spent on a section of the highway through the Mescalero Reservation.

Gonzales added that it would be at least another six years before the connector could be considered on the state plan for U.S. 70 if the village chooses that avenue. The planning director then suggested the village earmark a portion of the funds that it receives annually from the state on a 50-50 cooperative road funding program to the project.

Potter asked if the Highway Department could design the project in its planning department.

Gonzales answered that the planners now are "overloaded" with work, and it is unlikely they can take on more. He said the "most expeditious" way to get the design completed is for the village to hire a consultant.

Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Lincoln County have signed a joint powers agreement to participate in the alternate route project.

Councilman Dale asked why the project is "always put on the back burner" since it has been on the drawing board for 12 years.

Gonzales noted the bypass is not on the state system, and the Highway Department has limited funds to maintain its 12,000 miles of roads in the state.

"Under Commission (State Highway Commission) policy," he said, "we can't accept a road until it's completed."

Potter interjected, "We kind of feel your problem and our problem is the same problem." He said if Highway 37 does not meet future needs, then the state should help with the solution.

"We're willing to cooperate on funding of construction," Gonzales pointed out, referring to the 50-50 cooperative program and the state Municipal Arterial Program (MAP). The MAP program is a 75 percent match from the state to a 25 percent match from municipalities for bypass route projects.

But Gonzales noted that the MAP method of funding could cost more than the co-op because MAP projects must go out to bid.

The work on cooperative projects is done by municipal street departments with the state supplying 50 percent of the funding.

Gonzales said the Legislature appropriated \$10 million in co-op funding this year, with \$2 million earmarked for each of the Highway Department's five districts.

Ruidoso street superintendent Jack LaMay said the village share this year is \$150,000—\$100,000 less than what was requested.

Potter switched the subject of the proposed link to a temporary solution which

he said would "basically save Ruidoso's life."

The proposal, which Councilman Junge called a "Band-Aid deal," is to upgrade Walnut Drive—located next to Gibson's at the "Y"—to serve as a temporary link to Gavilan. Village officials said the connector is needed immediately so traffic can be diverted from midtown by next summer's racing season.

Worth Smelser said the paving of Walnut should be done with this year's co-op money.

Potter said the remaining funds—which enabled paving of many village streets last summer—are earmarked for the completion of improvements to Leon Farrar Drive and University Drive.

LaMay estimated that the Walnut project would cost \$65,000.

Potter said after the meeting that the village would take some of this year's co-op money to fund the work on Walnut.

Village officials presented the state visitors a list of figures on daily traffic counts, accidents and parking problems to support their case that something needs to be done to relieve Highway 37 traffic in the summer.

John Schuller read the figures from average daily traffic (ADT) counts that were done this year. He said the March average for Gavilan Canyon Road was 938, while the number increased to 1,861 in July.

The average for Sudderth in March was about 10,000 per day, and the number climbed to 23,260 in July. He said the July counts were evidence of the "tourista" impact on traffic.

Gonzales speculated that Gavilan Canyon probably could carry double what it now does.

Schuller said the position of his commission (Planning and Zoning) is that "the immediate expediency of Gavilan" would provide the best relief for the village.

Gonzales asked about the 1980 census count for Ruidoso. He said he was told the population two years ago was 4,280, but Mayor White noted the village gears its planning for a year-round population of 12,000.

Planning and Zoning enforcement officer John Cupp said 5,800 house units—including condominiums—are occupied.

Noting the growth potential of the village, he said 419 1982 building permits had been issued as of November 1, and the total permits for last year was 600. He added that about 7,500 lots are vacant, but have been approved for building on.

Chief Swenor quoted the accident rate in the village, and offered solutions to decreasing the rate.

Swenor said the village will exceed the all-time high of accidents this year. He said there already have been over 500 accidents—more than the entire 1979 amount.

Swenor said in the last three years the village has had more accidents than any city of similar population in New Mexico,

and also has had more than larger cities such as Grants, Las Vegas, Deming and Belen.

"We need to slow traffic down on Sudderth," Swenor declared.

He advised the main emphasis for making the streets safer is to increase the number of speed limit signs on Highway 37, and to add traffic signals at busy intersections.

But state traffic director Lou Madrano said "reducing the speed limit is almost a misnomer," because "the traveling public will drive at the speed that is comfortable."

Swenor agreed that compliance is already "lousy" on certain sections of Sudderth and Mechem.

Ralph Smith said, "You're swimming upstream against a real swift current if you try to post an arbitrary speed limit." He also contended enough regulatory signs exist, but that they are overlooked because of competition with business signs.

Jack Johnson, area State Police supervisor, said the highest accident frequency in the county is along the stretch from Alto to Angus Hill. But he noted the speed limit in Alto is already 25 miles per hour, which he called "completely unrealistic."

Johnson suggested, however, that Mechem be widened from Alto into the village because of an "insurmountable problem" with growth and traffic on the highway.

Coulston also asked about widening and the addition of turning lanes on Mechem.

He said the growth on Mechem "stagers the mind." He said "it's not our fault" there is so much building in the village, and he said residents should be grateful there is a traffic problem here, because depressed areas of the state do not have to worry about traffic.

He said last year Realtors handled \$100 million in transactions in the village.

Turning to the Gavilan Canyon bypass issue, Coulston asked, "If we don't have the money, at what point can we get help on engineering?"

Gonzales reiterated that the state "is in the same boat" concerning a lack of funds. Gonzales speculated that, with the support of new Legislators such as Mickey McGuire, the state may release more funds for relief routes next year. But he said the Highway Department is looking at a shortage of nearly \$150 million in revenue to apply toward budgeted projects.

Coulston wondered if village officials should approach Legislators, the Lincoln County Commissioners and the Highway Commission and inform the authorities about the village's traffic problems.

Madrano suggested the village should go those routes, and get its priorities in order. Gonzales said that two years ago, the main local concern was improving the Ski Run Road. It was pointed out that project is not yet finished.

Potter said the village is not in a position to drop any of the priorities. Gonzales also said the responsibility for

traffic is two-fold. He said the state must determine the highway needs, while the village should control development.

When it was pointed out the Safeway store under construction on Mechem will be the largest in the Southwest, Gonzales responded: "We didn't build Safeway... the problems occur after the roads are designed and built."

Greg Masters asked for state input on the parking problem downtown.

Masters noted the ad hoc committee completed a survey of parking problems, and the worst problem is with congestion in a seven-block area in midtown. He asked if Sudderth was crowded in that section because of the parking lanes lining the street.

It was pointed out the street is generally wide enough in midtown. When Masters asked about controlling delivery truck schedules for midtown, Madrano said it can be done with local ordinances.

Gonzales noted the parking problem is caused primarily from the lack of off-street parking.

Masters agreed, and said two one-acre areas are being looked at in midtown for parking lots. He did not specify the location of the lots.

After the meeting concluded, Potter said the council will have to hold a workshop to discuss its priorities and the direction to take. He said the village's case will have to be taken to the Highway Commission.

## SBAC chairman denies Ag Secretary's claim

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman Fred Heckman called comments made by state Agriculture Secretary Bill Stephens a governor's cabinet meeting Wednesday false.

"We've had no conversation with Bill Stephens whatsoever," Heckman said Friday.

The Associated Press last week quoted Stephens as saying before the cabinet that the report completed by the National Academy of Sciences which says New Mexico State University (NMSU) research and an airport cannot coexist on the preferred airport site on Fort Stanton Mesa means the airport "will be built on Site A."

SBAC prefers Site B on the mesa, but has been engaged in a long conflict over that site with NMSU, which leases the land containing Site B to conduct range research. Stephens was also quoted as saying

SBAC has accepted the report, and has asked for a broad base of help to acquire Site A, which adjoins the NMSU land and is on a mix of state, federal and private property.

But at meetings following the release of the Academy report, SBAC never committed itself to abandoning Site B. In fact the commission has decided to approach elected officials and seek advice on what to do.

"As per the commission's instructions," Heckman said, "we're going to build an airport on the mesa. We're still after both sites."

Heckman noted that concerned parties are feeling pressure to get something done since the release of the report, and he speculated that that prompted Stephens to comment on the issue.

But Heckman repeated the commission's stand is unchanged. "Our stand is we're waiting and seeing. We're still taking a look at both Site A and Site B."

Stephens could not be reached for comment.

# Scouts complete service projects

Schmidt organized a group that cut seven-and-a-half cords of wood and distributed it to needy families and to the First Presbyterian Church. Schluter organized a campaign to remove trash from the Ruidoso High School and village hall grounds. Flack organized the annual Fun Day at the Park last spring.

The Scouts had to design, organize and supervise an approved project to benefit a

church or school or the community in general. The first step is to write up a proposal, which has to be approved by the Conquistador Council in Roswell. Then the Scout has to organize all the logistics of the project.

Schluter said the organization was by far the hardest part of the project. He spent 21 hours organizing and four hours actually picking up trash.

Schluter talked to Ruidoso High School principal Tom Hanson and village manager Jim Hine in order to get permission to clean up the areas. He wrote and sent a letter for publication in The Ruidoso News asking Scouts and Scout parents for help in the project. He also talked to two Cub Scout packs and a Webelo pack, asking for their help.

Saturday, on the high school grounds, he directed the volunteers in their cleanup efforts. By the end of the day, after 175 man-hours of work, the group had collected 1,209 gallons of trash—1,053 at the high school (measured in trash bags). The volunteers piled it in Schmidt's pickup truck and deposited it in trash dumpsters around town.

Schmidt said the hardest part of organizing his project was finding families that needed the wood. The Ruidoso Downs Police Department helped him find needy families or elderly people who rely on wood for their winter heat and had little or no resources to obtain it.

The First Presbyterian Church was given wood because it sponsors many other church groups that come to ski during the winter.

Schmidt also had help from many people who donated trucks and saws in addition to their time and effort. Jim Dickinson and Jay Eastep donated saws and trucks. James Whitecotton donated his saw. Without the wood splitter of Jim

Wooldridge and J. C. Hughes the job would have been immeasurably harder, said Scoutmaster Rudy Flack. Flack also thanked Don Dorman and Ralph Belen for allowing the Scouts to cut the wood on Dorman's land.

Monday night Mark Flack, Schmidt and Schluter will spend one to two hours being questioned about why they think they should become Eagle Scouts. They will also be asked about current events and other subjects by the Board of Review.

"They just want to find out about you," said Schluter. He was studying for the interview Sunday night and admitted that he was a little nervous. "It's the thing that decides whether you make Eagle or not," he explained.

# New X-ray techs enjoying Ruidoso

A California couple who recently joined the staff of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital had a simple reason for coming here.

"We wanted to move someplace mellow," said Stephen Hedval, radiological technologist at the hospital. Late in September, Stephen, his wife Francine, son Eric and their golden retriever moved here from San Diego, California.

Francine and Stephen both work in the radiological department at the hospital. They take X-rays of patients.

Francine is also trained as a nuclear medicine technologist, which allows her to use radioactive material to scan different organs of the body otherwise invisible to X-rays.

Stephen talked about their reasons for leaving California.

The couple owned a house near the beach, and they had challenging careers and an active social life in San Diego. But Francine worked days and Stephen worked evenings. Stephen took care of Eric during the day, then dropped him off at a babysitter when he went to work. Francine picked up Eric two hours later when she was returning home from work. The couple only saw each other on weekends.

"We just decided one day we needed a change," Stephen said. Stephen's parents live in Albuquerque and Stephen knew about Ruidoso. He called the hospital, and fortunately, there were two openings for people with Francine's and Stephen's qualifications.

"Everything just fell into place," said Stephen. They sold their house, packed their belongings and moved out here in late September.

"We're still getting ourselves settled," said Francine. When asked what the main difference is between their lives in San Diego and in Ruidoso, she said, "The pace, the slowing down, is the main thing."

"It was life in the fast lane," said Stephen. Both work and play were fast-paced in San Diego. They kept busier at bigger hospitals, X-raying more patients. During the little time they did have together, much of it was spent with friends, enjoying the entertainment offerings of a big city.

Here, Francine and Stephen are able to work together. The pace at the hospital is slower and they enjoy the doctors they work with. Stephen said the doctors here are "very down to earth, mellow."

When not at work they spend more time together as a family, pursuing more out-

The much-publicized letter from the American Testing Institute of Miami, Florida, which is being sent around the country to unsuspecting postal patrons guaranteeing them a prize, has surfaced in Ruidoso.

Michael Lovelace of the Ruidoso Police Department said he knows of at least two

area residents who have received the letters.

The letter starts out: "Congratulations!! You have automatically been awarded one of the twenty outstanding gifts listed below, worth between \$260 to \$2,000 ..."

The letter says you can receive one of the gifts—ranging from an Acapulco vacation for two to \$2,000 cash—by filling out a

television response form, and sending in \$14.80 to cover handling costs.

"Just ignore it," Lovelace advises anyone who receives the letter.

He noted the Florida operation is being investigated by the U.S. Postal Service for possible mail fraud in connection with the letter.

"If it looks too good to be true, then it is," suggests Lovelace.

# Downs P&Z proposes standards

A proposal to adopt an ordinance requiring all new homes constructed in Ruidoso Downs to be at least 1,400 square feet, to be built with new materials on the outside, and to be completed within one year from the date construction begins was approved by the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday.

Also approved as part of the proposed or-

dinance was a requirement that any permanent mobile homes placed in the village be no less than 720 square feet, in good repair, and set on a permanent foundation and underpinned with matching materials within one year from the date erected.


In addition, commission members agreed to propose to village trustees that any fencing erected within village limits be required to be of new materials and maintained in good repair.

P&Z also wants to stipulate that plans

for any construction in Ruidoso Downs be presented to and approved by the commission and trustees before a building permit is issued and construction is begun.

P&Z chairman Jim Tidwell said Friday the purpose of the proposals is to "try to improve the quality of buildings in the village." Approval by the board of trustees is required before the suggestions can be adopted.

P&Z is scheduled to report on the matter at Monday's trustees meeting.

Riley said a vehicle driven by Thomas P. Fife, whom Riley said is from out of state, struck the woman as she was walking across the west-bound lane of the highway. The section of the highway is not lighted.

Riley said Clair was cited for crossing the street illegally. Fife was not charged.

Riley also said he would like to credit Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department personnel and Emergency Medical Services technicians for rendering emergency aid to the woman at the scene.


Police report they do not know who owns the pig. The only thing they could ascertain this morning was, the pig must have been "boarded" with life.

## 'Americanism' discussed at recent GOP Women meeting


"Americanism" was the theme of the November meeting of the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County Tuesday at Carrizo Lodge.



for the Warriors, stealing the ball several times.


The Warrior junior varsity will have its next game Friday, December 10, against Cloudcroft in the Ruidoso gymnasium.

# Warrior matmen impress in opener as three wrestlers take first place

One of the most remarkable decisions in recent New Mexico high school sports history was handed down Thursday by the state Board of Education.

The board decided to let Carlsbad High School and Belen High School participate in the AAAA division state football playoffs even though the schools in their districts had voted to send other teams.

There are both positive and negative sides to the board's decision.

The idea of voting in case of a tie for the district championship may not be the soundest way of determining which teams go on to the state playoffs. On the other hand, all the schools knew of the rules before the season started so they all started on an equal footing.

Also, the playoffs have now been extended a week with Hobbs having a bye next weekend. The Eagles will thus have a layoff which could either hurt or help their title chances.

Carlsbad finished in a three-way tie with Clovis and Hobbs for the district 4-AAAA title, while Belen tied with Eldorado and Del Norte for the district 2-AAAA championship.

The district 2-AAAA schools voted to send always-powerful Eldorado and Del Norte to the playoffs while district 4-AAAA schools decided to send defending state champion Clovis and Hobbs on to post-season play.

This caused a ruckus among Carlsbad and Belen coaches, players and fans. Belen followers were upset because their team had a better overall record than Eldorado and Del Norte and because they felt the rest of the district 2-AAAA schools (all Albuquerque schools) sided with Eldorado against Belen because the former school is in the Duke City.

Carlsbad, which had an 8-2 overall record, defeated Clovis and lost to Hobbs during the district season. All three teams are very close in talent. If each team played the other two 10 times apiece, they'd probably split the victories five and five.

However, the playoffs are now in a near shambles because of the board's decision.

Carlsbad defeated Belen handily (38-15) Sunday afternoon. The Cavemen will now meet Alamogordo, a 20-18 winner over Del Norte Friday night, next Friday. Eldorado and Clovis will tangle in another second-round game while Hobbs will be idle.

More than likely, the week off will help Hobbs since it will have a chance to rest its injured players. No wonder the Clovis and Alamogordo coaches have made angry comments about the board's decision.

Ruidoso High School head football coach Darrel Stierwalt feels that voting is probably the best way now available to settle three-way ties.

"I'd have to say that's fair," Stierwalt said. "Either that or flip a coin. Of course, you could have individual voters being in favor of other teams. That has been a problem but there's really no other way to settle the tie."

In case of a two-way tie for first or second place, the team that wins the head-on encounter between the two squads involved gets the bid to the state playoffs.

Ruidoso was in the state football playoffs in the 1981 football season when the Warriors tied with Tularosa for second place in the district 3-AAA standings behind Silver City. Even though Ruidoso had a better overall record, Tularosa got the nod because it had defeated the Warriors 13-0 in district play.

But a three-way tie makes voting almost a necessity for playoff selections. The board set a bad precedent when it decided to let Carlsbad and Belen into the state playoffs.

Hobbs now has an automatic berth in the semi-finals while four other teams must battle it out next weekend.

An injustice has been done!

The University of New Mexico (UNM) football season is over and the Lobos had their best season ever, a sparkling 10-1 campaign.

But there's no bowl for UNM this season. The Hall of Fame Bowl committee passed over the Lobos in favor of the Air Force Academy, a team UNM defeated 49-37 earlier this season!

On top of that, the Falcons only had a 7-4 record on the season.

What was probably the determining factor in the Air Force Academy's favor was its upset victory over Notre Dame Saturday.

The Irish are a legend in college football history, so when the Falcons beat them, they put themselves in line for the bowl bid.

But it's still an injustice to UNM. The Lobos are a better team than the Falcons and most objective football observers know it.

The UNM football players, including former Ruidoso High School standout Lon Nunley, can take solace in the fact they are probably the best team in the entire country not to be invited to a bowl game.

James Herrera, Gary Burgess and Gervase Peso took individual first places as the Ruidoso High School wrestling team opened its season at the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped (NMSVH) Takedown Tournament Saturday in Alamogordo.

There was no team scoring in the tournament but the Warriors performed well and head coach Gerald Ames was pleased.

"We didn't do bad," Ames said. "We'll get better. Some of our young kids did really well."

Peso won the 145 pound title, Herrera the 167 pound class and Burgess, who competed in the state tournament last season, took the 185 pound division.

"Peso is a transfer from Albuquerque," Ames said. "He's an expert in judo and that's similar to wrestling. He's only a sophomore but he looked very good out there. He'll get better."

Herrera, only a freshman, took first over some tough competition. Scott Ciraulo, another Warriors' wrestler, finished third in the 167 pound division. Ciraulo made the state tournament last season but has been coming on slowly in practice because of a football injury.

"Herrera has had three years of wrestling," Ames said about his freshman matman. "He didn't wrestle last season but

has looked good this year. He'll probably drop down to the 145 pound division."

Burgess should also improve, according to Ames.

Henry Rue, a state meet competitor last season, finished second in the 138 pound division. Rue wrestled in the 126 pound class last season and will probably drop below 138 pounds in the near future.

Randy Pierce finished second in the 119 pound competition and Warrior teammate Chuck Schmidt, a starter last season, ended up third.

"Montano is going to be tough," remarked Ames. "This is his first year and he's going to get better. He's still got some things to learn but he's strong. Shipman should also be good."

In the junior high division, Ruidoso took the top three places in the 132 pound class. Zack Swalander won the 132 pound division, Ruben Herrera was second and Billy Harrison third.

The Warriors took 30 wrestlers to the

meet. Silver City and Cobre, two other 3-AAA district schools, had about the same number of matmen entered.

The Warriors' next tournament will also be at N.M.S.V.H., that being held Friday, December 3.

Ruidoso will then travel to El Paso, Texas Friday, December 18 for dual meets with powerhouse Hanks and Eastwood. The Hanks match will be in the morning and the Eastwood one in the afternoon.

## Ruidoso boys' junior varsity to scrimmage tomorrow

The Ruidoso High School boys junior varsity basketball team will compete in a multi-team scrimmage at Alamogordo High School Tuesday.

The scrimmage will begin at 5 p.m. Other teams tentatively scheduled to compete are Alamogordo, Carrizozo and

Capitan.

The Ruidoso varsity will not compete in the scrimmage since the Warriors have already scrimmaged Carlsbad and state rules allow a player to participate in just one scrimmage.

Thornton had 8.15 scores in the floor exercise, vault and balance beam. She scored a 7.5 in the uneven bars.

Richardson scored an excellent 8.2 in the floor exercise, 7.6 in the uneven bars, 7.5 in the vault and 7.25 in the balance beam.

Heid had an outstanding 8.8 in the floor exercise, 8.1 in the vault, 7.95 in the balance beam and 6.5 in the uneven bars.

Duncan scored an 8.05 in the balance beams, 8.0 in the floor exercise, 7.8 in the

vault and 7.5 in the uneven bars.

Hart feels the team is coming along. "I'm still new here," he said. "But we're showing progress and in a few months we should start to go places in competition."

The gymnasts are working out Monday, Wednesday and Friday each week with about two-and-one-half hours of intense practice each time.

**New fish and game program started**

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish started a new program in 1981 called Share with Wildlife. This program, authorized by the State Legislature, allowed people to donate all or part of their State Income Tax refund to the Game Department. The program was very successful and a total of \$258,000 was donated to the Department. After the money was received, there was a controversy over how this money should be used. A committee was set up to determine which programs and projects should benefit from the donations.

The committee was chaired by Norma Ames and consisted of Department employees from several different fields. The committee received suggestions from many groups and individuals, including those who attended a public input meeting held in Albuquerque. For the present fiscal year, the following projects were recommended by the committee and approved by the State Game Commission to receive Share with Wildlife monies.

Rio Grande cutthroat program will receive \$36,000. This trout is a subspecies native to New Mexico which has been declining in the State over the past 20 years due to habitat changes and competition and hybridization with introduced game fish species. Monies from the Share with Wildlife fund will support programs in the Fisheries Division to protect and rehabilitate selected stream habitats, eliminate competing introduced species from these habitats, and conduct research into the artificial rearing of Rio Grande cutthroat trout in a Department hatchery.

Up to \$34,000 will be used for Wildlife Rescue. Department personnel are often involved in picking up and transporting injured wildlife, particularly raptors (eagles, hawks and owls), to veterinarians and salvage permittees for treatment, rehabilitation and release.

# Season's first ski tour tiring and exhilarating

The ski areas may not be open yet but the snow that fell on Sierra Blanca last week lured a number of people up to the mountain to play in the snow.

Becky and Bob Pierce decided to pull their cross-country skis out of the closet and see if they still knew how to get around on them. They kindly invited me along after I had talked to them enthusiastically about skinny skis a few days before.

As we drove up Ski Run Road we were skeptical that a friend's report of good snow would hold true. But just at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort enough snow had accumulated to cover the ground, or most of it at least.

Around the base of the ski area many people were walking around, enjoying snowball fights and sledding. There were even a few hardy alpine skiers hiking up with their skis over their shoulders and boots on their feet.

We slipped on our skis near the bottom of the gondola and skied past the quiet snowmaking machinery. Traveling up the Sierra Blanca trail, we soon left the rest of the people behind.

The snow that had been marginal at the base quickly deepened and became more than adequate. As we worked our way up the mountain, Bob, a member of the ski

patrol at Sierra Blanca last year, pointed out each trail and told us what kind of skiing it would offer later in the year. Although the Sierra Blanca trail was well covered, most of the others still had sprigs of grass and small brush piercing the white blanket.

Within an hour-and-a-half we skied to the Gazebo Restaurant at the top of the Gondola where we enjoyed a brief lunch and spectacular views in all directions. The contrast between the snow-covered trees near at hand and the White Sands thousands of feet below us was especially eye-catching.

But we kept laughing in spite of our clumsiness and enjoyed brief moments of grace and speed.

By the time we reached the bottom of the mountain we were tired and chilly but exhilarated about our first skiing session of the new winter.



The first rough draft of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Ordinance, which will regulate zoning of land surrounding the village limits in a one-mile radius, has been completed and was briefly reviewed Thursday by the extraterritorial zoning commission. The ordinance was adapted from the Roswell-Chaves County Extraterritorial Zoning Ordinance. Members of the commission will more





# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE— Don't count on coal to make New Mexico rich.

That thought, coming on the heels of the state's recent experiences with uranium, which was to be the fuel of tomorrow, is not a very consoling one.

What we have here in New Mexico is a lot of land. It's only natural that if we picture what is under that land (where the mineral rights lie), we might picture things as better than they are.

For awhile, uranium didn't seem like that. We had lots of it, and it could be sold. No longer.

That is to say, we still have lots of it. What's wrong is that it can no longer be sold.

So let's go big on coal—right? We have lots of coal, almost all of it still underground; but if we could only get some railroad lines in to where the coal is, we'd all get rich.

Right?

Sorry to say, but not really.

The state's Energy Research and Development Institute has just spent something like \$200,000 to have people come in and tell us what is the prognosis for the sale of New Mexico coal.

Their conclusion?

Things don't look too good.

That has to be a shock to the Department of Commerce and Industry, where they have been looking for some quick and easy solution to our state's financial problems.

It has to be something of a shock to Senator Jack Morgan, who has been telling us that if we only ran a rail line to that San Juan coal it would practically jump up out of the ground and turn into green money.

No way, the experts say.

Here's how International Energy Associates Limited put it in one of three reports the state just got through paying for:

"Specific market prospects for New Mexico steam coal from the San Juan Basin are poor to non-existent under present conditions."

Got that firmly fixed in your head?

Then let's go on to this one:

"New Mexico coal, relative to Utah/Colorado coal, has difficulty in competition for whatever share of the steam coal export market is available for the Western U.S. and Pacific Rim. New Mexico's high-quality underground coal (e.g., Raton Basin) is simply too expensive, FOB port compared to that available from the Central Rockies. On the other hand, the lower cost surfaced-mined San Juan coal is also of lower quality; and a large portion of the projected future production is lower in heating value than the minimum specification established by Pacific Rim customers."

Want that translated?

Your good coal costs too much. Your cheap coal not even the Japanese want.

Oh, well. It's good to know that.

No use kidding ourselves—which is what the Energy Research and Development people said when they ordered these studies.

Don't put your hard-earned money into New Mexico coal futures. You could lose your fundamen.

And don't rush to use great quantities of state funds to support the coal-mining industry. They're neat folks, but if they can't sell their product, where are we?

Just about where New Mexico has always been.

## Reporter's Round by Billy Allstetter



Thursday night I attended a program on Patriotism and the Family that was a part of Family Week, celebrated last week. During the evening I truly enjoyed the group's expression of patriotism and pride in the United States of America and was swept up in the patriotic mood.

But I also listened to a speech that used vague fears and threatening scenarios to turn-Americans against themselves in the name of patriotism.

Earlier in the day I was assigned to cover a flag disposal ceremony. I admit that the sensationalist in me grabbed onto the fact that the flag would be burned. Images of the turbulent sixties came to mind with protesters burning flags while police swung billy clubs in a riotous atmosphere.

What occurred, however, turned out to be a solemn and respectful ceremony that reminded me of many things I had forgotten.

A group of about forty people met in the all-purpose room of the library and listened to Boy Scouts from Troops 59 and 107 give short speeches on the care, display and disposal of the American flag.

Then we all filed outside and formed a circle around a fire in School House Park. As we stood quietly at attention, four young men, holding the flag by the corners, marched into the circle. They held the flag above their heads over the fire as Bill Streeter recited "I am Old Glory," a tribute to the American flag.

"I am Old Glory: For more than nine score years I have been the banner of hope and freedom for generation after generation of Americans ... Planted firmly on the high pinnacle of American Faith my gently fluttering folds have proved an inspiration to untold millions ... They have looked upon me as a symbol of national unity. They have prayed that they and their fellow citizens might continue to enjoy life, liberty and pursuit of happiness, which have been granted to every American as the heritage of free men. So long as men love liberty more than life itself; so long as they treasure the priceless privileges bought with the blood of our forefathers; so long as the principles of truth, justice and charity for all remain deeply rooted in human hearts, I shall continue to be the enduring banner of the United States of America."

Rudy Flack, standing out of the light of the fire, played taps as the four boys lowered the tattered and worn-out flag into the fire. Everyone silently watched as the flag caught fire and burned to ashes in the chill night.

It was a solemn moment and a time to remember how lucky we are to live in this country. No doubt we are plagued by great problems and inequalities in this country, but there are very few other nations in the world that allow the diversity of opinion and opportunity for achievement that are available here.

After the flag burning we all filed back into the library to listen to a speech by Lynn Martin. There was a delay while people worked to repair the video tape machine that recorded Martin's speech. For a few minutes everyone sat quietly, not knowing exactly how to fill the time.

Then a very inspirational event occurred. Carol Martin (the speaker's sister-in-law) and Charlene Bloomgrin stood in the front of the room and led us all in singing a number of patriotic songs. Under normal circumstances I am not especially demonstrative about my patriotism, especially if I have to sing to express it.

But something in the mood of the evening and the sincere and natural tone of the two women swept me up and I found myself singing The Star Spangled Banner, My Country 'Tis of Thee, Amazing Grace and others. Everyone in the room was singing.

At that moment I imagined stepping back and looking at this small group in the heartland of America singing songs spontaneously and sincerely. They were praising the country and blessing their opportunity to live in it. I imagined other groups all around the nation doing the same thing in their meeting places. I felt a goosebumpy pride and joy at being an American.

After we sang five or six songs, Lynn Martin came to the front and spoke to the group. He was a large, enthusiastic man who kept the crowd laughing as he played out scenarios of American life and the family. He discussed the importance of enthusiasm and communication among families. He said that families were the strongest unit in America and the key to freedom. These were all well taken points that he expressed in a humorous manner.

But then he began to talk of a conspiracy, of Nikita Khrushchev pounding his shoe and saying, "We will bury you," and a vague "they" infiltrating our television system, feeding our children drugs, and raising the price of gasoline. He talked of Rockefeller controlling our television networks and censoring our books.

I can't prove that he is wrong, although I do think his theories are rather farfetched. What made me uncomfortable was the vague way he made many of his accusations and insinuated that "they" were the source of our problems. It was like he was trying to scare us into being patriotic.

Minutes later he said that we were the only source of our happiness and our problems. He showed that when we point a finger at others, one finger may be pointing at them while the other three are folded back and pointing at ourselves.

The evening gave me a very enjoyable shot in the arm of patriotism. I only wish Lynn Martin had kept it positive and not left us looking at our fellow countrymen as potential members of a conspiracy to rob us of our freedom.

Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to the provisions of 77-38-47, N.M.S.A. 1978 the Property Tax Division of the Taxation and Revenue Department will offer for sale at public auction beginning on NOVEMBER 30, 1982, at 9:00 a.m. at the Lincoln County Courthouse in CARRIZOZO, New Mexico, the following described real property, the sale to continue until all the described property has been offered for sale.

The terms of the sale are as follows:  
1. A sale property made under the provisions of 77-38-47 constitutes full payment of all delinquent taxes, penalties and interest against the property at the time of sale, and the sale extinguishes the lien. The property is sold subject to the lien for property taxes for the year of the sale, provided those taxes are not yet delinquent. The purchaser at the public auction or his successor in interest, will be liable for those property taxes when they become due.

2. The description of the following real property is required by 77-38-47, to be sufficient to permit the identification and location of the real property by potential purchasers. The State of New Mexico warrants no title to properties purchased at public auction sale.

3. Section 77-38-74, N.M.S.A. 1978, prohibits officers or employees of the state or of any of its political subdivisions engaged in the administration of the property tax law, from directly or indirectly acquiring an interest in, buying or profiting from any property sold by the Property Tax Division for delinquent taxes, except that an officer or employee may purchase property sold for delinquent taxes only if the purchase of the property is the result of the property at the time the taxes became delinquent. Any officer or employee violating 77-38-74 is guilty of a fourth degree felony and shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars or imprisoned for not less than one year nor more than five years, or both; and he shall also be automatically removed from office or have his employment terminated upon conviction. A real property sale in violation of 77-38-74 is void.

4. Successful bidders are required to make payment in full of the amount bid before leaving the premises on the day of the sale. Payment is required to be made by money order, certified check, cashier's check or personal check which is accompanied by bank letter of credit for the amount of or in excess of the amount of the personal check drawn to the order of the Property Tax Division of the Taxation and Revenue Department.

5. Upon receiving payment for the real property sold for delinquent taxes, the Property Tax Division shall execute and deliver a deed to the purchaser. The deed conveys all the former property owner's interest in the real property as of the date the state's lien for real property taxes arose in accordance with the property tax code, subject only to perfected interests in the real property existing before the date the property tax lien arose. The property tax lien against real property arises on January 1 of the tax year for which the taxes are imposed.

6. After two years from the date of sale, neither the former real property owner shown on the property tax schedule as the delinquent taxpayer nor anyone claiming through him may bring an action challenging the conveyance. Subject to the year time limitation stated above, in all controversies and suits involving title to real property held under a deed from the state issued under this section, any person claiming an interest in the real property acquired by the deed from the state must prove, in order to defeat the title, that he or the person through whom he claims had title to the real property at the time of the sale, and that either the property was not subject to taxation for the tax years for which the delinquent taxes for which it was sold were imposed; or (2) all taxes penalties, interest and any cost due for the years involved were paid by him or the person through who he claims title prior to the sale.

7. The sale price of real property at this public auction sale is not to be taken or considered as being the value of that property for property taxation purposes.  
8. All persons intending to bid upon property are required to register and obtain a bidders number from the auctioneer and to provide the auctioneer with their full name and address. 

Sisneros, a graduate of Western New Mexico University, is also the assistant volleyball coach and junior high school track coach.



Billy Jack said it best. "Sometimes I just go berserk!" he would shout with a fiery gleam in his eye. He would then proceed to turn a quaint little diner into tooth-picks and several automobiles into molten metal.

Then there's the sadistic sheriff in that quaint little hick town. He's not fond of strangers or hitchhikers. When he happens across one he would approach them with a polite manner and calm voice "Boy," he says with an evil grin, "you in a heap o' trouble."

Mix that sheriff with an ex-Green Beret and the sparks (and bullets and fists) fly. Sylvester Stallone is the disgruntled Vietnam vet whose last friend has just died of cancer from Agent Orange.

He wanders into the small town where the potbellied sheriff informs him "we ain't got no use for your kind around here." No one says that to a Green Beret without some conflict.

Conflict is what this film is all about. nothing more, nothing

less. There's plenty of action, lots of gunpowder and flames, lots of crashing metal and crashing fists, but little else.

Sylvester Stallone must have taken the role as a way of making some quick bucks without taxing his memory. If he has five minutes of dialogue in the film, it's a lot. Most of that is almost unnecessary. He does some fine stunts himself, and does some serious flexing and fighting, but little else.

He does have one scene of angst at the end of the film, meant, no doubt, to be a plea for sympathy for Vietnam vets. One feels not sympathy, but the feeling that the plight of the vets has been exploited to make an "unleashed rage" movie.

Director Ted Kotcheff has designed a competent action film that has high production values with good scenery, stunts and settings. As long as you don't stop to think about it, this is competent movie-making with enough slams and bangs to keep you from doing just that.


