MORE SNOW ON THE WAY?

Storm a surprise

The first severe winter storm of the season dropped six to 14 inches of snow around Ruidoso late last week, finding many people unprepared and sending them scrambling for winter supplies.

Ruidoso Municipal Airport recorded six inches of snow, and Roy Parker at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort reported 14 inches of snow fell during the storm that started early Friday morning and lasted into Saturday.

Highway 70 east toward Roswell was closed Friday night after a semi-trailer truck slid sideways across the road. Lorena Kauppinen, Ruidoso police communications officer, said that Highway 70 west over Apache Summit was never closed but was very icy and treacherous.

The highway east was open Saturday morning but Kauppinen said Picacho hill east of Riverside remained "horrendously icy."

"We didn't have a whole bunch of accidents," said Kauppinen. Ruidoso police responded to five accidents, none of them injury accidents.

She said, however, that it was "a catastrophe as far as people out there with their tiny cars without snow tires or chains." Cars were slipping and sliding sideways in the street causing numerous traffic jams, according to Kauppinen.

She said she kept many of the wrecker services in town completely occupied all day Friday and Friday night rescuing stranded cars.

While the storm meant headaches for police and anyone out on the roads, it brought booming business to stores dealing in winter goods. People descended upon stores that stocked snow tires, tire chains, sleds, "moon boots," gloves and hats.

Mary Ann Brown, co-owner of White's Auto Store, described the situation at her store as near pandemonium Friday.

"We were swamped ... We hardly held our heads up," she said. The store was so busy she had to recruit her daughter, son and son-in-law to operate cash registers and put on tire chains. "Without them we would have been in trouble," she said.

The store almost sold out of tire chains Friday and did a steady, busy business in snow tires Friday and Saturday, Brown said.

Scott Schraeder, owner of Western Auto, said people started coming around 7 a.m. Friday and kept coming in until almost 8 in the evening, two hours after normal closing time. He said that there were consistently 50 to 60 customers in the store throughout the day.

By the time they finally closed the doors, the Western Auto

staff had sold \$16,000 worth of tire chains alone. Peggy Trueblood, an employee of Western Auto, said, "I sold chains all night in my sleep."

Dan Shaver, of Shaver Tire & Auto, said his customers were a combination of locals and tourists. He said he generally sold snow tires to the locals and chains to the tourists.

"The day after Thanksgiving was the busiest day in November we have ever had," said Richard Sandoval of Gibson's department store. He said people were buying gloves, hats, sleds, tire chains and everything else needed for winter weather.

The snow also allowed Sierra Blanca Ski Resort to open much more of the mountain to skiers than was previously anticipated. In addition to beginner lifts three and five, the number one and Lincoln chairlifts and the gondola were open by Sunday.

The ski area handled about 2,500 skiers over the weekend. "It is a stronger start than last year," said Brian Lesley, restaurant manager at Sierra Blanca.

The snowfall also allowed Eagle Creek to open up the area to midway. "For Thanksgiving that's one of the best weekends we've ever had," said owner Paul Southwick.

Hunters fared worse in the storm than skiers, however. Alden Deyo of White Mountain Search and Rescue said that many hunters had been reported lost in the area. The rescue team was called out once to search for two lost hunters, but the two were reported safe just before 4 a.m. Saturday morning, the scheduled beginning of the search. All other lost hunters either walked in or were found, said Deyo.

Gary Brown was like many of the people surprised by the sudden storm. He had delayed buying snow tires in spite of the two small warning storms that had already passed through the area. Driving to work Friday morning, he skidded twice on Mechem Drive, the second time turning almost perpendicular to traffic.

"It scared the heck out of me ... I said, 'Oh gosh, I've got to get snow tires!'" Brown recalled. He immediately drove to a service station and had snow tires put on his car.

While skies cleared Sunday and the snow began to melt at lower elevations, the National Weather Service in Albuquerque was forecasting another low pressure system to move across the Rocky Mountains, bringing colder temperatures and snow to the Ruidoso area by Wednesday or Thursday.

After the first real storm showed that winter was truly beginning, the people of Ruidoso should be more like good Boy Scouts—prepared.

But there will always be tourists needing winter supplies. Mary Ann Brown said, "If it'll just do this at Christmas, it's liquid gold."

Local Special Olympics participants sought

The first annual Southern New Mexico Winter Special Olympic Games held at Eagle Creek Ski Area last year were a great success—except that few, if any, local mentally retarded individuals participated.

Because there has been no Special Olympics organization within the county, the mentally retarded of this area have been left out of the activities provided by Special Olympics.

In an effort to combat that situation, an advisory council has recently been formed to establish a Special Olympics chapter in Lincoln County. Special Olympics is an international organization first created in 1968 by the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation. The purpose is to provide sports training and athletic competition for retarded children and adults.

The Special Olympics program is made up of community organizations throughout the United States and more than 40 other nations and is dependent upon the work of

hundreds of thousands of local volunteers.

The program is open to every retarded individual (anyone with an IQ of 70 or below) and offers competition and training in 16 official sports, including skiing, swimming, gymnastics, track and field, soccer, basketball, volleyball and bowling.

Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School recreation director Jeanne Culbertson realized the need for local retarded individuals to have the opportunity to participate in some of these activities. She organized the Lincoln County (Area 13) advisory council, which met earlier this month.

White Mountain Middle School special education instructor Mary Lee Cates volunteered to serve as area coordinator. Culbertson will serve as local representative to the state board.

Other members of the council are Robbie Matthews, Carla Beasley, Hilde Strobel, Barby Grant, Charles Spooner, Glen Ferguson, Nancy Radziewicz, Jimmy Goodwin, Danny Flores, Bobby Palm and Tom Hart.

The initial task of the group will be to generate interest in and support of the program among the retarded in Lincoln County. Culbertson estimates there are about 100 mentally retarded in the county who have never participated in Special Olympics.

Registration for the 1983 Special Olympic Winter Games—to be held at Eagle Creek January 25-28—is open until December 31. Anyone interested in signing up can contact Jeanne Culbertson at 257-7225 or 354-2211.

Anyone interested in helping coach at the winter games is encouraged to attend the training school December 6 and 7 at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort. Diana Person and Hilde Strobel will instruct the school. Interested persons can contact Culbertson for additional information.

The Special Olympics Area 13 advisory council will meet again Tuesday, November 30, at 7:30 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce. All persons who would like to serve on the council are welcome to attend.

Storm keeps Ruidoso police busy

Area law enforcement agencies investigated dozens of accidents and reports of lost hunters over the holiday weekend as the first major snowstorm of the winter covered the Ruidoso area with six to eight inches of snow Friday.

The Ruidoso Police Department reported 14 minor accidents over the three-day period from Friday to Sunday.

In one accident, a Texas woman received a fractured arm Saturday when the car she was riding in collided with another vehicle at the intersection of Brady Ca-

nyon Road and Vatonla Lane. The woman, Myrune Varnadore of San Angelo, Texas, was treated and released at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

The conditions were reported as icy at the time of the accident. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office reported several accidents and missing hunters over the weekend. All the hunters were found safe.

Dave Travis of White Mountain Search and Rescue said Saturday he received four reports of missing hunters in the Lincoln National Forest. He said all the missing persons turned up before his rescuers were sent out.

Ruidoso police lieutenant Jim Alston said Monday that police dispatchers often were tied up with calls concerning weather and road conditions.

He advised residents to listen to KRRR radio for information on the roads whenever conditions are bad. He said that would enable the dispatchers to handle more serious calls. Alston said the local radio station is given updates from the police when reports come in from the patrol units.

Dispatcher Paul Butler estimated the police handled up to 300 calls each shift Friday.

Proposed ordinance regulates guard, patrol dogs

Man's best friend is increasingly becoming man's protector, as merchants and residents rely on highly trained dogs to guard their businesses and property.

Only about five site guard dogs now are patrolling closed Ruidoso businesses nightly, and just a handful of residents own dogs trained for protection.

But Animal Control Officer Jack Sniadecki and Police Chief Richard Swenor want to ensure the dogs are handled correctly and are not a threat to law-abiding citizens.

"People more and more are getting trained dogs for their property and personal protection," noted Sniadecki.

For that reason, Sniadecki proposed amending the village animal control ordinance to include provisions for the regulation of site guard dogs and patrol dogs.

The amended ordinance, which will be considered by the village council Tuesday night, was drafted by Swenor, with cooperation from Sniadecki and village attorney Lee Huckstep.

Sniadecki explained Friday he proposed the regulations on trained dogs because he wants guidelines for control of the animals before their population grows. He pointed out, however, that the amendments do not prohibit the use of such dogs.

"This whole thing is a matter to have control before it gets out of hand. In no way is it designed as a deterrent," said Sniadecki.

"This is an attempt to control what levels of training they have, who's using them, and when and where they are located," he explained.

Sniadecki said his main concern is that site guard dogs and patrol dogs be registered with him and the police, so that the security of sites where the dogs are placed can be inspected, and so authorities will know whom to contact in case of emergency.

The ordinance stipulates that canines trained for protection, like other dogs and cats, must be vaccinated against rabies and licensed with the village clerk.

In addition, one section reads, the dogs "shall be identified to and registered with the Chief of Police or his designee who shall insure that the animal's training and certification meets the professional standards."

The license fee remains unchanged at \$5 for sterilized dogs and \$2.50 for sterilized cats. The fees double for animals that are unsterilized. Senior citizens pay \$2 for

dogs or cats. Sniadecki said the professional training requirement is to ensure that improperly trained dogs, which could endanger the safety of residents, are not used for protection.

He noted that a provision of the ordinance that allows police or animal control officers to "humanely destroy" any animal considered vicious does not apply to site guard dogs and patrol dogs.

But, Sniadecki said, if a site guard dog leaves the protected premise without the presence of its handler or owner, and the dog attacks someone, then it could be handled by authorities as a vicious animal.

Patrol dogs are defined as canines with certified skills including "tracking, crowd control, scent detection of narcotics or explosives and building searches." The ordinance goes on to say patrol dogs are "trained to aggressively attack upon a handler's command or when the handler is in jeopardy, and then only to thwart the threatened behavior." Based on his interpretation of that clause, Sniadecki said if a patrol dog, like a guard dog, were not in the presence of its handler and it harmed someone, the dog could be treated as a vicious animal.

Another protective measure regarding the trained dogs is that the areas they are to protect must be posted with warning signs. The signs, which are to be worded "WARNING—GUARD DOG ON DUTY" in English and Spanish, must be placed on entrances and exits to the premises, and at 50-foot intervals around the perimeter. The signs are also to include the name and address of the guard dog's handler.

Sniadecki said when someone applies for a permit to have a guard dog, he will go out and inspect the site where the dog is to be placed to make sure the area is secure.

Also, he added, if guard dogs are placed in an area where their barking would be a nuisance, he may require that the premises have a sight barrier so the animals would not be provoked to bark continuously.

The ordinance also requires that patrol dogs be carried in an enclosed and marked vehicle to warn of the presence of the dog. The doors that allow access to the dog must be marked clearly with a warning of a "working patrol dog."

Ruidoso police vehicles carrying police dogs must be identified with a "police canine" sign, and the premises of the handler must be posted.

A final requirement on site guard dogs is they have to wear a license tag on a two inch wide fluorescent collar that can be quickly identified when the dog is unat-

tended. In addition to the new provisions on site guard dogs and patrol dogs, the ordinance has updated sections on animal nuisances and cruelty to animals.

The village law stipulates that it creates a nuisance to let an animal run astray in the village limits. This is not a leash law, Sniadecki pointed out, because as long as a dog is in control, it is not considered to be running loose.

Another nuisance that is outlawed is allowing an animal to defecate or urinate on property other than the owner's premises.

It is also unlawful to allow an animal "to persistently or continuously bark, howl or make noise common to the animal's species," or to otherwise disturb the peace.

Cruelty to animals is also prohibited. The cruelty provisions make it unlawful to maliciously "kill, maim, disfigure," or beat any animal, unless it is reasonable force used to thwart a vicious animal.

Interest in drama among Ruidoso high school students remains strong despite the lack of a full-time program in school, and it is being kept alive now by volunteer efforts of "Supermom" Peggy Wilson.

has illustrated to her there is a great demand for a drama program at the high school. She said she was amazed to discover the amount of talented students in such a small town.

Wilson said the theater club plans to present the musical, "Cinderella," as the major production of the school year, during the last weekend in April. She will direct double casts, she said, to give all the students an opportunity to be involved in the production. Wilson's daughter Laura will choreograph the show, which Peggy hopes to present in Roswell and Alamogordo as well as Ruidoso.

Wilson gets involved in these types of projects, she indicated, because of her children. She feels it is her responsibility as a mother to be involved in whatever activities her children are interested in, and to offer them as many opportunities to develop interests as she can.

Wilson grew up in a family of 12 children but has only two herself. They are Laura, 15, and Duane, an eighth grader.

Both children are involved in dancing, and they travel to El Paso, Texas, on weekends to continue their lessons since moving here from Oregon. Their mom was active as a 4-H leader in Oregon, as well as being involved in school theater productions, working mostly with makeup and costumes. She also likes to oil paint and plans to open a fabric shop in Ruidoso by mid-December.

Wilson originally gained experience in theater when she was in high school and also through coaching her brothers and sisters, all of whom were involved in theater during their school years. Her parents, also, encouraged their children to get involved in a variety of activities so

they would have some exposure to lots of fields before deciding on a vocation.

"I strive to get them to try a little bit of everything," Wilson said about her own goal as a parent. And as they get involved in activities, so does she.

"I do it for the kids because they want it; whatever they want I'll do because I know I'll enjoy it along the way," Wilson noted. "Through my kids I have experienced so many different hobbies and fun things to do."

One reason she volunteered to organize the drama program at Ruidoso High School is because she had time on her hands after moving here and having to abandon all the projects she was involved in in Oregon. Asked if she plans to continue her involvement with 4-H in Ruidoso, Wilson said her first priority will be her fabric shop business, then the high school drama club.

"There will be time for 4-H and anything else to come along," she commented.

Wilson indicated the school may decide to find a full-time drama instructor soon, which would leave her available for some of those other things, and also allow her to concentrate on working with makeup and costumes for future school drama productions.

She indicated there is a real need for a full-time drama program in the school to develop the interests and talents of the students.

"The kids are so good; they're far from being amateurs even though they are amateurs," Wilson noted. "Their talent needs to be displayed more often."

Thanks to the efforts of this "Supermom," that need is being fulfilled at least temporarily.



Resource group meets Tuesday

A South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development meeting will be held Tuesday, November 30, at the fair building in Capitan. Lincoln County Extension Agent Barry Herd will present the program.

The executive committee meeting will begin at 10 a.m., followed by a break for lunch at 11:45 a.m. At 1 p.m. the steering committee meeting will begin, including discussion of new and continuing project measures and the presentation by Herd. All interested persons are invited to attend.

Bird hunters can look forward to the beginning of December with great anticipation. I know that I can hardly wait for the seasons to start on prairie chickens and pheasants. These two species provide very fast, exciting action and are a good test for the abilities of both the dog and the hunter.

The season for prairie chickens begins on December 4 and ends on December 6. The pheasant season starts on December 11 and runs through December 14.

Prairie chickens are found in the sandhills in the southeastern part of the state. The hunt area is south of U.S. Highway 70 from the state line to Fort Sumner, east of U.S. Highway 285 from Fort Sumner to Carlsbad and north of a line from Carlsbad to Eunice. The greatest concentration of chickens is north of Tatum, near a place called Milnesand.

In this area there are two ways to hunt prairie chickens. The first way is to wait for the dawn and dusk flights of birds into and out of the feeding areas. Once the flights are over, the birds have to be walked up. There is sparse cover in chicken country and the birds flush a long way off, so they offer only a quick shot for the hunter. Prairie chickens are very elusive and fast-flying which makes bagging them a difficult task. The hunter who reaches the bag limit of three birds per day can indeed be a very happy person.

The daily bag limit of three cocks per day is much easier with a good dog trained to find and flush the birds.

Once the bird has been flushed, a hunter must be careful to make sure it is a cock, since it is illegal to shoot a hen. A cock can easily be identified by its color and shape. The cock is brilliantly colored and appears very dark, while a hen is a drab light brown color. The cock pheasant also has much longer tail feathers and a larger head than the hen.

In addition to providing excellent sport hunting, both the pheasant and the prairie chicken are very good to eat. The smell of either of the birds roasting makes my mouth water.

Reports from the field show a very good hatch of pheasants for this year. It's time to practice and do a little scouting, since the seasons are close at hand.



Ruidoso hoopsters to host Roswell in opener

The 1983 version of the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team will begin competition Tuesday night when the Warriors host a strong Roswell High School team.

The Warriors, under the reins of new coach Ron Geyer, have no returning starters from last year's team. Curtis Palmer, a 6-3 transfer from California, started for his team last season as a sophomore.

Several other Warrior players saw very limited action last season on the varsity squad.

Geyer sees the Coyotes as a tough team. "They'll probably try to fast break a lot and play a full-court press and man-to-man defense," he said. Sluder, a 6-2 sophomore, lends some added height to the Warrior lineup. Bell, a senior, is about 5-10.

Sluder, Ullman, Reynolds, Espinosa, Pearson and Crow should also see some limited action in the junior varsity contest.

"I'm going to try and see that these players get about five quarters of play," Geyer commented.

Other members of tomorrow's junior varsity squad will probably include Russell Easter, Mark Langston, Bill Bomar, Michael Bridges, Rodney Rose, Ervin Randolph, Philip Yerrick, Cyrus Simmons and Justin Smith.

Simmons, a junior, hasn't practiced much lately because he had ingrown nail surgery. He played a lot on the junior varsity last season and also got in some time on the varsity squad.

Captain head coach Kendall Lawlis has a good deal of depth to work with and will probably play a lot of his players in the opener.


"Robert Parker has looked good in practice and Jon Todd Aguilar and Sammy Castillo have done well at guard," Lawlis said.

"She's looked good in practice and I expect her to come on strong," Castanon said of Huey. "Ivy is still trying to adapt to my style of play but she's learning."


Ivy is a transfer from Texas and is a good dribbler and jumper.

The status of the 1983 Ruidoso-Sertoma Little League basketball program is currently up in the air.

A scheduling conflict has come up because Hondo School's basketball teams have use of the White Mountain Middle School gym until 7:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Most of the Hondo School campus was burned down last summer and the Eagle sports team practices and other student activities are taking place at other sites, including White Mountain.

Last season the Little League games were played in the White Mountain gym during the week. Now that's impossible because of the arrangement with Hondo's teams.

"There will be a Little League basketball program this season," said Larry Montero, chairman of the Sertoma Club's basketball committee. "Just what form it will take is not clear yet."

The Sertoma Club has engaged Montero and three other members to discuss what alternatives the club has as far as a basketball program this year.

The four people will probably reach a decision sometime next week.

Hopefully, a regular Little League basketball program will be held this winter season. The program will begin its fifth year of operation this season and some of its early participants are now playing at Ruidoso High School and White Mountain Middle School.

One White Mountain player who competed in the Little League program last year is Kirk Ryan, younger brother of former Ruidoso standout Glenn Ryan. Ryan has very advanced basketball skills for a seventh grader and there's no question the Little League program helped him.

The football program at Ruidoso High School has benefitted greatly from Little League activities. Although Little League basketball hasn't been in existence as long as football in this area, the middle school and high school cage programs are just

starting to benefit from it.

If the Little League basketball program was discontinued or cut back, it could have an adverse effect on the Warrior and Brave teams in future seasons.

Little League basketball is really the only chance local youths get to play the sport before they reach middle school.

Outdoor playground facilities are extremely limited for basketball in the Ruidoso area, so an organized youth league is absolutely necessary for kids who want to play basketball.

What happens in the next couple of weeks will probably be watched very closely by local youth basketball fans.

Turning to college football, Ruidoso's Lon Nunley didn't play in the University of New Mexico's final game of the season against Hawaii last week, but the former Warrior standout did get in enough playing time during the year to earn his letter.

Nunley, a freshman linebacker, made the AAA division All-State team last year at Ruidoso High School and should see plenty of action the next three years with the Lobos.

UNM only loses 18 seniors for next season and the Lobos could equal this year's excellent 10-1 record, despite a rougher schedule.

Nunley's brother Don and Byron Wright, another ex-Warrior, played for West Texas State University's junior varsity this season. Wright was the starting fullback and Don was a wide receiver. Both players are freshmen.

Another former Warrior star, Jay Raulerson, just completed his junior season at Eastern New Mexico University.

The 6-2, 230 pounder played in the offensive line for the Greyhounds this past season. He was the starting center on punts, extra points and field goals.

The 1983 football season should see all four former Warriors get in a lot of playing time for their teams.

Cobb goes distance, loses to Holmes

Randall "Tex" Cobb went the full 15 rounds but lost a one-sided bout to World Boxing Council (WBC) heavyweight champion Larry Holmes Friday night at the Houston, Texas, Astrodome before 9,000 fans.

Cobb, who trained at the Inn of the Mountain Gods before the fight, was given a vicious punishment by the champion in almost every round.

Holmes was awarded 14 rounds by all three judges. One judge gave Cobb a round while the other two had the champion and the challenger fighting to a tie in one

round. Cobb is not exactly a finesse boxer and his only hope of winning the championship was to bore in on Holmes and hope to get the champion with a solid punch.

However, Holmes managed to dodge almost every punch the Texas native threw at him. Most of Cobb's punches were harmless lunges off Holmes' body.

The challenger weighed in at 234 pounds for the fight while Holmes weighed 217½. Holmes was able to keep the heavier challenger off balance most of the night

with an outstanding left jab and an assortment of other punches.

Cobb was fairly effective in the fourth and seventh rounds, landing a couple of hard punches, but the champion wasn't hurt.

By the end of the bout, Cobb's face was badly battered. He had bruises above both his eyes, a cut on the nose and a cut above the lip.

The fight was shown on ABC-TV with Howard Cosell as the commentator. At the end of the bout, Cosell was so disgusted

with the one-sided match he refused to do an interview.

Holmes earned \$1.8 million for the bout while Cobb picked up \$500,000.

Holmes now has a 41-0 pro record while Cobb has won 20 fights and lost three.

The champion may defend his title against Lucien Rodriguez of France next, possibly in the spring.

Cobb was a champion karate expert and standout college football offensive lineman at Abilene Christian before turning to professional boxing.



"Long may your lum reek." (Long may your chimney smoke).



Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Reporters here in Santa Fe are too kind to the Legislative Finance Committee.

We get lots of stories out of this group every year, so we do not tend to complain about them.

But there is at least one thing the LFC is guilty of which we would not normally forgive in other operations of state government.

Simply put, it comes down to this: This committee holds too many executive sessions.

Now, let us face facts: Legislative committees are not bound by New Mexico's Open Meetings law. (Since legislators were the ones who passed the law, they naturally exempted themselves from it.)

But to begin the day and to end the day every time your committee meets with a private session, from which the public and the reporters, representatives of the public, are omitted, is not a very smart thing.

It gives the wrong impression.

That sign hanging on the door of the committee room in which the LFC is meeting which says, "Executive Session" means "The Public Keep Out."

Yet if there is one reason for this and other committees to exist it is so that the public can be protected.

But when they meet in privacy, how can we be sure they are protecting us?

Mostly, one suspects, this starting and closing the day with purely private meetings is more a matter of convenience than anything else.

Members get to take their coats off—physically and metaphorically—and talk about things frankly, without those miserable people from the media listening

to them.

Convenient.

Convenient, that is to say, for the members of the committee.

But is it convenient for all of us citizens who are locked out and cannot listen to what is being said?

Is it convenient for those taxpayers who are providing the sustenance for the state this group is locked up in there discussing?

What reaches this writer most is the voice of at least one legislator who says he attended these executive sessions.

"With the door locked," he says, "I never heard anything being discussed which could not be talked about with the door open."

Maybe under Maralyn Buddke as chief staff member and John Mershon as chairman, this committee tended to be very private.

Both are now gone.

Maybe also those who are about to take over should evaluate this policy.

If they don't, maybe those of us who have to hang around outside waiting for the big doors to open may just want to blast the committee a little bit.

They are thoughtless, they are insensitive and they are maybe a tiny bit dumb.

State Senator Alex Martinez, scheduled to be the new chairman of this group, might note that.

If he doesn't many of those who report from Santa Fe may file reports like this one.

We are tired of being excluded.

Even if the law says this committee is entitled to privacy, the question is this: Is it smart to demand that privacy? Some of us have been known to stir up things. We might choose to do that with the LFC.

HERE COMES RALPH

Ralph Nader strikes again! The intrepid Nader, hunting for his customary quarry — the resourceful, productive and (heaven forbid) prosperous members of American society — has reached the conclusion, in a new book, that the Reagan administration is biased toward big business.

If you've had a cup of coffee at village hall lately, you may have noticed the switch from styrofoam cups to paper cups. I noticed because the darn paper cups are too hot to hold unless you use the little fold-out handle.

I grumbled to village purchasing officer John Cupp about this, but he gave me an inarguable reason for the change. Styrofoam cups cost about three-and-half cents per unit; paper cups are about two cents.

John has instituted other changes since he became purchasing officer last spring, and he discussed them with me the other day.

Purchasing by municipalities is an area that is fairly strictly defined by state law. The spirit of the law seems to be: buy at the best possible price.

Depending on the price of an item, the procedure for purchase can range from choosing the item from among those listed in different catalogues (for items costing under \$1,000) to formally calling for sealed bids (items over \$2,500).

But there is also a way to buy without going to bid. This is through a state purchasing contract.

John explained that the State of New Mexico does a lot of purchasing for its many agencies, and that every year the state goes through a bidding process on the items it buys in quantity.

Suppliers whose bids are accepted are awarded a "state price agreement." The law allows municipalities to buy from those same suppliers without having to go to bid, on the theory that the items have already been bid through the state.

Ambulances, ammunition, antifreeze, batteries, breath testers... the list of items available through state purchasing contracts includes "just anything," said John.

Most suppliers are New Mexico companies, since in-state firms are given a five percent advantage on comparative prices. John said he asked the state Purchasing Division if a five percent advantage could be given to local versus out-of-town suppliers, but he was told it cannot.

However, there is a stipulation in the law which can work in favor of local suppliers. If a supplier can offer a price which is lower than or equal to the price of an item in the state price agreement, the village can buy from that supplier without having to go to bid.

The state agreements do not always offer the lowest price available. John was able to stock up on paper products when a Las Cruces supplier put toilet paper on sale at a price below the state's.

The same company had paper towels at a price slightly higher than the state's, but they obligingly dropped the price more

than enough to go under it after John asked them if they could.

"So you have to look around—shop," said John.

He pointed out that the state has not always been careful about product specifications. If a good paper towel does the work of three cheaper ones, the cheaper ones are more costly, he pointed out. The state is improving in this area, however, providing detailed specs and even listing methods of testing and inspection.

Buying on state contracts or according to state prices is fine and good for planned purchases, John said. But, "the thing that chews us up—in employees' time and paperwork—are the day to day unforeseen purchases."

In the past, a village employee needing some small part might have driven around getting prices—spending time and gas.

To get away from this, John explained, the village called for bids on hardware items, plumbing, auto repair and auto parts. The winning bidders got one-year open-ended purchasing orders.

Now when goods or services in those areas are required, the department head goes directly to the supplier who has the purchase order, which saves time. The supplier bills the village monthly on the purchase order, which saves paperwork.

John said the bids were awarded to the suppliers who offered the best discount structure, in terms of price and quality.

"We couldn't do that overnight," he noted. "We had to do some studying on that."

The village is now studying its needs of routine auto parts (oil filters, for example) to determine when it is feasible to buy a year's supply. John figures such bulk buying can save the village 20 to 30 percent.

He mentioned that the village recently bought several hundred gallons of antifreeze at more than a dollar under the state price.

John told me that he has heard rumors around town that the village is phasing out local suppliers. Nothing could be further from the truth, he emphasized.

"I want to try to buy locally any and every thing we can," he said.

Once it is determined which items are to be bought in quantities, local suppliers will be encouraged to bid on them, with the state price as the standard to meet or beat.

"If I have anything to say about it," said John, "it will mean more money saved and more money spent in the village. That's our ultimate goal."

Sounds like a pretty good outlook for the village purchasing officer to have.

Keep after it John, we forgive you the paper coffee cups.

STILL OF THE NIGHT, from MGM/UA Entertainment Co., Directed by Robert Benton, screenplay by Robert Benton. Starring Roy Scheider, Meryl Streep, Jessica Tandy. Rated 'PG' ★ ★

If one doesn't check the credits before the film began, one might conclude that this film was made by Brian DePalma, the director who believes that you can build a career remaking Alfred Hitchcock's movies. But it's not.

"Still of the Night" is scripted and directed by Robert Benton — his first film since the successful "Kramer vs. Kramer."

All the elements of a Hitchcock movie are included in "Still of the Night." The female lead is a blonde who creates suspicion that she may be psychotic. There's even a duplication of the auction sequence from "North by Northwest."

What Hitchcock would call the "McGuffin" — the central fact around which the plot revolves — is whether or not Meryl Streep is a murderer. She comes into the office of her lover's psychiatrist (Roy Scheider) to say that her lover has been found with his throat rudely ventilated from ear to ear. Is she capable of murder? What is it about her past she's

trying to hide? Will she fall in love with the psychiatrist?

The answers are all neatly included in this basic, compact thriller that shows you can still give an audience a few chills and thrills without showing them guts and gore. Benton is a solid scriptwriter, and this is a no-frills script that could be a blueprint for a thriller. It's almost as if you had given the project to an engineer to film instead of a director. It's functional, if not elegant.

Miss Streep brings class to anything she's in, but here she almost overacts her part. Neither the film nor her character is that complex, and Miss Streep is trying to deep-sea fish in a shallow stream.

After the tense social realism of "Kramer vs. Kramer," Benton said he wanted to make a film that was purely a filmic exercise, a chiller that was simply a diversion. In that he has succeeded well, "Still of the Night" has no socially redeeming value, but it's entertaining. Hitchcock might have approved.

Merle Haggard joined several other country music headliners in the recently completed 13-show country music TV series "Kicker Country."

The shows were taped in New York City at the Ed Sullivan Theater.

Super-picker Chet Atkins says the 28-year-old Skaggs "could save country music."

Jerry Reed has signed with Nashville's Top Billing Agency for booking representation. He plans to tour year-round, focusing more attention on maintaining a high level of personal appearance concerts at fairs and family-oriented events.

Reed, a Grammy Award winner, seems headed for another No. 1 with his current

single, "The Bird."

Rumors are floating around the country music industry that record label executives are sitting up and taking notice of the recent trend being set by a relatively new chartmaker — Ricky Skaggs.

Hank Williams Jr. has done it again. He's broken his own record for the number of albums on the same label on the country album charts at the same time.

When his new "Greatest Hits" LP hit the charts, he had nine listed — his entire album output since signing with Elektra Records in late 1978.

A new version of Mark Twain's "Huckleberry Finn" airs Dec. 11 on the Movie Channel. The production by J. Lee Thompson is a musical, featuring Paul Winfield, Jeff East and Harvey Korman. If the film has only a tenth of the book's excitement and vitality, it will be worth watching.

Ernest Hemingway called "Huckleberry Finn" "the father of us all" — for the influence the book had on American writing in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The book is funny, topical (on topics that still have plenty of life), action-filled, sad and profound.

On Dec. 12, Nickelodeon's "Special Delivery" will present "Clarence and Angel," a portrait of two different and troubled kids. Clarence, a lethargic boy who hasn't learned how to read, and Angel, a swaggering, self-styled hero, meet in the corridor between the classrooms from which they are repeatedly expelled.

The film follows their unlikely friendship through city streets, pinball parlors, movie theaters and back to the hallway where Angel teaches Clarence to read — using everything from graffiti to "Br'er Rabbit." 


