# **Energy secretary** pushes for decontrol

U.S. Secretary of Energy Donald Hodel told a group of oil and gas producers gathered here Thursday night they have been "sending mixedsignals" to Washington concerning provisions of a proposed bill to deregulate natural gas production. while opponents have presented a unified front in pushing for continued. controls Hodel, speaking to the Permian Basin Petroleum Association's an nual meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, guipped he has had "a gas. problem since I got this job and Digel doesn't seem to help it. Then the energy secretary took the petroleum producers to task saying while oil and gas interests spent a lot of time worrying about the nits of the proposed deregulation legislation consumer lobbyists were selling Congress "a bill of goods" in favor of continued controls Hodel said his group knows the current language in the deregulation. legislation has problems, yet it is "a bill that would permit Congress to move as close to decontrol as possi-

Violinist Rosemary Silversteen, cellist James Fittz and planist William Leland will perform two major works by two of the giants of the romantic era in music, Brahms and Mendelssohn

Brahms' Trio No 1 in B Major, Opus 8 is included in the program in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of Brahm's birth He composed the piece twice, once at age 20 and again, in revised form, at age 57 The work begins with a long and marvelously original opening shared by cello and piano. The violin finally enters and adds its warm third voice as the melody grows into a great statement. In the closing coda, the violin and cello are in melting discourse against a quietly murmur ing plano accompaniment

The Scherzo is all kinetic excitement, reminiscent of Mendelssohnian grace. In the trio of this movement.

ment, as in the first, the cello is brought to the fore against light plano triplets. The delayed violin entry produces an exquisite effect. The second theme in D major is energetic and bright. One might imagine Brahms thinking of some old folk ballad as he was composing the music

Also on the program is Mendelssohn's Trio No 1 in D Minor, Opus 49. The spirited, flowing character of this entire trio is established in the main theme of the first movement. After the unbridled passion of the first movement, the succeeding slow movement comes as an idyll, blissful "song without words," which, after a brief cadenza for the violin and cello, sinks into reverie

The swift, gossamer-like scherzo is "Midsummer Night's Dream" music A true romantic pathos courses through the closing movement. Twice the fiery impulse sinks into a melancoly hush and seems to be ap-

James Fittz is also on the music faculty at NMSU and is principal cellist of the Las Cruces Symphony. He holds master of music and doctor of musical arts degrees in cello performance and music literature from the University of Arizona.

William Leland is currently planist in residence at NMSU. He is a graduate of the Philadelphia Conservatory and has studied privately with Hans Barth and noted Swiss pianist Karl Engle.

Sunday's concert will be the last in the series until August, when several performances will be offered to the public in conjunction with the Summer String Workshop at La Junta Guest Ranch in Alto.

# **Downs closer to clearing up zoning**

Discovery of a zoning ordinance adopted in 1969 for the Village of Ruidoso Downs means confusion over proper zoning of village property may be cleared up, if the 1969 zoning map can be located. During last Monday's board of trustees meeting it was revealed that adoption of a zoning map earlier this year was not legal. because state statutes governing zoning and rezoning of property were not followed

It has since been determined that zoning established by the 1969 or dinance and an accompanying map is the most current zoning legally adopted by the village and must be followed. The map cannot be found among village records, however, according to clerk Wilma Webb, so ac tual zoning of particular parcels of land is still in question.

The entire issue arose when plans were presented for a 40 unit moderate income apartment complex on Miriam Road off Highway 70 Conflic ting evidence concerning the current

zoning of the proposed site led the governing body to table acceptance of the plans until the matter is cleared. up

The 1969 zoning ordinance surfaced during a subsequent search through records by Webb. She reported on herfind during a special meeting Thurs day of the governing body and the Planning and Zoning Commission P&Z called to clarify the role of P&Z

Village attorney Tim Quigley advised the group that the 1969 zoning map must be located before any decision. can be made on the apartment complex plans. He said the ordinance establishes zoning for planned residential developments and plann ed commercial developments but does not set up zones for different types of residential and commercial developments. He conjectured that the apartment project would be acceptable in a planned residential development zone

members that they must go through the proper procedures including a public hearing and notification of pro-

perty owners of they want to legally adopt the 1983 zoning map which does establish separate zones for trailer parks, single family and multi family dwellings and for light and general commercial structures.

Mayor J. C. Day asked Quigley whether the governing body could vote at that time to tentatively approve plans for the apartment development pending proper zoning of the property. The attorney advised Day that the village would probably face legal problems if the matter were not considered in a regular trustees meeting. A number of property owners had attended last Monday's meeting to protest the project but the zoning question arose before plans were presented

Also discussed at Thursday's special meeting were problems P&Z faces because its responsibilities and powers are unclear. Quigley offered to meet with members to review the village ordinance which outlines Quigley informed trustees and P&Z – P&Z's duties and limits of authority A meeting was set for 6:30 p.m. Thursday, one hour pior to the commission's regular meeting

# AG says Legislature must to okay mule pari-mutual betting

Attorney General Paul Bardacke's office Tuesday told the state Racing Commission that an act of the Legislature would be required to allow pari-mutuel betting on mule races

"Our conclusion is that the Horse Racing Act does not allow wagering on mule races. The act would have to be amended to lawfully permit parimutuel wagering on mule races," stated the Attorney General's written opinion presented to the commission. American Mule Association president Bill Harris had said previously that he thought the question of parimutuel betting on mule races was a

question of definition that could be decided by the racing commission instead of the Legislature He was optimistic the commission would permit pari-mutuel betting on mule races.

The Horse Racing Act mentions only "horses" and "horseracing" said Vic Hogsett, staff member in the Attorney General's office. Referring to Webster's Third International Dictionary, the Attorney General's staff found very different definitions of the two animals

The Horse Racing Act is an exemption only for horse racing to the general prohibition against gambling in New Mexico, said Hogsett.

"In such a sensitive and important area, it can be assumed the Legislature would have involved mules if it had intended to allow wagering on mule races," states the Attorney General's opinion.

Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinner director Ed Hyman expressed disappointment at the Attorney General's opinion

"If we could get the pari-mutuel through, we could have a whole new industry that could bring in a few bucks," he said. He called mule racing a budding new industry that is not in competition with horse racing and could help both the farming and tourism industries.

"The only thing we can do now is get together and back it in the Legislature," he said.

Swenor noted that for every DWI arrest, it takes an officer about two hours for the arrest and booking and another four hours in paperwork That translates into about 150 eighthour working days to handle last year's DWI arrests.

The Legislature also had a number of bills before it this session designed to toughen up DWI laws, but it failed to pass a major DWI reform bill that contained several recommendations from a special task force on DWL McGuire thinks tougher DWI laws are needed, but he points out the problem would not be solved by throwing all drunk drivers in jail. "You've got to try preventive things as well as punitive," suggested McGuire. Intimately aware of the effects of alcohol, Hayhurst also sees it as the nation's primary substance abuse problem—and feels it is a substance that must be labeled a drug. Said Hayhurst, "Many people don't know it, but you can also OD on alcohol-not just drugs-if a large quantity is consumed quickly." High school counselor James Sanchez also does not separate alcohol from drugs, calling both "monsters" that can attack the user.

It's the leading killer on the state's highways; it is behind most violent crime locally; and it causes an untold number of family disturbances and problems in the workplace.

Yet alcohol, such an integral part of so many lives, often is not regarded as dangerous as illegal drugs.

But, according to Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor, if one is going to talk about the problems with substance abuse, alcohol has to head

#### the list.

"I don't separate drugs from alcohol. When you talk about abused substances, the biggest problem by far is alcohol," he said.

Alcohol abuse has clearly caused the police chief enough headaches over the years. He points out that on any given night, officers will be called out to a bar to break up a fight, or called to a home to cool off a family disturbance.

Every alcohol-related call puts officers in a state of stress, because they never know what they are going for law officers is contained in arrest figures compiled by RPD.

In 1982, Ruidoso police made 202 DWI (driving while intoxicated) arrests, setting an all-time record. About 15 percent of the 506 accidents in the village-another record-involved alcohol, and alcohol was also involved in about 26 percent of the injury accidents.

According to Swenor's estimate, alcohol was a contributing factor in about 60 to 70 percent of the violent crimes last year.

Through last weekend, Ruidoso police had made close to 50 DWI arrests for 1983.

The effect of alcohol abuse on law enforcement is most glaring in the DWI rate. Correlating the arrest figure, Ruidoso municipal and magistrate courts both handled record DWI case loads last year.

Ray Hayhurst, director of the Lincoln House Alcoholic Transitional Facility in Ruidoso Downs, thinks the number of DWIs in the area had some bearing on the 1983 Legislature's support for the rehabilitation facility. The Legislature appropriated operating funds for the facility, and money to create a county alcoholic treatment program, under an amendment to the General Appropriations Act, said State Representative Mar-

vin "Mickey" McGuire.

McGuire was the driving force in the House of Representatives behind the appropriation.

McGuire said part of the reason the solons granted the request was the building movement nationwide to fight the drinking-and-driving problem.

"I think it's an issue that has come to the forefront nationwide," he ex-

Because it is easier to buy than marijuana and it is socially accepted at all age levels, alcohol is more of a

Because of his concern, Swenor said his department does all it can to arrange transportation for intoxicated persons if the station is called by someone needing a ride.

Even though the DWI rate shows no signs of diminishing, and alcoholrelated incidents continue to burden his department, Swenor sees encouraging signs in the nation's increased awareness of the alcohol problem.

"Alcohol is being recognized more widely as an abusable substance, even though it's socially acceptable. Maybe that's the answer, there's more consciousness of health. Maybe we're only one or two generations away."

# Handicaps not restraining to walker Lyle Bert

"I found I can do darn near anything I want to if I try hard enough," said Lyle Bert, who was blinded and lost both hands in an accidental explosion in 1965. His current project of raising \$6 million for the Bright Hopes Foundation by walking 15,000 miles may be the biggest challenge he has yet taken on.

Facing an extremely difficult handicap. Bert has been able to shape a life that includes most of the activities of physically fit people. Living alone, he does his own cooking and housecleaning as well as tending a large garden.

He completed studies for and received a Master's degree in political science in just three-and-ahalf years in spite of the doubts of teachers and administrators. His grade point average was a perfect 4.0 throughout college.

He has made hooked rugs, worked a wood lathe and prides himself on his skill with a shovel.

Using the motto, "How do you know I can't do something? I haven't tried." Bert wants to build a motivational retreat for handicapped youths. He plans to purchase 40 to 160 acres of land in the Sacramento Mountains where he can build the small working retreat. There he hopes to challenge young handicapped people to develop skills they may not have been encouraged to try before, thus raising their self-confidence and feelings of self-worth.

The retreat is a dream Bert has had for eight years which grew out of his frustration at not being treated as a normal human being in a Veterans Administration rehabilitation center. The dream, however, has always been brought back to earth by lack of funds.

On April 15 Bert walked out of Portales on the first leg of a 15,000-mile journey he hopes will raise the \$6 million he figures he will need to accomplish his dream. He said he is walking to attract attention to his project and bring in donations for his . miles walked.

Thursday afternoon he walked into Ruidoso where he was greeted by a group of well-wishers, donations and good news in the parking lot of Gibson's. The student council of Ruidoso High School presented Bert with a \$160 check for each of the miles he has walked so far. The Evening Lions Club presented him with three \$160 checks.

He also received a message that Nancy Reagan and Senator Pete Domenici may greet him when he arrives in Albuquerque.

"I'm glad to be here and not on the hood of a Mack truck," he said to the waiting crowd.

Bert has walked 130 of his 160 miles alone on the side of the road, using a white cane for guidance. After shifting from size 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> shoes to size 12 in Roswell, he has gotten rid of the "blisters up to my ears" and continued on his way up the hill to Ruidoso.

"I shifted my transmission into stupid and just kept going," said Bert. Alex Cono, a close friend of Bert's, is accompanying the man on his trip.

They started with Cono carrying gear and bedding in a pickup truck with an improperly fitting camper shell. When Bill and Johnnie McTeigue of Hondo saw the "Last Chance Hotel," they offered Bert and Cono the use of their trailer home.

"We've moved from the outhouse to the penthouse," declared Bert.

Cono usually travels a half mile or more behind or ahead of Bert as he walks.

"If I have to walk the whole 15,000 miles, you can bet I will," Bert told Dub Williams' ninth grade class. However, he did say if some eccentric walked up to him and handed him \$6 million he would stop there and ask for a ride back to town.

He has now collected several thousand dollars but has no idea of the exact amount.

"The watched pot never boils; I know it's nowhere near six million yet," he explained.

But Friday morning Bert was tapping his cane on the road to Alamogordo in search of more donations for his dream.

"Now is the time for smart people to cut their firewood," U.S. Forest Service timber specialist Mike Funston said Tuesday.

In addition to many of Mother Nature's reasons for cutting wood in the spring, the Smokey Bear Ranger District is changing a number of its fuelwood cutting policies to make spring a better cutting time.

The Forest Service is opening the new fuelwood cutting areas earlier this year. They are reducing green pinyon and juniper available while increasing the ponderosa pine areas. Beginning July 1, wood cutting permits will cost more.

The strategy is designed to encourage people to cut and burn more ponderosa pine, explained Funston.

Pinyon and juniper are generally preferred for fuel by most people in this area. However, it takes 225 years for a new pinyon and juniper forest to Funston said wise woodcutters cut

grow back after harvesting. The increased demand for firewood that began with the 1973 oil embargo, and population growth in Lincoln County over the past several years, have depleted the pinyon and juniper forests, said Funston.

"We've all been spoiled cutting pi-nyon and juniper," he said. But it cannot last. "We just simply cannot meet the demand," he explained.

A ponderosa pine forest, on the other hand, can recycle itself in 80 years. An acre of ponderosa pine forest is also two to three times as productive as a pinyon and juniper forest, said Funston.

The Forest Service will open only 15 new acres of pinyon and juniper forest this year compared to 60 last year and 200 the year before. In contrast, 130 acres of the more productive ponderosa pine forest was opened last year, and is still 90 percent uncut, said Funston.

Regardless of the species cut,

their wood in the spring to allow it plenty of time to cure by fall. With an increasing emphasis on ponderosa pine, it is more important to cut in the spring. While pinyon and juniper will burn when they are green, ponderosa pine will not.

The Forest Service is opening new wood cutting areas May 2 this year as compared to July 1 in years past. Funston also said there are no plans to open any other areas until next spring. By fall those areas will be largely picked over, Funston predicted. Next year they may open the new areas even earlier in the spring, depending upon weather conditions.

Once it is dry, Funston said, ponderosa pine burns very well. It does not deliver quite as much heat per log as pinyon and juniper, but is much better fuel than many people realize, he said.

Funston said specific gravity is a direct equivalent of heat produced by the wood. Pinyon has a specific gravity of .51. Alligator juniper has a

specific gravity of .45, and ponderosa pine's is .40.

Another reason to cut wood earlier this year is that it will become more expensive beginning July 1. Fees for green pinyon and juniper wood will increase from \$10 to \$14 per cord. Down dead wood and green ponderosa pinewill increase from \$5 to \$10 per cord.

Funston explained the increased charges are a response to a call by the Reagan administration for government agencies to collect more money for goods and services obtained from federal lands.

The price increase will also bring the cost of cutting wood on federal land more in line with the fees private land owners charge, he said.

"We are trying to change the public's wood cutting habits," said Funston. He agreed it is a big order, but is hopeful about people's response to burning ponderosa pine.

"Give it a fair break and try it." he said.







The Ruidoso High School boys track team qualified entrants for the state AAA division meet in three events, and the Warrior girls turned in several fine performances at the Lov-" ington Invitational Saturday.

Mike Douglass qualified in the 200-meters, Grady Williamson in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles and Cisco Bob in the 3,000 meters to highlight the action for the Warriors. Ruidoso scored 29 points in the boys division and 24.5 in the girls competi-

Douglass ran a 22.8 in the 200-meter trials for a personal best and a state qualifying berth. In the finals, the senior finished third with a 23.12 time into a strong cross-wind.

Williamson ran the intermediate hurdles for the first time and won his heat in 44.1 éasily. He passed up the finals of the race to compete in relay events,

Bob, who had already qualified for the state meet in the 1,500 meters, won the longer race easily in 9:33.81. The sophomore led almost the entire race.

"I'd say most of our athletes did a lot better than they have," Warrior head boys coach Ronny Maskew said. "I am very disappointed in one individual, however."

The Warrior girls got a good performance from their long jumpers, also. Sophomore Gia Rose leaped 15-2 for fifth place, and junior Lilian Lopez also bettered the 15-foot mark. Lopez was fifth in the shot put with a 31-2 heave.


Rachel Kaydahzinne was third in the 3.000 meters with a 13:24.0 time, and Berdine Smith was fourth in 13:32,l.

Our father had the very gentle nature of the Whippo Quakers, but when the chips were down, was absolutely fearless.

Years ago he was on a trip in Central Mexico looking for mercury for his company, the Sun Oil Company, and was with some Mexican guides and a transplanted Englishman put on a high mountain. Suddenly a hail storm struck as only in Mexico can strike, and men and horses got under the shelter of an overhanging cliff. After so long a time, father pulled out his watch and said we had better be heading back.

"In this hail storm?" His guides stood open-mouthed, Pulling his hat brim down he led his horse out straight down the mountain side.

"Not that way: we have to go, around!"

"That is too far," said father with a grin, and led the way down in the driving hail. The horses seemed to gain confidence from the man leading the way and slid down the steep places, to the astonishment of the men following.

At the bottom, his guides patted him on the back telling him they had never seen such a man. And the Englishman named him "Old Captain Bill." Father could not understand why he deserved such praise.

About 1924 father became an oil geologist with the Sun Oil Company, working out of the Dallas office. He ended his career after more than fifty years in the mining and geologic field by being awarded the distinguished medal for service in his field by his Alma Mater, the Colorado School of Minès.


When his younger brother, Jerome Vincent Storm, heard about the Sun Company hiring father, he said.

# **Inside The Capitol**

## by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE-Look for more effort to combine the state's many investment officers.

At first glance, that seems pretty plausible.

If the State Treasurer's office is investing something on the order of \$600 million; the severance tax permanent fund has \$727 million to put into the market; the Public Employees' Retirement Fund wants maximum return on about \$800 million; the Educational Retirement Fund has \$600 million to put out to investment; and the state's permanent fund is now at the level of \$1.6 billion, why not get one office into operation to handle all that money?

Please note that the previous sentence ended with a question mark. It was not a declarative sentence.

That is to say, it does not posit an irrevocable stand.

It does not declare that this combining of all state funds should take place,

If New Mexico has—as the figures above would suggest-four billion, three hundred twenty-seven million dollars to invest, why not have one office to handle it all?

That's what Toney Anaya asked during the recent political campaign. The answer-"one office to include everything"--sounds beguilingly like it makes sense.

But that doesn't mean there aren't questions about it.

about be accused of a big grab for power? Answer: Yes.

-Aren't the varying funds of the state based upon and to be handled by those who have differing philosophies?

Should the PERA, for instance, which wants to have on hand maximum money when state employees retire, be governed by the same rules at the state permanent fund? That is supposed to produce income

for state institutions.

-Do these operations have the same needs?

PERA, for example, has to have a high degree of liquidity so it can pay off those leaving the state retirement system. Not so the Investment Office, which doesn't have to pay off anybody.

So are the aims and ends of these two groups the same?

Answer again: No. -Aren't all these operations a little better off if they compete with one another?

# Editorial

Ruidoso Downs officials appear to have put the cart before the horse in their eagerness to approve a 40-unit apartment complex.

While low- and moderate-income housing is very much needed in Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso, care must be taken to follow due process in allowing for it.

The Downs Planning and Zoning Commission rezoned a tract of land that has been proposed as the site of the apartments by simply passing a motion.

It was pointed out to the village trustees, correctly, that this is not the way it is done. Since zoning of property determines what type of development-residential, commercial or industrial—is allowed there, neighboring property owners can definitely be affected by a rezoning.

State statutes require that they be notified in writing of a proposed change, and that a public hearing be conducted. Veterans of last year's Racquet Club/Hilton Inn hearings in Ruidoso know that this can become a very involved process, but it is the law and there are good reasons for it.

Congressman JOE SKEEN **Reports From Washington** 

One of the things I enjoy most about serving in Congress is the fact that we're involved in a continuous learning process. In order to make reasoned decisions on the crucial matters presented to us, we must continually absorb and assimilate information about virtually every subject under and even beyond — the sun.

This month the Subcommittee on Investigations and Oversight, of which I am the ranking Republican member, held hearings that increased my knowledge in the field of "job forecasting" a hundredfold. Like most other Americans who have already chosen the path they want their lives to take. I really hadn't given much thought to whether anyone was involved in trying to make sure people are trained to fill the jobs that will be open in the future.

In the past many people followed the trade or profession of their family - whether it was farming, banking or operating the corner store. As populations have increased and shifted and the number of jobs and types of jobs have grown, this can no longer be true.

We all know what can happen if nothing is done to prepare our people for the future - especially in the area of employment. If you visited a college on registration day during the beginning of the space race in the 1950s, you remember the long lines of students waiting to sign up to become "engineers." It didn't make a lot of difference what kind of engineer, the conventional wisdom was that America needed more "engineers" if we were to win the space race. The

word was used generically. Needless to say, all of those aspiring engineers didn't become members of the profession. If they had, humans might be living on Mars today. But that's beside the point I'm trying to make. If we had perfected the art of job forecasting by the 1950s, the country could have trained all of the engineers we needed without encouraging a lot of people to enter a field that held no future for them. The subcommittee held two days of hearings on the subject and listened to experts on every aspect of it. The premise is fairly simple. All you have to do is determine what skills will be short supply in 20 years and make sure the training is available for people who want to acquire those skills. That sounds easy enough, doesn't it? That's where my education comes in.. You'd think that anyone could look at what's going on in the world today and predict without doubt that the so-called "high tech" industries will be the ones needing the workers to

tomorrow.

But the experts told us that the growth in technological occupations will amount to less than 4 percent of the total growth between now and 1990. The occupation they expect to grow the most goes under the simple description of secretaries or clerical services.

There will be a need for between 700,000 and 850,000 additional secretaries in this nation by 1990, we're told. The next greatest predicted area of growth will be in the field of "nurses aides and orderlies" (500,000 to 600,000); followed by janitors (around 500,000).

But that, too, doesn't tell the complete story. Those secretaries, nurses aides and janitors will most likely be doing basically the same job in 1990 that they're doing today — but they'll be doing it in different ways, using different tools.

Good penmanship was once the most highly sought after trait in secretaries, for example. This evolved into shorthand and typing skills.

Then came the need to operate basic office equipment such as adding machines and the stencil machines that were replaced by today's automatic copying machines. The skills needed to be a secretary evolved as the tools available to do the job evolved.

This will continue to be true. The shorthand skills of the past, in many instances, have given away to the skills needed to transcribe from dictating machines and tape recorders. In the same way, the manual typewriters of the past have been replaced by electric and elecwe changed our office location. **DEAR EDITOR:** 

Perhaps our snow pack and runoff couldn't have happened at a better time. It erases many conclusions reached by those experts who study our stream flows and attempt to strike some kind of average over the years in order to come up with an answer to our water problems.

For some time Eagle Creek has been pouring waters back into the Rio Ruidoso at Glencoe. These waters are those that could be impounded below the Alto Dam. These waters are those that could be diverted out of the Rio Ruidoso for filling the proposed Grindstone Dam, and could serve as replaced effluent which would eliminate any complaint of the farmers above Biscuit Hill.

In a few years Ruidoso will do well during any type of wet spell to impound their effluent credit, much less the waters they are entitled to use in Eagle Creek. The only possible way they can do this is have a diversion pipe large enough to store those waters in as short a time as possible. And they say more water rights are needed out of the Rio Ruidoso? They can't store the water rights they own, with their accredited effluent, so any additional rights would seem to be the last problem they have. The proof of what I say is present today in the two streams ... merely take a look at what is taking place.

We have had excessive runoffs in July, in September, in October, and yes in December as well as March, April and May. The problem ... catch as much waters as you can in as short a time as possible, close the valve and await another wet spell and let what little waters flow down our stream, the Rio Ruidoso, when it becomes dry so that it will stay alive. That is what the Order of the State Engineer dated September 10, 1962 does. The key to success is a large diversion pipe and a bit more storage in Eagle Creek. Conditions today verify that. It is that simple and that complicated.

Mesa, plus as was suggested, a hospital, consolidated high school and Jr. college. What a combination!

It has been known for some time, that there is a limited supply of water in the Ruidoso area, and much of that has been indescriminately used as if there was no tomorrow. Folks, "tomorrow" is here! A whole new airport to bring in the "lost millions" as stated by Mr. Tully, will in fact, require more water, that he says, isn't

there. Mr. Tully closed his letter by mentioning the loss of water from the Rio Bonito. This, after all, may be a blessing, because we've kept the Lincoln area pretty free of the destructive commercialism that has beset Ruidoso. Because we have maintained this special quality of life in Lincoln, many of us can sense the destruction to our environment by such proposed projects as an airport on the Ft. Stanton Mesa, Just a little work would upgrade the Carrizozo airport to satisfy the needs of Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

Sure we need the advertising, but let's make it a fair tax. Also how long will the state provide matching funds? Not very long from people I have talked to.



Now, to continue with my report on the New Mexico Press Women Convention ....

**ABC Nightline correspondent Betsy** Aaron was our luncheon speaker. Aaron's talk addressed, quite naturally, given the general makeup of the audience, the roles of women in the news media. "You Are What You Cover," her address was entitled.

Aaron began her career as a secretary, she informed us, and would have continued so had not all the pats on the head she received from male bosses awakened her to the situation. Even as a news reporter gaining respect and weighty assignments, though, Aaron said her career was just a way of "biding my time" until she married and began a family-she and most other females of her generation had been raised to believe so. Not until she was widowed at a relatively young age did she realize her work was actually necessary.

Since that time, Betsy Aaron has worked for all three major networks and has spent much of her career covering wars and politics. It seems that women have made great advances in the news media field, but Aaron pointed out that there are still no female network news executives. There also remains the tendency for female reporters to be assigned particular stories on the basis of their gender.

I've found myself at The News struggling against that tendency. Being the only female reporter on the five-member editorial staff automatically made me the recipient of most engagement and wedding announcements and other typical "society" news, plus any fashion or food features. I think I've succeeded in convincing the staff that my being female does not inherently mean I know about or appreciate such things. I'm much more helpless in the kitchen than several of my male coworkers.

was able to bring a woman's sensibili-ty to the story."

An audience member later questioned where the line is drawn between bringing one's sensibility to a story and biasing the story. Aaron answered that it is quite natural and actually inevitable that every reporter bring his or her own sensibility to what he/she is reporting. Aaron pointed out that she brings Betsy Aaron's sensibilities to a story and, as a female, those perceptions and responses are tied up with being a woman.

A reporter does not consciously set out to inject a story with a woman's or man's point-of-view or even with his personal point-of-view. But absolute objectivity is impossible, at least until such time as machines take over the job of reporting the news.

Deciding which facts and quotes to include in a story, in what order, and how to word the lead all require judgments that are inevitably affected by one's own "sensibilities." It is only right that both male and female sensibilities are reflected in the news stories we digest every day.

The most equitable situation would be for members of both sexes and various age groups to be fairly represented among news gatherers. An audience member at the convention wondered aloud why television newswatchers were able to tune in to see "Cronkite's white hair and sagging jowls" but never a grandmotherly image.

Aaron admitted the time has not yet arrived for that to happen. Women's careers in broadcast journalism tend to be more short-lived than men's-for now.

But one of the convention sessions I attended provided me with an idea for making a bundle of money at a young age, so at least I could retire comfortably. Former head writer for the soap opera "Texas," Paul Rader, conducted a session on "Writing for the Soaps." Rader informed the audience that soap opera assistant writers-usally the mid-twenties age in bracket-make about \$2,000 a week! When they move into prime time the salaries can soar to much greater heights. Rader told us about a Writer Development Program Proctor and Gamble sponsors in which they pay participants about \$200 an episode just to watch a television show once a day for a week. Someone would have to pay me that kind of money to sit through an episode of a lot of the shows on television now, but I'm sure I could be persuaded. At least when it comes time for a career change I have some possibilities to consider. Proctor and Gamble may be hearing from me!

tronic devices that correct mistakes and even keep often used form-letters in their memory banks to be typed automatically when needed.

These machines are now giving way to word processors and computer terminals that perform a myriad of tasks if you know which button to push.

Teaching tomorrow's secretaries "which button to push" will be a major task facing the educators of today if the employment needs of tomorrow are to be met. Employers, too, are going to have to learn the basics so that they can know what directions to give their secretaries.

The same holds true in other industries. The jobs will not necessarily be in the "high-tech" companies but those companies and their products will have a great influence on how the jobs that do grow will be performed. As I said, it's a fascinating subject and just part of the continuing education of a Congressman.
