

dealers in recent weeks. The effort

Council on council

(Editor's note: This is the fourth in a series of articles dealing with the November 8 special election on increasing the size of the Ruidoso village council.)

When talking about the past year and a half. Ruidoso village council members often mention the future. They believe decisions on water, streets, planning and zoning, annexations and other issues have put Ruidoso in a better position to face the

"We're beginning to plan ahead," said councilman Benny Coulston.

In evaluating their performances, the councilmen most often noted advances in the water supply and streets of Ruidoso.

The continuing effort to plan, finance and construct the Grindstone reservoir is obviously the largest undertaking of the council. While council members mentioned the reservoir among their accomplishments, it seemed to be an understood accomplishment.

Coulston said the council's efforts were things that should have been done 10 years ago. He did say, however, that the increased water storage has provided a solution to Ruidoso's water problems for the next eight to 10 years.

"You do not solve water on an immediate basis," said Coulston, "You have to have time to look ahead "

Both Coulston and councilman Al Junge said they are proud of the council's action to revise water rates, which has put the village water department in a much more solvent situation. Since the increase in water rates, the water department has been able to build up a half-million dollar surplus, said Junge, who personally took credit for the review of the water rates

"We have been able to replace literally miles of leaky pipes and faulty meters," said Junge.

He said water loss has been cut in half, saving the village seven million gallons of water a month.

The surplus has also provided money for the purchase of water rights, said Junge. The council is now in the process of bargaining for additional water rights.

Both Coulston and Junge said they would have liked this council to work harder at purchasing water rights.

The preservation of existing water rights has been another issue before the council, with the valley farmers' water protest. The protest of the change in sewage discharge points into the Rio Ruidoso has put the village's ability to fill Grindstone reservoir in jeopardy.

"That greatly disturbs me that we get entangled in the legal framework," said councilman Frank Sayner of the dispute over the new sewer treatment plant and effluent water credit.

Sayner said the council and the farmers worked hard to come up with a solution to the dispute, but that every solution was unacceptable to one or the other group's lawyers.

"We have tried every avenue to settle this thing peaceably," said councilman Don Dale, who emphasized the great number of hours spent trying to solve the problem

"This council has really worked hard to be as fair and equitable to everyone as possible," said Coulston He noted, however, that the council must keep the rights of Ruidoso's citizens in mind. "Our number one

priority is to the citizens of Ruidoso " The citizens of Ruidoso, councilmen say, can now drive on better streets and will continue to do so in the future because of their actions.

"Look what's happened to streets in the past three or four years," said

Sayner. Sayner said it was only a few years ago that one could not drive down Paradise Canyon "without basically having to realign your

Sayner and other councilmen noted the purchase of a hot mix plant, laydown machine and other equipment bought for the street depart-

"We gave him (street department superintendent Jack LaMay) men. money and materials," said Sayner. Coulston and Sayner noted that Ruidoso is the only municipality in the state that can meet State Highway Department standards for street pav-

Junge also noted that he directed the consolidation of the street and solid waste departments into one department, which he said has saved the village at least \$20,000 a year

He said he is also proud of revisions of solid waste collection charges According to Junge, the department, which was a perennial money loser, is now \$55,000 in the black. The cash surplus allowed the department to purchase \$8,000 worth of garbage dumpsters, he noted.

The water and solid waste department surpluses make it possible for the village to purchase equipment without having to go to the voters for a bond issue, said Junge

Junge noted the revamping of the village organizational chart, the institution of time clocks for village employees on an hourly wage, and the construction of a village barn as personal accomplishments during his term. He also mentioned the Gavilan Canyon bypass, more street signs, and the installation of a computer at village hall as council accomplishments

"There's not an aspect of the city operations I haven't had a foot in," said Junge.

Candidates are few at forum

Efforts to better inform the public about Tribal Council candidates' views got off to a fitful start Thursday night in Mescalero

Of 12 candidates invited to the Mescalero Apache Tribe's first public forum for the candidates, only two showed up Approximately 25 people went to listen to those candidates address 12 questions concerning the Tribe and its government

"I know this is the first time for this type of meeting, but I expected a lot more," said Tribal Council member Silas Cochise, who is not up for reelection "I wish that more people were here '

Tribal Council elections are Tuesday, November 1 Incumbents Berle

Kanseah, Raymond Kirgan, John Shendo Jr. and Evelyn Breuninger will face Frederick Peso, Reginald Tortilla, Vernon Scott and Lewis LaPaz for council seats

Wyndham Runningwater is challenging incumbent Wendell Chino for Tribal President Tribal Council member Harlyn Via is challenging Keith Miller for the vice-presidency of the Tribe

Although Tribal Council member Virginia Klinekole said invitations were sent to all candidates, only Harlyn Via and Tortilla showed up at the Mescalero Community Center

Tortilla spoke to the small group in the Apache language for five minutes Although Klinekole gave a rough translation of his speech for attending press members, Tortilla later refuted her translation and said he spoke in

Apache because his comments were not for the press

Harlyn Via addressed two of the 12 questions and spoke in English and Apache He called for more money for college students, and gambling to a limited extent

"There's never been enough money allotted to our students," said Via-

He said he helped get the allotment for college students raised from \$2,000 to \$4,000 per year. That amount is still not enough, especially for those with families, said Harlyn Via. He said there is \$2 million in the scholarship fund, which he indicated should be enough to supply students with more

"I believe legal gambling is a good business to turn to," said Harlyn Via Please see Candidates, 2A



Halloween is a big event at the Ruidoso Public Library.



Sayner, Junge and Dale all mentioned increased funding for the park and recreation department and the hiring of director Pam Graves as notable accomplishments

The councilmen reflected their different personal policies with varying evaluations of annexations accepted and refused during their terms

"I think the council has erred on some of its decisions on annexation. said Benny Coulston

Coulston voted in favor of the three major annexation requests presented to the council. Don Dorman's Grindistone land, the new high school property in Bog Springs, and Keith Mills' Sleepy Hollow subdivision. The council annexed the Grindstone land and new high school property. It refused to annex the Sleepy Hollow property

"The problem's still there," said Coulston of the Sleepy Hollow proper

It has been presented for annexa tion twice and will be again, said Coulston He said other councilmen's concerns about water rights with annexation indicate an inadequate understanding of development

It takes two to three years to develop land, and the village would have time to develop water resources before they are needed, he said. He

said he believes Ruidoso has the capability to supply adequate water

Sayner said current water improvements are just supplying water for land annexed in the mid-'70s. He said older areas of town such as the Town and Country and Forest Heights subdivisions are filling in and putting a burden on the village water supply

He defended the refusal to annex the Sleepy Hollow subdivision because of the unbearable demand be said development there would put on the Upper Canyon water treatment

Junge said Sleepy Hollow could not have been annexed since it was not going to bring any water rights in with it. It would have been unthinkable for the village not to supply the new high school with water, said Junge

The new sewer line hooked up to the school will benefit the village by relieving some of the load on the heavily used sewer system in White Mountain I and II, said Sayner.

When questioned about the council's annexation policy, councilman Dale called it "a hard one to answer." He noted, however, that he has voted consistently. He was against all three annexations. "I've been straight down the line."

said Dale. Dale said he is against rapid growth because the village does not even pro-

vide services to many homes already within the village limits. He noted that the village is just now getting around to providing sewer for the Ponderosa Heights subdivision. which he pointed out as one of the

council's accomplishments. Dale and Mayor George White also mentioned the new police complex as one of the accomplishments of this

council. "We've upgraded that department

to no end," said White. Dale also said the council has greatly improved the fire department in the past year and a half

Although some people are upset with disagreements and dissension among the council and mayor, White said he is not.

"I think we've had a good council," said White. "I've had to give and they have given.

Sayner, however, is not quite so positive.

"I think it's unfortunate the mayor and the council have been bullheaded at times," he said. He said he has been embarrassed some times with the lack of production at some of the council meetings during the past two years. He and Junge both said cooperation between the council and the mayor has improved recently. "Certainly we have disagreed ...

which I think is healthy," said Dale. One point on which the councilmen and mayor continue to usagree is over study sessions. All the councilmen said they were in favor of the sessions. The mayor said he thinks they are illegal because the small room in which the council meets does not allow access to the public.

Dale said he would not mind if the council met for study sessions in the big council room. Junge said he is willing to meet in other places, such as the library, but he is convinced that informally meeting around a table is essential to a good exchange of ideas. White said exchanging ideas would be fine, but making decisions in the sessions is not.

Both Junge and Coulston questioned whether the public really cares about the study sessions

None of the councilmen voiced strong opinions about increasing the size of the council by two members. but they generally leaned against it. "I don't see any good that would come out of it," said Junge.

If voters do decide November 8 to increase the size of the council by two members, all present council members will have to resign. Those who choose to could run in the March general election, when the voters decide who the council members will

The councilmen said they think the quality of the council members is more important than the size of the council. With a larger council, less would get done, believe the councilmen and the mayor. Sayner would not comment on the

ed the size of the Lodgers' Tax Committee to nine members. He was the only one questioned about that issue. "I really don't have that strong an opinion one way or the other," said Coulston. He said he foresees very

long council meetings with six council members. "I think it's going to be very hard to get six qualified people to give the

time needed," said Dale. The councilmen estimated they spend anywhere from an average of 10 hours a week to 25 hours a week working on council affairs. Dale said he spent close to 40 hours a week when he first started and had to help formulate a budget.

The outcome of the special election will have little or no effect on their plans to run for office again, said Sayner, Coulston and Dale. Sayner said he would "definitely not" run again if the increase passes. He was less sure about running again in 1986 if it does not pass, but said, "I would think not."

Coulston, whose term ends in March regardless of the election outcome, said he is now leaning toward not running. Dale, whose term also ends in March, said he will have to see who else runs. If qualified people run, he said, he believes he will leave it to them to run the village for the next

"We will feel that that's an indication that the electorate thinks we are not doing a good job," said Junge, speculating on a vote in favor of the increase.

He said he would have to reevaluate his position before running for office again if the increase passes. He will be 75 years old if he is allowed to serve his complete term until 1986, he pointed out, and added he will have to think seriously about four more years in office then as well.

Sayner said much of the controversy during this council's term has come from the disagreements between those who believe Ruidoso should remain a sleepy mountain town and those who believe it is growing to become a large resort. He said the die was cast when Texans discovered Ruidoso in the mid-1970s.

He said Ruidoso will continue to grow and there is "nothing any council can do" to stop it. Coulston also said people are wrong if they think Ruidoso is a sleepy little town. Dale said controversy has arisen

because the council did go after

things needed for Ruidoso. "We did have enough nerve to tackle some of those things," said

Continued from 1A Gambling could bring new businesses to the reservation and help reduce the high unemployment among Tribe members, said Harlyn Via. He noted, however, that gambling beyond bingo is illegal in New Mexico and thus is illegal on the reservation as well.

After the short program, moderator Klinekole opened the floor to noncandidates. Council members Joseph Via and Silas Cochise addressed the group. Associate Tribal Judge Nathaniel Chee, Miss Mescalero Lucille Rocha and Fort Sill Apache Tribal Chairperson Mildred Cleghorn also spoke to the group.

"Persons who aspire to the position of Tribal Council ... should make the effort to be here," said Joseph Via. He questioned the sincerity and preparedness for challenge of absent Tribal Council candidates. "Maybe they're afraid of the

public. Maybe they're afraid of questions," said Joseph Via, who addressed all the questions. The list included questions on wood permits, fair employment practices,

the Tribal Court system, financial

disclosures of Tribe enterprises.

traditions, education, natural Blanca Ski Resort but have seen resources, business and gambling.

Joseph Via's speech was especially critical of the present Tribal Council. Via said he thinks there is no such thing as fair labor practices on the reservation and no separation of the legislative, executive and judicial

He pointed out that it takes only a simple majority of Tribal Council members to remove a Tribal Judge. He spoke of one judge who was removed due to "trumped-up charges."

"Tribal politics is at a point where judges are not free to make their decisions," said Joseph Via. Judge Chee spoke only in Apache. He told the press he spoke in Apache

because he had touched on various

sensitive issues he did not want

publicized. Joseph Via said Tribe members should know more about the financial status of tribal enterprises. He said the Tribal Council has passed resolutions in the past three or four years requesting disclosure of the financial statements of enterprises such as the Inn of the Mountain Gods and Sierra

nothing.

"There's no such thing as victimless crimes," said Joseph Via, who is against gambling on the reservation. He said society is the victim of gambling and pays for it with higher

Cochise criticized Tribe members for not becoming more involved in tribal affairs.

"In the last year I have been pretty disappointed in what I have seen, said Cochise, who has been on the Tribal Council for 10 months. He said many people talk about the problems of the Tribe but only a few

actually do anything. He pointed to

Klinekole said the purpose of the

forum was to educate the public about the candidates' views. "I personally feel it's important to be informed," said Klinekole, who has been on the Tribal Council for 25

years. She said it is often difficult for candidates to address Tribe members, and incumbents are often in an advantageous position at election time. She asked the audience to remember which candidates showed up at the forum and to tell their friends what they said.

Thursday night's forum was the first of its kind and was not supported by a majority of the Tribal Council, said Klinekole.

SUBJECT: Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School

During the last few months I have been following closely the developments concerning the closing of the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center as a facility to treat the developmentally disabled. The hospital is located near Capitan in Lincoln County. I was born and raised in the Town of Lincoln which is approximately 10 miles from Fort Stanton. Fort Stanton, since I can remember, has been the economical lifeline of this area. The proposal totransition the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center by Secretary Robert McNeill is not consistent with Governor Toney Anaya's concern for the high unemployment and declining economy of this area.

The current budget for Fort Stanton is approximately \$4.8 million of which salaries and fringe benefits amount to \$3.5 million, Approximately 60 percent of the employees are female whose earnings are needed to supplement husbands and/or family's income for cost-of-living necessities. Most of these women employees could not possibly fit into an environment such as an alcoholism treatment center.

On August 31, 1983, Secretary McNeill and several of the Health and Environment staff members held meetings with employees of Fort Stanton and also conducted a public hearing at Capitan High School to explain and receive comments on the transitional use of the facilities at Fort Stanton: Interested individuals attending the hearing have indicated that they had no opportunity to hear and/or express input on the pros and cons pertaining to the proposed tran-sition. In fact, Secretary McNeill informed the public that a final decision had been made on the transition and

relocation of the Fort Stanton handicapped population. I would consider this decision to be arbitrary and capricious, taking into consideration the adverse impact on the clients, employees and citizens of Lincoln County.

The New Mexico Legislature has appropriated considerable sums of money for renovation of existing and construction of new facilities during the past several fiscal years. The appropriations are as follows:

66th to 69th Fiscal Years -\$1,100,000.00 - Renovation of residential cottages.

70th Fiscal Year -

\$1,326,000.00 - For construction of a multi-purpose facility (swimming pool and gym) - and upgrading of electrical and sewer system.

71st Fiscal Year -\$880,000.00—Construction Food Service Center.

72nd Fisdal Year -\$880,000.00—Water system replace-

The total appropriations by the Legislature amounts to \$4,271,000.00. \$2,426,000.00 of the amount has already been completed and the re-mainder is currently in progress.

The facilities available at Fort Stanton for developmentally disabled clients are medicaid certified. It becomes very apparent that the Legislature by approving improve-ment and construction appropriation in the amounts outlined above intend for Fort Stanton to remain as a developmentally disabled facility for New Mexico's handicapped population. To divert the use of this facility for any other purpose is a deliberate violation of legislative intent.

This statement is being made by me as a concerned citizen and taxpayer of this state and not as State Auditor. As State Auditor, I will have an additional news release in the very near future. I shall be addressing such matters as the waiting list at Los Lunas Training School, at Fort Stanton and the under utilization of the Health and Environment facilities at Roswell and Carlsbad.

A comment in this space a couple of months back lauded President Reagan for his "guts" in sending American warships to Central American waters. Upon hearing of the massacre in Beirut, the author of that comment thought something like, "It's one thing to have 'guts' when you're simply making a show of force, it's another thing when more than 220 young Americans die."

I suspect most Americans are glad to hear, as we do occasionally, that Afghani fighters continue to resist Soviet occupation.

Can we totally condemn anyone for resisting our presence?

Then we have Grenada in the same week. Our invasion there also raises a parallel with Afghanistan.

But seeing a photo of an American serviceman guarding a group of Cuban prisoners, I cannot help feeling, "It's about time we showed Castro again we're not going to tolerate his adventurism close to our own shores."

Events of recent weeks, months and years must show clearly to everyone that the Soviet Union and its surrogate states are a very real enemy. The line had to be drawn somewhere, and we can only pray. the loss of life on both sides will serve as a warning of the ultimate holocaust the world is flirting with.—TP

It all happened so long ago. I'm thinking about it now because today is

I was about six or seven, and I'm not sure if it was a dream or just some childhood fantasy. It just seemed starkly real.

All I remember is a winding stair-case with large dark figures hovering around it. The staircase wound up into a dark hole that seemed to symbolize something frightening. Was it death? Or was it just the

unknown, man's fear of the unknown that has existed since the beginning of

In a sense, Halloween is about fear of the unknown. Goblins, witches, ghosts and vampires all roam the streets of our towns and cities Hallo-

Of course, those "creatures" are just young kids dressed up in costumes. But the creatures they're dressed up as have always symbolized something evil or powerful.

Halloween itself has existed in

some form or another for over 2,000

It began with the ancient Celtics and was celebrated in England. But it didn't become popular in this country until the 19th century, when immigrants brought the idea of the holiday here with them.

Kids still celebrate the holiday here. But it has become less popular in the past 10 or 15 years because harmful pranks and, in some cases, criminal behavior have occurred on October 31.

I've always been fascinated with Halloween. I've been interested in the supernatural, haunted houses and the battle between good and evil.

When I was a kid in California, my friends and I used to roam around old, deserted houses. I always found Victorian era houses to be of particular interest.

These houses represented a time when mystery and romance abounded. Movies about old Gothic or Victorian houses with dark secrets hidden in them have long been one of Hollywood's trump cards in entertaining the public.

I can remember walking near one century-old house near my grandmother's home in California.

The house was two and a half stories high and was dark brown in color. It stood about 300 yards from any other house in the area and was surrounded by trees on one side and a freeway on the other.

If you didn't see the freeway, you'd think you were looking at a scene in some ancient Gothic novel. On an overcast day or in the early evening, you could hardly see the house because of its dark color.

Whenever I walked by the house, I got chills up and down my spine.

The house was lived in by three elderly sisters almost as old as the house itself. They hardly ever came out of their home, so the house seem-

ed deserted and forlorn.

It always appeared more formidable and mysterious in the fall and early winter, around Halloween

time! There was a sense that the house contained many dark secrets. Just by looking at it, I could see the events of

the past century pass before my eyes, perhaps even many tragedies. That house more than any other I've ever seen or been in gave me both a sense of fear of the unknown and an

excited yearning to find out what that unknown is. That is essentially what Halloween

is all about. In ancient Britain, people used to burn fires and make loud noises on

Halloween night to drive away the evil spirits they thought were around. Those people may have been ig-norant, but they were merely trying to express their fear of things they couldn't understand and knew nothing about.

My dream or fantasy as a small boy about the dark figures and the dark hole was probably about the same thing-my feelings about the future or things I couldn't understand.

People down through the ages have always been both fascinated and fearful of the unknown,
