## Serious crime increases in 1982

The annual compilation of crime statistics by the Ruidoso Police Department for 1982 shows a 20 percent increase in serious or felony crimes over 1981.

Police Chief Richard Swenor said Thursday the type of felonies committed swung dramatically from crimes against persons in 1981 to crimes against property last year.

Also included in the annual report are traffic accident figures showing '82 as a record year for collisions. Swenor wrote traffic is the single largest problem faced by the police department, calling the current situation practically "unsolvable."

"Basically, it was a record year for police services," summed up the chief in an interview.

Swenor will present the status report to the village council Tuesday evening.

The load of police work combines with recent reports of record case loads in the municipal and magistrate courts to illustrate that Ruidoso has not been insulated from the national hike in criminal activity.

The major difference between 1981 and 1982 was an across-the-board jump in property crimes—including burglaries, larcenies, auto thefts and robberies. Crimes against persons, the biggest problem a year ago, dropped off in some areas and rose only slightly in others, noted Swenor.

But the money crimes—armed robberies, auto thefts and larcenies over \$2,500—all tipped the scales with over 100 percent increases. Narcotics arrests also went up over 100 percent.

Larceny over \$2,500—a third degree felony carrying a possible penalty of three years in prison and a \$5,000 fine—leaped by 183 percent over 1981.

The increase of big money thefts corresponds to a national trend in crime that can be attributed to a worsening economy, said Swenor. He also said population growth and an influx of temporary residents in the area account for more property crimes.

"People are in a position economically where they need more," the police chief speculated.

Swenor said police recorded \$540,208 worth of stolen property last year, and recovered almost 32 percent of that amount.

The recovery rate reflects the progress being made against residential burglaries. While burglary was up 21 percent over a year ago, Swenor said that is a welcome level compared to huge increases in years past.

The fight against home thefts is seeing a success that the police chief relates to a number of programs instituted by the department in recent years.

The canine patrol is partially responsible for a slackening off in burglary, as is the take-home car program, which creates higher police visibility in neighborhoods.

But burglaries still dominate the local crime picture in sheer numbers. In 1982, a total of 156 home and business thefts were investigated. The only offense committed more often was larceny over \$100, with 158 incidents reported. Most thefts fall under that category, Swenor said, noting the cost of anything stolen is generally over \$100.

Swenor said the property crimes also are the hardest to solve. In his eight-page crime report, he wrote the resolution rate on all felony crimes was 52 percent, which he said far surpasses state and national statistics.

But burglaries and larcenies are significantly under that standard.

Burglaries are the most difficult crimes to solve in Ruidoso, the chief said, because police often do not learn of a residential ripoff until weeks or months after the crime was committed. The delay is attributed to the number of unoccupied homes that are burglarized.

The resolution rate for burglaries is only 11 percent. The figure most explicitly points up the need for citizen involvement against crime—an issue the police department considers at the top of the list for developing community programs.

"The more community involvement we can get is a boon to us because it stretches our capabilities," Swenor pointed out.

Seeking public involvement is an unending venture of the chief. Over the past year, Swenor feels, the numerous meetings between civic groups and the department have gone a long way toward creating a united front against crime.

"That's the thing I enjoy most right now," he said. "We've had more citizen input in the last 8 to 10 months than you can really believe."

The Crime Stoppers program that was recently established exemplifies the interest citizens are taking. Swenor hopes the program—paying rewards for tips that lead to arrests—will help most in cutting down the felony thefts that are the thorniest problem for police investigators.

"Invariably someone knows, sees or hears something," noted the chief.

Another program that will help reduce burglaries is the fledgling network of neighborhood watches being organized by the department. The program relies on coordinators in residential areas to keep an eye on their neighborhoods and report suspicious activities to the police.

If the two new programs help police raise the arrest and conviction rate on burglaries and thefts—which would result in fewer of those crimes being committed—the strength of community participation would be well demonstrated.

While theft is statistically the biggest crime problem in Ruidoso, traffic enforcement is the most serious problem faced by the police department, according to Swenor.

Last year a total of 602 accidents occurred on village streets—over 100 more than the record year of 1979. Of that number, 137 involved personal injuries and two involved fatalities.

Swenor wrote the problem probably cannot be solved until progress is made in alternate routing, traffic control and off-street parking.

"Our village still has one of the most complex traffic problems imaginable, and in its many facets, traffic remains the single largest problem faced by the Police Department and the Village," he said in the report.

Swenor added a long-range solution can only be achieved through the combined efforts of the village council, the state Highway Department and citizens.

In addition to the record number of accidents, Swenor noted DWI arrests totaled 202—156 of which were first offenses.

The conviction rate on DWIs was 98 percent. Swenor attributes the successful enforcement to training last year for recognition of drunk drivers, resulting in efficient department procedures.

Until work is done on bypass routes, traffic lighting

and parking, Swenor said, the only approach police can take to cut down accidents is to increase patrols. He indicated he expects the two new police motorcycle units—which will be on constant traffic duty—to help a lot.

Swenor also wrote in the report that: •Telephone and radio requests for emergency and police services increased by 150 percent, with 57,200 telephone requests and about 174,000 radio transmissions.

He noted two new phone lines have been installed—the 257-9111 emergency number and the 257-4545 Crime Stoppers number.

Because of the communications load, Swenor said, a police AM radio frequency is being considered, which would broadcast weather, road and fire conditions.

•Police communications personnel currently monitor 77 commercial and 171 residential alarm systems. Swenor said fees levied to private alarm companies for the service no longer compensate the village adequately, and therefore he anticipates discontinuing monitoring and responding to residential alarms unless necessary.

Swenor said police responded to nearly 1,600 residential and commercial alarms in 1982.

"The department is experiencing a manpower crunch" because of population and commercial growth creating increased police demands. The chief predicted he will ask for six additional employees at budget time, raising the department total to 38.

•The department will concentrate on upgrading the patrol fleet in the next budget. Swenor said emphasis will be placed on versatility and fuel economy—noting the past practice of buying used State Police vehicles is impractical because the vehicles have a short life span and low fuel economy.

•In 1982, each department member received 84 hours of proficiency and certification training and 40 hours of "First Responder" training. Officers and staff personnel also were trained in several other areas over the year. This year, Swenor said, communications-detention officers will attend a course in jail management.

•A total of 1,007 prisoners were jailed for 1,072 mandays in the detention facility—an increase of 163 persons from 1981.


•The canine, "Duke," was credited with catching seven burglars last year. Swenor wrote that the department would like more police dogs, but will wait until ideal circumstances exist regarding police officer/handlers.

•It is extremely gratifying to him, Swenor reported, to receive a great deal of official and public support over the past year. He said compliments have risen 10 times in the past few years. He also pointed to the success of the 30-minute weekly TV programs done by police officers and provided free by Cablevision.

•The sheer volume of record keeping has necessitated acquisition of a micro-computer system, which the chief said the department will actively pursue.

•The police/courts remodeling project is back in gear and could be ready to go to bid by mid-March. Swenor said the "bid blow-up" last summer may have been a blessing in disguise because the redesign will be more flexible.

Swenor concluded that the in-depth summary of 1982 gives the department and village administration a solid basis for drafting the 1983-84 budget.

About 105 mentally retarded athletes from throughout Southeastern New Mexico will be in the Ruidoso area this week to compete in the second annual Special Olympics Winter Games at Eagle Creek Ski Area. Participants will be arriving Tuesday, January 25, with competition scheduled to take place Thursday, January 28.

The public is invited to attend opening ceremonies Wednesday evening from 6:30 to 7 at the ski area. A parade of athletes, a torchlight parade and a fireworks display are planned for the ceremonies.

Cross-country and alpine skiing competition will take up most of Thursday, with award ceremonies scheduled to follow each event. Cross-country events will begin at 9:30 a.m. and last through 11:30 a.m. Alpine skiing will be held from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Closing ceremonies are scheduled for 4 p.m. The public is invited to watch the competition and ceremonies.

Anyone who would like to assist with the games should go to the volunteers booth to

be set up at the Eagle Creek ticket booth. A number of local service clubs have offered to provide meals for participants throughout the week. The police emergency phone number has been changed to 257-9111 because of a mixup over the number recently assigned to the Ruidoso Police Department for emergency calls.

Margie Dacy of Continental Telephone said the previous number—257-9911—would have prohibited collect calls and long distance dialing because the suf-

fix was programmed only for pay telephones.

Dacy said the phone company never should have assigned the 9911 number to the police department.

She added that the new number will be published soon in phone bills to customers with the 257 and 258 prefixes.

## Reward of \$1,000 for information on robbery

The local Crime Stoppers chapter established the amount of its first reward offer at \$1,000 Friday, seeking information on a crime that has stumped police since December.

The crime is the December 1 armed robbery of Billy the Kid Liquors (see story in box).

The offer, which is the most that can be rewarded according to the Crime Stoppers bylaws, was set after police coordinator Dave Pfeffer presented the first Crime-of-the-Week for the new chapter.

Richard Sandoval, chairman of the board of directors, suggested the maximum reward, noting the police are in "desperate need of information."

Sandoval said he thought the chapter needed to offer a substantial reward for the first highlighted crime "to get the bandwagon going."

But board member Mark Paz, concerned that the offer would be too high, argued against it. Paz noted that while the board has had a tremendous response for donations, the program could get into financial trouble if it starts paying out high amounts.

Board treasurer Bill McCutcheon reported at the meeting that over \$2,300 in

donations to the reward fund have already been received.

Pfeffer reminded the board that even though it is offering the \$1,000, the actual amount paid is at its discretion, based on the quality of tips received.

Sandoval said because the highlighted crime is an armed robbery that had the potential of violent consequences, the

maximum reward should be offered.

Board member Mike Radziewicz agreed with the amount, saying the first offer should be high to help establish the credibility of the local chapter.

Member H. Ray Bishop said if the offer results in the crime being solved, it will generate much more in donations.

In calling for a vote, Sandoval expressed

his pleasure at having opposition on the question, noting that rewards should never be automatically set.

The board also reviewed and approved its bylaws Friday evening. The bylaws establish the rules of operation of the local chapter—including the size of the board, terms of office and payment of rewards. Sandoval will submit the charter to the state Corporation Commission for approval of the board's non-profit status.

Also discussed was a fund-raising cocktail party, tentatively scheduled for Jerry Dale's sometime in February. Paz was instructed to finalize the arrangements.

In other business, the board selected members for several committees.

Paul Davis, Mike Radziewicz and H. Ray Bishop will sit on the nominating committee; Radziewicz, Paz and Glen Ferguson are in charge of fund raising; Bishop and Nelson Buck are on the publicity and public relations committee; and Davis and Charlie Spooner make up the bylaws and standing rules committee.

The executive group consists of Sandoval, McCutcheon, vice chairman John Howden, secretary Najla Sluder and member at large E. J. Fouratt.

## Crime of the Week

Crime Stoppers of Ruidoso is offering a reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest of a man who held up Billy the Kid Liquors at gunpoint December 1.

The armed robbery occurred about 6 p.m. in the liquor store adjacent to Piz-za Hut. The suspect reportedly got away with about \$700.

Police say they can use any information in connection with the incident. Investigator Dave Pfeffer said Friday the department has very few clues to work on.

Pfeffer said the suspect was wearing a navy blue ski mask, faded Levi jacket and pants and a Kelly green shirt. He reportedly walked around in the store

for about 10 minutes, picked up a case of Budweiser beer and placed it on the counter. At that point, Pfeffer said, a Hispanic female drove up to the window in a beige Chevy Blazer.

The clerk turned from the window and was confronted by the man holding a handgun. The clerk handed over the money and the suspect left on foot. It is possible the suspect entered a small red vehicle parked at Two Rivers Park.

The clerk reported the man also wore beige leather gloves and a leather tool belt.

## Completion of new high school at issue in February 1 election

Completion of the new Ruidoso High School, which is desperately needed to alleviate overcrowded conditions in all the Ruidoso schools, now hinges upon passage of the February 1 bond election, according to school officials.

The school district is depending upon issuance of the \$1.25 million bond, and an almost \$3.4 million allocation from the state Capital Outlay Council, to fund the remaining two phases of the school. Receipt of Capital Outlay funds is also dependent upon the bond election, as a school district is required by law to be bonded to at least 75 percent capacity before it can apply for Capital Outlay money.

issuance of the \$1.25 million bond would put the school district at full bonding capacity, which would be looked upon favorably by the Capital Outlay Council, school board president Dave Parks predicted recently.

The school district's current indebtedness will be influenced by the revised property valuation in the spring. But assistant school superintendent Sid Miller said there is a slim chance the district will be bonded to 75 percent capacity without passage of the bond issue February 1.

Approval of the bond issue would mean an estimated average tax increase of \$1.60 per year per \$1,000 assessed value for property tax payers over the next six years.

Ruidoso school system officials have counted on the support of local residents and the state to finance construction of the new high school from the very beginning.

The project is being built in phases as funds are made available from the Capital Outlay Council and local voters.

Phase one, on which construction began in June 1982 and which includes the central core and science wing, was funded from a \$1,259,000 allocation from the state council and the \$2.25 million bond election passed by local voters in May 1981. The Capital Outlay allocation was the largest received by any school in the state that year.

Phase two of the school, to include classrooms and a shop wing, will be started in mid-February and is being financed from the 1982-83 Capital Outlay allocation of about \$1.7 million. This was the second largest amount received by any New Mexico school district.

Phases three and four are estimated to cost about \$4.65 million, high school principal Tom Hansen reported this week. A

gymnasium and newly planned fine arts complex will compose phase three, with site development to complete the new school in the fourth phase. Phase three is scheduled for construction from July 31, 1983, to July 30, 1984. Site development is planned for February 1984 through July 1984.

Doors of the school should open to students in the fall of 1984, if all goes according to schedule.

School officials are confident the Capital Outlay Council will be generous to Ruidoso again this year as long as local residents also show their support by voting for the bond issue. It has been pointed out a number of times that the council usually continues to allocate funds for a particular project until it is completed, once the first allocation has been made.

Failure of the bond election and lack of

support from the Capital Outlay Council could result in a delayed opening for the school or no new high school at all, according to Hansen.

If less than the requested \$3.4 million is received from the council, either the gymnasium or fine arts complex would probably be put on hold for another year, delaying opening of the entire school, the principal noted. If no funds are forthcoming from the state this year, the project may be diverted to an elementary school, he said.

But Hansen feels that Governor Toney Anaya's request to channel \$20 million from the severance tax fund into Capital Outlay is a positive sign for the schools, as that is more money than has been allocated for Capital Outlay projects the past two years.

"The most important thing is to get

voters to help with the bond issue and then to get legislators to help with Anaya's plan," Hansen stated. "We'd be sitting pretty if it were approved," he added in reference to the governor's financing plan.

The principal has indicated he feels confident that he will be able to open the doors to the new high school in the fall of '84 as planned.

"I have faith in the community—it has never failed to support the schools before," he remarked. Hansen will know February 1 whether that pattern will continue.

All registered voters are eligible to participate in the election. Also on the ballot that Tuesday is selection of two school board members. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Ruidoso High School gymnasium.

# Downs Police Department adds canine unit: Blue

A new member recently joined the staff of the Ruidoso Downs Police Department (RDPD). Her name is Blue, and she is a two-year-old German shepherd dog.

Downs Municipal Officer Dale Patrick has been Blue's handler and companion since she was given to the department by local trainer Jack Miller earlier this month. Miller donated Blue to RDPD as part of his efforts toward developing a cooperative canine group in this area.

Blue has been trained as a basic patrol dog, Miller said. She has had weapons training, which means she knows how to fight a club-wielding opponent; and she has also been trained for multiple man attacks, crowd control, building search and basic trailing.

"She's the snooziest dog I ever saw in my life," Patrick remarked. He said the canine has been helpful to the department by relieving another officer of having to serve as a backup in many cases. Patrick said that many times the small Downs police department is limited to having only one officer on duty at night. Having the canine available means he does not have to call another officer at home to aid on a call.

"She gives me a great deal of confidence if I have to go in a residence that's been broken into without having to call another officer," Patrick noted. The dog's reactions are much faster than a human's, Miller explained, and she can maneuver in

the dark faster. Also, her sense of smell is sharper so she can detect a person's presence before the officer can.

Miller trains his dog's handlers as well as his dogs. He has been working with Patrick on training for animal control work, which he said is about the same as the training for a canine officer.

He is teaching Patrick how to read dogs—how to determine their temperament and mood and whether they are going to attack or bite or run. The officer is also learning to tell whether a dog has been beaten or starved.

After learning to "read" a dog, the officer can learn how to move in on the animal even if it is agitated, Miller pointed out.

Patrick said he has had a high rate of success with handling the animals he works with through his animal control work in the village.

"I've had good fortune cleaning up the village of stray dogs," the officer noted. "There's no way I could have handled the dogs if Jack had not taken a personal interest and trained me for the job."

Miller said he will later work with Patrick on a higher level of training with attack dogs, teaching him how to determine what kind of training the dog has had and how to handle the animal even if it is mean.

Patrick said he is looking forward to the additional training and working with Blue. He feels "the dog, at the present time, is smarter than the handler."

Blue is a very aggressive dog, Patrick reported, but she is also loving and affec-

tionate. Miller explained that a trained canine such as Blue is just like any ordinary dog to the people it knows; but it has been taught to view other people as territorial violators.

Asked how the dog is taught to be friendly and protective of the handler, Miller said the two go through a meeting process during which he shows the dog the handler is "okay." Then follows a touchy period during which the dog is getting to know the handler, and then comes the bonding period.

"Blue and I took off rather well together," Patrick noted.

The officer is still in training as a canine officer, Miller pointed out. He said he continues to work with all his canines and handlers and hopes to set up regular training and work sessions with all the canine units in this area. Those include the Ruidoso Downs Police Department, the Ruidoso Police Department and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Ruidoso Police Department canine officer Robert Achterberg has plans to operate obedience training sessions with all the canine units, Miller reported.

He added that he would like to branch out into aggression work with the dogs and invite canine departments from different areas to attend. Miller said if interest remains high, he has plans to begin monthly or bimonthly meetings of canine officers to work together on problems and additional training.

"There are lots of things they all need to learn," the trainer noted. He said he would like to build into a program of continuing

education for officers and dogs in this area.

"I'm trying to establish an extremely high level or high quality canine department," Miller continued, "and I'm trying to concentrate everything here and use it to demonstrate to other areas' departments."

Miller trains his dogs through behavior modification, which he feels enables him to train canines to be "more reliable, more intense and more powerful."

The dogs he trains are 100 percent reliable, he feels, adding that he will back them up as being so.

Miller is working toward a goal of having all trained attack dogs 100 percent reliable, and he hopes the reputation of the canines in this area will spread.

Miller and Patrick both would like to see some type of certification program established for all animal control officers and patrol dogs and their handlers. Patrick said the New Mexico Animal Control Association, of which he is treasurer and Miller is a member, is working toward that goal as well.

Miller has set up his own registry of canines, which he feels is an elite group and to which only 100 percent reliable dogs may belong. The trainer said he feels this area has some of the best dogs in the country working for local law enforcement agencies.

And now that Blue has joined that group, residents of Ruidoso Downs should beware that municipal officer Dale Patrick's bark may be backed up by the canine's bite.

## High school fine arts complex planned, pending election result

When voters visit the polls Tuesday, February 1, to decide on the issuance of \$1.25 million in bonds by the Ruidoso School District, they will be voting on whether to help fund the construction of a gymnasium and fine arts complex for the new high school.

Construction of a fine arts complex may come as a surprise to those who are familiar with plans for the school building project. Original plans call for band and music rooms to be located within the gymnasium complex.

But high school principal Tom Hansen reported last week that architects are now working on plans to build a separate fine arts complex on the east side of the main building, with the physical education complex on the opposite side.

"We decided we want to pursue a course toward developing a really fine arts program in the Ruidoso schools," Hansen explained.

According to the principal, the plan for a

separate arts complex is a direct outgrowth of the Chapter II fine arts program being funded this year by a federal block grant. The idea germinated during a meeting of the Chapter II advisory council, attended by Hansen (himself a college arts major), high school art instructor Karen Gray and band and chorus teacher Danny Flores.

Hansen related that one of the high school representatives mentioned how nice it would be to have some performing arts facilities like those used in the television show "Fame." The others agreed, and after thinking about it, decided "why not?"

The principal said he called the school architects that afternoon and asked them to draw up the plans. The complex will include a band hall, vocal music class, and art facilities, to include a classroom and drawing and painting rooms. The physical education complex will consist of a gymnasium, weight room, training room, wrestling room, film room, offices, dressing facilities and showers for boys' and girls' physical education and athletic programs.

According to Hansen, the construction time schedule and cost estimates should not change as a result of the change in plans.

Architects Alley-Connell and Associates also have been asked to draw up plans for a dance studio and auditorium to be added to the school sometime in the future, Hansen noted.

"I feel like there's a great need in Ruidoso for more of the fine arts," he said.

The principal pointed out, however, that the school does not have the finances to build such a facility. He hopes private endowment funds or the Chamber of Commerce cultural committee can make the building of an auditorium possible. He noted that if the public were involved in funding the project, the facility would be open to the public and available for community groups to use.

Hansen said he fears the realization of that dream is a long way off, however.

But the possibility of providing a better developed and organized fine arts program within the high school is imminent, depending now upon passage of the bond election February 1.

# Operation Precision—press rolling in new building

Your assignment—should you decide to accept it, Mr. Phillips—is to move thousands of pounds of equipment, worth tens of thousands of dollars, to exact positions measured in thousandths of an inch. Such was the request Ken Green, publisher of The Ruidoso News, made to Ernie Phillips of Mountain States Machinery. The publisher wanted his printing press moved.

When the new News building was finally ready, the staff cleaned out their desks, put everything in boxes and carried them one block up the hill. Heavier objects were piled in trucks and moved by the staff. But when it came time to move the presses—the guts of the paper—a professional was called.

Ernie Phillips has been rebuilding and moving presses for 25 years. His company, Mountain States Machinery, is based in Tucson, Arizona, but he moves presses all over North America. This week he and his

two helpers, Dan Romero and Steve Gompf, drove 10 hours in their mobile home to Ruidoso. Next week they will be in the Virgin Islands moving another press.

"I wouldn't have anybody else install a press for me," said Green. Phillips has moved and installed presses for Green several times since 1970.

Why not have the staff or local labor move the presses? Each one of the four press units weighs 5,500 pounds, and the folder unit weighs 4,500 pounds. They are also worth a lot of money.

There's not a lot of margin for error, either. After moving the machinery across the street and into the new building, it has to be aligned to within five-thousandths of an inch over 30 feet. And it all has to be done after Thursday's paper comes out and before Monday's paper is due out.

The date for moving the presses and people had been set weeks in advance. While the staff moved, the weather was sunny and dry. But come press moving day, the cold wet flakes came tumbling down.

Forklifts don't come equipped with snow

tires and presses don't run well when they are rusty. The contractor originally scheduled to supply the forklift would not do so in the bad weather.

But there was no turning back. Part of the machinery had been disassembled before the snow started, and Phillips and crew were here to do the job.

Another forklift was hired. After the paper folder had been moved to the back door of the old building on special rollers, the forklift was guided carefully up to it. Chains secured the folder onto the forks and it was lifted out of the building.

Slowly the forklift crossed Sudderth Drive and climbed Park Avenue to the new building. The folder was placed safely in the building, but there would be no more moving Thursday.

The road had been salted by a village road crew, but snow was falling so heavily that it didn't stay clear. The forklift was also out of its league. The lighter paper folder had seemed to almost lift the back wheels off the ground. The presses,

weighing half a ton more, might be just too much.

The plan had been to move all the machinery Thursday and allow the rest of the time for its precise alignment. With only one piece moved, contingency plans were made. The paper might have to be printed in Artesia. Copy deadlines were moved up and the advertising and editorial departments shifted into high gear, working late that night.

Friday, however, turned out better. Snow fell only lightly through the day. A heavier forklift—equipped with tire chains—was found, and all but one press unit were moved.

As Gompf, Romero, News staff members and forklift operator Perry Hogan brought the press units up to the new building, Phillips leveled and aligned them.

"It's a funny thing about paper," said Phillips. "You pull on it straight and it has lots of tensile strength. Pull it cockeyed and it'll snap."

Cockeyed means more than five-thousandths of an inch off along the whole length of the press and one-thousandth between each press unit. Level means level.

To do this job, it takes more than a standard carpenter's level and tape measure. Phillips' level is marked so that he can tell when the presses are tilting one-thousandths of an inch over a foot. His tramming gauge, which is used to make sure the presses are parallel, is equally precise, as are the feeler gauges.

When his crew moves the press units, they leave them in approximately the correct position, imprecise as a half-inch may be. Phillips levels the press. Then, with the use of the tramming gauge, a monofilament string line and feeler gauges, he moves it into place.

The large movements at first he does by slipping a bar under the frame and prying it over. For the fine movements of thousandths of an inch, he uses "the persuader"—a sledge hammer weighing about 10 pounds.

Saturday morning the last press unit is

moved and set in place. After a final check along the length of the press, anchor bolts are tightened down and the press is ready to run.

Rolls of paper weighing 800 pounds are mounted on the press and the aluminum plates carrying the image of the type and pictures are set on the rollers. The presses are filled with ink and the machine is turned on.

Papers roll. Nothing breaks, but there's a strange squeak. Phillips makes a few minor adjustments. Pressmen Richard Montgomery and Joe Gonzales adjust pressures, ink and water flow.

Monday's inside section marches out of the folder in neat array. In a little over two days, four press units and one paper folder have been moved safely to their new home.

Phillips and crew make a few more minor adjustments as the rest of the papers roll off the press, then climb into their motor home for the 10-hour drive back to Tucson. They will have a day's rest before heading out to the Virgin Islands for another routine move.

# Lady Warriors defeated by Hatch, tangle with Cloudcroft tonight

High school wrestling will have a lion's share of the athletic spotlight in Ruidoso this week, and it may mean a brighter future for the sport in this area.

The Warrior matmen will have a match with AAAA division power Roswell High School at 6:30 p.m. Thursday and will host a quadrangular meet Saturday, with New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI), the Carlsbad High School junior varsity and Carlsbad Junior High School participating. White Mountain Middle School will also compete in the meet, going against Carlsbad Junior High School in the 1 p.m. opener.

People in this area haven't been exposed to much wrestling tournament competition, and this week's meets will give the Warriors a chance to show their talents to the home folks.

The quadrangular meet will be a smaller version of the Ruidoso Invitational held last season. The invitational was not repeated this season because not enough teams agreed to come.

"That was a good meet, an excellent meet last season," Warrior head coach Gerald Ames said of the Ruidoso Invitational. "We had eight teams in it and it came off well."

Besides a lack of teams available for the invitational, Ruidoso only has one mat, and two are generally needed for a large invitational.

"We had to borrow one from New Mexico Military Institute last year," Ames said. "We also have a problem with storing the mat."

Despite not having a large invitational this season, this week should still provide Warrior wrestling fans with plenty of thrills.

The Coyotes nipped the Warriors 33-26 last month in a dual match in Roswell. However, Ruidoso's younger wrestlers have improved since then and the match Thursday promises to be a close, exciting one.

The quadrangular meet should also be a good one. NMMI has a strong team and the Carlsbad junior varsity is better than many AAA division varsity squads. The White Mountain-Carlsbad Junior High School match should give local fans a chance to see future high school stars in action.

If the quadrangular meet is successful, the Warriors might be able to get another major invitational started in the future.

"Our schedule this season is the best we've ever had," Ames remarked. "All we need to make it better in the future is a major invitational in December in our gym. We could invite maybe a couple of El Paso teams, NMMI, Roswell, Goddard and possibly Gadsden and we'd have a real good competitive meet."

But for now, the quadrangular meet will be a good substitute for a major tournament.

Wrestling fans who come to the Warrior-Roswell match and the quadrangular meet may see some future state champions competing.

The Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team hopes it can make fewer mistakes when it travels to Cloudcroft High School for a game tonight than it did against Hatch High School Saturday night.

Ruidoso committed 40 turnovers and only made seven of 27 free throw attempts in losing to the host Hatch team by a 47-45 score.

The Warriors threw the ball away with eight seconds remaining in the game and lost a chance to tie the contest up and send

it into overtime. "We're just making too many mistakes and not playing consistently," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon of his 5-8 team. "It seems like we're only getting up for the district games."

"The only girls who played well against Hatch were Kody Taylor and Sonja Jefferson."

Taylor scored 25 points while Jefferson was again a standout rebounder with 18 grabs.

The game was close most of the way. Hatch jumped off to a 12-6 advantage by the end of the first quarter. The Warriors closed the gap somewhat in the second

period, outscoring the victors 11-8 for a 20-17 halftime deficit.

Ruidoso tied the score at 34-34 by the end of the third period and took the lead several times before turnovers turned the game in Hatch's favor.

The winners had three players in double figures while Taylor was the only Warrior who scored over 10 points. Senior Claudia Branum added seven points and sophomore Stacy Ivy scored six for Ruidoso.

Castanon is leery of Cloudcroft. The Bears defeated the Warriors 49-40 last month in Ruidoso.



However, Capitan outscored the losers by a 14-9 margin in the third quarter to take a 36-33 advantage, and pulled away in


the final period for the victory.

## CONSTRUCTION MAY BEGIN NEXT MONTH

### Local coliseum almost a certainty

A major sports-entertainment complex for the Ruidoso area appears to be a certainty in the near future.

Former Ruidoso Downs municipal judge Briscoe West and rancher John Bachelor are planning to build a 7,000-seat coliseum on 32 acres of land across from Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The two men are near finalization of an agreement with A & M Builders of Clovis to build the complex.

"It's almost a certainty that they'll build the coliseum for us," West said. "We've just got a few more details to iron out. If we can't get a contract with them, we'll deal with someone else. The coliseum will be built. It will be a million dollar project." If the deal with A & M Builders is final-

ed, Bachelor and West hope to start the project within 30 days. They hope to have the building finished around May 15 to June 1, with it becoming available for use soon after.

The two men bought the 32 acres of land in September and plan to build some other projects on it besides the coliseum. One possibility is a seafood restaurant.

"But the coliseum is the number one project," West stressed. "There's nothing like it in the entire area now."

"It could be used for almost anything. Horse shows could be staged in it, as well as music concerts and conventions. High school athletic events could also be staged there. It will be big enough for any kind of horse show or event like that. There's nothing like it in Roswell."

The coliseum would probably be the biggest arena in the state between Albuquer-

que and Las Cruces.

Plans are to have enough parking space for 2,000 cars near the coliseum. Current plans call for the coliseum to be 200 feet wide and 340 feet long. The floor of the building where the events will be staged is expected to be 125 feet wide and 275 feet long.

"The building would have a solid concrete floor," West said. "Of course, when a horse show would be held, we'd bring in dirt to put on it."

Could the Ruidoso area support such a coliseum?

"I think so," West said. "With the large tourist population that comes here and the positive effect it would have on businesses in the area, it should be a very profitable area."

"Once we get it built, we plan on getting a manager and booking the various events."

# Steep slopes don't scare blind skiers

Have you ever skied up to the edge of an innocent looking road only to have your breath taken away when you see the slope dropping out like the face of a wall? Your heart pounds and your legs wobble as the fear rises biliously in your belly.

Diana Person has a suggestion to calm your quivering stomach—ski with a blindfold. What you can't see won't frighten you. Person, the director of the handicapped ski program at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, said that's the way it is with the

blind skiers she teaches. They can't see the hill and do not fear it.

Person has been running the handicapped ski program for seven years and currently has 12 blind or partially blind students learning to slide down the slopes. The Sierra Blanca program is the second largest of its type, smaller only than the one at Winter Park, Colorado.

In the past Person has had three National Champion blind ski racers. Her blind skiers have skied every run on the mountain. This year her students are less advanced than some years but still ski down intermediate runs such as Captain,

Meadows and Geronimo.

How do they do it? Person said the blind students learn much like others except they always ski with an instructor constantly talking to them and providing directions. The instructor is crucial to the whole effort.

The instructor acts as a seeing-eye dog and guide. He provides constant information on the upcoming terrain and tells the skier how to ski and when to turn.

The responsibility of the instructor is tremendous and the blind skier has to have total trust in his instructor, said Person. The skier depends on the instructor for the

information he cannot perceive.

"They have to feel the slope," said Carl Mori, who has been teaching blind skiers for seven years. "But they can only feel what's under them," he added.

The instructor has to direct the blind skier away from the trees on the side of the trail, warn him of upcoming moguls and other skiers. In contrast to sighted skiers who sometimes traverse endlessly across a slope, the blind skier automatically seeks the fall line, said Person. This can make it very frightening if a skier does not respond to an instructor's directions and begins to take off in an unplanned direction. But Person said it is not necessarily the skier who is so scared.

"It's the guide that's scared," she said. The guide can see upcoming hazards that the blind skier does not know exist.

That is why communication is so vital. Although the instructors do not have to be expert skiers themselves, they do have to attend a clinic with Person at the beginning of each season. One of the major things Person stresses is clear and precise communication.

The instructor maintains physical contact with the blind skier for only the first few runs, at the chairlift or in congested areas. Otherwise all directions are verbal.

Mori said it was difficult for him to learn "how to be concise about what you say." During the clinic Person also makes the instructors ski with blindfolds.

"That way they can experience the fears of the blind," said Person.

The blind skiers may not be scared of a steep hill, but it is not all a fearless experience.

"They are afraid of what they don't know. They don't know where the terrain goes. They don't know what's out there," said Mori.

Person said sometimes they are afraid of what they think they know. Partially blind skiers who can see shadows will see the shadow of a tree on the slope and think that it is a solid object. They will often sit down to avoid running into it.

These students can be the most difficult to teach. The student has to learn to trust the instructor when he tells the skier to keep skiing through something that looks—to the student—like a solid tree.

It is over the course of a season that the student and instructor become accustomed to each other and develop a bond of trust.

"They get incredibly close. They develop a rapport," said Person. "Most of my guides come back year after year because they get so much satisfaction out of it," she added.

Linda Zimmerly is the recreation director at the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped in Alamogordo, from which most of Person's students come. Zimmerly is also one of the volunteer instructors for blind skiers at

Sierra Blanca.

"It's really enjoyable. It's one of the funnest things we do together," she said.

It is obviously also a very rewarding experience for the skiers. Zimmerly said all the students talk to each other about what a good time they have had skiing. Like other skiers, they talk about what runs they have skied and brag about who has skied the steepest terrain.

Blind skier Eric Lilloquist has been skiing several years but still exults at the speed he gains following Mori on straight runs.

"My hair was just blowing in the wind. It was neat!" he exclaimed after he and Mori slid along at 20-25 miles per hour one day.

Mori finds that his students' enjoyment is a part of the reason he continues to teach year after year.

"You get to see them enjoy something five times more than other people," he said.

Learning how to maneuver successfully on their skis gives the blind confidence that spreads to other parts of their lives, said both Zimmerly and Person.

"It improves their self esteem," said Zimmerly.

"It gives them the idea that they can do anything," Person said.

Indeed, without the fear that most of us feel at the sight of a steep slope, they just about can.

### The Birthday Of Robert Burns

This will reach you on January twenty-four, the eve of the birthday of Robert Burns, the immortal poet, not only of his native Scotland, but also the whole world. Burns was born January twenty-five 1759 in Alloway, Scotland, near the town of Ayr. His people were farmers, and Robert began a life of "rustic toil" as a child, and became known by his neighbors as "The Singing Plough-Boy" since his voice could often be heard singing forth the emotions that came to his mind while following the plough.

Many of his greatest works were composed right in the thick of his work as ploughman. Two of the most famous are: "To A Field Mouse" and "To A Mountain

### Daisy

The former expressed his regret at turning the mouse out of his winter home; and he reminds the mouse that:

"The best Laid Plans  
Of Mice and Men  
Gang aft agley  
(go oftentimes awry)  
And leave us nought  
But grief and pain  
For promised joy"

The twenty-fifth is also the birthday of Miss Tommie Sue Dunnahoo, descendant of a pioneer Pecos Valley family, and a true birthday-mate to "The Singing Plough Boy."

She is an accomplished musician with the ability to compose songs and verses on the spur of the moment. And like Burns, sees beauty in the simplest things of nature.

Robert Burns transmitted his deep sympathy for his fellow man, and also all living creatures forever into his work, which are timeless, more greatly appreciated from year to year.

He also was very conscious of the history of his native land. One of his most famous works is a poem expressing the words of Robert Bruce to his army just before the battle of Bannockburn, in which the Independence of Scotland was won — June 24, 1314.

There are many variations of this poem, but I found the true original in a book salvaged from "The Glencoe Women's Club Library":

### Bannockburn

By  
Robert Burns  
Scots, wha hae wi' Wallace bled;  
Scots, wham Bruce has atten led;  
Welcome to your gory bed  
Or to glorious victorie—

Now's the day and now's the hour—  
See the front o' battle lour;  
See approach proud Edward's power—  
Edward! Chains and slavery!

Wha for Scotland's king and law  
Freedom's sword will stongly draw!  
Freeman stand or freeman fa',  
Caledonian! on wi' me! (1)

By oppression's woes and pains!  
By our sons in servile chains!  
We will drain our dearest veins,  
But they shall be — shall be free!

Lay the proud usurpers low!  
Tyrants fall in every foe!  
Liberty's in every blow!  
Forward! Let us do or die! (2)

"Caledonian" is the name given to the Scots and the Picts, the two earliest inhabitants of what is now Scotland, by the Romans in the time when they occupied what is now England.

The Caledonians became such a thorn in the side of the Romans that they gave up the idea of conquering all the British Isles, and left.

"Do" is the old Scottish dialect for "win" or "succeed."  
"Do or die" has become a by-word in the English-speaking world.

## Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE**—In the list of those who drew up the original constitution for our state there is the name of W.D. Murray. In the Legislature today is his grandson, Murray Ryan, from Silver City. Ryan is an unusual man—a staunch Republican who keeps on getting elected from a district which should be Democratic all the way. If you ask why that happens, you are told, go make the tour through the territory he represents. If possible, make it with him. You will see what the people who vote for him think of him as a man, not merely as a politician.

Thus one might conclude that Ryan could have something to teach New Mexico Republicans—if, that is, any of them who wanted to learn anything.

What they have to learn is what Ryan, a former state chairman of their party, has been trying to tell them for many years. Sometimes he says, "We must broaden the base of this party."

Sometimes he puts it the other way: "We Republicans must stop excluding well-meaning New Mexicans who think the way we think and would like to vote the way we vote."

So what have Republicans in the House of Representatives done?

They have, all during the days of the Cowboy Coalition there, excluded Ryan.

That didn't keep him from remaining a Republican. He admits that like present House member Max Coll and former House member Von Rue Crawford he has been tempted sometimes to change his registration.

He hasn't done so. He has, as a certain man in the White House would say of him if he ever heard about Ryan, "stayed the course."

He hasn't done it as a "regular" Republican. He has done it as an "independ-

ent" Republican. What that means in practise is that he has done it during the last few years in the House as a lonely man—ostracized by his own party and not taken in by the other. He was not a Republican member of the coalition, and he was not a Democrat.

So what was he? A man who made jokes about holding his party caucus in a phone booth.

As a result of that experience, which cannot have been pleasant (only a man of great patience like Ryan could have gone through it), he makes these observations:

—The state Republicans who cut this deal with the Democrats in the House sold out their own party. They were willing to do things like agreeing that no ranking Democrat in the coalition would be given any Republican opposition. There are even suggestions that they spent money raised for Republican legislative candidates to help elect members of the opposition party who were the leading lights in the coalition.

—To weaken the two-party system motivated only by those who serve their own desire for power is not to be a friend of our form of democracy.

—Unless New Mexico Republicans are trying to be the party solely of the Country Club set, speaking only to one another, they will find their organization withering and dying. (One gets the feeling Ryan believes it is doing that, under present party leadership, today.)

—The demise of the coalition in the House may give members there at least the chance to show what they really believe in. In time, that may help the Republicans to build. Until that happens, however, they (except for Ryan the rebel) were locked in and hurting mainly themselves.

### Editorial

Some individuals have a knack for generating negative publicity, whether or not their actions justify it.

Secretary of the Interior James Watt is a prominent case in point. Watt has become a household name because the news media have consistently portrayed him as a rabid anti-environmentalist.

This image has fed on itself to the point that naive Americans—including, obviously, a large number of journalists—base their low opinion of Watt not on his record but on his bad press.

When Watt issued his annual report recently, what made news was that the Secretary had written a "glowing account" of his accomplishments. It is easier to accept the image than to look at the facts, which show Watt building a commendable record at Interior.

The Secretary was back on the front pages last week for opining that America's Indian reservations are shameful examples of "the failures of socialism." New Mexico's new Congressman made headlines by saying Watt picked up Indian policy from Custer. The governor got his two cents in, referring to what he sees as Watt's "ignorance and insensitivity to the environment and cultures of our country."

This shows their press people were on the ball—they saw and seized the opportunity to make the papers at the expense of someone exercising the very American right to express one's opinion. This manipulation sticks in the craw of anyone who would see the news media behave in a responsible manner.—TP

Where there's smoke, there's fire.

The volatility of the smoking/nonsmoking issue was evident in the reaction to an editorial I wrote some weeks ago suggesting that Ruidoso follow the lead of Los Alamos in trying to adopt an ordinance prohibiting smoking in most public places.

Such a law (47 states have something like it) would require restaurants to provide a nonsmoking section. When I asked Gail Adams where the nonsmoking section at Sonny's was, he directed me to the men's room, outside that it was even vented to the outside.

After reading about the movement here in Los Alamos, I called the newspaper there to find out who was behind it. They put me on to Leslie Ruth Olsher.

As it turns out, Leslie is the president of an organization called New Mexico Nonsmoker Protection Projects. She was kind enough to send me some information, and to tell me about the things NMNPP is doing.

As I indicated, on this issue I have raised strong feelings, both sides. I tend to tend to be somewhat obnoxious about smoking, perhaps to balance the noxious character of smoke itself.

But Leslie, who has been involved in the nonsmoker protection movement for 10 years, emphasizes that NMNPP is not anti-smoking.

"It's not the smoker we're concerned about—I respect the right of anyone who chooses to smoke," she said. The problem, of course, is the smoke.

Tobacco and its combustion produce about 2,000 different chemicals. But the nonsmoker protection movement does not attempt to alert smokers to the dangers of carbon monoxide, ammonia, pesticide residuals and all the rest to the smokers themselves.

Its members just ask that smokers be aware that the act of smoking may adversely affect nonsmokers around them. Thus NMNPP's motto, "Please think of nonsmokers before you light up."

One thing that struck me in reading the NMNPP literature was the statement that the majority of adult Americans (two out of three) do not smoke. This is obvious when you think about it.

As Leslie pointed out, however, it is the nonsmoker who often feels alone. She and an associate are doing a national study of stress among nonsmokers, and have received more than 4,000 responses.

"A lot of people are saying, 'Yes, we feel very much alone,'" Leslie reported. "We find there's a sense of isolation, especially in the workplace."

Part of the nonsmoker protection effort is aimed at making employers aware that they may be losing a great deal of productivity from their nonsmoking workers. This problem could be the result of workers' physical reactions to smoke—especially if they have asthma or bronchitis.

Or it could be because working in a smoky environment day in and day out can put a worker under enormous stress. Maybe the person cannot afford not to work at that job—he might have 10 or 15

years toward retirement.

"There are more people like this than you can imagine," said Leslie. Part of the stress comes from a fear that the person who speaks up about smoke will be labeled "neurotic," even though his reaction to smoke is physical.

But the tide is turning. Workers have been successful in pressing lawsuits for a smoke-free working environment.

Agencies which provide temporary help are getting requests for nonsmoking workers, Leslie noted. One secretary who smokes, for example, can affect nine others in the office who do not.

Significantly, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission is doing its best to hire nonsmokers only to be discriminatory, as long as men and women get an equal shot.

When I called Leslie last week, she was preparing certificates that NMNPP is sending to restaurants and other businesses throughout the state that have policies acknowledging nonsmokers.

There are about 80 restaurants that have nonsmoking sections or are totally nonsmoking, she said. People who join the organization (dues are \$7, or \$3 if you're 60 or over) get a restaurant guide.

Leslie mentioned a beauty salon in Santa Fe that sets aside Monday and Tuesday for nonsmokers, and a motel in Albuquerque (Dollar Inn) that has a large nonsmoking section. She said NMNPP wants to hear about it when any business offers something for nonsmokers.

I told Leslie that one reaction to my editorial was that a smoking ordinance would not do in Ruidoso because a tourist town should not have "restrictive" laws. She offered a counter-argument.

"The vast majority of people who come into a resort area are nonsmokers—simply because most people are nonsmokers," she said.

She noted that many restaurant owners do not realize there are lots of potential customers among nonsmokers. These people do not bother going out to eat because they prefer to avoid the stressful experience of having someone light up at the next table.

Nonsmoking sections in restaurants tend to be quite successful and do not usually require much in the way of building modification, she added.

What the nonsmoking movement is bucking, Leslie pointed out, is two generations of people used to smoking wherever they please. This dates back to the invention of the cigarette rolling machine around the 1930s. The advertising blitz which started then and continues to this day made smoking socially acceptable.

I found it encouraging to realize there is a growing nonsmoker protection movement in the state and throughout the country. As Leslie put it, "We need to let the nonsmokers know that things are very definitely changing in their favor."



Property which was valued in 1982 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1983 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:  
1. mobile homes.  
2. livestock and  
3. land used for agricultural purposes.  
If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided in addition to the assessor's office.  
In either case, all non-governmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1983.  
Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land used for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by non-governmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February, and:  
1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and  
2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued, you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the assessor.  
If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:  
1. describes the property affected,  
2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and  
3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the assessor not later than the last day of February.  
If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1982, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. 





Plans have been completed for David Allan Coe's February tour of Britain.

Steve Young, once described by Waylon Jennings as "the second best singer in country music," (George Jones was the first!) has been named as the support act for the tour. He has toured Britain on two previous trips.

The attempt by Applause Records to sneak Sammy Davis Jr. onto the country charts as a country artist barely got off the ground.

His remake of the Tex Williams standard, "Smoke, Smoke, Smoke That Cigarette," debuted on the charts at No. 89 and hung there for a second week before disappearing. Not to discredit Mr. Davis as an entertainer, but country — he ain't!

Martha White Foods, a Nashville-based company with a long association with country

music, has committed to become the first advertiser on the Nashville Network, the national country cable-TV network.

Cohen Williams of Martha White, who made the announcement, has had some influence on country music, having "discovered" the team of Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs in 1953. He helped to form a sponsor-performer relationship with them that became one of country music's most famous associations.

The "Martha White jingle" became Flatt and Scruggs' most-requested song and was performed by the duo from Carnegie Hall to Tokyo.

The food company first sponsored a show on the Grand Ole Opry in 1948 and is now the oldest continuous sponsor of a full show on the Opry.

The Nashville Network will go on the air as an 18-hour-a-day service in early 1983.


Please tell me when "I Spy," now seen in reruns, first aired on TV. How many years was it on? — G. D.

Kay Villano is about to be married. Her husband-to-be is a handsome, dashing, intelligent young man. Although her mother calls him a gravedigger, he's really a Ph.D. in Egyptology.

Kay loves him and he loves Kay. Everything seems fine except for one small wrinkle — the ghost of Kay's first husband decides to playfully haunt the engaged couple.

He's Jolly Villano, a Broadway impresario, and a tough act to follow in the marriage game. Thus Kay has to decide whether to stay with her ghostly mate or go ahead with her earthly date.

But is Jolly really a ghost? Or is he just a figment of Kay's imagination, a way of finally severing the ties to her first husband? No one else can see or hear him. In other words, is he real or is he a memory of her ex?

Such is the premise for "Kiss Me Goodbye," a triangle with a spirited and spiritual twist. Sally Field is the woman in the middle, with James Caan as the tap-dancing ghost and Jeff Bridges as the faithful but beleaguered fiancé.

Charlie Peters is credited with the screenplay, but the film is a virtual remake of the recent "Dona Flor and Her Two Husbands." In that version, however, the ghostly husband walked the earth without clothes whereas here James Caan is a nattily attired spirit.

"Kiss Me Goodbye" also has elements of a 1930s screwball comedy. But its pace never really picks up the speed necessary to gain momentum.

The film also reminds one of Noel Coward's "Blithe Spirit," but without the delightfully droll Coward wit. What "Kiss Me Goodbye" does have is a pleasant little story, some engaging characters and a few hearty laughs. It also has Claire Trevor as the mother-in-law, and it's a pleasure to see her back on the screen. She co-starred with John Wayne in "The Stagecoach" in 1939 and won an Oscar for "Key Largo" in 1948. It's nice to know that she is still very much of this earth.
