

Ruidoso boasts only certified village clerk in state

Village clerk Leon Eggleston has brought a new level of professionalism to Ruidoso village hall by being the first certified municipal clerk in the state of New Mexico.

Eggleston, who has been village clerk since June 1982, completed a 35-hour course at Arizona State University last week which qualified him for the award from the International Institute of Municipal Clerks (IIMC).

"I'm thrilled," Leon exclaimed on his first day back on the job Monday.

"What it means to me?" he repeated a question. "It means I'm satisfied that I went and got the education, and I hope it means to the village that they have a clerk who knows what he's doing."

To qualify for the certification, Eggleston had to accumulate 100 points in two areas outlined by the institute as requirements for municipal clerks.

Eggleston became eligible for the award by belonging to IIMC for three years, acquiring on the job experience, and receiving the required education through the institute.

Eggleston, who was the Capitan village clerk prior to coming to Ruidoso, has attended the IIMC seminars for three suc-

cessive years in Arizona.

The courses were held in the Center for Public Affairs at the university. The classes included training on stress management, productivity in local government, word processing, media relations, ethics, liability, open meeting laws and parliamentary procedures.

"I learned things I never dreamed (village council) were doing wrong," Eggleston said.

Asked to elaborate, Eggleston noted that the Ruidoso council calls for an additional motion when it wants to amend a previously introduced motion, which he said is unnecessary. But he added the council is doing nothing illegal in its meeting procedures because it complies with practices prescribed by village ordinances.

Eggleston said he will inform the council members of what he learned from the institute, but he probably will not suggest changes.

Saying, "The clerk's job is the same throughout the world," Eggleston noted his certification is valid in every state and in several countries.

He said his official capacity is to keep up the records of the village, which is a responsibility often underrated by some, Eggleston believes.

Maintaining the records involves recording and typing minutes from every

meeting—one of the most time-consuming parts of his job—and continually keeping the municipal code book up to date.

In addition to being the only certified clerk in the state, Eggleston is also president of the New Mexico Clerks and Finance Officers Association, and he has been one of the main movers in getting an IIMC institute established in this state.

Eggleston said the New Mexico certification course will be held by the University of New Mexico for one week each October. He said notices of the course will be sent to every municipal clerk in the state.

Eggleston said he is very excited about the New Mexico branch of the IIMC, especially the new level of professionalism it will bring to many communities.

Mayor George White also expressed his feelings about the award. "I think it's great to see we've taken the lead in the state to do this. The clerk plays a tremendous role in the village," he said.

Now that he is the only certified clerk in the state, Eggleston was asked if the village will lose him to a better job in another city.

"I am not moving from this area," he answered. "This is a good job and a fantastic place to work. There's ups and downs with any job mine's more up here."

Voters approve school bond

The Ruidoso School District officials in the local community was justified again this week when voters approved a \$1.25 million bond election by more than four-and-a-half times.

Lamar Osborn and F. Lynn Willard were elected to seats on the board of education during Tuesday's election also.

Of a total of 463 votes cast on the bond issue question, 381 were cast with 84 against.

I'm very pleased," assistant superintendent Sid Miller said about the

election. "I think the community showed the quality they are. They're so great. We don't know how to express our thanks."

The bond issue will help finance the final two phases of construction of the new high school in Bog Spring and will permit the school district to apply for state Capital Outlay funds to provide the remainder of the financing. An application for \$3.4 million has already been submitted to the state but would not be accepted unless the district were bonded to 75 percent capacity.

Passage of the \$1.25 million bond issue put the district at 100 percent of its bonding

capacity. Miller reported Wednesday. He said he feels very confident that the Capital Outlay Council will allocate funds to the Ruidoso district this year, revenue for the Legislature appropriates, assuming for Capital Outlay.

Just under \$3 million has been received by the Ruidoso schools from Capital Outlay over the past two years. These monies, along with a 1981 bond issue have financed construction of the first two phases of the high school.

What the February 1 bond election means to local property owners is an estimated average tax increase of \$1.60 per year per \$1,000 assessed property

value over the next six years.

Voters Tuesday also elected two members of the school board. Incumbent N. Lamar Osborn retained his seat with 347 votes. Local veterinarian F. Lynn Willard will occupy the seat vacated by 20-year board member Dave Parks. Willard won over Charles E. McClellan by a 58 vote margin, receiving 280 votes to McClellan's 222.

The newly elected board members will join current members Don Swalander, C. L. Jones, Wright and Stormy Edwards at the March 8 board of education meeting.

Building slump continues

The January building permit report indicates that the building slump felt last year has continued.

But Ruidoso Building Inspector Don Hendricks said Wednesday the recent decline can be attributed to adverse winter weather, and he noted several projects are on the drawing board that probably will be started once weather is more favorable.

Everybody I talk to is looking at and adding. The snow nearly stops everything unless you're all closed in, but I think the first part of spring it will really pick up."

Hendricks issued 15 building permits reflecting a construction value of \$798,707 in January. That compares with 17 permits issued in December 1982 that had an estimated value of \$615,769.

In January 1982, the building department issued 26 permits, which was double the number issued the previous January.

The slump last year began in the second half and saw the number of new construction starts steadily decline, with the December permit total being the lowest in two years.

Hendricks said builders he has talked to recently generally are optimistic that the

market will pick up this year if interest rates stay at reasonable levels and the economy continues to improve.

Permits were issued in January for 11 single-family dwellings, two commercial additions or alterations and two multi-family projects.

P&Z begins commercial rezoning

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) at a public hearing Monday rezoned 30 lots from commercial to light commercial so the commission will have better control over the type of businesses that build on the property.

The lots, all located along Mechem

Drive on the northern edge of town, were the first to receive the light commercial C-1 designation under a P&Z campaign to bring all commercial property up to date with the village master plan.

The commission was informed at a recent meeting that all business property was zoned strictly commercial, which would allow virtually any enterprise to build in commercial districts without P&Z approval.

P&Z member Jim Paxton noted Monday that new zoning designations went into effect in May 1981 that divide commercial zoning into light commercial and general commercial (C-2) districts, but the affected lots were never brought into compliance with the law.

There's a real contradiction with the Blue Book of P&Z ordinances, and the way the whole town is zoned," Paxton commented.

Light commercial zones are intended for offices, motels, service clubs, medical and

dental facilities, recreation uses and retail stores. In the Blue Book, the category is broken down further to include dozens of businesses that would be permitted in the C-1 category.

According to law, the commission notified the lot owners and adjacent property owners of the rezoning process. For the 30 lots considered Monday, planning and zoning department secretary Debi Russell said she mailed out notices to 110 property owners. Russell said she received no objections to the procedure.

Paxton said the commission will gradually rezone all village commercial property to C-1, except for isolated lots which already have that designation.

He noted businesses that fit the general commercial (C-2) category will be considered on an individual basis, but he speculated P&Z may decide to zone the C-2 property as light commercial and attach nonconforming use permits to the lots.

If use of a building does not conform with

the zoning district, then P&Z may allow it to operate under a nonconforming use as long as the building is not structurally altered and the business does not change hands.

Once a nonconforming business is sold, Paxton explained, then subsequent businesses would have to comply with regulations for the zoning district.

Businesses allowed in C-2 districts include automotive shops, feed stores, nurseries or greenhouses, building material stores, plumbing shops and travel trailer parks.

Paxton also noted the commission wanted to rezone all commercial property to C-1 in a single action, which would have involved less expense, but learned adjacent property owners had to be notified and given a chance to voice opposition. P&Z did not schedule a date for the next public hearing in the rezoning process.

P&Z to reconsider motel conversion

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday will reconsider a request from Apache Village Motel owners to convert the motel into townhouses.

The request will be presented at the regular commission meeting Monday at 9:30 a.m. at village hall.

The commission turned down the conversion request in September 1982 because rear windows—which would serve as secondary fire exits—in the individual motel cabins did not meet size requirements in the Uniform Fire Code.

It was also pointed out in September that some of the cabins did not conform to parking regulations for multi-family housing projects.

Attorney Sharon Mitchell, representing the Apache owners, said Wednesday the owners have agreed to bring the cabins into compliance with Planning and Zoning laws and the fire code.

She said she will ask the commission to

approve the conversion with a condition placed on the plat that the units be brought up to the fire code. But she added the project owners want to first sell the units and require buyers to enlarge the rear windows.

"We'll agree that the changes will be made, but our concern is, if we make changes now, it may be a wasted effort," Mitchell said, noting that the townhome buyers may want to do their own remodeling on the cabins.

Mitchell said there are 20 proposed townhome units on the site, which is located on lower Mechem Drive.

S.K. Engineering is requesting the conversion.





Realtors addressed on local crime

"We have a significant crime problem in Ruidoso we have to look at," said Ruidoso Police Officer Chuck Mahenski during a meeting of the Ruidoso Board of Realtors Tuesday morning at the Ruidoso Inn. Mahenski, security specialist for the police department, spoke to the Realtors, the Rotary Club and two groups of citizens Tuesday about crime prevention and the Neighborhood Watch program he is organizing in Ruidoso.

Mahenski pointed out that a burglary occurs every 10 seconds in the United States and every other day in Ruidoso. The resolution rate of residential burglaries in Ruidoso was 11 percent in 1982 according to the department's statistics.

Mahenski said many of the burglaries are discovered three months after they occur, when a vacationing family arrives to find its house empty. Time is the key to apprehending a burglar, he said. The longer the time between a burglary and notification of the police department, the more difficult it is to find the burglar.

At best, after-the-fact pursuit of criminals is a difficult and tenuous task, said Mahenski. Prevention is a much more effective means of reducing crime, he suggested.

Mahenski outlined three basic measures to physically deter burglars. Burglars almost always enter unoccupied houses, he said. Creating the impression that someone is home by using light timers is an effective deterrent to criminals, explained Mahenski. He advised using two or three

timers that turn on and off lights and radios at different times when a house is unoccupied.

Burglars also do not want to be seen, he said. Using good outdoor lighting around a house makes a potential burglar less likely to enter a house, Mahenski explained.

"Don't compromise the locks on your doors," he warned the Realtors. He explained that it only takes a moment for a person to make an impression of a key which he can use to produce a copy and gain access to the house.

Putting in stronger locks or rekeying an entire house is an expensive proposition as are other physical deterrent measures, noted Mahenski. Physical deterrence only slows down a criminal, he added. If a burglar wants to enter a house he will, if given enough time.

The Neighborhood Watch program Mahenski is organizing is designed to reduce the time a criminal has to enter and burglarize a house. The program is an organization of homeowners who act as extra "eyes and ears" for the police.

"The most powerful thing we can get going here in Ruidoso is community involvement," said Mahenski. With people watching their neighborhoods and calling in any suspicious activities the odds of catching a criminal are much greater, he explained.

Mahenski has divided the village into 32 grids. He has assigned 32 volunteers to be coordinators for the program in each of the areas. These coordinators will in turn appoint four block leaders within their areas.

These volunteers will contact members of the neighborhood, ask them to join in watching for suspicious activities and

train them in observing and reporting crime. Homeowners will also be given Neighborhood Watch decals to place on their front and back doors. Eventually, Mahenski plans to have metal signs warning criminals that Neighborhood Watch exists in an area and that the criminal is being watched.

The decals and the whole program have been very successful crime fighters since the first program was organized in Oakland, California, 15 years ago, said Mahenski.

There are today over 20,000 Neighborhood Watch programs in existence throughout the country. In every community where there is a Neighborhood Watch program, crime has been decreased by at least 50 percent, Mahenski said.

He told of one community in Arizona, largely consisting of retired people, that was reporting an assault or burglary every other day. After the Neighborhood Watch program was instituted, crime reduced dramatically, and there has not been an assault or burglary reported in that community in six years, said Mahenski.

Prisoners in federal and state penitentiaries who were asked what were effective deterrents to criminals entering a house, mentioned the Neighborhood Watch decal and sign high in their list, said Mahenski.

"Let's get everybody involved and all work together," Mahenski told the Realtors.

Committee chairpersons delivered progress reports on their efforts to organize different events during the week long Golden Years Jubilee scheduled for May 14-22. The event is aimed primarily at drawing senior citizens to Ruidoso during a normally quiet time of year.

Sally Avery and Ellen Miller told the group that the buffet dinner and talent show will be at Jerry Dale's Tuesday night, May 17. The pair is working on signing up local people as well as registrants in the jubilee for skits, music, dance, mimicry and any other talented performance. It was decided that young and old alike will be welcome to perform. There will be prizes for everyone who enters the talent show.

"I think that anyone brave enough to get on stage should get a prize," said Nancy Radziewicz, RBA chairperson for the whole event. The registration form for the jubilee will include a place denoting entrance in the talent show and what kind of act so that Miller and Avery will have some idea what to expect.

"It's no telling what we'll get," said Avery.

Wednesday's Frontier Days in the Park is being organized by Glen Ferguson. He announced that he has tentatively scheduled square dancing, costume judging, a hog calling contest and a staged shootout for the morning.

After lunch he has planned a watermelon seed spitting contest, a horseshoe pitching competition, dominoes and cards, arts and crafts exhibition and continuous music in the afternoon.

Parents reminded of ski school times

White Mountain Middle School principal Texie Cole wants to remind parents that middle school students are not dismissed from school until 12:10 p.m. for Wednesday ski school.

Elementary school students are released earlier, during their lunch break, but middle school students are in class at that time.

Cole said she would appreciate it if parents do not come by to pick up their children for skiing until after 12:10.

Ferguson said the Flying J Wranglers have agreed to play, and he is looking for other musicians such as fiddlers, spoon and saw players.

Ferguson is also organizing the Casino Night scheduled for Thursday. He said management at Carrizo Lodge has agreed to provide space free of charge and that he has arranged to rent gambling equipment from Martin Rose. Ferguson has not arranged for dealers yet but said he will take care of it.

The Health Fair, scheduled for Friday, will have both a health clinic and trade show. Leala Newsom, head of nursing education at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, is in charge of the clinic and has arranged for glaucoma and blood pressure testing. She said she also hopes to have other tests available and speakers on subjects such as nutrition and safety measures in the home.

Home safety equipment such as handrails for bathtubs will be among the equipment Verna Adams and Barbara Duff hope to have at the trade show. They also plan to have adaptive equipment for handicapped people, electric beds, wheelchairs and other up-to-date equipment. Duff said she has talked to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital administrator Ken

Moore about other equipment that might interest older people.

"The outline for the health fair sounds tremendous," said RBA president Tom Dorgan. He expressed some concern over publicity for the health fair, and it was decided to include a half page explanation in the information packet that will be mailed out later this month.

Golf, bridge, fishing, bowling and miniature golf will be offered on a daily basis throughout the jubilee. Charline Jones is coordinating the activities which will include daily jackpots for many of the activities.

She reported that she has arranged for discounts to jubilee registrants at Cree Meadows Golf Course, Holiday Bowl and Holiday Miniature Golf. She said that she is in the process of contacting other facilities to ask for their participation in the discounts. Jones also reported that the Senior Citizens Center of Lincoln County will run a horseshoe tournament.

Ferguson asked if transportation would be available for those interested in all these daily activities. The members agreed that many jubilee participants may come to Ruidoso by public transportation and not have a means of getting to all the daily activities.

RBA gets plans underway for 1983 Motorcycle Festival

Following Wednesday's organizational meeting for the Golden Years Jubilee, Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) members met at the Chamber of Commerce to discuss plans for the 1983 Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival.

RBA president Tom Dorgan presented suggestions for classified advertising in national motorcycle magazines. He suggested an ad featuring "Ruidoso" printed in bold print at the top and copy calling the festival "America's granddaddy touring rally" and claiming to have "the largest motorcycle and accessory show in the Southwest."

Members decided to run the one-to-two column-inch classified ads in Rider, Roadrider and Touring Bike magazines in May and June. Decisions about larger ads will be made after members see the response to the classified ads.

Dorgan agreed to write a letter to vendors who were in last year's trade show stating that the festival

will occur this year, that RBA is looking at a new facility and that more information will be following. Dorgan said the purpose of the letter will be "just to get something out in front of them," and more will be sent to them later. Connie Brown agreed to type and mail the letters.

Brown announced that Smitty's motorcycle store in Ames, Iowa, has agreed to donate a trailer for the fully dressed touring motorcycle to be given away at the festival.

Members read a report of the October RBA meeting in the Texas Motorcycle Riders Association magazine and were excited about the publicity it would provide in Texas.

Members also agreed to seek American Motorcycle Association (AMA) sanctioning again. AMA refused to sanction the event last year because it had already sanctioned a motorcycle festival in Durango the same weekend.

Many options were discussed, and it was decided to look into finding a number of vans for daily transportation. Radziewicz said she will look into renting vans and also seek locals who might donate their vans for use by jubilee organizers.

Radziewicz reported that two major bus tours and a number of shorter ones are planned for the jubilee. On Tuesday, Inn of the Mountain Gods buses will take jubilee participants on a tour to the Smokey Bear Museum in Capitan, Lava Flows, Lincoln Town and the Billy the Kid Museum. Lunch will be served at the Lava Flows, and a geologist will explain the rock formations there, said Radziewicz. There will be tours of Lincoln, where a mid-afternoon snack will be served.

On Thursday, New Mexico Transportation will provide buses for a tour of White Sands National Park, the International Space Hall of Fame and the Omnimax Theater. Lunch will be included in this tour also, said Radziewicz.

Shorter tours around the Ruidoso area will also be offered, Radziewicz added. Committee chairperson Barbara Sorenson, who was not present at the meeting, is working on a scenic tour, a fine arts tour, and possibly a working senior citizens tour, reported Radziewicz.

Publicity for the jubilee is being handled by Katherine Finley, who was not able to attend the meeting.

"You know Katherine. She'll do it," said Radziewicz. The jubilee is on the state calendars of the nine states where RBA is sending materials.

Information packets have been sent to every Chamber of Commerce in those states for news of the jubilee to be included in their newsletters. Addresses of senior citizens centers were also requested of the chambers, said Radziewicz. Eleven national agencies for senior citizens have also been contacted, she reported. Radziewicz also asked that any Ruidoso residents with information about individuals or groups that might be interested in the jubilee contact her or Finley.

Finley is scheduled to appear on "New Mexico Today" to talk about the jubilee. The television show is produced by KBIM in Roswell.

As the meeting closed, RBA members and committee chairpersons expressed optimism in spite of the late start organizing the event. Bill Rawlins, one of the first planners of the event, said it is the only event he has ever been involved with that was greeted with enthusiasm by everybody contacted.

"There are a lot of people putting in a lot of effort," said Radziewicz, who noted as examples members of the Golden Age Club and the Senior Citizens Center of Lincoln County.

On the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, Three Rivers Campground is open. Road conditions are poor—some are icy and others are muddy. Fuelwood areas are inaccessible. They have received 6 inches of fresh snow and temperatures are ranging from the teens to the 50's.

Sledding and tubing are excellent at Karr Canyon on the Cloudcroft District. Snowmobiling conditions are excellent at Benson Ridge, Alamo Peak, and Upper

Karr Canyon areas. Cross-country skiing is good on the Apache Loop Trail and at Brown, Water, and Telephone Canyons. The Rim Trail is open for winter backpacking. All campgrounds are closed. Fuelwood areas are closed. Many roads are icy. From 6-8 inches of new snow has fallen, with temperatures ranging from 5 degrees to the low 30's.

The Guadalupe District received one inch of snow. Roads are open but off-roads are muddy. Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is closed. Caving reservations for spring break in March should be made now. Fuelwood areas are open, but may close at any time due to weather—always check with the Ranger Station before going out to cut wood.

The Mayhill District reports snowpacked roads, and two inches of new snow. Temperatures are ranging from mid 20's to high 40's. James Canyon Campground is receiving very light use. Fuelwood areas are closed.

Uproar in Downs over 'horse ordinance' simmers

The uproar over an ordinance regulating livestock in the Village of Ruidoso Downs has apparently simmered, if attendance at the town meeting called Wednesday evening for discussion of the matter was any indication. Two residents and two members of a committee appointed to revise the village's 1977 ordinance turned out for the meeting.

The uproar came back in October when most Downs residents were cited for being in violation of the '77 ordinance, which, it was generally agreed, was unenforceable. A committee was formed at that time to revise the ordinance.

The ordinance proposed by the committee was rejected by village trustees, however, because it was too vague and because the public had not been given the opportunity to voice an opinion on the matter. Trustees stipulated the committee fur-

ther study the ordinance during two public meetings.

Residents and trustees worked out a tentative agreement on wording of the ordinance during the first public meeting January 17. Committee members agreed to change the proposed ordinance so that "pastures and other large areas which allow each animal a minimum of one-eighth acre on which to roam at free will do not have to be cleaned unless manure accumulates and becomes a public nuisance."


The proposed ordinance further stipulates that "manure must be picked up daily from stalls or small areas of less than 500 feet and every two weeks from larger enclosures."

As nobody appeared at the second public meeting Wednesday to contest or discuss the revised proposed ordinance, committee chairman Fred Bernard announced that it will be presented to trustees for approval at their next meeting.

Teamwork key in Warrior girls' win

The race-walking exploits of Ruidoso High School coach Elmer Chavez reminds me of my brief career as a track sprinter. That's right, sprinter. I was a distance runner in high school, and I always thought I didn't have the natural ability it took to be a top sprinter. However, the paper I worked for about five years ago in California wanted to enter someone in a "media 100-yard dash" that was to be held at San Mateo Junior College during an all-comers' meet. Even though I had been a distance runner in high school, I had always dreamed of being the fastest runner in a short race. I thought the sprints were more exciting and dramatic than the distance races. So I volunteered to be the paper's representative in the race.

I knew it would take a lot of work to get in shape so I starting doing sprint workouts, laps and limbering-up exercises. I also ran sprint workouts on laps and cut down on my intake of coke, candy bars and beer which had badly affected my physical condition. I expected my competition to be fierce so I trained for over a month. I hadn't run competitively in several years, but I figured I still had a chance. After all, Jim Carr, a writer for a paper in the same chain as ours, was a couple of years older than me, and he had done a lot of distance running.

If Jim could do it, so could I! The day of the race I was confident. I drove the 35 miles from my house across the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge to the junior college race track dreaming about how I would explode from the block and run my opponents into the ground. When I got to the all-comers meet, I was surprised to find out that there were only two other competitors in the "media race."

One of the runners was a writer for a Bay Area track and field magazine (his name escapes me now). He was probably

about 35 years old. The other was a Stanford University graduate student who was probably two or three years younger than me.

I felt I could do well against this competition. After all, the track writer was older than me, and the graduate student seemed to be in about average physical condition.

We did some brief warm-up exercises and approached the starting line.

I got down in the blocks and was bursting with energy. The starter told us to get set, and I arched my back in that position, ready to break from the blocks.

I was dreaming about how I would leave my opponents in the starting blocks when the gun went off, sprinting across the finish line with my finger in the air signifying that I was "number one."

Then I came back into reality as the gun really went off. The three of us were together for a split second. Then on my right, the track writer pulled up with a cramp. On my left, however, the graduate student swiftly pulled away from me.

He crossed the finish line at least five yards ahead of me.

After I had crossed the line and gone back to see what my time was, one of the timers—a man about 60 years old—said to me about the guy who beat me, "Don't feel bad. He's a young man."

Thanks a lot, old man. My time was 12.6 or 12.7 seconds, not exactly an Olympian-level clocking.

As I walked back to my car, I decided that I had had enough of sprinting competitively.

I don't work out much now. I do some occasional jogging of about a mile or two. As far as competitive racing goes, I leave that to people like Elmer Chavez now.

Elmer's going to do a lot of race walking this summer, and I'll be on the sidelines cheering him on.

If teamwork in the face of adversity is the mark of a good team, then the Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team is an excellent squad.

The Warriors played without two of their best players Tuesday night but still managed to overcome Tularosa High School, 51-43 on the Wildcats' court.

Sisters Sonja and Jackie Jefferson, both excellent rebounders, were sick with the flu, and Ruidoso figured to have a tough time of it in the Tularosa gymnasium, usually one of the toughest places in district 3-AAA for a visiting team to win in.

However, Ruidoso got excellent performances from virtually every player on the

team and led most of the way in the victory.

Sophomore Stacy Ivy picked up the rebounding slack in place of the absent Jeffersons and grabbed 14 boards. Center Jan Huey added eight rebounds and played a fine all-around game.

Ruidoso led 12-9 at the first-quarter break and never led by less than three points the rest of the game.

Kody Taylor and Claudia Branum provided most of the offensive punch for the Warriors, particularly in the first half.

Taylor canned 12 of her game-high 23 points in the first half, and Branum scored eight of her total 16 points in the first two quarters.

With Ruidoso leading 16-12 halfway through the second period, Taylor hit a

jump shot and two free throws as Ruidoso outscored the hosts 12-9 the rest of the period for a 28-21 halftime advantage.

The Warriors built their lead up to 10 points twice in the third quarter before seeing it cut to seven points, 38-31, at the period break.

In the final period, the Ruidoso lead fluctuated between five and 10 points as good free throw shooting by the Warriors prevented any Tularosa comeback.

Ruidoso shot a solid 15 of 26 from the free throw line while Tularosa was 13 of 24.

Besides the shooting of Taylor and Branum, sophomore Gia Rose and Huey each scored four points for the Warriors. Tresa Jameson and Robin Rhodes each added two points.

Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon was pleased with the way his team played. "It was a good team effort," he said. "Everybody's improving. We have to get double figure scoring from at least two people like we did tonight with Taylor and

Branum while everybody else gets two or four points.

"Branum played the best she's ever played. She scored a lot, hustled and was a leader out there. Lillian Lopez also looked good. She played good defense and cut down on her fouls."

The Warriors are now 8-7 on the season and 3-3 in district action. They'll return to the district "wars" Saturday when they host Deming High School at 5:30 p.m. The girls junior varsity contest will be played at 4 p.m. while the boys varsity game will follow the girls varsity tilt.

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Special Olympics offers special rewards

When I first saw Paula she was standing alone, motionless on her skis. Around her was swirling the controlled chaos of the New Mexico Special Olympics' first morning.

More than 40 mentally handicapped athletes were putting on skis and moving on them for the first time. Volunteers were figuring out whom to help and leading athletes around the cross-country course.

Paula had no one helping her and didn't seem to be moving too fast by herself. She was a cute girl, about four feet tall with a white stocking cap pulled down tight on her head. Seeing her there alone, I thought I would show her how much fun it is to slide around the snowy forest on her skis.

I walked up, introduced myself and asked her if she wanted to learn to ski.

"Maybe," she said doubtfully. I put one hand on her back and gently urged her forward. She shook all over and let out an intense high-pitched whine. Hmm, it didn't look as if this was going to be as easy as I had at first thought.

Eventually I got Paula to take a few tiny steps forward on her skis. But she wasn't very enthusiastic and didn't trust me. Any sudden movement or slight slip brought on that emphatic whine that meant we were going nowhere for a while.

Paula was intensely frightened of falling. It wasn't until I had been with her for almost half an hour that I figured out a strong reason for the fear. In addition to being mentally handicapped, she was almost completely blind. I talked to her continuously, telling her that I was there

and would not let her fall. I always kept a steady hand on her arm.

Paula is from Las Vegas, but attends the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped in Alamogordo. She told me that she was 17 years old, but I hardly believed her because she was only about four feet tall and had such a young face. She talked very clearly, and I could barely believe she had the I.Q. of 75 or less required for participation in the Special Olympics.

She was a highly emotional girl, capable of extreme swings of mood within just a few minutes. However, most of that first morning she was solidly entrenched in a frightened and recalcitrant mood.

We did eventually make it around the course in spite of frequent whine stops and repeated questions about when we would be finished. She did laugh a couple of times, though.

When she apologized so sincerely for saying "bad things" I was captured by her and stayed with her during lunch. While I picked up our lunches, Paula sat patiently at the table waiting for my return. Although people all around her were talking and laughing loudly, she sat quietly, hat in hand staring at the table. But when she heard my voice she perked up and began to chat with me about her school.

During the afternoon we ran through the time trials that would establish categories for the next day's competition. I was concerned about getting Paula on skis, much less getting her around the course in a good time.

She was not terribly enthusiastic about putting her skis back on, but she fought it less than before. Again it was slow going;

while some skiers whizzed around the track, Paula and I completed the 100 meter course in 21 minutes.

She did seem to trust me more, though, and we had some fun along the way. Sometimes I would hum a made-up tune. When she laughed and sang along, I was charmed.

Other times, as we inched our way along, we played with different phrases. "Singing wheels" was one of her favorites, and she would repeat it over and over when she made a few steps in a row. When she popped out with, "Keep on trucking!" I had to laugh. I could also tell that she was happy when she began to make noises of barnyard animals.

By the end of the day we had made it around the course a couple of times, and I felt that we had conquered some of her fear. I told her that we were going to break 20 minutes the next day, and she seemed ready to try.

Come the next morning, however, all she could say when I met her was, "I'm tired. When can I go back to the van and sleep?"

It didn't look too good when we started with about six three-inch steps, and Paula asked how much farther we had to go. But pretty quickly we were on to "Singing Wheels" and she was "Choochooing" like a train.

She started giggling and snorting as we moved along, and I told her what a lucky guy I was to be able to teach such a pretty young lady like her. She told me she loved me and wanted to marry me.

When we came to the small hill on the course, instead of freezing up and refusing to move, she took her fastest and longest steps.

On the final straight away, she just kept laughing and moving those skis straight ahead. People on the sidelines began to cheer for Paula, and I could tell she was excited.

We crossed the finish line, and I looked at my watch. It had taken us 11 minutes to complete the course, almost half the time of the day before.

What was even better was that Paula asked me to take her skiing after the race was over. We had conquered her fear of skiing, and she was actually enjoying her mobility on the snow.

She was happy, and I felt a tremendous pleasure in having shared an activity with her that I enjoy so much. As Penny Zannes, executive director of the New Mexico Special Olympics had told me, "Just giving them the chance is what it's all about."

At the awards ceremony, I was rewarded again. Jeanne Culbertson, the games coordinator, and Zannes were presenting the medals to the excited competitors. When it came time to award Paula her medal for participating in the games, she asked me if I wanted to present the medal.

With tiny Paula standing on the award platform, and more than a hundred people cheering and clapping, I hung the ribboned medal around her neck and hugged her. She smiled and kissed me on the cheek. What more could I have asked for?

We have a chance Sunday to wish President Ronald Reagan, our president of today, "Many happy returns of the day, and all God's blessings.

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
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

DEAR EDITOR,

I was recently a juror on a murder trial held in Carrizozo between Thanksgiving and Christmas. Once the trial was over, I learned some things that concerned me and felt as a taxpayer and citizen, I should try to inform others and voice my opinions.

During the trial, evidence made available to the jury may not include any previous felony convictions of defendants. I understand and agree that this information should be withheld during the guilt phase of the trial because jury decisions should be made without bias. However, during the sentence phase of a first degree murder conviction, the jury may be told of all mitigating circumstances which might outweigh the facts of the murder conviction such as being an only child of a widow, father of three children, remorse felt, intelligence and having potential to contribute to the prison environment; but may not know that a defendant has a prior felony conviction. I wonder how a jury can make a truly sound, informed judgment for all concerned (taxpayers, defendants and victims) without knowledge of ALL the facts affecting the conviction.

Since the jury decision was not unanimous for the death sentence, it was then left up to the judge to weigh each of the three convictions and sentence the defendant accordingly. The procedure was to occur immediately following the trial on Dec. 18, 1982 but was postponed to 9 a.m. on Jan. 5, 1983 in Las Cruces on request of the defense attorney.

On Jan. 5, 1983 at the time of the judge's sentencing, neither of the two defense attorneys were present. Another public defender informed the court that he had received notice 15 minutes earlier that the attorneys were in court elsewhere (one representing a witness and the other representing a defendant) and would be unable to attend the proceeding.

Neither attorney had the common courtesy to notify the court of their conflict in advance, having had two and one-half weeks since the trial to do so. The public defender than asked for a postponement until the defendant could be properly represented. The request was granted for Jan. 7, 1983.

Having attended the sentence hearing, I was stunned to witness the total disrespect the defense lawyers seemed to show for the court, their client, the prosecuting attorney and the people of New Mexico. During the trial, I was reminded many times of the seriousness of this situation which was obvious to me, but, it appeared to me that the lawyers, who represent our judicial system, had not taken the situation seriously, having not appeared for their court appointment.

We taxpayers should and do foot the entire bill for trials such as these due to financial conditions of defendants. However, I think there should be some limits or checks placed on these expenditures.

Our taxes paid the salary for an additional two and one-half weeks for the lawyers from trial to sentencing. Additional money, coming from the public

defender's budget, paid for the four days services of a professional jury selector from Houston, Texas. I can't see how this expense could be justified when the state was already paying two defense lawyers and only one prosecutor since the incident occurred in October 1981.

One other expense that came from the defender's budget was the air fare and room and board for two of the defendant's children. Neither of these children or their mothers were called as witnesses. I wonder if their presence was solely to play on the jurors' sympathies. In any case, we taxpayers paid all of their expenses. The air fare for approximately 14 witnesses came to about \$10,091 and their daily per diem for two and one-half weeks was about \$17,500 including \$2,000 car rental.

These witnesses were here at state expense and did not testify until the last two days. At this rate, I wouldn't be surprised if this trial didn't cost the state \$200,000 or more.

We are currently experiencing a poor economy which has also affected our state treasury. Public school systems are facing cutbacks due to decreased state revenue, our state highways are in major disrepair, we must build more facilities to house criminals, plus many other problems and tax revenue needs—yet our taxes are spent in unnecessary ways.

Another fact that concerned me was parole eligibility. When sentenced to life imprisonment, the defendant may be paroled in 30 years. However, if he chooses to work in prison industries, the parole time may be cut in half, thus saying he may be eligible for parole in 15 years. I just cannot believe that a victim's life taken during a first degree murder is worth only 15 years in the state penitentiary.

Why aren't convicted felons required to work in prison industries and time worked computed at minimum wage in order to repay the state for the expense and maintenance costs?

One further concern of mine is the victim's rights. If the victim had been injured in an accident and unable to work in order to support his family, there would be a financial settlement made based on projected earnings of this victim during his productive years. Unfortunately, in this case, an innocent life was lost in a senseless manner, leaving no means of supporting his family. Perhaps once a victim dies, neither he nor his family has rights. In no way is his family being compensated for their losses: life of a loved one and income from the head of household.

I feel that changes need to be made to require felons to make adequate restitution to victims and/or families, no matter what length of time it requires.

After having personally experienced this situation, I feel it is necessary to enact changes to make our judicial system stronger and to protect our state treasury from waste and uncontrolled expenditures.

In reply to your article "White collar crime in Ruidoso," a comment or two might be appropriate.

As we live in a society where it has been "Easy come, easy go," those handling funds and property of others are in great jeopardy if not properly supervised and their accounts audited. When those responsible to audit funds and property fail to do so, they themselves are often tacitly at fault for having failed to fulfill their responsibility. I know of too many instances where those handling funds and property are paying lifetime penalties, partially because of the neglect of a supervisor, an employer, or an internal auditor. Cash and property and their accounting should be handled as carefully as a narcotic register. Even the most trusted employee handling funds and property needs a constant supervision that is sometimes not forthcoming.

How we handle our own personal finances is motivated by innumerable factors. The degree of our self-discipline is determining as well as our own personal dynamics. We live in a consuming society motivated by the dollar which is often destructive. One can soon develop a distorted perspective and "spend with the rest." If he does not have his own funds and property, one is liable to use those of someone else if available. Bank presidents do it; treasurers do it; churchwardens do it; bookkeepers and clerks do it; and any of us might do it if opportunities prevail. I suppose we have all heard of "There but for the grace of God, goes I."

A convicted bank cashier once said to me. "It was too easy to take and spend, and then too late to save myself." He paid a devastating penalty and still is, and learned that in handling the funds and property of others, we need constant and close supervision. In handling our own finances, we need to be as "hard nosed" as a demanding supervisor. Such conduct might decrease "White collar crimes," but then perhaps such crimes are indicative of the fact that we need a born-again philosophy of life; one based on respect for ourselves; for others and their property; for a continuing expanding self-discipline; and a commitment for a simpler way of life that deemphasize personal consumption. Perhaps even our emphasis on being a winner is destructive to our personal integrity, for too often one is motivated to get it one way or another; this does not live with playing it fair and square, and letting the chips fall where they will.

Many of my customers are just beginning to realize that Congress passed a law last summer to withhold 10 percent of their interest and dividend earnings beginning next July 1.

Banks and other financial institutions have opposed interest and dividend withholding since the idea first surfaced 40 years ago. We still do.

Withholding on interest and dividends will cost America's 80 million savers and investors some \$1.5 billion in foregone earnings on their interest and dividends. It will cost the country's financial institutions at least another \$1.5 billion to put withholding into place.

Although there is an exemption allowed for most senior citizens and low income people, this exemption process is an administrative nightmare in itself. To be exempt, people will have to file a government form with each institution where they have an account. On this form they will have to swear their tax liability is below the ceiling. Besides the obvious invasion of privacy involved here, banks will be buried under mountains of new and unnecessary paperwork.

Security Bank, Ruidoso, strongly opposes the withholding of taxes from interest and dividends. It is unnecessary and unfair. It's unnecessary because 95 percent of taxpayers already pay the taxes they owe on interest and dividend earnings that are subject to reporting when they file their federal income tax return. It is unfair because it will lower their interest earnings by reducing the benefits of compounded savings growth.

In short, the law clearly penalizes savers and investors. It should be repealed by Congress, and we will need the help of every saver and investor to achieve this goal.

If you agree that this 10 percent withholding law is unfair and unnecessary, please write to your Congressman and Senators to tell them so. We can get this law repealed, but we must begin now.

The Knowles Memorial allows for this destructive continuation through its failure to state what balanced levels are and when they will occur. Joint Freeze Memorial #1 will stop the M.A.D. mess now.

GUARD ON DUTY

If the guard falls asleep at his post, the fortress is at hazard.

So it is if a home smoke detector fails; then the house it is intended to safeguard against fire becomes vulnerable.

Keeping that household guard form "falling asleep" on duty is no great task. Dead batteries are the most common cause of smoke detector failure. Hence, replacement of batteries at intervals recommended by the manufacturer, 12 months, in most cases, is the best single precaution against this kind of trouble.

George Oster of Iowa State University's Fire Service Extension offers a couple of tips: When installing a new battery, inspect for damages, vacuum away dust, and test the detector by blowing smoke into it. Then rest easy, with the guard back on the alert. — Alamogordo Daily News

Reporter's Round by Dave Sheppard



Childhood memories often are like the disjointed, incomplete dreams of a restless night. The most vivid memories—like the series of dreams—are ones related to intense, even exaggerated, emotions of fear and joy.

When I was a kid, our country was gripped by the fear of the Cold War. The Russian suppression of Eastern Europe, the Berlin Wall and the Cuban Missile Crisis were all critical events that reinforced our belief that the Soviet Union was bent on conquering the world.

The pervasive anxiety in the '50s and early '60s saw our small New England neighborhood prepare for survival of an atomic bomb attack.

The cellars built under every house in the cold, northern latitudes—traditionally the places for escape from the rest of the family and the world above—were easily transformed into bomb shelters by every father on the block.

My dad measured, cut and cleverly fitted rectangular sections of particle board into the window wells of the small ground level windows. The whole family was trained to grab the boards in the event we were threatened by an atomic attack and insert them into the wells to shield out the blinding flash.

Our downstairs closet that housed the electric and water meters was stocked to the brim with canned goods and made into a food storage depot.

Gaps around the cellar door were filled so no light and radiation would filter through. With the addition of some old furniture and a TV set, our house had its own, cozy bomb shelter that could save us from a prolonged attack and the ensuing radiation fallout.

Our parents were not alone in their anxiety. Civil Defense authorities designated neighborhood schools and churches as fallout shelters. As students, we regularly went through atomic bomb drills. The fire bell would sound, and we would either crouch on hands and knees under our desks, or file neatly out of the room and into the school basement.

These memories of the atomic bomb fear were ingrained deeply on the minds of a whole generation.

In retrospect, the reactions of our country in the Cold War, although borne of a legitimate fear of Russian intentions, seem tragically preposterous. Instead of directing its energies toward eliminating man's most destructive weapon when the Soviets were decided underdogs, our nation let itself be terrorized.

While we shook in our boots, our superior advantage in nuclear weapons steadily shrank. The Soviet Union played our fears and eventually reached parity with us in its nuclear arms force.

The first attempts at negotiating reductions in the strategic forces of the super powers were well meaning and effective. As far as we know, the basic provisions of

both Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT) treaties have not been violated.

The treaties put ceilings on strategic nuclear arms and did indeed slow down the nuclear arms race, but SALT I and II also allowed for continued production and development of new weapons systems, which meant the net effect of the agreements led to a modernization of the arsenals.

The modernization has taken the form of developing so-called "counterforce" weapons which theoretically can knock out the enemy's intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBMs). The notion of a counterforce thus raises the possibility that one side may decide to launch a preemptive strike in a world crisis.

It has been estimated that both powers now possess some 50,000 strategic and tactical nuclear warheads—enough to wipe out the urban populations of the U.S. and U.S.S.R. many times over.

Considering the rate of overkill contained in those numbers, it would seem the time has come to pursue serious negotiations aimed at halting the growth of the nuclear arsenals.

Instead, the Reagan administration proposes meager reductions in strategic weapons in the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks (START)—which exclude submarine based missiles and weapons deployed in the European theater. And, on the obverse side of the coin, by refusing to agree on a realistic compromise in the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces (INF) talks in Geneva, the Soviets forcibly are daring the U.S. to begin deploying its Pershing II and cruise missiles in Europe the end of this year.

Meanwhile, new and more clever ways at surviving nuclear fallout have been devised by the Department of Defense Civil Preparedness Agency.

In the Crisis Relocation Host Handbook for New Mexico are several charts explaining step-by-step how you can construct a sophisticated basement fallout shelter. Also in the book are diagrams for "expedient" shelters.

One of the most amusing examples is called the "car-over-trench," which shows how you can use your car as protection. First you dig a small trench, then drive the car over it and fill the car with dirt, sandbag the sides of the car and cover the entry and ventilation holes to the trench with plastic.

Such schemes promoted by the government demonstrate the official belief that a nuclear war is survivable. Such preparations—which, if reports are true, are carried out even more intensely by the Russians—increase the suspicion that either side would pull the trigger as a last resort in a crisis.

And the generation that was raised under the fear of the nuclear cloud sees the atmosphere increasingly becoming more ominous.



Trainer Cliff Lambert has high hopes for Copper Case

 Clifford Lambert has trained such outstanding thoroughbreds as Bold Ego, a Triple Crown participant who earned more than \$500,000 and the durable Double B Express, a mainstay in Southwest handicap circles for the past few years.
 So when he places one of his runners in the same category as those two standouts, it's worth noting. Especially when the runner is the brilliant Copper Case.
 "He can't outspint Bold Ego, but he's probably better than Double B Express," said Lambert, one of the Southwest's top trainers who was also a superb jockey. "Copper Case is a real nice horse. He might be one of the better ones in the country."
 Copper Case, a New Mexico-bred Hopeful Venture gelding, made his six-year-old racing debut last Saturday at Sunland Park. Under jockey Casey Lambert, he laid off the early leaders in a six-furlong allowance, then made his late run to gain a half-length win over Scots Sissy.
 "That was his first race since last September—a fact which pleased Lambert.
 "It was a real good race for him. He's a sound horse, who's got a real strong move," Lambert said. "I'd like to get one more race in him at Sunland Park. We're looking at Sunday's City Of El Paso Handicap (a six and one-half-furlong dash under handicap weights for a purse of \$5,000-added). If the weights aren't too far off, we'll run him. I just don't want to spot a lot of weight."
 After that race, Lambert said Copper Case would be taken to Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas. That 56-day meet which begins February 11 features some of the toughest campaigns in the country and will provide a stern test for Copper Case.
 "He'll run in allowance or handicap races at Oaklawn. How long he stays there depends on how he does. If he doesn't do well, we'll take him back to Sunland. If he does well, he'll stay the whole meet and then come back and have a race or two at Sunland in April after Oaklawn closes (on April 16). He might race this summer at Ruidoso Downs. We just don't know yet."
 Lambert, who has had Copper Case almost all the time since he was a two-year-old, said he wasn't surprised by the gelding's success.
 "He's always been a good horse. He won the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity (worth \$107,075 in 1979) as a two-year-old. He got hurt as a three-year-old. He cut his eye when he was hit by a shoe during the Land Of Enchantment Derby (at La Mesa Park in Raton), so that hurt his three-year-old season. But other than that, he's been great."
 "He's real easy to train. He just doesn't like people to be around him. He doesn't even like me," Lambert laughed. "I don't think he likes anybody."
 But one thing Copper Case does like is running.
 He may have been at his best late last summer when he swept the three most important races in New Mexico for older performers.
 He tallied a one-length verdict over Annihilator in the \$35,000-guaranteed inaugural running of the Santa Fe Special on August 8 over six and one-half furlongs. He carried 124 pounds and the 8-5 wagering favorite.
 In the \$31,600 Ruidoso Mile on September 5 at Ruidoso Downs, he packed 126 pounds en route to an easy three and one-quarter-length victory over Fill Mackis Cup as the 3-1 betting favorite.
 Copper Case completed the triple sweep by gaining a one-length win over Fill Mackis Cup in the \$44,150 New Mexico State Fair Handicap over a mile and one-eighth on September 26 at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque. He was the topweighted entrant with 127 pounds and was bet to 4-5 favoritism.
 In fact, Copper Case has been a wagering favorite in his last nine races. In 1982, he won eight races with two seconds in 10 tries and collected \$90,713 for owner Jim Graham of El Paso.
 In his magnificent career, Copper Case has 23 victories with five seconds and six thirds in 49 tries. He's earned \$228,778, which ranks him among the highest money-making thoroughbreds in New Mexico racing history. "He was awfully good last September. Hopefully, he should be about that good again," said Lambert.
 Copper Case's multitude of New Mexico fans hope that assessment is correct.

Stormy Sailing sails to victory

Stormy Sailing took the lead for good on the far turn and pulled away for an easy victory in Sunday's featured City Of El Paso Handicap at Sunland Park.

The six-year-old gelded son of the outstanding California-based runner Agitate, won his second race in his last three outings and did it with relative ease.

His time for the six and one-half furlongs was a fine 1:17 1-5, beating the previous fastest clocking of 1:17 3-5 set by Double B. Express on October 24.

Ridden by apprentice jockey Mike Smith, Stormy Sailing was always within striking distance in this handicap race which drew a select field of six four-year-

old and older runners.

But around the far turn, Smith asked Stormy Sailing for his best while running on the outside. He quickly drove to the front and through the stretch he increased his advantage.

Stormy Sailing won by five and one-fourth lengths over Agapi Mou, who survived a tight three-horse photo for second. Agapi Mou, ridden by Louie Gomez as the 5-2 third wagering choice, was a neck better than Scots Sissy, the 9-5 second-wagering choice who was ridden by Mike Lidberg.

As the 3-2 wagering favorite, Stormy Sailing returned \$5.00, \$4.60 and \$2.20.

Agapi Mou placed for \$3.80 and \$2.10 while Scots Sissy, a nose better than fourth-place finisher Prove Out Val, returned \$2.20 for running third.

Trained by Jon Arnett, Stormy Sailing has now won one race with one second this year. In his career, Stormy Sailing has captured 11 victories with seven seconds and three thirds in 30 outings. The California-bred speedster has collected \$36,303 for owners Arnett and John Blank of El Paso.

For Agapi Mou, it was the third straight second for the four-year-old Will Hays gelding who is trained by W. R. Morse and owned by Al J. Horton of McAlister, Oklahoma.

Draconic's Lady takes easy win

Draconic's Lady took the lead for good on the far turn and drove to an easy victory in Saturday's featured race at Sunland Park.

The five-year-old Draconic mare coasted home in 1:38 2-5 for the mile chase contested by ten four-year-olds and older horses running under allowance terms. That was the fastest mile reading this season, snapping the former best of 1:38 3-5 set by Dolfinair on November 14.

Ridden by Ramon Apodaca, Draconic's Lady was held off the early pacesetter Callmechance. She remained just off Callmechance and the speedy General De Barzan, but accelerated around the far turn and start drawing away.

At the end, she held a two and one-fourth length advantage over Callmechance, who was five lengths ahead of third-place horse General De Barzan.

As the 1-2 wagering favorite, Draconic's Lady returned \$3.00, \$2.40 and \$2.40. Callmechance, the 9-2 second-wagering favorite, returned \$3.20 and \$3.00 for running second under Ruben Miranda. General De Barzan, ridden by Betty Harless, paid

\$4.60 for running third.

The victory snapped a four-race string of second-place places for Draconic's Lady. It was the mare's first victory since winning an allowance chase last October at Louisiana Downs in Bossier City, Louisiana.

Trained by Billy Hitt, Draconic's Lady has a career record of nine triumphs with 15 seconds and eight thirds in 49 appearances. With the \$1,920 she collected in Saturday's feature, the mare has earned \$149,204 for owner Lynn Bubose of Hobbs, New Mexico.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

DRACONIC'S LADY, one of the finest thoroughbred mares to compete in recent seasons at Sunland Park broke her string of four consecutive second-place finishes when she swept to a convincing two and one-fourth length victory in Saturday's featured race. In winning her first race since last October, the brilliant five-year-old Draconic mare set the fastest one-mile reading this season with a 1:38 2/5 clocking. Held off the pacesetter Callmechance by jockey Ramon Apodaca, Draconic's Lady started her move entering the far turn and then zipped through the stretch in a fine performance. Draconic's Lady had run a second in the Autumn Handicap at Turf Paradise in Phoenix before runnerup finishes at Sunland Park in the Bottle A Handicap, the Mr. Vate Handicap and the El Paso Herald-Post Handicap. As the 1-2 wagering favorite, Draconic's Lady returned a paltry \$3.00 to win. Trainer Billy Hitt, the victory was her ninth with 15 seconds and eight thirds in 49 lifetime outings. She has earned \$149,294 for owner Lynn Debose of Hobbs, New Mexico.

TRAINER BILLY HITT saddled two winners on Saturday's program. He won the fourth race with the favored Pale Pusher (\$6.20) for owner Michael C. Stinson of Fort Worth, Texas, and then took the featured 11th race with Draconic's Lady (\$3.00) for owner Lynn Debose of Hobbs, New Mexico. Ramon Apodaca rode both victories.

THE AMERICAN AND Sunland Park-Ruidoso Downs flags were flown at half mast during Friday's racing program in memory of veteran New Mexico trainer Wayne Stanton, who died Wednesday night in El Paso. The longtime conditioner had raced at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs

as well as other New Mexico race tracks. Mr. Stanton, 52, was originally from Trinidad, Colorado.

LOUIE GOMEZ, who won three races on Friday's program, teamed with trainer Ike Danley to win both halves of the daily double. They won the first race with Steve Quick (\$11.20) for owner Thomas G. Payne of Clovis, New Mexico, and then captured the second with Time For J. D. (\$45.60) for owner Marshall F. Bozarth of Robert Lee, Texas. The 4-10 daily double returned \$151.60. Gomez, who won three races on a single program for the third time this season, also won on Upicate (\$57.80) in the tenth race for trainer H. Duane Sterling and owner Alan J. Antweil of Hobbs, New Mexico.

THOSE PATRONS WHO WAGERED on La Ville to place in Friday's eighth race were happy. Only \$24 of the total place pool of \$2,096 were bet on La Ville to run second causing a lopsided play payoff of \$55.60, one of the largest this season. As a \$9.90-1 outsider, the six-year-old Yorkville gelding paid \$21.80 to win. Combined with runnerup Instant Glory, the 2-1 favorite and Joy Elect, the eighth-race trifecta returned a healthy \$3,699.

SATURDAY'S MUTUEL HANDLE of \$431,781 was the biggest this season, eclipsing the former mark of \$421,255 set on November 7. In addition, both trifecta mutuel handles shattered the previous highest trifecta pools. The twelfth-race handle on the exotic wager was \$50,917 while the eighth-race pool was \$50,143. The previous best trifecta pool was \$48,731 on November 6.
