## Mule races back on track

The mule races scheduled for this fall at Ruidoso Downs Race Track are back in the starting gates.

That good news came from Ruidoso Downs Mule Skippers president Melvin Means Saturday as he reported on Friday's decision by track owner Ruidoso Sunland to allow the races.

"They did agree to let us hold our races," said Means. The mule association president said he traveled to the Sunland Park racetrack near El Paso Thursday to await the decision from the Ruidoso Sunland board of directors.

Means said he received the news Friday afternoon from Ruidoso Sunland general manager Donald Smith.

Several things still have to be worked out between Ruidoso Sunland and

the Mule Skippers, Means noted, but the races will definitely take place.

Means said Ruidoso Sunland has agreed to donate whatever fees the mule association pays for use of the track to Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs charities. The price for the three days of races has not been established yet, Means noted.

The races have been moved up to September 16, 17 and 18 to accommodate Ruidoso Sunland.

Means said the Mule Skippers will again let the Ruidoso High School DECA club operate concessions during the races. It has been pointed out the sales are the biggest source of income for the club.

Asked if he knew why the Ruidoso Sunland board of directors changed its policy not to allow outside events at the racetrack, Means said he was certain it was the intense lobbying effort carried out by Ruidoso Mule Skippers sympathizers.

"I'm sure the support received from everybody was one deciding factor," Means speculated. The Mule Skippers president said he was not sure if other activities besides the mule races will be allowed.

Last year, in addition to the mule races, the New Mexico State Chili Cook Off was held after the close of the horse racing season, as was the Arabian Horse Show.

Means said hearing the decision Friday was "quite a relief. I spent several sleepless nights on it."

"I think they realized it wasn't just a few guys who wanted to race mules, it benefitted everyone."

Means said the Mule Skippers will have a general meeting Saturday, March 26, at 7 p.m. at the Ruidoso Public Library to discuss this year's races and the upcoming Mule Skippers weekend trail ride, scheduled for May 21-22. Anyone is welcome to attend the meeting.

## Downs bill to Anaya

Ruidoso Downs need only await the signature of Governor Toney Anaya on Senate Bill 232 before making plans for spending an additional \$50,000 in revenue it will receive from Ruidoso Downs Race Track gross receipts taxes. The bill, introduced February 10 by Senator Charlie Lee, made it out of the House of Representatives on a 55-2 vote Friday evening, at the end of the final full day of the legislative session.

Representative Mickey McGuire, who carried the bill on the floor of the House, said a few questions were raised about whether the bill would also benefit other municipalities with racetracks nearby, such as Albuquerque and Raton. McGuire explained that it will not, because Ruidoso Downs is the only municipality with a racetrack in its village limits.

The two dissenting votes on the floor of the House were the only negative votes on the bill as it passed through two Senate and two House committees and the floor of both legislative chambers. McGuire said he feels his presence on the House Appropriations and Finance Committee, the last committee to hear the bill

before it went to the House, helped pass it through that group.

The bill entitles Ruidoso Downs to receive a total of \$50,000 a year from daily handle tax revenues, after the first \$250,000, which is set aside for racetracks to utilize on capital improvements projects. Lee said the village will receive the money on a daily or weekly basis, beginning with the 1983 racing season.

The purpose of the revenue is "to compensate for the additional municipal services required by the location of a track within a municipality."

Ruidoso Downs Mayor J. C. Day said Friday the village must set priorities on where the revenue is most needed.

"There is no department in the village that could not consume easily the whole amount, so we are going, as a body, to set priorities for the time being and grow as monies are available."

He stated that his main concerns are in providing an adequate water system and police protection for the approaching busy summer season. Day also pointed out that the fire, police and sanitation departments are all in need of new facilities, and the municipal building needs to be replaced.

"These things will have to come in time with careful planning," the mayor pointed out.

"Although \$50,000 a year will not alleviate all our problems, it's certainly a step in the right direction in helping us solve our financial woes."

On behalf of the village, the mayor expressed his appreciation to Lee and McGuire, "who have worked diligently to help the village with this Bill 232." He also said he would like to thank Don Smith, general manager of Ruidoso Sunland, and other Ruidoso Downs Race Track officials.

Passage of this legislation is a special triumph for Day, as he made it a personal goal to see that the State Legislature release some of its gross receipts revenue from the track to the village.

The mayor claimed last May that the village was "legally getting robbed" by not being entitled to any of this revenue. He blamed the State Legislature for the situation and vowed to attempt to get the laws changed.

If Governor Anaya signs the bill into law, which Senator Lee said he feels is likely, Day can mark up a significant victory point for the Village of Ruidoso Downs.



## Paving plans dependent upon good weather

**MOTORISTS WHO HAVE** developed skills evading potholes the past few months may soon see their favorite obstacle courses disappear.

That's if Street Superintendent Jack LaMay gets along with the weatherman and receives a lot of sunshine and no wind this spring.

LaMay is gearing up his department for this season's paving and patching programs on village streets. He has already refired the hot mix plant that has sat dormant since fall, so the patching crew could get out and begin repairing damage caused by winter's ravage.

And if he gets cooperation from the weather, the paving crew will be out soon resurfacing and paving dirt streets by mid-April, hopefully to kick off a five-month improvement campaign on village streets.

"The problem with Ruidoso is you've only got about five months where you can really work," points out LaMay, after noting his crews just cannot afford too much bad weather if this year's paving schedule is to be completed.

Paving of village streets is a complicated process that begins with a request from LaMay to the State Highway Department for matching funds. The state provides 50 percent of the funds on a cooperative paving agreement.

Last year that amounted to about \$150,000 from each partner. LaMay paved several dirt roads and resur-

faced worn-out asphalt streets under last year's program, which resulted in a highly recognized jump forward in the condition of village byways.

The money paid for paving or resurfacing of Country Club Road, Main Road through the Upper Canyon, part of Wingfield Street, D Street and Brady Canyon Road, among other streets.

The co-op money continues through the end of the fiscal year in June. Crews are now doing preliminary work on Metz and Hanson drives to prepare sections of those streets for paving once the program resumes next month. LaMay hopes crews will be able to lay down about three more miles of blacktop on Morgan, Leon Farrar, University, White Mountain and Kirkman under last year's contract.

The street superintendent also has submitted next year's request for matching funds to the Highway Department, which makes on-site inspections before approving appropriations for projects. LaMay said Junction Road and Upper and Lower Terrace are definitely scheduled, but he preferred not to divulge the entire plan until it is okayed.

He did say, however, the total request amounts to \$500,000 - the same amount of funds applied for last year.

Another project to be started with last year's money will be the long-awaited bypass route through Gavilan Canyon. The project, talked about by the state and village government for years, eventually calls for a connector link off Highway 70 in the

Hollywood subdivision to Gavilan. But the State Highway Department has indicated funds are not available for that route and are not in sight.

The village and the state therefore worked out a temporary palliative that calls for a turnoff lane on Highway 70 as it approaches the "Y," and asphaltting of Walnut Drive, which intersects with the "Y" at Service Contractors.

The narrow dirt stretch of the road from the "Y" to its intersection with Gavilan is in need of several improvements. Major elements of the project include laying culverts and building a bridge over the Rio Ruidoso where the road now fords the river on a concrete slab. LaMay estimates the cost of the project at \$120,000. He said preliminary work should start in May.

**WHEN THE STREET DEPARTMENT** gets out of the starting blocks on the paving program, the 16-man crew will have to coordinate like a well-coached team to make sure the blacktop is laid smoothly.

LaMay explained that almost the entire department gets involved on paving a street. The first step is to fire up the hot mix plant and check the asphalt-aggregate mix for uniformity.

Before paving, crews already will have labored for up to two weeks laying down a subgrade and base course of aggregate, both of which must be carefully roller compacted to maximum densities. This compaction,

done with water and steel and pneumatic-tired rollers, is crucial to the life of the asphalt.

"Compaction is the biggest thing," explained LaMay. He noted that dirt and aggregate preparations act like sponges in soaking up moisture that, if allowed to collect in hollows under pavement, can later freeze and kill a good blacktop surface. Therefore, a thorough, level compaction of the base course - or aggregate - is crucial to warding off collection of moisture.

Once the preliminary work is done, the road is ready for hot mix. A coat of "tack oil" from the distributor truck is first spread on the base course to give the hot mix something to bond to.

Dump trucks pull up to the loader out of the hot mix furnace, fill up with the scorching substance and deliver it to the work site as quickly as possible. The mix is then transferred into the lay-down machine that will spread the mix and "screed" it onto the surface. The screed - the rear part of the machine - vibrates the mix as it distributes it.

Following the lay-down machine is the big steel drum roller, which compacts the mix while it is still steaming hot. As the mix cools, the smaller pneumatic-tired roller "kneads" the surface until all the irregularities are taken out. The steel roller then makes a final pass on the paved street to smooth the surface.

Resurfacing roads involves much of the same process as paving a dirt road. To resurface a road, crews first

spread out a thin layer of hot mix with motor graders. This layer, or "skin patch," fills in the holes and cracks and creates a smooth surface for the lay-down machine.

LaMay's crews already have skin-patched part of Paradise Canyon and will soon cover part of Hull and White Mountain in preparation for resurfacing.

**A FULL-TIME PATCHING CREW** is a new feature of the department this year. In the past, LaMay did not have the employees or the resources to devote to patching potholes and cracks, which resulted in some streets consistently looking like battlefields.

"You're going to get a certain amount of potholes with the winters like we have. Especially with water running down onto the streets," explained LaMay. He said the water from side streets will collect in low spots on flat roads and eventually seep through the pavement. Once that happens, there's no way of stopping the moisture from freezing and popping out the pavement.

LaMay also pointed out that clay underlies most village streets, which makes even compaction of base course even more crucial. If the base course is loose in spots, water will collect on top of the clay underneath and eventually freeze. LaMay said this is a recurring problem on a section of Country Club Road which continually needs repair.

If the patching crew gets favorable weather, the devastation from winter should be repaired soon.

**WATCHING FOR GOOD WEATHER** becomes a daily habit of LaMay in the summer. His eyes will continually dart up to the western sky to look for threatening storm clouds whenever he has the paving crew out.

"If we have showers we've got to shut right down. When it gets too wet, the hot mix just won't bond," he noted.

LaMay said the preferred condition for paving is about 80 degrees Fahrenheit with no wind or rain. While the temperature often reaches that level during the summer here, come July the thunderstorms will roll in with regularity during the afternoon and cool everything down.

Indeed, because of the rain, July and August see the least paving action in the village. That's why LaMay must count on an early and warm spring starting next month so he can get three months of paving in before mid-summer. When things dry out in September, paving will resume and last until October, giving the Street Department a maximum of five months to finish its paving projects.

But if LaMay doesn't strike a bargain with the weatherman and the present wet weather continues, the hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of paving plans could go right down the drain - at least until the sun returns and warms village streets again.

As LaMay put it, because of the capricious summer weather, paving "can get real tricky."

# Street number law enforced

An Emergency Medical Services crew recently was late in responding to a call of a man having chest pains—an alert that could have signaled a heart attack.

They drove up and down Walnut Street several times, even passing by the house where the emergency was reported. But they did not know which house to respond to because it had no address number posted.

They finally found the location when someone came out and flagged them down. Luckily, the emergency was not serious and the man survived.

But what will happen next time they cannot find the location?

The recent incident was told by emergency medical technician David Wheeler. The EMT was asked if the lack of proper house numbering has led to problems for emergency services.

"I don't think we've lost a patient yet because the place was hard to locate. But we do have our instances," Wheeler pointed out. "It's still quite a problem."

The problem with insufficient numbering in residential areas pro-

mpted Police Chief Richard Swenor recently to address the situation to the Planning and Zoning Commission. He told P&Z police "efforts to meet the ever increasing demands for police-emergency services are being seriously restricted by this lack of identifiable addresses."

He asked the commission to again emphasize the problem to homeowners, noting efforts have been made in the past but have yet to see success.

Because of Swenor's concern, P&Z enforcement field officer Paul Davis said the village will begin to "vigorously enforce" a law that requires posting of address numbers.

Davis noted a municipal ordinance provides a \$1 a day penalty for a property owner not posting the numbers after being notified. Until now the law has not been enforced, said Davis. He said the penalty can only be leveled after notification has been made to an owner.

Davis stresses that easily readable numbers should be put up in a conspicuous spot so emergency services can quickly find the location. He said if a person is unsure what street his house is on or the proper address, to contact the P&Z office at village hall for the information. Every address in the village is catalogued on a master

map, he pointed out.

A widespread move to post addresses in residential blocks will go a long way toward alleviating the complicated process police dispatchers go through to get a location description. The process, perhaps unique to Ruidoso, wastes valuable time.

Police communications-detention officer Holly Reed explained she will first ask callers if they know what street they live on and their house address—which sometimes is not all that certain.

"Sometimes they don't know the street they're on or their number," explained David Wheeler. He recalled one instance when he was given a precise address, only to find out the number posted on the house had even digits, even though the house was on the odd-numbered side of the street.

Since many residences have no address numbers, Reed said she will ask for a description of the house, including construction type and color. She will then go further and ask for any distinguishing landmarks, or the color and type of vehicle in the yard.

And, to make sure emergency responders don't waste their time driving around, she also asks for a call-back phone number so she can get back in touch with the caller. As a final measure, she will ask someone

to flag down the emergency vehicle when it arrives.

"Most of the time that works," Reed said, adding that emergency personnel are well-versed in locating hard-to-find places in the village. Asked if response time would be reduced if uniform address numbers were posted, Reed replied, "It certainly would."

In extreme cases, Wheeler said, ambulance crews have only six minutes to start treatment on a cardiac arrest patient before the patient begins to receive brain damage. He said those precious minutes sometimes are wasted because of the delay in getting directions. He remembered taking up to 15 minutes once just looking for a residence.

Time is of the essence, says Reed. And, considering the excited state of someone who calls for emergency help, the response time could be much quicker if the caller could just give the address number.

Davis said anyone wanting to know their number must give the planning and zoning office their lot and block number plus the name of their subdivision before the location can be pinpointed on a map.

# Fire threat as always

Though there seems to be enough moisture on the ground to ward off any fire threat for the next several months, a Smokey Bear Ranger District fire officer says we should not become complacent about the fire threat.

"The unofficial gauge at the ranger station tells us the fire season has started," Smokey Bear fire management officer Steve Makowski told the Committee For Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE) Thursday. Makowski was explaining lightheartedly that Lincoln National Forest district workers have come to gauge the start of the fire season by the melting of snow on a north slope at the station. It's not an accurate guide, Makowski knows, but it usually does indicate the start of the dry season.

Makowski reminded the few persons at the meeting not to become complacent because the village has not experienced large fires for the past few years.

All it takes in this heavily forested country, he pointed out, is a week of warm, sunny weather with steady wind and "you're basically there."

Makowski said the official fire danger recently at the district station has remained in the moderate level. At this time last year, the winds were

blowing strongly and the temperature stayed warm, which resulted in a high fire danger.

The ranger district is gearing for the fire season, Makowski said. The office again will receive an 18-person Hot Shot fire fighting crew. The specialized team of firefighters is stationed in different forest districts at various times of the year—whenever an area is in its traditional high danger period.

Makowski said the Hot Shots will arrive April 3. He also said the Ruidoso district station will have a Model 70 tanker crew on duty seven days a week and that the Bonito Model 70 crew will be available five days a week.

Makowski said the long-range weather forecast shows a split jetstream over the Lincoln National Forest, which should result in an unusual wet period and calm winds for the next month if the pattern continues.

In preparation for the fire season, village fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy and Makowski agreed to inventory the markers for the Red Flag Alert and to order more if necessary.

ComFIRE also heard from Barbara Duff Thursday that the Salvation Army Truck will be in the village on March 24 from 9 to 3 p.m. Anyone wanting large items picked up should call Duff at 257-2340 or the Chamber of Commerce at 257-7395.

# Churchill Cooke: Capitan's 'Music Man'

"He tries real hard and helps us a lot. When I first started I didn't know anything. Now I'm really beginning to get into it," said Sid Goodloe Thursday afternoon. The Capitan High School choir member had just finished the first performance of the choir and jazz band's 1983 tour show.

Before Goodloe could say anything more, music director Churchill Cooke called him over to help pack instruments and amplifying equipment into a pickup truck in preparation for Friday's 8:30 a.m. departure.

The Capitan High School choir and jazz band took off Friday for a three-day, four-concert tour to Dexter, Hagerman and Carlsbad. The more than 40 students performed a 12-song show ranging from Gospel songs to Country and Western to New Wave. In addition to the singing and orchestra backup, the group performed dance routines to almost every number.

"I'm an extravaganza buff," explained Cooke, whose efforts over the past three years have elicited enthusiasm from students, teachers and parents of the community.

"Our music program has really improved," said Capitan principal Glen Crane. "He has changed it from a regular program to an innovative, creative situation."

Cooke studied music education at Pennsylvania State University. Before going to work at a high school in Santa Fe in 1973, he had spent one night in New Mexico (Gallup) when he was five years old.

"I didn't even know where I was going or what I was doing," said Cooke. But he saw mountains and ski resorts on the map, and decided to come to New Mexico when the job was offered.

He has been teaching in New Mexico ever since, except for a year spent professionally arranging and singing in Florida. He returned, though, because, "I got too homesick for New Mexico."

Cooke came to Capitan three years

ago, inheriting what he acknowledged was not much of a music program. Since then, he has enlarged the program considerably and involved many more students, according to principal Crane.

"I have a little bit of everybody every day," said Cooke. He teaches students from kindergarten through 12th grade. The younger students study general music and recorder while the older ones play in the band.

He seems most proud, however, of the show group he took on tour this weekend. He said this group is the only show group of its type to come out of a 1-A school, and very possibly the only group of that size and instrumentation in the state.

Cooke has taken his group on tours all three years he has been in Capitan. But this, he believes, is the most ambitious yet. While the tour lasted three days, all four concerts were performed on Friday. Students toured Carlsbad Caverns and the Living Desert Museum and attended a movie during the other two days.

The tight concert schedule called for well-choreographed action during, before and after each show. Each student has a responsibility for a piece of equipment and set-up duties. Cooke said they can set up or tear down the whole set in six minutes.

The complicated show is possible because many of the students, especially the jazz band members, have been with Cooke all three years he has been teaching.

"I'm starting to see progress being made. They're becoming more sophisticated," he said. Results in the recent state band and choir competitions proved that.

For the first time in anyone's memory in Capitan, two students from the school were chosen as all-stars. Baritone Daron Armstrong was selected as a member of the all-state choir. Gloria Zamora was chosen as a member of the all-state band for her command of the alto clarinet. Six other students received top ratings in the competition.

The community response to his ef-

forts has been tremendous, according to Cooke and Crane.

"I'm just overwhelmed by how enthusiastic the parents are," Cooke said. He noted that the community donated over \$400 in the last few days to help with the costs of the tour. The parents also helped make the costumes the students wore on tour.

Crane noted the music program is extraordinary for a town the size of Capitan, where high school sports usually dominate the community's attention. Cooke said he tries to impress his students with the idea that they are at an age where they can treat athletics and arts as equals.

"I'm the window to the musical world for them," said Cooke. He mentioned a trip he took his students on last year to see a live performance of "West Side Story" in Albuquerque. It was the first time many of them had ever seen a live musical performance, he said.

The trip to Albuquerque and the tour last weekend are rewards for the students that Cooke feels are vital to the success of his programs.

"They feel what they are doing in the class is worthwhile," he said. This adds to the enthusiasm of his students, he explained.

Cooke's own enthusiasm spreads to the students as well. Many of the students talked about the energy Cooke puts into the program.

"He puts out a lot for the kids," said one choir member.

Cooke feels he gets a lot from the kids as well.

"They're great. They're super kids," he said. A performer himself, he said he often feels somewhat empty when he hears applause for himself because he already knows he can perform. But applause for the kids is much more rewarding.

"It pays tenfold to hear that, to see them get excited," he explained. These days, it seems lots of people in Capitan are getting excited about Churchill Cooke's music program at the school.

## Downs P&Z tables variance request

A request for a variance to permit additional mobile homes to be placed on lots in River Park Subdivision was again tabled by the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday.

Abe Chavez is requesting the variance for the purpose of opening a commercial trailer park, but a recently adopted village ordinance forbids more than one trailer being placed on a single lot. Chavez presented commission members with a plat of the area and was informed that his land would have to be replatted to permit the additional mobile homes.

Chavez also would need a zoning variance, he was told, as the commercial trailer park would be located in the midst of a residential section.

P&Z indicated the request could not be granted unless the area were replatted. Member Sonny Wood said he will study the ordinances to determine whether that is permitted.

P&Z also heard again from George Smith who claimed that a surveying error made when roads were platted in Las Lomas Subdivision robbed him of 23 feet of his property. Smith was requesting a variance on setback re-

quirements to build an addition onto his house.

P&Z made a recommendation that the village deed the 23 feet of property back to the owner so a variance would not be needed.

Smith also asked members whether they would have any objections to the installation of an arcade, to be open only during the summer, in part of the old Sundowner Restaurant, now owned by Smith and a partner. P&Z indicated it would not object.



## Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—The first session of the 36th Legislature has by law been concluded.

Official termination occurred at noon on Saturday, March 19, the 60th day of the 1983 session.

We who are pundits are expected to give you some comprehensive and intelligible explanation of all that went on there. You feel that is the least you can expect of us.

Hey! Don't be silly! Nobody could make much intelligible of this session. Nobody could discern patterns, much less point them out to his or her readers.

The fact is that this was one of the most disorganized and patternless Legislatures in many a year.

Why? Try these reasons on for size: —A governor who knew almost nothing about how to cause things to happen.

He couldn't cause things to happen when he was not a governor. Why should we have expected him to have learned that in the meanwhile?

—A Senate with almost no leadership from anyone.

Mike Alarid, who is supposed to run the Democrats; is not a man who likes face-to-face confrontations and unpleasantness.

Neither is Joe Mercer, the man who is supposed to run the Republicans.

Ike Smalley, the long-time veteran in "that body," capable of putting together the things which matter to him, no longer has many things which matter to him.

—A House where things were delicately balanced.

Those who overthrew the conservative coalition which ran things

there for the last four years did not have a sizeable majority.

That makes you tread very lightly.

In this case, that was probably an advantage. The more-or-less liberal Democrats who dominated by a slight margin had to move slowly, keep all their ducks in a row and not offend anybody.

—But that condition does not lead to innovative and imaginative legislation.

—The state was running out of money.

Lawmakers who have grown accustomed to having a surplus every year suddenly discovered that (honest Injun!) they were not going to have enough dough to operate state government.

So, with all those influences swirling around, what did we get?

A Legislature which did not distinguish itself.

We probably overspent on capital improvements. We acted as though there were no real problems. We wrote a package of tax-increase legislation which was too hurried, too much affected by the egos of certain legislators (more on this later) and almost certain to make every taxpayer uncomfortable.

Not, in short, a stellar session.

If you had to name one particular fault of the session, which was just concluded, McCaffrey, what would it be?

That few of those who took part in it truly realized the bad shape the state is in. They wanted to wish that fact away—and it won't go away.

Sooner or later (this year or next), they are going to have to get that through their heads.

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## Sense & Nonsense

Crime is one of the most serious problems facing this state and country today.

In 1981, according to one survey, nearly eight out of 10 Americans did not believe that our system of law enforcement discouraged people from committing crimes.

As the threat of crime has become clearer to all of us, so too has the need for improving our defenses against crime. One important step is bail reform.

A bill which I'm co-sponsoring would tighten the restrictions on dangerous criminals being released on bail. It would also increase the penalties against persons who commit crimes while out on bail for another offense.

It's a well-balanced piece of legislation which contains necessary safeguards to protect the innocent.

For example, a finding of "dangerousness" must be supported by clear and convincing evidence. The provisions parallel existing authority to detain persons who are serious flight risks or who threaten witnesses or jurors.

It also makes it more difficult for a person to be released on bail following a conviction. Once an accused has been found guilty, I see little reason to turn him loose before the judge sentences him.

Let me explain why this tough legislation is necessary.

One study presented to the Senate Judiciary Committee recently show-

ed that 70 percent of those persons arrested for robbery were rearrested while on bail. Some 65 percent of those released after an arrest for auto theft were taken into custody for another auto theft while out on bail.

Still another study disclosed that 28 percent of the murders, 19 percent of the rapes, 31 percent of the robberies and 32 percent of the burglaries in the United States were committed by persons free on some form of conditional release.

One report disclosed that for a defendant with a previous record of two or more prior arrests, the chance of rearrest before trial was twice as great as for those with one or no previous arrests.

While all of the studies do not agree as to the exact percentages, it's clear that the number of crimes committed by persons out on bail is staggering.

Daily reports in the newspapers and studies like these indicate the need for changing the standard for pre-trial release and detention so that judges can openly consider the possible threat a suspect poses to community safety.

These examples lead me to believe that the freedom bail provides should not be for sale at any price for dangerous criminals.

I believe this bail reform package is an effort to restore balance in the scales of justice. Congress needs to make laws that protect decent, law-abiding citizens.

### Editorial

Elected officials in Ruidoso Downs are pushing for a village-wide cleanup campaign.

It is always commendable to declare war on "filth, sewage, garbage, refuse, trash, standing or stagnant water, litter, rubbish, ruins, weeds, brush or any waste matter whatsoever."

Such efforts in the recent past have met with little success in Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso, however. Perhaps the Downs has the right idea in starting with a commitment from its municipal judge to enforce the ordinance against trash.

In light of the early success of the Crime Stoppers program, perhaps that approach could be applied to the problem of areas needing a cleanup.

It could be called "Eyesore Stoppers." People could place anonymous phone calls and report such areas. A reward fund could be established through donations from those who believe clean communities are important.

Callers who refused a reward—as appears to be the trend with Crime Stoppers—could be given a commemorative hubcap to hang in their den.

As we said, any effort to beautify a town is worthwhile, and we wish Ruidoso Downs well in this latest endeavor.—TP
