## Call before cut plan okayed

The Ruidoso council Tuesday approved village participation in and partial funding of a proposed "One Call" utility system, whereby persons digging into the ground will make one phone call to notify all utility companies.

According to the plan, as outlined in a letter by Cablevision manager Paul Crown, local utilities would join to form a Ruidoso Utility Council. This non-profit organization would hire a secretary to receive calls from those planning to dig.

The secretary would then notify the utilities, who would send out employees to point out the location of underground lines to backhoe operators. The program is designed to "reduce dig-in damages, periods of utility disruption, and the risk of injury to excavators and the public," Crown wrote.

Costs were cited as \$1,000 annually for purchase of a \$10 million liability insurance policy, and \$500 monthly to pay for a secretary. "If all five utilities participate... the first month's payment will be \$300. Monthly payments for the rest of the year will be \$100," Crown predicted.

Village manager Jim Hine told the council in its pre-meeting study session that Ruidoso Natural Gas has agreed to participate; that Continental Telephone has agreed, pending approval from higher up; and that Texas New Mexico Power has agreed on a six-month experimental basis. The Village of Ruidoso water and sewer departments are the other proposed members.

Hine pointed out, however, that all but Cablevision had refused to share in the estimated \$2,500 start-up legal costs to incorporate the Utility Council.

He said Crown had offered for Cablevision to split those costs evenly with the village to get the project under way.

Councilman Frank Sayner blasted the other utilities during the regular council meeting for refusing to share the start-up costs. He said he was "quite appalled" that the large utilities would not contribute.

"It's kinda pathetic," said Sayner. He added sarcastically that Continental, with its recently approved 60 percent rate increase, obviously cannot afford to help.

There was some discussion of whether the secretary for the Utility Council should be a village employee. Crown had suggested the village subsidize that person's salary for work done not pertaining to the Utility Council.

But assistant village manager Frank Potter said this would give the village exposure in terms of liability, and that village insurance costs would go up. Potter referred to tragic accidents resulting from cut gas lines in Portales and Odessa, Texas, however, indicating that the Utility Council is needed here.

It was brought out that the cost to the village for participation would be more than made up by savings through avoiding cut lines. Purchasing agent John Cupp said Albuquerque utilities subsidize a similar council to the tune of \$10,000 a year, figuring it saves them \$50,000 annually.

The council voted to accept Crown's proposal to split the start-up costs (up to one-half and not to exceed \$1,250) and proceed with formation of the Utility Council by ordinance. It was decided that persons calling in should be able to give 24 hours notice of intention to dig.

## Gary Myers wins Summer Fest art prize

After several hours of judging 68 pieces of art Monday afternoon, Santa Fe artist Maurice Loriaux selected Gary Myers' painting, "Song of Summer," as the winner of the 1983 Ruidoso Summer Festival Art Contest.

Myers will receive a \$5,000 check for his painting. The work will be made into a limited edition poster for the festival.

"Bless your heart," said Myers when he first met Loriaux at a celebration in honor of Myers' selection Monday night.

The gouache painting features a woman seated on a chair with an open book, a rose and a guitar. In the background is a staff of music from Johann Strauss' waltz, "Artist's Life Melody," and a full moon.

The piece is a departure from the Western style Myers is best known for.

"I wanted to do something special for the Ruidoso Summer Festival," said Myers. "I don't like to be pigeonholed," he added.

Myers said he began the painting soon after the contest was announced in The Ruidoso News February 7. He

said he drew many sketches and studies, experimenting with colors, clothing and poses before settling on his final design.

Myers said he abandoned other projects to work on the painting. He finished the painting on the last day the art pieces were being accepted.

At the celebration Monday night, Loriaux talked about the selection process.

"It's always a difficult job," said the artist, who has judged numerous other contests. There were many fine talents represented in the contest, he noted.

"It's a matter of the process of elimination," Loriaux explained. He said minor technical weaknesses eliminated a number of talented artists' pieces.

Loriaux spent five minutes describing what he liked about Myers' painting. He mentioned the monochromatic tonality and warm colors of the painting. He spoke of the composition with a strong vertical interest that flows well.

The background, which is smooth at the top and gradually shifts to a structured pattern at the bottom, also impressed Loriaux. The music and the moon in the background pleased him

as well. "Very fine work. I would like to see more," Loriaux wrote on the Best of Show ribbon he placed on Myers' painting.

"I think it will make a fine poster," said Loriaux. Monday night the painting was packed and ready to be taken to Denver, where lithographer Jerry Tewell will make a poster from the painting.

Myers will help design the poster. Summer Festival organizers are still undecided how many posters to print.

Loriaux said he did not know of Myers' work before judging the contest. He said that would not have mattered anyway, because the signatures of all the artists were covered by tape for the judging.

In addition to Myers' award, Loriaux pinned first, second and third place and honorable mention ribbons on 18 pieces.

First place ribbons were awarded to an untitled graphic piece by J. D. Yoakum, "High Mesa Song," a batik by Denise Dorn, "Mescalero Barn," an oil painting by Martin Rose, "Hopi World," a watercolor by Loren Gashemona, "The Emergence," a sculpture by Sam Pilgreen, "Apache Serenade," a pastel by Terri Sodd,

and "High Country Farm," a pastel by Joe Dunlap.

Second-place ribbons were awarded to "Sierra Blanca Tiffany," stained glass by Easy Al Harris III, "Technology," a watercolor by Stephen Long, "The Blanket She Wore," a batik by Denise Dorn, "Rocky Mountain Big Horn Sheep," a sculpture by Walter Rawley, and "Elk Dreamer's Tune," a pastel by Terri Sodd.

Third-place ribbons were awarded to "Grizzly," a sculpture by Walter Rawley, and "Penasco," a pastel by Joe Dunlap.

"Mute Bird Song," a pastel by Dorothy Bishop, "Sierra Blanca Water in Wood," stained glass by Easy Al Harris III, "Afternoon Warmth," a batik by Denise Dorn, and "War Chant," a sculpture by Bill Caster, all received honorable mention ribbons.

These pieces will be auctioned June 6 at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Half the selling price will go to the artist and half to Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated.

The 18 pieces will be on display at Security Bank, Ruidoso State Bank and First City National Bank until the auction.

## Downs presses on with cleanup plans

A village-wide cleanup of Ruidoso Downs was planned by trustees Monday night, including a regular spring cleanup April 22 and 23 and a program designed to force residents to rid the village of all refuse and junk.

The spring cleanup will coincide with Operation Trash, to be conducted in both Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. Any materials weighing more than 50 pounds, including old junk autos, can be deposited for pickup at regular trash receptacles. Trustees requested volunteers to help with the cleanup, and to loan pickups and wreckers for use during the project.

Trustee Jake Harris will coordinate the efforts Friday, April 22, and trustee Harrold Mansell will direct Saturday's operation.

The long-term cleanup operation will involve property which violates the village's ordinance prohibiting "filth, sewage, garbage, refuse, trash, standing or stagnant water, litter, rubbish, ruins, weeds, brush or any waste matter whatsoever." The village clerk will issue warnings to

owners of any property noted in violation of this ordinance, giving 10 days to clean up the offending material.

If the property is not cleaned up within 10 days, the owner will be cited into municipal court, where a fine of up to \$300 could be assessed. If the property remains in an unsatisfactory condition, the village will clean it up at the owner's expense. Trustees set fees for billing property owners for the village's labor, which include \$7 an hour for manpower, \$30 an hour for use of a front-end loader, \$10 an hour for a dump truck and \$25 an hour for a garbage truck.

Property owners will be given 90 days to pay the bill, after which a lien will be filed against the property.

Mansell pointed out that the cleanup should be conducted in phases, working with property along Highway 70 from the east edge of the village to the west in phase one, and with property along all village side streets in phase two.

In a discussion of wages and personnel practices, trustees tentatively approved a 10 percent across-the-board salary increase to be included in next fiscal year's budget. It was

noted that the increase is dependent upon the village's overall budget outlook and approval by the state.

Mayor J. C. Day encouraged the board to approve the increase to be worked into the proposed budget for next year. Police department employees pointed out the disparity between salaries in Ruidoso Downs and other municipalities. Although trustees agreed that wages are low, they argued that the village can pay only what it can afford.

Despite the trustees' concerns, the motion was unanimously passed to approve the increase.

In other business, trustees:

—Approved a schedule for use of the village park by softball leagues. League representatives announced they are looking for an organization to run a concession stand during games.

—Called for bids on needed repairs to restroom facilities at the park.

—Heard Day read a letter from Mule Skinners president Melvin Means thanking the village for support in obtaining use of Ruidoso Downs Race Track this summer.

—Discussed the need to search for a building to house the maintenance,

water and sewer departments.

—Heard Day read a letter from the police department commending Chief Charles Robinson for his leadership. Day also noted that officer Dale Patrick recently completed basic certification school.

—Stipulated that residents wishing to run a sewer line to the main line to hook onto the sewer system should present such a request to the board.

—Were reminded of the district meeting of the New Mexico Municipal League April 13 in Cloudcroft.

—Heard Day offer appreciation to state Senator Charlie Lee and Representative Mickey McGuire for their efforts in passing legislation to obtain money for the village from the racetrack's gross receipts tax revenue.

—Heard from village clerk Wilma Webb that the Ladies Auxiliary will offer assistance with the village cleanup and has plans to paint the municipal building.

—Heard from Day that Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Jim Tidwell has indicated he plans to resign from the commission because of lack of time.

## Grease and oil cause sewer line problems

When grease and oil from restaurants and gas stations clogs up in village sewer lines, collected waste backs up and builds up enough pressure to blow manhole covers out of the ground.

When that happens, the Ruidoso Wastewater Department is faced with a repair and cleanup that can run into the hundreds of dollars.

Unfortunately, such clogs happen all too frequently.

But there is a simple solution to the sewer line blowouts and repairs. And it is one that more than half the businesses that dispense grease and oil into sewer drains have failed to comply with.

"I'd say 50, 60 percent of the grease and oil businesses do not have an approved grease trap," wastewater department crew leader Mac Macleod told the village council Tuesday.

Macleod and department superintendent Blair Halladay

received council approval on their proposal to require wastewater applications and discharge permits from any commercial establishment before a sewer tap is made.

The employees indicated the requirements will ensure businesses install and maintain grease traps and will allow the department to monitor compliance.

Halladay, who has been with the department since the 1960s, said the village has a law requiring grease traps for food preparation and handling businesses and gas stations, but it was never enforced.

Now, with increased demands on the system, clogs have appeared more often due to coagulated grease. In some cases, sewage will back up into a house that sits lower than the line stoppage, or pressure builds in a manhole and pops off the cover.

Macleod pointed out one area where he said wastewater department employees have been sent six times since last summer to clean a clogged line.

# Administrator opposes proposed change at Fort Stanton

The Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School facility has been targeted for a change in use by state Health and Environment Department Secretary Bob McNeill, but Fort Stanton administrator Mark Delgado said he intends "to try like hell" to prevent that from occurring.

McNeill confirmed last week that his department is investigating possible alternate uses for the facility because of "trends in the last 10 or 15 years towards placing the (developmentally) disabled in community residences and semi-independent living situations away from large institutions."

Among the alternate uses being studied are an alcoholism treatment facility and a long-term nursing care facility, according to Robert Garcia, director of the Behavioral Health Services Division of the Health and Environment Department.

A decision on how the facility will be utilized in the future is about two years down the road, McNeill reported.

"The underlying issue is a change in services for the developmentally disabled," he pointed out. "The objective is to place them near their homes. We're trying to prevent institutionalization wherever possible," McNeill continued. He asserted that community-based programs "provide a much more homelike setting"—an environment

which enhances the developmental skills of the mentally retarded.

Garcia feels that "with some aggressive development of community-based programs, the majority of individuals at Fort Stanton could be placed successfully in community-based programs in a locale closer to their residence." Those patients who require institutionalization would be transferred to the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School.

But Fort Stanton administrator Delgado feels the facility is already doing its best to place patients in community-based programs when they are ready for them. In the last six years, 180 Fort Stanton patients have successfully been placed in community programs, which Delgado indicated is the highest success rate of any school of its type in the state.

He agrees that the trend toward de-institutionalization is a good trend. "Our philosophy and goal are to prepare clients the best we can."

"Can we enhance the quality of life of that individual?" is the question Delgado said is asked when deciding upon a program for each of the Fort Stanton patients. "We're not trying to hold anybody back."

He argues that there are a lack of community programs available in which to place patients. McNeill agreed, but pointed out there are new group homes opening this year. "There are not spaces readily available, but we're gradually meeting the demand more and more."

But Delgado feels the proper continuum of services for these patients has not been developed.

If the system were working properly, he explained, patients would be able to progress from the institution to community programs to semi-independent living to independent living situations.

"The system is stagnant," Delgado claims. "They're building more and more group homes," he noted. "They're just creating small institutions around the state."

He alleges that most community programs are just a cluster of homes in one part of a city, which often are referred to as "institution rows."

"They are really not de-institutionalizing; they are just institutions within the boundaries of a city," he declared.

McNeill pointed out, however, that the courts have already ordered a number of the patients in institutions in the state to be placed in community programs.

"The reality is the days of the Fort Stanton facility serving the mentally retarded are numbered by virtue of court decisions and statutes," the secretary stated.

Delgado admits that about 17 percent of the Fort Stanton patients have been ordered out of institutions by the courts, but he feels those patients ordered out are not necessarily ready to leave an institution.

He said the adjustment process takes longer if the patient is not completely ready for community placement when he leaves the

institution. And the community is not going to know how to deal with these individuals, he asserted.

Delgado argued that if most of the Fort Stanton patients are released from the institution, recidivism will appear, meaning those patients will relapse into former behavior patterns. He feels many of the patients will need to be re-institutionalized, but the facility will no longer be there to take them in.

Secretary McNeill underscored the premise that "the welfare of the resident is paramount" in his decision to change the use of the Fort Stanton facility. He feels that in light of current trends by the courts and by lawmakers to remove the developmentally disabled from institutions, Fort Stanton will eventually reach the point of being pointless anyway.

The state should therefore make more adequate use of the facility, he indicated.

McNeill also stressed his intention not to threaten the jobs of Fort Stanton employees nor to harm the area's economy by his plans to change Fort Stanton.

"I don't want to take any actions that will jeopardize anybody's job," he stated. McNeill said he hopes employment at the facility will be increased by whatever type of program is instituted there in the future.

He also indicated that he plans to be "consulting with communities in the area" and with labor union representatives of Fort Stanton employees in the near future, so those people directly affected by the changeover will

have some input into the plans.

Although Delgado contends that McNeill's idea to change the use of Fort Stanton in two years is "idealistic and very impractical," he indicated he will cooperate fully in the transition once the directive to do so is given.

"But I'm going to try like hell until that happens to maintain the facility as it is," the administrator declared.

In fact, Delgado favors an expansion of the programs for the mentally retarded now offered at Fort Stanton. Outlined in his five-year plan for the school are the establishment of programs for the mentally retarded offender, and for mild and moderately retarded with severe behavioral problems. He also advocates further development of the program for elderly mentally retarded individuals.

He also noted that the facility is now generating 80 percent of its own revenue, making it almost self-supporting. An \$890,000 appropriation from the Legislature in its recent session will finance construction of a new water line for the facility, also.

The project will be a joint venture serving Fort Stanton and Camp Sierra Blanca, replacing nine miles of the 50-year-old cast iron water line from Bonito Lake to the intake point at Fort Stanton.

# Council okays cut plan

Also Tuesday, the council agreed to allow the sewer department to require a wastewater discharge permit from new businesses before they can be issued a building permit. Sewer superintendent Blair Halladay explained that there is a problem with cooking grease from restaurants and oil and grease from service stations.

These establishments are supposed to have grease traps, he said. The permit will require businesses to show type of discharge and means of collection. It will also require the businesses to maintain the traps.

The council also gave village attorney Lee Huckstep permission to proceed with an ordinance redefining certain property usages. Huckstep said the idea came about because of a request for a motel to condominium—and thus commercial to residential—conversion.

There are different zoning requirements for commercial and residential property—in terms of setbacks, density and green space—Huckstep pointed out. But he noted in a letter to the council that the village was powerless to prevent a motel to condo conversion last fall because of the looseness of its definition of "motel" and "hotel."

The new ordinance, which defines apartment, boarding house, hotel, motel and travel trailer park, will "shut a fairly large loophole" in the zoning ordinances, Huckstep said. In other business Tuesday, the council

—Passed on a request from Marian Black to locate a directional sign for Carrizo Lodge in village right-of-way to Cupp and Huckstep for study

—Received a proposal from the Noon Lions Club to build a "Lions Hut" on land in Two Rivers Park behind the Chamber of Commerce building. The club is proposing a 99-year lease of the park property so it can build a 36-by-60-foot building. The club has offered space in the building for an office for the parks and recreation director. The council turned the proposal over to parks and recreation director Pam Graves and the parks and recreation commission for consideration.

—Heard Mayor George White read a letter from Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinnners president Melvin Means thanking them for support of the mule races.

—Agreed to impose a \$10 charge for bad checks submitted to the village.

—Agreed to impose a 10 percent surcharge on business license renewals applied for after March 15. (They come due January 1 each year.)

—Accepted the following bids for water department supplies from H. G. Reiter of Albuquerque for 500 meters, \$33 each; Bowles and Edens of El Paso, Texas, for 15 meter boxes, \$44.20 each; Reiter for 100 water meter couplings, \$1 each; Water Work Sales of Albuquerque for 10 meter yoke relocators, \$17.94 each; Reiter for five 6-inch mechanical joint tees, \$99.50 each. Water Work Sales for five 6-inch tapping valves, \$214.11 each.

—Accepted the low bid on the cemetery fence of \$13,018.28 from R & R Fence of Ruidoso Downs.

—Accepted the low bid on corrugated metal culvert of \$6,834.60 from Hydro Conduit of Albuquerque.

—Approved Mayor White's appointments

of Margaret Gaddy to Planning and Zoning Commission, pending her approval; Milt Alcorn and Mary Dean to Architectural Plans Review Committee; George Shoemaker to Extraterritorial Zoning Commission; Fred Heckman to Ruidoso Water Development Corporation; Emadair Jones to library board; and Buddy Bundick to the water board.

—Approved construction of a 10-inch sewer line along Paradise Canyon Road. Hine said the project will be done by the village and paid for with existing sewer bond funds.

—Approved a request from police chief Dick Swenor to purchase computer software. Swenor said he had been given estimates of \$15,000 to \$20,000 as the cost for software, but that he had learned he could purchase it through the international chiefs of police organization for \$2,000.

—Discussed whether to take action on the high price of gasoline in Ruidoso. Councilman Don Dale suggested the council instruct the village attorney to write to the state Attorney General asking for an investigation. Councilman Benny Coulston agreed with Dale's concern, but questioned the wisdom of the council to involve itself.

Councilman Al Junge agreed the prices are a "tourist ripoff," but indicated the Chamber of Commerce should press for action, not the council. Dale said his concern is whether the law is being broken in the matter of gasoline pricing.

—Approved request from Leon Eggleston for travel to clerks' meeting at Minneapolis, Minnesota.

—Adjourned into executive session to discuss water rights acquisition.

# Sewer line problems

The line, located between Hill's Pancake House and the All Purpose Ice Company on Sudderth Drive, has a cleanout pipe where sewage spills out and runs onto the street.

Macleod claims the problem is caused by the restaurant, which he says has no grease trap. He said he has asked the owners to install one, but they will not comply. The village has filed a complaint in municipal court to try and rectify the matter.

But restaurant co-owner Terri Hill contends the line does not come out of the restaurant and that the establishment regularly maintains its grease trap, located behind the building.

"We have a grease trap in the back," she said. "It's emptied and

maintained properly. We'd be happy to show them, but they've never asked to see it."

Hill says she "definitely, absolutely" believes restaurants should install grease traps on their sewer lines. She added she will cooperate with the village if her business is found in error.

Macleod claims that is all the department asks of any business discharging grease, oil or other damaging substances into sewer lines.

He said if widespread dumping is not stopped soon, the new treatment plant at Biscuit Hill could be damaged. Macleod told the council oil deposits already have collected on concrete surfaces of plant facilities.

The wastewater employee said his department cannot install grease traps for customers, but that it will inspect them for proper maintenance. He pointed out the traps—which are containers with a series of baffles that trap substances—are relatively easy to install.

A spokesman at Alamo Pipe and Supply said the Ruidoso store does not stock the traps but they can be ordered from Alamogordo. He said depending on size, grease traps retail for \$500 to \$1,000.

Village manager Jim Hine said the application and permit requirement goes into effect April 1. He noted a building permit for any establishment affected by the rule will not be issued until a wastewater permit is granted.

# Council hears drain problem

The recurring problem of drainage in the village surfaced before the village council Tuesday in the form of a neighborhood dispute.

After almost a year of asking the village to intervene in a problem between him and his neighbor over a wall that he says blocks water runoff, Manuel Carrillo received assurance from Mayor George White the village will do all it can to help resolve the problem.

Carrillo told the council he had informed administrative officials and municipal court about a wall his neighbor erected near the separating property line that blocks drainage and causes flooding on his property.

But he claimed he was told it was a private matter in which the village could not get involved.

But the council Tuesday instructed village attorney Lee Huckstep to research a municipal law concerning blockage of flood waterways that may apply in Carrillo's case.

If Carrillo's neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Burt, are found in violation of the ordinance, they may have to provide for drainage through the solid block wall they erected.

The wall runs the length of the property line between the neighbors at the corner of Spruce and Davis drives in Ponderosa Heights. Carrillo's property is located uphill from the Burts, and Carrillo claims precipitation runoff is blocked by the wall and floods his property.

But Mrs. Burt contends since the wall is located on her property, she should have to do nothing to alter it unless it is absolutely necessary.

"We checked with the proper authorities at the time and they okayed it," she pointed out.

Burt said she was told that as long as drainage can flow past the wall along the edge of the street, the wall would conform to village design standards.

Councilman Al Junge suggested Carrillo seek legal steps to resolve the problem, but Carrillo argued he should not have to pay lawyer's fees if the village has jurisdiction.

The council asked Huckstep to review flood waterway provisions in the subdivision regulations to determine if the ordinance is being violated.

# Committee chairman unhappy

A dispute surfaced Tuesday between the Grindstone Dam Oversight Committee chairman and assistant village manager Frank Potter over access to engineering documents on the proposed reservoir.

Committee chairman Bill Karn questioned Potter at two separate meetings whether engineers submitted a preliminary geotechnical report that expresses concern over the quality of the dam site, and why the review committee never saw the report.

According to Karn, the report, which he contended was released in December, points to a 25 to 30 percent yearly water loss from the proposed 1,000-acre-foot reservoir, through ground leakage.

Karn told the village council Tuesday night he asked Potter twice in the past two months about the report, but that the assistant village manager denied its existence. Karn said he learned from another source, who he did not identify, that the report was released in December.

The council did not deny the report's existence Tuesday. Councilman Frank Sayner acknowledged the estimate on leakage contained in the document, but he emphasized the finding was contingent on total removal of topsoil from the reservoir site. Sayner quoted engineers as saying if the topsoil is not removed down to the bedrock, the leakage would be reduced considerably.

Sayner told Karn if he was going to release information from the report, to include the "second half of the sentence."

But the incomplete information given Karn only illustrates the frustration of his committee in trying to obtain access to design reports.

Karn asked Potter in a private meeting earlier Tuesday why reports have been withheld from the committee. Potter said the committee has not been denied access and that Karn's group could look at all the reports at its next scheduled meeting.

Karn contended before the council the committee was established to review all documents on the design, as well as contracts with engineers and contractors. He asked the council to "reiterate the right of the Grindstone Dam committee to look at reports."

Councilman Al Junge expressed concern that the committee has not been privy to the reports, and suggested it should get the information. But he added some of the documents "are really dangerous (to release) at this point," because of pending litigation on purchase of the Grindstone property from owner Don Dorman.

The council has met in several closed sessions in recent months to discuss appraisals of the Grindstone Canyon site and condemnation procedures. Potter admitted earlier Tuesday negotiations on the purchase probably are 60 days behind schedule. But, he said, everything else on the project is running smoothly.

Potter explained to the council he was designated as liaison to the committee and he would not release information he deems sensitive.

"I have controlling authority over the oversight committee," he noted. "If I do not want to release information, I will not release it."

Potter also said the committee never was given approval to breach the project design with Boyle Engineering or the council, and it should not have the right to review contracts.

He pointed out the village has retained two engineering firms and now, put trust in the geologists to

make determinations on the site. He said, "I'm totally satisfied with their reports."

The assistant village manager added that a final report on the dam design is due to be released at the second council meeting in April.

Councilman Don Dale agreed with Potter that the committee "has no right to all information," and he claimed the public does not care about preliminary reports, that it just wants a dam built.

Karn disagreed, saying, "It's their money, they have a right to know what the geotechnical report is." He also said he would prefer to be told documents are privileged information rather than lied to about their existence.

The discussion led to a question over the purpose of the committee. Member Tim Palmer asked "Why have the committee?" If it cannot have access to documents, Palmer also pointed out the committee has never been given a precise definition of its function.

Committee member Tim Collins indicated he felt the committee does not need access to the reports because, he said, the members lack the expertise to review the technical documents.

Sayner, who recently has shown annoyance over demands from other council-appointed committees, reacted by suggesting the committee design the dam and save the cost of \$750,000 in engineers' fees.

Responding to Palmer, he indicated the committee should not have been established. "It's about time we do our own job instead of giving it to committees," he argued.

Discussion concluded when Councilman Benny Coulston asked village clerk Leon Eggleston to research instructions given to the committee when it was appointed.



# Portales competition should be good test for Ruidoso

In case anyone hears some loud rumbings from the north this weekend, don't worry, it's not an earthquake.

It'll probably just be some college basketball fans whooping it up at the University of New Mexico (UNM) arena in Albuquerque, as they watch the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) championships.

The University of Houston (UH), North Carolina State University (NCSU), the University of Georgia (UG) and the University of Louisville (UL) are the lucky final four.

In semi-final action Saturday, NCSU will tangle with Georgia in a battle of surprising teams at 1:30 p.m., while Louisville and the favored Cougars from Houston will go at it afterwards. The finals will be Monday.

I see the top-ranked Cougars going all the way and bringing an NCAA championship back to the Lone Star state.

Houston has everything, including an outstanding defense, a 25-game winning streak and a seven-foot center from Nigeria who had never touched a basketball until 1979.

The Cougars have one of the tallest teams in the country, and it showed in the Midwestern Regional championship against Villanova.

Houston blocked 13 shots and had 11 slam dunks, something that's sure to give the other three teams at Albuquerque something to think about.

Actually, Louisville has the best chance of beating the Cougars. The 32-3 Cardinals have good height and talent plus tournament experience.

Louisville won the NCAA championship in 1980 and is a traditional powerhouse.

The Bulldogs and North Carolina State are Cinderella teams. This is Georgia's FIRST-EVER trip to the NCAA tournament, while the Wolfpack survived the rugged Atlantic Coast Conference, probably the toughest conference in the country.

Georgia looked very impressive in defeating the defending NCAA champion University of North Carolina Tar Heels Sunday. They showed both speed and depth. Georgia looks strong enough to beat the Wolfpack Saturday and advance to Monday's finals.

So it looks like a Houston-Georgia finale.

The Cougars are the logical favorite, but logical favorites don't always win in the NCAA tournament. Still, Houston should pull out the championship, beating Georgia by about 10 points.

But the biggest winners of the tournament should be the citizens of Albuquerque and New Mexico in general.

If the seats at the UNM "Pit" are completely filled, and the reception Albuquerque gives the tournament is positive, it will probably increase the Duke City's chances of getting a return NCAA engagement fairly soon.

And who knows? It might even pave the way for a National Basketball Association franchise to come to Albuquerque.

New Mexico basketball fans have flocked to the state high school tournament for many years, and there's no reason why they won't show the same enthusiasm this weekend.

The Ruidoso High School boys track team will get a better idea of how it stands in the AAA division when it competes in the Portales Invitational Saturday at Portales High School.

The meet will start at 10 a.m. Ruidoso's girls will not compete and will be idle until Friday and Saturday, April 8-9. They will compete in the Dexter Invitational.

The Warrior boys competed in the White Sands Invitational in Alamogordo last Saturday against mostly AAAA division schools and found the going rough, scoring just one point.

However, the Portales Invitational will have mainly AAA division and AA division schools competing.

"Our lineup will be basically the same as last week except for a few guys who are on vacation," Warrior head coach Ronnie Maskew said. "Steve Snidow and Mark Johnston are the only ones I know for sure who won't be able to make the meet."

Snidow is a sprinter and Johnston is a 400-meter runner and long jumper. Cisco Bob will probably be the War-

riors' top hope for a first-place medal. The talented sophomore was fifth in the 1,500 meters last week with a 4:13.29 time, good enough to break his own school record.

"I think Cisco will have a good chance of winning the 1,500 meters," Maskew said. "He'll probably have the fastest time entering the meet."

Bob has a strong kick and almost finished fourth in last weekend's meet. He took fourth in the state AAA division meet last year with a strong kick at the end, getting a 4:17.3 time.

Bob will probably run on the sprint medley relay also. He ran the 800-meter anchor leg in that event last week as Ruidoso finished third in its heat with a 3:53.0 time. Maskew was disappointed with that time but thinks the Warriors can improve on it.

Freshmen Ivan Scott and David Ordeica along with sophomores David Landrum and Francisco Olivera should give the Warriors plenty of depth in the distance races.

Brothers Curt and Kip McClellan are slated to compete in the 800 meters and 400 meters, respectively.

Grady Williamson, Mike Douglass and Eric Strobel form a solid group of sprinters for the Warriors. They will probably run three or four relay events at Portales.

Williamson ran the 100 meters in 11.15 last season and recorded an 11.85 time at Alamogordo against a strong wind. He is also strong in the 200 meters.

Strobel ran a 12.16 100 meters last weekend and should improve considerably the rest of the season. Douglass is the Warriors' top 400-meter man.

Freshmen Bobby Dickinson, Mike Williamson and Russell Easter join sophomore Wade Proctor as a promising group of sprinters.

The young foursome ran a 48.2 in the 400-meter relay at Alamogordo and should get faster as the season goes along.

Easter, Manuel Montano and Chris Wynn will go in the hurdles again. Easter will probably run the 300-meter low hurdles while Montano and Wynn are scheduled to compete in the 100-meter high hurdles. Montano ran a 19.5 last weekend in his

first-ever attempt at the hurdles. The Warriors have a host of young athletes in field events like the shot put, discus and long jump.

Senior Chris Sanchez and sophomore George Gresham have thrown the shot put in the 55-foot area during the early season and practice. They could equal or pass 40 feet soon. Freshman Chip Ramsey should also continue to improve in both the shot put and discus.

Easter is a potential standout in the long jump.

Maskew sees Artesia High School as the meet favorite.

"They're strong and they won a meet at Jal recently," he said. "They competed against mostly AAA and AA schools but they had some very good times."

Other teams which could compete at Portales include defending AAA division state champion Lovington High School, Tucuman High School and Jal High School.

Last year's meet was cancelled because of high winds, but the weather is supposed to be good Saturday.

## Tigers compete at Hagerman

The Capitan High School track team is competing in the Hagerman Invitational today after coming through with an impressive performance in the Fox Relays at Fort Sumner last Saturday.

Capitan's boys squad scored 19 points in last Saturday's meet, the best the Tigers have done at the Fox Relays in several years.

Tim McElhannon led the Tiger performers with a second-place effort of 152 feet in the javelin.

Junior Todd Proctor placed fifth in the pole vault with a 10-6 effort and was third in the discus with a 135-foot toss. Defending state A division high jump champion Robert Parker cleared 5-11 in his specialty for third place. Parker has been bothered by a bad back.

Senior Paul Sullivan finished third in the 200 meters with a 24.5 time and also ran on the Tiger 400-meter relay squad which finished third. Other members of the relay team were David Beavers, Danny Cummins and McElhannon. Beavers also finished fourth in the 100 meters with an 11.5

clocking. Tiger boys coach Mel Holland was especially pleased with McElhannon's efforts.

"His javelin toss was really good," Holland said. "I'm not sure if that would be good enough to win state, Hagerman's got a couple of guys who have thrown it over 170 feet."

Richardson, who works at First Federal Savings in Ruidoso, is one of several coaches who take time off from other activities to coach the Little League teams. None of the coaches are paid for their efforts.

Richardson also competes in the Wednesday Night Mixed Bowling League, coaches a women's softball team and plays on a men's softball team. He also played basketball at Ruidoso High School and Hondo School.

Another coach is Dr. T. T. Marquardt.

"What I like best about coaching Little League basketball is being able to teach the child to be satisfied with only the best from himself," Marquardt said.

Marquardt coaches the Pioneer Savings team which is currently 4-2 on the season. The doctor is in his third year of coaching and has played both basketball and softball in recreation leagues.

Sonny Candelaria is the coach of the Roundup Realty squad which has a 1-3 record.

"I like the challenge most of all," Candelaria said. "It's a lot of fun to teach young kids how to play basketball. That's why I do it."

Candelaria has also been involved with the Little League program for several years. Before this season, he helped Lynn Willard coach a Minor Division team.

## Inside the Outdoors

April 1, 1983 marks the beginning of a new license year for the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. Anyone fishing in New Mexico waters or hunting within the state on this date and for the next year must have in their possession a 1983-84 license. In addition, anyone buying a new license will find that there has been an increase in cost.

The 1983 New Mexico State

Legislature voted to raise the price of hunting and fishing privileges in the state for the upcoming year. The following list is the new price schedule and includes all vendor and application fees.

### RESIDENT HUNTING

Deer, \$19; general hunting, \$22.50; general hunting and fishing, \$28; bear, fall turkey, spring turkey and cougar, \$10.50; antelope and javelina, \$23; elk, bighorn sheep, and Barbary

sheep, \$38; oryx, \$48; ibex, \$28; small game (squirrels and game birds other than turkey), \$9.50; fur dealer's and trapper's, \$10.50; junior trapper (12 to 17 years of age), \$5.25; senior and handicapped general hunting, \$11; and additional deer tag, \$5.25.

### NON RESIDENT HUNTING

Deer, \$14; bear and spring turkey, \$78; fall turkey, cougar, and small game, \$51; antelope, \$123; elk, \$213; bighorn sheep, \$373; Barbary sheep, \$303; oryx and ibex, \$503; javelina, \$103; fur dealer and additional deer tag, \$51; trapper's, \$301; nongame, \$26.

### FISHING

Resident season license, \$8.50, with trout validation \$14; junior-senior and handicapped (not issued to nonresidents), \$1.50, with trout validation \$4.50; nonresident season license, \$18.50, with trout validation \$25.50; one-day and five-day licenses (same for both resident and nonresident), \$5.25 and \$10.50 respectively, with trout validation \$8.50 and \$15 respectively.

One major change in the basic license structure made by the legislature pertains to big game licenses. In the coming year, both resident and nonresident hunters will have to purchase a separate license for each of these species. One other change of importance was the elimination of a nonresident bow license. This year non resident bow hunters will have to buy a regular nonresident deer license stratified for bow.

There are hunts beginning in April on three big game species and since proclamations have not been received from the printers at this time, I would like to give you these dates: bear and cougar, April 1 to June 30, 1983; spring turkey April 16 to May 1, 1983.

In addition, most fishing waters are open as of April 1, 1983, so remember to buy a new 1983-84 hunting or fishing license before going out. The price of a license is much less than the fine for being caught without one.

## Fishing season opens at Bonito Lake Friday

Fishing season at Bonito Lake opens Friday and will continue through November 31.

A fishing license with a trout validation (required at Bonito Lake) costs \$14 for a resident of New Mexico. Non-residents must pay \$25.50 for a license with a trout validation. Children under 12 are not required to have a

license. Only one pole is allowed per fisherman.

There is a bag limit of eight rainbow trout. Fishermen can have a total of 18 trout in their possession, but at least eight must be brown or brook trout.

Bonito Lake is about 15 miles from Ruidoso, off Highway 37. There are signs pointing to the lake.

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
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# Better eating habits = better health

It seems the once exalted "fat of the land" has taken residence around America's swelling waistline.

And it poses a growing national health problem, according to a spokesperson for the Southeastern New Mexico District Dietetic Association.

Rosine Stout, Alto, registered dietitian and public relations chairman for the area organization, says her group is campaigning for better eating habits during National Nutrition Month activities throughout March.

"We hope to help the public help themselves in learning the benefits of proper diet," the nutrition consultant and exercise instructor said.

She said professional dietitians are emphasizing that obesity stemming from poor eating habits is responsible for the development of numerous related health woes.

"Many southeast New Mexicans, through years of improper diet and inactivity, are 20 to 40 pounds overweight by middle age," Stout said.

She said those wishing to improve diets often have to overcome family

and cultural tradition, socio-economic habits and their own misconceptions about nutrition and weight loss.

"Hidden fats" are a major foe in area citizens' battle with the bathroom scales," according to Stout.

"Most people in this country are overnourished due to high consumption of fatty foods," she said.

Stout pointed out that although most families attempt to plan for and purchase nutritional grocery items, the habitual addition of items like potato chips and ice cream spells dietary trouble.

"It really isn't more expensive to eat properly," she said. "The problem lies in the purchase of foods we have traditionally learned to favor — those high in fats and refined sugars."

Stout said low income families can have nutritious balanced diets through food purchase planning, and the substitution of fruit for sweets and "junk items" like potato chips. She also suggests planting small gardens to supplement carbohydrate intake with fresh vegetables.

"Education is the key," the dietitian said. "Families must learn to

recognize the basic food groups and plan meals around them." She said local dietitians, family physicians and county health officials are available to assist both individuals and families with diet planning and nutrition education.

Stout added that low income individuals aren't the only ones prone to be overweight yet undernourished.

"Fast-paced living has its drawbacks, too," she said. "Many professional people — those with higher education and the financial ability to consume a quality diet — often abuse nutritional needs because of their lifestyles."

She said eating in restaurants — the bane of many businessmen — can result in high caloric intake due to hidden fats used in food preparation.

"You have to be choosy if you want to be healthy," Stout said. "Restaurants and fast food services can differ vastly in quality of preparation and menu diversity."

She said a balanced diet can be achieved when eating out by finding restaurants that serve cafeteria-style meals and by shying away from those featuring the deep-fat fryer.

"And business people need to increase activity — simply get more exercise," she said. "It's imperative that sedentary people adopt a program of jogging, playing racquetball, or whatever. Just anything to get the metabolic rate up and burn off those unused calories."

Stout pointed out she knew many business people who prepared high nutrition, low-calorie lunches featuring carrots, celery, cheese, yogurt, sunflower seeds, etcetera — bypassing the local greasy spoon or the traditional brown-bagged bologna-and-white-bread sandwich.

"It's so easy to simply substitute a low-fat meat like turkey for the bologna, and more nutritious whole-wheat for white bread," she said. "But for many the former is simply a matter of habit — they were raised on it. We've just got to educate ourselves to the problems that arise from these habits."

And what are the problems? Stout said a poor diet, combined with ten

excess pounds, affects an individual's stamina, produces mental and physical sluggishness, and causes blood sugar imbalances that can result in sometimes volatile emotional highs and lows.

"We can bypass those mental and emotional 'slumps' by simply eating correctly and getting the proper amount of exercise," she said.

The nutritionist also stressed that proper diet is also essential to those with jobs requiring physical labor.

"The laborer may burn more calories, but he or she still must balance those calories with proper nutrition," she said. "If not, mental lapses often occur — a particular problem in high-risk activities."

She said blood sugar problems particularly prevail among young children, who are often rewarded with sweets for good behavior.

"Mothers need to start children early on fruit and fruit juice as substitutes for sweets," Stout said. Recent research has disclosed that many behavior and learning disorders can be attributed to diet.

"Our association — and we're supported by medical research — feels that poor nutrition is our number one health problem," she said. "It's not a problem we can cure overnight, but through education we can certainly make improvement."

Stout said local nutritionists are available to help people adapt lifestyles and proper dietary habits.

"Most people are aware they are overweight and subsist on improper diets. But many are simply too lazy to do anything about it," she said. "Like anything else beneficial in our lives, proper nutrition requires self-discipline. There are no wonder diets, no quick cures."

Help is available through local nutrition counseling, Stout emphasized. She pointed out the only available alternative to proper nutrition is poor health. And synonymous with poor health is an unhappy life.

"That's why during March we're calling attention to better nutrition," Stout said. "It's simply a matter of life itself."

## Hospital adjusts ER prices

In a time when spiraling hospital costs have been leading the inflationary cycle, Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital is countering that trend by lowering its prices.

In response to feedback from the community, the hospital will charge less for visits to the emergency room beginning April 1, announced hospital administrator Ken Moore.

At the same time, the hospital will require payment before treatment from patients with non-emergency medical cases who come to the emergency room for treatment.

Moore said the move is an effort "to be responsive to the needs of the community." He explained that he has heard numerous complaints about the high charges for emergency room treatment.

The reduced charges will be financed by a reduction in uncollected bills, said Moore. At this point, the hospital writes off \$10,000 worth of bad debts for outpatients each month, said business office manager Jim Killian. Unpaid emergency room bills make up the bulk of this loss.

The hospital must charge higher prices to the paying patients to make up for the uncollected fees, said Moore.

The requirement of payment at the time of the treatment for non-emergency cases is "an effort" to reduce the bad debts, he added. Other arrangements for treatment will be made for those non-emergency patients who cannot pay at the time of appearance at the emergency room, said Moore.

Moore noted that many people come into the emergency room with nagging colds, in need of routine allergy shots or under other non-emergency conditions. These people will be required to pay at the time of treatment.

The hospital staff will use a Medicare definition of a medical emergency — "a condition which develops unexpectedly and requires immediate medical attention to prevent the death or serious impairment of the health of the individual."

"Examples of possible medical emergencies are: asthmatic attack,

stroke, overdoses, convulsions, acute coronary, possible heart attack, hemorrhage, coma, severe epistaxis (nosebleed) and acute hysteria."


Charges will be reduced for three of the five categories of visits to the emergency room. Minimal service visits, which do not necessarily require the presence of a physician, will remain at \$15.

Brief visits, requiring a brief history and limited physical examination or discussion of findings and/or treatment, will be reduced from \$40 to \$25. Intermediate visits, requiring x-ray or laboratory tests, will cost \$45, down from \$65. Intermediate visits are the most common, said Moore.

Extended visits requiring such actions as cast applications and multiple layer lacerations will be reduced from \$90 to \$65.

Trauma visits involving major trauma or cardiac arrest will remain at \$120.

Moore emphasized the lowered charges are experimental and can be raised if the new policies do not reduce the unpaid bills.



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# Motel conversion further complicated

Proposed developers of the Apache Village motel again are asking the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) to approve conversion of the business into townhomes.

The commission will consider the request at its regular meeting Monday, starting at 9:30 a.m. at village hall.

The motel is located on Mechem Drive across from Bennett's Supermarket. Developers propose to convert log cabin buildings at the motel into 20 townhomes.

The conversion request has twice been turned down by the commission. When it was first proposed in September 1982, village fire officials pointed out secondary fire exits would have to be enlarged in each of the cabins to conform with the Uniform Fire Code.

In addition, the commission denied the request because of nonconformity with parking requirements for multi-family housing.

The conversion again was turned down in February because the cabins were not in compliance. The developer had proposed to bring the cabins up to code, but wanted a guarantee the conversion would subsequently be approved.

The commission indicated it could not give conditional approval which essentially relied on future townhome owners to make required improvements on the cabins.

Attorney Sharon Mitchell, representing the proposed developers out of San Angelo, Texas, indicated this week her clients' position has not changed.

Mitchell said the developers do not want to invest a lot of money into the project without some assurance the conversion will pass.

"As far as I know, they don't intend to buy unless they can convert it," Mitchell said.

Mitchell added the developers want a specific idea of what would be required for the conversion.

Fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy and building inspector Don Hendricks inspected each of the cabins last month and drafted a list of 11 improvements needed to bring them into compliance with the uniform fire and building codes.

The list was sent to P&Z chairman John Schuller and Mitchell early this week.

In addition to the previous requirements, the inspectors addressed several items needed not only for the conversion but for the present use of the cabins.

Included on the list of requirements

are: smoke detectors and fire extinguishers for each unit; spark arrestors on chimneys and raising the height of the chimneys; occupancy loads of the cabins; and fire resistance ratings of exterior walls.

Also on the list are provisions from the codes regarding square footage minimums for multi-family units and distance of access drives from each building.

Regarding the fire provisions, Cuddy said he told the owners "those items should be corrected immediately" whether or not the use of the cabins changes.

Pointing to the nonconformity on the chimney heights and the absence of spark arrestors, smoke detectors and fire extinguishers, Cuddy said the cabins now pose a danger to any occupants.

Cuddy said he asked the owners to make the improvements, but that he did not threaten charges if corrections are not made.

One of the owners contacted at the motel refused to comment about the issue.

Mitchell indicated she does not know the position of the proposed developers in light of the additional safety provisions, which were released Monday.

Also on Monday's P&Z agenda are: —Public hearing on rezoning several lots along north Mechem Drive from commercial to light commercial. The lots, being rezoned under administrative review of commercial property, are in Forest Heights subdivision, Alto Crest, the Airport West subdivisions and the Blaugrund Tracts.

—Public hearing on rezoning property on the northwest corner of Highway 70 and Mesalero Drive from commercial to light commercial. The site is known as the Camelot Mountain Tracts 1, 2, 3 and 4.

—Request for side lot line variance on part of Lots 18 and 19, Block 7, in Palmer Gateway for Lester Eubank.

—Request for front and back lot line variances on Lot 12, Block 16, in Town and Country North Units 1 and 2 for Bradley Williams.

—Request for side and front lot line variances on Lot 10, Block 4, in Pinecliff for Betty Dunn Hartnup.

—Request for side lot line variance on Lot 3, Block 3, in White Mountain Unit 4 for James Larkin.

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
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
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## The Silver Lining

My Anna Lee, a Kentucky-bred, was ridden by Danny Summerow for his first victory after being sidelined since last summer at Ruidoso Downs. She's trained by Jose L. Dominguez for owner Thomas B. Badgett of Fort Lauderdale, Texas.

**THE HIGHLY REGARDED DRACONIC SHIP** made his racing debut a winning one when he scampered to a five-length victory in Friday's opening race. The two-year-old Draconic gelding was timed in :46 4/5, one of the fastest four-furlong readings here in recent years and just one second off the track record of :44 4/5 set by Tamran's Jet more than 15 years ago. Ridden by Larry Byers, the New Mexico-bred speedster is trained by Clifton Dean for owner

Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas. As a 7-10-wagering favorite, Draconic Ship returned \$3.40 to win.

**OAKLAWN PARK INVADER MISS MARY LU**, who won two races last spring at Sunland Park, returned to the west El Paso track and captured a head victory in Friday's featured race under an astute ride by veteran jockey Joe Martinez. The four-year-old Golden Ruler filly was in front throughout the five and one-half furlong allowance dash as Martinez hung close to the rail and rated her perfectly so she had just enough left at the end to withstand a closing bid by Northern Martini. After she left Sunland Park last May, she ran three times at Louisiana Downs in Bossier City, Louisiana, and then competed twice this spring at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas. The Kentucky-bred runner is trained by L. Caly Dissler for owner John M. Dissler of Rocksprings, Texas.

**MARK HARPER WAS THE** March recipient of the Barn-Of-The-Month award presented each month by the Horsewomen United. The blanket was donated by the Sunset Acres of El Paso.

**APPRENTICE RIDER DALE CORDOVA** suffered an injured arm as the result of a spill during Saturday's eighth race. Cordova was riding Bit Of Sovereign, who broke down about the three-eighths pole, throwing Cordova to the ground. He was forced to take off the remainder of his mounts on Saturday as well as his entire riding assignments on Sunday. Cordova has enjoyed a fine meeting at Sunland Park, holding fourth place in the rider standings.

**SUNLAND PARK WELCOMED BRUCE BRINKLEY** back to the stewards' stand on Friday. The popular official had missed several weeks of work due to an apparent heart attack. Former official John Phillips had served for Brinkley in his absence. Brinkley is a former standout rider who competed successfully at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

**TRAINER CLIFFORD LAMBERT SADDLED** two winners on Saturday's program, marking the sixth time this season the veteran conditioner has accomplished the feat. He won the seventh with Royal Family (\$4.80) for owner Leroy Spres Jr. of Snyder, Texas, and then captured the twelfth with Winds Of The East (\$5.80), whom he owns. Son Casey Lambert rode both victors.

**BORN TO LEAD SNAPPED** a seasonal fastest time while winning his third consecutive race during Saturday's 11th event. The five-year-old Mr. Leader horse raced to a rapid 1:38 clocking while winning a mile event for allowance horses. That was 2/5 seconds better than the previous standard this season of 1:38 2/5 set by Draconic's Lady and Fabulous Too.

The New Jersey-bred horse started his streak by winning a mile allowance at Sunland Park on January 15 and then drew clear for a two-length win in the El Paso Time Handicap at one mile on March 6. He has won three of his last four races for owner-trainer Al J. McClain of Boone, Colorado. Louie Gomez rode him to his first win in the streak and Richard Bickel has been aboard for the last two.

**HEAT WAVE JR AND RYDERS ROYALET** returned the season's highest quinella payoff when they ran one-two in Sunday's third race at 350 yards. Heat Wave Jr, ridden by Leroy Coombs, returned \$45.50 to win as a \$21.80-1 outsider while Ryders Royalett, ridden by Victor Escobar as a 25-1 risk ran second. The 2-8 combination paid \$1,199.60. The season's previous biggest quinella was a \$702.40 return on Jay Em Jay and Bugsway on March 13.

**WISTFUL EYE SCOOTED** to a three-length victory in Sunday's fourth race at four furlongs. The Scout Leader filly was clocked in :45 4/5, just one second off the track record. Making her first track appearance, Wistful Eye was ridden by

Casey Lambert for trainer Clifford C. Lambert and owner Leroy Spres of Snyder, Texas. As a 7-5 wagering favorite, Wistful Eye paid \$4.80 to win.

**STACKS BLUEJET SET** A SEASONAL fastest time while winning her third straight race during Saturday's West Texas Futurity Consolation over 330 yards. Aided by a brisk tailwind, the Easy Jet filly zoomed to a 16.69 clocking, eclipsing the 16.81 set by Windy City Queen while winning her trial race on March 11. Ridden by Larry Chavez, Stacks Bluejet tallied a half-length win over Honeymoon Suite. The filly broke her maiden on February 13 at Sunland Park, then won her trial race on March 11 before Saturday's victory which was worth \$7,097.98. The New Mexico-bred dasher is trained by Robert Esquibel for Ancol Farms of East Lansing, Michigan. As the 3-2 wagering favorite, Stacks Bluejet returned \$5.00.

**TRAINER FRANK CAPPELLUCI** saddled two winners on Sunday's card. He started with Never Love (\$8.60) in the ninth and then won the twelfth with Duke Of Balsamo (\$5.80). Both horses are owned by Warren N. Moore of Wagon Mound and both were ridden by Larry Byers.

**THE WAGERING EQUIPMENT** was really humming over the weekend as the three-day total hit \$1,184,249. That was a gain of 14.16 percent over the same three-day weekend a year ago (which was also the weekend of the West Texas Futurity). The big weekend pushed the seasonal daily average up to \$342,245 and kept the '82-'83 season on course toward another record year. At this point a year ago, the average was \$334,030. The current figure is a gain of 2.46 percent.

## Easily A Twelve kayos her foes

Easily A Twelve delivered a knockout blow in the final half of Sunday's West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park and rolled to a powerful one and one-fourth length victory.

The filly picked up her third straight win against no defeats and enriched her money line by \$82,809.

The ease of the triumph stamped Easily A Twelve as one to watch in the Triple Crown races at Ruidoso Downs during the summer.

Easily A Twelve, a filly by Easy Dozen out of Mayshego, is owned by the partnership of Don Farris of Sunland Park and Don E. Keith of Bakersfield, California. Farris is the trainer. Jerry Nicodemus does the riding.

The gross purse of the West Texas Futurity (including the consolation) was \$238,899. The amount disbursed in the finale alone was \$202,056.

Easily A Twelve was coupled in the wagering with Jest Real Easy (who finished fifth) and handed out mutual payoffs of \$9.60, \$3.60 and \$2.20. The filly was a pound overweight and packed 121.

Warm Thoughts, ridden by Jacky Martin for Jon F. Brannon of Choctaw, Oklahoma, finished second in a game try and earned \$87,855. The payoffs: \$3.80, \$2.40. Warm Thoughts carried odds of nearly 3-1.

The odds-on favorite, Windy City Queen, had to rally out of fifth place in order to salvage third. The filly was never in position to threaten the two leaders. She was a half-length behind Warm Thoughts at the wire.

Windy City Queen was piloted by Gary Sumpter (at 122 pounds) for the partnership of William Gahlberg and James Kelly of Oak Brook, Illinois. Third place was worth \$19,401. The show payoff was \$2.10.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in, with purse money earned: 4th — Jets Joy Deck, \$10,173; 5th — Jest Real Easy, \$9,227; 6th — Feature Going, \$8,590; 7th — Like A Haint, \$8,754; 8th — Moons Lady Levi,

\$8,517. Moons Lady Levi actually hit the finish in sixth place, but was disqualified and placed eighth. There were two scratches: Call It Charisma (also owned by the Farris-Keith partnership) and Really And Truly. Each earned \$8,162.

Easily A Twelve, who went into the West Texas finale with the eighth best qualifying time of 17.07 seconds, improved on that clocking considerably in the finale. She was timed in 16.71. A tail wind was blowing.

Warm Thoughts broke on top and quickly snared a short lead. Easily A Twelve immediately settled in second place. Somewhere around the midway point, Easily A Twelve shifted into overdrive and literally took off. The filly was pulling away with overpowering strides in the final portions of the dash.

Windy City Queen broke a bit sluggishly, found herself in fifth place, and remained out of striking distance the rest of the way.

The filly went into the finale with the top qualifying time and a spotless record of two-for-two.

In the post-race interview, Jockey Nicodemus was high in his praise of Easily A Twelve. "This filly is just as good as anything I've ever ridden as a two-year-old, at this state of the

game," he said. "I wasn't worried at all in this race, I knew we had it all the way."

Trainer Farris put in: "This is the first horse I've raised and won a futurity with. It's a great feeling. It was also a great feeling to qualify three horses for the West Texas Futurity. But it was something of a problem — I didn't know which one to root for. Easily A Twelve broke perfectly, although she drifted out a bit."

Farris indicated the filly's next engagement would come at Ruidoso Downs in the trials for the \$750,000 (estimated) Kansas Futurity, the first leg of the Triple Crown.

Here's the way they qualified: Windy City Queen, 16.81; Jets Joy Deck, 16.96; Warm Thoughts, 16.97; Call It Charisma, 16.98; Like A Haint, 17.01; Jest Real Easy, 17.01; Really And Truly, 17.07; Easily A Twelve, 17.07; Moons Lady Levi, 17.08; Feature Going, 17.08.

The West Texas Futurity traditionally stimulates one of the largest handles of the season. This edition was no exception, as 3,758 fans wagered \$469,777, which was the second-best handle of the season and a gain of nearly 10 percent over the handle on West Texas Futurity day last year.

outsider, Northern Martini. Miss Mary Lu had enough in reserve to hold off the challenge, covering the five and one-half furlongs in 1:06 1/5 seconds and refunding mutual payoffs of \$3.60, \$3.80 and \$2.60.

The winner is owned by John Dissler of Rocksprings, Texas. Joe Martinez was up. Northern Martini, handled by O. A. Martinez Jr., returned \$5.80 and \$4.20. All The Reasons got in third under Pedro Benitez and paid \$4.60.

## Jake Cascio has new Sail On Bunny?

The greatest experience of Jake Cascio's life began exactly one year ago.

The date: March 28, 1982. The place: Sunland Park. The occasion: the finale of the \$21,576 West Texas Quarter Horse Futurity.

Cascio, now 76 and still going strong, had an 11-1 outsider in that West Texas Futurity a year ago. The colt hacked out a gutsy head victory — and went on to earn nearly \$1 million before hanging up his running shoes and becoming the centerpiece of a \$4½ million syndication package.

That colt, called Sail On Bunny, was the champion Cascio had been waiting 55 years for. He describes that '82 campaign this way: "It was just like a dream."

After winning the West Texas, Cascio took Sail On Bunny to the West Coast, where both Cascio and the colt kept themselves busy winning races — and also becoming the darlings of the West Coast media. Sail On Bunny won the Kindergarten Futurity, the Skool Dash For Cash Futurity, and was second in the Faberge Special Effort Futurity by a nose — after stumbling at the start.

"He had more heart than any horse I've ever seen," Cascio now says. "No matter how sore he was, he'd run. It took a lot of work to get him ready, but you knew you had something that could run."

Cascio's acquaintance with Sail On Bunny began when he spotted him in

the 1981 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. The yearling had been raised by Jake Box, who'd sold a half-interest to Ray Starbuck. The two are farmers in Clovis. Cascio told the two owners: "Look, this horse can be a runner. Don't take less than \$10,000 for him. You don't have to let me train the horse, but for goodness sake, don't give him away!"

The two owners came to their senses, repurchased their horse for \$10,000, and wound up with one of the most valuable properties in recent quarter horse history. The financial spillover has also fallen liberally on Cascio. His share of the victory purses amounted to around \$100,000. In addition, he also got five percent of the syndication price — which amounts to a comfy \$45,000 per year for five years.

There's also another fringe benefit: Cascio gets two breedings per year to Sail On Bunny. Currently, a breeding is priced in the \$5,000 to \$7,500.

Perhaps the most fascinating aspect of all this is that Cascio stood a big chance to win the 1983 West Texas Futurity, which came up Sunday. His contender this time was Windy City Queen. Two weeks ago, she hardly raised a sweat while winning her trial heat by three and one-fourths lengths and setting the top qualifying time. Cascio got his first look at the filly last October, when Bill Gahlberg and James Kelly (businessmen in Illinois) shipped her to Cascio for breaking

and training. "Everybody looked at her and picked her for a racehorse," Cascio recalls. "Everytime we worked her, she showed a lot of run. She's got good conformation and she's well bred. I had an idea she could be something special."

Did Cascio start to think he had another Sail On Bunny in the making? "You bet," he replies. "Me and the groom, both!" Optimism really soared after that impressive trial win two weeks ago.

But Cascio is still keeping a level head. He says: "It's too early to tell how good she might be. And you never know how many other really good horses might be coming along."

After that trial victory, Cascio was approached by another owner: "Would you take \$400,000 for her?" Before Cascio could shake his head, the man added: "If that's not enough, give me a price you'd take."

Cascio relayed the message to Gahlberg, who pointed out: a) he wasn't interested in setting a price. b) he didn't want to sell.

After the West Texas Futurity, where Windy City Queen took third, the battleplan calls for a shot at Sunland's Sun Country Futurity, then it's on to California for the Kindergarten and Skool Dash For Cash. At summer's end, though, Cascio will ship to Ruidoso Downs for a crack at the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity. "I've been wanting to win that race for 23 years," he says.

## Stacks Blujet West Texas Futurity Consolation winner

Stacks Blujet, part of a three-horse entry owned by Ancol Farms of East Lansing, Michigan, pounded out a half-length win in the March 26 Consolation of the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park.

The 330-yard duel offered a purse of \$4,543 and awarded \$7,097 to the winner.

Sunland patrons made the three-horse combine of Stacks Blujet, Dashes Eagle and Cash Stub a 3-2 wagering choice in the 10-head field.

## Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — If you like soap opera, you'll love the Corporation Commission.

That could be a new bumper sticker, in light of the latest developments in that agency.

It would be a kind of clown-show if it weren't so serious.

Latest brouhaha there, after a series of previous wanderings from common sense over a variety of causes, has to do with who signed what order.

In a case of one of the state's telephone companies, which was granted a 53 percent rate increase, Commission Chairman Eric Serna and Commissioner John Elliott claim the vote on the matter was two to one, with Elliott and Commissioner Jimmie Glenn for the raise, and Serna against it.

Not so, says Glenn. He claims he didn't vote in the matter.

Serna and Elliott claim he voted by proxy, with his vote cast by Commission attorney Wayne Shirley.

That seems to be clearly reflected in the record — but from then on nothing much else is clear.

Plainly, Glenn wasn't at the meeting. He is not noted for his loyal attendance. If he is at 10 percent of the average hearing, that's about his normal level.

Glenn claims he bases his decisions on a close perusal of the record — which would be more plausible if the transcripts of the hearings were delivered before the decisions are made. They seldom are.

Now we have Shirley, who may or may not have voted in Glenn's place, saying he didn't do that. He may get a chance to swear to that in a court of

law, since Glenn has taken steps toward instituting a suit against his fellow Commissioners in the matter.

Gist of the whole problem would seem to be that Glenn thought Serna was going to vote for the raise to Continental Telephone. He presumed the vote would be unanimous.

When, an hour or so after the signing, he learned Serna had gone the other way, he tried to get off the hook himself.

Unfortunately, there is no provision for that in law, so Glenn had to go the trouble-making route — one which he sometimes seems to love unduly.

What we have now is an order that was signed only by Elliott, and hence is of doubtful validity (it takes two Commissioners to tango), a disagreement which is being played up in all the media, and a potential lawsuit between three grown men who are expected to be able to settle their problems quietly.

It's as if one of the Supreme Court justices filed suit against the other members of that body.

There's no way anybody can win this one.

Already the Commission has been made to look embarrassingly crude and clumsy.

Wayne Shirley has resigned his post with them, to move over to the Attorney General's office.

And Joe Mercer, soft-spoken man of peace, who has apparently been selected to be Glenn's attorney, may rue the day he agreed to take that case.

When men choose to act like children, not much good will come of it.

It's no wonder citizens lose confidence in some parts of government.

One of the more serious problems facing our state is illegal drug smuggling across our southern border.

Our miles upon miles of isolated desert in southern New Mexico provide a haven for low-flying planes carrying narcotics to sweep into our country undetected.

The problem is certainly not limited to New Mexico. The entire southern tier of states from California to Florida is experiencing this dangerous menace. It seems as though the minute one smuggling area is closed off, another is opened in an adjoining state.

That is why I have joined with Senator Dennis DeConcini (D-Arizona) to form the Senate Border Enforcement Caucus.

Just as a coordination of drug and other law enforcement activities is needed in our executive branch, a bipartisan coalition of senators from the southern border states holding key committee positions can help coordinate the legislative and budget costs of tackling this huge problem that exists on our southern borders.

This caucus will be able to form a truly bipartisan forum for problems of law enforcement that know no party lines. It will be able to review administration and congressional initiatives to improve border law enforcement and focus national attention on the continuing war on drug smuggling.

There are several issues the Senate

Border Enforcement Caucus hopes to address when it meets sometime after Easter. The first is how the military can assist border law enforcement efforts.

Our military's sophisticated radar systems would be of immense aid to the limited resources of the Drug Enforcement Administration, the U. S. Customs Service and the FBI. Being able to tie in to one or more of the military's tracking systems would make these current limited resources go a long way toward reducing the flow of illegal drugs and contraband.

Another area we must address is the type of legislation needed to improve border law enforcement efforts.

Finally, we must address all these needs on the basis of what we can realistically pay for in our national budget. While we want to stop the flow of illegal drugs and contraband, we must come up with programs that work and are cost-effective and not just throw money at the problem.

Senator DeConcini and myself have invited all southern border state Senators to join us in this bipartisan caucus to help find solutions to this ever-growing national problem. United in its goal, the Senate Border Enforcement Caucus will be a strong force supporting corrective legislation and initiatives to plug the holes through which smugglers gain access to our country.

### Editorial

District Judge Jack Love of Albuquerque has received a lot of attention for his plan to put "electronic handcuffs" on probationers.

Having tested the device himself, he was all set to try it out on an offender, but the state Supreme Court directed him to hold off until its justices know more about the program.

When one considers the ramifications of "electronic handcuffs," it is clear the court was justified in wanting more information.

Miniature radio transmitters strapped to a probationer send a signal over phone lines to a computer. The computer records the times the probationer leaves the immediate vicinity of his phone, so a probation officer can monitor whether terms of the probation are being met.

Cost of the electronic monitoring would be about \$14 a day (paid by the probationer) as opposed to the \$55 a day cost of detention in the county jail (paid by the taxpayers).

It makes sense to apply technology in this area of the criminal justice system, especially as it costs more to keep an inmate in a penitentiary than to send a student to Harvard.

But could "electronic handcuffs" lead to video monitors in the home, or the potential for use of such devices on non-criminal citizens? Shades of Big Brother?

Judge Love may one day be regarded as a pioneer. But the questions raised by his device merit a thorough public dialogue, as well as consideration by the courts.—TP

## Reporter's Round

Clark Carpenter, owner of Dan Dee Cabins and president of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA), has long been famous in this town for his support of a ski vacation package. He believes that a convenient and economically attractive package of hotel rooms, lift tickets and ski rentals could attract more skiers to Ruidoso, especially during the slow mid-week period.

In light of his well-known stance on this issue and his presidency of the RLA, I was especially surprised at his lack of support for a toll-free central reservations service recently proposed by Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth.

Jungbluth attended the most recent RLA meeting March 8 to explain an opportunity to obtain a toll-free telephone number for a central reservation service.

Ray Heid, who has owned Ruidoso Reservation Service for a number of years, has decided to give up the toll-free number and the service. Heid approached Jungbluth to see if he was interested in picking up the number for the Chamber to use.

Jungbluth was interested and came to the lodgers to seek their input. He said he was interested in creating a central reservation service coordinated by the Chamber of Commerce, but wanted support from a majority of the lodgers before working on the idea.

Carpenter said the RLA board members had voted not to support a central reservation service. General members at the meeting, however, expressed interest.

It was decided that Jungbluth would try to reserve the number to allow the lodgers to further discuss the subject. He contacted Carpenter two weeks later to see what the lodgers wanted to do about the number.

Carpenter said nothing had been done and advised Jungbluth not to pursue it. According to Jungbluth, Carpenter said efforts to open a central reservations number would only invite criticism and was a thankless job. Without support of the lodgers, Jungbluth has given up the idea and it has died once again.

I am very surprised at Carpenter's actions. A central reservation service seems crucial to an effective ski package, for which he has been such a vocal supporter.

John Ahearn, who put together ski packages at Steamboat Springs and other resorts, believes a central reservation service is crucial to such an effort. He said Steamboat is currently booking in excess of 30 percent of its skier days through a central

reservation system.

Even more impressive is the fact that most of those using the central reservation number are new to the resort. The use of a central reservation service by tourists new to the area could be important with or without a ski package.

The toll-free number has long been associated with Ruidoso, noted Jungbluth. Before Heid owned the number, it was used by the Chamber when it coordinated a ski package in the mid '70s.

"If we all wanted it to work, I think it could work," said Jungbluth of a central reservation service.

I guess "all" is the key word. Getting all the lodgers to agree on an issue, be it central reservations or where the sun rises, seems a near impossibility. It's too bad.

I don't really know why they have such difficulty agreeing. I have not been here long enough to know all the ins and outs of their disagreements.

But it seems to this recent arrival in town that they all have the same goals: attracting more tourists to Ruidoso and reducing operating costs.

Members who attend the meetings of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association discuss issues that affect all the lodgers and the town as a whole. They have discussed thorough lodgers' tax collections, ski packages, the recently passed tourist development bill, use of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track by the Mule Skinners, the Golden Years Jubilee, better lodging directories and cooperative purchasing of linens and paper goods.

But no one pays much attention to the Ruidoso Lodgers Association. They are not a force in the politics of Ruidoso.

Only about two-thirds of the lodgers belong to the association and, of them, 20 at most attend the meetings. With this lack of solid support people do not take the lodgers seriously.

I have heard complaints that some lodgers do not belong to the association because they do not like the way it is run. Is withdrawing from the association the way to change that?

If all the lodgers were members of the association and attended the meetings, it could be a much stronger association that could have something to do with the direction of Ruidoso. They represent a large section of the local economy and seem to me to have similar goals.

I guess no one really expects the lodgers to unite effectively. Carpenter's lack of interest in promoting one of his favorite issues makes me wonder if he has given up on uniting them.

### POSTAL PATTERN


Being in one of those endeavours in which criticism seems much more common than a stamp of approval, Deming Postmaster Robert Pillus has some positive news he wishes to impart.

Using the services of Mountain Bell, he informs us that postage in the U. S. costs far less than in other countries, including neighboring Canada. In Canada, the cost of mailing a letter out of the country just went up 2 cents to 37 cents, and the cost of domestic mail in Canada increased 2 cents to 32

cents. People in the U. S. can still send letters to Canada for 20 cents, he pointed out.

While no strikes are allowed among postal employees in this country, Canadian postal employees can strike anytime they please, Pillus noted.

"Canada used to be cheaper than us," he added. In England, it costs the equivalent of 60 or 70 cents to mail a letter, he said, emphasizing that the 20-cent U. S. stamp will still send a letter to anywhere from Guam to Puerto Rico and from Canada to Mexico. — Harold R. Couland, Deming Headlight.




