## Movement on airport

A decision may be reached within the next few months over which site to pursue on Fort Stanton Mesa for a regional airport, according to Judith Espinosa, secretary of the state Department of Transportation.

Espinosa toured the mesa with state Aviation Division director Bob White and Sierra Blanca Airport Commission chairman Fred Heckman Tuesday to acquaint herself with the two preferred airport sites.

She told Senator Pete Domenici at a Senate Budget Committee field hearing in Roswell Thursday about the status of the airport controversy. Domenici, who said, "We know sooner or later the Ruidoso problem has to be solved," was concerned about the source of funding for a new airport after the land problem is resolved. The senator asked Espinosa if money is available.

Espinosa, who was testifying on the condition of the state's transportation network, told Domenici a decision is near on which site to build the airport. She added that the proposed regional airport is a priority for new airport construction, and said she thinks funds are available.

The new transportation secretary said Friday she toured the mesa to familiarize herself with the sites. As soon as Governor Toney Anaya completes work on bills passed in the 1983 Legislature, Espinosa will brief him on the airport situation. Espinosa said she hopes to meet with the governor in the next month.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) has remained quiet while awaiting the governor's decision on the site. At its last meeting, the commission indicated the next move in the long airport battle must come from the governor.

Governments in the Ruidoso area have tried since the mid-1970s to acquire public property on Fort Stanton Mesa to build a regional airport. The property, an estimated 600 acres, lies in the middle of 26,000 acres leased from the Bureau of Land Manage-

ment by New Mexico State University (NMSU) to conduct agricultural experiments.

The university has contended an airport on the land, known as Site B, would irreparably harm long-term studies. NMSU claims were strongly supported last fall by an evaluation conducted by scientists working for the National Academy of Sciences.

Because of the study's results, SBAC decided to pursue a political decision on the land dispute. The decision is part of a two-stage process agreed to by concerned parties at a 1981 meeting with then U.S. Senator Harrison Schmitt. Schmitt requested the evaluation of NMSU's research as a result of the meeting.

Heckman said Friday he asked Espinosa to come to Ruidoso so the present administration could be brought up to date on the airport before reaching a decision. The governor's stand must be expressed soon, Heckman said, because time is running short for one of the sites.

"If we're going to have to look at Site A, we've got to do it soon," Heckman stressed. "There's a genuine concern that Site A very shortly will become unfeasible."

Site A is located on a mix of private, state and federal land on Fort Stanton Mesa directly to the west of the experimental ranch. It is not as suitable for an airport as Site B, according to the commission, because it is closer to the mountains, and a housing development is rapidly encroaching on the area.

But Site A is favored by the NMSU Board of Regents, which has passed a resolution in support of the location.

A consultant to the airport commission said last summer during a tour of the sites that airport construction had been estimated to cost \$1 million more on the western location than on the experimental ranch site. The additional cost would go into extensive earth moving needed to level Site A.

Heckman also is concerned that if a determination is not made soon, ballooning land prices caused by development near Site A will preclude purchase of the private land. More

land also will have to be included in the airport boundaries than for Site B. Heckman points out, so the landing strip will have a buffer zone between it and the new housing.

Ruidoso Mayor George White told Senator Domenici Thursday the estimated cost for the airport is \$14 million. But the figure may be outdated, especially if Site A is chosen.

The last appraisal on Site A was done eight years ago, Heckman said, adding he has no idea what the private land will now cost.

Heckman noted a portion of the funding for the airport would come from the sale of land where the Ruidoso Municipal Airport now sits. The airport would be closed upon completion of the proposed regional project.

Espinosa said the Sierra Blanca airport is a top priority for the state and money will be allocated for construction, if the land problem is resolved soon.

"My concern is, if we delay much longer, the funds may not be available," Espinosa said.

The secretary explained the financing scheme would probably be a federal-state cooperative program.

She said the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has committed funds through the Airport Improvement Program, but she was unsure of the amount. At this point, the state is considering allocating approximately \$1 million to match the FAA, Espinosa said. The secretary thinks the federal agency will agree to a 90 percent-10 percent match with the state.

But Espinosa reiterated her concern the funds could dry up before the land question is resolved.

"The funds are there—at least for now. We cannot continue to drag our feet the way it was done in the past," she stressed. "The Ruidoso airport is just too dangerous to keep open much longer."

Espinosa noted Anaya expressed support for the regional airport when he was campaigning for governor. She said he has not yet taken an official stand on choice of sites.

## White stresses airport need

The largest public project facing Ruidoso in the near future will be the Sierra Blanca regional airport. Mayor George White said at a Senate Budget Committee field hearing Thursday on the New Mexico Military Institute campus in Roswell

The hearing was conducted by Budget Committee chairman Senator Pete Domenici and U.S. Representative Joe Skeen, to record comments from southeastern New Mexico leaders and state officials on problems faced by the state and communities in rebuilding public works systems.

White and other southeastern New Mexico mayors addressed the need for additional funding to improve water and wastewater systems. Other projects discussed were highways and bridges, public buildings, and other capital investment projects defined as the infrastructure that state and local governments cannot finance alone.

Domenici also asked the officials to comment on Senate Bill 532, titled the Public Investment Incentive Act of 1983, which he recently introduced. The bill presents an alternative way of funding local public works projects which now are supported by the federal revenue sharing program and

one-time grant outlays. The bill, which White said the village governing body will definitely support, would create state infrastructure banks that would provide loans below market rates or at no interest for public works projects.

An infrastructure council would review public works proposals submitted by the states before the banks could be set up. Each state that establishes such a bank would receive a percentage of \$10 billion that would be allocated to the states over three years starting in 1984.

Payments would be made back into the infrastructure fund so money would continue to be available for new projects. Interest would also be credited back to the fund.

White said he would support the bill "with great emphasis" because it would relieve municipalities of the extra burden of high interest rates that drive up the cost of municipal bonds.

In a prepared speech for the panel, White outlined the need for a new airport, highway improvements to get the tourists here, and water and sanitary system improvements.

The mayor asked the representatives' help in getting New Mexico State University "to give us a little land" on which to build an airport on Fort Stanton Mesa. White said he an-

ticipates needing \$14 million for the initial phase of the regional airport.

Domenici and Skeen acknowledged Ruidoso's need for a new airport, and Domenici later asked the state transportation secretary if money is available for its construction.

Without additional water supplies and a means of storage, White said, Ruidoso will stop building and growth will stop.

But he said the village "is bonded to the hill" on water and wastewater facilities, which is a result of recent bond issues to finance the Biscuit Hill Wastewater Treatment Plant and the proposed Grindstone reservoir.

Ruidoso's bonding picture could look better if interest rates were not so high on municipal bonds. White predicted the interest rate will be over 10 percent on the \$6 million in revenue bonds for the reservoir. At that rate, he said, the village will have to return \$750,000 in interest for each \$1 million borrowed.

In concluding his statements, White praised Domenici's bill as introducing a system that would allow municipalities to stretch their tax dollars.

Domenici introduced the bill in February and it is now before the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works.

## Dates for Operation Trash set

Operation Trash is again gearing up for its spring cleanup campaign in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, organizer Barbara Duff announced this week. The weekends of April 23 and 24 and April 30 and May 1 have been set aside for the cleanup.

Volunteer crews will be organized to pick up trash in areas around both villages needing to be cleaned up. Residents are encouraged to call the Chamber of Commerce at 257-7395 or Duff at 257-2340 to report unsightly areas needing attention.

Residents wanting to volunteer for cleanup crews can register at the Chamber or with Duff or can just show up at the Chamber on cleanup days. Pickup trucks and drivers are also needed.

Free dumping, cash for recyclable aluminum, and discounts for paint supplies are all being offered to encourage residents to participate in the

cleanup. Duff reported. Individuals will be permitted to dump trash free of charge at the Fort Stanton Mesa landfill those weekends. Duff said Safeway has agreed to pay 21 cents per pound for aluminum cans, and area paint supply stores are offering a 10 percent discount to customers participating in Operation Trash, she added.

Large items such as refrigerators, stoves, water heaters, televisions, furniture and clothing will be picked up by the Salvation Army truck the preceding Thursdays, April 21 and 28. Persons wanting such items picked up should make arrangements with Duff or the Chamber before those dates.

Duff also plans to approach local service clubs about volunteering for the program. Some of the volunteers will be encouraged to help with special jobs such as cleaning, pain-

ting and yard work for elderly residents unable to do the work themselves. Any such residents should make arrangements with Duff or the Chamber for having the work done.

Operation Trash again is being organized around a fire prevention theme. Duff reported that the campaign has been endorsed by the village fire prevention officer, Smokey Bear District fire management officer and the Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE).

"This is an opportunity for residents to participate in making Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs the 'cleanest little towns in Lincoln County,'" Duff repeated about this year's cleanup project.

## Mule bets await AG opinion

Bill Harris, president of the American Mule Association, said Tuesday he expects to learn within 30 days if the New Mexico Racing Commission can legalize pari-mutuel betting on mule races, or whether it will take an act of the Legislature.

Harris Tuesday requested the racing commission initiate proceedings to find out the necessary steps to legalize pari-mutuel betting for mule races. He said commission members

told him he should find out from Attorney General Paul Bardacke what power they have to grant pari-mutuel betting on the mule races, before they will take any action on the issue.

Harris said he has given Bardacke's office information on Idaho's and California's legalization process for pari-mutuel betting on mule races. He expects an opinion from Bardacke within 30 days.

Harris seemed optimistic about chances for pari-mutuel betting if the racing commission is granted the

power to decide. He said some of the commissioners were in favor of pari-mutuel betting for mule races and no one seemed definitely against the idea.

He did not comment on chances for legalization of pari-mutuel betting on mule races by the Legislature.

Harris said he hopes to have something for commission members in time for their next meeting April 25. Whatever the outcome, Harris said there will be no pari-mutuel betting at any mule races in New Mexico this year.

**Cat bite victim decides against shots, negligence charges**

Jan Councilis, who threatened to sue the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department for gross negligence in their handling of a potential rabies case, has decided to drop the idea and not to take rabies shots.

Councilis was bitten by a wild cat

two weeks ago. He told The News he shot the cat in the head and took it to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department to be sent to Santa Fe for rabies testing. Upon discovering the cat had been shot in the head, officers decided not to send the cat in because they thought the tests would be in-

conclusive. Councilis said he did not find out about their decision for two days, and threatened to sue them for negligence. He wanted the department to pay for rabies shots that would cost him \$400 to \$500. The Sheriff's Department denied

any negligence. Councilis was being asked by Dr. Michael Stone to pay for the treatment in advance. Without the money to pay for the treatment, Councilis decided not to undergo the tests since the cat showed no physical signs of rabies, according to his friend Ida Brantley.

**Profile Ruidoso: Candyce Garret and her signs of the times**

"I want to be known for making the most attractive and classiest signs in New Mexico," Candyce Garrett asserts, looking seriously out of her quiet brown eyes. We are sitting with her dog Ralph on a stack of clear sugar pine boards in her small studio in the Adobe Plaza. Candyce, a multi-talented artist, who is probably the only woman sign carver in the United States, has already achieved her dream.

Growing up in Del Rio, Texas, Candyce always liked art. After high school, at Greenbriar College in Lewisburg, West Virginia, she returned to Texas for her university studies. She liked the college atmosphere so well that she stayed five-and-a-half years.

"I had many majors," she relates. She emerged with a degree in history. After college, Candyce married and had two daughters — Brandie and Stacy. Still interested in art, she "designed and painted Oriental and petpoint canvases." She sold the rug designs, which she had painted onto canvases, to hobbyists to sew.

Living in Corpus Christi, Texas, in 1978, Candyce decided to start running. "I started running a mile a day," she recalled. "Once you get past three miles you can really start enjoying it. I entered a quarter-marathon just for the heck of it, and won. That gave me more incentive to train."

Candyce helped to organize a running club in Corpus and put on several races. Eventually, she was running 85-95 miles a week, usually doing 20 miles every Sunday. She entered four marathons, and several half marathons and 10,000 meter races.

"I came in fifth in women in the Galveston Marathon," Candyce remembers. "That was the best I did."

Eventually her body began to show the wear of this intensive training. Candyce developed a lot of stress fractures in her feet and legs. "I was pushing," she explains. "I was doing more than my body would allow me to." So, in 1980, she decided to quit.

Some cousins living in New Hope, Pennsylvania, told Candyce about a man who carved wooden signs there. After her separation from her husband, Candyce moved north for five weeks to undergo a concentrated apprenticeship under Ray Hallacy, the top sign carver in the United States. Candyce explains that while she was there, "I only learned the basics — to carve letters. I'd never done anything you read to do to prepare the sign."

Although Ray Hallacy asked her to be his partner, Candyce decided to move back to Corpus and start her own business. She taught herself the other steps to signmaking though she admits "carving is the key."

Once I learned to carve, the other stuff is pretty basic," she said. What is the "other stuff?" I wondered. How does Candyce actually create a sign? She outlined the basic steps in simplified form, and illustrated them by carving a fancy "P" for me.

First, Candyce takes the order from her customer. "People have been so easy to work with on signs," Candyce feels. "Sometimes people know exactly what they want; other times I'll give them ideas and they pick from my ideas. Other times they say, 'I want a sign and I don't care how it's done. I'll leave it up to you.'"

Candyce charges by the letter, plus materials. Logos and extra carvings or paintings are additional.

In the second step, Candyce takes the 4-by-8-inch clear sugar pine stock she gets from Oregon (by way of Corpus), and cuts it to size. Then she glues the soft boards together horizontally, using pipe clamps.

In laying out the letters, Candyce uses no stencils. "Everything is free hand and a straight-edge," she asserts. When all the letters are drawn in pencil onto the sign, she stop cuts them. The technique involves hitting all along the center of the letter with a chisel and mallet.

From that point, Candyce selects from her 20-25 chisels to carve out the letter from the edge of the outline in toward the center cut. The sheer strength necessary for this task is phenomenal.

Candyce explains with a laugh, "It's like isometrics. It's a push and a pull. You tense up. I go home with backaches a lot, and my hands hurt."

From this point, she can either carve or paint the logo, and she has been doing quite a bit of redwood laminating lately. The final step involves sealing, priming, and painting the sign. When she elects to leave the bare wood showing, Candyce stains, seals, and varnishes it for protection. The completed sign is then ready to hang. Large signs can take four to six weeks for completion, while smaller ones take only one to two weeks.

Though Candyce made her signs in Corpus for one year, in 1981 she decided to move to Ruidoso for a while. She had been coming to the mountain village for 22 summers, and planned to stay only a year. "I changed my mind once I was here," she recounts.

"I like Ruidoso."

While in Corpus, Candyce carved signs mainly for professional men, such as oil executives, doctors, and lawyers. Here in Ruidoso, however, her signs have been mainly for individual shop owners.

You have seen many of the 30-35 signs around town. They hang over restaurants, ski shops, housing developments, a bank, a church, a veterinary hospital, and several doctors' offices. Candyce also carved the large beautiful sign for the new Ruidoso News building.

On many of her signs, you will see the characteristic silver paint preferred by Ruidoso businesses (though clients in Corpus favored 23-carat gold leaf).

Candyce advertises statewide, "I don't mind spending money advertising," she asserts. "But my best advertising is my signs." Lately, she has been carving for businesses in Odessa, Hobbs, and even Houston. Though Candyce enjoys the freedom of being able to "work as much as I want to," she is laboring hard to build her business.

Laughing, Candyce recalls the time some friends from Corpus came to visit and found her covered from head to toe in sawdust, and wearing her paint-splattered apron, running aces and straw hat. They gave her a hard time about it, Candyce remembers, "Asking when I'm going to be done with my little stint in the mountains."

But Candyce plans to stay right here for some time making her beautiful signs.

"Who knows what tomorrow will bring," she says philosophically. "For right now, I'm happy carving."

## Prime Time for Women program set April 21

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## Distance runners stand out as Ruidoso thinclads place sixth

A men's basketball team from Ruidoso has been making a lot of noise in an Alamogordo adult recreation league this year.

There are seven players on the team, captained by Jim McGarvey. They play in the Alamogordo City Gymnasium against other teams in the Alamogordo Industrial League.

Besides McGarvey, members of the team include Lynn Willard, Scott Schrader, Danny Hoffer, David Hoffer, Sonny Candelaria and former Ruidoso High School standout Bill Richardson, a 1982 Warrior graduate. Why do the men play in a competitive league?

"We play to keep in shape," Schrader said. "I played basketball in high school and I think all of our players did."

Candelaria had similar statements. "It's fun and it keeps the old heart ticking," he said.

The team is really a combination of two squads. Willard, Candelaria and some other players who don't play anymore formed a team called the Cobres in 1973.

"We used to drive down there twice a week for games," Willard said. "We'd usually bring whoever the high school coach at Ruidoso was then with us, and several other guys who liked to play basketball. We just did it for fun."

Four years ago, Schrader and the other present players formed a squad. Before the start of this season, the two teams combined forces.

Now the team just plays on Wednesday night each week.

"I think our record is 7-7 this season," Schrader said. "There are some really good teams in the Alamogordo league. Some of the teams down there are as good as some small-college squads. In fact, I think some of the players have competed on semi-pro teams before. I'm sure they could defeat Alamogordo High School's team."

Candelaria agrees that the Alamogordo league has some tough

teams and players.

"They've got a lot of players around 6-4, 6-5," he said. "When you see them play, it'll make your eyes fall out. They can dunk the ball and everything. However, I remember one year we won the whole thing (the championship)."

The Alamogordo Industrial League's regular season began in January and will end in late May. After that, the league will hold a tournament with every team participating.

"It's a single-elimination tournament but it will probably last more than a week," Schrader said. "The gym is only available for the league three days a week."

There's talk of a men's basketball team or league being formed in Ruidoso in conjunction with the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Police Athletic League.

Would Schrader, Candelaria and the other players join the new league? "We'd probably stick with the Alamogordo league and join the new one also," Schrader said.

Hopefully, a men's basketball league will be started soon in the Ruidoso area. Then we'll be able to see some high-level competition like that seen every week in the Alamogordo City Gymnasium.

Turning to baseball, hopes of a Pony League getting started in Ruidoso this spring are once again in the air.

Last year only 12 to 15 players signed up for the Pony League teams and the idea fell through.

This year, however, there's a possibility 30 to 35 players will sign up, more than enough for two teams. A Pony League in Ruidoso will go a long way toward a wide-range youth baseball program in the area.

It might even lead to an eventual high school program. Then you'd see the local baseball program really take off.

Getting some excellent performances in the distance races, the Ruidoso High School boys track team finished sixth in the Portales Invitational Saturday.

The Warriors scored 24 points, with their young distance corps accounting for many of the points. Sophomore Cisco Bob captured the 1,500 meters in 4:20.4 seven seconds

slower than his school-record time of 4:13.39 set last week at the White Sands Invitational in Alamogordo. "Cisco's time was still very good," said Warrior assistant coach Jim

Ramsey. "He wasn't really pressed during the race and had little competition."

Bob was fourth in the state AAA-division meet last season and could dip below the 4:10 mark before this season ends. Freshman Ivan Scott continued to show improvement as he finished third in the 3,000 meters with a 10:16.0 time and was sixth in the 1,500 meters.

"He's got a lot of potential," Ramsey said of Scott. "He's tall and has a long, natural stride. He should be very good."

Sophomore Curt McClellan finished second in the 800 meters with a 2:07.6 clocking and missed first place by about a yard.

"Curt looked very good," Ramsey said. "He just missed first place and that's the best I've seen him look."

McClellan also ran the anchor leg on the Warrior 1,600-meter relay team which recorded a 3:41.0 time, a slight improvement over the White Sands meet when Ruidoso ran a 3:43.0.

Other members of the 1,600-meter relay squad included Grady Williamson, Mike Douglass and Eric Strobel.

Freshman David Keaton showed considerable improvement in the 800 meters by running a 2:20.8.

The Warrior 800-meter relay team of Wade Proctor, Strobel, Douglass and Williamson finished fifth with a 1:40.3 time.

Douglass, a senior, recorded a personal best of 23.6 in the 200 meters as he finished fourth. Williamson made the finals of the same event but did not place.

"Douglass ran very well," said Ramsey. "I think he's run faster on relay events but that's his fastest time from the starting blocks. Grady was tired from running a lot of races but still made the finals of the 200 meters."

The Warrior medley relay team of Douglass, Strobel, Williamson and Bob recorded a 3:52.2 time for second place. Douglass and Strobel ran 200-meter legs, Williamson a 400-meter leg and Bob the 800-meter anchor leg.

In the field events, Ruidoso did not fare as well as it did in the running events, but still showed improvement.

Proctor threw the javelin 100 feet for a personal improvement while sophomore George Gresham hit 38-5 in the shot put, an improvement of about three feet for him. Manuel Montano, another sophomore, threw the shot put 30 feet, also a three-foot improvement. Senior Chris Sanchez hurled the discus 104 feet, a five-foot increase over his performance at the White Sands meet.

Lovington High School won the meet with Artesia High School finishing second. Lovington is the defending state AAA division champion in the boys division.

The Warrior boys varsity squad will compete in the Las Cruces Invitational next Saturday. The boys' eighth-graders will go to Alamogordo for a meet.

Ruidoso's girls team will return to activity after a two-week layoff by competing in the Dexter Invitational Friday and the Carrizozo Relays Saturday.

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

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# Flood plan to final review

Workshop participants reviewed the final draft of the Lincoln County Warning and Evacuation Plan Thursday and decided to send it on to area political officials for a final review before the plan is signed.

Tom Closson, an official with the state Civil Emergency Preparedness Division who has coordinated drafting of the plan, will make minor changes in wording of sections and schedule the final workshop.

The presentation of the plan to political officials is expected within a month.

The plan is designed for flood threats from Lake Mescalero, Bonito Lake, Alto Lake, the planned Grindstone Canyon reservoir and area streams. It also includes procedures for warning and evacuation during major forest fires.

Formation of the plan was originally suggested by Ernest Snyder, director of the dam safety program with the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Albuquerque, to meet safety requirements for Lake Mescalero on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

In coordinating the workshops, Closson recommended the plan be expanded to include other flood hazards in the county. Since fire also represents a considerable threat in the heavily forested region, drafters inserted provisions calling for implementation of the plan during a fire.

Closson pointed out Thursday that after the plan is signed, participating governing bodies may use the guidelines to respond to any disaster.

Snyder asked Closson who would be responsible for implementing the plan. The state official replied that the head of each political entity represented in the plan could activate it without consultation from other participants.

Also, by signing the plan, Closson said, officials would be committing their communities to render assistance when requested from another participant.

Snyder said once the plan is complete, he envisions drawing up a set of operational guidelines for monitoring Lake Mescalero. The warning plan outlines responsibilities of officials and agencies for monitoring the dams and streams, but it includes no definite procedures to be followed.

Closson noted such details were purposely left out of the plan during the workshops, so the final document would not be too lengthy and unreadable. The plan is also designed to allow the executive staff that mans the emergency operations center during implementation of the plan to have flexibility in its decisions.

The participants in the plan include Lincoln County, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona, the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.



# Strobel meets Schmitt

I was approached by Sandy Gladen, a teacher-counselor at Ruidoso High School, to do an interview with Harrison Schmitt and write an article for The Ruidoso News. At first I really didn't like the idea. I had never done an interview with anyone before. It turned out to be a lot of fun and very exciting. I found Harrison Schmitt to be a very informative and interesting man.

Schmitt said that he had made a personal commitment in graduate school to get into politics. He started running for office in 1975 and served in the U.S. Senate from 1976 to 1982. He now involves himself in several projects which still keep him close to politics and the space program.

He spent approximately eight and one-half years in the space program.

Schmitt was chosen in 1965 and spent a year in the Air Force learning how to fly jet aircraft. The next four to five years he was involved in many projects from training to designing specific missions. In 1970 he was picked for a backup crew member on the Apollo 16 mission, in case astronaut Jim Irwin could not fly. He then landed a spot on the Apollo 17 flight.

Schmitt feels good about how the space program has been working lately. The thing we need, he says, is a national policy to establish permanent presence of Americans in space. If we don't, he believes, the Soviets will, and we may end up having to fight our way into space. Schmitt also feels that the public is giving plenty of support to the space program.

The problem as he sees it is that since President Kennedy there has

not been enough support from the White House to further space program. As Schmitt puts it, President Reagan is supportive of the concept of space, but he has not as yet been willing to recommend that he articulate a whole new thrust to our space program.

For my last question I had to get one in that I couldn't resist. ("Do astronauts really drink Tang?") "Only the astronauts in the Mercury space flight drank Tang," he answered, amused. "It was the only packaged fruit drink available at that time. Since then the astronauts have used another package drink, which Schmitt says is very good."

In closing, I would like to thank Mr. Schmitt, on behalf of Ruidoso High School, for attending our Career Day, and adding to its success.

## Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE**—The piranha fish. They nibbled Johnny Hernandez to pieces.

From academe to politics may be too big a stride for most legs to accomplish, even if they are as long as those of Hernandez, former official at New Mexico State who moved to Washington—and lived to regret it.

This isn't to suggest that in-fighting and back-stabbing and doing-in-of-the-adversary are unknown among those in educational institutions.

Not at all. You will find there, on a steady, 365-days-per-year basis, all the kind of dirty pool most laypeople in the world are capable of.

But that is not enough to prepare a man or woman for Washington.

In our capital city, all that has been raised to its highest power.

So Hernandez, who had the misfortune to become second in command and then acting-in-command at the Environmental Protection Agency, became a victim.

A victim of the piranha-fish which swim in the Potomac.

Ronald Reagan "accepted his resignation," as we say at the obsequies.

Too bad, John. You had the stuff. They just didn't want it.

Come home to New Mexico where you belong.

\*\*\*

Why do we have to have extra millions of dollars to urge our state universities to set up "centers of excellence"?

Isn't that what universities are supposed to be in the first place?

So why did the Legislature in its so-called wisdom vote money only for

UNM, NMSU and New Mexico Tech to establish such centers?

Are the other universities in the state expected to become "centers of mediocrity"?

Don't let those folks who are talking about a Rio Grande Corridor, to include only those three educational institutions mentioned above, plus Los Alamos Labs and Sandia Labs, get to you.

All the bill to fund that kind of development is, is a kind of eggheads' con game. It won't fly.

Universities achieve excellence because of the excellent men and women who teach there — not because Legislators believe excellence is purchasable.

\*\*\*

What happens to New Mexico if the price of a barrel of oil drops a dollar?

You get all kinds of answers here, depending on whom you call upon.

This seems to be the safest estimate to date.

A one-dollar drop in the price of crude probably directly costs New Mexico from \$2 million to \$2.5 million in revenue during a single fiscal year.

Indirectly—that is, with all the other taxes the oil and gas people pay — the total loss may come to about \$8 million during the first year in which it occurs.

Thus, since we have estimated revenues at \$28 per barrel, \$27 per barrel would reduce them by what most here see as a minimum of \$8 million per year. If the price goes lower, our take goes lower.

Want to know if a special legislature session will be needed? Watch oil prices to see if they drop to or below \$24 per barrel.

## Sense & Nonsense

After years of debate and efforts at reform, the Social Security program has been rescued from the brink of bankruptcy.

Until a few days ago, the 172,000 New Mexicans who receive Social Security benefits faced the distinct possibility that their checks would not be received on time, beginning in July.

The system was broke. There was more money being paid out than being paid in. There was no way this massive assistance program could continue to survive another year because of the money drain.

It was just that serious.

However, all that has changed. Social Security has once again been placed on a sound economic basis. Congress approved legislation a few days ago which resolves the financing problems and assures that the program will be solvent into the 21st century when today's workers will retire.

The measure solves both the short-term and long-term financial problems. The retirement fund needed

about \$150 billion or more during the rest of the decade, and this legislation provides more than \$165 billion in new resources for Social Security.

The legislation contains another important aspect for about 5,000 unemployed workers in New Mexico.

It extends unemployment compensation benefits for the 5,000 jobless who have already exhausted their previous unemployment benefits.

Without the assistance, hundreds of thousands of workers across the nation would have been left without any unemployment aid.

This extension will be particularly beneficial in the Silver City and Grants areas where the decline in the copper and uranium industries have left hundreds without work.

The measure is desperately needed to ease these people through their unemployment crisis.

While this Social Security package is not perfect, I believe that this legislation will preserve the system for millions of Americans living today and for generations to come.

### Editorial

It is encouraging to note that members of the U.S. House of Representatives have formed a caucus to work on problems common to border states, following the lead of the Senate.

Texas Democrat Ron Coleman, organizer of the House caucus, mentioned three important issues the group will address: bridges, immigration and pollution.

All three affect southern New Mexico and, to some extent, Ruidoso.

Bridges may be taken in a literal and figurative sense. Anyone who has waited in a crowded line of vehicles at one of the bridges linking El Paso and Juarez would agree that access across the frontier could be improved.

Establishment of groups in the nation's highest legislative bodies signals the legislators' counterparts in Mexico that our countries should work together on problems along the border. Bridges of understanding will help smooth the way for increased international commerce, including tourism.

Immigration is an issue which seems to regularly surface and fade without ever being resolved. An uncontrolled flow of immigrants is a regional and national concern, yet there are businesses in Ruidoso that are grateful to employ unregistered workers.

We are relatively unaffected by the pollution that earned El Paso the distinction of having the dirtiest air in Texas. But the problems of the Juarez-El Paso metroplex will increasingly become those of southern New Mexico, which makes them our concern.—TP

## On the Village beat

One of these days I'll have to ask Rolland Ramos to ask our computer which News subscriber lives the farthest distance from Ruidoso. I wouldn't be surprised if it answered, "Harold and Betty Cummins of Kenya, East Africa."

Harold and Betty, who happen to be my wife Cathy's parents, live on a huge cattle ranch east of Nairobi. They are not herders of cows, however, but herders of men, so to speak. That is to say, they are Southern Baptist missionaries, and have lived in Kenya since 1963.

Evidently, they sometimes get The News by air mail and sometimes by surface mail (via ship). In their letters, they might refer to an event that happened a few weeks ago (a snowstorm, for example), or they might mention old news they just heard about ("Who is Al Junge and why are they starting a fund for him?").

But they seem to enjoy reading The News, as it helps them picture the place where we live.

The other day, we received a packet from Harold and Betty that was full of clippings from the Nairobi newspapers. In the interest of promoting awareness among readers that there is a world outside Lincoln County-New Mexico-Texas, I thought I would share some items from the Kenya press.

"Woman in labor saved from beast," reads one headline. A woman was walking to the hospital in the dark to give birth when she was overcome with labor pains by the roadside. A passerby heard an infant's cry from the bush and found the woman. Suddenly a hyena leapt from the thickets with a blood-curdling roar. The man hurled stones at the beast and shouted himself hoarse for half an hour, until the beast gave up and went away. The woman gave birth to bouncing twins, and named one Daniel in honor of her rescuer. Hooraay for happy endings!

"It's mob justice." This story, with photos, tells about a man who was thought to have stolen some money from a woman in downtown Nairobi. The suspect ran off down the street, but was captured by a crowd that responded when the woman raised the alarm. The man received numerous blows and kicks and "was even hit with rungs." I'm not sure what a "rung" is, but it sounds like

something you don't want to get hit with.

"Three hurt in giraffe, car smash." The accident occurred on the Nairobi-Mombasa highway, which runs by Joyce Farm. It was reported that "travellers helped themselves to free giraffe meat while others went to assist the accident victims. An eyewitness said that traffic was halted for some time as people struggled to get a share of the meat." Wonder if the new Safeway in Ruidoso is going to carry giraffe meat—must be good stuff.

"Driver killed by 'a witch's curse.'" This tells about a road repair worker who was driving an excavator when he unearthed a pot containing a reptile adorned with beads. As the creature escaped, a man approached the worker and told him he would not have long to live. "Two days later, the driver was working on another section of the road when he dug up a swarm of bees which attacked and killed him." The story came from reliable sources, according to the published account.

"Drunk killed by safari ants." This one I will reprint in full. "Safari ants killed a drunk at Makutano village in Kirinyaga District. Police said yesterday that John Kariuki fell in the ants' path and slept on his way home from a drinking spree. The ants set on him." The account did not mention whether any of the ants were tipsy when they finished.

"The largest headline on any of the stories (90 point) read, 'City Council suspended.' The story, dated March 4, reads: 'The Nairobi City Council has been suspended—by order of the Government. And last night Mayor Nathan Kahara and all councillors were barred from entering City Hall and all council establishments. At the same time, Town Clerk George Wanjia, Deputy Town Clerk Maxwell Omongo and all departmental heads were sent on compulsory leave.'"

There are times I might wish the Ruidoso council would suspend a meeting that has gone on particularly long. But I'm glad we live in a country where the local governing body is part of "the Government," and cannot be told by any other part to refrain from carrying on its business.
