

Awareness seen as key factor in combating drug, alcohol abuse

Substance Abuse in Ruidoso

(Last in a series)

Laura Casey last week said she realized she and several other local parents had been like ostriches with their heads in the sand when it came to the question of drug use among their children.

Spurred into action by Crime Stoppers' announcement of an anti-drug campaign, and by their own children, the parents decided to get educated. They asked investigator Hazel Poissot of the Ruidoso Police Department to give a talk and presentation with the simple theme of drug awareness.

Word of the talk was spread, and it led to a second meeting, held about three weeks ago, which more than 150 parents, teachers and children attended.

The awareness talks served their purpose. Casey said "it was a big shock" to some of the parents to see, touch and smell marijuana and drug paraphernalia; and they came away with a little more understanding about the subject.

"It's very much at the attention of people now," Casey said. "There's a big relief it's in the open; there's an opportunity now to discuss it with the kids."

Two of the points that came across, Casey said, were that drug use is a problem that affects everybody, and that avoiding the issue will not make it go away.

"We realize now the wolf's at the door" is how she described the lesson. Making participants aware of the problem was the sole purpose of the drug talks, noted Poissot. Awareness was one of several suggestions offered as a remedy for local drug and alcohol abuse—by parents, counselors, police and other individuals interviewed for this series.

Sources also said a new emphasis from the home, schools and community should be placed on educating children about potential dangers of substance abuse; and that alternatives to drug and alcohol use should be offered.

Casey said another thing she learned was that "we're never going to eradicate it—we couldn't." So, instead of demanding that children stay away from either liquor or marijuana, the approach should be, "If you're going to do it, be responsible," she suggested.

Establishing responsibility is the goal of education. Ruidoso High School principal Tom Hansen said the school does not "tell them they can't

smoke (marijuana), because they're going to if they want to." Rather, teachers, counselors and administrators try to be frank about the effects of use, and they let students know the alternatives.

High school science teacher Dub Williams explains the biological effects of drugs and alcohol on the body to freshmen in his general sciences class.

"One of the biggest things I try to get them see is what the end results can be and what the options are," Williams said. "If I know there is something that will cause damage physically, I will tell them about it. I guarantee they know what they are dealing with after coming out of this class."

Alcoholism counselor Ray Hayhurst agrees with the direct approach. Hayhurst, who sees the results of abuse in residents at the Lincoln House Alcoholic Transitional Facility in Ruidoso Downs, says education should be directed at physical harm caused by abuse.

Hayhurst notes that alcohol abuse can damage almost all internal organs; with the brain, liver and heart receiving the most damage.

Paul Gallegos, alcoholism counselor at the Ruidoso Counseling Center, points out a person can become just as addicted to alcohol as drugs. Gallegos, a rehabilitated alcoholic, says even a casual drinker may have a problem with alcohol if he experiences blackouts and temporary losses of memory.

Gallegos advises that parents must help in the educational process. "The parents can help them toward the decision," he said, "then let them make up their minds about it."

But it is not just children who need support in the home. Parents are faced with the same decisions about drinking. When it becomes a problem for a parent, one of the best means of dealing with it is within the family, Gallegos said.

"For most people, it helps to show some care, some love," he suggests. "It's one of the best ways to intervene. It's most effective within families, it brings the whole family together and it opens the lines of communication."

Family unity can provide parents and children with alternatives to getting drunk or high, adds Gallegos. Other alternatives, mainly through individual and group activities, are available in town for all age groups.

Hansen says he will not accept anyone using the excuse of "nothing to do" as a reason for getting into trouble. "There are opportunities for anyone. You can find something (to become involved in) any place you're at," Hansen said.

A large number of high school students participate in sports and extracurricular activities such as band, chorus, honor society and the drama club. Hansen said he believes the students who do participate are less likely to develop problems with drugs or alcohol.

The fledgling Ruidoso-Lincoln County Police Athletic League is another avenue for participation. PAL coordinator/treasurer Mark Paz and president Richard Swenor point out that one of the main goals of PAL is to provide a vehicle for participation in any sport or activity to children of all ages.

In fact, as written in the bylaws of the local PAL chapter, the purpose of the league is to "sponsor a sound amateur athletic program (and) other activities and to promote a constructive, community-youth oriented relationship" between youth and law enforcement agencies.

"It's an alternative for kids," notes Paz. "It's not just sports, it's anything they want to get involved in."

He continued, "My personal feeling is that: I think most kids on dope, they're looking for alternatives." Swenor points out that while

several community and school activity programs are available, "many kids just don't know how to find something to get involved in. There are not slots for everybody, somebody's got to help them find their slot."

Paz and Swenor noted only a few programs now exist—which include boxing, wrestling and a group program Saturday mornings—in the chapter, but the PAL board of directors will try to assist with any request for money to pay someone's way into another activity.

"If we find a kid with an interest, if he wants to play guitar, we'll try to get him into a class," Swenor said.

Swenor added that the program also benefits the police department because it helps build a close rapport between policemen and children. The program also is designed to work hand-in-hand with the village Parks and Recreation Department and other activities sponsored by church and community organizations, he said.

Laura Casey is a member of an organization of parents that has worked through churches to provide evening entertainment and group activities for children. The group already has sponsored chaperoned parties, and hopes to organize hayrides, dances, cookouts and concerts during the summer, Casey said.

Casey noted the success of the program will depend on the interest of children.

State Representative Marvin "Mickey" McGuire is working to establish a student program in county schools next year called Students Helping Other People (SHOP). The program, initiated in a Maryland school district, is designed to educate youth about chemical dependency.

A group of older students in the schools would attend a seminar about alcohol, drugs and alternatives, and relay the knowledge to other students throughout the system.

"I think kids definitely need to have the actual information, then it becomes their decision," said McGuire, who teaches at White Mountain Middle School. "This won't answer every kid's problem, but the more alternatives available, the better your chances are of reaching all the kids."

For persons who already have problems, or know others with a drug or alcohol problem, Gallegos urges them to seek guidance before a crisis occurs. Unfortunately, he notes, it usually takes a crisis before someone asks for treatment.

Gallegos said the Counseling Center is open to walk-ins, and cost of treatment will be adjusted to a person's income.


Hayhurst is excited about opening a counseling center in Ruidoso this summer. The center, to be managed by the Lincoln County Alcoholism Association, will offer both alcohol and drug treatment. Hayhurst said the center will be open to walk-ins and persons referred for treatment by courts and the children's probation office.

Two Alcoholics Anonymous groups also are active in Ruidoso. The Downs group meets Wednesday evenings at the Lincoln House, and the Arid group has several meetings a week at the First Christian Church. The Arid group sponsors an open meeting each Saturday evening which visitors may attend.

The First Christian Church also plays host to an Al-Anon chapter, designed for relatives of alcoholics, which meets each Tuesday starting at 8 p.m.

Georgia K., a member of the Arid group, said the group also is trying to establish an Al-A-Teen chapter.

Elegance Summer Fest keynote

"We're planning a very elegant type of affair for the art auction," said Vicki Daigle, director of catering and convention services at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, explaining plans for the upcoming Ruidoso Summer Festival. It appears Daigle and the Inn are planning to offer elegance all week long.

Writers in black tie will carry trays of champagne, hors d'oeuvres and canapés through the crowd gathered for the auction of 18 of the best entrants in the Ruidoso Summer Festival Art Contest.

Posters of the winning piece, Gary Meyers' "Song of Summer," will be available in Ruidoso Sunday, May 15. There have been 1,200 posters made that will be numbered and signed by Meyers. They will cost \$30. As a change of pace from the for-

mal atmosphere of the art auction, Daigle plans a Western motif for the Casino night Friday, June 3, at the Inn. Hors d'oeuvres will be available free of charge and there will be a cash bar and sandwiches for sale. The Dixieland Jazz Band will perform that night as well.

Arranged around the room will be two craps tables, a cashier's stand, 20 blackjack tables, three roulette wheels, a baccarat table, a wheel of fortune and a chuk-a-luk game, said Daigle. Patrons will make a donation to the summer festival for which they will receive gambling chips.

They will be able to gamble until 11 p.m., at which time over 30 prizes will be awarded to the patrons with the most chips. Among the prizes will be an all expenses paid weekend trip for two to Las Vegas, Nevada, and another to Lake Tahoe.

For those who do not know much about gambling, a booklet will be available to explain the basics of the games. There will also be people available to explain how the games are played, said summer festival director Peter Strobel.

Strobel said 300 of the 500 available tickets have already been sold for Casino Night. Cost of tickets is \$15.

Daigle said the room in which the performances are to be staged will accommodate 600 people seated at tables. Wine stewards and bar waitresses will be available to take orders directly from the tables, and there will also be service bars outside. Hors d'oeuvres will also be available. Hostesses will show patrons to their seats before the concerts and during intermission, but the doors will be closed during performances.

Summer theatre proposed here

The cultural committee of the Chamber of Commerce Thursday received a proposal for a summer theatre company that would bring Tony Award winning actors and plays to Ruidoso for a six-week period.

Cultural committee members read the seven page proposal submitted by Bruce Street, director of the drama department at New Mexico State University (NMSU). Street wrote that he believes a season as proposed "would establish the NMSU Theatre at Ruidoso as a major summer stock theatre from the outset."

The proposed budget of the summer theatre company is \$81,928, which would have to be raised by the cultural committee.

"It is ambitious, but anything worthwhile is," said Katherine Finley,

cultural committee chairperson.

The proposal was originally written with a 1983 summer season in mind. However, Finley said she and chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth believe they should move one step at a time and focus first on getting the Summer String Workshop off the ground before taking on the theatre.

Assuming the Summer String Workshop is successful, of which cultural members expressed optimism, they would consider bringing the NMSU Theatre to Ruidoso for the summer of 1984.

The proposal involves a company of 25 members coming to Ruidoso for a two-play, six-week season. Street suggested a "one-star company in which one actor or actress of established reputation is joined by... novice or aspiring actors and actresses who are of professional quality."

The proposal includes opportunities

for local actors, business and technical staff in the company.

"I think the Ruidoso Little Theatre would be instrumental," said Finley. Street proposed including Mark Medoff, the Tony Award winner for his play "Children of a Lesser God," in the company. Medoff is currently artistic director of the NMSU Theatre.

Street suggested producing "The Authentic Life of Billy the Kid" and "Children of a Lesser God." He also suggested bringing Phyllis Frelich, award winner for best actress on Broadway in 1980, for her lead role in "Children of a Lesser God."

Finley reminded members that the proposal is a rough draft which could be changed to suit NMSU's and Ruidoso's needs.

Cultural committee members appeared to be very enthusiastic about the proposal and will discuss it further at their next meeting.

Apartments back to trustees

The Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday passed the issue of the proposed 40-unit apartment complex back to the board of trustees for a decision, after determining that the proposed site is not currently zoned.

Confusion over proper zoning of the designated site caused the matter to be sent from P&Z to the board of trustees and back to P&Z for clarification of the zoning. A 1969 zoning map, which is the most current zoning legally adopted by the village, shows the property to be unzoned, it was revealed Thursday.

Attorney Gary Mitchell, representing the current property owner, Jess Armstrong, pointed out that a lack of zoning of the site probably means the village has little or no control over what is built there. Mitchell said that his client and the project developers need some response from the village, however, to submit to the federal Farmers Home Administration for financing approval.

Mitchell indicated the continual time delays are costing his clients money.

Wayne Ward, an owner of property near the proposed apartment complex site, voiced opposition to the pro-

ject, alleging that it would lower his property value. He requested that the development be turned down by the village.

P&Z member Jackie Branum said she has heard residents complain that the population density of the project would be too high.

Real estate agent Wayne Townsend contended that the project would not devalue property in the area because it would be under government control and therefore well maintained. In answer to the complaint raised by Branum, Townsend said the developers will change the plans to lower population density if they are requested to do so.

"There is such a need for apartment projects," Townsend exclaimed. The proposed units would be rented to moderate-income residents at a rental fee estimated to range from \$250 to \$325.

P&Z voted to send the matter back to the board of trustees to decide, without any further recommendation from the commission.

Because of the recent confusion over zoning throughout the village, W. R. Johnson asked P&Z for a determination on the current zoning of his property. Johnson explained that a developer is interested in the property for a moderate-income apartment

project and needs to know what the zoning is.

"I don't think you're zoned right now," P&Z chairman George Smith told Johnson. The commission advised him now is probably the best time to "go about doing whatever you want with the property."

Following this discussion, P&Z passed a motion to proceed with steps to legally adopt the zoning map that was adopted earlier this year.

Prior to the regular business meeting, P&Z met with village attorney Tim Quigley to review the village's ordinance governing planning and zoning and the commission. Quigley advised the members to familiarize themselves with the ordinance so they will know what their responsibilities and duties are and how to follow proper procedures in dealing with business brought before the group.

In other business, P&Z member Conrad Buchanan reported that several properties in the area are receiving village services but have never been annexed into the village. He said he feels these properties should be annexed and pay taxes.

Buchanan offered to pursue the matter by determining what procedures need to be followed to get the properties annexed.

hospital has been able to provide new televisions, new beds and window shades in many of the rooms. With money donated by the Chamber of Commerce from the Chilli Cookoff, Moore has been able to buy new pillows for all the rooms.

Moore also mentioned a new paint job, handrails in the rooms and more confidential chart racks on the beds.

In honor of National Hospital Week, the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital will host Wednesday's Coffee Cart. Moore said he hopes to use the week to educate people how to better use the services available at the hospital. During the Coffee Cart, tours of the hospital will be available.

Veterans Field Service Unit to visit here

A Disabled American Veterans (DAV) Field Service Unit will be in Ruidoso May 23 to help explain to local veterans recent changes in services, benefits and programs available to them and their families.

According to a DAV news release, 23 bills have been enacted during the past six years, bringing about 445 changes in veterans' services, benefits and programs. Also, nine provisions reducing veterans' benefits were included in the 1982 and 1983 federal budget bills.

DAV Field Service Units have traveled from town to town across America for the past nine years, offering free services such as benefits counseling and claim filing assistance to veterans. The DAV is not a government agency but an association of three-quarters of a million disabled veterans dedicated to helping fellow veterans, according to DAV National Service Director Arthur H. Wilson.

Veterans need not be members of DAV to take advantage of the free services offered. The program is an

extension of the DAV National Service Program, which employs more than 265 national service officers at Veterans Administration (VA) facilities around the country.

The Field Service Unit will be in Ruidoso from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. May 23 at the American Legion Post at Highway 70 and Spring Road.

Veterans and family members visiting the van are advised to take the veteran's VA claim number (if available) and Social Security number, needed for the purpose of filing and reopening claims.

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
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
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Warriors qualify nine thinclads for state meet

The Ruidoso High School boys and girls track teams will be well represented at the state AAA division championships next Friday and Saturday in Albuquerque.

Ruidoso made sure of that by qualifying nine athletes at the district 3-AAA meet at Silver City High School Saturday. The Warrior boys finished fourth in the team competition, while the girls were second for the second straight year. Ruidoso scored 52 points in the girls division to beat out third-place Cobre High School. Silver City won the title in both divisions.

Warrior boys who will participate in the state meet include Grady Williamson, Cisco Bob, Mike Douglass and Curt McClellan. The Ruidoso girls who have qualified for the state meet are Valerie Garcia, Lillian Lopez, Gia Rose, Stacy Ivy and Deanna Peso.

Ruidoso scored 52 points in the boys division, 10 more than it did last season. The Warriors scored that many points due largely to the efforts of the state-meet qualifiers and some key performances by underclassmen. Bob, who finished fourth in the state meet 1,500 meters last season, won that event in a photo-finish, edging out a Silver City runner. The Warrior sophomore recorded a 4:21.30 time. He also took first in the 3,000 meters, finishing in 9:58.0. Ruidoso showed strength in the latter event as sophomore Francisco Olvera was fourth, junior David Landrum sixth and freshman Ivan Scott seventh.

Williamson qualified in the intermediate hurdles with a second-place time of 52.4. The Warrior senior ran a 51.9 in the heats. He also was third in the 400 meters with a 53.2 time, but failed to qualify in that event.

Douglass continued to be one of the biggest surprises of the district season as he was second in the 100 meters and third in the 200 meters. The Warrior senior won his 100-meters heat in 11.4, but then some controversy began.

Only six sprinters were supposed to advance to the finals, but two athletes tied for the sixth fastest time. As a result, the finals were run in two heats.

Douglass won the second heat in 11.51, but Jim Vasquez of Silver City won the first heat in 11.49. Warrior head coach Ronny Maskew made an official protest because the Warriors did not file it before the race started.

Meet officials had to call state organizers in Albuquerque to get a ruling. The protest was overruled because the Warriors did not file it before the race started.

Douglass then came back to run a 23.82 for third place in the 200 meters, well below his seasonal best of 22.8. However, most of the times weren't fast because of the slow track.

McClellan added the third Warrior first place with a 2:06.6 victory in the 800 meters. The tall sophomore ran a tactical race, running away from two runners in the last 100 yards. He has a best of 2:05.18 this season.

The Ruidoso High School boys and girls track teams will be well represented at the state AAA division championships next Friday and Saturday in Albuquerque.

Ruidoso made sure of that by qualifying nine athletes at the district 3-AAA meet at Silver City High School Saturday. The Warrior boys finished fourth in the team competition, while the girls were second for the second straight year. Ruidoso scored 52 points in the girls division to beat out third-place Cobre High School. Silver City won the title in both divisions.

Warrior boys who will participate in the state meet include Grady Williamson, Cisco Bob, Mike Douglass and Curt McClellan. The Ruidoso girls who have qualified for the state meet are Valerie Garcia, Lillian Lopez, Gia Rose, Stacy Ivy and Deanna Peso.

Ruidoso scored 52 points in the boys division, 10 more than it did last season. The Warriors scored that many points due largely to the efforts of the state-meet qualifiers and some key performances by underclassmen.

Services were held last Wednesday in Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church in Roswell for a beloved Christian lady, Mrs. Helen Frazier, wife of Lake J. Frazier, former distinguished mayor of Roswell.

The life of Helen and Lake reads like a great story of two heroic people.

Shortly after he joined the army back in Pennsylvania, Lake was stricken with tuberculosis. This was in the days when humanity was practically helpless against the ravages of this dire illness. In 1926 Lake was in

the terminal ward of a hospital back in Pennsylvania. Many would have given up, but not Lake. The staunch spirit of his Scotch ancestors stood him in good stead.

"Betting on his last card" so to speak, he subscribed to a number of papers out in the Southwest, the land of healing climates.

He carefully scanned the obituary columns of these papers. And here out of the darkest situation Lake brought a touch of humor in relating his experiences.

"From reading the papers," Lake said, "I noticed that fewer people were dying in Roswell, New Mexico, than any place else. So I got here as soon as I could."

He "got here" November 19, 1926, and they carried him off the train on a

stretcher, to the old Gilkerson Hotel. Fifty years later, the Gilkerson Hotel was a parking lot. And Lake J. Frazier was a prominent New Mexico personality, having served four terms as mayor and received every honor and blessing from the people of Roswell.

The sunshine, pure air, and good water of Roswell had Lake on the road to recovery very soon. And more than this, the people of Roswell took him under their wing, pulling for him, helping him every way, extending the full cup of friendship.

The response of the people of Roswell and all the Pecos Valley struck a chord of gratefulness in the heart of Lake which inspired him with an even greater desire to get well.

During the height of the depression, Lake began his law practice while still in a wheel chair.

Jason Kellahin, a Roswell native, former editor of the old Roswell Morning Dispatch, and now a Santa Fe attorney once said:

There was a line extending down the block from Lake's office, of people needing legal help of all kinds. They would say,

"How can I pay you, Lake, I am broke."

And Lake would say, "Oh, pay me some day if you can; if not, the fact that I have helped you will be pay enough."

Lake Frazier's "bread cast upon the waters" truly did return "a hundred fold" and more.

We now must remember the saying that "Behind every great man is a great woman."

Helen Frazier was truly Lake's guardian angel through his heroic struggle; and, it is grateful to remember, shared in his success and happiness.

We rejoice that Helen Frazier is happy in her Heavenly Home with the Lord whom she has served so well while here among us.



To fill in the empty spaces and match what she already owned, Anderson said she made drawings of furniture which she took down to Juarez to have manufactured.

The house sits on the side of a hill and is landscaped with railroad ties and a variety of blooming plants mixed with the indigenous ponderosa pines.

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

At last some people are talking sensibly about "high tech."

That two-word phrase has become something of a fetish in New Mexico.

Those who are concerned with industrial development have homed in on that short statement as though it were going out of style.

The truth is such people have very little otherwise to say. All they can offer is a promise. That promise is often comprised in those two words: "high tech."

But what do those words have to do with reality?

What does "high tech" have to do with you, the reader of this column?

Not much.

"High tech" does not have much to do with anybody in New Mexico, though some departments of government, including the governor's office, would like you to believe that they do.

Of 50 states at the present time, 50 are trying to become the leaders in "high tech."

New Mexico is not alone in having noticed that there is money to be gained from this particular offshoot of our current society.

(Did you think that only our Department of Commerce and Industry noticed that "high tech" was the mode of the day?)

During the last months of 1982 — the closing days of the Bruce King administration — we paid for a lot of surveys.

There was, for example, that hokey paper on how UNM, NMSU, New Mexico Tech, Sandia and Los Alamos might be married to one another in something called "the Rio Grande research corridor."

A lousy idea. It was an ivory-tower suggestion if there ever was one.

Then there was the Fantus report. We were supposed to wait for that to be delivered, holding our breath as we did so. After all, it cost \$40,000. Didn't that make it important?

Not really.

It could have been written by anyone who took a report off the shelf and said, "Wherever a state is mentioned, change whatever it says to say 'New Mexico'."

Then Lee Zink, an economist at UNM published a paper which equally had nothing to do with reality.

What are people saying on this topic today?

Well, there is the lady in Albuquerque who has dealt with this sort of thing for a long time. She says, simply: "It's such a naive view to believe high technology is going to take care of everything."

And then there's the man who has tried to attract industry to New Mexico. He says: "There are not enough high-tech industries to go around."

And then there's the practical person who said of those companies of this kind who come here, "Locally, they'll hire secretaries, maintenance people . . . The lower-paying the position, the closer the circle will be. Technicians will be hired regionally; engineers, nationally."

In other words, New Mexicans hardly at all.

That person goes on to say: "New Mexico really prostitutes itself for industry. They don't ask enough questions at the beginning. The money the state spends on tax incentives and bonds . . . and they never have anything in writing about hiring locally at any level."

Don't count on silicon wafers to solve the financial problems in your particular county.

Kids write the darndest things, to paraphrase a saying by Art Linkletter. I recently had the opportunity to visit an intensive reading instruction program for third graders at East San Jose Elementary School in Albuquerque and while there, listened to 8- and 9-year-old youngsters deliver impromptu speeches.

I was impressed by their presentations. But I was even more impressed when these same children wrote to me in Washington, thanking me for my visit to their classroom.

The letters were part of their classwork under the Intensive Reading Instruction Team program designed to improve the basic skills of reading and writing for educationally disadvantaged students.

Judging from the quality of the letters I read, it appears to be quite successful.

The program involves students in grades 1-5 who spend three hours a day for 10 weeks learning to improve their reading and language arts skills. The results have been encouraging.

I really enjoy children's letters. For one thing, children usually ask little in return for their cheery correspondence.

Many of the letters from the East San Jose students asked me to preserve the funding for the reading program. Such a decision would be up to the state, but I'll be doing my part to keep he federal funding high enough to support such a program.

Funding for the government's Chapter I program which includes projects like the one at East San Jose Elementary School has been increasing during the past few years.

In fiscal year 1982, the entire

Chapter I program was funded at \$3,034 billion. That figure was raised to \$3,168 billion in 1983 and our current budget goal for fiscal year 1984 is to raise this yet another \$100 million to \$3,268 billion.

New Mexico received as its share of Chapter I funding \$24,712,816 for fiscal year 1983.

But children have far greater concerns than budget policy. Many more of them asked me to say "hi" to the president the next time I saw him.

A lot of the children expressed their interest in visiting the White House. I got the impression from reading their letters that they thought I lived there. I hate to disappoint these children, but even though my house is painted white, it's located in Rockville, Maryland.

One of the children Manuel Hernandez, inquired whether I had a horse, volunteering that he had three horses and a dog. No, I do not have a horse, Manuel. I thought eight kids were enough to handle without taking on the additional responsibilities of a horse.

Most students signed their names with the salutation "your friend" or an additional "I like you." But the one that touched me most was the part of a letter written by Isaac Lucero. He wrote, "I hope you aren't sad. I hope you are happy."

Well, I must say I am happy here. And letters from friends such as these third graders from East San Jose Elementary School make my day and keep my spirits up when the schedule and the work gets a little rough.

I hope they keep that positive optimistic attitude toward life that they have now when they take over as our leaders of tomorrow.

By the time the pesticide DDT was banned in this country, enormous damage already had been done to the bald eagle population.

Because of this chemical egg shells were too thin, so that many broke prematurely and hatchlings were greatly reduced.

It is pleasant to note that the recovery of these birds which symbolize the Republic is briskly continuing 11 years after the ban took effect.

The National Wildlife Federation's latest compilation shows a total of 13,804 bald eagles nationwide. That is 200 more than last year, and six times

the number counted a decade ago. The eagle's comeback is gratifying in itself, and further evidence of the value of federal controls over environmentally hazardous substances. — Alamogordo Daily News

Editorial

The new Lincoln war has turned out to be pretty unevenly balanced, with what seems like a majority of the town's tiny population rallying to the aid of the Historic Review Board. The citizens should be commended for so strongly supporting efforts to preserve historic traditions and maintain at least a 10-mile stretch of the past.

With the tremendous growth being experienced throughout Lincoln County, it is imperative that some careful planning be done and some control be exerted over expansion. Ruidoso has been noted as an example of what Lincolinites are trying to prevent their town from becoming.

While Lincoln's historic district ordinance, which regulates all construction in the area, contains only a nebulous explanation of what is and is not permitted, residents believe that its intent is clear—to ensure Lincoln is maintained as closely as possible as it was in the territorial period.

One has to wonder why anyone whose dreamhouse is anything other than a territorial-style adobe house would desire to build in Lincoln in the first place.

The historic board may appear to be nitpicking at times and inconsistent in its decisions—that speaks to the need for a more detailed outline of acceptable architectural styles and construction materials. But to set a precedent by allowing even a seemingly inconsequential variance from the spirit of the ordinance would destroy the 100 years of history that have been so carefully preserved there.—BG

Reporter's Round by Dave Sheppard

In exploring the issue of drug and alcohol abuse locally, I tried to get answers to some basic questions: What is the extent of abuse; who is affected by it and what are those effects; and what are the solutions or alternatives.

The numbers, especially associated with alcohol, tell us the extent of the problem.

As recognized by most sources, we have to realize that Ruidoso, though at times appearing to be an isolated, off-the-beaten-track mountain town, is not immune to social problems that affect any community.

Put Ruidoso and its permanent population in the middle of the Missouri farm belt and the problems with abuse probably wouldn't be too great, points out Ruidoso Police Department investigator Michael Lovelace. But consider the 20,000, 30,000—who knows how many—tourists who invade Ruidoso every year and you've got the makings of a big time.

The national and local DWI rates poignantly illustrate the extent and effects of alcohol abuse.

According to a national police publication, an average of 25,000 people are killed every year by drunk drivers, 600,000 are seriously injured, and the economic cost is estimated at \$25 billion a year. For every drunk driver arrested, another 2,000 get away.

Locally, Ruidoso police arrested 202 drunk drivers last year, 156 of whom were charged with first offense DWI. About a quarter of the 137 accidents involving injuries were alcohol related, and, of the two highway fatalities last year, one was attributed to alcohol.

The bombardment of alcohol-related problems continues. Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor estimates that 60 to 70 percent of violent crime in the village involves alcohol, and he says almost every family disturbance his officers are called to invariably involves alcohol.

The scope of drug abuse—or, as explained by Dr. Mike Stone, the actual terminology should be self abuse with drugs or alcohol—is more difficult to grasp because the numbers are unknown.

But, some interesting information came out when sources were asked about the drug scene. According to conclusions of a sting operation conducted jointly last year by local and state law enforcement agencies, the drug of choice in Ruidoso is cocaine.

RPD Investigator Gonzalo Cordova said the conclusion should not be a surprise. Ruidoso is an affluent community; and where there are people looking for a good time, and they have

plenty of bucks to pay for any pleasure, there's going to be cocaine.

But police are able to make little headway into the scene because use and trafficking is confined to small, tight-knit groups. Because police have made no large busts for cocaine or other hard drugs, the effect of drugs on local crime remains unclear.

When sources were asked what the most prevalent drugs in town were, the response was always the same. Alcohol is the number one abused substance here, with marijuana ranking a distant second place.

Something I didn't expect to see was, without exception, sources lumped alcohol together with all other drugs. In fact, most see it as being the most dangerous drug in our society because it is so commonly abused, and can be extremely harmful.

I was also surprised to hear the response from the high school on the issue. The real catalyst for the series came when Crime Stoppers and several local parents suggested the school is beset with a drug trafficking and use problem, and that something must be done.

When a former student fanned the fears of parents by claiming a majority of the school population uses drugs, present students, teachers and administrators loudly refuted the claim.

The surprise? No one denied use of drugs or alcohol at school. A majority of a group of students who supposedly represented a cross-section of student circles at the school said they drink liquor and smoke pot occasionally, but they rarely let it get out of hand.

Sure, pot and booze are widely available, they said, especially at weekend parties. And many high school students will indulge, whether on weekends or weeknights. But the main point they wanted to make clear was, even though they enjoy getting high, they don't want to ruin their lives with drugs and alcohol. Use is alright as long as it is controlled and doesn't become abuse.

The comments from the students were most encouraging. When sources were asked if any solutions exist to alleviate substance abuse in society, they overwhelmingly recommended education. A frank, realistic explanation to young people of the dangers of abuse is one step in the effort. Another recommendation was that parents, schools and the community must set convincing examples.

If the students interviewed are any indication of the current attitude toward abuse by today's youth, we are not far from achieving the goals set forth for drug and alcohol education.

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




