Golden Years Jubilee starts

The Golden Years Jubilee kicked off Sunday with a toe-tapping song festival in a grove of trees at the First Christian Church, and continues with activities planned through the week.

About 60 people showed up for the outdoor gospel singing sponsored by the Ministerial Alliance Jubilee Registration and a one-man play are scheduled for Monday.

Veteran actor and director Keith Holder will play Teddy Roosevelt in the one-man play "Bully" at Nottingham's Pub Monday at 8 p.m. Holder, formerly director of theatre at the Alamogordo campus of New Mexico State University, has had the lead in over 30 plays and directed over 40.

With only a desk, a chair and a Teddy bear for props, Holder will create the character of Roosevelt in a play that has been called "at times very touching and at times very hilarious."

Tickets for the play are available at the door for \$3. The public is invited. Tuesday through Thursday Jubilee participants will be able to see highlights of the area on tours planned each day.

Tuesday's tour will visit sights around Lincoln County. After leaving the old Safeway store the tour will travel to the Smokey Bear Museum in Capitan and on to the Malpais lava flows for a lunch break. After lunch, the tour bus will stop in Old Lincoln and the Billy the Kid Museum. Tourers will ride back through Lincoln National Forest. Tickets are available at the adult Recreation Center for \$20.

A fine arts tour is planned for Wednesday, leaving from Smith Ltd.

Gallery at 9 a.m. This tour will include exhibitions of stained glass work and bronze pouring, as well as stops at many local galleries. The tour will last approximately three hours and costs \$3.

Thursday's tour will travel to White Sands National Monument, the International Space Hall of Fame and the Omnimax Theater. "Hail Columbia" will be shown at the theater. The tour leaves at 8:30 a.m. and returns at approximately 5 p.m. Tickets cost \$20 and include lunch.

Due to uncertain numbers of participants in the tours, they may be cancelled if not filled.

Friday and Saturday appear to be the biggest days of the Jubilee with Frontier Days in the Park, the Health Fair and free admittance to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track for Jubilee participants.

The Health Fair will offer a variety of clinical testing and information at Jerry Dale's from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Glaucoma, hearing, blood pressure, anemia, blood sugar, height and weight testing will all be available to people 50 years and older. Local doctors will be on hand to interpret the tests and offer health counseling.

There will also be 25 exhibitors providing health information. National organizations such as the American Heart Association, American Lung Association, Easter Seal Society, American Cancer Society and Kidney Foundation will have educational exhibits at the fair.

An emergency medical transport helicopter, ambulance and fire fighting equipment will be on display outside at the fair. Crews will be on hand to answer information about the equipment and operations.

A frontier atmosphere complete with Western music and exhibitions of

frontier crafts will be the theme of Frontier Days in School House Park Saturday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Craftspeople will show their skills in quilting, spinning, weaving, soapmaking, whittling and more during the day. They will also sell their wares.

The children of the Mescalero Head Start Program in Mescalero will perform tribal dances, and square dancers from Roswell will entertain to the music of the Flying J Wranglers.

Watermelon seed spitting, hog calling, and horseshoe pitching contests will be open to people who want to compete for one of the prizes offered to the winners.

Historical writer Eve Ball will speak on local history and its characters at the Ruidoso Public Library, beginning at 3:15 p.m.

The Frontier Days will be free to everyone, and lunch will be offered for \$5.

Saturday night there will be a chuckwagon dinner at the Flying J Ranch, beginning at 6 p.m.

Both Friday and Saturday Jubilee participants will enjoy free admission to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Throughout the week organized games and activities are planned at the Adult Recreation Center. Jubileers will be able to play cards, 42, pool, checkers and horseshoes at the center.

Many restaurants, retail merchants and motels will offer discounts to people wearing Jubilee registration badges. The registration desk will be located at the Adult Recreation Center behind the Ruidoso Public Library. Registration will be free to Lincoln County residents, \$5 for single non-residents and \$7.50 for non-resident couples.

Council ratifies acts

The Ruidoso village council, whose official actions from March 30 to May 10 had been declared null and void by the state Attorney General's office, met Friday to ratify those actions and put them legally in force.

Rejection of the Open Meetings Act by the council April 26 was the cause of the ruling from Santa Fe. It came in the form of a letter from assistant attorney general Carolyn Wolf dated May 10.

"Based on (state) statutes, I must notify you that all actions taken by the Ruidoso Village Council after March 30, 1983, when your Open Meetings Resolution expired, are not valid," Wolf wrote.

The council passed the Open Meetings Act resolution at its regular meeting May 10. Acting on instructions from Wolf, village clerk Leon Eggleston prepared a summary of all the actions the council took at regular

meetings April 12, April 26 and up to the point during the May 10 meeting the resolution was adopted, plus special meetings April 6, April 15 and May 4.

Among the actions which had been declared null and void were the April 6 approval of a contract with Grindstone Canyon property owner Don Dorman and the April 26 annexation of the Grindstone Development property.

Friday Eggleston read aloud the nearly three legal-size pages summarizing the meetings before the council voted on ratification. Councilmen Don Dale, Benny Coulston and Frank Sayner and Mayor Pro Tem Al Junge all voted in favor.

Junge chaired the meeting in the absence of Mayor George White, who was in Santa Fe for a Municipal League meeting. White had called a special meeting for today (Monday)


at 4 p.m., also for the purpose of ratification of council actions.

According to Eggleston, the Open Meetings Act resolution must be passed once a year. The resolution was in force until the council rejected it, and adoption of the resolution April 26 would have continued it in force.

But the rejection, which came on a 3-1 vote (Dale voted aye) late in the meeting after White read the resolution aloud, meant all council actions after the time of expiration of the previous year's resolution March 30 were invalid.

Junge, who had called the rejection April 26 "a little trick on the mayor," said Friday had the councilmen know the repercussions, he thinks they would have reconsidered.

"You have no idea the work it's caused," said Eggleston earlier last week.

Summer Festival poster now available

If Gary Myers had painted a simpler painting for the Ruidoso Summer Festival poster, making it into a poster would have been an easier job.

But because of the mixture of fine detail with solid backgrounds and extraordinary colors of the painting, it took Myers and the pressmen in Denver, Colorado, two full days to get an accurate reproduction of his painting, "Song of Summer."

"It was an extremely difficult piece to print," said Myers Saturday morning as he signed and numbered the first of 1,200 posters.

Most color reproductions are produced by printing with four colors: red, blue, yellow and black. Myers and the pressmen added two extra colors to bring out the detail in the painting and the moon in the background.

After the first day and about 2,000

sheets of paper, Myers said, he thought they would not be able to get an accurate reproduction of his painting. They had tried a variety of color mixtures and even changed the paper twice, but were not satisfied with what they saw.

During the night a man completely reoperated the colors for the printing press by taking pictures of the painting through different filters. The filters let only specific colors through and make negatives that tell the presses where to print each color.

The pressman added another "push plate" to bring out the detail in the dress and foreground of the painting. They also added an extra blue printing to bring out the color and detail of the moon, which contrasts with the warm tones of the rest of the painting.

After comparing the reproductions with the original in a specially lighted area for two days, Myers finally approved one and the next 1,200 were made for sale.

The posters arrived in Ruidoso Friday night and Myers was hard at work over the weekend signing and numbering them.

They should be all signed by early in the week and are now on sale for \$30. Ted Bennett, chairman of finances for the Ruidoso Summer Festival, said the directors decided to keep the price low to make it affordable to more people.

The original painting, which is now property of Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated, is not for sale, although Bennett said one person has offered \$12,000 for the painting. Bennett said the directors hope to establish a permanent place for hanging Myers' painting and future summer festival art contest winners.

Allotta Dial, Easily A Twelve top Kansas Futurity qualifiers

ALLOTTA DIAL, a chestnut filly owned by Jack Fletcher of Simonton, Texas, emerged as the star of Thursday's elimination trials for the upcoming Kansas Futurity.

Allotta Dial sliced through a stiff headwind in the first race, covered the 350 yards in 18.08 seconds while winning by a length, and hung up the day's fastest qualifying time.

Thursday's program consisted of 15 races, each a qualifying heat for the Kansas Futurity. The first leg of the famed Triple Crown for two-year-olds carries a total purse of \$650,615, with \$216,654 going to the winner of the May 29 finale.

The Kansas trials continued Friday with another set of 15 races. The top five qualifiers from each day (as determined by the clock) will square off in the finale.

The "second five" from each day will meet in the First Consolation, while the third five from each day will go on to the Second Consolation. Allotta Dial, ridden by Larry Byers as an even-money favorite, went into

the Kansas trials with a 1-0-2 record from five starts and earnings of almost \$15,000. The filly is by Dial Jester out of Easter Lady Chick. The mutual payoffs were \$4, \$3.20, \$2.60.

The second-top qualifier was Fine-Looking Man, owned by William Carey of Lubbock, Texas. The colt was timed in 18.11. He was purchased in last year's All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs for \$55,000.

The third-best clocking of 18.13 was shared by Raise A Dandy, who won the eighth race by a head. The colt is owned by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma. Jest Real Easy won his heat by a head.

There was a deadheat for the fifth slot between Sassem Easy, an \$11,000 All-American Sale purchase, and Eagles Flight. Each was timed in 18.14. Sassem Easy won the shake and gained the fifth slot.

Sassem Easy is leased by John Bass and Charles Hawthorne of Ruidoso.

Eagles Flight will go into the First

Consolation. The other First Consolation qualifiers: Vital Link, 18.15; Steppin Lightly, 18.15; Mr. Crimson Bug, 18.16; Can Passem By, 18.17.

The qualifiers for the Second Consolation: Hopeshezin, 18.19; Ohs 199, 18.21; Sierra Tango, 18.21; Sierra Tango, 18.21; Easy Warrior, 18.22; Warm Thoughts, 18.22.

There was a three-way tie for the bottom two slots between Easy Warrior, Warm Thoughts and Tinsy Rose Bud. A shake eliminated Tinsy Rose Bud.

EASILY A TWELVE, the filly who scored a one and one fourth length win in the recent \$237,135 West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park, hung up the fastest qualifying time in Friday's elimination runs for the Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Easily A Twelve won Friday's 14th race, again by one and one fourth lengths, and stopped the clock in 18.05 seconds for the 350 yards.

That was the fastest time of the 15 heats staged throughout the afternoon.

The top five qualifiers from Friday, as determined by the clock, will join the top five from Thursday's runoff in the Kansas finale on May 29. The gross purse of the first leg of the Triple Crown is \$655,615. The Kansas winner collects a thumping \$216,654.

Easily A Twelve, a filly by Easy Dozen out of Mayshego, is owned by Trainer H Don Ferris of Sunland Park and Don E. Keith of Bakersfield, California. The filly's victory on Friday was her fourth against no defeats. She broke alertly under Jerry Nicodemus, then opened up powerfully in the final 100 yards.

Launched as a heavy favorite, Easily A Twelve returned mutual payoffs of \$2.60, \$3 and \$2.40.

Each end of the powerburst for fillies and mares in the three year-old and up category carried a purse of \$7,662. The winner's slice amounted to \$4,597.

In the first division, Baby Go Smooth, a 22-1 outsider, established an early half-length lead from the rail post. Coalcreek Ladybug, after breaking in second place, moved up strongly at the midway point to challenge for the lead.

The four-year-old mare got control not far from the wire and managed to retain a neck advantage. The mare—who'd won a division of the Go Together Handicap a year ago—is owned by Ernest Fanning of Coalgate, Oklahoma. Nicky Wilson was in the saddle.

Committee scolds Kelham, Coulston

The Architectural Plans Review Committee Wednesday denied a building permit application from a Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) member and approved an application submitted by village councilman Benny Coulston.

P&Z member Tom Kelham and Coulston had not followed procedures of the committee by initiating work on their building sites before submitting building plans to the committee.

The committee met in special session to review the applications.

Kelham admitted that he was well into construction on an addition to his store—House of Kelham—in midtown Ruidoso. Kelham had not received a building permit prior to starting the work.

Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) member Margaret Gaddy opened discussion on the matter by asking Kelham if he was involved in drafting rules that govern the review board. Kelham said he was.

"Then you know nothing should have been done until you got a building permit," Gaddy said.

According to village regulations, anyone who applies for a building permit is not permitted to initiate work on the site until the permit is issued. That includes clearing and excavating land.

Before a permit is issued for commercial construction, the application is submitted to the APRC for consideration. The committee reviews all exterior building plans to ensure buildings will not be detrimental to development of commercial districts.

The APRC also must approve the plans before a building permit can be issued.

Kelham said he started work on the building without a permit because he was pressed for time to finish the project before June. He applied for a permit about three weeks ago, he said, which was in time for the committee's previous meeting.

But the application was not considered because he failed to provide samples of building materials for review, which is required with each application.

Kelham also failed to present preliminary plans to building inspector Don Hendricks for a determination whether Kelham would have to retain an architect to approve the design. Gaddy said that, according to state law, any commercial building project estimated over \$30,000 has to be certified by a licensed architect or engineer.

After the committee denied the application, Kelham showed his plans to Hendricks. Kelham returned later with a written opinion from the building inspector that an architect was not needed on the project.

But the committee still denied the application and referred it to Hendricks for a final decision whether to issue a building permit. Kelham apologized to the committee for deliberately violating the requirements, noting that he "just went ahead and took a chance."

The committee also questioned Coulston about tree cutting he started on his building site without prior approval from the planning and zoning department.

Coulston said he cut some trees and cleared part of the site, located southwest of Minit Mart on Mechem Drive, to allow the site to be surveyed. "I just didn't have any choice," he said.

APRC member Lindsay Rusler noted that, according to a municipal regulation, no excavation or clearing of land is permitted without possession of a building permit.

But Coulston contended that any taxpayer is permitted to trim and thin trees to enhance property, without having to apply for a permit.

Rusler countered, "That's another problem. Who determines the interpretation of the ordinance? Yours sounds plausible, but will another guy determine that 500 trees need to be cleared?"

Gaddy agreed. She noted that one of the committee's main goals is to save landmark trees—which, according to APRC policy, are trees at least

25-inches in circumference—which is why the APRC makes on-site inspections before reviewing building plans.

"That's why we are so strict and demand we see the site," she said.

Coulston said he also wants to save trees, noting that he will orient the location of his building and parking spaces to minimize the tree loss.

Regarding his failure to obtain a building permit before starting work on the site, the councilman contended his project would have been delayed had he waited until the next scheduled meeting of the commission, and it would have cost him more money.

The committee meets every other Wednesday afternoon.

"It upset me I was going to be put off for two weeks," Coulston said.

"It seems to me you don't decide overnight to build," Milt Alcorn replied, and suggested Coulston could have asked APRC to inspect the site any time during the pre-planning stage.

APRC members emphasized that they encourage commercial developers to contact the planning and zoning office at village hall any time during preliminary planning stages of a project, and an APRC member will be available to make a site inspection.

After APRC approved Coulston's application, chairman Bill Carrigan noted that anyone can obtain a permit to cut and thin trees before applying for a building permit.

Roxann Box-Pfeffer achieves dream: police officer

Roxann Box-Pfeffer remembers a distant dream to one day patrol the streets as a police officer.

That dream came true almost two months ago when she sat for the first time in a Ruidoso Police Department cruiser as patrol officer R. Pfeffer.

"I finally made it here, now it's just going out and doing it," she said in an interview last week.

Box-Pfeffer was promoted from communications-detention officer to the streets in March. She began with RPD about two years ago as a dispatcher. Before coming to Ruidoso, she was a dispatcher with the Eddy County Sheriff's Department for two years.

Box-Pfeffer fell in love with Ruidoso during several vacation trips here. On one of those trips, she noticed a "help wanted" ad in the newspaper from RPD, which was soliciting applications for a dispatcher's position.

"I wanted to come to Ruidoso for years," recalls Box-Pfeffer. She applied for and was hired for the position, thus fulfilling one of her wishes.

As communications-detention officer—RPD dispatchers also are trained in jail management—Box-Pfeffer passed certification tests for her position and other related fields. She is a certified Emergency Medical Technician and she is trained as a key operator for breath alcohol testing equipment.

Within the next year, Box-Pfeffer will attend the New Mexico Police Academy's basic training course for law enforcement officers.

Box-Pfeffer is currently the only female among 16 officers in the RPD patrol division. At first, she admits, she bore the brunt of criticism from a few of the policemen who "thought I had no business being out there."

The initial indications of discrimination came when she was training in self-defense techniques.

Box-Pfeffer said she felt one of the police sergeants wanted to show her a lesson during training with the PR-24 defensive weapon. But, Box-Pfeffer, at 5 feet 7 inches tall and weighing 120 pounds, said she held her ground when the sergeant tried to muscle her down, and thus gained his respect.

"With the PR-24, the size of the person I come against doesn't matter on weight, it just depends on your skill with the PR-24," she explained.

Though she proved she could defend herself, Box-Pfeffer said she still had to prove herself on the street.

For the first three weeks on patrol, she was closely supervised by her training officer, Danny Steward. Box-Pfeffer said Steward showed her how to approach vehicles on traffic stops, and other procedures involved with being a patrol officer.

During the fourth week, Box-Pfeffer went out on her own, but Steward remained on the same shift as her backup officer.

Since going on patrol, Box-Pfeffer said she has been occupied mostly with traffic stops. At first, she noted, she had a difficult time "being nasty to people" who would argue with her about a ticket.

"But I'm finding now whenever I approach someone... I've got to be stern with them right off the bat," she said. "Being a female, I've got to let them know I can't let them bully me around."

So far, no one has attempted to physically threaten Box-Pfeffer. She points out that such things go through

her mind on almost any traffic stop—"You just never know what you're up against when you walk up to a window."

But she is developing more confidence in herself. And, she added, she knows there is always a backup if she needs help.

Asked if she has noticed any advantages she has over male officers, Box-Pfeffer thought for a moment, then said, "So far, making contact with men is easier than women. Men seem more cooperative."

And, now that she is starting to shed her rookie status, she said she is experiencing more cooperation and acceptance from the other officers.

"The other day, a sergeant said, 'When are you going to get those dispatcher's patches off.' I took that as saying, 'Now you're on our side.'"

Box-Pfeffer, who is married to RPD lieutenant Dave Pfeffer, said her husband supports her 100 percent in her decision to go on the street.

As far as further goals as a police officer, she said, "My goal is to be one of the best in the department. That's not easy because I feel we have a lot of the best working—it's a challenge."



Warrior tracksters stand out at state meet

Ruidoso High School track athletes won a host of medals in the AAA division state meet Saturday at Wilson Stadium in Albuquerque.

The Warrior boys team came through with its best performance since joining the AAA division, and the Ruidoso girls took a fifth in the 1,600-meter relay.

Ruidoso scored 14 points in the boys division and two in the girls division.

The Warriors' total in the boys competition is five more than Ruidoso scored last season, and the most in at least four years since the school left the AA division.

The Warrior boys got second places from Mike Douglass in the 100 meters and Cisco Bob in the 1,500 meters. Curt McClellan added a third place in the 800 meters and Grady Williamson was fifth in the intermediate hurdles. Douglass added a fourth in the 200 meters.

Gia Rose, Deanna Peso, Stacy Ivy

and Valerie Garcia made up the girls' 1,600-meter relay team which recorded a 4:16.90. The quartet ran a seasonal best of 4:15.40 in the heats Friday night. Rose and Ivy also had personal bests in the 400-meter heats Friday.

"I was very pleased with the guys' performance," said Warrior head boys coach Ronny Maskew. "All the guys worked hard and did a good job, particularly since the weather was cold and windy. We scored in every event we were entered in."

Douglass's outstanding effort in the 100 meters was particularly surprising since it was only the second time the senior had run that race in his career.

Douglass won his heat Friday in 11.12, then came back with an 11.13 for the runner-up spot in the finals Saturday. Darrel Foutz of Kirtland Central High School won the event in 11.08.

Douglass then ran a 22.94 for fourth place in the 200 meters. He put on a strong kick down the backstretch to earn his points. Foutz again won the event, finishing in 22.60.

"Mike got his best starts in the 100 meters," said Maskew. "That's more important in the 100 than the 200. We worked with his starts last week and it helped."

Bob also showed a strong kick in taking second in the 1,500 meters. He trailed Joel Lee of Aztec High School and Shannon Can of St. Pius High School on the final turn, but overtook the latter runner in the last 40 yards.

The Warrior sophomore ran a 4:16.20, almost three seconds slower

than his personal best of 4:13.29.

McClellan knocked almost three seconds off his previous best in running a 2:02.79 in the two-lap event. The 800 meters was one of the strongest events in the AAA field.

Williamson took fifth in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles with a 41.19 time. He had won his heat in 40.40 Friday. Rod David of Tucumcari High School—the AAA division team winner—won the event in a speedy 39.94.

It was only the fourth time the Warrior senior had tried the event.

Maskew felt that Williamson would have done even better in the hurdles if he had tried them earlier.

"That's probably my fault," the Warrior mentor said. "He might have been able to break 40 flat if he had more experience on them."

Maskew also liked the way McClellan and Bob came through.

"You know, Cisco's only a sophomore and there are always a lot of good runners," he said. "The cold and wind might have prevented him from running faster."

"Before the race, I felt Curt would have done well to run 2:03.0 or 2:04.0 considering how cold it was. He did a great job."

In the girls competition, Garcia brought the Warrior 1,600-meter relay team from sixth place to fifth place on her anchor leg.

The Ruidoso junior took the baton from Ivy about three yards behind the fifth-place runner. However, Garcia turned on the speed on the final turn and took fifth easily.

"We thought we could take fifth,"

Garcia said. "It was a hard race, though."

Warrior girls coach Sergio Castanon was hoping the 1,600-meter relay team could go faster.

"I was hoping after Friday night's heat, we could run about a 4:12.0 and maybe place in the top two," he said. "I was contented with the time but not satisfied. You're never satisfied."

In the 400-meter heats, Rose ran a 63.9 and Ivy a 65.1. However, neither runner made the finals.

Peso finished seventh in the 800 meters with a 2:39.0 clocking, six seconds off her seasonal best.

The Warrior medley relay squad of Rose, Ivy, Garcia and Lillian Lopez ran a seasonal best of 1:57.72 in the heats, but failed to make the finals. Ruidoso had a seasonal best of 1:59.0 entering the state meet.

"All in all, I felt the girls did a good job considering we only had 11 athletes on the team," Castanon said. "All five girls we had in the state meet will return next season. In order to win in our district, we're going to need more athletes."

"However, the snow storms hurt us this year. We would have done better if we hadn't had them."

NOTES. Garcia has made the state meet three straight years, and should make it a grand slam next season as a senior. Besides Tucumcari's win in the AAA boys division, Lovington High School won the girls AAA title, Hobbs High School took the AAAA boys crown and Manzano High School captured the AAAA girls championship. Hobbs won its title on the last event of the day, the 1,600-meter relay.

Now that the state high school AAAA-AAA division track meet is over, it's time to look at a possible change in the setup of the meet.

Team and individual champions are currently decided in each of the four divisions. That's fine, but why not have a meet of champions after the state team meets, to decide who are the overall individual champions in New Mexico?

The way the setup is now, it's possible for an athlete from the A, AA or AAA division to have a better mark in his or her division state meet than the AAAA division champion, and still not get credit for being the best in the state.

Last weekend in Albuquerque, several of the AAA division champions had better marks than their AAAA division counterparts.

In fact, the fastest girl sprinter in the state this season was Toni Brooks of Tatum High School, an A division school. Brooks, a transfer from Capitan High School, was the main reason Tatum won the girls A division championship this season.

Brooks' case is an exception to the rule. Usually, the AAAA division has most of the top marks in the boys and girls competition, mainly because the schools in that division are the largest in the state.

However, the lack of a meet of champions leaves some doubt as to who is really the state champion in each event.

If a meet of champions were held after the regular state meets, track

fans across the state would get to see the best athletes in all the divisions compete.

The first-place finishers in each event of the four divisions would automatically qualify for this meet.

A certain qualifying standard for times and throws could also be set up to allow deserving athletes who did not finish first in the state meets to participate in the meet of champions.

No team competition would be held in the meet of champions. The attention would be on the individual events and the four relay events.

The current situation does a disservice to those athletes who win championships in the smaller school divisions, but who don't have the competition to push them to better marks.

This meet wouldn't take anything away from the athletes and team champions who won the division titles. It would just give athletes a chance to show who really is the best in New Mexico in a particular event.




THE THREE LOGOS to be voted on are pictured here. They are, clockwise from top left, number one, two and three.



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Project encourages high school students' oral history interest

Area high school students are helping keep history alive in Lincoln County through a project sponsored by the Lincoln County Historical Society (LCHS) beginning this year. One high schooler's impressions of how Ruidoso has changed during her 17 years here, and a tale of the supernatural experience of two young hikers in the area are the subjects of two essays included in the LCHS Youth File, a new part of the society's ongoing oral history projects.

LCHS president Lynda Sanchez—a writer/teacher/historian—initiated the Youth File as an effort to get young people and teachers more enthused about oral history, to increase community involvement in the historical society and to add some different perspectives to the overall oral history files.

Ruidoso High School (RHS) English teacher Raymona McAdams agreed to submit some of the weekly essays written for her American literature class, from which LCHS officers select pertinent examples for the file. "Since they're studying American literature, they may as well be involv-

ed in it," McAdams remarked. Several other Lincoln and Otero County teachers have also agreed to submit students' work for the file. RHS junior Dahn Stirman wrote about the encroachment of new homes and commercial establishments on what was once a scarcely developed area of Ruidoso where she lives. She said she recalls that when her father built their house near the airport entrance, on Skyview Drive, "there was hardly anything around here, but the town has encircled us now."

Where only three or four houses used to compose all the structures on the block, an additional four houses, a Pizza Inn, real estate offices and storage units now stand where only trees previously made up the scenery, Dahn related.

She also recalls a hill near her house where she and her brother would build forts to play in, where they were the sole disturbers of the peaceful quiet there. A house now stands on that hill, Dahn pointed out. "I'm glad Ruidoso is growing," she said, "but I liked it because it was sort of isolated, and now it's not."

"I wish we could move again farther out of town." Dahn feels her story is an important part of the history of this area because "maybe in 20 years a J. C. Penney's will be sitting here." With her essay tucked away in the historical file, future residents can read it and discover how much Ruidoso has changed.

Dahn said her history teacher has impressed upon her that "the key to the future is the past." "What you do in the future is based on what was done in the past," Dahn agrees, so historical records are important.

Dahn also wrote an essay for McAdams' class based on interviews with her grandmother, who grew up on a farm in Texas. "I found out a lot of things I didn't know," she admitted.

Sanchez pointed out one of the reasons she encourages young people to get involved in oral history is because they often become more involved with their own families as a result.

Kathy Harrison also submitted an essay which has been included in the LCHS Youth File, based on an ex-

perience related to her by a friend. The story is of a seemingly supernatural occurrence witnessed by this friend and another youth on a camping trip near Three Rivers.

Two important elements of the story, Kathy explains, are that her friend is part Indian and that Three Rivers is known to be taboo—a place of witches. The two hikers were sitting around their campfire when they spied two other campfires in the distance.

When the boys began walking toward the two lights, everything grew deathly quiet. Upon reaching the site, the campfires were suspended in the air. The two young hikers quickly fled the scene and abandoned their camping trip in Three Rivers.

Kathy believes the story illustrates that much of the folklore handed down through generations is not just folklore but tales of actual incidents.

"A lot of so-called 'old Indian stories' we think didn't happen did happen," Kathy said. Having this story included in the historical files will help continue those legends, which is important because they are a part of our heritage, she noted.

"I think oral history is important to have recorded," Kathy continued. If

people do not make an effort to write down their feelings and experiences, they are going to be lost, she pointed out.

"We're keeping alive something that could die very easily," she noted.

The high school junior said she has always loved and been interested in history. Having moved here only last year, she has since discovered that Lincoln County history "holds a lot." That is part of what the Lincoln County Historical Society is attempting to convey and preserve through its oral history files. Sanchez said she has discovered the importance of such files in her research for various articles she has written.

"I feel that 50 years down the road these files will be equally important," she said.

"A richer and more varied history" will be offered to future researchers through the oral history projects now being carried out.

Sanchez feels including oral history in any research on a certain period in time is a responsibility of the researcher—"it gives you what the common man was doing." She hopes the LCHS Youth File will encourage more young people to utilize oral history and realize the importance of it.

In a talk on oral history to McAdams' class, Sanchez told students they can make a lot of wonderful friends and gather some different perspectives on life by talking with people about their life experiences and memories.

"I've had some of the neatest experiences of my life as a result of doing oral research," Sanchez stated. "It's not just for little gray-haired ladies."

She said LCHS encourages anyone in the area to get involved in the oral history project—an adult file is also kept by the society. The files are open to anyone interested in reviewing them and are kept at the Lincoln Courthouse or by the society's historian. The best tapes and essays will also be included in university archives at Las Cruces and Portales.

To better encourage participation in the project, the society hopes to establish a scholarship or special award for outstanding taped interviews or reports, Sanchez pointed out.

There are many old-timers in and around Lincoln County whose memories should be recorded, she said. The LCHS project is one effort toward that end.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—You can get good quotes if you promise not to name names.

This one is from a man who has been a high-ranker in the administrative and legislative sides of state government and a student of human foibles all his life.

"The main trouble with the Anaya administration," he says, "is that it built around a contradiction.

"The Governor, during the campaign and since taking office, has faithfully preached the doctrine of economic development—the need for new jobs for New Mexicans.

"He's right—so right, in fact, that his ability to achieve that will be almost the only thing by which the success or failure of his administration will ultimately be judged.

"But while he talks about that, almost everything else he does contradicts what he is saying.

"Almost every appointment he makes and a great deal of the legislation he sponsors signals business people, inside the state and outside it, that he is philosophically anti-business.

"He can't have it both ways. Within the next three-and-a-half years, his desire to have things both ways could eat him alive."

That's clear, crisp and to the point. It tells you what one shrewd observer of many New Mexico governments believes.

Here's another quote, this time from a man who has also served in state government as an elected official and has been active in the

Democratic party for many years:

"That was an interesting statement the Governor made on the night he was elected about how he didn't owe anybody anything. He offered, if you remember, to give back any financial contribution he had received if the giver felt that entitled him or her to anything from the new administration.

"That sounded good, and it got lots of notice in the media.

"Trouble is, it isn't true. "You do owe people when you get chosen for public office. Everyone ever elected does.

"Who ever got elected entirely on his own merits? Nobody.

"So Toney had lots of obligations, just as does anyone in office. The question is how well he has paid them.

"There are some who feel he has not done too well in passing out rewards, except possibly to the environmentalists and consumerites who worked for him.

"Certainly the teachers, who supported him, have grown restive, in the belief that he did not reciprocate their support during the legislative session earlier this year. They are unhappy.

"The same goes for the union members who are state employees. They don't believe they got much support when they needed it. They won't forget either.

"To me, it's always been a principle of politics that you pay your debts, you don't disavow them.

"That too may come back to haunt Toney during his future political career."

DEAR EDITOR:

The Lincoln National Forest, Mescalero Reservation and nearby State and private lands are facing an outbreak of western-spruce budworm. During the last few months an interdisciplinary team, with representatives from the U.S.D.A. Forest Service, New Mexico Division of Forestry, New Mexico Department of Agriculture and Bureau of Indian Affairs, have met to map out a plan of action concerning the outbreak.

The team held three meetings to analyze the situation. Attached is a list of preliminary public issues and management concerns which relate to the budworm infestation and possible treatments of the outbreak. These issues and concerns were identified through a scoping process to consider other western spruce budworm management programs in northern New Mexico where issues could relate to the outbreak in the southern part of the State.

A "public issue" is a subject or question of widespread public interest relating to use or management of resources. Issues are generally identified through a public participation process. A "management concern" is an issue or problem identified by those who manage the National Forest, Indian Reservation or State and private lands. Both issues and concerns are referred to as issues in the attached list.

We need your help to confirm these issues and determine if there are other issues or concerns we should include. We need your help. It will aid us in developing an alternative to treat the western spruce budworm outbreak.

You are invited to attend a public meeting scheduled on: Monday, May 23, at 7:30 p.m. in Mescalero at the BIA Forestry Office; Tuesday, May 24, at 7:30 p.m. in Ruidoso at the Public Library and Wednesday, May 25, at 7:30 p.m. in Cloudcroft in the multi-purpose room at the high school.

We will discuss preliminary issues and any others you feel should be con-

sidered.

At the meeting we will provide background information on the western spruce budworm, explain the damages caused by the infestation and describe the situation in southern New Mexico.

PRELIMINARY ISSUES

1. The visual quality of the forest and surrounding communities will be affected by the western spruce budworm infestation. Tourism depends heavily on natural beauty, and forest visitors expect a high level of scenic quality.

2. Use of chemical pesticides in the environment, if chosen as the preferred treatment alternative. There is concern over the effects of chemicals on water quality, domestic livestock, wildlife, bees, humans, and fisheries.

3. Efficiency of treatment chosen.

4. The mixed conifer type in the wilderness may be affected. Treatment of the wilderness will be based on threats to timber values of surrounding lands posed by insect populations existing in the wilderness.

5. Concern had been expressed over possible lack of suppression action by the Lincoln National Forest, Mescalero Apache Reservation and New Mexico State Forestry.

6. A long term infestation would have an adverse impact on timber including cones and Christmas trees.

7. There are two proposed research natural areas (RNA's), in corkbark fir and white fir which may be affected by the infestation.

8. A long term infestation may create a heavy build-up of fuels which could lead to a potential fire hazard.

9. A variety of wildlife species are present in the infested area including two threatened and endangered species—the Sacramento salamander and the bald eagle. Treatment chosen may have an effect on these species.

I have a friend, who, once every week, calculates to the penny the cost of visiting a psychiatrist on a regular basis.

Then, upon receipt of his paycheck, that exact amount is subtracted. With cash in hand, he journeys to the neighborhood fishing tackle store. There he spends it gleefully.

His reasoning is this: fishing keeps him sane. Conversely, he says, if he couldn't go fishing, he would go completely insane. And probably need to visit the psychiatrist. Therefore he allows that the money is predestined for his mental health, and all in all, he'd rather be fishing.

Rational, after listening to that kind of rationale for some fourteen years, his wife is understandably happy to see him go.

You'd think this man catches a lot of fish, since basically he lives for little else. But he doesn't. And he doesn't even seem to care.

Fishing, for my friend, is more than so many ounces of meat on the end of a wire hook. And despite the almost sinful elaboration he calls a tackle box, fishing has come to mean something more to him than a collection of expensive paraphernalia.

Every summer this man has himself and an aluminum canoe air-dropped into the wilds of Alaska. He then spends two weeks in virtual solitude upon some exotically named river, fishing, floating, and basically being about as happy as a member of humankind can be.

You'd think there would be a psychological letdown, returning from that kind of a trip into the heat of a south plains summer. Never. He simply ties a little yellow popping bug onto his battered old fly rod, launches a leaky johnboat onto a nearby farm pond, and commences flailing away at some overhanging willows, where the bluegill population has had his number for over a decade now.

I've often accused him of a will- ingness to turn his bathtub into a trout tank if someone would stock it. But that's just a joke among friends, for I know it's not true.

Fishing for my seemingly fanatical buddy has nothing to do with fanaticism. No, it's just the opposite: it's his particular brand of peace, and he seeks it out like a religion.

He is a man who has a deep love and respect for the land. Particularly the watery places. Fishing is simply a mechanical act, something to hone his natural instincts and reflexes while his mind goes a lot deeper.

My friend, when questioned, can tell you the hydrology, biology, ichthyology, entomology, geology, zoology, meteorology and botany of just about any place he's cast a lure. He's a good scientist—self-taught—a labor of love because he cares enough to learn about the countryside he cares for.

But then, being a well-adjusted and happy individual, he's careful not to let science get in the way of his fishing. Or vice versa. It's only that he knows somehow it's all interrelated: pure water, fish, soil, rock, rainfall, plants, animals, and man.

He says that's where the respect comes in. Every time his line sings through the air or the current bounces over a stone, he feels good, feels like he belongs. Peaceful.

And that means a lot to him, knowing we are one people, sharing one earth, charged with protecting this battered old planet we've abused pretty drastically in recent years. Maybe it's time, he says, to give a little back to the land, and the watery places.

I watch him fishing, his hands expertly making all the moves, his eyes reflecting a contentment I rarely see these days, and picking up my tackle, feel inclined to agree.

with a Hannover broker on a small farm in that area. According to the paper, the Anayas are buying the place to "raise horses and as a retirement investment."


