Dealin Easy wins Kansas Derby by a neck

DEALIN EASY looked like a beaten horse at the midway point of Sunday's Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs, but the colt turned things around with a dramatic rush on the final strides.

With one jump to go in the 400-yard classic, Dealin Easy was still behind the high-flying filly, Bartdress.


But Dealin Easy put everything he had into that final stride and nailed Bartdress by a head in the first leg of the famed Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses.

The Kansas Derby packed a hefty gross purse of \$327,735, of which \$276,089 was dished out in Sunday's finale. The victory share of \$113,151 went to Jack and Linda Fletcher of Simonton, Texas. The winning trainer is Jack W. Dube.

Dealin Easy was ridden by the veteran, Steve Harris. The win payoffs: \$12.60, \$6.40, \$6. The Derby champ, who is by the thoroughbred, Hempen, out of Surf Jet, covered the 400 yards in 20.06 seconds.

Bartdress, the property of James F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, collected a sizable \$51,726 for second and put prices of \$5.60 and \$4.80 on the tote board. Larry Byers was up on Bartdress is trained by Clifton Dean.

Mr. Phillips, running at odds of nearly 19-1, hit the wire in third place, a half length behind Bartdress.

Kenneth Hart was at the controls. Mr. Phillips (\$10.60) is also trained by Jack Dube. The owner is the Estate of Jack R. Delmar of Richmond, Texas. The third-place purse was \$26,509.

Here's how the rest of the field checked in, with purse money earned:

4th Calm Shesha, \$13,901; 5th Alth Tom, \$12,608; 6th Top Moons Gay, \$12,285; 7th Call Me Favorite, \$11,961; 8th Mighty White Hope, \$11,638; 9th Sparkling Sooner, \$11,315; 10th Heza Sissy, \$10,991. Dealin Easy went into the Kansas

Derby with a 1983 moneyline of \$2,100 and a record of two wins from two starts. As a two-year old in 1982, he went to the races four times, remained a maiden, but picked up respectable earnings of \$16,447. In the Kansas Derby, the chestnut

colt broke in fourth place while Bartdress, benefitting from a heads-up getaway, established a solid advantage on the rail. Bartdress gave no indications of weakening when she hit the half point, still trucking in high gear.

Dealin Easy appeared to be languishing in a holding pattern with about a 100 yards to go—just as Mr. Phillips was beginning to launch his best attack.

As the field neared the wire, it almost seemed Dealin Easy got a whiff of big money, and exploded to life. He closed with big, ground-eating strides, putting away the weakening Mr. Phillips without much fanfare.

But it was a different story with the courageous Bartdress. The filly plainly had no idea of quitting, and forced Dealin Easy to come and get her.

That's exactly what the colt did in the last jump. Bartdress was still hitting on all burners when she crossed the wire. Dealin Easy, much to his enormous credit, turned in a truly super performance in that last jump.

Shesha Goody, coupled in the waging with Call Me Favorite, was far behind in the early going, and needed a solid closing move in order to nail down fourth.

Call Me Favorite, a winner of nearly \$250,000 and ostensibly the stronger half of the entry, appeared to have no excuses. The filly broke without incident from the number 9 post. Jerry Nicodemus was up. But Call Me Favorite was unable to generate sufficient speed, and quickly found herself in ninth place. During the rest of the journey, she was able to improve her lot by only two notches.

Chamber, Lodgers tax proposals differ

For the first time in the short history of the Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC), the advisory committee has two fiscal year budget proposals to consider.

And, because one proposal suggests cutting the advertising subsidy to the Chamber of Commerce, the committee must prepare for some delicate negotiating in an upcoming budget workshop.

LTC chairman Ed Hyman asked last week that discussion on the two proposals from the Chamber and the Ruidoso Lodgers Association be tabled to allow the committee time to review the requests. Hyman said he will schedule a workshop sometime in the next two weeks to study the proposals and attempt to forge a compromise.

He noted the committee may need two or three meetings before drafting a 1983-84 budget proposal. Final approval of the lodgers' tax budget rests with the village council.

In the decade since the New Mexico Legislature authorized the collection of a lodgers' tax, the Ruidoso committee has formulated its budgets mainly on the advice of the Chamber. Hyman said last week the committee has had input from other organizations, but this is the first time it has had two fiscal year requests to consider.

In the balance is spending of anywhere from \$100,000 to \$125,000 in tax revenues, projections for next year's collections given by various sources.

Both organizations place a large emphasis on seasonal advertising of the community. The Lodgers Association

proposal, which was drafted by vice president Don Wenner, allots \$67,000 for seasonal promotion with \$30,000 each for the summer and winter. The Chamber proposes spending \$48,500 for seasonal advertising.

RLA president Glen Ferguson said Thursday the purpose behind the proposed seasonal campaign is to provide money to advertise Ruidoso as a year round vacation spot, something he says is not promoted enough.

The Chamber also proposes more money for seasonal advertising next year, with \$30,000 requested for the ski season and \$16,000 for a summer campaign. Last year, the council approved \$27,000 in ski season advertising money, \$2,200 for summer advertising, and \$1,520 for the off season.

A \$16,500 summer advertising campaign was proposed last June, but it never got off the ground.

Proposals to finance year round advertising with lodgers' tax funds are not new. Last year the Chamber and LTC tried to initiate an annual promotion campaign, but it failed because funds already were earmarked and the two organizations could not agree how to coordinate the advertising.

As proposed by RLA, seasonal promotion would require two thirds of anticipated tax revenues next year. To finance the campaign, the lodgers' group proposes deep cuts in subsidies to the Chamber, and to events organized by other groups.

One of the big cuts would be in assistance to the Chamber, which received \$24,645 under the 1982-83 budget. Ferguson said he believes the Chamber should become self-supporting and should not receive as much public tax money for its opera-

tions. Ferguson admitted, however, that after talking with Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth, he realized part of the subsidy is justified because it offsets Chamber costs associated directly with tourist promotion.

Still, the RLA president said he feels the Chamber should be able to raise its annual dues that are paid by some 500 members. This, he believes, would create more than enough revenue to support the Chamber's costs.

Jungbluth said he agrees the Chamber should not have to receive a public subsidy for advertising. The assistance pays for printing brochures, an employee's salary, postage costs and a weekly tourist inquiry. If it is slashed, Jungbluth points out, many promotional activities will have to be discontinued.

Concerning Ferguson's suggestion to raise dues, Jungbluth explained that the Chamber board of directors has discussed the idea, but decided that any increase would cause many members to cancel their membership.

The theory is 30 to 50 percent would drop their membership if dues were raised by 50 percent. Jungbluth said he noted that dues now range from \$100 to \$700 a year for most businesses.

In addition to cutting the Chamber's assistance, the Lodgers Association proposal would reduce the allocation for the Chamber's art festival to \$1,000, compared to the Chamber's request of \$6,000. Last year, the council approved almost \$4,000 for the art festival.

Also, the lodgers would like to see

the trade show request cut from \$10,000 last year to \$5,000. The Chamber has requested \$13,500 for the next fiscal year.

Ferguson said he feels that since the Chamber turns a profit from the art festival, it should not need an advertising subsidy for the event. Jungbluth noted the Chamber netted \$10,000 from last summer's festival, but he added the money was targeted to pay for a portion of the Chamber's operating costs.

Ferguson indicated at the LTC meeting last week that he disapproves of the trade show allocation because much of the money pays for transportation and food costs. Jungbluth countered that without the subsidy, volunteers would not be able to take time off from work and man-

age booths at the shows. Jungbluth says the reason the Lodgers Association has suggested deep cuts in the Chamber subsidies is ignorance about the Chamber budget. He said no one from the Lodgers Association discussed the Chamber requests with him before drafting the lodgers' tax proposals.

"People think 'You made a profit, what are you doing with it,'" Jungbluth said. "We have a budget of \$215,000, only \$50,000 comes from dues. Where's the rest going to come from?"

Ferguson said the philosophy of the RLA proposal is to cut requests for events that make a profit. The request for the fall motorcycle festival, however, is \$8,000, double the amount received last year. Ferguson said he disagrees with the request.

Forest Service agreeable to ski expansion

The United States Forest Service plans to accommodate expansion of the Sierra Blanca Ski Area north into the South Fork Rio Bonito watershed, according to a draft of the Lincoln National Forest Land Management Plan (LMP) dated February 1983.

"The area (South Fork Rio Bonito) has been determined suitable for designation as a corkbark fir

research natural area and the expansion of the Sierra Blanca Ski Area," states the plan written by an interdisciplinary team from the Lincoln National Forest supervisor's office in Alamogordo.

Dennis Roy, recreation and lands staff assistant at Smokey Bear Ranger District, said the target date for the finished Land Management Plan is December 1984, at which time the land would be formally allocated for the expansion.

Roy said the ski area is having a Master Development Plan prepared for submission to the Forest Service sometime this summer. After the final draft of the LMP is published, the Forest Service will be able to approve the ski area's Master Development Plan.

The Forest Service will consider a range of environmental, cultural, visual and archaeological factors before approving the ski area's plan. Roy mentioned sewage facilities and

transportation capabilities as important considerations.

Smokey Bear Ranger Paul Gordon explained that the master development plan is a general plan outlining sizes and locations of buildings and lifts. Even after it is approved, each phase of expansion will have to be studied and approved as it is submitted to the Forest Service.

Downs trustees to consider two annexations

Two requests for property annexation will be considered tonight (Monday) by Ruidoso Downs trustees, at their regular meeting beginning at 7 p.m. at the municipal building. Both annexation petitions were approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday.

The request for annexation of 19.692 acres between village limits and Lincoln National Forest was heard two weeks ago by trustees, who responded favorably to the proposal but sent it to

P&Z for a recommendation. The almost 20 acres will include Inspiration Corporation's camp facilities, a 48-unit apartment complex and a radio station and tower. The remainder of the acreage is undevelopable, according to owners.

The other request is for annexation of just under one acre, at the corner of Colorado and Dakota Streets. Property owner Mack Rice recently purchased a liquor license, which will be transferred to the B & R Incorporated.

Development District. The request is for a new water well, purchase of two pagers for the water department at a cost of \$325 each.

Assessment of penalty charge for failure to hook on to the sewer system by June 1.

Purchase of dumpsters. Request from B & R Incorporated to move a building to its property.

Ruidoso patrons evidently felt Calm Tom, the top qualifier, was something of a fluke. They pretty much ignored him in the wagering, letting him get away at 11-1. But the colt turned in a creditable performance, breaking in third place, and eventually settling for fifth. Troy Crissup was up.

A slight headwind was blowing during the Derby, but it was a sunny, pleasant afternoon.

Racing at Ruidoso Downs resumes Friday with a four-day holiday weekend extending through Monday, May 30 (Memorial Day).

LUCKS LUCKY got a heads-up start in Saturday's \$47,200 Consolation of the Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs and stayed in control all the way.

The colt left little doubt as to his superiority in the consolation field, pulling further ahead in the final strides of the 400-yard dash.

He hit the wire with a one and one quarter-length lead under Larry Byers and raked in \$9,698. Launched as a lukewarm favorite at 5-2, Lucks Lucky—a colt by What Luck out of One Fine Day—returned wagering payoffs of \$7.20, \$3.60 and \$3. The winning time was 20.44 seconds against a headwind.

The Consolation winner is owned and trained by Nerral E. Bruney of Dennis, Texas. Primetime Wrangler, a 7-1 shot ridden by Troy Crissup out of the number 10 slot, finished second, a neck in front of Chicks Etta Wind, a 3-1 shot.

Primetime Wrangler, owned by Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas, refunded mutual prices of \$7 and \$4.20. Chicks Etta Wind, the heroine of last summer's Kansas Futurity, returned \$3.20 to show.

Primetime Wrangler earned \$6,789 while Chicks Etta Wind collected \$5,172.

Lucks Lucky went into the Kansas Consolation with a 1983 record of 1-2-0 from four starts, which had produced

winnings of \$1,579—well under his '82 bankroll of \$92,004.

Once the colt got that fast getaway, the duel was over. Primetime Wrangler was in good position during the first half of the race but was unable to close the gap in the late stages. Chicks Etta Wind broke a bit tardily but came on gamely to take third. Rudy Bustamante was in the driver's seat.

GLOVER D. continued his sprinting mastery this season with a driving victory in Saturday's Lincoln County Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The five-year-old Valid Appeal gelding came from far off the pace to register a one-length win over favored Currobot in the six and one half-furlong race that drew seven older sprinters. His time was a good 1:20, the fastest reading at the distance this season.

Fill Mackis Cup, the 2-1 second wagering choice, broke on top and withstood an early attack by Round Table Top and Captense. As th field headed for home it appeared Fill Mackis Cup would take command and open up on his opponents.

But jockey F. O. Martinez on Glover D. had other ideas. The Florida-bred gelding unleashed his classic late attack and zoomed past the tiring Fill Mackis Cup.

Currobot, who defeated Glover D. by a head in the Inaugural at six furlongs here on May 7, was also moving rapidly at the end. He roared past Fill Mackis Cup in a fine performance.

The victory was Glover D.'s third in four tries this season with one second. He was named Sunland Park's top sprinter for two outstanding races this spring.

As the \$4.80-1 third wagering choice, Glover D. paid \$11.60, \$4.40 and \$2.80. Currobot, the 6-5 wagering choice, returned \$3.00 and \$2.30 under Jockey Salustio Burgos.

Fill Mackis Cup, ridden by O.A. Martinez Jr., was third and paid \$2.40 to show.

Trained by J. Doyal Roberts, Glover D. tallied his 12th lifetime win with seven seconds and one third from 29 outings. With the \$5,580 he earned with the Lincoln County victory, Glover D. has now collected \$80,882 for owner Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas.

SOME OTHER BROTHER launched a strong stretch assault and overtook the tiring Yallah Zip a few jumps from the wire in Friday's main event at Ruidoso Downs.

The six-furlong sprint for three-year-olds was staged under allowance terms and put up a hefty four-grand purse.

In the upper stretch, Yallah Zip, a 7-2 shot handled by Apprentice Paul Jaramillo, was cruising with a four-length lead, ostensibly on his way to an easy victory.

But just as Yallah Zip began conking out, Some Other Brother came on with that eager stretch move. He won by a half-length Pedro Benitez, earned \$2,400 and returned mutual payoffs of \$15.60, \$6.20 and \$3.80.

The win was Some Other Brother's second of the year from four starts. He's trained by Cliff Lambert for Robert McCasland and Barney Green of Eunice.

Some Other Brother toured the course in an excellent 1:15 1/5 seconds, which was only a second short of the seasonal mark set by the stakes horse, Currobot (in winning the Inaugural Handicap two weeks ago), and equaled by Funny Native in Friday's 10th race.

Yallah Zip, owned by L.G. and Helen Rhodes of Abilene, Texas, returned \$5.20, \$3.40. Southern Runder (\$2.60) rallied from far back to take third.

What might have been the biggest boost local adult softball leagues have ever had will not come about because the leagues could not agree on the scheduling.

A fast-pitch tournament sponsored by Ray Gann and the Blues team of the Ruidoso Men's Fast-Pitch Softball League had been scheduled for early next month at All-American Park Field in Ruidoso Downs. It was hoped that about 10 to 12 teams, most of them from other areas, would compete in the tournament.

However, the tournament has fallen through and another one to replace it is not planned.

Gann told me a couple of weeks ago that the tournament was cancelled and he "wasn't going to point any fingers at anybody."

The problem was that the two men's leagues (the fast-pitch league and the Ruidoso Men's Slow-Pitch Softball League) apparently could not agree to switch their playing dates for the tournament.

The tournament was scheduled for a weekend, but the slow-pitch league plays its games every Friday at All-American Park Field.

In order for the tournament to be that weekend, the slow-pitch league would have to play at some other time.

"The sponsors asked me about switching dates and I said fine," slow-pitch league president Tim Eckerdt said. "But I never heard from the fast-pitch league. I never heard how it came out."

The fast-pitch league normally plays some games on Thursday nights, but the plan was to have the slow-pitch league play its games that week on Thursday and have the fast-pitch tournament held on the weekend. The regular fast-pitch

schedule would probably have to be played at some other time.

But the fast-pitch league did not agree with that idea.

"Thursday's our night to play softball and we're not going to give it up because some private person wants to hold a tournament," fast-pitch league president Dennis Martin said.

So a local softball tournament is not in store for the immediate future.

Probably no one is at fault for the tournament being cancelled. The main problem was the dates the two leagues normally play on and the fact there was not another field in the area for the tournament to be held.

There lays the crux of the softball situation in the Ruidoso area.

Ruidoso is woefully lacking in softball facilities, and until it gets at least one more field, it will probably have a hard time getting a first-class tournament to be held here.

Both the softball leagues and the park and recreation department are working on the possibility of new softball fields in this area.

When and if new fields are built, Ruidoso will have a much better chance to attract top-flight softball teams to a tournament.

An adult softball tournament would be a boom for the entire area. Businesses and motels would be helped because of the teams coming in to play. Local sports fans would get a chance to see some fine teams in action.

But it looks like Ruidoso will have to wait until it gets more fields to have a tournament.

In the meantime, all the softball leagues should work together to enhance this area's chances of getting a tournament as soon as possible.

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne: What is the best method of packaging fish for the freezer and how long can they be kept? — Glen W., Pennsylvania

Dear Glen: Most often, fish is packaged for the freezer much the same as beef. It can be wrapped in foil or freezer paper, being certain to seal it against entry of air.

If you have adequate freezer space there is another method you may wish to try. Cut the top from a half gallon waxed paper milk carton. Stack the cleaned fish on end in the carton. Fill with water, completely covering the fish. Set in the freezer. Many people who have used this method believe the fish retain their fresh caught flavor longer. At any rate, freezing in ice will certainly seal them airtight.

The victors held a 45-28 lead at halftime, but the Sycamores closed the gap gradually in the second half.


Twice the losers closed to within 10 points, and finally lowered the margin to nine points, 72-63, with seconds left in the contest.

Gooch to retire next month

An era will come to an end in Ruidoso teaching and coaching circles next month.

That's when Leroy Gooch retires from a 32½-year teaching career in the Ruidoso school system.

Gooch, who has also coached the Ruidoso High School golf team since its inception about 20 years ago, decided last week to retire at the end of this school year.

"I still enjoy my job and I figured it was a good time to get out while I still enjoy it," Gooch said. "I've had a lot of good memories over the years and I can't really signal out any one thing."

Besides golf, the 54-year old Gooch has taught band and choir in his teaching career.

Gooch came to Ruidoso in 1950 after teaching one year in Seagoville, Texas, a small town near Dallas. He played football, baseball and basketball in his hometown of Wilmer, Texas, before attending North Texas State University.

He even had a couple of tryouts with some minor league baseball teams.

"I tried out with Gainsville (Florida) and the Sherman-Denison Twins," Gooch said. "I didn't sign with them because the pay then was very low, and by that time I had earned my degree. I figured I could make more money teaching."

Ironically, Gooch never played golf before coming to Ruidoso.

"I started playing when I got here," he said. "This is a beautiful place to play golf and live."

When Gooch first started teaching in Ruidoso, he had classes at the high school and two elementary schools. One of the elementary schools was located in what is now the Ruidoso police building. The other one was the old Stetson School just east of Ruidoso Downs.

Gooch started teaching at White Mountain Middle School six years ago when it opened, and has been there since.

Over the years Gooch has seen his bands and golf squads win many awards.

"I think the best year we had in golf was 10 or 12 years ago," he said. "We took third in the state small-school tournament. I can't signal out any one individual from that team. They were all good."

Gooch's teams have generally been competitive over the years. This year's team was one of his youngest, but it showed steady improvement over the course of the season. Furthermore, all five starters will return next season.

"This year was one of the worst as far as the weather goes," he said. "I think it affected most of the schools in the state. Only a few qualified for the state tournament."

The high school and middle school bands also have won a large number of awards under Gooch's instruction.

"I think one of the best bands we had was about 20 years ago," he remarked. "It was a very outstanding band, and it played a lot of different music. The kids played a lot of college-grade music."

Gooch's bands at White Mountain have enjoyed much success. A couple of weeks ago, the Brave band participated in a tournament and did very well, Gooch said.

"When we left the competition, about 16 bands had played, and we were in second place," he said.

"There were only about six bands left that hadn't competed."

What does Gooch like best about teaching and golf?

"There's a great contrast between the two activities," he commented.

"At times, it gets pretty difficult teaching and coaching at the same time. During the golf season, it's hard to keep organized when the season

gets going great guns, and there are a lot of musical activities."

Gooch plays in many of the local golf tournaments and said he enjoys the sport a lot.

"Golf presents the biggest challenge of any sport I know," he said. "It's difficult and competitive. It also gives a man my age a chance to compete with others."

Gooch's wife, Mary Lou, is the head librarian at the Ruidoso Public Library. They have three grown children. Kim lives in San Diego, California; Matt in Andrews, Texas; and Julie in Dallas.

What does Gooch plan to do now that he is retiring?

"I don't know," he said. "I do know we definitely plan to continue living in Ruidoso. This town has been a fantastic place to live and work in. The community and administration have been just super to us."

"I'll find something to keep me occupied. We might go traveling in a few years."


Whatever Leroy Gooch does in the future, he has left a big mark on the Ruidoso school system and the community.


Mikki Roller and Kody Willard scored the Tornado goals.

The slow-pitch league plays all its games at All-American Park Field on Friday nights.

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
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

Ruidoso State Bank opens new branch

Ruidoso State Bank cut the ribbon on the new north branch Saturday morning, and used the occasion to celebrate 30 years of business in Ruidoso.

Branch manager Andree Cohen took the scissors to the ribbon held by bank president Buz Browning and Mayor George White. Refreshments were served as employees and com-

munity members toured the skylit redwood building.

"This should really help service for the customers," said vice-president Roy Seay. Seay explained that the branch is full service with two full-time loan officers, safe deposit boxes, checking accounts and five drive-up windows. He predicted that the new branch will help clear out congestion at the main branch.

For years the main branch was the only bank in town. In October, Ruidoso State Bank will have been operating for 30 years.

Bank president Buz Browning said he estimated Ruidoso State Bank has made over \$750 million worth of loans during the 30 years of business, and agreed that the bank has been a large part of Ruidoso's growth during that time.

The RLA also would like to establish a contingency fund of \$16,275 to finance new projects or provide more money for ski season advertising.

The Lodgers' Tax Committee has indicated it also would like to decrease funding for established events, which would release monies for new events that could be organized for the off-season.

The total RLA request is \$125,000—well above the \$96,000 budgeted this year. Ferguson said he realizes that is probably more than will be collected, but he suggested the nearly \$55,000 being held in bank deposits could be used to offset the deficit.

Also, Ferguson said he will propose to the village council a .25 percent in-

crease in gross receipts tax to be earmarked for community advertising. He said he has the consensus of the lodgers for a gross receipts tax hike, as opposed to an increase in lodgers' tax from 2 to 3 percent.

"Why should we be the only ones required to pay for (advertising)? Ferguson asks.

But Jungbluth said he believes residents would be opposed to paying more gross receipts tax because the tax, at 5.25 percent, already is the highest in the state.

Instead, Jungbluth said he will lobby to increase the lodgers' tax, which not only will bring in more local revenue but will make the village eligible to receive advertising money from the state.

Also, Jungbluth does not seem particularly with the lodgers about being

burdened with the extra collection. He notes the theory of the state law authorizing a lodgers' tax is to make tourists help pay for the additional demand on municipal services, and the best way to collect from them is through lodging establishments.

As written in the law, the tax is meant to finance advertising and new facilities and to provide money to attract conferences and conventions.

Because the Chamber anticipates more revenue for advertising through passage of either a higher gross receipts tax or lodgers' tax, it increased its budget request to \$106,000. "We assume that someone will be successful. If not, it will have to be scaled back," Jungbluth noted.

Both Jungbluth and Ferguson said they would like to work out a compromise with the proposals.

Gordon said demonstrated need for the public is the real reason for allowing the expansion, although revenues from the special lease permit would also be beneficial to the Forest Service.

Possible conflicts with the Bonito watershed and the corkbark fir research natural area are mentioned in the draft. Gordon said these potential problems seem to be solvable.

"I think all conflicts with Bonito can be reconciled," said Gordon.

The Bonito water drainage supplies water to Alamogordo, Holloman Air Force Base and other towns in the area. Gordon said the Forest Service wants to maintain the high quality of the water by making sure that it remains silt free and does not increase substantially in bacterial count.

The Bonito drainage also contains some of the best corkbark fir stands

in the nation, which could be valuable research areas, said Roy. Gordon said he believes earlier conflicts between the potential research areas and the expansion of the ski area can be ironed out.

There will be no major expansion of the area this year. A request for some trail widening, a new storage shed, burying of an electric line and center line survey for one potential lift is in the forest supervisor's office for final approval.



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Downs P&Z approves annexations

The Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday voted favorably on two petitions for property annexation, to be considered by the board of trustees tonight. If approved, the annexations will bring slightly over 20 acres into the village, along with a Christian camp, apartment complex, radio station and a liquor license.

Almost 20 acres located between village limits and Lincoln National Forest land are proposed for annexation to facilitate the development of a 48-unit low to moderate income apartment project and an AM radio station and tower. Most of that property is currently owned by Inspiration Corporation for its Christian fine arts camp.

A resolution to annex about five acres for the apartment project was adopted by the board of trustees in February. Following discussion with P&Z and approval by the Inspiration Corporation board of directors, however, the decision was made to propose annexation of the entire

tract. Charles Adams of Chamari Incorporated, the Carrizozo firm planning to build the apartment project, presented the annexation petition and a legal description of the property to P&Z Thursday. In response to a question from P&Z, Adams pointed out that only two acres of the land not currently planned for development is developable, and those two acres are set aside for additional camp facilities.

"What benefit will the Village of Ruidoso Downs receive from that much land that is not developable?" P&Z member Conrad Buchanan asked. Adams responded that annexation would provide property taxes plus income from those developments that are planned, and "it squares out nicely the corners" of the village.

The previously adopted resolution to annex the apartment project site was contingent on developers erecting a 40,000-gallon water storage tank, to be filled during evening non-peak hours. Adams indicated that the water supply would be available for use by the village as long as apartment residents were not shortchanging.

It was also pointed out that 50,000 gallons of water a month is already assured to the 20-acre tract under an agreement signed shortly after Inspiration Corporation purchased the property.

Adams explained he was requesting the property be annexed under C-2 or general commercial zoning. Mountain Top Radio co-owner Jimmy White wanted assurance that a cabin or mobile home to be used as a corporate office would be permitted in a C-2 zone. P&Z said it would.

White reported Mountain Top Radio should be on the air in three to four weeks, with a contemporary adult music format.

Also approved by P&Z was the annexation of just under one acre of land on the corner of Colorado and Dakota Streets. Real estate agent Bill Pippin explained the annexation is being requested so a liquor license recently transferred to that site can be transferred to another site in the village. The license is needed for a restaurant, lounge and package store to be opened on Briscoe West's property, located across from the racetrack entrance.

Ruidoso Downs residents voted in 1981 to forbid the statewide transfer of additional liquor licenses into the municipality. Pippin indicated Thursday that annexation of the property, with the license, "is a legal means of doing what we need to do."

Offers to purchase a liquor license from owners within the village were refused, Pippin reported.

Buchanan said he believes the establishment wanting the license will be "well handled and well managed" and motioned the annexation be approved.

Also approved were requests to move a building already in the village to the Briscoe West property, to be used for a package store, and to erect a sign for Prime Time Restaurant, at the same site.

P&Z also outlined steps for adoption of a new zoning map and ordinance and voted to meet this Thursday, May 26, for a study session on the matter.

Mystery Spot owner Keith Shaw inquired about the current zoning of his property, saying it was zoned commercial five years ago and now is shown as residential on the map. Shaw was advised to bring up the problem at the study session.

Schools receive less

The Ruidoso School District received about \$1 million less than requested from the state Capital Outlay Council this year, which means completion of the new high school may be delayed about six months.

Ruidoso was granted a total allocation of \$1.8 million of the \$18 million appropriated by the Legislature for school Capital Outlay monies this year, it was announced Friday. Only \$1 million of that amount will be forthcoming in July, however. Receipt of the remaining \$800,000 is dependent on the sale of severance tax bonds in September or December, Capital Outlay secretary Louella Rodriguez reported Friday.

The school district will now have to apply for the additional \$1 million from the council next year, associate superintendent Sid Miller said. The \$2.7 million request submitted this year would have financed completion

of the new school. Miller said the delay in funding will probably mean the school's fine arts complex will not be constructed until about six months later than planned, although he predicted the school will still open in the fall of 1984.

The bidding schedule for the remaining two phases of construction may have to be changed also, Miller said, because \$800,000 of this year's allocation will not be received until September or December.

Miller said the school district anticipated having to make a fourth request for Capital Outlay funding, but he is disappointed it will have to do so. Still, he pointed out, "we appreciate the state and council for doing what they can."

"We're pleased we got as much as we did," he added. Miller also expressed appreciation to local taxpayers, who have helped fund the project, and asked that they be patient with the process toward its completion.

Ruidoso man dies after accidental gunshot wound to head

A Ruidoso man accidentally shot and killed himself early Friday morning when he reportedly wanted to demonstrate to a friend that his gun was unloaded.

Ruidoso police investigator Gonzalo Cordova said Julian Mirabal, age unknown, was found dead about 6:30 a.m. Friday in his rented room at the Lamplighter Motel with a gunshot wound to the head.

According to a witness report, Cordova said Mirabal removed the bullet clip from a pistol to show it to the friend, then put the clip back in. Then, apparently forgetting he reloaded the gun, Cordova said, he put the gun to

his head and pulled the trigger to demonstrate it was unloaded.

Cordova said Mirabal was dead when medical investigator Dave Pfeiffer arrived on the scene.

Spring Looks Toward Summer
By the time this reaches you, spring will be two-thirds of the way through its journey towards summer; and the pace increases from day to day, as if there is something very special ahead in the warm and sunny season.

The Cottonwoods are out in full leaf, and the Walnuts, beginning last in the leafing, are rushing to catch up, about half size already. The Apricot trees the last few days have put out bright red new terminal growth. The Wild Cherry trees of both kinds are starting to bloom.

And still the west wind, that great urger of the leaves, keeps blowing down the valley seeming to sing to the trees and bushes; "Come on, Come on. We got a late start. Let us catch up."

Such rapid growth lends the leaves and early blooms a special glowing radiance, with every shade of green shining over hill and dale.

The Echo Cliff
On account of the moist winter, and the late beginning of Spring, many of the mid-summer flowers are out along with the ones of early spring. So you see a little green bank by the way of pure New Mexico Pinks, and right beside is the Vermillion Indian Paint Brush. Among the spring daisies, with their golden centers and white petals trimmed in crimson, you see the pride of the Southwest, the Salmon-Colored Mallow of mid-summer, which cheers the way from the desert up to the foot of the Mountain.

Across from the old corral to the north is a cliff that has been a landmark since first we arrived in the Vale. It was fun to shout and hear your voice coming back so loud and plain. And you could be a mile and a half to the south on top of the hill at evening and hear the cows down at the creek calling their calves, using the cliff for a sounding board, sending their "Moo-ooo, Moo-ooo, Yoo-hoo" clearly all up the mountainsides and through the deepest glens.

Easily caught on the sharp ears of calves the calls would bring them out of the oak brush here and there or

from under trees; and they would begin their trip down the trails.

Often, as I lay in the old adobe house just opposite the cliff, the river coming around the bend could be heard plainly in the stillness of the summer night, and the cliff would amplify the sound — a dreamy lullaby.

Above the cliff near the top of the mountain beyond, the eagle would circle, sending down his far-carrying call.

Deer stood on the top of the cliff, scouting the country below, studying where to come down and drink. Wild goats would come marvelously down the cliff, finding footing impossible to all but themselves.

The cliff swallow built their homes under some of the cliff shelves, and in the quiet afternoon, you heard the clear descending notes of that bird from Elfland, the Canyon Wren.

The solid crimson mass of one of the Southwest's floral treasures, the Pin Cushion Cactus, growing like magic high on the cliff is just beginning to bloom. The Yucca at the base of the cliff is sending up its stalks so rapidly you can almost see them grow, to be ready to display our State Flower. And what a show it promises to be this year.

All around the cliff and even growing up on the cliff itself is a cousin to the Yucca, one of the Agave family. I think it must be the Mescal. It looks almost exactly like the Yucca in its Spanish Dagger-type leaves, but I very seldom see it bloom. Right now they are blooming all along below the cliff, and, as I say, up on the cliff itself. The blooms are very like the Yucca, in a clustered mass a foot and a half to two feet tall and as much as a foot in diameter. They have hardly any stem, blooming down cbs among the dagger leaves. If you do not look closely you will miss them. They are a rare treat to see in such abundant bloom.

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



Meetings on pest problem this week

An outbreak of the western-spruce budworm is threatening to denude the forests of the Sacramento Mountains. The public is invited to comment on proposed control of this pest at three meetings in Mescalero, Ruidoso and Cloudcroft this week.

The western-spruce budworm defoliates spruce, white fir and Douglas fir.

"The real damage to us here is the Douglas fir," said Paul Gordon, Smokey Bear District Ranger.

The infestation could damage the visual quality of the forest, which is an attraction for tourists. It could also seriously affect the timber industry, especially on the Mescalero Indian Reservation where timber is a mainstay industry, said Gordon. The infestation also could lead to a buildup of fuels, which could present a fire hazard.

An interdisciplinary team from the U.S. Forest Service, the New Mexico Division of Forestry, the state Department of Agriculture and the Bureau of Indian Affairs have been meeting to map out a plan to control the insect.

Members of the team are seeking public comment on the problem and proposed solutions. They will educate the public about the insect and infestation at the meetings this week. They will also invite input on possible methods of control, which include chemical pesticides and letting the insect die out by itself.

"This public meeting will help formulate the plan," said Gordon.

The public meetings will be 7:30 p.m. Monday, May 23, at the Bureau of Indian Affairs Office in Mescalero; 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 24, at the Ruidoso Public Library; and 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 25, in the Cloudcroft High School multi-purpose room.

Boys charged with burglary

Two 14-year-old juveniles were arrested while allegedly burglarizing Gibson's department store early Sunday morning.





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

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—"Six years ago, you didn't see the word Hispanic. Now it's a word that everyone can coalesce under. This is the news!"

That's a quote from Congressman Robert Garcia, from the Bronx, one of New York City's five boroughs, and it would seem to correspond to what is in the mind of Governor Toney Anaya of New Mexico.

The same thought may be, in one form or another, important to many of the 14.6 million citizens of the United States who chose to list themselves as Hispanic during the census of 1980. (That was the first time the word appeared on census forms.)

Those in New Mexico who cherish the thought that this may be "the decade of the Hispanic," as someone has declared it to be, might do well to read the article from which the Garcia quote above comes. It's called "The Latinization of America," and it appears in the current issue of Esquire magazine.

Most Hispanics in this part of the world will steam as they read it.

For one thing, in an article written by a man who obviously could travel all over the country to gather his material, New Mexico merits two mentions. One is a kind of throwaway

at the start of the sentence, which reads like this: "Aside from the patron system in Democratic New Mexico, neither party has bothered with that sort of thing ("Viva Kennedy" clubs and organizations of that kind) before." The second one comes when, in a raw list, the names of Manuel Lujan and Bill Richardson are given as Congressmen and the name of Toney Anaya is mentioned as a governor.

(All three, by the way, are called Mexicanos in the article.) No one from New Mexico is quoted.

though this correspondent knows for a fact that among those interviewed by Thomas B. Morgan, who wrote the piece, was former Governor Jerry Apodaca.

And that is exactly the point. What we have here is a good example of how an outlander, someone not from our part of the world, views Hispanic America.

He finds the Southwest hardly worth considering.

The Hispanics he quotes at length are, first, a Puerto Rican from the Bronx; second, Cesar Chavez; third, Henry Cisneros, mayor of San Antonio; and fourth, the mayor of Miami.

New Mexico? Nowhere.

To those who have only become aware of Spanish-speaking Americans in the last two decades—and this writer is, like most Americans, one such—our part of the world, our local Hispanic culture, our political history do not matter.

Question: Is it likely they will matter more than this to Fritz Mondale or Ronald Reagan?

Can we honestly expect a state outsiders barely know exist to count us as important when, for example, Los Angeles has a two million Hispanics and New York City has one and a half million, in both cases more than we have people of all kinds here at home?

If Toney Anaya can indeed gather all these Hispanics under his umbrella and lead them to the Democratic national convention in San Francisco, everybody in New Mexico ought to be for him.

It's only realistic to say, however; that achieving that may be considerably more difficult than it looks from here.

It doesn't seem likely that in this matter, New Mexico's time has yet come.

Editorial

Lodgers' tax seems to be challenging water as "most talked about subject" in the village of Ruidoso.

But it is time to bring the subject of spending of lodgers' tax revenue out of committees and coffee shops and into the open.

Last week, both the Chamber of Commerce and the Ruidoso Lodgers Association submitted spending proposals for lodgers' tax revenue to the Lodgers' Tax Committee. The committee tabled both proposals for review at a study session before its June meeting.

We suggest that that study session take the form of a town meeting. This would enable all interested parties to have input into spending of lodgers' tax revenue, and the question of raising the tax from two to three percent could also be discussed.

Everyone who makes their living in Ruidoso should be interested. It has been estimated that every dollar spent promoting Ruidoso returns ten dollars to the village economy.

When one considers that every one of those dollars spent by locals turns over many times, the significance of lodgers' tax revenue is magnified many times from the expected \$100,000 or so.

The Lodgers' Tax Committee, as the body that recommends expenditures to the village council, should take the lead in inviting the public to provide input on lodgers' tax revenue spending.—TP

On the Village beat with Tim Palmer



Do the names Fat Crompton, Tip Grizzle, Chic Stahl, Feedink Harrell, Juan Garcia, Bill Burnham and Notah mean anything to you?

They are the fictional teammates of the great Bronc Burnett, whose athletic exploits for Sonora (New Mexico) High School filled a series of novels by Albuquerque author Wilfred McCormick.

I was saddened to read several weeks ago of McCormick's death at age 80. His books meant a lot to me as a boy.

I picked up a couple of Bronc Burnett novels at my parents' house recently, and began to leaf through them.

Bronc is the ultimate schoolboy athlete. I thought of saying ultimate "jock," but that term doesn't fit him. He is too modest.

For example, in Quick Kick (copyright 1951), the Sonora football team is preparing to elect a captain. Fat Crompton, Bronc's sidekick, feels Bronc's election is a foregone conclusion.

Fat: "You want it, don't you?"
"Bronc frowned, but he did not shake his head. He glanced around, half guiltily, then when he saw that nobody else seemed to be paying attention, he nodded slightly. 'Of course, I want it,' he admitted, coloring some. 'Who wouldn't?' It's everybody's dream, being captain of his football team. But it's also something that a fellow just doesn't talk about."

As it turns out, Bronc loses the election to a loud-mouthed second stringer who gets in on a sympathy vote. So Bronc has to deal with his own hurt feelings, and help the team rally to overcome the dissension their choice of captain creates.

He and the team have a lot of help from Cap'n Al Carter, perennial coach at Sonora. In this case, he makes an example of Bronc for trying to get up and leave the room after the election. He says Bronc is a poor loser, "But there is a world of difference between a poor loser and a poor sport."

"I want this whole football team to be poor losers," he declared. "That is, when somebody else whips you, I want it to sting. On the inside, I mean. But I also want you to be good sports about it. I want you to shake hands with your conquerer, and congratulate him. But all of the time be saying under your breath, 'Brotter, you beat me today. But there'll be another time, and I'll beat you! Do you get what I mean?'"

Besides inspiring his players, Cap'n Al is an expert teacher. In Bases

Loaded (1950), he explains to catcher Crompton how to handle Bronc's corner pitches so the umpire will call strikes.

"Try to have the ball below the glove to start with. Then, in catching it, bring the low ball up with one motion. And to do this, you'll have to develop the quick instinct I just mentioned: have in your mind the mental picture of catching under the batter and up."

Cap'n Al doesn't want the boys to get the wrong idea. "Call it inside baseball, if you wish, but don't think for a minute it is unfair or unsportsmanlike. It is simply a means of preserving, or saving, those corner pitches for your team."

That bit of advice stuck with me, because I always think of it when I see a major league catcher "pulling strikes" on TV.

The Bronc Burnett books are also filled with information on rules and history. In Bases Loaded, Chic Stahl pulls off a double play by intentionally dropping a fly ball, and Rule 49, Section 2a is cited for the reader.

Fibate Jones, the perennial team manager, is a walking encyclopedia of sports lore. Readers learn from Fibate that Bud Wilkinson was the youngest man ever voted 'Coach of the Year,' for instance.

Thinking about the Bronc Burnett books caused me to wonder if boys today are reading them. Books in Print lists only one Wilfred McCormick title, Starmaker (1963). The Ruidoso library does not have any of his more than 75 books.

That's too bad. Maybe the books, which a news story on McCormick's death said "stressed high moral principles," are too corny and old-fashioned for today's readers.

But it seems to me that Cap'n Al's advice to his team in Quick Kick still has relevance today.

"If you go all out for the team—for Sonora—if you develop this burning desire to win, that is, I'll never have any qualms about your play on the field of Life afterward. You'll make good there, too, because the fundamentals are the same. Clean and honest, but hard. In other words, you will learn to be good winners. Let the other fellow be the good loser!"

I told my mom recently it was sad that Wilfred McCormick had died. She knew him through a creative writing class he taught. But she said he had gone blind and couldn't write any more.

So the author is dead. But he left his mark on the imagination and character of his young readers.

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

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
