Chamber officials glum about budget

The president and the executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce see three options open to the Chamber if the Lodgers' Tax Committee's proposed budget is approved by the village council Tuesday night. None of them are particularly attractive.

Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth said the Chamber can increase the dues, stage more fund-raisers, or curtail services to compensate for the proposed \$21,000 cut in assistance to the Chamber.

The Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) Wednesday approved a budget that would cut \$21,000 in assistance to the Chamber from the Chamber's requested budget. The LTC budget also allocates \$54,000 for seasonal promotion, but does not approve the

Chamber's use of these funds as has been done in the past.

Jungbluth said he does not think anyone wants to see the Chamber go backward and provide less services. "I think we've done a fine job of promotion, advertising and getting our name out," said Jungbluth. "Do people never stop to think where all these tourists came from?"

If services are not reduced, more money will have to come from somewhere, Jungbluth and Chamber president James Paxton explained.

The idea of increasing dues has been discussed by past boards of directors, said Jungbluth. "It has been the general consensus of past boards that increasing dues would result in a drop in membership, he stated.

Past boards have felt the drop in membership because of increased dues would reduce the Chamber's ability to act as a viable voice of the

business community, and might negate the additional funds collected through increased dues.

The local population is already saturated with Chamber fund-raisers, and Chamber staff would be hard pressed to find the time to organize one that would attract out-of-town supporters, Paxton stated.

Chamber staff member Doris Baca already spends time year round organizing the Art Festival. She said another fund-raiser would be very hard to organize.

"We could use another half time person in the summer as it is," said Baca.

Baca said the Chamber already receives complaints about having a local fund-raiser every six months. Paxton noted that the board has discussed canceling the Jeep Party because of the tenuous success of the event.

"I don't believe the town could support another fund-raiser," said Baca.

The Chamber currently uses the Cadillac party, the Jeep Party and the Art Festival to raise money. Paxton said the Chili Cookoff could feasibly become a money maker.

Jungbluth and Paxton emphasized they do not know what the Chamber will do if LTC's proposed budget is approved by the village council. They said the budget cuts have been proposed on a very short notice, and the board of directors will discuss it at their next meeting Wednesday.

Jungbluth and Paxton objected most strongly to cuts in printing costs directly related to tourist promotion, and funds for salary of a full-time employee directly connected with tourist promotion.

Opposition to airport yet

Despite Governor Toney Anaya's assurance to the Interior Department last week that no state agencies will oppose the transfer of federal land on Fort Stanton Mesa for an airport, there is still strong opposition to the proposal.

A spokesman at the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) office in Santa Fe said after Anaya's announcement that the agency will stick to its stand against an airport on Site B, the preferred regional airport site.

And Thursday, L. E. Davis, president of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, said in a news release that the organization will sue the Interior Department to deny the transfer.

Davis said the Farm Bureau is against the transfer "because of the devastating effect such a location would have on the New Mexico livestock industry after almost two decades of research at the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch."

New Mexico State University (NMSU), with strong support from state agricultural groups, has been successful in opposing construction of an airport on a portion of the land it manages on the mesa under an agreement with BLM.

Last week, Anaya moved to break the 20-year-old deadlock when he said he supports an airport on the BLM land, which is favored by airport proponents over an alternate site four miles west of Site B.

Anaya wrote Interior Secretary James Watt asking him to approve transfer of 1,700 acres from the Bureau of Land Management to the Federal Aviation Administration. The

transfer had been denied by two previous Interior secretaries.

Davis, taking the position voiced by NMSU and BLM, said the Farm Bureau supports placing the airport on the alternate site, known as Site A.

Davis also pointed to conclusions of the National Academy of Sciences evaluation of NMSU research last year, and said "construction of an airport at Site B would materially affect the NMSU research program and eliminate an important public service for present and future research use."

In the news release, Davis also claims the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) "publicly committed to honor the recommendations of the Academy regarding Fort Stanton research."

In fact, in meetings following release of the Academy report in October, SBAC did not accept the Academy's recommendations, and sought a political decision on the site controversy.

In other developments, the New Mexico State University Board of Regents was to meet today in Las Cruces to discuss Anaya's decision. Commenting on the decision last week, NMSU president Gerald Thomas said it was premature to express the university's official response to Anaya's announcement.

Fred Heckman, airport commission chairman, said SBAC will meet Wednesday at 9 a.m. at the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building to complete the transfer application.

Heckman said he expects Bob White, director of the state Aviation Division, and a Federal Aviation Administration representative to be present at the meeting.

Dionne dynamite

An energy-charged performance by Dionne Warwick at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Thursday ended the Ruidoso Summer Festival.

Backed by her own group and members of the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra, Warwick pumped ex-

hilaration into all her songs.

She began with "Wings of Love," and her strong voice carried the old favorite throughout the Wendell Chino Ballroom. She was exuberant, but also relaxed and professional.

After the first song, she chatted with the audience, talking about being in Ruidoso (however, she said she was in Mesquite). She invited the audience to join in while she sang by clapping their hands or even singing along.

She prefaced her second song, "Friends of Love," by explaining it is usually a duet with Johnny Mathis. However, in his absence, she explained laughingly, she would sing it solo and dedicate it to him.

Next Warwick launched into a Burt Bacharach-Hal David medley that brought applause in the midst of several of songs.

She began her recording career with Bacharach-David songs, and she definitely knows how to do them justice. Her throaty voice has a dimension from high to low.

She concluded the medley with her Grammy award winning hit, "Do You Know the Way to San Jose?" which brought a roar of applause from the audience.

She then stopped to tell a little story about her next selection. She explained it had been recorded by several people—42 to be exact—before she recorded it, with even such big names as Cher trying to make it a hit.

Governing bodies of three villages meet this week

Ruidoso Downs trustees will conduct a public hearing tonight (Monday) on the annexation of 19,692 acres of property owned by Inspiration Corporation and Mountain Top Radio. A portion of that tract is proposed for construction of low-to-moderate income apartment complexes by the Carrizozo firm of Chamari, Incorporated.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. at the municipal building.

Trustees will also consider ordinance 83-8 relating to zoning of the Jess Armstrong property. A moderate-income apartment complex is planned to be built on this site by developers from Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Also on the agenda are Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth and president James Paxton regarding the imposition of a lodgers' tax in Ruidoso Downs. Pax-

ton raised the matter at a Chamber board of directors meeting last week. He remarked that Ruidoso lodgers are concerned that lodging establishments outside the village benefit from lodgers' tax spent on advertising, but do not contribute to the fund.

Double B Express, Kita Charger, Some Other Brother star

DOUBLE B EXPRESS, the long-time stakes standout in Ruidoso Downs thoroughbred circles, still has a lot of youth left in those sturdy legs.

The eight-year-old gelding illustrated that point impressively in Sunday's renewal of the \$10,475 Mescalero Apache Handicap at seven furlongs.

He sprang out of the gate, surprised his foes by taking an early lead—and stayed in front all the way.

At the midway point of the stretch, jockey Casey Lambert asked Double B Express to throw some distance against his foes, and the old-timer sewed up the match with a quick powerburst. He sailed across the finish with a one and one quarter length lead after facing no real threat in the final portions of the duel.

Double B Express, trained by Clifford Lambert Sr., covered the seven furlongs in 1:28 2/5 seconds, which

equalled the seasonal record. The victory slice of \$6,285 put the gelding's 1983 earnings at \$8,984. His career bankroll is now \$219,581.

KITA CHARGER knocked off Saturday's Mr. Kid Charge Handicap at Ruidoso Downs and became the first double stakes winner of the meeting.

Earlier in the season, Kita Charger battered his foes in the \$9,150 Mr. Jet Moore Handicap, winning the 400-yard dash by three and one fourth lengths.

In Saturday's Mr. Kid Charge engagement, Kita Charger was asked to travel the same distance against essentially the same level of competition.

Once again, it was a decisive victory. The six-year-old gelding jumped into an early lead, and was in control at the halfway point, and was put to no pressure while cruising under the

wire with a length lead.

Jimmie Hunt was aboard in the top load of 122 pounds. Kita Charger is trained by Johnnie Goodman for Robert Gilbert and Marcus Whitman of Sugarland, Texas. First place was worth \$5,895 (out of a gross purse of \$9,825), and this boosted Kita Charger's 1983 bank account to \$17,545. His record for the year now stands at 4-1-0 from five spins.

Operating as a heavy favorite in the Mr. Kid Charge 'cap, Kita Charger returned depressed payoffs of \$3.20, \$2.40, \$2.20. He covered the 400 yards in a heads-up 20.04 seconds. The seasonal record is 19.77.

SOME OTHER BROTHER fought off a persistent attack from Yallah Zip and pulled out a nose win in Friday's six-furlong feature event at Ruidoso Downs.

Some Other Brother raced as a 3-1 shot while Yallah Zip, winner of the

\$8,725 Memorial Day Handicap, carried odds of 8-5.

Alertly grabbing an early lead, Some Other Brother settled on the rail during the backstretch rush. Yallah Zip took over third place.

At the turn for home, jockey Paul Jaramillo asked Yallah Zip to get moving and the gelding quickly reached even terms with Some Other Brother.

The colt covered the six furlongs in 1:13 1-5 seconds, which equalled the seasonal mark set by Promised Kingdom on May 27.

BOJACS MAGIC, the gelding who won last summer's \$135,495 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic at Ruidoso Downs, emerged as the top qualifier for the upcoming \$169,831 Rainbow Silver Cup.

The gelding flashed over the 440 yards in 21.57 seconds, easily setting a new seasonal record (the previous

mark was 21.86) and obviously coming away with the top Silver Cup clocking.

Running as an odds-on favorite under Larry Byers, Bojacs Magic handed out low mutual payoffs of \$3.60, \$2.60 and \$2.40.

The Silver Cup finale, which comes up on Sunday, June 19, is the exclusive domain of four-year-olds. Bojacs Magic, who looms as a solid favorite, is owned by Robert E. Walters of Nevada, Missouri.

The gelding's previous Ruidoso appearance was staged on August 1, 1982, when he finished second to Rule The Deck in the World's Championship Classic. But Rule The Deck was disqualified because of interference, and that handed the victory purse of \$67,748 to Bojacs Magic. The gelding finished out 1982 with a record of 7-1-0 from a dozen starts, good for winnings of \$113,691.

Arraignment in condo share case Tuesday

Ruidoso Condo Share Vacation Club, four of its officers, and the limited partnership funding the operation have been scheduled for arraignment Tuesday on 22 felony charges in connection with the sale of time-sharing memberships in the condo share club.

The defendants are scheduled to appear at 1 p.m. in District Court Division II, before Magistrate Judge Robert Doughty at the Lincoln County Courthouse.

At present no arrests have been made and the defendants are still free. State Police special investigator James Jenkins said he did not expect any of the defendants to leave the area before Tuesday's arraignment.

A grand jury Thursday handed down an indictment of Ruidoso Condo Share Vacation Club (RCS), Jim Vincent, Pamela Vincent, Donald D. Gardner, Dean Shade and Sierra Santa Development Company, Limited.

Pamela Vincent and Jim Vincent—also known as Jim Vincent Vultaggio—are named in all 22 counts of fraud, attempted fraud, racketeering, securities fraud, sale of unregistered securities, evasion of gross receipts tax, conspiracy, embezzlement, tampering with evidence and criminal solicitation. Pamela Vincent is the chief financial and fiscal officer of RCS. Jim Vincent is the club's manager and chief executive officer.

Donald D. Gardner, a former sales manager, is named in eight counts,

including fraud, conspiracy, and criminal solicitation. Shade, also a sales manager, is named in 10 counts, including fraud, conspiracy, tampering with evidence and criminal solicitation.

Sierra Santa Development Company, Limited is named in one count of embezzlement. Sierra Santa is a limited partnership that funded RCS. Dr. James Monahan of California, the father of Pamela Vincent, is one of the partners in the company, according to attorney Ron Harris.

Harris will represent Sierra Santa Development Company in court. Harris said Jim Brandenburg of Albuquerque will represent the Vincents and Shade.

Ruidoso Condo Share Vacation Club owns a number of condominiums above Sierra Swim and Racquet Club. They sold a 40-year right to use a condominium for a week at a time. A contract for one week's use every year for 40 years sold for approximately \$5,000 to \$8,000, depending on the time of year.

The company purchased the first condominiums November 10 and started selling time-share memberships January 8, said Shade in an interview in April.

"We've done extremely well," said Shade at that time.

According to the grand jury indictment, former employees, a special investigator and time-share purchasers, deceptive sale practices helped the defendants sell a number of those memberships.

Debbi Looten, former office manager at RCS, said the defendants

often told prospective buyers that memberships in a health club and country club came with the purchase of a time-share membership in RCS.

Andrew Paschall, of El Paso, Texas, said people associated with RCS promised to include a membership in a club similar to the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club but did not deliver. Paschall said he purchased a RCS time-share membership largely because of the promise of a health club membership that was included in the contract.

When he did not receive the health club membership, he asked for his money back but never received it, he said.

RCS belonged to an exchange network that offered members options of using their time-share membership at condominiums around the world. The defendants allegedly showed prospective purchasers catalogs of other exchange networks which offered many more options than were really available.

The charge of tampering with evidence against Shade and Jim Vincent involves the alleged destruction of those catalogs.

The grand jury indictment culminates three months of investigation by the Ruidoso Police Department, the District Attorney, State Police and the state Attorney General's office.

John Carver, special assistant to the district attorney, said the district attorney's office and the Ruidoso Police Department first began to investigate the club after hearing numerous complaints about the club's

operations.

They first investigated a claim of false advertising. According to Looten, the company sent out thousands of brochures promising a prize for looking at the condominiums.

The prize was always a Caribbean cruise, said Looten. The cruise ticket was legitimate, said Carver, but it was for one person and the winner had to go to Miami, Florida, to take the cruise.

Carver said they eventually straightened out the first investigation by getting RCS to pay cash for the cruise ticket to the man who complained. Looten said RCS ended up giving away only about four cruises, to people who complained to Vincent.

The investigation grew to include more activities.

"We knew we were onto something big," said Carver. "It became apparent that the State Police and the Attorney General's office were better equipped to handle the investigation," he added.

Special investigator Jenkins and Ed Staffel, special investigator from the Attorney General's office, coordinated the investigation after that.

"Those guys worked day and night," said Carver, who commended the two investigators for their work. Jenkins, in turn, thanked members of all the enforcement agencies for the help they supplied.

Jenkins also commended the grand jury, which listened to 12 days of testimony, sometimes lasting until seven or eight at night. Most grand juries sit only about three days, said a district court clerk.

"They put in a lot of long hours as citizens," said Jenkins.

She was the 43rd person to record it, and it became a hit. Bringing an "ah" from the audience, she made her entrance into "Alfie," but stopped short with a comedic mimic of Cher.

She then got serious and gave "Alfie" her all.

Warwick prefaced her next song, which is not one of her hits, with a short tale of meeting the composer of the song in Florida, and his already having promised the song to another singer.

She then launched into a well-done rendition of "Guilty," originally recorded by Barbara Streisand.

Next, she gave the audience her version of "Love Lifts Us Up," the hit song from the movie "An Officer and A Gentleman," recorded by Joe Cocker and Jennifer Warnes.

Warwick lengthened the end of the song, turning it into a gospel tune with the help of her two excellent backup singers. The audience got into the act by clapping along.

Singing other people's songs, she showed her professional versatility. However, unlike some other per-

formers, she does not ruin other singers' hits by changing the melody or the tempo.

She then sang some of her more recent hits from her new album, "Heartbreaker." Nine of the 10 songs on the album were written by Barry Gibb or his brothers.

Warwick began with "Short Way Home," an up-and-coming hit from the album. She then gave a tongue-in-cheek plea for the audience to buy her album.

Next she pumped energy into two other hits from the album—"Yours" and "Heartbreaker."

Warwick then went back into some of her older hits. She mellowed with the ever popular "Deja Vu."

She concluded the hour-and-10-minute concert with the soft ballad, "I'll Never Love This Way Again," leaving the audience stunned that this was the end and not just an intermission.

This was the only minus for the concert—its short length.

Warwick was an exuberant professional and definitely concluded the Ruidoso Summer Festival with a bang.

LTC approved \$8,000 of a requested \$10,350 for printing of brochures. Last year, the Chamber spent \$9,500 to print 50,000 Ruidoso brochures, 20,000 lodging brochures, 20,000 restaurant brochures and 5,000 campground brochures.

Jungbluth said the Chamber has given away just about all the brochures and will probably need to print 60,000 Ruidoso brochures this year.

He said the Chamber has received considerable feedback asking for a more attractive calendar of events. That document is currently Xeroxed in the office. Jungbluth said he had hoped to upgrade the appearance of the calendar of events by having it printed, but he claimed that will be impossible under the proposed budget.

The cutback in salary request for tourist counselor Carla Beasley is a shortsighted move, Paxton said. He explained that LTC has set aside a record \$54,000 for general seasonal promotion of Ruidoso, but is cutting back the Chamber's ability to respond to a larger number of requests and visits.

"Her (Beasley's) whole job is to respond to those advertising dollars," said Paxton. The majority of Beasley's duties are answering phone inquiries and greeting visitors to the Chamber.

Both Paxton and Jungbluth were disappointed in the budget cutback for participation in trade shows, and believe the amount budgeted shows a lack of understanding by LTC. The Chamber requested \$13,500 for participation in two trade shows. Paxton said the proposed cutback to \$8,500 would cover only one-and-a-half shows.

Last year the Chamber spent \$11,804 for two trade show appearances. This year the San Antonio show will last an extra day.

Jungbluth said the only way the Chamber could go to two shows would be to take fewer people. Those who went to the San Antonio show talked of the hard work and very long days they worked at last year's show. Jungbluth said the Aspen Festival

may be in the most serious position because of the proposed cutback in funds. He said the Chamber spent \$10,000 last year on advertising, trophies and awards. The Chamber requested the same amount of money this year, but were recommended for only \$5,000 by LTC.

"If we don't have the money, we have to cut back on advertising or events," said Jungbluth. He noted that this year's Aspen Festival will cover more weekends and require more advertising.

He disagreed strongly with the reasoning behind allocating only \$5,000 to the Aspen Festival, which did not raise any money and promotes several events over several weekends, while allocating \$4,000 to the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. The latter runs only one weekend and profited \$9,000 last year.

Both Jungbluth and Paxton question LTC's ability and right to administer the \$54,000 set aside for seasonal promotion. In the past, the Chamber has been allocated the money to formulate an advertising strategy for general promotion and for specific events put on by smaller organizations.

Jungbluth said he believes LTC's

role is to hear budget requests, decide their validity and make sure there is money in the budget to accommodate the requests.

LTC's role is not to formulate a plan for that spending, said Paxton. He also questions the LTC's ability to plan an advertising strategy. He pointed to the fact that LTC has only five unpaid members, whereas the Chamber has a paid staff of three and many volunteer members at its disposal.

He also pointed to what he claims is LTC's poor track record getting things done. He said the Chamber has not been able to run any summer advertising the past two years because LTC has been so late in approving its budget.

Jungbluth and Paxton said they are looking to the village council to redefine the responsibilities of LTC at Tuesday night's meeting. If the council redefines the role of LTC, Paxton said, the Chamber will know better how to work with the committee.

"We're wasting a lot of time and effort," Paxton said of the current arguing over budgets and responsibilities. He said it hurts everybody.

"We just want to stop the fussing," Paxton said.

More favor dues increase

The Ruidoso News conducted an informal telephone poll of 35 Chamber of Commerce members last week, asking them what they thought about a raise in dues. The \$30 figure mentioned would raise approximately \$15,000 annually, compared with the proposed \$21,000 cut from the Chamber budget request.

The question was asked: "The Lodgers' Tax Committee has proposed a reduction in funding to the Chamber of Commerce. In light of that, would you oppose or support a \$30 increase in your dues? If you oppose it, what would you do if the increase were implemented?"

The results of the poll were: •SUPPORT-19. Of those, four said they would drop their Chamber memberships.

UNDECIDED-3

Many of those questioned said they would have to be convinced the Chamber needed the money before supporting the dues increase. Many said support would depend on what the increased dues would pay for.

Some said Chamber members should not have to pay for lost advertising funds, while others said would support it only if it paid for advertising.

Slover Cape of the A-Frame Cabins, said he would drop his membership if the three percent lodgers' tax is instituted. Dave Parks, of Perteel Parks and Associates, called \$125,000 for promotion of a multi-million dollar business such as Ruidoso's tourist business ridiculous.

Just how much interest in adult recreation sports is there in Ruidoso? A couple of weeks ago, I went over to the White Mountain Middle School soccer field to take some photos of an informal adult soccer scrimmage.

Darrel Gateley, the organizer of the scrimmage, was already there. We waited for over an hour, but no one else showed up.

There used to be an informal adult soccer league three years ago in this area. There were several teams in both the men's and women's divisions. Since then, however, interest in getting a league organized has died down.

Other sports have gathered more interest among adults, particularly men and women's softball.

But there is still a very limited number of competitive adults sports teams in the Ruidoso area. A few people have expressed interests in several sports, but until recently not much has been done.

Some people are trying to improve the situation, however.

"We're hopeful of getting some organized adult basketball leagues going in the fall," said Pam Graves, the new Parks and Recreation Director. "A good number of men are playing informally now, and they've expressed some interest in getting a league formed."

Mark Paz, coordinator and treasurer of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Police Athletic League (PAL), is going one step further.

"We've already got five teams set up for a PAL basketball league," Paz commented. "We've got a PAL team that has already played teams from the high school faculty and others. The local bar association is trying to get a team going along with the faculty squad. Other teams have also been formed."

"We getting a schedule set up gradually. We're planning on getting some practice games scheduled and

then starting the league in the fall." Paz said the PAL is also thinking about setting up some other adult sports in the future.

"Right now, we're taking it slowly," he said. "However, we plan on adding some more organized sports in the future. The PAL team itself is open to challenges from anybody in the area who wants to play basketball, football or any other sport."

Soccer may be the hardest sport to organize. There appears to be a hard core of adults interested in soccer, but beyond that, not many people appear to be interested in playing the sport.

That's unfortunate, because soccer is one of the most popular sports among youths in the area.

One of the problems in organizing an adult soccer league is the fact that the sport didn't really begin to gain in popularity in this country until the early 1970s.

Most people in the over-30 age group and many in the 20-30 age group had little or no exposure to soccer in high school and the grammar school grades. When I was in high school in California, we didn't have any kind of a soccer program.


As a result, there is probably a smaller number of adults who would be willing to participate in an adult soccer league.

As soccer becomes more popular in this country, and as today's teenagers and young adults get older, more adult leagues will probably pop up in most areas of the country, including Ruidoso.

All things considered, the future of adult recreation sports in Ruidoso is generally bright.

With the Parks and Recreation department and the PAL both offering promising programs, there will probably be more adult sports in the future.

And that in itself, should stimulate more interest.







Former P&Z chairman reflects

If John Schuller had his druthers, he'd like to go back to the good old days in Ruidoso when he could ride a horse all day in the hills and not stumble across a single fence post.

But he realized long ago he couldn't stop the village from growing, so he decided to get involved in planning the community, and see that expansion was done with some controls.

Schuller, a retired insurance executive from El Paso who came to Ruidoso as a kid for vacations and settled here permanently after retirement, became an insider in the planning process when he was appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) almost four years ago.

In January 1982 his fellow commissioners elected him as their chairman, and he held the seat until his resignation last week.

During his tenure, he guided P&Z through one of its rockiest periods in village history. He personally suggested several changes to improve P&Z's procedures and authority, and he became embroiled in conflicts with village officials when he felt the commission's recommendations were brushed aside.

He even threatened to resign over a policy established last year concerning access to the village attorney, but he was encouraged by the commission to remain.

Schuller said in a recent interview that the policy—denying committee heads direct access to village attorney Lee Huchstep—was never adjusted to suit him, but he continued with P&Z because he really didn't intend to resign.

"I didn't seriously consider resigning," he said, recalling the October incident. "I was attempting to get a problem out in the open and get it solved. But it never was solved."

"In my estimation, the thing about volunteer work, if it's going to be of any value, you need the full cooperation of the village council and attorney. You can't be compromised in what you're doing. If you're going to be compromised, why mess with it?"

But Schuller did mess with several planning issues while chairman. And, although he didn't always get the cooperation he wanted, he did succeed in shepherding many of the proposals through to final council approval.

Water supply and traffic controls dominate the top of his list as factors to be considered in successful planning. As Schuller contends, he and others who have advocated slower growth—because of the always uncertain supply of water—failed in trying to get water availability used as a

criterion for expansion. On the other hand, Schuller has been instrumental in getting projects going that will lead to less congestion on village thoroughfares.

Schuller has argued before the council and on his commission that guidelines should be established to include water as a planning criterion. The question surfaced during debate on the Grindstone Canyon annexation—first brought to P&Z in the spring of 1982—and Schuller says it has yet to be resolved.

"There's nothing specific in planning on water," he said. "But it's basic: If you don't have water, how can you plan?"

Schuller, along with former water board chairman C. Newton Page, last summer requested a moratorium on annexations until more water rights are secured and the Grindstone reservoir is completed.

The council rejected the idea because it didn't want to prohibit all annexation proposals. Some annexations, the council decided at the time, may be beneficial to the village.

Schuller says now a moratorium isn't necessary, but he would like to see an ordinance requiring developers to transfer water rights to the village as a condition for annexation.

Reflecting on some of his successes on P&Z, Schuller said he feels good that headway now is being made to reduce the summer traffic problem on Sudderth and Mechem drives.

The solution he and others have long advocated is to divert northbound traffic off Sudderth and onto Gavilan Canyon Road. And, since the State Highway Department appropriated funds this spring to build a turnoff and improve an access road to Gavilan, it looks like temporary relief may be in sight.

Schuller also has pushed for more emphasis on traffic and village planning. In January, P&Z presented a detailed case to the council for the need of a new comprehensive plan

and for a professional planner to be hired as a consultant.

The council has taken the first step toward a new plan by allocating \$30,000 in revenue sharing funds in the new budget for a traffic planning study. Village manager Jim Hine said the traffic study will preface work on a complete comprehensive plan.

"This is the first time any real planning has been done in this city," Schuller said, referring to progress being made on traffic planning.

Insufficient planning in the past has caused one of the biggest problems faced by P&Z—property line encroachments. At every P&Z meeting, requests for variances on property line setbacks usually crowd the agenda, Schuller noted.

Registered surveys and setback requirements were frequently neglected until the last few years, Schuller said. This has caused discrepancies on many property titles when lots are sold.


But P&Z, with council support, has moved to reduce the problem. Early this year, a policy was set to deny variances on structures built since 1980, which was when registered surveys were first required. Variances still may be granted on lots with extreme topography.

The new variance policy is one example of an increased emphasis on stricter enforcement of planning and zoning laws.

Schuller feels confident the emphasis on planning and enforcement will be continued by the present Planning and Zoning Commission.

"The future of P&Z?" he asks, repeating a question. "It's a solid body with a great deal of talent and quality. They're all men of real character."

"There's always the possibility they will be accused of doing something that's not politically expedient. Then the politicians will descend with wrath," he said. "But P&Z has to be steadfast. It has to stick to its ordinances."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Cabinet meetings sure have changed.

Under Bruce King, they were charades. First there was a private meeting, where the real discussion went on. Then the Cabinet reassembled and put on a show for the rest of us. During it, of course, nothing but the best and most upbeat things were discussed. Everyone was supposed to go away with the impression there were no problems in New Mexico.

Not so during the present administration.

Anaya Cabinet meetings are open and honest, and even the most embarrassing topics can evidently be discussed there. Nobody seems to be constrained to keep the conversation on the Pollyanna level.

But there is one thing still missing. That is a Cabinet member who has the courage to say openly, "I'm sorry, Governor, but I disagree with you on that."

To hear that statement made would be a healthy thing indeed.

Here's an Anaya quote from the latest Cabinet meeting:

"If I could just get to the stage where I really accept the fact that not everyone is going to be pleased with me, my life would be a lot easier."

That's a wise perception.

It's unfortunate that whatever moves people to run for office seems also to make them want to be universally loved.

Obviously, those who get into office must sacrifice some of that desire. If they don't, it will paralyze their performance.

And how about those Anaya removals from boards and commissions?

The total of those who find they have "resigned" could reach 400 to 500, the Governor says.

Is that justified?

Well, almost any administration will tell you it wants on such bodies those who will carry out the pledges the administration has made.

Does the Governor have the right to

remove those who do not fit that description?

With the exception of those who are protected by a provision in the Constitution, almost certainly. More than once courts have ruled that a New Mexico governor who has the power to appoint people to policy-making boards and commissions at his own pleasure also has the right to remove them at his pleasure.

Those fired should not waste their money going into court on the matter.

Another Anaya quote from the same meeting:

"The press—and I compliment them for it—always look for an ulterior motive in what a governor does. In my case, there are no ulterior motives. If you want to know my position on anything, it is the way I said it was during my campaign or in my State of the State speech. I stand by those."

The writer withholds his comment pending further experience with the Anaya administration.

Do you know how many automobiles the state of New Mexico owns?

Something over 6,000.

That fact, revealed by Finance and Administration Secretary Denise Fort, struck us somewhat amazing.

There are, she tells us, more than 105 state agencies owning cars, plus school and court personnel and those in higher education.

The Secretary also admits frankly that nobody knows at the present moment exactly where they all are.

The Governor says he visited two homes over the past weekend where employees at the division-head level had state cars in their driveway to which they had no conceivable right.

It seems likely that kind of thing will be brought to a screeching halt under the present administration.

It's about time somebody took that sort of action.

Black—by law

The Mad Hatter comes to mind when one reflects on a Louisiana law under which Susie Guillory Phipps is

designated as black on her birth certificate, as she learned for the first time in middle age. Her skin is white. She had always considered herself to be white. But there is a joker in the deck.

The joker is that the state officially deems Mrs. Phipps, a great-great-great-grandchild of a black slave and a white planter, to be black because she has "one thirty-second black blood." This conclusion is reached by an official process of reasoning that is surely tortuous, if not downright nutty.

Unfortunately, the law was upheld by a state judge in the first stage of Mrs. Phipps' suit challenging it. Magistrate Frederick Ellis ruled, in effect, that the state is right in saying anyone with even such a smidgin of black blood is legally black.

The ruling is to be appealed, with excellent reason. Such a law stands as an affront to principles of equality set forth in the Constitution and Declaration of Independence, and reaffirmed in the 14th Amendment. It should be expunged from Louisiana's statute books, as we confidently expect, it will be in a higher court.—Alamogordo Daily News

Governor Toney Anaya has fired the iron by throwing his support to the preferred site of the proposed Sierra Blanca regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Karl Franzer graciously took time from his busy duties as manager of our new Safeway to show me around the store last week.

I say "our" new Safeway because the store is such a fine addition to our village that it makes you feel possessive about it.

The building looked big and impressive on the outside when it was going up, and it looks the same on the inside through the one-way glass in Karl's upstairs office. Leading off the office is something Karl called a "Las Vegas deal"—a security catwalk above the line of cash registers.

This allows monitoring of transactions and observation of suspected shoplifters.

Also upstairs is a break room for store employees. There are 83 employees at the new store. Many are familiar faces from the old store on Suddarth, but Karl told me 47 new jobs have been created.

Both Ruidoso Safeways are supplied from the same 15-acre warehouse in El Paso, said Karl, but the two stores order separately.

My tour moved downstairs and into the well-stocked liquor section. "The liquor business is good," said Karl. "Our pricing is probably as low as we can go and still, you know, stay in business."

Next to the liquor section is a display of cheeses, and Karl automatically began straightening them as we talked.

Franzer has been with Safeway since 1958. I asked him if it is a good company to work for. "I think in the grocery field it's the best," he answered. "I know it's the best."

Karl used to work at a Safeway in Alamogordo, and he did a lot of the groundwork for the first Safeway in Ruidoso, which opened in 1975. I wondered how it was decided the village was ready for a second store.

"I recommended that we should be building another store, or enlarging the store we had," he said. A market survey determined the former course.

And Karl is obviously proud of the new store.

"I have heard nothing but good comments about the store," he said

matter-of-factly, and asked me what I'd heard. The same, I told him.

He pointed out the openness of space between the end of the aisles and the checkout area as a nice feature.

Variety is another strong point of the new Safeway.

"We try to create more than one store within a store," said Karl. Indeed, the selections of cosmetics, drugs and sundries, flowers and plants, and natural foods and vitamins allow a lot of shopping under one big roof.

I especially like the coffee section, where you can grind your coffee from different types of beans, and sample a cup of the exotic blend of the day.

Next to the coffees are eclectic snacks, from trail mixes to yogurt-covered peanuts.

From there, Karl showed me through the part of the store that has really made a hit with Safeway patrons—the bakery and delicatessen.

The bakery offers all sorts of baked goods made right in the store. Three bakers were brought in, Karl told me, and they do custom work like birthday cakes in addition to breads, donuts, etc.

There is a sit-down section in the deli, so shoppers can take a lunch break and enjoy the sandwich of the day.

The new Safeway, along with the new branch of Ruidoso State Bank next door, is changing the pattern of business in the village by directing some of it to Highway 37 north. Karl appears satisfied with the location of the store—he mentioned that he pushed for it.

The big new building going up behind the Safeway is a hardware store, he noted.

Karl said there are a few finishing touches at his store, such as landscaping on the highway side. By this time, our tour was at an end, and my guide had to go deal with one of the many little crises that must make up his day.

Karl had been spoken to and greeted by several customers as we walked through the building, and it was clear that small town friendliness lives on in the big new store.

Gyroscope a hit

A new hands-on exhibit at the International Space Hall of Fame has visitors standing in line — waiting to prove Newton's first and third laws, "things in motion tend to stay in motion in the same direction" and "for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction."

According to gift shop manager Lee Schartau, the new Gyroscopic Demonstrator Display is a very popular exhibit. It was donated to the Space Hall by the International Space

and put through each end of a fibre optic coil. If the coil is rotated the light from one direction gets out of phase with the light from the opposite direction. Because the speed of light is constant, the smallest movement can then be detected. The real bonus is: no moving parts to wear out.

Crews battle forest fire

Both the Smokey Bear and the Sacramento Hotshot Crews were called to the Coronado National Forest in Arizona last week to help fight a man-caused fire that has burned about 300 acres near Fort Huachuca. On the Lincoln itself, fire hazard conditions are moderate to high. Forest visitors are reminded that carelessness with campfires and smoking cause the most person-caused fires, and are asked to be extra careful on windy days.

Wildflowers are beginning to bloom over most of the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso. District campgrounds are open with the exception of Oak Grove. VIS programs will be held at South Fork Campground on Saturday nights at dark. Bonito Lake is full and the fishing is good. Nogal Lake has been stocked. The road to Monjeau (FR 117) is open and in good condition. Capitan Mountains

Wilderness is free of snow; White Mountain Wilderness still has some snow remaining near the ski area. Hikers will find downfall at the upper end of South Fork Trail No. 19. Fuelwood areas are open.

On the Cloudford District, all camp and picnic grounds are open. Silver, Saddle, and Apache are receiving heavy use on weekends; Deerhead, Pines, and Sleepy Grass are receiving moderate to heavy use. VIS programs will be held at Silver Overflow Area on Saturday nights at dark. At group campgrounds, all weekends are reserved until September 1; however, many weekdays are still open. Afternoon thundershowers are causing muddy spots on secondary roads and on hiking trails. One fuelwood area is open.

Guadalupe District reports that Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is receiving moderate to heavy use. Roads are

open. Trails are in good condition. Hikers and visitors are reminded to stay aware of rapidly changing weather conditions, to carry plenty of drinking water, and to be on the lookout for rattlesnakes, especially around rocky outcrops. Fuelwood areas are open, but check with the district at 885-4181 before going to cut wood.

Visitors to the Mayhill District will notice Indian Paintbrush blooming, along with other wildflowers, in the James Canyon, Miller Flats, and Agua Chiquita areas. James Canyon Campground and many popular dispersed areas are receiving heavy use on weekends. Fishing is good on the Penasco River, which is still being stocked as long as the weather stays on the cool side. Fishing pressure has been heavy at Bear Canyon Dam. Thundershowers have made side roads muddy in places.
