

## Rainbow Silver Cup to Hempens Jet by a nose

**HEMPENS JET**, a gelding who was unable to threaten against far easier competition earlier in the Ruidoso Downs season, got his act together in Sunday's third running of the \$169,831 Rainbow Silver Cup.  
Hempens Jet led all the way in the 440-yard classic for four-year-olds and pocketed a handsome victory purse of \$84,915.  
But Hempens Jet had to run the race of his life and was under siege from start to finish. It took practically a shoehorn to separate Hempens Jet and the 20-1 longshot Lightfooted, on the wire. An inch or so made the difference.

Owned by James Helzer of Mansfield, Texas, Hempens Jet returned \$16.40, \$7.20, \$3.60. The gelding was clocked in a swift 21.68 seconds, a solid improvement over his second-best qualifying time of 21.80.

Alex Baldillez Jr. got the riding assignment from trainer C. Dwayne Gilbreath. Hempens Jet was purchased for only \$8,000 in the 1980 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs.  
Lightfooted, the property of Harriet Peckham of El Paso, Texas, raked in \$28,871 for second and handed back betting payoffs of \$18.20, \$7. Nicky Wilson was up.

Bojacs Magic, the odds-on favorite piloted by Larry Byers, crossed the finish in third place, a half-length behind Lightfooted. Bojacs Magic earned the favorite's role on the strength of his top-qualifying time of 21.57 (the seasonal record). The gelding is owned by Robert Walters of Nevada, Missouri. The show price: \$2.60.

It was a two-horse race all the way with Hempens Jet getting a tremendous jump from the rail post and Lightfooted moving up briskly to whittle away the difference. Bojacs Magic, who broke in third place, was unable to muster enough speed this time. He was unable to get within range of the two leaders.

In the second half of the sprint, Lightfooted was bearing down on Hempens Jet. But the latter refused to give up and held off the attack.

Bojacs Magic had to settle for \$16,983. The remaining order of finish with purse money earned: 4th—Rebeller, \$11,888; 5th—Chicks Passem All, \$3,491; 6th—Turn Bugs Loose, \$6,793; 7th—Ponti Bar, \$5,094; 8th—Arrows Request, \$3,396; 9th—Steppin Easy, \$1,698; 10th—Almost Identical, \$1,698.

Earlier in the meeting, Hempens Jet made his summer debut as an 8-1 shot in the Mr Jet Moore Handicap and ran eighth. But Sunday's conquest of the prestigious Silver Cup

marked the gelding's third straight win since the Mr Jet Moore Handicap.

**RUNNING BUCKET**, obviously the leading three-year-old in this part of the country, hammered home his point with a come-from-behind win in Saturday's \$43,343 Norgor Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

Running Bucket appeared to drop back at the top of the stretch in the six-furlong sprint, just as the 6-1 upstart, Yallah Zip, turned on a sudden powerburst.

Yallah Zip literally shot into the lead as the field straightened out for the stretch. With a two-length cushion, Yallah Zip almost looked like a cinch.

But Running Bucket caught his second win and bore down on Yallah Zip. At the halfway point of the stretch, the two were on even terms. In the final strides, Yallah Zip had little more to deliver, and Running Bucket was pulling ahead strongly.

Running Bucket hit the wire with a one and one fourth length lead in a crisp clocking of 1:14 seconds flat (only four-fifths off the seasonal mark) and collected a cool \$21,671. This boosted his 1983 income up to \$59,378 and hiked his career bankroll up to a robust \$325,833.

## Chamber membership drive Wednesday

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is gearing up for its annual membership drive, Wednesday, June 22.

With about 40 Chamber members participating, it is going to be "guys versus girls" this year, Chamber president James Paxton said.

Before the drive begins, one-and-a-half hours will be spent orientating the members, Paxton said. The teams will meet at 7:30 a.m. at Carrizo Lodge.

The Chamber is offering a new insurance plan this year, Paxton said. Each team member will be given a packet of basic information about the insurance. Also, Ed Jungbluth, Chamber executive director, will be available to answer any questions about the insurance.

The Chamber is changing from Blue Cross insurance to the ACI (Association of Commerce and Industry) insurance program, he said. It is underwritten by National Equity

Insurance.  
It is a plan that offers a good balance, Paxton explained, because some people have families and others do not; some businesses have a large number of employees, others do not.  
"A lot of chambers in New Mexico have this insurance," he said. It is less expensive, he noted, and the service is in Albuquerque.

"We want the team members to be well informed, and take the time necessary with each person to answer questions," Paxton stressed.

"It is more critical this year than it ever has been to have good success with membership," he said.

Because of budget requirements, the Chamber has had to raise its base dues by 10 percent. Team members will have to explain this to potential new members, Paxton said.

"We're also trying to get people to pay for a year in advance," he said. For entertainment, a television set is being offered in a drawing.

Any new member who pays for a year will have his or her name put in a hat, and will be eligible to win a

19-inch color television set.  
However, if the business cannot pay the whole amount at that time it is okay, Paxton said.

The Chamber has looked for quantity, and they need quality, too, he explained. "We're stressing that they (new members) stay with the Chamber."

Anyone who joins the Chamber will be interviewed on the radio and will be able to tell about their business. It is brief but free exposure, Paxton said.

He explained some of the advantages of being a member of the Chamber.

A business will get more advertising for its dollars by being with the Chamber. The Chamber of Commerce is the place people think of when they have questions or need information about a town, he said.

A Chamber of Commerce is important in any town, but it is especially important here because Ruidoso does not have an industry to support it, Paxton noted.

"We have tourism. We need to get

the people to town.

"By being a member of the Chamber, you can have input on how you'd like to see that done," he pointed out. "We are all affected by tourism, even indirectly.  
"Sometimes in a subtle way the Chamber may have helped you."

"The kid Davy lost to (Burton) was a real good boxer," said PAL coach Lucky Mulqueen. "He was a lefty, and they're always hard to box. He had a great jab."

"In the bout Thursday, Davy almost knocked Bales out."

Ordorica, who will be a sophomore at Ruidoso High School in the fall, is staying in Albuquerque for a day or so with the New Mexico PAL boxers. He has a 20-6 record.

## "Child Seat Act" law

A new state law designed to protect young children while riding in cars, vans or pickups is now in effect.

Area law enforcement agencies say they now are required by law to issue

tickets to motorists who allow children under five years old to ride in their vehicle without being held by some sort of restraining device.

The "child seat" act was passed by the 1983 Legislature and signed into law by Governor Toney Anaya in April.

The law went into effect June 17. The law provides for a \$50 fine to any motorist operating a car, van or pickup truck registered in the state and carrying young children who are not properly restrained.

Children between one and five years old may be secured in the rear seat by a safety belt, the law says. Infants must be placed in an approved child seat.

According to the law, the \$50 fine will be waived upon receipt of proof in court that the violator has purchased an approved child's seat, or is renting one through a rental program.

Ruidoso police chief Richard Swenor said his officers will give motorists about a two-week grace period to obtain the seats from the date the law went into effect. Motorists who flagrantly violate the law will be cited.

State Police officer Clayton Floyd notes that officers cannot stop drivers solely for violating the child restraint law. The law can only be enforced when a motorist is pulled over for violating another traffic provision.

But Floyd advises drivers to comply with the law, since it is designed for the safety of children.


"The whole deal is trying to get them to use (restraining seats) for the kids' sake," he said.

Several retail outlets in Ruidoso carry restraining seats for infants and toddlers. Prices range from about \$43 for an approved infant's seat to \$60 for a toddler's seat.

Peggy Trueblood at Western Auto said one seat model comes with adjustable straps for infants and toddlers. She said seats have been "selling like crazy" since word of the law came out.

Gibson's and Ben Franklin both have restraining seats in stock, according to spokeswomen at those stores.

Sierra Blanca Motors doesn't stock the seats, said parts man Dave Scott, but the parts department can order infant and toddler seats upon request.

# May building nearly \$3 million

Building in Ruidoso remained at a healthy level in May, as indicated by the number of building permits issued during the month.

Village building inspector Don Hendricks issued 38 permits reflecting a dollar valuation of \$2,941,789. That was one permit more than the number issued in April.

The total estimated cost of construction in May was 19 percent higher than in April. Permits for seven condominium projects, containing 41 units, bolstered the valuation by \$1.26 million.

The number of permits and construction costs are down from the same period last year, when 229 permits were recorded that reflected an estimated valuation of \$14,699,308. Through the first five months this year, the building department has issued 148 permits with a dollar figure of \$9,240,788.

The numbers show a considerable decline in building and remodeling starts from last year, but the high figures through last spring reflected

an unusual rapid spurt in local building, according to builder Tracey Burton.

"Last year, we had a lot of builders from other parts of the state come here," Burton noted. He said the influx into the area, coming at a time when construction was in a slump elsewhere, forced bidding down on home starts and pushed construction up.

When the industry began to turn around in other areas late last year, the number of construction permits dropped here and the local market went into a slump.

But indications now point to a sustained recovery. Burton, who is affiliated with the Lincoln County Home Builders Association, said most builders he talked to at the last association meeting "all had something going."

"Just driving around, you see all sorts of commercial stuff going up, and housing. Everything is starting up," he said.

Burton added that all indicators, including stabilizing interest rates, point to a busy summer for builders. Hendricks issued permits in May

for 18 new single-family home starts, two residential additions or alterations, nine new commercial buildings, two commercial additions or alterations and seven condominium projects.

## Chamber opts for 10 percent dues hike

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Budget Committee decided on a budget of \$185,000 for the budget year beginning July 1.

In an effort to add extra revenue to the budget, the committee decided to up the annual dues base by 10 percent.

Ron Hemphill, chairman of the committee, pointed out that this was the first dues raise in four years.

The members also discussed the enforcement of the annual dues structure, which is based on the number of employees in a firm.

If dues were left the same and membership increased, the Chamber would need a net increase of 70 percent just to break even, Hemphill said.

Copies of the budget may be included in letters to the members, so they can see the need for higher dues.

The Chamber of Commerce will be receiving \$42,000 from the lodgers' tax fund. Other anticipated receipts are \$61,000 from other special funds and \$2,000 from sales.

Membership dues are another part of the anticipated receipts. However, Hemphill said "the budget depends on how many new members we get."

The budget committee anticipates \$10,000 profit from the art festival and \$8,000 profit from the Cadillac party.

There was some discussion over doing away with the Jeep party, which members said usually nets about \$2,500.

However, James Paxton, president of the Chamber, said, "We can't afford to cut back. We need to try and get the \$2,500 from it (the Jeep party)."

Also, under receipts, the committee decided it should try to get \$1,000 in interest income.

In a major effort to cut expenses, Hemphill suggested that instead of allotting \$3,000 to paint the Chamber of Commerce building, the Chamber members should get together to paint the building themselves.

"We could save \$2,500 in one day's labor," he said. The Chamber needs a fund-raiser, and doing its own maintenance could be it, he indicated.

"It looks better when we're asking for funds if we pay our own way," Hemphill said.

The committee members agreed to this idea. Ed Jungbluth, Chamber executive director, noted that with some of the money saved, the Chamber might be able to get new carpet needed in the Chamber of Commerce building. Part of this labor might also be done by Chamber members.

In another cost-cutting measure, committee members discussed the idea of making members of the membership drive teams pay for their own breakfast at the 7:30 a.m. meeting before the drive begins Wednesday, June 22.

With at least \$6,500 allotted to telephones and utilities, there was some discussion about buying phones instead of renting to cut the surcharge fees. However, no decision was made.

## Cattle Growers' head criticizes Anaya

The New Mexico Cattle Growers Association has joined the Bureau of Land Management, the state Farm Bureau and New Mexico State University in opposing a regional airport on Site B, Fort Stanton Mesa.

And the president of the cattlemen's association, Bob Jones, has accused Governor Tony Anaya of "political upstaging" in announcing that he supports the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission in its quest for Site B.

Jones said in a news release that Anaya's support for the controversial site was "very premature."

The Cattle Growers support development of an airport on Site A,

about four miles west of the preferred site.

The Farm Bureau, federal Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and New Mexico State University (NMSU) also prefer to have an airport on Site A.

Site A is seen as an alternate airport location by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), which prefers Site B. Governor Anaya also expressed his support for Site B two weeks ago when he sent a letter to Interior Secretary James Watt asking him to okay the transfer of 1,666 acres on the site from BLM to the Federal Aviation Administration.

Anaya agreed with the argument of the airport commission that Site A—located on state, federal and private land—eventually would ex-

perience the same urban encroachment problems that have plagued the present Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

Airport proponents have tried to acquire BLM land on Fort Stanton Mesa since the late 1960s. Two previous interior secretaries have turned down requests for the land transfer.

The preferred site is on the 26,000-acre Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch operated by NMSU under a 20-year cooperative agreement with BLM. The agreement expires in 1990.

The Cattle Growers Association said it has been working, along with all parties involved in the issue, to "alleviate conflicts and obtain Site A for Ruidoso."

Jones also said, "I can't understand why the Governor chose to intercede at this time and cloud all the issues."

"The Governor's ability to mitigate impacts on long term range research, as stated by his press release, is a total impossibility. The Governor's disruption of current efforts by all interested parties to resolve the issue must be termed political upstaging."

Acting on Anaya's recommendation to reapply for Site B, the airport commission last week completed the application, which was submitted to the Albuquerque FAA office.

In the document, the commission says it would allow NMSU to continue its grazing research on the land that is fenced in around the airport. The airport would require less than 300 acres for the first stage of development, and almost 600 acres at the next century.

## 'E.T.' to designate zoning districts

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission met Thursday for the first time since official adoption of its ordinance, which regulates zoning of the one-mile area surrounding the Ruidoso village limits.

The next task for the commission, chairman M. R. "Mill" Alcorn pointed out, is to designate actual zoning districts in the extraterritorial area. In discussing how best to approach that job, the group decided to examine all restrictive covenants

now in effect for county subdivisions in the extraterritorial zone.

These will be utilized to avoid establishing zoning that may conflict with present uses of the land. Ex-officio member Greg Haussler was appointed to gather the necessary information from county records.

The commission Thursday also touched upon potential issues for its consideration. One of these is Sleepy Hollow subdivision, located just outside Ruidoso's Upper Canyon. This area, proposed for development with 48 single family residential lots, was recently denied annexation by the Ruidoso village council. It lies in the

extraterritorial zone.

Alcorn noted that he wants to fill several vacant positions on the commission before it begins regular business, however, Lincoln County commissioners and Ruidoso village councilmen will be asked to make the necessary appointments to replace former members Howard Shanks, Wesley Grigsby and Ronnie Hemphill.

The extraterritorial zoning commission meets the third Thursday of each month at 2 p.m., in Ruidoso or Carrizozo. The next meeting will be July 21.

The classy son of Insubordination out of Sprawl is owned by Harold D. Stone of San Antonio, Texas. His pilot is Casey Lambert and his trainer is Casey's pop, Cliff Lambert Sr. Turned loose as a solid favorite in the Norgor Derby, Running Bucket returned depressed mutual payoffs of \$3, \$2.40, \$2.40. The win was his third straight of '83, and the ninth of his career. Earlier this year, he handily polished off the \$47,544 Riley Allison Derby at Sunland Park.

Yallah Zip (\$3.40, \$2.80) finished second in a game bid, earned \$9,538 and swelled his 1983 bankroll up to \$16,555. The gelding was ridden by Paul Jaramillo. He's owned by L.G. and Helen Rhodes of Abilene, Texas.

Some Other Brother, an entrant of Running Bucket, took the third-place purse of \$5,201. O.A. Martinez Jr. was up. The colt is the property of Robert McCasland and Barney Green of Eunice.

Sunnily Smashed, the 2-1 second favorite, drifted into a fourth-place finish after helping force the pace and fending off repeated attacks from several challengers.

Saturday's ninth race at 400 yards also stirred up attention since it marked the return of Higheasterjet, the richest quarter horse of all time (with winnings of \$1,514,262). The five-year-old gelding was made a staggering 1-9 favorite and looked like it, winning by one and one half lengths. He paid a slight \$2.20 to win. Steve Harris was up.

**BARTDRESS**, a hard hitting filly owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, carved out the fastest qualifying time for the upcoming \$621,630 Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly's brilliant success was the highlight of Friday's 13-race program. Each race was a 440-yard elimination sprint for the Rainbow.

Bartdress raced as a 1-4 shot in the second race and left nothing in doubt. She was in command all the way and flashed under the wire with a

solid one and one fourth length lead. Despite a headwind, Bartdress stopped the clock in 21.66 seconds, the best of the day. She's trained by Clifton Dean. Larry Byers does the riding.

The victory was the third of the year for Bartdress, and the \$1,500 winner's slice hiked her 1983 income up to \$56,826. Included in her current record is a nose second in the \$327,735 Kansas Derby. Last year, Bartdress earned \$133,982 with a record of 9-3-1.

Fans who backed Bartdress in the wagering collected a meager win payoff of \$2.20.

Another highpoint of Friday's program was the seventh race, which matched Mr Master Bug, last year's All-American Futurity winner, against Call Caleb, winner of the Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity and the Los Alamitos Derby on the West Coast. Call Caleb, closing with a powerful burst, overtook Mr Master Bug to win by a length in a swift clocking of 21.71.

Both Call Caleb and Mr Master Bug (a winner of \$1,141,378) qualified for the Rainbow finale, thus setting the stage for a dramatic rematch. Mr Master Bug broke alertly in the trials, but appeared to tire at the end. The outing was only his second since the All-American.

Hopes for a Triple Crown contender went down the drain in the eighth race when Dealin Easy, the Kansas Derby winner, turned in a sluggish try and ran third.

**CLASSY LOOM**, the colt who finished second in the recent \$323,705 Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park, took another step toward the big cash during Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

# Ruidoso State Bank, Security Bank take victories in Little League Major action

Security Bank and Ruidoso State Bank took big victories in Ruidoso Little League Major Division action last week at the Little League field.

A round-robin league tournament will follow the regular season and playoff, with every team participating in it.

What would I like to see happen at Wimbledon this year?

I would like to see Guillermo Vilas win the men's singles, and I would like to see Chris Evert Lloyd complete her "Grand Slam with an asterisk" by winning the women's crown.

Only two players are given a chance of winning the men's title this year—defending champion Jimmy Connors and ex-champion John McEnroe. Though Vilas is seeded fourth—following those two and Czech Ivan Lendl—no one really figures him to have a shot at the title.

"But I do," as McEnroe says in his Bic razor commercial. Vilas is known as a clay court specialist, and he has notched major triumphs on that surface—U.S. Open, 1977; French Open, 1977.

But those who write off Vilas on the grass at Wimbledon forget he has won two major titles on grass—Australian Open, 1978 and 1979. Vilas has the ability to win Wimbledon this year—one wonders if he has the motivation.

"The mild bull of the Pampas" was recently hit with a one-year suspension from men's professional tennis for accepting an appearance fee to play in a tournament. The time limit for appealing the penalty will expire after Wimbledon, meanwhile he can play.

An outcry already has been raised about this stern action of the body governing men's pro tennis. Being the Wimbledon title-holder would certainly not hurt Vilas' position when it comes time for a final ruling.

One other element could enter into the performance of "El Campeon" these next two weeks. Vilas has always played exceptionally well in Davis Cup for Argentina.

Though he will not technically be playing for his country at Wimbledon, one wonders whether the thought of avenging in small measure Argentina's defeat in the Falklands may cross Guillermo's mind.

Like Connors, Vilas is over 30 and heading toward if not edging into the twilight of his career. What a wonder if he could cap his lifework by bagging the only Grand Slam title that eludes him—Wimbledon.

On the women's side, we have Chris Evert Lloyd aiming for a fourth consecutive Grand Slam title. Though a Grand Slam has traditionally been thought of as winning the French, Wimbledon, U.S. and Australian titles in one year, the international federation decided the feat also could be achieved by winning them consecutively over two years.

This is what Chrissie will be attempting to do. Her biggest obstacle is, of course, Martina Navratilova. But that is as the tournament starts. In two of the three Evert Lloyd majors over the past year, someone else has done the favor of knocking Martina off before the final.

That seems unlikely to happen this time, but you never know. Connors said about the men, "There are a lot of guys out to make names for themselves, capable of upsetting a top player on a particular day."

I think that holds true for the women, too, though someone would really have to be "in the zone" to beat Chris or Martina in a pre-final round.

Noting that Evert Lloyd has been in the final eight of the past 10 years (she and Martina have each won three times), helps me understand what I really feel about Wimbledon this year.

I want something different to happen!

In ten years, there has been just one men's champion outside the triumvirate of Bjorn Borg, Connors and McEnroe (Arthur Ashe, 1975). If Vilas can't do it, maybe a reborn Vitas Gerulaitis or a treeing Johan Kriek will ascend.

The very fact there is such certainty we will see a Connors-McEnroe and a Navratilova-Lloyd final makes me feel someone—maybe more than one—lies in wait to upset the oddsmakers.

If not—if the seedings hold true—those four will have earned the right to battle for the glory. And the viewing public will be in for a treat watching the finals the weekend after next.

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

# Campaign under way to improve business burglary awareness

Sometime during the wee hours of the night between June 6 and 7, five Ruidoso businesses were hit by at least one sloppy burglar.

The person or persons broke windows or went through doors of the businesses—one door was simply pushed open—searched for money and left a distinct trail through the stores.

The amount of cash stolen that night wasn't that significant. What was important, however, was that each business had something in common—each one was fairly easy to rip off.

"They all had weak points—either the windows or doors. One had a very bad door lock, you could just push on the door and it would open," said Ruidoso policeman Barry Smith.

The Ruidoso Police Department has not yet made an arrest in connection with the burglaries.

Such incidents of commercial burglary are on the rise, according to Smith, who this month is working to coordinate a burglary awareness campaign among business owners.

The strategy during June—which has been designated Burglary Awareness Month by the International Association of Chiefs of Police—will be to organize a committee of business owners to disseminate information on problems and solutions regarding business security.

Smith is organizing the project in conjunction with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. The committee, not yet formed, will be an offshoot of the Ruidoso Neighborhood Watch program, which got off the ground in March.

Businesses that join the program will have access to window decals and signs, to post a warning that the business is part of a village-wide crime prevention group—similar to the theory of deterrence used by Neighborhood Watch.

Smith also hopes the committee will establish a telephone "hot line" which could be used by merchants to get the word out on hot check artists, and incidents that could affect every business owner.

"It's basically people looking out for one another and sharing information," Smith said about the system. "One single businessman cannot fight crime activity by himself, it takes a collective effort."

According to Smith, the idea of a business committee has emerged at the right time. Because of Neighborhood Watch and the crackdown on residential burglaries, thieves are coming out of neighborhoods and into business districts, Smith said.

"My personal opinion is, the word is out that people in the community are keeping an eye out. Burglars are a little hesitant," Smith added that residential burglaries typically decline in summer when tourists

return to their summer homes and the number of daylight hours increase.

An added bonus of the higher occupation level is an increase in membership in Neighborhood Watch. The program now has over 300 members, Smith said, and he receives inquiries almost daily from returning seasonal residents.

That enthusiasm in the program is something Smith would like to see develop in the business community.

The first step business owners should take to improve security is to make a security survey. The survey is a basic check of all exterior doors and windows, locks and lighting.

Smith recommends metal bars or grates over windows, especially windows that are hidden from view of the street. Doors should be solid, with hinges on the inside. Key-operated dead bolt locks should be installed on all exterior doors, Smith suggested.

Another deterrent often overlooked is lighting, according to Smith. Well-placed night lights can be effective,

and inexpensive, protection.

Before starting the survey, Smith suggests the businessman draw up a checklist that can be marked off as he goes through the building. Smith also noted that Ruidoso police officers are available to help make a security inspection.

The most effective prevention for a home or business is an alarm system, says Smith. None of the five businesses burglarized two weeks ago had an alarm.

"With more and more businesses here, we just can't check them all effectively," he noted, adding that alarms can be the eyes and ears for police.

"Most burglars here are amateurs, opportunists. They're looking for an easy place to hit."

Some alarm systems come with telltale signs—such as window wiring or alarm boxes—that warn the thief to stay away. Other alarms, those using motion detectors or light beams, are

almost impossible to detect, Smith said, but businesses usually place a sticker in a window warning the premises are protected.

Though alarm systems are becoming more expensive, due mainly to increases in telephone line charges levied on the hookup between the alarm and monitoring station, Smith stresses the cost is justified when compared to the potential loss from burglary.

Alarms, better door and window locks, and adequate lighting are seen by Smith as obstacles placed before a potential thief and a business.

"The object is to put as many barriers in front of the people to make it harder for them, or less of an opportunity."

If business owners join the Neighborhood Watch network and take a stand to protect themselves, it will send a clear message to crooks.

Said Smith, the message is: "We're sick and tired of this, we're not going to be victims anymore."

## Downs P&Z works on map, zoning

The Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday continued working toward adoption of an updated zoning map and ordinance for the village. The commission scheduled a public hearing during its next meeting, Thursday, July 7, on adoption of the map and definitions of zoning districts.

P&Z members first reviewed the zoning districts proposed for inclusion in the village's planning and zoning ordinances, which were taken from the New Mexico Municipal League Land Use Management Policy. Zoning districts proposed include rural and agricultural (A-1), one family

dwelling (R-1), multiple family dwelling (R-2), apartment (R-3), neighborhood commercial (C-1), general commercial (C-2), light manufacturing (M-1), historic (H-1), mobile home (MH-1), mobile home park (MHP) and planned unit development (PUD).

Definitions of each zone are included in the proposed ordinance amendment, which P&Z will present to trustees for adoption. These zoning designations were attached to areas of land in the village, on the proposed map. Following the public hearing, trustees will be asked to adopt the map.

P&Z chairman George Smith mentioned trying to keep land owners from subdividing lots into small

tracts as a goal of the new zoning designations. He also feels some property may be upgraded in value by attaching a new zoning to it, thereby offering incentive for buyers to purchase and develop tracts in those areas.

Also discussed was the need to annex two parcels of property commission members believe are receiving village services but not being taxed. These tracts are surrounded on three or four sides by village land but have never been annexed. A motion was passed to recommend to trustees the properties be annexed.

In other business, P&Z granted approval to Eloy Sanchez to purchase a permit for erection of a sign at Mom's Kitchen.


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
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

The bonds will constitute the general obligations of the District, payable from general taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount.

**AUTHORIZATION**

Such bonds constitute the first portion of the \$1,250,000 of bonds authorized at an election held in the District on February 1, 1983. Such bonds were authorized for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings, and purchasing and improving school grounds.

**INTEREST RATE AND LIMITATIONS**

The following interest limitations are applicable:

- (1) The maximum net effective interest rate permitted for such issue is twelve percent (12%) per annum; provided, however, that if the net effective interest rate on such issue is greater than ten percent (10%) per annum (based on the actual price to be paid to the District for such issue, calculated to maturity according to standard tables of bond values), such rate must be approved in writing by the New Mexico State Board of Finance, and the Board may not issue the bonds before such approval is given.
- (2) The maximum stated interest rate permitted is twelve percent (12%) per annum.
- (3) Interest shall be payable on June 15, 1984 and semiannually thereafter on December 15 and June 15 in each year until maturity.
- (4) No bid shall specify more than one interest rate for each maturity.
- (5) Each interest rate specified must be stated in a multiple of one-eighth (1/8th) or one-twentieth (1/20th) of one percent (1%) per annum.
- (6) The maximum interest spread is two percent (2%) per annum, i.e., the stated rate borne by one bond may not exceed the stated rate borne by any other bond by more than two percent (2%) per annum.
- (7) Subject to the foregoing limitations, it is permissible to bid different or split rates of interest.

**BIDS**

Bidders are required to submit a bid specifying (a) the lowest stated rate or rates of interest and premium, if any, at which such bidder will purchase such bonds. For informational purposes only, each bidder is requested to specify (b) the total net interest cost to the District in dollars and cents and (c) the stated effective interest rate in a stated percent. Proposals should be enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Bid for General Obligation School Building Bonds of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, Lincoln County, New Mexico," addressed to F. Lynn Willard, D.V.M., Secretary of the Board of Education of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, at the Ruidoso School Administration Building in Ruidoso, New Mexico, 88345. Only unconditional bids will be considered. Bids should be submitted on the official bid form which may be obtained from either Mr. Pat Valliant, Superintendent of Schools, at such Ruidoso School Administration Building or the District's financial consultant (see "Information" which appears hereafter).

**BASIS OF AWARD**

Said bonds will be awarded to the best bidder considering the stated interest rate or rates specified and the premium offered, if any, and subject to the right of the Board of Education to reject any and all bids and readvertise. The best bid will be determined by deducting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the amount of interest which the District would be required to pay from the date of the bonds to the respective maturity dates at the stated rate or rates specified in the proposal, and said bonds will be awarded on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the District. The purchaser must pay accrued interest from the date of the bonds to the date of delivery. The bonds will not be sold for less than par and accrued interest. The District reserves the privilege of waiving any irregularity or informality in any bid.

**CUSIP NUMBERS**

CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto will constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and to pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms hereof. All expenses in relation to the printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid for by the District, but the CUSIP Service Bureau charge for the assignment of said numbers will be the responsibility of and will be paid for by the purchaser.

**GOOD FAITH DEPOSIT**

All bids shall be sealed and, except the bid of the State of New Mexico, if one is received, shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit of not less than \$20,000 (i.e., two percent (2%) of the principal amount of the bonds) either in cash or by cashier's or treasurer's check of, or by certified check drawn on a solvent commercial bank or trust company in the United States and payable to "Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3". Such good faith check shall be returned if the bid is not accepted. If the successful bidder shall fail or neglect to complete the purchase of said bonds within thirty (30) days following the acceptance of the bid or within ten (10) days after the bonds are offered for delivery, whichever is later, the amount of the deposit shall be forfeited to the District as liquidated damages and in that event, the Board of Education may accept the bid of the one making the next best bid. If all bids are rejected, the Board shall readvertise said bonds in the same manner as herein provided for the original advertisement. If there be two or more equal bids and such bids are the best bids received and for not less than par and accrued interest, the Board of Education shall determine which bid shall be accepted.

**TIME OF AWARD AND DELIVERY**

The Board of Education will take action awarding the bonds or rejecting all bids not later than twenty-four (24) hours after the expiration of the time herein prescribed for the receipt of the bids. Delivery of the bonds will be made to the successful bidder at some bank or trust company in Albuquerque, New Mexico, without charge to the account of the District. If for any reason delivery cannot be made within sixty (60) days, the successful bidder shall have the right to purchase said bonds during the succeeding thirty (30) days upon the same terms or at the request of the successful bidder during said thirty (30) days, the good faith deposit will be returned and such bidder shall be relieved of any further obligation. The bonds, however, will be made available for delivery by the District to the purchaser as soon as reasonably possible after the date of the sale. Chapter 350, Laws of New Mexico, 1975, provides that any act attacking the validity of any proceedings had or taken by any public body (such as the Board) preliminary to and in the authorization of any public securities (such as the bonds herein offered) is perpetually barred after the passage of 30 days following publication of a notice of action of the resolution authorizing such public securities. As noted above, the District expects to deliver such bonds within 30 days following such publication, and submission of a bid for the bonds shall constitute consent to delivery at such time, subject to receipt by the successful bidder of the opinion of bond counsel (as hereafter provided) at the time of delivery of the bonds.

**TRANSCRIPT, PRINTED BONDS AND LEGAL OPINION**

Pursuant to Section 22-10-9, NMSA 1978, as last amended, the written approval of the New Mexico Attorney General of said bonds as to form and legality will be supplied. The validity and enforceability of the bonds, in addition, will be approved by Messrs. "3. Interest on said bonds is exempt from taxation by the United States of America under present Federal income tax laws; and

"4. The obligations of the District are subject to the reasonable exercise in the future by the State of New Mexico and its governmental bodies of the police power inherent in the sovereignty of the State and to the exercise by the United States of the powers delegated to it by the Federal Constitution.

"As Bond Counsel, we are passing upon only those matters set forth in this opinion and are not passing upon the accuracy or completeness of any statements made in connection with any sale of such bonds."





## Inside the capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE — Government is supposed to be about people, but like many things in our society, it more often seems to be about money.

Some recent examples:  
—There was a little quiet joy in Santa Fe when Judge Edwin Mechem ruled in the state's favor on how the feds should pay their share of oil-lease revenues. Somewhere down the line, after all appeals have been exhausted, that decision could net us about \$40 million, plus additional sums we had not counted on in coming years.

Point in this case was that the feds, who are supposed to share with us half-and-half the money they get from oil and gas leases on federal lands within our state, have been first paying windfall profits tax on the total and only splitting with us what's left over.

Judge Mechem ruled they must instead pay us 50 percent of the total, without deducting the windfall tax. What's more, they have to go back and reimburse us for what he says they have been doing wrong ever since the windfall profits tax was first imposed.

The federal government is likely to appeal this ruling, since it affects Utah, Hawaii, Wyoming, Texas and other states, as well as New Mexico.

Technically, any money we get as a result of this matter goes to the public schools. That doesn't mean they will be richer by that amount, however. It simply means that particular money will replace an equal amount in what has been budgeted for them; and the equivalent sum will be returned to the general fund for the Legislature to dispose of.

—The Board of Finance is struggling with new guidelines to govern the relationship between banks and the state.

At the present time, nearly one fourth of all bank deposits in New Mexico are from public funds. In fact, three banks in the state now have more than 25 percent of their deposits in public money.

At one time state banks didn't even

have to pay interest on what the government deposited with them. Now they do, in most instances.

What worries the Board of Finance, in addition to the fact that there may be too much dependence by financial institutions on the good will of Santa Fe, is how much of this money is actually going to help local economies. Some banks loan out as little as 18 percent of their deposits, using the rest of the money to generate high interest with little risk in Treasury bills or by providing it for out-of-state investment.

The Board of Finance wants to make sure banks (and savings and loans, which become more like banks with each month that passes) are making loans with the state money they have which benefit the people of New Mexico.

—Nobody made a stir when Congress and the President recently raised the debt ceiling of the nation to \$1,389 trillion.

(That's "trillion," in case you missed it — written like this: \$1,389,000,000,000.)

So nobody should have been surprised when, following that vote, interest on long-term Treasury bills pushed above 11 percent for the first time this quarter.

If the nation spends that much more than it takes in, it has to borrow to make up the difference. That's what T bills accomplish.

To attract borrowers, the nation has to offer high interest, which in turn forces financial institutions to pay high interest to attract depositors. That in turn forces those financial institutions to charge higher interest on the money they loan us to buy cars, or houses, or whatever. That in turn leads to further chance of inflation, that plague which has punished our country almost since the end of World War II.

It's that simple — which is why Mr. Reagan and those who say any budget deficits don't fuel inflation are just whistling Dixie.

And soon you'll see a move to lift the debt ceiling even higher.

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## Sense & Nonsense

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici



One of the issues which has received an extensive amount of attention at the Capital lately has been the topic of nuclear disarmament.

I doubt there's anyone who is more worried about the proliferation of nuclear weapons than I am. Hopefully, within our lifetime, we can get rid of them all.

Recently, myself and 18 other senators wrote the President to share our views about the arms reduction matter.

We emphasized that even though we voted to release funds for the MX missile; we did so in exchange for a strong commitment to proceed with a meaningful nuclear arms reduction effort.

We endorsed in our letter the so-called "build-down proposal" as a means to achieve that goal.

The build-down proposal provides that for every new warhead deployed by the U.S. and Soviet Union, two existing warheads would be withdrawn from nuclear stockpiles.

We told the President in our letter that several key points should be borne in mind in framing such a proposal:

—The build-down proposal developed for presentation to the Soviet Union must be simple enough to be understood and fair enough to be negotiable.

—The build-down concept should be viewed as a complement to, but not a substitute for the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks. The build-down aims solely at achieving meaningful and rapid reductions in U.S. and Soviet forces while permitting those types of weapons modernization programs which enhance stability.

—To be workable and negotiable, the build-down concept must be ap-

plied comprehensively to all strategic nuclear warheads.

I think that the build-down proposal represents the most realistic, workable arms reduction effort that we have.

Among other things, it would also reduce the magnitude of explosiveness in nuclear weapons. The reason is that existing warheads have extremely high megatonnage because they are not all that accurate. Newer warheads, however, are more accurate and thus require much less firepower to hit their target.

Those of us who wrote the President believe that the build-down proposal can enhance achievement of a more stable nuclear environment. We all agree that to achieve true stability, each side must be satisfied that its' forces are and will remain secure.

In response to our letter, the President called a number of us to the White House to meet with him to discuss the issue. There were several Democratic senators who also attended, including Sam Nunn of Georgia, symbolizing a true bipartisan spirit in our proposal.

The President assured us that he is committed to achieving serious arms reductions and that the United States would demonstrate flexibility at the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks in Geneva.

I believe the present debate over the MX offers an opportunity to forge a broad and effective consensus around an arms control policy which combines arms reductions and modernization programs in a manner which promises to enhance stability. With good faith and hard work for all, we can create a framework for real progress.

## Reporter's Round

I took in a Ruidoso village council meeting for the first time in almost two years last Tuesday night, and found the whole affair rather interesting.

Since I usually cover sports, I decided it was time for me to get a good look at how our village government operates.

Fortunately, I just happened to pick a night when the council members were packed and some noteworthy subjects were discussed. A total of 120 people (including the council members) showed up for the meeting.

Upper Canyon residents were present to protest the Sleepy Hollow annexation, while the Lodgers' Tax Committee budget proposal and a one percent increase in lodgers' tax were also discussed.

The council meetings usually only last until around 9:30 p.m., but the subjects discussed last Tuesday were of such interest that this meeting didn't end until midnight.

People on both sides of each issue got up and spoke their minds.

Mayor George White and councilmen Frank Sayner, Don Dale, Benny Coulson and Al Junge listened to each person's statements and gave thoughtful answers.

Sometimes members of the audience hooted after another person gave their opinion of the subject that was being discussed.

However, that's just good healthy dissent in a free society. As long as the person speaking is able to get his point across without being interrupted, disagreements are part of the democratic process.

At some council meetings, orderly free speech is not always a guaranteed right.

I attended a city council meeting almost three years ago in California, and people were constantly interrupting and mocking other people's opinions.

The subject being discussed was an abortion clinic in the town. Pro-abortion and anti-abortion forces were out in force at the city council meeting and tempers were hot and heavy.

Now admittedly, abortion is one of the most controversial subjects in the country nowadays. Still, a good many people over-reacted during the course of the council meeting.

A man and a woman standing near the entrance door began to clap in each other's face when their respective side was represented. The two seemed on the verge of trading punches before the discussion cooled down a bit.

That same city council has held other meetings in the past where not more than 10 people have showed up, the subjects at hand being less noteworthy.

At times, the meetings had about as much excitement as a boring college class, with the few people that attended them often leaving before they were over.

Ruidoso generally doesn't go to such extremes at its council meetings.

Still, last Tuesday's meeting attracted a good representation of the community.

In the end, the council turned down the Sleepy Hollow annexation, accepted the Lodgers' Tax Committee budget proposal and rejected the one percent increase in the lodgers' tax.

Not everybody was satisfied with the results, and those people that weren't expressed their feelings about it.

But the meeting showed that people in Ruidoso—whether they be businessperson, homeowner or council member—care a lot about this community.

And that's says a lot for Ruidoso and the American democratic system.


