Racing strike concerns Anaya

Governor Toney Anaya Friday called a special meeting of the New Mexico Racing Commission "to provide a forum for horsemen and racetrack owners to discuss and attempt to resolve their differences pertaining to a dispute over the allocation of uncollected winning tickets."

Anaya sent a letter to the track managers and to Ray Reed, executive secretary of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association, informing them of the meeting called for Friday, July 1, at the State Capitol.

"I am shocked at the irresponsibility of the track owners and horsemen in allowing this dispute to go this far... the only loser will be the collective economy of the racing industry, but moreover, employees, the local economies of Santa Fe, Raton and Ruidoso and the state of New Mexico. This could be a crippling blow to the economy that is just now beginning to emerge toward economic recovery," said Anaya in his letter.

Anaya also indicated he has requested the Attorney General to explore every possibility to determine what action the state might take to require the racetracks to remain open and the horsemen to enter their horses, including the suspension of licenses for future meets should the issue not be resolved.

The New Mexico Horsemen's Association has threatened not to enter horses in any races except paid-up stakes after July 11 if the racetracks do not contribute close to \$200,000 in uncashed pari-mutuel tickets (out-tickets) to the purse structure of races. The horsemen claim Ruidoso Downs owes over \$90,000 to the purse structure.

They claim the racetracks promised to contribute the out-tickets to the purse structure in exchange for the horsemen's active support of Senate Bill 191, which returned the first \$5,000 in daily pari-mutuel taxes to

the tracks for capital improvements.

Anaya, in his letter, indicated if the matter could not be resolved amicably, it could best be resolved in a court of law instead of through a strike. He urged both parties to escrow the money in dispute pending negotiations or litigation to resolve the issues.

Horsemen's attorney Les Houston and Ruidoso-Sunland general manager Donald Smith Sunday responded differently to Anaya's intervention in the potential strike of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association.

Houston read a rough draft of a letter he sent to Anaya Monday morning, thanking the governor for his efforts to resolve the dispute between horsemen and racetrack ownership. But Houston disagreed with Anaya's use of the word "irresponsible," and the idea of an escrow account for the disputed funds, as well as a court settlement for the dispute.

Smith, who had not received a copy of Anaya's letter as of Sunday afternoon, agreed with the idea of an escrow account and court settlement after being told of the letter's contents.

"We're looking forward to the meeting. I think everybody can air their points of view and maybe we can get this thing resolved," said Smith.

"The only thing to be negotiated is how quickly are the tracks going to honor their commitment," read Houston from his drafted letter.

Houston disagreed with Anaya's idea of putting the disputed money into an escrow account, saying escrow accounts are only for situations where one party cannot pay. He called the escrow accounts a face-saving tactic for the tracks that makes no concession whatsoever to the horsemen.

Houston also said this dispute is not the type of issue that could be resolved in drawn-out court proceedings; it is an issue that calls for

direct action.

Houston took exception with Anaya's use of the word "irresponsible." He said the horsemen, through the efforts of Ray Reed, have made numerous attempts to settle this dispute amicably, but met with failure and hostility.

During a general meeting of the horsemen Sunday at Ruidoso Downs, Houston said the Racing Commission cannot keep the tracks open or make the horsemen race. He also warned the horsemen not to depend on the governor to settle the dispute.

During Sunday's meeting, Houston also read two affidavits sworn by former Ruidoso-Sunland Incorporated directors stating the tracks owed the out-tickets to the horsemen.

"As one of the driving forces to pass Senate Bill 191, I hereby state without question that the tracks owe the horsemen the out-tickets for the years 1981 and 1982," stated William L. (Sunny) Edwards, former president of the board of directors of Ruidoso-Sunland Incorporated in a sworn affidavit dated June 26.

"As one of the individuals on the ground floor of getting Senate Bill 191 passed into law, I can state, without any question whatsoever, that the racetracks owe to the horsemen the out-tickets for 1981, 1982 and up to the time the law was changed this year... I simply cannot understand why the racetracks are refusing to honor their commitment," stated Mack Henry Yates, former Ruidoso-Sunland board member and currently a major stockholder.

A letter signed by presidents or general managers of all the tracks and the New Mexico State Fair promised to return the out-tickets to the following year's purses if Senate Bill 191 was passed unamended.

"Although there were amendments to Senate Bill 191, the tracks got what they went after—the big capital improvements allowance. Any amendments that were added to Senate Bill 191 in no way changed

the obligation of all the racetracks to pay to the purse structures the out-tickets," stated Edwards in his affidavit.

"Right up to the time the bill was passed, and after it had been amended, the tracks verbally continued their commitment to give the horsemen the out-tickets, Senate Bill 191 would not have become law without the support of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association," stated Yates in his affidavit.

Houston also read a letter written by Finlay McGillivray, then general manager of Ruidoso-Sunland, after Senate Bill 191 had passed in early 1981. In the letter McGillivray promised to commit 100 percent of the out-tickets from one season to the next season's purses.

Houston told horsemen Sunday that the disputed \$200,000 is not the only thing at stake in this dispute.

"There's more involved here than just the money," said Houston. "We're going to have a say in New Mexico racing we haven't had in the past."

He repeatedly asked for horsemen's input on the issue and told them they had to remain united in their fight. He warned of what he said were the racetrack's efforts to undermine the horsemen's resolve by starting rumors that the track gates would be closed to horsemen, that electricity and water would be cut off.

"Don't let them spook you with all those threats," said Don Farris, executive board member of the horsemen's association. "They can't do it."

Houston told the horsemen he is investigating the possibility of running races at the New Mexico State Fairgrounds track in Albuquerque in the event all or some of the racetracks do not contribute their share of the out-tickets to the purse structure and the strike goes into effect.

He urged as many horsemen as possible to attend Friday's meeting in Santa Fe.

Mayor White supports dog leash law

If you ask Mayor George White whether the village council should amend the animal control ordinance by adopting a leash law, he will bark out a quick and convincing response.

"Of course!" he exclaims. "I have a perfect example of my wife being crippled because of a dog being out of control of his owner."

Indeed, it was the May 24 attack on his wife Ruth by a vicious German shepherd that has led the mayor to voice support for a canine leash law, which he said would allow the animal control officer to "put more teeth into enforcement."

As she went on her evening stroll that Tuesday, Ruth White was knocked to the ground and mauled by a German shepherd that escaped from its yard.

Mrs. White is continuing to rehabilitate from several deep wounds in her right leg. Mayor White said his wife underwent grafting treatment on the leg and therapy for

nerve damage. He said he expects her to be released from the hospital sometime this week.

According to the mayor, the attack led to renewed support in the town for a leash law. He said he has received several telephone calls from people, "asking me to do something."

Like several others, Mayor White admits that he thought the village had a leash law, but learned after the attack that the word "leash" doesn't appear in the animal control ordinance. "I thought our law was a leash law, but it only says (a dog) must be under control at all times," White said.

According to the ordinance, which was revised last year, a dog doesn't have to be restrained on a leash as long as it is in the "immediate control" of its owner.

Animal control officer Jack Sniadecki said the law also allows for a dog to roam free on its owner's premises. Sniadecki said he cannot pick up a dog until it is "astray or running at large," according to the law.

Because of the flexibility in the law, Sniadecki said he literally has to patrol "every inch of Ruidoso" looking for stray dogs.

"Ruidoso probably should have a leash law more than any other city," Sniadecki emphasized. "In Ruidoso, you could have a pack of dogs one hundred feet from you and you can't see them."

The absence of a leash law actually makes animal control tougher, Sniadecki points out. When he sees a dog loose in someone's yard, Sniadecki usually cannot pick up the dog because he doesn't know if the animal is astray or in its own yard.

"If a dog's in a yard, not chained or fenced, I can't do anything," Sniadecki explained. "He could run off the next minute. But with the law, if I drive down the street and see a loose dog, I can order the dog chained."

If a leash law were passed, Sniadecki said dogs would either have to be confined to a fenced yard, tied up or on a leash.

Sniadecki said he has promoted a leash law for three years. If one were passed, he notes there would be heavy opposition "for a year or two," but that it would win support from the majority of the public after that period.

Sniadecki said a leash law was proposed in the 1970s, but failed to win support of the council.

Village councilman Benny Coulston suggested at a recent council meeting that the Humane Society study the matter of a leash law and provide it put to the governing body.

Kay Allison, president of the Lincoln County Humane Society, said she thought a leash law was part of the animal control ordinance until recently.

"We feel they do need to have a strict leash law," Allison said, speaking for the newly reorganized county chapter.

She added, "It's the only way you can protect the public. This is the only way to be able to work together in society."

Classy Loom shows class in Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity

CLASSY LOOM, was never put to serious pressure while winging to a one and one fourth length score in Sunday's fifth running of the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

In winning the four-furlong duel, Classy Loom escalated himself toward the top of the class among two-year-old thoroughbreds now campaigning in the Southwest.

He also grabbed a \$62,875 slice out of the gross purse of \$125,750, which meant the colt doubled his career earnings in the time it took (46 2/5 seconds) to run the Norgor. He came out of the encounter with a sparkling record of three wins and one second from four starts.

This translates into a money line of \$128,316.

The outcome of the Norgor Futurity was also fine testimony to the Summer Sale for Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs. Last summer's sale graduates include Rita Fols, who went for \$14,000, and Queen Elect, who brought a bid of \$20,000.

Rita Fols raced at just under 6-1 in the Norgor Futurity and earned \$27,655 for second. Queen Elect collected \$15,090 with a third-place

finish.

Sale manager Rick Henson also noted that an unnamed full-brother to Classy Loom is entered in the upcoming Summer Sale (July 29-30). In addition, the '83 Sale includes a half-brother to Rita Fols.

Classy Loom, owned by Preston Farms of Burkburnett, Texas, operated as a heavy favorite in the Norgor and refunded skimpy mutual returns of \$2.80, \$2.20, \$2.20. Mike Lidberg got the saddle assignment from trainer Bob Arnett.

Jockey Lidberg made sure Classy Loom got a heads-up start out of the rail position, and the colt was in the thick of contention at the first jump. Rita Fols assumed an early lead, but Classy Loom was in the lead slot before the field had reached the halfway point of the backstretch.

SPECIAL HANK, a thoroughbred who performs brilliantly at 870 yards, was at his favorite distance in Sunday's Master Salls Handicap at Ruidoso Downs and belted out another impressive win.

The six-year-old gelding raced as a 1-2 favorite in the Master Salls and came through as expected.

With Salustio Burgos aboard in the top load of 126 pounds, Special Hank

stormed into an early lead in the six-head field. He resisted an early challenge from Easter Honor, a 10-1 shot, and looked like well-oiled machinery while gliding down the stretch.

My Going Jesse launched a strong bid in the upper stretch but Special Hank had too much in reserve. He turned back the threat and hit the wire with a three fourths length lead.

The gross purse was \$10,225, of which \$6,135 went to the winner. This fattened Special Hank's 1983 earnings in 870 competition up to \$16,896. His record is a perfect four-for-four.

Owned by Lowell F. Hankins of Ricksprings, Texas; Special Hank returned low mutual payoffs of \$3, \$2.20, \$2.10. He's trained by the highly respected George H. Cosper Jr.

My Going Jesse finished second with A.O. Martinez up (at 118 pounds) and earned \$2,249. The payoffs: \$2.20, \$2.10. Easter Honor, hauling Richard Bickel at 118, collected \$1,022 for third. The show price was the minimum \$2.10.

The winning time was 45.70 seconds.

SPARKLING HORNS, a filly carrying 9-2 odds, took an extremely wide turn into the stretch of Saturday's five

and one half furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

With so many horses lined up in a fight for position, jockey Jack Wallace had no choice but to concede considerable ground in that wide swing through the final turn.

But Sparkling Horns, a filly making the fourth start of her career, came on powerfully through the stretch and pulled out a tingling head victory. The win, her second straight, was worth mutual payoffs of \$11.80, \$5.20 and \$5.20.

Sparkling Horns is owned by R.D. and Suzanne Jones of Tatum. R.D. Hay does the training. The winning time was 1:08 3/5 seconds.

Slalom, packing odds of just under 4-1, also came on with a big rush to finish second. The payoffs: \$4, \$3.60. Carlos Rivas was up.

Grecian Gem, an 11-1 outsider directed by Wayne Buehrer, finished third, three fourths length behind Slalom. Fans who backed Grecian Gem got a \$5.40 show price.

Saturday's topper, an allowance event, offered a \$3,700 purse, of which \$2,220 went to the winner. Sparkling Horns now holds a career record of two wins from four starts.

ON A HIGH, a colt owned by Jerry Rheudasil of Lewisville, Texas, blasted out a half-length win in Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs and got by the first hurdle of the \$680,000 (established) Rainbow Futurity.

Friday's program marked the third and final day of the first-round elimination trials for the Rainbow Futurity. Each trial covers 400 yards.

In order to survive the first round, a hopeful had to finish in the top two in his trial race. These survivors (72 in all from the three days) meet in time trials on July 8. Those trials will decide the field for the finale and consolation of the middle jewel in the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses.

On A High carried a perfect record of four wins from four starts into Friday's fourth race and closed powerfully to win going away. Steve Harris was up. The victory purse of \$1,500 boosted the colt's career earnings up to almost \$60,000.

Ruidoso patrons made him a heavy favorite in Friday's outing and he returned only \$3.20 to win.

Suitably enough, the colt is a half-brother to the late Yankee Win, the heroine of last summer's \$728,058 Rainbow Futurity. Like Yankee Win,

On A High is out of Yankee Doll. His sire is the outstanding Dash For Cash.

One of the big surprises on Friday was the defeat of Easily A Twelve, winner of the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park and the second-place finisher in the recent \$655,615 Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, was among Thursday's first-round qualifiers for the upcoming Rainbow Futurity.

Thursday's card was the second of three straight days which comprise the first stanza in the elimination path leading to the July 24 grand finale.





Eight Mescalero maidens to be honored in Puberty Rites

During this Fourth of July weekend, eight Mescalero Apache maidens will participate in ceremonies ending their years as children, and prepare to enter womanhood.

The Puberty Rites are a happy but solemn occasion for these young women and their families, said Mescalero Apache Tribal Council member Evelyn Breuninger.

Preparations for the four-day celebration have already begun. On the south side of the Ceremonial Grounds teepees are being erected for each of the eight honored maidens. Next to the teepees a long arbor of oak brush has been built where the families of the maidens will prepare food to share with friends and family.

Friday morning at dawn, medicine men will begin chanting to invoke the blessing of the Great Spirit as men of the honored families begin constructing the Sacred Teepee in the middle of the Ceremonial Grounds.

After the Sacred Teepee is built, the maidens, dressed in traditional buckskin intricately decorated with beadwork, kneel on buckskins in front of the teepee facing east.

Each girl carries a small buckskin bag filled with yellow pollen, symbol of strength and fertility. The girls' godmothers bless them by placing small amounts of pollen on the shoulders, chest and back and across the noses of the girls. The girls in turn bless others with the pollen.

The girls then make several runs around a medicine basket containing such symbolic items as eagle feathers, gramma grass, pollen, and red and white clay.

Afterwards, they shake the buckskins they have been kneeling on and drive away any evil spirits that may be near. Then members of the families toss gifts of candy, gum, tobacco, money and other goodies to

the crowd. The ceremony over, the feasting and other celebrations begin. During the four days of celebration there will be games for all, a rodeo, parade, cross-country run, music and dancing.

The eight young Mescalero Apache maidens to be honored during the Puberty Rites are anticipating the ceremonies this week.

Sonya Geronimo is a great-great-granddaughter of the famous Apache Geronimo. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Snyder Geronimo, Sonya enjoys horseback riding and was active in other sports at Tularosa Junior High School. She was also a member of the Tularosa Junior High Band. She will be entering the ninth grade at Saint Catherine's Indian School in Santa Fe this fall.

Deanna Hostosavit is the 13-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Enjady. She is the grandniece of Tribal President Wendell Chino and the great-great-granddaughter of the famed Mescalero chieftain San Juan.

Jackie Baca, 12, is the great-great-granddaughter of the famed Apache chief Cochise and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Baca. Her favorite subject at Tularosa Junior High is English, for which she has received an award. She also enjoys reading, horseback riding, sewing and numerous sports. Jackie plans to become a nurse and would like to work among her Indian people.

Millette Rae Cochise is 13 years old and the daughter of Silas and Inez Cochise. She is also a great-great-granddaughter of Cochise, as well as a descendant of Shanta Boy. She plays saxophone in the White Mountain Middle School Band and enjoys basketball, dancing, cooking, gymnastics and horseback riding. She plans to acquire the basic tools of life through a higher education and good Christian training.

Sylvalene Morgan is 14 years old

and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Morgan Jr. Her grandparents are Kenneth Morgan Sr., the late Bertha Morgan, Harold Lee Pebeashy and Lucy E. Smith. Sylvalene attends Tularosa High School and enjoys horseback riding, beading, hiking, camping and fishing.

Lynell Scott is the 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Scott. She will be attending Ruidoso High School in the fall. At White Mountain Middle School she played the flute and played basketball. She recently received the United States Achievement Academy Award for Physical Education. Lynell is the great-great-great-granddaughter of Chief Victorio and the great-great-great-granddaughter of Shanta Boy.

Michelle Palmer is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carleton Palmer and lives in Albuquerque. She will be an eighth grader next fall at John Adams Middle School. The celebrations will take place at the Ceremonial Grounds and Rodeo Arena in Mescalero Friday, July 1, through Monday, July 4. Recorders, cameras, sketching, liquor and drugs will be prohibited on the Ceremonial Grounds.

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

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
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

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Bidders discuss village animal control service

Has the dog problem in the village reached a point where the government should consider spending more money to hire two—or more—animal control officers?

Animal control officer Jack Sniadecki, whose contract expires Friday, thinks so; and he has upped his price of performing the service so he can hire an assistant to nab loose dogs.

Sniadecki recently submitted a bid of \$61,568 per year for a new two-year contract that includes spending \$14,000 a year for an assistant.

"I felt it was justified that there'd be two animal control officers," Sniadecki said Thursday.

The bid was the highest of three submitted to the village purchasing department. Humane Control, owned by Jack Miller and Fred Volquardsen, bid \$48,166 per year; and D and J Service, owned by Jim Wooldridge, submitted the low bid of \$39,000 per year.

All three bids were rejected by the village council because of discrepancies in the bid specifications. Purchasing agent John Cupp has rewritten the specs with changes requested by the council. The contract is scheduled to be awarded July 12.

Sniadecki's bid is more than \$16,000 higher than the yearly cost of his current contract, which was signed two

years ago at a figure of \$45,000 per year.

The increase would cover the salary of an assistant and a salary increase for Sniadecki. Sniadecki hired an assistant last year to respond to calls in the county, but the hired hand left the job recently. Sniadecki no longer has the county animal control contract.

The need for another officer is contained in a 22-month report on animal control services Sniadecki sent to the village council. In the report, Sniadecki says, he told the council he has worked an average of 86.4 hours per week in enforcement the last two years.

He said the hours do not include office time and time spent maintaining the kennels at Fort Stanton.

Sniadecki said during peak months—May through September—he often works 125 to 130 hours per week.

A second animal control officer not only would allow him to reduce the hours, Sniadecki says. With two officers, he claims, the public would benefit from better animal control service.

"It depends on the type of service you want—whether one or more men can do it," Sniadecki explained. "I think actually Ruidoso should have four animal control officers," he added.

With four officers, each one could work an eight-hour shift and the fourth would work weekends and fill

in as a replacement.

If he is awarded the contract, Jack Miller said, he would hire someone to pick up dogs, while he would maintain the shelter and respond to cases such as dog bite incidents. But technically, his bid is for only one animal control officer, Miller indicated.

Miller said, "I don't think more than one officer is needed."

Miller, who trains dogs at his business, Orion Guard Dogs, does not have an animal shelter now, and will not build one unless he is awarded the contract. Under the new bid specs, the village is requiring the contractor to provide at least a 100-kennel shelter—up from 50 kennels required under the original specs—with extra kennels to quarantine animals.

Miller says a 50-kennel shelter would be sufficient for Ruidoso. He said the new requirement will cost the village more.

Sniadecki disagrees. He said he can document days when more than 100 dogs were kenneled at Fort Stanton. His shelter will hold 250 animals, and he is now expanding it to double the capacity.

On a strict 72-hour holding program—which is the minimum holding period required by law—Sniadecki said he could operate with a smaller shelter. But Sniadecki said he receives public support in part because "I'm able to keep animals longer than the law requires."

Sniadecki noted the cost of main-

taining the Fort Stanton kennels is not included in his bid. He said he provides the kennels free to the village because of an agreement he has with the state to operate the facility.

A 100-kennel shelter would be more than large enough for Ruidoso, Miller believes. If he gets the contract, he said, he will operate the shelter as a central facility for Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

Jim Wooldridge said he believes the new requirement on the size of the shelter is realistic considering the size of Ruidoso. He pointed out that the Fort Stanton shelter was at one time the only facility serving Ruidoso and most of Lincoln County and thus had to have more space.

Also, Wooldridge, a local contractor, said he could save costs by building his own facility, which is one reason why his bid was lowest.

Wooldridge agrees that more than

one officer is needed to handle the job, and he said he would hire an assistant if awarded the contract.

Under the specs, the village also is requiring the contractor to hire a full-time secretary to take calls and run the office. The village will provide an office, which is being built behind the Water Department off Wingfield Street.

The village also will provide radio equipment for the animal control vehicle.

Village manager Jim Hine said the contractor must furnish a vehicle and adequate animal cages for transportation. The vehicle must be under two years old and in good operating condition, Hine said. The contractor will pay for gas and vehicle maintenance costs.

The specs also require the contractor to carry \$500,000 public liability insurance, Hine said.

In the case of animal control, both Miller and Sniadecki say the village

has to consider the quality of service a contractor can provide, and should not award the contract only on the basis of the lowest bid.

Sniadecki said he agrees with a revised bid specification requiring the contractor to have experience either in animal control or law enforcement.

"That raises it to a professional level—I can compete on a professional level, I've been doing it for the past 18 years," he said, noting he has been involved in animal control since 1965.

Miller noted he works in all areas of behavior control with dogs, and that his close involvement with the animals is one reason why he wants to become animal control officer.

Wooldridge said he also enjoys animals, and that he would like to work closely with the Humane Society in operating his kennel facility if he gets the contract.

No arrests yet in robbery

Ruidoso police have questioned several persons who fit the descriptions of two Hispanic males who held up McLean's Limited jewelry store Wednesday, but have made no arrests in connection with the robbery.

Police investigator Michael Lovelace said one man was brought in for questioning last week based on a Crime Stoppers tip and was put in a photo lineup for identification. Lovelace said the man was cleared after the clerk who was in the store during the afternoon robbery could not identify him.

The first suspect is described as 26 to 28 years old, 5 feet 5 inches tall, thin build with shoulder-length dark brown hair and a mustache and goatee. The second suspect is 32 to 35 years old, about 5 feet 7 inches tall, thin build with medium length dark hair worn in bangs over his forehead.

Lovelace preferred not to disclose the value of the jewelry and the amount of cash taken.

Of course, I left out all of these and took off up the hogback to the south. Before I knew it the heat began to bear down, and I took good rests between Pinons and Cedars. In a half hour, puffing and blowing, I was on top of what I thought was the last hill, the flats. I started on again, and here was a steep and rocky path. Somehow I did not remember this trail being so straight up and rocky.

"John Is Too Old To Be A Goat Herder"

There is an old Mexican Proverb or "Dicho" that goes: "Ya Esta Muy Viejo Juan Para Cabrero" (John Is Too Old Now To Be A Goat Herder)

They bring this little jingle in when talking about somebody when the years have caught up with him and he finds himself cutting a ridiculous figure trying to run or jump as he did in days of yore.

In going up this steep pathway, I slipped on a rolling stone and went sprawling. Right away I somehow thought of this old Mexican saying, and had to break out laughing. All alone there on the dry hot mountain side.

But it was a "dry" laugh, because the forgetting to carry water was taking its toll. After many a rest, and the blood pounding in my ears and temples, and black streaks and light sparks jumping before my eyes, I reached, judging by the sky line, on ahead, what was near the top of the mountain. Away down and to the north I could see the home of Mrs. Gladys Nosker and son, Lowell. And thought "maybe if I pass out, Lowell can come and get me. Only right now, I don't think he has a saddle horse to pack me out."

Finally I am out on top of the world, and The White Mountain and all its little family of smaller peaks are purple blue to the west. Surely now it can't be but a little ways to the corner.

Clumps of trees, and clearings one after another I passed, thinking each one was the corner. Thirst became a problem. It was hard to swallow, and my lips wanted to stay together. I thought, suppose I cannot even holler for help.

I had the feeling that Mother Earth had put a mile or more of distance in here since last time.

Finally, half angry at being in such sorry condition, I arrived, a little heavy in the feet, and dry in the mouth at the gates at the southeast corner. There was a wonderful Pinon there and I lay down on the grass in its shade. The breeze came in from the White Mountain, and I felt so contented that I felt like sleeping there the rest of the day and all night. It was four-thirty. In five minutes I felt good as new, I thought.

I thought to myself: This trip is in the bag, all level and down hill on the way back.

But no sooner had I started back than I felt wobbly at the knees; the breeze quit, and the sun beat down with all its might. Oh, for a drop of water!

Let's see, I thought to myself, "Paul Jones is the only one who knows every foot of this country, and has a saddle horse to carry me out. I am going to make it, but just suppose..."

The heat blazed up from the burning ground, and things began to get a

A couple in Ruidoso—Paul and Tina Pearson—are seriously in need of assistance from the Ruidoso community.


On Sunday, June 19, Tina gave birth to a baby two months prematurely. The baby was taken to Roswell and then to Albuquerque, where he has been in intensive care.

The hospital and doctor bills are piling up, and the end is not yet in sight. Accounts have been set up at each bank in town, and any money donated to help would be sincerely appreciated.

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

DEAR EDITOR:

On Tuesday, June 14, 1983, I witnessed a successful campaign to block the annexation of forty-two (42) acres of land into the Village of Ruidoso. The land is owned by the Ruidoso Land Company and is located in the Upper Canyon area of Ruidoso.

The campaign to defeat the proposed annexation was carried out by the Ruidoso Upper Canyon Property Owners Association. Led by Hazel Haynsworth, the group portrayed the Ruidoso Land Company and its owner, Mr. Keith Mills, as a money-hungry land developer who stood ready to destroy the entire Upper Canyon.

The group mustered all the support they could raise and had six (6) Upper Canyon residents stand before the Village Council and plead that the annexation be denied. Those who testified led the audience to believe that the tract was an inaccessible mountain characterized by high cliffs and deep canyons that caused water to run four to five (4-5) feet deep through their property when it rained. They contended that there was no way the property could be developed.

The Village Council yielded to the pressure, tabled the petition, and did not even pass the ordinance that would provide a public hearing on the issue.

On the surface, this sounds like a case where a governing body has fully met its responsibility and protected the public's interest. However, if one looks at the facts, this is not the situation. Consider the following:

1. The Village has annexed hundreds of acres of land in the past seven (7) years which are comparable or are more rugged than the forty-two (42) acres in question. (Example: White Mountain Estates Unit 2 and Mountain View Estates.)

2. The master plan was approved by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission as meeting all Village subdivision requirements.

3. The Village Master Plan ranked this forty-two acre tract as the number three (3) in priority for annexation out of twenty-eight (28) tracts analyzed.

4. The property has been surrounded by the Village (on four sides) since 1957. It is bordered by commercial property, R-1 property and R-3 (mobiles) property.

5. Mr. Mills made a good-faith effort to minimize the impact of the proposed subdivision on the Upper Canyon. For example, only twelve (12) lots or twenty-five percent (25%) of the forty-eight (48) lots access directly to the Upper Canyon. Also, three (3) of the six (6) proposed accesses are on cul-de-sacs, thereby eliminating through traffic in the Upper Canyon.

6. Mr. Mills purchased Tract B of McCarty Subdivision (at a cost of \$56,000) to provide improved access to the property and to divert traffic away from the Upper Canyon area.

7. The proposed subdivision would have had the lowest density of any subdivision in Ruidoso with lot sizes ranging between .5 and 2.0 acres.

8. Of the six (6) people protesting the petition, how many are registered voters and residents of Lincoln County? Who knows?

The Doctrine of Eminent Domain and the process of condemnation allow a governmental authority to take private property or rights thereto, if that authority deems such action to be in the public interest. Of course, if that authority exercises this power, it must compensate the owner of the property.

The majority of the Village Council deemed it in the public interest to deny the annexation of Mr. Mills' forty-two (42) acres without so much as a public hearing on the issue. In so doing, the Village Council, in a very discriminating way, has taken a course that may eventually cause the Village to condemn Mr. Mills' land.

What will this cost the residents of Ruidoso? The cost of the property to the Village will be established by MAT appraisal and will easily exceed five

hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). It is unfortunate that some members of the Village Council yielded to Mrs. Haynsworth and her group and exposed the Village to such a high potential legal liability.

I know that it was not the intention of Mr. Mills to have the Village purchase his property, and I am angry that you and I as residents and taxpayers of Ruidoso may eventually have to pick up the half-a-million-dollar tab to serve the special interest of Mrs. Haynsworth and the Ruidoso Upper Canyon Property Owners Association.

A GIANT STEP BACKWARD

Antitrust laws are basically sound. No organization or company should be allowed to control a segment of our economy through the addition or the acquisition of a competing company. By and large, actions of this sort, eliminating competition, result in higher cost to the consumer.

The antitrust action by the Justice Department against the American Telephone and Telegraph Company proves to the contrary.

Breaking up this giant operation, leaving the local service intact while divorcing the long distance and equipment manufacturing and sales, was supposed to improve service and result in lower costs to the phone customer.

Long distance rates appear to be being reduced somewhat because of competition among several companies; but the basic home service, which the telephone company retained, is skyrocketing in cost to the average home user.

Both in this state and in Texas, rates for home service will increase by 300 percent if the telephone rate increases are approved by the Utility Commissions in those states. Since the profitable long distance and equipment manufacturing was taken away by the antitrust suit, the Telephone Company must find other means to show an operating profit. The only means left is to increase the basic phone rates.

Somewhere in the frantic endeavor to break up the American Telephone and Telegraph Company resulting final cost to the average consumer was completely ignored. This case took over eight years. This trust action was ill considered and ill advised.

Where were the Consumer Advocates? You and I will pay for this mistake.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — Cons con. That is amply clear, and it makes difficult any prosecution in which convicts are the witnesses: the fact that many prisoners will lie to suit their own purposes, even when they are under oath.

Here on the witness stand is a man who has been found guilty of two murders and has confessed to a third. He is serving sentences of 150 years. The man against who he is appearing is also a convicted murderer.

Which one will you believe? Do you think either will necessarily limit himself to the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, like a law-abiding citizen?

In the case referred to, the witness has already given ten statements of "fact" under oath. In five of them, he says he does not know who committed the crime. In two of them, he says he and a friend did it. In the remainder he charges the man who is presently on trial.

Whose story will stand? Which is the liar?

What complicates that search for truth even further is the propensity of the authorities to make deals.

Defense attorneys may not literally be able to offer such arrangements, though even they can say, "If you cooperate"—i.e., say what I want—"I will try to get you off." Prison officials and the prosecutors can make such statements with even more force and conviction.

That they do that is made clear by such evidence as this: Until today no prisoner from the Penitentiary of New Mexico has been prosecuted for anything having to do with the attempted escape on the night Corrections Officer Jerry Magee was killed, even though those in charge have admitted their guilt publicly on numerous occasions.

And as if those two things—a propensity to lie, and the existence of deals—were not enough to make things difficult in prison cases, there is a further problem.

This one is not limited to our pen, of

course, any more than the first two. But this one seems to be particularly flagrant within our state's penal system.

It is the simple fear that being a snitch can get you killed.

No guards were murdered during the bloody prison riot in Santa Fe in 1980, remember. All those who were killed were snitches, or those thought to be so by their fellow inmates.

"Snitch" is a word schoolboys sometimes throw at one another, but when hardened criminals use it, it is not a light and childish charge.

It can be, and often is, an effective sentence of death.

That is not just "language," or theory, or mythmaking. It is a bare-faced reality, and convicts in our state's penal system know that well.

They have heard about or even seen such killings, in our maximum-security facility, in our medium-security facility and in our minimum-security facilities.

To them, such killings are not just another ho-hum story on the nightly news. They are a reality with which prisoners must live.

You wonder why we have no convictions for any crimes committed during the last major prison riot except those of prisoners who were willing to cop a plea? These are some of the reasons why.

Who can put together a story of what really happens inside the fences of our penal institutions, when many prisoners will tell the authorities what they think the authorities want to hear and every prisoner is afraid?

These are not people, after all, you would invite to have a drink with you down at the lodge hall. These are tough and often ruthless men.

You can be sure of this: We may have no legal executions in our state's pens while Toney Anaya is governor. He has told us he will stay all such attempts. But he cannot stay the other "executions" which will occur as surely as you are reading these words. Listen to the prisoners and you know the killings are bound to come.

Success story

He was 19 when he and a friend, with \$100 in capital, started a messenger service in Seattle. In time, this undertaking evolved into the nationwide United Parcel Service.

Casey's business philosophy is of particular interest. He started one of the nation's first profit-sharing plans, and today most UPS stock is held by present and retired managerial people. He brought executives and managers at various levels into discussions of proposed actions, saying the company's ideals "cannot be carried out from the top alone." It was a far-seeing policy which contributed much to the success of the business he founded so long ago. —Alamogordo Daily News

Editorial

We are glad to see that Governor Toney Anaya has intervened in the potentially disastrous dispute between horsemen and racetrack owners.

It should be the hope of everyone concerned about horse racing in New Mexico—and this includes everyone in Ruidoso—that Friday's special meeting of the state Racing Commission in Santa Fe can produce a solution to the dispute that has led horsemen to call for a strike after July 11.

At issue is some \$200,000 in uncashed pari-mutuel tickets from the 1982 racing season. Approximately \$90,000 is from Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Of course, \$200,000 is a lot of money. But when one considers the money that will be lost to Ruidoso and the other communities whose economies depend on horse racing, it is a relatively small amount.

The governor used hard words in announcing his determination to see the problem resolved—"I am shocked at the irresponsibility of the track owners and horsemen in allowing this dispute to go this far."

His veiled threat about "suspension of licenses for future meets" may have been ill advised from his point of view, as that sort of talk seems more likely to rally the horsemen than cause them meekly to back off.

But the governor's heart and head are in the right place when he says if you can't settle this thing amicably, settle it in a court of law.

At this point, only one thing is for sure. If there is a strike, everybody loses.—TP

A friend called it sensory overload. A couple of times during the night, I got so excited I thought I might blow a fuse.

Standing in a corner of the packed room, forgotten friendships, memories and emotions flooded through my mind as high school companions I had not seen for at least seven years appeared at our ten-year high school reunion.

No sooner would I finish slapping one friend on the back—and start trying to find out what he had been doing for the last ten years—than another piece of the past would walk in and more memories would flood in.

I think for me more than most, the reunion was a journey to a past life. I graduated in 1973 with 75 other students, most of whom I had been going to school with since third grade. It was a small class and we all knew each other well; I might have said too well at the time.

Two years later my family moved away from Oklahoma City. I returned for a couple of visits the next year, but generally I saw little to draw me there from the San Francisco Bay area and my college friends. I kept in touch with a couple of friends, but generally let Oklahoma City and Casady School sink into the tar pits of my memory.

Walking into the reunion, I was greeted right off the bat by four or five people with whom I had played pee-wee baseball, learned how to drive, drank beer and kissed for the first time. Slam! Bang! Time warp!

How do you even go about greeting these people? Each one deserved my full attention for a long time, but they were all there at once and only for a few hours.

I spent much of the night laughing, saying "You look great!" and "Thanks, I feel great!" Numerous people I just grabbed by the arms, somehow hoping that their life histories, feelings and outlooks would magically conduct through our bodies.

One woman told me a few months ago how the men had all grown fat and bald by the time they got to their ten-year reunion. I was amazed by how well everybody looked. A few were a little bigger and a few had a little thinner hair, but many looked better than I remembered, especially some of the women.

The only trouble with those attractive ladies, was that so many of them had different names and strange men accompanying them.

On second thought, I take back what I said about my friends not being any larger. A number of the women crowding into the reunion were quite large with babies due in the next few days or weeks.

The cocktail party originally scheduled for 6 to 8 extended on into the early morning hours with the drinks flowing and a few hors

d'oeuvres for dinner. By four in the morning I felt like I had said almost nothing of substance to anybody, but had somehow touched base and found my friends as close as ever.

The next day it started all over again at an all classes reunion and picnic at our school. At the picnic friends brought not only their husbands and wives but also children. To see Michael Hightower, who had hosted the wildest high school parties, completely absorbed with one two-year-old girl on his shoulders and another five-year-old in his lap was a bit of a shock and heartwarming at the same time.

Or to see Debbie O'Toole break off a conversation in mid-sentence to retrieve a straying child reminded me we had all changed as well as stayed the same.

We moved from the school to a friend's farm outside Oklahoma City and slowly calmed enough to actually tell each other a little about the past ten years. Drifting from group to group, beer keg to volleyball game, I heard stories I would never have guessed at ten years ago.

Throughout the afternoon and on into the night, conversations about our situations today would erupt in laughter when someone would recall a past prank. From this rocky distance of ten years, high school looked like a fun-filled and never ending parade of jokes, good times and good friends.

The cruelties of the social circles, the excruciating boredom of some classes and the conflicts with parents were all hazed over by the better memories we chose to keep.

Again the excitement of seeing old friends kept us together into the evening. But as bedtimes for young ones, long trips the next day and general exhaustion took over, friends began to slip away. As our first greeting the night before had seemed unreal, our departures were equally so.

We came together for a few frenzied hours of friendship and then it was time to part. How much meaning could you pack into a handshake or a hug? As friends drifted away, I thought of old time sailing ships disappearing into the fog and boundless ocean.

But somehow they weren't lost. There are few people who know me as well as my high school friends, even after ten years. I feel confident we will see each other again and pick up our friendships where they left off.

Eight years after talk of turning Willie Nelson's Columbia LP "The Redheaded Stranger" into a movie, the project is finally off the drawing board. Nelson is set to play the film's lead and will be accompanied in the flick by Tommy Lee Jones. The release date has not been set.

A tribute to Jimmie Rodgers, titled "Hobo's Lament," has been released

on Main Street Records by Boxcar Willie.
The song was written for Rodgers by his sister-in-law, Elsie McWilliams, who wrote 29 of his recorded songs, and is being released to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Rodgers' death.
Boxcar Willie recorded the song (which was to have been

on Rodgers last recording session, but lacked a completed second verse), using Jimmie's guitar for the first time since the late singer's final recording session in 1933. The guitar was loaned for the session by the Roy Acuff Museum.
"Hobo's Lament" is backed by "T for Texas," one of the songs most associated with Rodgers.

This week in 1966, David Houston's smash single, "Almost Persuaded," was at country music's No. 1 slot and was on the charts for 25 weeks.
