## Horsemen, racetracks continue negotiations

The second meeting of a mediation board set up to conduct negotiations between racetrack owners and horsemen threatening to strike is scheduled for Tuesday afternoon in Santa Fe—with the attorney general optimistic of a settlement and the horsemen steadfast in their demand for \$200,000 from uncashed pari-mutuel tickets.

"I'm very optimistic that we will have a solution," Attorney General Paul Bardacke, who sits on the mediation board along with John Ramming of the governor's office and Sharon Janecka of the state Racing Commission, said Monday. The board was formed at a special meeting of the Racing Commission Friday in Santa Fe, on Bardacke's recommendation.

Ray Reed, secretary of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association, did not reflect the same optimism. He said Monday the horsemen had been offered half the money Saturday, and said if the racetrack owners acknowledge they owe half the money, they owe all the money.

"We want our money and it's just that damn simple," said Reed.

The Friday meeting, attended by dozens of horsemen from the three racetracks now in season—Ruidoso Downs, Downs at Santa Fe and La Mesa Park near Raton—adjourned abruptly after Bardacke recommended the mediating board be formed to hear both sides. Bardacke indicated a lengthy public airing of the issue would have done more harm than good.

A meeting of the board took place Saturday. It was closed to the public and the press.

The Racing Commission meeting Friday began with Ramming making

a statement of concern about the termination of racing the horsemen have said will occur after July 11 if they do not receive the money from out-tickets. He said the action would have a "snowball effect"—affecting tax receipts, jobs, lodgers' tax and what he called "supporting industries," including agriculture.

Bardacke then took the floor and outlined the sequence of events leading up to the conflict—noting the horsemen had been promised the out-tickets in return for their support of Senate Bill 191 in the 1981 Legislature, if the bill passed unamended. The bill, which gave the racetracks a large tax break for capital improvements, passed "with lots of different amendments," Bardacke noted.

He called the fact there had been amendments "the crux of the issue—the legal issue." He pointed out all the tracks except La Mesa paid the 1981 out-tickets to the horsemen—by adding the money to the purse structure in 1982—but that the tracks are still in possession of the money from the 1982 out-tickets.

Bardacke then referred to a letter from horsemen's attorney Les Houston, in which the termination of racing after July 11 was threatened.

"It is clear to me that that letter constitutes a violation of antitrust law," he said. Bardacke predicted that a court would enjoin the association from carrying out the "anti-competition" action.

He pointed out that the horsemen had written a letter to the racetrack owners seeking to form a contract for turning over the money from out-tickets, and suggested if the horsemen were sure the money was theirs they would not have asked for a contract.

The state has been good to the tracks and the horsemen, Bardacke

said, and was not being given its fair share by either party. He predicted a boycott would be broken by a federal or state court and that people would have hard feelings for years if matters went that far. He added that the Legislature would frown on such an action and remember it when considering racing legislation.

Bardacke then recommended the meeting be adjourned, with the matter to be taken up at this Friday's Racing Commission meeting at Santa Fe Downs, after the mediating board had met in the meantime.

"I would hate for either side to paint themselves into a corner," said the attorney general. His recommendation was accepted and the meeting adjourned.

Afterward, Bardacke was asked when the strategy of cutting off debate was formulated. He said he had thought of it that same morning "in desperation."

Commissioner Willard Kruger, who chaired the meeting, was asked if Governor Toney Anaya had requested him to follow Bardacke's recommendation and cut the meeting short. He acknowledged that was the case, but said it was his feeling also that it was the best course.

"The legal issue here is absolutely not clear," said Bardacke. "What is clear is that the threatened boycott is illegal."

Houston, the horsemen's attorney, conducted a meeting of the assembled horsemen for an hour-and-a-half after the Racing Commission adjourned. He told the horsemen that in the amendments to Senate Bill 191, they were the only ones affected in an adverse way, while the racetracks benefited.

## Mr Master Bug scoots to half-length win in Rainbow Derby

MR MASTER BUG blistered the 440-yard course at Ruidoso Downs while blasting out a stunning half-length win in Monday's finale of the \$621,630 Rainbow Derby.

The colt traveled the distance in a remarkable 21.38 seconds, which was one of the fastest 440-yard clockings in Ruidoso history.

More importantly, though, he collected a fat paycheck of \$215,809, which pushed his career income up to \$1,357,737 and made him the second richest quarter horse of all time. His only richer adversary is Higheaster-Jet, whose bank account stands at \$1,516,962.

In winning the Rainbow Derby, Mr Master Bug vaulted past Special Effort's earnings total of \$1,219,948.

Another key sidelight to Mr Master Bug's Rainbow Derby conquest is the fact he proved he can win big as a three-year-old. In addition, he squared matters with Call Caleb, the gelding who handed him an embarrassing length defeat a week earlier in the Rainbow trials.

But Ruidoso patrons evidently figured that setback in the trials was simply a belt-tightener for the classy colt who'd been to the races only once since winning the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso on

Labor Day of 1982. His All-American win was worth \$1 million.

Mr Master Bug is owned by Marvin Barnes of Ada, Oklahoma. His pilot is Jacky Martin and his trainer is the highly respected Jack Brooks.

The mutual payoffs on the Derby champion were \$4.40, \$2.60, \$2.60. Call Caleb collected \$98,655 for second, which padded his career earnings up to \$324,027. The mutual returns: \$2.60 to place and show. Call Caleb is owned by R.D. Hubbard of Kingsport, Tennessee and Don E. Keith of Bakersfield, California. The gelding was ridden by Jerry Nicodemus. Don Farris does the training.

Steppin For Te, a 55-1 longshot owned by Jerry Wells of Purcell, Oklahoma, turned in an excellent performance while finishing third, only a slim nose behind Call Caleb. Steppin For Te earned \$50,561 and refunded \$8.20 to show. The filly was ridden by Jerry Burgess.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in: 4th—Call Me Favorite, earning \$26,513; 5th—Bartendress, \$24,047; 6th—Dynago Victory, \$23,430; 7th—Mildly Jealous, \$22,814; 8th—Rare Jet, \$22,197; 9th—Flaming Thought, \$21,580; 10th—Mahan, \$20,964.

In the first few jumps, Call Me

Favorite (coupled with Dynago Victory at 11-1) joined Rare Jet in a duel for the early lead. Rare Jet quickly opened a half-length in a display of dazzling speed.

Mr Master Bug, coming out of the number 10 post, broke close to the front and never let the two early leaders get far out of reach. Call Caleb, a 2-1 shot, broke in fourth or fifth place. Bartendress, usually an alert starter, got away in seventh place.

With each stride, Mr Master Bug picked up steam. It quickly became evident he would be too much to handle. At the half-way point, he had his enemies under control. In the final 100 yards, he was clearly in command and still moving at a tremendous clip.

Call Caleb, a winner of five of seven spins in '83 and obviously at the top of his game, closed with determination but was no threat to Mr Master Bug.

A tailwind of some 10-15 miles-per-hour was blowing during the Derby.

Ruidoso patrons wagered \$707,688 on the holiday program, well over the \$484,119 bet on the same day a year ago. Monday's card also wrapped up a five-day stretch in which the daily betting average topped the \$600,000 level.

CURRIBOT unleashed a mighty

stretch attack and swept by the tiring Glover D. to grab an impressive length win in Sunday's \$12,125 Governor's Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

Curribot flashed around the seven and one-half furlong course in 1:33 1/5 seconds, which easily eclipsed the previous seasonal mark of 1:34 3/5.

The victory was Curribot's second stakes conquest of the meeting, and provided a victory purse of \$7,275. Salustio Burgos was in the saddle and turned in a masterful job.

Jockey Burgos played a fascinating waiting game, keeping the 2-1 shot well off the pace throughout much of the race. At the top of the stretch, when Glover D. (a 6-1 shot) zoomed into a two-length lead, the chances of victory for Curribot looked grim.

Jockey Burgos, evidently knowing the kind of horse he had under him, tapped Curribot a few times with the whip and the six-year-old gelding took off.

With a half-dozen jumps to go, Glover D. began to weaken, and was unable to fight back Curribot's crushing late rush. The latter, owned by Juliana Winters of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, carried 118 pounds—the same load placed on Glover D.'s shoulders.

## Site A owners withdraw land

The owners of private land that is within the boundaries of the alternate site (Site A) for the Sierra Blanca regional airport have written Interior Secretary James Watt telling him their land is no longer available for airport development.

Robert Blum, Fred Dantonio and Jack Ryan, owners of Rancho Ruidoso Corporation, explained their position in a telegram they sent to Watt June 28.

Rancho Ruidoso is a housing subdivision that abuts Site A on Fort Stanton Mesa. It was partly because of the development that Governor Toney Anaya voiced his support last month for the airport site preferred by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission—Site B.

Anaya, in a letter to Watt, said he was concerned that an airport on Site A would experience urban encroachment problems similar to those that have plagued the Ruidoso Municipal

Airport.

The Rancho Ruidoso owners said in their telegram that they have developed two subdivisions directly to the west of Site A, and that over 500 residential lots are being developed directly south of the site. Blum said in a telephone interview the subdivision to the south is being developed by a different corporation.

In the telegram, they said they wrote Bob White, director of the state Aviation Division, earlier this year and told him "we can no longer exclude the land needed for this alternate site because it is part of a larger parcel on which we have master planned a 5,000 home community."

They continued to say they are no longer "willing sellers or traders of our property needed for an airport on the alternate site."

The alternate site, about four miles west of Site B, lies on a mixture of private, state and federal land.

Fred Heckman, chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, said Thursday, "I'm not surprised" about Rancho Ruidoso's decision.

Heckman said the land owners "have been very patient" in holding the land on Site A from development. But, because of the increasing value of the land over the past 18 months, Heckman said he knew the owners could not afford to wait any longer before developing it.

"I felt we had just this spring and into summer to choose either site," Heckman said.

Almost all of the proposed cross-wind runway and about one-third of the main runway would be on Rancho Ruidoso land if Site A were chosen for an airport, Heckman said.

Blum estimated that 200 acres of Rancho Ruidoso lie within the boundaries of Site A.

The land owners told Watt they have recognized the need for an airport for 15 years and have supported its construction on the old Fort Stanton (Military) Reservation. They said they have "held up developing" their land so it could remain as the alternate site.

# Racquet Club liquor license okayed

The owner of the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club was granted approval for the transfer of a dispenser's liquor license to the club Friday after he assured the Ruidoso village council that his club would remain private.

On a 2-1 vote, the council okayed the transfer after hearing arguments from opponents that the license would be the first step to the club becoming a commercial operation. Councilmen Frank Sayner and Benny Coulston voted for the transfer, while councilman Don Dale voted against it. Mayor George White and councilman Al Junge were absent.

Paul Thorpe, whose Darmandam Corporation bought the club in October at a foreclosure sale, told the council the club "will continue as private membership," but "it's also a goal of ours to be profitable."

Thorpe noted the club now has a liquor license granted only to non-

profit private clubs. Under state Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control Internal Revenue Service regulations, Thorpe said his club will no longer be eligible for the private club license at the end of the year because the business will be making a profit.

"The private club license does not fit that goal," he said.

Barney Rue, who lives in the residential district that surrounds the racquet club, claimed the license would give the club "leverage in the future," indicating a commercial bar could be opened at the club.

Attorney Dan Bryant, representing Tom and Jenny Dorgan, also argued that once the transfer is approved, it would give "carte blanche approval to run a commercial liquor establishment there."

If the club is opened to the public, Bryant said, it would violate the zoning designation for the site, which is zoned for multi-family use.

In a letter to the Department of

Alcoholic Beverage Control, Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis said granting the dispenser's liquor license to the club would not violate zoning laws for the site.

Bryant reiterated that the council would be powerless to require the club to continue operating as a private club under state liquor license regulations.

But Sayner indicated the club could not operate as an open business under its present zoning restriction. It was pointed out that Thorpe would have to seek Planning and Zoning Commission and council approval for a rezoning change to turn the club into a commercial establishment.

Property owners Barbara DiPaolo and Wes Ryan also opposed the transfer. Ryan said, "It's absurd to have a liquor license that close to the school."

The club, located at 100 Jack Little Drive, is near the White Mountain schools.

Village clerk Leon Eggleston said

he also received five letters from people opposing the transfer.

Tom Dorgan told Thorpe he had been in the club building as a non-member, and asked how Thorpe would control other non-members from getting in and drinking at the bar. Thorpe, who said he owns 36 private clubs, acknowledged that non-members occasionally could slip in past door watchers.

Dale moved to table the transfer until village attorney Lee Huckstep could render an opinion on the potential use of the club if it has a public liquor license. His motion died for lack of a second.

Coulston moved for approval after he was assured the zoning could not change without approval by the council.

The council also approved the transfer of a dispenser's liquor license to the Ranch House Restaurant, 101 Wingfield Drive. There was no opposition to the transfer.

# State to seek input on Fort Stanton use

State Health and Environment Department Secretary Robert McNeill said Friday he hopes to visit this area within the next 60 days to get community input about possible alternate uses for Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School.

McNeill earlier this year announced plans to close Fort Stanton as a facility for the developmentally disabled. He said Friday that decision was made partly to avoid being "sued in federal court."

The state is "presently under some threat of litigation" from the New Mexico Protection and Advocacy Agency, the secretary explained, because some of the patients now at Fort Stanton have been ordered out of the institution by the courts. The New Mexico Protection and Advocacy Agency is an organization which represents the interests of the developmentally disabled. McNeill said.

The secretary also believes deinstitutionalization of the developmentally disabled is "just the right thing to do."

He said placing the patients in group or community homes is also the most cost effective means of caring

for them. McNeill quoted a cost of \$34,000 to \$36,000 per year per patient for institutional care. Group home care costs are half of that or less, he stated.

The target date for discontinuing the present use of Fort Stanton is January 1, 1985, but McNeill said the date was set only to keep the project on some kind of schedule. He listed three concerns which must be met before the changeover takes place. These include proper relocation of the residents, accommodation of the employees, and utilization of the facility "in a way that makes sense."

Alternate uses for the Fort Stanton facility now being considered, according to McNeill, are alcoholism treatment and corrections. He said discussions are currently under way with State Corrections Department officials about turning the facility over to them. But alcoholism treatment "may be the best candidate" for Fort Stanton, Secretary McNeill noted, because the state wants to expand its efforts in that area and has funds available to do so.

While discussion about alternate uses continues, the Health and Environment Department is also dealing with the problem of where to place the Fort Stanton clients. There are not sufficient group or community homes

now available, and McNeill expressed doubt there will be enough places open in 18 months.

He said some of the severely retarded patients will require continued institutionalization; these will be transferred to the Los Lunas facility. The target date for the change in mission at Fort Stanton will have to be set back if all patients are not placed by the beginning of 1985, the secretary indicated.

He also expressed concern about employment at the Fort and is confident the present employees can be retained.

"We're not going to do anything that will detract from the local economic base," promised McNeill.

But the president of Fort Stanton's local worker's union feels less confident about that promise. Tommy Nevarez said Thursday he does not feel assured there will be no jobs lost.

"I know damn well there will be if we go to an alcoholic treatment facility or corrections," Nevarez exclaimed. He said the female employees, which make up three-quarters of the work force at Fort Stanton, "can't cope with this kind of stuff."

Nevarez expressed disappointment with McNeill over his failure to meet with the employees at Fort Stanton before now. According to the union

president, McNeill indicated he would visit Fort Stanton immediately after the end of the 1983 legislative session, in mid-March.

The Health and Environment Secretary said there has been direct communication with Fort Stanton regarding plans and that he wants to involve employees and the community in the decision about Fort Stanton's future use. McNeill noted that he believes a community meeting would produce better results if he has first prepared some options for discussion. He hopes to schedule that meeting within the next 60 days.

In the meantime, Fort Stanton administrator Mark Delgado gave his assurance that "the facility will continue to operate and provide services that have been provided... until we're given formal direction as to how to proceed."

He claimed the tracks had been smart to enlist the support of the horsemen, adding, "They (the track owners) would kill for that bill."

"I promise you you've acted in a responsible way—and you've been wronged," said Houston.

He noted that attempts to resolve the problem had been met with hostility, inaction and unkept promises.

"One cannot negotiate with oneself," he stated.

Houston also questioned Bardack's reference to the horsemen's request for a contract for the out-tickets, saying it was a good

idea with "especially that group (the track owners)."

The attorney emphasized that the termination of racing had been thoroughly discussed by the horsemen along with other alternatives before he sent the letter announcing it. He asked for a show of hands from horsemen present who would stop racing if the money were not paid.

All the horsemen raised their hands.

Houston indicated the racetrack owners were testing the horsemen's resolve.

"This is the issue they picked to see whether the horsemen are going to be able to stick together or not."

Site B lies on the former military reservation now used by New Mexico State University as an experimental ranch. The university conducts long-term grazing and agricultural studies on the 26,000-acre ranch under a cooperative agreement with the Bureau of Land Management.

Attempting to break the

university's hold on the land, Anaya asked Watt to approve the transfer of nearly 1,700 acres to the Federal Aviation Administration for an airport. The airport commission has applied for the transfer.

The Rancho Ruidoso owners also asked Watt to approve the transfer request.

Copies of the telegram were sent to

Anaya, U.S. Senators Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman, U.S. Representative Joe Skeen and NMSU President Gerald Thomas. The telegram was also sent to Heckman, White, state Transportation Department Secretary Judith Espinosa, and to state offices of the Bureau of Land Management and Federal Aviation Administration.

Curribot came out of the Governor's Handicap with a seasonal record of two wins and two seconds from four starts, all in handicap competition. At the start of the summer meeting, he knocked off the Inaugural Handicap (six furlongs) by a head as an 8-1 outsider.

The Governor's conquest boosted the gelding's 1983 income up to \$19,531. He's trained by George H. Cosper Jr. The betting payoffs were \$6.60, \$3.60, \$3.

Glover D., owned by Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas, earned \$2,667 and refunded \$4.80 to place, \$3.40 to show. Mike Lidberg was at the helm.

Fill Mackis Cup, running as an 8-5 favorite, turned in an even performance while ending up third, one and three-fourths lengths behind Glover D. O.A. Martinez Jr. was up. The impost was 119 pounds.

Never too far out of the chase, Fill Mackis Cup managed to pass tiring horses at the end. But he was never a serious contender. Owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, the consistent five-year-old earned \$1,212 and returned a \$2.60 show price.

Double B. Express, the long-time stakes star at Ruidoso, made a strong move at the turn for home, but weakened and finished fifth.

Sunday's program was viewed by a hefty turnout of 8,055 fans who pumped a soaring \$893,156 through the mutuel machines. It was the biggest crowd and biggest handle thus far in the season.

HIGH BOUNDS DANCE, making only the third start of her career, scooted into an early lead and stayed on top all the way in Saturday's first running of the Ruffast Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The five and one half furlong sprint for juvenile fillies offered a total purse of \$8,375.

High Bounds Dance opened up her advantage steadily and reached the wire with a solid four and one fourth length lead. The victory slice amounted to \$5,025.

The Ruffast heroine is owned by Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas. Salustio Burgos does the riding. The trainer is Terrell E. Davidson.

Prior to the Ruffast engagement,

High Bounds Dance had been to the races only twice, both at Ruidoso Downs, and both at four furlongs. She debuted on May 22 with a four and one fourth length romp against maidens, then came back on June 16 and finished second, by a half-length, in a trial for the Norgor Futurity.

Ruidoso patrons made High Bounds Dance the second favorite at 9-5 in Saturday's outing, and that produced mutuel payoffs of \$5.80, \$2.60, \$2.40. The filly was clocked in 1:06 seconds flat.

Never Print, a 6-5 favorite directed by Mike Lidberg, grabbed second place shortly after the break and stayed in that position the rest of the way. Owned by Mildred M. Bowman of Alvin, Texas, Never Print earned \$1,842 and returned mutuel payoffs of \$2.40, \$2.10.

Fly By Chopsticks, a 7-1 shot piloted by Stuart Dolphus, hit the finish one and one half lengths behind Never Print and raked in third-place money of \$837. The show payoff was \$2.40.

MISS SQUAW HAND, the second-place finisher in last summer's \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, made easy work of Friday's \$90,023 Rainbow Derby Consolation.

The filly got off to a high-flying start out of the number 8 post and led all the way in the 440-yard dash.

Never put to a serious challenge, Miss Squaw Hand romped over the final half of the dash and reached the wire with a commanding two and one fourth lengths lead.

The daughter of Master Hand out of Miss Squaw Bug sliced through a headwind and clocked the distance in 21.74 seconds. Jackie Martin was up. The trainer is Jack Brooks.

Miss Squaw Hand is owned by Marvin Barnes of Ada, Oklahoma. She's a stablemate of Mr Master Bug, the '82 All-American Futurity winner.

Ruidoso patrons hand no doubt whatever on Miss Squaw Hand's chances in the Rainbow Consolation and made her a 3-5 favorite. The betting returns were \$3.20, \$2.60 and \$2.20.

That easy spin in the Consolation was worth a victory purse of \$18,497, which hiked the filly's '83 moneyline up to \$21,043, and put her career income at \$468,549.

EL REY BURNER, packing odds of

3-5, broke in the air at the start of Thursday's Zia Handicap at Ruidoso Downs, but moved well enough to get the job done.

The five-year-old quickly jumped into the lead and kept his advantage throughout the 400-yard journey for New Mexico-breds.

At the midway point, he was well in command, despite some mild threats from two outsiders, Easier Chicklet and Bardileo. In the final half of the duel, Coda Mundi, the second-choice at 2-1, mustered a game bid on the rail.

But Coda Mundi's salvo wasn't nearly enough.

El Rey Burner, despite hauling the top load of 127 pounds, was a half-length in front when he hit the wire. Joe Martinez was up. El Rey Burner clocked the distance in 20.42 seconds and returned modest mutuel payoffs of \$3.40, \$2.20, \$2.20.

# Big weekend at racetrack

The mutuel equipment was really humming at Ruidoso Downs over the Independence Day weekend.

The five-day stretch attracted a total attendance of 25,571 and the wagering soared to a stunning \$3,022,272. The daily average over the weekend was a remarkable \$604,454.

Wagering-per-race was \$50,371. During the same weekend last year, Ruidoso Downs staged six race days (Wednesday through Monday) and recorded a total handle of \$3,224,663. The daily average was \$537,444. The current daily average for the holiday weekend is up 12.47 percent.

Average attendance during the week was 5,114, a boost of 12.97 percent over the 4,527 average of July 4th weekend last year.



## Bicycle racing program begun

Thanks to Roy Propsner, many Ruidoso youths may be participating in one of the country's fastest-growing sports soon. Propsner is president of a recently-formed bicycle motocross organization in the Ruidoso area. The organization is sanctioned by the American Bicycle Association (ABA). He hopes to get the youths of Ruidoso involved in competitive racing soon. "My sons had a motocross bike and were working on it to improve it," he said. "I got interested in their work and thought motocross competition and a track in this area were needed. The kids needed a place to race." Propsner's sons Clinton, 12, and Jason, 11, are both interested in the new organization and work with bicycles a lot. The new president hasn't had much experience with motocross races, but hopes to learn more about them in the near future. "I plan to go to a couple of races in the next couple of weeks and see how it's done," he said. Propsner and Roy Seay, the treasurer of the new organization,

hope to attract a large number of youths six to 18 years old. "The parents will organize it, and the kids will participate in the competition," Propsner said. Propsner, who owns and operates Roy of Ruidoso & Sons Chimney Cleaning, already has a location for the track the motocross cyclists will race on. "It's going to be on the Eagle Creek Ski and Recreation property," he remarked. "The track will be about 1,000 feet in total length. The cost of the starting gate would probably be around \$2,000. The labor and ground work will probably be donated." When the track is finally built, it will be the ninth of its type in New Mexico. Albuquerque, Gallup, Farmington, Grants, Las Cruces, Santa Fe and Milan already have tracks. "We're hopeful of having the track ready for competition by the time school starts, maybe even August," commented Propsner. Bicycle motocross has grown rapidly since it was begun in California in 1970. The first race was held in Southern California, but it has moved out of that area to the Southwest and other parts of the country over the past 10 years. "Arizona and California have done the best in competitive events over

the years," Propsner said. "But New Mexico has done better in recent years and is coming on strong." Motocross bicycles range in price from around \$150 to \$350 or \$400. A used one can be bought for about \$75-\$90. Motocross bicycles are heavier than the average bike. Riders in the competition must wear helmets and long-sleeve shirts to avoid possible injury. Bicycle motocross racing is similar to motorcycle motocross in that the riders generally go over a hilly and winding course. There are several age and ability divisions. New riders start out in the beginners' division for their particular age group and progress from there to novice and expert. Propsner wants to get a lot of people involved in the local program. "People can sponsor a team or individual or enter their own kids in the competition," he said. "What is the ultimate goal of the local AMA program?" "To give local kids a chance to compete and a local track for them to race on," Propsner answered. "If we have a local track, our kids won't have to go out of town to race unless they want to." Anyone interested in the motocross program can call 257-6028.



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# Around Sports with Gary Brown



Sometimes those of us who cover sports tend to think of athletes as invincible heroes who are immune to physical tragedies that strike the average person on the street.

But that's not true, as some tragic events of the past two weeks have shown.

Miami Dolphin linebacker Larry Gordon dropped dead of a congenital heart problem while jogging two weeks ago. Last Wednesday Kansas City Chiefs running back Joe Delaney drowned as he bravely tried to help three struggling youths in a Louisiana waterhole.

That these athletes were National Football League (NFL) players made their deaths seem all the more unlikely.

Many people think of professional football players as the strongest examples of American manhood. That they could perish because of a health problem or an accident is something a lot of people can't fathom.

When I was working at a newspaper in California, Joe Roth, an All-American quarterback at the University of California at Berkeley, died of cancer.

Roth had developed cancer while playing football at Grossmount Community College near San Diego. He had an operation and his doctors thought they had removed the cancer.

He transferred to the Berkeley campus after his sophomore year, and led the Bears to a co-championship in the Pacific-10 Conference in 1975. California enjoyed an 8-3 record that season, its best in 25 years.

However, the next year his malignancy returned, and Roth died in January, 1977. When he died, he weighed a good deal less than he had during his playing days.

It hardly seemed possible that he was throwing touchdown passes against the likes of the University of Southern California (USC) only a few months before.

When something like this happens to an outstanding athlete in the prime of life, it makes you realize how vulnerable we all are.

Joe Roth, Joe Delaney and Larry Gordon were stars on the football field. They also showed a great deal of courage off the field.

But they died the way a lot of people died, because of a disease or accident.

When tragedy strikes the sports world, those of us who cover the athletic scene forget the glory and realize that athletes are as much a part of the real world as anybody else.

I'm not going to say much about the organization of a new professional football league, the International Football League.

It just seems like people are trying for an "overkill" in the number of professional sports teams.

If this new league makes it (and that's not likely), it may create more jobs for players coming out of the colleges but also force some owners into bankruptcy.

Some cities will have three or four pro football teams operating within their metropolitan areas. Some teams are sure to fold because of this.

# Parker gets most valuable honor in South loss

Robert Parker finished a brilliant high school career by winning the Most Valuable Player award in the AA-A All-Star basketball game at the University of New Mexico (UNM) arena Saturday night in Albuquerque.

The former Capitan High School standout tallied 23 points and grabbed 16 rebounds to lead the South team in a 93-86 loss to the North.

The lead swung back and forth until the North took the edge for good at 76-75 with just over four

minutes remaining in the contest and gradually increased its margin. Just a few seconds earlier, Parker had hit a free throw for a 75-74 South advantage.

Del Trujillo, a 6-4 center from state AA division champion Escalante High School, scored 20 points to spark the winning North squad. Michael Gonzales of AA division runner-up Pecos High School added 19 points.

Williams Reid of Dexter High School and David Stalley of Cliff High School each scored 12 points for

the South team. Troy Schmidt of Estancia High School, and Hagerman High School's Alfred Martinez added 10 points apiece.

In the AAAA-AAA contest that followed the AA-A game, the North again came out on top, taking a 93-87 victory.

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

## Alcoholism treatment service starts

Alcohol treatment services began in Lincoln County Friday, July 1.

Joseph Johnson, deputy secretary for the Health and Environment Department, said the Behavioral Health Services Division has contracted with the Lincoln County Alcoholism Association (LCAA) to provide counseling, residential and other services to citizens in the area.

Through the contract, the program has been funded \$191,000 to deliver services from July 1, 1983, to June 30, 1984.

These funds were obtained largely through the efforts of State Representative M. B. (Mickey) McGuire, according to Ray Hayhurst, executive director of LCAA.

The program will offer outpatient services, "driving while intoxicated

(DWI) screening, court referral services and family counseling. Hayhurst said, "It will take any alcohol-related cases, personal referrals and walk-ins."

"DWI screening will involve first trying to determine if there is an alcoholism problem," he said. "If a problem does exist, we will try to treat, counsel and curb the problem, then refer the individual to a DWI school."


Research shows that Lincoln County is number four in the state in alcohol-related highway deaths, Hayhurst said. "We're looking at the drinking and driving problem Lincoln County has, and we will be working closely with courts in the county."

"Until now we haven't had the manpower in this county to combat the

problem in Lincoln County." The already existing Lincoln House, a 10-bed, 90-day residential rehabilitation component on Agua Fria estates, will still be part of the program.

"If we see in an initial interview, that outpatient counseling is not sufficient, we will refer them to detoxification and then to the Lincoln House for further rehabilitation," Hayhurst said.

The offices of the program, which will employ eight people, will be next door to the Hollywood station post office and Ruidoso Flower Shop on Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs. Hayhurst emphasized that although the program is located in Ruidoso Downs, its services are intended for anyone in Lincoln County.

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# Volunteers give time to fire fighting for Downs department

A fire breaks out in Ruidoso Downs. Summoned by pagers and telephones, 15 men and women leave their work or family and race to the fire no matter what time of day or night. They are not paid for their efforts; they are the volunteers who keep the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department alive.

Five officers—a chief, assistant chief, captain for fire services, director, and soon a captain of rescue services—are included in these volunteers; they lead the volunteers in their fire fighting. There is one person paid a minimum number of hours' wages to service the trucks.

The volunteers range in occupations from a policeman to a roofer to those employed by the school district. Roger Riley, director of the volunteer department, said the volunteers do a lot of work—that all the volunteers put in at least 20 hours a week of their own time.

They are trained at Ruidoso Downs, and many also have gone to fire school under agencies including the Emergency Medical Technical Association of Colorado; the state fire marshal's office; New Mexico Fire Instructor's Association; and New Mexico Fire Chiefs Association, Riley said.

The volunteers learn about firemanship, breathing apparatus, ventilation, ground ladders and first aid, he said. "People really don't understand the amount of training it takes."

Two of the volunteers, both women, are certified emergency medical technicians (EMTs), he noted. The department will have an EMT class in the fall, and after that he hopes to have 10 EMTs.

The department is also trying to go to a Colorado institute that will teach the incident command system. This is a system whereby one person is in charge of a scene. It helps in coordination, Riley explained.

"The volunteers take vacations to go to fire school, take off work for fires and fight fires in 8 degree weather; you've got to respect anyone who'll do that," he said.

The volunteers for the department are Chet Southard, Allen Temple, Jay Fuseller, Paul Keith, Scott Tillman, Skip Miller, Cindy Miller, Jeanne Walker, Roger Riley, Dale Patrick, Humberto Maldonado, Ray Silva, Ray Walker, Renee Keith and Bob Proffitt.

Riley estimates 90 percent of New Mexico's fire fighters are volunteers. "It is not easy to get and keep

volunteers," he said, "but my volunteers don't want volunteers who won't work."

The Village of Ruidoso Downs pays the volunteers \$5 per alarm, and most of them donate the money to the department for equipment, Riley pointed out.

It costs about \$400 to equip each fireman, Riley said.

Fire fighting is dangerous, he said. There are sometimes hazardous chemicals involved.

"There is no such thing as an expert in the fire department; experts get you killed," Riley said.

The department has two pieces of equipment—a Class A pumper and a rescue mini pumper.

The Class A pumper is used for structure fires, Riley said. It will hold 500 gallons of water, which means it only holds two minutes of water.

"So we're in trouble if we don't have a hydrant," he noted.

The mini rescue pumper has two

purposes. It is used for rescues and for smaller fires such as grass or car fires, Riley said. It holds 250 gallons of water, which means it only has one minute of water.

"It tears us up when we have to watch someone's house burn down because we don't have enough water, or we run out," he explained.

For rescues, the mini pumper carries a trauma box, air chisel, jaws of life and CO2 for car fires.

The department also has foam to combat chemical fires.

Fire fighting is a lot more technical than people realize, he said. Some of the car plastics used now give off hazardous gases.

The mini pumper is also used a lot in the winter because it is easier to get up the hills in Ruidoso Downs in the ice and snow, Riley explained.

The department recently put light bars on the trucks because there is such a problem with highway traffic when they have to go to an accident

scene, he said. "Here we have either major or minor accidents, nothing in between."

The department built the mini pumper itself, which cost about \$15,000. If it was bought new, it would have cost \$37,000, Riley noted.

Riley said sometimes in the summer, they have up to 15 alarms in one week; but in the winter, they sometimes have one alarm in a month.

They have not had an alarm in the month of June yet, he noted, but the department helps out other departments such as Glencoe and Ruidoso when needed.

Riley pointed out that much of Ruidoso Downs is a fire hazard because there are so many wooden houses and mobile homes. Also, all the hay at the racetrack is an added danger.

He said he tries to keep a fireman at the station every night. For entertainment he put a pool table and a

television set in the station meeting room.

The department responds to alarms within the village district and 10 miles out, he said. "We also automatically roll when there is an alarm in the Glencoe district." He helped get the Glencoe Volunteer Fire Department started.

Riley said the maximum response time of the Downs Volunteer Fire Department is three minutes, and that is only if there is ice. It is usually one or two minutes.

The Ruidoso Downs Fire Department has recently been under fire because the Deputy State Fire Marshal made an inspection of the building and cited 10 things he said were needed to correct the "deplorable" conditions of the fire station building.

Riley replied that "people have been supporting us, but we just ain't have enough equipment or enough money."

The department gets \$29,045 a year from the state fire allotment, half of which goes for operations—gas, insurance and training, Riley explained.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs gives the department \$3,300, and they receive about \$3,000 from donations, he said.

Riley said there is not enough room for the fire apparatus in the fire station. The trucks almost scrape the ceiling going out of the station and the doors cannot be raised any higher.

"The interior is dilapidated; there is no storage space and no working space," he noted. "We've got to have better quarters; this is just not the size for a fire station."

The fire station used to be a gas station.

The department needs a 1,500-gallon tanker-pumper, he said. He would also like to have a separate rescue unit, but that would be five years in the future.

The metal building the department needs would cost about \$90,000, he said, and another truck would cost about \$60,000. "We might try to build it ourselves."

The three things Riley said he considers most important in a community are: police, fire and ambulance.

He said only three of the 10 things cited by the Fire Marshal are the department's fault; the rest are "the village's problem, not ours."

One problem they will be correcting soon is the lack of hose drying facilities. The department will build its own drying racks, he said. Hose dryers cost \$5,000.

Riley has proposed the purchase of a new building and tanker-pumper with a Farmers Home Administration loan. He estimated the cost at \$150,000. He explained the loan can be secured only with a bond and has asked village trustees to approve a General Obligation bond election as collateral for the loan.

Riley said the loan payments can be made through the state fire allotment, and the bond would only be collected if those funds are lost. He said the building could be erected on land adjacent to the present fire station, already owned by the department.

The department is planning an open house to orient the people of Ruidoso Downs with the problem faced by the fire department, he said.

"People think the department is a bunch of good old boys who want to ride on fire trucks, and it just ain't that way. It is dedicated professionals who are willing to give a lot of time," he said.

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
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

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# The Dreamer

Dear Dan,  
The other day I ran across an old snapshot of the Fort Stanton rodeo taken about 1939, on our first visit back to the land of the pinon and pine; since I left there in the fall of 1934 to join Ferne on our matrimonial trek here in Houston.

My last Fourth of July that same year was one I'll always remember. You were still on a trip with Dad somewhere and until now have not been apprised of the details.

In the bronc riding I drew the best horse by far, a Martin Herrera horse named Black Pete, and knew I had a good chance to win the event.

Before my turn came, a couple of the good riders got thrown, and then the last of the three saddles furnished by the committee went on loose horses between parked cars forming the arena; so it was decided to go ahead with the wild cow milking during the saddle roundup.

Meanwhile, one of the saddles came back, and I had it put on Black Pete in

the chute in plenty of time to get the stirrups right; one thing I hadn't always been able to do. Incidentally, these were swell-forked saddles that take a good horse to unseat even a rank dude.

Helping me in the chute, Martin wasn't sure I knew how proud he was of the horse and, as I eased down on Black Pete, he confided, "He's a pretty good horse, but you got to make him pitch."

I reassured him and came out spurring everywhere I could reach. The horse ran out about three strides and broke in two rather high off the ground, with me looking down at the empty saddle. I tried to get back in but was on the ground the next jump.

Harvey Jackson of Roswell had tried to trade me out of the horse and when I declined, he suggested that I couldn't ride him; so I offered to bet him ten dollars that I could. He didn't take me up and I've been grateful to him ever since. One thing, I didn't have ten dollars.

Then, too, there was a fellow taking pictures with a home movie camera for the first time I had ever seen one, and I asked if he would take a se-

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# Cummins takes on responsibility as state's youngest mayor

At 24 the youngest mayor in New Mexico, David Cummins feels his age is no factor in his performance as mayor of Capitan. But he is concerned about the publicity and responsibility that come with the job.

"It's a lot more responsibility," said Cummins when comparing his job as village council member to his new job as mayor.

Cummins became mayor of Capitan May 9, after former mayor Don Stark resigned because of health reasons. Cummins had been mayor pro-tem before Stark's resignation and was chosen by fellow council members to succeed to the mayorship. He will remain in that position until March 1986.

The soft spoken blond young man doesn't know exactly why he was chosen to become the mayor, but suggested it was because he was the only one willing to take the job.

"They didn't want it... at first I was kind of reluctant to take the job," said Cummins, who noted he was concerned about the additional responsibility.

His new job as mayor has brought him more public exposure as well, he said.

"I get ribbed about it a lot," he said. People also come to him first when they have a problem.

"I guess they expect the mayor to lay down the law," he said.

Cummins, however, sees the job of mayor in a different light. He said the village council rules the village and he acts as a sort of police officer for them, carrying out their orders. He also said he sees himself as a mediator between village employees and the council.

Cummins tries to drop by village hall every day during his lunch break from Cummins Food Market and Dry Goods. At that time he goes over any correspondence that has come in and tries to address problems with employees or the public.

If the employees have any complaints, he said he tries to sit down with them and work it out without having to take the issue to village council. It is essential to have satisfied employees to get anything done, said Cummins.

Occasionally disputes must be addressed by village council. Recently one such dispute over salaries came to the village council and appeared to be a deadlocked issue. After lengthy discussion and no progress, Cummins became exasperated and withdrew his vote, breaking the deadlock.

"I got kind of upset about it," admitted Cummins. It was a touchy issue that had been disputed for a number of weeks and raised some hard feelings, he explained.

As a rule, however, Cummins said he tries to keep personal feelings separate from village affairs when leading the village council meetings.

Cummins has now presided over two meetings in his position as mayor. He also led two meetings as mayor pro-tem. At first he said he was nervous about presiding over the meetings, and he wanted them to be shorter.

"But the public's got to have their say," he stated, adding that citizens' input can be very valuable.

Cummins said he will often get public input even if he doesn't ask for it. He said there are a number of small clans in town who sometimes have different opinions than he on certain subjects.

"If my way of thinking doesn't agree with theirs, I'll hear about it," Cummins said. He said he will listen to others' opinions, but will stick to his own if he doesn't agree. But he said that more often, he tries to get along with people as much as possible.

"You've got to learn to get along the

best you can in a small town like this," said Cummins.

Cummins should know; he has lived in Capitan all his life except for a short stint at the University of New Mexico (UNM) in Albuquerque. It was after attending UNM for a semester that he returned to Capitan and his father's store. Upon his return, he decided to "try my hand at politics."

Why? "I don't know. I just jumped into it," Cummins replied. He gave a clue to his political involvement later.

"It's pretty great if you work to get something done that helps everybody. It feels pretty good," he said.

Cummins ran for village council in 1980 at the age of 20 and received the most votes of the four candidates running for the two open spots. He said he has enjoyed his four years on the village council and has learned plenty—not the least of which is how to deal with the state's bureaucracy.

While he feels his age is not any disadvantage to his performance, he admits to an "almost endless" list of things to be learned. He said he needs to learn how to develop better contacts in the state government in Santa Fe, better ways to run village govern-

ment and handle people better.

It was while serving as a member of the village council that Cummins proposed a moratorium on annexations into the village. Today, he sees growth as the main problem facing Capitan.

"I just hope the village can keep up with the growth," said Cummins.

During the years before Cummins arrived on the council, numerous tracts of land and subdivisions were annexed into the village. He wants to make sure the village can supply city services—especially water—to customers within those subdivisions before adding any more land to the village.

Water and roads are the areas that will need the most attention in the future, said Cummins. He believes the village has made strides in improving the water system over the past few years with an upgraded filter plant and replacement of some water lines. Plans are under way to try to make a raw water storage reservoir if the village can find the funding to help construct one.

Streets should also be improved this

year with the allocation of \$8,700 in revenue sharing funds to the street department, said Cummins.

Cummins said he hopes to either start enforcing or drop a number of ordinances from the village statutes.

He noted specifically an ordinance against the accumulation of trash, junk or refuse on private property that he says the village will begin enforcing.

Cummins is concerned about finding enough time to do everything he wants as mayor. The \$10 a month salary he receives as mayor requires him to make a living elsewhere.

In addition to his duties as mayor, he is vice-president and part-owner of Cummins Food Market and Dry Goods, Incorporated. He spends an average of 10 hours a day there doing anything from balancing the books to stocking shelves and sacking groceries.

Between the grocery store and the added responsibility and exposure he gets as mayor, Cummins said the pressures do build up some times. That's when he takes off for the weekend with his wife Deborah. Other times he plays softball or skis if he wants to relax.

But he can't take off for too long. The grocery store and the village call back their young leader to solve their problems.

## Editorial

Now we're getting somewhere.

All the recent fuss about public education has drawn attention to that issue, but last week's Supreme Court decision on tuition credit actually accomplishes something for education.

By a 5-4 vote, the court ruled that states may grant tax breaks to parents of children in private and parochial schools. The case before the justices involved a Minnesota law that grants tax deductions of up to \$700 to parents of children in non-public schools.

Opponents of the law based their argument on the notion that it violates the constitutionally required separation of church and state.

But the Supreme Court, as stated in the majority opinion written by Justice Rehnquist, ruled that the law serves a "purpose that is both secular and understandable ... By educating a substantial number of students such schools relieve public schools of a correspondingly great burden—to the benefit of all taxpayers."

The court's action can be taken as a positive step toward elimination of the patently unfair double taxation to which parents of private school children are subjected.

It is also a step toward bringing education into the marketplace, where value is related to expenditure and merit is rewarded.

With the constitutional question resolved, it is hoped members of Congress will act favorably on tuition tax credit legislation proposed by President Reagan.—TP

## Inside the capitol

SANTA FE—What seems like a win can sometimes turn into a loss.

Take the case of the power the Legislature handed the Governor to consolidate all the licensing boards in the state.

Lots of previous governors have asked for that, on two principal grounds:

—If the licensing agencies were centralized instead of being spread all over the state, the citizens would at least know where to find them; and

—State money is being wasted staffing each agency with support services (secretaries, bookkeepers and the like) when these could in fact be shared.

To the surprise of many, the Legislature, which had long resisted ordering this consolidation, suddenly gave Toney Anaya the power to enforce it in 1983.

Some said of that, "A triumph!"

Others, perhaps more knowledgeable, said, "A triumph?"

Now the Anaya administration has to utilize that right, and that's tough to do.

The Governor's friend and former law partner, Harvey Fruman, named superintendent of the new licensing department effective today, now has to take these steps:

—Locate all boards and commissions which have licensing powers of any kind. (Nobody, as of this date, pretends to have a complete list of them all.)

—Recommend to the Governor which of these shall be combined into one centralized authority. (There's the touchy part. Bring in the plumbers, for instance, but leave out the electricians, and see what happens.)

—Then oversee the actual melding of all those tapped for centralization, despite the cries of grief from all those affected. (This is where Fruman will see delaying tactics, including lawsuits, to an extent New Mexico government has never seen before.)

Poor Harvey. Reportedly, he was never ecstatic over being one of Anaya's chief aides (the stress in that office is like being in a pressure cooker). But did he solve his problem when he accepted his current assign-

ment?

Every professional and trade group which has licensing authority will perceive any move on his part as threatening their turf. What's worse, they will claim that only they, the members of the inner circle, can understand the problems of their particular clan. They will fight like tigers to keep from being absorbed.

From here, it looks like Fruman, for his pains, will end up with more gray hairs in his beard and on his head.

Ironic addendum to the above:

Anaya and Fruman, both attorneys, are licensed to practice a profession but can never come under the department Harvey is heading.

That's because lawyers are all "officers of the court" and as such, their licensing procedures, including disbarment and other disciplinary procedures, are vested in the Supreme Court.

Those who are physicians or engineers or cosmetologists or whatever are not so lucky. They could be swept into the new department without so much as a "by your leave" from Anaya.

An additional note on those two recently named commissions to study education in the state, which this column has already predicted will be less than successful:

Neither includes any members who are engaged in the process of private or parochial education.

Now admittedly, the state does not have any responsibility for these forms of education, nor does it provide any funds toward their support. But if the subject of the study is roughly "education and how to improve it," representatives of such non-public schools might also be seen as having something to contribute.

It may be unconstitutional to give any funds directly to such schools, but surely it isn't dangerous to pick the brains of those who conduct them.

They might even have some ideas to contribute.

## Reporter's Round

There once was a small hometown newspaper in a verdant mountain river valley whimsically known by locals as Harmony Valley.

A snow-distinguished mountain peak on the flag distinguished the paper from any other. All sorts of "stupid and junk" that was beloved by the mountain folk and Texas admirers appeared on the pages every Monday and Thursday.

The names—the Greens, Lanes, and Edwards—were familiar to everyone in town. And what would the paper be without the prose written by that Sage of the Ruidoso Valley, the very Valdez Kid himself, Dannie Storm?

Ol' Cale Dickey rode herd on the news staff for years. It was a period when reporters clunked away on typewriters, glued pages together and handed over yards of copy to the editor.

A lanky journalist, who also happened to be an accomplished tennis player, pulled into the mountain town one late summer day and checked into the cluttered news office across the street from the Ben Franklin store. Dickey needed another reporter and Tim Palmer longed to get back to his favorite state. A timely match.

Palmer focused his eye on the village trustees, the police and fire departments and a quasi-governmental group that was trying to build the town a new airport.

Before long, the Greens started putting their hometown paper through a series of transformations. The high-tech revolution arrived at the Ruidoso News in the form of mini disk word processors and computer typesetters that advanced the operation light years ahead in efficiency.

Then Dickey decided it was time for greener pastures. The Greens were in a fortunate position—they needed a new editor and they had someone right under their noses who was ready to step in. Palmer, who served up a number of acres in a few short months, accepted the offer and began coaching the editorial staff.

Of course, he needed a replacement for the "village beat." Alas, he found a green New Englander who didn't know Ruidoso from Orogrande. But he needed little persuasion after hearing the town was nestled in the mountains, so he loaded his car and headed for the sun.

Trepidation and fear mounted as the Green Mountain boy drove through seemingly desolate country searching for the hint of blue on the horizon that would betray a mountain range.

Once the asphalt began its climb into pine-studded forests he felt more at ease. He would begin to think of how quaint the town must be. What would the character of the "village" be like? What about the character of the leaders? Where could information be found—at a little roadside diner where the cops hung out daily?

Under the tutelage of Palmer, he learned things were a little different than he expected.

For one, the paper was more than a small-time rag he imagined it would be. These guys were newspaper people who were devoted to informing the community on practically everything that was happening. The principles of freedom of the press and the right-to-know were just as important to them as they are to the big guys.

And there certainly was no time for sleep walking in the town. Things were developing and changing so fast that the community often seemed to be on the verge of an explosion.

He went in thinking nothing of great importance could be going on with the good ol' boy police, but soon found the opposite was true. He learned it was a highly respected force that regularly claimed top graduates from the police academy.

In fact, the key word at the department was IMPROVEMENT. Improvement, growth, improvement—the words applied to and affected every organization, business, group and facet of the town. He decided that those words, those ideals, defined the character of the town more than anything else.

Now, the New Englander is not quite as green around the gills. He'd like to think those words also have applied to him during his tenure on the newspaper with the mountain flag.

As he reaches to descend from the high mountain valley and its invigorating cool air, he realizes that he also is climbing toward a new level in his career and his personal growth.

And he knows he will be able to look back someday on that village and its dynamic weekly newspaper as being important steps that helped him reach that new height.
