



## Skeen hits several subjects

U.S. Representative Joe Skeen said Thursday he supports locating a regional airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa site preferred by airport proponents, and he said talks are under way in Washington to win transfer of the site to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

Skeen was decisive when asked if he would support the preferred site (Site B) for an airport in light of Governor Toney Anaya's recent request for approval of the land transfer and the apparent removal by developers of private land from an alternate site.

"If I were to pick either site, Site B would be the one from the beginning," he replied.

Skeen addressed the subject at a town meeting Thursday night at the Ruidoso village hall. About 60 persons turned out for the meeting, during which Skeen spoke on issues ranging from the airport controversy to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP) project to legislation he will propose that would provide compensation to ranchers displaced from White Sands Missile Range in World War II.

Skeen indicated he is working to get approval for the transfer of about 1,666 acres on Site B from the Bureau of Land Management to the FAA, but he said he would not elaborate on the negotiations.

He did say, however, that he sees a compromise possible on the site in the near future. He said airport proponents have already compromised, by reducing the amount of land requested for an airport from what was previously requested. And he said New Mexico State University should realize that it could benefit from the airport and the immediate air access to its experimental ranch on the mesa.

After the meeting, state Senator

Charlie Lee, who accompanied Skeen to the meeting, said he does not think a compromise will be reached soon over Site B because of Anaya's "obnoxious approach" to Interior Secretary James Watt.

Anaya recently called for Watt's ouster at the Western Governors Conference, and he has opposed Watt's coal leasing program and his land use policy at the WIPP site near Carlsbad.

"I would hope the people of Lincoln County would not be as gullible as they appear to be," Lee said, apparently questioning Anaya's sincerity in asking Watt to okay the land transfer for the airport.

Skeen voiced his support for Watt when a woman expressed concern about a news report quoting Senator Pete Domenici as suggesting Watt should be "dumped."

Skeen criticized the national media for taking Watt on with "editorialization at its very sleaziest" in news stories. He claimed media groups in the Northeast have tried to make Watt "an example for what's wrong with the Reagan administration."

He praised the Interior secretary for doing a tremendous job in renovating the deteriorated national parks system.

Then Skeen criticized environmental and anti-nuclear groups. The "pristine environment" environmental groups hope to return to is not a practical idea, Skeen said, and he noted there has to be a balance between natural resource development and environmental preservation.

Responding to a question about geological studies at the WIPP site, Skeen indicated that the anti-nuclear movement has caused an "interminable amount of delay" at the experimental nuclear waste repository.

Skeen noted transuranic waste has been deposited in geological strata in Germany and France that is similar to the formation at the WIPP site, and

those repositories have proven to be "totally safe."

"The nuclear age is here to stay," Skeen said, noting we've "got to face up to the facts" of nuclear life.

Skeen also told participants at the town meeting that he soon will introduce legislation that would provide compensation to ranchers who have been dislocated from their property since the 1940s. Ranchers were removed from the Tularosa Valley to make way for the missile range.

"I firmly believe that those folks were deprived of just compensation because the right of choice was taken away from them from the very beginning," Skeen said.

He said for 40 years the ranchers have been told year-to-year they would be able to return to their homes, and they have never received adequate payment for the land they were forced to leave. Skeen said the legislation would involve "animal unit compensation" and compensation for damage to ranch improvements.

He said he hopes to have the legislation ready by the time of a House subcommittee meeting July 26. Skeen said the subcommittee will discuss a controversy similar to the one at White Sands.

Lincoln County Commissioner Kenneth Nosker asked Skeen to support the Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILT) program, which compensates counties that have federal land within their borders for the loss of tax revenue on the property.

Specifically, Nosker asked Skeen to seek a change in the program so the federal monies would be sent directly to counties. Nosker said the state, which funnels the payments to counties, takes 15 percent off the top before allocating the rest to the counties.

Skeen, who supports the PILT program, made no commitment to Nosker's request.

## Rich ski race on go

It appears Ruidoso and Sierra Blanca Ski Resort will host the world's richest ski race, the "U.S. Open," in March 1984.

All five members of the Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) voiced support of contributing \$25,000 of lodgers' tax funds to the production of the race at an informal meeting Friday with race promoter Paul Carson. The group will meet Tuesday at noon to officially endorse the expenditure in time for final approval at Tuesday evening's village council meeting.

After hearing Carson outline the race, LTC member Clark Carpenter said he would introduce a motion to provide \$25,000 for the race, and support the motion. Other committee

members expressed support of the expenditure, as did councilman Al Junge, who also attended the meeting.

"It looks like a super opportunity," said councilman Benny Coulston, who left Friday's meeting early but has been involved with the planning since the first meetings in May.

"I think you've got it in the bag," said LTC chairman Ed Hyman. "I think the vote is pretty obvious. What we need is to work out the details."

Details include exactly which funds will be tapped for the expenditures. LTC members, councilman Junge and Chamber of Commerce president James Paxton discussed using lodgers' tax money now in certificates of deposit; advertising funds in the lodgers' tax budget; and/or some of the \$30,000 in the general fund

set aside by the village council for advertising.

"The U.S. Open will be the premier event on the tour," said Carson, who is the executive director of Pro Ski International.

Carson's pro racing tour will be in its third year in 1984 and will include a minimum of six races in the United States and two in Europe.

"We will have all the top professional racers in the world here," said Carson, who presented a list of 27 skiers who will race with Pro Ski International. The list includes Andre Arnold, Hans Hinterseer and numerous former Olympic contenders and medalists from 10 countries.

## Water protest hearing set

A protest filed last year against the Village of Ruidoso by farmers who irrigate fruit orchards and pastures between Ruidoso and Biscuit Hill will be aired August 19 in Santa Fe in a preliminary hearing before a representative of the State Engineer's office.

Neil Stillinger, a Santa Fe attorney who is representing Ruidoso in the case, said the purpose of the "pre-hearing conference" is to define the issue and the positions of both parties before the matter goes to a formal hearing.

The farmers, who all have priority water rights for irrigation, filed protests in May 1982 with the state engineer against Ruidoso's application for a permit to change the point of effluent discharge into the Rio Ruidoso.

The village applied for the permit in April 1982 in preparation for the opening of the wastewater treatment plant at Biscuit Hill that went into operation in June 1982. The farmers are

protesting that the change in point of discharge from the old wastewater plant—located six miles upstream from Biscuit Hill—to the new one is detrimental to their water rights.

The state engineer had granted Ruidoso partial credit for the water discharged from the wastewater plant, which allowed the village to supplement its water rights on the Rio Ruidoso. The village never has benefited from the "effluent credit," but plans to use the water—estimated at 623 acre feet per year—to fill the Grindstone reservoir.

The credit, however, has been suspended until the protest is settled and Ruidoso receives a discharge permit for the Biscuit Hill plant.

The village council appointed a negotiating committee to try to reach a compromise with the farmers, but the committee has since disbanded and the council and its legal counselors have taken over the negotiations.

When asked about specific solutions discussed in the negotiations, Stillinger noted that one proposal was for the village to reduce its diversions

during dry spells so the farmers would have enough water for irrigating.

But Stillinger said he "recommended against any such agreement" because the village would be giving up more than it wants to.

"I feel they don't have to give up very much and, as far as I know, they don't intend to," Stillinger said.

Asked if that meant the negotiations have failed, Stillinger said he did not know; but he said he is preparing to bring the matter to a hearing and let the state engineer decide the case.

If a negotiated settlement had been reached, it also would go before the state engineer, but only for final approval.

"In my view, (the application) will be approved one way or the other—by the state engineer or in court," Stillinger said.

Collins said the delay in getting the discharge permit for the new plant should not jeopardize the village's effluent credit rights. He said he thinks the full amount of those rights will be restored once the permit is granted.

## Falacy captures First Lady Handicap

FALACY, a filly making the third start of her career, tossed a haymaker at her unwary foes in Sunday's renewal of the First Lady Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The six-furlong sprint for fillies and mares drew seven takers and put up a purse of \$9,225.

Falacy, storming out of the number 7 post on a muddy track (heavy rains had fallen earlier in the program), assumed the lead after she was only a few jumps from the gate. Jockey Vickie Smallwood steered Falacy toward the rail, where the filly found solid footing. She literally took off. At no point did any of her opponents stand a fighting chance. Each was clearly outgunned.

At the turn for home, Falacy was cruising with an eight-length lead. Jockey Smallwood gave the filly a breather, then asked her to pick up steam in the upper stretch. Falacy poured it on to win by a crushing six and three fourths lengths.

The most remarkable aspect of the triumph was the winning time of 1:12 3/5 seconds, which clipped three-fifths of a second off the seasonal mark. Falacy's clocking was only a second shy of the track record of 1:11 3/5, first set in 1971 by Crazy Frills and equaled in 1976 by Time To Tell.

Falacy chalked up fractions of 22 1/5, 46 1/5 and 59 2/5 in her blistering First Lady Journey. She collected \$5,535 to go with the \$2,600 she earned in two previous tries at racing. Both previous spins were recorded earlier this summer at the Downs at Santa Fe.

Falacy is owned and trained by

Walter F. Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma. The win payoffs were \$11.40, \$4 and \$3.

Code's Draconic, the people's choice at just over 2-1, turned in a struggling second and paid \$4, \$2.80. She earned \$2,029. Wayne Buehrer was up.

Gray Wallet, a 12-1 outsider handled by Carlos Rivas, rallied steadily out of fourth place and managed to hit the finish in third place, a distant four and one half lengths behind Code's Draconic. Third was worth a paycheck of \$922. The show payoff was \$4.40.

NO TELL MOTEL rallied strongly from the outside to register an upset victory in Saturday's featured \$10,225 Jet Deck Handicap at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The three-year-old Truckle Feature colt broke sharply under veteran rider Roy Brooks from the outside seventh post position, started moving rapidly about halfway through the 440-yard dash, and then just got up in the final stride for a head victory over outsider Betts Full Moon.

Hempens Jet, wagered to 3-5 favoritism off his impressive victory in the Rainbow Silver Cup, led for much of the chase, but was passed at the wire and finished third. He was a head behind Betts Full Moon, a 20-1 risk.

The appearance was the first at Ruidoso Downs for No Tell Motel since he finished sixth in last Labor Day's \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity.

BURNELL scored his seventh straight win on Friday's program at

Ruidoso Downs and set the top qualifying time for the upcoming \$688,800 Rainbow Futurity.

The Rainbow Futurity is the middle jewel in the famed Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses.

Friday's program included seven 400-yard final elimination trial heats for the Rainbow. Each of the contenders was racing against the clock, aiming at a starting berth in the July 24 finale and a crack at that victory purse of \$239,330.

Burnell raced as an odds-on favorite in Friday's sixth race and led all the way. He ended the sprint with a head lead and stopped the clock in 19.87 seconds. That was the fastest of the seven trial spins.

Burnell, who went into the trials with career earnings of \$84,027 (from a record of 6-1-1 from eight starts), is owned by Thomas Rack and Ace Walker of Corpus Christi, Texas. The Chestnut colt operates out of the powerful barn of trainer Jack Brooks. The rider is Jacky Martin.

Meganette, who turned in a hard-fighting second to Burnell, ended with the second-best clocking of 19.89 seconds. The filly is owned by the San Jose Cattle Company of Pleasanton, Texas. Jerry Nicodemus is the rider.

Barbarys Pokey, who won the third race by one and one fourth lengths as a 6-5 favorite, checked in with the third-best time of 19.92 seconds. The colt is owned by John Kitzmann of Cypress, Texas. Wesley Smith does the riding.

SLALOM, a filly who started the current Ruidoso Downs meeting as a maiden, mercilessly crushed her opposition in Thursday's headliner and set a seasonal record for six and one half furlongs.

Slalom tore into the lead at the turn for home and continued to open up throughout the stretch run of the sprint for three-year-olds.

The winning margin was a lopsided five and one half lengths and the winning time of 1:19 4/5 seconds trimmed a tick off the previous mark set by the handicap star, Glover D., and equalized earlier this week by Some Other Brother in the Jockey Club Prep Stakes.

Ruidoso patrons made Slalom an 8-5 shot in Thursday's headliner and the filly returned mutual payoffs of \$5.20, \$3 and \$2.40. Carlos Rivas was up.

Slalom is trained by Clifford C. Lambert, Sr., for the partnership of Double B. Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico, and Dr. Joe N. Kidd of El Paso, Texas.

# Attorney tells horsemen 'courtesy' pays



Attorney Les Houston Saturday told Ruidoso Downs horsemen his decision to arbitrate the dispute over the allocation of uncashed pari-mutuel tickets was a courtesy gesture to Governor Tony Anaya and may help the horsemen in future efforts. "We have now got the top people in the state on our side," said Houston. Houston said Anaya had repeatedly asked him to do whatever he could to avert a boycott by horsemen that would have closed down all racetracks in New Mexico and cost the state as much as \$50 million in lost taxes. Both New Mexico Racing Commission members and Anaya said they would help the horsemen any way they could in the future if he would help stop the walkout by horsemen, according to Houston. By agreeing to arbitrate the dispute—opening the horsemen to a potential loss of the disputed funds—Houston said he traded in the

threat of a boycott for generous considerations by the Governor and Racing Commission in the future. Houston alluded to "long-range planning" and future requests the horsemen may have, but would not discuss any specifics. "The money has never been as important as the symbol itself," said Houston. "It's a sign of strength," he characterized the decision to arbitrate. "We got everything we wanted in the ground rules," said Houston. Jess Burner, president of Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, also expressed satisfaction with the arbitration. "We are the ones that were originally for it," said Burner. The arbitration agreement calls for the track owners and the horsemen to each pick one arbitrator by Monday at noon. Houston said Saturday he would look into ethics of the situation to see if they would allow him to be the arbitrator for the horsemen. Burner said Sunday the racetrack owners had chosen Judge W. A. Mor-

risson of Houston as their arbitrator. The two arbitrators will choose a third arbitrator by Thursday. If they cannot agree, Judge Gerald Cole of the Second Judicial District will appoint the third arbitrator. Houston said strict legal rules of legal admissibility of evidence have been waived, but that any affidavits presented by the horsemen must be accompanied by the person who swore to them. Houston said he included the provision that the arbitrators' awards must be either zero or 100 percent of the disputed funds, so there will be no 50-50 split of the money. The arbitration agreement also states that the decision must be made by 5 p.m. on Monday, July 25. If the award is not decided by then, the horsemen will boycott the tracks, said Houston. "The strike is not off," he said. Horsemen expressed some dissatisfaction with the decision to arbitrate the dispute, but appeared ready to go along with it.

"I was some kind of hot," said horseman Dan Lucas after he heard of Houston's decision to arbitrate. Lucas said he at first thought the horsemen had been sold down the river by Houston. But after thinking about it for a while, Lucas said, he realized that it was Houston that had led the horsemen this far in the dispute and that he was not selling them out. Lucas said he still did not agree with the decision to arbitrate but believed the horsemen must stick together whether they agree with the decision or not. "I think we've got to back him (Houston) 100 percent and be behind him, win or lose, all the way," said New Mexico Horsemen's Association executive board member Bob Arnett. Arnett's statement was met with applause from the close to 150 horsemen at Saturday's meeting. When trainer Don Farris asked the horsemen for a vote of confidence for Houston, the whole room clapped heartily again.

# Downs P&Z considers apartments again

Two proposed apartment projects that have been before the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees and Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) repeatedly over the past few months were presented to P&Z again Thursday for action. A 40-unit moderate-income apartment project proposed for construction by Colorado developers on property owned by Jess Armstrong was rejected by trustees at their June 13 meeting. Developers returned to P&Z with the project after clearing up some of the problems raised at that meeting. Residents again voiced strong opposition to the apartment development, but P&Z voted to send the matter back to the trustees with a favorable recommendation. One of the problems residents found with the apartment plans formerly was high population density. Architect Carl Reinhardt reported Thursday the project will be spread over three acres, rather than 2.3

acres as originally planned. The density will drop from slightly over 17 units per acre to 13.3 units per acre. Residents also objected to the apartment complex on the grounds the village has insufficient water. This was the reason given by trustees when they voted down the project. P&Z chairman George Smith indicated that two water main breaks during the day of the trustees meeting influenced the governing body's decision. He claimed that trustee Jake Harris contends problems with the water system result from an inadequate well pump and leaks in the lines. It was also noted that two grants for water system improvements are available to the village if matching funds are found. Reinhardt reported that construction will not begin until next spring because of the delays in getting approval of plans, which gives the village some time to resolve its water problems. Resident Wayne Ward suggested the project be built elsewhere in the village. Ward owns property near the

Armstrong tract and has said he does not want the apartment project in his neighborhood. Smith commented that he believes the development will upgrade the village. "I'm interested in Ruidoso Downs looking like a nice pleasant community to live in rather than one little mess after another," he said. The commission then voted to give its approval to the project, with member Jackie Branum abstaining at the request of real estate agent Wayne Townsend. Branum owns property near the Armstrong tract and has previously voiced opposition to the apartment complex. The matter will be presented to the governing body at its July 25 meeting. A petition to annex 19.692 acres of property housing Inspiration Corporation, Mountain Top Radio and a planned low-to-moderate income apartment project also was resubmitted to P&Z Thursday. Trustees had previously approved this petition, but questions over zoning led the parties involved to begin the petition process again.

"We just wanted to make sure all of this was done perfectly right," commented Mary Rich, whose firm plans to build the apartment project. P&Z agreed to conduct a public hearing on the annexation in two weeks. The commission changed its meeting night to Wednesday at the request of police chief Chuck Robinson. The meeting room is needed Thursday evenings for municipal court, he explained. P&Z will meet the first and third Wednesdays of each month, at 7:30 p.m., through the second week in September. In other business, P&Z: —Discussed the need to establish stricter setback requirements. It was decided to obtain a model ordinance on setbacks from the municipal league. —Held a public hearing on adoption of a new zoning map and zoning designations. P&Z will meet in study session next Wednesday to further discuss the new zoning proposals, and hold another public hearing August 3.

# Compactor bids opened

A difference of almost \$53,000 separates the high and low bidders for a village trash compactor-transfer system. Environmental Systems, Albuquerque, submitted the low bid of \$128,838 for a compactor, push pit and siml transfer trailer. All the equipment the company bid on is manufactured by Peabody Gallion, which was specified in the bid specifications. The high bidder—Border Machinery Company of El Paso—also bid a Peabody Gallion system. Its bid was \$181,577 for the system, and the company guaranteed a 60 to 90 day delivery. Environmental Systems guaranteed delivery within 45 days. Stuart Truck Equipment of El Paso also bid on the system. Its quote of \$132,340 was for a Pak-Mor system. The company included a few exceptions to the specifications in its bid. A spokesman for Border Machinery who was at the bid opening Thursday questioned the low bid from Environmental Systems. There was no representative from Environmental

Systems present at the opening. The council has scheduled to award the bid at its July 26 meeting. Village purchasing agent John Cupp also opened bids for the animal control contract Thursday. The bids were \$39,000 per year on a three-year contract from D & J Service Company, owned by Jim Woodridge; \$58,345.77 per year from Humane Control, owned by Jack Miller and Fred Volquardsen; and \$52,300 per year from Animal Control Services of Ruidoso, owned by Steve Shelby. The contract, which expired July 1, was previously let out to bid, but the bids were rejected after the village attorney questioned the specifications. Former animal control officer Jack Sniadecki was to have performed the service through August, but he resigned a few weeks ago. Shelby, who did not submit a bid previously, was an assistant to Sniadecki. Humane Control and D & J Services had submitted bids for the previous bid opening. The bids will be considered at the council meeting Tuesday night.

The U.S. Open will be a head-to-head elimination slalom race down Capitan run at Sierra Blanca. Skiers will have to defeat approximately 10 other racers to advance to the final pair of racers. The race will have a purse of \$100,000 to \$150,000, depending on the amount of money raised. Alex Mercure, state secretary of Commerce and Industry, sent a letter to Carson in June committing \$20,000 of state funds up front to the race and additional cooperative advertising and promotional funds. The state will match funds raised by the private and public sectors of Ruidoso, according to Carson and others who have been planning the race. Duggan Brown of San Patricio said he has been able to raise \$12,000 from local private businesses in just two-and-a-half days, and expects to be able to raise more. "The private sector is willing to do it," said Brown. Apparently so is Sierra Blanca manager Roy Parker. Parker expressed a willingness to stage the race at earlier planning sessions in May. Carson said Friday he had talked recently to Parker. "Roy is definitely behind it," said Carson. The \$12,000 private contribution, combined with the \$25,000 Ruidoso is expected to kick in, could bring in

close to \$40,000 in matching funds from the state. This is in addition to the \$20,000 up front already promised. Other funds would come from national sponsors—such as American Bell or Coors—with whom Carson is negotiating. When asked why Ruidoso and Sierra Blanca were chosen for the U.S. Open, Carson pointed to support from the state and village, as well as a natural tie to the world's richest horse race (The All-American Futurity) already staged in Ruidoso. "Having the town behind the event is extremely important," said Carson at a previous meeting. Resorts like Vail or Aspen and the state of Colorado were not as willing to put up close to \$100,000 for the race. The \$100,000 put up by Ruidoso and New Mexico makes it easier to attract national sponsors and also ensures a permanent location for the U.S. Open, said Carson. "What I would like to see is Ruidoso as the home of the U.S. Open," said Carson. Carson made it clear that benefits to Ruidoso would not be realized in the first year. Publicity, mainly in the form of national cable television coverage, could help Ruidoso in the future, indicated Carson. USA network, a national cable television network with an audience of 18.5 million people, has already committed to broadcast 20 shows of next year's races, said Carson. Car-

son also said he is talking with one of the three major television networks that has expressed an interest in broadcasting the U.S. Open. He also pointed out that production of the shows will be controlled by Pro Ski International. He said television crews will come to Ruidoso sometime in the fall to film a number of short pieces on Ruidoso and its attractions as a year-round resort. "We can promise you that these pieces will be on the show," said Carson. Pro Ski International will also have a magazine inserted into the December issue of SKI magazine, said Carson. He promised first right of refusal to Ruidoso for races in the future, meaning Ruidoso and Sierra Blanca will be first choice for the race in following years. Duggan Brown also pointed out that raising money for the race becomes easier in future years as the race becomes more established and outside sponsors are more eager to contribute funds. "I think we're all willing to take this gamble," said LTC member JoAnn Farris. LTC member Carpenter pointed out that Aspen and Vail were smaller towns than Ruidoso 20 years ago, and grew because of farsighted planning of the type that is leading to the U.S. Open.

# Downs adopts traffic ordinances

Anyone caught violating a municipal traffic ordinance in Ruidoso Downs as of July 19 will be charged an additional \$5, under ordinances adopted by the governing body in a special meeting Thursday. State statutes passed by the 1983 Legislature require municipalities to adopt the new ordinances, with the additional revenue collected to go toward constructing, operating and maintaining the municipal jail or costs of housing municipal prisoners in the county jail. Thursday was the deadline for

municipalities to adopt the ordinances to avoid being subject to a fine, Mayor J. C. Day reported. Ordinance 83-9 provides for the imposition of an additional \$5 to the regular penalty assessment fee charged traffic violators. Ordinance 83-10 provides for the imposition of a \$5 corrections fee for any persons convicted in municipal court of violating a traffic ordinance. Trustees Thursday also discussed the need to appoint an alternate municipal judge to fill in for judge Fred Bernard during absences. Day said Paula Smith is interested in the position, but the mayor wants to in-

crease the stipend paid an alternate judge for court appearances. The current ordinance stipulates that the alternate judge will receive \$10 per court date from the village, up to 30 appearances. After 30 absences, the municipal judge must pay the alternate \$10 from his own salary. Day suggested the ordinance be changed to read that the alternate receive \$25 per court appearance; and after only 12 absences, that the alternate's stipend be made from the municipal judge's salary. Day said an amended ordinance would be drawn up for presentation at the next regular trustees meeting.

# Trainer George H. Cospers Jr. passes away

George H. Cospers, Jr., 67, a pioneer trainer in the Southwest and one of the most successful, passed away in Ruidoso on Friday. Cospers began his racing career in the 1940s on the bush track circuit in Arizona and New Mexico. He was at Ruidoso Downs Race Track when the mountain track first opened for business in 1947, and raced at Ruidoso each year since then. Cospers also campaigned each year at Sunland Park and the New Mexico State Fair. He leaves an enormous reputation, and was often described

as "the most respected trainer in the Southwest." The long list of outstanding horses trained by Cospers includes Master Salls, who was named Thoroughbred Horse-Of-The-Meet, Best Sprinter, Best Router and Best Handicap Horse of the '75 Ruidoso season. Cospers also trained Floating Star, Ruidoso's Thoroughbred Horse-Of-The-Meet and Best Sprinter in 1973. Other standouts include Natural Flow, Bob's Slave, Tarjeta and Chladora. Two prominent Ruidoso Downs

trainers Cliff Lambert and J. Doyal Roberts, are sons-in-law of Cospers. His grandsons include the successful Southwest rider Casey Lambert, trainer Cliff Lambert, Jr., and Cody Lambert, a nationally prominent bronc rider. Cospers is also survived by his wife, Helen Cospers; and by three daughters, Mrs. Glenna Lambert, Mrs. Doris Roberts and Mrs. Dot Wilson. Services will be Monday at 2 p.m. at the First Christian Church of Ruidoso.

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## Deadline for hunter classes nears

SANTA FE — Summer has arrived, and big game seasons are fast approaching, as is the September 30 deadline for enrolling in hunter training classes prior to fall hunting, said John Davis, hunter training coordinator for the Department of Game and Fish. The hunter training course is required of all youths under 18 years of age before they can apply for or purchase a license to hunt with a firearm in New Mexico, Davis said. "The September 30 deadline allows us some leeway in scheduling and completing classes prior to the big game seasons. Prospective students who wait until the last minute to

enroll face the possibility of not being able to hunt this fall. Enrolling now will ensure the youngster of having his certificate by hunting season, assuming he completes the course satisfactorily," Davis said.

Some hunter training classes are currently under way; others will be scheduled statewide as need arises, probably into the fall's big game season.

Classes are available when an instructor has enough students signed up at a time when the instructor can

teach—most often at night since most of the instructors are volunteers who work during the day. Classes are generally limited to 25 to 30 students.

The hunter safety course is designed to familiarize students with firearms safety through hands-on training and discussion of proper care and use of firearms. They are provided with workbooks, and classes are often centered around a variety of instructional films.

"Familiarity with your firearm—how to handle and care for it—plays a vital role in preventing accidents," Davis said.

He said the course also includes the history, traditions and ethics of hunting, the hunter and conservation, ammunition, fundamentals of shooting, muzzleloading, safe bow hunting, hunters' responsibilities, first aid and survival afield.

Well, it won't be too long until National Football League (NFL) teams start knocking helmets in pre-season games.

That probably means more interest in the pro version of the sport in the Ruidoso area.

Sure the new United States Football League (USFL) is culminating a four-month season with its championship game this weekend. But really, hardly anybody in Ruidoso has shown an interest in the new loop.

"Ah, I just haven't paid much attention to the USFL," said News reporter David Sheppard, who used to live in Boulder, Colorado. "I've followed the Broncos (of the NFL) more than I have the Denver Gold. I guess it's because the new league plays in the spring, and we get enough football the rest of the year."

Ruidoso High School offensive line and head junior varsity coach Dr. Jim Ramsey also admits he hasn't paid much attention to the USFL.

"I slept through one of their games," he said. "However, I can't really get into television football as much as watching it live from the sidelines."

"That's really nothing against the USFL, though. Still, it will probably be awhile before it equals the NFL in quality."

Mountain Ski Shop owner Ronnie Taylor, a former Little League football and baseball coach, also hasn't paid much attention to the new league.

"I just can't get into it," he remarked. "I guess it's because it's a new league, and I don't know much about the teams. I don't think I've watched more than a few downs in six or eight games. I'm more into the NFL. I'm a Pittsburgh and Miami fan."

"Most of the people I know haven't paid much attention to the USFL either. In fact, my brother told me he hasn't watched a down of USFL football this spring."

Of course, a large number of the

people in this area root for the NFL's Dallas Cowboys and several Texas college teams. Those teams all play in the fall, of course, and most people still think of football as a fall sport.

"I'm a big Dallas fan," said Ricardo Garcia, a Ruidoso High School basketball player and former White Mountain Middle School football player. "I really haven't been able to get interested in the USFL this year because it's hard to know about any of the players. With Dallas, you know all about players like Danny White and Tony Dorsett."

"It might take a couple of years for the USFL to get more fans. They'll probably do better then. Also, it's harder to get interested in football played in the spring."

I've watched several USFL games this season, and I've had a hard time following the games from beginning to end. I've generally watched major league baseball more the past few months.

From what I've seen and read, the USFL is still far behind the NFL in the quality of play. That's to be expected, because it's only in its first year.

However, the new league is most deficient in offensive skills, particularly in the passing game. Its overall play is spotty at best. Offensive football is usually what draws the fans to the stadium and the television set.

The USFL's top teams—like Philadelphia, Chicago and Michigan—haven't drawn well.

These teams are in areas which already have established NFL franchises, and the older league plays a much better brand of football.

Ruidoso will probably always be a pro-NFL area. Most of the sports fans in this area have developed followings for NFL teams, and have other interests than football in the spring.

Yes, it appears that local television viewers will be watching a lot more football in the fall than they are now.

# Jimenez second girl named to All-Stars

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# Local female lifeguards making big strides

The "fairer" sex is making strides in yet another male-dominated field. The lifeguard field until recently has usually been thought of as a man's job. The image most people had of a lifeguard was that of a big man over six feet tall who stood out in a crowd.

But that image is beginning to change now.

Five of the seven lifeguards at the Ruidoso Municipal Pool are women, and they enjoy their jobs.

"It's really almost the other way around now," said pool manager Ellen Bizzell, when asked if women were making inroads into the lifeguard field. "It's not really male-dominated anymore, except maybe in some of the private clubs."

Besides Bizzell, other women who work as lifeguards at the municipal pool are Laura Trapp, Robin Rhodes, Mishawn Hendricks and Debbie Jo Almager. They work different days of the week, alternating duties along with the two male lifeguards.

Bizzell has worked as a lifeguard at the pool for seven years. She's a junior at the University of New Mexico (UNM) in Albuquerque and wants to go into health education.

She makes sure all the work at the pool is done, including cashier and lifeguard work.

In order to become a certified lifeguard, a person must pass a 20-hour life saving course. The potential lifeguards learn basic safety skills and, different holds in rescuing people.

Has Bizzell ever had to rescue anybody?

"Once I had to rescue two brothers," she answered. "A little boy jumped off the low diving board and landed on his older brother in the water. They both panicked, and I had to rescue them."

Rhodes, who graduated from Ruidoso High School this past spring, has been connected with swimming

most of her life. This is her second year at the pool.

"I've always liked swimming," she said. "I swam a lot back in Texas before we moved here. I was almost ready for competitive swimming when we moved here when I was in the eighth grade."

What does she like best about being a lifeguard?

"I get along with most of the people and it also allows me to keep in shape. I work out about one quarter mile every day."

The duties for Rhodes and the other lifeguards include standing guard over the pool, making sure there is not too much horseplay around it and helping out in the cashier's office.

Trapp is one of the most recent additions to the lifeguard corps at the pool.

She passed her lifeguard test this year, and has one more year at Ruidoso High School. Trapp is an outstanding tennis and volleyball player for the Warriors.

"I've always liked to swim," Trapp said. "I started here because I thought it would be a lot of fun. I swam some in Dallas (where she used to live). We had a neighborhood team, but it wasn't really very good. It was more of a social thing."

Trapp also enjoys working with people.

"I really like people," she said. "I

enjoy working with kids a lot."

How would a small woman lifeguard be able to rescue a large man, particularly if that man was in danger of drowning?

"There isn't really any problem," Trapp answered. "People are a lot

lighter in the water, and we're trained to handle the situation."

With the good job the women lifeguards are doing at the Ruidoso Municipal Pool, you can eliminate another sex stereotype.

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# Hospital has new mobile mammographic unit in use

With the new mobile mammographic unit, doctors at the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital expect to improve their fight against the number one cancer killer in women: breast cancer.

The \$15,000 breast x-ray unit, which was recently purchased by the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary (Pink Ladies), will allow local doctors to examine potentially cancerous women instead of referring them to hospitals in Roswell, Alamogordo or other larger cities. X-ray technician Stephen Hedval said the hospital has been referring close to 30 patients a week to other hospitals for mammograms.

"It's going to save our population a lot of time and energy," said gynecologist William Harrison. "It's something that's been needed in this community for a long time."

Harrison said the population in this area has a higher risk of breast cancer than many. High socioeconomic status is a factor that increases the risk of breast cancer, said Harrison. He also mentioned family history of cancer; never having born a child; first pregnancy after 30; early menarche; late onset of menopause; and advancing age as other factors increasing chances of cancer.

Harrison said 3.6 percent of the women in America suffer breast cancer.

Advancing age is the biggest determinant of cancer risk, according to radiologist Stephen Crowley. The risk begins to climb around age 40 and jumps significantly after 50, said Crowley.

That is why the American Cancer Society recommends yearly mammograms for women after the age of 50 and a baseline mammogram for

women sometime between the ages of 35 and 40.

Harrison also recommends monthly breast self-examinations for lumps during the week after the menstrual period, and an annual physical examination.

The American Cancer Society does not recommend mammograms for women under the age of 40 unless symptoms such as a lump, soreness, bleeding or nipple discharge occur.

Younger women have a much smaller risk of breast cancer and are also more susceptible to radiation from x-rays that may cause cancer, states an American Cancer Society pamphlet.

During 1978 and 1977 numerous reports about the cancer-inducing risks of mammography were published in the media. Since large doses of radiation have been correlated with increases in breast cancer, opponents of mammography argued that even the small amounts of radiation received from mammograms could be dangerous.

The American Cancer Society (ACS) does acknowledge there is some evidence for the existence of a breast cancer risk from low doses of radiation, but states the relationship of dose to risk at these levels is complex and not completely documented.

However, ACS still endorses mammography as a valuable tool in the early detection of breast cancer. The earlier breast cancer is detected, the better are the chances of survival, said Crowley.

"By doing mammography, you catch these things (cancerous lesions) smaller," said Crowley. The smaller the lesion, the better chance that the cancer has not spread out of the breast, and the better are survival rates.

"It is imperative to avoid needless cancer deaths due to delayed diagnosis and unreasonable fear of mammography," states the ACS pamphlet.

The new mammographic unit at the hospital offers both a very low dose of radiation and a sharp image, said Crowley.


"It's state of the art as far as radiation exposure," said radiology department supervisor Joe Nijera, who explained that the faster film-screen combination allows much shorter exposures while producing a clear image.

Soft tissue x-rays, however, are different and more difficult to read than bone x-rays, said Crowley. Crowley has had training in soft tissue x-rays. Using mammography, Crowley can often detect tumors too small to find by touch, and can also tell the difference between malignant and benign tumors in most cases.

The local doctors, however, will not be the ones performing the mammograms. X-ray technicians Francine Bennett Hedval and Judy Reich are performing the tests upon doctors' recommendations.

"Quite a few of the women were concerned that it would not be a woman doing the mammogram," said Francine Hedval. She said the women were relieved to find out that either her or Reich actually administer the mammograms.

"It's another example of how we're trying to keep up with the newest technology," said hospital administrator Ken Moore.

Happy Birthday To Gerald and Geraldine Tully

"I Never Let'em Pitch."

This will reach you on the eve of the birthday of Gerald and Geraldine Tully. Born July Twelve, 1903, at Fort Stanton to James V. Tully and the former Ora Gilmore.

I have known these well-beloved twins for fifty eight of those eighty years. The first person I met when we came here was Mr. James V. Tully down at his store and post office which used to stand by the old highway just north of the Hat T Ranch. Brothers, Mark, Joe, and Lynn and I would often walk down to the Tully Store; and Mr. Tully would treat us to soda pop and candy. Here we met Geraldine, who most of the time ran the post office.

Often we would walk down the old road through the Prospero Gonzales place and by the Tully Corrals and house, and then across to the store. Near the corrals was where I first met Gerald.

I had heard stories of how horses were broken on the open range with the help of quirt and spur, the idea being to "break" the horse of the habit of pitching.

When Mr. Tully told me one day at the store that his boy, Gerald, was going to break a horse, I went over to the corrals. There was Gerald patiently working the horse, leading him with a halter.

I asked Gerald if the horse would pitch very much when he got on, and Gerald grinned and said,

"I never let'em pitch." He then went on to explain that if you bring the horse along slowly, giving him a chance to understand what he is expected to do, and keep him from pitching, that he would not get in the habit.

This made sense to me, and I saw this principle in action many times after.

### Still Going Strong At The Age of Eighty

As his eightieth birthday approaches, Gerald has won several buckles and a new saddle in the roping arena, in continuing a remarkable career which began when he was about three or four years old.

It is a rare accomplishment to go to the very top in the roping game as Gerald has done, yet he has topped everything he has ever done in the arena in his youth, by remaining a star in this field — with the help of his son, Gerry, a chip off the old block — long after other ropers have hung up the lariat at half Gerald's age.

### A True Horseman

It has always seemed to me that Gerald's horses try their very best for him, that they seem to feel that they are part of the man-and-horse team. Gerald used to stop in the middle of a roping match in the old days, and unloosen the cinches and let his horse catch up on his wind and rest. He works on the principle that a horse will respond to good treatment. All through the years, there has been a bond of respect and trust between Gerald and his horses.

It has crossed my mind often that part of Gerald's accuracy with a rope is his life among the cedars and pinons. Roping steers or calves on the range, you have just one throw and must make it good. I have seen him throw his rope like a sharp-shooter, catching a steer around the horns as he ran between two Cedar trees.

### A Man of Dedication

A key to Gerald's success as a roper is that he is fully dedicated — devoted to his ranch, his family and friends.

In all things Gerald is sustained by the devotion of his charming wife, Wynema, and his children.

One of the keys to his remarkable durability in the roping arena is that he is an athlete — always staying in perfect condition by obeying the rules of health and clean living.

### Their Parents

No story of Gerald and Geraldine would be complete without a mention of their parents. Mrs. Ora Tully was a pioneer community leader, having been one of the founders of Saint Anne Episcopal Church. The rose hedge she planted still blooms brightly along the stone wall of the little church.

The first Episcopal service we attended was in the Tully home, with a Father Stanley in charge of services. One year I was working for Mr. Tully picking apples. I was living at the house for a while by myself, and every evening I would take groceries home from the store. Come the end of the week, me being a terribly slow apple picker, it turned out I owed Mr. Tully.

"Oh, well," he said, "you will need some money for the rodeo."

And he handed me three dollars. That was a lot of money in the twenties. Later I asked Mr. Tully about the balance I owed and he told me to "forget it."

Later on I helped Mr. Tully and Murray Morgan brand some calves across from the store. Those husky calves threw me sprawling, but Mr. Tully told me I was doing great and to "Stay with 'em," that I would be a "Western Boy" some day.

We congratulate Gerald and Geraldine (Mrs. Murray Morgan) on reaching this milestone on life's pathway in such youthful condition, and we wish them eighty more and all God's blessings.

## Assault suspect held

A Texas man still was being held in the Lincoln County Jail Monday morning in lieu of \$5,000 bond set on a charge of aggravated assault on a police officer early Tuesday morning.

Darryle Baker, 19, of Elmendorf, Texas, was arrested by Ruidoso police at 1:44 a.m. Tuesday after he allegedly tried to run over Ruidoso policeman John Layher with his pickup truck.

## Inside the Capitol

by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE**—It's easy to say that teachers ought to be paid on the basis of merit.

So should everybody.

We all ought to get more pay if we deliver more, less if we deliver less.

But once you've said that what do you have? Nothing but a sweeping, Ronald Reagan-type generality.

Schoolteachers insist that in their case at least you then have to go on and ask some questions, all of them very difficult to answer:

—What is good teaching? How do you define it? How do you recognize it? How do you measure it?

—Who decides which teachers are better than which other teachers and therefore deserve more pay?

—And while you're mulling on the answers to those, you might want also to consider these:

—How about merit pay for school administrators, instead of those automatic annual raises some of them have become accustomed to?

—How about a grading system for the performance of school board members, who are also responsible for some of the low state of America education?

Fair is fair, some uppity teachers say. If you're going to point at us, why not talk about all those involved in the education process, including the ordinary citizen on the street who influences the process as well?

Where are we on all this merit pay in New Mexico?

We've been coming at it from the other direction.

Instead of rewarding the good teachers, we have been trying to at least weed out the bad ones. To do that, we are developing some testing for those who enter university courses for teachers and for those who complete them, to be sure they have some basic grasp of the subject matter they may be asked to communicate.

Even that idea has met with strong resistance, particularly from some of the deans of education schools in our universities, who see this as a threat

to their specific baronies. (To heck with what future teachers know," they seem to say. "We need lots of students in our division or our budget will get cut.")

But classroom teachers may go overboard some when they keep pounding that point about the impossibility of determining which teachers are good and which are bad.

"There are no objective standards," they say — which is probably true.

But there are no objective standards for most of the decisions humans make every day which have to do with high or low quality.

Nobody can say with objective assurance exactly why a Rembrandt is a better painting than one turned out from a paint-by-numbers kit. We do, however, rest content in the commonly accepted belief that we can discern the difference.

Besides, teachers often contradict themselves on this point. Both those who follow Al Shanker, head of the American Federation of Teachers, and those from the National Education Association at least imply that if they, the teachers, have a part in deciding which are superior instructors and which are not, they may go along with the idea of merit pay.

If they can tell who's good and who's bad, there are at least some standards, no matter how subjective.

The AFT may itself be split on this idea, as the reception they gave President Reagan implied. But they have appeared a little more willing to accept the bare beginnings of the idea of merit pay than have the bosses at the NEA.

In New Mexico, both groups would be wise to rush to reserve their posts on the "merit pay committee." Sure as you're born, there'll be one here early in 1984.

When a topic heats up like this one has, with politicians from both major parties climbing all over it, New Mexico's lawmakers will not be far behind.

## Editorial

We tip our hat to Attorney General Paul Bardacke and Governor Toney Anaya for their diligent efforts to avert a termination of horse racing activities in the state of New Mexico.

At this writing, it appears those efforts have borne fruit. Horsemen and racetrack owners have agreed to arbitrate their dispute over money from uncashed pari-mutuel tickets. This agreement has at worst postponed a horsemen's strike for two weeks; and at best will prevent it from ever happening.

Bardacke did not win friends among the horsemen July 1. He recommended the state Racing Commission meeting that many had traveled a long way to attend be adjourned after a very few minutes. Afterward, Bardacke stuck his head into the room where Horsemen's Association attorney Les Houston was addressing the horsemen.

"I'm chastising you but I'm defending you," Houston told the attorney general. That statement was a subtle compliment to the state official, whose action in cutting short the meeting avoided a public bloodletting between the horsemen and racetrack owners.

Besides the racetracks and the horsemen, those who stand to lose the most if horse racing stops are the businesses in the communities nearest the tracks.

We have had no one to look out for our interest in this matter except the state officials, and they have come through admirably.—TP

## On the Village Beat

Politicians and the people who cover them.

Both play important parts in what we call "the system," and I have some observations based on recent contact with members of these two estates.

Six times a week, our office receives the Santa Fe-based column, "Inside the Capitol," by Fred McCaffrey. We choose two of those columns and run them elsewhere on this page.

But I had never met Mr. McCaffrey, so I made it a point to look him up when I was in Santa Fe for a state Racing Commission meeting.

He was at the same meeting, and when I asked if he could spare a few minutes later that day to talk, he suggested lunch at the Bull Ring. I agreed gladly—this was to be my first visit to that well-known legislators' watering hole.

My wife and my mother had accompanied me to Santa Fe and were to make up the rest of our party for lunch. The three of us made the short walk across the parking lot from the capitol building to the Bull Ring.

We were met by McCaffrey and shown to a table by an employee. McCaffrey is "Fred" to all the workers there. The waiter left a metal pitcher on the table.

Fred let us in on a trade secret after we were seated.

"It's iced tea," he said, gesturing at his cocktail glass. "I drink it in a glass like this so people will think it's Wild Turkey. They tell me things and think I won't remember the next morning. But I remember all of it."

At this point, I should mention that I am relying on my own recall of our conversation. I had it in mind to do a column from our meeting, but it would have taken from the ambience to scribble in my notebook.

We talked of many things, but the thing that sticks in my mind is Fred's appraisal of himself and the role he plays in the system through "Inside the Capitol."

He sees himself, he told us, as an "unreconstructed Romantic"—a person who still believes that the world can be changed for the better through his efforts.

Fred is proud of the fact that the combined circulation of the daily and weekly newspapers that carry his column is greater than the combined circulation of the two daily newspapers in Albuquerque, which is around 175,000.

I think he chose that comparison because it pains him that the Albuquerque papers don't carry his column, but I didn't ask about that.

Because so many people do read Inside the Capitol, though, "You can

make a difference."

Thinking out loud, I wondered whether Fred hopes people would contact their elected officials to make known their concern about the issues he reports on.

He acknowledged that is exactly what he hopes people do. One such issue McCaffrey has been writing a lot about is the situation at the state penitentiary. He thinks the pen is ripe for another riot.

That is a sobering thought. But that bright summer day on the patio of the Bull Ring, in Fred McCaffrey's charming company, was one of those rare times when worldly cares are put aside for a little while.

I have found myself from time to time exhorting people to contact their elected officials about one thing or another, and it was encouraging to hear Congressman Joe Skeen say the other night that he listens to his constituents.

At Thursday's town hall meeting, Skeen said his office receives about 1,000 pieces of mail per month, and tries to respond to them all. He and his staff want to know if a constituent does not get a response, he said.

He also stated that if a person indicates an interest in a particular issue, his office will see that that person is kept "tracked"—notified of any significant action on that issue.

Skeen also asked that constituents fill out the surveys his office sends them—though he acknowledged the questions are very broad in nature—and suggested that people check the boxes by subjects they want to be informed on. His staff makes sure he sees some of the survey forms, he said—they put them on his desk.

It is clear that Joe Skeen is a consummate politician. His large, deep-voiced presence seems to fill a room when he bulls his way in, and he "didn't miss a hand" at our office.

But at the town meeting, Skeen proved in his handling of questions from the audience that he has a thorough grasp of the issues to back up his "good ole' boy" style. I was very impressed.

Fred McCaffrey and Joe Skeen obviously enjoy their work. McCaffrey called it "doing what I love to do—shoot my mouth off, and getting paid for it."

Skeen seems to thrive on the number, variety and intricacy of the issues he deals with, and he expressed a complete willingness to share what he and his staff learn.

"One thing about Congress," he said, "we can give you more information than you'll ever need."

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
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
