Fort Stanton employees told jobs with state are secure

Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School employees got to hear firsthand Friday night that the state does not intend to rob them of their jobs when it changes the use of the Fort Stanton facility. State Health and Environment Department Secretary Robert McNeill and deputy secretary Joe Johnson were at Fort Stanton to address the employees at their annual awards banquet.

McNeill began by acknowledging that he knows "not everyone is 100 percent behind plans" to close Fort Stanton as a facility for the developmentally disabled. But the secretary was received with applause after announcing "the number one priority" in his department is to raise the salary levels of state hospital workers.

The focus of his brief talk, in fact, was on efforts to "bring greater salary equity to state employees," and he singled out state hospital workers as one of the most underpaid groups. McNeill said he plans to propose that positions be upgraded through reclassification and that a "career ladder" be established to provide greater opportunity for job advancement.

But McNeill also touched upon the

topic of most concern to the Fort Stanton workers—the impending change of use of the facility. January 1, 1985, has been set as a target date for Fort Stanton to discontinue serving the developmentally disabled. Although an alternate use has not been decided upon yet, alcohol rehabilitation and corrections are two areas under consideration.

"This administration... will strongly support the continued utilization of this facility and the continued employment" of its staff, McNeill pledged.

"I assure you we in no way will take any action that will detract from the economic base of Lincoln County," he added.

Secretary McNeill reported he still intends to return to the area soon to conduct a community forum on possible alternate uses for the Fort Stanton facility. And he apologized to the audience for not having visited Fort Stanton earlier in his administration.

Deputy secretary Joe Johnson directed his remarks to the issue of the impending changeover, reassuring employees they have done a good job and urging their support for what lies ahead.

"We want to take the developmentally disabled client out of the institu-

tion and place him in the community," Johnson explained. "That signals to society that no longer will we look at a developmentally disabled client as a person that can't make it in the real world."

He referred to this course of action as "the cornerstone of what we're trying to do."

"We're not trying to say there has not been a job well done here," he noted, assuring employees they have done a good job in what Johnson believes is "one of the most hard and difficult assignments to take."

But the deputy secretary also issued what could be construed as a warning.

"If you don't feel that this mission is worthwhile, maybe you should consider you are in the wrong business," he stated.

"I challenge you to help us undertake this change."

Johnson reminded the group that Fort Stanton formerly housed a tuberculosis clinic and was successfully transformed into a hospital and school for developmentally disabled.

"We're simply going to the next phase," he said.

"We will work 100 percent to see the avenue we take will be successful," concluded Johnson.

Third arbitrator named

Horsemen, racetracks to present cases here

Unable to agree on a third arbitrator in their dispute over unclaimed pari-mutuel tickets (out-tickets), horsemen and racetrack owners left it to District Judge Gerald Cole to select Albuquerque attorney Paul Robinson for the pivotal position.

Robinson will join another Albuquerque attorney, Les Houston, and a former judge, A. W. Morusund, on the arbitration panel that will decide who shall receive the more than \$200,000 in disputed out-tickets.

It is generally agreed that Houston and Morusund, selected by the horsemen and track owners respec-

tively, are partial to the sides that selected them. Most people involved believe Robinson's vote will decide the issue.

Robinson has been an attorney for 30 years, said Cole. He is very highly respected as a lawyer in the Duke City and was one of five persons recently nominated for a federal judgeship, Cole explained. He also has experience in arbitration, noted the judge who selected him.

"He's got all the credentials," said Cole.

Lawyers for the horsemen and the racetracks will present their cases to the arbitration panel in Ruidoso Wednesday and Thursday. Arbitrator Houston will present the case for the

horsemen, who claim the racetracks have reneged on a 1981 deal to contribute 100 percent of one season's out-tickets to the next year's purse structure.

Different lawyers will present the case for each racetrack, said Ruidoso-Sunland Incorporated general manager Donald Smith. Attorney Charles Cole of Roswell will argue Ruidoso-Sunland's case.

Arbitration, by agreement of horsemen and track owners, will result in one party or the other receiving all the money. If the dispute is not settled by Monday, July 25, the horsemen say they will not enter horses in any New Mexico races except paid-up stakes until it is resolved.

The auditorium at Ruidoso village hall was originally reserved for Tuesday and Wednesday, but Houston said he hoped it would also be available Thursday.

Arbitration will begin at 9 a.m. Wednesday. The sessions will be open to the public.

Hope held out for judgeship

The Lincoln County Bar Association has not given up its fight for an additional district judge to serve Lincoln and Otero Counties, despite the fact that a bill to establish such a position was vetoed by Governor Toney Anaya in April.

Bar Association president Mel O'Reilly said area lawyers are scheduled to present their case to the New Mexico Judicial Council in August. The council makes recommendations to the Legislature regarding the state's courts. Previous requests for the additional 12th District judgeship have been denied a favorable recommendation by the council.

But O'Reilly believes the Judicial Council has been furnished inaccurate reports of the caseload in Lin-

coln County. According to the Ruidoso attorney, the number of case filings in the 12th District has increased, but records of the court administrator in Albuquerque reflect a decline in the number of filings.

The Lincoln County Bar Association requested but was denied a meeting with the court administrator to discuss the discrepancy, O'Reilly said. But the attorneys will meet in Ruidoso next week to formulate "a list of the unique features we believe justify the appointment of an additional judge for the 12th District," noted O'Reilly.

Some of those features include the state's fifth highest number of cases per judge in Otero and Lincoln counties, and the extensive travel distance required between the courthouses in Alamogordo and Carrizozo. Currently the two judges serving Otero and Lincoln Counties both reside in

Alamogordo. The list will be presented to the Judicial Council in August, O'Reilly said.

But unless Governor Anaya's support is gained, action cannot be taken on the new judgeship position until 1985. The 1984 session of the Legislature will deal only with issues introduced by special message of the governor.

O'Reilly said the Lincoln County Bar Association hopes to persuade the governor to include this request on the agenda for that session. But Anaya vetoed a bill passed by this year's Legislature that would have established a new district judge position for Lincoln County. Anaya indicated in his veto message that the position should not be approved because it was not recommended by the Judicial Council.

P&Z chairman Masters notes 'little town vs. growth' conflict

Greg Masters believes communication may be the most important thing in his new position as chairman of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z). He thinks communication with fellow commission members, village councilmen and those seeking rulings will play a major role in the direction of P&Z.

During his time on P&Z, Masters said, people coming before the commission have generally held two distinct opinions. He said there are those who wish to see Ruidoso remain a quiet, sleepy little town, and those who are only concerned with growth.

Time and again people representing the two different points of view clash at P&Z meetings. Both are representative of the community and he feels he must incorporate portions of both in P&Z rulings.

"If you don't do what the community wants, you're not doing your job, I feel," said Masters.

Masters was named interim chairman after John Schuller resigned. He comes up for reelection in August.

Greg is hopeful he will be chosen to continue in the post of chairman.

"I hope they keep me because I care," said Masters.

While he wants to accept input from all voices in the community, he does have his own opinions about the growth of Ruidoso. Ruidoso is a tourist, vacation-oriented town and he wants it to stay that way.

Masters would like "to maintain the aesthetic qualities of Ruidoso." He believes the clean air, clean water

and abundance of trees bring people to Ruidoso and should be preserved.

In order to have any say in the future of Ruidoso, Masters feels it will be important "to get all the kinks out of the P&Z-oriented ordinances." He would like to see the laws become "livable, consistent, enforceable, fair and just, and flexible."

He pointed specifically to the recently passed zoning and sign ordinances, labeling them stopgap measures. During his first official meeting as P&Z chairman, the commission sent five recommended sign ordinance amendments for consideration by the village council.

He believes many of these will not be passed, but he is not concerned. As laymen in the planning and legal fields, P&Z members often will not know all the proper methods of writing the measures. Other times the council will disagree with the recommendations.

Masters believes his job is to let the village council and village attorney know the intent of the commission—the concept behind the recommendation. If there is good rapport between the commission and the council, Masters believes, many of the measures or their intent will become law.

"If we can all get along, it would really be easy," said Masters. It is largely because he and the rest of the commission members are lay people that Masters feels they cannot always provide legally proper recommendations.

Masters said a professional planner would be "an asset to the community" but that he has learned

during his time on the commission to understand the monetary constraints on the village. At this point he believes a full-time planner will have to wait, although he suggested the idea of a planner on retainer for part-time consultations.

A new comprehensive plan for Ruidoso will also have to wait due to lack of money. Masters, however, sees the \$30,000 set aside by the village council for a professional traffic study as a step in the right direction for one of Ruidoso's worst problems.

Masters said two or three planning firms have been interviewed for the study and one has been tentatively selected. Ruidoso will have to wait for approval of its budget by the state Department of Finance and Administration before making a final decision.

He said the study may begin in August or September, but expressed concern about doing the study in a low traffic season.

As chairman, Masters does not have a vote except to break a tie. He said it frustrates him occasionally, but he has his say by making recommendations to commission members.

"I let P&Z members know the consequences and possible consequences of every action they take," said Masters. "If I don't have a stand I'll let them vote, the way they want to. But if I feel strongly, I'll bend their ears."

Masters arrives at his opinions by doing background work before the commission workshops and official meetings. He said he spends some

time each day attending to P&Z matters, and visits the planning and zoning office an average of three times a week.

He would like to spend more time in enforcement officer Paul Davis' office, but cannot afford to take too much time away from his job as a Realtor at Sierra Development Company.

The ever-constraining money problems also restrict Davis and field enforcement officer Ollie Cuddy from keeping as close a tab on building as

Masters would like to see. Masters pointed out that there is very little checking on builders to make sure they are doing what they said they would.

Masters does believe the commission, the enforcement officers and the building inspector have been doing a better job controlling the type of construction going on in Ruidoso.

He believes the tougher stance P&Z has been taking on lot line variances will make people build their houses according to the zoning laws. Hopeful-

ly by 1986 P&Z will not be dealing with three-year-old problems as they are doing now, said Masters.

He also hopes to see P&Z exert better control over mobile homes, which do not need building permits or certified plot plans to be placed on a piece of property.

"We're just a little old town with big town problems," summarized Masters.

He plans to communicate those problems and their solutions to the right people.

Paula Smith a judge with opinions

The first female municipal judge in the history of Ruidoso Downs took the oath of office Thursday.

Paula Smith was appointed as an alternate judge for Ruidoso Downs recently.

She will hear cases on Tuesday and Thursday nights if Municipal Judge Fred Bernard is sick or absent, and if he ever resigns she will take over while a new judge is sought.

Smith is presently a teller at Ruidoso State Bank, north branch. She worked in law enforcement for four years, and her husband Fred is a police officer.

She holds a law enforcement degree from Eastern New Mexico University and is originally from Clovis. She has lived in Ruidoso Downs for one-and-a-half years, but her family has owned land there for 30 years.

Much of her job will consist of signing warrants and transport papers for prisoners, she said, because the

municipal judge works at the racetrack and is unavailable many times.

Smith said she thinks a woman judge in the courtroom will take everybody by surprise.

"People won't know how to react, but they might be quieter and more reserved," she predicted.

She hopes to be fair and impartial as a judge, she said.

Smith explained she wanted the job of alternate judge because she wanted "to see justice done." Also there had never been a female judge, and she wanted to see a female in the position.

"They had an opening and they needed someone who knew about law," she pointed out.

Smith said since she is new in town, she can be more impartial than someone who has grown up in Ruidoso Downs.

"I can do the job where someone locally couldn't," she noted.

Her aspirations for further judgeships include possibly running

for municipal judge when the position opens up again.

"I hope to further my career along these lines," Smith explained.

She plans to go to as many judge schools as possible and keep up to date on the profession.

She would like to see the village of Ruidoso Downs upgrade its standards, especially in the areas of streets, housing, employment and living conditions, she said.

"I want to see Ruidoso Downs grow, but grow in a positive way," Smith explained.

If she ever has the position of municipal judge, she said, she would like to help clean up the town.

"I think it can be done, but it will be a slow process to come up with the funds," she pointed out.

She said she backs the mayor and the Ruidoso Downs trustees in their efforts to clean up the town.

About her new responsibilities, Smith said, "I'm going to give it a good old try."

Fill Mackis Cup runneth over again in Sierra Blanca 'Cap

FILL MACKIS CUP staged his fourth stakes try of the summer in Sunday's \$10,200 Sierra Blanca Handicap at Ruidoso Downs and came through with a sparkling nose victory.

The five-year-old gelding wasn't bothered by the muddy conditions and nailed the front-running Piedmont Pete on the last jump, clocking the six and one half furlongs in a surprising 1:19 4-5 seconds. That equaled the seasonal record set by Slalom on July 7.

Fill Mackis Cup picked up a victory purse of \$6,120, which pushed his '83 earnings up to \$14,740 and kept him in the ballpark, so far as getting within range of his impressive '82 earnings total of \$46,663.

Turned loose at \$3.30-1 odds in the six-horse field, Fill Mackis Cup returned generous mutual payoffs of \$8.60, \$4.60, \$2.40. He was ridden by O.A. Martinez, Jr. for Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas. The impost was 118 pounds.

Fill Mackis Cup is trained by William F. Leach.

In the gelding's three previous stakes spins of the meeting, he came in third in the Inaugural Handicap, the Lincoln County Handicap and the Governor's Handicap. Squeezed bet-

ween those efforts were back-to-back wins (both times as a heavy favorite) in allowance company.

Oddly enough, Fill Mackis Cup faced essentially the same competition in those previous handicap outings: Curribot (who won the Inaugural and the Governor's Handicap), and Glover D. (who won the Lincoln County).

In Sunday's duel, Piedmont Pete — a newcomer to Ruidoso stakes circles — got off to a flying start as a 5-2 shot. The seven-year-old, in with Steve Asmussen at 116 pounds, held a two-length lead down the backstretch. Piedmont Pete fought his heart out all the way, barely losing to Fill Mackis Cup on the last jump.

Fill Mackis Cup had to rally out of last place, and even took a wide turn going into the stretch.

Piedmont Pete, owned by Dr. Richard Stansberry of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, collected \$2,244 for second and refunded mutual prices of \$4, \$2.60. Curribot (another 5-2 shot) came on steadily to finish third, a half-length behind Piedmont Pete. Third was worth \$1,020. The show price was \$2.40. Salustio Burgos was up at 120 pounds.

Double B Express showed early speed, but weakened at the end to

finish fourth. Glover D. got in fifth, and last went to the 20-1 dark horse, Yet Time.

Ruidoso racing resumes Thursday at 1 p.m.

JACK THE KNIFE came within a fifth of a second of equaling the seasonal record for six furlongs while storming to a half-length win in Saturday's main event at Ruidoso Downs.

Ridden by O.A. Martinez, Jr., Jack The Knife came on powerfully in the stretch to overtake the plucky 9-2 shot, Durazno.

The latter, piloted by Steve Asmussen, opened a three-length lead down the backstretch, but was unable to keep up that momentum when Jack The Knife launched his strong attack in the final half-furlong.

The winner covered the distance in 1:12 4/5 seconds, just a tick short of the seasonal mark set by Falacy on July 10.

Saturday's headliner offered an allowance purse of \$4,300 and directed \$2,580 to the winner. Jack The Knife is the property of Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas. The win was Jack The Knife's first in four starts this year. Last year, he earned almost \$32,000.

Ruidoso patrons made Jack The

Knife an odds-on favorite in Saturday's spin and had to be content with low mutual returns of \$3.80, \$3 and \$2.40.

Durazno, owned by L.R. French, Jr. of Midland, Texas, earned \$946 for second and returned mutual payoffs of \$3.40, \$2.40. Durazno is by the Kentucky Derby winner, Riva Ridge.

Bushido Dancer, with Richard Bickel up, came in third at 9-1. The five-year-old hit the finish two and one fourth lengths behind Durazno and refunded a \$3.20 show price.

The second favorite, Captense, offered no arguments and drifted into a fifth-place finish.

MACHISMA led throughout to register an easy victory in Friday's featured Pocket Coin Handicap at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The Scout Leader filly set early fractions of :22 1-5 for the quarter-mile, :45 4-5 for the half-mile, 1:00 for the five furlongs and coasted to the wire in 1:07 2-5 for the five and one half furlongs. Salustio Burgos did a fine job of rating the filly in the race which drew eight two-year-olds competing under handicap weights set by racing secretary Dean McKinney.

Machisma won by an easy four and

one half lengths over High Bounds Dance, the 7-5 wagering favorite under Pedro Benitez. High Bounds Dance, noted for her rapid starts, started slowly and passed the rest of the field through the stretch, but was no match for the winning Machisma.

The victory was the fourth with three seconds and one third in nine outings this year for Machisma. Her other major win was a two-length score in the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity over four furlongs on June 5 at Ruidoso Downs.

As the 5-2 second wagering choice, Machisma returned \$7.00, \$3.40 and \$2.80.

High Bounds Dance, a winner of two of her first three lifetime outings, ran second and paid \$3.80 and \$2.80. Turkey Tracker, who pressed Machisma in the early going under Casey Lambert, finished third and paid \$2.80.

Trained by Fred I. Danley, Machisma earned \$5,145 for owner H.T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque. The filly's lifetime earnings reached \$43,771 with the Pocket Coin triumph.

CHEROKEE BLADE rallied strongly around the far turn and went on to take a narrow nose victory in

Thursday's featured race at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Under a fine ride by Casey Lambert, the Blade gelding started moving down the backstretch and passed horses quickly. Through the stretch, he battled the second-wagering favorite, Sailing Blade, and finally barely overtook Sailing Blade in the final jump.

The triumph was Cherokee Blade's third with three thirds this year from six appearances for trainer and owner Clifford C. Lambert, Sr. of Ruidoso. The \$2,160 winner's share boosted Cherokee Blade's 1983 bankroll to \$7,858.

The Blade gelding toured the five and one half furlongs in 1:07 2-5 in defeating nine three-year-old opponents running under allowance terms.

As the 7-5 wagering choice, Cherokee Blade returned mutuels of \$4.80, \$2.60 and \$2.40. Sailing Blade, the \$2.80-1 second choice under O.A. Martinez, Jr. ran second and paid \$2.80 and \$2.40.

George Aros, the early pacesetter under Richard Bickel, finished third and paid \$2.60 to show. George Aros was nearly six lengths behind Sailing Blade.

Higheasterjet runs Thursday

Higheasterjet, quarter horse racing's all-time leading money-winner, heads a brilliant cast of entrants in Thursday's World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic trial races at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

A total of 42 three-year-old and older quarter horses will compete in five trial heats, each at 440 yards with a purse of \$2,400. The races will be carded as the sixth through 10th events.

The 10 fastest runners will earn berths in the 15th running of this prestigious event for older quarter horses on Sunday, July 31. The estimated purse for the 440-yard dash is \$120,000.

Despite a fine array of participants, the focus of attention must go to Higheasterjet for his career accomplishments.

He opened this season every bit as impressively as in past years, roaring to an easy front-running one and one half lengths victory in a 400-yard allowance race at Ruidoso Downs on June 18.

As a four-year-old in 1982, Higheasterjet won three races and one third from five outings and collected \$504,900. His major victory was a one-length verdict in the \$966,120 All-American Gold Cup.

He was undefeated in five races as a three-year-old in 1981, winning such major events as the Rainbow and All-American Derbies, the last two legs of

the Triple Crown for three-year-olds. He earned \$563,107.

As a two-year-old, he won the 1980 All-American Futurity, quarter horse racing's most important event.

Overall, the five-year-old Pine's Easter Jet gelding has tallied 13 wins with one second and two thirds from 19 appearances for trainer Johnie A. Goodman. He's earned \$1,516,962 for owner G.D. Highsmith of La Grange, Texas.

Higheasterjet will break from the third post position in the sixth race under Steve Harris. He will carry 124 pounds.

Other key horses in the sixth race include Summer Encounter, a career earner of more than \$220,000; and Bojacs Magic, last year's World Championship Quarter Horse Classic victor and third in this year's Rainbow Silver Cup on June 19 at Ruidoso Downs.

The key entrant in the seventh event will be Dr. Depot, a five-year-old Rene Depot gelding, who has been a participant previously in the Champion of Champions Classic held in December at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles.

Major entrants in the eighth race include Painted Bug, who won last Labor Day's All-American Futurity and Rocket Jet Bug, who won the 1980

Rainbow Derby.

Call Caleb, second in the Rainbow Derby behind Mr. Master Bug on July 4, heads the ninth-race field. The three-year-old Reb's Policy gelding has collected more than \$320,000 and has won such major events as the 1982 Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity and the 1983 Los Alamitos Derby on the West Coast.

The 10th race is loaded with such quality performers as Kita Charger, a multiple-stakes winner this meeting at Ruidoso Downs; Winkum; Mr. Easy Ed; El Rey Burner; and Seventy One South.

Following a regular 12-race program on Friday, racing continues on Saturday with the Rainbow Futurity Consolation at 440 yards. The winner will earn \$20,514 from the total consolation purse of \$99,834.80.

Sunday's 12-race program will begin with a special noon post time to accommodate a live telecast to much of the western and central United States of the Rainbow Futurity. The Rainbow Futurity, the second leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses, features the 10 fastest runners from the July 8 time trials.

The winner of this 400-yard classic will collect \$239,330 from the gross purse of \$688,800.

Post time will be the usual 1 p.m. for Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

When the Ruidoso Little League All-Stars play Holloman at 8 tonight in Alamogordo, they're hoping they'll have better luck than they did against Roswell Eastside pitcher Felix Trujillo.

But Roswell Eastside wasn't through yet, scoring a single run in the third and five more in the fifth.

Felix Trujillo clubbed a three-run home run to spark the fifth-inning splurge.

The only other Ruidoso baserunner was shortstop Chad O'Neal, who walked with one out in the fifth inning. He was stranded on fifth, however, as Trujillo fanned the next two batters.

squad by an 8-7 score.



The University of New Mexico's (UNM) football fortunes this fall are mixed if you pay attention to the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) coaches' poll and several magazines.

The coaches see Brigham Young University (BYU) winning the championship again, with the Air Force Academy second, San Diego State, Hawaii, Utah, UNM, Wyoming, Colorado State and the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP).

That sixth-place finish for the Lobos is a far cry from last year's 10-1 record and a share of the WAC title.

But Street & Smith 1983 College Yearbook has New Mexico winning the WAC championship. Most of the other publications have the Lobos either in contention or in the middle of the pack.

The Lobos' strong suit last year was their defense. UNM has several defensive starters returning from last year's team. Former Ruidoso High School standout Lon Nunley was named as a starter in the defensive line after the end of spring practice and should be a key performer this fall.

Defensive end Jimmy Carter and linebacker Jimmy Jackson are returning All-WAC performers. Jackson

was named WAC defensive player of the year and is a talented, aggressive player with All-America possibilities.

Thus, the Lobos have a good number of players to build with. A winning tradition from last year's squad doesn't hurt matters, either.

I see the Lobos finishing in the top three of the WAC, with a chance for a bowl bid.

Of course, even a 10-1 record wasn't enough to get UNM a bowl bid last season. Still, a couple of winning seasons should impress the bowl committees that UNM does have a solid program.

BYU and the Air Force Academy should be tough again, with San Diego State and Hawaii also fielding strong teams.

UTEP will probably have to struggle to finish among the top six or seven teams. But better days could be ahead for the Miners.

It should be one of the more interesting WAC races in recent years. It's unlikely that the winner will have a 10-1 record because the conference should be well balanced this year.

An 8-3 overall record could be enough to gain a bowl bid if the conference gets enough exposure.

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Lodgers talk tax, pro ski race

The Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA) Tuesday discussed pursuing a quarter percent sales tax increase and talked about the probable staging of the U.S. Open Ski Race in Ruidoso next winter.

President Glen Ferguson noted the lodgers were successful in preventing an increase in the lodgers' tax and asked whether he should approach the Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce about supporting a sales tax increase.

Such a move would require approval both locally and by the state and therefore would be at least a year from enactment. RLA presented a motion for Ferguson to present the idea at the next Retail Merchants Committee meeting.

Ferguson also announced the probability that Ruidoso will be hosting the first annual U.S. Open Ski Race in March. He predicted it would be at least three years before lodgers would directly benefit from the race in terms of room rentals, but said he believes it will "fill the town" after the second or third year.

Lodger Clark Carpenter said he had talked to personnel at a ski area in New York that had hosted other races on the same tour, and they called the races "dynamite." He said those races were covered on USA Network four times.

Carpenter also pointed out that the grand finale on the race tour would be in Ruidoso each year unless the village declined to host it. March 24, 1984, is the tentative date for the first U.S. Open.

Also on the RLA program Tuesday was a presentation by Continental Telephone service manager John Van Tussenbroek about new custom calling services now available. He explained that the company has been switching from electro-mechanical to digital (electronic computer) equipment to handle population growth in the area.

Ruidoso is the first place on the Continental System which is totally digital, Van Tussenbroek said.

"We will have a telephone system right here that is second to none in the world," he stated.

He said the digital calling system can process countless calls simultaneously and enables customers with

touchtone dialing to purchase additional custom calling features, including three-way calling, call waiting and call forwarding.

Van Tussenbroek told RLA members he is offering these services now on a 30-day free trial basis.

In response to complaints aired by RLA members about telephone service, Van Tussenbroek admitted the transition to digital equipment has been rough. But "it will be a good working system" when the transition is completed throughout the area, he promised.


Van Tussenbroek also said he expects one of the firms that offers less expensive long distance rates to make the service available in Ruidoso at any time.

In other business, the lodgers were urged by Carpenter to have some input into spending of the \$54,000 in lodgers' tax monies allocated for advertising this fiscal year. "We need some fresh ideas," Carpenter commented.

Lodgers were also encouraged to look over the newly released Sun Country Magazine and to make copies available to customers.

Dyslexia camp fun and therapy

Dyslexic children from around the state are having the opportunity to participate in therapy and fun at summer camp in Ruidoso this month.

Dr. Leslie Dalton, who runs a private dyslexia institute in Las Cruces called Audico Incorporated, moved his annual summer camp to Ruidoso this year. The camp is utilizing facilities at the Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount, the public library

and Nazarene Camp, as well as enjoying Ruidoso's public swimming pool and tennis courts.

Eight students from around New Mexico, including one from Ruidoso, are enrolled in the camp. Dyslexia is a learning disability with symptoms including hyperactivity; right/left confusion; and reading, writing, spelling and math problems.

Students enrolled in the institute are involved in a standard language therapy program known as the Orton method. But the one-on-one student/

counselor therapy is supplemented by therapy offered through a computer program, Dalton explained. The computer therapy enables the students to receive individualized help without requiring the presence of a therapist.

A second feature unique to this particular program is its diagnostic procedure using patented equipment, which is able to pinpoint the actual failure of the brain to process information readily. This equipment makes it possible to be sure of the cause of a particular learning disability, Dalton pointed out.

The summer camp program is in its fourth year, the doctor said, but this is its first year in Ruidoso. He has worked as a consultant to the local school district a number of times in the past, and decided he would like to move the camp to this area because "it's a beautiful place."

"It's very conducive to this type of program," Dalton stated.

He is looking for a place to locate a permanent facility for the institute and believes Ruidoso would be ideal if an affordable piece of property were available.

Dalton is unsure where the permanent facility will be located but said he is thinking about conducting the camp in Ruidoso again next summer.

In any case, Ruidoso has had the opportunity to host at least one camp enabling dyslexic students around New Mexico to learn and play in the summer.

Ranchmen's Camp Meeting brings God, nature to Nogal Mesa

High atop the Nogal Mesa is more than just a beautiful view, there is God.

Communing with nature and God is one of the main characteristics of the Ranchmen's Camp Meeting on Nogal Mesa July 13-17.

Worshippers come from around the Southwest, living atop the mesa in tents or trailers for four days. Others drive in just for a day of relaxed worship and chuckwagon meals.

The meeting was begun in 1940 by three men—Joe Evans, Everett King and Ralph Hall. Taking the idea from the Bloys Camp Meeting in the Davis Mountains of Texas, the men decided to create an interdenominational gathering for brother Christians in New Mexico. After inspecting possible sites in the Jicarillas and mountains near Capitan, the men selected the present site on Nogal Mesa, which is owned by the U.S. Forest Service.

At the first business meeting, the foundations and covenants, which still stand today, were agreed upon: "the Camp Meeting on Nogal Mesa was to be a yearly event in which men and women of all creeds would be welcomed to come join the brotherhood of Christians. No dues were to be charged, no collections taken, nothing sold on the grounds. All expenses would be defrayed by donations. Any funds over and above the cost of food and help would go into more permanent buildings and improvements."

The first service was held in a tent, but the camp now has several permanent buildings. The camp offers three religious services per day and three free chuckwagon meals per day. There are separate services for young children and teenagers. There is also a kiddie corral, which offers care and religious nurturing for very young children.

There are hayrides in the afternoon for children and teenagers, and there is always a beautiful view of the valley for resting among the pinons. A bonfire is built every night, and fellowship is shared there.

LaMoyné Peters, one of the directors of the camp meeting, said he thinks one of the characteristics of the meeting that draws people is that they do not ask for money.

Too many churches are paying for plush seats and are always asking for money, but at the camp meeting people make donations however they wish, he said.

Also, at the meeting, "people can be free to do and say what they want.

Some people want to get away from the confines of a church for a while," he pointed out.

Peters said the free meals are the biggest drawing cards. These draw some people who do not regularly go to church.

Mickey Fugitt, one of the two preachers preaching at the meeting, said he thinks some people keep coming year after year because of the tradition of the camp meeting.

"People know how it came about, and they want to keep the tradition going," Fugitt, the pastor of Believer's Baptist Church in Abilene, Texas, said.

The physical setting of the camp meeting also draws people, he noted. "They can see the beauty of God's creation.

"It is a place where they can come and find the sense and experience of the presence of God. God's presence is here."

It is a different atmosphere. People go to their own church every week and they tend to take it for granted, he explained. Here they have the opportunity for fellowship with people they do not see often, so they do not take each other for granted.

Camp manager Rick Steele said the camp meeting is entirely different from going to church. It is more informal, more relaxed and less threatening. It is another opportunity to hear God's word.


They try to keep the speakers consistently good, Steele explained.

About 1,100 people came to the camp meeting last year, and that many were expected this year, Peters said.

The Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting is only one in a series of camp meetings throughout the Southwest in the summer.

The Y/L Cowboy Camp Meeting meets June 23 near Canadlan, Texas; the Colorado Cowboy Camp Meeting is June 29 near Kiowa, Colorado; the Sierra Grande Rancher's Camp Meeting meets July 7 near Des Moines; the Mesa Redondo Cowboy Camp Meeting is July 21 near Tucumcari; the Four Corners Camp Meeting is July 28 near Mancos, Colorado; and Chiricahua Ranchmen's Camp Meeting is August 4, 50 miles southeast of Willcox, Arizona.

The Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting has closed for this year, but the opportunity for fellowship and worship on the Nogal Mesa will return again next year, as it has done for the last 43 years.

For the most comfort, of course, choose first class. The seats are wider, there is more legroom and you are pampered with personal, luxury service.
Many airlines are now offering business class, particularly on international and transcontinental routes. This normally offers a little more room than coach, can include such extras as free drinks and priority baggage handling, and is priced substantially below first class.
In coach, or economy class, it is still possible to request the "best" seat, though what you will consider "best" may vary. If you are tall, you usually get the most legroom in the first row behind the cabin partition and in seats by the emergency exit.
Seats over the wing offer a slightly smoother ride than those far front or aft; on the other hand, they usually restrict your view. For peace and quiet, you may prefer seats far forward of the engines and removed from the kitchen and lavatories.



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — It's an old rule of politics: The guy who gives out the jobs is the guy with the power.

That's why jobs were the first topic of conversation when the Governor's new sub-Cabinet on Indian Affairs was convened last week.

Ed Begay, the very first speaker, asked Anaya to let the tribes in the state be what bureaucrats call a "service delivery area" for Indian employment under the federal Job Training Policy Act.

Begay, second in command on the Navajo reservation, knows how skillfully the man who preceded him and Peterson Zah at the top of the Navajo Nation, Peter McDonald, used those old CETA jobs as a source of patronage and power.

Then up spoke Governor Merle Garcia of Acoma. He made it clear that the Pueblos too want to run their own Job Training Policy Act administration. His people, he said, are unique. They should not be thrown in with Navajos, Apaches and white men in such operations.

Who's going to have those JTPA jobs at its disposition as presently planned?

The Governor of New Mexico. He has, as an arm of his administration, an agency called the Governor's Office of Employment and Training Administration.

He gets to name the guy who runs that shop, who, having been appointed, normally shows his gratitude by doing just about anything the Governor asks of him.

Do-gooders who invented the civil service system, in short, didn't really end job patronage in government.

By stopping the more or less total turn-over which used to take place whenever a new administration took office, they created a paradoxical result: Now the few jobs left to the man at the top have become all that much more precious. That makes the man with the ability to dispose of them that much more popular and powerful.

A governor still has at his disposal all those juicy plums with the high salaries, the "unclassified" positions. State employees holding those can be

fired at the pleasure of the chief executive, and they have no recourse.

Any governor worth his salt can also get rid of pretty nearly any classified employee who has a job the boss targets as an attractive one for a friend or supporter.

And there are the small goodies, like summer jobs and summer internships, which can go to the youngsters in the families of supporters.

That's why Indian governments are a little bit jealous. They don't have that kind of power.

It's no coincidence that this is the first thing they asked Santa Fe to give them when this new form of powwow was initiated.

A lot of pueblos did not have representatives at that meeting discussed above, probably because the day chosen was a bad one for some of them.

Most notable absence, however, was that of Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache tribe.

Any attempt to relate to the state's Indians which does not include the Big Apache is not likely to come to much.

Legislators reading that the Governor talked to his new Commission on Higher Education about possible additional tax raises were less than jubilant.

Actually, what the Governor was saying was that any recommendations the new group came up with which involve additional funding can only come into being if the citizens get tapped for more.

Have you ever seen a report from a commission of this kind which didn't call for more spending?

Even more specifically, have you ever seen educators suggesting any change which didn't have a higher price tag on it?

The Governor was only giving fair warning — as we will no doubt see when the commission's report has been filed.

Letters to the editor

DEAR EDITOR:

Writing letters-to-the-editor is not my chosen pastime, but recent happenings and the beginning of summer rains make it necessary.

The area-changing, life-changing drama taking place in the Upper Canyon took place in this neighborhood five years ago. The main characters involved are the very same — only the location is different. The first did not involve admission because the completely undeveloped mountainside was already in the city limits. There was not that opportunity of stopping or regulating the activity.

Promises and assurances flew thick and fast. It was going to add nice private homes on five-acre plots. It was going to increase property values. It would bring a good road. We were not going to be hurt. We were going to be "improved."

—And what did we get?
 I got a road cut through what had been my front yard. We get water flowing down that road like a river — water that once stayed up on the mountain to water the trees. Because the original road was raised more than a foot, much of that water flows across my yard, under my house and into my carport. Both the carport and the driveway will be wet for weeks to come. I complained about the road and what it did to my parking facilities long, loud and constantly for more than a year. Finally Mr. Potter said, "Mrs. Pearson, that problem has given you enough trouble. We are going to put a culvert there. A load of pipe is due in today or tomorrow. We'll get right on it." That was two or three years ago. There's no culvert there yet. Some new hurry-up development probably needed that length of pipe much more than an old-timer living in an old cabin-type house. For the record — two loads of gravel I put in have sunk in the mud.

The old street that was rock and shale seldom caused trouble. The "new" road is covered with thick, sticky, slick soil washed down out of the woods and it definitely causes trouble. The road was gravelled almost two years ago, but only up to the old line. Trucks track down enough mud to keep the upper end pretty well covered.

There are many acres of land in the "development" area. I understand some of it on the upper end is being developed, though I have not been up to see for myself. The road is so bad there is little sightseeing. Lots of big trucks loaded with filler soil go up

constantly. A horrible rumor that we are to get that sort of traffic from now on is all we know about the trucks and their loads. That rumor — and it is a rumor, for we seldom get the straight answer to this sort of thing — says that a road is being built across the mountain for a working access to the new lake that will be enjoyed by the new development there — not by villagers who pay for it — though we do stand to get a little more water from it — we hope.

There was only one five-acre tract sold on this end of the plot. Yet when the village decided to put a water tank in the area, they did not choose to put it anywhere on any of the undeveloped acres. They put it squarely in the middle of the one five-acre tract individually owned, condemning the land to do so. The new view from my South windows and one on the West is no longer forest — it's water tank. I do have one thing to be thankful for — it's painted a nice chocolate brown, not "bilious pea green."

It would be possible to go on and on about what this undeveloped development has done to this neighborhood, but it would serve no good purpose.

I agree that we should treat landowners fairly, but that works two ways. In turn they should treat us fairly. We should not be expected to have to buy them out of bad spots they have bought themselves into. We should not be expected to give up our homes, to sit by and watch our property being destroyed by those wishing to open forest lands and mountainsides for money-making projects without proper safeguards for those already living above or below those projects — **GUARANTEED SAFEGUARDS.** "Good-faith" promises from developers are for the birds! They have not worked in the past and are no more likely to work in the future.

There are many of us here who are not late-comers — folks who grew up here or choose to move or retire here not primarily to make a lot of money, but because of the natural beauty of the area, the peace and the quiet of the small mountain village — we loved it dearly and weep over what has happened to it.

Agreed — we should treat everyone fairly — even developers — but in turn they should not be allowed to destroy us.

On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer

I don't guess I ever gave much thought to the trading post on Highway 70 east for a long time after we moved here.

When you grow up in the Southwest and travel the highways of New Mexico and neighboring states, you see so many billboards and signs advertising "Indian handicrafts," "genuine hand-made moccasins," "tom-toms" and the like. Often the same establishments invite travelers to see "giant rattlesnakes" and "terrifying Gila monsters."

You tend to lump all such places together, and you never stop at one.

But something I overheard at the police station one day started me thinking that the shop on Highway 70 might be something more. Betty Bennett, one of the graveyard shift dispatchers, was telling someone that she was setting off with her folks to do some trading with the Indians.

Hmmm, I thought.

When I met Clayton Bennett at his shop last week and told him I wanted to do a column on him and Helen and their shop, I must have come across sounding like, "Won't this be neat? I'll do this column and you'll get this publicity and it will bring you all this business!"

Well, Clayton allowed as how he really didn't much care about publicity. After all, he pointed out, he's only been here 57 years.

He came to New Mexico from Chicago around 1926, because he had TB. In fact, a doctor had told him he only had three months to live.

"I'll bet that man's been dead a long time," Clayton laughed. He went to work for Ike Wingfield in the Wingfield store at what is now Pinetree Square. His pay was less than a dollar a day, but he was "happy to get it."

Ruidoso then consisted of "just a few buildings." Across from the store was the Wingfield's old home place—the building that most recently housed Ray Heid's Ski Shop.

Further up the river was a sawmill, along with "whiskey makers and what have you," Clayton recalled.

"It was down to earth," was the way he described the Ruidoso of those days. Imagine this valley without all the houses, he suggested, seeing it in his mind's eye. "It was beautiful."

People howled about anyone cutting trees to build the highway through town, he said. One tree in particular—"the big tree" (up from the former Ruidoso News office)—was a local landmark. But it fell for the highway.

"Everybody in those days was just one big family," said Clayton. He described how they would cut blocks of ice out of the river behind the store in winter, pack them in sawdust and

store them. The ice would keep into summertime, and people would buy milk at Wingfield's dairy and buy ice to keep it cool.

How did Clayton get into the trading business?

"Well, you had to do something." Wingfield gave him the opportunity to run a business down on the highway where "the Chevrolet place" is now. The place was a combination gas pump and bus depot, and Clayton and Helen had a lunch counter, too.

Indians were among the Bennetts' customers, and they traded deerskins and stuff for goods. Betty Bennett remembers a photograph from those days, with her father minding the store in a white shirt and tie.

"Even when I run a filling station, I always dressed up," said Clayton. The day we talked, he was resplendent in a bolo tie and silver and turquoise belt buckle.

He and Helen ran their business for 30 years. They sold it in '61 and "retired," building a house on a spot a little west of there that had been a cornfield.

But the Indians still came around, and before long the Bennetts had enclosed the garage. They put in a display case and were back in business.

Among the wares of about a dozen tribes that a visitor finds at the shop are beadwork and baskets made by Mescalero Apaches.

"In the early days they did a lot of beautiful beadwork," Clayton said. But he added that old-timers on the reservation have told him the younger generation doesn't want to carry it on, and that the same is true with the baskets.

Traders have told him the same thing is happening on all the reservations.

Clayton showed me a Mescalero basket made by a woman who told him she was getting arthritis and wouldn't be able to keep on making them.

"Money don't buy that," he said, pointing out the quality of the work.

The Bennetts have a deep appreciation for the craftsmanship of the items they carry. And they very much enjoy the contact with people their business brings them—their "friends all over the world."

"To me it's very fascinating—it really is," said Clayton. And he has a word of advice for would-be collectors of Indian work: "You've got to know who you're dealing with."

I examined a beautiful Zuni bracelet and commented on the detail work that went into it.

"It's God's gift to them," said Helen Bennett. "And they accept it."
