## Capitan H<sub>2</sub>O situation complex

Capitan is growing with the overflow from Ruidoso. Growth in population can be advantageous to a town, but to Capitan it has brought a problem—water.

The problem is not necessarily lack of water, but getting the water to the people during the warm summer months, especially those people who live on the hills surrounding Capitan.

On July 11 Mayor David Cummins appointed an Emergency Water Board (EWB) to address the water problem in Capitan.

Coincidentally, the members—Jack Pogue, Kelly Beavers, Pat Sullivan, Dorothy Smith and Larry Caywood—all live on the hills, which had the problem with water pressure during the summer.

Member Kelly Beavers said when the water in the tank goes lower than the hills, there is no water pressure up on the hills because it is a gravity-fed system.

The EWB's first order of business was to recommend a moratorium on annexations and new water taps until other solutions could be determined.

The council passed a resolution halting water tap applications and annexations until September 1 or until further notice of the village council.

The water in Capitan comes from the Bonito line, which belongs to Alamogordo, which purchased Bonito Lake from the Southern Pacific Railway. Capitan has 50/50 water rights with Ruidoso on Eagle Creek; however, it does not take half the water because it does not have the capacity through the three miles of six-inch pipe that narrows into four-inch pipe the balance of the way into Capitan.

Capitan's water runs through this common usage line.

An added problem is maintenance on the Bonito line, which comes out of village funds, new water superintendent David Bernardone said. That should be paid by the Eagle Creek Water Association, he believes, and the village should be refunded its funds spent.

Storage is another problem for the Capitan water system.

Capitan is currently served by a 200,000-gallon tank situated by the filter plant.

The EWB has recommended that a 100,000-gallon tank near the First Baptist Church in Capitan be put back into operation. If it is put to use, it would be one-third of the storage, Beavers said.

Mayor Cummins said the 100,000-gallon tank should be ready soon. The water must be drained and super-chlorinated.

However, Bernardone said this water can be used only for watering and fires because it would create a pressure loss if put in the distribution system.

The present capacity of the Capitan filter plant, according to water engineers Will Harrison and Karl Soard, who recently addressed the village council, is 200 to 215 gallons per minute (gpm). Maximum capacity is 295. However, if the water supply is muddy, the filter fills and cuts down the flow to an average of 150 gpm.

The filter has to be back flushed at least once a day and more often if the lake turns over or it rains and the water becomes muddy. This is a down time of about one hour when no water is flowing through the system.

Bernardone predicts the filter plant will shut down within one to two years if not fixed soon.

"It is falling apart, and there are no funds set aside to repair it," he said.

The filter media was replaced in 1981 and a new section was welded in where it had blown apart, Bernardone explained.

Now he can hear the tank starting to creak, and the baffles pop when pressure is applied, he said.

The backwash system needs to be fixed; it needs a sand removal system for those times the lake turns over, he said.

Capitan also needs an elevated storage tank and more storage tanks for fire protection, he noted.

The major parts for the needed renovation are already out on bid, he said.

"We are trying to get funds to alleviate the immediate problems," he stated.

There is also a problem with the well water in Capitan.

"The old timers say the well water was too hard," Beavers said. The EWB has considered recommending mixing well water with Eagle Creek water for possible usage.

This is possible, Bernardone points out, however, that the wells cannot be reactivated because of an agreement with the Eagle Creek Water Association.

EWB member Dorothy Smith said the school also has problems getting water every fall.

It is not a pressure problem, she said, there is no water down there. The children come in from recess and cannot get a drink of water.

The high school is the largest user in town, Bernardone said, and their sprinklers create the water loss there.

Although there is not now a big problem with not having enough water, it may become a problem as more people move into Capitan, Beavers said.

At the July council meeting, engineer Soard suggested a three to four million-gallon settling pond and water pumps for residents on the hill in the Capitan subdivision.

The open type reservoir would let sediment and trash settle before it goes into the filtration plant, engineer Harrison said. With this, the filter would not have to be backwashed as often. It would increase filtering capacity about 35 percent.

The reservoir would not give much additional water, only a few thousand gallons, he said.

"This would be a drop in the bucket," Harrison admitted.

The reservoir would have about a 20 percent evaporation rate, Beavers said.

Harrison said the pressure pumps would have to be put in on an individual basis and taken care of by individuals. They cannot be put into a municipal system.

About the proposed pressure pump to get the water up to hill residents, EWB president Jack Pogue said the pipes may not hold the additional pressure.

Some of the pipes are 50 years old. Three or four years ago, some were replaced with plastic pipes, which will not hold the additional pressure, Pogue said.


Beavers said he thinks it would be wiser to put money into storage tanks for the hills rather than into pumps.

They also need another three miles of six-inch pipeline, Beavers said.

Pogue also pointed out that Capitan might have problems with water in an emergency.

"If we come into an emergency (such as a fire), we'd only have three days' water supply," he noted.

## Villages' governing bodies to meet

Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet tonight (Monday) at 7 at the municipal building.

Business on the agenda includes:

## Machisma win a Sunday cruise

MACHISMA proved she's the queen of New Mexico-bred two-year-olds with a casual and easy-going conquest of Sunday's \$55,072 Rio Grande Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The superb filly, owned by H.T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque, never gave her opponents a fighting chance in the six-furlong dash.

Taking command at the outset, Machisma opened up gradually under confident handling by Salustio Burgos. Except for a mild threat from Wistful Eye during the backstretch run, Machisma was never put to pressure.

At the top of the stretch, Machisma decided to wrap things up and highballed into a commanding lead. She reached the wire with a four and one fourth length lead and picked up a victory purse of \$27,536.

The win was her sixth of the year from 11 starts and hiked her career earnings up to a handsome \$72,867. Her record also includes three seconds and a third, which means she's been out of the money only once. (That came with a fifth-place finish in Sunland Park's rich Riley Allison Futurity last spring.)

Ruidoso patrons made Machisma a top-heavy favorite in the Rio Grande, and had to be content with depressed payoffs of \$2.60, \$2.40, \$2.20. The victory gave Machisma utter dominance in Ruidoso's two-part Rio Grande series.

Earlier in the meeting, she mistreated fellow New Mexico-breds badly in the Rio Grande Kindergarten

Futurity at four furlongs. She snared that one by two lengths and collected \$21,937 out of the total pot of \$43,875.

Machisma is trained by Fred I. Danley.

Backers of Machisma might have gotten a slight scare a few minutes after Sunday's victory when jockey Kenny Lewis, who'd ridden Just Like New (15-1), claimed a foul against the people's choice. He evidently felt Machisma had bothered his mount at the first turn. But the stewards wasted no time in tossing out the appeal.

Machisma covered the six furlongs in 1:14 3/5 seconds.

Tooth and Toenail, a 30-1 darkhorse piloted by Joe Martinez for B. Raymond Evans of Tulia, Texas, moved up steadily to finish second, claiming the runnerup prize of \$12,115. The payoffs: \$11.80, \$5.40.

Fly By Chopsticks (43-1) took third, earning \$6,608 for the J.A. Leonard Cattle Company of Abilene, Texas. Stuart Dolphus was up. The show price was \$8.20. Wistful Eye, the second choice at just under 5-1, faded badly in the stretch and came in eighth. Here's how the money was split up among the also-rans: 4th—Lady Platoon, \$3,304; 5th—Never Print, \$2,202; 6th—What A Celebration, \$1,101; 7th—Fancy Dee, \$1,101; 8th—Wistful Eye, \$1,101. Just Like New got in ninth and Coin Wilgo took 10th. Neither earned any purse money.

Sunday's program also included the

\$17,175 Ruidoso Sprint Championship for three-year-olds and up. The six-furlong sprint stuck another feather in the cap of the brilliant handicap ace, Fill Mackis Cup. The outstanding five-year-old gelding stalked his foes in the early going under cool handling by Joe Martinez.

At the top of the stretch, Martinez roused his mount with a few slaps of the whip and Fill Mackis Cup easily soared into the lead. He covered the rest of the journey under a hand ride, won by one and three fourths lengths and earned \$10,305 to go with the \$15,302 (in '83 alone) he brought into the race.

Fill Mackis Cup covered the six furlongs in a seasonal record time of 1:12 2/5 seconds, paying \$6, \$3.60, \$2.20. He's owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas. Piedmont Pete (\$4, \$2.80) took second, while Special Hank (\$2.40) ran third.

TOO TIDY SIS, the four-year-old mare who took second to the great Hightesterjet in the \$118,364 World's Championship Classic at Ruidoso Downs on July 31, easily put her foes away in Saturday's Mid-Summer Invitational Handicap.

The 350-yard sprint for fillies and mares covered 350 yards and offered a \$10,000 purse.

Too Tidy Sis charged into the lead about 100 yards down the track and swooped to an impressive three-fourths length victory.

A total of six free chamber music concerts will be offered for the public during the first annual Ruidoso String Workshop August 7-21.



Pogue said he would like to see three 30,000-gallon tanks up on the hill, which would serve the people on the hill and be used for emergencies such as fires. He also sees the need for a settling pond to store raw water before it is filtered.

Engineer Harrison defines the problem as Capitan having just outgrown its water system.

"It has had too much expansion and not enough put into updating their system," Harrison noted.

The line is not adequate from the source; the filtration system is not good; people built on the hills; there are problems in distribution into town; and the storage units are inadequate, he summarized.

"There is not any quick fix to it," Harrison said. "Any quick fix is money thrown away. You can't have a quick fix when you don't have adequate sources of getting water to the customers."

A total revamp of the system is the best option, he said.

Because the problems happen during periods of high usage, usually the summertime, they tend to be forgotten about during the winter, he said. He feels people shouldn't let up on the problem just because summer is en-

ding. Harrison predicts it will take three to four years to totally revamp Capitan's water system. The project will have to have engineering, planning, a source of revenue, and it will have to be let out to bid.

"The only thing they can do now is to try and do something to try and conserve," he said.

But people are basically greedy, he noted. When the people who live at lower elevations use a lot of water, the people who live higher must suffer.

Bernardone said he needs two more people in the water department to keep the system running. The water department now has three people.

Another problem Bernardone is trying to correct is that there is no adequate map of the water lines when trying to plot them.

Having an adequate map would alleviate some of the distribution problems, Bernardone said.

Beavers said the EWB is trying to come up with long-range plans to solve Capitan's water problems.

"The problem is money," he noted. "We don't want to raise water rates or taxes."

Up until now the EWB was identifying the problem. Now they are trying

to look into ways to raise the money, Beavers said.

"It is a problem everyone has dodged because it costs money," Pogue explained, and nobody anticipated this type of growth.

Engineer Harrison said a rough estimate of the cost to revamp the entire Capitan water system would be about \$1.5 million. The cost of just a settling pond would be about \$200,000.

Bernardone said it will cost \$2,000 to renovate the 100,000-gallon tank, \$3,000 to renovate the electrical system in the filter and \$2,000 for a chlorine system.

According to the Rural Water Association, a \$20,000 grant can be obtained, he said. "The chances look fantastic for funding."

"We're trying to work on a grant basis because the town doesn't have enough money to pay back loans," Bernardone said.

Mayor Cummins is also concerned about where the money will come from.

He said a general obligation bond would cost an estimated \$8 in property tax per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

"Most people over here can't afford that," Cummins said.

In their investigations of money sources, the EWB recently went to

Roswell to get an application for the Community Development Block Grant, Fiscal Year 1983, under the water supply construction act regulation.

Dorothy Smith said they are hoping for some of the grant because they are eligible under various points in the regulation.

The number one priority of the regulation is public health, and Smith said Capitan qualifies because it does not always have quality water.

She said Capitan also qualifies in the area of potential need for emergency assistance; the need for expansion projects because Capitan needs water storage expansion and a settling pond; and the need for treatment facilities because Capitan's treatment facility is too small.


The grant favors small towns with populations under 3,000.

They will not know about possible grant monies until after November, she said.

They are also investigating a possible loan from Farmers Home Administration.

Smith sums up what is needed to ease Capitan's water problems.

"It's going to take money and cooperation within the community. The overall good of Capitan needs to be considered."

## Attorneys state case for additional judge

The 12th Judicial District (Lincoln and Otero Counties) may have a good chance of receiving a favorable recommendation this year from the state Judicial Council on its request for an additional judge to serve Lincoln County. The discovery of 255 cases filed but not reported in the district between July 1980 and June 1982 will, it is hoped, alter the council's opinion about the need for a third district judge.

The Lincoln County Bar Association is scheduled to present its case before the Judicial Council Friday in Santa Fe.

Bar Association president Mel O'Reilly explained that the discrepancy in the number of cases filed and the number reported to the administrative office of the courts resulted from a change in the reporting forms. Two categories of cases were not included on the form and therefore were left off the report.

The district's caseload is one of the factors considered by the Judicial Council in making a recommendation on an additional judge.

But the Bar Association is not depending on the revised caseload alone to sway the council. The attorneys have prepared a list of the features they feel justify the need for another judge, and have made copies available to each council member.

The report notes a 38.4 percent increase in pending civil cases between July 1, 1980, and June 30, 1982, with a 21.1 percent increase in Lincoln County alone during that period. The domestic case backlog in Lincoln County rose 127.5 percent.

Also pointed out in the report is a significant increase in Magistrate Court filings "due to an attempt on the part of local attorneys to reduce criminal cases to a lower Magistrate misdemeanor level so that cases can be heard in the Magistrate Court."

According to statistics in the report, a Lincoln County judge would have had 847 case filings in 1981-82, which is higher than the number of filings per judge in six of the 13 judicial districts that year.

Another factor supporting the need for an additional judge is population. The report compares the 45.5 percent increase in population of Lincoln County to Otero County's 8.7 percent

increase from 1970 to 1980. And the number of attorneys practicing in Lincoln County has increased from three to 18 from 1970 to the present.

The Bar Association report also notes the travel time required of the two present district judges, both of whom reside in Alamogordo. The judges usually alternate holding court sessions in Carrizozo each Wednesday, resulting in non-jury cases being "crammed onto the Wednesday docket." Also, Lincoln County attorneys often are forced to travel to Otero County to expedite proceedings, resulting in higher costs to their clients.

The lack of a district judge in Lincoln County, the report notes, also negatively affects the length of time to obtain a setting, access to judges, cost to clients, scheduling of hearings, adequate time to try a case and research time available to judges.

The report points out that such difficulties will continue to increase with the increasing population of Ruidoso and the rest of the county.

Included with the Bar Association's report is a commentary on judgeship factors from the administrative office

of the courts, supporting the arguments put forth by the Lincoln County attorneys.

"Overall, the current situation does not allow for convenience and adequate service in Lincoln County," concludes the court office's report.

Dr. James Beall of Ruidoso, a member of the Judicial Council, said he believes the attorneys' chances are good of getting a positive recommendation from the entire council, in light of the revised caseload statistics. Beall said he has always favored the additional judge for Lincoln County and will continue to do so.

"I feel very definitely it will pass," he stated.

Beall said the council rejected the request before because the "facts and figures" did not support the need for a third 12th district judge. But he indicated the Bar Association members have done a good job gathering information and corrected statistics to prove otherwise.

If the Judicial Council does sanction the request to establish an additional judgeship here, local attorneys will then seek the support of Governor Toney Anaya, O'Reilly reported. The governor's okay is needed for the issue to be presented for action to the Legislature in its 1984 session.

If Anaya declines to put the issue on the agenda for that session, the final decision will have to wait until 1985.

## A-A Futurity trials Wednesday

First-round elimination trials for the world's richest horse race, the \$2,530,000 All-American Quarter Horse Futurity, begin Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs.

The first round covers three days, Wednesday through Friday. Each of the three days will include 11 All-American trials at 440 yards.

During the three-day period, a total of 33 first-round trials will be run. Altogether, 298 two-year-olds — hoping to get a chance at that fabulous winner's prize of \$1 million on Labor Day — will be taking part.

In order to survive the opening round, a contender must finish in the top three in his trial heat. At the end of Friday's program, the first-round trials will have produced 99 semi-finalists for the final round on Thursday, August 25.

On that day, the 99 semi-finalists will compete in 10 heats, racing against the clock. Those chalking up the 10 fastest times will advance into the televised finale on Labor Day. The clock will also be used to determine the fields for the first, second and third consolations.

First post each day this week, Wednesday through Sunday, is the regular 1 p.m. The weekend continues on Saturday with trials (again at 440 yards) for the \$1 million (estimated) All-American Gold Cup for four-year-olds, plus the \$15,000-added Isayolby Handicap for three-year-olds and up at one and one-sixteenth miles.

The tremendous weekend concludes on Sunday with two more stakes: the \$12,000-added Three Bars Handicap (three-year-olds) at a mile.

In Wednesday's opening round of the All-American trials, the spotlight figures to be on the outstanding filly, Easily A Twelve, who drew into the 11th race and will break from the Number 8 post. No rider was named at entry time, but it seems likely her regular pilot, Jerry Nicodemus — one

of the sport's leading riders — will again be in the saddle.

Owned by trainer H. Don Farris of Sunland Park and Don Keith of Bakersfield, California, Easily A Twelve was a supplemental nominee at a hefty fee of \$30,000. (Three other two-year-olds also got into the trials via the late penalty route.)

Another fast gun on Wednesday's program (also trained by Farris) is Racy N Lacy, who'll break from the Number 2 post in the fifth race. During the last Sunland Park meeting, the filly flashed to a two-length win in the finale of the \$259,913 Sun Country Futurity, earning \$90,969.

Meganette, coming off a smashing win in the Rainbow Futurity, heads the field for Thursday's second day of All-American Futurity elimination heats at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

A total of 99 two-year-olds will compete on Thursday in 11 elimination heats. Each race will be at 440 yards with a purse of \$2,900.

The three top finishers in each Thursday heat will join the top three runners from 11 Wednesday and 11 Friday elimination trials in time trials on Thursday, August 25. The 10 fastest runners on August 25 will advance to the 25th edition of the All-American Futurity, quarter horse racing's most prestigious event, on Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs.

The winner of that 440-yard dash will collect \$1 million from the gross purse of \$2,530,000. Meganette has already captured one leg of the Triple Crown series for two-year-old quarter horses.

The Dash For Cash filly rallied strongly through the stretch of the \$668,800 Rainbow Futurity over 400 yards on July 24 to register a nose victory over Allotta Dial.

Meganette will face eight foes in Thursday's first race. She will break from the sixth post position.

Tinys Rose Bud, who will leave the fifth post position in the third race, is also a key entrant.

The Tiny's Gay filly finished with authority to take a one-length win in the \$94,023 Rainbow Futurity Consolation over 400 yards on July 23 at Ruidoso Downs.

Patti Dash, who was supplemented into the Futurity at a cost of \$30,000, will break from the third post position in the fourth race. Regular rider Jacky Martin will be aboard.

Other key entrants include Firewater Fancy, third in the Kansas Futurity, who will leave the ninth post position in the fourth race; Vital Link, second in the Rainbow Futurity Consolation, will be in the sixth position in the fifth race; Fols Gold, a \$30,000 supplemental nominee, will break from the fourth post position in the seventh race, and Dashiin Angel, fifth in the Rainbow Futurity, will break from the ninth post position in the eighth event.

Following another 12-race program on Friday featuring 11 All-American Futurity elimination trials, racing continues on Saturday with two major events.

Trial races will be held for four-year-olds seeking berths in the second running of the All-American Gold Cup, quarter horse racing's top event for four-year-olds. Each 440-yard dash will offer a purse of \$4,300.

The Isayolby Handicap is also set for one mile and one-sixteenth. Three-year-old and older horses will travel under handicap weights set by racing secretary Dean McKinney for a purse of \$15,000-added.

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

## Broyles celebrates birthday with Cree victory

Hornbuckle, who is always among the top competitors in the tournament, won a semi-final match over Ronnie Jumper Thursday morning. The match had to go two extra holes to determine the winner.

Pat Weaver won the first flight crown, beating Kent Jones, two-up. Weaver defeated Ruidoso golfer Doug Bass in the semi-finals Thursday morning to gain the final round.

# Peter Church attends evangelism conference

The Reverend Peter Church, pastor of Trinity Mountain Fellowship in Ruidoso, recently attended "Amsterdam 83—the International Conference for Itinerant Evangelists." Church was invited to the conference by Dr. Billy Graham, organizer of the event.

About 3,800 full-time evangelists from 134 countries, along with 1,200 support staff, converged at the Rai Conference Center in Holland for the 10-day session, Church said. Attendees represented "every possible shade of denomination" and were mainly from Third World countries. Church called them "the bread and butter, or nuts and bolts of evangelism."

Church explained that he was invited because of his long affiliation with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association. He worked in the 1962 Chicago Crusade. In 1969 he represented the association in South Africa, his homeland, by distributing films. Church was also an official speaker at the Lausanne Conference in 1974.

Amsterdam 83 was the "first ever conference devoted exclusively to the inspiration, teaching and training of evangelists," Church explained.

The theme of the conference was taken from 2 Timothy 4:5—"Do the work of an evangelist." The word evangelist comes from Greek words meaning good message. Church revealed that an evangelist, therefore, is "one who proclaims the good news." Church believes evangelism is a gift of the Holy Spirit and is given to specific individuals.



The conference floor at Amsterdam was crowded with delegates.

Topics at the conference covered many aspects of the life of an evangelist: preaching, preparation, family life, study life, follow-up, and the evangelizing of intellectuals, students, schools, prisons and churches.

Dr. Graham spoke at the mass "plenary" sessions with the help of two giant idophor projectors and screens. Participants later chose from among 102 available workshops. They could elect seven, Church said, but two were mandatory.

All attendees were required to take workshops on "How to give the invitation" and "How to follow up those who respond to the invitation."

Church said the first workshop taught that the message preached must always be geared toward calling for a decision of commitment to Christ. A public decision must be made, Church explained, because all

disciples called by Christ were called publicly.

In the "follow-up" workshop, participants learned that from every church in which they speak, counselors must be trained to counsel those responding to the invitation. Responders should be asked to join the church and given Christian literature, Church related.

Church believes he has the "gift of evangelism" and plans to use what he learned at Amsterdam 83. He asserted there are people in Ruidoso who are longing for "real preaching and teaching of God's Word." Many Ruidosans, according to Church, have not found a church where both an emphasis on the Bible and an acceptance of the power of the Holy Spirit operate side by side.

In Ruidoso, Church sees many ministers emphasizing social issues rather than the Bible. "Give me a

man who spent 20 hours studying for his sermon on Sunday!" Church lamented.

"I feel that people are spiritually illiterate," he said of Ruidoso. "And I put the blame on the door of the ministers."

Church is grateful he had the opportunity to attend the "marvelously organized" conference on evangelism. He felt the response in Holland was varied. "Holland is a very Godless country," he explained.

Despite this, Dr. Graham was invited to return to the Netherlands to hold a crusade sometime in the near future. Church sees this as a sign the conference was a success.

For those interested in the type of worship offered at Trinity Mountain Fellowship, Church invited them to attend the services at 300 La Luz Lane or call him at 258-5511.

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


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

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

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE** — Say you're a Democrat, in office or out of it, who gets to dreaming about running for the United States Senate next year. That means you'll be running against Pete Domenici, since he's the only New Mexico Senator whose term is up in 1984. It also is not likely that he will face any opposition in the primary of his party, which happens to be Republican.

You can't help remembering that in 1982 our state went Democratic with a vengeance, including a big defeat for Jack Schmitt, at that time the state's other Republican Senator.

So it can be done, after all. The idea of a Republican from New Mexico representing this state in the Senate was once so unlikely that we went more than 30 years without such a happening.

Maybe the guy who plays his cards right and comes up with just the right timing can knock Pete off.

Maybe... maybe... maybe. But then you take a look at the numbers.

In this case, the numbers which first catch the eye have dollar signs in front of them, and they don't tell a story a potential Democratic candidate likes to hear.

In a report to the Federal Election Commission, the Domenici campaign staff reports that they raised over half a million dollars so far this year — \$509,999.92, to be exact. (Throw in eight cents and call it five hundred and ten thousand bucks.)

That big number can chill any Democrat who's looking at a run, especially if he hasn't even yet announced and gotten out of the starting blocks.

To decide to make the race now with the thought that you can head Domenici off at the pass would be somewhat less than realistic.

Of course, nobody ever said office-seekers are realistic.

But hidden in the full Domenici report are some other numbers that should make a potential Democratic opponent feel even worse.

The biggest single category in that large total is for contributions from individual New Mexico citizens. Their

checks, cash and money orders make up \$168,830.25 of the total.

That amount came from just under 2,000 local voters, who have decided to climb aboard the Domenici bandwagon already, more than a year before the election.

Any politician will tell you that if they give you money, they are hooked. They'll stay with you till the end. What's more, they'll evangelize their friends.

And look at the size of those gifts. They average over \$80 a pop — and that's from private citizens, mind you, not from the political action committees or the other sources of really big bucks which will be weighing in later.

At about that point any sensible Democratic hopeful will decide he needs to do a little more thinking about this situation.

And while he does, the calendar pages turn, and the likelihood of a successful campaign from the Democratic quarter grows smaller and smaller.

Sometimes you wonder if bureaucrats can do any math.

Here's a notably upbeat announcement from the Department of Human Services about how they will be setting up emergency food and shelter programs in 48 locations.

Here's what they say these operations will provide: "Purchase of food and/or transportation expenses for mass feeding; purchase of supplies incidental to feeding, such as utensils and pots and pans; direct expenses associated with mass shelter, such as rent, cots and blankets; emergency lodging or shelter costs; once-only, limited emergency rent or mortgage assistance to avoid immediate eviction when no other resources exist."

Total grant to do all this comes to \$33,915, which means each of these 48 centers will have on average a magnificent \$706.56 to accomplish those sweeping and unrealistic goals.

What can you produce these days for even a hundred bucks?

## Editorial

At the last regular village council meeting, a routinely approved item put to rest a favorite topic of discussion in the village.

The council passed Frank Sayner's motion that almost \$55,000 in lodgers' tax revenues held in a certificate of deposit be transferred when the certificate matures January 5. Of the total, \$15,000 was earmarked for promotion of the U.S. Open pro ski race, and the remainder will be placed in the Parks and Recreation Department budget.

That should end the grumbling about the money sitting in the bank instead of being spent for its intended purpose. It may be replaced by grumbling about HOW the council proposes to spend the money, but the plan sounds good to us.

The state statute on lodgers' tax specifies parks and recreation as an acceptable use of that revenue. In addition to improving the quality of life for residents, recreational facilities help attract visitors.

Parks and rec director Pam Graves described how a softball tournament with out of town teams participating can bring in over \$16,000 in a single weekend.

With the village on the threshold of an agreement with the schools on land for a recreational complex, \$40,000 in lodgers' tax money to fund the project will come in the nick of time.

The council and the Parks and Recreation Department are to be commended for substantial progress in a short time.—TP

Well, my internship with The Ruidoso News is over, and I have to return to the hot flatlands of Texas in one short week.

But I'll take back some great memories to keep me occupied during bored moments in classes at Baylor or during bored days in unexciting Waco, Texas.

This job, besides being great experience, has given me a chance to explore Ruidoso and New Mexico and meet many interesting people.
